### E! sets premiere date for 'Kardashians'

## At no point did we invite Trump: Last Week Tonight

LOS ANGELES, Nov 2, (RTRS): John Oliver's "Last Week Tonight" and Donald Trump have found themselves in a back-and-forth.

After Oliver said Friday that he has no interest in having the Republican presidential candidate on his HBO show, Trump fired back on Saturday, claiming that "Last Week Tonight" did in fact call and ask him to be on the show.

"John Oliver had his people call to ask me to be on his very boring and low rated show," he wrote. "I said 'No thanks' Waste of time & energy!"

"Last Week Tonight," however, wouldn't let Trump have the last word. On Sunday, the show wrote on its Twitter account, "At no point did we invite Donald Trump," linking to Trump's tweet.

The debacle started when Oliver said on "CBS This Morning" on Friday that he doesn't "really care about him in any capacity," speaking about Trump. Oliver maintained that Trump "said everything he has to say."

Oliver has yet to interview any 2016 presidential candidate on his show. This is hardly the first smackdown Trump has had with the media. Trump announced a boycott of Fox News in September, claiming the network had treated him "unfairly," only to end it five days later with an interview with Bill O'Reilly.

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**Premiere Dates:**  
E!'s first family, the Kardashians, will return for Season 11 of their reality show "Keeping Up With the Kardashians" on Nov 15 at 9:00 pm. Leading up to the new season's premiere, the cable net will air a special "Keeping Up: The Kardashians Rewind" on Nov 1, plus two additional "KUWTK" specials, which are set for Dec 1 and Dec 8.

**Holiday specials:**  
Pitbull will return to Fox on New Years Eve for the second annual "Pitbull's New Year's Revolution." Live from Miami, the Dec. 31 show will ring in 2016, counting down to midnight with some of the biggest names in music, plus performances by Pitbull himself. Last year's special featured Enrique Iglesias, The Band Perry and Becky G., among other musical guests.

The CW is also getting into the holiday spirit, lineup up this year's seasonal programming, which will be anchored by the Hollywood Christmas Parade, some animated perennial favorites and iHeartRadio's concert event with Calvin Harris.

The specials on CW kick off on Nov 24 with the one-hour "Greatest Holiday Commercials Countdown," and the next night (Thanksgiving Eve) will feature the 1987 Steve Martin-John Candy feature film "Planes, Trains and Automobiles."

Nov 27 is a night of all-animated classics with the hourlong "Grandma Got Run Over by a Reindeer," followed by half-hours "Kung Fu Panda Holiday" and "Merry Madagascar." On Dec 11, CW will broadcast the "84th Annual Hollywood Christmas Parade" with Penn & Teller serving as Grand Marshalls for the Hollywood Boulevard parade, which will be co-hosted by Erik Estrada, Laura McKenzie, Dean Cain and Montel Williams. The 90-minute "iHeartRadio Jingle Ball," featuring Harris, Selena Gomez and more from Madison Square Garden in New York, is set for Dec 17. And on Christmas Eve, the animated "Mr. Magoo's Christmas Carol" will air in the 8 o'clock hour.

**Casting News:**  
"Gotham" has added two new roles, Variety has confirmed. "Law & Order: SVU" alum **BD Wong** will recur as Hugo Strange, and **Kristen Hager** ("Being Human," "Masters") will play Mr. Freeze's wife Nora Fries. Both are based on the DC Comics characters.

Strange is a brilliant psychiatrist hired to run Gotham's Arkham Asylum. His devotion to rehabilitating Gotham's most notorious villains makes him appear altruistic, but he harbors a dark secret, and soon reveals himself as Gotham's greatest threat: a man whose obsession with pushing the limits of the human mind and body has translated into secretly conducting horrifying experiments for Indian Hill, Wayne Enterprises black-ops program dedicated to creating the ultimate super human — or super villain.

Hager, whose casting was first reported by Zap2it.com, will play the terminally ill wife of super villain Victor Fries (**Nathan Darrow**, "House of Cards"). Thanks to her smarts, sincerity and a lighthearted sensibility, Nora the only person who's managed to connect with the otherwise emotionally cold cryogenicist. As her condition worsens and her husband becomes more desperate to save her life, she must make the ultimate choice: play the willing participant in Victor's mad plan or sacrifice herself to stop the monster inside of him.

### Adult medical devices in youngsters up safety questions

## Move to spur pint-sized devices to treat kids

WASHINGTON, Nov 2, (AP): Improve isn't a word parents want to hear from their child's doctor. Yet pediatric specialists too often have to jury-rig care because many of the medical devices needed to treat sick children were built for adults.

Part of the problem is size. Doctors fixed Alice de Pooter's faltering heartbeat by wedging an adult pacemaker into a baby's body. But the device's large battery bulged so badly under her rib cage that she struggled to sit upright until her first birthday.

It's also an engineering problem. Children aren't just miniature adults; their bodies are growing and changing. When adult devices haven't been formally studied in children, using them in youngsters can raise safety questions.

"It affects patient care. We need to find a resolution," Dr Matthew Oetgen, chief of orthopedic surgery and sports medicine at Children's National Health System, said at a recent grants competition at the Washington hospital hosted to help spur development of innovative pediatric devices.

There's little financial incentive to create and test pint-sized devices because children overall are healthier than adults and make up a fraction of the treatment market.

### Demand

But families are starting to demand solutions.

A birth defect left Miyah Williams with one leg missing at mid thigh. The prosthetic leg she received as a toddler came with such a painful, sweat- and sore-inducing socket — a rigid cup connecting the leg to her thigh — that she refused to wear it. Her mother eventually found a small San Francisco company willing to design a softer, adjustable socket able to grow some as Miyah does.

Miyah, now 3, dances to show off a leg finally comfortable enough to wear all day.

"She told them earlier today that her bone no longer hurts," Tamara Williams of Fayetteville, North Carolina, said of manufacturer LIM Innovations. "They made her a socket that changed her life."

The industry acknowledges medical devices designed specifically for children often lag five years to 10 years behind new technology for adults, and Food and Drug Administration statistics illustrate the disparity. In 2013, eight of the 38 novel or higher-risk devices the FDA approved were labeled for use by patients younger than 22. In 2014, six of 33 such device approvals were for pediatric use; so were two devices for rare disorders allowed to sell under a special fast-tracking program.

Consider pacemakers. Children account for only about 1 percent of pacemaker implants, said Dr Charles Berul, co-director of Children's National Heart Institute. Adult pacemakers such as the biventricular version implanted into Alice de Pooter

## Brazil, world leader in cosmetic surgery

### 1 man goes under knife every 2 minutes

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov 2, (AFP): Once taboo, cosmetic surgery for Brazilian men is advancing at a rapid pace, with one male going under the knife every two minutes, experts said in an article Sunday.

Plastic surgery quadrupled among men from 72,000 to 276,000 operations annually from 2009 to 2014, a study by the Brazilian Society of Plastic Surgery said.

That's an average of 31.5 operations per hour, according to an article on the study in the newspaper Estado de Sao Paulo.

The main reason for the change is

cultural, with a lowering of bias against men undergoing these procedures, S.P Luiz Henrique Ishida, director of SBCP, told Estado.

"Additionally, in Brazil, cosmetic surgery is seen as a popular process and the country is a world leader in this field," he added.

Last year, 712,902 cosmetic procedures were performed across the country, with participation by men climbing from 12 percent of the total in 2009 to 22.5 percent in 2014.

The most popular operation for males is breast reduction with 80 percent of surgeries performed on

adolescents, followed by liposuction and eyelid procedures, according to SBCP.

Most patients are between the age of 20 and 50, but a larger portion of seniors still in the workforce may be contributing to the rise.

"A tired look is seen as a negative thing in the labor market," said the director of SBCP, which comprises some 5,800 surgeons.

"There are patients who are 70 who have operations because they have an active social life or to appear more compatible with their partner" who is younger, he said.

when she was 4 months old can save lives, but improvising has drawbacks, he said.

Adults typically have a pacemaker's electrical leads, or wires, easily threaded into the heart through a vein, but babies require open-chest surgery attaching them to the outside of the heart, explained Berul, Alice's longtime cardiologist. Faster child heartbeats wear out the batteries more rapidly, and the leads can stretch out of place as tots grow.

Now 3 and living near Houston, Alice has a well-functioning heart and while the battery's outline remains visible in her belly, "she's running and happy," said her mother, Charlotte Vanheusden.

Manufacturers are developing a tiny

wireless pacemaker for adults. If it works, Berul hopes eventually that could be adapted for children, too. Meanwhile, he's developing a less invasive way to place today's wires in tots, with aid from a tiny camera normally used in the urinary tract.

It's an example of partnerships between doctors and bioengineers that are springing up at numerous children's hospitals and universities, sparked in part by 2007 legislation establishing an FDA program with a small budget to help fund early pediatric device development. This year, the FDA awarded \$3.5 million to eight such consortia around the U.S. Some experts argue

more far-reaching incentives are needed, such as tax credits and patent exclusivity that in recent years have spurred an increase in medications for rare diseases.

Another incentive: Make a device that works first in kids, and "absolutely there will be benefit for the adult population. It's not as easy the other way around," said Dr Vasum Peiris, FDA's new chief medical officer for pediatric devices.

Doctors point to some successes. The Berlin Heart child-sized implantable pump was approved through a special FDA program in 2011 to help children survive the wait for a heart transplant, an option long available for adults.
