'Fuel subsidy cuts will harm low income, migrant workers'

Wage reforms needed: poll

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 23: In this week's Arab Times online poll, readers weighed in on the issue of fuel subsidy reform in Kuwait with the majority of voters expressing concern that it would severely affect low income and migrant workers.

In 2014, close to KD 4 billion, that constitutes 18% of government expenditures, accounts for 15% of oil revenues and 7.5 8 % of GDP, was spent on subsidies. But 35% of voters were not in favour of a fuel subsidy reform as it would lay a heavy burden on low income and migrant workers and another 20% voiced concerns that the increase in fuel prices would have a big impact on inflation.

The cost of living in Kuwait is high today even for expatriate families that have double incomes because rents have escalated, commodity prices have increased and expense for even essential services has soared. I can't imagine the effect raising the price of petrol would have on the disposable income of families here", a voter shared

"I think the government should work towards wage reform if they want to remove fuel subsidy. Otherwise, how will low income workers cope with this?", another reader commented.

Another 15% felt that the removal of the fuel subsidy is not logical because government itself is a major producer and 10% of respondents felt that the government should explore alternative sources of energy that are more sustainable in the long run.

"I think the government should be exploring alternative energy sources now, the air quality in Kuwait is really appalling. We need a energy solution with low carbon

emissions", a respondent shared.
Only 8% were in favour of subsidy reform, pointing to the fall in oil prices. Several projections indicate that the price of oil will stay below \$70 for the next five years and there are fears that Kuwait's national budget, after accounting for transfers to the Fund for Future Generations, will move into a substantial deficit and the current account surplus will decline sharply.

5% hoped that it would curb overconsumption and increase efficiency. Petrol prices in Kuwait are 66% below US prices before taxes in 2015 and below the GCC average by 20%. The per capita consumption amounts to 10 tonnes of oil equivalent, while the world average is 4 tonnes. Kuwait is thus the 6th largest consumer on the per capita basis in a survey of 67 countries. Moreover, the growth of energy consumption is close to 1% per annum while in most developed countries, it is negative.

"If you look at Kuwaiti society at both individual and industrial levels, there is over consumptions of resources, be it gas, electricity or water. We aren't driving cars that are fuel efficient, we are not using production processes that are efficient. There is a lot of waste and we need to change our attitude", a concerned individual shared.

Another 7% of voters were dismissive of fuel subsidy reform as there was no guarantee that the money will not be used inefficiently or exploited by corrupt leaders.

"I think removing the fuel subsidy will create a lot of resentment among the people in Kuwait because there is no assurance that the revenues gained from removing the subsidy would not be misused", a reader pointed out.

Expat dies in lift shaft fall

A European died when he fell down the ele-

vator shaft —from the sixth to the first floor
— inside a building in Maidan Hawally.
In a press statement, Kuwait Fire
Service Directorate (KFSD) revealed a rescue team from Salmiya Fire Center rushed to the location after receiving information on the incident.

It has been reported that the rescue operation lasted for two hours and the team had to use a special machine in getting the victim's remains from the elevator

A case was registered and investigations are ongoing to determine circumstances leading to the European's death.

Meanwhile, Mina Abdullah firefighters extinguished the fire that engulfed a water tanker in Mina Abdullah. The firefighters rushed to the location

after receiving a distress call and they were able to prevent the fire from spreading to other vehicles near the tanker. No casualties or injuries were reported

while investigations are underway to determine the actual cause of fire.

'Beware fire incidents': Public Relations and Media Department Director at

Kuwait Fire Service Directorate (KFSD) Colonel Khalil Al-Amir has warned about recurring incidents during Eid holidays like children playing with fireworks or using elevators alone, indicating such acts might

endanger their lives. He instructed all fire centers to be ready to deal with fire incidents and prevent fire not only during holidays but all the time. He also advised parents and owners of real estate properties to ensure that elevators are well maintained and functioning to prevent accidents. He pointed out there are



standards and specifications that should be followed in the installation and maintenance of elevators.

Position misused: Personnel from the Residence Affairs Department are trying to

identify a female employee working at one of the Citizen's Service Offices for granting residence permit to an Indian on the sponsorship of a citizen without his knowledge, reports Al-Rai daily.

The citizen was shocked when he found

the Indian under his sponsorship since February 2015. Police are also looking for the Indian.

Couple in trouble: The patrolmen affiliated to the Nugra Police Station have arrested a Kuwaiti woman for driving against the flow of traffic and not possessing identification documents, reports Al-Rai daily.

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 23: Two drivers, one of them Asian, died on the spot following a head-on collision reports Al-

Anba daily.

The accident took place in Jahra.

Both men were trapped inside the wreck of their trucks and police had to seek the firemen to cut through the metal and pull out the remains.

Meanwhile, the corpse of an unidentified Asian has been referred to Forensics to identify the cause of death, reports Al-Anba daily.

The victim was found dead on a street in Maidan Hawally. Police have not ruled out murder.

Initial reports show the suspect had died 15 hours before his corpse was

daily.


The arrest came after the father filed a complaint with the Taima Police Station accusing the barber of raping
