Ambassador 'hails' Kuwait reconstruction aid for Gaza

CAIRO, June 10, (KUNA): The Palestinian ambassador to Egypt on Thursday said he was grateful for Kuwait's support to push reconstruction efforts in the Gaza Strip, after Israeli bombardments caused large-scale damage across the coastal enclave.

Aid from the wider Arab region has flowed into Gaza since the end of the worst violence there in years, Diab Al-Lawah said amid Cairo-hosted talks over reconstruction plans in Gaza, which bore the brunt of "Israel's systematic acts of destruction.

Much of the city's infrastructure now lies in tatters, the diplomat emphasized, saying it would take years to rebuild the damage and restore conditions in place before the latest violence broke out.

The aid Gaza is set to receive would spark positive ripple effects on living conditions in the city, helping lower soaring unemployment rates which reached over 50 percent, added the Palestinian envoy.

On the talks involving Palestinian leaders and Egyptian officials in the capital Cairo that aim to solidify a truce with Israel, he said an end to Israel's "abusive practices" is the proviso needed to push for construc-

Iran sends warships to Atlantic

An Iranian destroyer and support vessel are now sailing in the Atlantic Ocean in a rare mission far from the Islamic Republic, Iran's state TV reported on Thursday, without offering the vessels' final destination.

The trip by the new domestically built destroyer Sahand and the intelligence-gathering vessel Makran comes amid U.S. media reports, citing anonymous American officials, saying the ships were bound for Venezuela. The Associated Press could not immediately confirm the ships' destination.

The vessels departed last month from Iran's southern port of Bandar Abbas, said Adm. Habibollah Sayyari, Iran's deputy army chief. He described their mission as the Iranian navy's longest and most

challenging voyage yet, without elaborating.
Iranian state TV released a short clip of the destroyer cruising through the Atlantic's rough seas. The video likely was shot from the Makran, a converted commercial oil tanker with a mobile launch

"The Navy is improving its seafaring capacity and proving its long-term durability in unfavorable seas and the Atlantic's unfavorable weather conditions," Sayyari said, adding that the warships would not call at any country's port during the mission. (AP)

Biden embraces Arab-Israeli deals

BAGHDAD: An Iraqi militia commander whose arrest last month sparked a standoff between the government and paramilitary groups was freed Wednesday after a judge ordered his release.

The release of **Qassim Mahmoud Musleh** came as Iranian Gen Esmail Ghaani, head of the expeditionary Quds Force, arrived in Baghdad to meet with militia and political leaders, two Shiite political officials said.

The officials said the meeting was to address ongoing tensions between the government and some militia groups linked to Iran following Musleh's arrest. The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak to media. (AP)

TEHRAN: Iran's leading presidential candidate staged a mass rally in the country's southeast that drew thousands of supporters, sparking controversy Thursday as the first such gathering amid the raging coronavirus pandemic that has largely halted traditional election campaign-

Ebrahim Raisi, Iran's hardline judiciary chief, toured the oil-rich southwestern Khuzestan province and addressed some 5,000 supporters at a sprawling football stadium in the city of Ahvaz late on Wednesday. Despite the rising infection count and scorching temperatures of 45 degrees Celsius (113 degrees Fahrenheit), roaring crowds mobbed the stadium to hear Raisi speak. (AP)

CAIRO: Sudan and Egypt renewed calls Wednesday for the international community to help in resolving their decade-long dispute with Ethiopia over a giant dam that Addis Ababa is building on the Blue Nile, the

main tributary of the Nile River. Egyptian foreign and irrigation ministers flew to Sudan's capital, Khartoum, for talks with Sudanese counterparts focusing on Ethiopia's dam project. (AP)

Lawmaker messages Amir

KUWAIT CITY, June 10: MP Muhannad Al-Sayer has conveyed a message to His Highness the Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah regarding the current situation in the country.

In a press statement, Al-Sayer addressed HH the Amir saying, "We, your children, came to the National Assembly according to the results of the 2020 parliamentary elections; during which the citizens conveyed their message and presented solutions to their problems. Your Highness, I am sure you cannot accept deterioration in various fields, including the public institutions; especially the legislative authority. I am fully aware that Your Highness will never accept the fact that around 800 citizens are living in exile and more than 30,000 are on the waiting list for jobs; while a large number are waiting to obtain houses because some influential persons are taking advantage of the situation to increase rental fees. Your Highness, we as MPs, presented solutions. We submitted bills and proposals to His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khalid who promised to include them in the agenda of the first session; but he did not fulfill his promise.

'Your Highness, we are witnessing a political crisis and it is unacceptable to allow certain people to transform the Assembly into a formal institution. There will be no reform in dealing with vital issues like health, education and economy without implementing political reform. The alliance between HH the Prime Minister and Assembly Speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanim has totally disrupted the work of the legislative authority. The future generation will condemn us if we allow or participate in the transformation of the Assembly into a formal institution.

'Not even one MP aims to dissolve the Assembly. On the contrary, MPs are keen on working hard and be a reflection of the citizens' views. Your Highness, whether we stay in the Assembly now or later, we will not allow anyone to use us as dolls to attack the Assembly.

"Your Highness, Kuwait has been witnessing an unprecedented era of stability and political calmness since 2013; but this led to stealing of public funds, deterioration of performance in all institutions, and squandering of the State budget. More than KD47 billion vanished from the Public Reserve Fund."



His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Sabah Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah received at Seif Palace on Thursday India's External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar, who delivered a letter from his Prime Minister Narendra Modi addressed to His Highness the Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah. The encounter was held with the attendance of Kuwait's Foreign Minister Sheikh Dr Ahmad Nasser Al-Mohammad

Al-Sabah, amongst other Ku-waiti officials. Kuwait's foreign minister hailed the 'depth' of his country's ties with India, saying bilateral relations remain on an upward trajectory. Against the backdrop of the 60th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic ties, the Kuwaiti foreign minister. amid talks with his Indian counterpart S. Jaishankar, said relations have made tremendous progress across numerous fields. (AP)

WASHINGTON, June 10, (AP): The Biden administration is laying the groundwork for a renewed push to encourage more Arab countries to sign accords with Israel and working to strengthen existing deals after last month's devastating war in the Gaza Strip interrupted those diplomatic efforts.

The embrace of the so-called Abraham Accords is a rare carryover of a signature Trump administration policy by President Joe Biden and other Democrats.

The Trump administration put U.S. clout and incentives into landing the country-by-country pacts by four Arab states last year, easing enmity and isolation for the Jewish state in the Middle East that had dated back to Israel's 1948 founding. The Biden administration saw significant prospects of several other Arab governments signing accords soothing and normalizing relations with Israel, U.S. officials have declined to publicly identify the countries they regard as promising prospects.

Sudan, which signed a general declaration of peaceful intent but has not yet signed on to diplomatic relations with Israel, had been a prospect. Oman, which has a policy of non-interference that allows it to be a broker across the Middle East's fault lines, long has been seen by Westerners as a likely contender.

But the 11-day war between Israel and Gaza's Hamas militant rulers last month has complicated U.S.-backed diplomacy for new Abraham accords.

The fighting "has strengthened the conviction of opponents of normalization" with Israel, activist Doura Gambo said in Sudan. Sudanese were already divided over their government's agreement last year to become one of the four Arab states signing accords. In Sudan's case, the Trump administration offered financial relief from U.S. sanctions.

Last month's bloodshed, which killed 254 Palestinians including 66 children and at least 22 members of one family - resonated deeply with the Arab public, including in the other countries that had signed accords with Israel: the United Arab Emirates. Bahrain and Morocco. Thirteen people died in Israel, including two children and one soldier.

Okays on Astra

KUWAIT CITY, June 10, (Agencies): În line with the recent decision of the Cabinet on the resumption of direct flights to Britain -- one flight for each licensed airline -- starting from June 13, Jazeera Airways announced that its direct flight to London will resume on June 18 with one flight per week (every Friday), reports Al-Qabas daily quoting sources.

Sources added Kuwait Airways Corporation intend to resume its direct flight to London on June 17, affirming that the agencies operating at Kuwait International Airport have laid down a plan for the resumption of flights to a number of travel destinations this summer.

Sources pointed out that Kuwaitis, who travel abroad for studies and medical treatment, will benefit a lot from the decision. Sources said if British airlines decides to request for the resumption of flights, it will be granted an operating license as per the decision of the Council of Ministers.

Sources clarified that the resumption of commercial flights to London does not mean the expatriates are now allowed to enter the country, as the circular of the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) on preventing non-Kuwaitis from entering the country remains in effect.

Approval

On the other hand, sources confirmed that DGCA granted operational approval to a number of airlines to resume including Kyrgyzstan, Georgia, Sarajevo and Uzbekistan among others.

Kuwait Olympic Committee announced resumption, as of Thursday, of all sport activities for all ages in local clubs in sport association after a halt for more than 15 months due to the coronavirus pandemic.

However, sport clubs and associations must comply with Ministry of Health's measures to ensure safety of players, the committee said in a statement. The committee urged the

clubs and association to ensure wellbeing of players of all ages in order to make sure smooth preparations for the next season.

The Ministry of Health announced it has adopted measures to possibly valuate the antibodies of the emerging corona virus (Covid-19) within a specific data that has been approved and not to evaluate or measure the number of antibodies after vaccination.

The ministry said in a press statement some of these analyses detect different types of IgG-IgM antibodies, so they do not have the ability to detect special antibodies resulting from vaccination. In a related context, the min-

istry said the Oxford vaccine, which is produced in Russia, is licensed and approved by the AstraZeneca company and that the manufacturing process and all procedures are under its supervision because it is the licensing company.

With regard to the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine, the ministry stated that it has received the third batch of the vaccine after the results of its samples matched the technical specifications and ensured that they were stored in accordance with the approved temperatures and storage conditions.

The sources confirmed the effectiveness of the first dose of the Oxford vaccine increases with the extended period of the second dose to more than 12 weeks, as indicated by scientific studies and realistic statistics.
