

In a statement, Kuwait's Ministry of Foreign Affairs conveyed its deep sympathy and solidarity with Iran, offering condolences and wishing a speedy recovery to those injured in the catastrophe.

The explosion, which occurred at Bandar Abbas port in Hormozgan, has claimed at least 18 lives, with over 800 others injured, according to Iranian officials. The blast, believed to have been caused by the detonation of several containers, has left ongoing efforts by firefighters to control the fire.

Jordan missed key international gains due to 'Muslim Brotherhood'

JORDANIAN security authorities quietly dismantled a subversive network affiliated with the Muslim Brotherhood Group, according to Interior Minister Mazen Faraya. He stated that the plot aimed to undermine the constitutional structure and the very existence of the Kingdom of Jordan.

This stance by the Muslim Brotherhood is not out of context, but rather a continuation of the group's broader destabilizing agenda - one that began in 2011 and has played out across several countries including Tunisia, Egypt, Libya, Yemen, and Syria.

This attitude by the Muslim Brotherhood is not an isolated occurrence; rather, it marks a new chapter in the group's ongoing campaign of chaos that began in 2011, starting from Tunisia, Egypt, Libya, Yemen, Syria, and beyond.

Throughout its history, the Muslim Brotherhood Group has been widely known throughout the Arab world for its attempts to undermine national security in pursuit of controlling one Arab country, using it as a springboard to influence others. The group exploited the Mohamed Bouazizi incident in Tunisia to fuel public outrage and transform it into a full-blown revolution that ultimately led to the overthrow of the regime.

That single spark was enough to topple several regimes, most notably in Egypt, the cornerstone of Arab national security.

The 1952 coup in Egypt is another example, as it served as a gateway for regime changes throughout the Arab world and ushered in waves of regional instability. Time and again, the same justification was used: defending the Palestinian issue and liberating Palestine.

Many innocent people were misled by these lies,

Muslim Brotherhood's relationship with the West and the various services it provided in exchange for the West's control over the resources of the Arab world. As a result, when the Gulf states began to approach the Muslim Brotherhood with caution, especially after the scandal involving the "Kuwaiti Brotherhood" and their power grab during the Iraqi invasion, it marked the first step toward liberating the region from the grip of this evil group.

Subsequently, some Gulf countries decided to ban the Muslim Brotherhood and classify it as a terrorist group. Over the past few years, Jordan has found itself at the center of the storm, particularly after the so-called "Al-Aqsa Flood," which brought widespread destruction to Gaza and the West Bank and resulted in the deaths of thousands.

It was a clear attempt to undermine the Palestinian cause and obstruct the two-state solution, which was on the verge of being realized. The discovery of the Brotherhood's chaotic cell in Jordan is the result of relentless efforts by the government, particularly King Abdullah II, to prevent the Kingdom from becoming a battleground for regional disputes. This was notably reflected in the revelation of a direct connection between the Muslim Brotherhood, Iranian-backed militias and Hezbollah, as well as Hamas's quick request for Amman to release the members of the cell.

This reveals the new face of the Muslim Brotherhood's long-standing agenda. Jordan serves as a strategic link in the region, and it is widely understood that there have been ongoing attempts to destabilize the country in order to gain access to the Gulf states. This is especially significant since the 1994 Wadi Araba Agreement, which was primarily designed to establish an economic and industrial zone through a US-Jordanian-Israeli partnership, thus opening the door to Arab North Africa and the rest of the Middle East. Over the years, the Muslim Brotherhood has consistently attempted to disrupt any progress in this regard by using its MPs to block the ratification of laws aimed at strengthening Jordan's economy and development, or by agitating the Jordanian street.

Blocking the bad, securing the good

Kuwait sets internet tariffs, enforces privacy standards

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: While the Communications and Information Technology Regulatory Authority (CITRA) set the monthly tariff and rental value for international transit circuits for internet services, it required all licensed telecommunications and internet companies to connect their networks to its internet and communications portal in accordance with its privacy protection standards.

CITRA confirmed in a decision issued by acting

Chairman Sheikh Athbi Jaber Al-Sabah, that through this decision, it can regulate and supervise the telecommunications sector, advance it, protect the interests of users, and ensure that licensed companies take all the necessary technical measures to block materials, websites, programs or other contents proven to have violated the laws of Kuwait, or anything which affects public order and public morals.

The newspaper obtained a copy of the decision, stating that "the monthly tariff for transit circuits in Kuwait for a 10G capacity circuit will be rented at KD458 and KD1,832 for a 100G capacity circuit.'

Kuwait, Tunisia sign key air transport deal

TUNIS, April 27, (KUNA): Head of Kuwait's Directorate General of Civil Aviation Sheikh Humoud Al-Sabah and his Tunisian counterpart Nidal Suwailem fully signed on Saturday an agreement on regulating air transport between the two countries.

The deal was signed in the presence of Tunisia's transport minister Rashid Ameri, and Kuwait's Ambassador to Tunisia Mansour Al-Omar and the embassy's members.

The agreement seeks to boost collaboration between Tunisia and Kuwait in civil aviation field and air linkage as well as aviation safety and security, and develop air services.

Speaking to KUNA in a statement, Sheikh Humoud said the deal is part of a series of agreements to be signed with some sisterly and friendly countries in the future to meet legal and technical measures, in line with the agreed-upon deals with countries

It aims to support Kuwait's plan for wider horizons of cooperation with countries to serve the State's promising future vision and help activate tourism and aviation generally, he added.

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: The Public Authority for Food and Nutrition

(PAFN) will launch a new fee list for its services, along with a list of trans and hydrogenated fats. This is aimed to balance the prices and value

of services pro-Dr. Al-Asfour while supporting the

government's efforts to rationalize and reduce consumption of these services.

Deputy Director and official spokesperson of PAFN Dr. Shaima Al-Asfour confirmed in an interview with the daily that PAFN is taking serious steps to implement the Smart Inspector Program and risk-based inspections to support the digitization of PAFN's services and help achieve faster, more efficient completion of transactions.

Al-Asfour said the revised school canteen regulations are nearing approval after being submitted to the Fatwa and Legislation Department for final approval, adding that the amendments will include provisions for private schools and accreditation for companies supplying school food.

At the start of the interview, Al-Asfour highlighted the Board of Directors' decision to raise the prices of 76 services in three sectors to reflect the global increase in prices. The following are the details of the interview:

May conference to attract global experts

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: The Sustainable Energy Conference will be held in Kuwait from May 11-13; under the auspices of Minister of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy Dr. Subaih Al-Mukhaizeem.

Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Regional Center for Renewable Energy and Energy Efficiency (RCREEE) and Director of the Renewable Energy Department Ahmed Al-Dosari said the conference will be held in conjunction with Kuwait's presidency of the Board of Trustees of the center.

Interested parties from the local and international arenas are expected to attend the conference, whose main objective is to ease the transition to sustainable energy sources in line with the 2035 Kuwait Vision.

In a press conference, Al-Dosari disclosed that the abovementioned conference aims to fortify collaboration among Arab nations and the Mediterranean region in research, development and technology exchange fields related to renewable energy, energy efficiency, sustainable energy and environmental technology.

He pointed out that the conference will raise awareness and foster innovation concerning the significance of transitioning to renewable and sustainable energy sources and their impact on economic advancement.

Drugs and Major General Fahd Al-Rasheed

IN response to the government's growing concern over the imminent threat of drugs, particularly to young people, and the rising number of drug defendants escaping conviction due to procedural errors or legal loopholes, the First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior Sheikh Fahd Yousef Al-Sabah has decided to form a committee headed by Counselor Mohammed Al-Duaij.

This committee will work on drafting a law aimed at dealing with the gaps in current drugrelated legislation, keeping pace with the rapid developments in the methods of committing these crimes, and closing existing procedural loopholes.

The committee has finalized the draft law, with notable amendments including the establishment of a Supreme Council for Combating Drugs and Intoxicants, chaired

by the Prime Minister. This council will be responsible for submitting an annual report to His Highness the Amir, detailing developments in the fight against drugs.

The amendments also include expanding the death penalty for drug and intoxicant traffickers and imposing hefty fines, potentially amounting to millions of Kuwaiti dinars.

Furthermore, the law mandates medical examinations for individuals applying for marriage, driving licenses, weapons licenses, and public jobs to ensure they are free from drugs and intoxicants.

In addition, all military personnel, regardless of rank, in the Ministry of Interior, Ministry of Defense, National Guard, and Kuwait Fire Force, as well as school and university students, will be subject to medical examinations to detect drug use. Those refusing the exam without justification will face up to four years in prison.

Penalties have also been increased for drug use in prisons, schools, or sports clubs. Doctors who prescribe psyface imprisonment. Pharmacies that negligently handle psychotropic substances will be fined KD 100,000 and may face years of suspension.

Sheikh Fahd Yousef Al-Sabah made a commendable decision in forming this committee and issuing the recommended amendments. However, several areas should be given attention for a more comprehensive approach. These are:

1. It is important to include the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Information, and religious institutions in community awareness campaigns about the dangers of drugs

2. There should be explicit and implicit warnings about the dangers of drugs incorporated into school curricula

3. Agencies should be appointed to monitor youth behavior and address psychological issues early on. Serious consideration should also be given to revisiting the ban on consuming certain prohibited items.

4. There needs to be an expansion of the professional and consistent use of social media to raise awareness about the catastrophic dangers of drugs.

5. Special attention should be given to the rehabilitation of minor offenders, as research shows they are at a higher risk of becoming major criminals in the future.

6. Lawyers should be prohibited from publicly announcing their success in acquitting clients, particularly in drug-related cases and especially after First Instance Court rulings.

7. It is essential that security personnel conduct their duties without abuse when dealing with suspects. There must be a balance between protecting public interest and upholding human rights. Adequate training and qualification of police officers and security personnel in police sciences and procedural law are vital.

Drugs enter the country through various channels. Aside from the security forces, the only civilian entity responsible for combating drug smuggling is the General Administration of Customs. Despite its important role, the General Administration of Customs has not been led by a competent head in recent years. Therefore, we welcome the appointment of Major General Fahd Mohammed Ali Al-Rasheed as Director General of the vital administration, along with his Deputy for Investigation and Research Saleh Mohammed Al-Omar. Both are renowned for their integ rity, excellent qualities, and decisiveness.

He mentioned other goals like attracting local and inter-national investments in renewable energy, providing an interactive platform for the exchange of ideas, and bolstering cooperation between the public and private sectors.

'Capital of Arab Culture and Media 2025' celebrations

Exploring Kuwait's cultural roots at intellectual symposium on pre-oil era

KUWAIT CITY, April 27, (KUNA): The intellectual symposium titled "Culture in Kuwait before Oil" kicked off on Sunday as part of the celebrations of "Kuwait as the Capital of Arab Culture and Media 2025," under the patronage of Minister of Information and Culture and Minister of State for Youth Affairs Abdulrahman Al-Mutairi. The symposium aims to shed light on the historical roots of Kuwait in the pre-oil era.

In his opening speech at the symposium, held at the Movenpick Hotel in Al-Bidaa, Secretary General of the National Council for Culture, Arts and Letters (NC-CAL) Dr. Mohammad Al-Jassar said that the choice of the conference topic stems from the firm belief that understanding our cultural present can only be achieved by returning to its authentic roots, which were formed during a very important phase of our national history.

He stressed that highlighting the pre-oil era is important, as it represents the founding stage that witnessed the birth of the first features of the Kuwaiti cultural identity, with all its dimensions. This era also marked the golden age of societal interaction, which created authentic cultural forms such as diwaniyas, councils, and scientific and literary clubs.

Dr. Al-Jassar emphasized that this period embodied the Kuwaiti people's ability to innovate despite scarce resources, confirming that "culture was and remains our true wealth."

He also explained that studying this historical era is doubly important today because it documents the national cultural memory, presents a model for cultural communi-

cation, contributes to strengthening a sense of belonging among new generations, and enriches the dialogue on the role of culture in sustainable development.

He added, "We at the National Council for Culture, Arts and Letters believe that culture is the true guarantor of sustainable development, and that interest in our

pre-oil heritage is not a regurgitation of the past, but rather an anticipation of the future through understanding the foundations of our modern renaissance."

Al-Jassar emphasized that Kuwait's celebration of the title of Arab Capital of Culture this year is not just a passing event, but rather "a recognition of our pioneering role in the Arab cultural scene," indicating that this symposium confirms that Kuwait's selection did not come from nowhere, but rather is the culmination of a long-standing cultural journey that began decades before the discovery of oil.

For her part, Assistant Secretary-General for the Culture Sector at the Council, Aisha Al-Mahmoud, said in a press statement that the symposium represents an important dialogue platform, noting that the symposium's proceedings will be issued by the Council later in a documentary book.

The symposium program includes six morning and evening intellectual sessions over two days, with the participation of an elite group of academics and thinkers from Kuwait and the Arab world, who will address integrated themes including cultural history, social role, economy, education, identity, and other factors that shaped Kuwaiti culture before the major economic transformation.

The intellectual symposium will also be accompanied by a miniature exhibition of traditional handicrafts from the pre-oil period, such as Al-Sadu and Al-Qallaf (shipbuilding), as well as a corner for the Council's periodical publications and Al-Arabi magazine.

"WHEN the Ministry of Interior announced the new traffic law four months ago and set a deadline for its full implementation for all road users, the goal was not to collect fines, but to protect citizens from the devastating consequences of traffic accidents, ranging from loss of life to serious injuries", columnist Ali Jaber Al-Ahmad wrote for Al-Seyassah daily.

"This measure is necessary for ensuring the safety of our roads and eliminating reckless drivers, provided that all motorists adhere to the law,

which is designed to protect their lives and property. "Meanwhile,

if it were logical and humane, I would address the respected officials at the Ministry of who Interior,

have

leniency in recent years towards residency law violators, and offered them ample time to rectify their status due to their financial circumstances.

"Would His Excellency the First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior, out of compassion for road users, consider exempting them from fines for the first two weeks after the law's implementation, taking into account factors like age and forgetfulness, and allow individuals to correct their mistakes without penalty? By doing so, the ministry could remove the justifications of violators, and offer them a four-month grace period before the law takes full effect and a two-week exemption period after its enforcement.

"Furthermore, on the median strip of Khaled Yousef Al-Marzouq Street, which separates South and North Shuwaikh, we see many palm trees planted in tight proximity to each other, an act intended as a generous donation from the area's residents. However, even the most novice gardener would recognize the issue with this planting method.

"Who, or what group, approved this ill-conceived arrangement of palm trees so close together? Where is the common sense in this decision, which doesn't even require the expertise of engineers? Is the Public Authority for Agriculture Affairs and Fish Resources aware of this situation? If they are aware, we urge the government to intervene, cancel the current arrangement, and repurpose the space for residential plots to be distributed to citizens. If they are not aware, we strongly recommend this proposal be considered.

"O God, protect Kuwait and its people from all evil and harm.'

"This growing issue has derailed the futures of countless young people and strained family dynamics, creating a disconnect between the addicted children and their environments at home, in school, and in society at large.

"To combat this destructive trend, society must actively reduce the chances of such addiction by providing free physical and artistic programs tailored to youth, and urging families to enroll their children in these activities. Unfortunately, many sports clubs today seem to cater only to the athletically gifted or those chasing competitive success.

"Society, through institutions like the Ministry of Information and the Ministry of Health, must launch continuous awareness campaigns on media to educate parents about the signs of addiction, how to deal with them, and which entities they can turn to for support when the situation becomes unmanageable. This is especially vital, as most families lack access to this necessary information.

"We must stay vigilant, as we are facing a serious battle against addiction, whether to drugs or digital devices and games. It is a shared responsibility, and we must act with sincerity and unity to shield our society from this growing threat. This silent epidemic can enter any home unnoticed, with parents unaware of its symptoms or how to intervene, often resulting in tragic consequences for both families and children.

"The Ministry of Social Affairs' decision to suspend online donations through links and websites of charitable associations and foundations has justifications and reasons," Adel Al-Jarallah Al-Kharafi wrote for Al-Seyassah daily. "However, this will also halt most

charitable work, until the ministry establishes the rules and guarantees for online donations. Until all these are completed, it is as if the ministry decided to put the horse behind the cart.

"It goes without saying that charitable work relies heavily on obtaining donations and grants for needy families and individuals and the disabled who will also suffer from this decision.

"While this is a regulatory decision, the logic behind it is for the ministry to exercise its role in establishing what-



Speed thrills, hefty bills

Speeding fines in Kuwait can now reach up to KD 150

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: A new Ministerial Decision has been issued, amending provisions of Ministerial Resolution No. 81/1976, which governs the executive regulations of the Traffic Law, reports Al-Sevassah daily.

The resolution, published in its first article, modifies Article '211 bis' of the Traffic Law to align with Clause '7' of Article '41' in Decree-Law No. 5/2025, which revises aspects of Decree-Law No. 67/1976 related to traffic violations.

Under the amended provisions, the settlement amounts for speeding violations will be based on the extent to which the speed limit is exceeded. The revised fines are as follows:

- 70 dinars for exceeding the speed limit by up to 20 kilometers.
- 80 dinars for exceeding the speed limit by 20 to 30 kilometers.
- 90 dinars for exceeding the speed limit by 30 to 40 kilometers.
- 100 dinars for exceeding the speed limit by 40 to 50 kilometers.
- 120 dinars for exceeding the speed limit by
- 50 to 60 kilometers.
- 130 dinars for exceeding the speed limit by

60 to 70 kilometers. ■ 150 dinars for exceeding the speed limit by more than 70 kilometers.

This amendment is part of ongoing efforts to update and enforce traffic regulations in the country.

PAHW to handover 12 new service buildings

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: The Public Authority for Housing Welfare (PAHW) will soon receive 12 service buildings in South Abdullah Al-Mubarak City, which will be transferred to the concerned government ministries.

The newspaper obtained copies of decrees stating that these service buildings -- located in Blocks Two and Three -- consist of a police station, a community development center, a social service facility, a fire station, a clinic, a central commercial market, a suite of retail establishments, a post office, a citizen services center, a municipal administration building, an elementary school and a preschool.

The formal handover of these facilities shall be conducted in the presence of representatives from the beneficiary government entities.

PAHW revealed that the receiving committees will conduct on-site evaluations, and then submit their findings and recommendations to the deputy director general for Implementation Affairs; contingent upon final approval by the director general.

The decrees stipulate that the formation of the competent committees is based on a formal correspondence between the contractor and the director general, affirming the readiness of the buildings for preliminary handover.

MoE's decision to transfer employee deemed illegal

Legal Advise Department urges reversal

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: The Legal Advice and Legislation Department at the Council of Ministers has recommended withdrawing Administrative Decision No. 189/2024 issued by the Ministry of Education to transfer the director of the Investigations, Contracts and Inspection Department in the Legal Affairs Sector to the same position in the Administrative and Technical Affairs Department at Ahmadi Educational District due to the legal violations.

The newspaper obtained a copy of the memorandum submitted to the acting undersecretary of the ministry in which the Legal Advice and Legislation Department clarified that the transfer decision is not justified by the interests of work and it violated the provisions and regulations of the Civil Service Commission and the decisions of the Civil Service Council.

The employee was transferred from a specialized legal position to an administrative position that was not compatible with the nature of his specialization or qualifications; hence, it was considered a disguised disciplinary action.

The Legal Advice and Legislation Department pointed out that the transfer decision does not protect public interest or benefit public service, considering it is beneficial if the employee works in his field of specialization.

The position to which he was transferred does not fall within the scope of specialized legal positions with technical progression, which deprives the employee of his entitlements to bonuses and other financial benefits stipulated by law for those holding legal positions.

This is based on Civil Service Council Resolution No. 20/2012, which limits these benefits to those working in the legal field.

The memorandum explained that the decision also violated Civil Service Council Resolution No. 38/2006 regarding the conditions for transfer and assignment.

It did not take into account equivalence in career progression, the nature of duties or the job group, instead it led to the employee being removed from his scope of expertise without justification.

The Legal Advice and Legislation Department concluded that the decision in question does not serve the best interests of the business and, in fact, affects the employee's job status and rights.

It recommended withdrawing the decision and to reinstate the employee to the legal position commensurate with his qualifications and level of supervision in order to uphold the principle of justice and ensure the integrity of administrative procedures.

Students' guide to scholarships abroad MoE launches 'Guide Me' campaign

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: The Ministry of Higher Education has started preparing for the annual national campaign for external scholarships entitled, "Guide Me".

Minister of Higher Education and Scientific Research Dr. Nader Al-Jalal presided over a meeting recently, during which he reviewed the comprehensive visual presentation on the campaign.

The undersecretary of the ministry; assistant undersecretary for scholarships, equivalencies and cultural relations; department directors; specialists and advisors from the Minister's Office attended the meeting.

The meeting included a visual presentation on the three main phases of the campaign. First is the introductory phase, during which the external scholarship plan is announced and comprehensive information is provided, including the approved specializations and countries. Second is the advisory phase that provides a detailed explanation of the conditions and procedures. It also guides students on how to register correctly and raise their awareness on the common mistakes they might commit.

Third is the guidance phase, when the names of those accepted are announced, post-acceptance procedures are explained, and an orientation meeting for accepted students is held.

A total of 12 public and private entities will participate in the campaign to help students make informed decisions in accordance with their abilities and interests.

The campaign will officially start May 4 through the social media accounts of the ministry. It aims to inform, educate and guide Kuwaiti students -- high school graduates and graduates of foreign educational systems in and outside Kuwait -- who wish to obtain scholarships abroad.

This will ensure they are fully informed about scholarship procedures, select courses required by the labor market and submit applications correctly.

The campaign will be held at The Avenues Mall on May 25-30 to respond to the queries of students and their parents.

KPC sees surge in retirement applications

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: The oil sector is witnessing a remarkable rise in retirement applications, particularly in Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) and its subsidiaries, reports Al-Rai daily.

Sources revealed that over the past week alone, 10 senior officials from the International Marketing Sector of KPC, including managers and team leaders, have submitted their retirement applications.

Sources said the recent spike in retirements reflects a trend that has gained momentum since the beginning of the month. Sources added that more retirement applications are expected in the coming days, including from at least one high-ranking official who has hinted at stepping down soon.

Sources stated that the growing number of early retirements is attributed to the desire among oil sector officials to capitalize on current financial incentives available to retirees, which may not remain in place long term.

Education Ministry opens nominations for supervisory positions in 2024/2025

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: The Ministry of Education has issued a circular regarding supervisory educational positions for public, private, and religious education schools, as well as the Special Education Department, for the 2024/2025 academic year, reports Al-Jarida daily.

According to the circular, the positions include school principal and assistant principal roles for kindergarten, primary, and intermediate levels. those with a non-educational degree, and 13 years for those with a diploma.

For the primary stage (male), the requirements for nominating a school principal include at least three years of experience as an assistant principal. Candidates for the assistant principal position must have at least six years of experience as a department head. Music and computer science teachers are required to have 14 years of experience for those

The registration period for nominations will be open from April 27 to May 8 via the ministry's website. Years of experience will be calculated up to October 31 as part of the required experience.

Candidates with experience in two stages can be nominated for their current stage if they have completed three consecutive years in it, or for their previous stage if there is a nomination available for it.

Candidates must be Kuwaiti citizens and have received an actual "excellent" performance rating for the past three academic years.

All candidates on the waiting list must register their nominations via the website. If they meet the nomination criteria, their test scores and personal interview results will be considered according to the new criteria outlined in Ministerial Decision No. 116/2025. Candidates may choose to have their test or interview scores, or both, recalculated.

The ministry outlined specific requirements for nominations at different educational levels.

For the kindergarten stage, candidates for the position of school principal must have at least one year of experience as an assistant principal. For the assistant principal role, candidates must have a minimum of three years of experience as a technical supervisor. Music teachers are required to have 11 years of experience for those with an educational degree, 12 years for with an educational degree, 15 years for those with a non-educational degree, and 16 years for those with a diploma.

For the primary stage (female), candidates for the principal position must have at least four years of experience as an assistant principal, and for the assistant principal position, at least eight years of experience as a department head. Music and computer science teachers must have 16 years of experience for those with an educational degree, 17 years for those with a non-educational degree, and 18 years for those with a diploma.

For the intermediate stage (male), candidates for the principal position must have at least four years of experience as an assistant principal. For the assistant principal position, at least six years of experience as a department head is required. Music teachers must have 14 years of experience for those with an educational degree, 15 years for those with a non-educational degree, and 16 years for those with a diploma.

Four Jahra areas being considered

Municipality considers wilderness sites for temporary wedding halls

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: The Kuwait Municipality is reviewing a proposal to designate four wilderness sites in Jahra Governorate for the establishment of temporary wedding halls and event tents, reports Al-Anba daily quoting sources.

Sources informed the daily that the proposed locations are strategically located in various areas in the governorate as follows:

Camel stables area opposite Jahra Industrial City

Al-Oyoun, behind the gas station at the former camping site

■ Pilgrims Rest House, opposite the Sixth Ring Road

Saad Al-Abdullah, at the site of the old scrapyard

Sources explained this aims to provide regulated and designated spaces for large events, particularly weddings, in response to growing demand. Sources said the concerned authorities have stressed that any future use of these sites must be in compliance with the regulations set by relevant entities, including the Ministry of Interior, Kuwait Fire Force (KFF) and the Environment Public Authority (EPA).

These conditions include:

■ No construction of permanent fences around the sites

- Minimum distance of 500 meters from main roads
- 100-meter buffer from high-voltage electrical lines

■ 200-meter distance from nearby facilities

Strict maintenance of site cleanliness and environmental standards

Sources added the proposal is still under review; as officials intend to assess its alignment with safety, environmental and urban planning regulations.

Education Ministry rolls out major academic calendar reforms

Kuwait mulls earlier school start, Ramadan break adjustment

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: The Ministry of Education is considering an earlier start for the 2025/2026 academic year and plans to include the last ten days of Ramadan as part of the holidays, reports Al-Anba daily.

According to educational sources, the ministry is currently working on the academic calendar in coordination with relevant authorities. The plan is to have school administrations begin on September 1, with students returning to school on September 7. This adjustment is being considered to compensate for the holiday during the last ten days of Ramadan, a period the ministry is contemplating suspending. The goal is to allow students and teachers to focus on worship and to promote religious and social values during this special time.

Meanwhile, the ministry announced that registration for educational supervisory positions is open from Sunday, April 27 to May 8. Interested individuals can apply through the Ministry of Education's website under the "Electronic Services" section, specifically the "Educational Supervisory Positions Services."

In another development, the acting Undersecretary of Public Education Affairs Mansour Al-Dhafiri announced changes to the dates and procedures for the examination control center for the end of the second semester of the 2024/2025 academic year for the twelfth grade, as per Ministerial Resolution No. 115/2025, issued on April 1.

Al-Dhafiri explained that the start period for the examination control center has been reduced by approximately 27 days compared to previous years. The start date for the control center for the science, arts, and religious education sections will now be Sunday, April 13, instead of the previous date of Sunday, March 16.

The period from April 17 to April 24 was set for the printing

and reviewing of twelfth-grade student transcripts by school administrations from the student record system. The period from May 11 to May 15 will be designated for conducting exams for subjects outside the schedule. Grades will be recorded in the student's record, and grade sheets (including daily work, practical work, and exams for subjects outside the schedule) will be printed for review by the school. Vertical technical review sheets for subjects outside the schedule will also be issued and recorded in the school's student record system.

On May 19, the student record system will be closed for entering or modifying grades for twelfth-grade students at the end of that day.

On May 22, the seat numbers for twelfth-grade students applying for the General Secondary Education Examinations will be announced on the ministry's website.

On May 26, the exam committee cards and roll call lists for

twelfth-grade students applying for the General Secondary Education Examinations will be made available on the ministry's website by the end of that day. Seat numbers for students applying for the second round of exams will be set on June 30.

Al-Dhafiri confirmed that the exams for subjects outside the schedule (Quran, Constitution, and Human Rights) for home-schooled students will be standardized throughout the ministry.

He stressed that if any of the unified tenth- and eleventhgrade certificates are unavailable, an equivalency certificate from the Private Education Department's Certificate Equivalency Department must be attached, irrespective of whether the student is studying outside Kuwait or transferred from private (foreign) schools. Also, a curriculum system certificate or the result of the equivalency exam for religious education certificates must be provided if the student is studying at home.

The decision stipulates that if the commitment is for a period of 15 years with one-time payment of the rental value, the 10G capacity will be rented at KD54,111 and KD216,446 for a 100G capacity circuit.

On the other hand, Sheikh Athbi Jaber Al-Sabah also issued a decision regarding the tariff for international leased circuits for internet services through international submarine and land cables and the interconnection tariff (retail sale).

He said the rental value tariff will be KD133,848 for additional capacity subscriptions for international leased circuits for internet services for a capacity of (10G) STM64; if a commitment is made for a period of one year with a one-time payment of the rental value, while for the environmental connection, the capacity and duration will cost KD111,540 and this is applicable to additional subscriptions, not the existing ones.

He revealed the decision states that the additional capacity subscriptions included in the tariff mentioned in this decision may be sold to end users, whether individuals or companies (retail sale). "The decision prohibits selling them to companies licensed as internet service providers or providers, in accordance with the Ministry of Communications' decision, the CITRA Law, and the regulations and decisions issued in this regard," he said.

The decision regulates the work between the internet and communications portal of CITRA and local telecommunications and internet networks. It requires telecommunications and internet companies and those licensed to manage, establish or operate a telecommunications network or internet service to provide communications to the public and information or content providers to connect the network they use to the internet and communications portal of CITRA in accordance with the privacy protection standards set by the authority.

Kuwait tightens

Question: The implementation of the hydrogenated fats regulation is set to be announced by early May. Will it be released on time?

Answer: Yes, the regulation on hydrogenated trans fats is already in effect in most Gulf countries and worldwide. We aim for Kuwait to become a country free from hydrogenated trans fats and to ban the import of foods containing these fats or their use at home. According to the World Health Organization's recommendations, individuals should consume no more than one percent of trans fats due to their severe health risks.

Q. What is the mechanism for implementing the regulation?

A. The regulation will be implemented in two phases. The first phase will take place before food enters Kuwait, where health and laboratory certificates will be checked, along with the product's nutritional label. If the product contains more than two percent hydrogenated fats, it will be rejected and not allowed entry for ensuring the safety of imported food. The second phase will involve inspections of restaurants and food establishments. Any establishment found using hydrogenated raw materials in its production will face penalties through intensive inspection campaigns. Statistics will be published to assess the impact of the regulation's implementation. No reconciliation will be allowed for violations.

Q. Did you encounter any difficulties in dealing with companies?

A. Initially, there were some concerns about implementation, but we later realized that this regulation is well-known to large companies, and there are no issues with its enforcement. These companies are eager to obtain international recognition and accreditation.

Q. What is the penalty for non-compliance with the regulation?

A. The penalty is non-negotiable. Violations involving the use of noncompliant materials, whether for display or circulation, do not fall under financial penalties and will be referred directly to the Public Prosecution.

He also referred to Kuwaiti consumer's desire to diversify consumption sources, and back Arab products and deliver them easily.

Furthermore, the Ministry of Electricity urged the public to ensure prudent energy consumption; reiterating its intention to pursue legal recourse against any entity or individual found to be engaged in excessive electricity usage through unauthorized activities that deplete the national electricity supply.

Also, sources from the ministry indicated such reduction in consumption is projected to result in an annual savings of KD15 million.

Meanwhile, Undersecretary of the Ministry of Social Affairs Dr. Khaled Al-Ajmi has called on the Board of Directors of the Union of Consumer Cooperative Societies to instruct cooperative societies to reduce their electricity loads and rationalize consumption, reports Al-Seyassah daily.



9 people killed after car rams into Filipino street festival in Vancouver

VANCOUVER, British Columbia, April 27, (AP): A man drove a vehicle into a crowd at a Filipino heritage festival in the Canadian city of Vancouver, killing at least nine people and injuring an unknown number of others, police said Sunday.

The vehicle entered the street at 8:14 pm on Saturday and struck people attending the Lapu Lapu Day festival, the Vancouver Police Department said in a social media post.

Several other people were injured, but the exact number of casualties wasn't immediately available.

A 30-year-old Vancouver man was arrested at the scene and the department's Major Crime Section is overseeing the investigation, police said.

"At this time, we are confident that this incident was not an act of terrorism," the police department posted early Sunday.

Interim Vancouver Police Chief Steve Rai told a news conference that the man was arrested after initially being apprehended by bystanders.

Video circulating on social media

shows a young man in a black hoodie with his back against a chain-link fence, alongside a security guard and surrounded by bystanders screaming and swearing at him.

"I'm sorry," the man says, holding his hand to his head.

Rai declined to comment on the video, but said the person in custody was a "lone male" who was "known to police in certain circumstances."

The festival was being held in a South Vancouver neighborhood. Video posted on social media showed victims and debris strewn across a long stretch of road, with at least seven people lying immobile on the ground. A black SUV with a crumpled front section could be seen in still photos from the scene.

Carayn Nulada said that she pulled her granddaughter and grandson off the street and used her body to shield them from the SUV. She said that her daughter suffered a narrow escape.

"The car hit her arm and she fell down, but she got up, looking for us, because she is scared," said Nulada, who described children screaming, and pale-faced victims lying on the ground or wedged under vehicles.

"I saw people running and my daughter was shaking."

Nulada was in Vancouver General Hospital's emergency room early Sunday morning, trying to find news about her brother, who was run down in the attack and suffered multiple broken bones.

Doctors identified him by presenting the family with his wedding ring in a pill bottle and said that he was stable, but would be facing surgery.

but would be facing surgery. James Cruzat, a Vancouver business owner, was at the event and heard a car rev its engine and then "a loud noise, like a loud bang" that he initially thought might be a gunshot.

"We saw people on the road crying, others were like running, shouting, or even screaming, asking for help. So we tried to go there just to check what was really actually happening until we found some bodies on the ground. Others were lifeless, others like, you know, injured," Cruzat said.

Murphy's 'emergency' message about US president connecting with voters

Georgia Democrat Ossoff says Trump's 'chaos and uncertainty' hurts economy

MARIETTA, Ga., April 27, (AP): Democratic Sen Jon Ossoff of Georgia said Saturday that President Donald Trump's unsettled economic policy is the biggest problem facing his state, saying the "chaos and uncertainty" is hurting the ability of businesses and individuals to makes decisions for the future.

Ossoff, who's gearing up to run for reelection in 2026, has been ramping up his criticism of Trump even as he says he will seek to work with Republicans and the Trump administration to deliver for Georgia. In his first four years, Ossoff tried to carve out a reputation as a traditional senator interested in advancing Georgia's traditional interests, including its farmers and military bases.

The 38-year-old Ossoff defeated incumbent Republican Sen. David Perdue in a 2021 runoff that helped flip control of the Senate to Democrats for four years. He's the only Democrat seeking reelection in 2026 who represents a state that Trump carried in 2024, making him a top target for Republicans seeking to defend their current Senate majority.

The Republican field is currently frozen, awaiting a decision from twoterm Republican Gov. Brian Kemp on whether he will seek to unseat Ossoff. The Democrat declined to discuss how he would run against Kemp or any other Republican, saying only, "I am more than prepared for any chal-

lenger."

He spoke in an interview with The Associated Press at Dobbins Air Reserve Base in the Atlanta suburb of Marietta, Georgia, following a meeting with students interested in appointments to military academies. Here are some excerpts from the conversation:

Ossoff: "Look, at this very moment as we conduct this interview, and of course, this can change by the hour depending upon the president's whim, businesses are unable to invest with an understanding of what the rules of international trade will be from one hour or week or month to the next. Households are unable to plan their annual budgets because there's so much chaos and uncertainty in the implementation of federal economic policy. This administration needs to clearly define its economic objectives, and it needs to competently implement its plan, whatever that plan may be. The fact that the White House does not even know what its policy is, and is with such unpredictability and chaos, lurching from one policy to the other, is putting the state's economy at serious economic risk.

Ossoff: "I think it's clear. We have never seen a president try to wield the federal government to crush his critics and political adversaries. That's something new in American history, and it is, in my view, un-American. And it's something that should chill us to the bone, no matter our politics, no mat-

ter our policy preferences. And with every new exercise of unprecedented presidential power, what I remind my Republican colleagues and my Republican and conservative friends and supporters here in Georgia, is that one day again there will be a Democratic president in the White House, and the shoe will be on the other foot. This is about checks and balances. This is about whether or not the executive branch is constrained as designed by our Constitution, by judicious legislators who can put their partisanship aside to protect the public interest."

Ossoff: "My view is that the American people expect and deserve secure borders. And I think the Biden administration failed in its border policies. The American people expect and deserve for people who enter this country illegally and may pose a threat to public safety or national security to be apprehended by the authorities. But the American people don't support and don't expect federal police raids on elementary schools and hospitals and churches. And don't except our military installations to become mass prison camps for immigrants. And don't want entire families rounded up with no due process. We just learned yesterday about a 2-year-old US citizen, a 2-year-old girl, who was deported without due process. Our immigration policy needs to be responsible and serious. It also needs to be humane."

SAXAPAHAW, NC: Connecticut Sen Chris Murphy isn't drawing arena-size crowds like Vermont Sen Bernie Sanders and New York Rep Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez are as he tours the country talking to voters. But in a packed concert hall in rural North Carolina, people are starting to view the Democrat as worthy of the national spotlight.

Murphy and Rep. Maxwell Frost, D-Fla., have been staging events in Republican congressional districts in recent weeks, trolling GOP lawmakers such as Rep. **Richard Hudson**, who represents the area they visited Thursday. Hudson, the chairman of the House GOP campaign arm, has discouraged Republicans from holding town halls, so Murphy and Frost decided to hold one on his home turf in North Carolina.

"We are doing the job that these Republican congressmen and senators won't do," Murphy told the hypedup crowd of mostly older voters at the event, while acknowledging that Democrats need to do more to soothe their anxiety and counter President **Donald Trump**. "I want to make sure that everywhere, in every corner of this country, people are willing to stand up and fight."

As other Democrats grasp for a response to Trump's election, unsure of how to confront him, Murphy is channeling his own frustration and anger into a sustained blitz of television appearances, fundraising appeals, Senate floor speeches and events like the one in North Carolina. He also is talking directly to voters on social media, including through lengthy live videos on Instagram where he sits in his kitchen with a cocktail and tries to explain what he sees as "the central story" of Trump's presidency - "the billionaire takeover of our government made possible by the destruction of our democracy.'

It's a methodical approach for Murphy, 51, a serious-minded legislator who has been most well known for his yearslong fight to stem gun violence in the aftermath of the 2012 shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Connecticut that killed 20 first-grade students and six educators.

While the kitchen talks on Instagram seem to come more naturally to Murphy than riling up a crowd, his message is clearly resonating with his party's base of voters, many of whom are angry at Democrats in Washington for inaction.

Russia launches nearly 150 drones against Ukraine as US doubts Putin desire for peace

KYIV, Ukraine, April 27, (AP): Russia launched a sweeping drone assault across Ukraine overnight into Sunday, targeting multiple regions, officials said, after US President Donald Trump cast doubt over Russian President Vladimir Putin's willingness to end the war.

One person was killed and a 14-year-old girl wounded in the city of Pavlohrad in the Dnipropetrovsk region, which was hit for the third consecutive night, regional Gov. Serhii Lysak said.

The attacks came hours after Russia claimed to have regained control over the remaining parts of the Kursk region, which Ukrainian forces seized in a surprise incursion last August. Ukrainian officials said the fighting in Kursk was still ongoing.

ing. Trump said Saturday that he doubts Putin wants to end the more than three-year war in Ukraine, expressing new skepticism that a peace deal can be reached soon. Only a day earlier, Trump had said Ukraine and Russia were "very close to a deal."

"There was no reason for Putin to be shooting missiles into civilian areas, cities and towns, over the last few days," Trump wrote in a social media post as he flew back to the United States after attending Pope Francis' funeral at the Vatican, where he met briefly with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy. Trump also hinted at further sanctions against Russia.

The Trump-Zelenskyy conversation on the sidelines of the pope's funeral was the first face-to-face encounter between the two leaders since they argued during a heated Oval Office meeting at the White House in late February.

Russia fired 149 exploding drones and decoys in the latest wave of attacks, the Ukrainian air force said, adding that 57 were intercepted and another 67 jammed.

One person also was wounded in drone attacks on the Odesa region and another in the city of Zhitomir, according to local officials.

Russia's Defense Ministry said Sunday that air defenses shot down five Ukrainian drones in the border region of Bryansk, as well as three drones over the Crimean peninsula, which was illegally annexed by Russia in 2014.

Five people were wounded when Ukrainian forces shelled the city of Horlivka in the partially occupied Donetsk region, the city's Russianinstalled Mayor Ivan Prikhodko said.

A peace proposal by the Trump administration that includes recognizing Russian authority over Crimea shocked Ukrainian officials, who say they will not accept any formal surrender of the peninsula, even though they expect to concede the territory to the Kremlin, at least temporarily.

Giving up the land that was illegally annexed by Russia in 2014 is also politically and legally impossible, according to experts. It would require a change to the Ukrainian constitution and a nationwide vote, and it could be considered treason. Lawmakers and the public are firmly opposed to the idea.

"It doesn't mean anything," said Oleksandr Merezkho, a lawmaker with Zelenskyy's party. "We will never recognize Crimea as part of Russia."

Unlike a territorial concession, a formal surrender would permanently relinquish Crimea and abandon the hope that Ukraine could regain it in the future.

The Ukrainian public largely understands that land must be ceded as part of any armistice because there is no way to retake it militarily. Polls indicate a rising percentage of the population accepts such a trade-off.

But much of the public messaging about land concessions has suggested that they are not necessarily permanent, as when Kyiv Mayor Vitalii Klitschko told the BBC recently that Ukraine may need to temporarily give up land as part of a peace deal. Romanians confront deluge of online disinformation ahead of election redo

BUCHAREST, Romania, April 27, (AP): Romanians are confronting a deluge of online disinformation ahead of a fraught presidential election redo next week, including ominous claims that the NATO member country is surging toward "imminent war" with Russia.

The campaign, attributed to unidentified anti-government and pro-Russian actors, underscores how large social media platforms can be exploited to fuel distrust and spin anti-Western narratives.

It's also a somber lesson for other democracies across the European Union.

Romania's political landscape was shaken last November when Calin Georgescu, a little-known, far-right populist, won the most votes in the first round of the presidential election, advancing to the runoff against reformist Elena Lasconi of the progressive Save Romania Union party.

Soon, allegations emerged of electoral violations and a Russian campaign promoting Georgescu, following declassified intelligence showing a highly-sophisticated, coordinated campaign via TikTok. Moscow denied

Georgescu, who has praised Russian President Vladimir Putin and criticized NATO and the EU, is now under criminal investigation. In March, he was barred from running in the May 4 election redo, prompting chaos on the streets of Romania's capital, Bucharest, as his incensed supporters staged protests that descended into violence.

We're not here practicing a war plan: Cederholm

US forces deploy anti-ship missiles in Philippines, stage live-fire drills near China hotspots

BATAN ISLAND, Philippines, April 27, (AP): The US military has deployed an anti-ship missile launcher for the first time on Batan Island in the Philippines, as Marines unloaded the high-precision weapon on the northern tip of the archipelago, just a sea border away from Taiwan.

US and Philippine forces separately unleashed a barrage of missile and artillery fire that shot down several drones acting as hostile aircraft in live-fire drills on Sunday in Zambales province facing the disputed South China Sea

The mock battle scenarios over the weekend in the annual Balikatan exercises between the US and its oldest treaty ally in Asia, the Philippines, not only simulated real-life war. They were also staged near major geopolitical hotspots, which have become delicate frontlines in the regional rivalry between China and the US under former US president Joe Biden and now Donald Trump.

About 9,000 American and 5,000 Filipino military personnel took part in the combat maneuvers. At least 260 Australian personnel also joined, with smaller observer delegations from Japan and other countries.

China has fiercely opposed the combat drills as provocative. Its aircraft carrier group sailed by a few days earlier near Batanes, where the US military had deployed the Navy Marine Expeditionary Ship Interdiction System on Saturday on Batan near the Bashi Channel just south of Taiwan, a critical trade and military route that the US and Chinese militaries have tried to gain strategic control of.

"The introduction of NMESIS into the first island chain for sea denial, sea control is another step in our force design journey," US Marine Lt Gen Michael Cederholm told a small group of journalists, including from The Associated Press, who were invited to witness the transport of the missile system aboard a C-130 Air Force aircraft to Batanes. "We're not here practicing a war plan," said Cederholm. "We're practicing for the defense of the Philippines."

The US and the Philippines have denied the annual combat maneuvers - which both said would focus on a "full-scale battle scenario" this year - were aimed at China or any adversary. The lines between what's mock and real, however, have been at times murky.

Asked if US forces would pull out the anti-ship missile system from Batanes after the combat drills, Cederholm did not reply clearly.

"We don't broadcast when we're going in, when we're coming out and how long things are going to stay," Cederholm said. "All I'll say is we're here at the invitation and with the support of the Philippine government.

"But I'm glad it's here," he said.

Additionally, China had repeatedly expressed its strong opposition to the US Army deployment last year of a mid-range missile system in the Philippines for ioint exercises.

The US Army launcher with at least 16 Standard Missile-6 and the Tomahawk Land Attack Missiles was repositioned in January from an international airport in northern Laoag city to a northwestern coastal area facing the Scarborough Shoal, where China's forces have used water cannons and dangerous blocking maneuvers against Philippine coast guard and fishery ships and fired flares near Manila's patrol planes, a Philippine official then told The AP.

The official spoke on condition of anonymity due to a lack of authority to discuss the delicate issue publicly.

Tomahawk missiles can travel over 1,000 miles (1,600 kilometers), which places China within their target range.

During the combat exercises from April 21 to May 9, American and Filipino forces will also practice jointly defending Philippine islands by repelling hostile forces attempting to assault from the sea in the western Philippine province of Palawan, which faces the South China Sea, and in northern Cagayan province near Batanes.

Philippine Brig. Gen. Michael Logico said the combat exercises were crucial to strengthening deterrence against aggression in the Bashi Channel.

"A peaceful region can only be maintained through a proper balance of strength between opposing forces until such time that ... both countries decide that it's not going to be worth it to fight over this area," Logico said.

Early this month, the Chinese military staged largescale drills in the waters around Taiwan and renewed a warning to the self-ruled democracy not to seek independence. Chinese navy, air, ground and rocket forces staged the drills.

The Philippines used to host two of the largest US Navy and Air Force bases outside the American mainland. The bases were shut down in the early 1990s after the Philippine Senate rejected an extension, but American forces returned for large-scale combat exercises with Filipino troops under a 1999 agreement.

"We take our treaty obligations very seriously," Cederholm said.

South Korea's liberal leader Lee wins party nomination to run for president

SEOUL, South Korea, April 27, (AP): Lee Jae-myung, a liberal who wants greater economic parity in South Korea and warmer ties with North Korea, became the main opposition party's presidential candidate Sunday, solidifying his position as front-runner to succeed recently ousted conservative President Yoon Suk Yeol.

The former Democratic Party chief had led the opposition-controlled parliament's impeachment of Yoon over the imposition of martial law in December. The country's Constitutional Court formally dismissed Yoon earlier this month, prompting a snap presidential election on June 3 to find a new president.

In a nationally televised announcement, the Democratic Party announced Lee won its presidential nomination with nearly 90% of the votes cast during the primary that ended Sunday, defeating two competitors.

"Now, the people and our party colleagues gave me an opportunity to win back the presidency and build a new, real Republic of Korea. Thank you! I'll humbly uphold that ardent, serious task," Lee said in a victory speech.

Lee, 60, who served as the governor of South Korea's most populous Gyeonggi province and a mayor of Seongnam city, is the clear favorite to win the election.

In a Gallup Korea poll released Friday, 38% of respondents chose Lee as their preferred choice, while all other aspirants obtained single-digit ratings. The main conservative People Power Party is to nominate its candidate next weekend. Its four presidential hopefuls competing to win the party ticket won a combined 23% of support ratings in the Gallup survey. It will be Lee's third bid to run for president. He lost the 2022 election to Yoon in the narrowest margin in the country's presidential elections. In 2017, Lee ranked third in a Democratic Party primary.

Lee has long established an image as an anti-establishment figure who can eliminate deep-rooted inequality and corruption in South Korea. But his critics view him as a populist who relies on stoking divisions and demonizing opponents and worry his rule would likely further polarize the country.

Lee currently faces five trials for corruption and other criminal charges. If he becomes president, those trials will likely stop as he will enjoy special presidential immunity from most criminal charges

Lee's rise comes as conservatives are struggling to win back public confidence in the wake of Yoon's martial law decree that plunged the country into turmoil. The People Power Party is grappling with internal feuding between senior members defending Yoon's action and reformist members who voted for his impeachment.

The U.N. said two other hospitals in that area "face critical shortages, including oxygen and emergency medical kits.

The two hospitals have treated more than 200 patients for gunshot wounds, strokes, malnutrition and suspected cholera since the Mirebalais hospital closed, according to the U.N.

U.N. spokesperson Stéphane Dujarric said that many of those deported "arrive in precarious and highly vulnerable conditions, often without any resources."

The International Organization for Migration said that it has seen an increase in women deported from the Dominican Republic in recent weeks, along with children and newborns.

It warned they're being deported to a country "where access to basic services remains severely limited."

The increase in those deportations comes as the administration of Dominican President Luis Abinader implemented a new measure this week requiring hospital staff to ask patients Haitians line up at non-profit help center to receive food after being de-ported from the Dominican Republic in Belladere, Haiti on Jan 30. (AP)

for their identification, work permits and proof of residence.

The measure is one of more than a dozen announced earlier this month to crack down on migrants living in the Dominican Republic without legal permission, as people in neighboring Haiti flee a surge in gang violence.

On Tuesday, the Dominican Republic's migration agency arrested 48 pregnant women and 39 others who just gave birth, along with 48 minors. On Wednesday, agents arrested 78 other migrants at hospitals, although the agency didn't provide additional details.

Amnesty International on Thursday called on Abinader's administration to repeal the measure, saying it "must take concrete action against racial discrimination." Haiti and the Dominican Republic share the Caribbean island of Hispaniola.

Abinader visited the shared border on Thursday, telling soldiers that it was "completely unacceptable" to let through any migrants trying to enter the Dominican Republic illegally.

He also dismissed criticism by Amnesty International and called on the rights group to work in Haiti and address its crises. "My responsibility it to defend the Dominican Republic," he said. Overall, the Dominican Republic has expelled more than 180,000 people since October, when it announced mass deportations.

Africa

Niger border village attack kills 12 soldiers: An attack by armed men in western Niger killed 12 soldiers, the army said Saturday, in a border area that has long been a hotbed of extremist violence.

The "surprise offensive" was launched Friday against a military unit near the village of Sakoira near the border with Mali and Burkina Faso, the army said in a statement. It described the assailants as "terrorists" but did not say what group was responsible.

The tri-border area has long been a site of extremist violence. Last month, an attack by a jihadi group on a village in the region killed 44 civilians. The army blamed that attack on the Islamic State in the Great Sahara, or EIGS.

Niger, along with its neighbors Burkina Faso and Mali, has for over a decade battled an insurgency fought by jihadi groups, including some allied with al-Qaida and the Islamic State group. Following military coups in all three nations in recent years, the ruling juntas have expelled French forces and turned to Russia's mercenary units for security assistance. The three countries have vowed to strengthen their cooperation by establishing a new security alliance, the Alliance of Sahel States. (AP)

Gunmen kill 20 in northwestern Nigeria: Armed men killed at least 20 people and injured dozens in a mining village in Nigeria's northwestern Zamfara state, a rights group said.

Gunmen arrived on motorcycles in the village of Gobirawa Chali in the Dan Gulbi district around midday Thursday, and went on a "house-to-house killing spree," Amnesty International Nigeria said in a post on X the same day.

The gunmen's first target was a gold-mining site where they initially killed 14 people, before more bodies were found inside homes and in a mosque.

The possible motive for the attack was unclear but bandit groups have been known for mass killings and kidnappings for ransom in the conflict-battered northern region, most of them former herders in conflict with settled communities.

Dozens of armed groups take advantage of a limited security presence in Nigeria's mineral-rich northwestern region to carry out attacks on villages and along major roads. (AP)

on Friday oversaw the signing by Congo and Rwanda of a pledge to work toward a peace deal that would ease US access to critical minerals in resource-rich eastern Congo, bringing US influence to bear in a minerals trade that has helped fuel conflict that has killed millions for three decades.

Rubio's participation in the Washington ceremony with his Central African counterparts is an early step in what the Trump administration says is a rebuilding of US foreign policy to focus on transactions of direct financial or strategic benefit to the United States.

Congo and Rwanda hope the involvement of the United States - and the incentive of major investment if there's enough security for US companies to work safely in east Congo will calm the fighting and militia violence that have defied peacekeeping and negotiation since the mid-1990s.

The risk is that the United States becomes involved in or worsens the militia violence, corruption, exploitation and rights abuses surrounding the mining and trade of east Congo's riches.

"A durable peace ... will open the door for greater US and broader Western investment, which will bring about economic opportunities and prosperity," Rubio said, adding that it would "advance President Trump's prosperity agenda for the world."

Congo is the world's largest producer of cobalt, a mineral used to make lithium-ion batteries for electric vehicles and smartphones. It also has substantial gold, diamond and copper reserves.

Khan attacker gets life

Pakistani troops kill 54 militants

ISLAMABAD, April 27, (AP): Pakistani security forces overnight killed 54 militants who attempted to cross into the country from Afghanistan, the military said Sunday, marking one of the deadliest such killings in recent years.

In a statement, the military said intelligence reports indicated the killed militants were "Khwarij" - a phrase the government uses for the Pakistani Taliban.

Without directly blaming anyone, the military said the slain insurgents had been sent by their "foreign masters" to carry out high-profile terrorist attacks inside Pakistan.

LAHORE: A Pakistani man who shot and wounded former Prime Minister Imran Khan and killed one of his supporters in 2022 was convicted and sentenced Saturday to life in prison, his lawyer said.

The attacker, Naveed Ahmad, was arrested shortly after he opened fire on Khan in Wazirabad, a city in Punjab province, wounding him in the leg.

Eastern Congo has been in and out of crisis for decades with more than 100 armed groups, most of which are vying for territory in the mining region near the border with Rwanda. The conflict has created one of the world's largest humanitarian disasters with more than 7 million people displaced, including 100,000 who fled homes this year.

Conflict in eastern Congo is estimated to have killed 6 million people since the mid-1990s, in the wake of the Rwanda genocide. Some of the ethnic Hutu extremists responsible for the 1994 killing of an estimated 1 million of Rwanda's minority ethnic Tutsis and Hutu moderates later fled across the border into eastern Congo, fueling the proxy fighting between rival militias aligned to the two governments.

"Today marks not an end but a beginning," Congolese Foreign Minister Therese Kayikwamba Wagner said Friday before signing the broad agreement, which commits Rwanda and Congo to draft a peace accord and work to instill security and a good business environment, allow the return of the millions of displaced and accomplish other goals.

"The good news is there is hope for peace," she said. "The real news is peace must be earned."

She directed part of her remarks to the civilians of east Congo, brutalized, isolated and displaced by the fighting: "We know you are watching this moment with concern, with hope and, yes, with doubt. You are entitled to actions that measure up to the suffering you have endured.

Kamco Invest focuses on fee-based income for stronger earnings quality

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: Kamco Invest, a regional non-banking financial powerhouse with one of the largest AUMs in the region, held its Annual General Meeting for the fiscal year ended 31 December 2024 where shareholders approved all agenda items. Shareholders approved the Board of Director's recommendation to distribute 5% cash dividends (5 fils per share), amounting to KWD1.7mn.

Talal Al-Ali said, "These results reflect the strength of our fee-based business model and our ability to generate consistent value for our stakeholders. The Company reported a 41.1% increase in total revenue reaching KWD25.4mn, supported by a 15.0% growth in fee income, which stood at KWD16.9mn."

He added, "We have consistently prioritized the quality of earnings, with a strategic focus on growing fee-based income, which accounted for 66.5% of our total income



in 2024. We remain committed to further strengthening our liquidity position to support our growth ambitions and drive the expansion of our fee-generating business lines, particularly asset management and investment banking."

This brings Investment Banking mandates total value since inception to USD41.3bn in equity capital markets, debt capital markets, and mergers & acquisitions."

United States

Services and Manufacturing PMIs

The S&P Global U.S. Services PMI dropped to 51.4 in April 2025 from 54.4, missing expectations and marking the second weakest growth in a year. The decline was driven by a sharp slowdown in new orders amid client uncertainty over tariffs and economic instability, particularly from foreign markets. Hiring slowed due to weaker demand and limited labor supply. Input costs rose sharply, prompting firms to raise prices. Business sentiment for the year ahead hit its lowest level since October 2022, reflecting concerns over unclear economic policies from the new administration. Meanwhile, the S&P Global U.Ss Manufacturing PMI rose to 50.7 in April 2025, exceeding expectations and marking a fourth month of modest growth. Output and domestic new orders increased slightly, but export orders fell due to tariffs. Jobs were cut for the first time since October. Input costs surged, pushing output inflation to a 29-month high. Business confidence dropped to its lowest since last August amid worries over rising costs, supply issues, and weakening export demand.

New Home Sales

U.S. new single-family home sales jumped 7.4% in April 2025 to an annualized rate of 724,000, the highest in six months and well above expectations, driven by lower mortgage rates. Sales surged in the South and Midwest, offsetting declines in the Northeast and West. The median home price fell 1.9% to \$403,600, while inventory stood at 503,000 units, or 8.3

Eurozone

Economic Conditions

The Eurozone Composite PMI dropped to 50.1 in April 2025, down from 50.9 in March, marking the fourth consecutive month of near-stagnation and slightly missing market forecasts. Services contracted to 49.7 from a revised 51.0, while manufacturing continued to shrink at 48.7 slightly up from 48.6. Weaknesses persisted due to ongoing declines in new orders, driven by global trade tensions and tariff concerns initiated by the US. Employment stalled as backlogs fell, while input costs and pricing pressures rose modestly. Business confidence slumped to its lowest level in more than two years amid continued uncertainty over trade policy.

The EUR/USD currency pair closed the week at 1.1364.

United Kingdom

Retail Sales

UK retail sales rose by 0.4% month-overmonth in March 2025, beating expectations of a 0.3% decline. Non-food store sales led the growth with a 1.7% rise, especially in clothing (+3.7%) and garden-related goods. Food store sales fell by 1.3%. Excluding fuel, sales were up 0.5%. Year-on-year, retail sales increased by 2.6%, and Q1 saw a 1.6% gain, the biggest three-month rise since July 2021.

The GBP/USD currency pair closed the week at 1.3314.

Asia-Pacific

Chinese Economy China's stronger-than-expected Q1

GDP growth of 5.4% has eased pressure for immediate monetary stimulus, though markets still anticipate further easing in the months ahead due to mounting risks from the escalating U.S.-China trade war. Policymakers remain cautious, balancing the need for growth support with concerns over a weakening yuan and narrowing bank profit margins, which limit their room to manoeuvre. As widely expected, the central bank kept both the one-year and five-year loan prime rates unchanged at 3.1% and 3.6%, respectively. Despite the solid Q1 data, analysts warn that upcoming export figures may not fully reflect the impact of higher U.S. tariffs, as many manufacturers rushed shipments beforehand. Several global investment banks have since downgraded China's full-year growth outlook, citing expectations for more stimulus to counter growing headwinds.

The CNY/USD currency pair closed the week at 7.2864.

Inflation in Japan

Core consumer prices in Tokyo rose 3.4% year-on-year in April 2025, the highest in two years and above expectations, driven by reduced energy subsidies and food price hikes. Despite the inflation spike, the Bank of Japan is expected to keep rates steady at 0.5% amid concerns over potential economic impacts from new U.S. tariffs, for which Japan has not secured exemptions. Tokyo's inflation data is seen as a key indicator of national trends.

The USD/JPY currency pair closed the week at 143.67.

Kuwait

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: Kuwait Finance House (KFH) Group Chief Executive Officer, Khaled Yousef AlShamlan said that all key financial indicators for KFH saw an overall increase in the first quarter of 2025. He stated that KFH topped the Kuwaiti banking sector in terms of net profits that approximated KD 168.1 million for Q1 2025, representing a growth of 3.2% compared to the same period last year and a 41.4% increase compared to the fourth quarter of 2024.

In an interview with CNBC Arabia TV, He added that KFH's net financing income reached KD 318.9 million; an increase of 21.1% compared to the same period last year. Total operating income increased, supported by an increase in all core activities to reach KD 454.9 million; an increase of 15.9% compared to the same period last year. This affirms KFH's successful strategy, solid capital base and robust operational performance.

AlShamlan mentioned that net operating income reached KD 295.7 million, an increase of 19.4% compared to the same period last year.

Speaking about the non-performing financing from the total financing and coverage ratio for Q1 2025, AlShamlan pointed out that the Group non-performing financing (NPF) ratio reached roughly 1.84% as per the Central Bank of Kuwait calculation. As for the provisions coverage ratio for KFH-Kuwait it reached approximately 337% and about 270% for the Group.

Financing and Liquidity Law

Discussing the influence of the Financing and Liquidity Law (Public Debt), on both banks and the broader economy, AlShamlan stated that it has a clear and immediate impact. He explained that this law is an integral component of economic reform, playing a role in strengthening financial stability and boosting the confidence of both domestic and international investors and lenders.

Furthermore, he noted that if the government issues sovereign bonds or Sukuk, it will improve its capacity to handle its financial commitments in the future. This will guarantee consistent public spending and support the nation's development plans. Consequently, this will undoubtedly benefit Kuwaiti banks by improving their liquidity management effectiveness, as they can utilize excess liquidity to meet necessary financing needs. Tariffs

Discussing the risks and consequences of a trade war involving tariffs, AlShamlan pointed out that such conflicts can slow down global economic growth, increase production cost, and cause exchange rates to become volatile. He further explained that these issues could create difficulties for certain parts of the economy, particularly those businesses that heavily rely on exporting and importing goods.

Turning to KFH, AlShamlan stated that the bank is in a strong position due to its di-

verse operations across different regions and sectors. Additionally, KFH's reliance on an Islamic finance model that uses real, physical assets as its foundation offers extra security during periods of economic instability, like a tariff war.

KFH, he stated, had already integrated potential risks into its strategic planning. This was achieved by strengthening stress tests on its financing portfolios vulnerable to global trade, closely monitoring FX markets and their volatility, and ensuring coordination across its various departments to address any possible vulnerabilities in advance.

AlShamlan further commented, "While we acknowledge the significance of global risks, we are confident that KFH possesses the necessary protective measures, adaptability, and expertise to navigate this period with awareness and professionalism, ultimately transforming challenges into opportunities for growth and investment."

KUWAIT CITY, April 27: Sheikh Mohammed Jarrah Al-Sabah, Chairman of Kuwait International Bank (KIB), announced the Group's financial results for the first quarter of 2025. KIB Group achieved net profit attributable to shareholders amounting to KD 7.3 million, which grew by 21% compared to KD 6 million. Earnings per share (EPS) was 4.40 fils compared to 3.64 fils for the first quarter of 2024. Total operating income was almost KD 21.6 million, marking a growth of 2% compared to the first quarter of 2024.

Meanwhile, its investment and high-quality Sukuk portfolio grew by KD 110 million, reaching almost KD 496 million as of first quarter 2025, compared to KD 386 million for the same period of 2024.

pressed pride in the Bank's strong performance during the first quarter of 2025, noting that it reflects the robustness of KIB's financial position and its ability to adapt to economic challenges. Many afraid to check their retirement savings

Fear tied to market turmoil

NEW YORK, April 27, (AP): Michael Montgomery used to check the balance on his retirement account once a week and smile. But lately, not wanting to get upset and question if he could retire in a few years, there was only one solution.

"I'm not looking," says the 66-yearold professor from Huntington Woods, Michigan.

As the White House simultaneously injects turmoil into financial markets with its trade war and dismisses fears of a downturn, retired and near-retired Americans are anxiously looking on, worried about outliving their savings or having to put off entries on their bucket lists.

Keeping logged off his account has made Montgomery's days less worrisome. He and his wife adjusted their portfolio after Election Day, including moving more money into bonds. But he's not sure what more he can do if the entire world economy can be affected by Washington's decisions. "I hope like hell I don't lose all my retirement savings," he says. "But where else could you put the money that these people could not disorder? They can't get into your mattress but that's about it." back.

Oats Estridge, who lives in Dayton, Ohio, retired from a job in software engineering and now writes books, including her latest, on four octogenarian women kidnapped by sex-trafficking aliens. Her account is down more than \$40,000 and she gets angry thinking about how some in Washington have reacted to the market volatility, including Trump's recent market assessment that it was "a great time to buy."

"Where am I supposed to come up with the money to buy? My underwear drawer?" Oats Estridge asks.

Earlier this month, the Cboe Volatility Index, considered a "fear gauge" of investor pessimism, reached its highest level in five years. The index, known as VIX, has since retreated but is still in territory reflecting fearful investors. Another measure of market sentiment, the Cboe S&P 500 Left Tail Volatility Index, which tracks investor worry about so-called "black swan" events such as the 2008 housing crash that spurred the Great Recession, likewise has backed off from highs but remains elevated.

Though stocks rallied this week, the S&P 500 is down 10% from an alltime high reached in February. Losses in the Nasdaq and among small-cap stocks are steeper. Even bonds and the U.S. dollar have been volatile. Many economists are warning of a possible recession.

It has 71-year-old Jeanne Oats Estridge feeling so "paranoid" she called her financial planner with an idea.

"How about we put it all in cash?" Oats Estridge asked.

"I just don't advise it," she heard

Tech industry tried reducing AI's bias. Now Trump wants to end its 'woke AI' efforts

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., April 27, (AP): After retreating from their workplace diversity, equity and inclusion programs, tech companies could now face a second reckoning over their DEI work in AI products.

In the White House and the Republican-led Congress, "woke AI" has replaced harmful algorithmic discrimination as a problem that needs fixing. Past efforts to "advance equity" in AI development and curb the production of "harmful and biased outputs" are a target of investigation, according to subpoenas sent to Amazon, Google, Meta, Microsoft, OpenAI and 10 other tech companies last month by the House Judiciary Committee.

And the standard-setting branch of the U.S. Commerce Department has deleted mentions of AI fairness, safety and "responsible AI" in its appeal for collaboration with outside researchers. It is instead instructing scientists to focus on "reducing ideological bias" in a way that will "enable human flourishing and economic competitiveness," according to a copy of the document obtained by The Associated Press.

In some ways, tech workers are used to a whiplash of Washington-driven priorities affecting their work.

But the latest shift has raised concerns among experts in the field, including Harvard University sociologist Ellis Monk, who several years ago was approached by Google to help make its AI products more inclusive.

Back then, the tech industry already knew it had a problem with the branch of AI that trains machines to "see" and understand images. Computer vision held great commercial promise but echoed the historical biases found in earlier camera technologies that portrayed Black and brown people in an unflattering light.

"Black people or darker skinned people would come in the picture and we'd look ridiculous sometimes," said Monk, a scholar of colorism, a form of discrimination based on people's skin tones and other features.

Google adopted a color scale invented by Monk that improved how its AI image tools portray the diversity of human skin tones, replacing a decades-old standard originally designed for doctors treating white dermatology patients.

"Consumers definitely had a huge positive response to the changes," he said. Now Monk wonders whether such efforts will continue in the future. While he doesn't believe that his Monk Skin Tone Scale is threatened because it's already baked into dozens of products at Google and elsewhere - including camera phones, video games, AI image generators - he and other researchers worry that the new mood is chilling future initiatives and funding to make technology work better

for everyone.

"Google wants their products to work for everybody, in India, China, Africa, et cetera. That part is kind of DEI-immune," Monk said. "But could future funding for those kinds of projects be lowered? Absolutely, when the political mood shifts and when there's a lot of pressure to get to market very quickly."

Trump has cut hundreds of science, technology and health funding grants touching on DEI themes, but its influence on commercial development of chatbots and other AI products is more indirect. In investigating AI companies, Republican Rep. Jim Jordan, chair of the judiciary committee, said he wants to find out whether former President Joe Biden's administration "coerced or colluded with" them to censor lawful speech.

Michael Kratsios, director of the White House's Office of Science and Technology Policy, said at a Texas event this month that Biden's AI policies were "promoting social divisions and redistribution in the name of equity."

The Trump administration declined to make Kratsios available for an interview but quoted several examples of what he meant. One was a line from a Biden-era AI research strategy that said: "Without proper controls, AI systems can amplify, perpetuate, or exacerbate inequitable or undesirable outcomes for individuals and communities."

Even before Biden took office, a growing body of research and personal anecdotes was attracting attention to the harms of AI bias.

One study showed self-driving car technology has a hard time detecting darkerskinned pedestrians, putting them in greater danger of getting run over. Another study asking popular AI text-to-image generators to make a picture of a surgeon found they produced a white man about 98% percent of the time, far higher than the real proportions even in a heavily male-dominated field.

Face-matching software for unlocking phones misidentified Asian faces. Police in U.S. cities wrongfully arrested Black men based on false face recognition matches. And a decade ago, Google's own photos app sorted a picture of two Black people into a category labeled as "gorillas."

Even government scientists in the first Trump administration concluded in 2019 that facial recognition technology was performing unevenly based on race, gender or age.

Biden's election propelled some tech companies to accelerate their focus on AI fairness. The 2022 arrival of OpenAI's ChatGPT added new priorities, sparking a commercial boom in new AI applications for composing documents and generating images, pressuring companies like Google to ease its caution and catch up.


Then came Google's Gemini AI chatbot - and a flawed product rollout last year that would make it the symbol of "woke AI" that conservatives hoped to unravel. Left to their own devices, AI tools that generate images from a written prompt are prone to perpetuating the stereotypes accumulated from all the visual data they were trained on.

Google's was no different, and when asked to depict people in various professions, it was more likely to favor lighter-skinned faces and men, and, when women were chosen, younger women, according to the company's own public research.

Paris heist trial

Kardashian robbery suspect to apologize

PARIS, April 27, (AP): One of the suspects in the armed robbery of Kim Kardashian said he plans to take responsibility for his role in the 2016 highprofile heist and will apologize in court as the trial begins Monday in Paris.

Yunice Abbas, 71, who has publicly acknowledged his participation in the heist, is among 10 sus-pects facing charges including armed robbery and kidnapping.

"I will apologize," Abbas told The Associated Press. "I mean it sincerely." Kardashian, 44, is expected to testify in person at the

Kardashian, 44, is expected to testify in person at the trial scheduled to run through May 23. In interviews and on her family's reality TV show, she has described being terrified as robbers pointed a gun at her to steal millions of dollars worth of jewelry in an apartment where she was staying for Paris Fashion Week. She said she thought she was going to be raped and killed. A bhas said he acted as a lookout at the recention

Abbas said he acted as a lookout at the reception area on the ground floor, ensuring the escape route area on the ground nooi, ensuring the coupe route was clear. He said he was unarmed and did not per-sonally threaten Kardashian, but acknowledged he shared responsibility for the crime. He was arrested in January 2017 and he spent 21

months in prison before being released under judicial supervision. In 2021, he co-authored a French-language book titled "I Sequestered Kim Kardashian."

Forcing

In her account to investigators, Kardashian described two men forcing their way into her bedroom and pointing a gun towards her, asking for her ring. She said she was tied up with plastic cables and tape while the intruders were looking for jewels, including her engagement ring worth millions of dollars.

In a 2020 appearance on David Letterman's Netflix show, she tearfully recalled thinking: "This is the time I'm going to get raped. I'm like, 'What is happening? Are we gonna die? Just tell them I have children. I have babies, I have a husband, I have a family'.'





She told investigators the men brought her in the bathroom before they ran off and she managed to free herself. The residency's concierge, held at gunpoint and forced to lead the robbers to her apartment, also suffered psychological impact.

Investigators found Abbas' DNA on plastic ties used to tie the hands of the concierge.

Asked about the trauma Kardashian suffered, Abbas said : "It's true, I didn't think about it. I recognize that because I did not brutalize her myself... I was not blaming myself regarding this aspect, and yet I'm responsible for it too.'

According to Abbas, minutes after the raid started, his accomplices came down from Kardashian's apartment and gave him a bag of jewelry.

As he was fleeing the scene on a bicycle, he saw a police car, but officers were not yet aware of the robbery. Abbas said as he rode the bicycle the bag containing the jewelry became caught in the front wheel and he fell to the ground, spilling the contents of the bag. "I picked the jewels up and left," he said.

The following morning, a passerby found a diamond-encrusted cross in the street and handed it to police. That was the only jewel from the robbery that was ever recovered

A teenage girl's dangerous quest

A darkly whimsical fable in 'Legend of Ochi'

LOS ANGELES, April 27, (AP): "The Legend of Ochi," a scrappy and darkly whimsical fable about a misunderstood teenage girl on a dangerous quest, has the feeling of a film you might have stumbled on and loved as a kid. Something tactile, something fantastical and, maybe, something a little dangerous - the kind of movie you knew you probably weren't supposed to be seeing just yet. They're the ones that tend to linger, like that strange English dub of the Norwegian adventure "Shipwrecked" that I once saw on the Disney Channel at an impressionable age.

Perhaps this is something familiar only to those first home video generations, from a naive, pre-social media era when the movies that you loved felt like your own personal discovery and secret, no matter if it was "Star Wars" or "The NeverEnding Story." How disappointing it was to learn later that everyone else loved them too.

It's no surprise that "The Legend of Ochi" was made by someone (Isaiah Saxon) in this zone - an older millennial shaped by some combination of "E.T.", "The Black Stal-lion" and the Palm Pictures' Directors Label box set. Those DVDs taught many a cinephile about the transportive possibilities of music videos dreamt up by Spike Jonze, Chris Cunningham and Michel Gondry for artists like Aphex Twin, Daft Punk and Björk (for whom Saxon would direct

the "Wanderlust" video). That music video energy and committed world building is evident in "Ochi," in a positive way. It's a description that seems to be used more pejoratively than not, like shallowly dismissing something pretty as a perfume commercial. But perhaps those people just haven't seen the good ones.

Helena Zengel ("News of the World") is the central heroine, Yuri, who lives with her father Maxim (Willem Dafoe) and a de-facto brother Petro (Finn Wolfhard) on the woodsy, old-world island of Carpathia.

Threatening

Maxim loves to hunt the Ochi, a species of primates that are constantly threatening the safety of the humans and their farms, and he's trained an army of young boys to help. Yuri is largely kept off to the side, partly for her protection, partly, probably, because Maxim is a blustery alpha male who dresses up in elaborate, ancient armor for his missions. Her armor is a dirty, oversized yellow puffer jacket that could double as a sleeping bag. At home, she stews silently and listens to death metal in her room.

She's a bit feral, which would be a cliche trope for a girl raised without a mother, but Zengel makes it work. It's clear she doesn't feel at home in this world, but finds a kind of

purpose when she comes across an injured baby Ochi and takes it upon herself to return it to its family. The Ochi, she quickly realizes, have been misunderstood too.

It's still a dangerous journey, which involves a humorous and slightly disgusting visit to a local supermarket, the discovery of her own long-lost mother (Emily Watson, who promptly helps Yuri brush her hair out of her eyes), and a comical, intense showdown between Watson and Dafoe. David Longstreth, of the Dirty Projectors, did the fanciful score and Evan Prosofsky is responsible for the vivid cinematography.

The Legend of Ochi" was forged out of many influences, from Miyazaki to Amblin, and it's the kind of ambitious swing that Hollywood doesn't seem to take very often these days - especially not with a PG rating. That doesn't mean it all works seamlessly, though. The emotional beats don't seem to land as authentically as the more irreverent humor. But it's impossible not to admire the creativity, the imagination and the care that went into making something like this, with puppetry, matte paintings and inventive graphics, for a mere \$10 million. "The Legend of Ochi," an A24 released in theaters na-

tionwide Friday, is rated PG by the Motion Picture Association for "some language, smoking, a bloody image, thematic elements and violent content." Running time: 96 minutes. Three stars out of four.

Auction price exceeds estimate

Titanic letter sells for nearly \$400K

LONDON, April 27, (AP): A letter-card penned by one of the Titanic's most well-known survivors from onboard the ship, days before it sank, has sold for 300,000 pounds (\$399,000) at auction.

In the note, written to the seller's great-uncle on April 10, 1912, firstclass passenger Archibald Gracie wrote of the ill-fated steamship: "It is a fine ship but I shall await my journeys end before I pass judgment on her."

The letter was sold to a private collector from the United States on Saturday, according to auction house Henry Aldridge & Son in Wiltshire, England. The hammer price far exceeded the initial estimate price of 60,000 pounds.

The letter is believed to be the sole example in existence from Gracie from onboard the Titanic, which sank off Newfoundland after hitting an iceberg, killing about 1,500 people on its maiden voyage.

Auctioneer Andrew Aldridge described it as an "exceptional museum grade piece.'

Gracie, who jumped from the ship and managed to scramble onto an overturned collapsible boat, was rescued by other passengers onboard a lifeboat and was taken to the R.M.S. Carpathia. He went on to write "The Truth about the Titanic," an account of his experiences, when he returned to New York City.

Gracie boarded the Titanic in Southampton on April 10, 1912, and was assigned first-class cabin C51. His book is seen as one of the most detailed accounts of the events of the night the ship sank, Aldridge said. Gracie did not fully recover from the hypothermia he suffered, and died of complications from diabetes in late 1912.

The letter was postmarked Queenstown, Ireland, one of two stops the Titanic made before sinking.


vollev of gunfire. Lauren's wounds were not life-

threatening in the April 8 shooting in the northeast Los Ângeles neighborhood of Eagle Rock, where the 51-year-old wife of Weezer base player Scott Shriner emerged from her home with a gun as city police and the California Highway Patrol searched the area for three people who fled a car wreck.

Lauren - listed by police as Jillian Lauren Shriner - was released

on a \$1 million bond on suspicion of attempted murder pending further investigation. She is scheduled to appear in court this week.

Police on Friday released excerpts from police body camera video, surveillance video and audio of 911 dispatch conversations. The video clips show officers peering over a high wooden fence into a yard and shouting



"Ma'am, we're trying to help you. Put the gun down," a voice says. "You're going to get shot. It's the police."

An officer indicates that the woman has cocked a gun "Oh, she racked it" - immediately before the sound of

at least six shots rings out. In a separate segment of silent surveillance video from Lauren's backyard, Lauren can be seen exiting the home barefoot and carrying a pistol in her right hand. Another segment shows Lauren from behind, apparently raising a gun that is briefly visible. Dirt kicks up near Lauren's feet, and she turns and walks toward a doorway to the house.

Further bodycam video shows Lauren lying prone in the middle of a residential road as police place handcuffs behind her back, while noting that she has a wound on her arm.

Lauren's published works include two bestselling memoirs - 2010s "Some Girls: My Life in a Harem" and 2015's "Everything You Ever Wanted."

Weezer is a Los Angeles-based band, beloved especially for their 1994 record unofficially known as the "Blue Album" with songs including "Say It Ain't So." Shriner joined the band in the early 2000s. (AP)

Memoir offers unseen glimpse into the life of Beyoncé's mother

Tina Knowles traces Beyoncé and Solange's rise to fame

NEW YORK, April 27, (AP): Many of Tina Knowles' fondest childhood memories are of sitting under a pecan tree as her mother recited the history of their family, stretching back generations. Now, the mother of Beyoncé and Solange has given her own story to the world with "Matriarch: A Memoir," out this week.

"Beyoncé and Solange have been busy since they were little kids working, and Kelly (Rowland). ... I've told them stories, but I don't even know if they really listened," said the 71-year-old Knowles. "When you're young, it's very few people that want to hear those stories about old times."

At 59, Knowles began recording voice notes of that history - adding in her contributions - after contemplating her mortality following her divorce from Mathew Knowles after a three-decade marriage. The recordings were meant only for her grandkids and future great-grandchildren, before eventually becoming the book's foundation.

The 432-page Oprah's Book Club selection explores a vast range of topics, including her enslaved greatgrandmothers, her entrepreneurial spirit, the Houston childhoods of Beyoncé and Solange, her infidelityplagued first marriage, Destiny's Child's struggle to get a record deal, and the blatant racism her family experienced navigating a segregated United States. (She was once allowed to briefly sit in the front of a whites-only bus as a child, disguised by her fair skin tone.)

But you won't find juicy details from the protective mother; there's no mention of the infamous 2014 Met Gala elevator incident between Jay-Z and Solange, or of Kanye West taking the mic from Taylor Swift at the 2009 MTV VMAs in his attempted defense of Beyoncé. This is Celestine Beyoncé's story - not her children's - still intriguing and very personal, revealing she was diagnosed with Stage 1 breast cancer last year. She had initially left it out of the book.

Surgery

"I just wanted to keep it to myself ... as I went through that process of getting the surgery and all of that, there were things that I felt that I needed to share," said Knowles, who is now cancer-free after surgery and treatment, and urges women to make mammogram appointments and get second opinions.

Knowles, who next month will launch a nine-city book tour that will include conversations with famous friends like former first lady Michelle Obama and Tyler Perry (she also hints at "family" joining her at some stops), spoke with The As-

sociated Press about receiving due credit, regrets as a parent and finding happiness. Answers have been edited for clarity and brevity.

AP: Some may have thought of you as only Destiny's Child's stylist or Beyoncé's mom. Is there a desire to get due credit?

Knowles: I gave a lot of people credit for things - and I'm fine with that - but this is all about my truth.

I definitely feel like I was a driving force, and I can say that now without feeling like - I was taught as a kid to just be super humble and to not ever y, April 22, in New York. (AP)

brag. ... I think I've dimmed my light for so long, I don't want to do it anymore.

AP: There are events involving Beyoncé or Solange that you barely mentioned — if you mentioned them at all — like the reasons surrounding Destiny's Child's breakup. Why exclude your perspective?

Knowles: I don't think that's important, because from that time, everyone has flourished and just moved on from that. And I just choose to focus on the positives in life. ... I don't feel like it's a need to

harp on those things. I don't want to talk about them.

AP: In highlighting the differences between Solange and Beyoncé, you describe how Solange loved school and craved structure, and you weren't always able to provide that as Destiny's Child began to take off. Why be so vulnerable with your parenting mishaps? (Solange, not wanting to travel or leave friends, eventually stayed with a family friend for a period of time for consistency.)

Knowles: Solange has been a speaker of truth since she was little ... she was the one that was in my case all the time. 'Cause she's like, "Mom, you're just so irresponsible when it comes to school."

Healing

I just felt like that was healing for me to talk about it. Because people think ... you're trying to be the perfect mother, and definitely, I was screwing up just like everybody else. And so, I was really wanting to be honest about my shortcomings.

AP: Why did you mention the importance of teachers, negatively affecting your own confidence attending Catholic school, as well their impact on your daughters?

Knowles: Some of them can be detrimental, and I go into detail about that because I realize that a teacher telling me that Beyoncé

was slow in kindergarten and that she needs to repeat the grade and it's December - that woman could have messed up my child's life. We wouldn't even have a Beyoncé today if I had listened to her.

You gotta fight for your kids. I hope that lesson came through loud and clear.... That was important to me because I see a lot of parents that don't, and my mom didn't protect me.

AP: Have Beyoncé and Solange read the book yet?

Knowles: By the time I finished the book and I was ready to share it with them, both of them were on these really crazy schedules and I just didn't want them to feel, "Oh, I got to stop and go read a book." So, I sent them all of their parts and they approved the parts.

AP: Did they asked you to cut anything after they read their parts? **Knowles:** No. They were in agreement with everything.

AP: What do you hope readers will take away from "Matriarch"?

Knowles: Your life, whatever it is, cannot just center around everyone else but you. And it took me a long time - I had to be 59 years old before I realized I deserve to be happy. And I deserve to have the things that I deserve, and not feel bad about it, not feel guilty about it.

I'm going to live my life - live my best life, as the kids say.

McRae's folk-pop strikes a chord

NEW YORK, April 27, (AP): As the COVID-19 vaccine began distributing more widely in early 2021, California-raised singer-songwriter Jensen McRae affectionally joked in a tweet that Phoebe Bridgers would release a song in two years about "hooking up in the car while waiting in line to get vaccinated at Dodger Stadium."

Bridgers didn't release the song, but McRae did. As the tweet took off, she threaded a video of herself singing "a preemptive cover." "Immune," penned by McRae in Bridgers' contemplative style, was released in full within two weeks.

"It was a perfect storm," McRae, 27, told The Associated Press. "I was parodying Phoebe Bridgers who was becoming world famous in that exact moment. ... I was also writing about this topic that everyone was thinking about constantly because we were in lockdowns." Bridgers reposted the video, writing simply: "oh my god."

video, writing simply: "oh my god." The song preluded McRae's debut EP, released in 2021, and album, in 2022, which led to touring gigs with Muna and Noah Kahan. Last year, she signed with Dead Oceans, the same record label that represents Bridgers. McRae's sophomore album, the folkpop "I Don't Know How, But They Found Me!," is out Friday.


The Vietnam War produced some of the gettable films of the unf most late 1970s and 1980s, as top Hollywood filmmakers like Kubrick, Coppola, Oliver Stone and others grappled with its painful legacy. Few, however, had classic, or even three-dimensional, female characters - with the notable exception of "Coming Home," which won .Jane Fonda an Oscar. But while these films were almost exclusively about how war dehumanized men - with female characters mere devices to tell that story - the opposite was often true of Vietnamese films about the conflict. Many of these were told from a female viewpoint - the stories of brave and loval women, for example, left to hold families together.

Characters

Here are some ways that classic Vietnam War films used female characters to tell their stories:

Michael Cimino's multi-Oscar-winning "The Deer Hunter" focuses on three lifelong buddies from a Pennsylvania steel town who go off to fight, with traumatic results.

Since the 1978 drama starts and ends at home, there's room for a female character in Meryl Streep's Linda, girlfriend of Nick (Christopher Walken) who also connects with Michael (Robert De Niro). An early-career Streep was such a magnetic presence as Linda earning an Oscar nomination - that it disguised a fairly thin role that mainly advanced the men's narrative.

A rare contrast was Hal Ashby's "Coming Home" the same year, in which Fonda and Jon Voight both won Oscars for the tale of a Marine wife embroiled in an intense affair with a wounded veteran at the rehab center where she volunteers.

"This is the only Hollywood film set during the Vietnam War that's told from the point of view of a female character," says filmmaker Tony Bui, who also teaches Vietnam War cinema at Columbia University. "That's really saying something."

Its tortured journey to the screen is a drama in itself, but 1979's "Apocalypse Now," with Martin Sheen as an army captain tasked with assassinating a renegade US colonel (Marlon Brando), is considered a masterpiece of the genre. As in many Hollywood Vietnam films, women are extras in villages, screaming and running from gunfire and deadly explosions - or killed brutally for no reason at all.

Power of the press takes center stage at WHCA dinner

WH journalists toast the First Amendment

WASHINGTON, April 27, (AP): There was no president. There was no comedian. What remained at the White House Correspondents' Association's (WHCA) annual dinner on Saturday night were the journalists and the First Amendment.

The stripped-down festivities were a reflection of the somber tone in Washington at the beginning of President Donald Trump's second term, in which he has battled with the press on multiple fronts and wrested from the correspondents' association the power to decide which outlets have the most access to Trump.

Trump's deeper involvement in politics began after then-President Barack Obama roasted the New Yorker's presidential ambitions during the 2011 correspondents' dinner. He skipped the annual gala during his first term, and his absence had been widely expected this year.

The association scrapped a scheduled appearance at this year's dinner by comedian Amber Ruffin after she referred to the new administration as "kind of a bunch of murderers" on a podcast last month. The organization, a nonprofit that helps White House journalists provide robust coverage of the presidency, decided to forgo the event's traditional levity and focus on celebrating journalism.

Association President Eugene Daniels said in an email to the organization's 900 members last month that the dinner was meant to "honor journalis-

tic excellence and a robust, independent media covering the most powerful office in the world."

The event, which raises money for journalism scholarships, remains a highlight of the Washington social calendar. The ballroom at the Washington Hilton was still packed with journalists, newsmakers and even a few celebrities. Daniels singled out Debra Tice, whose son Austin has been missing for a decade since disappearing in Syria.

"We've been tested and attacked.

But every single day our members get up, they run to the White House - plane, train, automobile - with one mission, holding the powerful accountable," Daniels said.

He later showed a video of past presidents, from Ronald Reagan to Joe Biden, who addressed the dinner, saying that the association invites the president to demonstrate the importance of a free press in safeguarding democracy.

Trump counter-programmed the

last dinner during his first term, holding a rally to compete with the event in 2019, before the coronavirus pandemic canceled the 2020 dinner. This year, Trump had just flown back from Pope Francis' funeral in Rome and had no events Saturday night.

The Trump administration has had multiple skirmishes with the press in recent months. The FCC is investigating several media companies, the administration is working to shut down Voice of America and other government-run outlets, and The Associated Press has sued the administration for reducing its access to events because it has not renamed the Gulf of Mexico in line with Trump's executive order.

A federal judge has issued a preliminary injunction ordering the administration to stop blocking the AP from presidential events. In response, the White House adopted a new press policy that gives the administration sole discretion over who gets to question Trump and sharply curtails the access of three news agencies, including AP, that serve billions of readers around the world.

For many years previously, the correspondents' association determined which news organizations had access to limited space events.

Alex Thompson of Axios, who won The Aldo Beckman Award for his coverage of the coverup of Biden's decline while in office, addressed complaints from some on the right that the press had gone too soft on the Democrat. The title is a reference to "Back to The Future," her favorite movie. It's a line of dialogue said by scientist Doc Brown just before he falls in a hail of bullets, causing protagonist Marty McFly to flee back in time in Brown's rigged DeLorean.

Bulletproof

"At the end of the movie - which, there's no spoilers, because this movie's 40 years old - you find out (Doc) was wearing a bulletproof vest the whole time. And that to me sort of is what my 20s have been like. There are all these events that are happening that feel like they should take me out, but I just keep standing up anyway," McRae said. "That's kind of the narrative of the album."

Resilience has long been a motif in McRae's songwriting. Her debut album, "Are You Happy Now?", deftly tackled sexual predators and racist microaggressions with poetic meditations on identity, love, growth and beauty. On the album's most-streamed song, the ballad "My Ego Dies in the End," she sings, "If I don't write about it, was it really worth it?"

"There's this quote that I can't cite, but someone said, as a writer, you've experienced enough by the age of 25 to have writing material for the rest of your life. I don't know if everyone agrees with that statement, but I certainly do," McRae said. It's years of practice, and reflection, that have brought clarity to those experiences.

"I Don't Know How But They Found Me!" is composed of songs McRae wrote throughout her early 20s, in the wake of one relationship and the rise and fall of another. She finished the album last spring in North Carolina with producer Brad Cook, a collaborator of Bon Iver, Waxahatchee and Suki Waterhouse. The 10 days they spent on the record, McRae said, were "a master class."

'Help child learn to talk'

Tips to use screen time for child's development

Screen time permeates the lives of toddlers and preschoolers. For many young children, their exposure includes both direct viewing, such as watching a TV show, and indirect viewing, such as when media is on in the background during other daily activities.

As many parents will know, research points to several negative effects of screen time. As scholars who specialize in speech pathology and early childhood development, we are particularly interested in the recent finding that too much screen time is associated with less parent-child talk, such as fewer conversational turns between parents and children.

As a result, the American Academy of Pediatrics and World Health Organization suggest limiting screen time for children.

Beyond quantity, they also emphasize the quality of a child's engagement with digital media. Used in moderation, certain kinds of media can have educational and social benefits for children - and even contribute to language development.

Effectively

These tips may help parents struc-

techniques, such as participatory cues. That's when characters in shows break the "third wall" by directly talking to their young audience to prompt reflection, action or response. Research shows that children learn new words better when a show has participatory cues - perhaps because it encourages active engagement rather than passive viewing

Many classic, high-quality television shows for young children feature participatory cues, including "Mickey Mouse Clubhouse," "Dora the Ex-plorer," "Go Diego Go!" and "Daniel Tiger's Neighborhood.'

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that parents and children watch media together whenever possible

Recommendation

This recommendation is based on the evidence that increased screen media use can reduce parent-child conversation. This, in turn, can affect language development. Intentionally discussing media content with children increases language exposure during screen time.

Parents may find the following joint media engagement strategies useful: - Press pause and ask questions.

- Point out basic concepts, such as

letters and colors. - Model more advanced language using a "think aloud" approach, such as, "That surprised me! I wonder what

will happen next?" Learning from media is challenging for young children because their brains struggle to transfer informa-

Measles cases near 900 in US

NEW YORK, April 27, (AP): With one-fifth of states seeing active measles outbreaks, the US is nearing 900 cases, according to figures posted Friday by the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The CDC's confirmed measles cases count is 884, triple the amount seen in all of 2024. The vast majority - 646 - are in Texas, where an outbreak in the western part of the state that's approaching the three-month mark

Two unvaccinated elementary school-aged children died from measles-related illnesses in the epicenter in West Texas, and an adult in New Mexico who was not vaccinated died of a measles-related illness.

Other states with active outbreaks - defined as three or more cases - include Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Montana, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Tennessee.

Outbreaks

North America has two other ongoing outbreaks. One in Ontario. Canada, has resulted in 1,020 cases from mid-October through Wednesday. And as of Friday, the Mexican state of Chihuahua state had 605 measles cases, according to data from the state health ministry. The World Health Organization has said cases in Mexico are linked to the Texas outbreak.

DAKAR, Senegal, April 27, (AP): Ndeye Lam visits the cemetery often, praying and gently touching the seashells laid out across her daughter's gravesite.

"Mariama will always be here," she said, stepping away from the grave and onto a path that winds through rows of monuments outlined with white tile, stone and sand.

At home, Lam and her husband Pathé smiled over an old video clip of their daughter beaming as she celebrated her 13th birthday with cake and sparklers. When the girl was little, she loved to play. By 13, her muscles had weakened, her spine had curved and stiffened and in her last months, she struggled increasingly to breathe.

She visited Fann hospital in Dakar, where neurologist Dr. Pedro Rodriguez Cruz measured her lung capacity. He suspects Mariama had SELENONrelated myopathy, a muscular dystrophy that causes severe respiratory compromise. A new BiPAP machine might have helped to ease her breathing, but it was too late.

Globally, more than 350 million people live with rare diseases, most of them caused by a misstep hidden within their genes. Some conditions can be caught early and treated-but in parts of Africa where population data and resources are scarce, many people go undiagnosed. Rodriguez is trying to change that by connecting patients with genetic testing and medical support, while gathering key data from those patients and their families.

"Most rare disease data has been collected from people of European ancestry, so we have very little knowledge about what's happening in other parts of the world, mainly in Africa," Rodriguez said.

Almost 1,300 participants-patients and families-have enrolled in his study of rare disease in West Africa. First, screen content should be ageappropriate - that is, parents should choose shows, apps and games that are specifically designed for young children. Using a resource such as Common Sense Media allows parents to check recommended ages for television shows, movies and apps.

Second, parents can look for shows that use evidence-based educational tion and ideas from screens to the real world. Children learn more from screen media, research shows, when the content connects to their real-life experiences.

To maximize the benefits of screen time, parents can help children connect what they are viewing with experiences they've had. For example, while watching content together, a parent might say, "They're going to the zoo. Do you remember what we saw when we went to the zoo?"

This approach promotes language development and cognitive skills, including attention and memory. Children learn better with repeated exposure to words, so selecting media that relates to a child's real-life experiences can help reinforce new vocabulary. (AP)



That includes following a strict diet, avoiding protein-rich foods like nuts, fish and meat and taking the supplement L-carnitine. Though consultation with Rodriguez was free, lifelong treatment is not. If Aminata shares her sister's disease, Sané will need government assistance to buy medication.

Prof. Moustapha Ndiaye, head of the neurology department at Fann, hopes young physicians will graduate prepared to assist rare disease patients not just in Senegal but in other African countries.

Monaco drops points in CL race after drawing at Le Havre

PARIS, April 27, (AP): Monaco dropped points in the race to qualify directly for next season's Champions League after drawing 1-1 at Ligue 1 struggler Le Havre.

Monaco moved above Marseille and into second place on goal difference, but direct rivals Nice and Strasbourg both won to move one point behind Monaco with three matches left.

Lyon could also move within one point of Monaco with a home win against Rennes in Saturday's late game. The top three qualify automatically and the team finishing fourth enters qualifying.

The draw boosted Le Havre's chances of staying up after fellow relegation battler Saint-Etienne earlier lost at Strasbourg 3-1.

Le Havre was in 16th place and the relegation-promotion playoff spot, one point above Saint-Etienne.

Le Havre striker Ahmed Hassan headed in a good leftwing cross midway through the first half. Mika Biereth equalized from close range in the second half for his 13th goal of the season.

United States forward Folarin Balogun went on late for Monaco but did not get a scoring chance.

The draw relegated rock-bottom Montpellier. Saint-Etienne's defeat left the 10-time former champion in deep trouble.

Poor defending allowed home striker Emanuel Emegha to break free down the right and pick out left wing back

Diego Moreira, who finished powerfully.

Georgia winger Zuriko Davitashvili equalized with a fine solo goal after cutting in from the left flank.

Moreira returned the favor to Emegha by setting him up in the second half for the Dutch striker's 14th goal of the season. Guéla Doué - the older brother of Paris Saint-Germain star Désiré Doué - skilfully started the move which French champion PSG lost 3-1 at home to Nice to end its chances of finishing the league unbeaten.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 27, (AP): As the first team to move on to the second round of the NBA playoffs, the Oklahoma City Thunder get some time off.

Rest for the best.

Oklahoma City, which finished the regular season with the best record in the NBA at 68-14, closed out a four-game sweep of the Memphis Grizzlies on Saturday with a 117-115 victory. The Thunder, who have won eight straight dating to the regular season, await the winner of the Los Angeles Clippers-Denver Nuggets series that is tied 2-2.

The Thunder weren't sure if the break will serve as a benefit.

Madrid rallied with two second-half goals, with Kylian Mbappé coming off the bench at halftime and scoring from a free kick in the 70th and midfielder Aurélien Tchouaméni's header in the 77th, making it 2-1.

Ferran Torres leveled in the 84th to force extra time.

Barcelona has beaten Madrid in all three clásicos this season, including a 5-2 rout in the Spanish Super Cup final in January after winning 4-0 at Madrid in the league in October.

The trophy is the first piece needed to repeat a treble that Barcelona won under Pep Guardiola in 2009 and Luis Enrique in 2015.

Madrid's Antonio Rudiger was shown a red card by the referee in the final moments when he apparently threw twice at the referee and shouted aggressively.

Jude Bellingham and Lucas Vázquez were also shown red cards for protesting. One of the biggest rivalries in global soccer was again a tale of two halves - until Torres scored the late equalizer against the flow of play to renew Barcelona's prospects.
