Indeed, for Arabs, it is all 'soap'

THE Sykes-Picot Agreement was the final nail in the coffin of the Ottoman Empire. The Balfour Declaration then marked the next phase in the division of influence between Britain and France, leading to a significant increase in Jewish immigration to Palestine.

Even before that fateful declaration was issued, when Jewish settlements began to be established in Palestine in 1908, Palestinian landowners were wary of this development. However, they did not actively prevent the new settlements.

As events accelerated after World War I, the Arabs lacked the military power needed to halt the process of Judaization.

Meanwhile, Europe provided financial support to the new settlers, who succeeded in establishing a network of settlements and forming a self-defense

After World War II, Europe and Germany, seeking to atone for the atrocities committed by Hitler against the Jews, facilitated the increased Jewish immigration to Palestine.

This historical context is crucial in countering attempts to displace Palestinians from their land, particularly in light of the Israeli Finance Minister's statement about relocating Gaza's population to a third country.

For nearly two decades, several Arab countries have witnessed civil wars and internal divisions. Yet, despite this, the slogan "Free Palestine" continues to be raised, while actions often move in the opposite direction, or as we say in Kuwaiti slang, "praying towards the east."



KUWAIT CITY, May 19: Syrian President Ahmad Al-Sharaa is scheduled to visit Kuwait at the end of this month, marking his first official trip to the country since assuming leadership during the transitional period, reports Al-Seyassah daily quoting Syrian sources.

Kuwait, Microsoft accelerate digital future

KUWAIT CITY, May 19, (KUNA): Kuwait's Minister of State for Communications Affairs Omar Al-Omar affirmed on Monday the ministry's commitment to accelerating digital integration and enhancing government innovation by implementing the terms of its strategic partnership with Microsoft.

In a speech during a high-level meeting with Microsoft's Executive Vice President and Chief Commercial Officer, Judson Bezek-Althoff, Minister Al-Omar said that Kuwait is making steady progress toward building an integrated digital system capable of keeping pace with global developments, enhancing the quality of government services, and creating an environ-

ment conducive to innovation and investment. He also noted that one of the most important gains of this partnership is the empowerment of national competencies through specialized training programs in artificial intelligence, cybersecurity, and advanced technologies, consolidating the role of Kuwaiti cadres in leading the transformation towards a competitive and sustainable digital economy.

In turn, Acting Chairman of the Communications and Information Technology Regulatory Authority (CITRA) Sheikh Athbi Jaber Al-Sabah said that the launch of the AI-powered data center project, in partnership with Microsoft and with direct support from the CITRA, is a pivotal step in Kuwait's digital future.

Sheikh Athbi affirmed that the Authority has taken it upon itself to serve as a link between relevant government agencies and international partners, most notably Microsoft, to ensure the necessary environment is created to establish and operate advanced data centers that serve the country's needs and support its ambitions towards digital transformation.





Imports helped curtail load shedding in April

KUWAIT CITY, May 19: The April report of the Statistics Department at the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy revealed that the electricity grid imported 599,151 megawatts or 832 megawatts per day last month; thereby, limiting the implementation of the programmed power cuts.

According to the report, the maximum electrical load reached 13,150 megawatts on April 26; while the minimum load reached 7,460 megawatts on April 1 and 18.

Meanwhile, with regard to freshwater statistics, the maximum net consumption reached 466.904 million imperial gallons on April 30, the maximum daily water storage reached 2,592.801 million imperial gallons on April 29, and the lowest daily storage reached 2,217.044 million imperial gallons on April 17.

Furthermore, the report indicated that the ministry connected electricity to 790 customers in various residential sectors in April. Private residential customers topped the list with 698, followed by the government sector with 40, investment sector with 16, commercial sector with 13, industrial sector with 12 and agricultural sector with 11.

The report indicated that the total load provided to new customers reached 94,245,020 kilowatts; while stating that 21 employees were added to the total number of Kuwaiti and non-Kuwaiti employees, reaching 35,677 compared to 35,656 in March. It also disclosed that the percentage of Kuwaiti employees at the ministry reached 97.8 percent.

Wily neighbor ... and bid to take us back to square one

"In recent days, as Iraq has increased pressure on Kuwait and mobilized all popular and parliamentary forces, we have observed that the issue has shifted from an internal Iraqi dispute to an attempt to drag Kuwait into a situation where it has no involvement, either directly or indirectly", Kuwaiti journalist Hassan Ali Karam wrote for Al-Seyassah daily.

"The Iraqi leadership, represented by President Hussein Rashid and Prime Minister Mohammad Shia al-Sudani,

submitted two letters to the Iraqi Federal Court challenging its ruling that rejected the Iraqi parliament's vote on the international resolution regarding the division of Khor Abdullah between Kuwait and Iraq.

on this matter came from Nouri al-Maliki, the former Prime Minister, who has been a main figure in the case from the very beginning.

"Al-Maliki stated that he visited Kuwait with a ministerial delegation and agreed that the Khor Abdullah would be designated as an international waterway. He added that Iraq was not present during the discussions on dividing the border in Khor Abdullah between Kuwait and Iraq. Experts decided to split the Khor equally between the two countries, with the deeper side allocated to Kuwait and the shallower side to Iraq, with a commitment to eventually deepen the shallow side.

"The renewal of this case arises not only from the letters sent by the President and Prime Minister to the Federal Court, nor because Iraq is set to hold parliamentary elections next November, but there is something more significant at play . Iraq, which has established the Faw Port, is located far from Khor Abdullah, while Kuwait's Mubarak Port directly overlooks the creek, giving it a clear advantage over Faw Port.

"The Iraqis have constructed roads and tunnels from their new port, which is expected to become operational by the end of this year. In contrast, Mubarak Port, due to its proximity to the creek, requires no additional infrastructure, only the regular roads and tunnels.

"Therefore, the Iraqis are deeply concerned about Mubarak Port, fearing it could undermine the viability of Faw Port. However, these fears are based on speculation and unfounded illusions. The region is home to numerous large ports directly overlooking the Gulf, the most significant of which are the Iranian ports, which are in close proximity to the Faw ports. Iraq currently uses Iranian ports due to their proximity to Basra and their ability to accommodate large vessels.

"Iraq's escalation, along with the mobilization of parties, tribes, and paid media, is an unjustified approach to what is essentially a technical matter for which experts from both countries could resolve with a suitable solution. Unfortunately, this escalation, combined with the return of insults directed at Kuwait and claims of Iraqi ownership over its territory, does not bode well. This rise in tensions stems from the ill intentions of certain individuals, particularly Baathists, loyalists, and the remnants of Saddam's

"In recent months, we have breathed a sigh of relief, thanks to football events and mutual visits between the youth of Kuwait and Iraq, particularly the dear people of Basra, Kuwait's closest and most beloved port of call.

"Any desperate attempts to change the Security Council resolutions regarding the brutal Iraqi invasion of Kuwait will only lead to disappointment. Therefore, Iraqis who harbor resentment toward Kuwait, and those who are sick in their souls, should not indulge in these notions and should not look back.

"Just as some ignorant individuals spread lies and nonsense to manipulate the minds of the naive, there is also history - books, records, and documents - that, if opened, would only magnify their losses.

losses.
"The Security Council resolutions regarding the Iraqi aggression against Kuwait were not issued for entertainment or to hide the crisis. They were made in accordance with Chapter VII of the UN Charter, and they are irreversible."

Also:

"Personal priority is the goal that takes precedence in one's actions. It is something a wise person must strive to achieve first, before anything else. When a person's priorities become disturbed or confused, they inevitably live their life without a clear sense of purpose", Kuwaiti writer **Dr. Khaled Al-Jenfawi** wrote for **Al-Seyassah** daily.

"Some of the causes and manifestations of this disturbed psychological and intellectual state, as well as how to determine personal priorities in today's turbulent world, include the following:

"Causes and manifestations: Excessive immersion in emotional thinking can prevent an individual from determining their personal priorities. Also, excessive dependency leads to wasting time and effort on things that offer no benefit (negative intellectual and psychological dependency).

"Manifestations of disordered priorities include preoccupation with matters that have nothing to do with the person, involvement in battles that are not their concern, pathological obsession with seeking approval from others at the expense of their own true goals, adherence to exploitative ideologies, and the reckless dedication of their time and energy to fulfilling the priorities of those who do not deserve such commitment.

"The more a person refuses to educate themselves about the realities of life, the

more disordered their priorities become. Immersing oneself in tribalism, sectarianism, and factionalism only wastes time, energy, and effort on matters that are ultimately fruitless. Furthermore, spending excessive zeal defending an idea more than its original proponent, and associating with fools and failures, only distracts from what truly matters.

only distracts from what truly matters.

"Setting personal priorities: True personal priorities arise from the innate tendency of a psychologically healthy and intellectually mature person to achieve self-sufficiency and care for those they love. The clearer their vision in this regard, the better they understand their rights, obligations, and what they must focus on achieving. The more they concentrate on what serves their legitimate personal interests, the clearer their priorities become.

"Those who strive to acquire critical thinking and personal decision-making skills are better equipped to define their priorities. Engaging with wise people will further illuminate which matters truly deserve attention and which should be left aside. Reading insightful writings clarifies vision and enlightens the mind.

"So, take the time to define your true priorities before it becomes difficult. May your efforts be blessed."

"Persuasion, not coercion, is the cornerstone of political and media discourse. Attempting to impose persuasion with weak arguments does not lead to sound opinions or accurate positions. Forcing people to engage with media and diplomatic discourse that lacks rhetorical skills only produces unproductive outcomes. The inevitable result is political failure", columnist Khalid Ahmad Al-Tarrah wrote for Al-Seyassah daily.

"The Kuwaiti delegation in Geneva took its seat at the United Nations Human Rights Council during the 49th session of the Universal Periodic Review, which focused on Kuwait's achievements in this regard. The session was full of surprises. The speeches lacked the skill to effectively direct the discourse, except for reciting the written text.

"Unfortunately, a traditional and rigid style dominated Kuwait's presentation, focusing excessively on the historical narrative and failing to break free from a cycle of weak arguments, arguments that, in fact, raised more questions than they answered.

"Main elements of effective discourse,

Main elements of effective discourse, such as eye contact and body language, were neglected. I can confirm that the Ministry of Foreign Affairs is closely monitoring international publications on human rights in Kuwait, along with the questions and observations raised regarding freedom of expression and national identity.

"However, it seems the ministry has not approached these issues with sufficient thoughtfulness in its reading and analysis, nor has it been prepared to adopt a more unconventional approach to discourse. I have received feedback from academics and specialists criticizing Kuwait's speech in Geneva for its lack of professionalism, contradictions, and failure to understand the significance of foreign presence at the meeting, and its cultures.

"The Kuwaiti discourse deviated from political and media correctness when addressing the details of the revocation of citizenships, referring to them as "administrative decisions," not "decrees," and raising the legitimate question: What has the government done about all of this from both a legal and political standpoint?

"Does explaining these details serve or undermine the intended goal? Does it strengthen the political argument or weaken its credibility, especially when the picture remains unclear about who was responsible for the administrative

one knows. From a media and political perspective, every issue has its own reasons, justifications, and motives.

"Regarding free education, it would have been more appropriate to focus on explaining the mechanisms for updating and developing curricula to combat religious extremism and intellectual terrorism, rather than simply recounting the well-known history of free education in Kuwait, which is recognized worldwide.

"As for Kuwait's speech on illegal residents (Bedoun), it lacked a clear, objective argument explaining the factors that transformed the issue from a small problem into an inexplicable and unjustifiable political and legal crisis. Simply reciting written texts was not a commendable approach. The Kuwaiti discourse lacked the essential elements and skills needed to deliver an impactful political message, including effective communication, proper use of gestures, and the expressive tones of voice.

"As for the international consensus on the Kuwait report, publishing the recommendations, international observations, and any Kuwaiti pledges, if any, would provide a clearer picture of the global response to the report.

"It is well known that there are systematic, non-random international procedures during such reviews, even if the recommendations are not legally binding on Kuwait. Unfortunately, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs has placed promising young talent in a challenging position. The lack of preparation and prior train-

Housing, sustainable development on agenda

KUWAIT CITY, May 19, (KUNA): The Third Gulf Housing Week (GHW) kicked off on Sunday in Kuwait and will run until Thursday, beginning with the 47th meeting of the GCC Technical Committee on Housing Affairs.

Deputy Director General for Planning at the Public Authority for Housing Welfare (PAHW) Engineer Nasser Khuraibet said in a statement to KUNA that the meeting discussed enhancing

regional cooperation in housing and sustainable urban development. Khuraibet explained that the meeting's agenda included reviewing and discussing the Gulf Joint Housing Action Plan (2024-2030), which aims to unify efforts and facilitate the exchange of expertise among GCC countries.

The meeting marked the official launch of the third Gulf Housing Week (GHW), which features a series of events and activities aimed

at raising awareness and strengthening communication between housing authorities and local communities, Khuraibet added.

The activities also include the second edition of the Gulf Housing Hackathon, with the participation of students from architecture and planning faculties across GCC countries, aimed at encouraging youth innovation in smart and sustainable housing solutions.

Huge cache of drugs found on four 'Bedoun' residents – Mol

Expat duped ... phone, cash stolen

KUWAIT CITY, May 19: Ministry of Interior announced that the Criminal Security Sector, represented by the Drug Control General Department (DCGD), arrested four Bedoun residents, identified only as M.A., A.J., S.S., and S.A, in possession of various quantities of narcotics and intoxicants, reports Al-Sevassah daily.

Authorities discovered the following items in their possession: 15,000 Lyrica capsules, 100 grams of cocaine, 500 grams of Chemical drug, 250 grams of hashish, 80 psychotropic pills, a sensitive weighing scale, and KD 10,590, suspected to be profits from drug

rafficking.

The ministry affirmed that the necessary legal procedures have been taken against the individuals, who have been referred to the competent authorities for further action.

Phone, cash stolen: The Criminal Security Department at the Interior Ministry recently closed a robbery case titled, 'Forced Robbery', after apprehending the suspect -- a young Gulf national who was positively identified by the victim, an expatriate, in a police lineup, reports Al-Anba daily.

According to a security source, an expatriate born in 1982 filed a report at Hawally Police Station. In his report, the victim narrated "I signed a contract with a telecommunications company to purchase an iPhone. Since I no longer needed the device, I put it up for sale on social media. Two days later,

someone interested in purchasing the phone contacted me.

We agreed on the price and I shared my location. The individual came to the basement of my building, asked to inspect the phone, and requested to see my civil identification card. The potential buyer then ran off with my phone and wallet." The victim reported that his wallet contained KD1,860.

The source affirmed that the case was immediately referred to detectives who traced the phone number used to contact the victim. A carefully planned entrapment led to the arrest of the suspect outside his residence in Jahra Governorate.

During questioning, the suspect confessed to the crime after being presented with the victim's statement and surveillance footage of the incident. He admitted to reselling the stolen iPhone to a store in the Capital Governorate and that he already spent the stolen money.

Crackdown leads to wanted people, criminals arrest

KUWAIT CITY, May 19: The Rescue Police General Department at the Interior Ministry continued its security campaigns to pursue wanted individuals and outlaws.

Last week's campaigns resulted in the arrest of 42 individuals who were referred to the Drug

Control General Department (DCGD).

The weekly statistics revealed the implementation of 1,927 security operations; during which 147 wanted individuals, eight individuals with criminal convictions, and 87 individuals without identification were apprehended.

In addition, 104 absconding cases were recorded, while two individuals with theft reports against them and 149 individuals with expired

residency permits were referred to the competent authorities.

Meanwhile, rescue officers dealt with nine fights, referred 36 wanted vehicles to the concerned authorities, and provided assistance to 674 individuals. The rescue patrols issued 3,026 citations for various traffic violations; including 33 violations related to the use of parking spaces designated for people with disabilities.



KUWAIT CITY, May 19: The Ministry of Islamic Affairs has launched its procurement plan for the 2025/2026 fiscal year, which includes approximately 212 tenders and projects of all sectors of the ministry.

The tenders aim to implement a variety of projects aimed at developing and expanding the ministry's services in various religious, administrative, and technical fields.

The plan highlights the implementation of several major construction and service projects. Notable among them are the establishment of Quranic studies centers, residential facilities for imams and muezzins, and Ouran memorization centers in various areas of Kuwait.

There will also be modules to manage Hajj and Umrah operations, as well as campaign-related complaints and evaluations.

The plan also includes a tender for automating the Islamic Studies Sector, aimed at completing the analysis, development, and maintenance of a modern electronic educational system for the Quran and Islamic Studies Sector.

In addition, the ministry will issue a tender for the development, updating, and maintenance of its electronic portal to automate government services provided through its official

Is fall of the Jordanian Muslim Brotherhood just a beginning?

n 1945, Abdul Latif Qura founded the Muslim Brotherhood in the Emirate of Transjordan, which later became the Kingdom of Jordan. Around the same time, the late Abdul Aziz Al-Ali Al-Mutawa established the same group in Kuwait.

Initially, both organizations started as peaceful charitable groups, focused on promoting good morals and avoiding litical involvement. I don't know anyone from my gen-



eration, or older, who was not once a member of this organization.

However, as the group became increasingly embroiled in political quagmires, some of its early founders, including Abdul Aziz Al-Mutawa, distanced themselves from it, leaving it in the hands of those more aligned with Al-Banna's radical ideology. Over time, the organization collapsed.

In the early 1960s, the Muslim Brotherhood was revived, taking on a more hard line stance and increasingly infiltrating political life, with the back-

ing of influential government agencies. After the defeat in June 1967, the group's influence grew, along with the other branches of the Muslim Brotherhood

In this context, scholar Mohamed Metwally Al-Shaarawy famously remarked that he thanked God for the defeat of the "atheist" Soviet weapons used by his country's army, which were countered by the "faithful" American weapons used by Israel in that war.

The Muslim Brotherhood, outside of Egypt, has always been a peculiar offshoot of the original organization. Evidence of this lies in the fact that, for 70 years, the Supreme Guidance Council of the Muslim Brotherhood, which has led the international organization, has never included any members from outside Egypt, except as symbolic figures, primarily to enhance financial gain.

The Muslim Brotherhood is notori-

ous for its volatility and pragmatism. It can be seen supporting state authority

one day, opposing it the next, and then aligning with the government again for years, depending on the laws that serve its interests and the ministries it

One of the biggest dangers has been the Muslim Brotherhood's control over education curricula for more than half

It is ironic that the Muslim Brotherhood parties in Egypt and Jordan have long relied on funding from the Gulf, particularly Kuwait, and yet, they were the first to betray Kuwait when Saddam Hussein invaded the country. The Muslim Brotherhood's accept-

ance of billions in foreign funding stands as one of the most telling contradictions to their claims of independence. The dramatic 180-degree shift in their stance after Kuwait's liberation serves as clear evidence of their true

The ultimate goal of the Muslim Brotherhood is to seize power and establish a caliphate, with the caliph inevitably being the same as their Supreme Guide once they gain control in any country.

The Muslim Brotherhood has no homeland; they believe in a universal regime. Given this, how can any government genuinely accept or compromise with them, even reluctantly?

Jordan, Egypt, the United Arab Emirates, and Saudi Arabia made no mistake in taking action against the Muslim Brotherhood in their societies.

Testimonies from senior officials in these countries reveal the group's treachery, malicious intent, and the urgent need to prevent their activities.

Many intelligence reports have shown that the Muslim Brotherhood uses charitable organizations and associations as fronts to fund its operations and spread its ideology worldwide, extending beyond Arab and Islamic na-

In response, the governments took decisive action by shutting down all fundraising websites that specialized in collecting donations for many, often fraudulent projects. The funds raised were frequently funneled to organizations or parties linked to the Muslim Brotherhood, and eventually ended up in their secret bank accounts.



These accusations were used to justify Major Jamal Abdel Nasser's coup against the king in 1952 and the secession of Sudan from Egypt. Such claims were also exploited by power-seekers in different Arab countries.

This period marked the beginning of a wave of revolutions (coups) that swept through the Arab world, starting with Iraq and Syria, followed by a failed coup attempt in Lebanon, Yemen, and Libya. In 1969, Colonel Muammar Gaddafi led a coup that ousted King Idris Al-Senussi in Libya.

I still remember the chants of the demonstrators in Tripoli that day, shouting, "The Devil is better than Idris." It is said that when King Idris Al-Senussi heard those chants, he prayed to God that Libya be ruled by the Devil.

We all know the history of Gaddafi after the success of his coup and how he adopted the liberation of Palestine as his slogan. However, Gaddafi went too far in threatening Arab rulers, intervening in the Lebanese civil war, and attempting to invade Chad, instead of directing his army to liberate Palestine.

In 2011, Muammar Gaddafi's regime collapsed, and he was killed in one of the most brutal ways. Following his death, militia leaders took control of various regions in Libya. Despite being a country rich in natural resources, with beautiful coastlines and fertile land, Libya has been reduced to ruins since 1969.

This is similar to what the Ba'ath Party regime did in Iraq, under Saddam Hussein, who also raised the slogan of liberating Palestine. Saddam even went so far as to declare the formation of the "Jerusalem Army." However, instead of marching into Palestine, he invaded Kuwait.

What has recently transpired in Libya, with Abdul Ghani al-Kikli, also known as "Ghaniwa al-Kikli," attempting to seize control of the country's resources and loot the central bank, mirrors what gangs in Somalia and Iraq have done.

It has become evident that the slogan of liberating Palestine is often nothing more than a justification or pretext for theft and the illegal assumption of power. Even Palestinian factions, who are supposed to be the most dedicated to their cause, are not exempt from this behavior.

This is why the proverb "It is all soap to the Arabs," which has been a hallmark of Arab culture since the year 800, when Ibn Khaldun referenced it in his book "Ibn Khaldun and the Arabs", seems especially relevant today.

What is happening in the Middle East is the result of a long history of division and discord, often at the expense of peoples and nations. In the end, as the saying goes, for Arabs, it is all "soap".

Omar Al-Samati, advisor to Lahj Governor, said in a press statement that construction of the small village was part of the efforts by the State of Kuwait and the association to support sustainable humanitarian projects in Yemen.

Such ventures largely help in improving Yemenis' living conditions and alleviate their hardships, particularly in rural regions where basic services are scarce, Al-Samati said.

For some, it's too late

US reinstates records for int'l students

WASHINGTON, May 19, (AP): After the government terminated his legal status in the US, one student abruptly lost his laboratory job in Houston and, fearing detention, he returned to his home country in south Asia on a one-way ticket.

The Trump administration later reversed course in its expansive crackdown on international students, but there was a major obstacle. The student cannot return because his American visa was revoked.

Without it, he's "stranded," said the student, who spoke on condition of anonymity for fear of retaliation. As the government begins rein-

a daunting and complicated path toward rebuilding their lives. For those who left, there is no guarantee they can return. Others have faced challenges reenrolling in school and returning to jobs.

Mental anguish from their ordeals linger, as do feelings of vulnerability. Immigration and Customs Enforcement has expanded the grounds for terminating a student's legal status, leaving many to fear they could be targeted again.

A total of more than 4,700 international students had their permission to study in the U.S. canceled

this spring, with little notice or explanation. In court hearings, Department of Homeland Security officials said they ran the names of student visa holders through an FBI-run database that contains the names of

suspects and people who have been arrested, even if they were never charged with a crime or had charges dropped.

At a court hearing last week in Oakland, California, lawyers for international students sought a nationwide injunction they said would protect their clients and others across the country.

But government attorneys said that wasn't necessary because ICE was mailing status reactivation letters to affected students. It likely will take two weeks for all students to receive their letter, which can then be shared with universities and employers, assistant US attorney Elizabeth Kurlan said.

The plaintiffs' lawyers said the letter is meaningless, arguing ICE's new policy suggests student records can be terminated on a whim. There's also no evidence ICE has asked the State Department to restore revoked visas, the plaintiffs' attorneys said.

The man in Houston left within about a week of learning his legal status had been terminated. Around that time, he also received an email that the visa he used to enter the U.S. had been revoked. He believes his termination stemmed from a 2021 fraud case that was dismissed.

Trump's big bill advances in weekend vote as conservative holdouts secure changes

WASHINGTON, May 19, (AP): US Republicans advanced their massive tax cut and border security package out of a key House committee during a rare Sunday night vote as deficit hawks who blocked the measure two days earlier reversed course after gaining commitments on the package's spending cuts.

Speaker Mike Johnson met with Republican lawmakers shortly before the meeting, telling reporters that the changes agreed to were "just some minor modifications. Not a huge thing."

Democrats on the panel pressed for more details about the changes that Republicans had agreed to in the private negotiations. But Rep. Jodey Arrington, the chairman of the House Budget Committee, said he could not do so.

"Deliberations continue at this very moment," Arrington said. "They will continue on into the week, and I suspect right up until the time we put this big, beautiful bill on the floor of the House."

The first time Republicans tried advancing the bill out of the House Budget Committee, deficit hawks joined with Democratic lawmakers in voting against reporting the measure to the full House. Five Republicans voted no, one on procedural grounds, the other four voicing concerns about the bill's impact on federal budget deficits.

On Sunday evening, the four voicing concerns about the bill's impact on the deficit voted present, and the measure

passed by a vote of 17-16. Johnson is looking to put the bill on the House floor before the end of the week.

"This is the vehicle through which we will deliver on the mandate that the American people gave us in the last election." he said on "Fox News Sunday."

The Republicans who criticized the measure noted that the bill's new spend-

ing and the tax cuts are front-loaded in the bill, while the measures to offset the cost are back-loaded. For example, they are looking to speed up the new work requirements that Republicans want to enact for able-bodied participants in Medicaid. Those requirements would not kick in until 2029 under the current

We wish Joe a fast and successful recovery: Trump

Former US president Biden diagnosed with aggressive prostate cancer

WASHINGTON, May 19, (AP): Former US President Joe Biden has been diagnosed with prostate cancer, his office said Sunday.

The finding came after the 82-year-old reported urinary symptoms, which led doctors to discover a nodule on his prostate. He was diagnosed with prostate cancer on Friday, with the cancer cells having spread to the bone.

"While this represents a more aggressive form of the disease, the cancer appears to be hormone-sensitive which allows for effective management," his office said. "The President and his family are reviewing treatment options with his physicians"

Prostate cancers are graded for aggressiveness using what's known as a Gleason score. The scores range from 6 to 10, with 8, 9 and 10 prostate cancers behaving more aggressively. Biden's office said his score was 9, suggesting his cancer is among the most aggressive.

When prostate cancer spreads to other parts of the body, it often spreads to the bones. Metastasized cancer is much harder to treat than localized cancer because it can be hard for drugs to reach all the tumors and completely root out the disease. However, when prostate cancers need hormones to grow, as in Biden's case,

they can be susceptible to treatment that deprives the tumors of hormones.

Outcomes have improved in recent decades and patients can expect to live with metastatic prostate cancer for four or five years, said Dr. Matthew Smith of Massachusetts General Brigham Cancer Center.

"It's very treatable, but not curable," Smith said. "Most men in this situation would be treated with drugs and would not be advised to have either surgery or radiation theorem."

radiation therapy."

Many political leaders sent Biden their wishes for his recovery.

President Donald Trump, a longtime political opponent, posted on social media that he was saddened by the news and "we wish Joe a fast and successful recov-

ery."

Biden's vice president, Kamala Harris, said on social media that she was keeping him in her family's "hearts and prayers during this time."

"Joe is a fighter - and I know he will face this challenge with the same strength, resilience, and optimism that have always defined his life and leadership," Harris wrote

Former President Barack Obama said his thoughts and prayers were with Biden, his former vice president, lauding his toughness. "Nobody has done more to find breakthrough treatments for cancer in all its forms than Joe, and I am certain he will fight this challenge with his trademark resolve and grace," Obama wrote on social media.

The health of Biden was a dominant concern among voters during his time as president. After a calamitous debate performance in June while seeking reelection, Biden abandoned his bid for a second term. Harris became the nominee and lost to Trump, a Republican who returned to the White House after a four-year biotus

But in recent days, Biden rejected concerns about his age despite reporting in the new book "Original Sin" by Jake Tapper and Alex Thompson that aides had shielded the public from the extent of his decline while serving as president.

In February 2023, Biden had a skin lesion removed from his chest that was a basal cell carcinoma, a common form of skin cancer. And in November 2021, he had a polyp removed from his colon that was a benign, but potentially precancerous lesion.

In 2022, Biden made a "cancer moonshot" one of his administration's priorities with the goal of halving the cancer death rate over the next 25 years. The initiative was a continuation of his work as vice president to address a disease that had killed his older son, Beau, who died from brain cancer in 2015.

His father, when announcing the goal to halve the cancer death rate, said this could be an "American moment to prove to ourselves and, quite frankly, the world that we can do really big things."

Portugal election brings another minority govt, far-right rise

Portugal's president was due to convene the country's political parties for consultations on Monday, after a general election delivered another minority government as well as an unprecedented showing by populist party Chega (Enough) that added momentum to Europe's shift to the far-right.

The center-right Democratic Alliance, led by the Social Demo-

cratic Party, captured 89 seats in the 230-seat National Assembly to win Sunday's ballot. The outcome leaves it without a parliamentary majority, however, and vulnerable to opposition parties that ousted it two months ago in a confidence vote after less than a year in pow-

Portugal's third general election in three years provided little hope

for ending the worst spell of political instability for decades in the European Union country of 10.6 million

people.
"The Portuguese don't want any more early elections," Luis Montenegro, the Democratic Alliance leader and incoming prime minister, said late Sunday in an appeal for opposition parties to let him serve a full four-year term. (AP)

Flights disrupted at Paris-Orly after ATC breakdown

PARIS, May 19, (AP): France's civil aviation authority said some flights were still being cancelled and others delayed on Monday at Paris-Orly airport, one day after air traffic control (ATC) systems suffered a breakdown that caused substantial disruption.

"The situation is improving," the authority, known as DGAC said, in a statement. Airlines have been asked to reduce flights by 15% on Monday - down from a 40% reduction on Sunday.

"Despite these preventive measures, delays are expected," the statement said.

Landslide threatens Alpine village, authorities expand evacuation order

GENEVA, May 19, (AP): Swiss authorities on Monday expanded the evacuation of an Alpine village threatened by a possible landslide, ordering most of its people to leave.

More than 90 people were evacuated on Saturday night from their homes in Blatten, in the Lötschental - a valley above the larger Rhone valley in the southern Valais canton (state).

On Monday, authorities in Valais announced the complete evacuation of the village of some 300 people, with the exception of two areas, citing a risk of falling rocks and landslides

Trump hopes for ceasefire progress in calls with Putin and Zelenskyy

WASHINGTON, May 19, (AP): US President Donald Trump is hoping separate phone calls Monday with Russian leader Vladimir Putin and Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy will make progress toward a ceasefire in the war in Ukraine.

Trump expressed his hopes for a "productive day" Monday - and a ceasefire - in a social media post over the weekend. His effort will also include calls to NATO leaders.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov confirmed to the media on Monday that Putin and Trump will speak at 5 p.m. Moscow time (1400 GMT), about 10 a.m. Eastern, and called the conversation "important, given the talks that took place in Istanbul" last week between Russian and Ukrainian officials, the first such negotiations since March

Trump has struggled to end a war that began with Russia's invasion in February 2022, and that makes these conversations a serious test of his reputation as a dealmaker after having claimed he would quickly settle the conflict once he was back in the White House, if not even before he took of-

The Republican president is banking on the idea that his force of personality and personal history with Putin will be enough to break any impasse over a pause in the fighting.

"His sensibilities are that he's got to get on the phone with President Putin, and that is going to clear up some of the logjam and get us to the place that we need to get to," said Trump's envoy, Steve Witkoff. "I think it's going to be a very successful call."

Still, there are fears that Trump has an affinity for Putin that could put Ukraine at a disadvantage with any agreements engineered by the U.S. government.

Bridget Brink said she resigned last month as the U.S. ambassador to Ukraine "because the policy since

the beginning of the administration was to put pressure on the victim Ukraine, rather than on the aggressor, Russia."

Brink said the sign that she needed to depart was an Oval Office meeting in February where Trump and his team openly berated Zelenskyy for not be-

ing sufficiently deferential to them.

"I believe that peace at any price is not peace at all," Brink said. "It's appeasement and as we know from history, appeasement only leads to more war."

Trump's frustration about the war had been building before his post Saturday on Truth Social about the coming calls, which he said would begin first with Putin at 10 a.m. Mon-

day.
Trump said his discussion with Putin would focus on stopping the "bloodbath" of the war. It also will cover trade, a sign that Trump might be seeking to use financial incentives

to broker some kind of agreement after Russia's invasion led to severe sanctions by the United States and its allies that have steadily eroded Moscow's ability to grow.

Trump's hope, according to the post, is that "a war that should have never happened will end."

His treasury secretary, Scott Bessent, said Sunday on NBC's "Meet the Press" that Trump had made it clear that a failure by Putin to negotiate "in good faith" could lead to additional sanctions against Russia.

Bessent suggested the sanctions that began during the administration of Democratic President Joe Biden were inadequate because they did not stop Russia's oil revenues, due to concerns that doing so would increase US prices. The United States sought to cap Russia's oil revenues while preserving the country's petroleum exports to limit the damage from the inflation that the war produced.

Russia outlaws Amnesty Int'l

MOSCOW, May 19, (AP): The Russian authorities on Monday outlawed Amnesty International as an "undesirable organization," a label that under a 2015 law makes involvement with such organizations a criminal offense.

The decision by the Russian Prosecutor General's office, announced in an online statement, is the latest in the unrelenting crackdown on Kremlin critics, journalists and activists that intensified to unprecedented levels after Moscow invaded Ukraine in February 2022.

The designation means the international human rights group must stop any work in Russia and it subjects those who cooperate with it or support it to pros-

'North Korea likely had Russian support for air-to-air missiles'

TOKYO, May 19, (Agencies): South Korea on Monday raised the possibility that North Korea received technological assistance from Russia in developing a new air-to-air missile following the North's test of the weapon last week, Yonhap News Agency reported.

"We believe there is an association," Col. Lee Sung-jun, spokesperson for the Joint Chiefs of Staff (JCS), told a press briefing in Seoul, when asked whether the North received arms and advanced technology from Russia in exchange for its troop deployment.

Lee said, however, that further analysis is necessary to determine the extent and scope of Russia's possible technological assistance.

"There have been many cases in which the North attempted to deceive or exaggerate issues in securing parts and material have led to delays in de-

ployment," he said.
"We believe the weapons systems will also take considerable time (to be operational).'

On Saturday, the North's state media reported North Korean leader Kim Jong-un oversaw anti-air com-

bat and air raid drills by an air force flight group earlier in the week, unveiling what appeared to be a live-fire drill involving a new air-to-air missile launched from a MiG-29 fighter jet.

The North's latest drills came as

Kim has been highlighting the importance of modernizing conventional weapons as he recently made a series of public visits to military units and munitions factories and emphasized stronger war preparations.

SEOUL: Lee Jae-myung, presidential candidate of South Korea's majority liberal Democratic Party, led a poll for the June 3 presidential election, Flower Research survey showed Monday. Lee came out on top with a support rate of 52.1 percent, taking a big lead over Kim Moon-soo, the second-biggest conservative People Power Party's presidential candidate who garnered 29.5 percent of support. The human rights lawyer-turned-politician maintained his position as a presidential frontrunner in the June 3 election, triggered by the removal of former President Yoon Suk-yeol from office over his botched martial law imposition last December. Lee lost the 2022 presidential election to Yoon by the country's narrowest margin of 0.73 percentage points. The Democratic Party won an approval score of 50.3 percent, while 32.0 percent supported the People Power Party, the survey showed. The result was based on a poll of 2,007 voters conducted between Friday and Saturday. It had plus and minus 2.2 percentage points in margin of error with a 95-percent confidence level.

3 dead in lightning strike at Angkor Wat

Three people were killed and several others injured when they were struck by lightning while visiting Cambodia's famous Angkor Wat temple complex.

They had been seeking shelter around the main temple of the UNESCO site when the lightning struck late Friday afternoon.

Video posted on social media showed two ambulances arriving in the aftermath and onlookers and site officials carrying out some injured people and helping others out on foot. Other images showed multiple people being treated in the hospital.

The day after the incident, Cambodia's Minister of Tourism Hout Hak issued a statement telling people to take down online posts about it, saying the spreading of "negative information" could harm the country's tourism sector. (AP)

Nations vow to boost economic and defense ties

Thailand, Indonesia announce strategic partnership

BANGKOK, May 19, (AP): Indonesia and Thailand agreed Monday to elevate their relationship to a strategic partnership, during the first state visit by an Indonesian president in 20 years and agreed to push for greater trade and investment.

President Prabowo Subianto, who took power last year, was welcomed by Thai Prime Minister Paetongtarn Shinawatra in intermittent rain at Government House in Bangkok. As is traditional, the two leaders reviewed an honor guard before heading inside to hold bilateral talks on the future shape of their relationship.

Subianto's visit also coincided with the 75th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations between the two countries.

Paetongtarn said that the two countries agreed to boost cooperation in various fields including trade and investment, tourism, and food security.

The decision to elevate the two countries' relations to strategic partnership "reflects our shared commitment to strengthen cooperation in several aspects on issues of mutual interest to the people of both countries," Paetongtarn said in a statement.

They also discussed defense and security issues, which include "enhancing maritime security collaboration, strengthening counterterrorism efforts, bolstering cybersecurity cooperation, increasing joint military exercises and fostering defense industry partnerships," Subianto said in his speech.

Paetongtarn said Thai and Indonesian police will strengthen cooperation in suppressing transnational crimes, especially online scams, human trafficking and drug trafficking.

Dozens of Indonesians earlier this year were freed from scam centers in Myanmar and repatriated through Thailand, in part of a large-scale regional crackdown effort. Hundreds of thousands of people are believed to have been lured to work in the region to commit global scams through false romances, bogus investment pitches and illegal gambling schemes. Many of the workers were recruited under false pretenses, only to find themselves trapped in virtual slavery.

Ministers from both countries also signed a memorandum of understanding on health cooperation in a number of fields including prevention and control of communicable diseases and medical tourism.

They also discussed the ongoing crisis in Myanmar, and Subianto praised Thailand's constructive role, especially in engaging neighboring countries to seek a peaceful solution in Myanmar and facilitating dialogue between all parties.

"We emphasized the importance of an inclusive national dialogue that can achieve peace and stability in Myanmar," Subianto said, "We also emphasized the importance of maintaining the unity and centrality of ASEAN."

The crisis in Myanmar has emerged as one of the bloc's biggest challenges since a military coup ousted an elected civilian government in February 2021, plunging the country into conflict. It has sparked an armed resistance movement, with rebel forces now controlling large parts of the country. The war has killed tens of thousands of people, and displaced millions.

Mexico to elect new judges on June 1 after contentious process

MEXICO CITY, May 19, (AP): What do an activist searching for missing Mexicans, an attorney who once represented a drug lord and a university professor trying out TikTok have in common?

They are all campaigning for positions in Mexico's first judicial election on June 1.

More than 2,600 contenders are vying for 881 positions from Mexico's Supreme Court down to district courts across the country. In 2027, another election is planned to elect 800 more

judicial positions. Those on the June 1 ballots won a lottery after being screened by committees made up of people from the three branches of government. In order to qualify, they had to have a law degree, at least five years of professional practice, write an essay and collect letters of recommendation from friends and colleagues

Foreign governments, including the United States, and civil society organizations in Mexico criticized the change, warning that it would lead to a politicization of the judiciary and weaken its independence.

Electing judges was former President Andrés Manuel López Obrador's way to root out corruption. Make them accountable to the people, he said. The contentious reform's passage was among the last major acts of his presidency last September.

Here are some of the candidates:

What's she known for? She is among the hundreds of Mexicans searching for a missing relative, in her case a brother who disappeared in 2014. Candidate for: District judge in the

western state of Sinaloa. Quiroa's experience has been different to most other candidates' in that she's more accustomed to being on the victims' side.

After her brother disappeared in the northern border state of Tamaulipas, Quiroa began searching and eventually founded a collective called "March 10" for the day he vanished.

She quickly realized there was little legal help available to help searchers like herself, so she left her engineering career and began to study law while continuing her search.

Quiroa gained notoriety a couple years ago when she proposed criminal groups consider a peace treaty to make it safer to search for the missing and she began selling a "Searcher Barbie" to raise money for her group's activities.

Late last year, she decided to return to her native Sinaloa state to compete

Quiroa knows the risks of being a judge in the violent state, home to a powerful cartel of the same name, but she said that there need to be more judges who empathize with those searching for missing loved ones.

"If I become a judge, I'm not going to send legal documents and wait for authorities to answer when they feel like it," Quiroa said. "I'm going to go out and look for the missing people. Age: 40

What's he known for? He went viral as "Justice Pork Rinds."

Candidate for: Supreme Court. Until the campaign started, Guer-

rero wasn't well-known outside of Mexico's National Autonomous University, where he has taught classes for more than a decade. He had also led Mexico City's public records agency and worked at the capital's electoral

But it was a homemade TikTok video that took off and launched Guerrero's campaign. In it, a student hands him a platter of a typical pork rind dish. Playing on the turn of phrase, he says he's "more prepared than a pork rind" to be a Supreme Court justice,

before rolling into his qualifications. Some grumps accused him of turning the race into a circus, but Guerrero said that his attempt at humor was far less harmful than having a corrupt justice on the highest court.

"You have to be colloquial sometimes in your use of language," he said, accepting that he has tried to run a "disruptive" campaign.

If elected, Guerrero said that he would push to have the court hold hearings around Mexico to have more contact with people. Age: 51

What's she known for? She represented drug kingpin Joaquín "El Chapo" Guzmán in 2016.

Candidate for: Criminal court judge in northern state of Chihuahua.

Nine years ago, Silvia Delgado García was a member of Sinaloa cartel leader Guzmán's legal team when he was temporarily held in a prison in Ciudad Juarez before being extradited to the United States. He was eventually tried, convicted and sentenced to life in prison in the US.

She's still marked by the case.

Some critics of electing judges, and a human rights litigation group called Defensorxs, have labeled Delgado García "high risk," because "she defends alleged drug traffickers."

The group has also identified 17 other candidates that way for being prosecuted, being members of investigated organizations, for alleged human rights violations and deals with crimi-

"Everyone has a right to an effective defense," Delgado García said about her decision to represent Guzmán.

In win for far-right leader Milei, Argentines deal blow to centrists in local elections

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, May 19, (AP): What was once one the bastion of the center-right in Argentina fell on Sunday to the radical libertarian party of President Javier Milei, a dramatic result that could help the leader's chances in crucial midterm elections later this year as voters across the country's capital abandoned the main

conservative party. Milei's top candidate and official spokesperson, Manuel Adorni, swept to victory in the Buenos Aires elections, securing over 30% of the ballots and crushing the center-right party of former President Mauricio Macri in its

Milei's La Libertad Avanza party, or LLA, said it racked up twice as many votes Sunday as it did in the last local election, in 2023.

As a brassy Argentine rock anthem blared at the post-election rally, Milei burst onto the stage, bouncing and pumping his arms to whip up the

"Today is a pivotal day for the ideas of freedom," he bellowed, reveling in the cheers of supporters.

The upset marked a bruising defeat for Macri's PRO (Republican Proposal) party, which has governed Buenos Aires uninterrupted for the past 18 years. The PRO candidate, Silvia Lospennato, came in third with 15.9% of the vote.

"The results are not as expected," Lospennato acknowledged. "We have a lot of work ahead of us.

Argentina's left-leaning populist Peronist party, which has governed the country for much of the past two decades, came second, scraping over 27% in a city where they normally fall short, a sign of how the splintered right-wing has benefited the opposi-

"The Peronist party is far from dead with this result," said Juan Cruz Díaz, a political analyst who runs the Cefeidas Group, a consultancy in Buenos

But the main takeaway from Sunday's vote, he said, "is the fight for dominance in the center-right and the strong victory over the PRO party."

Some 2.5 million people were eligible to vote in Sunday's election, in which half of the 60 legislative seats were up for grabs. Turnout was far lower than usual, hovering around

Widely seen as a power struggle between far-right Milei and centerright Macri, this local race reflected the shifts that hard-right factions have pulled off around the world, from Europe to the United States, squeezing the political center.

"It turned into a crucial battle for the political leadership," said Ignacio Labaqui, a senior analyst at research group Medley Global Advisors.

The result cements Milei's party as Argentina's main alternative to the left-leaning Peronist movement championed by former President Cristina Fernández de Kirchner, who governed for eight years after succeeding her husband in 2007. Under her watch, Argentina became notorious for its unbridled state spending and massive budget deficits.

"What this election yielded is that society understands we're the best way to end Kirchnerism for good, which was nothing but a tragedy for Argentina," Adorni said in his victory speech, referring to the political movement of former President Kirchner.

Pakistan car bomb explosion kills four

QUETTA, Pakistan, May 19, (AP): A car bomb exploded near a market in Pakistan's restive southwest, killing four people and wounding 20 others, a government official said Monday, as violence intensifies in the region.

The attack occurred Sunday night in Qillah Abdullah, a city in Balochistan province bordering Afghanistan, said Deputy Commissioner Abdullah Riaz.

The blast also damaged several shops and the outer wall of a nearby building housing paramilitary forces, he said. No group immediately claimed responsibility for the bombing. den northeast

However, suspicion is likely to fall on ethnic Baloch separatists, who frequently target security forces and civilians in Balochistan and other parts of the country. Shahid Rind, a spokesperson for the Balochistan government, condemned the bombing and said an investigation is underway.

Balochistan has been the scene of a long-running insurgency in Pakistan, with an array of separatist groups stag-

this year. Abdulrahman Ibrahim survived Thursday's attack on two villages in Baga in Borno State and participated in the burial of the dead. He told The Associated Press that the Jama'atu Ahlis Sunna Lidda'awati wal-Jihad (JAS) faction of the militant group Boko Haram gathered more than

100 residents of the neighboring villages of Mallam Karamti and Kwatandashi and marched them into the bush. Later on Saturday, 57 bodies were recovered there. A spokesperson for the Borno

government said he could not confirm the casualty counts. The Nigerian military did not respond to a request for comment.

According to Ibrahim, who is from Mallam Karamti, and another survivor from Kwatandashi who requested anonymity for fear of reprisals, the villagers were accused of acting as informants for the rival Islamic State West Africa Province

"Without the capacity to attack the military like ISWAP, JAS is focused on terrorizing civilians," said Malik Samuel, an expert on northern Nigeria's conflicts with nonprofit Good Governance Africa.

The bank also recommended that customers protect their bank accounts by avoiding the storage of confidential information, such as card numbers or passwords, on their mobile phones. BAGHDAD, May 19, (KUNA): Arab League Secretary General Ahmad Abul-Gheit said on Saturday that unity and vigilance were key factors to face the rapid and uncertain developments in the world of

Addressing the inaugural session of the fifth Arab Development, Economic and Social Summit, he asserted that rapid and sometimes dangerous international developments made this summit very signifi-

The world economy is passing through severe turbulences and the international commerce is facing emerging challenges, and the worst forms of protectionism, he added.

Abul-Gheit said he observed a trend for regional integration at the expense of globalization.

"I assume that the Arab states are warranted to interact effectively with these challenges through a collective vision and common strategies as well as bolstering integration and coordination in the economic sectors," he added.

Such an approach has become a necessity for serving the Arab nations' interests at time the world is gripped with turbulence and uncertainties, amid mounting hazards and threats, the Arab League Secretary General stated.

The Arab League chief said that the issue of food security was paramount issue not only for the Arab world, but also for countries across the globe, indicating that ensuring the smooth flow of global food supply was important and indicated that this summit must come up with a project to secure this resource for Arab citizens.

The summit is awaiting for an important Iraqi initiative on Arab food security for grains, indicated the Arab League chief who also alluded to an Iraqi proposal for establishing an Arab commerce ministers council within the League to exchange views on cooperation and also address challenges posed by possible global "trade wars"

The Arab League chief also touched on the Mauritanian initiative on

"Blue Economy" as a solution to food and energy shortages. According to the World Bank, Blue Economy is the "sustainable use of ocean resources for economic growth, improved livelihoods, and

jobs while preserving the health of ocean ecosystem." Abul-Gheit said that the Blue Economy initiative would utilize Arab nations capabilities in this field, which would be beneficial economi-

cally and environmentally. The Arab AI initiative is also an important part of plans for technology pioneering and sustainable development, he affirmed, adding that AI should be utilized in various sectors to close the gap in this sector

between the Arab world and other nations. Abul-Gheit also asserted that overall Arab national security would not be achieved without boosting efforts within food security, health, education, marine security, energy, cybersecurity, and social security.

He called for utilize the vision of the founders of the Arab League some 80 years ago, saying that Arab agencies must be given every opportunity to fulfill their role in achieving the aspiration of the Arab people.

The youth in the Arab world are a majority and this demographic must be encouraged to use their full potential to serve their communities and develop them to the point of excellence, he asserted.

Despite the challenges with Palestine being brutally assaulted and Arab nations being targeted and taken advantage of, it is of utmost importance for Arabs to unit and find means to fend off adversaries and seek a better life for all, he concluded.

Nearly 60% of Arabs excluded from formal financial systems

BEIRUT, May 19: Nearly 60% of adults in the Arab region remain excluded from formal financial systems, according to a new report by the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWA). The Annual SDG Review 2025 paints a sobering picture of persistent financial exclusion that is undermining the region's ability to meet the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by the 2030 deadline.

The report, which focuses on financial inclusion as a cross-cutting enabler of sustainable development, reveals those inequalities continue to lock millions out of economic opportunity.

"The Arab region cannot afford to treat financial services as a luxury,' said Economic Affairs Officer at ES-CWA Mario Jales, the lead author of the report. "Without inclusive finance, we cannot hope to lift people out of poverty, support small businesses, or achieve equitable growth."

Women remain among the most excluded, with only 29% having access to bank accounts or mobile money - making the Arab region the worst-performing globally on women's financial inclusion. The gender gap stands at a staggering 13 percentage points. Persons with disabilities fare no better: just 21% have access to financial services, often due to discriminatory practices, inaccessible infrastructure, or lack of

supportive regulation The data also show sharp rural-urban divides. In many countries, rural populations are up to twice as likely to be unbanked compared to urban residents. Youth, informal workers, and refugees face additional barriers, compounding

cycles of vulnerability. Mobile finance has seen rapid growth, with mobile money accounts doubling between 2020 and 2023. Yet, the report warns of a "digital divide within the divide": poor connectivity, limited smartphone access, and weak digital literacy prevent the most marginalized from benefiting. In conflictaffected countries, mobile services are often disrupted or unavailable.

Access to credit also remains a major challenge. Fewer than one in five adults in the region have borrowed from a formal financial institution. For micro-, small-, and medium-sized enterprises (MSMEs), this financing gap restricts innovation and job creation.

ESCWA calls for urgent reforms. These include strengthening consumer protection, promoting financial literacy, integrating gender and disability perspectives into financial regulation, and improving digital infrastructure. It also advocates for interoperable digital ID systems to facilitate safe and inclusive access to

The report places financial inclusion within the broader SDG context. With only 18% of global targets on track – and stagnation or regression in several Arab countries ESCWA emphasizes that inclusive finance is essential for progress on poverty, education, gender equality, and decent work.

Despite the bleak statistics, the report identifies success stories. Countries like Egypt, Morocco, and Jordan have made strides in expanding digital finance and reaching underserved populations through regulatory innovation and targeted programs.

"The path forward exists," the report concludes, "but it requires political will, targeted investment, and a whole-of-society approach.'

Oil recovers after sliding from two-week highs on supply concerns


Kuwait crude export falls 6.7% in April as global demand wavers

The speculations surrounding talks between the US and Iran moved crude oil prices higher at the start of the week on indications of curbs. Talks continued between the two producers during the week resulting in volatile crude oil prices. Brent crude future prices traded around USD 63/b after declining by more than 5% during mid week but recovered by the end of week to reach USD 65.4/b. The volatility comes after consistent gains at the start of last week following a healthy gain of 4.3% during the previous week led by signs of improving market fundamentals. These gains were mainly led by talks of easing trade tensions between the US and China coupled with expectations of increasing oil demand in China. Supply side factors also supported gains that mainly included sanctions on Russia, Iran and Venezuela. The market also took cues from the softer-than-expected inflation numbers from the US pointing to a relatively smaller economic impact from the tariffs. A relatively weaker greenback vs. historical levels also supported crude oil prices while estimates of higher inventories in the US partially dented the rally. Meanwhile, the weekly crude oil inventory report from the US EIA pointed to an unexpected build of 3.5 million barrels during the week ended 9-May-2025 that was much higher than analyst forecasts. This was the biggest weekly increase in inventory since the week of 28-March-2025 that pushed total inventories to 441.8 million barrels, the highest since the week of 18-April-2025. The increase was led by an increase in imports, as per a Reuters report, from OPEC+ countries. On the demand front, the latest monthly report from the OPEC kept demand growth forecasts unchanged but maintained a cautiously optimistic tone related to trade developments, although the report showed a trimmed economic growth outlook for the world to 2.9% vs. its previous forecast of 3.0% growth. On the other hand, the monthly oil report from the IEA showed that oil demand is expected to slow during the remainder of the year due to economic headwinds. However, the report also noted the positive impact of lower oil prices on overall oil demand. The latest traffic data from China also showed a strong rebound in from the steep drop during the first week of the month. On the supply side, OPEC crude oil output declined last month to reach 26.7 mb/d, according to data from OPEC secondary sources. The decline was mainly led by lower output from Venezuela, Iran, Nigeria and Libya that was partially offset by an increase in output reported by Saudi Arabia and the UAE. Meanwhile, the trend in oil production in the US remained mixed over the last few weeks owing to lower prices that was also reflected in the data for oil rig count. Production remained elevated at 13.4 mb/d but below the record reached at the end of March-2025.

Crude oil prices touched the highest level in more than two weeks at the start of last week but failed to sustain the momentum after news that the US President said that they are closer to a deal with Iran. A successful deal would pave the way for Iran to increase oil output which stood at 3.35 mb/d as of April-2025, according to Bloomberg, with a total capacity of 3.83 mb/d, indicating a spare capacity of close to 0.5 mb/d. The declines also came after the weekly oil inventory report from the EIA showed an unexpected build during the week ended 9-May-2025. As per the report, crude oil inventories in the US showed the biggest increase in six weeks to reach 441.8 million barrels. Meanwhile, a survey of oil drillers in the shale patch, quoted by Bloomberg, showed muted sentiments from oil drillers. As per the survey, respondents expect oil prices to trade at current levels by the end of the year at around USD 60/b for WTI.

In terms of monthly price trend, prices of all crude grades witnessed steep declines to reach multi-year low levels during April- 2025 reflecting the fears of demand impact from the tariffs imposed by the US government. This was also the third consecutive month of decline in average crude oil prices. Average spot Brent crude oil price declined by 6.6% to reach USD 67.8/b during April-2025, the lowest monthly average in four years as compared to an average of USD 72.5/b during March-2025. On the other hand, average OPEC reference basket price witnessed a



slightly bigger decline of 6.8%, the biggest decline in eight months, to reach USD 69.0/b while Kuwait export grade crude prices witnessed a similar decline of 6.7% to average at USD 70.3/b during April-2025. Meanwhile, the consensus estimate for Brent crude showed sharp downward revisions for the next four quarters with some recent forecasts suggesting prices going below USD 60/b this year. The median consensus forecast for brent crude grade for Q2-2025 stood at USD 67.0/b, according to data from Bloomberg, witnessing a downward revision of USD 6/b. Similarly, the forecast for Q3-2025 stood at USD 68/b, revised down by 4.75/b as compared to the consensus last month.

Global oil demand growth forecast for 2025 was kept unchanged by the OPEC in its latest monthly report. The agency expects oil demand to grow by 1.3 mb/d during the year and average at 105.0 mb/d. However, there were adjustments to forecasts for Q1-2025 reflecting actual data for the quarter. The adjustments were mainly made to demand estimates for the US which underwent an upward adjustment of 0.21 mb/d as well as OECD Asia Pacific with an upward adjustment of 0.05 mb/d. These increases were partially offset by downward adjustment to estimates for OECD Europe by 0.05 mb/d as well as 0.25 mb/d downward adjustment to demand estimate for the non-OECD region. Within the non-OECD region, demand estimates for India, China, Middle East Other Asi and Latin America were lowered that were partially offset by upward adjustment to demand estimates for the Africa region. On the other hand, demand forecast from the IEA showed a slight upward revision to demand forecast for 2025 backed by healthy demand growth in Q1-2025 According to the IEA monthly report, global oil demand growth is expected to come in at 740 tb/d in 2025, a slight upward revision from 730tb/d growth forecasted in the previous month's report. As per the IEA, demand growth stood at 990 tb/d y-o-y during Q1-2025 but is expected to slow significantly to reach 650 tb/d for the remainder of the year. The forecast for the rest of the year is expected to be affected by economic headwinds as well as record EV sales. The agency said that despite the trade deal with UK and the 90-day accord with China, oil demand is expected o be affected by the increased trade uncertainty that is expected to weigh on the world economy. The forecast for the rest of the year also reflect weaker-than-expected non-OECD delivery data, especially for China and India. Nevertheless, emerging economies are expected to remain the key driver of oil demand growth this year as well as next year, as per the IEA, with an expected demand growth of 860 tb/d this year followed by 1.0 mb/d growth next year. On the other hand, OECD countries are expected to see a demand decline of 120 tb/d this year followed by a decline of 240 tb/d next year. For 2026, the forecast from OPEC showed no change with an expected demand growth of 1.28 mb/d to reach

Non-DoC liquids supply growth forecast for 2025 was once again lowered marginally by $0.1\,$ mb/d in OPEC's latest monthly report. The supply from the group is expected to grow by 0.81 mb/d this year and average at 54.0 mb/d. The downward revision mainly reflected lowered supply forecast for the OECD region with the US supply 0.07 mb/d vs. previous forecast and is expected to growth forecast lowered by average at 22.1 mb/d. The forecast for the overall Americas region was lowered by 0.09 mb/d, indicating cuts to supply forecast for Canada. The forecast also reflected the latest rig count data from Baker Hughes that showed 10 consecutive weeks of rig count decline in the North America region by the week ended 9-May

2025. For the US, overall rig count declined last week to reach 578 rigs, the lowest since January-2025. Supply forecast for the overall OECD region was also downgraded by 0.09 mb/d after a marginal downward revision for OECD Asia Pacific. The forecast for the non-OECD region was kept unchanged but there were minimal changes at the country level. Meanwhile, forecasts from the IEA showed that world oil supply is expected to grow by 1.6 mb/d to reach an average of 104.6 mb/d in 2025 mainly led by higher production growth from non-OPEC+ producers that are expected to add 1.3 mb/d in additional supplies this year.

For 2026, non-DoC liquids supply growth is expected to be in line with this year, as per the OPEC. The agency expects supply growth of 0.8 mb/d next year to reach an average supply of 54.81 mb/d after making a downward adjustment of 0.1 mb/d to the yearly forecast. The downward revision once again reflected lowered forecast for supplies from the US partially offset by an upward revision to forecast mainly from Latin America, China and Other Asia regions. As per the IEA, world oil supply is expected to increase by 970 tb/d next year with non-OPEC+ producers expected to increase supply by 820 tb/d and the remaining 150 tb/d of increase is expected to come from OPEC+ producers.

OPEC crude oil production declined for the second consecutive month during April-2025. As per Bloomberg data, average OPEC production stood at 27.24 mb/d during the month, the lowest in three months, registering a decline of 0.2 mb/d as compared to the previous month. The decline was mainly led by lower production reported by Venezuela, UAE, and Nigeria that was partially offset by marginal growth in production mainly in Iraq and Saudi Arabia. Data from Bloomberg showed that OPEC production has declined in four out of the five previous months. On the other hand, data from OPEC secondary sources showed a relatively smaller production decline of 62 tb/d with production averaging at 26.7 mb/d during April-2025. The decline was led by a broad-based fall in production that was partially offset by an increase in production in Saudi Arabia and the UAE.

Output from the broader DoC producers group showed a production decline of 106 tb/d after output from the nonOPEC DoC countries showed an output decline of 45 t b/d during the month. This decline was mainly led by lower output from Kazakhstan and Malaysia partially offset by marginal growth in output from Russia and Oman.

Meanwhile, the OPEC+ announced to increase daily crude oil production by the group by another 411 tb/d for June 2025. This along with the announced increases for May 2025 and April-2025 to around 0.96 mb/d or 43.6% of the 2.2 mb/d in pledged cuts. The IEA expects OPEC+ supply growth of 310 tb/d this year reflecting the unwinding of production cuts followed by an increase of 150 tb/d in 2026.

Oil production in Venezuela declined during April-2025 after US renewed its sanctions on the country. This led to revocation of license issued to oil producer Chevron that produces around 0.2 mb/d of Venezuela's daily output through four joint ventures with the state owned oil company. The sanctions resulted in the company exiting their operations in the country before the 27-May-2025 deadline.

Oil production in Nigeria went below it OPEC+ quota to reach 1.47 mb/d during April-2025. The decline was led by structural issues in production as well as underinvestment in facilities, although the government has recently announced a new target to expand capacity to 2.5 mb/d by 2026.

Trump's tariff spree casts shadow over Euro economy, even in best case scenario

FRANKFURT, Germany, May 19, (AP): U.S. President Donald Trump's tariff offensive has led European officials to cut back their growth forecasts for this year and next - even in a bestcase scenario in which the highest rates on most goods could be negotiated away.

The forecast for this year for the 20 countries that use the euro currency was cut to 0.9% from the previous forecast in November of 1.3%, the European Union's executive commission said Monday in its regular spring forecast.

The forecast for 2026 was cut to 1.4% from 1.6%.

One reason for the lower growth estimate was the stagnating economy in Germany, where growth is expected to be zero this year after two years of shrinking output. Germany's economy is heavily dependent on exports but has faced strong headwinds from higher energy costs after the loss of Russian natural gas due to the invasion of Ukraine as well from lack of pro-growth infrastructure spending and competition from China in autos and industrial machinery.

The proposal for a 20% U.S. tariff on imported goods from Europe in addition to its suspension for 90 days have meant uncertainty "not seen since the darkest days of the COVID-19 pandemic," said Economy Commissioner Valdis Dombrovskis.

Global shares slide, US futures and dollar drop

HONG KONG, May 19, (AP): Global shares fell Monday and U.S. futures and the dollar also weakened after Moody's Ratings downgraded the sovereign credit rating for the United States because of its failure to stem a

rising tide of debt. The future for the S&P 500 lost 1.2% while that for the Dow Jones Industrial Average fell 0.8%. The U.S. dollar slipped to 144.92 Japanese yen from 145.65

yen. The euro advanced to \$1.1254 from \$1.1183. The yield on the 10-year U.S. Treasury was at about 4.54%, up from 4.44% late Friday.

In Europe, Germany's DAX retreated 0.1% to 23,733.96 while the CAC 40 in Paris lost 0.5% to

Britain's FTSE 100 declined 0.5% to 8,643.23. Chinese markets fell after the government said retail sales rose 5.1% in April from a year earlier, less than expected. Growth in industrial output slowed to

6.1% year-on-year from 7.7% in March.

That could mean rising inventories if production outpaces demand even more than it already does. But it also may reflect some of the shipping boom before some of U.S. President Donald Trump's tariffs on Chinese goods took effect.

"After an improvement in March, China's economy looks to have slowed again last month, with firms and households turning more cautious due to the trade war," Julian Evans-Pritchard of Capital Economics said in a report. Hong Kong's Hang Seng lost 0.1% to 23,332.72 and the Shanghai Composite

Index was nearly unchanged at 3,367.58. E-commerce giant Alibaba's shares in Hong Kong skidded 3.4% following a report that U.S. officials are scrutinizing a potential Apple-Alibaba deal to integrate

AI features into iPhones in China. Tokyo's Nikkei 225 gave up 0.7% to 37,498.63 while the Kospi in Seoul dropped 0.9% to 2,603.43. Australia's S&P/ASX 200 declined 0.6% to 8,295.10.

Taiwan's Taiex was 1.5% lower.

In oil trading early Monday, U.S. benchmark crude oil lost 47 cents to \$61.50 per barrel. Brent crude, the international standard, gave up 50 cents to \$64.91

Wall Street cruised to a strong finish last week as U.S. stocks glided closer to the all-time high they set just a few months earlier, though it may feel like an economic era ago.

The S&P 500 rose 0.7%. It has rallied to within 3% of its record set in February after it briefly dropped roughly 20% below it last month.

Gains have been driven by hopes that Trump will lower his tariffs against other countries after reaching trade deals with them.

'Nouvelle Vague,' a beautiful reimagination of Godard's era

Linklater's ode to French New Wave enchants Cannes

CANNES, France, May 19, (AP): When Richard Linklater first started thinking about making a film about the French New Wave, he figured he'd show it all everywhere except one place.

"I thought: They'll hate that an American director did this," Linklater said Sunday. "We'll show this film all over the world, but never in

But Linklater nevertheless unveiled "Nouvelle Vague" on Saturday at the Cannes Film Festival, bringing film about the making of Jean-Luc Godard's "Breathless" to the very heart of the French film industry. It was, Linklater granted, an audacious thing to do.

And "Nouvelle Vague" went down as one of the biggest successes of the festival. At a Cannes that's been largely characterized by darker, more portentous dramas, "Nouvelle Vague" was cheered as an enchanting ode to moviemaking.

"Nouvelle Vague" is an uncanny kind of recreation. In black-and-white and in the style of the French New Wave, it chronicles the making of one of the most celebrated French films of all time. With sunglasses that never come off his face, Guillaume Marbeck plays 29-year-old Godard as he's making his first feature, trying to launch himself as a film director and upend filmmaking convention.

Linklater's movie, which is for sale at Cannes and competing for the Palme d'Or, is in French. It not only goes day-by-day through the making of "Breathless," it endeavors to capture the entire movement of one of the most fabled eras of moviemaking. Truffaut, Varda, Chabrol, Melville, Rohmer, Rossellini and Rivette are just some of the famous filmmakers who drift in and out of the movie.

Linklater told reporters Sunday that he wanted audiences to feel "like they were hanging out with Nouvelle Vague in 1959."

"It was an old idea of some colleagues of mine," said Linklater. "Thirteen years ago we started talking about it. We're just cinephiles Austin,

Texas, who love this era and it's meant so much to me in my filmmaking. It represented freedom and the notion of the personal film. I've made a lot of films and I've always felt if you do it long enough, maybe you should make one film about making films."

The stars of "Breathless" - Jean-Paul Belmondo and Jean Seberg - are played by Aubry Dullin and Zoey Deutch, respectively, in "Nouvelle Vague." With precision, Linklater captures them making some of the most famous shots from "Breathless" with a visual style and camera movements typical of that time.

"We couldn't work quite as fast. We had sound and things," said Linklater, chuckling. (Godard dubbed sound after shooting.)

"It was a crazy idea and I haven't really ever seen a film exactly like this. I said: We're making a film from 1959 but it's not a Godard film," said Linklater. "You can't imitate Godard. You fail. But we could imitate the style of the time.'

In "Nouvelle Vague," Godard is surrounded by doubts - Seberg is notably unsure of the project - but he stubbornly sticks to his instance on spontaneity. There's no real script, some shooting days just last a few hours and lines are improvised on the spot. In one fittingly moment where Godard tells his actors just to quote Humphry Bogart movie lines, he explains: "Not plagiarism. Homage."

Linklater's own homage in "Nouvelle Vague" brought him back to his early days as a filmmaker. His first films - "Slacker," "Dazed and Confused," "Before Sunrise" - have much of the independent spirit of the New Wave, he said.

"Making this film all these later, I felt like I erased my own history," said Linklater. "I was going back to being in my late 20s making my first film. I told a friend last night: I felt like was 28 years old making

'Explore new horizons'

Norville wraps up 30-yr stint at 'Inside Edition'

NEW YORK, May 19, (AP): For a television news industry in a constant state of motion, Deborah Norville has been a model of stability. She began hosting the syndicated newsmagazine "Inside Edition" in 1995 and

has remained there ever since. Now that 30-year run is coming to a close.

Norville, 66, signs off on May 20. She's planning to celebrate with a long vacation through Europe with her husband, and try something new when she gets back. She will host "The Perfect Line," a trivia show that begins airing this fall. No successor has been named at "Inside Edition."

"I'm very excited about the game show," she said. "It's fun, and who doesn't want to give away somebody else's money to people who are

Three decades ago, Norville left CBS News for a genre largely dismissed as tabloid television. She's proud of telling stories that add value to the audience's lives: A company that makes a device to aid choking victims says it has traced a thousand uses to people who say they learned about it through an "Inside Edition" story.

During COVID, the show began broadcasting from her kitchen almost immediately and never stopped, as she built a makeshift studio in her New York-area home.

"We were a familiar presence during a time when everything else was topsy-turvy," she said, "and I think the bond with our audience was made even stronger then."

As she prepares to adjust to a life no longer governed by news cycles, Norville paused to reflect on her time with The Associated Press.

Associated Press: You made the decision a while ago to leave "Inside Edition." Now that it's happening, how does it feel?

Norville: It really hit me today. It's the same day my daughter and husband came over (to the studio) for an in-person interview for a piece they're doing - a farewell Deb thing. My daughter was on "Inside Edition" the day she was born. Nine hours after I gave birth, the crew was in my hospital room taping "Inside Edition" because they couldn't find anyone else to do the show, which was ridiculous. To see her, this beautiful, 27-year-old grown woman, so statuesque and wonderful and lovely and perfect, to do an interview about what it's like having her mom work at this place for literally her entire life, it was like, oh my gosh, there's something major about to happen.

AP: When you first joined, tabloid shows were considered less respectable than networks. How do you think that's changed?

Norville: Remember Tom Shales of the Washington Post? Tom Shales actually put in the paper that I was selling my credibility. The old Deborah would have just gone into a fetal position and cried. The new me said, "Oh, I don't think so." I never knew my credibility had anything to do with the peacock or eyeball on my paycheck, because I had worked at NBC and CBS. My credibility had to do with the show that I stood in front of, the stories that I personally produced and reported on and what we put on television every day. All I was asking was that people watch.

AP: When you look back on it, what is the work you'll remember the Norville: "Inside Edition" has evolved a lot in the 30 years that I've

been here. When I got here, it was still the hard-core, tabloid, beach blanket bingo - a lot of girls on sandy beaches in tiny bikinis. We don't do that anymore. ... It has evolved in such a way that we as a program have become a companion to people - not just on television, but we're a companion on the internet, on social media, on YouTube. The content that we do is watchable, but also very relatable and meaningful.

AP: It's unusual these days to stay at the same job for a long time. Why did that appeal to you?

Norville: I came to "Inside Edition" because I was expecting my second child. I knew it was going to be a boy (Norville and her husband, Karl Wellner, have two boys and a girl). I turned down an offer from CBS News to be "Eye on America" correspondent four days a week and anchor the weekend news one night. I would have been teed up for the job that Katie Couric ultimately got. But those four nights a week were going to be on the road all over the country and I didn't think I could be the kind of mother I aspired to be, and certainly the kind of wife that I wanted to be, if I was on the road. I just didn't know how I could do it.

AP: Any regrets about paths not taken?

Norville: Oh, probably. But here's the antidote to that. You take a look at where the road has taken you and you take stock at what you see at that spot in the road where you find yourself. ... The biggest thing is that I look at my family, which is the most important thing to me. My husband and I have been married for 37 and a half years. I have three amazing children who actually enjoy being with us, who are solid citizens, who are kind and giving and industrious and entrepreneurial. I didn't mess up my kids. Coming to "Inside Edition" for the right reasons, turned out to be the right reason for me.

Actress shines in postpartum role

Jennifer Lawrence sparks Oscar buzz in Cannes for 'Die, My Love'

CANNES, France, May 19, (AP): Last year, the Cannes Film Festival produced three best actress nominees at the Oscars. This year's edi-

tion may have just supplied another.
In Lynne Ramsay's "Die, My
Love," Jennifer Lawrence and Robert Pattinson play a married couple with a newborn who move into an old country house. In Ramsay's messy and moving marital psy-chodrama, Lawrence plays an increasingly unhinged young mother named Grace whose postpartum depression reaches darkly hallucinatory extremes.

For Lawrence, the 34-year-old mother of two, making "Die, My Love" was an intensely personal ex-

"It was really hard to separate what I would do as opposed to what (Grace) would do," Lawrence told reporters Sunday. "I had just had my firstborn, and there's not really any thing like postpartum. It's extremely isolating. She doesn't have a community. She doesn't have her people. But the truth is, extreme anxiety and extreme depression is isolating, no matter where you are. You feel like an alien."

Competition

"Die, My Love," which is in competition for the Palme d'Or at Cannes, was one of the most anticipated premieres of the festival. That was owed partly to the widely respect for Ramsey, the Scottish director of "Ratcatcher" (1999), "Movern Callar" (2002) and "You Were Never Really Here" (2017). Lawrence sought her out for the film.

"I've wanted to work with Lynne Ramsay since I saw 'Ratcatcher' and I was like, 'There's no way, said Lawrence. "But we took a chance, and we sent it to her. And I really, I cannot believe that I'm here with you."

In Ramsay's "Die, My Love," adapted from Ariana Harwicz's 2017 novel, is disorienting experience, pulsating with animalistic urges and manic spurts of violence. As a portrait of a marriage in trouble, it makes "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" look tame.

"Die, My Love" was quickly snapped up by Mubi on Sunday. In easily the biggest sale of the festival, the indie distributor plunked down \$24 million for distribution rights to the film in the U.S. and multiple other territories.

Lawrence's performance, in par-

ticular, drew the kind of raves in Cannes that tend to lead to Oscar consideration. Lawrence has been

nominated four times by the Academy Awards, winning once for 2013's "Silver Linings Playbook." Since then, much has changed for

Lawrence, including becoming a mother. On Saturday, Lawrence said parenthood has been such an enriching experience for her that, she joked, "I highly recommend having kids if you want to be an actor."

"Having children changes everything. It changes your whole life. It's brutal and incredible," Lawrence said. "I didn't know that I could feel so much.

"My job has a lot to do with emotion, and they've opened up the world to me," she added. "It's almost like feeling like a blister or something. So sensitive. So they've changed my life, obviously, for the best, and they've changed me crea-

tively.' Pattinson, who recently had his first child with Suki Waterhouse, chimed in that he found having a baby "gives you the biggest trove of

energy and inspiration. Lawrence mockingly pounced on him: "You get energy?!" Pattinson let out a sigh. "This

question is impossible for a guy to answer correctly," he said, to laugh-Meanwhile, stars in glamorous gowns often peacock on the Cannes

Film Festival red carpet, but one attendee Saturday night literally came as a bird. Ahead of the the premiere of

Lynne Ramsay's "Die, My Love," with Robert Pattinson and Jennifer Lawrence, a man came fully dressed as bird, complete with a beak and feathers.

The costume had a purpose. It was a tie-in with the documentary "I Love Peru," which is playing in the Cannes Classics section. The costume was specifically a condor, which in Peru has been seen as a creature connecting heaven and

The Cannes Film Festival recently banned nudity and "excessively voluminous" gowns. But it has no policy against condors.

'This victory is for you'

Austria welcomes Eurovision winner JJ with cheers, hugs

VIENNA, May 19, (AP): Austrian fans enthusiastically welcomed classically trained singer JJ back home at Vienna airport on Sunday after he won the 69th Eurovision Song Contest

with "Wasted Love." As JJ walked through the gate, hundreds of fans cheered, some played his song and others surrounded the new star, hug-

ging him and asking for autographs. The 24-year-old countertenor, whose winning song combines operatic, multi-octave vocals with a techno twist, and who also sings at the Vienna State Opera, held up his trophy in one hand and a big bouquet of roses in the other. He smiled, wiped away tears and told the crowd "that victory is for you."

JJ, whose full name is Johannes Pietsch, was Austria's third Eurovision winner, after bearded drag queen Conchita Wurst in 2014 and Udo Jürgens in 1966.

"This is beyond my wildest dreams. It's crazy," said the singer when being handed the microphone-shaped glass Eurovision trophy after his win in the Swiss city of Basel on Sat-

On Sunday night, JJ told reporters in Vienna that "I don't think you'll realize that you did it at all until you're on your deathbed.

Austria's president, Alexander van der Bellen, celebrated JJ in a video posted on X.

"What a success! What a voice! What a show!" he exclaimed. "All of Austria is happy."

Chancellor Christian Stoecker wrote on X: "What a great

success - my warmest congratulations on winning #ESC2025! JJ is writing Austrian music history today!'

The Vienna State Opera also expressed joy over the win. "From the Magic Flute to winning the Song Contest is somehow a story that can only take place in Austria," opera director Bogdan Roscic told the Austrian press agency APA.

Several Austrian cities were quick to show their interest in hosting next year's contest. Innsbruck Mayor Johannes Anzengruber told APA that "not everything has to take place in Vienna. ... Austria is bigger than that," and the towns of Oberwart in Burgenland and Wels in Upper Austria also threw their hats into the ring.

JJ himself said he hoped that Vienna would get the next ESC which he would love to host together with his mentor, Con-

At a post-victory press conference, JJ said the message of his song about unrequited romance was that "love is the stron-

gest force on planet Earth, and love persevered. "Let's spread love, guys," said JJ, who added that he was honored to be the first Eurovision champion with Filipino heritage, as well as a proudly queer winner.

The world's largest live music event, which has been uniting and dividing Europeans since 1956, reached its glitterdrenched conclusion with a grand final in Basel that offered pounding electropop, quirky rock and outrageous divas.

Acts from 26 countries - trimmed from 37 entrants through two elimination semifinals - performed to some 160 million viewers for the continent's pop crown. No smoke machine, jet of flame or dizzying light display was spared by musicians who had three minutes to win over millions of viewers who, along with national juries of music professionals, picked the winner.

Estonia's Tommy Cash came third with his jokey mock-Italian dance song "Espresso Macchiato." Swedish entry KAJ, which had been favorite to win with jaunty sauna ode "Bara Bada Bastu," came fourth.

The show was a celebration of Europe's eclectic, and sometimes baffling, musical tastes.

This year's contest was roiled for a second year by disputes over Israel's participation.

GEM set to open, become world's largest museum

Grand Egyptian Museum: Cultural edifice telling unique civilization story

CAIRO, May 19, (KUNA): With a charming view of the worldfamous Giza Pyramids and covering nearly 500,000 meters, the Grand Egyptian Museum (GEM) is expected to open its doors for visitors very soon as the world's largest museum.

Once visitors get into the 7,000-meter lobby of the modern museum, they come across the huge statue of King Ramses II, which stands out in a way as if it invites them to an expedition that reveals the secrets of the ancient civilization of Egypt, which the GEM, in fact, tells its story in an amazing mode.

The idea of establishing the new historic edifice emerged in the seventies and the ceremonial cornerstone of the museum was laid in early 2002. Construction works started at a strategic location just next door to the Pyramids in 2005.

The main contract for the design of the GEM was awarded to the Irish architectural firm Heneghan Peng in 2003 following an extensive international competition. But, in fact, a team of 300 people from 13 companies in six different countries contributed to the design phase.

The original cost of the great project was initially estimated to be around USD 500 million, but delays, changes and other factors have driven the final price tag for the complex to over one billion US dollars.

The Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) provided the necessary financial support for the project through a couple of official development aid loans at a value of 84.2 billion Japanese yen (around USD 800 million).

The GEM whose construction works were completed in 2021 is considered to be one of the greatest modern achievements of Egypt, becoming an integrated international cultural and entertainment facility and the first destination for all those interested in the great Egyptian civilization.

Once all relics and collections are finally transferred from the Egyptian Museum in central Cairo and other places to the Grand Egyptian Museum, it will host about 100,000 ancient artifacts, 4,549 of which will be from the tomb of the famous king of Tutankhamun.

The GEM is expected to welcome around 15,000 visitors per day, roughly three times the number of people who visit the current museum daily. They can see the facility's artifacts and the three famous Pyramids at the same time through modern tech-

The facility was mainly designed to preserve and maintain the Egyptian cultural and historic heritage, to organize temporary

and permanent archaeological exhibitions in Egypt, and to hold cultural and scientific symposia, conferences and activities aiming at raising public awareness of the Egyptian civilization.

The GEM had opened 12 halls with exhibits about ancient

official opening, coinciding with final arrangements and preparations for shops, cafeterias, restaurants, gardens and parks. The GEM has adopted a clear-cut sustainable development

Egypt in its main galleries in a trial run ahead of the announced

strategy by means of using green building dimensions in all phases of the mega project through lobby ventilation and natural

The Egyptian government, in fact, is racing against time to complete all arrangements for officially opening the GEM for visitors on July 3.

In this context, Spokesman for the Egyptian Cabinet Mohammad Al-Homosani told KUNA that the government was doing its utmost to finish all preparations to inaugurate the museum at

He added that a large number of kings, presidents, emirs and senior officials from different world countries would be invited to attend the high-level opening ceremony.

He pointed out that works are in full swing to put the final touches for completing the development of surrounding areas involving corridors and main roads leading up to the facility, in addition to the underway development of the area surrounding the Giza Pyramids, thus becoming an integrated touristic desti-

The spokesman added that the GEM would be run in line with relevant international standards in order to be one of the most significant tourist attractions not only in Egypt but in the entire

Al-Homosani underlined that this mega project came within the framework of the Egyptian government's eagerness to promote the tourist sector and develop the country's main attractions with a view to drawing more tourists, boosting operation rates, creating job opportunities and raising foreign exchange

For his part, Dr. Mohammad Ghoneim, a professor of artifact restoration and conservation and vice-dean of Minia University's College of Fine Arts told KUNA that it was necessary to establish a grand modern-styled museum in order to deliver its all-out message of displaying, conserving and considering

He added the mega project was mainly meant to ease the burden on the current Egyptian Museum, which was established in 1902 and is home to a large number of relics, and to introduce modern conservation and restoration methods as well as to promote cultural, educational and scientific activities and confer-

He remarked that the location of the 500,000-meter GEM was carefully chosen in order to be on the Giza Plateau and next door to the world-famous Giza Pyramids.

The Egyptian professor elaborated that the GEM is home to tens of thousands of Egyptian artifacts, mainly the tomb of Tutankhamun, which is to be displayed for the first time since it was

He commended the mega museum as being a cultural and civilizational beacon and an entertainment and business hub that would unquestionably contribute to the promotion of domestic

"I care deeply about the game, and about the work I've done with the BBC over many years. As I've said, I would never consciously repost anything bias - it goes against everything I stand for. Ian Frazier, author of "Paradise Bronx: The Life and Times of New York's Greatest Borough,' and Nicole Gelinas, who wrote "Movement: New York's Long War to Take Back Its Streets from the Car," will split the \$50,000 in prize money given for books that "encourage and honor writing about New York City," award officials announced Monday

Philanthropists-political strategists Bradley Tusk and Howard Wolfson cofounded the Gotham prize in 2020 as a "way to uplift the creative community" during the pandemic.

In "Paradise Bronx," Frazier draws upon his years of walking about the New York City borough and weaves together everything from Revolutionary War history to baseball and hip-hop. Gelinas' "Movement" continues the tradition of such classics as Robert Caro's "The Power Broker" in documenting how New Yorkers have fought for the preservation and improvement of mass transit.



NEW YORK: Libraries across the United States are cutting back on e-books, audiobooks and loan programs after the Trump administration suspended millions of dollars in federal grants as it tries to dissolve the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

Federal judges have issued temporary orders to block the Trump administration from taking any further steps toward gutting the agency. But the unexpected slashing of grants has delivered a significant blow to many libraries, which are reshuffling budgets and looking at different ways to raise

Maine has laid off a fifth of its staff and temporarily closed its state library after not receiving the remainder of its annual funding. Libraries in Mississippi have indefinitely stopped offering a popular e-book service, and the South Dakota state library has suspended

its interlibrary loan program. E-book and audiobook programs are especially vulnerable to budget cuts, even though those offerings have exploded in populari-

ty since the COVID-19 pandemic. "I think everyone should know the cost of providing digital sources is too expensive for most libraries," said Cindy Hohl, president of the American Library Association. "It's a continuous and grow-

ing need." President Donald Trump issued an executive order March 14 to dismantle the IMLS before firing nearly all of its employees. (AP)

UN health agency faces 'existential crisis' amid US cuts

WHO chief defends \$2.1b budget, compares it to war cost

GENEVA, May 19, (AP): Stripped of US funding, the World Health Organization chief on Monday appealed to member countries to support its "extremely modest" request for a \$2.1 billion annual budget by putting that sum into perspective next to outlays for ad campaigns for tobacco or the cost of war.

After nearly 80 years of striving to improve human lives and health -- which critics say it has done poorly or not enough -- the UN health agency is fighting for its own after US President Donald Trump in January halted funding from the United States, which has traditionally been WHO's largest donor.

"Two-point-one billion dollars is the equivalent of global military expenditure every eight hours," WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said. "Two-point-one billion dollars is the price of one stealth bomber, to kill people."

"And \$2.1 billion is one-quarter of what the tobacco industry spends on advertising and promotion every single year. Again, a product that kills people." he told the WHO's annual assembly. "It seems somebody switched the price tags on what is truly valuable in our world."

Tedros made no specific reference to the US cuts but has said previously the US pullout was a "mistake" and urged Washington to reconsider.

WHO has presented a budget for the next two years that is 22% less than originally planned, largely in response to US and other Western funding cuts, and says it has landed commitments for about 60% of that. But it still faces a budget gap of \$1.7 billion.

"We know that in the current landscape, mobilizing that sum will be a challenge. We are not naive to that challenge,"

"But for an organization working on the ground in 150 countries with a vast mission and mandate that member states have given us, \$4.2 billion for two years — or \$2.1 billion a year — is not ambitious. It's extremely modest,"

As a result of the cuts, the UN health agency this year has seen a plunge in its ability to carry out its sweeping mandate to do everything from recommend reductions in sugar levels in soft drinks to head the global response to pandemics like COVID-19 or outbreaks like polio or Ebola.

Tedros and his team have been grappling with a response to the US cuts as well as reduced outlays from wealthy European countries that are worried about an expansionist Russia and are putting more money toward defense, and less toward humanitarian and development aid.

Matthew Kavanagh, the director of Georgetown University's Center for Global Health Policy and Politics, said other countries have used the US cut in aid "as cover to do their maneuvering, with many countries in Europe reduc-

ing aid."
"The WHO faces an existential crisis that goes well beyond a budget gap to the question of whether this sort of multilateralism can succeed in addressing global health in this new era of nationalism and misinformation," he said, alluding to discord between many countries that could cost lives

"Literally millions will likely die needlessly on the current trajectory and the world's health ministers do not seem capable of a coherent response," Kavanagh added.

On tap for the nine-day World Health Assembly are two major advances that are aimed to buttress WHO's financial strength and bolster the world's ability to cope with future

Member countries are expected to agree to raise annual dues, known as "assessed contributions," by 20% to support WHO finances and reduce dependency on governments' voluntary contributions — which change each year and make up over half of the budget.

They are also expected to agree to a hard-wrought "pandemic treaty" that was born of a desire to avoid any replay of the patchy, unequal response to COVID-19 when the next—and inevitable, most experts say—pandemic hits.

Among other things, the treaty would guarantee that countries that share critical samples of viruses will receive any resulting tests, medicines and vaccines and give WHO up to 20% of such products to make sure poorer countries can

have access to them.

"Every World Health Assembly is significant, but this year's is especially so," Tedros said. "This is truly a historic moment."

The treaty's effectiveness will face doubts when the U.S. — which poured billions into speedy work by pharmaceutical companies to develop COVID-19 vaccines — is sitting out, and because countries face no penalties if they ignore it, a common issue in international law.

Kavanagh said passage of the treaty "could be a significant victory — evidence that the U.S. government may no longer be indispensable in global health" and could offer an opportunity for developing nations in the "global South" over the longer term.

Trump has long derided WHO, including back in his first term when he pulled the United States out over its alleged kowtowing to China and other alleged missteps in the Covid pandemic. President Joe Biden put the US back in.

On his first day back in office in January, Trump signed an executive order to pause future transfers of US government funds to the WHO, recall US government staff working with it, and announce a formal pullout by next January — under a one-year timetable required under US law.

Other opponents continue to lash out at WHO. CitizenGo, an activist group that supports right-to-life and religious liberty issues, protested Monday against the pandemic treaty outside the UN compound in Geneva where WHO's meeting was taking place.

The rally included a balloon sculpture in the shape of the world and a banner inveighing against "globalist elites" and showing an image of Tedros and billionaire Microsoft cofounder Bill Gates, a major WHO supporter, shaking hands while surrounded by dollars.

Health risks

EPA to roll back PFAS regulations

WASHINGTON, May 19, (AP): Last Wednesday, the Environmental Protection Agency announced plans to weaken limits on some harmful "forever chemicals" in drinking water roughly a year after the Biden administration finalized the first-ever national standards.

The Biden administration said last year the rules could reduce PFAS exposure for millions of people. It was part of a broader push by officials then to address drinking water quality by writing rules to require the removal of toxic lead pipes and, after years of activist concern, address the threat of forever chemicals.

President Donald Trump has sought fewer environmental rules and more oil and gas development. EPA Administrator Lee Zeldin has carried out that agenda by announcing massive regulatory rollbacks.

Now, we know the EPA plans to rescind limits for certain PFAS and lengthen deadlines for two of the most common types. Here are some of the essential things to know about PFAS chemicals and what the EPA decided to do:

PFAS, or perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, are a group of chemicals that have been around for decades and have now spread into the nation's air, water and soil.

They were manufactured by companies such as 3M, Chemours and others because they were incredibly useful. They helped eggs slide across nonstick frying pans, ensured that firefighting foam suffocates flames and helped clothes withstand the rain and keep people dry.

The chemicals resist breaking down, however, which means they stay around in the environment.

Environmental activists say that PFAS manufacturers knew about the health harms of PFAS long before they were made public. The same attributes that make the chemicals so valuable resistance to breakdown - make them hazardous to people.

PFAS accumulates in the body, which is why the Biden administration set limits for two common types, often called PFOA and PFOS, at 4 parts per trillion that are phased out of manufacturing but still present in the environment.

Kuwait gears up for historic first lung transplant surgery

KUWAIT CITY, May 19: Dr. Issa Al-Ghunaim, thoracic surgery consultant at the Chest Hospital, revealed that preparations are underway for Kuwait's first lung transplant, a process that has been in the works for over six months, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

In an interview with Kuwait TV, Dr. Al-Ghunaim explained that this significant procedure requires the collaboration of multiple specialties, including internal medicine, chest medicine, physical therapy, and other medical experts. An integrated team at the Chest Hospital is dedicated to making this historic lung transplant a reality.

In line with political directives and the Ministry of Health's guidance, a study was conducted to assess the cost of lung transplantation. The study revealed that the total cost for the operation and six months of follow-up abroad ranges from \$1 million to \$2 million. However, the procedure in Kuwait would cost approximately KD 100,000, including ongoing patient follow-up

The majority of patients eligible for the procedure are those in the final stages of pulmonary fibrosis or those suffering from pulmonary obstruction due to smoking-related complications.

Dr. Al-Ghunaim revealed that there are currently around ten patients in Kuwait who are in the final stages of preparation for lung transplantation.

Chronic inflammatory

High-fat meals rapidly harm gut health, research shows

SYDNEY, May 19, (Xinhua): Even just a few high-fat meals can quickly weaken the gut's natural defenses, triggering inflammation long before any visible symptoms appear, a Melbourne-based medical institute revealed on Monday.

In pre-clinical trials, researchers discovered that just two days of consuming foods high in saturated fats significantly reduced levels of IL-22, a key protective protein that maintains gut health and helps control inflammation, said a study by the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute (WEHI), Australia's oldest medical research institute.

Despite appearing healthy, test mice showed microscopic signs of inflammation and impaired gut function, according to the study published in the Journal of Immunity.

"Every meal we consume actively shapes our gut health," said WEHI's Cyril Seillet, senior author of the study. "The more saturated fats we eat, the more inflammation that builds up, gradually weakening our gut defenses and increasing our susceptibility to chronic inflammation," said Seillet.

Chronic inflammatory conditions, such as coeliac disease, inflammatory bowel disease, and rheumatoid arthritis, affect roughly one in three Australians. However, how these diseases develop has remained poorly understood, researchers said.

This study showed that high-fat diets not only spark inflammation but also suppress the body's ability to fight it by depleting IL-22. Encouragingly, researchers also found that unsaturated fats, like those in nuts, seeds, and avocados, had the opposite effect, boosting IL-22 and strengthening gut defenses.

"The gut's protective abilities can be compromised in just two days, even without any outward signs," said lead author Le Xiong from WEHI. Over 2m people face severe malnutrition

Gaza on brink of famine as aid workers struggle with blockade

BEIRUT, May 19, (AP): Two cases pushed nutritionist Rana Soboh to wits' end. First, a woman was rushed to a Gaza emergency room after fainting while she breastfed her newborn. She told Soboh she hadn't eaten in days.

The next day at another medical

The next day at another medical facility, Soboh found a severely malnourished 1-year-old boy weighing 5 kilograms (11 pounds), less than half what's normal. He hadn't grown any teeth. He was too weak to cry. The mother was also malnourished, "a skeleton, covered in skin."

When the mother asked for food, Soboh started crying uncontrollably. A feeling of powerlessness has

A feeling of powerlessness has overwhelmed her. Soboh said sometimes she gives a little money or a bit of her own food. But now she, too, is struggling.

"This is the worst feeling, wanting to help but knowing you can't. I wished the earth would crack open and swallow me," she said. "What more cruel scenes does the world need to see?"

After months of trying to raise alarm, humanitarian workers are overflowing with anger, frustration and horror over Israel's nearly three-month blockade. The Associated Press spoke to over a dozen aid workers, some with years of experience in emergencies around the world and Palestinians who have worked through this and other wars.

They say what is happening in Gaza is a catastrophe, among the worst they have ever seen. It's more painful, they say, because it's man-made, caused by Israel cutting off all food, fuel, medicine and other supplies to the territory nearly 11 weeks ago.

The world's top authority on food crises last week warned of famine unless the blockade ends. Almost the entire population of around 2.3 million is acutely malnourished, and one in five Palestinians are on the brink of starvation, it said.

Israel late Sunday said it would allow a "basic" amount of food into Gaza, saying it didn't want a hunger crisis to jeopardize its new military offensive. It was not immediately clear how much would be allowed in, or when, or how.

Israel says it imposed the blockade to force Hamas to release hostages, a decision that rights groups call a "starvation tactic" and a violation of international law.

Aid workers are also wrestling with moves by Israel and the U.S. to impose a new aid system, despite their objections. The system would limit distribution to a few locations and put it under armed private contractors - to prevent theft by Hamas, Israel says. Humanitarian workers say it won't meet Gaza's needs and violates humanitarian principles. The U.N. denies that significant aid diversion takes place.

The workers say they should be allowed to do their jobs. Some 170,000 metric tons of aid, including food, sits in trucks a few miles away, just inside Israel.

"The humanitarian community is well-experienced and well-versed in terms of treating malnutrition," said Rachel Cummings, emergency coordinator for Save the Children in Gaza. But "we need food into Gaza and to stop this, by design, attack on the children across the whole of Gaza."

Community kitchens are the last lifeline for most people, but more than

60% have shut down as supplies run out. Those still working can only produce 260,000 meals a day.

At his kitchen in Khan Younis, Nihad Abu Kush and 10 cooks prepare enough meals for about 1,000 people a day. More than 2,000 show up every morning, he said.

There are no lines, just a sea of people terrified of being among the half who will miss out. They push and shove, waving pots for portions from the vats of lentils, beans or peas in tomato sauce.

"I feel so helpless because the numbers grow every day," Abu Kush said. "I look at their faces and I am unable to do anything."

On a recent day, he gave up his own portion after he locked eyes with a child with an empty pot. "I was among the 1,000 who didn't get any," Abu Kush said.

Soboh, a nutritionist with MedG-lobal, said her team stretches supplies of malnutrition treatments. Each can of baby formula is divided among several mothers. Therapy food portions are reduced by half. They give supplements only to children up to a year old, no longer up to 2.

Gujarat, Bengaluru and Punjab advance to IPL playoffs

NEW DELHI, May 19, (AP): Sai Sudharsan hit 108 not out off 61 balls as Gujarat Titans thrashed Delhi Capitals by 10 wickets and sealed its spot in the Indian Premier League playoffs.

Sudharsan shared a double-century unbeaten opening stand with skipper Shubman Gill - the third equal highest by runs in the IPL - as the Titans reached 205-0 in 19 overs.

Gill scored 93 not out off 53 deliveries.

Their stand canceled out Lokesh Rahul's 65-ball 112 not out - his fifth IPL century - in Delhi's 199-3in 20 overs. It was Delhi's fifth loss in seven games. Gujarat climbed to the top of the IPL points table with 18 points from 12 games. Its victory over fifthplaced Delhi also meant that Royal Challengers Bengaluru (second, 17 points) and Punjab Kings (third,

17 points) also advanced to the playoffs. Delhi has 13 points and is a point behind fourthplaced Mumbai Indians, who occupy the fourth and final playoff spot, with two regular season matches remaining. Lucknow Super Giants is currently seventh with 10 points from only 11 games

Punjab beat Rajasthan Royals by 10 runs earlier Sunday to secure its playoff spot.

Rahul scored his fifth IPL century overall as Delhi

rode on a blistering knock to present a challenging

He hit 14 fours and four sixes, and put on a vital 90 off 52 balls with Abhishek Porel (30). Axar Patel and Tristan Stubbs also had cameos - but there wasn't a second major contribution alongside Rahul, who reached 100 off 60 balls.

In reply, Gujarat relied on its in-form openers to confirm a spot in the knockouts. The duo dominated Delhi's bowling, hitting 11 sixes and 15 fours alto-

Gill scored 50 off 33 balls, including four sixes, and then added another three.

Sudharsan hit 12 fours and four sixes. Three of those sixes came after he scored 50 off 30 balls and helped him gallop to a second IPL century. Nehal Wadhera scored 70 off 37 balls to lead Pun-

jab Kings to a 10-run win over Rajasthan Royals. Wadhera smashed five sixes and five fours in his

second half-century of the season in Punjab's 219-5 in 20 overs. Shashank Singh's 59 not out off 30 balls also helped the Kings cross the 200-mark.

Left-arm spinner Harpreet Brar then took 3-22 in four overs as Rajasthan's chase lost momentum despite half-centuries from Yashasvi Jaisal and Dhruv Jurel. The Royals were restricted to 209-7 for a 10th loss this season.

Wadhera took charge of the innings after Punjab was down to 34-3 in 3.1 overs, rebuilding it with a 67-run partnership off 44 balls with skipper Shreyas Iyer, who scored 30 off 25 balls.

Wadhera reached 50 off 25 balls, and then added 58 off 33 with Shashank Singh which set up the base for a 200-plus score.

Singh hit five fours and three sixes, while also finding an able partner in Azmatullah Omarzai, who scored 21 not out off nine balls. The duo added 60 runs off the last four overs.

In reply, Rajasthan made a quick-fire start. Jaiswal took 22 runs off the first over, and added 76 off 29 balls with his teenage opening partner Vaibhav Survavanshi.



Scheffler pulls away to win PGA **Championship for 3rd major title**

Winner shows why he has been No. 1 for two straight years

CHARLOTTE, N.C., May 19, (AP): Scottie Scheffler had every reason to worry the PGA Championship was slipping away.

A five-shot lead on the front nine was gone in four holes. Every shot seemed to go left and he didn't know why. Jon Rahm was peeling off birdies and on the verge of tracking him down Sunday at Quail Hollow.

And that's when Scheffler showed why he has been golf's No. 1 player for two straight years, why he has compiled more PGA Tour titles quicker than anyone this side of Tiger Woods and Jack Nicklaus since 1950.

And why he now has the Wanamaker Trophy to go along with two Masters

Scheffler turned a tense Sunday into another runaway by not missing a shot when the pressure was at its peak, giving himself another pleasant walk to the 18th green with another major title secure in the hands of golf's best.

There was nothing fancy about it, just fairways and greens and holing the putts that eluded Rahm in his first time in serious contention at a major since he won the 2023 Masters and left at the end of the year for LIV Golf.

Rahm's hopes ended when he failed to convert birdie chances on the two

easiest holes on the back nine at Quail Hollow, and then finished bogey-double bogey-double bogey. By then the tournament was effective over. It only cost Rahm money.

The only comfort for Scheffler was looking across the lake on the par-5 15th to see Rahm in a bunker, leading to bogey on the 16th that gave Scheffler a three-shot cushion. Scheffler recalls thinking, "If I birdie here, it's going to go a long way.'

He drilled 3-wood just over the back of the green, and from the same spot where Rahm earlier that hit putter 12 feet by the hole, Scheffler cozied it up to a foot for birdie.

Scheffler closed with a bogey he could afford for an even-par 71, giving him a five-shot victory and his third major title. Scheffler became the first player since Seve Ballesteros to win his

first three majors by three shots or more. The margin doesn't match up with

the grind. That much was clear when Scheffler raised his arms on the 18th green and then ferociously slammed his cap to the turf, a brand of emotion rarely seen by the 28-year-old Texas star.

It was a lot sweeter than last year, when he was arrested outside Valhalla Golf Club for charges later dropped that he wasn't following police instructions as they investigated a traffic fatality.

No change of that happening at Quail Hollow. He stayed close enough to walk. Inside the ropes, this was no walk in

the park the final margin might suggest. Scheffler had a five-shot lead standing on the sixth tee. But with a shaky swing that led to two bogeys, and with Rahm making three birdies in a four-hole stretch around the turn, they were tied when Scheffler got to the 10th tee.

It looked like a duel to the finish, with Bryson DeChambeau doing all he could to get in the mix. Under the most pressure he felt all day, Scheffler didn't miss a shot off the tee or from the fairway until his lead was back to four shots.

Rahm wound up seven shots behind, but the two-time major champion was the only serious threat. After bogey on the 16th hole, he had to take on a dangerous pin at the par-3 17th. It bounded over the sunbaked green into the water for double bogey. And his last tee shot went left off the grassy bank and into the stream for another double bogey.

Farioli resigns as Ajax coach: Ajax coach Francesco Farioli resigned on Monday, following his team's late-season collapse that saw bitter rival PSV Eindhoven crowned Dutch champion. Ajax had seemed all but certain to win the league as it held a nine-point

lead with five games remaining, but a dire run allowed PSV to make up the deficit in dramatic fashion and clinch a 26th Eredivisie title on "The management and I have the same goals for the future of Ajax, but

we have different visions and timeframes about the way we should work and operate to achieve those goals," said Farioli, who was in tears after Sunday's

"Given these differences in the principles and foundations of the project, I feel deep in my heart that this is the best moment to part ways."

Farioli became Ajax's first Italian coach - and first non-Dutch one since 1998 - when he was appointed almost exactly a year ago.

The 36-year-old had a contract until the end of June 2027.

"I find this incredibly disappointing ... we achieved our goal: qualifying for next season's Champions League," Ajax Technical Director Alex Kroes said. "Francesco also played a key role in enhancing the high-performance culture at Ajax, for which we are extremely grateful.

This summer was already set to be a challenging transfer window, and it has now become even more so. It is up to us to ensure that a strong new coaching team is in place when pre-season preparations begin on 26 June."

6 Nations gets unusual start: The Six Nations rugby tournament will start on a Thursday night for the first time next season when France opens the defense of its title against Ireland in Paris.

The schedule for the 2026 tournament was released Monday, with the French getting the honor of launching it on Feb. 5 against its biggest rival in recent championships.

According to stats supplier Opta, the last time the tournament staged a match on a Thursday was back in 1948 - when it was the Five Nations. On that occasion, Ireland won away to France in Round 1 and went on to complete its

France will close against England, which finished in second place in the 2025 edition, as it goes in search of a third title in five seasons. (AP)

Third All-Star Race win for Joe Gibbs Racing

Bell beats Logano in action-packed NASCAR All-Star Race

NORTH WILKESBORO, May 19, (AP): Christopher Bell loves North Wilkesboro Speedway, and Joey Logano hates the "Promoter's Caution."

Those were the main takeaways from the top two finishers in an action-packed NASCAR All-Star Race at the 0.625-mile oval in North Wilkesboro, North Carolina.

In a slam-bang affair that set a record for lead changes, Bell beat Logano by 0.829 seconds to earn his first All-Star Race victory. Bell, who won three consecutive Cup Series races earlier this season but had a previous best All-Star finish of 10th, delivered the third All-Star Race win for Joe Gibbs Racing.

He also is a fan of Marcus Smith, the president and CEO of Speedway Motorsports that owns North Wilkesboro Speedway. In a new All-Star Race wrinkle, Smith was allowed to choose when to throw a " Promoter's Caution" that would bunch the field for

Smith sent two-time Daytona 500 winner and Fox Sports personality Michael Waltrip to the flag stand to display the random yellow flag on Lap 217 with Logano leading by about a half-second over Bell.

Logano, who was trying to win his second consecutive All-Star Race, elected to stay on track rather than pit during the caution, and the decision proved costly. Bell pitted for two fresh tires, restarted in sixth and needed only five laps to catch Logano. After a battle for first that lasted a dozen laps, Bell took the

lead for good on Lap 241 of 250. It was a stark turnaround for the defending Cup Series champion, who recently said he supported the "Promoter's Caution" because "the All-Star Race presents the opportunity to try things outside of the box." But he was questioning its validity after Sun-

Ross Chastain finished third, followed by Alex

Bowman and Chase Elliott. The "Promoter's Caution" was introduced to guarantee an exciting finish, but the All-Star Race hardly

needed much help this year. After lackluster showings in the first two outings,

the All-Star Race delivered much more action in its third year at North Wilkesboro Speedway. There were 18 lead changes, breaking the mark of 13 (set in 2016) for the most in the event's 41-year history. Pole-sitter Brad Keselowski and Logano traded the

lead twice in the first 10 laps and often ran side by side for the lead. There were six leaders and 10 lead changes in the first half of the race, which topped the total number of leaders (four) and lead changes (five) in the past two All-Star Races combined.

After leading 62 laps, Keselowski's bid for his first All-Star Race victory ended with a crash on Lap 177. Capitalizing on pit strategy, Carson Hocevar led the final 46 laps to win the All-Star Open earlier Sun-

day and advanced into the NASCAR All-Star Race. Runner-up John Hunter Nemechek also advanced to the main event by finishing second in the 100-lap warmup race. Noah Gragson won an online fan vote to earn the final transfer spot to the All-Star Race, whose field will included 20 other drivers competing

Villarreal dampens Barcelona's title celebrations

MADRID, May 19, (AP): Villarreal dampened Barcelona's title celebrations by handing the Catalan club its first defeat of 2025 in the Spanish league.

Barcelona, which clinched its 28th league title midweek, presented the trophy to its fans in the team's final home match of the season at Montjuic stadium. Players were announced one by one after the game, which Villarreal won 3-2, before lifting the trophy.

Barcelona's Spanish Super Cup and Copa del Rey trophies also were displayed at Montjuic, with players dancing around the silverware during the celebrations. "We can be proud of this team for winning these titles and for how it did it," Barcelona goalkeeper Marc-André ter Stegen said. "We had a great season in all

Before the match, Villarreal players did a guard of honor for the new league champions, with its players lining up to congratulate Barcelona as the team entered the fold.

Real Madrid won 2-0 at nine-man Sevilla, with Kylian Mbappé extending his league-leading tally to 29 goals with one round to go. Jude Bellingham also

scored. Madrid reached 81 points, four fewer than Barcelona.

Villarreal's victory secured its return to the Champions League for the first time since reaching the semifinals in 2022.

It will join Barcelona, Madrid, Atletico Madrid and Athletic Bilbao in Europe's top club competition next season. Spain will have five clubs in the Champions League next season.

Real Betis clinched one of the Europa League spots. Celta Vigo, Rayo Vallecano and Osasuna will be chasing the final Europa League place and the Conference League spot.

Leganes, owned by former Houston Astros general manager Jeff Luhnow, and Espanyol will try to avoid the last relegation spot in the final round when Leganes is at last-placed Valladolid and Espanyol faces relegated Las Palmas.

Barcelona, Madrid, Atletico and Athletic will play in next year's lucrative Spanish Super Cup in Saudi Arabia.

All 10 games were played at the same time on Sunday. Barcelona hadn't lost in the league since a 2-1 defeat against Atletico on Dec. 21, with 15 wins and two draws since then. Villarreal's win was its fifth straight victory in the league.

Ayoze Pérez put the visitors ahead after a breakaway four minutes into the match. The hosts equalized when Lamine Yamal scored with yet another beautiful goal in the teenager's outstanding season, curling in a left-footed shot from

outside the area.

Fermín López put Barcelona ahead in first-half stoppage time, but Santiago Comesaña scored for Villarreal in the 50th and Tajon Buchanan netted the winner in the 20th.

It was likely the last match Barcelona played at Montjuic stadium as the club plans to return to the Camp Nou Stadium next season even though renovation work at the venue is not expected to be fully completed until mid-2026.

Mbappé strengthened his chances of finishing as the league's top scorer this season with a goal from a low shot from outside the area in the 75th.

Mbappé now has 29 league goals. Barcelona's Robert Lewandowski (25 goals) is his nearest rival.

Alcaraz outclasses Sinner again to win Italian Open

Spaniard solidifies status as French Open favorite

ROME, May 19, (AP): There's only one player who is consistently beating Jannik Sinner.

Carlos Alcaraz defeated the top-ranked player again, beating Sinner 7-6 (5), 6-1 to win his first Italian Open and add another big clay-court title to his resume.

Since the start of last year, Alcaraz is the only player to beat Sinner more than once and now he's done it four straight times.

"Just proud about myself, the way that I approached the match mentally. Tactically think I did it pretty well from the first to the last point," Alcaraz said. "I maintained my level during the whole match."

Alcaraz's victory before Sinner's home fans at the Foro Italico snapped the Italian's 26-match winning streak, which stretched back to October - when Alcaraz beat him in the China Open final in a third-set tiebreaker. Alcaraz now leads the career series 7-4.

It was Sinner's first tournament back after a three-month doping ban.

"I'm just really happy to see Jannik back at this amazing level," Alcaraz said. "I'm sure it wasn't easy for him coming back from three months without playing. Making the final here is something insane."

Alcaraz also solidified his status

as the favorite to defend his title at the French Open, which starts next Sunday.

Sinner was playing his first tournament since he won his third Grand Slam title at the Australian Open in January.

In February, Sinner agreed to a settlement with the World Anti-Doping Agency that raised questions, since the three-month suspension allowed him not to miss any Grand Slams, and come back at his home tournament.

Sinner said he and his team went through "three months that were anything but easy, so achieving this result already here is really big" and that "we should be really proud."

He added: "We're bringing home a very special trophy, even if I wanted the other one."

Sinner was attempting to become the first home man to win the Italian Open since Adriano Panatta in 1976. He was also trying to complete a sweep of the Rome singles titles for Italy after Jasmine Paolini won the women's trophy on Saturday.

Paolini and partner Sara Errani also defended their women's doubles title earlier Sunday, making Paolini the first woman since Monica Seles in 1990 to sweep

Rome's singles and doubles titles in the same year.

A large number of the 10,500 fans in Campo Centrale were decked out in orange - Sinner's theme color - and they were chanting Sinner's name before the match even began.

But Sinner wasted two set points on Alcaraz's serve when he led 6-5 in the first set and then Alcaraz jumped ahead in the tiebreaker with two aces and held on to seal it before cruising in the second set.

On Alcaraz's third match point, Sinner ran down a drop shot but Alcaraz was waiting for his reply and hit a stretch volley winner into the open court.

Alcaraz then held his hands out wide and flashed a wide smile.

Alcaraz, a four-time Grand Slam champion, will move back up to No. 2 in the rankings on Monday after his third final in three clay-court events this season. He won the Monte Carlo Masters and finished runner-up in the Barcelona Open before withdrawing from the Madrid Open because of injury.

Having also won the Madrid Open in 2022 and 2023, Alcaraz became the fifth man to win all three Masters 1000 clay events after Rafael Nadal, Novak Djokovic, Gustavo Kuerten and Marcelo Rios

LA Galaxy draws with LAFC

Orlando shuts out Inter Miami, extends unbeaten streak to 11

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla., May 19, (AP): Luis Muriel scored a goal just before halftime, Marco Pašalić added a goal early in the second half and Orlando City beat Inter Miami 3-0 on Sunday night in the Florida Derby to extend its unbeaten streak to 11 consecutive games. Orlando City (6-2-6) has not lost since it dropped a 2-1 decision to New York City FC on March 8.

Pedro Gallese finished with four saves for his sixth shutout of the season and had the second assist of his five-plus year career in MLS.

Luis Muriel opened the scoring in the 43rd minute. Gallese played a perfectly-placed ball ahead from the edge of Orlando's penalty area to a streaking Muriel, who slipped behind the defense, in the attacking third before his rolling finish from the right-center of the area made it 1-0 at halftime.

Pašalić scored on a first-touch shot from near the penalty spot to give Orlando a 2-0 lead in the 53rd.

Dagur Thorhallsson capped the scoring in the fourth minute of stoppage time, putting away a cross from Duncan McGuire with a one-touch shot from point-blank range. Marco Reus scored two goals for the LA Galaxy in a 2-2 tie with Los Angeles FC in the 20th playing of El Tráfico in the MLS regular season.

The Galaxy (0-10-4), the defending MLS Cup champions, have a minus-21 goal differential, worst in MLS, and are off to the worst start in MLS history.

Reus opened the scoring in the sixth minute. Hugo Lloris made a diving stop of a shot by Gabriel Pec on a breakaway but Reus tapped the rebound into a wide-open net from point-blank range. The 35-year-old slipped a free kick from the edge of the penalty arc inside

the right post to make it 2-2 in the 87th.

The 30-year-old has scored in three consecutive games and has seven goals in the last seven matches for LAFC.

Nathan Ordaz scored his third goal of the season - and the fourth of the 21-year-old's career - to make it 2-0 in the 50th. Ryan Hollingshead played a perfectly-placed ball ahead that split two pairs of defenders before ripped a first-touch shot inside the near post from the left-center of the area. LAFC (6-4-4) is unbeaten in seven straight, including a 4-0 win over Seattle on Wednesday.

Top-seeded OKC dominates Nuggets in Game 7

SGA and Thunder roll into West finals

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 19, (AP): The Oklahoma City Thunder grew up on

Shai Gilgeous-Alexander scored 35 points, Jalen Williams added 24 and the 125-93 in Game 7.

The top-seeded Thunder will host the sixth-seeded Minnesota Timberwolves starting Tuesday. It's Oklahoma City's first trip to the conference finals since 2016. Oklahoma City went a league-best 68-14 in the regular season, becoming the

youngest team to win at least 60 games. To back up their status as the best team in the league, the Thunder had to get past three-time MVP Nikola Jokic and a Denver squad that won the NBA title in 2023 and beat the Los Angeles Clippers in seven games in the first round this year.

Coach Mark Daigneault said his players handled the pressure well.

"There's not many games, you wake up in the morning and you know that you're going to remember the game for the rest of your life, and Game 7 is one of them," he said. "To be able to focus through that and perform the way these guys did today was very impressive.'

Jokic had 20 points, nine rebounds and seven assists for the Nuggets. Aaron Gordon, a key player for Denver throughout the playoffs who hit the winner in Game 1 against the Thunder, started despite a strained left hamstring. He had eight points and 11 rebounds in 24 minutes.

"What he played with today, I don't know many people that would even attempt to go out there and run up and down," Nuggets interim coach David Adelman said. "And he did it in Game 7 against Oklahoma City on the road. That that was one of most incredible things I've ever seen. He was extremely close to not playing.

The Thunder fell behind by 11 in the first quarter, but took the lead early in the second. Oklahoma City outscored Denver 39-20 in the period to take a 60-46 lead

Gordon was called for a flagrant-1 foul for elbowing Gilgeous-Alexander in the face early in the third quarter. Gilgeous-Alexander made both free throws, and then Williams hit a short jumper to give Oklahoma City a 66-46 lead

Cason Wallace got loose on a fast break and dunked on Jokic to put the Thunder up 78-57, sparking delirious roars from the crowd.
