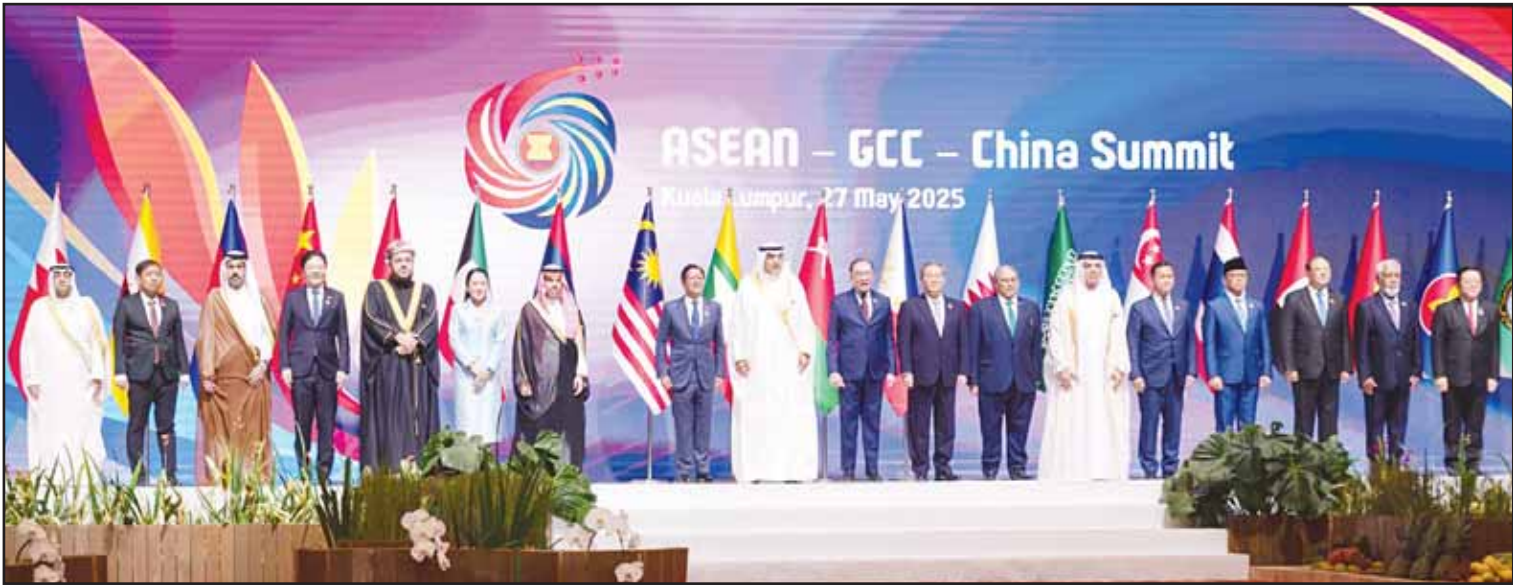




# Kuwait ignites GCC-ASEAN-China synergy

### H.E. the First Deputy Prime Minister, the crack is wide but this is not the solution

ONE of the important objectives of feasibility studies is to examine the consequences and impacts of decisions and actions that may affect the relevant institution, the environment, or the state. This includes analyzing potential risks, both short-term and long-term, and estimating associated costs, benefits, and losses.

Thus, feasibility studies form the basis for project success and cost efficiency. This is a practice widely adopted by countries that are committed to solving their chronic problems.

For instance, the United States was able to transform the problem of tens of thousands of illegal immigrants into an advantage by offering American citizenship to those who enlisted in the US Army. This policy aligned with the US's increased need for military personnel to enhance its military strength, especially during the brutal Iraqi invasion of Kuwait.

As a result of this decision, approximately 120,000 illegal immigrants joined the US military, some of whom participated in the liberation of Kuwait as part of the international coalition. America utilized these soldiers through military service, and many rose to hold high ranks.

Today, Kuwait faces the issue of illegal (Bedoun) residents who make up a significant portion of those who fought along with the Kuwaiti army in the wars supporting Arab states against

Israel and in the efforts to liberate Kuwait.

Many of these Bedoun residents spent their lives on this land, knowing nothing but Kuwait as their homeland, and some were martyred defending it. Some even accompanied the convoy of the late Amir Sheikh Jaber Al-Ahmad (May God have mercy on him) during the assassination attempt in 1985.

The number of Bedoun residents in Kuwait is estimated at around 90,000, not including those registered with the Central Agency for the Remedy of the Situations of Illegal Residents. The Ministry of Interior holds the exact figures.

After the revocation of citizenship, the Bedoun population increased by several thousand, including many experienced individuals who provide valuable services to Kuwait but whom other countries seek to attract by offering benefits such as citizenship.

Another problem stems from the revocation of citizenship from individuals who acquired it by proxy. This issue is quite complex.

## Kuwait closes 5 clinics, refers 23

KUWAIT CITY, May 27: Minister of Health Dr. Ahmed Al-Awadhi issued a decision Monday, referring 23 private healthcare facilities — including hospitals, medical centers, clinics and laboratories — to the Medical Liability Authority; in addition to the closure of five healthcare facilities, for violating rules and regulations on advertising and medical practice.

This decision was taken after the specialized inspection teams uncovered violations

**KUWAIT CITY:** The State of Kuwait strongly condemned and denounced the storming of the Al-Aqsa Mosque by members of the Israeli occupation government and some extremists and settlers, in a flagrant violation of international law and a provocation of the feelings of Muslims.

In a statement Tuesday, Kuwait's Ministry of Foreign Affairs warned against the continuation of such escalatory practices, which constitute a violation of the historical and legal status quo in **Jerusalem**.

KUWAIT CITY, May 27: Dean of Kuwaiti journalism and Editor-in-Chief of the Arab Times and Al-Seyassah newspapers Ahmed Al-Jarallah met with Ambassador of the Republic of Pakistan to Kuwait Dr. Zafar Iqbal at his office in Dar Al-Seyassah on Tuesday.

They discussed ways to strengthen media cooperation, a number of current regional and international issues, and ways to address the media developments.

## Decision to end donation collection sparks debate

‘Charitable reputation of country at stake’

KUWAIT CITY, May 27: The recent decision of the Ministry of Social Affairs to suspend donation collections by charitable societies and foundations until further notice is a regulatory step that has sparked widespread debate among those active in the charitable sector.

This move is part of a general trend to reassess the mechanisms for charitable work -- a field in which Kuwait has long played a prominent role, both domestically and internationally.

While some view the decision as a necessary measure to introduce stronger oversight, others argue that it risks disrupting a vital pillar of the soft power and humanitarian outreach of the country.

Critics of the suspension emphasized the long-standing reputation of the country as a global leader in charitable and humanitarian efforts. They stressed that oversight must be part of a continuous development process -- ensuring transparency and accountability -- without hindering the sector's ability to support beneficiaries or undermining public trust in philanthropy.

Former MP Dr. Mohammad Al-Dallal told the newspaper that charitable work is central to the soft power of Kuwait, reinforcing the country's humanitarian image at both official and grassroots levels. He highlighted the historic role of Kuwaiti charities in bolstering the nation's international standing and noted their pivotal contributions during national crises, especially during the Iraqi invasion.

Al-Dallal called for balanced reforms, stressing the need for responsible governance without im-

posing undue restrictions. He urged the ministry to issue a clear regulatory framework that empowers charities while ensuring proper oversight.

In contrast, writer Ahmed Al-Sarraf expressed support for the decision, arguing that the charitable sector has operated for decades with insufficient oversight. He warned that some associations have been misused to fund illicit activities, serving partisan or personal interests.

Speaking to the newspaper, Al-Sarraf revealed that a temporary committee has been formed to draft a comprehensive law regulating charitable activities. “The committee recently discussed a key provision concerning the disproportionate allocation of funds to foreign efforts over domestic needs,” he added.

He recommended banning all external charitable activity unless conducted under direct government supervision through a unified platform. He also called for strict rules prohibiting political involvement by charitable organizations, demanding transparency in financial reporting and restrictions on receiving funds from government or foreign sources. He proposed that annual budgets be publicly disclosed in at least two daily newspapers.

Meanwhile, preacher Faisal bin Qazzaz Al-Jassem voiced concern over the suspension through the ‘X’ platform; warning that even a temporary freeze could severely impact Muslims and philanthropists reliant on these organizations. He affirmed that the charitable and relief associations in Kuwait are unparalleled in the Islamic world, often filling gaps where other nations fall short.

He asserted that “tens of thousands, even hundreds of thousands of people are affected by the decision -- orphans, families, preachers, imams, orators, teachers, educators, doctors, nurses and directors of centers, institutes and universities -- have no source of support other than Allah and the charities. Therefore, freezing the accounts means halting all of these activities and rendering all of them unable to continue their work; especially for the orphans, widows, families, patients and health centers.”

## ‘Zionist cause, not Palestinian cause perpetuates aggression’

“I WAS not surprised by Republican U.S. Congressman Randy Fine’s outrageous call to drop a nuclear bomb on the Gaza Strip, brazenly invoking the atomic bombings of Japan during World War II. Nor was I surprised by similar calls from some in the West and the United States advocating for the annihilation of Gaza’s population, or by the continued portrayal of the Palestinian cause as an ‘evil cause.’ Such rhetoric is, sadly, expected from those who deny truth and justice, and those who preach human rights while practicing their opposite. This blatant hypocrisy has long been evident,” columnist Eng. **Adel Al-Jarallah Al-Kharafi** wrote for **Al-Seyassah** daily.

“What matters now is that we, as Arabs, particularly Palestinians, draw lessons from the painful history we have endured, from the time of the Sykes-Picot Agreement to the present day. One lesson is the importance of establishing effective lobbies and pressure groups in the capitals of global decision-making. Alliances and treaties, while useful, are often toothless. Without real leverage, they fall short, and this is a strategic weakness we must no longer ignore.

“For decades, Arabs have placed their eggs in the baskets of the very countries that once colonized them. Others turned to so-called friendly countries that, while occasionally supportive, always prioritized their own interests and acted with calculated caution. As a result, the Arab voice has often been reduced to an echo - reactive rather than proactive.

“This dynamic is clearly reflected when 147 countries recognize the State of Palestine, yet that recognition remains merely symbolic, without tangible implementation. Such recognition holds little weight unless it is backed by real pressure, first on the United States, and second on Israel. This pressure must go beyond simply demanding an end to the war... It must aim to empower the Palestinian state to function and thrive.

“That means, first, granting its official institutions the freedom to operate; second, enabling them to truly represent their people; and third, allowing them to exercise their authority without Israeli interference.

“While it is true that global public outrage over Israel’s actions has intensified in recent months, that anger has done little to alleviate the suffering of the starving population in Gaza. Aid has trickled in, but nowhere near enough, largely because Tel Aviv continues to rely on the unwavering political and military support of the United States. Even former President Trump’s remarks about withdrawing support unless Israel accepts his plan to allow aid into the Strip have gone unheeded.

“Tel Aviv also depends on a vocal and organized base of popular support which, though limited in number, remains effective. Just days ago, I came across footage from a demonstration in London where a small group of pro-Israel supporters openly chanted slogans against ‘all Palestinians.’ They were protected by police. In stark contrast, thousands of demonstrators rallying for Palestinian rights were met with suspicion, scrutiny, and accusations of anti-Semitism.

“Because the Western eye often sees only in black and white, advocates for the legitimate rights of Palestine and its people are frequently accused of anti-Semitism, which is a false and misleading refrain used to discredit their cause. This narrative is supported by powerful Western financial, economic, and political lobbies capable of obscuring justice, defending the oppressor, and denying the rights of the oppressed.

“Therefore, the U.S. congressman’s recent statements are not merely a reaction to an isolated incident; they reflect a wide pattern of political behavior, due to the absence of any meaningful counter-response to challenge or correct such rhetoric and perceptions.

“In light of this, Arabs today must focus on building real international pressure groups. A clear-eyed view of 77 years of Palestinian suffering shows that this oppressed people has an undeniable right to a dignified life. It is time to reverse the narrative and expose the reality: it is the Zionist cause, not the Palestinian cause, that perpetuates injustice and aggression.”

### Also:

“As we roam the streets at night, we wonder why all the lights are on? Sixty thousand bulbs on a government building, and ten thousand on another,” columnist **Ahmad Al-Dawas** wrote for **Al-Seyassah** daily.

“At the start of summer, just when people rely most on air conditioning, the government expresses concern over high electricity consumption. We then see official announcements in newspapers warning that power will be cut for hours in certain areas, according to a set schedule.

“The government could have instructed its employees to turn off office lights at the end of the workday and requested all social, charitable, and other organizations to do the same after working hours.

“As I mentioned earlier, I once entered a library in a cooperative society and found nearly 100 ceiling lights switched on. Wouldn’t it have been more sensible to use just ten, for example?

“I know exactly what a single light bulb means to me ... I consider it a source of wealth.

“I began a difficult professional journey when I was transferred to work at

the Kuwaiti Embassy in Sudan. Upon arriving at Khartoum Airport on August 31, 1974, a colleague welcomed me and took me to my residence. I was shocked to discover that the electricity was out, and remained so for long hours each day. Naturally, this also meant the water supply to homes was cut off, as the generators weren’t functioning. When the generators stopped, people couldn’t fuel their cars, and I couldn’t even read the two official newspapers “Al-Ayyam” and “Al-Sahafa”.

“It was a difficult experience. I would read “Newsweek” by candlelight, along with Sam Wilson’s book on economics, despite the stifling heat. When the situation became unbearable, I would head to a hotel to read, only to find half the building lit and the other half in darkness.

“That is why I consider even a single light bulb a great blessing. That period of hardship taught me that people often only recognize the true value of something when it is lost.

“Here in Kuwait, we live in great comfort, thanks be to God. However, we often fail to appreciate it or take steps to preserve it. So why do we waste electricity by keeping unnecessary lights on?

“Kuwait could learn from Scotland’s example, where wind turbines were installed along the coast to generate electricity. Why not install similar wind turbines in the northern region of Kuwait to help meet our energy needs?”



“With the rise of a fast-paced consumer lifestyle, personal finance has become a matter of critical importance for every individual in Kuwaiti society. Debts and personal loans are no longer rare exceptions, they have become a reality for many who rely on them to meet various needs,” Kuwaiti Lawyer **Abdul Rahman Al-Houti** wrote for **Al-Seyassah** daily.

“However, managing and legally regulating these debts presents a real challenge, especially when financial obligations begin to accumulate or when defaults occur.

“Looking at the legal framework that governs personal debt, we find a set of regulations designed to regulate the relationship between borrowers and financial institutions. These rules guarantee the rights of both parties by enforcing strict conditions on the issuance of loans. This protects the economy as well as shields individuals from falling into excessive debt.

“Accordingly, personal loans are strictly regulated under the guidelines issued by the Central Bank of Kuwait, particularly concerning salary deduction rates, repayment periods, and interest calculations. One of the most notable regulations in place is that the deduction from a borrower’s income must not exceed 40 percent for employees and 30 percent for retirees. The repayment period is capped at five years for consumer loans and 15 years for housing loans.

“In addition, the law sets a maximum limit for consumer loans at KD 25,000, with clearly defined terms for interest and its calculation method. It also obligates banks and financing companies to maintain full transparency when issuing loans. This includes clearly explaining the loan terms, disclosing the total cost, and clarifying the borrower’s future financial obligations.

“When it comes to regulating debt, it is important to understand that it is not merely a financial issue but also a legal matter. The law offers multiple tools to protect your rights as a borrower, but you must be aware of them and use them wisely. Legal awareness, combined with sound financial planning, is necessary for maintaining financial stability and avoiding default, and the costly legal consequences that can follow.

“Lending laws grant you the right to fully understand the terms of any debt before committing to it. You should exercise this right by carefully verifying everything you sign with the lender and seeking clarification for any terms that are unclear or ambiguous.

“In the event of default, you also have the right to request that the lender reschedule your debt, either by extending the repayment period or reducing the monthly installments. This is a legal option available in cases such as job loss, reduced income, or other compelling circumstances, provided you can present official evidence.

“This procedure is designed to support borrowers who are dealing with real repayment difficulties by offering legal mechanisms to manage their situation. These include direct negotiation with the lender, ensuring that any new agreement is properly documented, or seeking assistance from the Arbitration Center or the Complaints Department at the Central Bank of Kuwait in cases of lender misconduct. As a last resort, you may turn to the judiciary to present your legal defenses in response to any unlawful practices by the lender, or to request an extension of repayment under the protection of the legal framework.

“One of the most common issues that confuses many people is the requirement to sign checks or promissory notes as a condition for obtaining a loan, often without clear justification. We therefore strongly advise against signing any document without first seeking legal advice. Signing such documents without fully understanding their implications could expose you to legal liability and potential prosecution.”

## Court acquits expat woman of forging docus, fraud 16 yrs on

Bid to acquire social allowance fraudulently

KUWAIT CITY, May 27: The Criminal Section in the Court of First Instance acquitted an expatriate woman of forging official documents and embezzlement of public funds (social allowances) that occurred 16 years ago.

The woman and her former husband were accused of forging official documents with the intention of fraudulently presenting them as genuine. They allegedly concealed their true marital status, provided false informa-

tion to officials, and signed declarations affirming the accuracy of this false information.

The Public Prosecution contended that they took advantage of the trust of employees responsible for processing such transactions by dictating fabricated details. They presented a divorce certificate and an official notification certificate, misleading officials into believing the ex-husband still had legal standing; thereby, enabling them to obtain social assistance using the altered documents.

Furthermore, the prosecution argued that the de-

fendants used official documents that were no longer legally valid; specifically, the divorce contract and the official notification certificate.

The woman allegedly submitted these expired documents to misrepresent her marital status, as their validity lapsed due to her remarriage and her failure to disclose this to continue receiving benefits from the Ministry of Social Affairs. The ex-husband purportedly knowingly participated, intending to give the false impression that the documents were still legally in force.

Attorney Enaam Haider, lawyer for the defendant, argued that the essential elements of forgery and the use of legally invalid documents were not present. She asserted that the investigations were superficial, inconsistent and without merit and that the documents lacked definitive proof of any crime.

## Licenses of 16 domestic labor offices suspended

KUWAIT CITY, May 27: The Domestic Labor Recruitment and Regulation Department at the Public Authority for Manpower (PAM) revealed that the total number of domestic labor recruitment offices registered with the authority has reached 482, reports Al-Anba daily.

According to the latest statistics from the authority, the department received 462 complaints from domestic workers, employers and recruitment offices. As a result, 16 office licenses were suspended, while suspensions were lifted for 18 others. Three new professional licenses were issued and 10 licenses were renewed.

In another development, the authority confirmed the launching of a training program for Kuwaiti youths -- aged 18 to 24, in collaboration with Kuwaiti Injaz Association. The program features a guidance session titled, “My Path to Professionalism,” from May 26-28 at the PAM theater in Al-Riqqa.

The session aims to equip participants with essential workplace skills; including written and verbal communication, time management, leadership fundamentals and job interview techniques.

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# ‘AI can help produce more fascinating media content’

8,000 media persons attending Dubai media summit

DUBAI, May 27, (KUNA): A pan-Arab media summit in Dubai is tantamount to a creative “platform” aiming to ratchet up the quality of the industry’s content across the region, Kuwaiti Minister of Information and Culture Abdulrahman Al-Mutairi said on Tuesday.

Serving as the representative of His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Ahmad Al-Abdullah Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah to the summit, the Kuwaiti minister, who doubles as minister of state for youth affairs, spoke of how cutting-edge technology like Artificial Intelligence (AI) can be employed as a tool to create more riveting media content, resulting in more “efficient and timely” productions, he said.

He went on to cite a long-term strategy his ministry has assembled that revolves around digital infrastructure and investment in AI tools, which he said can be useful in gauging “public trends”, in addition to the recently-launched “Platform 51”

of media outlets has seen, the Kuwaiti information minister said the industry has morphed into a “content creator” rather than a news provider, a change that has become necessary in keeping up with the latest social trends, he said. Accelerating a digital drive has now become the perennial goal of media bodies across the wider Arab region, a strategy that has seen rapid progress across public and private sectors alike over the course of the

last five years, the minister said. Kuwait’s Information, Culture and Youth Minister Abdulrahman Al-Mutairi – representing His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Ahmad Abdullah Al-Sabah – left Kuwait on Tuesday for Dubai to attend the Arab Media Summit 2025, held under the sponsorship of UAE Vice President, Prime Minister and Dubai Ruler Sheikh Mohammad bin Rashid Al-Maktoum. ## Hajj approval for persons with revoked citizenship

KUWAIT CITY, May 27: Hajj caravans have been informed about the approval of competent authorities to issue Hajj permits to those whose Kuwaiti citizenship was revoked in accordance with Article Eight of the Nationality Law, after fulfilling the specified conditions. Sources told the newspaper that those who meet

the conditions will be issued passports and their names will be removed from the banned list, paving the way for them to be assigned to the caravans. Sources added those who do not meet the conditions — those with a travel ban, a security restriction or an expired passport — are excluded from the aforementioned procedures. Sattam Al-Muzain, head of the Ministry of Islamic Affairs team in the Kuwaiti Hajj expedition, has announced the arrival of the expedition mem-

bers to the Holy Land in preparation for receiving the pilgrims from Kuwait. This is a confirmation of the report about the arrival of Kuwaiti Hajj expedition teams to the Holy Land that the newspaper published recently. Al-Muzain said the teams and committees began their duties immediately upon their arrival at the expedition’s headquarters in Makkah, affirming that they have completed preparations to provide the best services to the guests of Almighty Allah from Kuwait.

## ‘Leadership conveys condolences on demise of ex-Vietnamese Prez’

KUWAIT CITY, May 27: Minister of Amiri Diwan Affairs Sheikh Mohammad Al-Abdullah visited the Vietnamese Embassy in Kuwait on Monday to convey the condolences of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Meshal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, His Highness the Crown Prince Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Sabah, His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Ahmad Al-Abdullah, the government and people of Kuwait on the passing of former Politburo member and former President of the Republic of Vietnam Tran Duc Luong. The Vietnamese Embassy opened a condolence book on the passing of Luong in the presence of all the embassy staff. A number of ambassadors offered their condolences during the opening ceremony. In his condolence message, Vietnamese Ambassador to Kuwait Nguyen Duc Thang expressed his deep respect and appreciation for the late President; commending his significant contributions to the country’s renewal process, particularly in expanding foreign relations and promoting Vietnam’s international integration. Meanwhile, Thang stated that his country and Kuwait have tremendous potential to expand cooperation in several promising economic areas; including free trade, green energy, food security, digital transformation, artificial intelligence, infrastructure development, halal tourism and regional aviation despite the challenges posed by geographical distance, global economic fluctuations, international conflicts and climate change. He affirmed that many halal Vietnamese products are available in supermarket chains in Kuwait; indicating that Vietnam is a ma-

major importer of Kuwaiti crude oil, which accounts for 95 percent of total imports from Kuwait. “This enhances Vietnam’s energy security and serves the economic interests of both countries,” he asserted. On the investment front, Thang revealed that Kuwait is currently the largest investor among the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries in Vietnam, particularly through its partnership in the Nghi Son Refining and Petrochemical Complex project, being implemented by Kuwait Petroleum International (KPI). He touched on expectations of further investment flowing from the Middle East, specifically from Kuwaitis, into the Vietnamese market in the coming period. He said Kuwait is currently Vietnam’s largest trading partner in the Gulf region and ranks 19th among its trading partners globally, while Vietnam is a prominent trading partner of Kuwait in Southeast Asia. The ambassador disclosed trade figures, which increased from \$350 million in 2005 to \$6 billion in 2023, while in 2024 it reached approximately \$7.33 billion. Imports from Kuwait accounted for more than \$7.2 billion, while Vietnamese exports remained at only \$75 million. He considers this disparity a promising opportunity to expand exports of Vietnamese products to the Kuwaiti market in the future. On the other hand, Abdul Mohsen Al-Attar, Director of the International Organizations Department at the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, said “the trade agreement between the two countries represented a milestone on the path of economic cooperation, as it established a solid legal foundation for the free flow of goods and services and supported mutual investments based on the principles of the World Trade Organization.”

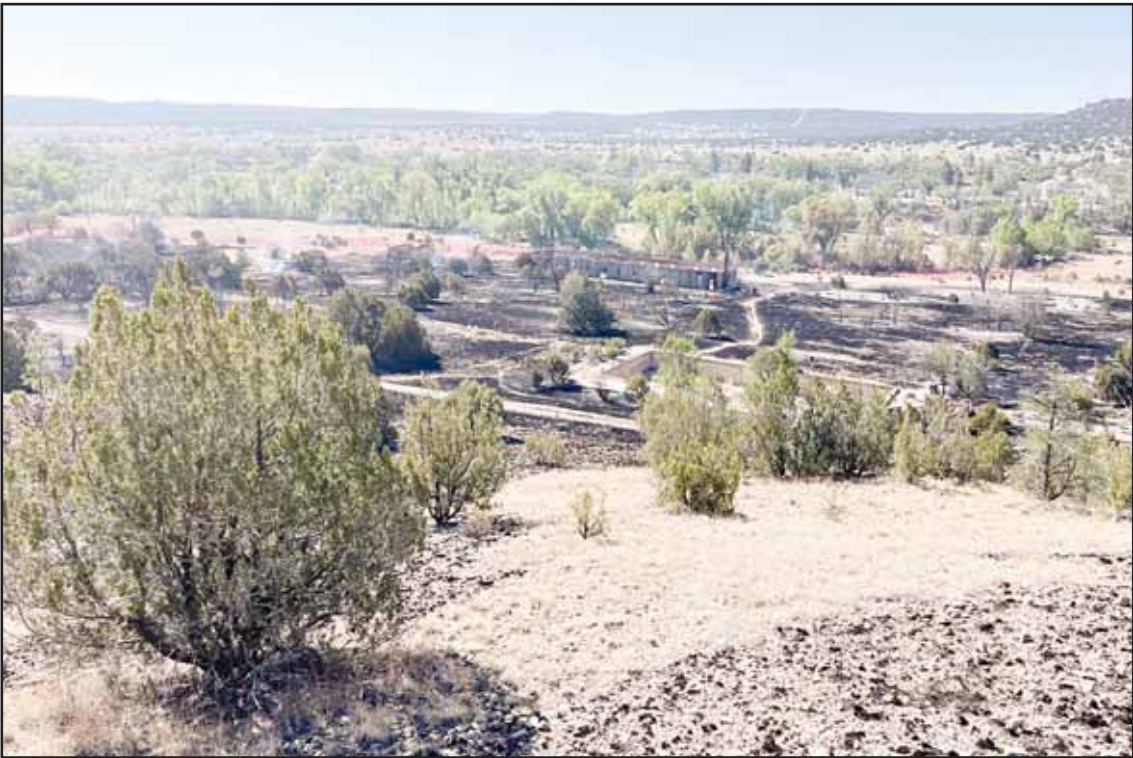

The fire damaged structures at Fort Stanton Historical Site built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the 1930s and a gym erected by Germans interned at the site during World War II after their ship sank. (AP)

US president targets Democrats over questionable online fundraising

WASHINGTON, May 27, (AP): When US President Donald Trump directed his attorney general last month to investigate online fundraising, he cited concerns that foreigners and fraudsters were using elaborate “schemes” and “dummy accounts” to funnel illegal contributions to politicians and causes.

Instead of calling for an expansive probe, however, the president identified just one potential target: ActBlue, the Democrats’ online fundraising juggernaut, which has acknowledged receiving over 200 potentially illicit contributions last year from foreign internet addresses.

Trump’s announcement contained a glaring omission - his political committees also received scores of potentially problematic contributions.

An Associated Press review of donations to Trump over the past five years found 1,600 contributions from donors who live abroad, have close ties to foreign interests or failed to disclose basic information, often making it difficult, if not impossible, to identify them and verify the legality of their donations. Among those was \$5,000 linked to a derelict building, and \$5,000 from a Chinese businessman who listed a La Quinta Inn as his address. Another sizable donation - \$1 million - was made by the wife of an African oil and mining magnate.

It’s against the law for US can-

didates and political committees to accept contributions from foreign nationals. Laws also place strict limits on donation amounts and prohibit the laundering of contributions to get around legal caps. For the most part, such donations have been policed by campaigns and the Federal Election Commission, with only the most egregious examples being targeted by federal law enforcement.

But after reclaiming the White House,

Trump embarked on a campaign of retribution against his perceived enemies, launching broadsides against universities, law firms and his own former officials. If the Justice Department were to investigate ActBlue, it could imperil a key fundraising tool for Trump’s political rivals before the 2026 midterm elections, when Republicans’ threadbare House majority - and the president’s ability to pass an agenda through Congress - will be on the line.

‘We just revere their incredible legacy’

Trump honors fallen soldiers on Memorial Day, while attacking Biden and judges

ARLINGTON, Va., May 27, (AP): US President Donald Trump paid tribute to fallen service members during a Memorial Day ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery on Monday, in an address that honored the “great, great warriors” yet also briefly veered into politics as he boasted of a nation he is “fixing after a long and hard four years.”

Though the holiday is one that US presidents typically treat with pure solemnity, Trump began it with an all-caps Memorial Day social media post that attacked his predecessor and called federal judges who have blocked his deportation initiatives “monsters who want our country to go to hell.”

Yet at Arlington National Cemetery, where more than 400,000 have been laid to rest, Trump commemorated the sacrifice of US service members and singled out several Gold Star families to tell the stories of their fallen relatives.

“We just revere their incredible legacy,” Trump said. “We salute them in their eternal and everlasting glory. And we continue our relentless pursuit of America’s destiny as we make our nation stronger, prouder, freer and greater than ever before.”

“Their valor,” he said, “gave us the freest, greatest and most noble republic ever to exist on the face of the earth. A republic that I am fixing after a long and hard four years.”

During his remarks, Trump told the story of Navy Senior Chief Petty Officer Shannon Kent, killed along with three other Americans by a suicide bomber in 2019 in Syria, leaving behind her husband, 3-year-old son and 18-month-old son.

The Pine Plains, New York, native was on her fifth combat deployment, he said, embedded with a team hunting Islamic State group militants in Syria, serving as linguist, translator and cryptologic technician working alongside special forces.

“She was among the first women ever to do it, and she did it better than anyone,” Trump said, calling out Kent’s family for applause at the ceremony.

The crowd also heard of Air Force Senior Master Sgt. Elroy Harworth from Erhard, Minnesota, whose plane went down in enemy territory during the Vietnam War, dying while his wife was seven months pregnant. His son, who was cheered in the audience, followed his father’s path and has been in

the Army for 20 years.

There was also the story of Army Cpl. Ryan McGhee of Fredericksburg, Virginia, who enlisted after the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks and whose mother

was in the audience.

Trump said McGhee knew he wanted to be an Army Ranger since he saw the towers fall on that day, did three tours in Afghanistan, then deployed to Iraq.

Sixteen years ago this month, the president said, McGhee died in a firefight, and “gave his life at 21 years old.”

Vice President JD Vance, who spoke before Trump, said the lesson of all the gravestones is: “We must be cautious in sending our people to war.” He urged the crowd to push political leaders to treat the lives of soldiers as the “most precious resource.”

Later in his remarks, Trump pointed to a “big, big celebration” coming next year as the U.S. celebrates its 250th birthday, joking that “in some ways, I’m glad I missed that second term” when he lost to Joe Biden.

“Because I wouldn’t be president for that,” Trump said, as the crowd laughed. “In addition, we have the World Cup and we have the Olympics. Can you imagine? I missed that four years. And now look what I have, I have everything. Amazing the way things work out.”

Prior to speaking, Trump placed a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, a somber tradition for U.S. presidents. The president paused after placing the wreath, then stepped back and saluted during the playing of taps. Vance and Defense Secretary Pete

Hegseth joined him.

The president began the day with a decidedly different tone.

In a social media message in all capital letters, Trump ranted at Biden, calling him the “scum” who spent the last four years trying to destroy the country with radical leftism and who, he said, left behind an open border.

That was after he posted a separate message proclaiming “HAPPY MEMORIAL DAY!” Wishing people a happy Memorial Day is regarded as verboten because the day is considered a somber one to honor soldiers killed in service.

Vance emphasized as much when he spoke to US Naval Academy graduates in Annapolis on Friday, when he said that he and Trump would “lead the most solemn occasion in our nation, Memorial Day at Arlington Cemetery.

“You will learn as I have that when people say things like ‘Happy Memorial Day,’ you appreciate the sentiment behind it but know that it’s wrong because Memorial Day is not a happy day,” Vance said last week. “Memorial Day is not for those who served and came home, it is for those who served that didn’t.”

Driver suspected of attempted murder

65 people injured after Liverpool car ramming

LIVERPOOL, England, May 27, (AP): A 53-year-old British man who injured 65 people when he plowed his vehicle into a crowd of Liverpool soccer fans celebrating their team’s Premier League championship has been arrested on suspicion of attempted murder, police said Tuesday.

The driver was also being held on suspicion of dangerous driving and driving on drugs, said Detective Chief Superintendent Karen Jaundrill.

Some 50 people were treated at hospitals and 11 remained hospitalized in stable condition, police said.

The driver had managed to get around police road blocks by following an ambulance that was rushing to treat a person having a heart attack.

Merseyside Police said they were

not treating the incident as terrorism and are not looking for other suspects. The force has not identified the arrested driver. Police in Britain usually do not name suspects until they are charged.

Detectives were still working to piece together why the minivan plowed into crowds packing a narrow street on Monday, just after the players of Liverpool Football Club had celebrated its championship with an open-topped bus parade.

The incident cast a shadow over a city that has suffered twin tragedies linked to the soccer team and led to widespread expressions of shock, sadness and support.

“It is truly devastating to see that what should have been a joyous cele-

bration for many could end in such distressing circumstances,” King Charles III said in a statement while on a visit to Canada. “I know that the strength of community spirit for which your city is renowned will be a comfort and support to those in need.”

Water Street, near the River Mersey in the heart of the city, was cordoned off by police tape, and a blue tent had been erected on the road strewn with the detritus of celebration, including bottles, cans and Liverpool flags.

Four of the injured are children, said ambulance service spokesman Dave Kitchen.

A child was among four victims trapped under the van that was lifted by firefighters to free them.

Russia seizes Ukrainian border villages as massive bombing campaign slows

KYIV, Ukraine, May 27, (AP): Russian forces have taken four border villages in Ukraine’s northeastern Sumy region, a local official said Tuesday, days after Russian President Vladimir Putin said he had issued an order to establish a buffer zone along the border.

Sumy borders Russia’s Kursk region, where a surprise Ukrainian incursion last year captured a pocket of land in the first occupation of Russian territory since World War II. Creating a buffer zone could help Russia prevent further Ukrainian cross-border attacks there.

Meanwhile, a Russian bombing campaign that had escalated in recent days slowed overnight as far fewer Russian drones targeted Ukrainian towns and cities.

Moscow’s invasion has shown no signs of stopping despite months of intense US-led efforts to secure a ceasefire and get traction for peace talks. Since Russian and Ukrainian delegations met in Turkey earlier this month for their first direct talks in three years, a large prisoner exchange has been the only tangible outcome, but negotiations have brought no significant breakthrough.

Between Friday and Sunday, Russia launched around 900 drones at Ukraine, officials said, amid a spate of large-scale bombardments. On Sun-

day night, Russia launched its biggest drone attack of the 3-year war against Ukraine, firing 355 drones.

From Monday to Tuesday, Russia fired 60 drones at Ukraine, the Ukrainian air force said Tuesday. Russia’s Ministry of Defense claimed its air defenses downed 99 Ukrainian drones overnight over seven Russian regions.

The weekend surge in Russia’s bombardments of Ukraine drew a rebuke

from US President Donald Trump, who said Putin had gone “crazy.” That comment prompted a sharp Kremlin reaction Monday, with spokesman Dmitry Peskov criticizing “emotional reactions” to events.

Peskov adopted a milder tone Tuesday, hailing US peace efforts and saying that “the Americans and President Trump have taken a quite balanced approach.”

Canada facing unprecedented challenges: King Charles

OTTAWA, Ontario, May 27, (AP): King Charles III said Canada is facing unprecedented challenges in a world that’s never been more dangerous as he opened the Canadian Parliament on Tuesday with a speech widely viewed as a show of support in the face of annexation threats by US President Donald Trump.

Trump’s repeated suggestion that the US annex Canada prompted Prime Minister Mark Carney to invite Charles to give the speech from the throne outlining his governments priorities for the new session of Parliament. The king is the head of state in Canada, which is a member of the British Commonwealth of former colonies.

“We must face reality: since the Second World War, our world has never been more dangerous and unstable. Canada is facing challenges that, in our lifetimes, are unprecedented,” Charles said in French.

He added that “many Canadians are feeling anxious and worried about the drastically changing world around them.”

It’s rare for the monarch to deliver what’s called the speech from the throne in Canada. Charles’ mother, Queen Elizabeth II, did it twice before in 1957 and 1977.

“I have always had the greatest admiration for Canada’s unique identity, which is recognized across the world for bravery and sacrifice in defense of national values, and for the diversity and kindness of Canadians,” he said.

Charles, on his 20th visit to Canada, noted that it has been nearly 70 years since his mother first opened Parlia-

ment.

“In the time since, Canada has dramatically changed: repatriating its constitution, achieving full independence, and witnessing immense growth. Canada has embraced its British, French, and Indigenous roots, and become a bold, ambitious, innovative country that is bilingual, truly multicultural,” the monarch said.

**Former US rep Rangel dies:** Former US rep Charles Rangel of New York, an outspoken, gravel-voiced Harlem Democrat who spent nearly five decades on Capitol Hill and was a founding member of the Congressional Black Caucus, died Monday at age 94.

His family confirmed the death in a statement provided by City College of New York spokesperson Michelle Stent. He died at a hospital in New York, Stent said.

A veteran of the Korean War, he defeated legendary Harlem politician Adam Clayton Powell in 1970 to start his congressional career. During the next 40-plus years, he became a legend himself as dean of the New York congressional delegation and, in 2007, the first African American to

Presidential frontrunner vows to restore communication channels with DPRK

S.Korea police ban ex-PM, ex-deputy PM from leaving country for alleged insurrection

SEOUL, May 27, (Agencies): South Korea's police banned former Prime Minister Han Duck-soo, and Choi Sang-mok, former deputy prime minister for economic affairs, for alleged insurrection charges, multiple media outlets said on Tuesday. Han and Choi have been under investigation as suspects of insurrection and prevented from leaving the country in the middle of this month. The police special investigative unit summoned Han and Choi as well as Lee Sang-min, former interior minister who was prohibited from leaving the country last December, for questioning on Monday. The three former government officials were suspected of being involved in the botched martial law bid by former President Yoon Suk-yeol, who was removed from office in April.

Meanwhile, Lee Jae-myung, presidential candidate of South Korea's majority liberal Democratic Party, vowed on Monday to restore communication channels with the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK). Lee announced his foreign security

policy, saying that he would push for the restoration of inter-Korean communication channels, including military hotlines, mutually stop acts causing tensions, and manage situations in a stable manner. The presidential frontrunner pledged to promote dialogue, exchange and cooperation with the DPRK while pursuing the Korean Peninsula where the two Koreas can coexist with the de-escalated tensions and denuclearized peace. The presidential by-election, caused by the removal of former conservative President Yoon Suk-yeol from office over his botched martial law bid, is scheduled for June 3.

Lee led a poll for the snap presidential election on June 3, Flower Research survey showed Monday. Lee won a support rate of 48.9 percent, taking a big lead over Kim Moon-soo, presidential candidate of the second-biggest conservative People Power Party who garnered 30.8 percent of support. The civil rights lawyer-turned-politician maintained his position as presidential

frontrunner in the election, triggered by the removal of former President Yoon Suk-yeol from office over

his botched martial law imposition last December. Lee lost the 2022 presidential election to Yoon by the

country's narrowest margin of 0.73 percentage points. Lee Jun-seok of the minor conservative New Reform Party took 9.6 percent of support. The Democratic Party won an approval score of 49.2 percent, while 31.1 percent supported the People Power Party, the survey showed. The result was based on a poll of 2,004 voters conducted between Friday and Saturday. It had a plus and minus 2.2 percentage points in margin of error with a 95 percent confidence level.

**TOKYO:** US Forces Korea (USFK) on Friday denied media reports that Washington is considering withdrawing thousands of its troops from South Korea.

Reports that the US Defense Department will reduce American troops in South Korea are not true, South Korea's public broadcaster KBS reported, citing a USFK statement.

"The US remains firmly committed to the defense of South Korea and we are looking forward to working with

the incoming government officials to maintain and strengthen the iron clad alliance with South Korea," according to the statement.

Quoting defense officials familiar with the discussions, the Wall Street Journal reported yesterday that the Pentagon is looking at plans to pull approximately 4,500 of the 28,500 US troops out of South Korea and redeploy them elsewhere in the Indo-Pacific region, including Guam.

Seoul's Defense Ministry said Friday that there have been no discussions at all between South Korea and the US regarding the withdrawal.

"The USFK, a key asset of the South Korea-US alliance, has contributed to peace and stability on the Korean Peninsula and in the region by maintaining a strong combined defense posture with the South Korean military and deterring a North Korean invasion and provocations," the ministry said.

It added that South Korea will continue to cooperate with the US in that regard.

5 dead, 19 injured in China chemical plant explosion: CCTV

A huge explosion rocked a chemical plant in China's eastern Shandong province around noon Tuesday, killing at least five people and injuring 19, according to state broadcaster CCTV. An additional six people remain missing.

The blast was powerful enough to knock out the windows at a storage warehouse more than two miles (three kilometers) away from the factory, according to a video shared by a local resident, who declined to give his name out of concern for retaliation.

His home shook from the blast, he said. As he went

to the window to see what was wrong, he saw a tall column of smoke from the site, more than seven kilometers (4.3 miles) away.

The explosion happened at the Gaomi Youdao Chemical Co, which is located in an industrial park in the city of Weifang. It manufactures pesticides as well as chemicals for medical use, and has more than 500 employees, according to corporate registration records.

Local fire officials sent more than 230 personnel to the scene, according to CCTV. (AP)

Nation hosts confab for Everest climbers

Nepal vows to keep Himalayas safe, clean

KATHMANDU, Nepal, May 27, (AP): Nepal's government said on Tuesday it has a "duty to protect" the Himalayas from the risks presented by climate change and the growing numbers of climbers attempting to scale the region's summits, especially Everest.

"The government is strongly committed to support mountaineering in every possible way by keeping climbers safe, by protecting the natural beauty of our peaks and by helping local communities grow alongside the spirit of adventure," Nepal's tourism minister Badri Prasad Pandey said.

He was speaking in Kathmandu at a gathering of about 100 climbers from around the world who have successfully tackled Mount Everest. The one-day conference, dubbed the Everest Summiteers Summit, involved discussions on how to protect climbers and the environment.

Attendees expressed concern on the rising numbers of people who crowd Everest to try to scale the 8,849-meter (29,032-foot) peak. Veterans have complained how the mountain is becoming crowded and dirty.

Climbers normally spend weeks at base camp to acclimatize to the higher altitude. They make practice runs to the lower camps on Everest before beginning their final attempt on the peak.

Nepal's government last year funded a team of soldiers and Sherpas to remove 11 tons (24,000 pounds) of garbage, four dead bodies and a skeleton from Everest during the climbing season.

"Today, climate change and global warming are putting this future at risk. That is why we must act with care, with wisdom and with a deep sense of respect," Pandey said. "These mountains are sacred, and it is our duty to protect them for the generations yet to come."

Nepal doesn't have rules on how many days climbers must spend acclimatizing or making practice climbs. The permits to climb Everest, which cost \$11,000 each, are valid for 90 days. Climbing season normally wraps up by the end of May, when the weath-

er deteriorates and monsoon season begins.

Mount Everest was conquered in 1953 by New Zealander Edmund Hillary and his Sherpa guide Tenzing Norgay. Since then it has been climbed thousands of times and every year hundreds more attempt to reach the summit.

The popularity of the challenge means climbers face increased risks as queues form on the routes to the summit during the short windows of good weather. crowding the narrow and dangerous path to the summit though icy ridges and steep slopes.

Brazil Prez Lula hospitalized with inner ear ailment, then released

RIO DE JANEIRO, May 27, (Agencies): Brazil's President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva was diagnosed with labyrinthitis Monday after suffering from vertigo, hospital officials said. The 79-year-old leftist leader has already returned to the country's presidential residence, where he is resting.

The Sirio-Libanes Hospital said in a statement that Lula underwent imaging and blood tests, and its results came within normal limits. Labyrinthitis is an inflammation of the labyrinth in the inner ear, which is responsible for hearing and balance. Physicians advised him to observe strict rest at his official residence, resulting in the cancellation of his official agenda.

The health scare adds to Lula's recent medical worries, which are also part of his allies' concerns ahead of his likely bid for reelection next year.

The most serious is a fall he had in the bathroom of the presidential residence in Brasília on Oct. 19. Almost two months later, he was transferred to São Paulo for surgery after suffering headaches caused by new a bleeding in his head. He was discharged Dec. 15.

Australia's youngest senator elected at 21

SYDNEY, May 27, (AP): A woman who turned 21 on the day of Australia's federal election in May has been declared the nation's youngest ever senator.

And like many female candidates who run for election in Australia, Charlotte Walker wasn't expected to win.

The former union official won the governing center-left Labor Party's third Senate seat for South Australia state in a complicated rank order voting system. A party's third choice rarely wins.

She had the lowest vote count of the six newly elected senators for the state. The Australian Electoral Commission officially declared the poll Tuesday.

The new job will be a "big adjustment," said Walker, who starts her six-year term July 1. A federal lawmaker's base salary is more than 205,000 Australian dollars (\$133,000) annually.

"There's a few feelings. Obviously, there's a lot of pressure," Walker told Australian Broadcasting Corp. after the results were announced late Monday.

for regions affected by flooding on the east coast as authorities confirmed almost 800 homes and businesses have been destroyed. Albanese toured flood-hit regions in the east coast state of New South Wales (NSW) for the second time since the flooding crisis, which has caused five deaths, began

earlier in May following record-breaking rainfall.

Speaking at a press conference in the town of Taree, 250 km northeast of Sydney in the hardest-hit Mid North Coast region, Albanese announced expanded federal financial assistance for affected areas.

Rwanda-backed rebels committed possible war crimes in eastern Congo: rights group

DAKAR, Senegal, May 27, (AP): Human rights group Amnesty International accused the M23 rebels in eastern Congo of killing, torturing and forcibly disappearing civilian detainees in two rebel-controlled cities on Tuesday.

"These acts violate international humanitarian law and may amount to war crimes," Amnesty said in a statement.

The decades-long conflict in eastern Congo escalated in January, when the Rwanda-backed M23 advanced and seized the strategic city of Goma in North Kivu province, followed by Bukavu in February.

Amnesty said that between February and April, it interviewed 18 civilians who had been detained by M23 in Goma and Bukavu, after they were accused of supporting the Congolese army or government. The former detainees said that the rebels produced no evidence of these accusations and several weren't informed of the reasons for their detention.

They were held in overcrowded, unsanitary cells without sufficient food, water, sanitation facilities or health care, according to the rights group. Several said that they saw fellow detainees die from the harsh conditions, and torture.

Some described how they witnessed M23 fighters kill two detainees with hammers and shoot another who died

on the spot.

All of the former detainees interviewed by Amnesty said that they were either tortured or witnessed M23 fighters torture others in detention, describing severe beatings with wooden rods, electric cables or engine belts.

The rights group said that relatives looked for their loved ones at the detention sites, but M23 fighters often

refused to grant them access or denied that their relatives were there, which Amnesty said amounts to enforced disappearances.

M23 is one of about 100 armed groups that have been vying for a foothold in mineral-rich eastern Congo near the border with Rwanda, in a conflict that has created one of the world's most significant humanitarian crises.

Opponents reject budget

Samoa prime minister seeks early election

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, May 27, (AP): Samoa's Prime Minister said she would seek to dissolve Parliament, prompting an early election, after a vote on her government's budget for the next year failed Tuesday.

Fiam Naomi Mata'afa's admission of defeat followed months of political havoc in the South Pacific island nation, during which the leader survived two votes of no confidence and struggled on with a minority government. Her budget was rejected during a swift vote in the capital Apia, with 34 lawmakers against it, 16 in favor and two abstaining.

An election must be held within 90 days. Samoa, a country of about 200,000 people, was due to go to the polls next April.

Fiam has led Samoa since 2021, when she ousted her predecessor of 22 years. She is the country's first woman prime minister and in 1991 was the first woman appointed to Samoa's Cabinet.

The daughter of a former prime minister, Fiam is one of the region's longest-serving politicians. She came to power after splitting with the previous leader's party over constitutional changes that she said would undermine the rule of law.

Fiam holds a chiefly rank as a village leader, rare for women in Samoa. She remains an outlier, too, in Pacific island politics, where only 8% of parliamentarians are women, according to January figures from the Inter-Parliamentary Union.

Tuesday's budget defeat capped months of political turmoil after Fiam in January sacked a Cabinet member who faced a raft of criminal charges and is also her party's chairman. He in turn expelled Fiam from the FAST party and forced her into a minority government.



Kuwaiti oil price rises to \$64.02 pb

KUWAIT CITY, May 27, (KUNA): The price of Kuwaiti oil went up by 44 cents to USD 64.02 per barrel on Monday as opposed to USD 63.58 pb last Friday, said the Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) on Tuesday.

The prices of the Brent crude and West Texas Intermediate globally had differed with the former decreasing by four cents to USD 64.74 per barrel, the latter stabilizing at USD 61.53 pb.

Assembly approves 70% cash dividend

NAPESCO reports 56% surge in net profits to KD 13.4 million

KUWAIT CITY, May 27: Chairman of the Board of Directors of the National Oilfield Services Company (NAPESCO) Sheikh Sabah Al-Sabah confirmed that the company had several qualitative accomplishments last year; most notably reaping the benefits of its investment in the Oil Projects Company, the effects of which were reflected in the company’s financial results.

In his speech at the company’s general assembly on Monday, he highlighted the strategic direction toward regional expansion; indicating the board approved the establishment of subsidiaries in Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates (UAE), particularly the development of oil services technology in the Oil Services Department of the company to enhance operational efficiency and contribute to establishing a more sustainable business environment.

He affirmed that the general assembly was held with a 90.09 percent attendance rate; and that the company witnessed significant developments last year, driving innovation to achieve a comprehensive and sustainable future.

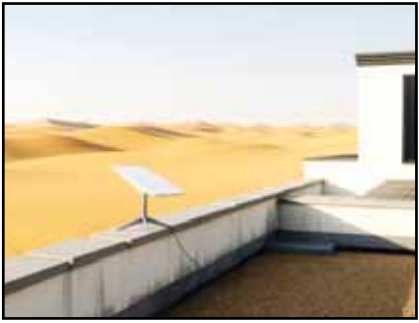

## KIB enhances cybersecurity awareness for 'Eid Al-Adha'

KUWAIT CITY, May 27: As part of its ongoing commitment to the 'Let's Be Aware' (Diraya) campaign, Kuwait International Bank (KIB) is continuing, for the fifth consecutive year, its efforts to enhance banking security for its customers. The Bank is sharing a series of precautionary tips and guidelines across various communication channels to raise public awareness about financial security and fraud prevention – especially during the Eid Al-Adha holiday period.

Commenting on KIB's efforts to support the campaign, which was launched by the Central Bank of Kuwait (CBK) and the Kuwait Banking Association (KBA) in cooperation with local banks, Basil Al-Suwaidan, General Manager of the Information Security, Privacy and Anti-Fraud Department at KIB, said: "The holiday period typically brings a surge in shopping, travel, and online activity, which is often accompanied by a sharp rise in fraud targeting bank cards and electronic transactions. That's why KIB is intensifying its efforts to raise customer awareness about the risks of cyber fraud and how to use bank cards safely, in order to safeguard their assets and personal data from theft, breaches, and other threats."

To safeguard banking transactions, Al-Suwaidan recommended that customers download the "KIB Mobile" app and enable instant notifications or SMS alerts to stay updated on any activity related to their accounts and immediately report suspicious transactions. He also highlighted the importance of securely storing banking information, such as card numbers and OTPs, and never sharing them with anyone. In addition, he advised against the use of public Wi-Fi networks when accessing online banking services.

He also emphasized that KIB never requests personal or confidential information from customers via email, text message, WhatsApp, or phone call. If such a request is received, he advised, it should be ignored and reported immediately.

Al-Suwaidan explained that during holiday periods, common fraud tactics tend to surge, such as sending suspicious links via email or SMS that lead users to fake websites designed to steal personal and financial information. He also noted an increase in false advertisements and misleading offers related to chalet rentals. He emphasized the importance of carefully inspecting links received through unsolicited messages, verifying the sender's identity and website URLs, using secure payment methods, and avoiding the sharing of sensitive information over unsecured networks.

KIB recognizes the importance of providing its customers with the knowledge and tools needed to protect them-

selves from fraudulent activities. As part of the 'Let's Be Aware' campaign, the Bank encourages customers to stay cautious and vigilant when conducting online transactions. This step aligns with Zain's corporate sustainability strategy and marks a new milestone in the company's journey toward decarbonizing its operations and supply chain. It also supports the company's commitment to the Paris Agreement and Zain's plans to achieve net-zero emissions by 2050.

Commenting on the partnership, Waleed Al-Khashti said: "At Zain, we believe the transition to a green economy starts not only internally but also across our partner ecosystem and supply chain. That's why our partnership with DHL to adopt the GoGreen Plus service reflects a model that embodies this direction."

He added: "This step enables us to reduce carbon emissions from our air freight shipments and enhances our ability to meet our environmental commitments under our corporate sustainability strategy. Makram Raad, Country Manager of DHL Kuwait, commented: "Through this agreement between Zain and DHL, both parties reaffirm their commitment to the local Kuwaiti community by continuing to decarbonize supply chains in pursuit of cleaner operations and better climate protection. It also strengthens both sides' positions in promoting awareness and embracing the responsibilities that all key players must uphold to achieve sustainability strategy goals."

DHL's GoGreen Plus service provides a sustainable alternative by using SAF produced from renewable sources such as used cooking oil or plant waste. SAF can reduce carbon emissions by up to 80% compared to conventional jet fuel.

The service is based on the Book & Claim methodology, which allows DHL to separate the environmental benefit from the actual shipping location, enabling companies to benefit from SAF use anywhere in the world.

Through this partnership, Zain will be able to reduce its Scope 3 carbon footprint associated with air freight emissions, further supporting the company's ability to accurately report its carbon emissions and meet its environmental goals.

This initiative builds on several recent actions by Zain to increase the use of clean energy, including installing solar panels at its headquarters to replace conventional car park shading, implementing the region's first comprehensive Scope 3 supply chain monitoring system, and

deploying artificial intelligence solutions to optimize network energy efficiency.

In its 14th Annual Sustainability Report, Zain Group reaffirmed its deep commitment to environmental protection and climate action as a core pillar of its five-year strategy. In 2024, the Group secured approval from the Science Based Targets initiative (SBTi) for its climate goals.

Zain also adopted the Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Protocol to calculate emissions and aligned its emission factors with the International Energy Agency (IEA) standards to ensure consistency across its markets. It implemented a market-specific water management plan, achieving a 5.89% reduction in water consumption compared to the previous year, and maintained its commitment to voluntary disclosures under global standards such as GRI, SASB, and TCFD.

Zain further reinforced its commitment to nature and biodiversity conservation through its ongoing participation in the Carbon Disclosure Project (CDP) and by expanding sustainability across its value chain, including supplier training in ethical business practices and environmental compliance.

- 4.55% for USD 400 million for 3-month tenor; and,
- 4.55% for USD 340 million for 6-month tenor.

This marks the IILM's ninth auction year-to-date and the sec-

ond for the month of May. Year-to-date, cumulative issuances have reached USD 9.49 billion across 27 Sukuk series of varying tenors. The auction attracted strong demand from the IILM's network of Primary Dealers and global investors, resulting in a healthy orderbook of USD 2.58 billion and a robust average bid-to-cover ratio of 202%, reflecting continued confidence in the IILM's short-term Sukuk programme.

The issuance forms part of the IILM's "A-1" (S&P) and "F1" (Fitch Ratings) rated USD 6 billion short-term Sukuk issuance programme.

US futures, European markets

rise on temporary US-EU truce

S&P 500 climbs 1.5% before the bell

NEW YORK, May 27, (AP): European markets and U.S. futures jumped early Tuesday following a weekend trade truce between the E.U. and U.S. after Trump’s threat late last week to tack on 50% imports from the trading bloc.

Futures for the S&P 500 climbed 1.5% before the bell, while futures for the Nasdaq rose 1.6%. Futures for the Dow Jones Industrial Average gained 1.4%. Those premarket gains were enough to wipe out all the losses from Friday when Trump went on his E.U. trade tirade.

Markets went into a tailspin early Friday after Trump posted on social media that trade talks with the European Union “were going nowhere” and that “straight 50%” tariffs could go into effect on June 1.

Trump on Sunday said he would delay a threatened 50% tariff on goods from the E.U. until July 9 to give the trading partners time to negotiate.

The EU’s chief trade negotiator

said Monday he had “good calls” with Trump administration officials and that the bloc was “fully committed” to reaching a trade deal by the July deadline.

In Europe at midday, London’s

FTSE 100 gained 0.8%, reopening after a British holiday on Monday.

Germany’s DAX added 0.7% while the CAC 40 in Paris picked up 0.2%.

Tesla’s sales in Europe plunged for the fourth consecutive month, even as

growth in the electric car market picked up pace, according to data released by an industry trade group there.

Sales of Tesla vehicles in 32 European countries tumbled 49% to 7,261 in April from 14,228 in the same month last year, according to the European Automobile Manufacturers’ Association. Sales of battery-electric vehicles by all manufacturers rose about 28%.

The numbers are the latest indication of how the Tesla brand is suffering because of the backlash against billionaire CEO Elon Musk over his far-right views.

Despite the grim sales figures, Tesla shares rose 2.1% before the bell Tuesday, perhaps propelled by optimism over an E.U.-U.S. trade deal.

Southwest Airlines rose close to 3% in premarket trading as the carrier prepares to implement its new policy on Wednesday that will charge most travelers for checked bags.

Southwest had built years of advertising campaigns around its policy of letting passengers check up to two bags for free, but the struggling airline has come under pressure from activist investors to boost profits and revenue.

LONDON, May 27, (AP): Tesla sales across Europe plunged by half last month even as growth in the electric car market picked up pace, according to data released Tuesday.

The numbers are the latest indication of how much the Tesla brand is suffering because of the backlash against billionaire CEO Elon Musk over his far-right views.

Sales of Tesla vehicles in 32 European countries tumbled 49% to 7,261 in April from 14,228 in the same month the previous year, according to the figures released by the European Automobile Manufacturers’ Association, or ACEA.

At the same time, sales of battery-electric vehicles by all manufacturers rose about 28%. Meanwhile, sales of gasoline and diesel powered cars slumped.

The figures, which cover the European Union’s 27 member countries and five other nations outside the bloc, back up early data from Sweden, the Netherlands and Denmark released at the start of this month that had pointed to a sales collapse.

Tesla has been reeling from protests and boycotts over Musk wading into politics, but it also faces other factors including an aging model lineup and intensifying competition from rival electric vehicle brands, particularly from China.

U.S. President Donald Trump’s trade war has also turned Europeans off buying American brands. In recent days, Trump threatened to impose a 50% tariff on EU goods, accusing the bloc of being “very difficult to deal with,” before agreeing to delay the duties until July.

In one sign that Tesla appears to be losing ground to cut-price Chinese brands, sales at China’s SAIC zoomed up 54% in April, according to the ACEA figures. SAIC owns a slew of auto brands including U.K.-based MG, known for its low-cost EV models.

Tesla is also suffering because it had to shut down factories for several weeks this year while upgrading its best selling Model Y sport utility vehicle, pinching supply.

For the first four months of the year, Tesla’s European sales fell roughly 39% to 61,320 while the continent’s auto market as a whole showed little change during the same period, according to the data.

For April, car sales in the EU edged up 1.3% from the previous year, “showing signs of recovery despite the ongoing unpredictable global economic environment,” the group said in a press release.

Trump extends tariff deadline

EU trade negotiator says calls

with US officials were ‘good’

FRANKFURT, May 27, (AP): The European Union’s chief trade negotiator said he had “good calls” with Trump administration officials and the EU was “fully committed” to reaching a trade deal by a July 9 deadline, after Trump agreed to delay his threatened 50% tariff - or import tax - on European goods.

Trade Commissioner Maros Sefcovic said on X that the EU’s executive commission was pushing “at pace” towards an EU-U.S. deal and the two sides were in constant contact.

Sefcovic’s calls with U.S. Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick and Trade Representative Jamieson Greer came a day after Trump said he would delay implementation of the 50% tariff from June 1 until July 9 to buy time for negotiations with the 27-country EU.

That announcement came after Trump’s call with EU Commission President Ursula von der Leyen, who told Trump that she “wants to get down to serious negotiations,” according to the U.S. president on Sunday.

In a social media post Friday, Trump had threatened to impose the 50% tariff on EU goods, asserting that the bloc had been “very difficult to deal with” on trade and that negotiations were “going nowhere.”

The stakes are high given the size of the U.S.-EU trading relationship. Although the trade partners don’t have a free trade agreement like the one the U.S. has with Mexico and Canada, some \$1.8 trillion in goods and services cross the Atlantic in both directions each year.

EU Commission spokeswoman Paula Pinho told a news conference that von der Leyen and Trump agreed to “fast-track” the negotiations. The result of the call means that “there is a new impetus for these negotiations, and we will take it from there ... from our side, we always said we were ready to make a deal.”

The EU has offered Trump a “zero for zero” deal in which tariffs would be removed on industrial goods including automobiles, but the U.S. administration has said it will not lower tariffs below a 10% baseline imposed on almost all its trading partners. Trump has also announced tariffs of 25% on steel and automobiles.

‘Empathy builds knowledge, courage’

Empathy can be draining – but it’s still a strength, say philosophers

In an interview with podcaster Joe Rogan, billionaire and Trump mega-donor Elon Musk offered his thoughts about what motivates political progressives to support immigration. In his view, the culprit was empathy, which he called “the fundamental weakness of Western civilization.”

As shocking as Musk’s views are, however, they are far from unique. On the one hand, there is the familiar and widespread conservative critique of “bleeding heart” liberals as naive or overly emotional. But there is also a broader philosophical critique that raises worries about empathy on quite different and less political grounds, including findings in social science.

Empathy can make people weaker - both physically and practically, according to social scientists. Consider the phenomenon known as “empathy fatigue,” a major source of burnout among counselors, nurses and even neurosurgeons. These professionals devote their lives to helping others, yet the empathy they feel for their clients and patients wears them down, making it harder to do their jobs.

As philosophers, we agree that empathy can take a toll on both individuals and society. However, we believe that, at its core, empathy is a form of mental strength that enables

us to better understand the impact of our actions on others, and to make informed choices.

The term “empathy” only entered the English language in the 1890s. But the general idea of being moved by others’ suffering has been a subject of philosophical attention for millennia, under labels such as “pity,” “sympathy” and “compassion.”

One of the earliest warnings about pity in Western philosophy comes from the Greek Stoic philosopher Epictetus. In his “Discourses,” he offers general advice about how to live a good life, centered on inner tranquility and freedom. When it comes to emotions and feelings, he writes: “He is free who lives as he wishes to live ... And who chooses to live in sorrow, fear, envy, pity, desiring and failing in his desires, attempting to avoid something and falling into it? Not one.”

Compromises

Feeling sorry for another person or feeling pity for them compromises our freedom, in Epictetus’s view. Those negative feelings are unpleasant, and nobody would choose them for themselves. Empathy would clearly fall into this same category, keeping us from living the good life.

A similar objection emerged much later from the German philosopher Friedrich Nietzsche. Nietzsche framed his discussion in terms of “Mitleid” - a German term that can be translated as either “pity” or “compassion.” Like Epictetus, Nietzsche worried that pity or compassion was a burden on the individual, preventing them from living the good life. In his book “Daybreak,” Nietzsche warns that such feelings could impair the very people who try to help others.

Epictetus’s and Nietzsche’s worries about pity or compassion carry over to empathy.

Recall, the phenomenon of empathy fatigue. One psychological explanation for why empathic people experience fatigue and even burnout is that empathy involves a kind of mirroring of other people’s mental life, a mirroring that can be physically unpleasant. When someone you love is in pain, you don’t just believe that they are in pain; you may feel it as if it is actually happening to you.

Results from neuroscience and cognitive psychology research indicate that there are different brain mechanisms involved in merely observing another’s pain versus empathizing with it. The latter involves unpleasant sensations of the type we experience when we are in pain. Empathy is thus difficult to bear precisely because being in pain is difficult to bear. And this sharpens the Stoic and Nietzschean worries: Why bother empathizing when it is unpleasant and, perhaps, not even necessary for helping others?

The answer for why one should see empathy as a strength starts with a key insight from 20th century philosophy about the nature of knowledge.

That insight is based on a famous thought experiment by the Australian philosopher Frank Jackson. Jackson invites us to imagine a scientist named Mary who has studied colors despite having lived her entire life in a black and white room. She knows all the facts about the spectrum distribution of light sources and vision science. She’s read descriptions of the redness of roses and azaleas. But she’s never seen color herself. Does Mary know everything about redness? Many epistemologists - people who study the nature of knowledge - argue that she does not.

What Mary learns when she sees red for the first time is elusive. If she returns to her black and white room, never to see any colored objects again, her knowledge of the colors will likely diminish over time. To have a full, rich understanding of colors, one needs to experience them.

Thoughts like these led the philosopher and logician Bertrand Russell to argue that experience delivers a special kind of knowledge of things that can’t be reduced to knowledge of facts. Seeing, hearing, tasting and even feeling delivers what he called “knowledge by acquaintance.” (AP)



## HBO docu honors the man behind the legend

## ‘Pee-wee as Himself’ unmasks Paul Reubens

LOS ANGELES, May 27, (AP): Some bio documentaries are carried mostly by the reflective, archival footage that send you back to the subject’s heyday.

But in Matt Wolf’s “Pee-wee as Himself” - as wonderful as much of the archival stuff is - nothing is more compelling than when Paul Reubens is simply himself.

Before his death from cancer in 2023, Reubens sat for 40 hours of interviews with Wolf. His cooperation is clearly uncertain and sometimes strained in the film - he stopped participating for a year before talking about his infamous 2001 arrest - and his doubts on the project linger throughout.

Reubens would rather be directing it, himself, he says more than once. The man many know as Pee-wee Herman is used to controlling his own image, and he has good reason for being skeptical of others doing so. But beyond that tension over authorship of his story, Reubens is also delightfully resistant to playing the part of documentary cliché.

“I was born in 1938 in a little house on the edge of the Mississippi River,” he begins. “My father worked on a steamboat.”

Talking heads have gotten a bad rap in documentaries in recent years, but in “Pee-wee as Himself,” nothing is more compelling than Paul Reubens simply sitting before the camera, looking back at us.

Pee-wee may be iconic, but Paul Reubens is hysterical.

And Wolf’s film, with that winking title, makes for a revealing portrait of a performer who so often put persona in front of personhood. In that way, “Pee-wee as Himself,” a two-part documentary premiering Friday on HBO and HBO Max, is moving as the posthumous unmasking of a man you can’t help but wish we had known better.

Reubens was a product of TV. He grew up transformed by shows like “Howdy Doody,” “The Mickey Mouse Club” and, later, “I Love Lucy.”

“I wanted to jump into my TV and live in that world,” he says.

## Delight

Part of the delight of the first half of Wolf’s film is watching the wide range of inspirations - the circus culture of Sarasota, Florida, where his family moved to; Andy Warhol; performance art - coalesce into a singular creation like Pee-wee. That name, he says, came from a tiny harmonica that said “Pee-wee” on it, and a kid named Herman he knew growing up.

“It was a whole bunch of things that had never really connected connecting,” says Reubens.

Wolf carefully traces the birth of Reubens’ alter-ego through the Groundlings in Los Angeles, on stage at the Roxy and then out into the world, on “The Gong Show,” on Letterman, in the 1985 Tim Burton-directed “Pee-wee’s Big Adventure” and, ultimately, on “Pee-wee’s

Playhouse.”

“I felt in a way I was bringing the character out into the wild,” he recalls. “I just stayed in character all day.”

That came with obvious sacrifices, too. For the sake of his career, Reubens stayed closeted as a gay man. He grew intensely private and seldom appeared in public not in character. Reubens also jettisoned some of his close collaborators, like Phil Hartman, as his fame grew. There’s tragedy, both self-inflicted and not, in Reubens’ increasing isolation.

When Reubens was arrested in 1991 and charged with indecent exposure, Reubens’ carefully guarded persona came crashing down. The scandal was worse because people knew only Pee-wee and not Reubens. There was also injustice in the whole affair, particularly the 2002 arrest that followed on charges of child pornography that were later dropped. In both cases, homophobia played a role.

When Reubens does get around to talking about it, he’s most resistant to painting himself as a victim, or offering any, as he says, “tears of a clown.”

Wolf, the director of films like “Recorder,” about Marion Stokes, who recorded television all day long for 30 years, and “Spaceship Earth,” about the quirky 1991 Biosphere 2 experiment, is better known as a talented documentarian of visual archives than as an compelling interviewer of celebrities.

## Lovato marries songwriter Lutes

LOS ANGELES, May 27, (AP): She’s more than just cool for the summer - **Demi Lovato** is officially married.

**Scot Pollard** was standing in Gasoline Alley at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway and trying not to cry.

The NBA champion and “Survivor” contestant was talking about meeting the family of **Casey Angell**, whose heart was now beating inside Pollard’s chest. Angell’s sister brought a stethoscope.

“She touched my chest. She listened and she started crying. She said, ‘Hey, Bubba,’ because that’s what she used to call him,” Pollard said. “And we all lost it. And I’m losing it right now.”

A first-round draft pick who took Kansas to the NCAA Sweet 16 four years in a row and won it all with the 2008 Boston Celtics, Pollard was virtually bedridden by 2024, unable to walk around the block or even conduct an interview without needing a rest because of a virus that had weakened his heart.

Since receiving the life-saving transplant last winter, he has dedicated himself to raising awareness of organ donation, a mission that earned him the honor of serving as the Grand Marshal for the Indy 500 Festival Parade on Saturday. Angell’s family rode along on the float with him.

“Any time we get to see them and be around them is a great moment,” Pollard said in a telephone interview with The Associated Press. “But also just to be able to share this experience of being grand marshal with them, and be part of their lives.”

At 6-foot-11 and a playing weight of 260 pounds, Pollard inherited his size from his father along with a genetic heart condition that doctors say was triggered by a virus that left him no other choice but a transplant. The problem would be finding a donor organ big enough to pump blood throughout his NBA center-sized body.

## At 95, June Squibb shines in ‘Eleanor the Great’

## Johansson crafts a witty, tender story of grief

CANNES, France, May 27, (AP): Scarlett Johansson’s directorial debut, “Eleanor the Great,” stars June Squibb as a 94-year-old woman who, out of grief and loneliness, does a terrible thing.

After her best friend (Rita Zohar) dies, Eleanor (Squibb) moves to New York and, after accidentally joining the wrong meeting at the Community Center, adopts her friend’s story of survival. The film builds toward a moment where Eleanor could be harshly condemned in a public forum, or not.

For Johansson, her movie speaks to the moment.

“There’s a lack of empathy in the zeitgeist. It’s obviously a reaction to a lot of things,” says Johansson. “It feels to me like forgiveness feels less possible in the environment we’re in.”

Johansson brought “Eleanor the Great” to the Un Certain Regard sidebar of the Cannes Film Festival last week, unveiling a funny and tender, character-driven, New York-set indie that launches her as a filmmaker. For the 40-year-old star, it’s the humble culmination of a dream that’s always bubbled around in her mind.

“It has been for most of my career,” Johansson says, meeting at a hotel on the Croisette after a day of junket interviews. “Whether it was reading something and thinking, ‘I can envision this in my mind,’ or even being on a production and thinking, ‘I am directing some elements of this out of necessity.’”

Johansson came to Cannes just days after hosting the season finale of “Saturday Night Live,” making for a fairly head-spinning week. “It’s adding to the surrealistic element of the experience,” Johansson says with a smile.

In just over a month’s time, she’ll be back in a big summer movie, “Jurassic World Rebirth.” But even that gig is a product of

her own interests. Johansson had been a fan of the “Jurassic Park” movies for years, and simply wanted to be a part of it.

Following her own instincts, and her willingness to fight for them, has been a regular feature of her career recently. She confronted The Walt Disney Co. over pay during the pandemic release of “Black Widow,” and won a settlement. When OpenAI launched a voice system called “Sky” for ChatGPT 4.0 that sounded eerily similar to her own, she got the company to take it down.

## Increasingly

She’s increasingly produced films, including “Eleanor the Great,” “Black Widow” and “Fly Me to the Moon.” After working with an enviable string of directors such as Jonathan Glazer (“Under the Skin”), Spike Jonze (“Her”), the Coen brothers (“Hail, Caesar!”) and Noah Baumbach (“Marriage Story”), she’s become a part of Wes Anderson’s troupe. After a standout performance in “Asteroid City,” she appears in “The Phoenician Scheme,” which premiered shortly before “Eleanor the Great” in Cannes.

“At some point, I worked enough that I stopped worrying about not working, or not being relevant - which is very liberating,” Johansson says. “I think it’s something all actors feel for a long time until they don’t. I would not have had the confidence to direct this film 10 years ago.”

“Which isn’t to say that I don’t often think many times: What the hell am I doing?” she adds. “I have that feeling, still. Certainly doing ‘Jurassic,’ I had many moments where I was like: Am I the right person for this? Is this working? But I just recently saw it and the movie works.”

**WEST MONROE, La.:** Phil Robertson, who turned his small duck calling interest in the sportsman’s paradise of northern Louisiana into a big business and conservative cultural phenomenon, died Sunday, according to his family. He was 79.

Robertson’s family announced in December on their Unashamed With the Robertson Family podcast that the patriarch of the clan had Alzheimer’s disease. The statement on social media from Robertson’s daughter-in-law didn’t mention how he died.

“Thank you for the love and prayers of so many whose lives have been impacted by his life saved by grace, his bold faith, and by his desire to tell everyone who would listen the Good News of Jesus. We are grateful for his life on earth and will continue the legacy of love for God and love for others until we see him again,” Korie Robertson wrote.

Phil Robertson skyrocketed to fame in the early 2010s when the A&E network created a reality show, presented like a sitcom. It followed the adventures of Robertson, his three sons - including Willie, who runs the family’s Duck Commander company, their wives and a host of other relatives and friends.

Phil Robertson and his boys were immediately recognizable by their long beards and their conservative, Christian and family-oriented beliefs.

At the time, Robertson’s family called his comments coarse, but said his beliefs were grounded in the Bible and he “is a Godly man.” They also said that “as a family, we cannot imagine the show going forward without our patriarch at the helm.”

Robertson was born in north Louisiana and spent his life in the woods and lakes that make up the region called Sportsman’s Paradise.

Robertson played football at Louisiana Tech and taught school. He also loved to hunt and created a duck call in the early 1970s that he said replicated the exact sound of a duck.

The calls were the centerpiece of the Duck Commander business Robertson would grow into a multimillion-dollar enterprise before A&E came calling. (AP)

Health centers overwhelmed as cases rise

Cholera outbreak worsens in Sudan, experts warn

CAIRO, May 27, (AP): A leading medical group warned on Tuesday of a rising number of cholera cases in war-torn Sudan as a new outbreak of the waterborne disease grips the country, and said its teams have treated hundreds of patients in the region of the capital, Khartoum.

Joyce Bakker, the Sudan coordinator for Doctors Without Borders - also known as Médecins Sans Frontières or MSF - said that the alarming spike began in mid-May, with Khartoum's twin city, Omdurman, as the epicenter.

She said MSF treated almost 2,000 suspected cholera cases in the past week alone. There were no immediate official figures of fatalities from cholera in this latest outbreak, though an aid worker said he was told on Monday of 12 people dying of cholera.

In March, MSF said that 92 people had died of cholera in Sudan's White Nile State, where 2,700 people had contracted the disease since late February.

Sudan plunged into war more than two years ago, when tensions between the Sudanese army and its rival paramilitary Rapid Support Forces group, or RSF, exploded with battles in Khartoum and across the country.

Since then, at least 20,000 people have been tallied as being killed, though the number is likely far higher, and the African nation has been engulfed by what the United Nations says is the world's largest humanitarian crisis.

More than 14 million people have been displaced and forced from their homes and disease outbreaks, famine and atrocities have mounted as the country entered its third year of war.

Sudan's Health Minister Haitham Ibrahim said on Saturday that the recent increase in cholera cases is estimated to average 600 to 700 per week, over the past four weeks.

He attributed the surge to the return of many Su-

dane to the Khartoum region - people who had fled their homes to escape the fighting and who are now coming back. Their returns have strained the city's dwindling water resources, he said.

Last week, the Sudanese military said it had regained control of the Greater Khartoum area from the paramilitary forces.

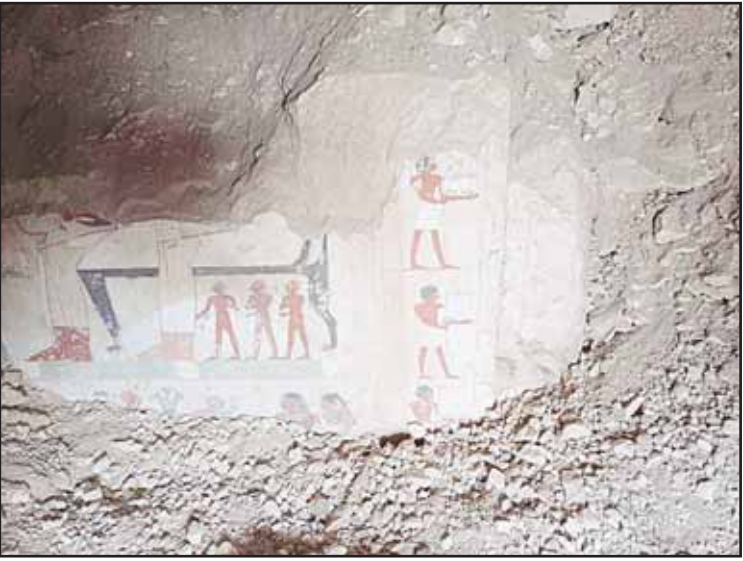
On Monday, Mohanad Elbalal, co-founder of the Khartoum Aid Kitchen, said he was told that 12 people had died of cholera in Omdurman, including a relative of one of his kitchen staff.

Bakker, the MSF coordinator, said Tuesday that the group's treatment centers in Omdurman are overwhelmed and that the "scenes are disturbing."

"Many patients are arriving too late to be saved," she said. "We don't know the true scale of the outbreak, and our teams can only see a fraction of the full picture."

Tomb owners identified

Egyptian archaeologists find three tombs in Luxor

CAIRO, May 27, (AP): Egypt unveiled three new tombs of prominent statesmen in the Dra Abu al-Naga necropolis in Luxor, officials said Monday.

Egyptian archaeologists have discovered tombs dating back to the New Kingdom period (1550-1070 B.C.) and identified the names and titles of their owners through inscriptions found within, according to a statement by the tourism and antiquities ministry.

Mohamed Ismail Khaled, secretary-general of the Supreme Council of Antiquities, said in the statement that further study of other tombs' inscriptions is needed to gain a deeper understanding of the tombs' owners.

The ministry released pictures of items discovered in the tombs, including artifacts and statues. The discovery comes in the lead-up to the highly anticipated full opening of the Grand Egyptian Museum, which is expected this summer, though a final official date is yet to be confirmed. The museum will showcase more than 100,000 artifacts from Egypt's rich ancient heritage.

One of the tombs discovered in Luxor on Monday belonged to Amum-em-Ipet, from the Rameside period, who worked in the estate of Amun. His tomb was mostly destroyed and what remained were depictions of the funeral furniture carriers and a banquet.

Amum-em-Ipet's tomb begins with a small courtyard leading to an entrance and then a square hall ending with a niche, whose western wall was destroyed.

The other tombs date back to the

18th Dynasty and include one belonging to a man named Baki, who served as a supervisor of the grain silo. Another tomb contains the burial of an individual named "S," who held multiple roles - he was a supervisor at the Temple of Amun in the oasis, a writer and the mayor of the northern oases.

Baki's tomb has a courtyard leading to the main entrance of the tomb as well as a long corridor-like courtyard. It also has a transverse hall leading to another longitudinal hall that leads up to an unfinished chamber that contains a burial well.

Meanwhile, the other tomb that belongs to "S" has a small courtyard with a well, the tomb's main entrance, and a transverse hall that leads to an incomplete longitudinal hall.

Minister of Tourism and Antiquities Sherif Fathi described the discovery as a significant scientific and archaeological achievement, noting that it is one of the areas poised to greatly boost cultural tourism and attract more visitors with an interest in Egypt's rich heritage.

In January, Egypt made several discoveries near the famed city of Luxor, including ancient rock-cut tombs and burial shafts dating back 3,600 years. They were unearthed at the causeway of Queen Hatshepsut's funerary temple at Deir al-Bahri on the Nile's West Bank.

Late last year, Egyptian and American archaeologists excavated an ancient tomb with 11 sealed burials near Luxor. The tomb, which dates to the Middle Kingdom, was found in the South Asasif necropolis, next to the Temple of Hatshepsut.

Expert warns of chronic disease risk in children

MAHA report reveals the dangers of ultraprocessed foods on kids' health

On May 22, 2025, the White House released a new report highlighting what it claims are the causes of chronic disease in children.

The report fleshes out many of the themes that have emerged as priorities for the Make America Healthy Again, or MAHA, movement promoted by Health and Human Services Secretary Robert F. Kennedy Jr.

One major area of focus is the negative health effects of ultraprocessed foods. The report points to the prevalence of ultraprocessed foods in the American diet as a key contributor to chronic illness in children and cites research that finds that nearly 70% of children's diets and 50% of pregnant and postpartum women's diets in the U.S. consist of ultraprocessed foods.

The Conversation US asked Paul Dawson, a food scientist at Clemson University, to explain how the government's stance on the harms of ultraprocessed foods squares with the science.

Concerns that ingredients used by food manufacturers can contribute to chronic illness first emerged in the 1970s and 1980s, when research began linking processed food consumption to increasing rates of obesity, type 2 diabetes and cardiovascular disease. The term "ultraprocessed food" dates back to the 1980s and was used to describe convenience foods and snacks that contained high amounts of additives and had low nutritional value.

Debated

As research on the health effects of ultraprocessed foods began to build, experts in public health and the food industry have debated the meaning of the term. Increasingly, researchers are settling on defining ultraprocessed foods based on a framework called the Nova Food Classification System, created in 2009 by nutrition researchers in Brazil. The framework assigns foods to one of four groups based on the level of processing they undergo:

Group 1: Unprocessed or minimally processed foods: This category includes raw fruits, vegetables and meats that may be cleaned, frozen or fermented but remain close to their natural state.

Group 2: Processed culinary ingredients: Think salt, sugar, oils and other ingredients extracted from nature and used to cook and flavor foods.

Group 3: Processed foods: Foods in this category are made by adding ingredients like salt or sugar to Group 1 items - for example, canned vegetables or cheese.

Group 4: Ultraprocessed foods: These are mostly foods that contain ingredients not found in a typical kitchen, such as hydrogenated oils, modified starches, flavor enhancers,

color additives and preservatives. Examples include chips, sodas, candy bars and many frozen meals, which are designed to be hyper-palatable and often nutrient-poor.

A growing body of research links ultraprocessed foods with many negative health outcomes, including obesity, type 2 diabetes, cardiovascular disease, cancer and cognitive decline. One issue is that these products are typically high in added sugar, sodium, saturated fats and chemical additives, and low in fiber, vitamins and essential micronutrients.

But some studies also suggest that what makes these foods harmful isn't just the ingredients but also how they're made. That's because the industrial processing of fats and starches can produce harmful compounds. For example, a substance called acrolein, formed when oils are heated at high temperatures, has been linked to DNA damage. Studies are also finding that microparticles from packaging and plastics, now found in air, water and food, may disrupt the gut microbiome, a key player in immune and metabolic health.

Drawback

One drawback of nutrition studies is that they often rely on self-reported dietary data, which can be inaccurate. They can also have confounding factors that are difficult to account for, such as lifestyle patterns. However, the consistency of the findings across diverse populations gives credence to the growing concerns about ultraprocessed foods.

An important caveat, however, is that not all ultraprocessed foods are created equal. They vary in how nutritious they are, and some ultraprocessed foods play an important role for vulnerable populations. For example, foods containing the slow-release carbohydrate sweetener sucralose help people with diabetes prevent blood sugar spikes, and hypoallergenic infant formula can be lifesaving for infants that cannot digest milk at a young age.

The report echoes key themes of the 2020-2025 Dietary Guidelines for Americans, a document jointly published by the Departments of Agriculture and Health and Human Services every five years.

Both the MAHA report and the federal guidelines encourage the consumption of nutrient-dense, whole foods.

One critical difference between them is that the 2020-2025 dietary guidelines make no mention of ultraprocessed foods. Some public health experts have noted that this omission may reflect food industry influence.

Kennedy has stated that a follow-up report outlining a strategy and potential policy reforms for addressing childhood chronic illness will be released in mid-August 2025.

However, change is unlikely to be straightforward. Ultraprocessed foods represent a significant industry, and policies that challenge their prominence may encounter resistance from influential commercial interests. For decades, US agricultural subsidies, food policy and consumers have supported the mass production and consumption of ultraprocessed foods. Reversing their overconsumption will require structural shifts in how food is produced, distributed and consumed in the US. (AP)

Police guarding polio workers killed in Pakistan

QUETTA, Pakistan, May 27, (AP): Gunmen shot and killed a police officer assigned to protect polio workers in southwestern Pakistan on Tuesday before fleeing the scene, police and officials said.

The attack occurred in Noshki, a district in Balochistan province, local police official Mohammad Hassan said, adding that the polio workers escaped unharmed in the attack.

The female health workers were administering oral polio vaccine drops to children inside a house when the assailants opened fire on the officer, Abdul Waheed, who died on the way to the hospital, Hassan said. No one immediately claimed responsibility for the assault, but suspicion is likely to fall on separatist

groups and Pakistani Taliban that have stepped up attacks on security forces and civilians in recent months.

Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi in separate statements denounced the assault and vowed stern action against those behind the attack, which came a day after Pakistan launched the nationwide campaign to vaccinate 45 million children from polio.

Pakistan and neighboring Afghanistan remain the only two countries where the spread of the wild polio virus hasn't been stopped, according to the World Health Organization. There are ongoing outbreaks of polio linked to the oral vaccine in 10 other countries, mostly in Africa.

Bill debated

France may OK assisted suicide

PARIS, May 27, (AP): France's lower house of parliament, the National Assembly, was voting Tuesday on a bill to allow adults with incurable illness to take lethal medication, as public demands grow across Europe for legal end-of-life options.

Tuesday's vote, expected in the late afternoon, is a key legislative step on the contentious and long-debated issue. If approved by a majority of lawmakers, the bill will be sent to the Senate for further debate.

The proposed measure defines assisted dying as allowing people to use a lethal substance under certain conditions so that they may take it themselves. Only those whose physical condition doesn't allow them to do it alone would be able to get help from a doctor or a nurse.

To benefit from the newly proposed measure, patients would need to be over 18 and be French citizens or live in France.

A team of medical professionals would need to confirm that the patient has a grave and incurable illness "at an advanced or terminal stage," is suffering from intolerable and untreatable pain, and is seeking lethal medication of their own free will.

Eligible

Patients with severe psychiatric conditions and neurodegenerative disorders such as Alzheimer's disease won't be eligible.

The person would initiate the request for lethal medication and confirm the request after a period of reflection.

If approved, a doctor would then deliver a prescription for the lethal medication, which could be taken at home, at a nursing home or a health care facility.

In parallel, another bill on palliative care meant to reinforce measures to relieve pain and preserve patients' dignity will also be put to a vote Tuesday.

A 2023 report indicated that most French citizens back legalizing end-of-life options, and opinion polls show growing support over the past 20 years. Initial discussions in parliament last year were abruptly interrupted by President Emmanuel Macron's decision to dissolve the National Assembly, plunging France into a months-long political crisis.

A definitive vote on the measure could take months to be scheduled amid France's long and complex legislative process. The National Assembly has the final say over the Senate.

Earlier this month, Macron suggested he could ask for French voters to approve the measure via referendum if parliament discussions get off track.

Activists supporting the change have criticized the complexity and length of the parliamentary process that they say is penalizing patients waiting for end-of-life options.

Many French people have traveled to neighboring countries where medically assisted suicide or euthanasia are legal.

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Al-Hilal reportedly trying to tempt Italian club’s coach with a bumper offer

Inter’s last shot at glory: Can the Nerazzurri overcome PSG and keep Inzaghi?

MILAN, May 27, (AP): Inter Milan was gunning for the treble just over a month ago.

Then Inter lost in the Italian Cup semifinals to AC Milan, and lost its Serie A title by one point to Napoli.

The Nerazzurri’s third and last shot at a trophy is on Saturday in the Champions League final against Paris Saint-Germain, and coach Simone Inzaghi doesn’t want talk of it being his last match in charge becoming another distraction for his side.

Saudi Arabia club Al-Hilal is reportedly trying to tempt Inzaghi with a bumper offer of more than 20 million euros (\$23 million) a season.

“Fortunately, my club knows me well,” Inzaghi said. “Every year, there are offers from Italy and abroad, from Saudi Arabia, but I think it would be crazy to think about that now.”

Inzaghi was speaking at a media day ahead of the Champions League final - his and Inter’s second in three seasons after they lost to Manchester City in 2023.

The Italian coach has been at Inter since 2021

and has one more year left on his contract.

“After the final, we’ll sit down and talk with a single goal in mind, and this always applies: The good of Inter,” Inzaghi said. “If all the components and conditions are there, we will move forward as we have always done in harmony these past few years.

“It would be crazy to talk now about something that doesn’t exist. Look at what awaits us on Saturday.”

Inter and Inzaghi have progressed in the coach’s four years at the club.

At Inter, Inzaghi finally shrugged off his “King of Cups” nickname when he lifted his first league trophy last year.

Before that, with Lazio and then Inter, Inzaghi won three Italian Cups and five Italian Super Cups, earning him the title of “Re di Coppe” (“King of Cups”) because he had never coached a league champion.

But winning the Champions League would be a crowning achievement, especially after the disappointment of two years ago.

It would also completely alter the perception of a season in which Inter missed out on trophies by small margins.

“That (Champions League win) would clearly make all the difference in the world,” Inzaghi said. “The boys have been extraordinary this season because we played 59 games.

“We gave everything on the field, we didn’t think, we didn’t make choices, we tried to give everything we had ... that was always our strength and we had an exciting journey in the Italian Cup, in Serie A and above all in the Champions League.”

Indeed, it has been in the Champions League that Inter has especially thrived.

The Nerazzurri beat Bayern Munich in the quarterfinals and won an extraordinary semifinal against Barcelona that saw 13 goals scored across two legs.

“We’ve reached a wonderful milestone and played some incredible games,” Inzaghi said, “but we know one final step remains to fulfill a dream and make history.”

Punjab demolishes Mumbai to secure top-two spot in playoffs

Kings to play qualifier 1 on Thursday

JAIPUR, India, May 27, (AP): Punjab Kings secured a top-two spot in the Indian Premier League playoffs after dominating five-time winners the Mumbai Indians by seven wickets.

Josh Inglis (73) and Priyansh Arya (62) smashed the Mumbai bowling and cruised Punjab to 187-3 in reply to Mumbai’s below-par 184-7.

Punjab will play qualifier 1 on Thursday with the winner going directly to the June 3 final.

Mumbai will play eliminator 1 on Friday against Royal Challengers Bengaluru or Gujarat Titans.

Gujarat Titans are second in the table but could be overtaken by Bengaluru if it beats the already-eliminated Lucknow Super Giants on Tuesday.

Arya and Inglis combined in for 109 runs off just 59 balls for Punjab after Prabhsimran Singh was dismissed by Jasprit Bumrah inside the batting powerplay.

Arya hit Trent Boult for three boundaries off the first four balls

he faced from the New Zealander.

Arya raised his half-century from 27 balls when he hit Hardik Pandya for six over wide long-on and bashed Jasprit Bumrah for a six over fine leg.

Inglis shrugged off the spin threat

of Mitchell Santner, whose first two overs went for 23, while impact player Ashwani Kumar was dropped from the attack after being hammered for 16, in his only over.

Santner finished with 2-41 when he had Arya caught at long-off in

the 15th over, and Inglis was out lbw when he missed a paddle shot against the left-arm spinner in the 18th over with Punjab just 14 runs from victory. They won with nine balls to spare.

Suryakumar Yadav’s 57, his 14th successive score of 25-plus in Twenty20s, was the cornerstone of Mumbai’s total but he felt his team was 10, 15 runs short.

Ryan Rickelton, playing in his last IPL game before joining South Africa for the World Test Championship final, lashed a 20-ball 27, while Rohit Sharma struggled to 24 when he holed out to long-on against left-arm spinner Harpreet Brar.

Mumbai stuttered in the middle overs when it lost Tilak Varma and Will Jacks quickly.

Pandya grabbed two fours and two sixes in his 26 off 15 and was caught behind in Jansen’s return spell.

Naman Dhir and Yadav counterpunched in the death overs and Vijaykumar Vyshak’s penultimate over of the innings went for 23 runs.

Arshdeep Singh bowled splendid yorkers in the final over and conceded just three runs for the wickets of Dhir and Yadav.

‘It’s just more accurate, saves time’

‘French Open picking humans over technology is a bad call’

PARIS, May 27, (AP): For Novak Djokovic, this is a relatively easy call: He, like many players, thinks the French Open is making a mistake by eschewing the electronic line-calling used at most big tennis tournaments and instead rendering old school by letting line judges decide whether serves or other shots land in or out.

Plenty of sports, from soccer and baseball to the NFL, are replacing, or at least helping, officials with some form of high-tech replays or other technology. Tennis, too, is following that trend, except at Roland-Garros, where competition continues through June 8.

Even the longest-running and most tradition-bound of the majors, Wimbledon, is - gasp! - abandoning line judges and moving to an automatic

system this year. The WTA and ATP added machine-generated rulings this season for four events on red clay, the surface at the French Open. But Grand Slam hosts can do what they want, and the French tennis federation is keeping the human element.

Djokovic, the 24-time major champion, understands why folks might prefer the way to keep things the way they were for more than a century in his sport. He gets why there could be an inclination to shy away from too much change in a world now drowning in cell phones and streaming and social media.

“You don’t want to give everything away to the technology, right? But if I have to choose between the two, I’m more of a proponent of technology. It’s just more accurate, saves

time, and ... (means) less people on the court” said Djokovic, 38, who was disqualified from the 2020 U.S. Open for inadvertently hitting an official with a ball hit out of frustration between games.

That edition of the tournament in New York only placed line judges on its two largest courts, while others used an electronic setup, a nod to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Australian Open got rid of all line judges in 2021, a first at a tennis major; the U.S. Open did the same later that year.

The French Open remains a hold-out, and that’s not likely to change anytime soon.

“Unless the players are unanimous and come to us and say, ‘We won’t play if there isn’t a machine’ ... then

I think we’ve got a great future ahead of us to maintain this style of refereeing,” French federation president Gilles Moretton said, while boasting of the quality of his country’s officials.

Players don’t sound that adamant, although they tend to echo the opinion of 2023 U.S. Open champion Coco Gauff, who is 21: “I mean, I don’t know if it’s like the ‘Gen Z’ in me, but I think if we have the technology, we should use it.”

Still, there is some charm to be found in the choreography of players insisting a call was wrong and chair umpires climbing down for a closer look at a ball mark on the clay. Watch a day of TV coverage from Paris and odds are good that dance will take place - probably more than once.

Union president takes dig at others

Bundesliga rivals not paying their women’s teams enough

BERLIN, May 27, (AP): Union Berlin president Dirk Zingler has criticized Bundesliga rivals of apathy toward women’s soccer.

“Every football club that has a professional team is capable of paying its women’s football team appropriately,” Zingler said in comments reported by dpa news agency.

“When I see and hear that, even in the (women’s) Bundesliga with 12 teams, there are only four or five who pay the women professionally, it’s a pitiful disgrace in Germany,” Zingler added on the day it was confirmed he will stay on for another term as president to 2029.

Union’s own women’s team was promoted to the Bundesliga for the first time this season after winning the second division. The Köpenick-based club has invested heavily in women’s soccer, particularly since its men’s team clinched promotion to the 18-team Bundesliga in 2019.

Zingler also criticized the media for not giving more attention to women’s games. He said it was “simply not right to treat women’s football as a disability sport and say we have to run special programs and play highlight games.”

Zingler has been Union’s president since 2004, when the men’s team was playing at fourth-tier level. He said stability has been key to the club’s success.

Union’s men reached the Europa Conference League in 2021, the Europa League the following season, and the Champions League in 2023, though that was followed by a brush with relegation. This season, the team clinched Bundesliga survival with four rounds to spare.

Away from the field, Union refurbished its stadium in 2009, added a new main stand in 2013, and established a new training center for youth players last year. This year it plans to start construction on new training facilities for its men’s and women’s professional teams then turn attention to more stadium development to accommodate more fans.

Roma accuses Zaniolo of punching 2 youth players

FLORENCE, Italy, May 27, (AP): Fiorentina winger Nicolò Zaniolo could be facing a lengthy ban after Roma accused him of punching two youth team players.

The incident allegedly happened after Fiorentina beat Roma in the Primavera youth league title playoff semifinal on Monday.

Zaniolo denied any wrongdoing after Roma issued a statement on the “regrettable incident” but the Italian soccer federation reportedly opened an investigation on Tuesday.

“According to initial reconstructions, the player allegedly entered the Primavera team’s dressing room after the match and engaged in provocative behavior towards some of the Giallorossi youth players,” Roma said. “During the confrontation, two players from the Primavera squad were reportedly physically struck.”

Zaniolo is on loan at Fiorentina from Galatasaray. He joined the Turkish team from Roma after five years at the capital club, during which he was named Serie A young player of the year in 2019.

The 25-year-old Zaniolo was in the stands at Viola Park to watch the match on Monday, and Fiorentina published his statement after Roma’s accusations.

“At the end of the match I went down to the locker room to congratulate the Fiorentina boys and then I went to the Roma locker room to greet and congratulate them on their season too,” Zaniolo said. “But at a certain point they started insulting me so, at that point, to prevent the situation from degenerating, I preferred to leave.”

Zaniolo was considered one of Italy’s most promising prospects and made his international debut as a teenager in 2019.

But injuries derailed his career. He has not featured for Italy since being ruled out of last year’s European Championship after breaking his metatarsal while on loan at Aston Villa in the penultimate match of the season.

**Earps retires from int’l duty:** England goalkeeper Mary Earps surprisingly retired from international soccer on Tuesday, just five weeks before the Women’s European Championship.

Earps was in goal when the Lionesses won Euro 2022 and reached the Women’s World Cup final in 2023.

She was facing increased competition for her place from Chelsea’s Hannah Hampton but was due to join England this week for Nations League group games against Portugal and Spain.

“I have taken the difficult decision to retire internationally,” Earps said in a statement on X. “It has been the greatest honour and privilege of my life, to wear this badge, represent my country and play alongside such an incredible group of players.

“I’ve spent a long time making this decision and it’s not one I’ve made lightly. For me, ultimately this is the right time for me to step aside and give the younger generation an opportunity to thrive.

“Winning the Euros in 2022 was the best day of my life and I’m rooting for the girls to do it again this summer.” (AP)

# Scienza's dramatic late goal saves Heidenheim's Bundesliga status

SPIESSEN-ELVERSBERG, Germany, May 27, (AP): The longest-serving coach in any major men's European soccer league has written another chapter in a remarkable career.

Now he just wants a rest.

A last-minute goal on Monday gave Heidenheim and its coach Frank Schmidt, who's nearing 18 years in charge, a win which guaranteed survival in the Bundesliga for another season.

It was Schmidt's 709th game with a club he's taken from a regional league in southwestern Germany to the top division, beating Bayern Munich and facing the likes of Chelsea in the Europa Conference League.

"I've given all my energy to the team and it was very important, but now I'm empty," Schmidt told broadcaster Sky after Leo Scienza's added-time goal sealed a 4-3 aggregate win over Elversberg in the promotion-relegation playoff.

"No one needs to call me tomorrow, I won't be contactable, because I'm going away. I need the

energy to prepare for the new season."

The town of Heidenheim is home to 50,000 people and Schmidt's team is usually the underdog against clubs with more history, trophies and fans.

It was the other way round on Monday. Heidenheim's opponent was Elversberg, another team which has risen from regional leagues to the national stage in recent years. It comes from a town of just 13,000 people.

German fans dubbed the game "El Dorfico," a play on Barcelona and Real Madrid's El Clásico rivalry and the German word "Dorf," or village.

Heidenheim seemed to be tiring as the game entered stoppage time but Brazilian winger Scienza burst down the left flank to score the winner to start Heidenheim's celebrations.

It was a narrow escape for Heidenheim, which finished an impressive eighth in the Bundesliga last season to qualify for the Europa Conference League but struggled to cope with the extra

games this year.

The soccer world looked very different in September 2007 when Schmidt first coached Heidenheim in a regional cup game against Olympia Laupheim reserves.

David Beckham had just made his debut for the Los Angeles Galaxy after a shock move from Madrid, while Alex Ferguson's Manchester United was the team to beat in England.

Cristiano Ronaldo and Lionel Messi were successful young players at United and Barcelona, respectively, but neither had yet won the Ballon d'Or prize for best player in the world. They now have 13 Ballon d'Or awards between them.

Schmidt's tenure with Heidenheim makes Pep Guardiola's nine years at Manchester City or Diego Simeone's 13-year stint at Atletico Madrid look short by comparison. He's still some way short of historical greats like Ferguson (26 years at United) or Arsene Wenger (22 years at Arsenal).

## SGA's 40-point gem fuels Thunder's game 4 win

MINNEAPOLIS, May 27, (AP): Being blown out of the game before didn't sit well with Oklahoma City.

The young Thunder moved within one win of the NBA Finals with a championship response.

Shai Gilgeous-Alexander had 40 points, 10 rebounds, and nine assists in a steely performance befitting the NBA MVP, and the Oklahoma City Thunder snapped back from a 42-point loss by beating the Minnesota Timberwolves 128-126 in Game 4 on Monday night to take a 3-1 lead in the Western Conference finals.

"I tried not to worry too much about scoring or making plays or whatever it was," Gilgeous-Alexander said. "I tried to just lose myself in the competition, be aggressive, pick my spots."

Jalen Williams scored 34 points on 13-for-24 shooting, including 6 of 9 from 3-point range, and Chet Holmgren added 21 points, seven rebounds, and three blocks in a statement game in his hometown that helped the Thunder stave off several pushes by the Wolves to tie the series.

Gilgeous-Alexander went 12 for

14 from the free-throw line, making a pair with 6.1 seconds left to stretch the lead back to three.

The Thunder fouled Anthony Edwards with 3.5 seconds to go, and his intentional miss of the second free throw to try to keep possession was tracked down in the corner by Gilgeous-Alexander and flung out of bounds to drain the clock.

The Wolves had one more des-

peration inbound pass from half-court with 0.3 seconds remaining that Williams grabbed to send the Thunder back to Oklahoma City for a close-out Game 5 on Wednesday.

"They outplayed us, outrebounded us, got more of the 50-50 balls," said Edwards, who was limited to 16 points. "Wanted it a little bit more."

Nickel Alexander-Walker (23

points) and Donte DiVincenzo (21 points) each went 5 for 8 from 3-point range to lead a second straight onslaught of bench offense to keep the Wolves close all night, but the Thunder always had an answer for the mini-runs they managed. They trailed for only 36 seconds, all stretches in the first quarter.

"Give their role guys credit," coach Mark Daigneault said. "The shot-making was ridiculous, so for us to overcome that on the road the way we did was a great team win."

Any intrigue about how the Thunder would respond from Game 3 quickly disappeared when Williams started hitting from deep to lead an 11-for-17 shooting start from the floor. The Thunder grabbed 11 offensive rebounds in the first half, too.

The Thunder, for all their dominance, have shown a hint of vulnerability away from Paycom Center, where they're 7-1 with a plus-191 scoring differential this postseason. But Luguentz Dort helped bottle up Edwards and Julius Randle (five points on 1-for-7 shooting), and the Thunder forced 23 turnovers to help offset those 64 bench points.

"Uphill battle," DiVincenzo said, "but everybody is sticking together, understanding that you try to look at this game and grab any sort of hope."

## Coach names preliminary squad of 20 players

Kuwait volleyball team begins training for West Asian Champ'ship in Bahrain

KUWAIT CITY, May 27: The Kuwaiti national volleyball team has officially launched its training program today at the Federation Hall in the Sheikh Saad Al-Abdullah Complex, located in Sabah Al-Salem. The training is part of the team's preparations for the inaugural West Asian Men's Volleyball Championship, which will be held in the Kingdom of Bahrain from July 10 to 20.

The technical staff, led by Argentine head coach Julian Alvarez and his assistant Zaid Al-Kazemi, has announced a preliminary squad of 20 players to take part in the training phase ahead of the regional tournament.

Speaking on the team's preparations, assistant coach Zaid Al-Kazemi stated that the staff has designed a comprehensive and intensive training program that begins immediately and will continue until the tournament begins. The program will be split into two phases – domestic training in Kuwait and an overseas training camp, the details of which (location and timing) will be finalized upon approval from the General Sports Authority.

Al-Kazemi emphasized that the training plan will focus on all techni-

# Ancelotti turns down Neymar and predicts a 'better' Vinicius Júnior

RIO DE JANEIRO, May 27, (AP): Carlo Ancelotti's first day as Brazil coach included saying "No" to Neymar and a promise to find more improvement from his former Real Madrid striker Vinicius Júnior.

Ancelotti was introduced on Monday at a packed press conference in a Rio de Janeiro hotel, and just to ensure he was under no illusions as to his primary task, he was welcomed by Brazil's last two World Cup-winning coaches, 1994's Carlos Alberto Parreira and 2002's Luiz Felipe Scolari.

Scolari gave Ancelotti a national team jacket and told the first foreigner in a century to coach Brazil full-time, "Just be you, the person you always were, and you will win with Brazil. We all wish you well with Brazil, we will always support you."

The Italian, contracted to the end of the 2026 World Cup in the United States, Canada and Mexico, announced his first squad for World Cup qualifiers next week against Ecuador and Paraguay.

Neymar returned to Santos only last week from a muscular injury, and that was too late for the new coach.

"Unfortunately, we have a lot of players who suffered injuries and cannot be in the national team, like Neymar," Ancelotti

said. "Brazil has many talented players, and in Neymar's specific case we are counting on him. He came back to Brazil to play and prepare for the World Cup. I spoke to him this morning to explain that to him, and he is totally in agreement."

Ancelotti said Vinicius will grow as a Brazil striker under his management. Vinicius has been criticized by Brazil fans for not reproducing his sterling Real Madrid form in the national team.

# Berlin presents bid to re-host Olympics with 100th anniversary of 1936 Games looming

BERLIN, May 27, (AP): Berlin formally presented its bid to re-host the Olympics on Tuesday in the same stadium where Jesse Owens starred during the 1936 Games under the Nazis.

Berlin sports minister Iris Spranger said the city wants to put on a sustainable Olympic and Paralympic Games in 2036, 2040 or 2044, making use of existing sports venues.

But her announced plans to include the former airport Tempelhof are likely to be resisted by locals who already opposed any development of the popular city park in a 2014 referendum.

Spranger envisaged beach volleyball at the Brandenburg Gate, and water sports in Grünau, a riverside locality which also staged water sports in 1936.

Otherwise, Spranger gave few details during the presentation, saying the bid was still at concept phase.

"You'll have to be patient," she told a journalist.

Berlin's bid - titled "Berlin+" with support from the states of Brandenburg, Saxony, Mecklenburg-Vorpommern, and Schleswig-Holstein - is to be presented to the German Olympic Sports Confederation (DOSB) before an end-of-month deadline.

It will be up to the DOSB to decide which Games to bid for. Los Angeles is hosting the 2028 Olympics and Brisbane the 2032 Olympics, so the next available edition will be 2036, the 100th

anniversary of the Berlin Games.

The DOSB previously said a German bid for 2040 was also possible.

"I believe that the 2036 Games, regardless of where they take place, will also focus on the Nazi Games of 1936. That's part of history and attention will be paid to it," Berlin Mayor Kai Wegner said. "I have to tell you, I'm proud to be the governing mayor of a city that has changed in the last 100 years, that we no longer stand for dictatorship, exclusion, and mass violence, but that Berlin is now a cosmopolitan, international metropolis, a colorful, diverse city."

Wegner said it was "important for Germany to make a bid. We're making an offer here today."

Wegner, Spranger, and the governors from the other four states made their presentation in the same battle-scarred stadium, Berlin's Olympiastadion, where Adolf Hitler watched Owens, the Black American athlete, win four gold medals in the 1936 Games, dealing a blow to Hitler's notions of racial superiority.

Hitler was personally involved in the design and construction of the 100,000-seat track-and-field stadium after the Nazis assumed power in 1933, two years after the Games were awarded to the city.

## Al-Arabi completes Amir Cup semifinal lineup

Dahilis announces departure from Al-Jahra

**KUWAIT CITY, May 27: Al-Arabi secured the final spot in the Amir Cup semifinals with a hard-fought 2-1 victory over Al-Jahra in the last quarterfinal match held at Thamer Stadium.**

With the win, Al-Arabi will now face Al-Salmiya in the first semifinal clash scheduled for Friday at Mohammed Al-Hamad Stadium. The other semifinal will see Al-Qadisiya take on Kuwait Club tomorrow at Ali Sabah Al-Salem Stadium.

Al-Arabi's path to qualification was far from straightforward. The team went ahead 2-0 thanks to goals from Nigerian forward Emmanuel Iwala in the 34th minute and Bahraini international Kamil Al-Aswad in the 52nd. Al-Jahra fought back, narrowing the margin with a goal by Abdulaziz Marwi in the 61st minute but couldn't find the equalizer.

This marks Al-Arabi's second challenge in the tournament after a tough preliminary round against First Division side Sulaibikhat, where it advanced on penalties (4-3) following a 2-2 draw after extra time.

Al-Jahra head coach Mohammed Dahilis announced he would step down at the end of the season, describing his experience with the team as "beautiful and convincing."

Under Dahilis' leadership, Al-Jahra earned promotion to the Zain Premier League by topping the Zain First Division League and made a commendable run in the Amir Cup, including a win over Kazma in the preliminary round. Reflecting on the loss to Al-Arabi, he said, "We conceded from two mistakes. Al-Arabi is a strong team and deserved to win."

Club President Yousef Karim revealed that Al-Jahra will begin preparations for the upcoming season soon.

"We will develop a comprehensive plan to avoid repeating past mistakes," he stated, praising the efforts of the club's technical, administrative, and medical teams, as well as the players.

Al-Arabi player Abdulwahab Al-Awadhi expressed gratitude to head coach Nasser Al-Shatti for trusting him in the starting lineup. "That trust gives me the confidence to give everything I have," he said.

Al-Awadhi, who previously played as a striker for Al-Yarmouk, emphasized his readiness to play any role needed for Al-Arabi. "I'm fully committed to the team and will give my utmost to help us compete for every title."

## Al-Ittihad wins Saudi league title with historic 83 points

RIYADH, May 27, (Agencies): Al-Ittihad capped off a remarkable campaign by securing the 2024-2025 Roshen League title, finishing with a record-breaking 83 points – the highest in the club's history since the inception of the Saudi Professional League in 2008-2009.

This marks the club's third title in the professional era. The first came in the league's inaugural season (2008-2009), when Al-Ittihad claimed the championship with 55 points, finishing five points ahead of Al-Hilal.

After a long wait, the western giants returned to glory in the 2022-2023 season, lifting the title with 72 points – again five points clear of second-placed Al-Nassr.

Now, Al-Ittihad has raised the bar even higher. With an impressive 83 points this season, it surpassed its previous record and finished eight points ahead of its closest rivals, Al-Hilal, underlining its dominance and crowning an exceptional season.

Meanwhile, Cristiano Ronaldo's time at Saudi Arabian club Al-Nassr might be done.

The 40-year-old Portugal striker posted a message on social media hours after the final round of the Saudi Pro League late Monday sparking speculation over the future

of one of the most high-profile figures in sports.

"This chapter is over," Ronaldo told his 115 million followers on X, above a picture of him in an Al-Nassr jersey. "The story? Still being written. Grateful to all."

The five-time world player of the year joined Al-Nassr in late 2022 and his contract will expire at the end of June.

On Saturday, FIFA president Gianni Infantino said Ronaldo could play at the new-look, expanded Club World Cup starting on June 14 because of a unique transfer window created for the tournament.

"There are discussions with some clubs," Infantino told online streamer IShowSpeed, whose YouTube channel has more than 39 million subscribers. "So if any club is watching and is interested in hiring Ronaldo for the Club World Cup, who knows. Still a few weeks time, will be fun."

Al-Nassr, which finished in third place in the Saudi league this season, did not qualify for the Club World Cup – where Lionel Messi, Ronaldo's great rival, will be playing with Inter Miami.

Ronaldo did not react on Saturday to Infantino's speculation on his social media channels.

### Shelton reaches third round, opponent withdraws with injury

## Coco jokes about forgotten rackets after opening win

PARIS, May 27, (AP): Coco Gauff caused a brief and amusing delay at the French Open on Tuesday when she stepped onto Court Philippe-Chatrier without her rackets. Novak Djokovic Serbia, defeated Mackenzie McDonald in straight set, 6-3, 6-3, 6-3.

Gauff looked confused before a ball boy ran out minutes later carrying her pack of mint-colored rackets.

"That's better," said the court announcer, drawing laughter, applause and smiles from the crowd in the tournament's main stadium.

Despite the mix-up, No. 2-seeded Gauff went on to defeat Australia's Olivia Gadecki 6-2, 6-2 in her opening match.

The American jokingly blamed her coach for the missing rackets.

"Honestly, as long as I've been on tour, my coach has always put the

rackets in the bag before the match because he's very superstitious," she said. "I'm blaming it on my coach. It's OK."

Gadecki also found humor in the incident.

"Now that I think about it, it seems like that was the only way I was going to win the match," she said about Gauff's empty-handed arrival. "It was a funny little incident."

Gauff was a 2022 finalist at Roland-Garros and is among the title contenders again.

Ben Shelton reached the third round at the French Open for the second year in a row – and this time, the American didn't even need to swing his racket, moving on Tuesday when Hugo Gaston withdrew from the tournament because of an abdominal injury.

The 13th-seeded Shelton's best

Grand Slam results were making it to the semifinals at the 2023 U.S. Open and the Australian Open this January.

He was supposed to face France's Gaston in the second round at Roland-Garros on Wednesday night. The tournament replaced that matchup in Court Philippe-Chatrier with No. 10 seed Holger Rune of Denmark against unseeded Emilio Nava of the United States.

Shelton advances to a meeting on Friday against two-time major finalist Stefanos Tsitsipas or Matteo Gigante. That means Shelton will have had four days without competition following his five-set victory over Lorenzo Sonego in the first round Sunday night.

Jannik Sinner stretched his Grand Slam winning streak to 15 matches by grabbing the last five games to complete a 6-4, 6-3, 7-5 victory over

Arthur Rinderknech of France in the French Open's first round.

The No. 1-ranked Sinner is playing in his second tournament since serving a three-month doping ban that was announced shortly after he won the Australian Open in January. His case came to light shortly before last year's U.S. Open, which Sinner also won.

The 23-year-old Italian has three Grand Slam titles in all, each trophy arriving on hard courts, and his best showing at Roland-Garros was making it to the semifinals a year ago before losing in five sets to eventual champion Carlos Alcaraz.

The result against the 75th-ranked Rinderknech in Court Philippe-Chatrier was Sinner's 62nd win in a row against opponents outside the top 20.

Sinner was pretty close to perfect over the initial two sets Monday, combining for 19 winners and just eight unforced errors in that span. His level dipped a bit in the third, with nine unforced errors off his racket contributing to deficits of 4-0 and 5-2.

But Sinner righted himself from there and was on his way to a matchup against another Frenchman, 38-year-old Richard Gasquet, who has said this tournament will be the last of his career.

"I know you will support him," Sinner told the fans with a smile, "but that's OK."

Rinderknech, whose best Slam appearance was reaching the third round at the 2023 U.S. Open, did his best to involve the partisan crowd, playing to the spectators and wildly celebrating his best points by sprinting around or waving his arms or shaking his head or reaching into the front row of the stands for a high-five or a handshake.

He has been to known to rile up his supporters and get under an opponent's skin. During a loss against American Taylor Fritz at Roland-Garros two years ago, when Rinderknech was the last French man in the field, the crowd booed and whistled heartily at the end. Fritz put a finger to his lips, then spread his arms to egg on the crowd and yelled, "Come on! I want to hear it!"

## Kuwait submits bid to host IIHF Division IV Champ'ship

KUWAIT CITY, May 27, (KUNA): The Kuwait Winter Sports Club announced on Tuesday that it has officially submitted a bid to host the 2026 IIHF Ice Hockey World Championship Division IV. The tournament features national teams from Armenia, Indonesia, Malaysia, Iran, Singapore, and Kuwait.

The announcement came during the club's participation in the ongoing International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF) annual meetings currently taking place in Sweden.

Speaking to KUNA, Club President Fahed Al-Ajmi said that the IIHF will evaluate all submitted bids and is expected to name the host nation in the near future.

Al-Ajmi expressed hope that Kuwait will be granted the opportunity to host the prestigious championship, noting that doing so would significantly elevate the profile of Kuwaiti ice hockey on the global stage and further promote the sport domestically.

The Kuwaiti delegation to the meetings also included Development Director Mishal Al-Ajmi and board member Rashid Al-Failakawi.

According to Al-Ajmi, the meet-

ings covered a wide range of topics focused on the development of ice hockey worldwide, particularly in Asia. Discussions emphasized the importance of strengthening tournaments and enhancing the sport through technical and administrative development.

The IIHF sessions also produced a number of key decisions aimed at improving officiating, coaching, and management by expanding training and development programs in these areas. Al-Ajmi praised the IIHF's efforts in supporting the growth of the sport at the international level.

### Best of the Rest

**Roglic withdraws from Giro:** Pre-race favorite Primoz Roglic abandoned the Giro d'Italia after crashing during a wet 16th stage on Tuesday, one of several falls during the mountain leg.

Italian rider Alessio Martinelli was hospitalized after sliding into a ravine. The VG Group Bardiani-CSF Faizane team said Martinelli was "conscious and in stable condition."

He was carried up from the ravine on a stretcher by an Alpine rescue team.

Roglic, the 2023 champion, stood 10th overall after dropping five places on Sunday. His fall also involved Richard Carapaz, the 2019 champion. Carapaz continued racing.

Egan Bernal, the 2021 champion, also fell but continued.

British rider Josh Tarling of the Ineos Grenadiers team also abandoned following a fall.

The 203-kilometer (126-mile) leg from Piazzola Sul Brenta to San Valentino included four major climbs across the Dolomites – including an up-hill finish – and was made more challenging due to rain early in the stage.

Mexican rider Isaac Del Toro leads the race. (AP)
