THE relationship between the two largest Gulf states – Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) – is often highlighted, as the close ties between these two nations are significant, making them the economic and political center of gravity of the Gulf Coopera-

Meanwhile, their geographical location makes them the most influential soft power in the Arab world and their influence is felt internationally.

This reality makes them, along with the rest of the countries in this system, a subject of scrutiny, as they are positively perceived by the people in the region or by countries worldwide seeking to strengthen economic and political relations with the region.

Conversely, if there is a negative view from outsiders seeking to undermine stable countries, they will seize the opportunity to drive a wedge between the two largest Arab soft powers, which will then weaken the region as a whole.

Hence, the world views the economic power of the two countries (Saudi Arabia and the UAE) as a globally influential and competitive force. This is why attempts to undermine them are frequent.

In recent years, we witnessed a great deal of insinuation in Western and some Arab media outlets aimed at destabilizing the two nations, but all of these attempts have failed.

Therefore, the visit of UAE President Sheikh Mohammed bin Zayed Al Nahyan to Saudi Arabia and his meeting with Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman could be considered a fatal blow to those seeking to undermine the two countries.

At the same time, it is a strong indication that fraternal understanding regarding regional and international issues is the basis of Gulf action.

Doha blast targets Hamas leaders amid ceasefire talks

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 9, (Agencies): Kuwait vehemently denounced on Tuesday the Israeli occupation's attack on Qatar, calling it a dangerous threat to the region's security and stability.

The Foreign Ministry stressed in a statement that this is a blatant violation to all international laws, directly undermining international safety and peace.

Kuwait reiterated the necessity for the Security Council to take responsibility in safeguarding international peace and security and take serious steps to put an end to the systematized Israeli occupation's aggression against the region.

Kuwait expressed its total support to Qatar in all the measures it would take to preserve its stability and sovereignty, and guarantee the safety of its nationals and residents.

India's Goods and Services Tax Reforms 2.0: A paradigm shift

India is set to implement a significant Loverhaul of its Goods and Services Tax (GST) system, effective September 22, 2025, coinciding with the start of the auspicious festival season. This comes soon after Prime Minister Narendra Modi had announced from the ramparts of the Red Fort in his Independence Day Speech on 15 August 2025 about his intention to unveil the next Generation Reforms in GST soon. These GST reforms are anchored on three core pillars: structural reforms, rate rationalization, and procedural simplification.

Under the new system, the GST structure will be streamlined into two primary slabs: 5%, and 18%, with addition of a new slab of 40% rate solely for luxury and sin goods such as highend vehicles, tobacco products, and aerated drinks. The previous 4-tier GST system, which included higher 12% and 28% slabs, will be abolished.

The Goods and Services Tax (GST) was, initially, introduced in India on 1 July 2017- hailed as India's most signifi-

Al-Budaiwi praises Gulf sustainability initiatives

'GCC a model for climate action'

MANAMA, Sept 9, (KUNA): Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) Secretary General Jasem Al-Budaiwi affirmed Tuesday that GCC states have become an inspiring model in balancing economic growth, sustainability, and climate

This came in his address at the Second Global Conference on Water, Energy, and Climate, which kicked off today and was attended by Bahrain's Deputy Prime Minister Sheikh Khalid bin Abdullah Al-Khalifa, along with ministers, specialists, and experts from around the world.

Al-Budaiwi noted that the world faces unprecedented challenges from climate change and mounting pressures on water and energy, stressing that GCC states, under their leaders' guidance, are turning these challenges into opportunities by advancing regional integration and reinforcing water, energy, and food security.

He highlighted the ambitious national strategies of member states toward carbon neutrality, the UAE targets 44 pct clean energy by 2050, Bahrain seeks 20 pct renewable energy by 2035 and net zero by 2060, Saudi Arabia aims for 50

pct renewable energy by 2030 and carbon neutrality in 2060.

Kuwait targets 15 pct renewable power generation by 2035 and carbon neutrality in 2050, Oman pursues 30 pct renewables by 2030, 39 pct by 2040, and net zero in 2050, while Qatar plans to meet 20 pct of its energy needs from renewables by 2030.

He stressed that these strategies reflect the GCC's commitment to climate responsibility, innovation, technology,

and human capital investment, strengthening supply security and multiplying the economic and social impact of sustainable energy projects.

Al-Budaiwi expressed confidence in the region's determination, capabilities, and institutions to play a leading role in global sustainability, thanking the Kingdom of Bahrain for hosting the conference and voicing hope that it yields substantive recommendations to advance Gulf and international efforts toward a more sustainable future.

Kuwait 'strengthens' support for women athletes with UN backing

PAS focuses on training and empowerment programs

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 9, (KUNA): The Public Authority for Sports (PAS) discussed on Tuesday with the UN Special Rapporteur on Violence Against Women and Girls, Reem Al-Salem, issues related to supporting and empowering women in the fields of awareness and sports, as well as combating violence against female athletes.

PAS said in a press statement that its Acting Director General, Deputy Director General for Financial and Administrative Affairs Fatima Sayed Hashem, and Deputy Director General for the Sports for All Sector Haya Al-Daham received Al-Salem as part of her visit to Kuwait.

The visit "comes within the framework of increasing efforts to provide a safe and inclusive sports environment," she explained. Al-Salem met with a number of PAS officials to discuss mechanisms to support female athletes and develop their skills,

Dr. Al-Dosari's operations

write this article to praise not only the efforts and creativity of Dr. Saad Al-Dosari, Director of Sabah Al-Ahmad Kidney and Urology Center, but also all doctors who are similar to him in character, experience and understand-

ing. My testimony regarding him is biased, as he is the doctor who takes care of my health at the center. However, what is due must be mentioned.



Dr. Al-Dosari and his medical team achieved the first-of-its-kind accomplishment in Kuwait and the region.

They successfully performed 10 telesurgeries using the latest surgical robotic technology and advanced medical communication, establishing Kuwait as a prominent figure on the map of global medical development.

This project began in December 2024, when the first remote surery in the Middle East was per formed.

Dr. Al-Dosari performed the operation in Shanghai, China -7,000 kilometers away from Kuwait. The patient was lying in the operating room at Sabah Al-Ahmad Center, where he used direct link technologies and an advanced surgical robot to perform the op-

successful operation marked a turning point in the future of surgical procedures in the country and the region.

Achievements followed, as the same medical team performed seven more remote surgeries in April and June 2025 from Shanghai, averaging one major surgical case per day. All were successful.

This step not only demonstrated the country's high medical competence, but also the advanced digital infrastructure and healthcare workforce.

The medical team published the results of these eight surgeries in peer-reviewed medical journals. This qualified the performers to at-

tend the annual conference of the International Society of Robotic Surgeons, held in Strasbourg, France.

They attended the conference, accompanied by Minister of Health Dr. Ahmed Al-Awadhi and his delegation. From there, Dr. Al-Dosari per-

formed two remote surgeries on patients in Kuwait. The surgeries were broadcasted live at the conference halls, with more than 2,500 attendees, including senior This brought the total number

of robotic surgeries performed by the Kuwaiti team to 10. It is a record in the history of the Kuwaiti and global healthcare sector, especially since it included operations performed in two different countries and continents (China and France). In recognition of this great

achievement, he received well-deserved congratulations from higher authorities that commended his efforts, his medical team and all Kuwaiti healthcare professionals. They considered this achieve-

ment evidence of what Kuwaiti competencies can do when the will and technology are present.

For your information, remote surgery is a medical revolution in modern surgery. It enables surgical expertise to reach remote areas or facilities lacking highly specialized expertise, while reducing surgical response time in emergency

It enables collaboration with international centers to perform complex robotic surgeries, eliminating the need to send the patient abroad or invite doctors to the country.

Furthermore, it plays a vital role in enhancing the efficiency of medical training and education through the ability to monitor operations remotely.

This national achievement is a model worthy of emulation in the use of modern technology to better serve humanity and put Kuwait among the leading countries in remote robotic surgery, paving the way for further developments in the health sector.

Kuwait hosts 20th Security Media Committee meeting

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 9, (KUNA): Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) states attach great importance to combating organized crime and money laundering, given their grave impact on national, regional, and international security and economies. Against this backdrop, the 20th

meeting of the GCC Security Media Committee convened Tuesday in Kuwait, chaired by Director General of the Interior Ministry's Public Relations and Security Media Department Brigadier Nasser Abu Sulaib

The Interior Ministry said in a press statement that the meeting was held on the sidelines of a workshop on preparing the GCC strategy to combat money laundering crimes, hosted by Kuwait in cooperation with the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) Regional Office, continuing until Thursday

Abu Sulaib conveyed greetings of the First Deputy Prime Minister and Interior Minister Sheikh Fahad Yusuf Saud Al-Sabah to participants, wishing them success in the meeting and the accompanying workshop.

Regulating the industry, a step in the right direction

"REGULATING and developing industries are essential tasks contributing to the development of the country as a whole," Sheikh Eng. Fahad Dawoud Al-Sabah wrote for Al-Seyassah daily.

"It helps boost the gross domestic product (GDP), which we need to support with significant revenues so it is comparable to that of neighboring coun-

"Therefore, I focused on the recent Cabinet decisions related to this impor-

"Kuwait long needed this type of sound regulation, as it is well known that industry is the foundation of societal development "Many coun-



tries, whose incomes are based

on industry despite their lack of raw materials, have been able to build a massive industrial system, benefiting from numerous national expertise and strategic relationships with other countries that have a

surplus of raw materials. The importance of industry in developing other economic sectors lies in its role as a key driver of sustainable growth.

"For example, it provides numerous job opportunities, increases human capacity, promotes social stability, increases the GDP, and, as previously mentioned, fosters innovation and tech-

"It contributes to providing the goods and services needed for consumption, improves infrastructure, and develops exports to increase government revenues and reduce reliance on imported finished products, leading to sustainable and balanced economic development.

"Kuwait has a unique nature, so it needs to strengthen many productive sectors. With vast untapped land areas, the potential exists to break the impasse of dependence on imports.

"The importance of industry lies in its status as a primary source of national income and a vital element in diversifying the economy, away from dependence on

"Industry also provides opportunities for value-added development and employment, particularly in the manufacturing and petrochemical sectors, which boost exports of high-value products.

"This is in addition to enabling industries support other vital sectors, such as food security and health, making industry a pillar of sustainable economic growth, and providing flexibility in the

midst of oil price fluctuations. "Any development in this sector that is based on sound regulatory processes is considered the first step on the right path toward sustainable development, founded on a sound vision that is appropriate for many developments taking place globally in various development fields

"Given its geographical location, Kuwait is capable of becoming a major regional hub, strengthening its partner-ships with the world, and developing its economy.

"The mere preparation of development plans does not entail that develop-ment is progressing," **Dr. Bader Oth**man Maalallah wrote for Al-Seyassah

"Achievement is not measured by spending. It is inappropriate to measure achievement using international indicators. Development has its own national characteristics and its indicators must reflect those characteristics.

"No matter how diverse their definitions and descriptions are — balanced, comprehensive, real, multidimensional, in reality development is development, and any addition to it is just augmenta-

"Development must include all of these descriptions, but it must be sustainable in all dimensions of such characteristics. Its indicators must reflect the dimensions and aspects of sustainability.

If the components of sustainability are absent, there is no development.

"Sustainability is limited to the environment, optimal exploitation of natural resources, combating pollution and other related matters.

"However, with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), which the United Nations expanded to 17 goals and 169 targets, to encompass most, if not all, of the challenges that developing countries are facing, such as combating poverty, health, education, gender equality and others, sustainable development has thus become a matrix covering all aspects of life. Ensuring a secure future requires meeting the terms of this matrix.

"From this framework, and in response to the realities of life and the requirements of sustainability, a fundamental question emerges and it constitutes an important entry point for sustainable development, from which other related issues arise: Can development goals be achieved while shouldering an economic mountain teeming with imbalances, accumulations and challenges that roll like a snowball and grow over

"Definitely, development goals can

be achieved only through an effective development planning system that includes medium-term plans, annual plans, projects and programs. This is in terms of mechanisms.

"In terms of substance, development must be directed toward achieving sustainable and operational economic growth, which must exceed the population growth rate.

"This, in turn, can only be achieved in a healthy economy, free of financial distortions and economic imbalances. If this is not the case, development, through its policies, projects and programs, must be directed toward correcting this—that is, toward economic and financial reforms

"Financial distortions are the result of economic imbalances, and vice versa, because addressing distortions and imbalances is a long-term issue. The vision and plans must be oriented toward this goal, while other goals are aligned with this context.

"Thus, development begins its path toward sustainability, but it can only be completed within other related contexts. First among these contexts is Decree-Law No. 60/2025 on Financing and Liquidity, which provides government spending with a borrowing ceiling of KD 30 billion.

"Despite the importance of its six development goals (see the law), in practice, it may have both positive and negative aspects.

"It can oscillate between being a constructive tool that enhances the role of government spending in growth through good and governed debt management and the risk of falling into a 'debt trap' in the absence of such management.

"This must be understood so that the price is not too high when it is repaid.

"The most important issue here is having a clear vision for the use of debt that answers vital questions, specifically: Why do we borrow, and how will

"Furthermore, having the ability to transform borrowing into a means for turning our economy from a rentier to a productive one will help us escape the debt trap, which is essentially borrowing and then borrowing again to repay

"Despite the importance of this legal mandate for borrowing, particularly for credit rating agencies, donor institutions, and investors, the concern is that borrowing could turn into financing current spending.

"This is particularly true when the budget is threatened by a deficit and in light of the ambiguity of an integrated

development project. "Fitch Ratings indicated that 70 percent of the budget deficit will be fi-

nanced through borrowing. "The six objectives justifying the aforementioned decree-law should be part of a comprehensive national projstructural economic and financial re-

"This is difficult to achieve in light of public finances and an economy suffering from structural imbalances. Public debt should be one of the tools for this

The CSC stated that positions for which training is provided after joining the workplace depend on the manpower needs of government agencies, and these jobs include student escort, security assistant, food preparer, transaction processing, housing supervisor and service implementer.

According to the CSC, those wishing to apply for positions requiring training before joining the workplace must register for the qualifying courses through the official website of the CSC from Monday until Sept 14.

New mechanism introduced

MoSA dissolves four non-profit organizations for irregularities

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 9, (Agencies): Kuwait's Minister of Social Affairs, Family and Childhood Affairs Dr. Amthal Al-Huwailah decreed that four non-profit organizations be dissolved for violating their respective executive statutes.

Ad hoc committees will be set up to account for the finances and assets of those orgs and report to the ministry pursuant to the established legal procedures, the minister said in a press re-

lease on Monday. Today's action falls in the framework of the Ministry's commitment to transparency, accountability, institutional work and protection of the public interest, she stressed.

Meanwhile. the Ministry of Social Dr. Al-Huwailah Affairs, represented

by the Charitable Societies and Endowments Department, has introduced a new mechanism to regulate the process of opening donation collection links for licensed charitable projects by registered charitable societies and endowments in the country, reports Al-Jarida daily.

The new mechanism allows charitable entities (associations/endowments) to create a sub-link (donor link) if they have already obtained a license for the project for which donations are being collected, without the need to

the value of the link donation does not exceed KD15,000. However, if the value surpasses this amount, the charitable entity must obtain approval from the ministry before creating the donation link

The new mechanism prohibits charitable associations and organizations from creating links for special cases – such as for the sick. debtors, blood money payments or any other type of fundraising for individual cases.

It also prohibits charitable organizations from creating links through payment companies, with the sole exception of the official website of the association or charity

The mechanism clarifies that "the general link designated for collecting donations for alms, zakat or endowments does not require approval from the ministry, as wells the general link designated for projects already licensed by the ministry.

The ministry stressed that this mechanism applies exclusively to charitable societies and organizations licensed to carry out domestic and international projects, which are subject to approval issued by the

It asserted that this step is in line with its commitment to regulate charitable work in the country, especially since it has already licensed several charitable societies and organizations to implement charitable projects inside and outside Kuwait, necessitating the establishment of donation links for such initiatives.



meet the conditions for the right to benefit from the areas that will be allocated for rental housing for women as soon as they are ready and completed, provided the current housing unit is

handed over in good condition. It called on the beneficiaries of rental housing units to update their data as soon as possible and follow the official accounts to be updated on developments regarding the condition of hous-

It added that it is working with the relevant sectors in PAHW to prepare the documents related to the infrastructure in Taima and Sulaibiya, and expedite the implementation of housing projects in these areas.

The Hat-trick of India's Economic triumph

GST 2.0 comes in at the heels of major income tax and monetary policy measures, implemented as part of broader vision to provide a strong boost to India's economic growth. To begin with, rationalized tax slabs announced in the 2025 Union Budget allowed for more disposable household income. The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) reduced repo rate to 5.5% from 6%, thus making loans cheaper with lower EMIs on homes and vehicles, while expanding credit availability for businesses. Now, GST 2.0 completes this three-pronged strategy of the Indian Government, which analysts are referring to as India's economic "hat-trick

Consumer Relief and Demand Stimulation

At its core, GST 2.0 seeks to ensure that the benefits of reduced GST rates are passed on to consumers promptly and boost consumption by making everyday essentials more affordable. The recent GST reforms have made healthcare and social security more accessible by exempting GST on life and health insurance, including family and senior citizen policies, and on reinsurance, while reducing taxes on medicines and medical equipment-33 lifesaving drugs now attract zero GST, and most other healthcare essentials just 5%. Food items such as cottage cheese, packaged snacks, and essential items such as soaps, hygiene products, and smaller vehicles now fall under lower rates, directly easing household budgets. The reforms also addressed agricultural needs by slashing GST on tractors, farming machinery, and fertilizer inputs like sulphuric acid and ammonia from 18% to 5%. Further, GST on education services and learning supplies has been eliminated, reinforcing the government's fo-

cus on accessible education. **Sectoral Impact and Market Response**

The reform is already generating optimism across markets. In the Automobiles sector, effective price drops across popular models such as SUVs and sedans are expected to spur demand. For MSMEs, simplified compliance, faster refunds, and reduced tax anomalies will free up resources for growth. The manufacturing sector is expected to see improved export competitiveness with rate adjustments and simplified processes that will benefit the textile, renewable energy, and auto parts sectors by resolving inverted duty structures (IDS). Kuwait legislative

He announced the launch of the largest legislative development plan in Kuwait's history.

The package of laws approved by the Kuwaiti government over the past year marked the beginning of a methodical reformation of the state's legal framework to achieve Kuwait Vision 2035, and to align with international laws and agree-

Currently, legislative reviews are nearing the completion of 25 percent of the laws. These new laws, alongside full-scale development, have

produced positive economic outcomes, reflected in improved national economic indicators and optimistic growth forecasts. Notably, foreign direct investment inflows increased by 20 percent last year.

In this regard, rating agency Fitch expected Kuwait's new key legislations will enhance the growth and diversification of the banking sector, support economic expansion and reinforce government spending on major projects.

Fitch stated in a recent report that progress in reforms particularly in diversifying financial revenues, rationalizing expenditures and reducing reliance on oil - would further support the government's budget and financial flexibility. It noted the implementation of a minimum top-up tax on mul-

One of the most notable practical applications of legislative reform is the new traffic law, which came into effect in April. The reforms included bills amending parts of Penal Code, parts of Code of Criminal Procedure and parts of the Civil and Commercial Procedure Law, and amending Anti-Corruption Authority (Nazaha) and financial disclosure regulations, amending the law establishing the Administrative Disputes Circuit in the Court of First Instance and new laws regarding real estate developers and amendments to the

Companies Law. Currently, around nine committees are reviewing a set of laws, including those related to economic courts, rental systems, real estate owners' associations, criminal laws and procedures, labor law, and civil and commercial law. This is happening in parallel with ongoing coordination among various ministries and relevant entities to amend other leg-

Within this framework, Kuwait is preparing to make a qualitative leap in family and social legislation by amending laws concerning personal status, domestic violence, juvenile justice and child protection. These changes aim to address issues identified in the practical application of existing laws and to form a legislative shield that protects families, protects women from violence and ensures justice.

The initial draft of the expected amendments to the 1984 Personal Status Law targets more than 120 articles, proposes the addition of 20 new articles, and the cancellation of 15 articles, all aiming to produce a comprehensive law that serves

all parties and preserves family.

A merging of the Juvenile Law and Child Law is also planned into a unified, carefully drafted law. This includes resolving the confusion between the concepts of a "child at risk" under the Child Law and a "juvenile at risk of delinquency" under the Juvenile Law and organizing proper pro-

cedures for dealing with children in both cases In addition, the new Judicial Law, which has been referred to the Fatwa and Legislation Department, represents the gateway to the largest judicial system reform in Kuwait. This is part of an integrated legislative path aimed at balancing the protection of rights and freedoms with the requirements of deterrence and justice.

Kuwait slams

Israel launched a strike targeting Hamas' leadership in Qatar on Tuesday as they considered a U.S. proposal for a ceasefire in the Gaza Strip. The strike on the territory of a U.S. ally marked a stunning escalation and risked upending talks aimed at winding down the war and freeing hostages.

Qatar, an energy-rich U.S. ally hosting thousands of American troops, had served as a key mediator between Israel and Hamas even before the war. It condemned what it referred to as a "flagrant violation of all international laws and norms" as smoke rose over its capital, Doha.

It was not immediately clear if anyone was hurt in the strike. Hamas has survived numerous assassinations of top leaders and is still intact in Gaza, despite having suffered major blows since the outbreak of the war triggered by its Oct. 7, 2023, attack on Israel.

The future of the long-stalled ceasefire talks was more uncertain, as Israel gears up for a major offensive aimed at taking over Gaza City. That escalation has been met with heavy international condemnation and opposition within Israel from those who fear it will doom the remaining hostages

U.N. Secretary General Antonio Guterres condemned the

attack, saying "all parties must work towards achieving a permanent ceasefire, not destroying it."

Israel has long threatened to strike Hamas leaders wherever they are. While it has often welcomed Qatar's role as a mediator, alongside Egypt, it has also accused the Gulf nation of not putting enough pressure on the group.

In contrast to previous Israeli operations against senior militants abroad, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu was quick to publicly claim the strike, saying: "Israel initiated it, Israel conducted it and Israel takes full responsibility.' He said the decision was taken Monday after a shooting at-

tack in Jerusalem that killed six people and an attack on Israeli forces in Gaza that killed four soldiers. Israel alerted the U.S. ahead of time, according to an Israeli

official and another person familiar with the matter, who were not authorized to comment publicly and spoke on condition of anonymity. There was no official comment from the White House or Pentagon.

The Israeli military said it used "precise munitions and additional intelligence" in the strike, without elaborating. It was not immediately clear what caused the explosions.

Qatar condemned what it referred to as a "cowardly Israeli attack" on Hamas' political headquarters in Doha. Foreign Ministry spokesman Majed al-Ansari called it a "flagrant violation of all international laws and norms" and said Qatar "will not tolerate this reckless Israeli behavior."

The U.S. Embassy in Oatar said it had instituted a shelter-inplace order for its facilities.

Egypt, which has also served as a key mediator with Hamas. condemned the attack, saying it targeted Palestinian leaders who had met "to discuss ways to reach a ceasefire agreement." It said the strike was a "direct assault" on Qatar's sovereignty.

The main group representing families of the hostages expressed "deep concern and great fear" after the strike. "The prospect of their return now faces greater uncertainty than ever, with one thing absolutely certain - their time is running out," the Hostages and Missing Families Forum said in a statement.


US Homeland Security Dept to launch 'Operation Midway Blitz' in Chicago

WASHINGTON, Sept 9, (Xinhua): The US Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced Monday that Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) is launching an operation that "will target the criminal illegal aliens who flocked to Chicago and Illinois."

The so-called "Operation Midway Blitz" is in honor of Katie Abraham, who was killed in a drunk driving hit-and-run car wreck caused by "criminal illegal alien" Julio Cucul-Bol in Illinois, the department said in a statement.

Democrats have expressed opposition to this latest action. "Once again, this isn't about fighting crime. That requires support and coordination -- yet we've experienced nothing like that over the past several weeks," Democratic Illinois Governor JB Pritzker said on X.

"Instead of taking steps to work with us on public safety, the Trump administration's focused on scaring Illinoisians," the gov-

nor said.

Chicago Mayor Brandon Johnson, meanwhile, said that the City of Chicago received no notice of any enhanced immigration action by the Trump administration.

Supreme Court lifts restrictions on LA immigration stops set after agents swept up US citizens

WASHINGTON, Sept 9, (AP): The Supreme Court on Monday cleared the way for federal agents to conduct sweeping immigration operations for now in Los Angeles, the latest victory for US President Donald Trump's administration at the high court.

The conservative majority lifted a restraining order from a judge who found that roving patrols were conducting indiscriminate stops in and around LA. The order had barred immigration agents from stopping people solely based on their race, language, job or location.

The court's 6-3 decision followed a pattern of at least temporarily allowing some of the Republican administration's harshest policies, while leaving room for the possibility of a different outcome after the legal case plays out fully. The net effect, meanwhile, has Trump pushing ahead in many of the areas he considers most critical.

The majority did not explain its reasoning, as is typical on the court's emergency docket. But Justice Brett Kavanaugh said the lower-court judge had gone too far in restricting how

Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents can carry out brief stops for questioning. "The prospect of such after-the-fact judicial second-guessing and contempt proceedings will inevita-

bly chill lawful immigration enforcement efforts," he wrote in a concurrence.

In a stinging dissent joined by her two liberal colleagues, Justice Sonia

Sotomayor said the decision erodes constitutional freedoms.

"Countless people in the Los Angeles area have been grabbed, thrown to the ground, and handcuffed simply because of their looks, their accents, and the fact they make a living by doing manual labor," she wrote. "Today, the Court needlessly subjects countless more to these exact same indignities."

Kavanaugh, for his part, suggested stops in which agents use force could yet face legal challenges.

The Supreme Court's decision comes as ICE agents also step up enforcement in Washington as part of Trump's unprecedented federal takeover of the capital city's law enforcement and deployment of the National Guard

The lawsuit will now continue to unfold in California, with a hearing set for Sept. 24. It was filed by immigrant advocacy groups that accused the Trump administration of systematically targeting brown-skinned people during his administration's crackdown on illegal immigration in the Los Angeles area.

Texas Democrat Talarico joins widening race

US Senate to change rules to push through Trump's blocked nominees, says Thune

WASHINGTON, Sept 9, (AP): US Senate Majority Leader John Thune says Republicans are ready to change the chamber's rules to allow quick confirmations of dozens of President Donald Trump's executive branch nominees and will move to speed up votes after months of Democratic delays.

Opening the Senate on Monday, Thune said Democrats' obstruction is "unsustainable." He said Republicans will begin action this week to allow votes on groups of lower-level executive branch nominees if a majority of the Senate agrees. Currently, one senator's objection can force days of votes on a single nominee.

If the Democratic delays continue, Thune said, "there is no practical way that we could come close to filling all the vacancies in the four years of this administration no matter how many hours the Senate works."

Changing the rules would take time, with procedural votes potentially Thursday and early next week to push through a first tranche of 48 nominees, according to a person familiar with the GOP plan who requested anonymity because it hasn't been released publicly. The nominations include undersecretaries and staff positions for various agencies across the government as well as several ambassadors.

Republicans have been talking about options for changing the rules since early August, when the Senate left for a monthlong recess after a breakdown in bipartisan negotiations over the confirmation process. Democrats have blocked nearly every single one of Trump's nominees, forcing majority Republicans to spend valuable floor time on procedural votes and leaving many positions in the executive branch

The delays have infuriated Trump, who told Senate Democratic Leader Chuck Schumer to "GO TO HELL!" in a social media post after negotiations broke down over the process in early August.

The changes come after both parties have escalated their obstruction of the other party's nominees for years, and as leaders in both parties have incrementally changed the rules to make the process less bipartisan. Democrats have blocked more nominees than ever before as they have struggled to find ways to oppose Trump and the GOP Congress, and as their voters have pushed them to fight Republicans at every turn.

Schumer has said Democrats are delaying the nominations because Trump's nominees are "historically bod"

"If you don't debate nominees, if

you don't vote on individual nominees, if there's not some degree of sunlight, what will stop Donald Trump from nominating even worse individuals than we've seen to date, knowing this chamber will rubber stamp anything he wishes?" Schumer said Monday evening.

Still, the proposal to group nominations is loosely based on legislation introduced by Democrats two years ago as Republicans blocked many of thenPresident Joe Biden's picks.

But while Senate Republicans forced similar delays during Biden's administration, Democrats have blocked almost all of Trump's picks. It's the first time in recent history that the minority party hasn't allowed at least some quick confirmations.

The GOP proposal would only apply to executive branch nominations, not lifetime judicial appointments, and

would exclude the most high-profile positions, such as Cabinet nominees, that require a longer debate time. The process to change the rules will likely require several floor votes and the support of a simple majority, so at least 51 out of the chamber's 53 Republicans. But most GOP senators appear to be on board.

If Republicans act quickly, they could confirm more than 100 of Trump's pending nominations this

The Republican move is the latest salvo in years of intensifying Senate standoffs over presidential nominations. In 2013, Democrats changed Senate rules for executive branch and lower court judicial nominees to remove the 60-vote threshold for confirmations as Republicans blocked President Barack Obama's picks. In 2017, Republicans did the same for Supreme Court nominees as Democrats tried to block Trump's nomination of Justice Neil Gorsuch.

Schumer on Monday echoed former GOP Leader Mitch McConnell, who warned then-Democratic Leader Harry Reid in 2013 that his party would regret changing the rules, "and regret it a lot sooner than you think."

"I say to my Republican colleagues, think carefully before taking this step," Schumer said, adding that "it's going to be a decision you will come to regret."

HOUSTON, Texas: Texas state Rep James Talarico, a Democrat and former schoolteacher with a rising national profile, joined a widening race for US Senate on Tuesday that already has two prominent challengers trying to unseat Republican Sen. John Cornyn.

Talarico, 36, has gained popularity in the Texas House through viral social media posts challenging Republican-led policies such as private school vouchers and requiring the Ten Commandments in classrooms. It is the first statewide race for Talarico, who flipped a seat in Austin's booming suburbs in 2018.

He will seek the Democratic nomination in a field that includes former US Rep Colin Allred, who is running again after unsuccessfully challenging Republican Sen. Ted Cruz last year.

"I get the sense that there is a deep hunger across the political spectrum for a fundamentally different kind of politics," Talarico said in an interview ahead of his announcement. "It's been 10 years now of Trumpian politics, politics as a blood sport ... and there is a hunger 10 years later for a return to more timeless values of sincerity and honesty and compassion and respect."

WWII bomb discovery prompts evacuations: The discovery of a World War II bomb in Slovakia's capital during construction work prompted evacuations

on Tuesday, officials said.

The emergency measure covered several blocks in downtown Bratislava, including a major bridge across the Danube River. Public transportation and all traffic were halted during the morning rush hour.

Experts were planning to defuse the 500-pound (225-kilogram) bomb, which was discovered on Monday evening, by midday.

An oil refinery located in the area was a target of the Allied bombardment in 1944 during the war. (AP)

Terminal at Heathrow Airport reopens: Part of a terminal temporarily closed at London's Heathrow Airport was reopened later Monday when police reported finding no sign of a hazardous substance blamed for harming about 20 people, authorities said.

The Metropolitan police said the patients treated at

Terminal 4 were not seriously injured and that officers found no trace of any dangerous material.

The departures area of the terminal at the U.'s busiest airport was evacuated and closed as a precaution for

about three hours as police, firefighters and ambulance crews responded.

Crowds of passengers with luggage crowded outside the terminal in the late afternoon. As the sun went down, some wrapped themselves in space blankets to keep

The arrivals area of the terminal remained open throughout and all other terminals were operating.

Thousands rally in Serbia: Thousands of student-led protesters chanted slogans against Serbia's President Aleksandar Vucic at a rally in downtown Belgrade on Monday, accusing police of brutality during recent antigovernment demonstrations that have shaken his populist rule.

The protesters demanded that police officers responsible for excessive use of force during months of unrest be punished, including for alleged rape threats against a female student.

The protests started in November when a concrete canopy collapsed at a train station in Serbia's north, killing 16 people. The disaster ignited an anti-corruption movement led by university students alleging graftfueled negligence as its cause.

Student Nikolina Sindjelic, who was detained last month during the protests, said she was beaten and sexually harassed during her detention. Sindjelic told the rally that the "entire state system has been directed against its own citizens." (AP)

French govt collapses in confidence vote, forcing Macron to seek yet another PM

PARIS, Sept 9, (AP): Legislators toppled France's government in a confidence vote on Monday, a new crisis for Europe's second-largest economy that obliges President Emmanuel Macron to search for a fourth prime minister in 12 months.

Prime Minister François Bayrou was ousted overwhelmingly in a 364-194 vote against him. Bayrou paid the price for what appeared to be a staggering political miscalculation, gambling that lawmakers would back his view that France must slash public spending to rein in its debts. Instead, they seized on the vote that Bayrou called to gang up against the 74-year-old centrist who was appointed by Macron last December.

The demise of Bayrou's short-lived minority government - now constitutionally obliged to submit its resignation after just under nine months in office - heralds renewed uncertainty and a risk of prolonged legislative deadlock for France as it wrestles with pressing challenges, including budget difficulties and, internationally, wars in Ukraine and Gaza and the shifting priorities of U.S. President Donald Trump.

Although Macron had two weeks to prepare for the government collapse after Bayrou announced in August that he'd seek a confidence vote on his unpopular budget plans, no clear front-

runner has emerged as a successor.

After Gabriel Attal's departure as prime minister in September 2024, followed by former Brexit negotiator Michel Barnier's ouster by parliament in December and Bayrou now gone, too, Macron again is hunting for a replacement to build consensus in the parliament's lower house that is stacked with opponents of the French leader.

Macron's office said that he'd ac-

cept the resignation of Bayrou's government on Tuesday and name a new prime minister "in the coming days." As president, Macron will con-

tinue to hold substantial powers over foreign policy and European affairs and remain the commander in chief of the nuclear-armed military. But domestically, the 47-year-old president's ambitions are increasingly facing ruin.

Norway's Labor Party claims victory in general election

OSLO, Norway, Sept 9, (AP): Norway's Labor Party of Prime Minister Jonas Gahr Støre has claimed victory in Monday's general election with most votes now counted and with a narrow but clear win by the center-left block over the right-wing parties.

Rapturous cheering erupted in Oslo on Monday night as Labor supporters gathered to celebrate a closely fought campaign in which the future of a wealth tax that dates to the late 19th century has been a central issue.

Addressing the crowd, Prime Min-

Addressing the crowd, Prime Minister Gahr Støre thanked his supporters and said the victory showed it's possible for Social Democratic parties to win elections even with right-wing forces on the rise in Europe, according to broadcaster VG.

A short while earlier, Conservative leader Erna Solberg apologized for the dismal performance of her party, which fell to third place in parliament behind the right-wing populist Progress Party that saw its best result ever in a national election.

Addressing supporters, Progress Party leader Sylvi Listhaug was pleased with her party's result but lamented what she called "four tough years ahead for people and business-"

About 4.3 million people in the Scandinavian nation were eligible to vote for the new 169-member parlia-

ment, or Storting. With almost all votes now counted, center-left parties have won just over the 85 seats needed to form a majority.

Final results are expected Tuesday, and they are likely to be followed by weeks of negotiations to build a coalition and agree on Cabinet positions before King Harald can swear in a new government.

Monday's result was never expected to have major implications for Norway's foreign policy. The country is a

stalwart member of NATO and a strong supporter of Ukraine's defense against Russia, with which it has a border in the Arctic north. It isn't a member of the European Union but has close economic ties with the 27-nation bloc.

Norway is one of the richest coun-

Ic tres with the 27-nation bloc.

Norway is one of the richest countries in the world. It has a generous welfare state, sits on billions of barrels of oil and gas, and has one of the world's largest sovereign wealth funds, worth around 20 trillion kroner (\$2 trillion).

PRAGUE, Sept 9, (AP): A spy network being built in Europe by Belarus was broken up by intelligence services from the Czech Republic, Hungary and Romania, the Czech counterintelligence agency said Monday.

The Czech agency, also known as BIS, said in a statement that a team of European agents discovered spies in several European countries from Belarus' KGB security agency. BIS said that a former deputy head of Moldovan intelligence service SIS who handed over classified information to the KGB was among them.

The Czechs also expelled a Belarusian agent who was operating under the cover of a diplomat. That person was given 72 hours to leave the Czech Republic, the Czech Foreign Ministry said Monday.

The Czech agency said that Belarus managed to create the network because its diplomats are able to freely travel across European countries.

"To successfully counter these hostile activities in Eu-

rope, we need to restrict the movement of accredited diplomats from Russia and Belarus within the Schengen (borderless) area," BIS head Michal Koudelka said in a statement.

The agency didn't immediately offer more details

The agency didn't immediately offer more details. Romania's anti-organized crime agency, DIICOT, said on Monday that it implemented an arrest warrant for a 47-year-old suspect on treason charges. The suspect had previously held management positions within Moldova's SIS. The suspect allegedly disclosed state secrets to Belarusian intel-

ligence officers that would likely "endanger national security," DIICOT stated.

The Romanian agency added that, between 2024 and 2025, the Moldovan suspect - who wasn't named - met twice with Belarusian spies in Budapest, Hungary, and that there is "reasonable suspicion" that the meetings involved "transmitting instructions" and exchanging payments for services provided.

Political leaders' homes set on fire

Nepal's premier resigns but protests against government and corruption rage on

KATHMANDU, Nepal, Sept 9, (AP): Nepal's prime minister resigned Tuesday as protests against a short-lived ban on social media grew increasingly violent and expanded into broader criticism of his government and accusations of corruption among the Himalayan country's political elite.

The resignation appeared to have little effect on the demonstrations. Tens of thousands of protesters remained on the streets late in the day, blocking roads, storming government buildings and setting them on fire, and, in some cases, attacking political leaders. Army helicopters ferried some ministers to safe places.

A day earlier, demonstrations led by young people angry about the blocking of several social media sites gripped the country's capital, and police opened fired on the crowds, killing

The ban was lifted Tuesday, but the protests continued, fueled by anger over the deaths and growing frustration with the political elite in the nation wedged between China and India As the protests intensified, Prime Minister Khadga Prasad Oli announced he was stepping down. The president accepted the resignation and appointed Oli to lead a caretaker government until a new one is in place though it was unclear what power he would wield or even where he was.

The army issued a statement calling for calm and urging political dialogue, but did not give any other details.

The demonstrations - called the protest of Gen Z - began after the government blocked platforms, including Facebook, X and YouTube, saying the companies had failed to register and submit to government oversight.

But they spiraled to reflect broader discontent. In particular, many young people are angry that the children of political leaders - so-called Nepo Kids - seem to enjoy luxury lifestyles and numerous advantages while most youth struggle to find work. With youth unemployment running at about 20% last year, according to the World

Bank, the government estimates that more than 2,000 young people leave the country every day to seek work in the Middle East or southeast Asia. "I am here to protest about the massive corruption in our country," said Bishnu Thapa Chetri, a student. "The country has gotten so bad that for us youths there is no grounds for us to stay.

Videos shared on social media showed protesters beating up Nepali Congress party leader Sher Bahadur Deuba and his wife, Arzu Rana Deuba, the current foreign minister. Both appeared to be bleeding, while one video showed the party leader being helped to safety. The party is the country's largest and is part of the governing coalition.

Local media and videos on social media also showed protesters attacking government buildings and the residences of the top political leaders throughout Tuesday.

The presidential palace, the prime minister's official residence, and a building that houses the offices of the prime minster and several ministries were all torched. Thick smoke rose from the prime minister's office building.

Earlier, Oli's private home was set on fire, as were those of the president, home minister and the Deubas. The home of the leader of the opposition Communist Party of Nepal (Maoist)

was also set ablaze. Some protesters blamed the government for the police opening fire and called for the ouster of the increasingly

unpopular prime minister. 'We are here to protest because our youths and friends are getting killed, we are here to see that justice is done and the present regime is ousted," said Narayan Acharya, who was among the protesters outside the battered wall of the parliament building Tuesday. 'K.P. Oli should be chased away."

Monday's rallies swelled to tens of thousands of people in Kathmandu and crowds surrounded the Parliament building before police opened fire on the demonstrators.

"Stop the ban on social media. Stop corruption, not social media," the crowds chanted, waving national flags.

Seven of the 19 killed and scores of the wounded were taken to the National Trauma Center, the country's main

S.Korea, NATO discuss defense cooperation

N.Korea conducts final test of solid-fuel engine for long-range missiles

SEOUL, South Korea, Sept 9, (Agencies): North Korea said Tuesday it had conducted the final ground test of a solid-fuel rocket engine for a longrange ballistic missile in its latest advancement toward having an arsenal that could viably threaten the continental United States.

The test Monday observed by leader Kim Jong Un was the ninth of the engine built with carbon fiber and capable of producing 1,971 kilonewtons of thrust, more powerful than past models, according to the North's official Korean Central News Agency. The report came a week after Kim visited the research institute that developed the engine, which North Korea then said will be used for future intercontinental ballistic missles, including a system called Hwasong-20.

Some analysts say that North Korea may conduct another ICBM test around the end of the year, showcasing its military strength ahead of a major ruling party congress expected in early 2026, where Kim will likely issue his new directions in domestic and foreign

flight-tested a variety of ICBMs that demonstrated potential range to reach the U.S. mainland, including those with built-in solid propellants that are easier to move and conceal and can be prepared for launch more quickly than the North's previous liquid-fuel missiles.

Kim has called for further advancements in North Korea's long-range weapons, including the development of multi-warhead systems that would improve their chances of defeating missile defenses. Some experts say North Korea's efforts to build more efficient rocket engines could also be aimed at developing smaller ICBMs that can be launched from a wider range of vehicles or submarines, a capability Kim is also pursuing.

All of North Korea's ICBM tests so far have been conducted at steeper-than-normal trajectories to avoid neighboring territories, and experts say the country may not yet have perfected the technology needed to ensure its warheads survive the harsh conditions of atmospheric re-entry.

KCNA said Kim expressed satisfaction after Monday's test, calling the "eye-opening" development of the new rocket engine a "significant change" in his effort to expand North Korea's nuclear forces.

Lee Sung Joon, spokesperson for South Korea's Joint Chiefs of Staff, said South Korea and the United States are closely monitoring North Korea's weapons development but did not provide a specific assessment of the new rocket engine.

Thailand's former PM to serve 1-year prison term for previous convictions

BANGKOK, Sept 9, (AP): Thailand's Supreme Court said Tuesday former Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra must serve a one-year prison term for previous convictions on graft and abuse of power charges, after investigating whether officials had mishandled his return to Thailand in 2023 to begin serving the sentences.

A judge said that the enforcement of Thaksin's penalty was not done properly, and therefore his detention in a police hospital did not count as serving prison time.

Following his return to Thailand after more than a decade of living in self-exile, Thaksin was sent to a suite at Bangkok's Police General Hospital in the middle of the night, reportedly for medical reasons, after spending less than a day in prison. His eight-year sentence was then commuted to one year by King Maha Vajiralongkorn, and he was released on parole after six months in the hospital.

The circumstances raised questions about whether he received special treatment and many were suspicious whether he was genuinely ill.

The court's statement Tuesday said evidence showed that Thaksin's condition on that night was treatable by the prison's hospital, but that he was instead sent directly to the police hospital without first being as-

sessed by prison doctors, which was a violation of procedures.

It also said that the police hospital's request for an extension of his stay claimed that Thaksin needed urgent neck surgery, but a record showed that he received surgeries for a locked finger joint and tendonitis in his right shoulder, which were not serious conditions and not what originally sent him to the hospital. The court added Thaksin did not end up having neck surgery before his release.

It also said that Thaksin was believed to have intervened in the treatment procedures to avoid having to go back to the prison, and that he falsely claimed having a health condition in order to be sent to the hospital.

Thaksin was sent to the Bangkok Remand Prison after the proceedings. A message on his Facebook page, shared by his team following the ruling, said that he accepted the court's decision.

10 dead and more than 50 injured after double-decker bus hit by train in Mexico

ATLACOMULCO, Mexico, Sept 9, (AP): The freight train's horn rang out shortly before it cleaved in two a double-decker bus carrying domestic and construction workers to Mexico's capital on Monday morning, leaving at least 10 dead, more than 50 injured and sending families to hospitals to search for answers.

Minutes earlier Isabel Segundo, 38, was chatting by phone with her 17-yearold daughter Yoana Segundo, who was aboard the bus. Like thousands of others. Yoana is a domestic worker and was commuting to her job as the sun rose over throngs of workers doing the same early Monday.

"I was terrified when I saw news of the accident. I thought my daughter had died," Segundo said. "We were calling and calling, and all I got was voice-

Late Monday, Segundo said she was relieved to hear her daughter survived as she waited outside a hospital with dozens of other families. Medical workers called out names through a megaphone as hospital staff rushed injured people on stretchers into ambulances to be transferred to other hospitals throughout the State of Mexico.

Women cried at the entrance of the medical facility, while others set up a tent in preparation for a long night of waiting to hear of news of their loved ones.

Authorities were investigating the accident, but videos of the collision and

immediate aftermath showed the bus creeping onto the train tracks as bumper-to-bumper traffic crawled through an industrial area in Atlacomulco, about 80 miles (130 kilometers) northwest of Mexico City.

There was a stop sign and a decrepit railroad crossing sign, but no protective gates or lights to signal an approaching

Still, even 100 yards away Miguel Sánchez heard the familiar horn blast from the freight train as he started his

shift at a nearby gas station.

It was the thunderous crash that followed shortly after that surprised him.

"We thought it was just a car. We never thought it would be a bus with so many people aboard," Sánchez said.

Mexico's train line regulatory authority did not respond to request for comment. The bus line Herradura de Plata said in a statement it was working with authorities and providing "medical, psychological, legal and logistical" help to those affected. The company spokesperson wrote that it "deeply regrets" the accident.

80 killed in ADF rebel attack in eastern DR Congo

KINSHASA, Sept 9, (Agencies): At least 80 people were killed overnight Monday to Tuesday in an attack blamed on Allied Democratic Forces (ADF) rebels in eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), local authorities confirmed to Xinhua on Tuesday.

The attack targeted a funeral gathering in the village of Ntoyo, said Colonel Alain Kiwewa, administrator of Lubero territory in the eastern North Kivu province, putting the provisional death toll at around 80, while adding that several people remain missing or were taken hostage by the assailants.

The ADF, an Islamic State affiliate in Central Africa and a Ugandan-origin armed group, has escalated assaults on villages in North Kivu and Ituri provinces in recent months, mainly targeting civilians. According to the UN Stabiliza-

tion Mission in the DRC, the assaults claimed at least 52 lives on Aug. 9-16 in North Kivu. In late July, some 40 civilians were killed during an attack on a Catholic church in Ituri Joint Congolese and Ugandan mili-

tary operations against the ADF have been underway since November 2021, but attacks have persisted.

Witnesses belonging to a militia and a civil society group participating in the protest in the city of Uvira in South Kivu province said members of Congo's military opened fire on the protesters and killed at least four of them and injured seven.

But South Kivu Gov. Jean-Jacques Purusi Sadiki said the regional government's death toll so far was three, with five people wounded. He said the victims were "unarmed protesters," and gave his condolences to victims, but he declined to say who had opened fire.

The protesters accused Gen. Olivier Gasita, a commander recently deployed to the city by the Congolese military, of supporting the Rwanda-backed M23 rebels and demanded his removal. Gen. Gasita denied the allegation and urged the locals to "remain united behind the institutions" of the government.

Marafiki Masimango said his civil society group in Uvira organized a march on Gasita's hotel with a document calling for the officer's resignation. Members of the Walazendo militia group, which often fights alongside Congolese forces, joined the demonstration.

Hegseth and Caine visit Puerto Rico

US steps up military ops in Caribbean

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, Sept 9, (AP): US Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth and Air Force Gen. Dan Caine, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, arrived in Puerto Rico on Monday for an unexpected visit as the US steps up its military operations against drug cartels in the Caribbean.

Their arrival in the US territory comes more than a week after ships carrying hundreds of US Marines deployed to Puerto Rico for what officials said was a training exercise, a move that some on the island have criticized.

But on Monday night, Hegseth said in a video posted on X that the deployed Marines were "on the front lines of defending the American homeland."

"Make no mistake about it, what you're doing right now is not training. This is the real-world exercise on behalf of the vital national interest of the United States of America to end the poisoning of the American people," he said while aboard the USS Iwo Jima.

Earlier in the day, Puerto Rico's Gov Jenniffer González said Hegseth and Caine visited on behalf of President Donald Trump's administration to support those participating in the

Real estate transactions dip sharply in early Sept

Market shows 55% decline

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 9: The real estate market witnessed a significant decline in the number and value of transactions in the first week of September, compared to the same period last year, as well as the last week of August.

This is a clear indication that the market has entered a period of relative calm and investment anticipation driven by seasonal factors and qualitative shifts in transactions, particularly commercial real estate, which accounted for about 60 percent of the total trading value during the week, compared to only three

It reflects the interest of major institutions or entities in 'heavy' commercial transactions.

The weekly report of the Real Estate Registration and Documentation Department at the Ministry of Justice for the period from Sept 1 to 3 showed that the number of real estate transactions was 62, with a total value of KD83.92 million. These include 37 private transactions worth KD 13.5 million, 22 investment transactions worth KD 17.6 million, and three commercial transactions worth KD 52.8 million

Compared to the first week of September 2024, weekly trading recorded a decline of approximately 39 percent in the number of transactions, compared to a 16.8 percent increase in total value due to the completion of qualitative commercial deals

The number of transactions during that period reached 101, valued at KD 69.8 million, reflecting a quantitative decline versus a qualitative increase in transactions on an an-

Compared to trading during the fourth (and final) week of August 2025, the decline was more severe, with 139 transactions recorded, valued at KD 163.24 million. This is a decline of approximately 55 percent in the number of transactions (77 transactions) and a 49 percent decrease in the value or KD 79.32 million.

It is a clear indication that the market has entered a shortterm slowdown after a remarkable wave of activity in Au-

Regarding private real estate transactions, they declined from 89 in the last week of August to just 37, a decrease of nearly 58 percent. The value also fell from KD 33.4 million to KD 13.5 mil-

lion — by KD19.9 million, a decrease of nearly 60 percent. This indicates a decline in residential ownership activity due to travel or investors' anticipation of market movements following the recent enactment of several real estate

Despite the decline in the number of investment transactions from 28 in August 2025 to 22 in September, the value of transactions increased to KD 17.6 million, compared to KD 15.3 million in August.

It means continued demand for investment properties and the search for attractive, quality opportunities.

As for commercial transactions, only three transactions were recorded this week, worth KD52.8 million or 60 percent of the total weekly trading value.

Global demand, prices drive decline

KPC cuts propane to \$520, butane to \$490 per ton

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 9: In view of the decline in demand for propane and butane gases, and following Kuwait Petroleum Corporation's (KPC) announcement of new prices – \$520 per metric ton for propane and \$490 per metric ton for butane – KPC confirmed that these revised prices were set in line with market demand.

Sources explained that this adjustment also followed a decline in global prices for the two gases. In June, KPC sold propane at \$600 per metric ton, reflecting a 1.64 percent decrease compared to \$610 in May.

The price of butane also dropped in June, falling by 3.39 percent to \$570 per metric ton, compared to \$590 in May. Sources pointed out that the intense political developments in the Middle East during the final months of 2024

affected transportation, which was the main driver behind the surge in propane and butane prices in December 2024. According to KPC's records for the last month of that year, propane was priced at approximately \$635 per metric

In the same context, sources confirmed that Kuwait National Petroleum Company (KNPC), a leading exporter of propane and butane, is planning to expand production in the

ton, while butane stood at \$630.

KNPC is working toward raising its export volume to

7,000 metric tons in fiscal 2025/2026 to increase revenues and maximize profits over the current and following two years. This comes after successfully exporting more than 6,200 metric tons of propane and butane in fiscal 2024/2025, compared to approximately 5,278 metric tons in the previ-

Sources pointed out that propane and butane have significant applications in Europe, particularly in power generation and heating, in addition to their role as intermediate feedstocks in the petrochemical industry. They explained that KNPC is a leading exporter of several gases – including methane, ethane, propane, and butane – produced from the fifth liquefied natural gas (LNG) train. The company, they emphasized, is focused on diversifying income sources by expanding its range of refinery products.

According to KNPC's 2024/2025 report, the company's net production of petroleum products during that period reached approximately 40.56 million metric tons, compared to 39.42 million metric tons projected in the plan. The report also indicated that KNPC's share of refined petroleum products in 2023/2024 stood at around 40.04 million metric tons.

KNPC's most important products include naphtha, gasoline, reformate, kerosene, jet fuel, gas oil, diesel and fuel oil. The fifth liquefied gas line at the Mina Al-Ahmadi refinery enhanced the company's production capacity, playing a key role in generating higher returns and contributing to the supply of clean fuel



This is followed by a practical application phase from October to December 2025 with school collection points activated and creative upcycling activities for non-functional devices. The initiative concludes in January 2026 with evaluation, publication of an environmental and technical report, and recognition of distinguished schools and stakeholders.

Implementation Mechanism and Partnerships

The initiative follows an integrated participatory approach based on institutional collaboration that engages ministries and government authorities along with leading national private sector companies. Field implementation includes monthly workshops and talks across Kuwait's six governorates.

The campaign focuses on waste management by placing dedicated containers as central collection points inside schools and transporting devices using approved waste management processes to certified recycling partners. Rigorous documentation and follow-up include measuring collected volumes and issuing interim and final reports. The initiative aims to involve students in volunteer work, encourage parents to drop off old devices at collection points, and build partnerships with cooperative societies and civil society organizations to maximize impact.

India urges BRICS to address ongoing global conflicts

NEW DELHI, Sept 9, (KUNA): India called upon the BRICS countries to focus attention on ongoing conflicts along with its current focus on stabilizing the international economy and reforming the world order.

Addressing the BRICS Leaders' Summit on Monday, Indian External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar said that the state of the world today, is a

The virtual summit meeting was hosted by Brazilian President Luis Inacio Lula da Silva.

"The last few years have witnessed the devastating impact of the Covid pandemic, major conflicts in Ukraine and the Middle East, volatility in trade and investment flows, extreme climate events and a discernible slowing down of the SDG Agenda," Jaishankar said in a speech on behalf of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

The BRICS countries are discussing these challenges as the multilateral system appears to be failing the world and so many serious concerns are being left unaddressed, he said.

"Today, the focus is on stabiliz-

ing the international economy and the world order. But it is equally essential that we turn our attention to ongoing conflicts, not least because they have direct developmental and supply chain implications," he said.

He also pointed out to the weight of the members of BRICS as they represent a broad diversity of societies underlining the need to find common ground between ational noli the basis of common challenges.

Jaishankar appealed to maintain fair and transparent economic practices that are to everyone's benefit

"When there are multiple disruptions, our objective should be to proof it against such shocks. That means creating more resilient, reliable, redundant and shorter supply chains.

"Not just that, it is also essential that we democratize manufacturing and production and encourage their growth in different geographies," he went on.

He criticised linking trade measures to non-trade matters and asserted that trade barriers and complicating transactions will not help.

"The world requires constructive and cooperative approaches to promote trade that is sustainable. The BRICS itself can set an example by reviewing trade flows among its member states," he stated.

He also appealed to protect the international trading system which he said is based on the foundational principles of open, fair, transparent, non-discriminatory, inclusive, equitable and a rules-based approach.

"Where shipping is targeted, not just trade but livelihoods also suffer. A selective protection cannot be a global answer. An early end to the hostilities and undertaking diplomacy to ensure a durable solution is the obvious pathway before us," he said.

LOS ANGELES, Sept 9, (AP): At a Home Depot parking lot, a man patrols on a bicycle for federal immigration agents, toting a megaphone on his hip so he can blast a warning to day laborers waiting to land a landscaping or construction job.

Their work is cut out for them. Agents have raided the lot outside the 108,000 square-foot Home Depot store in the Van Nuys neighborhood of Los Angeles at least five times this summer, rounding up some immigrants and sending others running in search of safety.

Home Depot stores in Southern California have long been an informal jobseeking hub for day laborers in the country both legally and illegally. Now the locations have become a prime target for immigration agents.

In fact, Home Depot was reportedly mentioned as a target for immigration raids by Stephen Miller, the White House deputy chief of staff and chief architect of President Donald Trump's immigration policies, earlier this year. At least a dozen Home Depot stores have been targeted, some of them repeat-

edly, in Southern California since the administration stepped up its immigration crackdown this summer. Immigrant advocates sued over the raids but on Monday the Supreme Court cleared the way for federal agents to continue conducting sweeping immigration

operations for now in Los Angeles, the latest victory for the Trump administration at the high court. Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem called it "a win" for the rule of law, while advocates swiftly criticized the ruling. "When you undermine the civil rights of those who are more vulnerable, you undermine the civil rights of everyone else," Pablo Alvarado, co-executive direc-

tor of the National Day Laborer Organizing Network, said Monday during a press conference held near a Home Depot. Last month, outside a Home Depot in Monrovia, a man ran onto a nearby freeway to flee immigration authorities, and was struck and killed.

The Van Nuys location has been hit particularly hard. Javier, a 52-year-old Mexican immigrant who has lived in U.S. states spanning from California to Kansas over the past three decades, said he narrowly escaped

three raids at the store, avoiding agents by hiding beneath a truck, peeling off in his car and dashing inside among the busy shoppers. "They come in big vans and they all go out to chase people," he said in Spanish, asking that his last name not be used out of fear of government

The store sits on property near the Van Nuys Airport that is owned by Los Angeles World Airports, a department in a city whose policies limit cooperation with

federal immigration enforcement. Los Angeles Mayor Karen Bass said in a statement that her office supports the litigation against the sweeps and has trained city workers to prepare for immigra-

tion enforcement on city-owned properties.

City councilperson Ysabel Jurado has voiced opposition to a plan for a new Home Depot in her district, contending the company hasn't done enough to fight

Chris Newman, legal director for the National Day Laborer Organizing Network, said "these locations should be protected by the city to the same degree the public libraries are."

The Department of Homeland Security did not respond to a request for com-

Immigrant advocates say the country's largest big-box home improvement retailer benefits from having an ample labor pool at the ready for contractors and should do more to protect customers, employees and day laborers.

The Atlanta-based company, with nearly \$160 billion in annual sales through Feb. 2, counts on contractors and professionals for about half its business - and that's a key draw for largely immigrant-day laborers. Its second-ranked competitor, Lowe's, gets about 30% of its business from contractors, relying more heavily on homeowners and DIY enthusiasts, said Neil Saunders, managing director of GlobalData Retail

"So if you're going for the volume, if you're going where people are, and you

can enforce things, you go to Home Depot," Saunders said.

The raids haven't hurt overall sales, but the disruptions could affect specific

stores by making some customers afraid to shop there, Saunders said.

In the Los Angeles area, the company's stores saw a 10.7% decline in foot traffic in June from a year ago and a 10% decline in July, according to Placer.ai, an analytics firm that tracks people's movements based on cellphone usage. That's a larger drop than the 3.8% and 2.7% declines reported at stores nationwide for the same months.

Home Depot has repeatedly denied being involved in immigration enforcement operations. The company's late co-founder Bernie Marcus supported Trump, though a Home Depot political action committee has donated to both Democrats

and Republicans. The company said it isn't told if a raid is going to take place at any of its roughly 2.300 stores.

"We tell associates to report any suspected immigration enforcement activity immediately and not engage with the activity for their safety," said Beth Marlowe, a company spokesperson, adding that if employees feel uneasy after a raid, they can go home for the rest of the day with pay.

In Van Nuys, witnesses said federal agents have arrested those in the lot before appearing to ask about their immigration status. Local managers have shut the store's automated glass doors to keep agents out, they said.

"They're just fishing," said Luis, a 37-year-old day laborer who is a legal resident and grew up in the United States after arriving from Mexico as a child. He declined to use his last name fearing government reprisal.

The trend of workers gathering outside Home Depot began with the rise of the home improvement retail store that allowed people, including contractors, to price shop and buy materials directly, said Nik Theodore, a professor of urban planning and policy at the University of Illinois in Chicago. "The basis of competition began to shift and what distinguishes a contractor

from getting the bid or not more and more has to do with labor costs," Theodore said. "Home Depot is not an innocent bystander in all of this. Their sources of success were instrumental in catalyzing this change.' As the trend grew so did complaints about workers congregating in store parking lots, and in 2008 Los Angeles passed an ordinance requiring similar retailers

opening up to adopt plans to provide relief, such as a seating area, bathrooms and In the parking lot in Van Nuys, a non-profit runs a labor center that takes work-

ers' names and tracks employers who fail to pay as promised. That's one reason workers said they keep returning even after the repeated raids. Since the raids, Javier said he's started considering returning to Mexico to wait

out the Trump administration. In the meantime, he said he'll keep coming to Van

"It's a place that becomes familiar," he said. "Here, all of us together, we've

Actor offers insight into family life, creativity and addiction

Sheen talks his road to sobriety ahead of memoir release

NEW YORK, Sept 9, (AP): Charlie Sheen said fatherhood quickly occupied his life when he got sober eight years ago.

"It turned into just an interesting daily grind of just sudden responsibility and, you know, having to answer the call and it was amazing," Sheen said Monday, telling an audience that once he "finally put down the bottle," his children started coming to his home.


Sheen sat down with actor and writer David Duchovny during an event at 92nd Street Y, New York on Monday to discuss the writing process behind his memoir, "The Book of Sheen," his journey through sobriety and his passion for acting.

The actor battled addiction throughout his decadeslong career. Writing about it candidly, as he does in his book set to be released Tuesday, took years of selfreflection, he said.

Sheen grew up on film sets and began creating home movies as a young child, before getting his big break starring in movies like "Platoon" and "Wall Street." His decorated career in Hollywood, however, was accompanied by decades of drug abuse, legal battles, an HIV diagnosis and messy divorces.

"I'm a good guy," Sheen said. "Good guys sometimes do some bad things but the only way to stay a good guy is to own that (expletive) and move forward.'

Amid jokes and lighthearted prodding, Duchovny

applauded the memoir, which he described as "not vindictive at all. There's no animus against any other person in the book, even yourself, which I really appreciate. Not just your gentleness with other people, but your gentleness with yourself."

The book chronicles Sheen's life from a near-death experience during his birth in 1965 to the moment he decided to get sober in 2017. It carries a unique writing style, with certain words purposefully misspelled and instead written the way Sheen sees them in his mind, he said. Dude, for instance, became "dood."

Sheen said he was inspired by the narration and rhythm in "Apocalypse Now," the 1979 film his father, Martin Sheen, starred in.

"I wanted it to feel like the reader was kind of in the room with me or at the small dinner party hearing this story," he said.

His drug addiction and recovery is at the center of the book and addressed in the latter half of the discussion. Sheen spoke on the "intense sexual component" of a lot of the drugs he grew reliant on, including cocaine. When substance abuse is "the first bridge you build," the actor said, "that's the one you'll keep walking across.'

Sheen said he figured out early on that alcohol helped calm his stutter, which had negatively impacted his acting, and it turned into "the most difficult drug for me to deal with.

"The only part of the drinking that I could navigate was the first hour," Sheen said. "But, it's the next 500 hours or just the next 12 hours. So, once I can just abandon that fantasy of living inside that hour, then it is not a big deal."

Sheen struggled to answer whether he'd be open

to acting in the future, noting that "writing the book was the most challenging job I've ever had and hands down the most rewarding one.

"It was incredible to have a job where I didn't have to get approval ... it's just you and the page," he said. 'Maybe I need to write the next thing I act in.'

Sheen's career began young, making home movies with childhood friends like the Penn brothers, Chris and Sean, in the Malibu, California, neighborhood he

Clips from the movies, which had previously only been enjoyed by family and friends, will be featured in Sheen's upcoming Netflix two-part documentary, "aka Charlie Sheen," which will be released Wednesday.

The movies, Sheen said, had simple plots, often revolving around a crime, a villain and someone seeking revenge. They were filmed on old cameras with props handed down by his father, Martin Sheen, and the Penn brother's parents, who were actors and direc-

"Everybody was surfing or skateboarding or doing other stuff and we just found a way to, just kind of emulate or mimic or copy what our parents were doing," Sheen said.

The documentary, which includes interviews with Sean, felt like "the perfect place for them to finally be put on full display," he said.

Harry visits late queen's grave

LONDON, Sept 9, (AP): Prince Harry arrived in the UK on Monday for a visit to his charities, sparking speculation about whether he will meet with his father, King Charles III, for the first time in 19 months.

Amid signs of a thaw in the frigid relationship between Harry and the rest of the royal family, British media suggest that the prince's trip to London on Monday's third anniversary of the death of Oueen Elizabeth II provides an opening for a long-overdue rapprochement between Charles, 76, and his estranged son. Harry visited the monarch's grave in Windsor to offer his respects and lay flowers.

The last time Harry and Charles met was in February 2024, when the prince flew to London after receiving news that his father had been diagnosed with cancer. Harry spent about 45 minutes with Charles before the king flew to his Sandringham country estate to recuperate from his treatment.

Harry was last in London in April, when the Court of Appeal rejected his bid to restore a police protection detail that was canceled after he stopped being a working royal. Charles was on a state visit to Italy at the time, so a meeting was impossible.

Impediment

That case was itself an impediment to improved relations because it involved Harry criticizing the king's government in the courts. But once it was over, change became possible.

Immediately after the case ended, Harry said he would "love reconciliation with my family."

"There's no point in continuing to fight anymore," he told the BBC on the day the court case was resolved. "Life is precious. I don't know how much longer my father has.'

Despite that olive branch, Harry struck a combative tone that might torpedo hopes of repairing the family breach. The prince repeatedly said that the decision to withdraw his security was made at the direction of the royal household in an effort to control him and his wife while putting their safety at risk.

"What I'm struggling to forgive, and what I will probably always struggle to forgive, is the decision that was made in 2020 that affects my every single day and that is knowingly putting me and my family in harm's way," Harry

But with the lawsuit out of the way, the mood music coming from Charles and Harry's supporters seemed to change.

In July, the new team handling Harry and Meghan's communications, headed by Los Angeles-based Meredith Maines, was seen on the balcony of a private members' club in London speaking with Tobyn Andreae, the king's press representative. The Mail on Sunday was on hand to snap a photo of what the paper called: "The secret Harry peace summit."

'Wake Up, Dead Man' explores faith, family, and forgiveness

Johnson takes Close to church in new mystery

TORONTO, Sept 9, (AP): The morning after Rian Johnson premiered his latest whodunit "Wake Up, Dead Man: A Knives Out Mystery," he and one of his stars, Glenn Close, were debating billing.

Not among the main cast, which considering

all the stars in "Wake Up, Dead Man" - Daniel Craig, Josh O'Connor, Josh Brolin, Mila Kunis, to name a few - would be a headache for any filmmaker to sort. But for an uncredited one: Close's dog, Pip, who very briefly appears in the movie.

"And he's got a pain in the butt for an agent," chuckles Johnson.

In each "Knives Out" movie, Johnson has assembled some of his favorite actors and managed to give nearly all of them a moment to shine. "Wake Up, Dead Man" is no different; there are numerous standout performances. But one of them, most definitely, is Close's, whose connections to Johnson's film run deeper than her Havanese's cameo.

"When Rian called, it was so thrilling," Close says. "I had heard about what a good guy he was before I talked to him. And to be on set with him was really something. It's such a delicate chemistry when you're putting a cast

In "Wake Up, Dead Man," Johnson, drawing on G.K. Chesterton's Father Brown mysteries, shifts from the Greek isles of "Glass Onion" to an upstate New York church. A young priest named Jud Duplenticy (O'Connor) has been sent to aid a flagging church led by Brolin's monsignor, a charismatic but tyrannical figure. Much of the cast make up his loyal flock, with Close's Martha Delacroix as his most devout follower.

"Knives Out" has forged its own community. When "Wake Up, Dead Man" premiered over the weekend at the Toronto International Film Festival, it was the third of the three movies to launch here, and the most eagerly anticipated film of the festival. The movie, which Netflix will release in theaters Nov. 26 before it

streams two weeks later, has plenty of the comic elements of the first two "Knives Out" films. But it's less satirical when it comes to questions of faith and belief.

"For me, that's where this whole thing came from," Johnson says. "I grew up Protestant and what we'd now term evangelical. I was very Christian growing up and not just my parents dragging me to church. Through my early 20s, I really was entirely in it and framed the world around through my relationship with Christ. It was a big, big part of my life. And it's not anymore. But anyone who is a lapsed Christian,

you still carry so much with you. And it's this backdrop of sincere reckoning with religion that makes "Wake Up, Dead Man" more than a simple part for the 78-yearold Close. When Close was 7, her parents moved from Greenwich, Connecticut, to join with Moral Re-Armament, a religious movement Close has called a cult. For years, it dictated much of her life, including what she wore and said. Close later joined with an outgrowth of that movement, the conservative performance troupe Up With People, before quitting

at age 22. Acting, she has said, saved her. "I just think religion has been responsible for most of the things human beings have done to each other," Close says. "It's very hard for me not to look at religion as a way of controlling people. It's more political for me. I do think there's something in the human psyche that we don't know who we are, where we came from and where we're going. I think we're tribal creatures and the comfort you can get from a community, whether religious or not, is pal-

When Johnson decided to reach out to Close for the role, he was aware of her history. But his

sociation, which includes music executives,

reasons were simpler. He hoped to cast Close, he says, because "she's one of the best actors of our generation.'

The truth is, it's a part that calls for somebody who can both have fun with a certain degree of archness with it but ultimately can land the real emotional truth," says Johnson. "And that's a very, very tall order.'

The less said, the better is generally the case with the narratives of the "Knives Out" movies. But it's fair to say that Close, after making an impeccably timed entrance, fills Martha with an uncommon amount of depth in a performance ranging from comic to tragic.

Career

"I love characters that have this crazy belief that others can look from the outside and say, 'Whoa, that's over the top.' But it's real," says Close, whose celebrated career has included films like "Dangerous Liaisons" and "Fatal Attraction.

From the first "Knives Out," Johnson set out to draw Agatha Christie-style mysteries - usually quaint period pieces - into the present day. Though "Wake Up, Dead Man" doesn't sharpen its knives for Christianity quite the way the previous films did for MAGA hat-wearers in "Knives Out" or tech bros in "Glass Onion," it doesn't ignore political connections, either. There's a DOGE mention, among other refer-

"When you talk about Christianity in America today, it's hard not to talk about politics." says Johnson. "For me, growing up in the evangelical church, right into the rise of Reaganism. it was kind of the crucible of the Christian right. I obviously have a lot of thoughts about that, but I also grew up with a very personal relationship with Christ. I also have a deep feeling about the stuff I took from Christianity that's positive, which is largely just the stuff Jesus actually said, is exactly what the world most needs right now. And that's the irony of it."

Johnson adds: "You're trying to thread the needle in terms of having an actual conversation about this, instead of just wagging your finger and saying 'How could you think this, or how can you think that?' on both sides.'

Murder mysteries ultimately deal in justice and meting out moral determinations. But "Wake Up, Dead Man" makes room, also, for understanding and grace in a way that, in many ways, goes against whodunit conventions.

"I really believe the hardest thing for a human being to do is to forgive," Close says. "And I'm not even talking in a religious context. Especially now. It goes so against our basest instincts. When you forgive, you stop the circle."

Now that "Knives Out" has become a trilogy, or, rather, a trinity, it's natural to wonder if "Wake Up, Dead Man" is also closing a loop for Johnson. The writer-director has begun writing something original outside of the series, but, he says, that doesn't mean he's moving on.

"Three is the smallest number where you can establish and then break a pattern. For me, it was largely about showing how these movies can be anything," Johnson says. "It's not so much the closing of a chapter, so much as the promise, hopefully, that as long as Daniel and I can keep getting ourselves excited about these things, we can keep making them."

"Wake Up, Dead Man," of course, also brings some parts of Close's life full circle. When Martha's big moment comes in a dramatic scene inside the church, Close says, "the thing that was kind of a surprise was how real it became.'

While he did return Monday, Stern did not announce that he had reached a new contract with SiriusXM. His current deal expires at the end of 2025. (AP)

Activists link artwork to Palestine Action ban

New Banksy mural of a judge beating protester to be removed

elusive street artist Banksy showing a judge beating an unarmed protester with a gavel will be removed from a wall outside one of London's most iconic courts, authorities said

The mural appeared Monday and depicts a protester lying on the ground holding a bloodsplattered placard while a judge in a traditional wig and black gown beats him with a gavel. Banksy posted a photo of the work on Instagram, his usual method of claiming a work as authentic. It was captioned "Royal Courts Of Justice. London."

Security officials outside the courthouse covered the artwork Monday with sheets of black plastic and two metal barriers, and it was being guarded by two officers and a security

Because the Victorian gothic revival style building is 143 years old, the mural will be removed with consideration for its historical

significance, according to HM Courts and Tri-

"The Royal Courts of Justice is a listed building and HMCTS are obliged to maintain its original character," it said in a statement. Listed buildings are considered the country's most significant historic buildings and sites and are protected by law.

While the artwork doesn't refer to a particular cause or incident, activists saw it as a reference to the UK government's ban on the group Palestine Action. On Saturday almost 900 people were arrested at a London protest challenging the ban.

Defend Our Juries, the group that organized the protest, said in a statement that the mural "powerfully depicts the brutality unleashed" by the government ban.

"When the law is used as a tool to crush civil liberties, it does not extinguish dissent, it strengthens it," the statement said.

The courts have weighed in on the Palestine

Action case, with judges initially rejecting the organization's request to appeal its ban. A High Court court judge then allowed the appeal to go forward, though the government is now challenging that decision.

Banksy began his career spray-painting buildings in Bristol, England, and has become one of the world's best-known artists. His paintings and installations sell for millions of dollars at auction and have drawn thieves and

Banksy's work often comments on political issues, with many of his pieces criticizing government policy on migration and war.

At the Glastonbury Festival last year, an inflatable raft holding dummies of migrants in life jackets was unveiled during a band's headline set. Banksy appeared to claim the stunt, which was thought to symbolize small boat crossings of migrants in the English Channel, in a post

The artist has also taken his message on mi-

gration to Europe.
In 2019, "The Migrant Child," depicting a shipwrecked child holding a pink smoke bomb and wearing a life jacket, was unveiled in Venice, Italy. In 2018, a number of works including one near a former center for migrants that depicted a child spray-painting wallpaper over a swastika were discovered in Paris.

Banksy has also created numerous artworks in the West Bank and Gaza Strip over the years, including one depicting a girl conducting a body search on an Israeli soldier, another showing a dove wearing a flak jacket, and a masked protester hurling a bouquet of flowers. He designed the "Walled Off Hotel" guesthouse in Bethlehem, which closed in October

Last summer, Banksy captured London's attention with an animal-themed collection, which concluded with a mural of a gorilla appearing to hold up the entrance gate to London

Violence against judges should not be public service cost

Justice Barrett reflects on historic cases in memoir

WASHINGTON, Sept 9, (AP): Supreme Court Justice Amy Coney Barrett says "violence or threats of violence" against judges shouldn't be the cost of public service.

But in an interview at the court with The Associated Press about her new book, "Listening to the Law: Reflections on the Court and Constitution," Barrett was not willing to join other judges who have called on President Donald Trump to tone down rhetoric demonizing judges.

She said there "has been a lot of clear polarization" that has "spilled over into a bad place, spilled into a bad place when it comes to these acts of political violence.'

Along with other justices she said she has received death threats following the court's decision in 2022 that overturned Roe v. Wade's right to an abortion.

At 53, Barrett is the youngest member of the court. She said she wrote the book, for which she received a reported \$2 million advance, to make the nation's highest court accessible to non-law-

Barrett joined the court in 2020, just over a month after Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg died and Trump chose Barrett to replace her. In her book, the Republican president gets just a few mentions, mainly in connection with her nomination and confirmation.

She dealt with the court's 2024 decision that spared Trump from prosecution for his efforts to

overturn his 2020 election loss without even us-

ing his name or explaining the decision. "For example, when a former president was indicted - a historical first - the court took the case to decide whether he could be prosecuted for his official acts," Barrett wrote. She joined most of Chief Justice John Roberts' majority opinion.

Even as Barrett writes about political polarization across the country, she does not address what role Trump may have played in it. The book does not deal with events of his second term, which began in January, about when Barrett said she was wrapping up the writing.

The court's consideration of the president and executive power "necessarily has to be detached from the current occupant of the office because ... the court has to think about things in the context of the broad sweep of history, of the presidents who have come before and the presidents who will come later. And so the court in deciding cases about executive power, it really is focused on the presidency rather than the president," Bar-

In the interview and in subsequent public appearances, Barrett downplayed the idea that the nation is facing a constitutional crisis or dealing with unprecedented events.

"It's hard to say when you look over all of history that there haven't been times in which that disagreement has been even more acute," she said, listing the Civil War, Vietnam war protests

and the Great Depression.

The book is being published Tuesday by Sentinel, a conservative imprint of Penguin Random

Barrett wrote clearly on two topics that suggest some disagreement with the president. Trump signed an executive order last month requiring the Justice Department to investigate and prosecute people for burning the American flag, despite a 1989 high court decision protecting the act

as political speech.

Barrett wrote admiringly of the free-speech votes of Justices Anthony Kennedy and Antonin Scalia, for whom she once worked, despite their personal distaste for burning the flag.

Without reference to Trump and his musings about seeking a third presidential term, Barrett also noted the clarity of the two-term limit added to the Constitution in 1951. "That clear imperative - now memorialized

in our binding law - leaves no room for secondguessing," she wrote. Barrett was the last of Trump's three appoin-

tees to join the court, cementing a conservative supermajority that has moved quickly to undo the constitutional right to abortion, end affirmative action in education, expand gun rights and make it harder to sustain government regulations. In a series of emergency orders this year, Barrett has mainly been in the majority to allow Trump to move ahead with plans to remake the federal government, even after lower-court judges have found some of his actions likely illegal.

The decision to overturn Roe hinged on Barrett's vote. At the time, she was the junior justice and the last to vote when the court met in a private conference following arguments.

In all likelihood, when it came her turn to speak, the court would have been split 4 to 4 on the central question of overturning nearly 50 years of high court precedent.

Rick Davies dies

Maestro Dohnányi passes away at 95

CLEVELAND, Sept 9, (AP): Christoph von Dohnányi, a conductor acclaimed for performances as music director of the Cleveland Orchestra from 1984 to 2002, has died at age 95.

Dohnányi died in Munich on Saturday, the Cleveland Orchestra said in a statement Monday.

"A grand seigneur among the great international conductors to whom the Salzburg Festival owes its world reputation," Salzburg Festival artistic director Markus Hinterhäuser said in statement.

Dohnányi was most known for his time in Cleveland, helping burnish an orchestra led by Szell George from 1946 to 1970 and Lorin Maazel from 1972 to 1982.

"It's an ensemble of musicians who come

somehow from making chamber music," Dohnányi said in a 2011 interview for the Cleveland Orchestra Musicians. "The real, very special (characteristic) about the Cleveland Orchestra is that people, musicians, are used to listen to each other very much. All orchestra should do it, many do it, but very few do it to the extent the Cleveland Orchestra is able to do it."

Showing remarkable stability, the orchestra has been led since his departure by Franz Welser-Möst, who plans to leave in 2027.

Dohnányi was born in Berlin on Sept. 8, 1929, a son of lawyer Hans von Dohnanyi and Christine Bonhoefhoeffer and grandson of the Hungarian composer Ernst von Dohnányi.

"His storied family history gave him a unique musical perspective," Cleveland Orchestra CEO André Gremillet said in statement. "Maestro Dohnányi's artistry and dedication led to a deep mutual respect with our musicians, which was felt sincerely by our audiences."

Hans von Dohnanyi and Bonhoeffer were arrested by Germany's Nazi government in 1943 and executed two years later, according to a timeline Christoph von Dohnányi helped prepare for the Cleveland Orchestra.

Christoph von Dohnánvi initially studied law for two years after World War II, then attended Munich's Musikhochschule to study piano, composition and conducting and coached at the Bavarian State Opera. He studied with his grandfather at Florida State in 1952-53, then at the Boston Symphony Orchestra's Tanglewood Music Center.

LONDON: Rick Davies, the co-founder, singer and songwriter of British band Supertramp, has died after a long battle with cancer, the band said Monday. He

Davies, who co-wrote the band's music with Roger Hodgson, was "the voice and pianist behind Supertramp's most iconic songs, leaving an indelible mark on rock music history," the band said in a statement on its website.

He died Saturday after battling multiple myeloma, a type of blood cancer, for more than a decade, the band said.

Davies and Hodgson formed Supertramp in 1969, and produced hits including "Goodbye Stranger," "Take the Long Way Home," "The Logical Song," and "Give a Little Bit."

The band's 1979 album "Breakfast in America" topped charts in the United States and Ĉanada, won two Grammys and sold over 18 million copies.

The yearlong celebration will kick off on New Year's Day, with a float in the Rose Parade in California. The float "will reflect values of hope, inclusivity, exploration and unity," the franchise representatives wrote in a statement.

The float will also feature the upcoming new series "Star Trek: Starfleet Academy" set to launch in

early 2026 on Paramount+. 
Pest discovery in Maine marks US northeast limit

Invasive, disease-carrying tick found in Maine for first time

PORTLAND, Maine, Sept 9, (AP): Researchers have confirmed the presence of an invasive species of tick in Maine for the first time, marking the farthest northeast in the United States the pest has been discovered.

The University of Maine and state conservation officials said Monday they confirmed the presence of the Asian longhorned tick in the state in July. The tick is native to east Asia, where it is capable of spreading tickborne infections such as spotted fe-

The tick was first confirmed in the United States in New Jersey in 2017 and it has since spread to more than 20 states, clustering mostly around the eastern third of the country. Exactly

how the tick arrived in the country isn't certain, but public health officials have cited possible routes of entry in-

cluding on pets and livestock. "This discovery underscores the critical importance of continued tick surveillance in Maine," said Griffin Dill, director of the UMaine Extension Tick Lab. "While this appears to be an isolated case, we are closely monitoring the situation and coordinating with state and federal partners.

The tick specimen was not yet an adult and it was collected in the southern part of the state, the lab said in a statement. Follow-up surveillance didn't turn up any additional specimens in the surrounding area, the lab

Asian longhorned ticks feed on numerous animals, including cattle and humans. They pose a challenge for pest control authorities because female ticks of the species can reproduce without mating, which means a single individual can create an infestation, the lab said. The specimen found in Maine could not reproduce yet because it was a juvenile, the lab said.

Research is still going on to determine the tick species' ability to spread pathogens in Maine and elsewhere in the US, the lab said. Ticks are a major public health concern in the Northeastern US, where another species, the blacklegged or deer tick, spreads Lyme

In the meantime, the public can prevent tick bites by taking steps such as conducting rigorous checks for them, avoiding overgrown vegetation and wearing protective clothing, public health officials said.

Drug cuts cataplexy attacks by over 80% in studies

New drug offers hope for narcolepsy patients

SINGAPORE & OSAKA, Japan & CAMBRIDGE, Mass, Sept 9, (AP): Takeda has presented data from two global Phase 3 double-blind, placebo-controlled studies of oveporexton (TAK-861), a potential first-in-class investigational oral orexin receptor 2 (OX2R)-selective agonist in narcolepsy type 1 (NT1), during multiple oral presentations at the World Sleep 2025 Congress in Singapore yesterday.

Both the FirstLight (TAK-861-3001) and Radiant-Light (TAK-861-3002) studies met all primary and secondary endpoints demonstrating statistically significant improvement across a broad range of NT1 symptoms compared to placebo with p-values of 0.001 across all doses (twice-daily 1mg/twice-daily 2mg) at week 12. Oveporexton was generally well-tolerated with a safety profile consistent across clinical studies to date. No serious treatment-related adverse events were reported. The most common adverse events were insomnia, urinary urgency and frequency.

NT1 is a chronic, rare neurological disease caused by the loss of orexin neurons in the brain that results in a range of debilitating symptoms, which can severely impact every aspect of life. Currently, the standard available therapies only partially address some of the symptoms people face. As an orexin agonist, oveporexton is designed to fully address a broad range of NT1 symptoms by targeting the underlying orexin deficiency.

"Our research has shown that the loss of orexin is the cause of narcolepsy type 1, which results in symptoms like excessive daytime sleepiness and cataplexy," said Dr. Emmanuel Mignot, M.D., Ph.D.,



Authority still urges vigilance

WOAH confirms Kuwait free of 'foot-and-mouth' disease

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 9: The Public Authority for Agriculture Affairs and Fish Resources (PAAAFR) announced the end of the foot-and-mouth disease (SAT1) outbreak in Kuwait, following the adoption of the final report of the World Organization for Animal Health (WOAH), which officially confirmed the end of the epidemic in the country, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

In a press statement, the Authority praised the efforts of workers in the livestock sector, including the Animal Health and Animal Production departments, medical laboratories and veterinarians, in cooperation with cattle breeders, the Dairy Producers Union and farm workers.

It also stressed the need for farms to remain committed to biosecurity regulations and prompt reporting to the Animal Health Department of any suspected cases, in order to protect livestock and prevent the spread of epidemics.

NASA to begin year-long Mars mission simulation

LOS ANGELES, Sept 9, (Xinhua): Four volunteers will spend a year inside a 3D-printed habitat at NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas State as part of a mission simulation to help prepare for future human exploration of Mars, the agency said

The participants will conduct scientific research and operational tasks, including simulated Mars walks, growing a vegetable gartechnologies designed for Mars and deep space exploration, such as a potable water dispenser and diagnostic medical equipment, according to NASA. The project is part of NASA's Crew

den, robotic operations, and testing

Health and Performance Exploration Analog program, carried out in the 3D-printed habitat to evaluate certain human health and performance factors ahead of future Mars missions.

China launched a new remote sensing satellite from the Wenchang Spacecraft Launch Site in the southern island province of Hainan on Tuesday.

It will be mainly used for scientific experiments, land resource surveys, crop yield estimates, and disaster prevention and relief work.



MILAN, Sept 9, (AP): American historian Josiah Ober, whose studies of Athenian democracy provide insights into current political crises, and US immunologist Carl H. June, who works on gene-

The Switzerland-based Balzan Foundation makes four awards each year in the humanities and hard sciences. Winners receive a total of 800,000 Swiss francs (about \$940,000), half which must be used to support projects by young researchers. The awards were announced in the northern Italian city of Milan and will be presented in Bern, Switzerland on Nov. 14.

The other recipients were Rosalind Krauss, a Columbia University art historian cited for her role in establishing the field of contemporary art history, and French physicist Christophe Salomon, for his work revolutionizing the ultraprecise measurement of time, according to the Balzan Foundation.

Ober, the American historian, is a classics professor at Stanford University and a senior fellow at the Hoover Institution. He was cited for "groundbreaking research" identifying factors behind the success of Athenian democracy, and drawing comparisons with the present day, the foundation said.

"The relevance of the topic is more than obvious, because it is clear in recent times that the Western form of democracy, long considered a model for ideal government, is truly in crisis, adding to the desire to study historic precedents to better understand the deep social and cultural transformations underway," said Christoph Riedweg, a Swiss scholar who read the citations.

June, an immunologist at the University of Pennsylvania, was recognized for having invented a genetically engineered cellular therapy called CAR-T cells that has contributed to the treatment of childhood and adult leukemia, and holds promise for the treatment of autoimmune disease and solid tu-

June runs a lab at Penn's Perelman School of Medicine that focuses on designing new engineered receptors for T-cells and developing improved delivery methods for use in cancer treatment.

"June's pioneering discovery has had a cascading effect that has generated new versions of the CAR-T cells and to engineer new responses in cells," said presenter Alberto Mantovani, an Italian immunologist. "The hope is that the CAR-T cells will help us to treat and heal autoimmune diseases.' for which currently there are no cures.

Krauss, lauded as one of the world's most acclaimed female scholars, was cited as a pioneer in contemporary art history who made it one of the most important disciplines within the broader field. She is the co-founder of the influential magazine "October," and her writings have been translated into many languages.

Salomon, a physicist at the Laboratoire Kastler Brossel Ecole Normale Supérieure in Paris, was cited for "his pioneering contribution in paving the way for the application of ultracold atoms to the creation of atomic clocks which have revolutionized the measurement of time."

Next year's prizes will be awarded in the social science of digital technology, Jewish studies, biodegradable polymers from renewable sources and molecular evolution.

The Balzan Foundation will also make an additional award for Humanity, Peace and Fraternity among People.

After Paris heartbreak, Fraser-Pryce seeks redemption in Tokyo

TOKYO, Sept 9, (AP): It certainly wasn't Shelly-Ann Fraser-Pryce's greatest

But in getting to the core of who she is and how to define the most decorated female 100-meter sprinter to ever put on spikes, that race earlier this year against other parents at her son's sports day at school says a lot.

Fraser-Pryce beat all those parents in the short sprint by a veritable mile. The drone footage of the scene is hilarious. At 38, with enough medals, trophies, and other hardware to fill a warehouse, Fraser-Pryce surely didn't have to line up for

But she was a parent, and her son, Zyon, was a student and ... why not? Did the thought of easing up a bit - letting some lucky mom or dad say she hung with, or beat, the champ - ever cross her mind?

"I would never do that," Fraser-Pryce said with a laugh. "It's not in my DNA to do it. What amazes me is that they actually think they stood a chance!

Fraser-Pryce will be back on the starting line this week for the 100 meters at the world championships in Tokyo - her eighth and, she says, final appearance on track's biggest stage outside of the Olympics.

This is a retirement that has been delayed by a year after things at what was supposed to be her closing act - at the Paris Games a year ago - went dreadfully

It's a chance for the three-time Olympic gold medalist, the champion for women in sports, and the athlete many have watched grow up - from a 21-year-old brace-faced unknown in Beijing to an all-time great - to go out on her own terms. On the day of the 100-meter final in Paris last year, a video of Fraser-Pryce be-

ing denied entry to the stadium popped up on social media. It happened to several sprinters that day, including the American favorite at the time, Sha'Carri Richardson.

The Olympics called it a simple mix-up. The video shows Fraser-Pryce clearly under duress, as she argues that, up to that day, the most important day -- she and other athletes had gone in through the same gate where they were now being denied.

She stood there for around 30 minutes, seeing if the situation would be resolved.

She saw busloads of athletes passing by, watching the scene unfold. She felt hu-

By the time she finally made it to the warmup track, an hour later than scheduled, nothing felt right. If nothing else, finely tuned sprinters are creatures of habit. Fraser-Pryce, running well that season and in the mix for a medal, had lost her mojo.

"I've had injuries before, and I've had setbacks, and I've really been tough and got it done," she said. "And this time, I wasn't able to get to the line. It's the first time in my entire career that I have had a panic attack. That's what the unfinished business is - is having the opportunity to walk away knowing I gave everything.'

When she made her Olympic debut in 2008, Fraser-Pryce concedes she didn't really know what kind of sprinter she might be. She was hoping to make the final. "That was the only goal I had going in," she said.

She won that night, leading a Jamaican medal sweep that generated more head-

lines than her individual win. When she won again in 2012, she was officially royalty - up there with Gail Devers and Flo Jo and all the greats to ever run track -- even if her win, once again,

got overshadowed by the spectacle of Usain Bolt and the overall dominance of Yet other than the braces, which came off in 2010, the trademark colorful wigs and the nickname "The Pocket Rocket" - homage to the 5-foot-tall burst of speed

and color that she was - Fraser-Pryce's story wasn't all that well-known outside of Jamaica and, specifically, around Waterhouse, a working-class community in Kingston, where she grew up sharing a bed with two brothers and her mom in a house without an indoor toilet.

The story, however, gained more texture and heart after her son, Zyon, was

She sat on the bed and cried after learning she was pregnant. Some friends were wishing her congratulations on a career that, they now suggested, was certainly

"Everyone's entitled to their opinion," she said. "I knew how I felt, and I knew I wasn't ready to go. I had something left to do, and I stayed focused on the goal.' That quote came in 2019, after winning the gold medal at the world championships in Doha. Fraser-Pryce became a symbol of a growing phalanx of runnersturned-mothers - including Allyson Felix, Alysia Montano and Faith Kipyegon -- who were tired of being written off just because they'd had kids.

Three years later in Oregon, after Fraser-Pryce won her fifth world title in the 100 - this one after another Jamaican, Elaine Thompson-Herah, had won two Olympics and seemingly left her far behind - she was shedding another stereotype. 'So many people believe that when women turn 35, it somehow diminishes our gift, our talent," Fraser-Pryce said after that one. "But I'm still able to line up and compete, and that is very special."

India enters Asia Cup campaign with eye on home T20 World Cup

Samson's place in the XI under scrutiny as Gill re-enters the fold

DUBAI, Sept 9, (AP): Suryakumar Yadav's India lineup will have one eye on an Asia Cup title defense and the other on the Twenty20 World Cup it is co-hosting next year, when it opens Group A against the United Arab Emirates on Wednesday.

India is the designated host of this 2025 edition of the Asia Cup, although it is being played at a neutral venue in the UAE under the Asian Cricket Council's guidelines for when the continental tournament is scheduled for either India or Pakistan.

The Asia Cup marks a resumption of cricket ties between India and Pakistan, only months after the neighbouring countries were engaged in a tense border tension in May that disrupted the IPL and the Pakistan Super League.

India's government has given the national cricket team permission to play against Pakistan only in multi-nation tournaments.

The first of a potential three meetings at the Asian Cup will be on Sunday, with a chance for more in the Super 4 stage and the Sept. 28 final. India also faces tournament newcomer Oman in the group stage on Sept. 19.

India's test captain Shubman Gill has returned to the T20 squad after a year out. He last played T20s against Sri Lanka in July 2024 when coach Gautam Gambhir took charge of the

Indian team.

Gill scored 754 runs in England as India's new test skipper, helping the team draw 2-2 in the five-match series, and now returns as T20 vice-captain.

T20 ace Suryakumar Yadav retained captaincy, so there's some speculation about where Gill will slot into the XI. "He has been very successful in the

IPL. He was part of the Indian team earlier, too. The kind of form he is in, it really augurs well," India great Sunil Gavaskar, who is part of the commentary panel for the Asia Cup, said. "Having him back was a no-brainer."

In Gill's absence, Sanju Samson and Abhishek Sharma formed an attacking opening partnership for India in T20s.

While left-hander Sharma has shored up his opening spot with a mix of clever left-arm spin, Samson will be vying with Gill for the other opening slot.

Since July of last year, Samson has scored 487 runs in 17 matches at an impressive strike rate and hit three centuries. Those three hundred inflated his run tally, though, and masked a string of poor scores in between. Samson scored 111, 107, and 109 not out across five innings last October and November against Bangladesh (home) and South Africa (away). Take away those scores, and he is left with 160 runs in 13 innings.

Samson does play the dual wick-etkeeper-batter role, but should Gill open, Jitesh Sharma provides a middleorder alternative. Sharma helped Royal Challengers Bengaluru win its first IPL trophy, and his hitting prowess in the late overs didn't go unnoticed.

Along with Shivam Dube, Rinku Singh, and Hardik Pandya, he provides a solid finishing platform for India, putting Samson's place in some doubt.

"Samson should be left alone as opener - he is most dangerous at the top and can win you matches," Ravi Shastri, former India captain and coach, told the Asia Cup's broadcasters. "Gill can come in for someone else.'

Jasprit Bumrah 's fitness and availability leave Samson's position as India's only selection headache. Bumrah featured in three of India's five tests in England and, after being released from the squad ahead of the fifth test, has had sufficient rest ahead of the Asia Cup. The next T20 World Cup is India's and Bumrah's - foremost assignment, and team management is balancing the paceman's workload.

Harshit Rana and Arshdeep Singh are expected to share pace duties with Bumrah, while Pandya will back up as the all-round pace option. He will share all-rounder duties with Axar Patel and Dube. Kuldeep Yadav and Varun Chakravarthy should headline India's

The last Asia Cup played in the T20 format was in 2022, when Sri Lanka beat Pakistan in the final. This edition is a precursor to the T20 World Cup next February, where India will be playing at home and Pakistan will play its games in Sri Lanka.

The Asia Cup has alternated between ODI and Twenty20 white-ball formats since 2016, when India won the first of the T20 edition in Bangladesh.

'A proven and consistent record'

LONDON, Sept 9, (AP): Ange Postecoglou is back in management after taking over as coach of Nottingham Forest on Tuesday.

The Australian was fired by Totten-

to the Premier League - replacing Nuno Espirito Santo at Forest. "We are bringing a coach to the Club who has a proven and consistent record

of winning trophies. His experience of coaching teams at the highest level, along with his desire to build something special with us at Forest, makes him a fantastic person to help us on our journey

and achieve consistently all our ambitions," said Forest owner Evangelos Marinakis.

Postecoglou's appointment concluded a frantic 24 hours at Forest, with Nuno's departure confirmed shortly past midnight on Tuesday, UK time. Within hours Postecoglou emerged as the favorite to take over and he was confirmed in his new role that after-

Postecoglou led Tottenham to its first trophy in 17 years last season when winning the Europa League and securing qualification to the Champions League. But that wasn't enough save his job at the end paign that saw Spurs finish 17th in the 20 team English top flight - its worst position since the start of the Premier League in 1992. His team also lost 22 times in the league - a club record in the modern era.

Postecoglou will get the chance to compete in the Europa League again at Forest after Nuno guided the club back into Europe for the first time since 1996. Forest finished seventh last season - having mounted an unlikely challenge for Champions League qualification for much of the campaign - its best placing in the top flight since 1995. Alcaraz keeps rivals guessing with constant variety

NEW YORK, Sept 9, (AP): Here's the thing about watching Carlos Alcaraz play tennis: He will hit shots no one else would dare try, make them, then crack a smile and rile up a crowd by pointing to his ear or raising his fist.

And here's the thing about trying to beat Carlos Alcaraz at tennis: He is never quite the exact same player, from tournament to tournament, match to match, set to set, game to game, or

even point to point, really. Part of that is because he's always trying to find ways to improve, including a remodeled serve that has gone from a vulnerability to a strength this year. Part of that is also Alcaraz's ability, and willingness, to do a bit of everything, even in Sunday's crucible of a Grand Slam final against his biggest

rival and the other Big Thing in men's tennis right now.

That full bag of tricks and an unmatched athleticism were responsible for the way Alcaraz beat Jannik Sinner 6-2, 3-6, 6-1, 6-4 for a second U.S. Open championship, sixth major trophy overall, and, as of Monday, a return to No. 1 in the rankings.

"Every player has their styles. My style - it's about the variety that I have in a match. I feel I can do everything on court, to be honest: slices, drop shots, topspin, flat. I just trust my physical conditions. I feel like I can reach every ball, which gives me the confidence and the security of making good points," said Alcaraz, a 22-yearold from Spain. "Since I was really, really young, I just (had) that feeling of

doing everything."
The victory, Alcaraz's 10th in their 15 career head-to-head matchups, allowed him to end Sinner's reign as the champion at Flushing Meadows and his year-plus stay atop the ATP, too.

They are the first two men to play each other in three Grand Slam finals in a row within a season, and after Alcaraz won their matchup at the French Open in June, Sinner triumphed at Wimbledon in July.

From the moment the latter contest ended, Alcaraz and his coach, 2003 French Open champion Juan Carlos Ferrero, focused on finding ways to beat Sinner.

Nothing else really mattered to them. And Sunday's outcome proved that work was successful.

At least this time. Asked what makes Alcaraz different from other opponents on tour, Sinner said: "He doesn't have weaknesses." Now it's Sinner's turn to make the

One thing the 24-year-old from Italy with four Grand Slam titles figures he needs to add is more of an air of unpredictability, of the sort Alcaraz possesses.

"Carlos does that very well. He might be the best at it. He changes a lot. He goes to the net. He does a drop shot. He hits a slice. I'll never be like him. I'll always be the player I am," Sinner said. "But it is necessary to push me to a zone where I don't feel comfortable as a player. Man City, Premier League settle dispute

LONDON, Sept 9, (Xinhua): Manchester City and the Premier League have settled their dispute over regulations governing commercial partner-

Under the agreement, City has accepted that the league's rules on associated party transactions (APTs) are valid and enforceable. Both sides confirmed that ongoing legal proceedings will be brought to an end.

"Neither the Premier League nor the club will be making any further comment about the matter," a joint statement said.

City had previously challenged the APT framework, arguing that the regulations were "unlawful." An independent arbitration panel had already found against parts of the Premier League's rules last year, following a case initiated by the club.

The APT regulations are designed to stop clubs from benefitting from sponsorship or commercial agreements with owner-related companies that exceed "fair market value." In November 2024, most Premier League clubs voted to strengthen those rules, despite City's objections.

The club is still awaiting the outcome of a separate high-profile disciplinary case, in which the Premier League has charged it with more than 100 alleged breaches of financial regulations. City continues to deny any wrongdoing.

Suarez handed additional ban: Inter Miami striker Luis Suarez has been given an additional three-match suspension by Major League Soccer after spitting on a Seattle Sounders staff member in the Leagues Cup final, the league said on Monday.

The sanction extends the 38-year-old's punishment to nine games in total. Suarez had already been banned for six matches by tournament organizers,

ruling him out of next year's Leagues Cup. The new penalty applies to MLS fixtures, meaning he will miss league games against Charlotte FC on Sept. 13, Seattle on Sept. 16 and D.C. United

The altercation followed Miami's 3-0 defeat to Seattle in last month's final. Suarez grabbed Obed Vargas by the throat before Sergio Busquets struck the midfielder on the chin. The Uruguayan forward was then restrained by teammates as he spat at Sounders director of security Gene Ramirez. (Xinhua)

Santos out as Azerbaijan coach: Veteran coach Fernando Santos left his job with the Azerbaijan national team on Monday following a 5-0 loss to Iceland in the team's first qualifying game for next year's World Cup.

The man who led Portugal to the 2016 European Championship title stepped down after a decision that was mutually agreed, the Azerbaijan soccer

After Friday's loss to Iceland, Santos was directly criticized by the federation's secretary general who said "the head coach did not do his homework." Santos has now been ousted from the Poland and Azerbaijan national-team jobs since taking Portugal to the 2022 World Cup quarterfinals. Portugal lost to Morocco and Santos left days later, after more than eight years in charge.

China kicks off ISSF World Cup with gold in 10m air pistol mixed team

Lihao and Xinlu break world record

NINGBO, China, Sept. 9, (Xinhua): Yao Qianxun and Hu Kai gave China a winning start on home soil at the ISSF World Cup on Tuesday with victory in the 10m air pistol mixed team.

Yao and Hu, who had already collected one gold and two silvers from three World Cups this year, combined for 585 points to lead qualification. Veronika Schejbalova and Jindrich Dubovy of the Czech Republic followed with 581 to make their first mixed team final.

In the final, Yao and Hu broke away after a 3-3 tie to lead 9-3, forcing a timeout from their opponents. The Czech pair responded with 10.3 and 10.6 but could not stop the Chinese duo, who secured the title 17-5.

"It's an honor to win the first gold medal of this World Cup on home soil. There's still a long way ahead, so we must keep pushing forward and working hard," said Hu, who averaged 10.1

Hungary's Veronika Major and Akos Karoly Nagy clinched bronze, defeating neutral athletes Iana Enina and Anton Aristarkhov 17-13.

In the 10m air rifle mixed team event, 20-yearold Olympic champion Sheng Lihao and 16-yearold Peng Xinlu broke the qualification world record but fell short in the gold medal match.

Peng impressed with 318.5 in her first World Cup appearance. Their combined 636.9 points surpassed the previous record of 635.9 set by Sheng and Wang Zifei at the Munich World Cup in June. But in the final, Norway's Jeanette Hegg Duestad and Jon-Hremann Hegg raced to a 7-1 lead.

In the qualification, Sheng scored 318.4, while

Panama draws against Guatemala

Suriname makes historic start in CONCACAF final round with win

PANAMA CITY, Sept 9, (AP): Suriname scored late to edge El Salvador 2-1 on Monday and take the lead in Group A after Panama struggled at home in a 1-1 draw against Guatemala in Central American qualifying for the World Cup.

The Panamanians, who played in their first and only World Cup at Russia in 2018, were group favorites after losing to Mexico in the League of

Nations final earlier this year. Oscar Santis put Guatemala ahead in the 35th minute and Carlos Harvey equalized two minutes later.

Suriname secured its away victory at El Salvador with Radinio Balker scoring with a header in the 12th and Dhoraso Moreo Klas firing in the winner in the 81st.

Suriname leads Group A with four points from two games. El Salvador has three points, from its opening win, and Panama has two points from two draws.

Twelve teams, divided into three groups, are vying for three direct spots from regional qualifying for next year's World Cup. The United States, Canada and Mexico have qualified automatically as World Cup co-hosts.

Suriname, one of CONCACAF's founding nations in 1961, has never reached the World Cup and is playing in the final round of qualifying for the first time since 1978.

Toyotas turning heads with speed in playoffs

WASHINGTON, Sept 9, (AP): When Toyota entered NASCAR's premier series in 2007, the manufacturer was concerned more about making races than winning 200 of In its first year, Toyota drivers

suffered through nearly 100 failed qualifying attempts - but the lack of speed didn't dissuade Joe Gibbs Racing from signing with the automaker for the 2008 season despite its drivers' concerns.

"Certainly, I was worried when we switched over," JGR driver Denny Hamlin said Sunday after winning at World Wide Technology Raceway to make Toyota the fourth manufacturer to reach the 200-victory mark in Cup. "Obviously, it was a big leap of faith by everyone at Joe Gibbs Racing. The drivers were kind of like an innocent bystander. We were going to live and die by those decisions that JGR made. It turned out to be the best partnership that they

Naz Hillmon had 14 points, five rebounds, four assists and four steals for Atlanta. Maya Caldwell added 11 points and Brittney Griner scored 10.

Rivers scored 16 points, Aneesah Morrow had 13 points and 14 rebounds, and Tina Charles scored 12 for Connecticut (11-32), which dropped to 4-18 on the road this season.

Rivers made two 3-pointers in the first half to set Connecticut's rookie record with 42 3-pointers in a single season.

Italy wins nine-goal thriller in World Cup qualifying

DEBRECEN, Hungary, Sept 9, (AP): Sandro Tonali scored a stoppage-time winner as Italy won a chaotic nine-goal thriller against Israel 5-4 and dodged another big setback in its bid to qualify for the 2026 World Cup.

A 3-0 loss to Norway in June left Italy's qualification campaign in trouble. More difficulties were in store when Israel twice took the lead in a game held in neutral Hungary.

Moise Kean found space among the Israeli defense to score each side of halftime, leveling the score on both occasions. Matteo Politano finally gave Italy the lead in the 59th minute off a backheeled flick assist from Mateo Retegui, and Giacomo Raspadori scored a fourth.

The game seemed over, but Israel scored twice in two minutes to level the score at 4-4, Dor Peretz scoring his second of the game.

Tonali then hit a speculative curling shot in the first minute of stoppage time which seemed unthreatening but found its way through a crowd of players and into the net.

Italian errors were a major topic, with two own goals and some glaring mistakes from new Manchester City goalkeeper Gianluigi Donnarumma.

The game was played less than a month after the Italian Soccer Coaches' Association said it wrote a formal letter calling for Israel to be suspended over the war in Gaza. Some in the largely empty stadium seemed to whistle during the

Italy moves ahead of Israel for second place in Europe Group I. Winning the group is the only way to ensure direct qualification to next year's tournament in North America. The second-placed team goes into the playoffs, the stage where Italy was eliminated by Sweden and North Macedonia and ruled out

But at least Italy, which started qualifying with a 3-0 loss at Norway, is now in position to make the playoffs.

Assuming that Erling Haaland's Norway continues to cruise, four-time champion Italy needs to be perfect in its remaining qualifiers and vastly improve its goal differential - the first tiebreaker - before a likely decisive final group game against Norway at the San Siro in November.

Norway's goal differential entering Tuesday's game was +11 while Italy's was

Gattuso was criticized for benching Arsenal defender Riccardo Calafiori against Israel, with center backs Gianluca Mancini and Alessandro Bastoni unable to stop Manor Solomon from slaloming his way through the Azzurri defense.

Napoli center back Alessandro Buongiorno was unavailable due to injury, and veteran Francesco Acerbi's days with Italy appear done after he turned down a call up for the Norway match under Spalletti. There were also glaring mistakes from new Manchester City goalkeeper Gian-

luigi Donnarumma and Juventus midfielder Manuel Locatelli. "We're a crazy team, because we're too fragile, we concede ridiculous goals too

easily," Gattuso said. "The guys know that. But this is my problem, not theirs. My staff and I need to figure out solutions.

Gattuso likened the match to the wild 2005 Champions League final, when the AC Milan team he played for squandered a 3-0 halftime lead and lost to Liverpool in a penalty shootout.

"We need to learn that these matches are never finished," Gattuso said. On the positive side, Gattuso has several in-form forwards.

Mateo Retegui scored two goals and provided three assists in two matches; Moise Kean scored three goals and Giacomo Raspadori scored two and assisted

But reverting to a traditional 4-4-2 featuring both Retegui and Kean left Italy

"Nearly nobody in modern soccer plays with two strikers, but we're sticking with them and we're pleased with what they've produced - and not just in terms of goals scored," Gattuso said.

It marked the first time that Italy - which has traditionally been known for its defensive tactics - scored five goals in consecutive matches.

Another positive takeaway was the growing leadership provided by Tonali, who as a kid modeled his game after Andrea Pirlo and Gattuso.

"It's inspirational for me," Tonali said, "to work with a coach who has always been my reference point."

Sweden's qualifying bid is already struggling after a 2-0 loss to Kosovo left the Swedes with one point from their first two games. Kosovo scored both goals on lightning-fast counterattacks which began in its own penalty area.

Switzerland stayed top of Group B after beating Slovenia 3-0 with two of its goals coming from headers at corners.

Denmark and Scotland were level on four points at the top of Group C after the Danes beat Greece 3-0 and Scotland won against Belarus 2-0.

Croatia eased past Montenegro 4-0 to top Group L after Montenegro's Andrija Bulatovic was sent off for two bookings in the space of eight minutes before half-

Croatia was level on points with the second-placed Czech Republic but has played one less game. The Faroe Islands beat Gibraltar 1-0.

took second place and qualified by virtue of finishing as one of the four best runners-up among the 11 qualifying groups. Australia dominated possession and had the chance to break the deadlock in the

first half, but striker Nathanael Blair's header was kept out by China goalkeeper Li Hao in the 39th minute. In the 48th minute, Oscar Priestman could have given Australia the lead, but his close-range volley was denied by Li, and Blair fired over the crossbar eight

minutes later. "We came here knowing it was going to be a difficult match against a very good team," Australia head coach Antony Vidmar told Xinhua after the game.

Kuwait fails to qualify for U-23 Asian Cup

Blues suffer heavy loss to Japan

MYANMAR, Sept 9: Kuwait's Olympic soccer team saw its AFC U-23 Asian Cup dreams end after a crushing 6-1 defeat to Japan in their final Group B qualifier at Thuwunna Stadium in Myanmar.

The Olympic side, which needed a win to advance, remained on four points and exited the qualifiers alongside Afghanistan and Myanmar. Japan, meanwhile, topped the group with a perfect nine points.

Kuwait started brightly, taking an early lead through Ahmed Boudi in the 10th minute. However, defensive lapses and organizational issues allowed Japan to quickly regain control. Takumo Kawai equalized in the 19th minute after capitalizing on a goalkeeper error, and Japan added a second goal from a penalty caused by Nasser Khidr in the 32nd minute. Late first-half strikes from Kawai and Ryonzuki Wada gave Japan a commanding 4-1 lead at halftime.

Despite substitutions by coach Dario Basic, including Mohammed Al-Surayei, Montaser Abdulsalam,

Jarrah Al-Helili, and Mohammed Isa, Kuwait could not turn the tide. Japan scored twice more in the second half to complete a 6-1 victory,

while Kuwait's counterattacks failed to yield results.

The loss marks a disappointing end for Kuwait, who had started the campaign with hope but ultimately could not match the strength and consistency of their Japanese counterparts.

"As Round 1 approaches, clubs' fans, the media and soccer lovers around the globe are preparing to witness history being made, as the first FIFA Women's Champions Cup commences in Wuhan. This tournament will bring together the best women's clubs from every continent under the FIFA banner for the very first time, offering a global stage to showcase excellence, elevate the women's club game and inspire generations to come," said FIFA Secretary General Mattias Grafstrom in a statement.

The winners will progress to Round 2 to meet the champions of the CAF Women's Champions League, who will be crowned in November. That match will be staged in December at a venue still to be confirmed.

FIFA added that the final phase of the tournament, comprising the semifinals, third-place play-off and final, will feature the four strongest women's clubs in the world in a centralized location. Those matches are scheduled for January 28 to February
