THE Kingdom of Saudi Arabia has realized 95 years of achievements, marked by numerous services to its citizens and the future of the Gulf and the Arab world.

Citizen gets 14 years jail for maid murder, garden burial

Trial postponed for husband accused of killing wife on Eid

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 22: The Criminal Court on Monday sentenced a citizen to 14 years in prison for murdering an Asian domestic worker.

Case files indicate that the citizen beat the domestic worker to death and then buried her in the garden of his home in Saad Al-Abdullah.

The court affirmed the citizen's responsibility for his actions after referring the case to a psychiatric hospital to assess his mental state.

The court also sentenced the father of the citizen, brother and expatriate wife to one year in prison with hard labor for covering up the crime and failing to report it. Earlier, the Public Prosecution charged the killer's brother and expatriate wife with covering up the crime and ordered the detention of the killer and several other individuals, including an Asian worker, on charges of violating the sanctity of the deceased and failing to report the incident.

Meanwhile, the Criminal Court postponed until October 13 the trial of the man accused of killing his wife in the desert on the first day of Eid Al-Fitr, and a new lawyer was appointed for the accused.

The court made this decision after the defense team of the defendants withdrew from the case and left the courtroom following the pleadings of the Public Prosecu-

In her opening statement, Public Prosecutor Hessa Al-Hamoud emphasized the sanctity of the marriage contract. She pointed out that "the marriage contract is a solemn covenant established by Allah from the seven heavens. It is a sacred bond in which Allah commanded good treatment. However, the accused disregarded this covenant when he committed a heinous crime, taking the life of his wife on a day of joy and happiness.

These questions remain unanswered: Where do debt collection companies obtain the data of debtors' relatives?

Appointments, dismissals of officials and advisors

THE Ministry of Health recently approved the implementation of the "Healthy Cities Program", in line with a community initiative launched by the World Health

Organization (WHO). The initiative aims to enhance the quality of life for residents by integrating health into all aspects of urban life. This includes improving living, working, and educational conditions to ensure community well-being, enhancing collaboration among various sectors and communities to achieve a unified vision, and promoting self-reliance and selffinancing for the initiative.



The program will be implemented by registering the city as a member of the "WHO Regional Network of Healthy Cities", following the successful completion and application of the criteria set by the organization.

The criteria include important pillars through which New Kuwait 2035 vision for health can be realized. The program offers effective mechanisms to address complex health challenges that go beyond the capacity of traditional healthcare systems in the country.

It is an ambitious and demanding program, and its suc-

cess will largely depend on the competence and qualifications of those tasked with managing it. Achieving its goals will not be easy, and one important requirement is full proficiency in English, given the project's collaboration with international organizations.

Previous governments have repeatedly appointed individuals to various roles, including ministerial positions, only to later discover that the selections were flawed. These issues often stem from political controversies, problematic past positions, or judicial rulings, issued or expected to be issued, that could legally prevent the appointees from assuming or continuing in their posts if found guilty. As a result, many are dismissed either before the appointment process is completed or shortly after taking the constitutional oath.

These missteps have sparked widespread criticism and highlight shortcomings in the selection process. They point to a lack of due diligence by many ministers and advisors, underscoring the need for greater care in choosing candidates based on integrity, qualifications, and competence.

It has been observed that some officials have begun appointing advisors or assistants who not only lack the necessary competence but have also been previously convicted of dishonorable conduct.

This phenomenon recently resurfaced with the appointment of a female doctor to a prominent position. Tweets circulated on social media about some of her political views, which were highly critical of the government. She was subsequently dismissed from her post.

Some supported the dismissal, citing her prior public statements and opinions as offensive to the government. Others saw her Twitter posts as an expression of "freedom of opinion" that did not warrant termination, viewing the ministerial response as an overreaction, especially since it was prompted by demands circulating on WhatsApp.

"Iceland has adopted an educational system that encompasses a wide range of subjects and disciplines, helping students build diverse skills and stay informed about the latest developments in science and technology. The system emphasizes critical and creative thinking, which is still lacking in many Arab

"Personal development is essential for the progress of any society, despite the challenges it may face. Every step toward improving education contributes to shaping individuals who can adapt to changing circumstances.

"Building individual well-being also helps reduce the negative social impacts of inactivity. Identifying and nurturing athletic talent among young students supports both their personal growth and educational advancement.

"What Kuwait needs today is a comprehensive overhaul of the education system to correct the long-standing imbalances that have hindered progress for years.

"It is time for international action following the end of the mandate of the high-level UN envoy tasked with sup-

porting coopera-tion between Kuwait and Iraq on the return of the remains of Kuwaiti prisoners of war, missing persons, and Kuwaiti property from Iraq. Accordingly, we must reactivate our national



efforts to support the work of the UN envoy and ensure all relevant documents and information, particularly the most recent, are fully prepared and made available," Kuwaiti writer Tariq Idris wrote for Al-Seyassah daily.

"Kuwait urgently needs to encourage all activists from the families of prisoners and missing persons to step forward by forming a National Affairs Committee in cooperation with relevant authorities, including the Ministries of Interior, Foreign Affairs, Defense, and Health. Political and public support must be mobilized to advance the issue of the missing individuals after 34 years of search efforts.

"The UN mandate aims to sup-

port cooperation between Kuwait and Iraq and to open a new chapter in this humanitarian mission. Today's international action can pave the way for meaningful dialogue on related political, legal, social, and economic issues, which must be addressed directly, logically, and to the satisfaction of both par-

"Indeed, strong international support is urgently needed to strengthen bilateral relations and promote joint cooperation between the two brotherly nations for a better future.

"The involvement of the UN Security Council will be a major step and a driving force toward achieving stability, peace, and security. Diplomatic and political representation on both sides must be enhanced.

"As families of prisoners and missing persons, we seek the honest disclosure that the Security Council is calling for, in order to ensure progress in the return of the remains of our loved ones, as well as the recovery of official and national property lost or looted over the past 35 years.

"Statistics show that the fate of more than 321 Kuwaiti prisoners remains unknown, out of a total of 605 cases. Many missing individuals have been declared deceased through judicial rulings, yet their remains have not been located.

"We urge the Kuwaiti government to immediately begin preparations for this humanitarian mission and move forward to achieve this long-awaited goal.

"We extend our hopes for successful cooperation between the Kuwaiti government, the Iraqi government, and the UN envoy to the UN Security Council."

While they can contribute to security and service delivery, granting them unrestricted powers can lead to abuse of power, violations of privacy, and increased corruption. Therefore, it is essential to establish clear legal and regulatory frameworks to ensure that doormen perform their duties fairly and transparently, maximizing the benefits of this role while minimizing its draw-

Justice Ministry employees freed, court secretary jailed in drug bust

Men acquitted in threat case

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 22: The detention renewal judge ordered the release of two Ministry of Justice employees who had been arrested for possession of narcotics, while the third employee - a court session secretary - remains in custody pending investigation.

The judge also released the mother and two sisters of one of the defendants on bail of KD 500 each.

The Public Prosecution had previously ordered the detention of the three Ministry of Justice employees, along with the mother and two sisters of one of the defendants, for 21 days pending investigation. They were caught red-handed in Doha area in possession of narcotics with the intent to consume and traffic

In an earlier statement, the Ministry of Interior confirmed that the Drug Control General Department seized a quantity of marijuana, a sensitive scale, and several empty bags from the suspects. During the search operation, the mother and two sisters of one of the defendants physically assaulted the officers, while another sister slammed a glass door on a drug enforcement officer's hand, causing a deep wound that required hospital treatment.

Meanwhile, the Criminal Court acquitted several individuals of threatening a citizen with an electric shock to force him to sign three promissory notes. Case files indicate that the complainant revealed during investigations that he received a call through Instagram from a person requesting to meet him at his residence to discuss a trade show project. During the meeting in his diwaniya, he was surprised as the caller came with a group of people. All of them allegedly threatened him, while one of the accused took a knife and an electric shock device, and asked those present to close the door of the diwaniya. This prompted the complainant to call a relative to provide KD2,000. After failing to do so, he was forced to sign the promissory notes and surrender his civil identification card.

Attorney Abdullah Al-Alanda, who represented one of the defendants (the caller) in court, argued that the accusation was invalid, and that the material and moral elements of the crime were absent. He asserted that the documents had no conclusive evidence proving his client committed or participated in the threat, and that the complainant's statements are nothing more than hearsay and are not supported by any evidence



KUWAIT CITY, Sept 22: As part of the joint cooperation and coordination between the Criminal Security Sector and the General Administration of Customs (GAC), customs inspectors at the Nuwaiseeb border point thwarted two separate attempts to smuggle 118 cartons of cigarettes using innovative methods, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

Six individuals were involved in the crime, including an officer and two military personnel from the Ministry of Interior, a teacher, and two Saudis. The cigarettes were hidden inside the fuel tanks of two vehicles and in the back seats, as they attempted to leave Kuwait through the port. GAC explained on its X platform account that Criminal Investigation officers received information about a group of individuals preparing vehicles for customs smuggling by concealing cigarettes in innovative ways.

Saudi National

That is why, at the 1981 Fez Summit, Saudi Arabia adopted a pragmatic policy based on solid facts that reflected the realities of the situation in Palestine at the time. It was during this summit that then-Crown Prince Fahd bin Abdulaziz announced the first Saudi initiative to resolve the Arab-Israeli conflict.

Unfortunately, this initiative was met with a lukewarm response from some Arab countries and factions close to Palestinian decision-making circles. Israel seized on this hesitation as a pretext to reject the proposal, using it as a lifejacket. In reality, the interests of certain Palestinian and Arab parties appeared to align with those of Israel, creating the impression of a calculated and deliberate distribution of roles.

Despite this, Riyadh never ceased its efforts. Saudi Arabia has dedicated over two decades to vigorously supporting the Palestinian cause. It played a pivotal role in the 1991 Madrid Peace Conference, which laid the groundwork for the establishment of the current Palestinian Authority that was officially declared in

With all these developments, Riyadh remained committed to a clear approach based on the centrality of the Palestinian issue. So, when things did not go as planned, the initiative of then-Crown Prince Abdullah bin Abdulaziz at the Beirut Summit in 2002 laid the foundation for a future of peace in the region.

In the years following the announcement of the Beirut Summit initiative, the Palestinian situation worsened due to disputes over the personal interests of some faction leaders. In response, Saudi Arabia hosted these factions in Makkah, where an agreement was reached. However, Hamas sought to nullify the agreement from the moment it was signed.

The recognition of the Palestinian state by 150 countries is, therefore, the result of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia's historic efforts in this regard.

Furthermore, no one can deny Saudi Arabia's efforts to end the Lebanese civil war through the Taif Conference, nor its firm stance during the Iraqi occupation of Kuwait, expressed by the late King Fahd bin Abdulaziz, who said, "Kuwait must be restored, otherwise Saudi Arabia will face the same fate. If Kuwait's dignity is lost, Saudi Arabia's dignity will be completely lost."

No reasonable person can deny Saudi Arabia's pivotal role in Arab affairs.

He turned the marital home into a battlefield. He planned and resolved to kill his wife on the blessed day of Eid Al-Fitr. - lowing: ■ The first witness (the victim's brother) stated that on the night of the incident, the defendant's brother called him, saying the defendant had sent his location and asked him to follow. Repeated calls to the defendant elicited a cold reply: "I killed Kholoud," followed by laughter, claiming he had returned her to her familv's home.
- The second witness (the victim's brother) corroborated the first witness regarding the calls and the luring of the victim to the crime scene
- The third witness (the victim's sister) stated that her sister went with the victim believing there was a surprise awaiting her, unaware it was a premeditated at-
- The confession of the accused: "I deliberately collided with her." He admitted during investigations that he had been driving throughout Kuwait since morning, deceived his wife into accompanying him, and deliberately chose

a remote, dark location where no one would see him. He said, "I was thinking where to go, in a place where there was no one... I followed her and deliberately collided with her.'

■ His criminal record: The prosecutor emphasized, "We are dealing with a dangerous individual, capable of planning before and during the execution of crimes. His criminal record, which includes multiple felonies and misdemeanors supported by final judgments, culminated in the cold-blooded murder of his wife, shattering his family and depriving his children of their mother."

Al-Hamoud urged the court to impose the harshest penalty prescribed by law, as retribution for the crime that took an innocent life and violated the most sacred covenant. She concluded with the verse: "Read your record. Sufficient is yourself against you this Day as a reckoner." [Al-Isra: 14]

Meanwhile, Attorney Abdul Mohsen Al-Qattan, representing the victim's heirs, addressed the defendant's claim of intoxication. He refuted it using the following scientific and technical evidence:

- First, the Criminal Evidence Report - Alcohol and Liquor Section No. 1033K/2025 proved no trace of ethyl or methyl alcohol in the defendant's urine sample. ■ Second, the Criminal Evidence Report
- Toxicology Section No. 1167S/2025 confirmed the presence of a benzodiazepine derivative in the urine sample. This does not absolve him, as he denied consuming any psychotropic substance. The law holds anyone who intentionally consumes intoxicants liable for crimes committed under their influence.
- Third, Article 23 of the Penal Code stipulates that liability from intoxicants arises only if they are ingested involuntarily, causing loss of ability to sense and choose, which was not the case here.
- Fourth, proving intent to kill subjective and it is deduced from the perpetrator's behavior before and during the commission of crime. It has been proven that the defendant lured the victim to a secluded location, severely beat her, and deliberately ran over her, demonstrating

premeditation. He stressed that medical reports and expert evidence confirmed that the defendant was not mentally ill at the time of the crime, and any intoxicants did not impair his will or criminal responsibility. He said this principle was affirmed in Appeal No. 235/2006 and Appeal No. 28052/2007, in which the Court of Cassation ruled that such claims do not negate liability if there was no genuine loss

of consciousness or choice. He also confirmed the presence of elements of kidnapping, punishable by death under Article 180 of the Penal Code, as well as premeditated murder and intentional acts under Article 149 of the Penal Code. They demanded the maximum penalty be imposed on the accused to protect public and private rights.

Reliable sources affirmed that some of these companies may have resorted to external intermediaries to collect data, raising concerns about the existence of a "black market for personal data" that requires urgent intervention from regulatory authorities.

Legal experts described this move as "serious violation of privacy" and a blatant violation of laws regulating the protection of personal data.

Complaints received by the newspaper indicate that some citizens defaulted on paying for devices they purchased in installments, prompting collection companies to repeatedly pursue them by telephone. Despite having the telephone numbers of debtors registered in the purchase contracts, these companies contacted their family members and reveal to them the details of the debts and the amounts owed. Legal experts consider this a "violation of privacy" and data protection laws.

Citizens expressed their astonishment at how these companies obtained their relatives' telephone numbers, wondering whether this was a leak from within the original companies or through intermediaries collecting customer data illegally. They appealed to the Ministry of Commerce, Communication and Information Technology Regulatory Authority (CITRA), and Privacy Protection Authority to urgently intervene to put an end to these practices.

One of the cases me newspaper is the divorce of a couple after a debt collection company contacted the husband to inform him that his wife owed money for a mobile phone line he had no knowledge of. This led to a heated argument that ended in divorce, raising questions about the extent of the social damage resulting from such prac-

Attorney Jarrah Mubarak Al-Wawan confirmed these practices fall under criminal and civil liability. He explained that disclosing a customer's financial information to others is a violation of Article 21 of the CITRA Law, which obligates service providers to maintain the confidentiality of customer data and not to disclose it except through a judicial order or official permission from the

Public Prosecution. Al-Wawan pointed out that causing moral or material harm to a customer, whether by disclosing his debt or defaming him before others, could open the door to compensation claims in civil courts based on Article 227 of the Kuwaiti Civil Code, which permits claims for compensation for damages resulting from harmful acts.

Attorney Abdul Mohsen Al-Qattan called on regulatory authorities and the Kuwaiti legislator to intervene and issue clear legislation requiring collection companies to use only legal means to collect payment for debts and prevent them from overstepping the bounds of privacy or contacting the relatives of debtors. He also stressed the need for the newly established Privacy Protection Authority to activate its oversight role and impose deterrent penalties on violating companies

Attorney Israa Al-Haddad explained that if it is proven that customers' data are leaked or exploited without their permission, companies or their employees may face criminal penalties, including imprisonment and fine in accordance with Cybercrime Law No. 63/2015, particularly its provisions on hacking or disclosing confidential data.

Al-Haddad added that debt collection requires urgent legislative action to ensure it does not become a tool for social and psychological pressure on individuals and to protect the family from fragmentation due to illegal practices. She asserted that companies must also follow judicial and official channels to collect their rights.

Moreover, if a violation is proven, companies may face the following penalties: ■ Imprisonment of up to three years and a fine of up to KD5,000 as per the Cybercrime Law

■ Obligation to pay civil compensation for psychological and social damages suffered by the debtor or his family.

■ Administrative measures, such as revoking the license or suspending the company's activities through a decision issued by the Ministry of Commerce or

World Public Assembly kicks off in Moscow

MOSCOW, Sept (KUNA): The President of the Women's Institute for **Development and Peace in** Kuwait Kawthar Al-Jouan stressed Sunday on the importance of ending the suffering of the Palestinian people and holding the Israeli occupation accountable for its attacks on civilians, as this is a fundamental step towards achieving international peace and security.

In her speech before the World Public Assembly, Al-Jouan emphasized that "targeting women, children, and the elderly in Palestine is a flagrant violation of the Geneva Conventions and all international conventions," asserting that "these practices constitute crimes of genocide, whose perpetrators must be held accountable before the international community, and foremost in the International Criminal

She noted that His Highness the Amir Sheikh Meshal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah has emphasized the need to support regional and international efforts to combat terrorism for the safety and stability of peoples, and that peace is Kuwait's goal and its path to achieving security and stability.

Al-Jouan emphasized strengthening the role of Arab women in building peace and development is one of the pillars of Kuwait's participation in the global

Al-Jouan added that commemorating the International Day of Peace, recognized by the United Nations on September 21 of each year, "represents an important occasion to renew the global commitment to rejecting violence and establishing a culture of dialogue and coexistence," calling for "an end to the aggression on Gaza and paving the way for peaceful solutions that stop the bloodshed and preserve the legitimate rights of

Earlier, the first World Public Assembly kicked off in the Russian capital, Moscow, with Kuwaiti and international participation in a dialogue that seeks to promote the values of cooperation, unity, and peace among the peoples of the world.

Valentina Matvienko, Chairwoman of the Federation Council of the Russian Federal Assembly, said in her opening remarks that "this event constitutes a prestigious platform for developing public diplomacy

and strengthening dialogue between countries," noting the importance of building a world of mutual respect and understanding.

In a video message to the participants, Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov emphasized that adhering to spiritual and moral values, such as family, patriotism, and respect for one's roots, is a fundamental factor in confronting current

global challenges. For her part, Kawthar Al-Jouan, President of the Women's Institute for Development and Peace in Kuwait, told KUNA that Kuwaiti participation aims to enhance the role of women and youth in develop-

ment and global peacebuilding. She emphasized that dialogue between cultures and shared human values constitutes a fundamental pillar for achieving stability, international cooperation, and establishing the foundations of a new world based on respect and conscious unity among peoples.

'International cooperation is straining under pressures unseen in our lifetimes'

As world convulses in war and contentiousness, its leaders convene at UN to figure it out

UNITED NATIONS, Sept 22, (AP): World leaders begin convening Monday at one of the most volatile moments in the United Nations' 80-year history, and the challenges they face are as dire as ever if not more so: unyielding wars in Gaza and Ukraine, escalating changes in the US approach to the world, hungry people everywhere and technologies that are advancing faster than the

understanding of how to manage them. The United Nations itself, which emerged from World War II's rubble on the premise that nations would work together to tackle political, social and financial issues, is in crisis itself. As Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said last week: "International cooperation is straining under pressures unseen in our lifetimes.

Yet the annual high-level gathering at the UN General Assembly will bring presidents, prime ministers and monarchs from about 150 of the 193 UN member nations to UN headquarters. The secretary-general says it is an opportunity that can't be missed - even in the most challenging of moments.

"We are gathering in turbulent - even uncharted - waters," Guterres said. He pointed to, among other specters, "our planet overheating, new technologies racing ahead without guardrails, inequalities widening by the hour."

Guterres said he will use the more than 150 one-on-one meetings he has with leaders and ministers to urge that they speak to each other, bridge divides, reduce risks and find solutions - to conflicts, to keep the planet from increased warming, to put guardrails on fast-expanding artificial intelligence, and to find funding for lagging UN goals for 2030 including ending poverty in all countries and ensuring quality education for every child.

He said leaders must make progress. not merely engage in "posturing and

But UN watchers say that in a deeply polarized world, with no prospects of ceasefires in Gaza, Ukraine and Sudan, whether the high-level meeting makes any progress remains a big

question mark.

Richard Gowan, UN director for the International Crisis Group, said he is confident three topics will dominate high-level week - US President Donald Trump's first appearance in his second term, the horrific situation in Gaza, and what's next for the United Nations as it grapples with major funding and staff cuts, mainly due to the cutoff in US payments to its regular and peacekeeping budgets.

Gowan said he expects the nearly two-year war in Gaza to be the central issue, as Israel launches a major offensive in Gaza City forcing thousands to flee and following a report by independent experts commissioned by the UN Human Rights Council that accused Israel of committing genocide in Gaza. Israel rejected the allegation, calling the report "distorted and false.'

Riyad Mansour, the Palestinian ambassador to the United Nations, has stressed that "Palestine is going to be the huge elephant in this session of the General Assembly.'

It will be front and center on Monday at a high-level meeting co-chaired by France and Saudi Arabia on implementing a two-state solution to the nearly eight-decade Israeli-Palestinian conflict. And the spotlight will be even brighter because the Trump administration refused to give a US visa to Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas to speak a that meeting and the General Assembly.

On Friday, the General Assembly overwhelmingly adopted a resolution enabling Abbas to speak by video - as it did in 2022 for Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy following Russia's invasion. This year Zelenskyy will be attending in person, and the Security Council is expected to meet on Ukraine on Tuesday.

The assembly voted overwhelmingly earlier this month to support a two-state solution and urge Israel to commit to a Palestinian state. Hours before that vote, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said that "there will be no Palestinian state.'

More than 145 countries already recognize Palestine as a state, and Mansour told The Associated Press on Sunday that "it's going to be 10 more" announcing their recognition at Monday afternoon's meeting. High-level week is also expected to see a Security Council meeting on Gaza, possibly Tuesday afternoon.

US president praises Kirk as a 'great American hero', 'martyr' for freedom

GLENDALE, Ariz., Sept 22, (AP): US President Donald Trump praised Charlie Kirk as a "great American hero" and "martyr" for freedom as he and other prominent conserva-tives gathered Sunday evening to honor the slain conservative political activist whose work they say they must now advance

The memorial service for Kirk, whom Trump credits with playing a pivotal role in his 2024 election victory, drew tens of thousands of mourners, including Vice President JD Vance, other senior administration officials and young conservatives shaped by the 31-year-old firebrand.

"He's a martyr now for America's freedom," Trump said in his tribute. "I know I speak for everyone here today when I say that none of us will ever forget Charlie. And neither now will history.

Speakers highlighted Kirk's profound faith and his strong belief that young conservatives need to get married, have children and pass on their values to keep building their movement. They also repeatedly told conservative activists, sometimes in forceful tones, that the best way to honor Kirk was doubling down on his mission to move American politics further to

"For Charlie, we will remem-

Kirk's assassination at a Sept. 10 appearance on a Utah college campus has set off a fierce debate about violence, decency and free speech in an era of deep political division.

The shooting has stirred fear among some Americans that Trump is trying to harness outrage over the killing as justification to suppress the voices of his critics and political

Those close to Kirk prayed and the floors at the home of the NFL's Arizona Cardinals shook from the bass of Christian rock bands, as the memorial started with the feel of a megachurch service before veering into something more akin to a politi-

Zelenskyy anticipates intense diplomacy at UN

Russia and Ukraine trade deadly drone strikes

KYIV, Ukraine, Sept 22, (AP): Russia and Ukraine swapped accusations of deadly drone strikes on civilian areas of their countries Monday as Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy anticipated "a very intense week" of diplomacy at the UN General Assembly in New York, where the Security Council was expected to discuss the more than three-vear war.

Zelenskyy has tried to give momentum to a US-led peace effort, offering a ceasefire and a summit meeting with Russian President Vladimir Putin. Moscow has taken issue with some of the proposals, however, and an end to the bloodshed appears no closer.

Additionally, international concerns have mounted recently that the fighting could spread beyond Ukraine's borders as European countries rebuked Russia for what they said were provocations. The incidents have included Russian drones landing on Polish soil and Russian fighter aircraft entering Estonian airspace.

Latvian President Edgars Rinkevics said on social media that Russia was testing NATO's political and military response and aiming to reduce Western support for Ukraine by compelling countries to redirect resources toward the defense of alli-

ance countries. Calibrating how to respond to Russia was not easy, Rinkevics said Sunday. Russia was doing just enough not to cross a red line, but things could still spiral, he added.

Russia's Defense Ministry denied any Estonian airspace violation by its planes, and Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov on Monday dismissed Estonia and NATO's claims as "void, ungrounded and continuing an unbridled policy of inciting tensions and provok-

ing confrontation. Zelenskyy was due to attend the an-

nual high-level gathering at the UN General Assembly, where he planned to recruit support for efforts to stop Russia's invasion.

"The schedule already includes

nearly two dozen meetings with leaders from different countries, from all parts of the world," Zelenskyy said on Telegram late Sunday.

Zelenskyy said he also planned to

meet with US President Donald Trump, whose drive for a peace deal after taking office in January has yielded no

"It is vital that this week strengthen the world's resolve for robust action - for without strength, peace will not prevail," Zelenskyy said.

He said that over the past week Russia fired more than 1,500 strike drones, 1,280 glide bombs and 50 missiles of various types at Ukraine. More than 132,000 foreign components were found in those weapons from dozens of countries, he said.

Ukraine has campaigned for tighter

sanctions on Russia. Meanwhile, at least seven Russian aircraft bombarded the southern Ukrainian city of Zaporizhzhia overnight, killing three people and wounding two others, according to regional

administration head Ivan Fedorov. The attack started around 4:20 am and lasted about 40 minutes, Fedorov said. Residential buildings, shopping malls, a parking lot and "critical infra-

structure" were targeted, he said. "None of the sites had anything to do with military infrastructure," Fedorov

The Ukrainian air force said it stopped 132 out of 141 strike and decoy drones launched by Russian forces

Trump ramps up retribution campaign with push for Bondi to pursue cases against foes

WASHINGTON, Sept 22, (AP): Eight months into his second term, President Donald Trump's long-standing pledge to take on those he perceives as his political enemies has prompted debates over free speech, media censorship and political prosecutions.

From late-night comedian Jimmy Kimmel's suspension to Pentagon restrictions on reporters and an apparent public appeal to Attorney General Pam Bondi to pursue legal cases against his adversaries, Trump has escalated moves to consolidate power in his second administration and root out those who have spoken out against

In a post on social media this weekend addressed to Bondi, Trump said "nothing is being done" on investigations into some of his foes.

"We can't delay any longer, it's killing our reputation and credibility," he said. Noting that he was impeached and criminally charged, "JUSTICE MUST BE SERVED, NOW!!!"

investigations into Criticizing Trump's dealings under Democratic President Joe Biden's Justice Department, Sen. Rand Paul, R-Ky., said Sunday that "it is not right for the Trump administration to do the same thing.'

Trump has ratcheted up his discussion of pursuing legal cases against some of his political opponents, part of a vow for retribution that has been a theme of his return to the White House.

He posted that he had "reviewed

over 30 statements and posts" that he characterized as criticizing his administration for a lack of action on investigations

"We have to act fast - one way or the other," Trump told reporters later that night at the White House. "They're guilty, they're not guilty - we have to act fast. If they're not guilty, that's fine. If they are guilty or if they should be charged, they should be charged. And we have to do it now.'

German, Swedish fighter jets track Russian plane flying over Baltic Sea

BERLIN, Sept 22, (AP): Air force fighter jets from Germany and Sweden were scrambled Sunday to intercept and track a Russian surveillance plane that was flying unidentified over the Baltic Sea, military officials

Two Swedish Gripen jets and two German Eurofighter jets deployed in international airspace to monitor and photograph the Russian IL-20 reconnaissance aircraft. It had been flying without providing a flight path or radio contact that could signal its presence, Swedish and German air force officials

The monitoring, which ended without incident, came as NATO and European Union member countries have been on heightened alert for Russian military and reconnaissance activities

in and around their airspace. On Friday, three Russian fighter aircraft entered Estonia's airspace without permission and stayed there for 12 minutes, the Estonian Foreign Ministry said. That happened just over a week after NATO planes downed Russian drones over Poland and heightened fears that the war in Ukraine could spill

Quake jolts San Francisco Bay Area: An earthquake with a magnitude of 4.3 woke up a number of people with a sharp jolt in the San Francisco Bay Area early Monday, according to the United States Geological Survey

The earthquake was just east-southeast of Berkeley, the survey said. It happened shortly before 3 a.m. PDT.

People posted online that they felt their homes shake. "Our calls are coming in from San Francisco and the East Bay and all over," KTVU-TV anchor Dave Clark said in a video from the newsroom. "Things were shaking in our newsroom. ... It caught everyone off guard."

It wasn't immediately known if there were any injuries or significant damage. (AP)

2 dead in Indianapolis shooting: Two people were killed and another five were injured in a shooting Sunday in

northwest Indianapolis, officials said. At about 2 am, Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department officers responded to a parking lot on Shore Terrace, where they found five people suffering from gunshot wounds, according to a news release. Police said two of those people were declared dead at the scene, while the

Police say two other people believed to have been shot in the same incident sought help on their own: one walked into a hospital and the other into a fire station. An investigation is continuing. (AP)

'Patrons at restaurant acted quickly': Patrons at a restaurant acted quickly and selflessly to stop a gunman who opened fire while a wedding was taking place at a New Hampshire country club, averting a worse tragedy, authorities said Sunday.

One person was killed and two others were wounded by gunfire Saturday night before a suspect was taken into cus-

tody in a nearby neighborhood not long after the shooting, authorities said.

The gunfire killed Robert DeCesare Jr., 59, at Sky Meadow Country Club in Nashua, said New Hampshire Attorney General John Formella and Nashua Police Chief Kevin Rourke. They said the suspect was Hunter Nadeau, 23, of Nashua, and that he had been arrested and charged with one count of second-degree murder for knowingly shooting DeCesare.

Nadeau was a former employee of the club, Formella said, adding that Nadeau made a number of statements during the shooting and appeared to be attempting to cause chaos in the moment as opposed to showing a hate-based motivation. Witnesses reported that Nadeau said "Free Palestine" during the confusion.

Some witnesses said someone struck Nadeau with a chair in an attempt to subdue him. Formella cited "selfless acts of courage by the patrons in the restaurant who put aside care for their own safety and worked to intervene and stop the shooter.' The shooting happened adjacent to a wedding that was

taking place at the club. Wedding DJ Michael Homewood credited the chair strike with preventing an even worse shooting. (AP)

North Korean leader recalls 'good memories' of Trump, urges United States to drop denuclearization demands

SEOUL, South Korea, Sept 22, (AP): North Korean leader Kim Jong Un says he still has good memories of US President Donald Trump and urged Washington to drop its demand the North surrender its nukes as a precondition for resuming long-stalled diplo-

Speaking to Pyongyang's rubberstamp parliament on Sunday, Kim stressed that he has no intention of ever resuming dialogue with rival South Korea, a key U.S. ally that helped broker Kim's previous summits with Trump during the American president's first term, according to a speech published by state media on Monday.

Kim suspended virtually all cooperation with the South following the collapse of his second summit with Trump in 2019 over disagreements about U.S.-led sanctions against the North. Tensions on the Korean Peninsula have worsened in recent years as Kim has accelerated his weapons buildup and aligned with Russia over the war in Ukraine.

Kim's comments came as South Korean President Lee Jae Myung departed for New York to attend the UN General Assembly, where he is expected to address nuclear tensions on the

Korean Peninsula and call on North Korea to return to talks.

Trump is also expected to visit South Korea next month to attend the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation summit, prompting media speculation

that he may try to meet Kim at the inter-Korean border, as they did during their third meeting in 2019, which ultimately failed to salvage their nuclear

During his latest speech at the Su-

preme People's Assembly, Kim reiterated that he would never give up his nuclear weapons program, which experts say he sees as his strongest guarantee of survival and the extension of his family's dynastic rule.

"The world already knows well what the United States does after forcing other countries to give up their nuclear weapons and disarm," Kim said. "We will never lay down our nuclear weapons ... There will be no negotiations, now or ever, about trading anything with hostile countries in exchange for lifting sanctions.

He said he still holds "good personal memories" of Trump from their first meetings and that there is "no reason not to" resume talks with the United States if Washington "abandons its delusional obsession with denuclearization.

Kim has stepped up testing activities in recent years, demonstrating weapons of various ranges designed to strike U.S. allies in Asia and the U.S. mainland. Analysts say Kim's nuclear push is aimed at eventually pressuring Washington to accept the idea of the North as a nuclear power and to negotiate economic and security concessions from a position of strength.

Super typhoon blowing by northern Philippines and Taiwan forces evacuations, closures

MANILA, Philippines, Sept 22, (Agencies): Thousands of people were evacuated from northern Philippine villages and schools and offices were closed Monday in the archipelago and neighboring Taiwan as one of this year's strongest typhoons threatened to cause flooding and landslides on its way to southeastern China.

Super Typhoon Ragasa had sustained winds of 215 kph (134 mph) with gusts of up to 295 kph (183 mph) when it slammed into Panuitan island off Cagayan

province on mid-afternoon Monday, Philippine forecasters said.

Tropical cyclones with sustained winds of 185 kph (115 mph) or higher are categorized in the Philippines as a super typhoon, a designation adopted years ago

to underscore the urgency tied to such extreme weather disturbances Ragasa was forecast to remain in the South China Sea at least into Wednesday while passing south of Taiwan and Hong Kong before landfall on the Chinese mainland.

The Philippines' weather agency warned of coastal inundation, saying "there is a high risk of life-threatening storm surge with peak heights exceeding 3 meters (nearly 10 feet) within the next 24 hours over the low-lying or exposed coastal localities" of the northern provinces of Cagayan, Batanes, Ilocos Norte and Ilocos

Power was knocked out on Calayan island and in the entire northern mountain province of Apayao, west of Cagayan, disaster-response officials said. There were no immediate reports of casualties or further damage from Ragasa, which is lo-

Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. suspended government work and all classes Monday in the capital and 29 provinces in the main northern Luzon region.

More than 8,200 people were evacuated to safety in Cagayan while 1,220 fled to emergency shelters in Apayao, which is prone to flash floods and landslides. Domestic flights were suspended in northern provinces lashed by the typhoon while fishing boats and inter-island ferries were prohibited from leaving ports due to

Ragasa, the 14th weather disturbance to batter the Philippines this year, comes while authorities and both chambers of Congress investigate a corruption scandal involving alleged kickbacks that resulted in substandard or non-existent flood

Taiwan's southern Taitung and Pingtung counties ordered closures in some coastal and mountainous areas as well as on the outlying Orchid and Green islands. Ragasa also forced the cancellation of afternoon flights to outlying islands and suspended various ferry services, the Central News Agency reported.

In Fujian province, on China's southeast coast, 50 ferry routes were suspended. Officials in Shenzhen, the southern Chinese tech hub, planned to relocate about 400,000 people, including residents living in low-lying and flood-prone areas. Shenzhen's airport said it will halt flights, starting Tuesday night.

China's National Meteorological Center forecast the typhoon would make landfall in the coastal area between Huizhou city in Guangdong province and Wenchang city in Hainan province Wednesday.

China's State Flood Control and Drought Relief Headquarters on Monday activated a Level-IV emergency response in the provinces of Guangdong, Hainan and Fujian as Typhoon Ragasa approaches, according to the Ministry of Emergency

A ministry task force has also been urgently dispatched to Guangdong to guide local flood prevention efforts.

Ragasa is expected to sweep south of Hong Kong and Macao. While Hong Kong's airport is expected to remain open, the city's airport authority said flights would be significantly reduced after 6 p.m. Tuesday and most flight operations would be affected on Wednesday.

Hong Kong's flag carrier Cathay Pacific Airways said passenger flights scheduled to depart and arrive in the city after 6 p.m. Tuesday will be suspended, with more than 500 flight cancellations expected.

Other Hong Kong-based airlines announced their flights would be disrupted, including budget airline HK Express, which reported a cancellation of over 100 flights between Tuesday and Thursday.

Brazilians protest against bill that could lead to pardon for Bolsonaro and allies

SAO PAULO, Sept 22, (AP): Thousands of Brazilians protested in all 26 states and the federal district Sunday against a possible pardon for former president Jair Bolsonaro and his allies, who were convicted of attempting a

Calls for demonstrations grew after the lower house Tuesday passed a constitutional amendment that would make it harder to arrest or launch criminal proceedings against lawmakers. The measure now heads to the Senate.

The following day the lower house voted to fast-track a bill backed by right-wing opposition lawmakers that could grant amnesty to Bolsonaro, his closest allies and hundreds of supporters convicted of their roles in the January 2023 uprising.

In São Paulo, 42,400 people joined

the protest, while 41,800 turned out in Rio de Janeiro, according to estimates by the University of São Paulo's Monitor of Political Debate and the nonprofit More in Common.

Pablo Ortellado, director of the Monitor of Political Debate, told The Associated Press the numbers in Brazil's two largest cities were the highest for a left-wing demonstration since President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva's 2022 electoral victory. Researchers estimated crowd sizes using drone

"Right-wing mobilizations have typically been three times larger than those of the left," Ortellado said. "In recent months, that pattern has changed. The opposition's support for (U.S. President Donald) Trump's tariffs and for the amendment has brought the left

Bolsonaro was sentenced to 27 years and three months in prison on Sept 11 for attempting to stay in power after losing a 2022 reelection bid. He is the first former president convicted of trying to overturn an election in Latin America's largest economy. Bolsonaro has denied any wrongdoing.

Ana Paula Brito, a 37-year-old

nanny, attended the São Paulo protest mainly to oppose a possible pardon for Bolsonaro. She said she was also outraged by the proposed amendment shielding lawmakers from prosecution. "They (politicians) are rich, have

plenty of money and keep stealing. No funds are ever released for us. That's one more reason we're in the streets today," Brito said.

Afghanistan removes Interpol branch from chart

KABUL, Sept 22, (Xinhua): The Afghan government's Ministry of Interior Affairs has dissolved the branch of Interpol from its administrative chart, spokesman for the ministry Abdul Mateen Qani said.

"The Interpol police structure has been removed from the Ministry of Interior Affairs," local media outlet Tolonews quoted Qani as saying on Sunday night.

The official did not give details for the decision.

Earlier reports, according to private media outlet Tolonews, suggested that the leader of the Afghan government had dissolved the Interpol police structures in both the Ministry of Interior and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

South Sudan suspended VP Machar appears in court on treason charges

JUBA, South Sudan, Sept 22, (AP): The criminal trial of South Sudan's suspended vice president began in the capital Monday as Riek Machar opeared in a cage alongside his codefendants.

It was the first time Machar had been seen in public since he was placed under house arrest in March.

President Salva Kiir suspended Machar as his deputy earlier this month after justice authorities filed criminal charges for Machar's alleged role in an attack on a garrison of government troops earlier this year.

In addition to treason, Machar and seven others face charges of crimes against humanity, murder, conspiracy, terrorism, destruction of public property and military assets.

The trial by a special court in Juba, the capital, was broadcast on national television. In opening remarks, a lawyer for

Machar opposed the trial by what he described as "an incompetent court" that lacks jurisdiction. The defense argued Machar cannot

be criminally charged without hurting the spirit of a 2018 peace deal between Machar and Kiir to end a deadly civil war that caused an estimated 400,000 people. That agreement is the basis for the transitional government in which Machar has been serving as first vice

Defense attorneys said the agreement effectively governs South Sudan, which has been on the brink of a return to full-blown war as government

forces battle armed groups believed to be loyal to Machar.

They argued Machar remains the country's vice president under the provisions of the 2018 agreement, which was negotiated with the help of regional leaders and others in the international community.

The proceedings were then adjourned until Tuesday.

Kiir and Machar were leaders of the rebel movement that secured South Sudan's independence from Sudan in 2011. They are from rival ethnic groups: Kiir is from the Dinka, the

largest, and Machar is from the Nuer, the second-largest.

Their military rivalry began in the 1990s, when Machar led a breakaway unit that drew accusations he had betrayed the rebel movement. During the split, forces loval to Machar carried out a massacre in the town of Bor that targeted the Dinka, angering rebel commander Kiir and John Garang, the movement's now-deceased political figurehead.

Fighting among southerners briefly undermined their struggle for independence, but also sowed lifelong distrust between Kiir and Machar.

Khan alleged that two local Pakistani Taleban commanders, Aman Gul and Masood Khan, had established hideouts in the compound, which was being used as a factory for producing roadside bombs.

GCC growth to accelerate 4.1% in 2025, 4.6% in 2026

ABU DHABI, Sept 22: The GCC is set for stronger growth in 2025 and 2026, as higher oil output, robust non-oil sectors, and resilient domestic demand strengthen the region's outlook, according to the latest ICAEW Economic Insight Q3 2025 report, produced by Oxford Economics.

GCC GDP is forecast to grow by

4.1% in 2025, nearly double last year's pace, before accelerating to 4.6% in 2026. The trajectory reflects both oil and non-oil gains, reinforcing the region's resilience to global trade tensions, tariff headwinds and softer oil prices

GCC: Oil rebound, non-oil resilience and fiscal contrasts

The sharp increase in oil production has lifted energy-sector growth forecasts to 4.9% in 2025 and 6% in 2026. Non-oil sectors are also expected to expand by 4% in 2025, driven by strong labour markets, credit growth and continued diversification efforts.

While global GDP growth is expected to slow to 2.7% in 2025, the GCC remains an outperformer. Saudi Arabia's non-oil exports rose 16.5% y/y in H1, while the UAE recorded a surge of nearly 45% y/y, underscoring the region's growing role in global trade. Fiscal positions remain mixed: deficits are forecast in Saudi Arabia, Bahrain, Kuwait and Oman, while Qatar and the UAE are projected to maintain surpluses. Headline GCC inflation is projected at 2.1% in 2025, rising moderately

to 2.6% in 2026.

Kuwait: Political breakthrough supports fiscal reform

Kuwait's GDP is expected to grow 4% in 2025, fuelled by a 7% expansion in the oil sector. Crucially, the passage of a new debt law has ended years of political gridlock, giving the government greater fiscal flexibility to finance investment and stabilise public finances. This reform marks an important step in sustaining growth while enabling longer-term diversification.

Even so, the region's mix of reforms, energy growth, and strong non-oil diversification positions it to outperform global peers."

Loan worth KD 7.5 mln to support hydropower project

Kuwait Fund signs second loan agreement with Pakistan for Mohmand Dam

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 22: A Second Loan Agreement was signed today in Kuwait between the Government of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan and the Kuwait Fund for Arab Economic Development, whereby the Kuwait Fund will provide a loan to Pakistan in the amount of Kuwaiti Dinars 7,500,000 (equivalent to about US \$24 million) for the financing of the Mohmand Dam Hydropower Project.

The Loan Agreement was signed by His Excellency Dr. Zafar Iqbal Ambassador of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan to State of Kuwait on behalf of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan, whereas Mr. Waleed Al-Bahar, Acting Director-General of Kuwait Fund for Arab Economic Development signed the Loan Agreement on behalf of the Fund.

The Project aims to support the economic and social development in by enhancing national energy generation from the available hydro resources to meet the increasing electricity demand, improve the region's resilience to flooding, provide sustainable water resources for agriculture and drinking water for the region of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Province (KPP), and creating new job op-

The project is expected to contribute to the achievement of sustainable development goals, including: the first (No Poverty), the second (zero hunger), the sixth (clean water and sanitation), the seventh (affordable and clean energy), the eighth (decent work and economic growth), the nineth (industry, innovation and infrastructure), thirteenth (clean

action) and the seventeenth (partnerships for the goals). The Project aims at enhancing national energy generation from the available hydro resources to meet the increasing electricity demand, improve the region's resilience to flooding, provide sustainable water resources for agriculture and drinking water for the region of Khyber Pakh-

The Project consists of the construction of a hydropower scheme on the Swat River located in the northeast of Pakistan, about 200 km west of Islamabad. It comprises a concrete-faced rockfill dam with a height of about 213 meters and a crescent length of about 717 meters, creat-

ing a reservoir with a total length of about 56 km, an area of about 24 km2, and a volume of about 1.6 billion m3. The scheme will include a powerhouse with 4 electricitygenerating units with a total installed capacity of about 800 MW, capable of producing about 2,862 GWh a year.

The project will include flood protection, irrigation infrastructure, and an intake for future drinking water facilities. The project also includes consultancy and project management services. The project is expected to be completed by

The total cost of the Project is estimated at about 322.8 billion Pakistani Rupee, equivalent to approximately 900.6 million Kuwaiti dinars. The second Kuwait fund's loan of 7,500,000 million Kuwaiti dinars covers about 0.83% of the project costs. With both loans, the Kuwaiti Fund's contribution would increase to approximately 1.66% of the project's costs.

In addition to that, the project is financed through contributions from the Islamic Development Bank in an amount equivalent to about 56.3 million Kuwaiti dinars, the OPEC Fund for Development in an amount equivalent to about 22.5 million Kuwaiti dinars, and the Saudi Fund for Development in an amount equivalent to about 75 million Kuwaiti dinars, while the Pakistani government will cover the remaining costs or any other increase that may occur in the project costs.

By consolidating the First and Second Loans, the Loan will have a term of 25 years, including a period of grace of about 5 years, and will be amortized by 40 semi-annual installments, the first of which will be due on the first date on which or any interest or other charges on the loan shall fall due after the elapse of the grace period. Loan will bear interest at 2% per annum in addition to a charge of 0.5% for meeting administrative costs and the expenses of implementation of the Loan Agreement.

The Fund Loan represents the nineteenth loan provided by the Fund to the Islamic Republic of Pakistan, as the Fund had previously provided eighteenth loans to Pakistan, in various sectors, totaling approximately 137.3 million Kuwaiti dinars.

Why Do Fund Flows Matter?

Fund flows are a real-time indicator of investor behavior, revealing what investors do rather than what they say; equity inflows typically signal bullishness, while inflows to bonds or cash often indicate a shift to safety.

Persistent inflows to specific sectors or themes can precede price rallies, whereas sustained outflows may suggest stress or regulatory headwinds in regions or sectors.

Professionals use flows to identify trends, manage liquidity risk during redemptions, and avoid crowded trades; policymakers gauge financial stability, and companies time capital raises when investor appetite is strong.

Some Contexts:

- Investor Psychology: Reveal actual investor behavior, for example inflows into stocks signal bullishness, while inflows into bonds signal caution
- Leading Indicator: Can predict market moves. A sustained inflow into technology

Trump says Murdochs & Dell may join TikTok deal

Congress passed TikTok ban for Jan

WASHINGTON, Sept 22, (AP): President Donald Trump said prominent billionaires - including media mogul Rupert Murdoch and tech founder Michael Dell - could be part of a deal in which the U.S. will take control of the social video platform TikTok.

Trump namedropped 94-vear-old Murdoch and his son Lachlan Murdoch, the head of Fox News and News Corp, as part of a group of possible participants in a deal during an interview recorded Friday and aired Sunday on Fox News. "I think they're going to be in the

group. A couple of others. Really great people, very prominent people," Trump said. "And they're also American patriots, you know, they love this country. I think they're going to do a really good job."

Trump's disclosure of the potential the founder and CEO of Dell Technologies, is the latest twist in a fast-moving potential deal to keep TikTok operating

Trump also said Sunday that tech giant Oracle founder and Chairman Larry Ellison was part of the same group. His involvement had been previously disclosed. On Saturday, White House press secretary Karoline Leavitt said Oracle would be responsible for the app's data and security and that Americans will control six of the seven seats for a planned board.

Much is still unknown about the actual deal in the works. Trump discussed the TikTok deal with China's Xi Jinping in a lengthy phone call on Friday. officials h Dec. 16 to hash out the details, following the latest deadline extension by the Trump administration.

TikTok is a hugely popular app currently owned by a Chinese company, ByteDance. American officials have warned the algorithm TikTok uses to shape what users see is vulnerable to manipulation by Chinese authorities, who can use it to push content on the platform in a way that's difficult to de-Congress passed legislation call-

ing for a TikTok ban to go into effect in January, but Trump has repeatedly signed orders that have allowed Tik-Tok to keep operating in the United States as his administration tries to reach an agreement for the social media company's parent company to sell its U.S. operations. On Sunday, Trump said that he was "a little prejudiced" about TikTok because he credited the app for helping

him connect with young voters. Trump said slain conservative activist Charlie Kirk encouraged the president to use Representatives for Ellison, Dell and

the Murdochs could not immediately be reached for comment.

Trump filed a lawsuit against Murdoch and one of his newspapers, The Wall Street Journal in July after it published a story reporting on the president's ties to wealthy financier and convicted sex offender Jeffrey Epstein.

Ex-mall turned high-tech tax HQ

Greece revamp tax system with drones, big data, & Al

ATHENS, Sept 22, (AP): With a pristine white exterior, the Greece tax authority's new headquarters looks out of place on a clogged industrial artery outside Athens. A former shopping mall and ice rink, the building has been overhauled into an ultramodern digital center that has led the rescue of the nation's ailing finance and tax sector.

It is teeming with inspectors who chase down tax cheats with the help of drones, big data and live surveillance feeds from as far as Greece's island ports and remote farming villages.

Analysts at the Independent Authority for Public Revenue monitor millions of transactions in real time and order stings on businesses flagged by algorithms for a high potential of illegal activity. The high tech was on full display during a recent visit as The Associated Press was granted rare access to the authority's headquarters.

Greece's tax system - once a byword for inefficiency - has been rewired by technology.

Now, the country that spent nearly a decade as Europe's financial outcast, drowning in debt, has become one of its best budget performers, with bonds restored to investment grade by all major ratings agencies.

"We worked systematically over the years, with dedication," Giorgos Pitsilis, governor of the revenue authority, told the AP. "We started from a situation of no data to a situation with big

Greece was one of just six EU member states that recorded a budget surplus in 2024, after running deficits for decades. Momentum carried into this year, with government revenues shooting past targets through August.

Moody's upgraded Greece's bonds to investment grade in March, praising its large-scale push to digitize the tax system. Jason Graffam, senior vice president at ratings agency Morningstar DBRS, noted that Greece's longterm borrowing costs now sit slightly above Spain's - and below Italy's and France's

"The Greece of today is indeed very different from a decade ago," Graffam said. "There has clearly been durable change to the country's economic model and its fiscal regime.

During the crisis years, international creditors imposed punishing austerity measures in exchange for three massive bailout packages. Greece's population felt the pain deeply - wages were slashed, companies shut down and the economy bled jobs. Sustained pressure from lenders

forced successive governments to modernize one of Europe's weakest tax

Out went paper files and fax machines. In came cashless, paperless systems powered by algorithms that scour card payments, tax filings, payroll data, customs declarations and bank records - and flag anomalies for inspectors to

Repurposed smartphones carried by inspectors in the field stream video and audio back to headquarters. There are panic buttons to use when someone feels threatened.

Back at headquarters, screens map ongoing site inspections and drone surveillance feeds from multiple sites: from restaurants and ports to hidden grain silos and fruit delivery trucks even live readings from ships' fuel

Tax and customs officials described how the data translates into raids. They spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because of the confidentiality of their work and citing reasons of per-

During a recent nightclub sweep dubbed "Saturday Night Fever," they matched individual table orders against receipts to uncover undeclared sales, mostly of alcoholic drinks.

"We knew the tables were full, but the receipts didn't match," one official said, adding that after inspectors showed up, the nightclub's reported revenues doubled within days.

Fraud can be detected by cross-referencing mobile phone activity with reported sales as recorded by cash registers and card-payment terminals that by law must be connected to the tax

"If we detect signals from 20 phones inside a store, but see almost no receipts, that's a cue to dispatch a team immediately," another inspector ex-

The reforms have salvaged Greece's

reputation abroad. At home, the windfall has funded 1.6 billion euros in tax cuts recently announced by the centerright government. Still, opposition parties argue that

more efficient tax collection does not offset policies that worsen inequality: The national sales tax rate was hiked during the crisis to 24% - higher than most EU countries.

It hasn't been reduced since, while other austerity-era cuts remain in place and poverty is stubbornly high.

The powerful Greek Communist Party described recent budget figures as a "blood-stained surplus" that is eating further into the spending power of wage earners.

But the revenue is a sorely needed boost for the government, which is facing public anger over a corruption scandal and the cost-of-living crisis.

Tax compliance may also - slowly and grudgingly - build trust in public institutions, revenue agency officials

say.
"It's a powerful argument ... being tax responsible is beneficial," said Pitsilis, who has been governor since the tax agency became an independent authority in 2017. "We earn more, and

that gives space for tax reform." Change is visible on the streets too. At a stall north of Athens, Makis Panaretos sells watermelons, tomatoes, cucumbers and oranges. About 70% of his sales are now electronic - all transactions are instantly referred to the tax

"Customers use their cards, phones and watches to pay," he said. "I don't mind it, even though it slows things

down when there's a line.' By November, all businesses will be required to accept IRIS, a Greek instant payment system similar to Venmo in the United States, eliminating bank and payment provider fees currently incurred by vendors like Panaretos.

Greece's progress is an example how a crisis can accelerate reforms, observers say.

"Greece has shown how digitalization and institutional independence can translate into real fiscal gains," said Alexandros Kentikelenis, a political economy professor at Bocconi University in Milan.

App likely won't mirror current TikTok exactly

TikTok's algorithm key to user engagement & app's success

President Donald Trump announced on Sept. 19, 2025, a preliminary agreement for the sale of a majority stake in TikTok from Chinese tech giant ByteDance to a group of U.S. investors following Trump's negotiation with Chinese leader Xi Jinping.

The deal would create a new U.S.-only version of the app, bringing it into compliance with a law signed by former President Joe Biden on April 23, 2024, and upheld by the Supreme Court on Jan. 17, 2025. Specifics of the deal remain to be hammered out, and left unresolved is the fate of the video sharing app's core algorithm - and what that means for TikTok's millions of U.S. users.

The Chinese government has indicated it will not permit ByteDance to sell the algorithm, because it is classified as a controlled technology export, per Chinese law. Meanwhile, U.S. tech industry executives and some lawmakers say compliance with the law requires the algorithm to be under American control. The deal as proposed includes licensing the algorithm so that it remains Chinese intellectual property while the U.S. version of

the app continues to use the technology. TikTok's For You Page algorithm is widely considered the most important part of the app. As one analyst put it: "Buying TikTok without the algorithm would be like buying a Ferrari without the engine.

The algorithm's value lies in its uncanny capacity to anticipate users' content preferences. Many users claim it knows them better than they know themselves - a sentiment that has evolved into a curious mix of spiritual belief and conspiracy theorizing, as my colleagues and I have documented. Other scholars have similarly noted that users feel more intimately seen and known by TikTok's

algorithm than those powering other popular platforms. I have studied social media algorithms for nearly a decade, exploring how our relationships with them have evolved as they become increasingly entwined with daily life. As both a social media scholar and TikTok devotee, I want to shed some light on how the algorithm works and

how the app might change in the wake of its sale. In some ways, the TikTok algorithm does not differ significantly from other social media algorithms. At their core, algorithms are merely a series of steps used to accomplish a specific goal. They perform mathematical

computations to optimize output in service of that goal. There are two layers to the TikTok algorithm. First, there is the abstract layer that defines the outcome developers wish to accomplish. An internal document shared with The New York Times specified that TikTok's algorithm optimizes for four goals: "user value," "long-term

user value," "creator value" and "platform value. But how do you turn these goals into math? What does an abstract concept like "user value" even mean? It's not practical to ask users whether they value their experience every time they visit the site. Instead, TikTok relies on proxy signals that translate abstract outcomes into quantifiable measures - specifically, likes, comments, shares, follows, time spent on a given video and other user behavior data. These signals then become part of an equation to predict two key concrete outcomes: "retention," or the likelihood that a user will return to the site, and "time spent" on the app.

The TikTok For You Page algorithm relies on machine learning for predicting retention and time spent. Machine learning is a computational process in which an algorithm learns patterns in a dataset, with little or no human guidance, to produce the best equation to predict an outcome. Through learning patterns, the algorithm determines how much individual data signals matter for coming up with a precise prediction.

A Wall Street Journal investigation found that the amount of time users spend watching each video plays a large role in how the algorithm chooses videos it suggests to users. Using the equation it has generated to predict retention and time spent, the algorithm assigns a score to each video and ranks possible videos that could be shown to the user by this score. The higher the score for an individual user, the more likely the video will ap-

pear in their feed. Of course, content characteristics and other users additionally inform recommendations, and there are other subprocesses folded into the equation. This step is where algorithmic moderation usually comes in. If a video looks like engagement bait or has excessive gore, for example, the content's score will be penalized.

The sale has not been finalized, and what happens to the algorithm is unresolved. However, it's fairly certain that TikTok will change. I see two key reasons for change. First, the proposed app's U.S.-only user population

will alter the makeup of the underlying dataset informing algorithmic recommendations on an ongoing basis. As the kinds of content and users come to reflect American cultural preferences, values and behaviors, the algorithm may be slightly different as it "learns" new patterns.





Epic last show

Bad Bunny closes 'Puerto Rico tour'

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, Sept 22, (AP): Bad Bunny fans drowned out memories of Hurricane Maria in one booming voice on the anniversary of the

Saturday was a concert for Puerto Ricans by Puerto Ricans to remind the world about the power of "la isla del encanto" ("the island of enchantment").

"We're not going to quit. The entire world is watching!" Bad Bunny thundered into his microphone as he looked into a camera streaming his last show in Puerto Rico this year to viewers around the world following a historic 30-concert residency in the US territory.

The crowd roared as thousands watching via Amazon Music, Prime Video and Twitch joined them, marking the first time Bad Bunny was streamed across the globe.

The residency was more than just a series of concerts. Saturday marked the end of an extended love letter that Benito Antonio Martínez Ocasio sang to Puerto Rico. He tapped into what it means to be Puerto Rican, to delight in the island's beauty, defend

its land and fight for its people.

"This is for you," Bad Bunny said from the roof-top of an iconic Puerto Rican house installed at the concert venue as he raised his glass and the crowd raised their glasses in return.

Saturday marked the eighth anniversary of Hurricane Maria, which slammed into Puerto Rico as a Category 4 storm on Sept. 20, 2017.

An estimated 2,975 people died in the sweltering of the property of the storm that reveal the inland's also

aftermath of the storm that razed the island's electric grid, leaving some communities without power for up to a year. Anger and frustration over the pace of reconstruction continues to simmer as chronic power outages persist.

"Over seven years after Hurricane Maria, FEMA does not know when Puerto Rico's electrical grid will be completely rebuilt. The grid remains unstable, inadequate, and vulnerable to interruptions, the report stated.

Imprinted

On Saturday, the number of estimated deaths were imprinted on the back of T-shirts and written on Puerto Rican flags that the crowd waved into the air.

At every concert this summer, Bad Bunny invited new celebrities - among them LeBron James, Penélope Cruz, Darren Aronofsky, DJ Khaled and Kylian Mbappé - and sang with different musicians, including Rubén Blades, Residente, Gilberto Santa Rosa, Rai Nao and Jorge Drexler.

But on Saturday, the noise from the crowd hit new levels as Bad Bunny rapped with Puerto Rico heavyweights Nengo Flow, Jowell y Randy, Dei V and Arcángel and De la Ghetto. Thousands of fans flexed their knees in unison to thumping rap and reggaetón.

Then, the crowd gasped in disbelief as Marc Anthony appeared on stage after Bad Bunny pleaded with his fans to join him because he was going to sing a song he hadn't sung in public in some 20 years.
"Yo te quiero, Puerto Rico!" the crowd cried as

the two singers embraced at the end of the iconic song, "Preciosa," whose lyrics say, "I love you, Puerto Rico.'

Thousands gathered outside the concert venue on Saturday hours before the concert, with Puerto Rico's national flower, the vibrant flor de maga, tucked behind their ear, and the traditional straw hat known as the "pava," set at a jaunty angle on their head.

But not all were celebrating.

Darlene Mercado milled around, asking strangers if they knew of anyone with tickets she could buy for herself and her daughter, who had flown in from New Jersey.

They were around number 122,000 in a virtual waiting line to buy tickets for Saturday's sold-out concert and weren't able to get any after waiting eight hours online.

'This is not only the anniversary of the hurricane, but it's also the anniversary of me no longer having cancer and it's my birthday. We wanted to celebrate everything with a bang," she said.

Saturday's concert was open only to residents of Puerto Rico, as were the first nine concerts of Bad Bunny's residency, but the remainder was open to fans around the world.

Overall, the concerts attracted roughly half a million people, generating an estimated \$733 million for Puerto Rico, according to a new study by Gaither International.

Most foreign visitors came from the Dominican Republic, Colombia and Spain, with an average stay of nearly nine nights, the study found. Overall, roughly 70% of concertgoers were female, with an average age of 33, according to the study.

Among those attending was Shamira Oquendo. "It's going to be an emotional night," the 25-year-old said, noting that Hurricane Maria was her first hurricane. "It was very sad. A lot of people around me lost their things.

Puerto Rico's party with Bad Bunny ended early Sunday, but the superstar who recently clinched 12 Latin Grammy nominations will go on a worldwide tour in December, with concerts planned in countries including Costa Rica, Mexico, Brazil, Australia, Spain, France and Sweden. Notably, he is skipping the US, citing concerns over the arrest

of immigrants. On Saturday, Bad Bunny thanked his fans for their love. "I'm going to miss you a lot. I'm going to miss this energy," he said as he urged the crowd to embrace love no matter the situation.

Football horror 'Him' opens in second place

'Demon Slayer' holds steady as box office surge stalls

LOS ANGELES, Sept 22, (AP): Neither a Jordan Peele-produced horror nor a Margot Robbie and Colin Farrell romantic drama were enough to continue the September hot streak at the movies. After back-to-back weekends that had films majorly overperforming, first "The Conjuring: Last Rights" followed by the anime "Demon Slayer: Kimetsu no Yaiba - Infinity Castle," the North American box office slowed sig-

Overall ticket sales were down nearly 50% from last weekend, with the holdover champion "Demon Slayer" edging out the newcomer "Him" for first place, according to studio estimates Sunday. Crunchyroll and Sony Pictures "Demon Slayer" added \$17.3 million over the weekend, bringing its total to \$104.7 million, which makes it the highest grossing anime film ever in North America.

The football horror "Him" opened in second place with an estimated \$13.5 million in ticket sales. Universal Pictures opened "Him" in 3,168 North American theaters, where the audience was 52% male and 65% over the age of 25. Internationally, it earned \$400,000.

Produced by Peele's Monkeypaw and directed by Justin Tipping, "Him" is about a promising young quarterback (Tyriq Withers) who is invited to train with a veteran (Marlon Wayans) at an isolated compound.

"Him" scored with neither critics (it carries a 29% on Rotten Tomatoes) nor audiences, who gave the film a C- CinemaScore. In his review for The Associated Press, film writer Jake Coyle wrote that the film "was made with the potent premise of bringing the kind of dark, satirical perspective that characterizes a Monkeypaw production to our violent national pastime. But that promise gets fumbled in an allegorical chamber play that grows increasingly tedious.'

"Him" was also nearly upstaged by another horror, "The Conjuring: Last Rights," which made an estimated \$13 million in its third weekend. With a global total of \$400 million, it's now the biggest film in the Conjuring universe.

They are two of three horror movies in this weekend's top 10, including "Weapons." According to data firm Comscore, this year that genre alone has generated \$1.1 billion in domestic box office receipts, just several million short of the 2017 record driven by "It" and "Get Out."

"Horror movies have been on a bit of a hot streak," said Paul Dergarabedian, Comscore's head of marketplace trends. "It's going to be a record-breaking year."

In addition to "Demon Slayer," Sony had a new film this weekend as well: The original romance "A Big Bold Beautiful Journey," starring Robbie and Farrell, but that fizzled with audiences, earning only \$3.5 million from 3,300 locations. It also received largely negative reviews and currently has a 37% on Rotten Tomatoes.

"Audiences are selective in what they want to see," Dergarabedian said. "Negative reviews can create really strong headwinds for original films with no brand recognition.

In its second weekend, "Downton Abbey: The Grand Finale" added another \$6.3 million, bringing its running total to \$31.6 million. The Stephen King adaptation "The Long Walk" is also estimating \$6.3 million in weekend two, down only 46% from its opening. Its domestic total of \$22.7 million has already exceeded its production budget of \$20 million (though that sum does not account for marketing and promotion).

Ron Howard's 1995 hit "Apollo 13" played in 200 theaters this weekend for its 30th anniversary as well. It made an estimated \$600,000. The 30th anniversary re-release of "Toy Story," now in its second weekend, added \$1.4 million.

Next weekend there is excitement surrounding the new Paul Thomas Anderson film "One Battle After Another," although his biggest hit to date remains the 2007 film "There Will Be Blood," which made just over \$76 million worldwide, not accounting for inflation.

And right on its heels is a very different kind of cinema experience: AMC Theaters is hosting a release party for Taylor Swift's 12th studio album, "The Life of a Showgirl." The 90-minute show, aptly titled "The Official Release Party of a Showgirl," will play at all 540 AMC theaters in the U.S. from Oct. 3 through Oct. 5.

Gad and Scodelario shine in twisted comedy

Dark humor, family secrets in 'Adulthood'

LOS ANGELES, Sept 22, (AP): Early on in "Adulthood," siblings Meg and Noah Robles suddenly - and unhappily - learn why they never got to have a dog growing up.

It's not because their parents didn't think they could handle the responsibility or because dogs can be messy. It's because there was a body walled up in the

"How could our parents act like nothing ever happened?" Noah Robles asks. "That's worse than the killing. It's not, but still. They called it the 'playroom.'

That 30-year-old corpse will soon unleash a suburban comedy of errors as the bungling brother and sister - raised on TV police procedurals - try to find a way out of this mess without losing their freedom or precarious lifestyles.

"I wrote for two seasons on 'Blue Bloods.' I know how cops think," says Noah Robles, a wonderfully childlike loser played by Josh Gad. His man-boy is a failed screenwriter in an Alamo Drafthouse T-shirt with maxed out credit cards.

Director Alex Winter and screenwriter Michael M.B. Galvin combine for a pitch-perfect black comedy that has a nifty satirical edge, inverting the movie convention of discovering that the kids are monsters.

Meg - played with lovely comic timing by a languid Kava Scodelario - brings her young children to a dangerous payoff meet because she couldn't get child care and loses her cool when she's mocked for missing a yoga class. "Have a good day. Make good choices," she tells her kids even as she clearly doesn't.

Not long after the body in the basement is found, more bodies start piling up, as does the extortion, sword play, swirling detectives and so-called heavies who look the part even if they're really lambs. If you liked "Fargo,' "Adulthood" is for you. It's all about the noose slowly

tightening.
"Once we do this, there's no going back, Meg. Even years from now you'll think about it when you're trying to get to sleep," the brother tells his sister as they decide what to do about the body. "It'll pop in your head at random times.'

Winter keeps the tension tight but nicely steps off the gas for some neat touches - like a conversation between the siblings about moving on that's set against a child's flag-football game - while both Gad and Scodelario take turns being the strong one.

He offers advice about not leaving evidence while moving a dead body - "You should put some towels down" - and she juggles mundane tasks like Zoom meetings and checking her son's glucose levels with slamming a hammer into someone's skull, like just another task for stressed-out parents these days.

Fitting for a movie with an actual skeleton in a closet, "Adulthood" is about legacy and how we become our parents. It's also about recognizing that our parents are human and complicated.

Very rarely do such movies end well. They peter out or ramp up the violence to absurd and pointless levels. "Adulthood" finds the sweet spot and lands the thing perfectly. If you think Meg and Noah are monsters, what would you do in a similar situation? There are probably monsters like that everywhere. They even might be in the foldable chair next to you at the flag football game.

"Adulthood," a Republic Pictures release that opened in select US theaters on Friday and streams on Sept. 23, is rated R for "violence, language throughout, drug use and brief sexual material." Running time: 97 minutes. Three stars out of four.

Paralympic Games. Whitehead, who is on a quest to run 20 marathons this year, posted the photo on Instagram.

Styles' debut album, "Harry Styles," topped the album charts in the US, Britain and several other countries, while the second, "Fine Line," appeared in 2019 and included the Grammy-winning "Watermelon Sugar." (AP)

LOS ANGELES: Christopher Nolan has been elected to lead the Directors Guild of America, the organization said late Saturday. The Oscar-winning "Oppenheimer" filmmaker said in a statement that it is, "one of the greatest honors of my career."

The guild represents the interests of some 19,500 film and television directors in the United States and abroad, in addition to hosting the DGA awards annually.

"Our industry is experiencing tremendous change, and I thank the Guild's membership for entrusting me with this responsibility," said Nolan, a well-known champion of the

theatrical experience and film stock. The box office success of "Oppenheimer," which was shot entirely on large-format film (a combination of 70mm and IMAX), and made over \$976 million worldwide made many in the industry reconsider the mass audience appeal of a format that not too long ago was in danger of

extinction. Just over a decade ago, facing bankruptcy and

an industry that seemed to be migrating to digital, Kodak nearly stopped film production. Filmmakers like Nolan, Martin Scorsese and others rallied to keep it going. Earlier this year, Ryan Coogler's "Sinners" helped prove the point again.

Nolan will take over for outgoing president Lesli Linka Glatter, who led the group for four years through the Hollywood strikes of 2023. He said he looks forward to collaborating with Glatter and the board "to achieve important creative and economic protections for our members.

4 suspects arrested as officials investigate theft

Anger in Egypt as stolen pharaoh bracelet is melted

CAIRO, Sept 22, (AP): Egyptians reacted with outrage this week after officials said that a 3,000-year-old bracelet that

had belonged to an ancient pharaoh was stolen from Cairo's famed Egyptian Museum and then melted down for gold.

Tourism and Antiquities Minister Sherif Fathy said in televised comments late Saturday that the bracelet was stolenger for the comments are sure for the comments are len on Sep. 9 while officials at the museum were preparing artifacts for an exhibit in Italy. He blamed "laxity" in implementing procedures at the facility and said that prosecutors were still investigating.

The bracelet, containing a lapis lazuli bead, belonged to Pharaoh Amenemope, who reigned about 3,000 years ago. Authorities said it was taken from a restoration lab at the museum and then funneled through a chain of dealers before being melted down. The minister said the lab didn't have

Four suspects have been arrested, including a restoration specialist at the museum who confessed to giving the bracelet to an acquaintance who owns a silver shop in Cairo's Sayyeda Zainab district. It was allegedly later sold to the owner of a gold workshop for the equivalent of about \$3,800. It was eventually sold for around \$4,000 to a worker at another gold workshop, who melted the bracelet down to

make other gold jewelry. The suspects confessed to their crimes and the money was

seized, the ministry said in a statement on Thursday. The ministry also released security camera video showing a shop owner receiving a bracelet, weighing it, and then paying one of the suspects

Local media reported Sunday that a judge ordered the restoration specialist and her acquaintance to remain in detention for 15 more days pending further investigations. He ordered the release of the two remaining suspects if they posted bail set at 10,000 Egyptian pounds (\$207) each.

The loss of a treasure that had survived for three millennia was painful to many people in Egypt, where there is great esteem for the nation's ancient heritage.

Some questioned security measures at the museum and called for tightening these measures around the country's

Monica Hanna, a prominent Egyptian archaeologist, called for suspending oversees exhibits "until better control"

is implemented to secure the artifacts. Hanna is the dean at the Arab Academy for Science, Technology & Maritime Transport, and campaigns for the return of Egyptian artifacts exhibited in museums overseas.

Malek Adly, an Egyptian human rights lawyer, called the theft "an alarm bell" for the government and said better se-curity is needed for antiquities in exhibition halls and those

Amenemope ruled Egypt from Tanis in the Nile Delta during Egypt's 21st Dynasty. The Tanis royal necropolis was discovered by the French archaeologist Pierre Montet in 1940, according to the Egyptian Museum.

The necropolis' collection exhibits about 2,500 ancient artifacts, including golden funerary masks, silver coffins and golden jewels. The collection was restored in 2021 in cooperation with the Louvre Museum in Paris.

The theft reminded some of past cultural losses, including the disappearance of Vincent van Gogh's "Poppy Flowers" - then valued at \$50 million - from another Cairo museum in 2010. The painting was first stolen in 1977 but was later recovered. However, since its theft in 2010 it has not been found.



'Kavalier & Clay' based on novel by Michael Chabon

Met season opens with opera starring Mykkanen NEW YORK, Sept 22, (AP): Miles Mykkanen grew up wanting to sing and dance on Broadway, but he was turned

down by the musical theater programs he applied to for college. So he had to "settle" for studying opera at the Juilliard School at Lincoln Center. "At 18, when your sights are set on

42nd Street and then you're getting called to 65th Street, it was weirdly a

letdown," he recalled. "But after a few

hours I kind of slapped myself and said 'Miles, pull yourself together.' That was 16 years ago, and he has since pulled himself together to such an extent that at age 34 he's just opened the Metropolitan Öpera season in a leading role in a new opera, "The Amazing Ad-

ventures of Kavalier & Clay.' With a libretto by Gene Scheer and score by Mason Bates, the opera is based on the novel by Michael Chabon. Mykkanen portrays Sammy Clay, a kid growing up in World War II-era Brooklyn who teams with his cousin, Czech refugee Joe Kavalier, to create a comic strip hero modeled on Superman.

He'll also be back at the Met in the spring in another modern opera, Finnish composer Kaija Saariaho's "Innocence." He plays the Bridegroom, a part he first sang in 2024 when San Francisco Opera gave the work's US

Mykkanen had sung at the Met before, mostly attracting little attention in small parts, though his haunting rendition of the Holy Fool in Mussorgsky's "Boris Godunov" in 2021 drew critical

"But this season is so ideal," Mykkanen said. "All of a sudden my schedule came together, and I thought,

my God, where did this all come from." When the Met was casting "Kavalier & Clay," it was Michael Heaston, the artistic administrator, who thought of Mykkanen for the role of Sammy.

"I first became acquainted with Miles when he was still a student at Juilliard, and he immediately impressed me,' Heaston said. "He is a singer who can straddle genres, that rare artist who can

sing a heartfelt operatic aria in one moment and then turn on a dime to a classic tune from the American Songbook.

"When I looked at Mason's score and considered the vocal and acting demands alike, it seemed tailor-made for Miles."

Mary Birnbaum, who taught Mykkanen acting at Juilliard, said she's not surprised at his sudden rise to

"Honestly it's what I thought he would do all along," she said. "He's got a very American sound, and it's appealing and it's lush. But also he's bold as an actor ... and he makes material look better for being in it."

By coincidence, both his roles this season are people who have something to hide. "They are characters with two huge secrets that are kind of gnawing In Sammy's case, it's his sexuality

and ambivalence about his attraction to

actor Perry Bacon.

away at them," Mykkanen said.

"As a gay man myself, it's been really rewarding for me to be working on this role, thinking back to my coming out process 20 years ago now," Mykkanen said. "Sammy wants to believe there's a future for him, but he keeps struggling and wondering if the world will ever get past its prejudice and accept him.'

"Innocence" deals with the lingering effects of a school shooting 10 years later, and as secrets are peeled away, the Bridegroom's role in the horrific events is gradually exposed.

Mykkanen relishes the very different musical challenges the two roles provide. Saariaho's score for "Innocence," he said is composed with a kind of "mathematical" precision. "When I first cracked it open, it was overwhelming because of the time signatures, the key signatures. You're trying to figure out, what was she thinking, how do you put this all together?"

"Kavalier & Clay," written in a style

that uses what Bates calls "symphonic electronica," has been easier to learn. "I almost feel it's starting to carve a new genre in opera," Mykkanen said. "Something American opera has been trying to find in the last decade or so. ... I don't want to stay to say it's musical theater, but at times it's very col-

Mykkanen grew up in the remote Ironwood region of Michigan's Upper Peninsula, where both his parents were high school band directors. Though he displayed a talent for singing at a young age, it was show music rather than opera that inspired him. When his parents found him a classical voice teacher, "For me it was a means to an end, to develop my voice so I could sing on the Broadway stage."

Though his career now takes him all over the US and to Europe, Mykkanen still calls the Ironwood region home. In 2019, he launched an arts festival called Emberlight that has grown into a two-month summer program of live performance, film, art shows and talkbacks with visiting artists. When he's not on site he handles logistics remotely and also relies heavily on volunteers.

"Just being the person who with a lot of other people behind me brings art to this region which is rural and remote ... It's been one of the big blessings of my life," he said.

And when he isn't performing, he returns. "I have a room in my parents' basement where I store my stuff," he said. "When I'm between contracts I come back here and stay with my mom and dad. ... I'lll call them from Amsterdam and say 'OK, what are we having for dinner next Tuesday when I land.

"Kavalier & Clay" runs through Oct. 11. Also starring are baritone Andrzej Filoczyk as Joe; soprano Lauren Snouffer as his sister, Sarah; soprano Sun-Ly Pierce as Rosa Saks, and baritone Edward Nelson as Perry Bacon. Met music director Yannick Nézet-Séguin conducts the production directed by Bartlett Sher.

The decision includes providing antibodies to infants and children up to two years old with risk factors, as well as adults with chronic diseases or weak immune system.

The ministry considers the approval of this vaccination an important step toward strengthening community immunity, alleviating the burden on the healthcare system, and keeping pace with the latest international medical recommendations for preventing seasonal diseases.

More Americans now meet high BP criteria

Updated blood pressure guidelines push for more aggressive treatment

Nearly half of all Americans have high blood pressure - a condition called hypertension.

Hypertension is the No. 1 risk factor for heart disease and stroke. In addition, hypertension increases risk of dementia and cognitive decline. Heart disease, stroke and dementia are the first-, fourth- and sixth-leading causes of death in the US. Unfortunately, only 1 in 4 people with a history of high blood pressure have this condition under control.

In August 2025, the American Heart Association and the American College of Cardiology released new guidelines on prevention and management of hypertension, based on a comprehensive analysis of literature published over the past 10 years.

The Conversation US asked cardiologist Dr. William Cornwell of the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus to explain what the new guidelines mean and how you can work with your doctor to manage your blood pressure.

The most recent guidelines prior to this new statement were in 2017. Since that time, the medical community has learned a lot about hypertension and the best way to control it. The new guidelines provide a great deal of new information.

First, the definition of hypertension has changed. The criteria are more strict, and the target blood pressures are lower

The criteria depend on the values of the "systolic" and the "diastolic" pressure. Systolic blood pressure, the top number, represents the pressure in the blood vessels when the heart is squeezing blood into the body. Diastolic blood pressure, the bottom number, is the pressure in the blood vessels when the heart is relaxing. Both numbers are important when determining the severity of hypertension and how it is most appropriately managed.

The new guidelines have removed the category of "prehypertension," which was defined by a systolic pressure of 120-139 millimeters of mercury (mm Hg), or a diastolic pressure of 80-99 mm Hg. Now, patients are categorized as having "elevated blood pressure" if their blood pressure is 120-129 over less than 80 mm Hg, or stage 1 hypertension if they are 130-139/80-89.

Habits

A reading of 140/90 or more is considered stage 2 hypertension, and a reading of 180/120 or greater is a hypertensive crisis. In essence, the bar has been lowered, and this change may impact millions of Americans.

People need to ask their doctors if they have hypertension based on these new criteria and whether or not they should be treated. It is also very important for patients to get advice from their doctors about lifestyle habits that they can incorporate into their daily routine, like diet, exercise and healthy sleep habits to help lower blood pressure.

In addition, the guidelines encourage providers to use a risk calculator, called PREVENT - short for Predicting Risk of Cardiovascular Disease EVENTS - to determine a patient's overall risk of cardiovascular disease and heart failure. This tool represents a significant advance in personalizing medical care, since it incorporates risk factors unique to the individual, allowing for a tailored approach to medical care.

The guidelines encourage people to limit alcohol intake because alcohol increases blood pressure.

A 2023 meta-analysis of seven studies with nearly 20,000 people showed that systolic blood pressure will increase by about 1mmHg for every 10 grams of alcohol consumed. A standard beer contains about 14 grams of alcohol, so regular alcohol consumption may increase blood pressure by several points over time. For people who have been drinking an excessive amount of alcohol but stop, their blood pressure may come back down.

That might not sound like much, but when combined with other unhealthy and risky behaviors, like sedentary behavior, excessive weight, inadequate sleep, psychological stress and smoking, the risk factors start to add up quickly. Together, they can very quickly increase the risk of heart disease, stroke and dementia.

The new guidelines encourage patients to reduce or eliminate alcohol consumption entirely compared with the old guidelines. For people who do want to drink alcohol, the new guidelines recommend that men should drink no more than two drinks per day, and women should drink no more than one drink per day.

The new guidelines also emphasize the fact that diet can have a major impact on blood pressure. They recommend that all adults - with or without hypertension - consume less than 2,300 milligrams of salt, or approximately 1 teaspoon, per day, and more ideally, less than 1,500 milligrams per day. For a comparison, the average American eats more than 3,300 milligrams of salt per day. Patients may also consider potassium-based salt substitutes to further lower blood pres-

Diet

The guidelines recommend a specific diet called the DASH diet, short for Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension, for patients with or without hypertension to prevent or treat elevated blood pressure. The DASH diet emphasizes fruits, vegetables, low-fat or nonfat dairy and whole grains. This diet may lead to a reduction in blood pressure by up about 10 mm Hg.

The guidelines also emphasize the need to increase physical activity. On average, for every additional 30 minutes of aerobic exercise a person gets per week, systolic blood pressure decreases by 2 mm Hg and diastolic blood pressure drops by 1 mm Hg, with the largest reduction occurring at 150 minutes of dynamic exercise per week.

Regular exercise also helps you live longer and reduces the risk of cardiovascular disease, stroke and dementia.

The PREVENT risk calculator that the new guidelines recommend incorporates several factors, including demographics, cholesterol levels, medical history and blood pressure, to determine risk. This risk calculator is free and available online to the general public. The PREVENT calculator may be a helpful tool for all Americans since it reliably provides patients and providers with an assessment of overall risk assessment. But it is particularly helpful for people with multiple chronic conditions, like hypertension, high cholesterol, overweight/obesity or diabetes.

The American Heart Association recommends eight essential health behaviors for controlling blood pressure and reducing risk of cardiovascular disease overall. These include healthy diet, regular exercise, stopping or avoiding smoking, sleeping seven to nine hours per night, and controlling weight, cholesterol, blood sugar and blood pressure.

One of the greatest advances with these new guidelines is the personalized approach to medical care through the use of the PREVENT calculator.

The guidelines recommend that doctors encourage their patients to check blood pressure at home to better understand the fluctuations in pressure that occur throughout the day.

Finally, the guidelines encourage physicians to be more aggressive about treating blood pressure. This may be an important change since uncontrolled blood pressure is a major risk factor for eventual development of heart disease and

Youth climate activists face housing challenges

As UN climate summit looms in Brazil, many fear they can't afford to attend

BRAZIL, Sept 22, (AP): Pooja Tilvawala knows it's a gamble to use more than \$46,000 of her own savings to help young people get to the United Nations climate summit in

Brazil. But she thinks it's a necessary one. As national delegations, activists and other attendees struggle to find affordable places to stay by November, with some deciding not to go at all, Tilvawala, who lives in London, has spent hours working from afar to find lodging in Belem, negotiate prices and contracts and put down deposits. She did all that to create a housing portal specifically for young people who want to be part of the international conference. If not enough people sign up for the housing she's secured, she might lose some of

"There's always a huge number of fossil fuel company representatives there. And who's going to be there to combat those voices and those negotiating influences?" said Tilvawala, founder and executive director of the global organization Youth Climate Collaborative. "So I was like, 'We

need to be here.' With less than two months before this year's Conference of the Parties, or COP30, only about 36% of the 196 participating countries have confirmed attendance and paid for accommodations, according to a spokesperson for the conference presidency.

Activists and poorer nations are feeling the crunch as hotel prices have skyrocketed and even private homes, love motels and other makeshift accommodation options are charging a minimum of several hundred dollars a night.

The Brazilian government chose Belem because it's part of the Amazon and to underscore the problems common to growing cities in the developing world, but some prospective attendees are raising questions about how productive the talks will be if they are overshadowed by a big drop in attendance.

The Brazilian government has taken steps to address the problem. Climate Minister Marina Silva said 10 to 20 rooms have been made available "at accessible prices" for vulnerable countries. The government has also brought in two large cruise ships that can house as many as 6,000 people.

"Everybody will have access to participate in COP30," Silva said at a recent press briefing. "Facing climate change must be done by all of us, by all the parties of the convention and especially by those who are already living the consequences of climate change."

But U.N. Climate Change executive secretary Simon Stiell sent a letter on Sept. 9 asking that agencies in the U.N.

system, and related organizations, review how many people they're sending to COP30 and reduce it where possible. To add to the pressure, a construction workers' strike started Sept. 15 and includes areas being worked on for

Belem was initially excited to host the conference, said Arnaldo Vaz Neto, a Brazilian financial adviser who has been working with an organization called the Young Scholars Initiative as an intermediary between locals and COP30 visitors seeking housing. "It's kind of taught in our childhood to have this behavior of hospitality," he said.

But that was followed by the realization that the United Nations had high international standards for its guests. It was difficult to manage expectations on both sides, Vaz Neto

Belem isn't the only city hosting a U.N. climate conference where lodging rates have gone far higher than usual. Silva said it's happened at nearly all such conferences, with prices three or even four times market rates.

"A lot of people here are expecting to charge \$1,000 a night but that's beyond the average," Hugo Pinheiro, a secretary who works for K Pine Mobile in Belem, and has worked to match delegations with housing and to ne-

The "accessible" rooms made available by the Brazilian government will rent for between \$200 and \$600 a night, according to a COP30 presidency spokesperson.

Prosthetics help amputees rebuild their lives

At Congo's front line, a trauma center tells a story of suffering and survival

GOMA, Congo, Sept 22, (AP): In a sunlit rehabilitation room, Jerome Jean Claude Amani offers a faint smile. For the first time since losing his wife and children to a rebel attack in eastern Congo, the 35-yearold is standing again - one leg his own, the other made of plastic.

"I feel at peace," said Amani, who lives on the outskirts of the North Kivu provincial capital of Goma. "I don't see this leg as plastic, but as a second chance.'

Amani's wife and four children were killed when they came under attack by armed groups in April. Badly wounded and seeking help to start over, he found his way to Shirika la Umoja, an orthopedic center on the front line of eastern Congo's conflict in Goma, which finds itself overwhelmed by surging numbers of casualties.

Congo's mineral-rich east has long been battered by fighting involving more than 100 armed groups including the Rwanda-backed M23 rebels. The rebels made an unprecedented advance in January and seized two key cities including Goma, further deepening one of the world's largest humanitarian crises.

Some 7 million people had been displaced in the conflict that was already one of the world's largest humanitarian crises before it escalated this year. While fighting has largely decreased as a result of peace efforts, there are still pockets of clashes and civilians are still being killed.

Demand

Shirika la Umoja has long been producing prosthetics for the wounded in Goma, with support from the International Committee of the Red Cross since 2005. But the escalation in fighting has brought increased demand for artificial limbs for amputees.

"Every week, we receive new patients who lost limbs to stray bullets, landmines, or explosion," said Gisèle Kantu, a physical therapist at

Since early 2025, the center has treated more than 800 amputees and other severely injured patients.

The number of prosthetic limbs provided by the clinic has soared from 422 in all of 2024 to 326 in just the first half of 2025. There's no sign of demand easing anytime soon.

The center currently runs with nearly three dozen professionals. Unlike in most other places, the prosthetics are made by hand, each one individually carved, molded and assembled.

For each patient, there is a story of both horror and survival.

Melisa Amuli, 30, survived a bombardment near a checkpoint in the town of Mubambiro in North Kivu province in January.

"I was lying among the dead. I started saying my final prayer," she re-

called, wiping away tears. Hours later, some motorbike riders pulled her from the rubble. Gravely injured, Hamuli was spared amputations but her legs no longer functioned correctly.

Today, with the help of a special orthotic brace supplied by the center, she can stand again. Forced to close her business selling potatoes, she now relies on others for support. But she's looking forward to returning to work as her recovery continues, one physical therapy session at a time.

For the wounded, the consequences of armed conflict endure long beyond the fighting.

Violetta Nyirarukundo, 27, saw her life crumble in April when armed men shot her during an attack. The mother of four was adjusting to her new reality when her husband abandoned her and their children.

"When my husband learned I had lost a leg, he left me," said Nyirarukundo. "He didn't want to live with a woman who was 'incomplete."

Violetta tries to remain strong. "I've lost everything, but I'm still alive," she said, adding that she plans to move in with her father to raise her children.

Wound

Faustin Amani, 20, sits silently on a wooden bench at the clinic, his gaze fixed on the courtyard. His right leg, amputated above the knee, is neatly bandaged. Yet the pain seems to extend beyond the physical wound.

Last March a speeding military vehicle struck him and his friend when he was selling mobile phone airtime not far from home. It cost him both legs, and killed the friend instantly.

Though grateful to have survived, he speaks of feeling trapped in a body he barely recognizes.

"I wonder if I'll ever have a normal life ... Who will want me? Who will pay for my schooling? My father pushes carts, my mother carries heavy loads at the market. All my friends have two legs," he said.

In the center's hallways, Amani crosses paths with other young amputees - victims of mines, bullets, and bombs. He wasn't a fighter, just a street vendor who dreamed of buying a motorcycle some day to grow his business.

"If I could, I'd avenge my leg," he said, eyes welling with tears.

As the injured heal, a workshop offers locals the chance to help build the prosthetics with materials made available by the Red Cross. They've gone from crafting just a few to about 10 in a day, pressing ahead to meet the surging need.

"We want to give back mobility to those who've lost it," said Julienne Paypay, a 35-year-old prosthetic technician who herself lost a leg as a child. "I know what it means to walk again.'

In the workshop, the smell of plaster mixes with the hum of generators and the whirring of saws.

Workers carefully carve, mold, and assemble the prosthetic limbs one by one.

The challenges are steep. "All materials are imported. With insecurity, the lack of a functioning airport, and new customs regulations, everything is harder," said Sylvain Kambale, the center's administrator. "We only have two qualified technicians for hundreds of patients still waiting."

Red Cross says it will continue to work with the center to bring in more professionals to meet the growing

For Amani, his new prosthetic leg symbolizes a fresh start and new hope. "I will fight for my children. I want to reopen my shop," he said. "I don't see my prosthetic as a weakness but as a victory."

Pfizer bets \$4.9B for obesity drugs

NEW YORK, Sept 22, (AP): Pfizer is doubling down on obesity treatments by spending \$4.9 billion on the developmentstage drugmaker Metsera.

The COVID-19 vaccine and treatment maker said early Monday that it will pay \$47.50 per share in cash for each Metsera share. That represents a premium of more than 42% to Metsera's closing price Friday.

Pfizer also could pay an additional \$22.50 per share depending on how Metsera's product pipeline develops. Metsera has no products on

the market, but its pipeline in-

cludes four programs in clinical development and one in midstage testing. Demand for obesity treatments has soared in recent years, fueled by market leaders Zep-

bound from Eli Lilly and We-

govy from Novo Nordisk. Pfizer currently has no obesity treatments on the market but has some in clinical development. Earlier this year, the company said it was ending development of a potential once-daily pill treatment before it started latestage testing, the biggest and most expensive phase of clinical development.

Shares of Pfizer Inc., based in New York, climbed 31 cents to \$24.33 before markets opened Monday while Metsera's stock advanced about 60%

Chikungunya cases

Bangladesh records highest dengue deaths in single day

DHAKA, Sept 22, (Xinhua): A total of 12 people died of dengue fever in Bangladesh, the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) said here Sunday. This is by far the highest death toll

in a single day in the country. According to DGHS figures, the death toll this year reached 179. In the last 24 hours, as of 8:00

a.m. local time Sunday, Bangladesh reported 740 new infections, bringing the total number of dengue cases to 41,831 so far this year, the DGHS said. The fresh infection tally indi-

cates the fast-rising trend of the mosquito-borne disease in parts of the country. The June-September monsoon period is the season of dengue fever in Bangladesh, which is considered a

high-risk nation prone to mosquito-

borne diseases.

Food poisoning: A suspected food poisoning incident has occurred in Xishui County in the city of Zunyi, southwest China's Guizhou Province, resulting in dozens of people, including children, being hospitalized as of 2 p.m. on Sunday.

Those hospitalized showed abnormal liver and kidney function after eating sandwiches produced by a local food factory. The factory has eight stores in the county, and 208 sandwiches of the batch in question had been sold. Twenty-nine were recalled, leaving 179 actually sold.

Family members of the patients said that since the incident occurred on Sept. 18, most patients have been treated at a local hospital, while some have been transferred to hospitals outside the county.

Local authorities in Xishui stated that the stores involved have been suspended from operating, while patient treatment, epidemiological investigations and sample testing are currently underway.

Chikungunya: Authorities in Jiangmen, a city in south China's Guangdong Province, had reported 1,714 cases of Chikungunya fever, a mosquito-borne viral disease, by Friday, prompting the launch of a public health emergency response.

The city government on Friday decided to launch a Level III public health emergency response in light of the current Chikungunya situation in Jiangmen.

Chikungunya fever is an acute infectious disease caused by the Chikungunya virus -- featuring clinical symptoms including fever, rashes and joint pains.

Kim wins French Open for first title in 7 years, Koepka fades to 4th

PARIS, Sept 22, (AP): Michael Kim holed a 15-foot par putt on the last hole for a one-shot victory in the French Openhis first worldwide title in seven years - while five-time major champion Brooks Koepka faded to a fourth-place finish.

Kim found a greenside bunker on the par-3 18th at Saint-Nom-La-Bretèche and came up short from the sand before rolling in the putt for a closing 6-under 65 and a four-day total of 16-under 268.

The 32-year-old became the first American to win the French Open since Barry Jaeckel in 1972. Other U.S. players to win the title include Walter Hagen and Byron Nelson.

"I kind of blacked out when that putt went in," said the 64th-ranked Kim, whose last win came in 2018 - by eight shots - at the John Deere Classic on the PGA Tour.

Jeong weon Ko and Elvis Smylie each shot 65 to finish at 15 under. Koepka, who has not won outside the LIV Golf League since the 2023 PGA Championship, began the day tied for the lead but made eight pars and a bogey on the back nine to shoot 68 and finish two shots back.

Koepka was playing a third straight week on the European tour after missing the cut at the Irish Open and the BMW

the tournament unofficial. Sarah Schmelzel and Minami Katsu shared the lead at 8-under 63 and received the unofficial winner's prize money from a reduced purse. The event does not count toward the season-long Race to the CME Globe.

After play was washed out on Saturday at Pinnacle Country Club, the course received 3 1/4 inches of rain Saturday night, the LPGA announced, adding that it was "highly unlikely" the course could be readied to complete 36 holes on Monday or Tuesday and make the event official.

Had it been official, the event would have had a \$3 million purse, with \$450,000 to the winner. Under LPGA rules, the payout was reduced to \$1.5 million, but tournament sponsors kicked in another \$500,000 to be divided evenly among all players in the 144-woman field - \$3,500 each

Doug Barron birdied the last three holes at Pebble Beach for a 6-under 66 while his pursuers faltered down the stretch and won the Pure Insurance Championship by one shot on Sunday for his fourth senior victory.


Barron finished at 12-under 204. Lynx overcomes Mercury

LAS VEGAS, Sept 22, (AP): Kelsey Mitchell scored a playoff-career high 34 points and the Indiana Fever beat the Las Vegas Aces 89-73 on Sunday in Game 1 of the best-of-five semifinal series.

After seeing their double-digit lead shrink to three points with 2:51 left in the third, the Fever closed the quarter on an 11-0 run to extend their advantage to 14 points, seizing control of the game and never looking

Mitchell, who finished fifth in MVP voting with 93 points, scored 17 points in the first half, setting the tone for the Fever's offense. The veteran guard, who finished the regular season ranked third in scoring with 20.2 points per game,

shot 12 of 23 (52.2%) from the floor, including 4 of 6 from

3-point range in her first-ever semifinal game.
"I think what you guys see is just me trying to just be a kid in the playground," said Mitchell, whose scoring tally was the second-highest in franchise history.

Odyssey Sims had 17 points, while Natasha Howard finished with a double-double (12 points, 11 rebounds).

The Fever finished the game hitting 50% from the floor (34 of 68), while the Aces shot just 29 of 71 (40.8%).

"We wanted to come in and be the aggressor right to make sure that we were dictating on the defensive end, and we were dictating from a pace standpoint," Fever coach Stephanie White said. "We knew that they were going to make runs. They made a big one in the third and we responded with a big one. It's one game, it's a long series. ... But to come in here and to be able to steal this one was big for us."

The victory spoiled A'ja Wilson's celebration for becoming the WNBA's first player to win four MVPs in her career. The 29-year-old, who was also named the AP Player of the Year, finished with 16 points and 13 rebounds. Wilson shot just 27.3% (6 of 22) from the field.

Jackie Young led the Aces with 19 points, while Dana Evans came off the bench to score 14 points and Chelsea Gray chipped in with 13.

Las Vegas hadn't lost at home since Aug. 2, when the topeded Minnesota Lynx handed the Aces the worst home loss in WNBA history, a 53-point beatdown. From that point, the Aces closed the regular season on a 16-game win streak before defeating the Seattle Storm in the opening round.

The win was even more impressive, considering the Aces came into the game without a single player on the injured list, while the Fever had six.

Already shorthanded without Chloe Bibby (left knee), Caitlin Clark (right groin), Sydney Colson (left knee), Sophie Cunningham (right knee) and Aari McDonald (right foot), Indiana added Damiris Dantas to the list, as she was in concussion protocol.

Lynx 82, Mercury 69

In Minneapolis, Courtney Williams scored a game-high 23 points, Kayla McBride scored 21, and Napheesa Collier added 18 points and nine rebounds as the top-seeded Minnesota Lynx defeated the Phoenix Mercury 82-69.

The Lynx trailed by as many as nine and faced a sevenpoint deficit at halftime. As Phoenix threatened to even the game down the stretch, it was Williams and McBride making big shots to keep the Mercury at bay. McBride drilled a shot from deep to put the Lynx up 73-67 with under four minutes to play, and Minnesota never looked back.

Unanimous choice

Wilson earns a historic 4th WNBA MVP award

LAS VEGAS, Sept 22, (AP): Las Vegas Aces star A'ja Wilson is in a class by herself, winning the WNBA MVP for an unprecedent-

ed fourth time. She won the award last season as the unanimous choice and also in 2020 and 2022. Sheryl Swoopes, Lisa Leslie and Lauren Jackson all won the award three

"It's not going to hit me until the end of the season honestly; it is truly a blessing to be where I am. I don't think I could ever put into words how special this moment is," Wilson said hours before Las Vegas lost Game 1 of the WNBA semifinal series to Indiana. "My name is in the history books for-

Wilson and former Houston Comets star Cynthia Cooper were the only ones to win the award unanimously. Cooper was the only other player to win it in consecutive years, doing so in the first two seasons of the WNBA (1997, 98).

The 29-year-old Wilson again led the league in scoring (23.4 points per game) as well as blocked shots (2.3) and helped the Aces win their last 16 regularseason games, earning the No. 2 seed in the playoffs. For the second consecutive season, Wilson averaged at least 20 points, 10 rebounds, 2 assists, 2 blocks and a steal per game. She is the only WNBA player to reach these averages in a season while playing at least 15 games.

"The fact she's not even 30 yet is crazy," Las Vegas coach Becky Hammon said. "She still has a lot left in the tank. There's still areas that she knows she can improve in and she will. Every year she's coming back and adding something different to her game. Everyone talks about the Mount Rushmore of basketball faces. ... There's no Mount Rushmore, you're the only one, you're Everest.'

The league surprised Wilson on Friday, with WNBA Commissioner Cathy Engelbert and Wilson's boyfriend, Miami Heat star Bam Adebayo, presenting the trophy to her at the end of practice.

Europe has done it only four times

Ryder Cup is never easy to win on the road

FARMINGDALE, N.Y., Sept 22, (AP): Rory McIlroy, who became only the sixth player in history to complete the career Grand Slam of majors by winning the Masters, now faces another tall order.

McIlroy has been saying for the last few years that winning the Ryder Cup away on the road is the biggest accomplishment in golf.

He would know. McIlroy was on

the last winning road team in this passionate competition. That was 13 years ago and required so much to go right on the final day in the Chicago suburbs that it became known as the "Miracle at Medinah."

"We weren't supposed to win in '12," McIlroy once said. "Even since then, the home team has won, each time pretty convincingly.'

The Americans were coming off a record rout over Europe in 2021 - 19-9 - when they went went to Marco Simone in Italy with hopes of ending 30 years without a road victory. Europe swept the opening session and sailed to a five-point win.

After Europe's win at Medinah, the home team has won by the following margins: five points in Scotland, six points in Minnesota, seven points in France, 10 points in Wisconsin and then last time in Rome.

Europe returns Luke Donald as captain and 11 of the players who won in Rome. Now it faces a big, loud crowd at Bethpage Black when the matches start Friday. The course will be groomed to favor an American style of golf.

That led Donald to say winning a Ryder Cup in New York "is a different animal.

But the Europeans have done it before - four times in the last 40 years. Here's a look back on how they did it:

Europe was coming off its first Ryder Cup victory since 1957, facing an American team with Jack Nicklaus as the captain on the Muirfield Village course he built.

Among the three captain's picks for Europe was Jose Maria Olazabal,

the perfect partner for Seve Ballesteros. They went 3-1 in team play as Europe, behind a 4-0 session in Friday fourballs, and built a five-point lead going into Sunday singles.

The American rally came up short, particularly on the 18th hole. Ben Crenshaw, who broke his putter in anger on the sixth hole and used a 1-iron, driver and wedge the rest of the way, drove into the water and lost his match. Dan Pohl lost his match with a double bogey.

Ballesteros closed it out by beating Curtis Strange for a 15-13 victory, the first time the Americans lost on home soil since the matches began in 1927. Noteworthy: This was the last Ry-

der Cup in which the Americans did not have captain's picks. Quoteworthy: "We're not fright-

ened any more. In time, this could change the world of world golf." -European captain Tony Jacklin.

American dominance appeared to be restored with wins at Kiawah Island in 1991 and at The Belfry in 1993. And then Corey Pavin chipped in on the 18th for a fourballs victory Saturday evening at Oak Hill for a 9-7 lead that looked insurmountable given the U.S. edge in singles.

An aging European team - this was the last playing appearance by Seve Ballesteros - showed the moxie late and dominated the 18th hole, as it had done in its previous road victory. Five matches went 18 holes, and Europe won a full point from four of them.

Nick Faldo got up-and-down for par from 93 yards away on the 18th to rally for a 1-up win over Curtis Strange, who bogeyed the last three holes. Philip Walton clinched it for Europe by holding on to beat Jay Haas in a 14 1/2-13 1/2 victory.

Noteworthy: Phil Mickelson went 3-0 in his Ryder Cup debut. It was the first of his record 12 consecutive

Europe recorded its largest margin of victory in the Ryder Cup, 18 1/2-9 1/2, and yet this Ryder Cup will be

best remembered for U.S. captain Hal Sutton pairing Tiger Woods and Phil Mickelson for the first time. They lost the opening match to Padraig Harrington and Colin Montgomerie. Sutton sent them out again and they lost to Lee Westwood and Darren Clarke.

Europe already had a five-point lead after the first day and won four of the five sessions with Bernhard Langer at the helm.

Trailing 11-5 going into Sunday, Sutton decided to send out his players in the order they made the team. By the fifth of 12 matches, Europe already had secured the cup.

Noteworthy: For the first since 1981, Europe had no major champions on its team.

Quoteworthy: "Believe it or not, there's people that can play golf outside the States." - Sergio Garcia.

The Americans were poised to take an 11-5 lead into singles when Ian Poulter finished with five straight birdies to carry him and Rory McIlroy to a stunning point in the final fourballs match. The momentum was enormous.

The Americans still had a fourpoint lead. McIlroy forgot Chicago was in the Central time zone and nearly missed his tee time, arriving at Medinah with 10 minutes to spare. And then the Europeans staged the greatest comeback by a road team in Ryder Cup history.

Their top five players in the lineup won, none bigger than Justin Rose making birdie on the last two holes to beat Phil Mickelson. Back and forth it went over the final hour until Martin Kaymer made a 6-foot par putt to beat Steve Stricker. The cup in Europe's hands, Tiger Woods conceded a short par putt to Francesco Molinari for a 14

1/2-13 1/2 victory. Noteworthy: Éuropean captain Jose Maria Olazabal had an image of Seve Ballesteros sewn into the sleeves of his team's Sunday shirts. It was the first Ryder Cup since Ballesteros died from a brain tumor in May 2011.

Star faces expulsion from the federation

Ramadan faces legal trouble

CAIRO, Sept 22: Pyramids and Egypt national team star Ramadan Sobhi is in hot water as he faces serious legal allegations that could potentially lead to imprisonment. The player is accused of forgery, bribery, and using falsified documents to secure personal benefits from official authorities.

The Egyptian Public Prosecution has referred Sobhi to the Criminal Court on charges of participating in the falsification of an official document linked to an educational institute. Investigations indicate that Sobhi allegedly arranged to forge a document claiming he was enrolled in the third year at the Pharaonic Higher Institute for Tourism and Hotels.

Legal expert Sid Ali Al-Mohammedi explained that Sobhi "committed multiple acts of forgery, including issuing documents stating his enrollment and falsely claiming he had completed the first and second years, all intended to mislead official authorities."

According to a source within the Egyptian Football Association, if Sobhi is found guilty, he could face expulsion from the federation, permanently barring him from playing for Egyptian clubs. A court ruling confirming the charges would serve as conclusive proof of his involvement.

Denis Bouanga scored three goals, his second hat trick in the last three games, and Los Angeles FC beat Real Salt Lake 4-1.

Bouanga, who has scored in four consecutive games, has 22 goals this season, tied with Lionel Messi for the most in MLS. Bouanga had 20 goals in each of the last two season and is the first player in MLS history with at least 20 goals in three consecutive seasons. The 30-year-old Bouanga, who also had three goals in a 4-2 win over San Jose on Sept. 13, has a club-record four career hat tricks in the regular season, one more than Carlos Vela. Son Heungmin added a goal and two assists for Los Angeles (14-7-8).

LAFC, which clinched a spot in the 2025 MLS Cup playoffs when St. Louis beat San Jose 3-1 on Saturday, has 50 points and is fourth in the Western Conference. Thirdplace Minnesota has 54 points and Seattle is fifth with 45.

Son, who had his first hat trick in MLS to help Los Angeles beat RSL 4-1 on the road Wednesday, has seven goal contributions in the last three games.

Women's participation in sports has soared by more than 150%

Vision 2030 sparks Saudi Arabia's sporting revolution

RIYADH, Sept 22: Saudi Arabia has been making unprecedented strides in developing its sports sector in recent years. Guided by the strategic framework of the Saudi Sports Federation, the Kingdom has built an active and thriving community by encouraging physical activity among adults, with a goal of reducing inactivity rates by 1–10% this year alone.

This rapid growth is driven by the generous support of the Saudi lead-ership and the close oversight of His Highness Prince Abdulaziz bin Turki bins Faisal, Minister of Sports. Since the launch of Vision 2030, sports development has been a national priority - improving quality of life while elevating the Kingdom's presence on both regional and global sports stages.

According to the 2024 Vision report, the Kingdom has witnessed remarkable growth in sports infrastructure. In 2019, there were 16 clubs in the Prince Mohammed bin Salman Professional League, 16 in the First Division, and 20 in the Second Division. By 2024, the total number of clubs had surged

to 128 across the Kingdom. Likewise, the number of Saudi sports federations expanded from 32 in 2015 to 97 by the end of 2024 - reflecting a comprehensive transformation across all sports

Since the launch of Vision 2030, women's participation in sports has soared by more than 150%. Today, over 330,000 registered female athletes, supported by thousands of coaches, referees, mentors, and sports physicians, are competing and excelling locally, regionally, and internationally.

The Kingdom now boasts more than 500 women's sports centers and 104 women serving on the boards of sports organizations – 7 of whom lead federations. Saudi Arabia has also established 37 national women's teams and trained nearly 100 female coaches. Grassroots participation is thriving as well, with 15,000 schoolgirls taking up tennis for the first time and more than 70,000 playing football.

Female participation in sports is now just 2% lower than that of men. In 2020, Saudi Arabia celebrated its first female Paralympian at the Tokyo Games, and in 2024, its first female Olympic swimmer competed in Paris. Women's football has also seen rapid progress, with Al-Nassr's women's team capturing both the league and Super Cup titles, securing a place in international competitions.

Saudi Arabia is increasingly a hub for world-class sporting events under Vision 2030. The Kingdom will host the 2034 FIFA World Cup - the biggest event in global football – as well as the Asian Games in the same year. Other events such as Formula E, Formula 1, the Spanish Super Cup, and the prestigious Saudi Cup horse race further showcase the Kingdom's expanding role on the global sporting stage.

The Saudi Pro League (Roshn) has also risen in international prominence, now regarded among the top 10 leagues worldwide.

The arrival of global stars, most notably Cristiano Ronaldo with Al-Nassr, has transformed the league into a global spectacle. Ronaldo, now a sporting ambassador for Saudi Arabia,

continues to spotlight the Kingdom most memorably when he appeared in

and drawing millions of fans to follow

Barcelona closes in on Real, Atletico drops more points

Torres scores brace

MADRID, Sept 22, (AP): Dani Olmo scored and set up one of Ferran Torres' two goals with a neat backheel flick as Barcelona beat Getafe 3-0 in the Spanish league.

It was the second straight game for Barcelona at its training facility as the newly renovated Camp Nou Stadium lacks the required permits.

Olmo's clever flick inside the area led to Torres scoring for Barcelona in the 15th minute, and Raphinha's assist to Torres in the 34th allowed the Catalan club to increase its first-half advantage.

Olmo then closed the scoring with a shot from near the penalty spot in the 62nd after a setup by substitute Marcus Rashford. A man carrying a Palestinian flag entered the field just before Olmo scored but did not affect the goal. The man was taken away by security.

"We had to focus on our own performance," Barcelona coach Hansi Flick said. "We controlled the match. It's never easy to score three against Getafe."

The victory moved defending champion Barcelona within two points of leader

Real Madrid, which defeated Espanyol 2-0.

"It was important to come away with the three points," Torres said. The match was played at the Estadi Johan Cruyff, which typically hosts the Barcelona women's team and men's reserve and youth squads. The club had already played there in its home opener - a 6-0 rout of Valencia on Sept.

Getafe, which had won three of its first four matches, dropped to eighth place. Atletico Madrid's early-season struggles continued with a 1-1 draw at Mallorca, giving the club its worst league start under coach Diego Simeone after five

Julián Alvarez missed a first-half penalty kick and Atletico conceded a late

equalizer as it failed to win for the fourth time in five league matches. Atletico's only win so far was 2-0 against Villarreal last weekend. It has six points, its lowest points total after five matches since 2009-10 (three points), just before Simeone took over as coach.

"We are trying to build a new team," Simeone said. "Several players arrived

and we knew that something like this could happen. We knew we would have to go through this process. Atletico had also drawn 1-1 against both Elche and at Alaves after opening with

a 2-1 loss at Espanyol. It was coming off a 3-2 loss at Liverpool in its Champions League opener on Wednesday. Forward Alvarez had his 14th-minute penalty kick saved by Mallorca goal-

keeper Leo Román, and striker Alexander Sorloth was sent off for a hard foul in the 72nd after video review. Sorloth had replaced Alvarez about 10 minutes before being sent off. Alvarez

did not hide his frustration at being substituted but Simeone later downplayed the player's reaction. Åtletico, which has conceded eight goals in six matches across all competitions so far, went ahead with a shot from inside the area by Conor Gallagher in the 79th,

but Vedat Murigi equalized for the hosts with a header in the 85th Mallorca remains winless with only two points.

Earlier, Celta Vigo drew 1-1 at Rayo Vallecano, while Elche beat Oviedo 1-0 at home with a ninth-minute goal by André Silva in a match between promoted

Agnelli granted plea bargain that could lead to soccer return

Inter bounces back from consecutive losses in Serie A

MILAN, Sept 22, (AP): Inter Milan bounced back from consecutive losses in Serie A with a 2-1 win over Sassuolo on Sunday.

Federico Dimarco scored early on after being set up by Petar Sucic and Carlos Augusto doubled the lead in the 81st with a deflected shot.

Walid Cheddira pulled one back for Sassuolo in the 84th after an exchange with Domenico Berardi. Inter, which was coming off defeats

to Udinese and Juventus but won 2-0 at Ajax in the Champions League on Wednesday, has six points after opening the season with a 5-0 rout of To-

Serie B champion Sassuolo remained with three points.

Earlier, Lorenzo Pellegrini scored as Roma beat Lazio 1-0 in the capital

Also, Nikola Krstovic scored twice as Atalanta won 3-0 at Torino; Como rallied to win 2-1 at Fiorentina with a stoppage-time goal from Jayden Addai; and promoted Cremonese remained unbeaten after a 0-0 draw with Parma that newly signed Jamie Vardy

A plea bargain deal for former Juventus president Andrea Agnelli with a 20-month suspended sentence in a false accounting trial was

granted by a judge Monday - possibly setting up Agnelli's return to soccer after his sports ban expires next month.

The trial, which began after prosecutors started investigating Juventus in 2021, contributed to Agnelli's

downfall at the record 36-time Serie A champion.

Former Juventus vice president Pavel Nedved was granted a deal of 14 months and former Juventus sporting director Fabio Paratici got 18 months - with their sentences also

Former Juventus CEO Maurizio Arrivabene was cleared of wrongdoing by the court in Rome - where the trial was moved to after starting in

Juventus, which is listed on the Milan stock exchange, was fined 156,000 euros (\$183,000) and also reached a settlement with about 75 investors who the club will pay slightly more than 1 million euros (about \$1.2 million).

The case prompted Agnelli and Juventus' entire board of directors to resign in 2022. Agnelli was then given two separate bans by sports authorities, the last of which expires in October.

Juventus was hit with a 10-point penalty in the 2022-23 season and then removed by UEFA from the Conference League for financial irregulari-

Juventus and its managers were investigated for cashing in on illegal commissions from transfers and loans of players and illicit handling of players' salaries. The case also explored whether investors were misled with invoices being issued for non-existent transactions to demonstrate income that in turn could be deemed false ac-
