Kuwait committed to UN Charter in its entirety

World peace, security, sovereignty, justice top priority

NEW YORK, Nov 1, (KUNA): The State of Kuwait underlined its firm commitment to the principles and lofty goals of the UN Charter, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the International Humanitarian Law.

Kuwait "also emphasizes the UN Human Rights Council's pivotal role in promoting these rights at the international and regional levels," said Wafiqah Al-Mulla, second secretary of the Permanent Mission of the State of Kuwait to the United Nations, at a special session of the UN General Assembly on the Human Rights Council's report.

She added that Kuwait, under the wise leadership of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Meshal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, is fully committed to the values of international peace and security, respect for the sovereignty of states, the promotion of justice and equality, and the defense of humanity.

Al-Mulla emphasized that the State of Kuwait attaches particular importance

to the Universal Periodic Review mechanism as a key tool of the Human Rights Council for promoting dialogue and constructive cooperation among member states in the field Kuwait, since its election in 2024 to the membership of

the UN Human Rights Council, has organized more than 24 workshops and 9 panel discussions on pivotal issues such as the rights of the child and persons with disabilities, women's empowerment, peace and security, and combating human trafficking, she unveiled.

She stated that Kuwait reaffirms its commitment to full cooperation with this mechanism to enhance exchange of expertise and best practices and support national efforts aimed at promoting and protecting fundamental rights and freedoms.

Al-Mulla noted that the State of Kuwait received 290 recommendations in the last review, from which it accepted 206, partially accepted 35, and took note of

49 others.

"This reflects the State of Kuwait's commitment to practically addressing actionable recommendations and aligning them with its national plans, foremost among them the development of legislation and institutions within the framework of Kuwait Vision 2035," she clarified.
Al-Mulla indicated that these efforts "come within the framework of close co-

operation with the United Nations system, the international community, and relevant regional organizations, reflecting the State of Kuwait's commitment to its pledges and adherence to an approach based on dialogue, capacity building, and international cooperation as a means to achieve genuine and sustainable progress in promoting and protecting human rights.'

She stated the State of Kuwait is looking forward to continuing this constructive approach by seeking re-election to the Human Rights Council for the 2027-2029

King Mohammed VI, may Allah bless your wisdom...

NO right is lost as long as there is someone demanding it. The Kingdom of Morocco has proven this through a long history of diplomacy, wisdom, and patient and diligent work. Throughout the blessed Moroccan march, the Kingdom of Morocco aimed first and foremost to maintain good relations with its closest neighbor, Algeria, and to uphold the principles of the Arab Maghreb Union (AMU), which are based on achieving consensus among member states, establishing close diplomatic cooperation based on dialogue, and contributing to the maintenance of peace based on justice.

Therefore, the United Nations (UN) Security Council resolution issued recently reinforces these principles, which Rabat has never deviated from. Since the launch of the Green March, led by the late King Hassan II, may Allah have mercy on him, in 1975, Morocco has been working hard to serve common Arab interests without being embroiled in military conflict. Thus, Morocco chose diplomacy as its favorite path in spite of the numerous difficulties.

In 1989, the Kingdom strengthened the AMU, which emerged from the Marrakesh Summit of the five countries, with the aim of promoting joint development among member states. However, some sought to undermine this through baseless claims, by raising the Western Sahara issue once again and using a group of misguided individuals, thereby, causing problems for both countries.

Consequently, once the UN Security Council adopts the Moroccan autonomy plan for Western Sahara, it puts an end to many attempts to sabotage and destabilize Morocco, which focuses on development based on regional cooperation and support for everything that serves the Maghreb countries.

On this basis, the remarks made by King Mohammed VI of Morocco regarding his country's plan and its acceptance by the Security Council should be considered. Two-thirds of the UN member states now consider the autonomy initiative the only framework for resolving this conflict.

In his speech recently, King Mohammed VI emphasized this point, saying, "Today, thanks be to Allah, we are entering a decisive phase at the international level.' The Security Council resolution established the principles and foundations necessary for finding a final political solution to this conflict, within the framework of the legitimate rights of Morocco.

Given the commitment of Rabat to maintain the best possible relations with its neighbors, King Mohammed VI was very clear when he stated, "Despite the positive developments in the issue of our territorial integrity, Morocco remains committed to finding a solution that is neither victorious nor vanquished, one that preserves the dignity of all parties.

The primary objective is not to achieve any victory, but rather to achieve the desired benefit, which can be translated into an invitation to the Algerian leadership for "a sincere and fraternal dialogue between Rabat and Algiers to overcome differences and build new relations based on trust, brotherhood and good neighborliness."

RABAT, Nov 1, (Agencies): Moroccan King Mohammed VI called on Algerian President Abdelmadjid Tebboune to engage in "fraternal and sincere dialogue" between Morocco and Algeria in order to overcome their differences and build new relations based on trust, brotherhood and good neighborliness.

King Mohammed VI affirmed the commitment of his country to continue exerting efforts to revive the Arab Maghreb Union (AMU) on the basis of mutual respect, cooperation and integration among its five member states.

In a televised address to the Moroccan people, following the

United Nations (UN) Security Council's vote in favor of a US-backed resolution supporting the initiative of Rabat regarding the Western Sahara issue, the King stressed that history and geography dictate unity, not division.

He said "I call on President Abdelmadjid Tebboune to engage in a sincere and fraternal dialogue between Morocco and Algeria to overcome differences and build new relations based on trust and good neighborliness.3

The Moroccan monarch welcomed the UN Security Council resolution supporting the autonomy plan presented by Morocco in 2007, considering the resolution a "new breakthrough" in the process of consolidating Moroccan sovereignty over the Sahara and putting a definitive end to the fabricated conflict surrounding it.

He pointed out that "the international community recognized the credibility of the autonomy initiative as the only viable and consensual solution to the conflict," adding that the Kingdom is approaching this historic shift with confidence and responsibility,

He considers the adoption of the UN resolution a culmination of the process that began with the Green March in 1975 and a reinforcement of the gains achieved by Morocco in defending its territorial integrity and full sovereignty over its southern

Panel to draft bylaws for cooperative sector

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 1, (KUNA): Minister of Social Affairs, Family and Childhood Affairs Dr. Amthal Al-Huwaila has issued a resolution forming an extraordinary committee to draft bylaws for the cooperative sector.

The commission, to be chaired by the undersecretary Dr. Khaled Al-Ajmi, will group a number of ranking personnel of the ministry of social affairs tasked with handling cooperative affairs.

Minister Al-Huwaila said in a statement on Saturday that he decision was compatible with instructions of the sagacious political leadership for overhauling the sector, boosting its role at the development and social levels.

It also affirms the ministry's keenness on upgrading the legislations and regulations that back up the cooperative

The said commission will study and revise the current cooperative regulations, enact new rules for enhancing governance and transparency, the minis-

ter indicated. It is also tasked to prepare a final report about its mission, along with the proposed bylaws, in no longer than 60 days, with possibility to extend the grace period for a single month.

UAE lauds Kuwait move to host event on falcons

ABU DHABI, Nov 1, (KUNA): Kuwait's hosting of the inaugural UAE World Falcon Racing Cup reflects the strength of relations and keenness on preserving heritage, said Emirati officials on Saturday.

The upcoming tournament from December 4 to 7 will be held in several categories, with the prizes totaling Dirham 500,000 (around KD 40,000).

Speaking to KUNA, the UAE Ambassador to the State of Kuwait, Dr. Matar Al-Neyadi, affirmed that the UAE and Kuwait were eager to preserve Gulf history and the heritage, noting that ventures like the 1977-established Nabat Poets Diwaniya was founded by the late Amir of Kuwait, Sheikh Jaber Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, with the late UAE President Sheikh Zayed Al-Nahyan attending the inauguration.

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 1, (KUNA): The Kuwaiti Ministry of Interior warned on Saturday against entering, hunting or wandering in nature reserves in the country, billing this as a breach of law that necessitates necessary legal action.

The warning is part of ongoing efforts to preserve natural environment and protect wildlife from any violations or illegal practices, the ministry said in a press

Kuwait to witness astronomical phenomena events in November

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 1, (KUNA): A series of remarkable astronomical phenomena will be observed in Kuwait during November bringing together spectacular planetary conjunctions, various phases of the Moon, and meteor showers which are considered among the most beautiful phenomena observable with the naked eye, Al-Ajiri Scientific Center (ASC) announced on saturday.

In a press release, the center said Novemner will be the richest month of events throughout the year.

These phenomena will appear as of Sunday with the conjunction of the Moon and Saturn, as they come closer to each other, passing at a distance of approximately three degrees, it noted.

On Novembr 5, the Moon will reach its full phase, known as the "Beaver Moon", a name historically associated with the season when beavers build their dams during this time of the year, the Moon will be full, it pointed out.

These phenomena will conclude on November 20 with the appearance of the new Moon and the beginning of the crescent of the month of Jumada al-Akhirah, when the Sun and Moon are aligned in a single line, the center elaborated.

Kuwait calls for protection of essential workers in conflicts

Ambassador Al-Bannai highlights law enforcement

WASHINGTON, Nov 1, (KUNA): Kuwait has called for protecting essential services providers in conflict areas, stressing the need of holding accountable violators.

This came in a speech delivered by Kuwait's Delegate to the UN Ambassador Tariq Al-Bannai during a ceremony held by Kuwait's Permanent Mission to the UN that focused on "Essential Services' Providers and Their Safety in Contemporary Armed Conflicts."

The ceremony was held as part of the United Nations' annual International Law Weekend, taking place this year from October 27 to 31.

"Our discussion today does not address abstract theoretical principles, but rather focuses on the practical protection of engineers, technicians, water operators, electricians, sanitation teams, and healthcare workers who keep civilians alive when conflicts threaten to bring their daily lives to a halt," Al-Bannai noted.

Essential services providers are civilians that must be respected and protected, and enabled to achieve safely their mission, he noted.

International humanitarian law obliges parties to the conflict not to attack, destroy, or disrupt water facilities and other essential infrastructure, and to exercise constant care to ensure the safety of individuals responsible for maintaining these facilities, he said.

The UN Security Council affirmed these obligations in its resolution No. 2573 and the need of safeguarding civil infrastructure and those operate and reform it, he emphasized.

There are binding duties, and Kuwait's wide involvement boosts concentration on life-sustaining services.

The GCC States thank Special Rapporteur on human rights situation in the Occupied Palestinian Territories (OPTs) Francesca Albanese for her appreciated efforts to highlight serious violations committed by the Israeli occupation against Palestinians due to continued aggression and siege imposed on Gazans, she added.

The Gulf group stressed the need of mandate of Albanese in the OPTs, rejecting sanctions imposed on her, Al-Mansouri pointed out.

Minister of Education, cauterization is the last resort!

Tbelieve that nations are built by engineers, as in China, and I minds are shaped by creative thinkers, as in the United States and other countries. However, the engineer or educator, who is the subject of this article, has failed to fulfill either role.

At the start of this academic year, Minister of Education Engineer Jalal Al-Tabtabaei announced that he had assigned 150 education experts, even though I doubt we have that many, and most are unknown to the public, to develop the curriculum. He had only three or four months to complete what was essentially an impossible task.

The limited time frame resulted in new curricula that were "rare" rather than "well-crafted," with noticeable shortcomings in content, quality, and timing.

Parents and teachers are still waiting for the printing of the remaining new curriculum books, which contain a large number of political, technical, and linguistic errors, as well as typos that have sparked controversy and ridicule. In response, the minister met with teachers at the Kuwait

Teachers' Society and raised several points, some of which could alone justify his dismissal. He noted, for example, that those who developed the curricula, not merely amended them, worked 17-hour days. This, in itself, is a serious concern. The objective should have been to create material that engages students' minds, not simply to demand exhaustive work. It appears that these individuals were forced to work

based on a decision that lacked logical planning.

The minister surprised attendees at the meeting by claiming that an electronic transfer system for teachers was being developed by a "global company" free of charge.

But who today provides such a service for free? What if serious social or financial errors arise from such a system? Would those offering it at no cost be held accountable?

The minister also criticized any premature judgment or challenge to the curricula's effectiveness before they had been

tested. In response, Professor Suad Al-Moaiel posted a widely praised statement on so-cial media - "Educational curricula are not subject to trial and error; they are the result of a cumulative evaluation process guided by academic and investigative

principles.' Testing curricula is not like testing new medications, which are first tried on animals, then on volunteers, followed by a period of

observation to monitor health effects and side effects. Trial and error cannot be applied to curricula or to educating young minds by simply overwhelming them with a mass of books and waiting to see the impact years later. By then, it may be too late to correct any resulting damage.

The minister refused to appoint individuals with a file in the

psychiatric medicine hospital to supervisory positions, yet he did not bar them from working as teachers.

It is important to note that not everyone with such a file is inherently unfit for employment in all capacities.

In a move that reflects inexperience and contradicts his stated goals, the minister abolished the Education Development Center instead of revitalizing it. This decision reveals a lack of belief in the need for educational development.

Due to space constraints and out of respect for the minister in question, this article will not delve into the minister's highly inappropriate remarks regarding wives, cancer patients, individuals with psychiatric histories, or his predecessors. In addition, his statement, "We want to return Kuwait to number one, regardless of anyone's opinion," was inappropriate and should not have been made by a Minister of Education in a

public setting. I would like to remind the minister that quality education is not a wheel that needs to be reinvented. It is a system already in place in several leading countries, such as Singapore and Scandinavian nations like Sweden and Finland. All that is required is to learn from their experiences and adapt them to suit our local environment.

As the Arabs say, "Cauterization is the last resort"... or perhaps dismissal from office.


Lebanon politically, economically weakened, paralyzed by militant group

"SINCE Iran established Hezbollah in Lebanon, the country has suffered from extensive Iranian control and interference in its internal affairs, turning its territory into an active battleground against Israel. This involvement is not aimed at liberating Palestine, but rather at keeping the region locked in ongoing military conflicts, thereby reinforcing Iran's dominance and influence in regional affairs," columnist Hamed Salem Al-Marri wrote for Al-Seyassah daily.

"Hezbollah has repeatedly dragged Lebanon into wars with Israel. Each time, parts of the country are devastated, while Hez-

bollah leaders continue to deliver fiery speeches, issue threats, and make sweeping promises, even as Israel continues to bomb and destroy Lebanese ter-

"Despite the assassination of some of Hezbollah's political and military leaders by Israel, including attempts on former Secretary-General Hassan Nasrallah, its expulsion from Syria after devastating the country and causing widespread casualties, and its designation as a terrorist organization internationally, Hezbollah continues to wield significant influence over Lebanon's political arena.

"It is widely recognized that stable countries do not allow armed factions or militias, and that weapons are controlled exclusively by the army and

official security forces. "The Lebanese government is working to disarm Hezbollah and reduce its influence over the political arena. It has taken measures against the group, including tightening controls on financial transfers, blocking funds from reaching the party, and prohibiting dealings with its affiliated financial institutions, such as Al-Qard Al-Hasan and Ta'awuni.

"In response, Hezbollah Secretary-General Naim Qassem criticized Lebanese Justice Minister Adel Nassar and Central Bank Governor Karim Saad. Despite these efforts, Hezbollah continues to smuggle funds from various countries, including in Latin America, and engages in drug trafficking and money laundering to compensate for its financial losses and fund

"The cell arrested in Kuwait on charges of financing Hezbollah is just one of many channels used to funnel money to the group in the region. Some of these networks have been uncovered, while others continue to operate and fund Hezbollah.

"Hezbollah's presence in Lebanon acts like a cancer that weakens the body. If left untreated, it can be fatal. For years, Hezbollah has politically weakened and paralyzed Lebanon, driving it toward economic collapse. Delaying the end of Hezbollah's control and its severing of ties with Iran risks plunging Lebanon into a crisis even deeper than the years of the civil

"In light of the rapid changes our world is witnessing today, governments require greater efficiency and flexibility in their performance, especially in the public sector, which is the backbone of any state. This underscores the need to reconsider the role of some unions within ministries and government institutions, particularly when these entities transform from being tools for defending workers' rights to platforms for political discourse, or something akin to a parliament, where slogans abound but

results are lacking," columnist Abdullah Sahoud Al-Fadhli writes for Al-Seyassah daily.

'There is no doubt about the importance of having unions that represent employees' voices, protect their rights, and help build bridges of understanding between workers and management.

"The reality in some ministries and institutions reveals an imbalance, where unions have become tools of pressure that disrupt workflow and impose demands inconsistent with the requirements of reform and develop-

"Some view these unions as a source of administrative chaos and an arena for side conflicts that hinder work.

"Some unions have become more like electoral battlegrounds, producing leaders who treat the union as a populist platform, seeking media attention or personal and political privileges. In these unions, there is much noise but little tangible results.

"The call for the government to adopt a project to abolish or restructure unions within certain ministries is not intended to end union activity, but rather reflects a desire to activate their true role. Perhaps the best solution is to regulate these unions, establish strict legal frameworks to oversee their performance, or replace them with independent professional bodies that work according to merit-based standards and are held accountable for tangible results.

'In conclusion, the public interest must take precedence. Whenever any institution - union or otherwise - becomes a burden on the state and its citizens, review and reform are essential. Re-examining the reality of unions within some ministries is not an attack on union activity, but a call for its correction for the benefit of the nation and its citizens.

Supervisor, 3 officials probed in graft case

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 1: Kuwait Anti-Corruption Authority (Nazaha) has referred a supervisor and several other officials from the Ministry of Public Works to the Public Prosecution, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

In an official statement, Nazaha emphasized that this action is part of its ongoing efforts to combat corruption, mitigate its risks and impacts, and hold perpetrators accountable, in line with its mandate under Article 5, Paragraph 2 of its founding law.

The authority explained that as soon as the reports are verified as constituting a suspected crime, they will be referred to the relevant investigative body for suspected forgery, which is a crime punishable under Penal Code No. 16/1960, as well as for embezzlement and facilitating the embezzlement of public funds.

The Minister of Social Affairs, Family, and Childhood, Dr. Amthal Al-Huwailah announced the referral of several successive boards of directors of the Kaifan Cooperative Society to the Public Prosecution following the discovery of suspected financial violations, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

Dr. Al-Huwailah stressed that the ministry will not tolerate any misuse of public funds or shareholders'

She affirmed that the rule of law, accountability, and transparency are the pillars of the ministry's oversight of cooperative societies.

The minister revealed that the ministry is implementing a comprehensive plan to rectify the situation of cooperative societies, strengthen governance, and ensure sound man-

Cassation court acquits trio

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 1: The Court of Cassation acquitted three young men of possessing narcotics with the intent to distribute, after the Criminal Court and the Court of Appeals upheld the 15-year prison sentence imposed on them.

According to the investigating officer, one of the defendants possessed narcotics for personal use, so he obtained a warrant from the Public Prosecution to arrest him. He sent a secret agent to purchase hashish from the suspect. The transaction was arranged to take place in front of a tourist facility.

The officer added that he cret agent went to the location. During the transaction, the secret agent gave the agreed signal, leading to the arrest of the accused while his companion fled. The officer then proceeded to the residence of another accused, where eight cigarettes and a small quantity of marijuana were found. He discovered that all three defendants were accomplices in obtaining

Earlier, the Court of First Instance sentenced the defendants to 15 years imprisonment for drug trafficking and the Court of Appeals upheld the verdict. However, Attorney Bashar Al-Nassar, lawyer for the accused, appealed to the Court of Cassation, asserting that the proceedings were marred by a violation of the defendants' right to a fair trial. He argued that the court based its ruling solely on the testimony of the investigating officer which, he maintained, was merely an opinion, subject to error or falsehood, unless corroborated by other material evidence.

The Court of Cassation acquitted the defendants of drug trafficking, explaining it was not convinced by the investigation or the officer's testimony regarding the trafficking incident, since it was based on statements unsupported by conclusive

Officer wins right: The Court of Appeals upheld a lower court ruling granting a retired military officer the right to have his study period at Saad Al-Abdullah Academy for Security Sciences counted as part of his active service. The plaintiff filed a lawsuit against the

Ministry of Interior and the Public Institution for Social Security (PIFSS), demanding that his study period at the academy from September 1999 to June 2000 be calculated as part of his active military service, with all the resulting financial benefits in terms of his pension and ser-

Attoreny Mishari Al-Marzouq, lawyer for the defendant, stated that he submitted documents to the court, including his client's graduation certificate from the academy, proving that his client successfully completed the study period and graduated, and that he continued his active service without interruption after graduation.

Al-Marzouq pointed out that the court based its ruling on the fact that Military Pensions and Retirement Benefits Law No. 69/1980 does not prohibit including the period of academic study in the calculation of active service period if it is necessary for the preparation and qualification of the military officer.



Court acquits five of importing and smuggling liquor

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 1: The Court of Appeals acquitted five defendants of importing and smuggling alcohol for the purpose of trafficking, after confirming the lack of conclusive evidence against them.

The court adopted the legal arguments presented by Attorney Inam Haidar, who represented two of the defendants who are brothers.

The case involved customs officers at Shuwaikh Port who seized containers from Vietnam containing large quantities of Heineken beer cans, hidden among boxes of energy drinks, totaling about 28,000 cans.

The Public Prosecution referred the defendants to trial on charges of importation and customs smuggling, with the brothers faced harsher charges due to their prior convictions in similar cases.

Haidar asserted in court that her clients had no connection to the seized shipment and that there was no physical or technical evidence linking them to the incident. She pointed out the absence of the elements of the customs smuggling offense against them, as well as the lack of criminal intent and knowledge of the seized items.

She argued that the investigations were invalid due to lack of seriousness and violation of Article 46 of the Criminal Procedures and Trials Law, which

stipulates that investigation reports lose their probative value unless presented to the competent prosecution.

She added the case file lacked any conclusive evidence to support the charges, and that the incident, as presented, is legally inconceivable in the case of her clients. This, she stressed, rendered the initial ruling on acquitting her clients legally sound.

After reviewing the case, the Court of Appeals upheld the appealed ruling, which acquitted the brothers, and rejected the appeal of the prosecution, confirming the validity of the initial ruling and its consistency with the established facts.

Meanwhile, the Court of Appeals issued final rulings in several drug cases, upholding the acquittal of the defendants, as the invalidity of the arrest and search procedures was established.

Following the arguments of Attorney Tahani Al-Nafis – lawyer for the defendants, the court dismissed the claim for financial compensation against one of the defendants. It also upheld his acquittal of possessing narcotics for personal use, citing insufficient evidence. In a separate ruling, the Court of Appeals upheld the acquittal of a defendant of possessing narcotics and psychotropic substances. The defense argued that the search warrant was invalid because it was not based on serious investigations, and that the search of his vehicle was also invalid due to the absence of a warrant.

MoE opens digital charity fund for needy students

It added that the new electronic system will enable beneficiaries to submit and track applications digitally, contributing to faster processing,

accurate documentation, and effective communication between the ministry, schools and parents.

According to the ministry, the service aims to support stateless and needy students who face financial difficulties that prevent them from paying tuition fees, thus, enabling them to continue their education in a stable and suitable learning environment. It affirmed that this initiative is a manifestation of the humanitarian and educational roles it plays to support students from all backgrounds.

Digital soil data key to urban safety

KISR plans landmark geotechnical database to boost smart city plans

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 1, (KUNA): Head of Geotechnical Database Project at Kuwait Institute for Scientific Research Dana Al-Enezi said KISR aims to establish a national digital geotechnical database, a strategic and inevitable step to support digital infrastructure of smart city visions, enhance crisis response capabilities and develop independent national engineering codes.

In an interview with the Kuwait News (KUNA), Al-Enezi, of KISR's Environment and Life Research Center, said that her current project focused on highlighting importance of managing and digitally archiving geotechnical data, a core element

She explained that the absence of a unified national digital database leads to repeated mistakes, delays in decision-making, and increased risks in major urban projects, noting that digitalization and integrated data management have become essential components of modern infrastructure amid the global shift toward smart cities.

Al-Enezi cited the historical case of the Dhahar area in the late 1980s, saying that the region experienced major ground collapse problems in 1988 and 1989, which prompted the Public Authority for Housing Welfare to seek experts to assess damages, and KISR to conduct extensive investiga-

"This incident illustrates the dangers of lacking a national database, as it led to a slow response and greater losses due to reliance on ad-hoc studies instead of a permanent knowledge system that could be quickly accessed," she said.

Al-Enezi pointed out that despite past research efforts, Kuwait still lacks a national geotechnical database or detailed maps showing soil characteristics at different

She praised the leading Gulf experiences that have advanced significantly in the digital transformation of national data management, stressing that these examples prove the importance of investing in digital infrastructure.

She said Saudi Arabia "is a leading regional model in geological data infrastructure," referring to the digital platforms and services provided by the Saudi Geological Survey through its official portal, which offer national geological maps and data sup-

porting major development projects and infrastructure planning, while also facilitating controlled access to subsurface records and layers for decision-makers and technical authorities.

"This progress has been reflected in Saudi Arabia's mega projects, especially future cities that rely on the Digital Twin concept and subsurface modeling linked to verified geological and geotechnical data, enhancing design efficiency, implementation, and risk management throughout the project life cycle," said Al-Enezi.

She emphasized that having a specialized national database under the supervision of an official geoengineering authority was a cornerstone of any rapidly developing urban project.

She also noted that the United Arab Emirates has presented successful examples of geo-digital transformation, highlighting Abu Dhabi's Department of Municipalities and Transport's initiatives in modeling, which enable more precise planning, better geotechnical risk anticipation and broader integration with smart city platforms.

Al-Enezi explained that addressing

geological hazards (Geohazards) requires adopting a comprehensive geotechnical and geological data system based on Geographic Information Systems (GIS) to collect detailed data on terrain, physical and chemical soil properties and historical incidents.

She added that "this system allows predicting problems before they occur, establishing early warning mechanisms, and enabling engineers, designers, and decision-makers to understand subsurface conditions accurately - even before the feasibility study stage.'

She emphasized that the role of the database extends beyond urban planning and crisis management, serving as a key reference in developing national engineering

She said, "Preparing a national seismic code relies on precise data about soil nature and dynamic behavior, as well as on determining seismic risk factors for each region." She added that it also provided the basis for developing a national geotechnical code based on local data instead of full reliance on foreign codes.

Engineer Al-Enezi noted the critical importance of this database for major national projects, such as the Al-Mutlaa Residential City and development projects on Boubyan

Al-Mutlaa City, she said, "with its extensive construction works, needs a main reference to help understand soil distribution, reduce risks, and ensure infrastructure

Kuwait champions education as pillar of human rights in Geneva

Al-Khaldi emphasizes inclusive schooling, Al and lifelong learning

GENEVA, Nov 1, (KUNA): During the Social Forum held in Geneva, the Kuwaiti delegation reaffirmed the vital role of education as a key driver of sustainable development and a fundamental pillar for advancing human rights for all.

This came in a statement delivered by the head of the Kuwaiti delegation Acting Undersecretary of the Ministry of Education Mohammad Al-Khaldi during the Human Rights Council's Social Forum convened on October 30-31.

Al-Khaldi emphasized that investment in education extends beyond developing minds it builds an inclusive society founded on justice equality and human dignity.

He re-affirmed Kuwait's unwavering commitment to the core principles upheld by the Human Rights Council particularly the right to education without discrimination. He stressed that human development and capacity-building lie at the heart of the country's development strategy.

He noted that Kuwait actively supports both national and international efforts to strengthen the role of education in promoting civil social economic cultural and political rights while empowering individuals to participate effectively in building a democratic and equitable society based on freedom justice and equality.

Al-Khaldi highlighted that Kuwait provides free mandatory and inclusive education for all segments of society at the pre-university level including adult education literacy programs and inclusive education for persons with disabilities aligning with the Sustainable Development Goals and the principles of equality and fairness enshrined in the Kuwaiti Constitution.

He further underlined Kuwait's ongoing efforts to keep pace with global advancements by integrating artificial intelligence digital learning and innovation into the national curriculum with a strong focus on science and technology disciplines

to equip future generations with the skills needed for the labor market.

He pointed out that the Ministry of Education has recently revamped curricula from kindergarten to middle school introducing 143 new textbooks for the 2025 academic year. These materials incorporate concepts that promote awareness of rights and responsibilities reinforce citizenship and national identity and foster analytical and creative thinking among students.

Al-Khaldi explained that Kuwait places human capital investment at its core by supporting lifelong learning opportunities for all. Adult education and literacy centers he noted play a central role in realizing this goal.

He also pointed to Kuwait's strong commitment to the inclusion of persons with disabilities and integrated students emphasizing the government's efforts to equip public schools to accommodate their needs provide specialized educational psychological and social support staff and design appropriate curricula that respect individual differ-

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 1: Engineering students from the Australian University (AU) secured second place at the 2025 Gulf Petrochemicals and Chemicals Association (GPCA) Carbon Neutrality Cup, a regional competition that brings together top university innovators from across the GCC to develop practical solutions supporting the region's transition toward net-zero emissions.

Held in Bahrain during the Responsible Care Conference, this year's edition drew more than 70 project entries from over 20 universities. Following the preliminary evaluation, five teams from the undergraduate category, including two teams representing AU, were

shortlisted as finalists, and invited to present their work through poster exhibitions and oral pitches before judges composed of leading GCC industrial experts.

Following the deliberation, the second-place award was granted to AU students Tesnim Bouhanna and Nourah Al Shaibani, under the supervision of Dr. Jean El Achkar, Assistant Professor of Petroleum Engineering at AU's College of Engineering. In this vast Maghreb region, with its immense resources, development cannot occur as long as a sense of unease persists. Stability is the only natural path to prosperity. Q: To achieve this vision, what role does Kuwait play? What is the role of the government?

Governments have a key role to play. They can ensure there is a platform to provide smokers with accurate information about the benefits and risks of alternatives. The message should always be clear - quitting is best, and non-smokers should not start, but for those who continue smoking, better alternatives should be available. This is the most important thing governments can do to improve public health.

Q: How long do you think it will take to fulfill this vision? Do you believe we will ever see a world without cigarettes?

A: I hope so. Change takes time, and people are naturally skeptical of innovation. But rationality prevails. When an innovation improves lives, adoption eventually follows.

Our journey is still young, but globally, over 40 million consumers have adopted better alternatives, and 72 percent of them have completely abandoned cigarettes. Countries like Sweden and Japan have achieved historically low smoking rates, and New Zealand has reduced smoking incidence to seven percent through progressive policies.

So yes, it is feasible. It will take time, but we will see a day when cigarettes are a thing of the past and people live healthier lives, thanks to better alterna-

O: Do you think the Gulf region, especially Kuwait, is capable of reaching

A: I do. While the cost of switching may be a barrier for some, this region is progressive and accustomed to adopting innovation. Countries here often set global examples in innovation, and there is no reason why the same approach could not apply to tobacco and nicotine. With supportive policies, I believe Kuwait can follow in the footsteps of Japan and Sweden and become a success story in smoke-free adoption.

During the conference, Fred De Wilde, President of the SSEA, MEA & CIS Region, said, "Bringing smoke-free alternatives to developing economies comes with unique challenges. Many smokers remain unaware of the health risks, and economic barriers often limit access to new technologies. High upfront costs can be daunting, but by developing a diverse product portfolio, we aim to make smoke-free choices accessible to people from all income levels.

Our mission is clear. No one should be left behind on the journey to a smoke-free future. By understanding local needs and purchasing power, we are making better alternatives available to a wider audience."

Meanwhile, Director, Scientific Engagement, SSEA CIS & MEA, PMI, Tomoko Iida, said, "Harm reduction is about minimizing the negative consequences associated with risky behaviors, such as smoking.

Effective harm reduction requires that reduced-risk products are actually used; otherwise, they will have no impact on public health. That is why it is essential for these innovations to be widely accessible and affordable to smokers everywhere.

Tobacco harm reduction is not a theoretical concept but a pragmatic policy approach that is already delivering results. In Japan, cigarette volume decreased by 50 percent after the introduction of heated tobacco ten years ago. In Sweden, the increase in oral nicotine products has contributed to the country having one of the lowest rates of smoking-related diseases in

Furthermore, Vice President, Smoke-Free Products Category, SSEA, CIS & MEA, PMI, Christos Kiritsis, said, "We know that no single product will meet all consumers' needs. Two days ago, thousands of Moroccans participated in public celebrations that erupted in several cities following the UN resolution.

Eleven countries voted in favor, while Russia, China and Pakistan abstained. Algeria did not participate in the vote. The resolution reaffirmed its support for Morocco's autonomy initiative for the Western Sahara.

Republican leaders reject Trump's demands to scrap Senate filibuster to end shutdown

WASHINGTON, Nov 1, (AP): Back from a week abroad, US President Donald Trump threw himself into the shutdown debate, calling on the Senate to scrap the filibuster and reopen the government, an idea swiftly rejected Friday by Republican leaders who have long opposed such a move.

Trump pushed his Republican Party to get rid of the Senate rule that requires 60 votes to overcome objections and gives the minority Democrats a check on GOP power. In the chamber that's currently split, 53-47, Democrats have had enough votes to keep the government closed while they demand an extension of health care subsidies. Neither party has seriously wanted to nuke the rule.

"THE CHOICE IS CLEAR - INI-TIATE THE 'NUCLEAR OPTION, GET RID OF THE FILIBUSTER,' Trump said in a late night social media post Thursday.

Trump's sudden decision to assert himself into the shutdown now in its 31st day - with his highly charged demand to end the filibuster - is certain to set the Senate on edge. It could spur senators toward their own compromise or send the chamber spiraling toward a new sense of crisis. Or, it might be

Republican leaders responded quickly, and unequivocally, setting themselves at odds with Trump, a president few have dared to publicly

Senate Majority Leader John Thune has repeatedly said he is not considering changing the rules to end the shutdown, arguing that it is vital to the institution of the Senate and has allowed them to halt Democratic policies when they are in the minority.

The leader's "position on the importance of the legislative filibuster is unchanged," Thune spokesman Ryan Wrasse said Friday.

A spokeswoman for Wyoming Sen John Barrasso, the No. 2 Republican, said his position opposing a filibuster change also remains unchanged. And former GOP leader Mitch McConnell, who firmly opposed Trump's filibuster pleas in his first term, remains in the

House Speaker Mike Johnson also defended the filibuster Friday, while conceding "it's not my call," from his chamber across the Capitol.

"The safeguard in the Senate has always been the filibuster," Johnson said, adding that Trump's comments are "the president's anger at the situ-

Even if Thune wanted to change the filibuster, he would not currently have the votes to do so in the divided Sen-

"The filibuster forces us to find common ground in the Senate," Republican Sen. John Curtis of Utah posted on X Friday morning, responding to Trump's comments and echoing the sentiments of many of his Senate Republican colleagues. "Power changes hands, but principles shouldn't. I'm a firm no on eliminating it."

Debate has swirled around the legis-

lative filibuster for years. Many Democrats pushed to eliminate it when they had full power in Washington, as the Republicans do now, four years ago. But ultimately, enough Democratic senators opposed the move, predicting such an action would come back to haunt them.

Trump's demand comes as he has declined to engage with Democratic leaders on ways to end the shutdown, on track to become the longest in his-

He said in his post that he gave a "great deal" of thought to his choice on his flight home from Asia and that one question that kept coming up during his trip was why "powerful Republicans allow" the Democrats to shut down parts of the government.

But later Friday, he did not mention the filibuster again as he spoke to re-porters departing Washington and arriving in Florida for a weekend at his Mar-a-Lago home.

While quiet talks are underway, particularly among bipartisan senators, Trump has not been seriously involved. Democrats refuse to vote to reopen the government until Republicans negotiate an extension to the health care subsidies. The Republicans say they won't negotiate until the government is reopened.

House Democratic Leader Hakeem Jeffries said on CNN that Trump needs to start negotiating with Democrats, arguing the president has spent more time with global leaders than dealing with the shutdown back home.

From coast to coast, fallout from the dysfunction of the shuttered federal government is hitting home. SNAP food aid is scheduled to shut off. Flights are being delayed. Workers are going without paychecks.

And Americans are getting a first glimpse of the skyrocketing health care insurance costs that are at the center of the stalemate.

"People are stressing," said Sen Lisa Murkowski of Alaska, as food options

in her state grow scarce. "We are well past time to have this behind us.'

The White House has moved money around to ensure the military is paid, but refuses to tap funds for food aid. In fact, Trump's "big, beautiful bill" signed into law this summer, delivered the most substantial cut ever to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, known as SNAP, projected to result in some 2.4 million people off

Agriculture Secretary Brooke Rollins said Friday the agency cannot release contingency funds to keep SNAP running, but two judges ruled nearly simultaneously Friday that the administration must continue to fund the food aid program. How quickly that might happen remains to be seen, as further consultation with the courts is expected on Monday.

Trump, in a social media post, said administration lawyers will be asking the courts "to clarify how we can legally fund SNAP as soon as

Obama to rally Dems in Virginia and NJ in weekend campaign push before Election Day

RICHMOND, Va., Nov 1, (AP): Former US president Barack Obama was to headline rallies Saturday for Democrats running for governor in Virginia and New Jersey, corralling voters ahead of elections that may signal the national mood 10 months into Donald Trump's second presidency and a year ahead of midterm elections that could reshape it.

Republicans in those states are stumping as well on the final weekend of campaigning before Tuesday's elections, but without the national star power.

And on the west coast, California advocates are making a final push ahead of a statewide referendum over whether to redraw the state's congressional map in Democrats' favor. The effort backed by Gov. Gavin Newsom is part of a national redistricting battle that began when Trump urged GOPrun states to help him keep a friendly House majority in 2026.

Obama, the Democrat whom Trump succeeded when he first assumed the presidency, will appear first Saturday with Virginia's Democratic gubernatorial nominee Abigail Spanberger in Norfolk. Obama then travels to New Jersey for an evening rally with Democratic gubernatorial nominee Mikie

Sherrill in Newark. Both events put the nation's first Black president in areas where Black voter turnout is key for Democratic victories.

Virginia Republican nominee Winsome Earle-Sears, the current lieutenant governor, and New Jersey Republican Jack Ciattarelli, a former state lawmaker, have busy itineraries, as well.

The Virginia contest ensures the election of the first woman to lead the Commonwealth since its 1776 founding. If elected, Earle-Sears would be the first Black woman elected governor of any state.

Democratic Virginia House Speaker Don Scott brushed off questions about whether Obama was needed to help turn out Black voters who are key to Democrats' coalition of voters, saying his popularity

2 die in flooded NYC basements: Two people died in flooded New York City basements Thursday during a rainstorm that shut down roadways and caused airport delays, authorities said.

A scuba team recovered the body of a 39-year-old man after firefighters received a call of a person trapped in the flooded basement of a three-story townhouse in Brooklyn at about 4:30 p.m., police said.

A video posted online showed firefighters carrying the victim away through calf-deep water on the street.

In Manhattan, a 43-year-old man was found dead inside

the flooded basement boiler room of an apartment building, police said. The cause of death was under investigation.

Some spots around the city saw record rainfall. Preliminary reports showed 1.8 inch (4.57 centimeters) of rain fell in Central Park on Thursday, which would surpass the record of 1.64 inches (4.17 centimeters) set for the park in 1917, the National Weather Service said. LaGuardia Airport recorded 1.97 inch (5 centimeters) of rain, which would break the 1955 record of 1.18 inches (3 centimeters) for that airport.

New York saw hours of rainfall of varying intensity Thursday leading into the evening commute. Photos and video on social media showed water rising to the bumpers of cars and pouring into subway stations.

"When you look at the amount of water that was coming down, our sewer systems are just not built to handle that. It was a steady rain, throughout," Mayor Eric Adams told radio station 1010 WINS. (AP)

Explosion at New Mexico oil refinery: Emergency crews responded Friday to an explosion at an oil refinery in New Mexico as thick smoke emerged from the plant and drifted across parts of the city of Artesia before crews were able to extinguish the flames.

Navajo Refinery operator HF Sinclair said that the fire had been extinguished and that three people were transported off-site for medical attention. No other injuries were reported Air monitoring on the perimeter of the refinery and in

a nearby community showed no risk to public safety, said Corinn Smith, a spokesperson of HF Sinclair. It was unclear whether refinery production was affected. Artesia Police Commander Pete Quiñones said that po-

lice and other first responders scrambled to the site before the fire was contained.

Authorities said the smoke had dissipated by Friday afternoon and roads were reopened. The New Mexico Environment Department said it was sending a team to Artesia to assess conditions and monitor air quality.

The refinery sits adjacent to Artesia's main intersection, which serves as an artery from the Permian Basin in the southeastern corner of the state to the rest of New Mexico. The company's website notes that the facility has a crude oil capacity of 100,000 barrels per day, making it the largest in New Mexico, but it wasn't immediately clear how full the plant was at the time of the incident. Federal judge rules Trump can't require citizenship proof on federal voting form King Charles III strips Prince Andrew of titles

NEW YORK, Nov 1, (AP): US President Donald Trump's request to add a documentary proof of citizenship requirement to the federal voter registration form cannot be enforced, a federal judge ruled Friday.

US District Judge Colleen Kollar-Kotelly in Washington, DC, sided with Democratic and civil rights groups that sued the Trump administration over his executive order to overhaul US elections.

She ruled that the proof-of-citizenship directive is an unconstitutional violation of the separation of powers, dealing a blow to the administration and its allies who have argued that such a mandate is necessary to restore public confidence that only Americans are voting in US elections.

"Because our Constitution assigns responsibility for election regulation to the States and to Congress, this Court holds that the President lacks the authority to direct such changes," Kollar-Kotelly wrote in her opinion.

She further emphasized that on matters related to setting qualifications for voting and regulating federal election procedures "the Constitution assigns no direct role to the President in either domain.

Kollar-Kotelly echoed comments she made when she granted a preliminary injunction over the issue.

The ruling grants the plaintiffs a partial summary judgment that prohibits the proof-of-citizenship requirement from going into effect. It says the US Election Assistance Commission, which has been considering adding the requirement to the federal voter form, is permanently barred from taking ac-

In a statement, Sophia Lin Lakin of the ACLU, one of the plaintiffs in the case, called the ruling "a clear victory for our democracy.

'Russia 170,000 troops in Donetsk'

Ukraine hits key fuel pipeline near Moscow

KYIV, Ukraine, Nov 1, (AP): Ukrainian forces hit an important fuel pipeline in the Moscow region that supplies the Russian army, Ukraine's military intelligence said Saturday, a claim that came amid a sustained Russian campaign of massive drone and missile attacks on Ukraine's energy infrastructure.

The operation was carried out late Friday, according to a statement on the Telegram messaging channel. The agency, which is known by its acronym HUR, described it as a "serious blow" to Russia's military logistics.

HUR said its forces struck the Koltsevoy pipeline, which spans 400 kilometers (250 miles) and supplies the Russian army with gasoline, diesel and jet fuel from refineries in Ryazan, Nizhny Novgorod and Moscow.

The operation, which targeted infrastructure near Ramensky district, destroyed all three fuel lines, HUR said.

The pipeline was capable of transporting up to 3 million tons of jet fuel, 2.8 million tons of diesel and 1.6 million tons of gasoline annually, HUR

Meanwhile, Russia's defense ministry

on Saturday claimed its forces defeated a team of Ukrainian special forces that were rushed to the eastern front-line hotspot of Pokrovsk in a bid to stop Russian troops from pushing further into the

Russia and Ukraine have presented conflicting accounts of what is happening in Pokrovsk, a key Ukrainian stronghold in the eastern Donetsk region. Russian President Vladimir Putin claimed last week that his forces had encircled the city's Ukrainian defenders.

But Volodmyr Zelenskyy said last week that Russia had deployed around 170,000 troops in Ukraine's eastern Donetsk region, where Pokrovsk lies, in a major push to capture the city and claim a major battlefield victory.

Royal exit latest crisis for Britain's monarchy

LONDON, Nov 1, (AP): King Charles III stripped his disgraced brother Prince Andrew of his remaining titles and evicted him from his royal residence after weeks of pressure to act over his relationship with Jeffrey Epstein, Buckingham Palace said.

After the king's rare move, which follows years of shameful scandals, he will be known as Andrew Mountbatten Windsor and not as a prince, and he will have to vacate his Royal Lodge mansion near Windsor Castle.

Demand had been growing on the palace to oust the prince from Royal Lodge after he surrendered his use of the title Duke of York earlier this month over new revelations about his friendship with Epstein and renewed abuse allegations by one of Epstein's victims, Virginia Roberts Giuffre, whose posthumous memoir hit bookstores last week.

But the king went even further to punish him for serious lapses of judgment by removing the title of prince that he has held since birth as a child of a monarch, the late Queen Elizabeth II.

"These censures are deemed nec-essary, notwithstanding the fact that he continues to deny the allegations against him," the palace said. "Their Majesties wish to make clear that their thoughts and utmost sympathies have been, and will remain with, the victims and survivors of any and all forms of

It is almost unprecedented for a British prince or princess to be stripped

of that title. It last happened in 1919, when Prince Ernest Augustus, who was a UK royal and also a prince of Hanover, had his British title removed for siding with Germany during World

Giuffre's brother declared victory for his sister, who died by suicide in April at the age of 41.

'Today, an ordinary American girl from an ordinary American family, brought down a British prince with her truth and extraordinary courage," her brother Skye Roberts said in a statement to the BBC.

Andrew faced a new round of public

outrage after emails emerged earlier this month showing he had remained in contact with Epstein longer than he previously admitted.

Andrew, 65, has long denied Giuffre's claims, but stepped down from royal duties after a disastrous November 2019 BBC interview in which he attempted to rebut her allegations.

Although Charles was involved in discussions with Andrew before he announced he would relinquish his dukedom two weeks ago, the king had largely managed to steer clear of the scandal until this week.

Serbia marks anniversary of deadly train station disaster with large demonstration

NOVI SAD, Serbia, Nov 1, (AP): Tens of thousands of people from all over Serbia gathered on Saturday in the northern town of Novi Sad to commemorate the victims of a railway station disaster a year ago. The rally was also a massive display of boiling discontent with the government of autocratic President Aleksandar Vucic.

The collapse of a concrete canopy at the Novi Sad train station last Nov. 1 killed 16 people. The tragedy triggered youth-led street protests and a nationwide movement demanding political changes that have seriously shaken Vucic's tight hold on power.

The protesters believe that the concrete construction at the renovated station building in Novi Sad collapsed because rampant corruption and nepotism in state infrastructure projects with China led to fatal disregard of safety rules.

President Xi, PM Carney try to rebuild China-Canada relations US vows to 'stoutly defend' Indo-Pacific interests in talks with China

GYEONGJU, South Korea, Nov 1, (AP): The leaders of China and Canada took a step toward mending the long-fractured ties between their countries on Friday.

Chinese President Xi Jinping and Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney, meeting in South Korea during an Asia-Pacific summit, called for improving ties in a pragmatic and constructive manner, according to both


"The leaders agreed that their meeting marked a turning point in the bilateral relationship," a Canadian statement said.

Xi was quoted as saying that relations are showing signs of recovery, thanks to the joint efforts of both

"We are willing to work together with Canada to take this meeting as an opportunity to promote the return of bilateral relations to a healthy, stable and sustainable track as soon as possible," Xi said, according to an official report distributed by China's state me-

Carney, who became prime minister in March, accepted an invitation from Xi to visit China, the Canadian statement said, without specifying any date.

Carney also later told reporters he was "very pleased" with the outcome.

"We now have a turning point in the relationship, a turning point that creates opportunities for Canadian families, for Canadian businesses and Canadian workers, and also creates a

path to address current issues," he said. Relations took a nosedive in late 2018 after Canadian authorities arrested a senior executive of Chinese tech giant Huawei as a part of its extradition agreement with the United States. China then arrested two Canadian citizens and charged then with espionage.

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia, Nov 1, (AP): The US secretary of defense said Friday he told his Chinese counterpart during talks in Malaysia that Washington would "stoutly defend" its interests in the Indo-Pacific. He also signed a new agreement aimed at strengthening security ties with India.

Pete Hegseth described as "good and constructive" his meeting with Chinese Admiral Dong Jun, held on the sidelines of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations defense ministers meeting in Kuala Lumpur. He said he raised US concerns over Chinese activities in the South China Sea. around Taiwan and toward US allies and partners in the region.

"I highlighted the importance of maintaining a balance of power in the Indo-Pacific," Hegseth wrote on social media platform X. "United States does not seek conflict (but) it will continue to stoutly defend its interests and ensure it has the capabilities in the region

China's defense ministry issued a cautious response, emphasizing its longstanding positions. Dong Jun stressed the reunification of China and Taiwan is an "unstoppable historical trend" and urged the US to be cautious in its words and actions on the Taiwan issue, the statement said.

"We hope the US will translate its

India is a major defense partner of the U.S and has in recent years embedded advanced American jets, helicopters, missiles and military gear into its armed forces.

"This advances our defense partnership, a cornerstone for regional stability and deterrence," Hegseth wrote on X. "Our defense ties have never been stronger.'

Singh said the US-India partnership is crucial for ensuring a free, open and rules-based Indo-Pacific region. "It is a signal of our growing strategic convergence and will herald a new decade of partnership," he said on X.

The framework agreement comes amid renewed strains in bilateral ties after President Donald Trump imposed a 50% import tariff on Indian goods in August and criticized New Delhi for continued purchase of discounted Russian oil. India is the second biggest buyer of Russian oil after China.

'7,500 refugees to be admitted to US'

S.Africa slams Trump's refugee policy

JOHANNESBURG, Nov 1, (AP): South Africa's government on Friday criticized the US refugee policy shift that gives priority to Afrikaners, the country's white minority group of Dutch descent.

The Trump administration on Thursday announced a ceiling of 7,500 refugees to be admitted to the United States, a sharp decrease from the previous 125,000 spots and said Afrikaners would be given preference over other

US President Donald Trump has claimed that there is a "genocide" against Afrikaners in South Africa and that they are facing persecution and discrimination because of the country's redress policies and the levels of crime in the country.

It's one of the contentious issues that has seen diplomatic relations between South Africa and US hit an alltime low, with Trump suspending all financial aid to South Africa and setting one of the highest tariffs for the country's exports to the US.

The South African government's international relations department said Friday that the latest move was concerning as it "still appears to rest on a premise that is factually inaccurate."

"The claim of a 'white genocide' in South Africa is widely discredited and unsupported by reliable evidence," spokesman Chrispin Phiri said.

Phiri said that a program designed to facilitate the immigration and resettlement of Afrikaners as refugees was deeply flawed and disregarded the country's constitutional processes.

"The limited uptake of this offer by South Africans is a telling indicator of this reality," Phiri said.

The U.S. notice, which signifies a huge policy shift toward refugees, mentioned only Afrikaners as a specific group and said the admission of the 7,500 refugees during the 2026 budget year "justified by humanitarian concerns or is otherwise in the national interest.

Trump's asylum offer for Afrikaners has sparked divisive debate in South Africa, but has been largely rejected even by many in the Afrikaner community.

This week, a group of prominent Afrikaners including politicians, activists, writers and businesspeople penned an open letter rejecting the notion that Afrikaners needed to emigrate from South Africa.

UN human rights chief says US strikes on alleged drug boats 'unacceptable', must stop

GENEVA, Nov 1, (AP): The UN human rights chief said Friday that US military strikes against boats in the Caribbean Sea and eastern Pacific Ocean allegedly carrying illegal drugs from South America are "unacceptable" and

The UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, Volker Türk, called for an investigation into the strikes, in what appeared to mark the first such condemnation of its kind from a United Nations organization.

Ravina Shamdasani, a spokeswoman for Türk's office, relayed his message Friday at a regular UN briefing: "These attacks and their mounting human cost are unacceptable. The U.S. must halt such attacks and take all measures necessary to prevent the extrajudicial killing of people aboard these boats.

She said Türk believed "airstrikes by the United States of America on boats in the Caribbean and in the Pacific violate international human rights

President Donald Trump has justified the attacks on the boats as a necessary escalation to stem the flow of drugs into the United States, but the campaign against drug cartels has been divisive among countries in the region.

The strikes and the U.S. military's growing presence near Venezuela have stoked fears that the Trump adminis-

India temple stampede kills at least 9

NEW DELHI, Nov 1, (Agencies): A crowd surge at a popular temple in southern India left at least nine people dead and dozens injured, local authorities said Saturday.

The incident occurred at the Swamy Venkateswara Temple in the Srikakulam district of Andhra Pradesh state where hundreds of devotees had gathered to mark "Ekadashi," senior police officer K. V. Maheswra Reddy told the Associated Press.

An initial investigation suggests that an iron grille meant to maintain the queue of worshippers at the temple broke, leading to the uncontrolled crowd surge, Reddy said.

Senior local government official Swapnil Dinkar Pundkar said more casualties were feared. "Initially, we had reports of seven deaths, but two more people have succumbed to their injuries while the condition of two others is critical," he said.

NEW DELHI: Over 15 children aged between 11 and 15 years were taken hostage by a man at a studio in india's financial capital Mumbai, confirmed a local police over the phone.

And this continues to reflect the excellent asset quality of our loan book and compares very favorably both historically and to other banks in the system. Overall, the NPL percentage remains very low at 1.4% which was the same as H1, and broadly similar to the

levels this time last year. And we continue to have significant total coverage including collaterals of 324%."

Margins

In response to questions raised regarding the net interest margins and the trend during Q3, Mr.Challinor remarked: "In Q3, we saw the overall net interest margin fall from O2 by 9 basis points although we still remain 5 points above Q1 levels.Now, the income yields were flat from Q2 to Q3, so the margin compression in the quarter was entirely driven by the cost of fund increase. As we know, we had a 25-point rate cut in both KD and USD in mid-September but the impact in Q3 on both income yields, and cost of funds was negligible. But we'll see larger impacts flow through the full quarter in Q4.

Loan Growth

In regard to loan growth, Mr. Challinor noted: "Our loan book was basically flat for Q3, with both the corporate and retail books being around the same levels as at H1. But in total we have a 4% growth year to date. Now, in terms of corporate, we do have a significant pipeline in this space and would expect Q4 to be a strong quarter in terms of corporate loan growth.

And even though we had a flat quarter in terms of corporate loan growth there was a strong performance in fee income, which is a strategic focus area for the bank. When we look at retail, even though Q3 was flat it was a relative turnaround from the prior quarters where we saw degrowth. Looking ahead, we gave guidance at the beginning of the year that full year loan growth would be around mid-single digit, but we could expect to exceed this if the strong corporate pipeline con-

Operating Revenues: Operatrevenues reached KD 37.06 million, representing an increase of 41.45% compared to KD 26.20 million recorded during the same period in 2024.

■ Operating Profit: Operating profit grew by 58.16%, reaching KD 28.36 million compared to KD 17.93 million in the corresponding period of 2024.

■ Earnings Per Share (EPS): Earnings per share witnessed a significant jump, rising from 71.85 fils in the first nine months of 2024 to 114.82 fils per share for the period ended September 30, 2025 - mirroring the 59.81% growth in net profit.

Strong Financial Position and **Balance Sheet Growth**

The Group's balance sheet continued to strengthen, reflecting the sustained growth in both assets and shareholders' equity:

Historic Growth in Operating Performance

The Kuwaiti capital market susits positive momentum throughout the first nine months of 2025, supported by notable improvements across key performance indicators. Total traded value increased by 89.73%, rising from KD10.20 billion in the third quarter of 2024 to KD 19.35 billion for the period ended September 30, 2025, while traded volume grew by 92.17% to reach 84.23 billion shares, compared to 43.83 billion shares during the corresponding period last year.

Average daily traded value (ADTV) also rose by 91.82%, reaching KD 106.91 million compared to KD 55.74 million in the same period of 2024, while total market capitalization stood at KD 52.61 billion, reflecting an increase of 24.67% from KD 42.20 billion in the first nine

As such, market velocity, which measures traded value related to total market capitalization, for the Kuwaiti capital market continued an upward trajectory, exceeding 45% and outpacing its peers across the GCC. The All-Share Index also reported the highest growth compared to other regional indexes, with a performance of 19.47% in the nine months ended September 30, 2025.

The "Premier" Market maintained its position as the cornerstone of trading activity at Boursa Kuwait, recording a strong 49.82% increase in traded value from KD 7.32 billion to KD1.96 billion. The market also

This achievement also stands as a model for advancing the country's development objectives," said Al-Osaimi.

Flexibility and Amendments to **Main Market Listing Rules**

Boursa Kuwait has amended its rulebook to ease listing requirements for the "Main" Market, decreasing the minimum fair value of freely traded shares not owned by the controlling shareholder group from KD 15 million to KD5 million, while maintaining the requirement that free-float shares must represent at least 20% of total capital.

These amendments aim to encourage more companies, and familyowned businesses in particular, to list, providing greater flexibility that allows them to retain control while accessing the capital market. This initiative will further diversify the listed company base, stimulate new listings and enhance overall market liquidity.

pal subsidiary. The Company undertook oil refining across three refineries - Shuaiba, Mina Al-Ahmadi, and Mina Abdullah – alongside gas liquefaction operations, domestic fuel and lubricant distribution, and comprehensive management of fuel filling stations throughout Kuwait.

Clean Fuels Project – Global Environmental Standards

In a groundbreaking achievement marking a transformative milestone for Kuwait's refining industry, the late Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah inaugurated the Clean Fuels Project (CFP) on March 22, 2022. This initiative elevated KNPC's products to meet global environmental standards (Euro-4 and Euro-5), aligning with specifications in the United States, Europe, and Asia while minimizing pollutants and impurities.

Fifth LPG Train

A major recent achievement includes KNPC's Fifth LPG Train at Mina Al-Ahmadi, which boosted Kuwait's energy security and advanced sustainable growth. The facility produces 805 million standard cubic feet of gas and 106,000 barrels of condensate daily, serving domestic demand and export markets with high-quality products.

Modern Head Office Reflecting Heritage

In 2006, after decades in Mubarakiya, KNPC relocated to its new Head Office in Ahmadi City, closer to operational facilities and partner companies. The environmentally sustainable building showcases contemporary architecture inspired by ocean waves, symbolizing Kuwait's maritime heritage and honoring ancestral legacy.

Al-Zour Refinery – A Landmark Achievement

On May 29, 2024, His Highness Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, Amir of Kuwait, officially inaugurated Al-Zour Refinery's full operations at 615,000 bpd capacity. As the largest refinery in Kuwait, it processes diverse Kuwaiti Crude types, including heavy oil, significantly strengthening the nation's global refining standing and operational capabilities.

Integration and Expansion Journey

Aligned with KPC's comprehensive restructuring initiative and 2040 strategic vision, KNPC advances its integration and expansion journey, which commenced in 2024. The integration encompasses the merger with KIPIC and ownership transfer of LPG Cylinders Filling Plants in Shuaiba and Um Al-Aish, previously managed by Kuwait Oil Tanker Company (KOTC). By August 1, 2025, the plants became under the direct responsibility of KNPC.

A New Era for a Bright Future

Today, having accomplished these significant milestones across its operations, KNPC demonstrates enhanced capability to pursue promising future opportunities. The Company strengthens its position and reputation while maintaining industry leadership through God's blessings and the dedicated, sincere efforts of its entire workforce and employees who drive continued excellence and success.

Historical Milestones

KNPC's inaugural decade featured several landmark achievements, including the launch of its first brand, the establishment of its Head Office in Mubarakiya area – a renowned commercial and cultural landmark – and the fuel filling stations ownership transfer. The most pivotal milestone occurred in 1968 with the commissioning of Shuaiba Refinery, affectionately called "Umm Al-Khair." Boasting a capacity of 200,000 barrels per day, the refinery became the Arabian Gulf's first fully nationally-owned and operated refinery. Remarkably, it was also the world's first refinery to employ hydrogen technology, producing superior, lowsulfur fuels – a groundbreaking innovation that positioned Kuwait at the forefront of the global refining industry.

Refining Operations and Petroleum Products

Currently, KNPC operates Mina Al-Ahmadi Refinery (346,000 bpd) and Mina Abdullah Refinery (454,000 bpd), following the closure of Shuaiba Refinery in 2017 for economic reasons.

Additionally, Al-Zour Refinery, with a capacity of 615,000 bpd, was integrated into KNPC through a sector-wide restructuring project. As the operator of the refinery, the project encompassed the integration of Kuwait Integrated Petroleum Industries Company (KIPIC) into KNPC, bringing the Company's total refining capacity to 1.415 million bpd.

The Company produces a wide range of petroleum products, including Fuel Oil, Ethane, LPG, Naphtha, Gasoline, Kerosene, Diesel, BunkerFuel, Bitumen, Petroleum Coke, and Sulfur products – demonstrating KNPC's comprehensive capabilities in meeting domestic and international energy demands.

Gas Processing

Gas processing forms an essential component of KNPC's operations. The Company owns a Liquefied Gas Plant at Mina Al-Ahmadi. Inaugurated in February 1979, the Plant currently features five production trains with a combined daily capacity of 3.125 billion standard cubic feet of Gas and 332,000 barrels of Condensate.

Fuel Filling Stations

Since its inception, KNPC has overseen the construction, operation, and maintenance of fuel filling stations across Kuwait. In 1961, the Company acquired 14 stations from Kuwait Oil Company, progressively expanding to manage all stations nationwide, reaching 119 by 2004. Following a 2005 privatization decision initiated by the Supreme Petroleum Council, some stations were transferred to Al-Oula Fuel Marketing Company and Al-Sour Fuel Marketing

'Crime of opportunity, and not a targeted art theft'

California museum's collection looted: Over 1,000 items stolen

OAKLAND, Calif., Nov 1, (AP): Police in California are investigating the theft of more than 1,000 items from a museum's collection including metalwork jewelry, Native American baskets and everyday items like athletic trophies that tell the story of the Golden State.

The burglary occurred in the early morning hours of Oct. 15 at an off-site storage facility of the Oakland Museum of California, Oakland Police said in a news release

Lori Fogarty, the museum's director, said Thursday the investigation was going public because the artifacts might show up at flea markets, antique stores or pawn

"They're not just a loss to the museum," she said. "They're a loss to the public, to our community and we're hoping our com-

munity can help us bring them home."

Fogarty said it appeared to be a crime of opportunity, and not a targeted art theft. "We think the thieves found a way to enter the building, and they grabbed what they could easily find and snatch and get

out of the building with," she said. Stolen items include neckpieces by the late artist and metalsmith Florence Resnikoff, a pair of scrimshaw walrus tusks and Native American baskets. But she said much of it was historical memorabilia from the 20th century such as cam-

paign pins and athletic awards. The mission of the Oakland Museum of California is to document the art, history and natural environment of California, and its collection includes works by California artists from the late 18th century to the present, a well as artifacts, photographs, natu-

ral specimens and sound recordings. The museum has mounted shows dedicated to the Black Power movement and student

John Romero, a retired Los Angeles Police Department captain who led the department's commercial crimes unit, told the Los Angeles Times that the items may already have been sold since the burglary occurred two weeks ago. He expects detectives are looking at resale platforms such as Craigslist and Ebay, and networks that specialize in historic or collectible an-

"These people are interested in fast cash, not the full appraisal value," he told the Times. "They need to get rid of it quickly."

In January 2013, an Oakland man broke into the museum itself and got away with a California Gold Rush-era jewelry box. Fogarty said the the item was traced to a pawn shop with help from the public, and she hopes the community can help again.

The Oakland Police Department declined to provide further details, but said in its news release that police are working with a unit of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that specializes in art crime, including theft, forgery or antiquities and cultural property trafficking.

The theft occurred four days before thieves made off with priceless Napoleonic jewels from the world's most-visited museum, the Louvre, in broad daylight. Authorities have made arrests but the jewels have not been recovered.

Ode to tragedy

Lightfoot's ballad keeps the Edmund Fitzgerald alive

NASHOTAH, Wis., Nov 1, (AP): Without Gordon Lightfoot's song, the Edmund Fitzgerald could have faded

from memory along with the names of the roughly 6,500 other ships that went down in the Great Lakes before it.

Lightfoot was inspired to write his ode to the Fitzgerald and the 29 men who died on board after reading the first Accounted Press story should be shown that the first Associated Press story about the wreck and a Nov. 24, 1975, article in Newsweek magazine. The song was released in August 1976, less than a year later.

Lightfoot's mournful storytelling propelled the tragedy into infamy. Affection for the song and interest in the wreck has sustained for half a century, though it wasn't even the deadliest recorded on the Great Lakes. The deadliest wreck on open waters was the Lady Elgin in 1860, which historians estimate killed nearly 400 people.

"The song has made this by far the most famous Great Lakes shipwreck," said John J. Bacon author of "The

said John U. Bacon, author of "The Gales of November," a recently published book coinciding with the 50th anniversary of the wreck. He said the Edmund Fitzgerald trails only the Titanic and possibly the Lusitania as the most famous shipwreck in the world.

Rick Haynes, 80, played bass on the single and in Lightfoot's band for 55 years. He said the first recorded take of the song was what they released on the album "Summertime Dream."

"When you listen to the record Edmund Fitzgerald, it's like he's putting you right there, like he was right there, Haynes said in a telephone interview from his home in Canada. "And that's pretty hard to do with a tragedy like that, you know?"

Debbie Gomez-Felder was 17 when her father, Oliver "Buck" Champeau, died on the Fitzgerald. She couldn't bear to listen to the song at first.

"I put it on the record player and I thought, 'Oh no, this music is eerie,' she said. "I turned it off."

But she came to love it. "The part that says 'All that remains are the faces and the names of the wives and the sons and the daughters,' I thought there wasn't a word he missed," Gomez-Felder said. "There wasn't anything he didn't recognize."
Lightfoot died in 2023. His widow,

Kim Lightfoot, said in a statement to The Associated Press that "the Edmund Fitzgerald was always present in Gordon's mind."

"Just as he eulogized the tragedy in song for the world, he also kept the memory alive in our home; Paintings, models and tributes adorned the walls and followed us from room to room as we went about our daily lives," Kim Lightfoot said. "If Gordon were with us today, he would have been intent on helping keep the candle of memory

Lightfoot met regularly with family members and famously changed one of the lyrics at their request, removing a reference to a disproven theory that unsecured hatch covers caused the wreck. The exact cause remains a mystery.

That mystery and the song continue to draw people to the wreck, including a new generation encountering the story through TikTok and social media. Bruce Lynn, executive director of the Great Lake Shipwreck Museum, said children visit the museum wearing costumes of the Fitzgerald.

"There's something about the Fitzgerald that really draws that attention," he said.

Havnes estimated that he has played "The Wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald" more than two thousand times without tiring of it. Lightfoot's band still tours and plays it at every concert.

Haynes remembers flying with Lightfoot to Whitefish Point, Michigan, to mark an anniversary of the wreck. They met with victims' families then Haynes took a walk along the shores of Lake Superior, looking out toward where the Fitz sank, about 17 miles away.

GEM dedicated to Egypt's ancient civilization

Egypt unveils the world's largest museum

CAIRO, Nov 1, (AP): Egypt was inaugurating the long-delayed Grand Egyptian Museum (GEM) on Saturday, the world's largest museum dedicated to its ancient civilization - a megaproject also aimed at boosting the country's tourism industry and troubled economy.

Two decades in the making and located near the Giza Pyramids on the edge of Cairo, the museum showcases over 50,000 artifacts detailing life in ancient Egypt.

World leaders, including monarchs, heads of states and governments, were to attend the grand opening ceremony in the Egyptian capital, according to a statement from the presidency, which touted the museum as "an exceptional event in the history of human culture and civilization.'

President Abdel-Fattah el-Sissi wrote on social media that the museum will bring "together the genius of ancient Egyptians and the creativity of modern Egyptians, enhancing the world culture and art with a new landmark that will attract all those who cherish civilization and knowledge."

The museum is one of several megaprojects championed by el-Sissi since he took office in 2014, embarking on massive investments in infrastructure with the aim of reviving an economy weakened by decades of stagnation and battered by the unrest that followed the 2011 Arab Spring uprising.

Preparations for the grand reveal have been shrouded in secrecy.

A stage was built in the museum courtyard where an orchestra and musicians would later preform what the Egyptian media described as a 'global symphony of humanity."

Security around Cairo was tightened ahead of the opening ceremony, with the government announcing Saturday would be a public holiday. The museum, which has been open for limited visits over the past few years, was closed for the final,

two-week preparations.

The government has revamped the area around the museum and the nearby Giza Plateau that holds the pyramids and the Sphinx. Roads were paved and a metro station is being constructed outside the museum gates to improve access. An airport, Sphinx International Airport, has also opened west of Cairo - 40 minutes from the mu-

The \$1 billion facility had faced multiple delays, with construction beginning in 2005 but interrupted due to political instability.

The museum, known as GEM, boasts a towering, triangular glass façade imitating the nearby pyramids, with 24,000 square meters (258,000 square feet) of permanent exhibition space.

It opens to a granite colossus of Ramses the Great, one of ancient Egypt's most powerful pharaohs who reigned for around 60 years, from 1279 B.C. to 1213 B.C., and is credited with expanding ancient Egypt's reach as far as modern Syria to the east and modern Sudan to the south. The statue greets visitors once they step inside the museum's angular atrium.

From the atrium, a grand six-story staircase lined with ancient statues leads up to the main galleries and a view of the pyramids. A bridge links the museum to the pyramids, allowing tourists to move between them either on foot or via electric vehicles, according to museum officials.

The museum's 12 main galleries, which opened last year, exhibit antiquities spanning from prehistoric times to the Roman era, organized by era and

Two halls are dedicated to the 5,000 artifacts from the collection of King Tutankhamun - a boy pharaoh who ruled from 1361 B.C. to 1352 B.C. that will be displayed in its entirely for the first time since British archaeologist Howard Carter discovered King Tut's tomb in 1922 in the southern city of Luxor.

Zahi Hawass, Egypt's most renowned archaeologist and former minister of antiquities, said the Tutankhamun collection is the museum's master-

"Why this museum is so important, and everyone is waiting for the opening?" he told The Associated Press. "Because of Tutankhamun."

The collection includes the boy pharaoh's three funeral beds and six chariots, his golden throne, his gold-covered sarcophagus and his burial mask. made of gold, quartzite, lapis lazuli and colored

The government's hopes the museum will draw more tourists who will stay for a while and provide the foreign currency needed to shore up Egypt's battered economy. The state-run Al-Ahram daily said the museum is expected to attract 5 million visitors annually. The tourism sector has suffered during years of

political turmoil and violence following the 2011 Arab Spring uprising. In recent years, the sector has started to recover after the coronavirus pandemic and amid Russia's war on Ukraine - both countries are major sources of tourists visiting Egypt.

A record number of about 15.7 million tourists visited Egypt in 2024, contributing about 8% of the country's GDP, according to official figures. Tourism and Antiquities Minister Sherif Fathy has said that overall, Egypt expects about 18 million tourists this year, with authorities hoping for 30 million visitors annually by 2032.

This will translate into more jobs and pump foreign currency into the economy, said Walid el-Batouty, a tour guide.

"It will be boost the economy of Egypt tremendously not just the hotels and the museum itself," he said. Whenever a tourist rides a cab or even just buys a bottle of water, "that is pumping money" into Egypt's coffers, he added.

Salmonella tied to supplements

NEW YORK, Nov 1, (AP): At least 11 people have been sickened, including three who were hospitalized, with salmonella infections linked to powder supplements sold at Sam's Club stores nationwide and online, federal health officials said Friderical said Fr

Member's Mark Super Greens Powder Supplements have been pulled from store shelves because they contain moringa leaf powder that may be contaminated with salmonella bacteria, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said.

Infections were confirmed in seven states: Florida, Kansas, Michigan, North Carolina, New York, South Carolina and Virginia. Illnesses were reported between May and September.

The source of the salmonella was traced to a single lot of organic moringa leaf powder imported from Vallon Farm Direct in Jodhpur, India, according to an investigation by the US Food and Drug Administration. State health officials in Virginia and Michigan collected and tested samples of the product from the homes of people who fell ill.

Moringa is a plant native to India and other countries prized for essential nutrients including protein, amino acids, vitamins and minerals, according to research published by the National Institutes of Health. Its leaves can be dried and powdered.

Consumers should not eat the supplements and should throw them away or return them to the store for a refund.

Symptoms of salmonella poisoning include diarrhea, fever, severe vomiting, dehydration and stomach cramps. Most people who get sick recover within a week. Infections can be severe in young children, older adults and people with weakened immune systems, who may require hospitalization.

'Early detection boosts 5-year cancer survival to 99%'

Kuwait conference on breast cancer constitutes scientific platform: Minister

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 1, (KUNA): Kuwait breast cancer conference is a scientific and humanitarian platform that cements a culture that prioritizes humans and their health, Minister of Health Dr. Ahmad Al-Awadhi said on Friday. In an inaugural speech at the conference, Al-Awadhi added efforts focused on early detection and comprehensive treatment of this disease in a manner that aligns with global medical developments.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO) reports in 2022, more than 2.3 million females were diagnosed with breast cancer across the globe, he stated.

This ratio is expected to reach about 38 percent by 2050, according to The Lancet Magazine, the minister elaborated.

These figures pushed to early detection which highly raises the percentage of recovery as the five-year survival rate when disease is detected in its early stages exceeds 99

percent, according to American Cancer Society, he said. The Ministry of Health has launched the national early detection program on breast diseases in the six governorates nationwide, he pointed out.

The ministry established rapid diagnosis clinics at Kuwait Cancer Control Center (KCCC) that offers the results of tests during 48 hours.

Additionally, oncology service has been launched at Jaber Al-Ahmad Hospital, and there are surgeons of breast cancer diseases, he explained.

Meanwhile head of the conference Dr. Anwar Al-Nouri said.

Meanwhile, head of the conference Dr. Anwar Al-Nouri said holding this event is to confirm the ministry's commitment to upgrading healthcare quality based on scientific evidence and keeping pace with developments in breast cancer treatment.

Breast cancer makes up 13 percent of mortalities of cancer, he noted.

Limited benefit cited

US restricts fluoride use for children over health risks

WASHINGTON, Nov 1, (AP): The Food and Drug Administration on Friday moved to limit the use of fluoride supplements used to strengthen children's teeth, the latest action by Health Secretary Robert F. Kennedy Jr. and his deputies against a chemical that is a mainstay of dental care.

The FDA said that the products are

no longer recommended for children younger than 3 and those who are older but don't face serious risks of tooth decay. Previously, the products have been prescribed for children as young as six months.

The action stopped short of FDA

The action stopped short of FDA statements in May suggesting regulators would seek the removal of the products from the market. Instead, the agency sent letters to four companies warning them not to market their products outside the new limits.

Fluoride tablets and lozenges are sometimes recommended for children and teens at increased risk of tooth decay or cavities because of low fluoride in their local drinking water. Companies also sell drops for babies.

nies also sell drops for babies.

The FDA released a new scientific analysis Friday, concluding that fluoride supplements have limited ben-

efits for children's teeth and may be linked to emerging safety concerns, including gut issues, weight gain and cognition.

"For the same reason fluoride may work to kill bacteria on teeth, it may also alter the gut microbiome, which may have broader health implications," the agency said in a statement.

The agency also sent a form letter to dentists and other health providers warning about the risks of the products.

Those claims have been disputed by the American Dental Association, which has said there are no significant health problems associated with fluoride when used at the levels prescribed by dentists.

Blood pressure drug pulled over potential cancer risk

NEW YORK, Nov 1, (AP): The US Food and Drug Administration says drugmakers have recalled more than a half-million bottles of the blood pressure medication prazosin hydrochloride over concerns it may include a cancer-causing chemical.

New Jersey-based Teva Pharmaceuticals USA and drugs distributor Amerisource Health Services issued voluntary nationwide recalls earlier this month of more than 580,000 bottles of various strengths of prazosine capsules, according to the FDA.

Doctors prescribe prazosin, which relaxes blood vessels, to help lower blood pressure. It also is sometimes prescribed for nightmares and other sleep disturbances caused by post-traumatic stress disorder.

The FDA said in enforcement orders posted online that it has given the affected lots of the drug a Class II risk classification because some of the recalled medication may have nitrosamine impurities that are considered potentially cancer causing

According to the FDA, N-nitrosamine impurities are a class of potentially cancer-causing chemicals that can form during manufacture or storage of a drug.

People abused by intimate partners experience worse asthma: experts

Asthma is a common, serious and difficult-to-manage chronic health condition. In the US, 1 in 7 people are diagnosed with asthma, and that number is rising.

Over the years, researchers have identified a mix of individual and en-

identified a mix of individual and environmental factors that play a role in asthma. For instance, obesity and alcohol use increase a person's risk for asthma. And more extreme weather is linked to worse asthma symptoms.

In that mix of research, a new pattern has emerged pointing to links between

has emerged pointing to links between asthma and abuse by a current or former romantic partner. As surprising as that might sound, these links are important because intimate partner abuse is common in the US. An estimated 47% of women and 44% of men are physically or sexually victimized or stalked by intimate partners at some point in their lives.

As a psychologist and an asthma specialist, we have teamed up to learn more about asthma and intimate partner abuse.

And what we're seeing has important implications for treatment.

To understand how factors such as obesity or extreme weather can result in asthma, researchers have focused on inflammation. Inflammation plays a key role in keeping humans and other animals healthy.

When pathogens such as viruses attack the body, or the body suffers an injury, the immune system responds with

inflammation. This immediate, short-term response helps the body minimize damage to cells and fight infection. It's also what causes the red hotness that surrounds a skin injury or bothersome symptoms when fighting a cold.

While short-term inflammation is critical to good health, the inflammation system can go awry. Chronic inflammation contributes to many kinds of diseases, including asthma.

Uncontrolled inflammation drives asthma development and symptoms. Over the years, a better understanding of different types of inflammation that can worsen asthma has led to the identification of critical targets for asthma medications and important advances in care.

Because of this inflammation-asthma connection, most drug treatments for asthma today target overactive inflammation in the airways.

Despite significant advances in drug treatments for asthma, a majority of adults with the condition have uncontrolled asthma, which means more flare-ups and an increased chance of dying from the disease.

As researchers and medical providers have figured out that not everyone responds to common medications, they've turned to more personalized approaches to understanding asthma predictors.

That more personalized approach led one of us, Dr. Wang, to wonder whether intimate partner abuse might play a role in asthma for some of her patients. After all, intimate partner abuse is linked with a host of health problems and health care costs.

Using a large database that was representative of the US population, one of us (Dr. Wang) led a team in 2021 that discovered intimate partner abuse was associated with worsened asthma attacks and symptoms. That study included over 2,600 adults and found that having asthma along with a history of intimate

partner abuse meant significantly greater odds of asthma attacks, more frequent symptoms and greater impact of symptoms on daily life.

This pattern was true even for adults who were out of the abusive relationships for a year or more, suggesting a persistent effect of intimate partner abuse on asthma.

Over time, other research teams also found links between intimate partner abuse and increased rates of having or developing asthma for adults.

In addition, research showed that intimate partner abuse also affects the next generation. Multiple studies have shown increased rates of asthma in children of women who were abused by their intimate partners.

So, does this mean that intimate partner abuse leads to chronic over-inflammation, which in turn causes asthma? Not necessarily, according to another study we did.

We worked with a team of researchers to recruit 60 adults with uncontrolled asthma into our study and examined many different markers of inflammation in the blood. Importantly, about half of those adults told us they had been abused by an intimate partner at some time in their lives. And about half said they had not.

First, we looked at the traditional types of inflammation studied in prior asthma research, including those targeted by currently available treatments. On measure after measure, our team found that patients with histories of intimate partner abuse had lower inflammation than those without histories of abuse, despite having uncontrolled asthma.

uncontrolled asthma.

Surprised by this finding, we tested whether other factors that have been linked with asthma could better explain what we found. However, the pattern was still there - even when we took into account factors such as gender, obesity, anxiety and depression. (AP)

JIUQUAN, China, Nov 1, (AP): China announced Saturday that its Shenzhou 21 spaceship docked with China's space station with its latest three rotation crew at the country's own record

speed after a successful launch.

The entire docking process lasted around 3.5 hours - three hours shorter than the previous missions, according to China Manned Space Agency.

The Shenzhou 21 spaceship took off as planned at 11:44 p.m. local time Friday from the Jiuquan launch center in northwestern China. The three astronauts on Shenzhou 21 are planned to enter the Tianhe core module of the space station after the dock.

The crew includes pilot and mission commander Zhang Lu, who also was on the Shenzhou 15 mission to the space station two years ago.

The other two are flying for the first time. Wu Fei, 32, an engineer, is the country's youngest astronaut to join a spaceflight. Zhang Hongzhang is a payload specialist who was a researcher focusing on new energy and new materials before becoming an as-

Zhang said the team would turn the space station into a "utopia" by doing tai-chi, gardening and appreciating poetry on the Tiangong space station. Like those before them, they will stay at the station for roughly six months.

While in space, the astronauts planned to conduct 27 scientific and applied projects in biotechnology, aerospace medicine, materials science and other areas.

For the first time, China is send-

ing mice to its space station. Four in total, two males and two females, will be monitored to study how weightlessness and confinement affect their behavioral patterns, said Han Pei, an engineer at the Chinese Academy of

"This will help us master key technologies for the breeding and monitoring of small mammals in space and make a preliminary assessment of the mice's emergency responses and adaptive changes in space environments," Han said.

The "space mice" were calcuted.

The "space mice" were selected from 300 candidates after more than 60 days of intensive training, according to China's official Xinhua News Agency. State media China National Radio reported that the mice are expected to stay five to seven days in the space station and hitch a ride in Shenzhou 20 coming back to Earth.

China's space program is a source of enormous national pride and a hall-mark of the nation's technological advances over the past two decades. China launched its first crewed mission in 2003, becoming only the third nation to do so after the former Soviet

Union and the United States. Zhang Jingbo, a spokespe

Zhang Jingbo, a spokesperson for the China Manned Space Agency, said the research and development work is progressing smoothly for the agency's plans to send an astronaut to the moon.

"Our fixed goal of China landing a person on the moon by 2030 is firm," Zhang said at a news conference a day ahead of the launch.

The Tiangong, or "Heavenly Palace," space station has helped make China a major player in space. It was entirely Chinese-built after the country was excluded from the International Space Station over U.S. national security concerns. China's space program is controlled by the People's Liberation Army, the military branch of the ruling Communist Party.

In a collaboration with Pakistan, China is in the process of choosing two Pakistani astronauts to come to China for training

hopes of spotting a feathered friend that has never been seen before in the state.

The common cuckoo is typically found from Europe to Ja-

pan, with the majority of the population wintering in Africa. But one was recently spotted in Riverhead - a town on the north shore of Long Island about 75 miles (120 kilometers) from New York City - by a golfer who snapped a photo and sent it to his nephew, a birding enthusiast.

The information eventually was shared with the Cornell

Lab of Ornithology in Ithaca, New York. Once the bird was confirmed as a common cuckoo, birders quickly shared the news in their communities.

Birders going 'cuckoo' after unexpected sighting in NYC area

The bird has since been spotted more than 200 times by enthusiasts who have noted their sightings on the birding site ebird.org and various social media sites, including the American Birding Association. Many people in other parts of the U.S. also have reported making special treks to the region in hopes of seeing it for themselves. The last confirmed sightings came late Sunday afternoon.

It's not clear how or why the bird ended up in southern

New York, or if it's even still in the region. Experts say it's a juvenile - meaning it hatched this spring or summer - so it's reasonable to conclude it was trying to migrate for the winter but somehow got lost or blown off course.

The common cuckoo has been found only three other times in the eastern U.S. and Canada, experts said.

Jay McGowan, a curator at the Cornell Lab's Macaulay Library, said Thursday that the bird may still be in the area, but if it has relocated, it may be unlikely anyone will happen across it again. He urged anyone who does see it to report their sightings to the birder community.

Kipchoge and Hassan to make New York Marathon debuts against strong competition

NEW YORK, Nov 1, (AP): Eliud Kipchoge and Sifan Hassan are at different ends of their marathon

Kipchoge, who turns 41 next week, is wrapping up a historic run as one of the most accomplished marathoners in the sport, while the 32-year-old Hassan is in the prime of her career, coming off a victory at Sydney two months ago.

The two are taking on the New York Marathon for the first time Sunday, with Hassan looking to pull off the incredible double after winning in Australia.

To accomplish that feat, the Dutch star will have to beat the last three champions Sheila Chepkirui of Kenya (2024), Hellen Obiri (2023) and Sharon Lokedi (2022), who set the Boston Marathon course record

"I have respect for the course which I haven't done," Hassan said. "I have big respect for the athletes going to run with me. I'm not going to say I'm going to win, it's very hard."

Hassan has the best time of the group, running a personal best 2 hours, 13.44 minutes at the Chicago Marathon in 2023, but she'll have to deal with the 26.2-mile course that is full of bridges and hills.

"I remember last year after Paris it made me so scared of how hard this course (is)," said Hassan, who broke the Olympic record in the marathon last year. "I wasn't ready last year."

This is Hassan's first trip to the city and she knows how she'll celebrate after finishing the race - by having her "first slice of New York pizza."

U.S. record holder Emily Sisson and Tokyo Olympic bronze medalist Molly Seidel are the top Americans in the field. An American woman hasn't won the race since Shalane Flanagan did it in 2017. It's been 16 years since an American man won.

Kipchoge sees New York as a victory lap after his illustrious career in which he's won 11 major marathons and set two world records. His last major mara-

thon victory came in Berlin in 2023. "I'm really saying thank you because this is the

only way that I can do that," he said. He has spent the last few days in New York and has been running around iconic Central Park, where the race finishes.

"Going down the streets everyone is happy, it's a beautiful (running) culture," he said. "I realized that over a million people run in Central Park every year."

Nageeye said that he'll wait to see how the race unfolds before figuring out his strategy.

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Nov 1, (AP): England will head to the five-test Ashes series in Australia low on form and confidence after being bowled out for 222 in a two-wicket loss to New Zealand in the third one-day international Saturday and a 3-0 series defeat.

New Zealand was desperate at the end, with two wickets remaining and 28 runs still needed to win. But Zak Foulkes, with 14 not out, and Blair Tickner, with an unbeaten 18, saw New Zealand home with 32 balls to spare and a total of 226-8.

New Zealand won the first match by four wickets and the second by


England captain Harry Brook bowled out Jofra Archer, Brydon Carse and Jamie Overton, leaving Sam Curran and Adil Rashid to bowl the critical final overs.

Wembley and Camp Nou up for 2029 final **Munich to host 2028 Champions League final**

GENEVA, Nov 1, (AP): Bayern Munich's stadium is set to host another Champions League final in 2028, and staging the 2029 final is a contest between Wembley Stadium in London and Barcelona's renovated Camp Nou.

UEFA confirmed the list of interested bidders from among its member associations, suggesting a longspeculated final in New York will not happen until at least 2030.

"The declarations of interest are not binding, and the final proposals must be delivered with the bid dossiers by June 10," UEFA said in a

Munich was the only bid for the 2028 final. It hosted the final last season and Wembley staged the previous final in 2024. Barcelona has not been the final venue since 1999, when Manchester United famously stunned Bayern with two stoppagetime goals.

The behind-schedule Camp Nou renovation should lift capacity to 105,000, the largest in Europe.

The UEFA executive committee is due to decide next September on hosts for all club competitions' finals in 2028 and 2029

dapest - with a new early evening kickoff time in Europe - and the 2027 final is at Atletico Madrid's stadium.

Barcelona and Atletico were members of the failed Super League project in 2021, as was Juventus which also wants to host European finals.

The 41,000-seat Juventus stadium in Turin is proposed by the Italian

soccer federation to host a final in either the Europa League or the thirdtier Conference League for each year on offer. The venue hosted the Europa League final in 2014 when Juventus lost in the semifinals.

Romania's National Stadium in Bucharest also is competing for either of the Europa League finals. So too is the French soccer federation which at this first stage has not decided between Parc des Princes in Paris and Lyon's home stadium.

Two stadiums now being built also are competing. The new Serbian national arena in Belgrade is in the 2028 contest, and the 2029 race includes the Ankara 19 Mayıs Stadium in Turkey. The 67,000-seat Puskas Arena

also is a candidate to get the Conference League final in 2028 or 2029, and would be the biggest venue yet for the third-tier event launched in 2021. The first two finals had fewer than 20,000 people attend in Tirana and Prague.

Also in both contests are the home stadium of Lille, Arena Gdansk in Poland and Kazakhstan, which has yet to decide between the capital Astana and the home of Champions League newcomer Kairat Almaty.

Helsinki Olympic Stadium in Finland is a candidate for the 2029 final. Lyon's home stadium - which hosted the 2019 Women's World Cup final won by the United States - also is competing for the marquee women's final in either year. So is St. Jakob Park, Basel, which staged the Women's European Champion-

Lakers' Doncic has third 40-point game to start season

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov 1, (AP): Luka Doncic reaching the 40-point mark in a game is becoming a common theme through the early weeks of this season.

Doncic, returning after missing three games with injuries, had 44 points in the Los Angeles Lakers' 117-112 victory over the Memphis Grizzlies, topping 40 for his third straight game to start the season. The only other player in NBA history to do that

was Wilt Chamberlain. Twice. "He just continues to get where he wants to go, and he takes what the defense gives him," Lakers coach JJ Redick said with Doncic sitting in the back of the

Doncic, who shot 14 for 27 from the field, including 6 for 15 from 3-point range, scored 43 in the Lakers' opening night loss to Golden State. He had 49 against Minnesota in the second game. He then missed the next three game with a left finger sprain and a lower left leg contusion.

Friday was his return to action, and he continued his scoring pace.

Celtics 109, 76ers

In Philadelphia Jaylen Brown scored 32 points, Anfernee Simons added 19 and the Boston Celtics never trailed in a 109-108 win against the Philadel-

Payton Pritchard and Derrick White had 15 points apiece for the Celtics, who evened their record at .500 by winning their third straight after beginning the season with three consecutive losses. Boston evened a 117-116 season-opening defeat to the 76ers on Oct.

Tyrese Maxey scored 26 points to lead Philadelphia, which entered as one of four unbeaten teams in the league.

The game was the first as part of the NBA Cup for
