

Private sector skills debated

Capital return will uplift economy, create jobs: expert

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 5: Can the Kuwaiti private sector undertake the major projects that have been postponed for years, projects that would place a financial burden on the state budget if implemented? This question was posed by the daily to several economists.

In response, economist Mohammad Ramadan stated that the local private sector is not capable of implementing large infrastructure projects, such as the metro project, due to a lack of experience in this field.

He said the state could hire international companies with a strong track record for executing

projects that the private sector cannot handle, especially since these projects require substantial capital. Ramadan cited the Al-Mutlaa residential project, for which Kuwait contracted a Chinese company to execute.

Meanwhile, economic advisor Abdullah Hadi Al-Gharib believes that private sector participation is the quickest way to implement major projects, especially since the private sector possesses substantial capital that enables it to carry out these projects without the state incurring any financial burdens that could increase budget deficits in the coming years.

He affirmed that the return of Kuwaiti capital abroad, estimated at 25 billion dinars, to the local market would strengthen the national economy and create more job opportunities for Kuwaiti

Kuwait, Google Cloud deal hailed

Strategic step in going hi-tech: Al-Omar

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 5, (KUNA): Minister of State for Communications Affairs Omar Al-Omar affirmed on Wednesday that the agreement between the Kuwaiti government and Google Cloud represented a strategic milestone in building the national digital infrastructure and a qualitative leap in the management and operation of government services.

Speaking at the "Cloud Day Kuwait" event, Al-Omar stated that the agreement supports the State's vision vation and artificial intelligence (AI) paving the way for the development of future government applications and services that rely on advanced data analytics and informed decision-making.

This, he added, aligns with the political leadership's support for national digital integration and the objectives of

"New Kuwait 2035." The minister explained that, under the agreement, several national projects have been launched, forming the practical foundation for Kuwait's digital transformation. The first is the National Data Exchange Platform (Apigee), which serves as the cornerstone of governmental integration by unifying Application Programming Interfaces (APIs) among government

entities within a secure and reliable digital environment. He added that another key initiative is the Data Migration to Cloud Project (SOW2), which aims to transfer government systems to Google Cloud in a modern and secure manner.

These projects, he noted, are not merely technical steps but represent an integrated operational framework that lays the foundation for a data-driven, smart government, fostering a safe, sustainable digital ecosystem that supports innovation and enhances the quality of life and public services.

The goal is not only to move to the cloud but to build digital sovereignty that safeguards the country's data and enables government entities to operate efficiently, securely, and swiftly, Al-Omar said, noting that over 67 digital interfaces have been activated across eight government bodies, enabling smooth and reliable data exchange.

He expressed his gratitude to Google Cloud for its continuous support in building Kuwait's advanced digital infrastructure, emphasizing that the partnership serves as a global model for public-private collaboration in shaping a sustainable digital

In turn, General Manager of Google Cloud Kuwait, Shaymaa Al-Terkait, said the partnership represents a vital investment in the country's future and a pioneering example of cooperation between the public and private sectors to enhance Kuwait's digital capabilities. Housewives caught working at illegal clinic

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 5: As part of the efforts of the Public Authority for Manpower (PAM) to monitor and regulate the labor market and ensure compliance with labor laws and regulations, the Labor Inspection Department has been carrying out intensive inspection campaigns in coordination with the Residency Affairs Investigation Department at the Ministry of Interior, the Drug Control General Department, and the Health Licensing

Department at the Ministry of Health, reports Al-Anba daily. PAM revealed on its website that, during one of these inspection campaigns, the joint tripartite committee discovered a health center employing workers not authorized by PAM to work, including individuals holding family residency permits and domestic workers. The center was also found to be practicing medicine without a license, using unlicensed and unidentified medications stored improperly, and operating medical devices on patients. These actions constitute clear violations of the laws regulating the practice of medicine, labor, and residency in Kuwait.

PAM affirmed that joint inspection campaigns are ongoing in all governorates to deal with various types of violations, stressing that no leniency will be shown in taking legal action against those who violate labor laws.

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 5: A Kuwaiti citizen and a Gulf national have been sentenced to seven years in prison with hard labor and fined KD 599,000, double the amount they embezzled in salaries, financial benefits, loans, and rent allowances by forging Kuwaiti citizenship documents, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

This verdict followed an investigation by the Nationality Investigations Department, which revealed manipulation of one defendant's lineage. DNA testing confirmed that the samples did not

match the alleged father, proving the forgery.

The court emphasized that the defendants' actions caused serious harm to the prestige and benefits of Kuwaiti citizenship and constituted illegal exploitation of public funds, warranting the maximum deterrent punishment to protect public order and the interests of the state.

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 5, (Agencies): Lebanese Army Intelligence successfully rescued a kidnapped Kuwaiti citizen in the Bekaa Valley early Wednesday, and apprehended the sixmember gang involved in the abduction, reports Al-Seyassah

According to media reports, Lebanese Army Intelligence, in accordance with high-level military directives, rescued the citizen who had been kidnapped near the town of Karak in the Bekaa Governorate, eastern Lebanon. It had deployed several mobile checkpoints near the town of Saadnayel in the Zahle district close to the Bekaa Valley. An ambush was set for the kidnappers, allowing the military to safely rescue the Kuwaiti citizen without any injuries. He was then transferred to Beirut after the Embassy of Kuwait in Beirut was contacted.

Security sources explained that the rapid execution of the operation was a major factor in both apprehending the gang members and successfully freeing the Kuwaiti citizen.

Firm directives have been issued to confront all kidnapping and extortion operations, along with strenuous efforts to combat smuggling and drug trafficking in the Bekaa Valley and across Lebanon. The six-member armed gang, composed of Lebanese and

Leaders push sustainable consumption and efficiency

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 5: Minister of Electricity, Water, Renewable Energy and Finance, and acting Minister of State for Economic Affairs and Investment Dr. Subaih Al-Mukhaizeem pointed out that convening the Gulf Forum for Rationalizing **Electricity and Water Con**sumption reflects the depth of cooperation and integration among the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries, and strengthens joint efforts to address the challenges related to sustainability and the management of vital resources.

Speaking at the opening session of the forum on Wednesday, Al-Mukhaizeem said the GCC countries recognized early on that rationalizing electricity and water consumption is no longer a secondary option, but rather an essential element for maintaining water, food and energy security. He stated that rapid population, urban and industrial growth necessitates the adoption of conscious consumption patterns and modern technologies that reduce waste and increase efficiency.

He asserted that conservation must become a permanent societal culture and behavior, not just temporary awareness campaigns, as efficient resource management is a pledge for

He revealed that Kuwait has made progress in energy conservation through national awareness ficiency standards in the planning and operation phases, and expansion of renewable energy projects, in line with the New Kuwait 2035 vision and the Gulf's move towards a green economy and reducing carbon emis-

He confirmed that the Gulf experience in conservation constitutes a comprehensive system of expertise worthy of documentation and exchange, starting with smart meters and monitoring systems, moving through green buildings and energyefficient appliance standards, and

culminating in promoting societal awareness and responsible consumption behavior.

He commended the role of the Gulf Committee for Electricity and Water Conservation and Customer grams and awards it offers as they encourage positive competition

among individuals and institutions. He expressed his gratitude to the GCC Secretariat General, the organizing committees, and the participating entities from within and outside Kuwait. Digital courses to enhance service and efficiency

Ministry launches 'Skills for Tourism' program

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 5, (KUNA): Kuwait's Ministry of Information launched four online training courses under the "Skills for Tourism" program, offering free access to all professionals working in Kuwait's tourism sector to enhance their skills and knowledge.

In a statement on Wednesday, the Ministry said the program was launched under the directives of Minister of Information, Culture, and Minister of State for Youth Affairs Abdulrahman Al-Mutairi, in coordination with the Ministry of State for Communications

UNAMI vows to resolve Kuwait-Iraq missing persons and property cases

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 5, (KUNA): The Special Representative of the UN Secretary-General and Head of the United Nations Assistance Mission for Iraq (UNAMI), Ambassador Dr. Mohammad Al-Hassan, reaffirmed the UN's commitment to supporting Kuwait and Iraq in resolving the files of missing persons and Kuwaiti property.

During an interview with KUNA on Tuesday, Al-Hassan stressed UNAMI's dedication to closing the missing persons file "once and for all," in a way that brings solace to the families of the missing and strengthens good-neighborly relations between both countries.

He noted that UNAMI's role is defined under UN Security Council Resolution 2107 (2013), which mandates the Mission to facilitate Iraq's efforts in returning the remains of Kuwaiti and other nationals, as well as restoring Kuwaiti property, including the national archives seized during the 1990 in-

Al-Hassan highlighted the recent handover of 400 boxes containing Kuwaiti books and microfilm tapes belonging to Kuwait's Ministry of Information, describing it as a "significant step" in enhancing cooperation and building trust between the two neighbors.

He recalled earlier returns, including 200,000 books in 2019 and 738 boxes of materials in 2022, as part of Iraq's ongoing fulfillment of UN resolutions.

Since assuming its role in 2013,

UNAMI has helped identify the remains of 59 Kuwaiti and other nationals found in Iraq, with over 300 individuals still missing, he added.

Al-Hassan further referred to the UN Security Council Resolution 2792 (2025), which calls for the appointment of a High-Level Representative to continue supporting efforts to locate missing persons and recover Kuwaiti property after UNAMI's mandate ends.

He emphasized that continued cooperation between Kuwait and Iraq, supported by modern technology, remains key to achieving closure on this humanitarian file, reaffirming the UN's commitment to stand by both nations until all outstanding issues are resolved.

SME support goes digital

MoCI completes electronic linkage for funded projects

Commerce and Industry has confirmed the completion of the digitization of all procedures related to projects funded by the National Fund for Small and Medium Enterprises Development.

This step aims to simplify the business environment and facilitate transactions for entrepreneurs, in line with the strategy of the State towards digital transforma-

tion and reducing paperwork. Following a press conference organized by the ministry to make the announcement, acting Undersecretary of the ministry Marwa Al-Jaidan revealed the launching of new electronic services that enable the National Fund to monitor funded projects and safeguard public funds. She asserted that "the electronic transformation ensures the organization of the oversight process in a way that preserves the rights of the State and supports

entrepreneurs. Al-Jaidan confirmed that government systems are now unified and interconnected, hence, the ease of issuing, updating and tracking commercial licenses electronically without the need for any paper documents. She said this greatly contributes to accelerating the business cycle and supporting the growth of small

and medium enterprises (SMEs). She clarified that the electronic linkage stems from the fact that these projects are financed by the National Fund, necessitating the implementation of all their procedures through the systems of the Fund, as it is the responsible financing and supervisory body. She added this move reinforces the principles of

transparency and financial governance. She added the ministry has dedicated an electronic screen within its systems to the National Fund, covering the 10 activities under its supervision including business incubators, innovation centers and business accelerators. Thus, the establishment, renewal, cancellation and approval processes are now entirely electronic, eliminating paper transactions.

She affirmed that this development

aligns with the vision of the State to move towards the digital economy, and a continuation of efforts to regulate the business environment and support the SMEs sector as a pillar of economic development.

She stated that this step is part of the ongoing endeavor of the ministry to improve the business environment, simplify procedures and reduce paperwork. She added that this achievement is part of the vision of the ministry to unify and integrate government systems to facilitate procedures for entrepreneurs and business owners, and to simplify the steps for issuing, updating and tracking commercial licenses electronically, thereby, eliminating the need for paper transactions.

She emphasized that this procedure enhances the principles of transparency and ioint oversight between the two entities to ensure the proper disbursement of funds, and that support is directed to those truly deserving.

In addition, Eng Basma Al-Jassem, Director General of the Fund, underscored the importance of this integration between the Fund and the ministry regarding funded projects. She described this step as distinctive and crucial for integration between government entities, supporting the entrepreneurship ecosystem, and expediting transactions between the

two parties. She indicated that this step, specifically the completion of the electronic linking of all procedures related to funded projects, will contribute to accelerating the pace of work and obtaining approvals through the Fund. She disclosed that the number of projects funded by the Fund has exceeded 1,000 since the beginning of 2016.

Abdullah Al-Harz, Director of International Relations and official spokesperson of the ministry, confirmed that the ministry has transferred all previously submitted transactions to the electronic system. He added the ministry is ready to train the staff of the Fund on how to handle the new procedures to ensure smooth operations.

Municipality orders demolition of 67 unsafe buildings in Jleeb

Need to stem spread of e-adverts: MC member

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 5: Director General of the Kuwait Municipality Manal Al-Asfour issued an administrative order requiring the owners

of 67 properties in Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh to evacuate and demolish them within two weeks of the date of publication of this order in the official gazette (Kuwait Al-Youm).

This order is based on reports from the Government Center for Testing, a letter from the deputy director general for Farwaniya and Mubarak Al-Kabeer governorates, and a letter from the Legal Department.

The Municipality indicated that reports from the Government Center for Testing, Quality Control and Research, affiliated with the Ministry of Public Works, confirmed that these buildings are unsafe, susceptible to collapse, and pose a serious threat to life, property and public safety. It stated that the relevant department in the Municipality is responsible for ensuring that owners remove the buildings within the specified timeframe.

Al-Asfour emphasized that if the owners fail to demolish these buildings after the deadline, the concerned municipal department will remove them at the expense of the owners after ensuring that they are completely

Meanwhile, Municipal Council Member Dr. Hassan Kamal submitted a question to the executive branch regarding the regulation of electronic advertisements, in light of the ministerial decree regarding the advertising regulations issued on Dec 28, 2023, and the Council's approval of the amendments submitted by Kuwait Municipality.

Kamal stated that the amended regulations include provisions on television and electronic advertisements, yet the proliferation of electronic advertisements continues, with some advertisers failing to adhere to the regulations. He pointed out that some electronic advertisements were licensed before the new regulations were issued, hence, the need to clarify their current implementation mechanism.

He requested detailed answers regarding the mechanisms for implementing Article 13 of the regulations, which pertains to not harming pedestrians and neighbors, determining lighting intensity and brightness standards and their impact on public safety and health, and the role of the Ministry of Interior in approving lighting intensity, the orientation and location of electronic billboards and their impact on motorists.

Kuwaiti jailed 7 years in 'royal' defamation issue

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 5: The Court of Appeals, presided over by Judge Fahd Bouslaib, sentenced a Kuwaiti citizen to seven years in prison with hard labor after convicting him of offending the Amir, embracing extremist ideology, and planning to travel to Nigeria to join ISIS and fight with

Security forces from the Ministry of Interior arrested the defendant following a thorough investigation, which revealed that he had adopted extremist ideas and called for the overthrow of the Kuwaiti government through publications and extremist activities.

The Court of Appeals overturned the Criminal Court's previous ruling, which had acquitted the defendant of the charges of offending the Amir.

Minors driving rises: The General Traffic Department at the Interior Ministry remains committed to the strict enforcement of the law to ensure the safety of road users. The most recent traffic campaign led to the arrest of six mi-

nors for driving without a license in various parts of the coun-

try within 24 hours. A security source revealed that traffic officers deployed in the governorates identified several violators and reckless drivers whose actions endangered others. He said these individuals were apprehended and referred to traffic detention centers for

The source affirmed that traffic campaigns are continuing round the clock in all governorates, stressing the department does not tolerate any violation of the law in order to protect lives and properties and promote the culture of traffic compliance among motorists.

Drugs cache dumped in sea seized KUWAIT CITY, Nov 5: In accordance 93 pieces of psychotropic substances, estiwith the directives of the First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior

Sheikh Fahad Al-Yousef, the General Directorate of the Coast Guard seized a large quantity of narcotics and psychotropic substances during field operations conducted on the seabed in areas where ships wait within Kuwait's territorial waters, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

In a press statement, the Ministry of Interior explained that the operation resulted in the seizure of 193 pieces of hashish and mated at around 10,000 pills, which were intended for distribution. The operation is part of a security strategy aimed at strengthening coastal surveillance, combating smuggling attempts via maritime routes, and preventing the exploitation of maritime areas for trafficking prohibited substances.

The ministry affirmed its ongoing commitment to implementing security measures to protect maritime borders and counter any attempts at smuggling or breaching security.

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 5: The 47th Kuwait Conference on Otolaryngology, Facial Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery commenced Wednesday under the patronage and in the presence of Health Minister Dr. Ahmed Al-Awadhi, with the participation of an elite group of doctors and consultants representing more than 10 Arab and international countries, including Kuwait.

Al-Awadhi affirmed that holding the conference is in line with the commitment of the ministry to keep updated on the latest medical and surgical developments worldwide, stressing that the conference is considered a vital scientific platform, which brings together the experts and specialists from Kuwait and abroad to exchange experiences and review the latest technologies in this field.

In his speech at the event, Al-Awadhi pointed out that organizing this major scientific event underscores the keenness of the ministry to develop medical performance and the quality of services provided to patients, while adhering to the highest safety and quality standards. He disclosed this includes adopting advanced technologies, which bolster the precision and efficiency of surgical procedures and achieve optimal treatment outcomes.

He added that this conference is unique as it does not only showcase the latest medical research and technologies, but also serves as an interactive platform for exchanging expertise among doctors and specialists from various countries. "Lecturers from Canada, Turkiye, Russia, Europe, and several Arab and Gulf countries are participating this year, alongside renowned Kuwaiti doctors who will share their pioneering experiences and perform complex and advanced head, neck, ear, nose and throat surgeries.

He believes that active participation in such conferences contributes to developing the skills of medical personnel and their scientific and practical competence, which positively impact the quality of healthcare services and strengthen the ongoing development of the medical



system in the country.

He cited several remarkable achievements of Zain Specialized ENT Center, particularly performing the first procedure of its kind in a government hospital in the Middle East to treat sleep-disordered breathing by implanting a smart chip that stimulates the 12th cranial nerve located under the tongue. He affirmed this procedure was performed by Kuwaiti doctors.

He added the center also performed cochlear implant surgeries on infants aged six and nine months who lost their hearing after contracting meningitis, a first for public hospitals in the country. He said the center introduced the TRV device for treating motion sickness, also the first of its kind in the country. He confirmed as well the expansion of services in new areas by establishing a twoday-a-week ENT clinic in Sabah Al-Ahmad and opening a specialized 24/7 emergency clinic in Mutlaa.

Meanwhile, conference Chairman Dr. Mutlaq Al-Sihan stated that the three-day conference serves as a vital scientific platform for presenting and discussing advancements in head, neck and ear surgeries, and balance disorders. He disclosed that the first day was allocated for exploring the latest developments in cosmetic and reconstructive head and neck surgery, while the second day focuses on the most recent techniques in microsurgery of the ear, cochlear implantation and implantable devices, and the third day is for presentations on new approaches to diagnosing and treating balance

He said specialized workshops in the fields of hearing, speech difficulties and balance are being held on the side-

lines of the conference, in addition to a number of major surgical procedures and microsurgery of the ear and nose, with the participation of visiting consultants from several

He added the conference this year puts emphasis on scientific research and modern surgical techniques, with the participation of lecturers from Canada, France, Britain, Switzerland, Russia, Turkiye, South Korea, India, Egypt, Oman, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates, along with the best Kuwaiti doctors.

Waleed Al-Khashti, CEO for Corporate Communications and Relations at Zain, said the company is proud of its participation in the conference, as this participation is an extension of the historical relationship that has linked Zain to the healthcare sector in Kuwait for more than a quarter of a century.

Private sector

Indicating that bureaucracy had been driving capital flight, Al-Gharib revealed that the recent period has witnessed a strong and genuine push for economic and political reform, which has reassured Kuwaiti investors and encouraged the return of their capital.

He stressed that the government could allow multiple private sector companies to participate in the metro project, with ownership reverting to the state after 20 years, similar to the arrangements for the Souq Sharq Complex and Al-Muthanna Complex.

Al-Gharib affirmed the importance of implementing the metro project in parallel with the construction of the six workers' cities, noting that sites for these cities have already been allocated in Subiya, South Jahra, North Mutlaa, South Sabah Al-Ahmad, and South Khairan City.

He indicated that the project to transform Kuwait into a financial and commercial hub has been proposed for many years but has yet to materialize, and insisted on the need to activate this initiative as one of the main goals of New Kuwait 2035 vision.

Al-Gharib explained that the Public-Private Partnership Projects Authority should take the lead in implementing such projects. Its founding law No. 116/2014 aims to leverage the capabilities of the local private sector, enhance its efficiency. promote market competition, and facilitate development and innovation. The authority's role is not limited to encouraging private sector participation through partnerships with the government but also extends to ensuring balance in project tendering processes, stimulating and attracting Kuwaiti capital, and generating new revenues for the state budget.

In addition, economist and former head of the Kuwait Contractors Association Dr. Salah Boursli highlighted the importance of involving the private sector in major projects that the government has postponed for years.

He affirmed that private sector participation would help solve the problem of financing needed to implement these projects, especially since the state has been incurring billions in additional costs due to repeated delays.

Dr. Boursli explained that the metro project, for which structural plans were drawn up in 2011, was initially expected to cost the state around KD 4 billion to KD 5 billion. However, due to the postponement of the project, the cost may now exceed KD 15 billion.

He called for the removal of all obstacles facing the local private sector so it can contribute more effectively to economic development and play a stronger role in resolving financial challenges.

Dr. Boursli emphasized that there are many projects requiring private sector participation through the B.O.T. system, which is one of the main mechanisms for implementing major national projects.



The airport is just a 10-minute drive from the city's downtown, which sits on the Ohio River bordering the Indiana state line. There are residential

areas, a water park and museums there. Emergency officials initially put out a shelter-in-place order for a 5-mile (8-kilometer) radius. By Wednesday morning, they shrunk it to just a quarter-mile (0.4-kilometer) radius as officials monitored the air

US govt shutdown becomes longest on record as fallout spreads nationwide

WASHINGTON, Nov 5, (AP): The government shutdown has entered its 36th day, breaking the record as the longest ever and disrupting the lives of millions of Americans with federal program cuts, flight delays and federal workers nationwide left without paychecks.

US President Donald Trump has refused to negotiate with Democrats over their demands to salvage expiring health insurance subsidies until they agree to reopen the government. But skeptical Democrats question whether the Republican president will keep his word, particularly after the administration restricted SNAP food aid, despite court orders to ensure funds are available to prevent hunger.

Trump, whose first term at the White House set the previous government shutdown record, is set to meet early Wednesday for breakfast with GOP senators. But no talks have been scheduled with the Democrats.

"Why is this happening? We're in a shutdown because our colleagues are unwilling to come to the table to talk about one simple thing: health care premiums," said Sen. Amy Klobuchar,

D-Minn., in a late evening speech. "Stop this mess, come to the table, negotiate it," she said.

With Trump largely on the sidelines, talks have intensified among a loose coalition of centrist senators trying to negotiate an end to the stalemate.

Expectations are high that the logjam would break once election results were fully tallied in Tuesday's off-year races that were widely watched as a gauge of voter sentiment over Trump's second term in the White House. Democrats swept key contests for governor in Virginia and New Jersey, and New York City mayor, certain to shake up

the political assessments. But earlier in the afternoon, Senate Democrats left an hours-long private meeting stone-faced, with no certain path forward. "We're exploring all the options," Senate Democratic leader Chuck Schumer said afterward.

Trump's approach to this shutdown stands in marked contrast to his first term, when the government was partially closed for 35 days over his demands for funds to build the US-Mexico border wall. At that time, he met publicly and negotiated with congressional leaders, but unable to secure the funds, he relented in 2019.

California voters approve new US House map to boost Dems in 2026

Zohran Mamdani wins New York City mayor's race, capping a stunning ascent

NEW YORK, Nov 5, (AP): Zohran Mamdani was elected mayor of New York on Tuesday, capping a stunning ascent for the 34-year-old, far-left state lawmaker, who promised to transform city government to restore power to the working class and fight back against a hostile Trump administration.

In a victory for the Democratic party's progressive wing, Mamdani defeated former gov Andrew Cuomo and Republican Curtis Sliwa. Mamdani must now navigate the unending demands of America's biggest city and deliver on ambitious - skeptics say unrealistic - campaign promises.

With his commanding win, the democratic socialist will etch his place in history as the city's first Muslim mayor, the first of South Asian heritage and the first born in Africa. He will also become New York's youngest mayor in more than a century when he takes office on Jan 1.

"The conventional wisdom would tell you that I am far from the perfect candidate. I am young, despite my best efforts to grow older. I am Muslim. I am a democratic socialist. And most damning of all, I refuse to apologize for any of this," Mamdani declared to a roaring crowd at his victory party.

He cast his win as a boon for blue-collar workers struggling to get by. "New York, tonight you have delivered a mandate for change," he said, vowing to "wake up each morning with a singular purpose: To make this city better for you than it More than 2 million New Yorkers cast ballots in the contest, the largest turnout

in a mayoral race in more than 50 years, according to the city's Board of Elections. With roughly 90% of the votes counted, Mamdani held an approximately 9 percentage point lead over Cuomo.

Mamdani's unlikely rise gives credence to Democrats who have urged the party to embrace more progressive candidates instead of rallying behind centrists in hopes of winning back swing voters who have abandoned the party.

He has already faced scrutiny from national Republicans, including President Donald Trump, who have eagerly cast him as a threat and the face of a more radical Democratic Party that is out of step with mainstream America. Trump has repeatedly threatened to cut federal funding to the city - and even take it over - if

At his victory party in Brooklyn, Mamdani supporters cheered and embraced, some tearfully, after The Associated Press called the race. Campaign posters flew through the air, as one person hoisted the official flag of New York City and Bad Bunny played from the speakers.

The mood was far more muted at Cuomo's party at a midtown Manhattan the

ater. In his concession speech, a defiant Cuomo called his campaign "a caution flag that we are headed down a dangerous, dangerous road" and noted that "almost half of New Yorkers did not vote to support a government agenda that makes promises that we know cannot be met."

Still, he corrected his supporters when they began to boo at the mention of Mamdani's name.

'No, that is not right," he said, offering to help the incoming mayor in any way. "Tonight was their night." Mamdani's grassroots campaign centered on affordability, and his charisma spoiled Cuomo's attempted political comeback. The former governor, who resigned four years ago following allegations of harassment that he continues to deny, was dogged by his past throughout the race and was

criticized for running a negative campaign.

Mamdani will also have to deal with Trump, who not only threatened retribution against the city but also suggested he might try to arrest and deport Mamdani if he won. Mamdani was born in Uganda, where he spent his early childhood, but was raised in New York City and became a US citizen in 2018.

In his speech, Mamdani addressed Trump head on.

"New York will remain a city of immigrants, a city built by immigrants, powered by immigrants and as of tonight, led by an immigrant," he said, adding that, "If anyone can show a nation betrayed by Donald Trump how to defeat him, it is the city that gave rise to him."

LOS ANGELES: California voters approved new congressional district boundaries Tuesday, delivering a victory for Democrats in the state-by-state redistricting battle that will help determine which party wins control of the US House in 2026 and, with it, the power to thwart or advance President Donald Trump's agenda.

The approval of Proposition 50 gives Democrats a shot at winning as many as five additional seats, just enough to blunt **Texas** Republicans' move to redraw their own maps to pick up five GOP seats at Trump's urging. Texas' move and California's response have kicked off a flurry of redistricting efforts around the country, with Republican states appearing to have an edge. Deeply blue California is Democrats' best opportunity to make up seats.

Midterm elections typically punish the party in the White House, and Trump is fighting to maintain his party's slim House majority. Republicans hold 219 seats to Democrats' 213.

Tuesday's results mark a political victory for Democratic Gov Gavin Newsom, who cast the measure as an essential tool to fight back against Trump and protect American democracy. Speaking to reporters in Sacramento, Newsom cast the California vote as part of a broader national rejection of Trump's policies that saw Democratic governors elevated in New Jersey and Virginia. But he warned the more consequential battle would come next year.

If Democrats win the House majority, they can "end Donald Trump's presidency as we know it," Newsom said. "It is all on the line, a bright line, in 2026."

California's Proposition 50 asked voters to suspend House maps drawn by an independent commission and replace them with rejiggered districts adopted by the Democratic-controlled Legislature. Those new districts would be in place for the 2026, 2028 and 2030 elections.

Pope Leo calls for 'deep reflection' about treatment of detained migrants in US

VATICAN CITY, Nov 5, (AP): Pope Leo XIV called for "deep reflection" in the United States about the treatment of migrants held in detention, saying that "many people who have lived for years and years and years, never causing problems, have been deeply affected by what is going on right now.'

The Chicago-born pope was responding Tuesday to a range of geopolitical questions from reporters outside the papal retreat at Castel Gandolfo, including what kind of spiritual rights migrants in US custody should have, US military attacks on suspected drug traffickers off Venezuela and the fragile ceasefire in the Middle East.

Leo underlined that scripture emphasizes the question that will be posed at the end of the world: "How did you receive the foreigner, did you receive him and welcome him, or not? I think there is a deep reflection that needs to be made about what is happening.'

He said "the spiritual rights of people who have been detained should also be considered," and he called on authorities to allow pastoral workers access to the detained migrants. "Many times they've been separated from their families. No

the bloc's executive branch, the European Commission, also said that Montenegro could wrap up its EU membership talks by the end of next year, leaving it first in line to become the 28th member country.

Presenting the reports, EU Enlargement Commissioner Marta Kos said the progress toward membership made by Ukraine and Montenegro, but also Albania and Moldova, "shows that reforms pay off. This should serve as a strong motivation for all countries engaged in the process."

Japan's new prime minister praised for 'energetic' diplomatic debut hosting Trump

TOKYO, Nov 5, (AP): Japanese Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi won praise in her country's parliament on Tuesday for a diplomatic debut that included hosting US President Donald Trump - but was scolded by the opposition leader for what he said was going too far in flattering Trump.

Takaichi held a summit with Trump last Tuesday, only a week after she took office as Japan's first female leader, and attended two regional summits

Yoshihiko Noda, head of the main opposition Constitutional Democratic Party of Japan, remarked on Takaichi's "big smiles" and noted she was "full of energy," saying she had earned Trump's praise as a "very energetic

He added, "I believe you are off to a good start in building a personal re-

Noda, however, criticized Takaichi for "flattery diplomacy to the extreme" for plans to nominate Trump for next year's Nobel Peace Prize. White House press secretary Karoline Leavitt told reporters that Takaichi would be

nominating Trump for the prize.
"It was too careless," Noda told Takaichi during Tuesday's lower house session. Noda cited Trump's later suggestion that the US would resume nuclear testing - an extremely sensitive issue in Japan due to the nuclear bombs the U.S. dropped on the country at the end of World War II.

Noda asked Takaichi if she still planned to nominate Trump for the peace prize in light of that announcement. She did not comment.

Takaichi's recent talks with China's President Xi Jinping and South Korea's Lee Jae Myung and a promise to develop stable ties have also been well

Her past views defending Japan's World War II actions and visits to Tokyo's Yasukuni Shrine - viewed by Asian victims of Japanese wartime aggression as signaling a lack of remorse - had been seen as risks to relations with Seoul and Beijing. However, she has toned down her hawkish stance. She also skipped her seasonal Yasukuni visit last month and donated a religious ornament instead.

Takaichi has enjoyed support ratings of around 60-70% since taking office, and one taken over the weekend after her diplomatic debut was even higher at about 80%, though support for her Liberal Democratic Party remains little

changed at around 20-30%. Her struggling party and its ruling coalition with a new partner, Japan Innovation Party, lacks a majority in both houses of parliament, meaning the coalition cannot achieve any policy without cooperation from the opposi-

Earlier Tuesday, Takaichi's government launched a ministerial meeting to address foreigner-related issues. These include investment, land transactions, labor and tourism. Kalmaegi death toll climbs to 85 in Philippines

Vietnam orders vessel ban as regions brace for typhoon

HANOI, Nov 5, (Agencies): Vietnamese Deputy Prime Minister Tran Hong Ha has ordered a ban on all vessels from going out to sea as the country's central and southern regions brace for Typhoon Kalmaegi, the local daily Tuoi Tre reported on Wednesday.

Chairing a meeting on disaster response, he stressed that no residents should be at sea after 5 p.m. local time on Thursday.

He said the evacuation of residents from dangerous areas must be completed before 7 pm local time on Thursday in coastal zones affected by high tides as well as in mountainous areas prone to isolation and landslides.

The typhoon is expected to affect the regions from 7 pm local time on Thursday to around 4 a.m. local time on Friday, leaving little time for preparation, he said, urging localities in the typhoon's projected path to promptly update and implement response plans.

Meanwhile, Typhoon Kalmaegi has left at least 85 people dead with 75 others missing in the central Philippines, many in widespread flooding that trapped people on their roofs and swept away cars in a hard-hit province still recovering from a deadly earthquake, officials said Wednesday.

Among the dead were six people who were killed when a Philippine air force helicopter crashed in the south-

ern province of Agusan del Sur on Tuesday. The crew was on its way to provide humanitarian help to provinces battered by Kalmaegi, the military said. It did not give the cause of the

Kalmaegi blew away from western Palawan province into the South China Sea before noon Wednesday with sustained winds of up to 130 kph (81 mph) and gusts of up to 180 kph (112 mph), according to forecasters.

Bernardo Rafaelito Alejandro IV, deputy administrator of the Office of Civil Defense, and provincial officials said many of the deaths were reported in the central province of Cebu, which was pummeled by Kalmaegi on Tuesday, setting off flash floods and causing a river and other waterways to

The resulting flooding engulfed residential communities, forcing startled residents to climb on their roofs, where they desperately pleaded to be rescued as the floodwaters rose, officials said.

The Philippine Red Cross received many calls from people needing rescue in Cebu from their roofs, its secretarygeneral Gwendolyn Pang said Tues-

At least 49 drowned in floods and others died as a result of landslides and falling debris in Cebu, where 13 people were reported missing, the Office of Civil Defense said.

It added that 62 others were reported

missing in the central provinces of Negros Occidental and Negros Oriental which are located near Cebu.

"We did everything we can for the typhoon but, you know, there are really some unexpected things like flash floods," Cebu Gov Pamela Baricuatro told The Associated Press by tele-

Caloy Ramirez, a volunteer rescuer, said the massive flooding set off by the typhoon turned an upscale riverside residential community in Cebu city on Tuesday into an unrecognizable scene of tumbled SUVs and houses in disar-

"A joint rescue team is still searching for the 23 missing residents, of whom 15 are in Dal District and eight in Yuguru District," said Abdul Muhari, head of BNPB's Disaster Data, Information and Communication

Hurricane death toll rises to 43 in Haiti's government said Tuesday that the death toll from Hurricane Melissa rose to 43, with 13 others still missing.

Crews were still trying to reach people in the country's southwest region, where landslides and floodwaters devastated more than 30 communities. At least 25 deaths occurred in the southwestern coastal

town of Petit-Goâve, one of the hardest hit communities. The Category 5 storm, one of the strongest Atlantic hurricanes on record, flooded nearly 12,000 homes and destroyed nearly 200 others after its outer bands battered Haiti last week. Numerous roads remain inaccessible.

The government warned there's a drinking water shortage in several communities, and that it will soon distribute seeds and tools to farmers facing major agri-

Dominican Republic postpones summit: The Do-

minican government announced that it will postpone the 10th Summit of the Americas, originally scheduled for this year, until 2026 after consultations with key partners, including the United States. The decision was made after a "careful assessment"

of the regional situation, the foreign ministry said in a statement, citing deep political divergences that hamper productive dialogue in the hemisphere and the recent impact of extreme climate events in the Caribbean. It noted that the postponement had been coordinated

with institutions such as the Organization of American States (OAS) and the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB), and that funds already invested will be used for next year's meetings. (Xinhua)

Trump administration announces 16th deadly strike on an alleged drug boat

WASHINGTON Nov 5 (AP): US Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth announced yet another deadly strike on a boat accused of ferrying drugs in the eastern Pacific Ocean, coming the same day an aircraft carrier began heading to the region in a new expansion of military firepower.

The attack Tuesday killed two people aboard the vessel, Hegseth said, bringing the death toll from the Trump administration's campaign in South American waters up to at least 66 people in at least 16 strikes.

President Donald Trump has justified the strikes by saying the United States is in "armed conflict" with drug cartels and claiming the boats are operated by foreign terror organizations. The administration has not provided evidence or more

"We will find and terminate EVERY vessel with the intention of trafficking drugs to America to poison our citizens," Hegseth posted while on a trip to Asia.

Lawmakers from both parties have pressed the Trump administration for more information on who is being targeted and the legal justification for the strikes given that Congress has not authorized military action. United Nations human rights chief Volker Türk last week called for the U.S. to halt the attacks and "prevent the extrajudicial killing of people aboard these boats.

The latest strike comes as the USS Gerald R. Ford aircraft carrier has left the Mediterranean Sea on its way to the Caribbean after Hegseth ordered it to the region more than a week ago. It will join an already robust buildup of American planes, ships and thousands of troops in Latin

ity to discuss ship movements, confirmed that the Ford and the destroyer USS Bainbridge crossed through the Straits of Gibraltar and into the Atlantic on Tuesday.

The Ford originally deployed with five destroyers, but it's not clear if all of them will go to the Caribbean. Two of the other destroyers in the Ford's strike group, the USS Winston Churchill and the USS Mahan, are in the Mediterranean now, with the Mahan in port at Rota, Spain.

The other two destroyers, the USS Forrest Sherman and the USS Mitchener, are in the Red Sea, the official said.

Survivors of powerful earthquake in Afghanistan face cold, rain amid rubble

KABUL, Afghanistan, Nov 5, (AP): Survivors of a powerful earthquake in northern Afghanistan that killed more than 25 people and injured nearly 1,000 were digging through the rubble of their homes Tuesday, trying to salvage what belongings they could after spending the night outside in the bitter cold.

Rain was forecast for the region, further compounding the misery for survivors.

The 6.3 magnitude quake struck just before 1 a.m. local time Monday, with an epicenter 22 kilometers (14 miles) west-southwest of the town of Khulm in Samangan province. By early Tuesday afternoon, the death stood at 27. while another 956 people were injured, Public Health Ministry spokesperson

Sharafat Zaman said in a statement. The tremor also damaged historical sites, including Afghanistan's famed Blue Mosque in the northern city of Mazar-e-Sharif, which is one of Afghanistan's most revered religious landmarks, and the Bagh-e-Jahan

Nama Palace in Khulm. The Blue Mosque's minaret was badly damaged, while some bricks and tiles had fallen from some of the mosque's walls and cracks appeared in other parts of the centuries-old site, said Mahmoodullah Zarar, Head of Information

thorities in Tanzania faced mounting concern over killings during crackdowns on protests surrounding last week's election, with the largest opposition party alleging that security forces were secretly dumping bodies of hundreds killed in the violence. Demonstrations spread across the

East African country for several days after the Oct. 29 voting as mostly young people took to the streets to protest an election that foreign observers said failed to meet democratic standards because key opposition figures were barred.

Authorities declared a nationwide curfew and security forces cracked down on protests by firing live bullets and tear gas canisters.

The main opposition party, Chadema, has claimed that more than 1,000 people were killed and said Tuesday that security forces were trying to hide the scale of the deaths by secretly disposing of the bodies. The authorities have not responded to the claims.

"Tanzanians' hearts are bleeding right now. This is a new thing for Tanzanians," Brenda Rupia, Chadema's director of communications, said by phone from the commercial capital of

Dar es Salaam. President Samia Suluhu Hassan was

Tariffs target imports from China, Canada, Mexico

Supreme Court weighs Trump tariffs in a trillion-dollar test of executive power

WASHINGTON, Nov 5, (AP): President Donald Trump's power to unilaterally impose far-reaching tariffs is coming before the Supreme Court on Wednesday in a pivotal test of executive power with trillion-dollar implications for the global economy.

The Republican administration is trying to defend the tariffs central to Trump's economic agenda after lower courts ruled the emergency law he invoked doesn't give him near-limitless power to set and change duties on

imports.

The Constitution says Congress has the power to levy tariffs. But the Trump administration argues that in emergency situations the president can regulate importation taxes like tariffs. Trump has called the case one of the most important in the country's history and said a ruling against him would be catastrophic for the economy.

The challengers argue the 1977 emergency powers law Trump used doesn't even mention tariffs, and no president before has used it to impose them. A collection of small businesses say the uncertainty is driving them to the brink The case centers on two sets of tariffs. The first came in February on im-

gency over drug trafficking. The second involves the sweeping "reciprocal" tariffs on most countries that Trump announced in April. Multiple lawsuits have been filed over the tariffs, and the court will hear suits filed by Democratic-leaning states and small businesses focused on eve-

ports from Canada, China and Mexico after Trump declared a national emer-

rything from plumbing supplies to women's cycling apparel. Lower courts have struck down the bulk of his tariffs as an illegal use of emergency power, but the nation's highest court may see it differently.

Trump helped shape the conservative majority court, naming three of the justices in his first term. The justices have so far been reluctant to check his extraordinary flex of executive power, handing him a series of wins on its emergency docket. Still, those have been short-term orders - little of Trump's wide-ranging

conservative agenda has been fully argued before the nation's highest court. That means the outcome could set the tone for wider legal pushback against

The justices have been skeptical of executive power claims before, such as when then-President Joe Biden tried to forgive \$400 billion in student loans under a different law dealing with national emergencies. The Supreme Court found the law didn't clearly give him the power to enact a program with such a big economic impact, a legal principle known as the major questions

The challengers say Trump's tariffs should get the same treatment, since they'll have a much greater economic effect, raising some \$3 trillion over the next decade. The government, on the other hand, says the tariffs are different

the courts should not be second-guessing the president. The challengers are also trying to channel the conservative justices' skepticism about whether the Constitution allows other parts of the government to use powers reserved for Congress, a concept known as the nondelegation doctrine. Trump's interpretation of the law could mean anyone who can

regulate" can also impose taxes, they say.

The Justice Department counters that legal principle is for governmental

agencies, not for the president. If he eventually loses at the high court, Trump could impose tariffs under other laws, but those have more limitations on the speed and severity with which he could act. The aftermath of a ruling against him also could be complicated, if the government must issue refunds for the tariffs that had collected \$195 billion in revenue as of September.

The Trump administration did win over four appeals court judges who found the 1977 International Emergency Economic Powers Act, or IEEPA, gives the president authority to regulate importation during emergencies without explicit limitations. In recent decades, Congress has ceded some tariff authority to the president, and Trump has made the most of the power

Actress delivers emotional keynote on gender equity in Hollywood

Stewart urges honesty, unity at Academy Women's Luncheon

LOS ANGELES, Nov 5, (AP): In a rooftop space filled with Hollywood's most influential figures, actor Kristen Stewart delivered an unflinching speech urging women in film to stay united, reject tokenism and celebrate the next generation of female filmmakers.

Stewart, who directed "The Chronology of Water," an adaptation of Lidia Yuknavitch's 2011 memoir, began her remarks with some humor, but she quickly turned to gender inequity in Hollywood.

"It's awkward to talk about inequality for some people," Stewart said Tuesday at the Academy Women's Luncheon. "We can discuss wage gaps and taxes on tampons and measure it in lots of quantifiable ways, but the violence of silencing. ... It's like we're not even supposed to be angry. But ... I'm so angry."

Stewart said she was invited to speak about the women who inspire her and began with Yuknavitch, whose memoir she credited with "giving voice to certain truths I inherently understood."

"Hard truths, when spoken out loud, become springboards to freedom," Stewart said. "The permission to be unpalatable, unsanitary, and to come from the inside out ... led me to acknowledge the invisible cage that we are all living in and how easy it is to story our way out there." Stewart was the keynote speaker at the event held at the Academy Museum of Motion Pictures with attendees including Tessa Thompson, Kate Hudson, Julia Louis-Dreyfus, Claire Foy, Kerry Condon, Patty Jenkins and Emma Mackey.

Many actors in attendance dressed in Chanel clothing, jewelry, shoes, makeup and accessories. The luxury fashion brand, which sponsored the event, has had a long association with film and women creatives since founder Gabrielle "Coco" Chanel saw an opportunity to put her designs in the movies and empower women in film.

While reflecting on the state of women's filmmaking in the post MeToo era, Stewart said it seemed possible that stories made by and for women were finally getting their due.

"But I can now attest to the bare-knuckle brawling that it takes every step of the way when the content is too dark, too taboo," she said before adding that "our business is in a state of emergency."

After Stewart's remark, she paused as the audience murmured in agreement.

"We are allowed to be proud of ourselves," she said. "But let's try not to be tokenized. Let's start printing our own currency."

Tuesday's event was held to bring together women from all facets of the filmmaking community. It was also a celebration of the Academy Gold Fellowship for Women, a program that supports emerging women filmmakers.
Oscar-winning costume designer Ruth E. Carter presented this year's fellowship awardees to US recipient Alina Simone, who was born in the Ukraine, and international fellow Marlén Viñayo, who has been based in El Salvador.

Carter described mentorship as the bridge between aspiration and opportunity.

"For me, mentorship was someone seeing me before I could see myself," said Carter, the costume designer behind the "Black Panther" films became the first Black woman to win two Oscars in 2023.

"From my college professor Linda Bolton Smith, who refused to let me quit, to director Spike Lee, who offered me my first film, to the late John Singleton, who gave me room to learn and grow – that's what mentorship and fellowship do," Carter said. "They say to every woman filmmaker and artist: We see you. We believe in you. You belong here."

From Carter's praise to bold statements from Stewart, the energy of solidarity and sisterhood remained the centerpiece of the afternoon.

"I am so for you," Stewart told the room. "I hope you are too. Let's make art in the face of it."

RHCP's Smith gifts music scholarship

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Nov 5, (AP): The Red Hot Chili Peppers may be strongly associated with southern California, but drummer Chad Smith's heart never left the Midwest.

The Rock & Roll Hall of Famer, who grew up in suburban Detroit, is gifting a need-based music scholarship to the University of Michigan.

"A lot of people (say), 'The Chili Peppers, West Coast band, California this and California that.' I get it. I was born in St. Paul, Minnesota," Smith told The Associated Press in an interview Sunday, just hours before he made the official announcement during a surprise appearance at the Ann Arbor school's annual Band-O-Rama event. "The Minnesota connection is strong. The Michigan connection is strong.

"And that's why we're here. It's a natural, authentic fit for us."

Smith, 64, performed the RHCP hit "Can't Stop," alongside the Michigan Marching Band at Hill Auditorium.

The Curtis & Joan Smith Scholarship, which is named in honor of Smith's parents, will be awarded to an incoming University of Michigan School of Music, Theatre & Dance student, beginning in 2026.

Partnership

The scholarship is a partnership between the School of Music, Theatre & Dance and the Chad Smith Foundation and comes on the heels of one with the same name launched two months ago at the University of Minnesota. Smith's parents are Minnesota alums.

Michigan's version of the Curtis & Joan Smith Scholarship will support incoming freshmen to the School of Music, Theatre & Dance undergraduate program who demonstrate financial need and a strong commitment to pursuing a music career. The scholarship reinforces CSF's mission to expand access to high-quality music education and career pathways for aspiring musicians across the country.

Smith attended Lahser High School in Bloomfield Hills, Michigan, and began his career playing in clubs and bars across the Detroit area. He credits his parents with nurturing his love of music and supporting his dream to pursue it professionally.

"My mother is 98 years young. Still going. She's here today - amazing," Smith said. "So, to be able to honor her (and) my father unfortunately passed away, but they were so integral in helping me with my musical path."

Smith has been with the Red Hot Chili Peppers since the late 1980s. During that time, the quartet, which also includes singer Anthony Kiedis and bassist Flea, have been one of the biggest-selling music acts, mixing layers of funk, punk, rap and traditional pop over a foundation of rock.

The backward-baseball-cap-wearing Smith has held down the beat on such hits as "Give It Away," "Under the Bridge" and "Dani California." The Chili Peppers were inducted into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame in 2012.

"I'm fortunate to be in a band people like and I play the drums and maybe some drummers or musicians will get inspired just from my story," Smith said. "So, yeah, it's just an opportunity to give back to what I've been so lucky to have and for next generations of musicians to be able to pursue what they love."

'Nuremberg' explores forgotten psychiatrist Douglas Kelley

Crowe and Malek face off in trial drama

LOS ANGELES, Nov 5, (AP): The Nuremberg trials have inspired filmmakers before, from Stanley Kramer's 1961 drama to the 2000 television miniseries with Alec Baldwin and Brian Cox. But for the latest take, "Nuremberg," writer-director James Vanderbilt focuses on a lesser-known figure: The US Army psychiatrist Douglas Kelley, who after the war was assigned to supervise and evaluate captured Nazi leaders to ensure they were fit for trial (and also keep them alive). But his is a name that had been largely forgotten: He wasn't even a character in the miniseries.

Kelley, portrayed in the film by Rami Malek, was an ambitious sort who saw in this assignment an opportunity to write a book (bestselling, he hoped) on his findings about the men who committed such atrocities. Over several months he conducted many hours interviews and Rorschach tests with the inmates, including fallen Reichsmarschall Hermann Goering (Russell Crowe), who proved an especially fascinating subject as the highest ranking official still living.

The film, in theaters Friday, centers on a series of conversations between Kelley and Goering, who develop something almost like a friendship - or at least a temporary understanding. It's interesting, morally murky territory fitting of the filmmaker best known as the screenwriter of "Zodiac" that does gesture toward some provocative ideas - including the very concept of war tribunals overseen by the victors. But it can't quite synthesize its classical form with the bleak, sobering truths at its core.

Crowe, who speaks both German and English in the film, is well suited to playing this charismatic, larger-than-life egoist who believes he can outwit those around him. Curious choices are made, though, about what to tell of his transgres-

sions during the war and the angelic representation of his wife and daughter in hiding.

Goering is likely not as much of a household name as "Nuremberg" seems to assume, but Crowe does get to do some of his best work in years. Malek, wild-eyed as ever, portrays Kelley as an overconfident opportunist who is more than willing to cross lines to gain Goering's trust. Are we rooting for him, though? Not exactly. You might think that these chats would be the kinds you don't want to leave - a meeting of two unique minds trying to figure one another out, and yet there's a spark and intrigue lacking. An unnerving descent into the mind of Hitler's right hand man this is not.

Greatness

Instead, they talk about fathers and greatness and sometimes magic tricks. Perhaps that's why Vanderbilt, who based his film on Jack El-Hai's book "The Nazi and the Psychiatrist," broadens his scope beyond the prison cell to include the story of how the unprecedented trial came together, with Supreme Court Justice Robert H. Jackson (a very good Michael Shannon) leading the charge to build a case against the Nazi leaders.

What results is a familiar historical drama, weaving together many various characters in the buildup to the climactic courtroom showdown. With an expansive and recognizable ensemble cast, including Richard E. Grant as the British lawyer Sir David Maxwell-Fyfe, John Slattery as the commandant of Nuremberg prison, Colin Hanks as another psychiatrist brought into the fold (Gustave Gilbert, whose writings would eclipse Kelley's) and Leo Woodall as a German speaking US officer, "Nuremberg," stately and sober,

is what we might have called Oscar-bait once upon a time. The most fascinating character is probably Woodall's, but the real story of Sgt. Howie Triest, a German Jewish emigre, is used as a reveal late in the film to motivate a humiliated Kelley to "do the right thing" and help Jackson and the lawyers bring Goering to justice.

Oddly, the trial is filmed like a standard courtroom drama, resorting to cliches and a rousing but hollow "we got him" moment that feels antithetical to the film's larger point, that there is little glory in the charade and the convictions. At the end of it all is death anyway.

What does it say about a nearly two-and-a-half hour drama when the 80-year-old footage from inside Nazi concentration camps that was shown inside the real courtroom is the most compelling and memorable sequence? Perhaps in these days of Holocaust denial, it's never a bad idea to remind people of the truth. But will anyone harboring those assumptions stumble upon "Nuremberg" and, if they do, make it that far into the film?

Kelley would go on to write that book, "22 Cells in Nuremberg," but his chilling conclusions were not exactly embraced in that postwar moment. He did not find monsters or psychopaths in those cells, after all, but instead saw essentially normal people. Kelley wrote a warning: "I am convinced that there is little in America today which could prevent the establishment of a Nazi-like state."

"Nuremberg," a Sony Pictures Classics release in theaters Friday, is rated PG-13 by the Motion Picture Association for "the Holocaust, some language, violent content, smoking, brief drug content, some disturbing images, suicide." 148 minutes. Two and a half stars out of four.

Soccer legend honored for services to sport, charity

Bend a knee like Beckham: Soccer star is knighted

LONDON, Nov 5, (AP): When it came time to receive his knighthood, soccer great David Beckham knew what to do. He bent his knee like, well, Beck-

King Charles III tapped his shoulders with the blade of a sword and "Becks" was transformed to Sir David Beckham

"This is without doubt my proudest moment," Beckham said after Tuesday's ceremony at Windsor Castle. "I've been very obviously lucky in my career to have won what I've won and done what I've done, but to receive an honor like this, of a knight, is beyond anything that I ever thought that I would

The distinction marks the pinnacle of Beckham's effort to rehabilitate his image following events that at times alienated him from fans during a long and distinguished career. He also has had a very public persona as a fashion model, husband to Victoria "Posh" Beckham of the Spice Girls and "Bend it Like Beckham" movie muse.

The 50-year-old was knighted for his services to sport and charity, having partnered with UNICEF, the U.N.'s children's fund, for two decades and campaigned with a charity working to eradicate malaria. He also played a pivotal role in London being awarded the 2012 Summer Olympic Games.

Nobel Prize-winning novelist Kazuo Ishiguro, author of "The Remains of the Day" who previously was knighted, was recognized in Tuesday's ceremony as a Companion of Honor for literature. Renowned musicals singer and actor Elaine Paige was given a damehood, the female equivalent of a knighthood.

Beckham is the only English soccer player to score at three different World Cups, and his career included the triple-winning campaign of 1999, when Manchester United won the Premier League, the FA Cup and the Champions League.

With 115 appearances for the England national team, Beckham is third on the all-time list. He also captained the side on 59 occasions.

After leaving Manchester United in 2003 - a move that devastated fans - Beckham played for Real Madrid, Los Angeles Galaxy and Paris Saint-Germain. He now co-owns the Major League Soccer team Inter Miami.

His career hit a low point at the 1998 World Cup in France, where Beckham was widely vilified for his petulant kick of Argentina player Diego Simeone, which saw him sent off and left the team short a player. Many fans blamed him for England's exit.

In 2023's Netflix documentary series "Beckham," he described the abuse he experienced, which included an effigy of him hanging from a noose outside a London pub.

"I knew it was bad at the time, but going over that whole thing was quite a tough one," he told The Associated Press at the time.

Beckham's knighthood was announced in June during the king's birthday honors list. The awards, which are also given out at New Year's, recognize contributions to British life.

Syrian artists turn 'war-torn' house into memorial mural

DARAYA, Syria, Nov 5, (AP): In the war-ravaged town of Daraya, on the outskirts of Damascus, a group of young Syrian artists has turned the ruins of a bombed-out house into a canvas of remembrance. On the collapsed ceiling, they painted a colorful graffiti mural honoring families lost during years of conflict.

The project was led by Bilal Shoraba, seen in a yellow T-shirt, who was an activist and graffiti artist during the Syrian army's siege of Daraya between 2012 and 2016. During that time, when the city became a center of resistance to then-President Bashar Assad's rule, Shoraba created about 30 graffiti works as quiet acts of defiance.

Assad was ousted in a lightning rebel offensive in December, halting nearly 14 years of civil war that killed around half a million people, displaced millions more, and left tens of thousands missing. After returning to Daraya, Shoraba launched a workshop with the

Dar Ebla Cultural Center to teach local youth the art of graffiti. The mural seen here grew out of that collaboration - a symbol of resilience and renewal in a place once synonymous with loss.

In the midst of shattered walls and broken homes, their paint brings a touch of color and hope back to Daraya.

Marriage boom mirrors cautious economic recovery

Lebanon's weddings in full swing after years of crisis

BEIRUT, Nov 5, (Xinhua): At the Forum De Beyrouth exhibition hall in Beirut, where the largest annual wedding fair in Lebanon was in full swing, the hum of conversation mingled with the scent of roses and fondant.

Brides-to-be wandered between lace and jewelry stalls, while grooms weighed catering options and photographers thumbed through glossy albums -- After years of disruptions resulted from economic crisis and conflicts, the fair was crowded again, with aisles teeming with couples ready to tie the knot. The renewed enthusiasm for wed-

dings is seen by many as a quiet indicator of Lebanon's economic recovery. As couples spend and vendors rehire, the industry's rebound reflects a fragile return of consumer confidence and the resilience of a service economy that has survived war and inflation. "We finally had a good year," said

Charbel Krayem Al-Asmar, owner of the Grand House wedding venue and Carre Sucre catering. "After years of fear, people are encouraged again. Couples are paying from their own savings ... but they still want to celebrate."

His company handles weddings of 300 to 500 guests, with most budgets between 15,000 and 30,000 US dollars. "We Lebanese love life," he added. "If you offer good packages, people will celebrate no matter what

Across the hall, hotel representatives and venue managers shared similar optimism. At Coral Beach Resort, senior banquet manager Vinane Nadar described a noticeable rebound. "After Ramadan, activity was great. As

soon as the war ended, people started reserving again -- some with 400 guests," she said. "They're tired of postponing. The mood is changing."

In the mountains of Faytroun, newly-opened wedding venues are also benefiting from the sentiment. "We didn't expect to host 12 weddings in our first year," said Elie Badr, owner of Upper House. "If calm continues, 2026 will be even better."

The recovery stretches far beyond ballrooms. On the fashion floor, sequined gowns caught the light as designer Christian Abdallah explained that "demand for dress rentals above 3,500 dollars is back." He produces locally despite higher costs. "People are starting to spend again. It's a sign that the crisis is easing." Photographers, jewelers, and enter-

tainers echoed the sense of momentum. Patrick Nicolas, a photographer, has already booked 30 weddings for next year. "People want to move on,"

Jewelry retailer Elie Nassif said that "2025 was better than 2024" despite the high gold price, with couples already commissioning pieces for 2026.

At a booth festooned with cascading blooms, planner Wafica Ramadan sifted through color palettes between client consultations. "Budgets may be tighter, but ... people are craving joy again," she said.

Entertainment provider Miriam Rayes, whose team stages contemporary wedding performances, agreed. "We had a wedding every weekend. Couples don't give up on the entrance show -- it is tradition.

For organizer Fadi Semaan, who heads Wedding Small, the company that organizes the wedding fair, the turnout itself was proof of renewed confidence. "We have 215 exhibitors this year," he said. "After years of interruption -- from political turmoil to the explosion and war -- vendors wouldn't return if they didn't believe next year will be stronger.

Economist Nassib Ghobril of Byblos Bank believes the revival of wedding activity offers a measurable sign of stabilization. "Early reservations show people's willingness to plan and spend again," he said. "The sector has wide linkages, from food and clothing to transport, and when expatriates hold weddings here, they inject fresh cash into the economy."

Yet, he cautioned, "security is key. Some expatriates still choose Italy or Cyprus for stability.

Around the stands, the crowd mixed locals and diaspora couples returning to celebrate at home. Rita and Daniel, Lebanese expatriates from Montreal, Canada had just signed a venue contract for next summer. "We could have done it in Canada," Daniel said, "but we want our families together in Lebanon. It's cheaper here, and the service is better."

Nearby, Layal and Karim from Tripoli, Italy leaned over a floral display. "We postponed twice. First because of the crisis, then the war,' Layal said. "Now we're saving money and keeping it small, but it feels right

billion Grand Egyptian Museum opens to the public

CAIRO, Nov 5, (AP): The Grand Egyptian Museum opened its doors to the public on Tuesday after an extravagant inaugural ceremony attended by royals and

The \$1 billion megaproject has been promoted as the world's largest museum dedicated to a single civilization, with nearly 50,000 artifacts. For the first time, visitors can marvel at the collection of treasures from the tomb of the famed King Tutankhamun, which was discovered in 1922.

"Most Tutankhamun treasures were in the old Egyptian museum," Ahmed Ghoneim, the museum's CEO, told reporters. "However, some were scattered in other museums and others were kept in storage. Bringing all those treasures in one place enriches the museum display experience.

Visitors flocked to the monarch's gallery that houses over 5,000 artifacts in-

cluding jewelry, gilded chariots and his gold death mask. "It was amazing, especially the mask," said Nikolas Voulgarakis, a tourist from

The museum, located near the Pyramids at the edge of Cairo, is expected to boost Egypt's tourism revenues and help invigorate the country's troubled econ-

omy.
"We expect 7 million visitors a year," said Ghoneim, adding that a daily cap of 20,000 visitors will be enforced to ensure a smooth experience for all.

President Abdel Fattah el-Sissi inaugurated the museum over the weekend after nearly two years of a soft debut, where visitors had access to parts of the museum.

Yodeling now a popular form of singing

Shout-out for yodeling? Swiss seek recognition from UNESCO

LUCERNE, Switzerland, Nov 5, (AP): Yodel-ay-hee ... what?! Those famed yodeling calls that for centuries have echoed through the Alps, and more recently have morphed into popular song and folk music, could soon reap a response - from faraway Paris.

Switzerland's government is looking for a shout-out from UN cultural agency UNESCO, based in the French capital, to include the tradition of yodeling on its list of intangible cultural heritage. A decision is expected by year-end.

Modern-day promoters emphasize that the yodel is far more than the mountain cries of yesteryear by falsetto-bellowing male herders in suspenders who intone alongside giant Alphorns atop verdant hillsides. It's now a popular form of sing-

Over the last century, yodeling clubs sprouted up in Switzerland, building upon the tradition and broadening its appeal - with its tones, techniques and tremolos finding their way deeper into the musical lexicon internationally in classical, jazz and folk. U.S. country crooners prominently blended yodels

into their songs in the late 1920s and 30s. About seven years ago, the Lucerne University of Applied Sciences and Arts, or HSLU by its German-language acronym,

became the first Swiss university to teach yodeling. "For me, actually, in Switzerland we have four languages but I think really we have five languages. We have a fifth: The yodel," said HSLU professor Nadja Räss, alluding to the official German, French, Italian and Romansh languages in Switzerland. Yodeling exists in neighboring Austria, Germany and Italy, but Swiss yodeling is distinctive because of its vocal technique, she said.

In its early days, yodeling involved chants of wordless vowel sounds, or "natural yodeling," with melodies but no lyrics. More recently, "yodeling song" has included verses and

The Swiss government says at least 12,000 yodelers take part through about 780 groups of the Swiss Yodeling Associa-In Switzerland, Räss said, yodeling is built on the "sound

colors of the voice" and features two types: one centering on the head - with a "u" sound - and one emanating from deeper down in the chest - with an "o" sound. And even within Switzerland, styles vary: Yodeling in the

northern region near Appenzell is more "melancholic, slower,"

while in the country's central regions, the sounds are "more intense and shorter," she said. What began as mostly a male activity is now drawing more and more women in a country that only finalized the right to

vote for all women in the 1980s - long after most of its Euro-Julien Vuilleumier, a scientific adviser for the Federal Office of Culture who is spearheading the Swiss request, said it's

Also among the 68 total nominations this year are traditions like Thanakha face powder in Myanmar; Ghanaian highlife music; the fermented Kyrgyz beverage Maksym; and the El Joropo music and dance tradition in Venezuela.

The list is different from the UNESCO World Heritage List, which enshrines protections for physical sites that are considered important to humanity, like the Pyramids of Giza in

Last year, Japan's famed sake - the smooth rice wine - was one of more than 60 honorees in the intangible heritage list, alongside things like the Nowruz spring festival in parts of cen-

tral Asia, and the skills and knowledge of zinc roofers in Paris. Räss of the Lucerne university says that candidates for the intangible heritage list are asked to specify the future prospects of cultural traditions.

"We figured out some projects to bring it to the future. And one of those is that we bring the yodel to the primary school," said Räss, who herself grew up yodeling. She said 20 Swiss school teachers know how to yodel and are trying it with their

"One of my life goals is that when I will die, in Switzerland every school child will be in contact with yodeling during their primary school time," she said. "I think it's a very good chance for the future of the yodel to be on that (UNESCO)

Protein may impact muscle growth and athletic performance

Women gain greater heart benefits from exercise than men: study

XIAMEN, Nov. 5, (Xinhua): A study reveals that in the prevention and treatment of coronary heart disease, the cardiac protection benefits obtained by women through exercise may be significantly better than those of men.

This finding was recently published online in the international journal Nature Cardiovascular Research.

The research results were jointly released by a team led by Professor Wang Yan and associate researcher Chen Jiajin from Xiamen Cardiovascular Hospital Xiamen University and the Shanghai Chest Hospital Affiliated to Shanghai Jiao Tong University School of Medicine, both located in east China.

Based on the wearable device data of 85,000 participants -- the research team systematically analyzed gender differences in the prevention and treatment of coronary heart disease through exercise. It found that women only need 250 minutes of exercise per week to reduce their risk of

coronary heart disease by 30 percent, while men need 530 minutes, which is about twice as much as the time required by women, to achieve the same cardiovascular benefits.

Further analysis showed that among people who have been diagnosed with coronary heart disease, women who exercise for 51 minutes per week can reduce their risk of death by 30 percent, while men need to exercise for 85 minutes to achieve the same result.

Coronary heart disease is a major cause of human deaths. Institutions such as the World Health Organization recommend that adults should do at least 150 minutes of moderateintensity physical activity throughout the week, or do at least 75 minutes of vigorous-intensity physical activity, or an equivalent combination of both.

As some current guidelines still adopt a "one-size-fits-all" exercise standard, experts hope that the findings of this new research project will serve as a reference for efforts aimed at prevention and treatment of different gender groups -- in coping with coronary heart disease.

Lacking a common protein may affect how muscles respond to testosterone, potentially affecting athletic performance and age-related muscle loss, according to a new study led by an Australian research

The research has uncovered a surprising link between ACTN3, the gene for speed, and the body's response to testosterone, the hormone that helps maintain muscle mass, according to a statement released Wednesday by Australia's Murdoch Children's Research Institute

The α -actinin-3 protein is found in muscles important for explosive activities. About one in five people lack this protein due to a variation in the ACTN3 gene, said the study published in Science Advances.

The research showed this genetic variation reduced levels of the androgen receptor in muscle tissue in both men and women, impacting how muscles grow or shrink in response to testosterone, said MCRI Senior Research Officer Jane Seto.

"This gene has long been associated with elite sprinting ability, but we're now seeing it plays a much broader role in muscle biology. It's not just about speed but about how your muscles respond to testosterone," Seto said.

The study, using both mouse models and human samples, found that missing the α -actinin-3 protein worsened muscle loss in male mice when testosterone was blocked, and blunted muscle growth in female mice treated with supplementary testosterone during puberty.

Researchers identified seven key genes that appear to drive this effect, as they are sensitive to testosterone and depend on the α-actinin-3 protein for proper expression. These genes influence important cell processes such as breaking down amino acids, cleaning out damaged cells and regenerating newer, healthier ones and producing energy in mitochondria, the study said.

Seto said the findings could explain why some people lose muscle more rapidly with age or illness, or respond to testosterone-based therapies differently, and suggest this protein as a potential target for treatments preserving muscle mass.

Europe commits to 90% carbon cut by 2040

before global climate meet in Brazil

BRUSSELS, Nov 5, (AP): The European Union said Wednesday it would slash carbon emissions by 90% by 2040, in an agreement widely seen as a weakening of the 27-nation bloc's previous climate goals, after an overnight debate ahead of the UN climate conference in Brazil.

Hungary, Slovakia and Poland voted against the agreement, despite other nations agreeing to key compromises including allowing flexibility for member states to buy carbon credits internationally to reach their emissions targets and for the EU to reassess its climate policy depending on economic performance. The agreement also allows for postponing a new carbon trading plan covering transport and heating, a central demand of Poland

Environmentalists criticized the deal for provisions that will allow the EU to buy carbon credits from lessdeveloped countries, effectively out-sourcing the bloc's obligations. "The use of offshore carbon laundering to meet this nominal target means the EU's own commitment is much lower, and that commitment means even less with a baked-in clause to dilute the target every two years," said Greenpeace EU climate campaigner Thomas Gelin. Jeroen Gerlag, Europe director at the nonprofit Climate Group, said that "while the EU keeps its 90% commitment on paper, in effect it'll be offshoring some of its emission reductions -

making it someone else's problem." The agreement was hammered

out between EU climate ministers in a marathon session overnight into Wednesday morning. Before it becomes a legally-binding document, the European Parliament will vote on it and negotiate its contents with the European Council.

"This is exactly the signal that Europe has to send in these times," said Swedish climate minister Romina Pourmokhtari, who thanked Finland, Germany, Spain and the Netherlands for pushing for high emissions cuts in

Wopke Hoekstra, the European

Commissioner for Climate, Net-Zero and Clean Growth, said the agreement is strong compared to those of allies in the Pacific, Europe and North America, but that some compromise was necessary amid current geopolitical and economic tension.

"On this continent, we will continue with climate action, but it has to be bridged, it has to be married with independence and competitiveness. Not one without the other. All three are essential," he said.

The EU executive, European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen, will now travel to Brazil for the Conference of Parties - known as COP30 - with a clear EU emissions agreement.

Now we have the possibility to go to Belem with leadership," said Sara Aagesen, Spain's climate minister.

Many EU governments have shifted to the right since the Paris Agreement in 2015. Some see climate regulations as shackling the economy, while others say Europe will either make and sell renewables or be forced to buy energy or green products from countries like

EU agrees on new emissions targets As world leaders enter climate talks, people in poverty have most at stake

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov 5, (AP): When summer heat comes to the Arara neighb.orhood in northern Rio, it lingers, baking the red brick and concrete that make up many of the buildings long after the sun has gone down. Luis Cassiano, who's lived here more than 30 years, says he's getting worried as heat waves become more frequent and

In poor areas such as Arara, those who can afford air conditioning - Cassiano is one - can't always count on it because of frequent power outages on an overloaded system. Cassiano gets some relief from the green roof he installed about a decade ago, which can keep his house up to 15 degrees Celsius (about 27 degrees Fahrenheit) cooler than his neighbor's, but he still struggles to stay comfortable.

"The sun in the summer nowadays is scary," Cassiano said.

As world leaders come to Brazil for climate talks, people like Cassiano are the ones with the most at stake. Poor communities are often more vulnerable to hazards like extreme heat and supersized storms and less likely to have the resources to cope than wealth-

Âny help from the climate talks depends on countries not just laying out pledges and plans to lower emissions. They also need to find the political will to implement them, as well as come up with the billions of dollars needed to adapt everything from harvests to houses to better withstand human-caused climate change.

All of it is sorely needed for the 1.1 billion people around the world who live in acute poverty, according to the United Nations.

That's why many have lauded the choice of Belem, a relatively poor city, to host these talks.

"I am pleased that we will be going to a place like this, because this is where climate meets poverty, meets demand, meets financing needs, and meets the reality of the majority of the population of this world that are impacted by climate change," said Inger Andersen, executive director of the

U.N. Environment Programme. It's not just poor people in poor countries who suffer when poverty and climate change collide. A U.N. Development Programme report found that even in highly developed countries, 82% of people living in poverty will be exposed to at least one of four climate hazards: high heat, drought, floods and

People in poverty are more vulnerable to climate change for several reasons, said Carter Brandon, a senior fellow at the World Resources Institute who works on the economics of climate change and the finances of adapt-

They might not have the money to leave areas like inundated deltas or floodplains, landslide-prone hillsides or farmlands regularly scorched by drought. Nor to rebuild after a disaster hits. And those financial hits can be worsened by other problems like health issues, lack of education or lack of social mobility.

"It's not just, climate destroys buildings or bridges or property. It destroys the livelihoods of families. And if you don't have savings, that's really devastating," Brandon said.

Even relatively developed countries ith more ways to adapt will see some farm yields drop significantly, according to a UNDP analysis of global agriculture under different warming sce-

But poorer countries will be more severely affected, said Heriberto Tapia, head of research and strategic partnerships advisor at the UNDP Human Development Report Office.

Tapia said Africa, with more than 500 million people in poverty, is a big concern. Many depend on crop yields for their livelihoods.

Most of the world's 550 million small agricultural producers are in low- or middle-income countries, working in marginal environments and more vulnerable to climate hazards, said Ismahane Elouafi, executive managing director of CGIAR, the Consultative Group for International Agriculture Research.

Elouafi thinks technology can help ease the climate pressure on many of those farmers, but also noted that many can't afford it. She's not confident that this year's COP will provide enough money to help with that.

Brazilian officials thought Belem, on the edge of the Amazon and not a rich city, would be a forceful reminder for negotiators of the difficulty that climate change and rising extreme weather are bringing to millions of people every day.

"I heard there were a lot of negotiators who have been complaining of being put on a bunk bed, or in terms of sharing a room, but this is the reality of most people around the world," said Nafkote Dabi, climate policy lead at global development organization Oxfam. "So I think it makes things real."

But some experts were skeptical, despite the recent UNDP report saying the need to take action is urgent.

"I wish that they had said more about what exactly is the rapid action that needs to be taken, because I don't think rapid action is going to come out of COP," said Kimberly Marion Suiseeva, an associate professor at Duke University who studies how international policies impact people in rural and forested areas.

Although the public narrative has long been that humankind has generally been making progress on alleviating poverty, numbers show that now there's a "stagnation," said Pedro Conceição, director of the Human Development Report Office at the UNDP. "The numbers are high and they are not budging."

In a memo ahead of COP30, Microsoft co-founder Bill Gates called for a shift from prioritizing reducing emissions to focus on reducing human suffering. On climate change, "there's no apocalyptic story for rich countries,' he said. "The place where it gets really tough is in these poor countries."

But Conceição said it's wrong to think about poverty reduction and climate as a tradeoff.

The idea that climate is only a future problem, "or it's about things out there like glaciers melting, needs to be completely thrown out and replaced with the notion that actually the two agendas are one and the same," he said.

Dengue vaccine offers 7-year protection was seen across all four dengue virus

Bangladesh sees 1,147 dengue cases in a day

OSAKA, Japan, Nov 5, (Agencies): Takeda announced the completion of the 7-year pivotal Phase 3 Tetravalent Immunization against Dengue Efficacy Study (TIDES) trial evaluating its dengue vaccine, Qdenga (Dengue Tetravalent Vaccine [Live, Attenuated]) (TAK-003). "We are seeing an unprecedented surge in dengue, with over 14 million cases reported across more than 100 countries in 2024 alone, largely driven by the impacts of climate change and inadequate urbanization. Brazil, consistently among the countries most impacted by dengue, has contributed to the record-breaking number of dengue cases and rise in severity and deaths. This surge highlights the urgent need for prevention methods like QDENGA," said Edson Moreira, M.D., Senior Researcher at Oswaldo Cruz Foundation, Brazilian Ministry of Health. "The inclusion of Qdenga

in Brazil's public vaccination program has reduced symptomatic dengue cases and dengue-related hospitalizations."

After 4.5 years, two doses of Qdenga provided 61.2% [95% CI: 56.0, 65.8] vaccine efficacy (VE) in preventing virologically confirmed dengue (VCD). 1 A booster dose administered at 4.5 years only marginally increased efficacy to 74.3% [95% CI: 66.7, 80.1] after 2 years. 2 Qdenga showed 84.1% [95% ČI: 77.8, 88.6] VE in preventing dengue-related hospitalizations at 4.5 years, and VE remained consistently high at 90.6% [95% CI: 78.9, 95.8] after the booster dose. DHAKA: Bangladesh reported 1,147 new dengue cases and five new deaths in the past 24 hours, the Ministry of Health said on Monday.

According to the data, 2,960 dengue cases were recorded so far in November, taking the tally to 72,822 and the death toll to 288 so far this year. Dengue fever, typically a monsoon-season illness in Bangladesh, is now spreading beyond its usual June-September period.

Türkiye imposes quarantine after FMD outbreak

ISTANBUL, Nov. 5, (Xinhua): Turkish authorities imposed quarantine measures across 22 villages and neighborhoods in the northwestern province of Bolu on Tuesday following an outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease, local media reported.

The outbreak also prompted the suspension of operations at the regional livestock market until further notice, as part of efforts to contain the animal disease, the news website Halk TV re-

Officials noted that the disease spreads rapidly, even via vehicle tires, and stressed that all animal transfers remain prohibited during the quarantine period. Türkiye has faced repeated outbreaks of foot-and-mouth disease this year, forcing many livestock markets to remain closed throughout the

The viral illness affects clovenhoofed animals such as cattle, sheep, and goats, causing fever, blisters, and painful sores in the mouth and on the feet, which make it difficult for the animals to eat or walk.

Bird flu: An outbreak of highly pathogenic avian influenza has been confirmed at a poultry farm in the central Japanese prefecture of Niigata, local authorities said Tuesday.

The prefectural government said it has confirmed the outbreak at the farm in the city of Tainai, with a total of 630,000 egg-laying chickens to be culled.

Officials said that the Niigata farm reported abnormalities on Monday morning, including an increase in the number of chicken deaths.

A preliminary virus test returned positive results, while a detailed genetic analysis was conducted.

The latest case marks the third bird flu outbreak confirmed at a poultry farm in Japan this season.

Meanwhile, the Friedrich Loeffler Institute (FLI), Germany's federal animal health agency, said on Monday that almost one million animals have been culled in Germany to contain the spread of the highly contagious H5N1

The institute reported that the number of confirmed infections this year has already surpassed the level recorded at the same time during the record outbreak of 2021. "We saw an early start to the infection wave in 2025, an FLI spokesperson said. "It remains to be seen whether it will also subside earlier than in previous years."

E-cigarette use highest among youth

Vapers now outnumber smokers in Britain

LONDON, Nov 5, (Xinhua): The number of adults in Britain using e-cigarettes, or vapes, has for the first time overtaken cigarette smokers, the Office for National Statistics (ONS) reported Tuesday, marking a significant shift in the country's smoking habits but also raising new public health concerns.

According to ONS data, 10 percent of adults in Great Britain, around 5.4 million people, reported using e-cigarettes daily or occasionally in 2024, compared with 9.1 percent (4.9 million) who smoked cigarettes. This is the lowest proportion of smokers since records began in 2011, highlighting the continuing decline of tobacco use across the country.

The survey showed that smoking was most prevalent

among adults aged 25 to 34 (12.6 percent), while those aged 65 and above had the lowest rate at 7.1 percent. The largest decline since 2011 was seen in the 18 to 24 age group, where smoking fell from 25.7 percent to just 8.1 percent.

However, the pattern of vaping is more complex. ONS found that e-cigarette use among men fell slightly in 2024 compared with the previous year, 10.1 percent down from 11.0 percent, while among women it rose sharply to 10.0 percent from 8.5 percent. Use of e-cigarettes "daily or occasionally" remained highest among 16 to 24 year olds at 13 percent, though that figure was down from 15.8 percent

David Mais, head of health analysis at ONS, said: "For the first time, the number of users of e-cigarettes or vapes has overtaken the number of smokers. Among adults aged 16 and over, 10 percent said they were e-cigarette users compared with 9.1 percent who smoked cigarettes. This reflects the long-term trend of fewer people smoking over the past

Public health experts, however, warn that the rapid rise in vaping is not without risks. Professor John Ashton, a leading public health specialist who has worked with the World Health Organization, told Xinhua that while the decline in smoking is encouraging, the new trend poses fresh chal-

"Over 30 years ago, more than 30 percent of British adults smoked," Ashton said. "Most of the reduction happened before vapes became widely available. By the time vapes came along 10 or more years ago, smoking rates had already fallen to about 20 percent. Now they're around 10 percent.

International cricket returns to Faisalabad after 17-year absence

FAISALABAD, Pakistan, Nov 5, (AP): A full-strength Pakistan beat a spirited South Africa by two wickets in their ODI series opener v to mark the return of international cricket in Faisalabad after a 17-year absence.

Pakistan tailenders hung in to reach 264-8 in the last over as an inexperienced South Africa fought gallantly to claim four wickets in the last five overs and pushed the home team to the limit.

South Africa, which lost its sixth straight toss across formats on its tour of Pakistan, couldn't capitalize on half-centuries from debutant Lhuan-dre Pretorius (57) and Quinton de Kock (63) before it got bowled out for 263 in 49.1 overs.

Top-scorer Salman Ali Agha (62) and Mohammad Rizwan (55) saw Pakistan cruising to 196-3 in the 39th over before Pakistan nearly slipped in what appeared to be a straightforward run-chase Rizwan smashed a half-century in his first ODI

after being removed from the captaincy and was replaced by Shaheen Shah Afridi as he shared a 91-run stand with Agha to put the chase back on track.

Rizwan and Agha gauged the slow wicket perfectly

after Pakistan lost three wickets in the space of 18 runs as they kept rotating the strike by picking up singles and twos

The left-handed opening pair of Fakhar Zaman (45) and Saim Ayub (39) combined in an 87-run partnership against a second-string South Africa pace attack as the Proteas rested key fast bowlers Kagiso Rabada and Marco Jansen for the three-match series.

Off-spinner Donovan Ferreira, one of the three South African debutants, pegged back the chase with the pitch offering plenty of assistance to the spinners. Ferreira removed both openers in his successive overs when Ayub was adjudged plumb leg before wicket as he tried to cut the off-spinner, and Zaman holed out at long-on while attempting a big shot against Ferreira.

Babar Azam, whose half-century helped Pakistan clinch the T20 series at Lahore last Saturday, lasted only 12 balls before he was lbw by left-arm spinner Bjorn Fortuin's delivery that skidded into the righthander and struck him low on the pads

Rizwan and Agha then dug in by rotating the strike as the former dominated the spinners with his trademark strong sweep shots before he holed out to deep mid-wicket off Corbin Bosch's shot ball, but mistimed the pull shot.

Agha and Hussain Talat (22) added 44 runs, and Agha completed his half-century with a straight six

before South Africa made a stunning comeback when Lungi Ngidi deceived Talat with a slower ball and George Linde plucked a low catch at mid-off.

With the wicket assisting spinners, captain Matthew Breetzke kept on spinners from one end in the death overs as Linde had Hasan Nawaz stumped. Pakistan needed to run a ball off the final two overs, but Agha was brilliantly snapped by Ferreira at long-on.

And with the scores tied, Mohammad Nawaz got a leading edge of Bosch's short ball in the final over before Naseem Shah ran a leg bye to carry Pakistan home with two balls to spare

De Kock, coming out of ODI retirement after two years, and Pretorius put up a strong opening stand of 98 runs in 96 balls as they batted aggressively against the pace before South Africa lost its way in the latter half of the innings and lost the last seven wickets for 72 runs.

Pretorius found the early momentum as he struck well square of the wicket and also played some brilliant shots down the ground before completing his halfcentury off 47 balls with seven boundaries and a six.

Pakistan turned to its spinners, and Saim Ayub made an immediate impact when the off-spinner lured Pretorious to drive and had him caught at point. De Kock changed the gears and raised his 31st ODI half-century off 50 balls, but chopped Naseem Shah's ball back onto his stumps in the 25th over.

On Monday, Al-Hilal, also of Saudi Arabia, remained the only team in the tournament with a perfect record after a 2-1 victory over Al-Gharafa of Qatar, earning the maximum 12 points to stay atop its group. World Aquatics first suspended athletes from Russia and Belarus from participating in its competitions in March 2022 following the outbreak of the Russia-Ukraine conflict. The organization began easing restrictions in 2024, allowing swimmers, divers and artistic swimmers to return under neutral status. (Xinhua)

He will also coach the struggling national team in the World Cup playoffs in March, which Sweden is likely to reach by virtue of winning its most recent Nations League group.

However, the Englishman will start his tenure

However, the Englishman will start his tenure without Gyökeres, who was substituted because of injury at halftime in Arsenal's 2-0 win over Burnley in the Premier League on Saturday and missed the 3-0 victory at Slavia Prague in the Champions League on Tuesday.

Arsenal manager Mikel Arteta said ahead of the Slavia game that he was "concerned" about Gyökeres' injury and indicated there was uncertainty over just how bad it was.

Isak, who joined Liverpool as the British record signing in the summer transfer window, hasn't played since coming off at halftime in the 5-1 win over Eintracht Frankfurt on Oct. 22.

Liverpool manager Arne Slot said Monday that Isak was in a race against time to be fit to play against Manchester City in the league on Sunday, and Potter said the striker's fitness would be assessed after the weekend.

"He is not ready to play two matches for 90 minutes (for Sweden)," Potter said of Isak, "but he is available."

RIYADH, Nov 5: Portuguese superstar Cristiano Ronaldo, Al-Nassr striker, revealed that his retirement from football is approaching. The 40-year-old, who has scored 952 career goals and won numerous titles, said he may cry when the time comes but is ready to adapt to life off the pitch.

In an interview with Piers Morgan, Ronaldo said: "Soon. I think I will be ready. Of course, it will be difficult. Maybe I will cry. But I've been preparing for my future since I was 25, so I can handle it." Ronaldo emphasized his enduring passion for football: "Nothing compares to the thrill of scoring a goal. But everything has a beginning and an end. I have other passions and will dedicate more time to myself and my family, raising my children."

Despite leaving Manchester United for the second time in 2022, Ronaldo still follows his former club closely, particularly his former teammate and current manager Rúben Amorim. On United's struggles, he added: "They have good players, but some don't understand what Manchester United truly means. Miracles are impossible.'

Mbappé muzzled as Liverpool sinks Madrid

Diaz double fires Bayern past PSG

PARIS, Nov 5, (AP): Bayern Munich and Liverpool won the blockbuster matchups in the Champions League. Micky van de Ven might have already scored the competition's goal of the season.

With a 2-1 win at defending champion Paris Saint-Germain, Bayern made it 16 straight victories in all competitions to underline its status as perhaps the new leading force in European soccer.

Real Madrid came unstuck at Anfield for the second straight season, losing 1-0 to Liverpool as Trent Alexander-Arnold - jeered on his every touch - endured a miserable return to his long-time former club.

Midway through the fourth round of league-stage games, only Bayern and Arsenal are on a maximum 12 points. Arsenal swept to a 3-0 win at Slavia Prague, bringing 15-year-old Max Dowman off the bench to make him the youngest player in Champions League history.

The moment of the night fell to Van de Ven, the lanky Tottenham defender who set off on a mazy, 90-meter run from the edge of his own area to score the team's third goal in a 4-0 win over FC Copenhagen.

"It was like Lionel Messi transformed into a center back," Tottenham manager Thomas Frank said.

Bayern oozed quality in the first half before showing resilience in the second half to hold on with 10 men at the Parc des Princes on a night of mixed fortunes for Luis Diaz.

The former Liverpool winger produced clinical finishes in the fourth and 32nd minutes to power the German champions into a 2-0 lead, only to mar his display with a reckless lunge from behind on PSG right back Achraf Hakimi in first-half stoppage time. Diaz was sent off after a VAR review, and Hakimi hobbled out of the game with an injured left ankle.

PSG, which had already seen Ballon d'Or winner Ousmane Dembélé come off hurt, reduced the deficit through substitute Joao Neves, and Bayern endured some nervy moments before

clinching yet another win.

At Anfield, Madrid goalkeeper Thibaut Courtois produced save after save to defy Liverpool almost singlehandedly but was finally beaten by

Alexis Mac Allister's header off a free kick in the 61st minute.

The teams had played each other in the league phase of last season's competition at the same stadium,

with Liverpool winning 2-0. It took the brilliance of Courtois to keep the score down, with Kylian Mbappé

kept quiet at the other end. Alexander-Arnold, who left Liver-

pool for Madrid in the offseason, was jeered by the home fans before the game and after coming on as a secondhalf substitute. Earlier, a mural dedicated to him near Anfield was defaced. A fourth straight win. An eighth straight clean sheet to tie a 122-year record. A competition debut for a 15-year-old schoolkid.

It was quite the night for Arsenal in Prague, where Bukayo Saka converted a penalty and Mikel Merino added two second-half goals. Arsenal has yet to concede a goal in the Champions League and has matched its best-ever streak for shutouts, which was recorded in 1903 when in the second tier of English soccer.

Dowman, aged 15 years and 308 days, entered as a second-half substitute for the Premier League leaders for his latest record-setting salvo.

Juventus is still waiting for its first win of the league stage after coming from behind to draw 1-1 with Sporting Lisbon in Luciano Spalletti's first Champions League game since taking over as coach.

The former Italy and Napoli coach watched the team's poor start as Maximiliano Araújo fired in off the far post in the 12th minute. Francisco Trincão struck the crossbar just afterward leaving Spalletti with his arms outstretched on the sideline.

Dušan Vlahović equalized in the

Julian Alvarez, Conor Gallagher, and Marcos Llorente scored a goal each as Atletico Madrid defeated Union Saint-Gilloise 3-1 at home.

It was a second win for Atletico, which was coming off a 4-0 defeat at Arsenal in the previous round. Monaco also won, 1-0 at Bodø/

Glimt, thanks to U.S. international Folarin Balogun's first-half strike, for a first victory of the campaign.

Goals were expected, but none arrived in a 0-0 draw between Napoli and visiting Eintracht Frankfurt.

Napoli was coming off a 6-2 loss to PSV Eindhoven two weeks ago, but was without its most creative player in Kevin De Bruyne, who has just undergone surgery on his right hamstring.

It marked an end to Frankfurt's remarkable run of 5-1 results in this season's competition, with the German team having been on the receiving end of two of them.

In the night's other match, U.S striker Ricardo Pepi scored in the third minute of stoppage time for PSV to salvage a 1-1 draw at Olympiakos.

Kuwait sends 65 athletes to Islamic Solidarity Games

RIYADH, Nov 5, (KUNA): Kuwait will take part in the sixth edition of the Islamic Solidarity Games, set to begin next Friday in Riyadh and continue until November 21, with a delegation of 65 athletes competing in

Retired Major General Mohammad Al-Khalfan, Director of the Kuwaiti delegation and Director General of the Kuwait Olympic Committee, said Kuwaiti athletes will compete in athletics, triathlon, e-sports, jiu-jitsu, swimming, camel racing, fencing, weightlifting, karate, equestrian (show jumping), and handball.
