Jleeb security sweep nets multiple arrests

Storms persist into Thursday morning

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 28: (KUNA): Acting Director of the Meteorological Department Dhirar Al-Ali forecasted a chance of rainfall during the night-time hours on Wednesday, at times accompanied by thunderstorms, continuing into the early hours of Thursday morning.

In a statement to Kuwait News Agency (KUNA), Al-Ali disclosed that weather maps and numerical models show Kuwait being affected by an extension of a surface low-pressure system that is gradually intensifying, coinciding with another low-pressure system in the upper atmosphere. He pointed out an increase in low and mid-level cloud cover, interspersed with some cumulonimbus clouds.

Kuwait opens new surgical wing at Amiri Hospital

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 28: Minister of Health Dr. Ahmad Al-Awadhi inaugurated the new surgical ward at Amiri Hospital on Wednesday.

This is in line with the strategy of the ministry to renovate wards, particularly the surgical departments, in a bid to provide the best medical and therapeutic services to patients.

In a press statement, Al-Awadhi revealed that this is the second surgical wing opened at Amiri Hospital within two weeks following the completion of its renovation.

According to Al-Awadhi, the two wards have a combined capacity of 60 beds, 20 private rooms and 40 general rooms, in addition to rooms for medications, doctors,

nurses and administrative staff.

He added that the plan of his ministry for 2026 includes developing healthcare services in the northern, southern and central areas of the capital, as well as attracting visiting doctors from around the world.

He also affirmed the commitment of the ministry to fully support national medical professionals who have reached international standards and led medical work in many countries, whether in robotic surgery, complex procedures, organ and kidney transplants or open-heart surgery.

He asserted that these renovations mark the commitment of the ministry to modernize the infrastructure of government hospitals and provide comprehensive and state-of-the-art medical services that meet the needs of all patients.

Scientists cite war, climate, AI risks

'Doomsday Clock' ticks closer to midnight

WASHINGTON, Jan 28: (AP): Earth is closer than it's ever been to destruction as Russia, China, the U.S. and other countries become "increasingly aggressive, adversarial, and nationalistic," a science-oriented advocacy group said Tuesday as it advanced its "Doomsday Clock" to 85 seconds till midnight.

The Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists members had an initial demonstration Friday and then announced their results on Tuesday.

The scientists cited risks of nuclear war, climate change, potential misuse of biotechnology and the increasing use of artificial intelligence without adequate controls as it made the annual announcement, which rates how close humanity is from ending.

Last year the clock advanced to 89 seconds to midnight.

Since then, "hard-won global understandings are collapsing, accelerating a winner-takes-all great power competition and undermining the international cooperation" needed to reduce existential risks, the group said.

They worry about the threat of escalating conflicts involving nuclear-armed countries, citing the Russia-Ukraine war, May's conflict between India and Pakistan and whether Iran is capable of developing nuclear weapons after strikes last summer by the U.S. and Israel.

International trust and cooperation is essential because, "if the world splinters into an us-versus-them, zero-sum approach, it increases the likelihood that we all lose," said Daniel Holz, chair of the group's science and security board.

The group also highlighted droughts, heat waves and floods linked to global warming, as well as the failure of nations to adopt meaningful agreements to fight global warming - singling out U.S. President Donald Trump's efforts to boost fossil fuels and hobble renewable energy production.

This is why a European king abandoned the throne in favor of Moulay Idris

History states that in the year 169 AH, a battle took place in Makkah at a location called Fakh, near the grave of the Companion of Prophet Mohammad, Abdullah ibn Umar.

At Fakh, more than 198 members of the Prophet's family were killed by the Abbasids—their own cousins. Only one survived: Idris, later known as Moulay Idris ibn Abdullah al-Kamil, ibn al-Hasan al-Muthanna, ibn al-Hasan, ibn Ali, ibn Fatima al-Zahra (may Allah be pleased with her), the daughter of the Prophet Muhammad (peace and blessings be upon him) from his first wife, Khadija (may Allah be pleased with her).

The sole survivor fled alone to Morocco as a wanted fugitive, without an army, family or power. Upon arriving, he found a king crowned by a European kingdom, named Ishaq ibn Abd al-Hamid al-Urabi. When this ruler learned of Moulay Idris's lineage to Prophet Muhammad (peace and blessings be upon him), he relinquished the throne in his favor, despite Idris having arrived alone and without influence.

The Sultan and the Madman

It is said that one day a sultan left his palace for a short time. During his absence, a madman entered the palace and sat on the sultan's throne. When the guards saw him, they condemned his act, dragged him down from the throne, beat him severely, and left him crying in a corner of the palace.

When the sultan returned and saw him in that condition, he felt compassion and asked why he was crying, and whether the beating had hurt him.

The madman replied, "I am not crying because of the beating, I am crying over you."

Surprised, the sultan asked, "How can you cry over me?"

The madman said, "I sat on this throne for only a few moments, and all this suffering befell

me. You have sat on it for years. What will your condition be tomorrow when you are questioned about governance and justice?"

The sultan wept and realized that kingship is a heavy responsibility, and that accountability increases with authority.

Thus, thrones are not measured by their splendor, but by the weight of the trust placed upon those who occupy them. The longer a ruler remains in power, the longer his questioning before Allah will be.

Blessed is the one who remembers his responsibility before judgment comes.

It is narrated that Commander of the Faith-

ful Caliph Umar ibn al-Khattab (may Allah be pleased with him), once said:

"If a mule were to stumble in Baghdad, I would fear that Allah would question me about it: 'Why did you not pave the road for it, O Umar?'"

The Story of Murad IV

After the deposition of Sultan Mustafa in 1622 CE, Sultan Murad IV ascended the Ottoman throne at the age of 12.

His mother, Kösem Sultan — a Janissary assumed the role of regent and exercised real authority on his behalf.

At the time, the Ottoman Empire was facing severe internal turmoil. The governor of Tripoli in Syria took advantage of the weakness and chaos and declared independence from the Ottoman State. Abaza Pasha did the same in Erzurum.

Meanwhile, the Safavid State seized Baghdad, and the Janissaries revolted against the Sultan following the dismissal of Khusraw Pasha, to whom they were loyal.

After Kösem Sultan's guardianship over her son ended, Murad IV resolved to reform internal affairs so that he could confront external threats.

He began eliminating the Janissary tyrants, executing rebels in Istanbul and throughout the empire. He established a powerful intelligence network, through which he identified despots throughout the state. Whenever Murad IV traveled to a region, he would arrest the rebels and order their immediate execution.

Through patience, determination, and strategic cunning, Murad IV consolidated power and shifted the balance decisively in his favor.

In 1634, war erupted with the Safavids in Iraq. Sultan Murad IV personally led the army and

marched on Baghdad, which Abbas Shah captured after killing the Ottoman governor.

Murad IV besieged Baghdad, destroyed its walls with artillery, and successfully recaptured the city. He ordered its reconstruction, repaired its defenses, and appointed a new governor of Iraq.

Sultan Murad IV died in 1640 after restoring the lost prestige and glory of the Ottoman Empire.

Brother not his 'actual' brother

Ex-MP's file reopened

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 28: The concerned authorities reopened the file of the former Member of Parliament (MP), in which it was previously established that the brother listed under the file of the former MP's father as his 'brother' is not his real brother, reports Al-Rai daily quoting sources.

Sources confirmed that the Higher Committee for Citizenship Investigation revoked his Kuwaiti citizenship. Sources said this case was not closed. Instead, it has been subjected to further in-depth investigations, including DNA testing of those listed under the file of the deceased father of the former MP.

Sources disclosed that the scientific tests confirmed the existence of a second brother of the former MP listed in the same file. It was established that this brother is neither the son of the file holder nor the real brother of the former MP.

Sources added that the ongoing investigations are still exploring other names. Suspicion currently surrounds three additional individuals who are believed to have been fraudulently listed under the file of the father. This brings the total number of potential fake brothers to five. Two of these individuals have already been proven not to be the sons of the file holder, while it appears that the other three are on the path to being proven otherwise.

Sources indicated that the three names suspected of being fraudulent, along with the fourth individual whose identity was recently proven to be forged, and the first brother whose citizenship was previously revoked, were not listed in the family's inheritance registry. This omission provided further evidence that strengthened suspicions and bolstered the investigation.

Sources pointed out that the case file, after its completion, was referred to the Public Prosecution for legal action regarding the established facts.

About the second brother, who was proven not to be the former MP's biological brother, sources stated that he is a fugitive. He left Kuwait about 18 months ago and is officially registered as having been born in 1935, although there are serious doubts about the accuracy of his recorded birth year.

Sources added that most of his children have also left Kuwait. The forgery was confirmed through DNA testing, as well as a Gulf document bearing his real name, and the fact that his name is not listed in the inheritance registry. The Higher Committee decided to revoke the Kuwaiti citizenship of the aforementioned individual, whose file lists 68 dependents, including children and grandchildren.

Sources revealed that the suspicions surrounding his registered birth year of 1935 stem from his desire to register a fictitious son under his file. Gulf documents indicate his actual birth date is in the latter half of the 1940s, meaning he is around 10 to 15 years younger than his registered Kuwaiti age.

Nationality fake, Gulf citizen admits

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 28: In a new case filed based on a report made through the hotline, the relevant authorities received information about a person holding Kuwaiti citizenship but possessing Gulf documents under a different name, and that the first name is identical in both documents, while the rest of the names differed, reports Al-Rai daily quoting sources.

Sources asserted that the hotline once again served its purpose by receiving the report. They indicated that based on the suspect's photograph in the Gulf document and its comparison with Kuwaiti documents by the forensic personnel, it was confirmed to be the same photograph taken by the same photographer. Sources said he submitted it to official authorities in both countries and used it to forge his identity documents in Kuwait and another Gulf state.

Sources added investigations revealed that the suspect was in Kuwait, working in the public sector. He was summoned for official questioning and he complied, immediately reporting to the Citizenship Investigation Department.

During questioning, the suspect confessed to forging Kuwaiti citizenship by claiming a fictitious father who was, in reality, a friend of his Gulf father.

He admitted to having entered the Kuwaiti citizenship file when he was 18 years old.

Sources reported that the accused was referred to the Public Prosecution and is currently being held in the Central Prison pending investigation and trial.

DNA samples were taken from him and compared to those of his alleged brothers in Kuwait to prove, with conclusive scientific evidence, that he is not their brother.

Arab expat accused of embezzling cash

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 28: The representative of a food company lodged a complaint at Shaab Police Station, accusing an Arab of breaching trust as he allegedly embezzled company funds amounting to KD1,720, reports Al-Anba daily.

The lawyer of the company disclosed that the accused received the money from the company's driver but retained it for himself instead of delivering it to the company.

pany. The lawyer said the incident took place in front of the residence of the accused in Hawally.

A security source confirmed that the case was referred to the Criminal Investigation Department in the Interior Ministry, indicating the accused was summoned for questioning. He added the accused voluntarily reported to the investigation office.

The occasion is a moment to reflect on the historical milestones that shaped Australia's national identity.

During the celebration on Wednesday, Kelly underscored these pivotal moments in Australian history, from the rich legacy of indigenous peoples to the adoption of the Westminster-style parliamentary system. She emphasized the nation's multicultural fabric, which binds Australia to the global community.

Kelly described the bilateral rela-

tionship between the two nations as "progressing excellently," focusing on three priority areas: food security, education and investment. She pointed out that remarkable progress has been made in all these sectors, calling the developments "very positive."

Kuwait remains Australia's largest Middle Eastern investor, reflecting the strong economic ties between the two countries. While it is difficult to pinpoint the exact size of investments due to conservative Australian reporting practices, estimates suggest that Kuwait's investments are around \$13 billion.

Kelly hinted that discussions with Kuwaiti partners suggest the actual figure could be much higher, preferring not to release potentially inaccurate data.

Bilateral trade exceeds half a billion dollars, though fluctuations can occur due to the commodity-based nature of the trade.

The agricultural exports to Kuwait have been steadily growing, particularly in the areas of meat, wheat and

vegetables. Australian beef, including locally slaughtered varieties, is widely available through the Livestock Company, alongside an increasing supply of high-quality chilled beef. Livestock shipments continue year-round, with a seasonal ban in place during the summer months.

The education sector is thriving as well, with two Australian universities operating in Kuwait and a notable year-on-year increase in student enrollment.

The Ambassador expressed satisfaction with the continuous growth of academic cooperation.

Regarding the Australian expatriate community, she indicated that the number of Australians living in Kuwait remains stable at approximately 1,000. She also mentioned that there are no recent statistics available on the number of visitors from Kuwait to Australia.

When asked about upcoming high-level visits, she stated that "there are no announced visits at present."

Kuwait, Armenia explore investment partnerships

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 28, (KUNA): Kuwaiti Minister of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy, Minister of Finance and Acting Minister of State for Economic Affairs and Investment Dr. Sabeeh Al-Mukhaizeem and Armenian First Deputy Minister of High-Tech Industry Gevorg Mantashyan and Enterprise Armenia's CEO Goran Abajyan discussed joint investment issues.

This came during a meeting held by both sides on Tuesday on the sidelines of an official visit by an Armenian investment and economic delegation to Kuwait, in the presence of Armenian Ambassador in Kuwait Arsen Arakelyan, the Ministry of Finance said in a press release.

During the meeting, they tackled a set of investment and economic matters pertinent to developing projects and promoting bilateral partnerships as well as future cooperation, it added. They also considered preparations for Kuwaiti-Armenian ministerial committee meetings during the coming period.

Kuwait's Al-Mansour secures APA vice presidency in Cairo elections

It noted that the General Assembly also reviewed the board's report on activities during the 2022-2025 term, including major events, as well as the association's financial and administrative performance.

Founded in 1962 by the Arab League and headquartered in Cairo, APA aims to protect intellectual property rights and advance the publishing industry across the Arab world.

It currently includes more than 1,250 publishers representing 20 national publishing associations, in addition to members from countries without local publishers' Association.

New PAFN HQ moves forward

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 28: The Ministry of Public Works is moving forward on two significant fronts – securing a new headquarters for the Public Authority for Food and Nutrition (PAFN) and finalizing the contract award for the Jahra pumping station project.

The ministry recently asked the Central Agency for Public Tenders (CAPT) to issue a tender for the comprehensive study, design and supervision of the construction of the new PAFN headquarters.

However, the Board of Directors of CAPT postponed the issuance of a decision regarding the project and it is waiting for the follow up letter from the ministry detailing amendments that were discussed recently.

Conducting a feasibility study is a crucial preparatory step toward the construction of the new headquarters.

PAFN is one of the government entities whose construction is overseen by the ministry. This project aims to establish a modern facility that guarantees a suitable working environment

for both the employees and visitors.

To ensure the project achieves its objectives, the ministry will coordinate closely with PAFN to finalize the requirements for the building, taking into consideration the quantitative and qualitative specifications. Upon completion of the study and design phase, a separate tender will be issued for the construction, which will adhere to the highest engineering and technical standards, benefiting from the extensive construction experience of the ministry.

In another development, the ministry obtained approval from CAPT through a majority vote to award the contract for the management, development, operation and maintenance of the Jahra pumping station.

The project was awarded to the second lowest bidder with a contract value of KD1.864 million.

This project is integral to the broader strategy of the ministry to develop its pumping stations throughout the country. The main goal is to increase the capacity and operational lifespan of these stations, and make sure that they perform without disruption caused by malfunctions.

Secrets of the Rothschilds

Behind towering walls overlooking Lake Geneva stands a museum that houses one of the world's most valuable private collections, containing an extensive array of artistic masterpieces that is part of the Rothschild family fortune. For decades, these treasures have remained secured behind reinforced doors inside the Château de Brienne.

In recent times, this collection has become the focus of a legal confrontation between 93-year-old Nadine de Rothschild and her daughter-in-law, Baroness Ariane de Rothschild, who currently holds the title.

The lawsuits revolve around the daughter-in-law's insistence on keeping the collection within the 19th-century château, while the mother-in-law seeks to transfer it to a newly established museum in Geneva.

The château is filled with works by Old Masters, Renaissance-era artifacts, chests and suits of armor, intricately carved side tables, gilded mirrors and invaluable paintings by El Greco, regarded as among the most treasured items in the residence, along with rare royal furnishings.

The collection is estimated to be worth hundreds of millions of dollars and includes works attributed to Goya and Rembrandt, earning it the description of a miniature Louvre.

This dispute marks the first legal conflict of its kind in the history of this extraordinarily wealthy family since its emergence as a dominant force in banking and finance during the 18th century.

The Rothschilds—whose name is not their original surname—are a prosperous German Jewish family that rose to prominence through banking and financial activities. Originating in Frankfurt, they later expanded into the most influential European capitals of the era.

Their founder, Mayer Amschel (1744-1812), was a visionary figure who devised an innovative strategy by sending his five sons abroad to manage the family's overseas branches, a system that has endured for nearly three centuries.

Mayer, the family patriarch and its principal driving force, began his professional life as a currency trader and financial adviser to a European prince. In the 1760s, he established a banking enterprise and made a calculated decision to dispatch his five sons to set up financial branches within a broad network that enabled the swift movement of information and capital by the standards of the time.


Through this structure, the family became instrumental in financing European governments, particularly during the Napoleonic Wars, as well as in underwriting sovereign loans and large-scale projects.

As a result, they accumulated immense wealth and were granted noble titles in the Austrian Empire and the United Kingdom, including the title of 'Baron', which conferred upon them a social status equal to their financial influence.

Mayer selected the name "Rothschild," meaning "red shield," derived from the family home in Frankfurt's Jewish quarter.

Contrary to widespread assumptions, certain branches of the Rothschild family experienced significant setbacks in the 20th century as a result of the World Wars, Nazi persecution of Jews, and the nationalization of banks in countries such as France and Austria, leading to a reduction in their influence compared to earlier periods.

Even so, the family continues to own private banks and influential investment institutions, though not with the absolute financial dominance it once enjoyed, nor with the power portrayed in conspiracy theories alleging that they control half of the world's wealth—claims that many historians and scholars firmly reject.



Online confirmation now open

KU admits 132 non-Kuwaiti students

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 28: Kuwait University announced the admission of 132 international students who will be studying at their own expense. The admitted students, who are high school graduates of various nationalities, will join the university in the second semester of the 2025/2026 academic year.

In a press statement, acting Dean of Admissions and Registration Dr. Fadel Abbas Aziz explained that the admission of these international students is based on their ranked preferences, in accordance with the quotas approved by the University Council and the Council of Public Universities.

He pointed out that the admission process took into consideration the minimum admission requirements applied to Kuwaiti students in each college, as well as the ad-

mission policy for the 2025/2026 academic year.

He said the admission of any non-Kuwaiti student to any university major requires that their high school grades or equivalent GPA meet or exceed the minimum percentage required for Kuwaiti students admitted to the same major.

He added that text messages will be sent to all accepted students to inform them of their assigned majors.

He stated that admission must be confirmed online through the electronic admissions system through the website <http://portal.ku.edu.kw/admission>, along with payment of the KD10 fee. All applicants can also check their admission status by logging into the online application portal.

Authorities also took action against local businesses operating unlawfully, shutting down an unlicensed vegetable warehouse and a barbershop without the required permit. A street vendor was arrested for regulatory violations, and legal proceedings have been initiated against him.

The operation also led to the apprehension of an individual with an outstanding absconding warrant, as well as the arrest of three others wanted for involvement in different cases.

Two individuals were deported after completing the legal procedures.

In a related development, the Kuwait Municipality issued two violation citations, and power was cut off from two residences found to be in violation of building codes.

The ministry reaffirmed its commitment to conduct comprehensive security campaigns nationwide in order to track down violators and wanted individuals, as well as maintain national security.

'Doomsday Clock'

Starting in 1947, the advocacy group used a clock to symbolize the potential and even likelihood of people doing something to end hu-

More 'No Kings' protests planned for March 28 as outrage spreads over Minneapolis deaths

WASHINGTON, Jan 28, (AP): A third round of "No Kings" protests is coming this spring, with organizers saying they are planning their largest demonstrations yet across the United States to oppose what they describe as authoritarianism under President Donald Trump.

Previous rallies have drawn millions of people, and organizers said they expect even greater numbers on March 28 in the wake of Trump's immigration crackdown in Minneapolis, where violent clashes have led to the death of two people.

"We expect this to be the largest protest in American history," Ezra Levin, co-executive director of the nonprofit Indivisible, told The Associated Press ahead of Wednesday's announcement. He predicted that as many as 9 million people will turn out.

"No Kings" protests, which are organized by a constellation of groups around the country, have been a focal point for outrage over Trump's attempts to consolidate and expand his power.

"This is in large part a response to a combination of the heinous attacks on our democracy and communities coming from the regime, and that's what nobody's coming to save us," Levin said.

Last year, Trump said he felt attendees were "not representative of the people of our country," and he insisted that "I'm not a king."

The latest round of protests had been in the works before the crackdown in Minneapolis. However, the killing of two people by federal agents in recent weeks has refocused plans.

Levin said they want to show "support for Minnesota and immigrant communities all over" and oppose "the secret police force that is murdering Americans and infringing on their basic constitutional rights."

"And what we know is, the only way to defend those rights is to exercise them, and you do that in nonviolent but forceful ways, and that's what I expect to see in 'No Kings' three," Levin said.

Trump has broadly defended his aggressive deportation campaign and blamed local officials for refusing to cooperate. However, he's more recently signaled a shift in response to bipartisan concern over the killing of Alex Pretti in Minneapolis on Saturday.

In June, the first "No Kings" rallies were organized in nearly 2,000 locations nationwide, including cities, towns and community spaces. Those protests followed unrest over federal immigration raids and Trump's deployment of the National Guard and Marines to Los Angeles, where tensions escalated with protesters blocking a freeway and setting vehicles on fire.

They were organized also in large part to protest a military parade in the nation's

capital that marked the Army's 250th anniversary and coincided with Trump's birthday. "No Kings" organizers at the time called the parade a "coronation" that was symbolic of what they characterized as Trump's growing authoritarian overreach.

In response, some conservative politicians condemned the protests as "Hate America" rallies.

During a second round of protests in October, organizers said demonstrations were held in about 2,700 cities and towns across the country. At the time, Levin pointed to Trump's sweeping immigration crackdown, his unprecedented promises to use federal power to influence midterm elections, restrictions on press freedom and retribution against political opponents, steps he said cumulatively represented a direct threat to constitutionally protected rights.

On social media, both Trump and the official White House account mocked the protests, posting computer-generated images of the president wearing a crown.

The big protest days are headline-grabbing moments, but Levin said groups like his are determined to keep up steady trainings and intermediate-level organizing in hopes of growing sustainable resistance to the Trump administration's actions.

"This isn't about Democrats versus Republicans. This is about do we have a democracy at all, and what are we going

to tell our kids and our grandkids about what we did in this moment?" Levin said. "I think that demands the kind of persistent engagement."

MINNEAPOLIS: A man sprayed an unknown substance on Democratic US Rep Ilhan Omar and was tackled to the ground Tuesday during a town hall in Minneapolis, where tensions over federal immigration enforcement have come to a head after agents fatally shot an intensive care nurse and a mother of three this month.

The audience cheered as the man was pinned down and his arms were tied behind his back. In video of the incident, someone in the crowd can be heard saying, "Oh my, he sprayed something on her."

Just before that Omar had called for the abolishment of US Immigration and Customs Enforcement and for Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem to resign or face impeachment. Calls are mounting on Capitol Hill for Noem to step down after the shooting deaths in Minneapolis of two people who protested deportations. Few Republicans have risen to her defense.

"ICE cannot be reformed," Omar said, seconds before the attack.

Minneapolis police said officers saw the man use a syringe to spray an unknown liquid at Omar.

Aviation system returns to normal

Bitter cold grips eastern US as winter storm deaths rise and power outages linger

WASHINGTON, Jan 28, (AP): Three Texas siblings who perished in an icy pond were among several dozen deaths in US states gripped by frigid cold as crews scrambled Tuesday to repair hundreds of thousands of power outages in the shivering South and forecasters warned the winter weather is expected to get worse.

Brutal cold lingered in the wake of a massive storm that dumped deep snow across more than 1,300 miles (2,100 kilometers) from Arkansas to New England and left parts of the South coated in treacherous ice.

Freezing temperatures hovered Tuesday as far south as Tennessee, Arkansas and North Carolina and were forecast to plunge again overnight. Parts of northern Florida were expected to sink to 25 degrees Fahrenheit (minus 3.9 degrees Celsius) late Tuesday into early Wednesday.

The US aviation system was returning to normal after a brutal weekend that saw more than 17,000 commercial flights canceled. There were about 6,300 cancellations in the U.S. Mon-

day and about 2,500 Tuesday, according to FlightAware, a flight tracking and data company. Less than 500 were anticipated to be canceled Wednesday.

The arctic misery over the eastern half of the U.S. was expected to worsen Friday and Saturday. The National Weather Service said another winter storm could hit parts of the East Coast this weekend, and more record lows were forecast as far south as Florida.

"This could be the coldest temperature seen in several years for some places and the longest duration of cold in several decades," the agency's Weather Prediction Center warned Tuesday.

Crews were working feverishly to restore power to the more than 410,000 homes and businesses without electricity Tuesday evening. Over half the outages were in Tennessee and Mississippi, where temperatures could bottom out at the end of the week. In Nashville, the low Friday night is predicted to dip to 4 F (minus 15.6 C), while Oxford, in northern Mississippi, could hit 10 F (minus 12.2 C), according to the

she ran into the freezing lake and frantically tried to pull her sons from the water, but the ice kept breaking beneath them.

"They were just screaming, telling me to help them," Cheyenne Hangman told The Associated Press. "And I watched all of them struggle, struggle to stay above the water. I watched all of them fight."

Dozens of Mississippi counties were in need of bottled water, blankets, tarps, fuel and generators, and the state's National Guard is using aircraft to deliver supplies to hard-hit communities, Gov. Tate Reeves said Tuesday evening.

Three 18-wheeler trucks stalled on an icy Interstate 55 in northern Mississippi, causing a major backup Tuesday night, according to the state's Department of Transportation. The governor said various resources from first responders to drones and tow trucks were being deployed to clear the highway and help stranded drivers.

Jean Kirkland used a lighter and paper Tuesday to ignite her gas stove top. Her neighborhood in Lexington,

Mississippi, lost power Sunday, and Kirkland and her daughter have been relying on the stove and a couple of gas-powered heaters to keep warm.

"When you're used to certain things, you miss them when they're gone," said Kirkland, who's been getting by without hot water and lights at night.

Health officials warn against using gas-powered stoves to heat a home. They can give off fumes that increase the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. At least one carbon monoxide death was reported in Louisiana, according to the state Health Department.

North Carolina's largest public school system closed schools again on Wednesday, with the Wake County school system saying on Facebook that it was "due to the continued threat of black ice."

More than 110,000 outages remained in Nashville, Tennessee, and neighboring communities Tuesday. Nashville Electric Service said on social media it had dispatched more than 740 workers to restore power.

Spain grants legal status to immigrants lacking authorization – potentially 500,000

BARCELONA, Spain, Jan 28, (AP): Spain's government announced Tuesday it will grant legal status to potentially hundreds of thousands of immigrants living and working in the country without authorization, the latest way the country has bucked a trend toward increasingly harsh immigration policies imposed in the United States and much of Europe.

The extraordinary measure will be implemented by expediting a decree to amend immigration laws, according to Spanish Minister of Migration Elma Saiz, bypassing a similar bill that has stalled in parliament. Eligible immigrants will be granted up to one year of legal residency as well as permission to work.

In contrast to other nations that have moved to restrict immigration and asylum, many emboldened by the Trump administration's policies, Spain has moved in the opposite direction with Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez and his ministers often extolling the benefits of legal migration to the country's economy and aging workforce.

Spain "will not look the other way," Saiz told journalists during a press conference. The government is "dignifying and recognizing people who are already in our country," she said.

The measure could benefit an estimated 500,000 people living in Spain without authorization, Saiz said. Other

organizations have estimated up to 800,000 people live in the shadows of Spanish society. Many are immigrants from Latin American or African countries working in the agricultural, tourism or service sectors, backbones of Spain's booming economy.

Foreigners who arrived in Spain before Dec. 31, 2025 and can prove they have been living in the country for at least five months will be eligible. They

must also prove they have no criminal record.


Saiz said she expects those eligible will be able to start applying for their legal status from April until the end of June. She added that resources would be in place to process them smoothly and efficiently after a union representing Spain's national police officers, responsible for processing applications, warned of a possible collapse.

Europe

Belarus to deepen strategic ties with China: Belarus plans to further strengthen its high-level strategic partnership with China, President Alexander Lukashenko said on Tuesday.

Speaking at a meeting on bilateral cooperation, Lukashenko highlighted China's growing importance as a key pillar of Belarus' foreign and economic policy amid global geopolitical shifts. "China is not only our most important partner, but also a major partner for all countries committed to development," Lukashenko said.

China is now Belarus' second-largest trading partner, with exports to China surpassing those to the EU, Lukashenko said. He called for more proactive efforts to expand market access to China and attract more Chinese investment. (Xinhua)

5 killed in Russia house fire: Five people, including three children, were killed in a house fire overnight on Wednesday in Russia's Yakutia region, said the re-

gional office of Russia's Emergencies Ministry.

The fire damaged the building, and 10 firefighters were deployed to put out the blaze.



Lawmakers in German state elect new gov to counter far-right rise



BERLIN, Jan 28, (AP): Lawmakers in an eastern German state elected a new governor on Wednesday as mainstream parties try to prevent a victory for the far-right Alternative for Germany in a regional election that is only seven months away.

The state legislature in Saxony-Anhalt elected Sven Schulze, a member of German Chancellor Friedrich Merz's center-right Christian Democratic Union, to replace long-serving incumbent Reiner Haseloff.

Haseloff, 71, has led the state of some 2.2 million people since 2011. Schulze, 46, was designated last year as the CDU's candidate for governor to succeed him in a state election on Sept. 6.

Although it's quite common in Germany for governors to hand over the reins in midterm to allow their successors a chance to become better-known to voters, Haseloff originally appeared minded to serve out his term. But with regional support very high for Alternative for German-

biggest party in Germany's federal parliament in a national election last year, is at its strongest in the formerly communist and less prosperous east. Opposition to migration is the signature issue of AfD, with which mainstream parties refuse to work. But it also has shown a talent for capitalizing on discontent with other issues, such as the country's sluggish economy.

In recent years, some sitting governors in the east - including Haseloff himself in the state's last election in 2021 - have managed to beat back challenges from AfD as relatively popular incumbents. Schulze, who was Saxony-Anhalt's economy minister until now, would have lacked that potential advantage if Haseloff had stayed in office.

AfD so far has emerged as the biggest party in one state election, in the neighboring eastern region of Thuringia in 2024, but it has yet to take power at state level.

AfD, which became the second-

main perched perilously on the cliff edge.

Upcoming party congress to unveil plans to bolster nuke deterrent: Kim

SEOUL, South Korea, Jan 28, (AP): North Korean leader Kim Jong Un said his country will unveil plans to further bolster its nuclear program at the upcoming ruling party congress, as he observed the North's latest weapons launch, state media reported Wednesday.

The Korean Central News Agency said North Korea performed a live-fire drill of an upgraded large-caliber multiple rocket launcher system in the presence of Kim on Tuesday, an apparent reference to what South Korea and Japan earlier described as ballistic missile launches from North Korea.

State media photos show Kim walking near a huge launch truck with his teenage daughter in her latest public appearance with her father. South Korea's spy service said in early 2024 it considered the girl, reportedly named Kim Ju Ae, as her father's likely heir.

KCNA quoted Kim Jong Un saying the test launch was meant to enhance the effectiveness of the country's "strategic deterrent," a term used to describe its nuclear weapons capability. KCNA said the launcher system's mobility and strike accuracy have been improved.

Experts say North Korea's large-sized rocket launchers blur the boundaries between artillery systems and ballistic missiles because they can create their own thrust and are guided during delivery. North Korea has said some of these systems are capable of delivering nuclear warheads.

Kim said that boosting the country's military capability is the inevitable line of the ruling Workers' Party. He said the upcoming party congress, the first of its kind in five years, will be a venue to declare "next-stage plans for further bolstering up the country's nuclear war deterrent," KCNA said.

Enforcement of peace plan discussed

ASEAN's top diplomats under pressure to end Myanmar war

CEBU, Philippines, Jan 28, (AP): Southeast Asia's top diplomats met Wednesday under growing pressure to push a peace plan that has so far failed to end Myanmar's civil war, and to beat a deadline to conclude talks on a non-aggression pact with China this year.

The Association of Southeast Asian Nations, a diverse 11-national bloc, has struggled to project unity and relevance for years. But it faced its latest setback last year when deadly fighting erupted between two members, Thailand and Cambodia, over a longtime border conflict.

Fighting ended with a ceasefire that was brokered by Malaysia and pushed through by pressure from US President Donald Trump, who threatened to withhold trade privileges unless they agreed. Helping sustain that fragile ceasefire is high on the agenda of the ASEAN's foreign ministers' annual meeting in the central Philippine city of Cebu.

The Philippines holds ASEAN's rotating chair this year, taking what would have been Myanmar's turn after the country was suspended from chairing the meeting after its army forcibly ousted Aung San Suu Kyi's democratically elected government in 2021.

ASEAN does not recognize the country's military government, and its leaders are barred from attending the regional bloc's meetings, although lower-level career diplomats have been allowed to participate.

The resulting war has killed tens of thousands of people and displaced millions in a crisis that has emerged as one of ASEAN's biggest challenges and source of embarrassment as Western govern-

ments demanded the bloc to do more.

Last week, Malaysian Foreign Minister Mohamad Hasan said that ASEAN leaders decided in their annual summit in October not to send observers to Myanmar's recent elections because conditions for credible polls were not met, though some member countries, like Cambodia and Vietnam, chose to do so individually.

ASEAN leaders proposed a five-

point peace plan in 2021, which demanded, among others, an immediate end to fighting and hostilities, but it has failed to end the violence or foster dialogue among contending parties.

Discussion on the peace plan was a top priority in the ministerial meetings in Cebu, according to the agenda, which was seen by The Associated Press.

Philippine Foreign Secretary Theresa Lazo, who has been designated as the ASEAN's special envoy to Myanmar, would report to her counterparts in Cebu the result of her recent visit to Myanmar, where she met the ruling generals among other officials. She would also discuss the result of a conference of various political and ethnic groups opposed to Myanmar's military government that she recently organized in the Philippines in a bid to reach out to all contending sides.

Participants in the Philippine conference discussed enforcement of the peace plan, "including how to advance de-escalation, facilitate humanitarian assistance, effectively address transnational crime and foster political dialogue among relevant stakeholders," the Department of Foreign Affairs in Manila said.

Trump-backed businessman Asfura sworn in as president of Honduras

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, Jan 28, (AP): Trump-backed businessman Nasry Asfura was sworn in Tuesday as president of Honduras, and pledged to create jobs, crack down on crime and improve key social services like education and health care.

The 67-year-old president said he would lead the country "with the full commitment required to deliver real solutions to every corner of our beloved Honduras."

The inauguration was held in an austere, simple ceremony at Congress without the presence of dignitaries from other nations, though representatives of various countries attended through the diplomatic corps and international organizations.

Asfura's rise to power was marked with controversy after US President Donald Trump threw his support behind the Honduran conservative in the lead up to the election. Competitors called the elections fraudulent as vote counts dragged on for weeks and Asfura won by less than a 1% lead.

Honduran authorities said Asfura won with 40.27% of the vote, just ahead of conservative competitor Salvador Nasralla with 39.53%. Nasralla maintains he's the rightful president.

Asfura on Tuesday said he would

shrink the size of the state to improve efficiency and direct resources to those most in need.

He pledged to "confront insecurity head-on" as gang violence continues to ravage the Central American nation, and said he would invest in health care and education. Asfura also emphasized

the need to attract investment to generate jobs and to boost infrastructure so there is greater connectivity among municipalities.

Asfura served two terms as mayor of Tegucigalpa from 2014 to 2022. He previously served as secretary of the Honduran Social Investment Fund during the administration of Porfirio Lobo Sosa (2010-2014).

The new president won the presidency on his second attempt as the candidate of the conservative National Party, after losing in 2021 to former President Xiomara Castro of the leftist Liberty and Refoundation Party, known as Libre.

Asfura is from the same political party as former President Juan Orlando Hernández, who was pardoned and freed from U.S. prison by Trump in the midst of the election. Hernández, who was extradited to the U.S. after leaving office in 2022, was serving a 45-year sentence for his role in a drug trafficking operation that moved hundreds of tons of cocaine to the U.S.

The outcome of the complicated election is part of a broader shift to the right taking place in Latin America and came after Chile elected far-right politician José Antonio Kast as president.

Uganda's army on hunt for Wine: Where is Bobi Wine?

In a recent video shared from hiding, the Ugandan opposition leader walks in a family graveyard in central Uganda, taunting the army chief who has failed to find him and lamenting what he calls the injustice that has befallen him.

The 43-year-old musician-turned-politician has been evading a military hunt for over a week, infuriating Gen. Muhoobi Kainerugaba - the army chief and president's son - in what has become a very public rivalry.

South Korea's former first lady sentenced to 20 months in prison for corruption

SEOUL, South Korea, Jan 28, (AP): The wife of South Korea's ousted President Yoon Suk Yeol was sentenced to 20 months in prison for corruption Wednesday, as her husband awaits a verdict on a high-stakes rebellion charge that could result in the death penalty or life imprisonment.

The presidential couple, who have been jailed separately for months, suffered a spectacular fall from grace after Yoon's martial law debacle in December 2024 led to his impeachment and eventually his removal from office. Yoon was handed a five-year prison term this month for defying authorities' attempts to detain him and other charges related to the martial law decree.

Investigators say Kim was not involved in Yoon's martial law enforcement.

On Wednesday, Seoul Central District Court sentenced Kim for receiving luxury gifts like a Graff diamond necklace and a Chanel bag from the Unification Church in return for promises of political favors.

"Being closest to a president, a first lady can exert significant influence on him and is a symbolic figure who represents the country together with a president," the court said in a televised verdict. "But the defendant exploited her position to seek personal gains."

Kim said via her lawyers that she

would "humbly accept" the court's view and "apologizes again to everyone for causing concerns."

The 20-month sentence was a surprise after independent counsel Min Joong-ki called for a 15-year prison term for Kim on three charges including stock price manipulation, political funding law violations and accepting bribes. The court acquitted Kim of two other charges, citing a lack of evidence and other reasons.

Min's team responded that it cannot accept the ruling and will appeal to a higher court. The governing liberal Democratic Party, which led Yoon's ouster, slammed the verdict as sending a wrong signal that "abuse of power like Kim Keon Hee's can be tolerated."

US takes first steps to possibly reopen embassy in Venezuela

WASHINGTON, Jan 28, (AP): The Trump administration has notified Congress that it is taking the first steps to possibly reopen the shuttered US Embassy in Venezuela as it explores restoring relations with the South American country following the US military raid that ousted then-President Nicolás Maduro.

In a notice to lawmakers dated Monday and obtained by The Associated Press on Tuesday, the State Department said it was sending in a regular and growing contingent of temporary staffers to conduct "select" diplomatic functions.

"We are writing to notify the committee of the Department of State's intent to implement a phased approach to potentially resume Embassy Caracas operations," the department said in separate but identical letters to 10 House and Senate committees.

The notification, sent to Capitol Hill just two days before Secretary of State Marco Rubio is due to testify on Venezuela before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said the staffers would live and work in a temporary facility while the existing embassy compound is brought up to standard.

It is the first formal notice of the administration's intent to re-open the embassy in Caracas. Such a move would be key to the restoration of diplomatic relations between the two countries, which have been broken since March 2019 when the embassy was shuttered.

The Trump administration has moved slowly but surely to try to normalize ties with Maduro's successor and current acting President Delcy Rodríguez. However, doing so would require the U.S. to revoke its decision to recognize the Venezuelan parliament elected in 2015 as the legitimate government.

Rodríguez on Tuesday said her government and the Trump administration "have established respectful and courteous channels of communication" since Jan. 3, when Maduro was captured.

She did not address the US government's first steps to possibly reopen its embassy, but during her televised remarks from a public hospital tour, Rodríguez said she is working with President Donald Trump and Rubio to set "a working agenda."

Tens of thousands flee Pakistan over fears of military operation

More than 70,000 people, mostly women and children, have fled a remote region in northwestern Pakistan bordering Afghanistan over uncertainty of a military operation against the Pakistani Taliban, residents and officials said Tuesday.

Pakistan's Defense Minister Khawaja Mohammad Asif has denied the claim by residents and provincial authorities. He said no military operation was underway or planned in Tirah, a town in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province.

Speaking at a news conference in Islamabad, he said harsh weather, rather than military action, was driving the migration. His comments came weeks after residents started fleeing Tirah over fears of a possible army operation. (AP)

Private plane crashes in India, kills deputy chief minister and 4 others

NEW DELHI, Jan 28, (AP): A private plane carrying a deputy chief minister crashed in an open field in western India on Wednesday, killing the official and four other people on board, aviation authorities said. There were no survivors.

The aircraft was en route from India's financial capital of Mumbai to Ajit Pawar's home city Baramati when it crashed and burst into flames some 254 kilometers (159 miles) from Mumbai. The reason for the crash was not immediately known. Television footage showed smoke rising from the wreckage.

Pawar, 66, was the deputy chief minister of India's western Maharashtra state. He was traveling to Baramati to campaign in a local election when the privately-operated aircraft went down.

Two of his staffs and two crew members on board the mid-size Learjet 45 also died, the directorate general of civil aviation said in an initial statement.

Pawar was a key figure in state politics and served as the second highest elected official in Maharashtra as part

"His understanding of administrative matters and passion for empowering the poor and downtrodden were also noteworthy," Modi said on X. "His untimely demise is very shocking and saddening. Condolences to his family and countless admirers."

Kuwait: Strong residential activity in Q4 propels 2025 property sales to historic high



Property sales in Q4 2025 reached strong levels, supported by a significant increase in residential sales and robust commercial sales. For the full year, sales came in at KD4.4 billion, the best on record. This increase was aided by gains in the investment and commercial segments as well as a rise in residential plot sales, with sellers perhaps offloading empty residential plots before the residential land monopoly law came into effect this year. The prospects for the real estate market in 2026 look positive, with sales momentum supported by potential further monetary easing, legislation including granting foreign shareholders the right to own property (excluding private residences) and the anticipated approval of the real estate financing law on top of activation of the residential land monopoly law to curb hoarding of idle residential lands.

Residential activity drives sales higher in Q4 2025

Total real estate sales reached KD 1.3 billion in Q4 2025, surpassing the previous quarterly peak recorded in Q2 2014. This increase was driven by a sharp acceleration in residential sales to KD587 million (+48% q/q; +29% y/y), the strongest quarterly reading since Q3 2021. (Chart 1.) The surge was primarily driven by a pronounced increase in residential plot sales in the Sabah Al-Ahmad coastal area (KD 129 million), perhaps reflecting the above mentioned implementation of the residential land monopoly in January 2026.

Stripping out these transactions, residential sales growth would have otherwise been much less strong (+15.8% q/q; +0.6% y/y) and resulted in an overall decline in the value of real estate transactions in Q4 (-3.5% q/q). Commercial activity, the most volatile segment, remained robust at KD303 million, albeit below the exceptional KD441 million recorded in Q3 2025. Sales in this segment were supported by several large-ticket deals, including sizable land sales in Al-Farwaniya and Kuwait City (KD63 million) and the sale of two commercial buildings in the Hawalli and Kuwait City governorates worth KD60 million in total. Meanwhile, investment property sales rose mod-



estly in Q4 (+7.3% q/q), despite a decline in transaction volumes.

Real estate sales in 2025 hits a historical high

For the full year 2025, total sales were 27% higher than the previous year and the best performance in more than two decades of available data. This was underpinned by strong activity in the commercial and investment segments. Commercial sales reached an all-time high of KD953 million, while investment property sales recorded the fastest growth among all segments (+39% y/y to KD1.67 billion).

Meanwhile, residential sales continued to recover (+14.3% y/y to KD1.75 billion). The average transaction size in 2025 was down by -5.2%, which could indicate a possible shift toward smaller or lower-value units in outer areas.

The shift in sales toward the commercial and investment segments could reflect a change in investors' sentiment toward income-generating assets, partly in response to easing financial conditions. Moreover, amendments to investment housing regulations allied to government efforts to curb speculative activity in the residential segment (particularly through enforce-

ment of the residential land monopoly law) likely redirected liquidity to the investment and commercial segments. Additional regulatory changes that permit non-Kuwaiti participation in the real estate market (June 2025), including listed companies, licensed funds, and investment portfolios (excluding residential land), have contributed to a strong rebound in the sector's performance at Boursa Kuwait with the Real Estate Index (BKRE) expanding by 49.9% in 2025. We also note that bank credit for real estate purposes saw solid growth of 5.2% in 2025. (Chart 2.)

Divergent sectoral price dynamics in Q4 2025

Prices, according to our real estate price index, continued to decline on a quarterly basis, but at a more moderate pace (-0.3% q/q from -3.1% in Q3), reflecting signs of stabilization rather than a broad-based recovery. This was driven by a rebound in investment prices of 1.4% q/q, partially offsetting weakness in the residential segment. Residential prices fell for the second consecutive quarter, though at a slower rate (-1.7% q/q). On a year-on-year basis, the overall price index slipped into negative territory for the first time since Q4 2024, driven by a marked deceleration in

investment price rises (0.4% y/y from 5.3% in Q3), alongside a deeper fall in residential prices (-4.7% y/y from -1.8%). A sustained recovery in residential prices could hinge on the approval of the real estate financing law, which is expected to enhance liquidity and broaden access to housing finance.

PAHW launches prequalification invitations for three residential projects

The Public Authority for Housing and Welfare (PAHW) continued to advance infrastructure plans across several major housing projects in Q4 2025. Execution remained uneven, though. As of October 2025, the completion of main road works reached 49.2% in South Sa'ad Al-Abdullah and, in December, 75.8% in South Sabah Al-Ahmad. Moreover, PAHW has also signed several contracts to set up the electricity grid in South Sabah Al-Ahmad city. Furthermore, it initiated prequalification for three large-scale residential development projects, reflecting a strategic shift toward a long-term supervisory role, with development contracts structured for 30 years. The designated sites span Al-Mutla (2.12 million sqm), East Sa'ad Al-Abdullah (1.02 million sqm), and West Sa'ad Al-Abdullah and Jaber Al-Ahmad (1.01 million sqm in total). This follows the earlier introduction of a 'real estate developer' model, including the appointment of consultants to master plan three residential areas exceeding 5,000 units. At the same time, PAHW has maintained the suspension of plot distributions since July 2024, pending legislative reforms, most notably the mortgage law and broader revisions to allocation mechanisms for units. As a result, existing housing applications, which approached 100,000 by late 2024, reached 103,110 by June 2025. Meanwhile, Kuwait Credit Bank approvals for government plot loans rose for a third consecutive quarter in Q4 (+22% q/q to KD74.6 million), while disbursements rebounded modestly (+4.6% q/q to KD85 million). As for the full 2025, approved government plot loans fell sharply (by 49% y/y to KD221 million), with disbursements showing a more moderate contraction (-10.8% to KD363 million).

A costly corporate legal loophole

Absent partner ... present in liability

In investment practice, partnerships are often formed on the basis of trust and flexibility rather than rigorous legal scrutiny. As such arrangements become common, certain structures appear stable on the surface while concealing deferred risks that emerge only when tested legally. In Kuwait's business environment, where commercial partnerships often intersect with family and social relationships, the non-active partner model has become widespread yet, legally misunderstood. Frequently viewed as a silent investor or nominal stakeholder, such a partner is assumed to be removed from operational risk. In reality, this assumption conceals a legal vulnerability that often surfaces at the first sign of dispute.



confine their analysis to incorporation documents alone. Judicial assessment frequently extends to actual conduct, including presumed knowledge of company affairs, continued participation despite irregularities, and failure to exercise reasonable oversight. In this context, non-active offers limited legal protection.

Risks

The risk becomes most apparent when disputes arise. Non-active partners often find themselves unexpectedly involved in litigation, facing claims they neither anticipated nor controlled – particularly where authority is unclear or management is concentrated in a single partner without safeguards. In many cases, the issue stems from poor legal structuring rather than bad faith. The solution lies not in excluding non-active partners, but in clearly defining their legal position. This includes aligning constitutional documents with operational reality, allocating powers and responsibilities precisely, implementing reporting mechanisms, and utilizing shareholders' agreements as preventive tools. In this sense, governance functions as a protective investment instrument.

The non-active partner is not inherently problematic. The real risk lies in assuming that lack of involvement eliminates legal exposure. In a dynamic market such as Kuwait's, early awareness and proper structuring can be decisive in preserving investment stability and avoiding costly disputes.

Oil sector eyes solar shift

KPC targets two gigawatts of solar power generation

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 28: Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) intends to generate up to two gigawatts of solar power, despite signing a memorandum of understanding (MoU) with the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy to establish a power and steam generation plant in Ratqa – within the KOC operations.

Sources told the newspaper that this is a relevant move, taking into consideration that KPC and its subsidiaries consume about 1.7 gigawatts of the 17 gigawatts produced by the ministry.

Sources revealed that KPC will enlist the help of international and local companies specializing in this field to implement this project. They added that KPC will continue coordinating with the government to obtain the legal framework that will allow it to replace its electricity supply from the ministry with solar power.

Sources attributed the move of KPC towards alternative energy to reduce the cost of purchasing conventional electricity, especially since the corporation currently pays 25 fils per kilowatt-hour to the ministry. They pointed out that if the corporation were to fully transition to solar energy, the price per kilowatt-hour will range from seven to eight fils.

Sources also explained that the oil sector's reliance on government electricity in the future will be limited to nighttime hours

when oil companies are not engaged in production or exploration.

Sources stated that the KPC's implementation of solar energy production for all its operations will ease the load on the ministry during peak summer months.

Gas imports drop to 6.885 million tons in 2025

KPC lowers LNG imports as local gas output rises

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 28: Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) reduced gas import rates from 6.89 million tons in 2024 to 6.885 million tons in 2025, in line with its strategy to increase gas production capacity to two billion cubic feet per day by 2040.

Reliable sources told the newspaper that this is attributed to the following:

■ KPC continues to closely monitor the performance of its subsidiaries to ensure adherence to LNG conservation policies in all their operations, which led to a decrease in LNG consumption rates compared to previous levels.

■ Ongoing maintenance of oil facilities and all refineries, as maintenance plays a significant role in reducing liquefied natural gas (LNG) con-

sumption.

■ The Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy relies on the fuel oil blend produced by the KPC at its domestic refineries (Zour, Mina Abdullah and Mina Al-Ahmad) for use as fuel in some power and water plants, particularly during peak demand. This is in addition to the ministry's primary use of LNG as a main fuel source due to its lower emissions.

■ KPC's efficient utilization of the Zour LNG facility, which was inaugurated in 2021. This facility enabled KPC to maintain the required quan-

ties for use as needed.

Sources pointed out that the highest LNG import rate of Kuwait was in the third quarter of 2025, reaching 2.61 million tons. They said LNG import rates typically increase in the third quarter of each year due to the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy's increased consumption during the summer months to avoid scheduled power cuts

Federal Reserve poised to stay on hold

Central bank balances growth, jobs, & inflation risks


WASHINGTON, Jan 28, (AP): Federal Reserve officials are expected to keep their short-term interest rate unchanged Wednesday after three cuts last year, ignoring huge pressure for lower borrowing costs from the White House in favor of waiting to see how the economy evolves.

The central bank's rate reductions last year were intended to shore up the economy and prevent a sharper deterioration in the job market, after hiring slowed to a near-crawl in the wake of President Donald Trump's sweeping tariffs last April. Yet there are signs that unemployment has stabilized and the economy could be picking up. At the same time, inflation remains stubbornly above the Fed's 2% target. All those trends argue for keeping rates where they are.

A key issue that Chair Jerome Powell will likely address at his news conference Wednesday is how long the Fed will remain on hold. The rate-setting committee remains split between those officials opposed to further cuts until inflation comes down, and those who want to lower rates to further support hiring.

In December, just 12 of the 19 participants in the committee's meetings supported at least one more rate cut this year. Most economists forecast the Fed will cut twice this year, most likely at the June meeting or later.

from the Trump White House. Powell said Jan. 11 that the Fed had received subpoenas from the Justice Department as part of a criminal investigation into his congressional testimony about a \$2.5 billion building renovation. Powell in an unusually blunt video statement said the subpoenas were a pretext to punish the Fed for not cutting rates more quickly.

And last week, the Supreme Court took up Trump's attempt from last year to fire Fed governor Lisa Cook over allegations of mortgage fraud, which she denies. No president has fired a governor in the Fed's 112-year history. The justices at an oral argument appeared to be leaning toward allowing her to stay in her job until the case is resolved.

At the same time, Trump has suggested he is close to naming a new Fed Chair, to replace Powell once his term ends in May. The announcement could

come as soon as this week, though it has been delayed before.

The president's efforts to pressure the Fed may have backfired, economists say, as Republicans in the Senate voiced support for Powell and threatened to block Trump's replacement chair.

"The last couple of weeks have been pretty positive for Fed independence," said Patricia Zobel, a former official at the New York Fed and now head of macroeconomic research at Guggenheim Investments.

Even so, all the turmoil may have led Powell to hunker down as he nears the end of his term as chair. Vincent Reinhart, a former Fed economist and now chief economist at BNY Investments, noted that Powell has given just one speech touching on the economy since September.

He could be letting other Fed officials take on the job of explaining

why the central bank may hold off on rate cuts in the coming months, Reinhart said. It also underscores that the chair does not make decisions on rates alone, he added.

"The contribution of Chair Powell to news about our understanding of the next Fed move has been as small as it's ever been, over his tenure," Reinhart said.

Only 12 of the 19 members of the Fed's rate-setting committee have a vote, including all seven members of the board of governors, the president of the New York Fed, and a rotating group of four presidents from the regional Fed banks.

This year, Beth Hammack, president of the Cleveland Fed; Neel Kashkari, president of the Minneapolis Fed; Lorie Logan, president of the Dallas Fed; and Anna Paulson, president of the Philadelphia Fed, will vote on rate decisions. All have recently expressed some skepticism of the need for further cuts anytime soon.

In a speech earlier this month, Paulson said an improving economy should allow more rate cuts later in the year.

"I see inflation moderating, the labor market stabilizing and growth coming in around 2% this year," she said. "If all of that happens, then some modest further adjustments" to the Fed's key rate "would likely be appropriate later in the year."

Larger-than-usual tax refunds over the next few months should help fuel more consumer spending, economists expect. And faster growth could eventually boost hiring, which has been noticeably weak even as the economy is expanding.

With businesses barely adding jobs, consumers remain gloomy about the economy. The Conference Board's measure of consumer confidence dropped to an 11-year low in January, the business research group said Tuesday.

EU is seeking new trade partnerships. Here's why

BRUSSELS, Jan 28, (AP): The ambitious free trade agreement between the European Union and India underscores the EU's efforts to ink new global partnerships at a time when the Trump administration has rattled a continent deeply tied to Washington on trade, defense and diplomacy.

The agreement announced Tuesday reflects a new priority for the 27-nation EU, the world's largest trading bloc, after U.S. President Donald Trump threatened to impose tariffs because of opposition to American control of Greenland, only to back off days later. It follows trade deals struck or pending over the past year with India, Japan, Indonesia, Mexico and the five Mercosur nations of South America.

"There is a hope that things will change given the importance of the U.S. for us ... but there is a realization now that we are a bit more alone in this world," said Ivano di Carlo, a senior policy analyst at the European Policy Centre.

Russia's invasion of Ukraine drove the EU to create financial tools to boost the bloc's defense industry and infrastructure like trains, roads and ports - but the Trump administration's criticism of the continent's low levels of defense spending kicked those initiatives into overdrive.

Denmark's prime minister has said Russia could pose a credible security threat to the EU by the end of the decade and that defense industries in Europe and Ukraine must be able to thwart that threat.

Trade pact covers nearly all goods, from cars to textiles

India, EU seal historic free trade agreement

NEW DELHI, Jan 28, (AP): India and the European Union reached a free trade agreement Tuesday that could affect as many as 2 billion people after nearly two decades of negotiations.

The accord, which the head of the EU's executive branch described as the "mother of all deals," will see free trade on almost all goods between the EU's 27 members and India, covering everything from textiles to medicines, and bringing down high import taxes for European wine and cars. It will likely take several months before the agreement takes effect.

The deal between two of the world's biggest markets comes as Washington targets both the Asian powerhouse and the EU bloc with steep import tariffs, disrupting established trade flows and pushing major economies to seek alternate partnerships.

"This agreement will bring major opportunities for the people of India and Europe," Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi said in a virtual address to an energy conference. "It represents 25% of the global GDP and one-third of global trade."

India and the EU also agreed on a framework for deeper defense and security cooperation, and a separate pact aimed at easing mobility for skilled workers and students, signaling that their partnership extends beyond commerce.

The negotiations for the India-EU deal got a new impetus after U.S. President Donald Trump's strong-arm trade tactics, including threatening his European allies with punitive tariffs over their objections to Trump's threats to take control of Greenland.

Modi, speaking at a joint news conference in New Delhi with European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen and European Council President António

Costa, said that the partnership with the EU "will strengthen stability in the international system" at a time of "turmoil in the global order."

"Europe and India are making history today. We have concluded the mother of all deals," von der Leyen posted on X.

In a speech later, she said that the accord was a tale of "two giants" who chose partnership "in a true win-win fashion." She also said that it sends "a strong message that cooperation is the best answer to global challenges."

The deal is expected to further integrate supply chains and strengthen joint manufacturing power between the two economies. It will also cut up to 4 billion euros (\$4.7 billion) in annual tariffs for exporters and create jobs for millions of workers in India and Europe.

A formal signing of the deal could come later this year after officials go through the legal details of the text and the European Parliament ratifies it. India's trade minister, Piyush Goyal, said that he expected the deal to take effect by the end of the year.

India is expected to reduce or eliminate tariffs for 96.6% of EU exports, while Brussels will reciprocate with similar reductions in phases that eventually cover nearly 99% of India's shipments by trade value, according to statements from both sides.

India's sectors poised to gain from the deal include textiles, apparel, engineering goods, and leather, handicraft, footwear and marine products, while the EU's gains will be in wine, automobiles, chemicals and pharmaceuticals, among others.

A quota system for automobiles, wines and whisky has been agreed upon, bringing down steep duties.

Chalamet, DiCaprio among stars nominated for best actor

'One Battle After Another' tops BAFTA nominations with 14 nods

LONDON, Jan 28, (AP): Paul Thomas Anderson's politically charged action thriller "One Battle After Another" leads the race for the British Academy Film Awards, securing 14 nominations Tuesday including acting nods for five of its cast.

Ryan Coogler's blues-steeped vampire epic "Sinners" is close behind with 13 nominations for Britain's equivalent of the Oscars, while Chloe Zhao's Shakespearean family tragedy "Hamnet" and Josh Safdie's ping-pong odyssey "Marty Supreme" have 11 apiece.

Guillermo del Toro's reimagining of "Frankenstein" and Norwegian family drama "Sentimental Value" each got eight nominations, rounding out a six-pack of leading contenders for both the British and Hollywood Academy Awards.

The best film nominees are "One Battle After Another," "Hamnet," "Marty Supreme," "Sinners" and "Sentimental Value."

BAFTA Chief Executive Jane Millichip said the nominations recognized "films like 'One Battle After Another,' 'Sinners,' tackling really big societal issues - the moral ambiguity of activism, Black identity," alongside films exploring "the most intimate side of family relationships."

"They're all doing it in quite different ways: Strong flavors, really bold storytelling," she said.

Best leading actor contenders are Timothée Chalamet for "Marty Supreme," Leonardo DiCaprio for "One Battle After Another," Ethan Hawke for Broadway biopic "Blue Moon," Michael B. Jordan for "Sinners" and Jesse Plemons for "Bugonia" and British actor Robert Aramayo for playing a man with Tourette's syndrome in biographical drama "I Swear."

Aramayo said it was "really crazy" to be nominated alongside Hollywood heavyweights. "It's absolutely amazing," he said. "I admire each and every one of them so much."

The leading actress category includes awards-season favorite Jessie Buckley for her performance as Agnes Hathaway, wife of William Shakespeare, in "Hamnet." She's up against Rose Byrne for "If I Had Legs I'd Kick You," Kate Hudson for "Song Sung Blue," Chase Infiniti for

"One Battle After Another," Renate Reinsve for "Sentimental Value" and Emma Stone for dystopian tragicomedy "Bugonia."

"One Battle" actors Teyana Taylor, Benicio del Toro and Sean Penn are all nominated for supporting performances.

The Associated Press was recognized in the best documentary category with a nomination for Mstyslav Chernov's harrowing Ukraine war portrait "2000 Meters to Andriivka," co-produced by the AP and PBS Frontline.

The winners will be announced at a Feb. 22 ceremony in London hosted by actor Alan Cumming. The U.K. prizes - officially called the EE BAFTA Film Awards - often provide clues about who will triumph at Hollywood's Academy Awards, held this year on March 15.

This year, unusually, Oscar nominations were announced first, with "Sinners" securing a record 16 nominations, followed by 13 for "One Battle After Another."

The British academy has recognized several performers overlooked by the Oscars, including supporting actor nominees Paul Mescal for "Hamnet" and Odessa A'zion for "Marty Supreme."

The BAFTAs also have a distinctly British accent, with a separate category of best British film. Its 10 nominees include "The Ballad of Wallis Island," "Pillion," "I Swear" and "Bridget Jones: Mad About the Boy."

Tom Basden, co-writer and star of "The Ballad of Wallis Island," the story of a musical duo reluctantly reunited by a superfan, said it was gratifying to receive three nominations for a movie filmed on a tiny budget in 18 days. Carey Mulligan, who spent 10 days on set, is nominated for best supporting actress.

"Sort of against the odds, we managed to create something in those conditions that we're really proud of and that's really hit home with people," Basden said. "So it's a lovely kind of underdog story in many ways."

Most BAFTA winners are chosen by 8,500 members of the U.K. academy of industry professionals, with one - the Rising Star Award - selected by public vote from a shortlist of nominees. This year's rising star contenders are Infiniti, Aramayo, "Sinners" star Miles Caton and British actors Archie Madekwe and Posy Sterling.

Like other major movie awards, Britain's film academy has introduced changes in recent years to increase diversity, including the addition of a longlist round before the final nominees are selected. Diversity has improved since 2020, when no women were nominated as best director for the seventh year running, and all 20 of the main acting nominees were white.

Still, Zhao is the only female nominee in the best director category, alongside Anderson, Safdie, Coogler, Yorgos Lanthimos for "Bugonia" and Joachim Trier for "Sentimental Value." Across all categories including documentaries and shorts, 25% of the directing nominees are women.

NEW YORK: Neil Young is giving the people of Greenland the gift of song - his songs, that is.

The veteran rocker announced Tuesday on his blog that he is providing free access to his entire music catalog to residents of Denmark's semiautonomous territory, whose futures have lately become a point of tension between the US and NATO.

"I hope my music and music films will ease some of the unwarranted stress and threats you are experiencing from our unpopular and hopefully temporary government," Young wrote. "It is my sincere wish for you to be able to enjoy all of my music in your beautiful Greenland home, in its highest quality."

The offer is for a year - though Young said renewing is possible - and applicants need to have a Greenland-based cellphone. "This is an offer of Peace and Love," he wrote.

Young's manager confirmed to The Associated Press the rocker's message was genuine.

The offer is in stark contrast to Young's recent decision to deny listeners his catalog on the streaming Amazon Music platform, a swipe at its founder, Jeff Bezos, who has supported U.S. President Donald Trump.

"Amazon is owned by Jeff Bezos, a billionaire backer of the president," Young wrote last week. "The president's international policies and his support of ICE make it impossible for me to ignore his actions. If you feel that as I do, I strongly recommend that you do not use Amazon." (AP)

NEW YORK: Prize-winning composer Philip Glass has called off a scheduled world premiere at the Kennedy Center of a symphony about Abraham Lincoln, the latest in a wave of cancellations since President Donald Trump ousted the previous leadership.

Glass' Symphony No. 15, "Lincoln," was to have been led by Grammy-winning conductor Karan Kamenetz for performances on June 12 and June 13.

"Symphony No. 15 is a portrait of Abraham Lincoln, and the values of the Kennedy Center today are in direct conflict with the message of the Symphony," Glass said in a statement released Tuesday by his publicist. "Therefore, I feel an obligation to withdraw this Symphony premiere from the Kennedy Center under its current leadership."

A spokesperson for the Kennedy Center did not immediately respond to a request for comment. Glass, who turns 89 on Saturday, was a Kennedy Center honoree in 2018. (AP)



'Troublemaker' lets Mandela speak for himself

was "very uncomfortable." While there they got a feeling for where Mandela spent 18 of his 27 imprisoned years and bonded at night over dinners. That's where Maharaj told him Mandela was a Tracy Chapman fan.

They met many people along the way, including some who were part of the resistance against apartheid, taking to heart their continued optimism and hope despite past and present grievances and racism.

"One gentleman came in and he had no arm, his eye was missing. He looked like a character out of James Bond. He had a Tommy Bahama shirt on, he had the hat on," Fuqua said. "And he was so full of life and so funny and so matter of fact about what happened to him, fighting for justice. I started to learn so much more about the people there."

The film, which Fuqua has been working on for over three years, blends archival footage and photographs, interviews with Maharaj and animation by South African artist Thabang Lehobye to fill in the gaps where footage didn't exist, like on Robben Island.

He even slept a few nights on Robben Island, which he said

Fuqua hopes the lessons audiences take are on a global scale.

"The lesson I learned was meaningful change is never easy or comfortable," Fuqua said. "The people in the moment were willing to do what's necessary, the difficult job to make change."

He added: "I hope people take the lessons of great leaders like Mandela and Mac Maharaj ... People who stood up for the right reasons."

Meanwhile, Jay Duplass had come to a turning point in his life and career. After years of mining personal stories, add those of his family, he'd decided that he was ready to tell other people's stories.

That's when Kumail Nanjiani and Emily V. Gordon approached him with a special project that fit the bill, Adam Cayton-Holland's tragicomic script, and memoir, about his PTSD after his sister dies by suicide. It had Duplass both laughing and crying and wanting to help tell the story.

"You really have to be like irrationally in love with the movie that you're making," Duplass said. "We're really standing on the shoulders of the Cayton-Holland family

in Denver who got hit with something surprising and unbelievable. It's the story not only of how they survived it but came through better people."

The film, "See You When I See You," is having its world premiere Tuesday at the Sundance Film Festival where it is seeking distribution. It stars Cooper Raiff, Kaitlyn Dever, David Duchovny, Hope Davis and Lucy Boynton.

"I kind of see it as an heir to their film 'The Big Sick,'" Duplass said, of Nanjiani and Gordon's Oscar-nominated romantic comedy.

Putting Raiff in the lead role over a more established movie star was an unconventional choice, to say the least, but Duplass was certain it was the right one. He's been Raiff's de facto mentor since before Raiff made his first feature. He saw in him a range that he hadn't quite observed in some of his peers.

"He's just so talented and smart and funny and emotionally available," Duplass said. "Frankly there aren't a lot of 27-year-olds who are all those things." (Raiff is now 28).

Rounding out the cast with more well-known names was then non-negotiable. But Duplass has noticed in the past 10 to 15 years that it's harder to get big name actors to join smaller art movies. Part of that, he said, is that actors are making "so much money in TV" and that the talent agencies are gatekeeping their talent on the off chance that a last minute offer will come in for one episode or a limited series.

He added: "I hope people take the lessons of great leaders like Mandela and Mac Maharaj ... People who stood up for the right reasons."

Majumdar and Li win ALA honors

NEW YORK, Jan 28, (AP): Novelist Megha Majumdar, one of this year's winners of medals presented by the American Library Association, doesn't only visit libraries for the reading.

There's the jigsaw puzzle table in midtown Manhattan and the telescope she borrowed from the central branch of Brooklyn Public Library so she could have a closer look at the sky at night. And libraries, wherever the location, are an ideal place to get some writing done.

"I go often enough that my I have favorite places to sit," she says.

The library association announced Tuesday that Majumdar has won the Andrew Carnegie Medal for Excellence in Fiction for "A Guardian and a Thief," her story of a woman's troubled quest to leave India and join her husband in the United States. Yiyun Li was awarded in nonfiction for the memoir "Things in Nature Merely Grow," in which she confronts the loss of her two sons, both of whom took their lives.

The authors each will receive \$5,000 and be formally honored when the ALA gathers in June in Chicago.

"Megha Majumdar's intoxicating novel is filled with emotion and relevance to all people and all places across time," Lillian Dabney, chair of the awards' selection committee, said in a statement. "Yiyun Li has courageously put almost inexplicable events into words that will benefit all who encounter her book."

Previous winners of the Carnegie medals include Percival Everett, Jennifer Egan and Donna Tartt.

Li, 53, is the recipient of numerous literary honors, including the PEN/Faulkner Award for her novel "The Book of Goose" and The Guardian First Book Award for the story collection "A Thousand Years of Good Prayers." A native of Beijing who emigrated to attend the University of Iowa in 2000, Li says she never saw the inside of a library until middle school, when she was chosen to be a librarian's assistant, "a monumental experience."

After moving to the US, she was dazzled, and educated, by the public library in Iowa City.

"I would walk to shelf to shelf," she remembers. "That's how I discovered (British author) A.S. Byatt. There was a big collection of A.S. Byatt in the A's, so I started to read her. I read through the collections, from A to Z."

Li now teaches at Princeton University, where she is the Robert F. Goheen Professor in the Humanities, a position first held by Nobel laureate Toni Morrison. She gets writing done at the university library, and likes to visit the public library in town and "just look at the books and look at the shelves - language books for immigrants and maps and travel books. I'm an old-fashioned person who likes to see the object."

Social media giants in court

TikTok settles landmark child addiction lawsuit before trial

LOS ANGELES, Jan 28, (AP): TikTok agreed to settle a landmark social media addiction lawsuit just before the trial kicked off, the plaintiff's attorneys confirmed.

The social video platform was one of three companies - along with Meta's Instagram and Google's YouTube - facing claims that their platforms deliberately addict and harm children. A fourth company named in the lawsuit, Snapchat parent company Snap Inc., settled the case last week for an undisclosed sum.

Details of the settlement with TikTok were not disclosed, and the company did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

At the core of the case is a 19-year-old identified only by the initials "KGM," whose case could determine how thousands of other, similar lawsuits against social media companies will play out. She and two other plaintiffs have been selected for bellwether trials - essentially test cases for both sides to see how their arguments play out before a jury and what damages, if any, may be awarded, said Clay Calvert, a nonresident senior fellow of technology policy studies at the American Enterprise Institute.

Joseph VanZandt, co-lead counsel for the plaintiff, said in a statement Tuesday that TikTok remains a defendant in the other personal injury cases, and that the trial will proceed as scheduled against Meta and YouTube.

Jury selection starts this week in the Los Angeles County Superior Court. It's the first time the companies will argue their case before a jury, and the outcome could have profound effects on their businesses and how they will handle

children using their platforms. The selection process is expected to take at least a few days, with 75 potential jurors questioned each day through at least Thursday. A fourth company named in the lawsuit, Snapchat parent company Snap Inc., settled the case last week for an undisclosed sum.

"This was only the first case - there are hundreds of parents and school districts in the social media addiction trials that start today, and sadly, new families every day who are speaking out and bringing Big Tech to court for its deliber-

erately harmful products," said Sacha Haworth, executive director of the nonprofit Tech Oversight Project.

KGM claims that her use of social media from an early age addicted her to the technology and exacerbated depression and suicidal thoughts. Importantly, the lawsuit claims that this was done through deliberate design choices made by companies that sought to make their platforms more addictive to children to boost profits. This argument, if successful, could sidestep the companies' First Amendment shield and Section 230, which protects tech companies from liability for material posted on their platforms.

"Borrowing heavily from the behavioral and neurobiological techniques used by slot machines and exploited by the cigarette industry, Defendants deliberately embedded in their products an array of design features aimed at maximizing youth engagement to drive advertising revenue," the lawsuit says.

Executives, including Meta CEO Mark Zuckerberg, are expected to testify at the trial, which will last six to eight weeks. Experts have drawn similarities to the Big Tobacco trials that led to a 1998 settlement requiring cigarette companies to pay billions in health care costs and restrict marketing to young minors.

"Plaintiffs are not merely the collateral damage of Defendants' products," the lawsuit says. "They are the direct victims of the intentional product design choices made by each Defendant. They are the intended targets of the harmful features that pushed them into self-destructive feedback loops."

The tech companies dispute the claims that their products deliberately harm children, citing a bevy of safeguards they

have added over the years and arguing that they are not liable for content posted on their sites by third parties.

"Recently, a number of lawsuits have attempted to place the blame for teen mental health struggles squarely on social media companies," Meta said in a recent blog post. "But this oversimplifies a serious issue. Clinicians and researchers find that mental health is a deeply complex and multi-faceted issue, and trends regarding teens' well-being aren't clear-cut or universal. Narrowing the challenges faced by teens to a single factor ignores the scientific research and the many stressors impacting young people today, like academic pressure, school safety, socio-economic challenges and substance abuse."

A Meta spokesperson said in a statement Monday the company strongly disagrees with the allegations outlined in the lawsuit and that it's "confident the evidence will show our longstanding commitment to supporting young people."

José Castañeda, a Google Spokesperson, said Monday that the allegations against YouTube are "simply not true." In a statement, he said "Providing young people with a safer, healthier experience has always been core to our work."

TikTok did not immediately respond to a request for comment Monday.

The case will be the first in a slew of cases beginning this year that seek to hold social media companies responsible for harming children's mental well-being. A federal bellwether trial beginning in June in Oakland, California, will be the first to represent school districts that have sued social media platforms over harms to children.

Armani revamps with elegant edit

Chanel couture gets breath of fresh air, stars

PARIS, Jan 28, (AP): Fashion powerhouse Chanel stacked the Paris front row like a movie premiere Tuesday: Nicole Kidman, Dua Lipa, Penélope Cruz, A\$AP Rocky, Gracie Abrams, Margaret Qualley.

Then, it handed the spotlight to its new designer, Matthieu Blazy, for his much-anticipated couture debut built on one big, confident swing: joy.

Inside the Grand Palais, the house went full fantasy.

The set was a dream-garden of candy-colored trees and giant pink-and-red mushrooms: a surreal antidote to the gray January day outside, and to the even heavier mood of the world beyond the doors.

Before the first look, Blazy even teased the mood with an animation film of woodland animals at work in the Chanel ateliers, "Cinderella" style: a wink that said this would be couture, but not grim.

Then came the clothes, and the message landed fast: lightness.

Blazy took Chanel's most famous codes - the suit, the pearls, the chain-weighted hem - and made them feel almost weightless.

A classic skin suit arrived as a sheer, barely-there version of itself, cut so delicately it looked like air had been tailored.

In a house where tweed can be armor, this was tweed as whisper.

Birds hovered over the collection as a guiding idea: freedom, motion, travel.

Featherlike textures and flighty embroideries fluttered across silhouettes that moved like breath in-

stead of structure.

There were flashes of plumage in color and surface - at times bright, at times raven-dark - and plenty of soft, floating chiffon that made the models look as if they were gliding rather than walking.

The best trick was how the craft wasn't obvious.

Up close, the work was meticulous: a level of handwork couture clients pay for, and ateliers live for.

But the overall effect stayed easy, almost casual; as if the clothes were beautiful without demanding applause.

Blazy played with the artistic technique trompe l'oeil, including a tank top-and-jeans idea reimagined in organza and with textures that were romantic but also a little strange; couture that winked.

In a brand built on total looks and strong house signatures, Blazy offered something personal: choice.

Models were invited to pick symbols and messages to stitch into the clothes - a love note, a sign, a private message.

It pushed Chanel away from "uniform" and toward intimacy: couture as a wearable secret, not just a public statement.

The show also had a sense of casting as storytelling.

Blazy's runways have tended to carry an open, joyful energy, and that continued here - a mix of ages, backgrounds and presences that made the clothes feel lived-in.

Model Bhavitha Mandava, fresh off her viral mo-

ment at the house's Métiers d'Art show, returned.

Later she closed as a couture bride, shimmering and feathered, smiling as if she knew she was ending the scene exactly on the right note.

The soundtrack shifted moods like a DJ set, moving from Disney sweetness to millennial nostalgia - including Moby's "Porcelain," and a mashup that blended Oasis' "Wonderwall" with The Verve's "Bitter Sweet Symphony."

By the finale, the room was playing along.

Big sets are easy. Blazy's debut didn't try to overpower Chanel with noise or force a new era with aggression. Instead, he made it feel alive.

Silvana Armani stepped forward Tuesday with her first couture collection as creative director of Armani Privé, taking the spotlight after the death of her uncle, Giorgio Armani, in September.

Armani, who worked alongside him for more than four decades, becomes the only woman leading a couture house this season, in a week dominated by high-profile debuts from male designers.

Her debut kept the house's signature restraint but pushed it toward a lighter, more wearable mood. The lineup was trimmed to about 60 looks, a sharper edit than the brand's typical scale.

Tailoring opened the show, but softened: relaxed suits, sheer organza shirts with ties, and wide-leg trousers in light layers that moved easily on the runway. Accessories were kept minimal - hats were left out entirely, a notable change for a house long associated with Giorgio Armani's love of headwear.

Hollywood composer reflects on life's highs and lows

Shaiman looks back in pessimistic humor in memoir

NEW YORK, Jan 28, (AP): Some people see the glass as half full and some as half empty. Marc Shaiman is something else entirely.


"I'm not even happy with the glass," he says with a laugh.

The award-winning Hollywood and Broadway composer and lyricist cheerfully likes to call himself an "Eeyore" and a "card-carrying pessimist" despite many of his biggest dreams coming true.

"Just as soon as something good happens, something bad's going to happen," he tells The Associated Press. "I am always waiting for that other shoe to drop, and it inevitably drops."

His career and personal ups and downs are on full display this winter with Tuesday's publication of his memoir, "Never Mind the Happy: Showbiz Stories from a Sore Winner," which is filled with funny stories from a man who has helped fuel popular movies and musicals for decades.

"I've been lucky enough to do a lot

and I've been lucky enough to have an outrageous longevity. I thought, 'Let me write it down, finally,'" he says.

The memoir charts the New Jersey-born musical prodigy's rise from Bette Midler's musical director in his teens to scoring such films as "Sleepless in Seattle" and "Mary Poppins Returns" and Broadway shows like "Hairspray" and "Catch Me If You Can."

He's worked with Billy Crystal, Martin Short, Luther Vandross, Raquel Welch and Rob Reiner, sparred with producer Scott Rudin and had a spat with Nora Ephron ("I'm certain she's in heaven, telling all the angels she doesn't like harps," he writes). He also played at the White House and was a force in the early days of "Saturday Night Live."

There was the time in 1999 that he got legendary composer Stephen Sondheim so high on pot at a party in his apartment that the iconic composer collapsed three times. "I've killed Stephen Sondheim," he thought to himself. (Sondheim asked him to tell the

story only after he died.)

He tells the story of hearing Meryl Streep repeatedly working on a song for "Mary Poppins Returns." Moved, he and his writing partner, Scott Williams, knocked on her door to say how impressed they were by her dedication to rehearse. "Well, guys, fear can be a powerful motivator," she told them.

"I'm mostly just trying to show how human everyone is - even these bold-faced names," Shaiman, a two-time Grammy winner and two-time Emmy winner, says in the interview.

Shaiman isn't above mocking himself, as he does for becoming an inveterate pothead and cocaine user. "I should go into the Guinness Book of World Records for being the only person who put on weight while being a cocaine addict," he writes.

There are stories about how a misunderstanding over an unpaid bill with Barbra Streisand left him shaken for days and the time he insulted Harry Connick Jr. (Both would later reconcile.)

Meet Sprout: The robot ready to enter homes

NEW YORK, Jan 28, (AP): As the new robot called Sprout walks around a Manhattan office, nodding its rectangular head, lifting its windshield wiper-like "eyebrows" and offering to shake your hand with its grippers, it looks nothing like the sleek and intimidating humanoids built by companies like Tesla.

Sprout's charm is the point. A 5-year-old child could comfortably talk at eye level with this humanoid, which stands 3.5 feet (1 meter) tall and wears a soft, padded exterior of sage-green foam.

Forged by stealth startup Fauna Robotics over two years of secret research and development, Sprout's public debut on Tuesday aims to jumpstart a whole new industry of building "approachable" robots for homes, schools and social spaces.

The robot is in many ways the first of its kind, at least in the United States, even as rapid advances in artificial intelligence and robot engineering have finally made it possible to start building such machines. If its emotive expressions and blinking lights seem vaguely familiar, it might be from generations of Star Wars droids and other endearingly clunky robotic sidekicks dreamed up in animation studios and children's literature.

"Most people in this industry take inspiration from the science fiction that we grew up with," said Fauna Robotics co-founder and CEO Rob Cochran. "I think some do so from 'Westworld' and 'Terminator.' We do from WALL-E and Baymax and Rosie Jetson."

The usual hypothesis for the commercialization of humanoid robots is that they will get their first jobs in warehouses or factories long before they are ready for homes. That's the path proposed for two of today's best-known prototypes: Tesla's Optimus, which CEO Elon Musk sees as the carmaker's future, and Boston Dynamics' Atlas, which parent company Hyundai plans to deploy in car manufacturing by 2028.

Fauna looks to skip that step for an entirely different clientele: other robot tinkerers. Much as early personal computers and, later, smartphones sparked a culture of developers designing new games and applications, Sprout is a software developer platform more than just a robot. It's also a mechanically complex one that will cost buyers \$50,000.

Spending

That's a price some university research labs and technology entrepreneurs are already spending on China's Unitee, which sells a lightweight humanoid often seen at robotics conferences and competitions. Others have avoided Chinese hardware due to tariffs and broader security concerns.

Cochran believes Fauna is "the first American company to be actively shipping robots as a developer platform" and has been hand-delivering the first models. Early customers include Disney and Boston Dynamics.

"You take it out of the box and you can start walking it around immediately," said Marc Theermann, chief strategy officer at Boston Dynamics, in a recent interview. "Seeing their robot for the first time really lets you see the future a little bit. And if you squint, you can see how a robot like that would be welcomed into people's homes."

Sprout can't lift heavy objects, but it can dance the Twist or the Floss, grab a toy block or teddy bear, or hoist itself from a chair to take a long stroll along the wood floors of Fauna's headquarters in New York City's Flatiron District.

Cochran and co-founder Josh Merel, the company's chief technology officer, demonstrated the robot to The Associated Press in mid-January ahead of its public launch. Fauna employees and an AP reporter piloted the robot, using a video game controller, a phone application and a virtual-reality headset. Sprout also knows the office layout enough to be sent on a planned mission, such as to check out the inventory of the break room refrigerator.

It walks slowly but steadily on uneven ground. Only once it came close to tripping, taking a sharp turn to avoid a person and instead hitting its foot on a protruding table wheel too low to the ground to be seen by Sprout's camera eyes. But the robot, built to handle what engineers call perturbation, quickly recovered its balance and kept walking, much like a clumsy person might.

"If you step in front of it, it won't crash into you, it'll plan a new path around you," said Anna Pervan, a Fauna research scientist who works on the robot's mapping and navigation. Among the first batch of Fauna's 50 employees, and a fan of science fiction writer Isaac Asimov, she previously worked on self-driving cars but was excited about joining a startup building something that might one day serve as a robot butler.

"It's cute, and it's not too humanoid, and I think that actually makes it a lot more fun," Pervan said. "It's not verging on creepy or trying to be too human. It's like your buddy, your pal, that's a different thing than you."

Starting a robot company can be unforgiving, especially one designing personal robots. One of the few successes, Roomba vacuum maker iRobot, had a decades-long run before filing for bankruptcy protection last month.

Most others didn't last that long, like Anki, maker of the playful toy robot Cozmo, or Jibo, which went out of business less than a year after its dynamic talking speaker made the cover of Time Magazine's 2017 "best inventions" edition.

"There were a lot of really brilliant attempts. I think the technology wasn't quite there," Cochran said. "I do think we're right on the precipice now where you could build a companion that is present, engaging, delightful to be around, and can also move around a space in a way that nothing ever has before."

Researchers edge closer to preventing rheumatoid arthritis

More than 18 million people worldwide suffer from rheumatoid arthritis, including nearly 1.5 million Americans.

Rheumatoid arthritis (RA) is an autoimmune, inflammatory form of arthritis, meaning a person's immune system attacks their joints, causing substantial inflammation. This inflammation can cause pain, stiffness and swelling in the joints, and in many cases, patients report fatigue and a flu-like feeling.

If left untreated, rheumatoid arthritis can lead to damage of the joints. But even when treated, this condition can lead to significant disability. In highly active disease or advanced stages, patient may have difficulty performing daily tasks, such as preparing food, caring for children and getting dressed.

Up to now, this condition has been treated once patients have already developed symptoms. But a growing body of evidence suggests this disease can be identified earlier - and maybe even ultimately prevented.

I'm a physician specializing in rheumatoid arthritis and a researcher who has conducted a clinical trial on treatments for this condition. I believe this research is moving us toward being able to identify people who are at risk for rheumatoid arthritis before the disease fully develops, and to finding treatments that will delay or prevent it altogether. My hope is that this could lead to changes in how we manage rheumatoid arthritis in the next several years.

Currently, when someone visits their health care provider because they are experiencing joint pain or other symptoms

of an immune attack, health care providers can make a diagnosis by examining the joints for swelling. The health care provider will also run tests to find blood markers called autoantibodies, which help in confirming the diagnosis. While not all people with rheumatoid arthritis will have abnormal blood markers, the two autoantibodies that are seen in up to 80% of people with rheumatoid arthritis are rheumatoid factor and anti-cyclic citrullinated peptide.

But multiple studies have now confirmed that rheumatoid arthritis has a preclinical stage of development. This is a time about three to five years or longer, prior to the onset of swollen joints when markers like rheumatoid factor and anti-cyclic citrullinated peptide are detectable in the blood. The presence of these markers indicates that autoimmunity is occurring, yet the body and organs are still functioning well, and a person who is at risk of getting rheumatoid arthritis may not feel sick yet.

Now that researchers have identified this preclinical stage, health care providers can use markers such as autoantibodies and symptoms like prolonged early morning joint stiffness to identify people who are at risk for rheumatoid arthritis but do not yet have joint inflammation.

At this point, predicting future rheumatoid arthritis is still in the research stage, although the field is working toward established ways to test for risk for rheumatoid arthritis as a routine part of health care. This is akin to how cardiovascular disease risk is assessed through measuring cholesterol levels.

Because of advances in the ability to predict who may get rheumatoid arthritis in the future, researchers are now working on identifying treatments that can delay or prevent the full-blown condition from developing.

In particular, trials have been performed in people who tested positive for anti-cyclic citrullinated peptide, or who have other risk factors for rheumatoid arthritis. These risk factors include joint pain and subclinical joint inflammation, which is when an imaging study, like magnetic resonance

imaging, sees joint inflammation that can't be seen by a clinician examining the joints.

To date, almost all of these trials have used immune drugs that are commonly used to treat full-blown rheumatoid arthritis, such as methotrexate, hydroxychloroquine and rituximab. Researchers have been testing whether a short course of any of these drugs could lead to a lasting reset of the immune system and prevent rheumatoid arthritis from developing.

While there is not yet an approved drug for rheumatoid arthritis prevention, these studies offer hope that researchers are on track to find the right drug - as well as the right dosage and duration of that drug.

Some challenges remain to be addressed before preventive treatments become the norm in clinical care.

First, researchers need to better understand the biology of the preclinical stage of disease. Until recently, most studies have focused on patients with full-blown arthritis and generally ignored people at risk for developing the disease.

But now, researchers can use blood markers like anti-cyclic citrullinated peptide antibodies to identify those who are at risk much more easily. And a growing number of studies of people with this marker are informing how scientists understand the biology of rheumatoid arthritis development.

In particular, it is now apparent that the preclinical stage is marked by multiple circulating immune system abnormalities in cells, autoantibodies and inflammation. The hope is that researchers will find interventions that effectively target the immune system abnormalities driving the development of rheumatoid arthritis before the patient's joints begin to swell.

Researchers are also finding that the abnormalities in the immune system during the preclinical stage may be coming from sites in the body other than the joints. An emerging idea called the mucosal origins hypothesis posits that the early autoimmunity of rheumatoid arthritis is caused by inflammation at mucosal surfaces of the body, such as the gums,

the lungs and the gut. According to this theory, the joints are involved only later as the disease progresses.

More research is needed, but the mucosal origins hypothesis may help explain why periodontal disease, emphysema or other forms of lung disease and exposure to tobacco or forest fire smoke are risk factors for rheumatoid arthritis. It would also explain why certain bacteria have been associated with the disease. Future trials targeting interventions to a mucosal process could help researchers better understand the nature of this disease.

But while biomarkers like the anti-cyclic citrullinated peptide antibodies are strongly predictive for future rheumatoid arthritis, one difficulty remains: Some people who test positive for them never develop the full-blown disease.

Studies have shown that about 20% to 30% of people who are positive for anti-cyclic citrullinated peptide antibodies develop rheumatoid arthritis within two to five years, although the presence of combinations of risk factors can identify people who have a greater than 50% risk for developing the condition within one year.

This makes it difficult to find participants for clinical trials for rheumatoid arthritis prevention. If you can't predict who will get the disease, it's hard to know whether you're preventing it.

So far, researchers have tried to recruit people who have already come to their health care provider with early joint symptoms of rheumatoid arthritis but still no swollen joints. That has worked well, but there are likely far more people at risk for rheumatoid arthritis who have not yet sought care.

Since health care providers are not yet testing everyone for blood markers for rheumatoid arthritis, researchers will need larger, international networks that can test for risk factors like autoantibodies to identify candidates for participation in prevention trials.

More needs to be done, but it's exciting to see the field advancing toward the point where prevention may be part of routine clinical care for rheumatoid arthritis. (AP)

New hope for pain relief

Aquagym brings healing to those with limited mobility

DAKAR, Senegal, Jan 28, (AP): The sun has not yet risen in Senegal's capital, Dakar, but about 100 people in swimsuits and life jackets already crowd a section of beach, ready for aquagym class.

In the chilly Atlantic, 63-year-old Aminata Sall is soon kicking in rhythm with others, foam noodles tucked under her arms. On the beach, people with limited mobility are buried knee-deep in the sand and gently rotate their torsos in a therapy session meant to ease pain.

Sall's doctor once warned her she could lose the ability to walk within five years because of rheumatoid arthritis, an autoimmune disease that causes pain, stiffness and swelling in the lining of joints and can cause severe damage if left untreated.

"The shock was enormous," she said. "I stayed at home for almost a year, doing nothing." Then one morning she wandered down to a beach in Dakar's Ngor neighborhood and saw people exercising in the water.

"I asked what they were doing, and they told me to try," she said. "I'm still walking."

Senegal's first aquagym program with its low-impact exercises has drawn praise from health professionals for helping people with reduced mobility caused by chronic illnesses such as heart disease, stroke and arthritis.

As life expectancy rises sharply across Africa, these diseases have become more common, often leaving older adults with pain and limited mobility. But prevention, diagnosis and rehabilitation services have not kept pace on a largely youthful continent whose public health systems prioritize infectious diseases, maternal care and children.

Many older people have little access to geriatricians or other doctors and tend to forego diagnostics or treatment to cut costs.

The aquagym emerged little over a decade ago as a rare, low-cost option to relieve pain and improve mobility.

After Sall was diagnosed with her autoimmune condition, she said her doctor told her she would need surgery at a cost of about \$10,000, which she could not afford. She was prescribed an anti-inflammatory drug, but it was later taken off the market due to complications.

"That's when I started losing hope," she said. "Some mornings, a blocked vertebra or swollen ankles would leave me unable to move all day."

In Senegal, most medical care is paid out of pocket. Public insurance coverage is limited, and private plans remain unaffordable for many. Costly procedures like surgery are often not covered.

"A lot of people don't come to us until things get really bad, and by then it's much harder and more expensive to treat them," said Dr. Seydina Ousmane Ba, director of the National Orthopedic Prosthetics and Rehabilitation Center in Dakar.

Khadija Wade, 76, has spinal stenosis, a degenerative condition that can compress and irritate the nerves in the spinal cord. She was diagnosed three years ago and her condition worsened after her husband died earlier this year.

"I became very sedentary. I could spend an entire month at home without walking," Wade said.

Many suggested she see a specialist in Italy or France, but visas are hard to obtain for many Senegalese and treatment abroad is costly.

Last month, Wade began aquagym classes on her doctor's recommendation. She said she is already seeing results.

"I came to my first session with a cane, but now I can walk without it," she said.

People with reduced mobility in West Africa face especially steep hurdles, said Clément Philit, director of Handicap International in Senegal. Public spaces and transport are often inaccessible, and specialized health care and rehab services are scarce, he said.

Cambodia bans 3 infant milk powder brands over 'toxins'

PHNOM PENH, Jan. 28, (Xinhua): Cambodia prohibited the sales and distribution of three kinds of Babybio Optima 1 infant milk powder over concerns it may be contaminated with the toxin cereulide.

Cereulide is a bacterial toxin that can cause nausea, vomiting and abdominal pain.

The Directorate-General of Consumer Protection, Competition and Fraud Repression (CCF) said in a statement that the three banned French products are Babybio Optima 1 800g infant formula with Lot No: 894408, Babybio Optima 1 800g infant formula with Lot No: 900035, and Babybio Optima 1 400g with Lot No: 900932.

The CCF urged traders and vendors to cooperate with its officials in the recall of the above-mentioned products.

"Parents and consumers must avoid purchasing the three types of the above-mentioned infant formula products and stop using them immediately," the statement said. "The move aims to ensure safety and health for infants and children."

The statement came after Comptoir Perfect Pharmed Co., Ltd., which is the exclusive distributor of Babybio products in Cambodia, notified on Monday that there may be the toxin cereulide in three types of Babybio Optima 1 baby milk products currently circulating in the Cambodian market.

the lungs and the gut. According to this theory, the joints are involved only later as the disease progresses.

To date, almost all of these trials have used immune drugs that are commonly used to treat full-blown rheumatoid arthritis, such as methotrexate, hydroxychloroquine and rituximab. Researchers have been testing whether a short course of any of these drugs could lead to a lasting reset of the immune system and prevent rheumatoid arthritis from developing.

While there is not yet an approved drug for rheumatoid arthritis prevention, these studies offer hope that researchers are on track to find the right drug - as well as the right dosage and duration of that drug.

Some challenges remain to be addressed before preventive treatments become the norm in clinical care.

First, researchers need to better understand the biology of the preclinical stage of disease. Until recently, most studies have focused on patients with full-blown arthritis and generally ignored people at risk for developing the disease.

But now, researchers can use blood markers like anti-cyclic citrullinated peptide antibodies to identify those who are at risk much more easily. And a growing number of studies of people with this marker are informing how scientists understand the biology of rheumatoid arthritis development.

In particular, it is now apparent that the preclinical stage is marked by multiple circulating immune system abnormalities in cells, autoantibodies and inflammation. The hope is that researchers will find interventions that effectively target the immune system abnormalities driving the development of rheumatoid arthritis before the patient's joints begin to swell.

Researchers are also finding that the abnormalities in the immune system during the preclinical stage may be coming from sites in the body other than the joints. An emerging idea called the mucosal origins hypothesis posits that the early autoimmunity of rheumatoid arthritis is caused by inflammation at mucosal surfaces of the body, such as the gums,

Measles cases rise across US

NEW YORK, Jan 28, (AP): The South Carolina measles outbreak has surpassed the recorded case count in Texas' 2025 outbreak, as health officials have logged almost 600 new cases in just over a month.

The outbreak centered in northwestern Spartanburg County is showing little sign of slowing down, with health officials saying Tuesday that 789 cases have been confirmed since September. Last year in Texas, 762 cases were reported, although experts believe that was likely an undercount.

A large outbreak on the Utah-Arizona border is also ongoing, and the United States' measles elimination status is at risk.

As of Thursday, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention had confirmed 416 measles cases nationwide this year, nearly 20% of the 2025 case total. The other states with confirmed cases in 2026 are: California, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Kentucky, Minnesota, North Carolina, Ohio, Oregon, Virginia and Washington.

Last year was the nation's worst year for measles spread since 1991, according to the CDC. The US confirmed 2,255 cases and nearly 50 different outbreaks. Three people died, all of them unvaccinated, including two children in Texas.

Measles is caused by a highly contagious virus that's airborne and spreads easily when an infected person breathes, sneezes or coughs. A vaccine can prevent it.

Measles first infects the respiratory tract, then spreads throughout the body, causing a high fever, runny nose, cough, red, watery eyes and a rash.

Most people recover, but infection can lead to dangerous complications such as pneumonia, blindness, brain swelling and death.

The CDC defines an outbreak as three or more related cases.

Vietnam's Health Ministry on Tuesday urged strict food safety practices and directed local authorities to increase monitoring at border crossings, health facilities and communities, according to state media.

China said it was strengthening disease prevention measures in border areas. State media reported that health authorities had begun risk assessments and enhanced training for medical staff, while increasing monitoring and testing capabilities.

Earlier Nipah outbreaks were reported in West Bengal in 2001 and 2007, while recent cases have largely been detected in southern Kerala state. A major outbreak in 2018 killed at least 17 people in Kerala.

Meanwhile, the Philippines' Department of Health (DOH) on Wednesday urged Filipinos to remain vigilant amid reports of the spread of the Nipah virus abroad, even as it assured the public that the country is prepared to prevent its entry and transmission.

The DOH said the recent detection of confirmed human cases of Nipah Virus in West Bengal, India, is being

closely monitored globally.

It noted, however, that there are no international recommendations for travel restrictions at this time.

While the Philippines' borders remain open, the DOH said proactive border screening measures continue to be enforced to protect the public from the entry of infectious diseases. These include online health declarations and enhanced training for medical staff, while increasing monitoring and testing capabilities.

The DOH stressed that the Nipah virus is not new to the Philippines. It was detected as early as 2014 in the southern Philippines, where 17 cases were recorded.

Following the 2014 incident, no further Nipah virus cases were detected in the country, said the DOH.

Vietnam's Ministry of Health has urged local authorities to strengthen surveillance and promptly detect suspected cases of Nipah virus infection at border gates, medical facilities and in communities to prevent potential spread, especially during the Lunar New Year holiday and the upcoming festival season, local daily Suc Khoe & Doi Song reported on Wednesday.

OKC avoids first three-game skid of season

Pistons hold off Nuggets

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan 28, (AP): Shai Gilgeous-Alexander scored 29 points and the short-handed Oklahoma City Thunder beat the New Orleans Pelicans 104-95 to avoid their first three-game skid of the season.

Chet Holmgren had 20 points, 14 rebounds and five blocks for NBA-best Oklahoma City (38-10), which had lost back-to-back home games for the first time this season. Isaiah Joe added 17 points.

The Thunder were missing starters Jalen Williams, Isaiah Hartenstein and Cason Wallace and key reserve Alex Caruso with injuries.

Gilgeous-Alexander shot 8 of 22 from the field but went 13 of 14 from the foul line. He scored at least 20 points for the 118th consecutive game, the second-longest streak in NBA history.

Zion Williamson led New Orleans with 21 points on 8-of-11 shooting and 11 rebounds. Saddiq Bey added 16 points and 13 rebounds for the Pelicans, who had won two straight.

Tempers flared in the closing minutes. First, Bey and Jaylin Williams got tangled up and were assessed technical fouls. With 9 seconds left, Jeremiah Fears, who played in college at Oklahoma, and Lu Dort grabbed each other's jerseys before being separated. Fears then ran after Dort and players from both teams had to be separated.

Pistons 109, Nuggets 107

In Denver, Tobias Harris scored 22 points, including two free throws with 2 seconds left, and the Detroit Pistons held off a late Denver rally to beat the travel-weary Nuggets.

Cade Cunningham had with 22 points and 11 assists for Detroit, which has won nine of 11 and leads the Eastern Conference by 5 1/2 games over Boston.

Jamal Murray had 24 points and 10 assists but missed two free throws in the final seconds. With the Nuggets down 107-104, Murray was fouled on a 3-point attempt with 4 seconds left and missed the first foul shot. Harris was fouled and made both free throws. Murray went to the line again with 0.7 seconds remaining but missed the second foul shot.

Jonas Valanciunas returned from a one-game absence to finish with 16 points and 16 rebounds for Denver, which had been scheduled to play at the Memphis Grizzlies on Sunday. The game was postponed because of the winter storm that hit most of the country, and the Nuggets were stranded in Memphis until Monday morning.

Clippers 111, Jazz 99

In Salt Lake City, Kawhi Leonard scored 21 points, James Harden had 16 points and 10 assists, and the Los Angeles Clippers beat the Utah Jazz for their ninth win in 10 games.

Kris Dunn added 14 points and a season-best five steals for the Clippers (22-24), who have the best record in the NBA since Christmas. They have won 16 of their last 19 games - immediately after going 3-16 in their previous 19.

The Clippers took control during a 10-2 run in the third quarter powered primarily by Dunn's two steals and layups, along with a 3-pointer that made it 73-61. Los Angeles led by double figures the rest of the way.

Utah's Lauri Markkanen returned after missing seven games due to illness to score 19 points on 5-for-15 shooting.

Ace Bailey scored 20 points and Brice Sensabaugh added 13 but the Jazz (15-32) have dropped seven of their last eight games. It was just the second time in the last 30 games that Utah failed to reach 100 points.

Knicks 103, Kings 87

In New York, Jalen Brunson scored 28 points and the New York Knicks dominated the fourth quarter to beat the Sacramento Kings 103-87 on Tuesday night for their third straight victory.


Mikal Bridges added 18 points and Karl-Anthony Towns had 17 points and 11 rebounds for the Knicks, who outscored the Kings 31-15 in the final period after the game was tied at 72 after three.

DeMar DeRozan scored 34 points for the Kings, who lost their sixth straight. Russell Westbrook added 14 points, but he and DeRozan combined to go 3 for 16 from 3-point range on a night when Sacramento finished 5 for 30 (16.7%).

Mike Brown earned his first victory as Knicks coach against the team that fired him last season, two years after he was NBA Coach of the Year after leading Sacramento to the 2023 playoffs.

Only 20 athletes from Russia and Belarus cleared for Winter Games

They could try to qualify for the Olympics after a Dec. 2 ruling at the Court of Arbitration for Sport overturned a blanket ban by the International Ski and Snowboard Federation imposed within days of the war in Ukraine intensifying in February 2022.

In luge, the IOC said it invited Russian athletes Daria Olesik and Pavel Repilov to compete at the sliding track in Cortina. Olesik was the first Russian to start a luge World Cup race in almost four years when she competed last month at Lake Placid, New York.

Rephilov was a silver medalist in boy's singles at the 2020 Lausanne Winter Youth Olympics.

The best Russian medal prospects at the Olympics are figure skaters Adelina Petrosian and Petr Gumennik.

Russia is still excluded, as it was at the 2024 Paris Summer Games, from team sports like ice hockey.

At the 2022 Beijing Olympics, Russian athletes won 32 medals including five gold competing at ROC - the acronym for Russian Olympic Committee, which was a neutral title as punishment in the long-running scandal of state doping.

Three Players score their first international goals

US women extend shutout streak to 5 with convincing victory over Chile

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., Jan 28, (AP): Croix Bethune, Jameese Joseph and Emily Sams all scored their first international goals and the United States went on to beat Chile 5-0.

Emma Sears and Trinity Rodman also scored for the United States, which hasn't conceded a goal in five matches.

Coach Emma Hayes went with a completely different starting lineup in the match at UC Santa Barbara than the one she used on Saturday for the team's 6-0 victory over Paraguay in Carson, California. Players on the roster averaged 5.2 national team appearances, fewest for a lineup since 2001.

"I think in both games, the team, regardless of its inexperience as a collective, regardless of the connections that are there because they haven't played together before, I think they showed an awful lot of maturity in the performance, and that's all I can ask from them," Hayes said. "They always do me proud. But I'm impressed by everybody's approach."

Bethune, who plays for the Washington Spirit, opened the scoring in the 18th minute. Chile goalkeeper Ryan Torero came out to stop Bethune, who was rushing at the goal alone, but the strike got past her.

Joseph, who plays for the Chicago Stars, earned her first start for the United States and scored in the 26th minute.

Sams, serving as captain, made it 3-0 in the 33rd minute with a goal off a cross from Sears.

Dahlen and midfielder Sally Menti - made their U.S. debuts against Paraguay.

The roster did not include U.S. players based in Europe because they are in the middle of their seasons. It also did not include Gotham FC players, who are in London for the semifinals of the first FIFA Women's Champions Cup.

The match against Chile concludes the U.S. team's January training camp, as Hayes looks to solidify her player pool for the upcoming SheBelieves Cup, starting in March, and Women's World Cup qualifying at the end of the year.

"I don't think you can really look at this camp as like 'They didn't do their job, they're not as good as we think they should be,' because after all we're coming off an offseason of a lot of players not playing, some players playing, a bunch of new faces," Rodman said. "I stayed fit and ready in the offseason because of the injuries I've dealt with, and I felt really good out there."

The last meeting between the United States and Chile was a 3-0 U.S. victory at the 2019 World Cup. Chile, ranked No. 47 in the world, has made just one World Cup appearance.

The United States previously held a training camp at UC Santa Barbara's Harder Stadium ahead of the 1991 World Cup, which included scrimmages against the Gauchos and a West Coast all-star team. That U.S. team, including Mia Hamm and Michelle Akers, went on to win the World Cup.

UConn improves to 10-0 in Big East after topping Providence

STORRS, Conn., Jan 28, (AP): Tarris Reed Jr. scored seven of his 19 points in the final five minutes as second-ranked UConn beat Providence 87-8 to become the first team to open 10-0 in Big East play in seven years.

Solo Ball had 17 points, Silas Demary Jr. added 15 points and six assists, and Eric Reibe had 14 points and eight rebounds for UConn. The Huskies opened a season 20-1 for the sixth time, but the first since 1998-99. Villanova in 2018-19 was the last team to start 10-0 in the Big East.

Malachi Smith, 1 for 8 from 3-point range in his previous 13 games, made his first four and had 12 points and seven assists as the Huskies won their 16th straight game.

Jamier Jones had 20 points and Jaylin Sellers added 18 for Providence (9-12, 2-8).

Providence trailed by 10 points in the first half but cut it to 67-66 before a runner by Alex Karaban and a 3-pointer by Ball made it a six-point UConn lead. With Providence trailing by three, Reed scored UConn's next five points.

UConn led 41-37 at halftime.

UConn played without freshman guard Braylon Mullins, who suffered a concussion in the win over Villanova.

va. Providence's leading scorer, Jason Edwards, missed his fifth consecutive game with a foot injury.

Elmer scored a career-high 30 points and No. 24 Miami (Ohio) improved to 21-0, rallying in the second half and then holding on for an 86-84 victory over UMass.

Miami is one of two unbeaten teams in Division I after fifth-ranked Nebraska lost 75-72 at No. 3 Michigan earlier Tuesday night. Top-ranked Arizona is 21-0 following an 86-83 win over No. 13 BYU on Monday night.

Unheralded Elezi Cannaferina improves from eighth position to third

SCHLADMING, Austria, Jan 28, (AP): Loic Meillard has won the last men's World Cup giant slalom before the Olympics, denying Lucas Pinheiro Braathen what would have been his second victory for Brazil.

Pinheiro Braathen narrowly led Meillard after Tuesday's opening run but couldn't hold on to his advantage after the Swiss skier posted the second-fastest time in the final run.

Last November, Pinheiro Braathen won a slalom in Finland to give Brazil its maiden victory in a top-level ski race.

Meillard won the race under the floodlights on the icy Planai course by 0.73 seconds for his second World Cup victory of the season and ninth overall.

"It's always been a slope that I liked. And good memories from the first victory in GS and

to win again here is amazing," said Meillard, who also won the event three years ago.

"I know the form is getting better and better, I would say, in the last few weeks," said the Swiss skier, whose best Olympic result is fifth from the 2022 slalom.

Pinheiro Braathen was fastest in the opening run to prove again he is an Olympic medal contender for Brazil not just in slalom.

Pinheiro Braathen has two GS wins from the time he was competing for Norway but is chasing his first victory in the discipline since his switch to the Brazilian ski federation in 2024.

"I really had the feeling that the victory would be mine today. I had such a good feeling," said Pinheiro Braathen, who has racked up five podium results in GS - all second places - since his nation switch, including three in the current season.

"But it is OK, I didn't find the speed in the second run. I'm impressed with Loic."

Pinheiro Braathen stepped away from the sport in October 2023 following a dispute with

the Norwegian ski federation over his personal marketing rights, but returned a year later to represent Brazil, his mother's native country.

Unheralded Alban Elezi Cannaferina clocked the fastest second-run and the Frenchman improved from eighth position to third, 0.90 behind Meillard, for his first career podium.

Elezi Cannaferina was the 2023 junior world champion and had an 11th place from a GS in Norway last March as his best World Cup result so far.

His stunning final run bumped Olympic GS champion Marco Odermatt off the podium and into fourth, 0.36 behind the Frenchman. Odermatt lost time early in his second run when he struggled for balance and nearly skied out with his right leg in the air, though the Swiss star ultimately managed to stay in the course.

Odermatt remained in the lead of the GS standings with 450 points, 103 clear of Pinheiro Braathen, with two more races scheduled after the Olympics.

10-man Hoffenheim maintains perfect 2026 start

BERLIN, Jan 28, (Xinhua): Werder Bremen's slump deepened as Hoffenheim preserved its unbeaten start to the new year with a composed 2-0 away victory, even after being reduced to 10 men in a rescheduled Bundesliga matchday 16 fixture at the Weserstadion.

The contest brought together two sides moving in opposite directions, with Bremen entering the night as one of the league's most out-of-form sides and Hoffenheim arriving unbeaten in 2026. The hosts, forced into several defensive changes, began with early intent and nearly struck inside the opening minute when Justin Njimah broke clear, only to squander a promising opportunity.

Hoffenheim gradually imposed control but initially struggled to stretch a compact Bremen back line. Clear chances were scarce, aside from an early headed effort from Andrej Kramaric. Just as the half appeared set to end scoreless, Alexander Prass produced a decisive moment of quality, drilling a long-range effort into the top corner for his first Bundesliga goal in the 44th minute.

The visitors' task became significantly harder shortly after the restart when Wouter Burger was

sent off following a VAR review for a reckless challenge in midfield. Bremen briefly sensed momentum, but Hoffenheim responded with ruthless efficiency. From a partially cleared delivery, Gris-

cha Promel struck a controlled volley to double the lead, a goal that stood after another VAR check.

Christian Ilzer immediately reshaped his side into a compact defensive unit, and Hoffenheim defended in numbers. Bremen thought it had pulled one back just past the hour mark, only for Romano Schmid's close-range finish to be ruled out for offside. Despite sustained pressure and territorial dominance, the hosts lacked conviction in front of goal, with late chances falling to Keke Topp but failing to change the scoreline.

Hoffenheim saw out the closing stages with composure to claim a fourth straight league win of the calendar year.

The result leaves Hoffenheim third with 39 points in the Bundesliga standings, strengthening its push for direct UEFA Champions League qualification, while Bremen remains 15th, only three points above the relegation play-off zone after extending its winless run to nine matches.

In the other rescheduled match from the 16th round, relegation-threatened St Pauli held fourth-placed RB Leipzig to a 1-1 draw.

Abraham completes Villa return from Besiktas

Traoré joins West Ham and says movie taught him about passion of club's fans

LONDON, Jan 28, (Agencies): Spain winger Adama Traoré switched London clubs on Wednesday by joining West Ham from Fulham - and said a movie about his new team taught him about the passion of its fans.

"I've been seeing West Ham for a long time," the 30-year-old Traoré said. "It's a massive club, a massive fanbase. I've been watching since I was young, when I watched a film about West Ham. I know about the fans and how much passion they have." Traoré was likely talking about "Green Street," a fictional 2005 movie that explored the culture of hooliganism in English soccer through a fan group linked to West Ham.

Green Street was the name of a road leading up to West Ham's old stadium, Upton Park.

The club now plays at the Olympic Stadium, where Traoré will be united again with West Ham manager Nuno Espírito Santo. They previously worked together at Wolverhampton.

The powerful right winger came through Barcelona's academy and has already played for four English teams - Aston Villa, Middlesbrough, Wolves and Fulham.

"He will give us a different option in attacking areas," Nuno said.

England striker Tammy Abraham has completed a reported move back to Aston Villa from Besiktas, signing a four-and-a-half-year contract with the Premier League title contenders.

The 28-year-old returns to English football for the first time since joining Roma in 2021. Abraham had been on loan at Besiktas, but the Turkish club activated their 11 million pounds purchase option from Roma on Monday. It was reported that Villa would pay Besiktas a fee of 21

million euros to secure his transfer. Aston Villa manager Unai Emery has been searching for additional striking options to support Ollie Watkins and has maintained a long-standing interest in Abraham. The forward previously spent the 2018-19 season on loan at Villa, playing a key role in their promotion from the Championship with 26 goals in 40 appearances.

"Some clubs play a big part in your journey and stay with you," Abraham said.

"I've scored goals, faced challenges, and grown as a player and as a man. I'm back at Aston Villa, ready to work and give everything," he added.

As part of the deal, teenage Villa midfielder Yasin Ozcan, who has been on loan at Anderlecht this season, will join Besiktas.

Best of the Rest

Brazil's Corinthians defeats Gotham FC: Corinthians captain Gabi Zanotti scored late as her team beat Gotham FC 1-0 in the semifinals of the inaugural Women's Champions Cup intercontinental competition.

The 40-year-old Zanotti stopped a cross on her chest, then shot the dropping ball with her left boot to the right of Gotham's German international goalkeeper Ann-Katrin Berger, who got her hands to it but couldn't stop it slipping through in the 82nd minute.

It had been a scrappy game of few clear-cut chances for either team.

New York-based Gotham, which qualified for the inaugural FIFA event by winning the first CONCACAF Champions Cup, had pushed hard for the opener in the second half. Jaelin Howell forced Leticia in the Corinthians goal into action, then fired another good chance high and wide.

But Corinthians defended smartly and the Brazilian team made it count with the 38-year-old Tamires producing the cross for the oldest player on the field to score the goal that mattered. (AP)

Kuwait clashes with Japan for bronze at Asian Handball Championship

Qatar and Bahrain battle for continental glory

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 28: The 22nd Asian Men's Handball Championship, serving as the 2024 World Cup qualifiers in Germany, concludes today at the Sheikh Saad Al-Abdullah Sports Complex. Kuwait will face Japan at 4:00 p.m. in the bronze medal match, ahead of the final at 6:00 p.m. between defending champion Qatar and Bahrain. Earlier, China will meet Hong Kong at 2:00 p.m. to decide ninth and tenth place.

In the tournament standings so far, South Korea finished fifth, Saudi Arabia sixth, Iraq seventh, and the UAE eighth.

Bahrain booked spot in the final with a 35-25 semifinal win over Japan and aims to claim its first Asian Championship title. Qatar advanced to the final after a thrilling 27-26 extra-time victory over Kuwait, seeking its seventh continental crown.

Kuwait's bronze medal showdown with Japan carries its own significance. The "Azraq" has secured

third place four times in the history of the championship—in 1979, 1983, 1987, and 1989.

South Korea holds the record for the most Asian titles with nine, followed by Qatar with six, Kuwait with four, and Japan with two.

The Asian representatives for the 2027 World Cup in Germany will be Kuwait, Bahrain, Qatar, and Japan.

This marks the fourth time Kuwait has hosted the Asian Championship, following editions in 1977, 1995, and 2020. Kuwait's national team has lifted the Asian title four times: in 1995, 2002, 2004, and 2006.

Mishal Al-Qabandi, Assistant Treasurer of the Kuwait Handball Federation and Head of the Media Committee for the championship, praised the event's success, highlighting both the extensive media coverage from Gulf, Arab, and Asian outlets and the tournament's smooth organization.

Al-Qabandi emphasized that such success was made possible thanks to strong government support and the dedication of the federation's staff and committees.

Kuwait aims to bounce back against Thailand at the AFC Futsal Asian Cup

JAKARTA, Jan 28: Kuwait looks to recover from its opening loss when it takes on Thailand at 1:00 p.m. today in its second Group B match at the AFC Futsal Asian Cup finals in Jakarta, Indonesia.

In the group's other fixture, Vietnam will face Lebanon. In the opening round, Kuwait narrowly lost to Vietnam 5-4, while Thailand secured a 2-0 win over Lebanon.

The clash with Thailand offers Kuwait a crucial chance to regain momentum and strengthen its bid to advance from the group stage.

Djokovic survives quarterfinal drama to meet Sinner in semis

World No.2 Swiatek flames out

MELBOURNE, Jan 28, (Xinhua): World number two Jannik Sinner's next step towards a third straight Australian Open title will go through a fortunate Novak Djokovic, while world No.2 Iga Swiatek crashed out after a quarterfinal capitulation against Elena Rybakina on Wednesday.

Quarterfinal action wrapped up in much cooler conditions compared to the heatwave that had scorched Melbourne on Tuesday.

Sinner, a four-time Grand Slam champion, defeated American eighth seed Ben Shelton 6-3, 6-4, 6-4 to record his 19th straight victory at Melbourne Park.

Sinner hit 33 winners and his consistency ensured Shelton made more than double the number of unforced errors.

After two hours and 23 minutes, Sinner held his arms aloft in steely celebration as he locked in a fifth Grand Slam semifinal against 38-year-old Djokovic.

"We are still lucky to have Novak here playing incredible tennis at his age. Hopefully, it will be a great battle," Sinner said.

Another salivating semifinal at Rod Laver Arena awaits, after the Italian had usurped 10-time tournament winner Djokovic in 2024.

Fourth seed Djokovic was extremely lucky to move forward after fifth-seeded Lorenzo Musetti retired hurt when leading by two sets.

The Italian was headed for the biggest win of his career after rolling to a 6-4, 6-3 lead before severely struggling with an injury to his upper right leg.

He battled on but was severely limited with his movement before pulling the pin at 1-3 in the third set.

Just before the dramatic turn of events, Djokovic needed a medical timeout after the second set and had his right foot strapped up due to a blister.

"I feel really sorry for him. He was a far better player, I was on my way home," said Djokovic, who also had a walkover in the fourth round after 16th seed Jakub Mensik pulled out injured.

"These things happen in sport. It's so unfortunate. He should have been a winner today." The 23-year-old Italian became the first player in the professional era to retire in a major quarterfinal after winning the first two sets.

"I felt it at the beginning of the second set. I felt there was something strange in my right leg," he said.

"I continued to play because I was playing really, really, really well, but I was feeling the pain

increasing, and the problem was not going away.

"To be forced to retire, it is something that, of course. It's really painful." In the women's draw, six-time Grand Slam champion Swiatek will have to wait longer for an elusive Australian Open title after falling well short against Rybakina.

The 2022 Wimbledon champion was all over her slumping opponent and thoroughly deserved her 7-5, 6-1 victory in one hour and 35 minutes.

While Swiatek could never get going in Melbourne, Rybakina has been near flawless and will enter the semifinals having not dropped a set.

"Really pleased with the win. We know each other pretty well and I was trying to stay aggressive," Kazakhstan's Rybakina said.

Rybka will face a similarly in-form Jessica Pegula, who strolled to a comfortable 6-2, 7-6 (1) win over Amanda Anisimova in an all-American quarterfinal.

The 2024 US Open finalist remains on track for an elusive grand slam triumph after whacking 20 winners and she has also not dropped a set in the tournament.

It was the end of the road for fourth-seeded Anisimova, who was unable to reach a third straight grand slam final.

She could not rediscover the clean ball striking that was a feature of her fourth round victory over China's Wang Xinyu.

"It's awesome. I've been able to go deep in the US Open, but I feel like I play well here and I like the conditions," Pegula said.

Women's semifinal action will be held on Thursday, with top seed Aryna Sabalenka squaring off against 12th seed Elina Svitolina before the late night match between Rybakina and Pegula at Rod Laver Arena.

China's Zhang Shuai and Elise Mertens of Belgium, the fourth seeds, feature in the women's doubles semifinals.

Malaysian soccer faces turmoil

FAM executive committee resigns over player scandal

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia, Jan 28, (AP): The entire executive committee of the Football Association of Malaysia (FAM) resigned Wednesday after a scandal involving the naturalization of seven foreign-born players led to FIFA sanctions, a court appeal and intensified scrutiny of the country's soccer governance.

All committee members, elected 11 months ago for the 2025-2029 term, stepped down with immediate effect in a unanimous and voluntary decision in order to protect the association's credibility.

The mass resignation followed FIFA's decision last September to fine the association about \$450,000 and suspending the seven players for a year after determining that fake documents had been filed to support their naturalization. The players - Facundo Garcés, Rodrigo Holgado, Imanol Machuca, João Figueiredo, Gabriel Palmero, Jon Izazabal and Héctor Hevel- were also fined individually.

The seven, who originate from Argentina, Brazil, the Netherlands and Spain, went on to play for Malaysia, including in a qualifying match for the 2027 Asian Cup that Malaysia won against Vietnam.

Malaysian officials had maintained that all seven players were eligible under FIFA rules because each had a grandparent born in Malaysia. FIFA, however, said its investigators obtained original documents from the players' countries of origin that contradicted those claims.

In a statement Wednesday, FAM said the committee had been elected for a four-year mandate covering the 2025-2029 term and the decision to resign after just 11 months demonstrated that service to Malaysian soccer takes precedence over hold-

ing office.

The mass resignation was intended to safeguard the association's reputation and mitigate further consequences for Malaysian football, it said. It would allow FIFA and the Asian Football Confederation to review governance, administrative and procedural matters within FAM, and ensure any reforms can be undertaken without distraction or perceived conflicts of interest, it said.

"The executive committee recognizes the importance of collective responsibility and the need to act in a manner that protects the integrity and standing of the association," the statement said.

FAM said the move was aimed at restoring confidence among supporters, stakeholders and the wider football community, emphasizing that institutional credibility is essential to the stability and future development of the sport in Malaysia. The outgoing leadership will fully cooperate with FIFA, the AFC and other stakeholders. No timeline was announced for interim leadership or new elections.

Acting FAM president Mohamad Yusoff Mahadi told local media that committee secretary-general Noor Azman Rahman will continue overseeing day-to-day operations of the governing body, which is expected to convene a congress to appoint a new executive committee.

After FIFA rejected FAM's appeal, it took the case to sports highest court based in Switzerland.

FAM said Tuesday that the Court of Arbitration for Sport had temporarily halted the FIFA-imposed ban on the players, allowing them to compete while an appeal is reviewed.

It didn't say when a final ruling is expected.
