How long will the debts from the 'Manakh Crisis' persist?

FOR 44 years, the tragedy of the victims of the 'Manakh Market' crash has persisted without plausible solutions in sight.

This enduring stock market crash, which has impacted the national economy and the social stability of many Kuwaiti families, remains unresolved even with the existence of the Difficult Debts Settlement Authority – a body in charge of addressing this decades-long problem.

The fact that 668 cases remain open up to this day strongly suggests that the solutions implemented, thus far, are not genuine attempts to resolve the crisis, but merely temporary, inadequate fixes.

The human and financial cost of this inaction is substantial. Many of those originally burdened by these debts already passed away. Tragically, their children may now be suffering under the anguish of travel bans and other crippling hardships.

Financially, the legacy of these non-performing loans persists in the State budget, reflected in an item called 'Debts under Collection,' which currently amounts to a staggering KD7 billion – money that is essentially uncollectible.

Furthermore, the legislative response to the crisis, particularly Law No. 41/1993, exacerbated the suffering.

This law, issued by the National Assembly, imposed a punitive 15 percent penalty on the debtor for every missed payment, added directly to the outstanding balance.

This law also established a body whose opera-

tional costs continue to drain the public treasury each year.

The prolonged inability to resolve this issue is starkly contrasted by the swift and effective steps taken by other nations facing similar economic and financial challenges.

In the 1980s, Bahrain resolved what was known as the 'Cheque Crisis' with a single, decisive government action.

Similarly, in Britain, Margaret Thatcher's government tackled crises in the mining, unemployment and stock market sectors in 1985 through comprehensive economic restructuring.

While initially facing some repercussions, the financial sector of the United Kingdom rapidly recovered and triumphed over challenges with relative ease.

The ongoing failure in Kuwait to resolve the 'Manakh Market' crash stands as a poignant reminder of the need for decisive action and a political will that prioritizes permanent cure over temporary relief.

Likewise, France suffered a major financial crisis in the 1980s and resolved it through pragmatic measures, without imposing any negative repercussion on its citizens or the local economy.

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Lebanon voices concern over Kuwait's terror list

BEIRUT, Feb 9, (Xinhua): Lebanon's Ministry of Public Health expressed "great surprise" on Sunday following Kuwait's announcement that it had added eight Lebanese hospitals to its national terrorism sanctions list.

In a statement, the ministry said it received no advance notice from Kuwaiti authorities, adding that this action contradicts Kuwait's longstanding fraternal and diplomatic stance toward Lebanon.

The eight hospitals are situated in southern Lebanon, eastern Lebanon and Beirut's southern suburbs, areas reportedly known for strong Hezbollah influence. Kuwaiti daily Al-Rai reported that Kuwait's committee for enforcing UN anti-terror resolutions made the decision based on "reasonable grounds" linking the facilities to terrorist activities.

Statements on microphones

For many years, me and several others have called for moderation in the use of powerful loudspeakers in mosques, advocating for using less powerful ones. The goal is not to punish or disturb people, especially during the early morning hours.



People have different lifestyles and habits, they are not programmed like robots.

It is wrong to assume that the timing of the call to prayer is suitable for everyone. In fact, the opposite is more accurate.

Loud noise from vehicle engines pollutes the environment. Therefore, the Ministry of Interior criminalized their use due to their harmful effects. High volume loudspeakers are no different, as they cause the same damage.

It is generally impermissible to use loudspeakers, especially during Ramadan, for reciting the Quran. This is incorrect. The Quran is not recited for someone sitting in their shop, walking on the street, managing their pharmacy, or driving a taxi.

The recitation of the Quran is intended for worshippers inside the mosque.

Some citizens, particularly the elderly, complain about the loud volume of loudspeakers, as it prevents them from sleeping.


The same applies to children, students and the sick. Those who wish to hear the Quran should listen to it recited by the most beautiful voices, such as the imams of the Two Holy Mosques, via television or mobile phone.

The spirituality that religious rituals aim to achieve does not necessarily mean disturbing others and shouting through loudspeakers.

Spirituality can be attained by going to the mosque and performing prayers there, not by loitering on the streets and then complaining about not hearing the recitations or prayers through loudspeakers.

Opportunity for good or moment for misfortune

"IMAM ALI (Peace be Upon Him) has a saying that is not fleeting, not something that might pass by unnoticed, or a passing wave that disappears. Rather, it is a piece of wisdom that he (Peace be Upon Him) consistently shared during his sermons and meetings with his companions. He said, 'Opportunity passes like a cloud, so seize opportunities for good,' Hassan Ali Karam wrote for Al-Seyassah daily.

"Here, we do not know whether the ministerial post to which Abdullah Bouftain was nominated was an opportunity for good or an opportunity for misfortune. As the popular saying goes, 'We wanted it to be joyful, but it turned into trouble,' and so it is. It may seem like Hassan Ali Karam a blessing, but the good can quickly turn into evil, God forbid.

"I do not know whether those who plotted against Bouftain were among the envious and malicious, or among his supporters, or neither. But they did not like what they perceived as 'unfair work', if that applies to our friend. I have not met Abdullah Bouftain personally, but I occasionally follow him on social media. He is a master of the game and he excelled at it.

"Undoubtedly, he is a good speaker and a creative young man. Ideas are not just about manufacturing and innovation, they also come from eloquent speeches and captivating addresses that win hearts and minds. He succeeded in this area and built a wide following, especially among young people.

"After the Amiri decree was issued during the nine o'clock news, I reflected and said, 'I hope replacing one person with another is not just a matter of moving a chair around. Abdullah is certainly successful, or at least successful, in speeches and presenting ideas, but being Minister of Information is a different story altogether, especially when we know the position encompasses both culture and media. How weighty culture is, and how crucial media is, at a time everything seems to be just a passing fad?'

"Culture is no longer just printed books or poems about a beloved or a homeland. Authors and poets are facing a near-deserted market. Poetry has become riddles without substance, and stories and novels are mere soulless anecdotes. You regret buying a novel and browsing through it, finding nothing worth your time. In fact, it is often less than trivial.

"I believe that Bouftain has experience in radio, television, arts, drama and theater, unlike his departing colleague who, as he says, has only recent experience (or so I think). His appointment as Minister of Culture is, in my opinion, an injustice to the man. Here, it is nothing more than a game played by opportunists. As the saying goes, 'Give the bread to the baker, even if he eats half of it.'

"For many years, media and the arts have been neglected by the arts and culture sector. The bottom line is that it was a good opportunity to hand over media and culture to an inspiring generation that understands the language of young people, who constitute about 70 percent of the population -- both citizens and expatriates. Perhaps, Bouftain missed the opportunity, but you do your job, and leave the rest to Allah."

Also:

"In a rapidly evolving era of medicine and psychotherapy, traditional treatments alone are no longer sufficient to address the physical, psychological, and social challenges individuals face," Dr. Reem Ahmad Al-Hazim wrote for Al-Seyassah daily.

"With this progress, innovative modern therapies have emerged, integrating the arts, applications, and theoretical sciences to enhance healing and improve the quality of life."

"One of the most prominent is theater therapy, which utilizes acting and theatrical performance as a means of expression and overcoming trauma. Through role-playing and storytelling, the patient is empowered to cope with stress and anxiety, develop skills to regain self-confidence, and overcome social isolation."

"Color therapy has also emerged. It employs lighting and color techniques to alter mood, guided by a physician or therapist. Bright colors may be used to stimulate mental activity and improve mood, while calming colors can promote relaxation, reduce stress, and stimulate healing."

"Therapeutic play has also emerged, providing a safe space for children to express their feelings, fears, and various sensations. Interactive play and simple activities help develop problem-solving skills and promote positive behavior."

"Therapies that connect people with nature have also appeared, and there are many. Among the most well-known are animal therapy and horticultural therapy. Animal therapy primarily relies on the presence of animals, such as dogs, horses and cats, in the patient's vicinity."

"Research has indicated that interaction with animals can reduce blood pressure, stimulate the release of endorphins, and enhance focus, thus, aiding in the rehabilitation of the patient."

"Horticultural therapy is closest to my heart due to my specialization of over 30 years in the field of botany and



agriculture. Horticultural therapy engages the patient's five senses. When a person is in a field, garden or orchard, they activate and utilize his senses of smell, touch, hearing, taste and sight. In its simplest form, horticultural therapy is direct work with plants to calm the nerves, stimulate the senses, and improve both physical and mental performance."

"These activities are excellent for supporting physical rehabilitation, especially given the widespread use of modern technology in our time, which has significantly reduced daily physical activity."

"Gardening improves quality of life and reduces feelings of depression and psychological stress amidst the fast-paced and complex rhythm of modern life."

"Walking among plants and breathing in the oxygen-rich air in the morning, taking advantage of sunlight, is very beneficial."

"All these therapies and innovative medical techniques complement the role of the physician, not replace it."

"The best approach is to combine innovations with direct follow-up from a specialist physician and to develop treatment protocols with a therapist to achieve a holistic therapeutic experience that ensures the highest levels of patient safety."

"Garden therapy is an invitation to healing and recovery in close proximity to living beings in general, and plants in particular."

"Construction contracts are among the most common contracts due to their direct connection to engineering and construction work, as well as financial rights," Attorney Sarah Al-Jassem wrote for Al-Seyassah daily.

"However, reality shows many disputes arising from contractors' errors in executing construction work."

"Contractors often resort to subcontracting work, which raises a legal issue concerning the determination and blurring of responsibilities between the parties, especially since any defect could result in serious material and technical damages that may be irreparable."

"Civil law regulates this type of work, stipulating that the contractor is obligated to execute the agreed work according to the terms, specifications and best practices, and is responsible for any error or negligence in its execution."

"Construction errors can vary, including violating agreed technical specifications, using materials that do not conform to approved specifications, breaching professional standards, unjustified delays in execution, or carrying out defective work that threatens the building's safety."

"Many property owners make the mistake of assigning the work to another contractor upon discovering defects, errors or delays in execution."

"This creates a problem by blurring the lines of responsibility between the previous and subsequent contractors, thus, losing the right to compensation by proving the error, the damage, and the causal link between the fault and the contractor."

"Before handing over the site to a new contractor, the project owner must take precautionary legal measures to document the current state of the completed work. This documentation aims to determine the actual percentage of completion, identify technical deficiencies and defects, and list the defective or non-compliant work. This is achieved by appointing a specialized engineering expert from the court, who is vital in this type of dispute for proving damages."

"The expert examines the completed work to determine its conformity with the contract and specifications, estimates the cost of repairing defects or removing faulty work, identifies technical deficiencies and damages, determines the percentage of work actually completed, and accurately identifies damages and violations."

"Once a contractor's fault is established, the employer has the right to demand that the defects be rectified at the contractor's expense and to receive compensation for any material or moral damages incurred, before handing over the work to a new contractor for completion."

"The previous contractor is held accountable for the work performed and any defects therein. The subsequent contractor is not responsible for previous errors unless it is proven that they were aware of them and continued the work without correcting them."

"This underscores the importance of legal procedures before handing over the site to the new contractor to prevent the loss of rights and the difficulty of assigning blame to the actual perpetrator."

"Disputes arising from contractor errors require a thorough legal and technical understanding, especially given the current boom in construction."

"Legal procedures remain the best way to protect rights, ensure a fair separation of responsibilities among contractors as they succeed one another in executing a project, and achieve justice in accordance with the law."

Wedding vows gone awry

Suitor flees with woman's KD 15,000

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 9: A marriage arrangement between a young woman and a man, which began in September 2024, ended with a fraud complaint being filed at a police station in the Capital, reports Al-Anba daily.

The woman accused a customs officer of misappropriating KD15,000 that she obtained through a bank loan, after he disappeared and stopped responding to her calls once he received the money.

According to the details of the case, the woman filed a report accusing the man of fraud and stated that she met him by chance at the Ministries Complex in September 2024. The two exchanged introductions, after which the accused expressed his wish to marry her.

The complainant stated that the man later asked her to assist him in furnishing what he described as their future marital home. This re-

quest prompted her to take a loan of KD15,000 from a local bank. She handed the amount to the accused in cash immediately after exiting the bank on Jan 22, 2026. She added that the accused suddenly disappeared after receiving the money and stopped answering her telephone calls.

A security source said that once the complaint was registered, the case file was referred to the Criminal Investigation Department to take the necessary legal measures and carry out investigations aimed at locating the accused and confronting him with the complainant's statements.

The source disclosed that the accused was contacted and later appeared voluntarily. During questioning, he admitted that there had been a marriage proposal which he later found unconvincing, as stated by the complainant, dating back to September 2024. He also confessed in detail to receiving KD15,000 from her, explaining that he used the money to settle accumulated debts and that he was unable to

return the amount or repay the loan due to his financial obligations.

The source added that the complainant was summoned to confront the accused with his statements. The investigation did not reveal any new information beyond what both parties had already stated, confirming that the money had indeed been handed over, in line with the complainant's testimony.

In accordance with legal procedures, the accused was referred to the Public Prosecution to take further action.

The source concluded by calling on citizens and residents to remain vigilant and not be deceived by promises, stressing the importance of never handing over money to anyone under any circumstances without clear and legally binding guarantees. The source also emphasized the need to promptly report any suspected cases of fraud or exploitation, in order to safeguard personal rights and assist security authorities in apprehending suspects and taking the necessary legal measures against them.

Fugitive facing 90 years jail in drug trafficking case held

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 9: The Criminal Investigation Department officers apprehended a man wanted by law for evading a total of 90 years in prison sentences, reports Al-Anba daily.

According to a security source, all the cases filed against the man are related to the possession and trafficking of narcotics. The source indicated that the wanted man had been on the run since 2013.

The source stated that the detectives received information about the suspect's whereabouts — at the house of his friend in Zahraa.

A team from the Criminal Investigations Department immediately arrested the fugitive. He was transferred to the Central Prison after being interrogated regarding his whereabouts and the individuals who provided him safe haven during his more than 10 years in hiding.

Drugs found on expat: A chance discovery of four bags of crystal meth in the possession of an expatriate — led to the seizure of a quarter kilogram of crystal meth and

heroin in Farwaniya, reports Al-Anba daily.

A security source said that a patrol from the Farwaniya Support Unit stopped an expatriate on suspicion during a routine security patrol and found four bags of crystal meth in his possession.

The source confirmed that the suspect was referred to the Drug Control General Department for questioning.

During interrogation, he confessed to possessing narcotics at his residence and drug trafficking. After obtaining a warrant, a search was carried out at his residence in Farwaniya, which resulted in the seizure of a quarter kilogram of crystal meth, along with an undisclosed quantity of heroin.

The source stated that the drugs were confiscated and that all necessary legal measures were taken against the suspect who, along with the seized items, were referred to the competent authorities to complete the investigation procedures.

He added that this seizure is part of intensified security efforts to track down drug dealers and promoters and to firmly deal with anyone who attempts to threaten the security and safety of society.

Ex-KFA head knifed by duo in Mayfair murder attempt

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 9: Former President of Al-Qadsia Club and Kuwait Football Association Fawaz Al-Hasawi was stabbed at his residence in Central London recently. Mainstream and social media reports indicate that two unidentified individuals broke into the Mayfair home of Al-Hasawi early morning on Monday. Armed with knives, the suspects entered his bedroom with the intent to kill him.

Al-Hasawi resisted and struggled with the assailants, who then fled the scene, abandoning their weapons. He was transported to the nearest hospital.

Security authorities have initiated an investigation into the attack, including a review of CCTV footages from the houses and surrounding streets.

While his condition is reported as stable, Al-Hasawi sustained multiple stab wounds in both hands, a neck wound and facial abrasions.

His lawyer, Attorney Khawla Mubarak Al-Hasawi, provided an update on his condition. She posted on the 'X' platform, "Given the many inquiries about my brother Fawaz's condition following the incident, I want to reassure everyone who asked about him."

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Trio nabbed for illegal fishing and assault bid

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 9, (KUNA): Kuwait's Ministry of Interior, through the Coast Guard, announced on Monday the arrest of three individuals for engaging in illegal fishing using an unauthorized boat and attempting to run over a security officer.

According to an official statement, the incident occurred during a routine maritime patrol when the Coast Guard spotted a boat violating fishing regulations. The boat's captain failed to comply with orders to stop and tried to flee. Pursued to the shore, the suspects attempted to escape in a vehicle, during which one of them tried to run over a Coast Guard officer.

Authorities managed to apprehend them without any injuries to the security personnel.

The three suspects include one Kuwaiti citizen and two illegal residents, all with prior criminal records. The boat was not registered for fishing.

Following legal procedures, the Coast Guard seized and destroyed the vessel and referred the suspects to the competent authorities for prosecution.

The Interior Ministry emphasized that anyone attempting to break the law or threaten the safety of security personnel will face strict consequences, reaffirming its commitment to maintaining security and safety in Kuwait's territorial waters.

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 9: The Ministry of Health, represented by the Nuclear Medicine Departments Council, organized an international workshop entitled, "Latest Developments in Nuclear Medicine and Molecular Imaging for the Diagnosis of Neurological Diseases."

The workshop, held under the patronage of Minister of Health Dr. Ahmed Al-Awadi, witnessed the participation of several experts and specialists from around the world to discuss the latest diagnostic advancements in neurological diseases.

In a press statement, Dr. Abdul Redha Ismail, Head of the Nuclear Medicine Departments Council, highlighted the diagnostic applications for neurological diseases in Kuwait.

He also unveiled the plan to introduce specialized radioactive materials for diagnosing Alzheimer's disease using molecular imaging in the near future. He said this development coincides with the availability of modern treatments, and that the official announcement of the introduction of this technology will be made as soon as the necessary requirements are met.

He added that this year's workshop focused on neurological diseases, including epilepsy and the identification of epileptic foci in preparation for surgical intervention, as well as age-related dementia and brain tumors.

He affirmed that the diagnosis rates for these diseases in Kuwait are within the global average, indicating that the workshop is in line with the commitment of the ministry to support continuing medical education and enhancing the integration of advanced scientific knowledge and its applications, which contribute to developing the medical diagnostic system and, consequently, the quality of healthcare.

He disclosed that the field of nuclear medicine and molecular imaging has been witness-

al scientific developments.

He revealed that the first topic addressed movement disorders and epilepsy, reviewing the role of imaging techniques in supporting diagnosis and assisting in assessing the patient's condition. The second topic is on memory disorders and dementia, highlighting the importance of early diagnosis and the role of modern technologies in identifying and monitoring these diseases. The third and fourth topics are on tumors of the nervous system, the role of imaging in diagnosing tumors, assessing their spread and helping to monitor the disease after treatment, and developments in the field of nuclear medicine and molecular imaging, such as the role of artificial intelligence, and the use of the latest radioactive materials in diagnosing nervous system diseases.

Inventors showcase cutting-edge solutions

Kuwaiti engineers shine at ME Expo

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 9: On the sidelines of the 16th International Invention Fair in the Middle East, held under the patronage of His Highness the Crown Prince Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Sabah, the newspaper interviewed several inventors who presented outstanding innovations that reflect the extent of scientific ambition and the diversity of creative fields.

In an interview with four Kuwaiti female engineers who presented an invention related to road pavement, Eng. Zainab Bin Haider pointed out that the presence of several potholes on the roads in the country was the primary motivation behind the idea. She explained that she and her colleagues -- engineers Safa Karam, Sheikha Al-Khalfan and Rabab Abdullah -- conducted a series of research studies based on conventional road repair methods, in cooperation with the Ministry of Public Works, which provided the necessary support and facilities.

Meanwhile, Al-Khalfan explained that the device integrates all pothole repair stages into a single unit, begin-

ning with cleaning the pothole and ending with pouring the filling material, while maintaining pressure balance throughout the process.

She said the device relies on cold asphalt, which is characterized by its fast-drying time, thereby, reducing implementation period by half.

In another section of the exhibition, the newspaper interviewed Kuwaiti engineers Mohammad Al-Dhibyan and Khaled Ahmed Al-Jumah, who presented a project on using artificial intelligence to control oil wells and address the problem of blowouts.

Al-Dhibyan disclosed that the program is based on analyzing vast quantities of data from previous oil wells, including wells that experienced blowouts and others that did not. He stated that artificial intelligence can predict risks and offer faster and more accurate solutions, contributing to the reduction of economic, environmental and human losses.

The exhibition also witnessed the distinguished participation of female inventors from Tajikistan. Tajik Ambassador to Kuwait Zubaydullo Zubaydov stated that this group of inventors has obtained the highest international

certifications.

In this context, Dean of the Faculty of Medicine in the Tajik capital Prof. Parvina Alizoda revealed that one of her innovations enables doctors to review a patient's health condition prior to the appointment through an electronic system based on precise examinations and a 10-day follow-up period.

Prof. Samira Repeka presented an herbal treatment for liver diseases, stressing that it has no side effects and has been proven effective in treating jaundice within six months.

Prof. Madina Krifa showcased several innovations in the treatment of fractures, for which she obtained international patents, in addition to her expertise as a prominent orthopedic surgeon.

Moreover, Prof. Mukhlis Abdul Rahman from Bangladesh presented an innovation consisting of bags made from ultra-durable fabrics that have been tested and proven resistant to various elements.

The interview concluded with scholarship student Nurullah, who introduced a surgical clip designed to stabilize and lift the uterus and its appendages.

their audible and visual warning devices are activated, without obstruction or delay."

It indicated that the procedures for yielding the right-of-way begin with immediate reduction of speed, gradually moving to the right side of the road, and then stopping on the side of the road if necessary.

Kuwait, Malta

From the business perspective, Ambassador Said-Zammit referred that, during his tenure of office in Kuwait, a number of Maltese companies managed to penetrate successfully the Kuwaiti market, following rigorous quality assurance tests. He also mentioned that there is also interest in certain Kuwaiti companies in expanding part of their operations in his country. These business opportunities came partly as result of a webinar that the Embassy of Malta coordinated with the Kuwait Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Malta Chamber of Commerce and Industry, and other related agencies and entities whose mission is to boost trade and business between the two countries.

These positive opportunities of collaboration have to be contextualised in the light of Kuwait's continuous efforts to diversify its economy and modernize its infrastructure, adding that the investment environment in this country provides promising opportunities for European investors, especially in the fields of renewable energy, blue economy, and logistics services.

In 2024, Malta imported goods from Kuwait worth €20,645, while exporting €3,221,986 to Kuwait. Main imports of goods were articles of apparel and clothing accessories, footwear, and leather goods. Main exports of goods were cereals, edible preparations, and essential oils. Inroads on education have been made again to attract Kuwaiti students to study at the University of Malta, mostly in medicine. There were also a good number of private Kuwaiti investor and corporate holder accounts that at some point held investments in securities listed on the Malta Stock Exchange.

As far as direct connections between Malta and Kuwait, the two countries are working towards the possibility of establishing direct flights, thus eliminating the waste of precious time that travellers currently have to spend in transition airports. Both countries strongly believe that the development of direct routes will facilitate and boost tourism, business, and trade. In 2025, the Ambassador of Malta, in collaboration with the Malta Tourism Authority, will then find that it has recovered its debts, perhaps, even with a surplus.

Clear way

Al-Sumait highlights capacity-building and legal compliance

Kuwait reaffirms commitment to IHL awareness

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 9, (KUNA): Kuwait's Minister of Justice and Chairman of the National Permanent Committee for International Humanitarian Law, Counselor Nasser Al-Sumait, underscored the country's commitment to building national capacities and strengthening awareness and understanding of International Humanitarian Law (IHL).

This came in a speech delivered on his behalf by Acting Undersecretary of the Ministry of Justice, Awatif Al-Sand, during the launch of a special discussion forum organized by the Kuwait Institute for Judicial and Legal Studies. The three-day forum targets leaders

from various executive and judicial government bodies and is held in cooperation with the National Permanent Committee for International Humanitarian Law.

The national committee, in collaboration with relevant partners, has been keen to enhance compliance with the provisions of IHL in line with Kuwait's obligations arising from its accession to the 1949 Geneva

Conventions, the 1977 Additional Protocols, and other international legal instruments and charters, the minister added.

He noted that, under its founding mandate, the committee is responsible for coordinating efforts among concerned government entities, participating in national, regional and international events, and contributing to the drafting and review of relevant national legislation.

Al-Sumait said that the committee works to build national capacities through seminars, discussion forums, training and educational programs, reflecting Kuwait's commitment to the principles of international law and their institutional

and legislative consolidation.

In turn, Director of the Kuwait Institute for Judicial and Legal Studies, First Advocate General Counselor Bader Al-Massad, noted the forum is an extension of the institute's ongoing efforts to promote and entrench the culture of IHL and raise awareness of its importance in safeguarding human dignity.

Al-Massad affirmed the institute's belief that effective application of IHL rules can only be achieved through deepening legal awareness and expanding the circle of beneficiaries, noting that the institute has issued numerous specialized publications addressing various aspects of IHL.

Kuwait witnesses record surge in energy projects

KAPP-backed partnerships fuel growth

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 9: Minister of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy Dr. Subaib Al-Mukhaizeem confirmed the unprecedented surge in the project proposals of the ministry -- the most extensive since the establishment of Kuwait Authority for Partnership Projects (KAPP).

Al-Mukhaizeem made the statement at the inauguration of the National Day and Liberation Day celebrations of the ministry on Monday.

He stressed the need to move beyond the current phase until all projects are completed, expressing his optimism that the commissioning of power plants will lead to increased production. He said the last major project implemented in partnership with the private sector was the North Zour Power Plant-Phase One, signed in 2013, indicating that phases two and three, with a capacity equivalent to 150 percent of Phase One, were signed last week.

He revealed there are three projects currently under consideration -- Khairan Power Plant with a capacity of 1,800 megawatts, and Shagaya Zones One and Two, totaling 1,600 megawatts. He expects these projects to be finalized within the next two months, while mentioning the collaboration with a State-owned company in the

People's Republic of China, with a production capacity of 3,200 megawatts, in addition to the Nuwaiseeb power plant project, which is expected to be the largest in the history of Kuwait. He affirmed that KAPP already approved this project.

He explained that electricity and water projects require tremendous efforts and years of work before becoming operational, emphasizing that the most important step is to start, especially since three additional projects are expected to be launched this year.

Regarding the National Day and Liberation Day celebrations, Al-Mukhaizeem said the occasion is a special national holiday, in which all sectors of the ministry participate.

The events include highlighting the achievements of the ministry's engineers, along with a historical exhibition showcasing the evolution of equipment and technologies used over the decades, emphasizing the vital role of the ministry in providing essential services, which its staff works hard to deliver round the clock.

Meanwhile, Undersecretary of the ministry Dr. Adel Al-Zamil revealed that a study is underway to transform the ministry into an institution within a comprehensive legislative framework that aligns with best global practices.

He added that a review of electricity and water consumption tariffs is being conducted, taking into account low-income households. He expects both studies to be completed this year.

How long

In Kuwait, however, there is a flawed approach to problem-solving: the saying, "Do not worry, time heals all wounds."

In reality, this only exacerbates the problem. If the 'Manakh Market' crash had been addressed promptly, perhaps, by liquidating the assets of those indebted, the situation would have been different. Those who died in despair would at least have been spared the daily suffering they endured.

The good thing is that these debts were not inherited, otherwise, the children and grandchildren would have faced travel bans, asset seizures, and an inflated debt management apparatus.

Furthermore, the value of the assets back then would have far exceeded the debt, and the State would have saved public funds.

Today, this crisis has become a dilemma, but it remains solvable if there is a genuine will to reduce the budget deficit that has plagued the country for three decades.

Therefore, Your Highness, it is true that the future does not wait for the hesitant, for hesitation is the graveyard of opportunities.

The solution to this historic crisis is within the grasp of the current Cabinet, which must enact a law addressing the repercussions of the 'Manakh Market' crash.

This will pave the way for resolving many financial problems for some individuals and will eliminate the biggest problem, or rather, the most significant interest on bad debts.

It is unreasonable for the penalty to be 15 percent of the debt if the borrower defaults on any single payment.

Finally, and most importantly, liquidate the assets of these individuals and abolish the punitive interest of 15 percent.

their audible and visual warning devices are activated, without obstruction or delay."

Kuwait, Malta

In this context, he referred to the various agreements that the University of Malta and the Malta College for Arts, Science and Technology signed in recent years not only with the Kuwait University, but also with respectable private universities, including the American University of Kuwait, the Arab Open University, and the Kuwait College for Science and Technology. He sees that educational opportunities for students from both countries will lead to a better understanding of each other's culture and identity.

From a cultural perspective, Ambassador Said-Zammit mentioned the cultural similarities that exist between Malta and Kuwait, especially in language, place names, family names, and cuisine. Historically, one has to keep in mind that, in the ninth century of our Common Era, the Maltese Islands came to form an integral part of the Dar al-Islam along with Spain, Sicily, and North Africa. When about four hundred years later the Maltese Islands were occupied by the Spanish, the local culture in Malta remained largely semitic. Today, the semitic element in Maltese culture is still an inherent component of our national identity. The Maltese language is basically semitic, and about 60% of its vocabulary, for example the numbers and the days of the week, are exactly like Arabic. The rest of the language is made up of a mixture of Italian, French, Spanish and English vocabulary reflecting, in a way, Malta's historical past when it was colonized by different dominions like the Knights of St. John, the French, and the British. Therefore, Maltese is the only semitic language in the world written in the Latin alphabet. This unique distinction has made Maltese one of the official languages of the European Union since 2003. Here, he referred to an exhibition

organized in December 2025 by the Embassy of Malta, the National Archives of Malta, and the Kuwait College for Science and Technology. This exhibition selected a number of common themes which testify to the similarities and close ties between Kuwait and Malta. These included the language, folklore, the sea, migration, and colonization.

At the end of his statement, the Ambassador of Malta to Kuwait expressed his aspiration to a new stage of joint cooperation, based on the launch of practical initiatives that enhance bilateral partnership and open up wider horizons for cooperation between the State of Kuwait and the Republic of Malta, in order to serve the interests of the two countries and enhance their presence in the international arena.

'It is been too long, I am desperate'

Migrants languish in US detention centers amid dire conditions and prolonged waits

MIAMI, Feb 9, (AP): Felipe Hernandez Espinosa spent 45 days at "Alligator Alcatraz," an immigration holding center in Florida where detainees have reported worms in their food, toilets that don't flush and overflowing sewage. Mosquitoes and other insects are everywhere.

For the past five months, the 34-year-old asylum-seeker has been at an immigration detention camp at the Fort Bliss Army base in El Paso, Texas, where two migrants died in January and which has many of the same conditions, according to human rights groups. Hernandez said he asked to be returned to Nicaragua but was told he has to see a judge. After nearly seven months in detention, his hearing was scheduled for Feb 26.

Prolonged detention has become more common in President Donald Trump's second term, at least partly because a new policy generally prohibits immigration judges from releasing detainees while their deportation cases wind through backlogged courts. Many, like Hernandez, are prepared to give up any efforts to stay in the Unit-

ed States.

"I came to this country thinking they would help me, and I've been detained for six months without having committed a crime," he said in a phone interview from Fort Bliss. "It is been too long. I am desperate."

The Supreme Court ruled in 2001 that Immigration and Customs Enforcement cannot hold immigrants indefinitely, finding that six months was a reasonable cap.

With the number of people in ICE detention topping 70,000 for the first time, 7,252 people had been in custody at least six months in mid-January, including 79 held for more than two years, according to agency data. That's more than double the 2,849 who were in ICE custody at least six months in December 2024, the last full month of Joe Biden's presidency.

The Trump administration is offering plane fare and \$2,600 for people who leave the country voluntarily. Yet Hernandez and others are told they can't leave detention until seeing a judge.

The first three detainees that attorney Ana Alicia Huerta met on her

monthly trip to an ICE detention center in McFarland, California, to offer free legal advice in January said they signed a form agreeing to leave the

United States but were still waiting.

"All are telling me: 'I don't understand why I'm here. I'm ready to be deported,'" said Huerta, a senior attorney

at the California Collaborative for Immigrant Justice. "That's an experience that I've never had before."

A Chinese man has been held for more than a year without seeing an immigration judge, even though he told authorities he was ready to be deported. In the past, Huerta said, she encountered cases like this once every three or four months.

The Department of Homeland Security did not address questions from The Associated Press about why more people are being held longer than six months.

"The conditions are so poor and so bad that people say, 'I'm going to give up,'" said Sui Cheng, executive director at Americans for Immigrant Justice.

The waiting time may depend on the country. Deportations to Mexico are routine but countries including Cuba, Nicaragua, Colombia and Venezuela have at times resisted accepting deportees.

Among those detained for months are people who have won protection under the United Nations Convention Against Torture, who cannot be de-

ported to their home country but may be sent elsewhere.

In the past, those migrants were released and could get a work permit. Not anymore, said Sarah Houston, managing attorney at Immigrant Defenders Law Center, who has at least three clients with protection under the U.N. torture convention who have been in custody for more than six months. One is from El Salvador, detained for three years. He won his case in October 2025 but is still in custody in California.

"They're just holding these people indefinitely," said Houston, noting that every 90 days, attorneys request the release of these migrants and ICE denies those requests. "We're seeing people who actually win their immigration cases just languishing in jail."

Hernandez, who doesn't have a lawyer, said he signed documents requesting to be returned to his country or Mexico at least five times. An Oct. 9 hearing was abruptly canceled without explanation. He waited months with no news, until early February, when he learned his new hearing date.

Moderate candidate wins big in Portugal's presidential runoff

LISBON, Portugal, Feb 9, (AP): Center-left Socialist candidate António José Seguro recorded a thumping victory over hard-right populist André Ventura in Portugal's runoff presidential election Sunday, according to official results with 99% of votes counted.

Seguro won a five-year term in Lisbon's riverside "pink palace" with 66.7% of votes, compared with 33.3% for Ventura.

The ballot was an opportunity to test the depth of support for Ventura's brash style, which has struck a chord with voters and helped make his Chega (Enough) party the second-biggest in the Portuguese parliament, as well as gauge the public appetite for Europe's increasing shift to the right in recent years.

European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen congratulated Seguro and said on social media that "Portugal's voice for our shared European values remains strong."

Seguro, a longstanding Socialist politician, positioned himself as a moderate candidate who will cooperate with Portugal's center-right minority government, repudiating Ventura's anti-establishment and anti-immigrant tirades.

He won the backing of other mainstream politicians on the left and right who want to halt the rising populist tide.

In Portugal, the president is largely a figurehead with no executive power. Traditionally, the head of state stands above the political fray, mediating disputes and defusing tensions.

However, the president is an influential voice and possesses some powerful tools, being able to veto legislation from parliament, although the veto can be overturned. The head of state also possesses what in Portuguese political jargon

is called an "atomic bomb," the power to dissolve parliament and call early elections.

In May, Portugal held its third general election in three years in the country's worst bout of political instability for decades, and steady the ship is a key challenge for the next president.

Ventura, an eloquent and theatrical politician, rejected political accommodation in favor of a more combative stance.

Thailand's ruling Bhumjaithai Party of Anutin tops election

BANGKOK, Feb 9, (Agencies): The Bhumjaithai Party of Prime Minister Anutin Charnvirakul is on track to win the most seats in Thailand's general election, according to unofficial results released by the state Election Commission after about 94% of polling stations had reported Monday.

It's the first decisive victory of a conservative party in Thailand in years. Sunday's election came against a backdrop of slow economic growth and heightened nationalist sentiment. Voter turnout stood at around 65%, significantly lower than in the 2023 election.

The commission's running count, shown on its website, indicated that Bhumjaithai won about 193 seats in the 500-member House of Representatives.

The House comprises 400 lawmakers directly elected based on constituencies, while 100 others are chosen from "party list" nominees, who gain seats according to each party's proportional share of the vote on a separate ballot indicating party preference.

A simple majority of 251 seats is needed for the body to elect a prime minister. The figures indicate Bhumjaithai will have to seek one or two partners to form a coalition govern-

ment with Anutin returning as its head.

The progressive People's Party, which had been tipped to win the most seats, was holding down second place with 118 seats. It swept all constituencies in Bangkok and a majority in the capital's neighboring provinces. The party also took a lead in the party list totals, taking about 3.8 million more

votes on party list ballots than Bhumjaithai.

Phu Thai, the populist party representing the political machine of former Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra, trailed behind with 74 seats. It's considered a disappointing result for a political force that has often dominated Thai elections.

It's widely believed that Phu Thai will accept, if asked, to join a coalition government led by Bhumjaithai.

Anutin has been prime minister since last September, after serving in the Cabinet of his immediate predecessor, Paetongtarn Shinawatra, who was forced out of office for an ethics violation regarding mishandling relations with Cambodia. Anutin dissolved Parliament in December to call a new election after he was threatened with a no-confidence vote.

Subsequent border clashes with Cambodia allowed Anutin to recast himself as a wartime leader after his popularity initially slipped because of floods and financial scandals. His campaign focused on national security and economic stimulus.

BANGKOK: A large dome roof structure under construction in Thailand's Samut Prakan province collapsed on Monday at noon, injuring four people, according to Thai media reports.

Thai national daily Matichon reported that the building is located within a training center operated by the Metropolitan Electricity Authority. The authorities are currently investigating the cause of the collapse.

TOKYO, Feb 9, (AP): Japanese Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi's gamble that her personal popularity would lead to big election gains for her struggling party paid off hugely.

On Monday, she began the process of translating that new power,

sweeping conservative legislation that will shift Japanese security, immigration, economic and social policies.

The first steps include reappointing her Cabinet and pushing forward on a delayed budget and the votes next week that will re-elect her as prime minister.

Takaichi, in an interview with public television network NHK

following her victory, said her efforts will make Japan strong and prosperous.

NHK, citing vote count results, said Takaichi's Liberal Democratic Party, or LDP, alone secured 316 seats by early Monday, comfortably surpassing a 261-seat absolute majority in the 465-member lower house, the more powerful of Japan's two-chamber parliament. That is a record since the party's foundation in 1955. With the 36 seats won by its new ally, Japan Innovation Party, the ruling coalition won 352 seats.

A smiling Takaichi placed a big red ribbon above each winner's name on a signboard at LDP headquarters as accompanying party executives applauded.

Despite the lack of a majority in the upper house, the huge jump from the preelection share in the more powerful lower house allows Takaichi to make progress on policies that aim to boost Japan's economy and military capabilities as tensions grow with China and she tries to nurture ties with the United States.

Top leader visits national defence ministry to mark Army Founding Day

Kim expected to issue major policy goals at N.Korea party congress in late February

SEOUL, South Korea, Feb 9, (Agencies): North Korea will convene a major political conference later this month, the country's state media said Sunday, where leader Kim Jong Un is expected to outline his domestic and foreign policies for the next five years.

The ruling Workers' Party congress, which Kim previously held in 2016 and 2021, comes after years of accelerated nuclear and missile development and deepening ties with Moscow over the war in Ukraine that have increased his standoffs with the United States and South Korea.

North Korea's official Korean Central News Agency said the party's political bureau met under Kim's supervision and decided the congress would be held in late February. State media did not immediately specify a date or release agenda details.

The congress will likely continue for days as a highly choreographed display of Kim's authoritarian leadership. In recent weeks, Kim has in-

spected weapons tests and toured military sites and economic projects as state media highlighted his purported achievements, crediting his "immortal leadership" with strengthening the country's military capabilities and advancing national development.

His recent activities and comments suggest Kim will use the congress to double down on economic development through "self-sustenance" and mass mobilization while announcing plans to further expand the capabilities of his nuclear-armed military, including upgrading conventional weapons systems and integrating them with nuclear forces.

Kim also could highlight his increasingly assertive foreign policy based on closer ties with Moscow and Beijing while hardening an adversarial approach toward rival South Korea as he continues to embrace the idea of a "new Cold War," experts say.

Kim's willingness to resume diplomacy with the US is unclear. Relations derailed in 2019 after his second summit with US President Donald

Trump due to disagreements over sanctions against his nuclear weapons program.

Kim has rejected Trump's overtures for dialogue since the US president began his second term in January

2025. Kim insists Washington abandon demands for the North to surrender its nuclear weapons as a precondition for future talks.

Entering his 15th year in rule, Kim finds himself in a stronger position than when he opened the previous congress in 2021 during the shock of the COVID-19 pandemic. Navigating what was seen as his toughest stretch in a decade of power, Kim acknowledged his previous economic policies failed and issued a new five-year development plan through 2025.

He called for accelerated development of his nuclear arsenal and issued an extensive wish list of sophisticated assets including solid-fuel intercontinental ballistic missiles, multi-warhead systems, tactical nuclear weapons, spy satellites and nuclear-powered submarines.

Kim has exploited geopolitical turmoil to his advantage. He used Russia's invasion of Ukraine as a window to accelerate weapons testing and align himself with Russian President Vladimir Putin, who has accepted thousands of North Korean troops and large quantities of military equipment for the war.

Kim also has pursued closer ties with China, traditionally the North's primary ally and economic lifeline.

He traveled to Beijing in September for a World War II event and the first summit with Chinese President Xi Jinping in six years.


While Kim's strict information blockade prevents precise assessments, South Korean analysts say the North's economy appears to have improved over the past five years, possibly due to a gradual recovery in trade with China and an industrial boost from arms exports to Russia.

Kim visited the Ministry of National Defence on Sunday on the occasion of the 78th founding anniversary of the Korean People's Army, the official Korean Central News Agency (KCNA) reported Monday.

In his speech, Kim extended congratulations and greetings to all officers and soldiers, and encouragement to overseas special operations units, the KCNA report said.

As indicated by the Ninth Congress of the Party, the coming five years will be a period in which "the army's outstanding role will become further enhanced," Kim said.

Nicaragua govt blocks key pathway used by Cuban migrants to reach US

rules in Nicaragua would put up extreme new barriers for Cuban migrants who hope to reach the US in the future.

What remains is primarily Guyana, a small South American nation where Cubans have also traveled to in order to reach the US. From Guyana, Cuban migrants normally travel through the perilous jungled trenches of the Darien Gap dividing Colombia and Panama before winding their way up through the Americas.

In the past, migrants with few other options have also taken precarious boat rides from Cuba to Florida's coast.

Meanwhile, the Mexican government on Sunday dispatched two navy vessels carrying more than 800 tons of food supplies as humanitarian assistance to Cuba, the Secretariat of Foreign Affairs said in a statement.

The statement said the ships departed from the eastern port of Veracruz and are expected to arrive in four days. One ship is transporting staples and personal hygiene products, and the other is loaded with powdered milk.

Mexico's President Claudia Sheinbaum on Friday pledged that her government will send humanitarian aid, including food and other basic supplies, to Cuba.

Sheinbaum also said that efforts are being made "to resume oil shipments to Cuba," after Mexico halted crude and refined products shipments to the island in mid-January.

As the Trump administration carries out a contentious migratory crackdown and largely eliminated access to asylum along the southern border, migration to the US has hit record lows, but the new

Storm Marta kills at least 4 in Morocco as country battles floods

Flash floods caused by a storm in northern Morocco killed at least four people as the country struggled with days of heavy rain and water releases from overfilled dams that forced mass evacuations, local authorities said Sunday.

Three children - a girl and two boys aged 2 to 14 - and a man in his 30s died in a car that was swept

away in a village near Tétouan, about 270 kilometers (168 miles) north of the capital Rabat, according to a statement from the Interior Ministry citing local authorities. Another person remains missing.

Local authorities said they will open an investigation into what happened.

The flash floods were caused by

a storm system known as Marta, which moved into Morocco over the weekend and dumped up to 92 millimeters (3.6 inches) of rain on some northern cities. Houssine Youabed of Morocco's General Directorate of Meteorology told The Associated Press. Storm Marta also reached neighboring Spain and Portugal. (AP)

Police said efforts are ongoing to trace the remaining fugitives and recover additional assets linked to criminal activities overseas. (Xinhua)

Afghanistan highway collision kills 3: At least three people were killed and three others injured in a traffic accident on the Jalalabad-Torkham highway on Sunday evening, according to a statement from the Nangarhar provincial police office.

The collision occurred in the Samarkhail area when a passenger vehicle collided with a tanker on the highway linking Jalalabad, capital of eastern Nangarhar province, to the Torkham border crossing point. The crash resulted in three fatalities at the spot and left three others wounded, said the statement.

Nigeria truck crash kills 30

KANO, Nigeria, Feb 9, (AP): A truck carrying passengers crashed in northern Nigeria because of reckless driving, killing at least 30 people and injuring several others, authorities said Sunday.

The trailer was driving along a highway in Kwanar Barde town in Kano's Gezawa local government area when it lost control, according to a statement from the Kano governor's office.

Road accidents are frequent in Africa's most populous country, in part due to poor road conditions and lax enforcement of traffic laws.

The truck involved in the latest accident was carrying some passengers and goods towards Gujungu town in Kano when it crashed early Sunday morning.

Those injured, many of them with serious injuries, are receiving medical care in different hospitals, according to the statement issued by Sunusi Bature Dawakin Tofa, spokesman for Kano Gov Abba Kabir Yusuf.

LONDON: Nigeria's president is set to make a state visit to the U.K. in March, the first such trip by a Nigerian leader in almost four decades, Britain's Buckingham Palace said Sunday.

Officials said President Bola Tinubu and first lady Oluremi Tinubu will travel to the UK on March 18 and 19.

Kuwait's stock market closes lower

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 9, (KUNA): The Boursa Kuwait ended Monday's trading session on a negative note, with the general index slipping 20.56 points, or 0.23 percent, to close at 8,735.53 points.

Trading activity was moderate, with a total of 232.7 million shares exchanged in 16,748 trans-

actions, generating a turnover of KD 67.6 million (around USD 206.18 million).

The main market index recorded a sharper drop of 33.42 points, or 0.41 percent, settling at 8,156.15 points. It saw 111.1 million shares traded through 7,167 deals, totaling KD 18.7 million (approximately USD 57 million).

Real estate transactions increase 68% in early Feb

Nursery real estate sector surges

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 9: Despite a slight quantitative decline of 1.2 percent (two transactions) year on year, the value of real estate transactions in the local market increased tremendously in the first week of February, rising by 68.2 percent (KD94.3 million) -- 158 transactions valued at KD232.4 million, compared to 160 transactions worth KD138.1 million in the first week of February 2025.

The newspaper obtained a copy of the weekly statistical report from the Real Estate Registration and Documentation Departments at the Ministry of Justice, indicating that the nursery real estate market experienced an unparalleled upswing from Feb 1-5, with 21 transactions worth KD 79.28 million.

This contrasts sharply with the complete absence of transactions during the entire year of 2025. It shows a sudden

resurgence in a sector that had been dormant for extended periods due to recent regulatory decisions concerning land use in industrial and agricultural areas, construction regulations in agricultural zones, the determination of permissible development ratios, and stricter oversight of illegal land use in the country. As usual, residential real estate accounted for the largest share of transactions, with 77 deals totaling KD 32.7 million, compared to 110 deals worth KD 51.1 million in the first week of February last year.

This is a decrease of 30 percent in quantity and 36 percent in quality -- a difference of 33 deals worth KD 18.4 million.

Despite a relative increase of 11 percent in the number of investment real estate transactions this week, with 48 deals totaling KD39.0 million compared to 43 deals worth KD68.7 million last year, the significant decrease in transaction value of 41.4 percent (KD 28.74 million) reflects the completion of small to medium transactions.

In contrast, the commercial sector witnessed a significant surge during the first week of February, recording 12 deals worth KD80.48 million. This is an increase of more 638 percent in both quantity and value, compared to the single transaction worth KD10.9 million recorded in the first week of February last year.

NBK Egypt provides \$115 million financing for Safaga Terminal project

CAIRO, Feb 9: Reinforcing its leadership in advancing Egypt's sustainable economic development agenda, National Bank of Kuwait – Egypt (NBK – Egypt) continues to strengthen its role as a leading financial partner in the financing of strategic national projects. The financing has secured all required approvals, and financial close is expected during the first quarter of 2024.

Egypt's Economic Growth

He added that port development and logistics infrastructure projects constitute a key driver of economic growth due to their direct impact on stimulating foreign trade activity, enhancing the competitiveness of the Egyptian economy, and creating sustainable employment opportunities. Ports in particular represent one of the most critical components of such projects, given their contribution to expanding external trade flows and supporting the state's plans to maximize the benefits of Egypt's unique geographic location as one of the most important logistics hubs along the Red Sea.

International institutions signal improved outlook for economy

'Kuwait transitioning from stability to growth'

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 9, (KUNA): Progress achieved in financial reform programs and clarity of Kuwait's economic vision have positively reflected on Kuwait's economic ratings by leading global financial institutions and rating agencies.

The ratings, starting with the international Bretton Woods institutions, passing through international credit rating agencies, and extending to reports by the Financial Action Task Force (FATF), the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the World Bank, boosted confidence in the economy.

This collective progress contributes to reshaping the international perception of the Kuwaiti economy - not merely as an asset-rich economy, but as one that is gradually moving toward more efficient and sustainable resource management.

Economists, in separate statements to Kuwait News Agency (KUNA), said specialized international ratings and assessments reflect a tangible improvement in the performance of the Kuwaiti economy and confirm that it is proceeding along a sound economic path.

The experts explained that Kuwait's economy was currently undergoing a transition from managing stability to managing growth in the coming phase, which requires shifting from maintaining short-term stability to creating sustainable growth drivers by empowering the private sector, stimulating high-quality investment and developing labor market.

Chairman of the Board of the Union of Investment Companies, Abdulla Al-Turkait, said positive indicators issued by specialized international institutions, like IMF and World Bank, reflect a tangible improvement in Kuwait's economic performance and confirm it was on a path of gradual recovery and more balanced growth.

This, he said, reflected soundness of economic policies and the state's ability to manage challenges.

Al-Turkait added that recent international reports indicate how the positive shift in how international institutions view Kuwait's economy reflects a high level of confidence in reforms, as well as the Kuwaiti economy's ability to adapt to regional and global changes, particularly amid volatility related to energy markets.

He stated IMF expects Kuwait's economy to return to a growth trajectory in 2025, recording real growth of 2.6 percent, with continued improvement in 2026 driven by recovery of economic activity and increased contribution from non-oil sectors.

The World Bank, meanwhile, expected sustained growth of around 2.2 percent in 2025 and 2.7 percent in 2026.

Al-Turkait noted that the improvement in economic indicators reflects the continuity of Kuwait's reform efforts to improve the investment climate, simplify procedures, and develop the legislative and regulatory environment, thereby enhancing long-term economy's competitive attractiveness.

He added that these reports were based on an objective reading of several factors, most notably improved financial stability and the adoption of a balanced monetary policy that supports growth without leading to significant inflation increases.

IMF estimates inflation would decline to 2.3 percent in 2025, compared to about 2.9 percent in 2024.

Al-Turkait explained that Kuwait's international credit ratings continued to improve and remain stable over the past year, reflecting strength of its financial position and external standing.

He pointed out that Standard & Poor's raised Kuwait's sovereign rating in November 2025 to "AA-" with a stable outlook, based on progress in financial reforms and the enactment of legislation supporting financial sustainability - most notably the financing and liquidity law along with efforts to diversify non-oil revenue sources.

He emphasized that this improvement and stability in credit ratings directly reduce the cost of sovereign and corporate financing, enhance international investor confidence and improve Kuwait's ability to lure foreign direct investment (FDI), thereby supporting sustainable economic growth over the medium and long term.

On the domestic level, he said these positive indicators directly enhance investor confidence, help accelerate development projects, improve the business environment and support the private sector.

He noted that FDI inflows into Kuwait increased by eight percent year-on-year, reaching 223 million Kuwaiti dinars (approximately USD 725 million) during the 2024-25 fiscal year, reflecting the attraction of foreign capital across various sectors, particularly in light of investment-friendly reforms.

Al-Turkait considered that the key factors driving international institutions to present a positive picture of Kuwait's economy include progress in financial reform programs, clarity of economic vision, increased focus on diversifying income sources, reducing reliance on oil and strengthening the role of the private sector in economic development.

For his part, Secretary-General of the Kuwaiti Economic Society, Mohammad Al-Jouan, affirmed international institutions' positive indicators were not based on impressions, but rigorous quantitative models and analyses of financial, monetary and structural trends.

Their positive stance toward Kuwait, he said, reflects recognition of the Kuwaiti economy's ability to absorb shocks and maintain stability in a highly volatile global environment.

Al-Jouan explained that the impact of these indicators goes beyond media coverage and directly affects investor behavior, sovereign financing costs, and confidence of international financial institutions.

In practical terms, these assessments enhance Kuwait's investment appeal to long-term institutional investors, support fair pricing of sovereign risk in debt and financing instruments and give policymakers greater room to maneuver economically without immediate market pressure.

Al-Jouan stated that the key factors contributing to the improved outlook of international institutions toward Kuwait's economy can be summarized in six interrelated pillars.

The first was improved fiscal discipline and more efficient management of financial surpluses, reflecting the state's ability to manage economic cycles with greater flexibility.

The second was the robustness of the banking sector and its operation under an advanced supervisory framework led by the Central Bank of Kuwait, in line with international best practices for risk management and governance.

The third factor, he said, was gradual progress in institutional reforms and enhanced transparency, particularly in disclosure and financial governance. The fourth was monetary policy stability and the Kuwaiti Dinar's peg to a basket of currencies, which has strengthened monetary policy credibility and reduced volatility.

He pointed out that two fundamental factors had a direct impact on changing the international assessment. The first was adoption of strategic fiscal decisions, most notably the passage of the public debt law. Previously, global rating agencies viewed the state's solvency as heavily concentrated in the Future Generations Fund, with limited flexible financing tools, which placed pressure on the sovereign rating despite strong assets.

The shift in this approach helped rebalance assessments of the state's financing capacity.

The sixth factor, he said, was intensified government efforts at the highest levels under wise guidance from the political leadership to combat corruption and reduce waste in the public budget.

This is a critically important element in international assessments, as it reflects the state's seriousness in protecting public funds, improving spending efficiency and strengthening confidence in financial management.

Al-Jouan noted that these combined developments have helped reshape the international view of Kuwait's economy not only as an asset-rich economy, but as one that is gradually moving toward more efficient and sustainable resource management.

Regarding future expectations, Al-Jouan said that maintaining a positive outlook depends on three main paths: accelerating structural reform and diversifying the economic base away from oil; activating and empowering the private sector as a true engine of growth, and transitioning from managing stability to managing sustainable growth.

He added if reform momentum was maintained, Kuwait was likely to see further gradual improvements in ratings and indicators. However, if implementation slows, indicators will remain positive in terms of fundamentals but may lose relative momentum compared to more rapidly transforming regional economies.

He explained that future expectations for international economic indicators related to Kuwait remain cautiously and deliberately positive, closely linked to the speed and depth of reform implementation on the ground.

Al-Jouan said indicators were likely to improve further if reform momentum continues, particularly in financial, legislative and institutional areas while maintaining fiscal discipline and efficient resource management.

He pointed to the recent positive assessment issued by the Financial Action Task Force (FATF) in the area of combating money laundering and terrorism financing, stressing that this evaluation should be treated as a starting point rather than an endpoint, through addressing technical observations and strengthening effective implementation.

He clarified that progress in this area was directly reflected as a positive indicator for credit rating agencies as well as the World Bank and IMF when assessing the strength of the state's institutional and financial framework.

Enhancing international credibility and compliance with governance and financial transparency standards raises global confidence and reduces what is known as reputational risk, an indirect but influential factor in creditworthiness assessments.

Al-Jouan stated that the upcoming transition from managing stability to managing growth requires moving from maintaining financial stability to creating sustainable growth drivers through empowering private sector, stimulating high-quality investment and developing capital markets.

If the results of the FATF report are practically leveraged alongside the completion of structural reforms, Kuwait is likely to witness further improvement in indicators.

Meanwhile, Professor of Economics at Gulf University for Science and Technology, Dr. Osama Al-Falah, said that international economic reports are among the most neutral tools for evaluating countries' economic performance, as they are largely based on numerical data and precise technical indicators, lending credibility and objectivity to their results.

Dr. Al-Falah added that Kuwait's positive evaluations from prominent international institutions such as the IMF, World Bank and global credit rating agencies reflects an improvement in domestic economic reality, and enhances confidence among investors and stakeholders.

Moreover, El-Tayeb emphasized that long-tenor financing extended by the banking sector serves as a decisive catalyst in translating development strategies into operational projects with real economic impact, reflecting the approach embraced by leading international banking institutions in advancing national economic development.

Puerto Rico stops for 13 minutes to applaud history, Bad Bunny

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, Feb 9, (AP): The Super Bowl lasted all of 13 minutes for many Puerto Ricans in San Juan and beyond.

People turned their backs to TV screens as food, music and chatter filled the first half of the game until a hush fell across the island. The halftime show was starting.

This was Puerto Rico's moment, a spotlight on a collective son who quit bagging groceries a decade ago and became the world's most streamed artist on Spotify last year. Since then, Bad Bunny has used his platform to applaud immigrants, sing about Puerto Rico's identity and turmoil and denounce US immigration policies.

"He appeared at the right moment in the history of Latin America," said Marilyns Rojas, 39, who is originally from Venezuela but has lived the last 22 years in Puerto Rico.

She was among the hundreds who gathered by a grassy knoll near a beach in Puerto Rico's capital to watch the halftime show on a huge screen as waves crashed behind them and the sounds of coquí, an endemic frog, filled the salty air.

Amarilys Reyes, 55, arrived at the seaside watch party with her 22-year-old daughter.

She had never watched a Super Bowl and didn't know who was playing, but it didn't matter. Like many others, she was only there for Bad Bunny.

"It's the biggest show of his life," Reyes said.

Energy, nerves and excitement had been building across Puerto Rico ever since the NFL, Apple Music and Roc Nation announced that Benito Antonio Martínez Ocasio would headline the Super Bowl XL Halftime Show.

Watch parties were quickly organized across the US mainland and the island. Some dubbed it "Super Bori Sunday," a shortened nod to "Boricua," which refers to someone with Puerto Rican ancestry, while others referred to it "The Benito Bowl: Morcilla, Sancocho, Mofongo, Reggaetón and a little bit of Football."

One woman wrote on social media that she would watch the halftime show with her 87-year-old mother in Puerto Rico so they could dance together, while another person posted that they had prepared a PowerPoint presentation for their American

friends dubbed "Bad Bunny 101."

Creativity flowed as Feb. 8 approached: One bar in Puerto Rico posted a promo featuring the quarterbacks from the Seattle Seahawks and New England Patriots sitting on the iconic white plastic lawn chairs that grace the cover of Bad Bunny's newest album.

Even the Teletubbies got in on the excitement, shaking their colorful rumps to

Bad Bunny's "Baile Inolvidable" a day before the show.

Wonder Woman also lent her support, with Lynda Carter noting on social media that she was a "huge fan" of Bad Bunny, whom she noted was an American citizen: "Make no mistake." But criticism of the first all-Spanish NFL halftime show spiked as the first half ended.

Jake Paul, a YouTuber-turned-boxer who has property in Puerto Rico and has posted about life on the island, wrote on X: "Turn off this halftime. A fake American citizen performing who publicly hates America. I cannot support that."

Puerto Ricans quickly responded.

"Don't you live where he's from?" wrote one person while many others noted that Puerto Ricans are US citizens.

Luke Lavanway, a 35-year-old who lives in New York but was vacationing in Puerto Rico to escape the ongoing cold snap, said he had no problem with a halftime show in Spanish.

"That's part of us," he said. "That's what makes us great, and we should just enjoy it."

The crowd that had gathered for the halftime show began streaming out of the watch party as soon as the second half started, smiling as they reflected on what they had just witnessed.

"I thought it was phenomenal that Bad Bunny brought all Latinos together in one place and represented them all equally," said Carlos Ayala, 36, of San Juan. "It's an important moment for Latino culture."

He also thought it fantastic that Ricky Martin sang Bad Bunny's, "Lo que le pasó a Hawaii," which laments gentrification in Puerto Rico, a worsening issue for many on an island with a more than 40% poverty rate.

"Transmitting that message is extremely important in these times," he said, adding that he also appreciated the light posts and exploding transformers featured during the show, a nod to Puerto Rico's chronic outages "so the world can see what we live through."

TUCSON, Ariz.: The urgent investigation into the apparent kidnapping of 84-year-old **Nancy Guthrie** continued Sunday, a week after the mother of "Today" show host Savannah Guthrie was reported missing in Arizona.

Flanked by her siblings, Guthrie said "we received your message" and that: "This is the only way we will have peace. This is very valuable to us, and we will pay."

An FBI spokesman said Savannah Guthrie was referring to a message that was sent to the Tucson-based television station KOLD on Friday. The station declined to share details about the message's contents as the FBI conducted its review.

Investigators believe Nancy Guthrie was taken against her will from her home just outside Tucson last weekend. DNA tests showed blood on Guthrie's front porch was a match to her, Pima County Sheriff Chris Ninos has said.

Multiple press outlets have received alleged ransom letters during the past week. At least one letter made monetary demands and established Thursday evening and Monday evening as deadlines. Law enforcement officials declined to affirm that the letters were credible but said all tips were being investigated seriously. (AP)

NEW YORK: Paul Thomas Anderson won the top prize at the 78th Directors Guild Awards, putting the "One Battle After Another" filmmaker on course to potentially win his first Oscar.

The DGA Awards, held Saturday night at the Beverly Hilton in Beverly Hills, California, is among the most reliable Academy Awards precursors. In the last 10 years, nine DGA winners have gone on to win best director at the Oscars. In the guild's nearly eight-decade history, only eight times has the guild not predicted the Oscar winner.

The award adds to a virtual awards-season sweep for "One Battle After Another," which has won with critics groups, the Gotham Awards and the Golden Globes. It's considered the favorite for best picture at the March 15 Oscars. Academy voting begins Feb. 26.

The other nominees were Ryan Coogler ("Simmers"), Guillermo Del Toro ("Frankenstein"), Josh Safdie ("Marty Supreme") and Chloé Zhao ("Hamnet").

As he's often done through awards season, Anderson in his brief speech paid tribute to late assistant director Adam Somner, who died in 2024. "Obviously," he said, "we are up here minus one." (AP)

MILAN: Russian figure skater Petr Gumennik has been forced to change his short program music two days before the men's program at the Milan Cortina Olympics after joining a growing list of figure skaters dealing with copyright issues.

Gumennik, who is participating as a neutral athlete at the Winter Games, had been working all season to music from "Perfume: The Story of a Murderer," a psychological thriller film. But the 23-year-old Russian national champion learned in the last few days that he did not have proper permission to perform to the music, leaving him in limbo as the Winter Games began.

Given such a tight timeframe, Gumennik also was unable to get clearance for his music from last season, which came from the space opera film "Dune." So, he pivoted to "Waltz 1805" by Edgar Hakobyan, for which Gumennik was able to get permission. The men's competition begins Tuesday night with the short program. (AP)

Super Bowl show shines with star power, strong message

Bad Bunny brings Puerto Rican pride to world stage

SANTA CLARA, Calif., Feb 9, (AP): The sun hung low when Bad Bunny emerged in Puerto Rico's sugar cane fields during his halftime show, surrounded by jíbaros in pavas (rural farmers in traditional straw hats), viejitos playing dominos (an affectionate term for older men) and a piragua stand (shaved ice) - undeniable symbols of Puerto Rico.

From a small Caribbean island with a complicated colonial history, to the world: The artist born Benito Antonio Martínez Ocasio brought Puerto Rican culture to the Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara, California, for his 2026 Super Bowl halftime show in what was always going to be a landmark moment for Latinos.

He started with his huge reggaeton-and-then-some hits, "Títi Me Preguntó" moving into "Yo Perreo Sola," as he reemerged on top of the casita ("little house") from his Puerto Rican residency - Cardi B, Jessica Alba, Pedro Pascal, Karol G, Young Miko, Ronald Acuña Jr., Alix Earle and Dave Grutman were guests at his pari de marquesines ("house party").

Then he crashed through the roof - Daddy Yankee's "Gasolina" played for a moment, clearly an acknowledgement and celebration of the Puerto Rican artists who laid the path for his career to go global.

"Mi nombre es Benito Antonio Martínez Ocasio," he introduced himself to the crowd in Spanish. "Y si hoy estoy aquí en el Super Bowl 60, es porque nunca, nunca dejé de creer en mí y tú también deberías de creer en ti, vales más de lo que piensas."

In English: "My name is Benito Antonio Martínez Ocasio, and if I'm here today at Super Bowl 60 it's because I never, ever stopped believing in myself and you should also believe in yourself, you're worth more than you think."

The strings of his song "Monaco"

played - then, a surprise Lady Gaga emerged at a real wedding scene, singing her portion of the Bruno Mars-duet "Die with a Smile," joined by the salsa band Los Sobrinos. Her dress featured a maga, Puerto Rico's national flower.

As they performed, the couple was married and Benito served as their witness and signed their certificate.

It also gave Benito time for a fashion change - rocking a white suit like a classic salsa - for "Baile Inolvidable" and "NuevaYol," with a block party set where he took a shot with Toñita, owner of one of the last Puerto Rican social clubs in New York City, Brooklyn's Caribbean Social Club.

Ricky Martin, one of Puerto Rico's greatest crossover artists, performed Bad Bunny's "Lo Que Le Pasó a Hawaii," ("What Happened to Hawaii"), a rallying cry for Puerto Rico's cultural autonomy in an era of neocolonialism. Martin sat in a plastic chair in front of a plantain tree; a scene that mirrored the cover of Bad Bunny's 2025 album "Debi Tirar Más Fotos."

He did speak in English at the end of the set, however, when he said, "God Bless America," and then named coun-

tries in the Americas: "Chile, Argentina, Uruguay, Paraguay, Bolivia, Peru, Ecuador, Brazil" and so on, including the United States and Canada - a reminder that while it is common to use "America" as a synonym for the US in the US, it is the name used across two continents.

Behind Martin, jíbaros in pavas climbed power poles that exploded, symbolic of Puerto Rico's frequent blackouts and failing power grid. It queued up a moving performance of 2022 song "El Apagón" ("The Blackout"), in reference to Hurricane Maria, its aftermath and the continued anger and frustration over persistent, chronic power outages.

As he sang one of his most political songs, Bad Bunny held a Puerto Rico flag in red, white and baby blue - reflective of the Puerto Rican independence movement.

For around 13 minutes during the halftime show sponsored by Apple Music and Roc Nation, all eyes on the field - and around the world - were on Benito Antonio Martínez Ocasio.

Bad Bunny performed entirely in Spanish - as all of his music is recorded in the language, though he has collaborated with English-language artists. The only English singing came from Gaga.

And my motherland, mi patria, Puerto Rico, seguimos aquí." In English, "My homeland, Puerto Rico, we are still here."

Behind him, a screen read "The only thing more powerful than hate is love" in English text, a direct reference to one of his recent speeches at the 2026 Grammys.

He ended with "DmF" as he walked out of the stadium, joined by musicians with güiros (a percussive instrument made of a hollow gourd) and pandoreo (tambourines, a symbol of plena.)

For years, Bad Bunny has been one of the most-streamed artists on the planet. And on Sunday, he made it clear that his global popularity translates seamlessly to the biggest stage in the US. (Though he is no stranger to it. He previously appeared during the

Grammys last Sunday, said "ICE out" while accepting a televised award. Bad Bunny's latest tour skipped the continental US; in an interview he said it was at least partially inspired by concerns that his fans could be targeted by immigration agents.

At a press conference on Thursday, Bad Bunny told Apple Music's Zane Lowe and Ebro Darden viewers could expect a huge party - and joked that while viewers didn't need to learn Spanish to enjoy his set; they should learn to dance.

"I want to bring to the stage, of course, a lot of my culture," he said at the time. "I don't want to give any spoilers. It's going to be fun."

Of course, he delivered on just that - with a message of hope and a reminder of Puerto Rico's resiliency.



Spring Festival holiday sparks surge in weddings

China's wedding dress makers push boundaries

HEFEI, Feb 9, (Xinhua): As the Spring Festival approaches and much of the country prepares to celebrate, 36-year-old bridal store owner Li Tao has been busy completing his last orders before the holiday.

"Many couples plan to hold their weddings during the Spring Festival holiday. Between December and January alone, we shipped more than 2,000 wedding dress packages from our online and physical shops," Li told Xinhua in his 300-square-meter wedding dress store in east China.

The gowns in Li's store are made at his nearby factory in Dingji Town, which is located in Lu'an City of Anhui Province and known as one of China's top destinations for wedding dresses. The town produces and sells nearly 5 million gowns each year, generating about 2.4 billion yuan (about 345 million U.S. dollars) in revenue. Its products are sold nationwide and exported to more than 30 countries and regions, including the United States, New Zealand and Spain.

With numbers of marriage registrations rebounding across multiple regions last year, the town's bridal industry is gaining momentum and branching out beyond traditional wedding gowns.

The rebound was partly attributed to reforms easing restrictions on where couples can register their marriages, alongside other supportive measures.

And recent changes go beyond numbers. In Xu's view, younger consumers are placing higher demands on both the quality and design of wedding dresses.

Many companies have established in-house design teams and developed their own brands, testing sample garments in brick-and-mortar stores before moving to mass production based on customer response.

The town is now home to more than 400 wedding dress brands, many of which are expanding their reach alongside other supportive measures.

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Medications help, but healthy habits remain essential

Achieved your weight loss goal on GLP-1 drugs – what now?

GLP-1 drugs have ushered in a new era in weight loss. In just a few years, medications such as semaglutide and tirzepatide, known by the brand names Ozempic, Wegovy, Mounjaro and Zepbound, have gone from niche diabetes treatments to household names, reshaping how America thinks about weight loss.

A November 2025 Kaiser Family Foundation poll found that 1 in 8 US adults have tried a GLP-1 medication for weight loss, diabetes or another condition. And we expect that number to rise now that one of these drugs, Wegovy, has become available in pill form, increasing its accessibility for many people.

These drugs' ability to help patients lose anywhere from 15% to 20% of body weight has made them one of the most powerful nonsurgical obesity treatments ever seen.

GLP-1, short for glucagon-like peptide-1, is a hormone your gut normally makes that helps control blood sugar and appetite after eating. It signals the pancreas to release insulin when blood sugar rises and slows how quickly food leaves the stomach, which helps people feel full sooner.

Modern GLP-1 medications are designed to amplify these effects, leading to better blood sugar control and substantial weight loss for many patients.

But success brings a new question that millions of people are confronting: What happens after the weight comes off? And just as importantly, what should patients do when their progress suddenly stalls, even while still on the medication?

As an obesity medicine physician, I've seen firsthand how life-changing GLP-1 drug therapy can be for my patients. But I also remind each of them that no medication - GLP-1s included - replaces the foundational importance of nutrition, physical activity, sleep and mental health. These lifestyle pillars are essential for maintaining muscle and bone health, preventing significant weight regain and supporting long-term cardiovascular and metabolic health.

The key is simple but critical: Every weight-loss or health plan must be tailored to each person.

In 2023, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported that more than 40% of American adults live with obesity. For most people, the real challenge isn't losing weight - it's keeping it off.

Researchers have known this for decades. As early as the mid-20th century, studies of commercial diet programs showed that while short-term weight loss was common, regaining weight long term was the norm.

This is because when people lose weight, the body's natural inclination is to return to its previous weight - a phenomenon called metabolic adaptation. As a result, the brain releases more of the hunger hormone ghrelin and dials down leptin, one of the hormones that signals fullness and energy sufficiency.

The net effect is simple: After weight loss, people are hungrier, feel less satisfied after eating and burn fewer calories than expected. The body interprets weight loss as a threat to survival

and responds by slamming the brakes on metabolism through sophisticated energy-conserving mechanisms. Put plainly, when there's less body weight to maintain, the body does less work - but it also becomes extra efficient, burning fewer calories than predicted and nudging weight back up.

And to that an environment filled with ultraprocessed foods, oversized portions, high stress and limited time for movement, and it's no surprise that so many people's weight ends up yo-yoing despite their best efforts.

Clinical trials on GLP-1 medications also follow these well-established patterns. A pivotal 2021 clinical study of more than 1,900 adults, known as the STEP 1 trial, laid the groundwork for the use of these drugs as a treatment for weight loss.

But a follow-up 2021 study, known as STEP 4, showed that within 48 weeks of no longer taking semaglutide, participants regained approximately two-thirds of their prior weight loss, while those who remained on GLP-1 drug therapy continued to lose weight.

This is not because people lack discipline, but rather because their biology fights hard to return to its old set point.

Although obesity is now widely recognized as a chronic disease, clinical guidance has not kept pace with this new generation of highly effective medications.

For most patients, the most effective long-term strategy after achieving a target weight is to continue GLP-1 treatment. Clinicians aim for the lowest dose that still helps regulate appetite and stabilize weight.

Another option patients may pursue is to slowly taper off the drugs over about three to six months and to focus on reinforcing lifestyle choices that support goals for overall health

and weight maintenance.

Plateaus in weight loss are normal, even on GLP-1 drug therapy.

In clinical trials, weight loss with GLP-1 medications tends to follow a predictable curve: rapid early losses during drug initiation and dose increases, a gradual slowing and eventual plateau. A plateau, typically defined as little or no weight change for eight to 12 weeks, is not a sign of failure but rather the body adapting to a lower weight.

But before assuming that a GLP-1 medication has stopped working, clinicians will typically consider how the patient is using the drug, such as whether it's being taken properly, with little to no missed doses, and whether it is being stored properly.

Clinicians will also evaluate a patient for medical conditions that might make weight loss more challenging, such as perimenopause or hypothyroidism, which is underactive thyroid.

They will also take into consideration whether the patient is on other drugs that might be obesogenic, meaning causing weight gain, or if they are using an FDA-approved GLP-1 drug versus a compounded medication, which can have variable quality and unknown efficacy.

Helpful strategies to prevent weight regain related to diet include building meals around lean protein and noticing where calories might be creeping in, such as snacks, sugary drinks and alcohol.

With GLP-1 drugs, the goal for nutrition has shifted from calorie restriction to calorie quality. Aim for a healthy balance of vegetables, lean proteins and whole grains. And make sure your water intake is sufficient, especially since GLP-1 medications not only reduce hunger but can also reduce feeling thirsty. (AP)

Calls grow for cleaner fuels as global warming worsens

Rising Arctic shipping fuels black carbon and accelerates ice melt

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, Feb 9, (AP): As rising global temperatures speed up the melting of sea ice in the Arctic Ocean, it's set off a boom of ships taking routes that previously were frozen and not traversable.

The increase in marine Arctic traffic, which received increased attention as President Donald Trump pushed for the United States to take over Greenland, has come with a heavy environmental cost: black carbon, or soot, that spews from ships and makes the ice melt even faster. Several countries are making a case for ships in the Arctic to use cleaner fuels that cause less pollution in meetings this week with international shipping regulators.

Glaciers, snow and ice covered in the soot emitted by ships have less ability to reflect the sun. Instead, the sun's heat is absorbed, helping to make the Arctic the fastest warming place on Earth. In turn, melting Arctic sea ice can affect weather patterns around the world.

"It ends up in a never-ending cycle of increased warming," said Sian Prior, lead adviser for the Clean Arctic Alliance, a coalition of nonprofits focused on the Arctic and shipping. "We need to regulate emissions and black carbon, in particular. Both are completely unregulated in the Arctic."

In December, France, Germany, the Solomon Islands and Denmark proposed that the International Maritime Organization require ships traveling in Arctic waters to use "polar fuels," which are lighter and emit less carbon pollution than the widely used maritime fuels known as residuals. The proposal includes steps that companies would take to comply and the geographic area it would apply to - all ships traveling north of the 60th parallel. The proposal was expected to be presented to the IMO's Pollution Prevention and Response Committee this week and possibly another committee in April.

A 2024 ban on using a type of residual known as heavy fuel oil in the Arctic has had only modest impacts so far, partly because of loopholes.

The push to reduce black carbon, which studies have shown has a warming impact 1,600 times that of carbon dioxide over a 20-year span, is happening at a time of conflicting interests, both internationally and among the countries

that have coastlines in the Arctic.

In recent months, Trump's periodic comments about the need to "own" Greenland to bolster U.S. security have raised many issues, from Greenland's sovereignty to the future of the NATO alliance. Pollution and other environmental issues in the Arctic have taken a backseat.

Trump, who has called climate change a "con job," has also pushed back against global policies aimed at fighting it. Last year, the IMO was expected to adopt new regulations that would have imposed carbon fees on shipping, which supporters said would have pushed companies to use cleaner fuels and electrify fleets where possible. Then Trump intervened, lobbying hard for nations to vote no. The measure was postponed for a year, its prospects at best uncertain. Given that, it's hard to see the IMO making fast progress on the current proposal to limit black carbon in the Arctic.

Even inside Arctic nations, which are most impacted by black carbon and other shipping pollution, there are internal tensions around such regulations. Iceland is a good example. While the country is a world leader in green technologies such as carbon capture and the use of thermal energies for heating, conservationists say the country has made less progress on regulating pollution in its seas. That is because the fishing industry, one of the country's most important, holds huge sway.

"The industry is happy with profits, unhappy with the taxes and not engaged in issues like climate or biodiversity," said Arni Finnsson, board chair of the Iceland Nature Conservation Association.

Finnsson added that the costs of using cleaner fuels or electrifying fleets have also prompted resistance.

"I think the government is waking up, but they still have to wait for the (fishing) industry to say yes," he said.

The country has not taken a position on the pending polar fuels proposal. In a statement, Iceland's Ministry of Environment, Energy and Climate said the proposal was "positive with regard to its purpose and basic content," but that further study was needed. The statement added that Iceland supports stronger measures to counter shipping emissions and reduce black carbon.

Afghanistan among the worst for mothers, newborns

Pakistan vaccinates over 44M kids against polio

ISLAMABAD, Feb 9, (Xinhua): Pakistan has successfully concluded its first nationwide anti-polio campaign of 2026, vaccinating more than 44.3 million children across the country, the National Emergencies Operation Center said on Monday.

According to official data, more than 22.9 million children were vaccinated in eastern Punjab province, 10.5 million in southern Sindh, 7.13 million in northwest Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and 2.36 million in southwest Balochistan.

In other regions, over 455,000 children were vaccinated in the federal capital Islamabad, around 261,000 in the northern Gilgit-Baltistan region, and more than 673,000 in Pakistan-controlled Kashmir.

Health authorities thanked all stakeholders for their cooperation and active participation, calling the nationwide drive a major step toward polio eradication.

Pakistan remains one of the two countries in the world where polio is still endemic, and authorities say sustained high-quality campaigns and cross-border coordination are critical to achieving eradication.

Meanwhile, Afghanistan remains one of the most perilous countries in the world for mothers and newborns due to extremely high mortality rates and persistent funding constraints, the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) said, according to local media reports on Saturday.

The UNFPA reported that the country records 521 neonatal deaths per 100,000 live births, ranking highest in the Asia-Pacific region and among the highest globally.

The agency currently supports nearly 500 family health centers across Afghanistan and plans to deliver essential health services to about 4.5 million people in 2026, with particular attention to remote and underserved areas, the report added.

Ongoing shortages of funds and trained medical staff continue to challenge efforts to reduce preventable deaths.

Tanzania's Zanzibar has concluded its annual performance evaluation for malaria elimination, with Chinese expertise featured for the first time to help the archipelago refine its prevention and control strategies.

The meeting, held from Feb. 2 to 7, focused on assessing achievements in malaria elimination in 2025, formulating the 2026 work plan, and identifying priority areas for the next round of Global Fund malaria grant applications.

Addressing Zanzibar's practical needs, Liu Yaobao, a public health expert from the 35th Chinese medical team in Zanzibar, introduced China's successful strategies, including establishing multi-sector collaboration mechanisms, strengthening surveillance and rapid response systems, enhancing grassroots prevention and control capacity, and expanding health education.

ALTO ILA, Ecuador, Feb 9, (AP): On a recent journey into the Ecuadorian Amazon jungle, Ramon Pucha realized he was being trailed. Fresh puma tracks now lined the path alongside his own footprints. Unfazed, he continued his trek, focused entirely on the previous cargo he carried - seeds from some of the world's most endangered plant species.

Pucha and his family have spent years recreating their own piece of jungle with rescued species on a 32-hectare farm called El Picaflor in the Indigenous Quichua community of Alto Ila, 128 kilometers (80 miles) southeast of the capital, Quito.

"I have a passion for nature, for plants, for animals," said Pucha, 51, noting that his drive to protect the environment is so intense that many people in his community consider him "crazy."

To save endangered plant species, Pucha ventures deep into the jungle, often alone, for up to five days at a time. On more than one occasion, he said he returned empty-handed because - as a consequence of climate change and severe droughts across the region - many of the large trees had stopped producing seeds annually.

Once the seeds reach home, Pucha's wife, Marlene Chiluisa, takes charge. She plants them in suitable soil and compost so that they can begin to grow into plants that are then replanted in the rainforest. The

plants by their common, traditional and scientific names with ease. He also serves as a guide, ferrying visitors across the turbulent Ila River in a precarious craft made of wooden planks lashed to a buoy.

Yet, for all their effort, the family's struggle remains a solitary one.

"Nobody gives us any incentive-not foundations, not anyone," said Chiluisa.

Ecuador's Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock recognizes the importance of the family's work, calling El Picaflor a "living laboratory" and a vital seed bank in an area scarred by 50 years of constant logging.

But while Ecuador was the first country to enshrine the "rights of nature" in its constitution, that reputation is now at risk. Environmentalists and Indigenous groups warn that President Daniel Noboa's decision to merge the Ministry of Environment with the Ministry of Energy and Mines threatens the very landscape the family is fighting to save.

As he walks across the property that was once barren pastureland, Pucha pauses to observe the plants, describing the unique purpose of each one.

His eyes light up as he points to a small, growing tree, which he says is now rare in the area - a type of fine wood that will reach maturity in 100 years. Though he knows he will never see it fully grown, he remains committed to his mission.

family even shares the fruits of their labor, selling or gifting a percentage of the plants to neighbors committed to forest regeneration.

Gotterup wins Phoenix Open playoff as Matsuyama struggles at the finish

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz., Feb 9, (AP): Chris Gotterup shot 7-under 64 and won the Phoenix Open with a birdie on the first hole of a playoff Sunday after Hideki Matsuyama pulled his tee shot into the water.

The leader by one heading into the final round, Matsuyama had converted all of his previous five 54-hole leads into wins, but limped to the finish at TPC Scottsdale's Stadium Course.

The two-time Phoenix Open champion nearly hit his tee shot in the water left of the reachable par-4 17th and pulled his drive on 18 left into the church pew bunkers - his 11th missed fairway of the day. Matsuyama hit his second shot into the face of the bunker and couldn't get up-and-down from 43 yards to send the tournament to a playoff. He shot 68 to match Gotterup at 16-under 268.

Gotterup, winner of the season-opening Sony Open, closed with five birdies on his final six holes and stayed loose by hitting balls off the first tee before uncorking a massive drive on 18 in the playoff.

Matsuyama yanked his tee shot even further left than he did in regulation, caroming it off the bank of the lake into the water. The Japanese star hit his third shot to onto the green after a drop, but Gotterup left no doubt by sinking his 27-foot birdie putt for his fourth career PGA Tour win.

Top-ranked Scottie Scheffler went from being in danger of the missing the cut with a shaky first round to turning heads as his name moved toward the top of the leaderboard. He closed with a 64 to tie for third at 15 under. Patrick Reed capped off his remarkable month in the Middle East by winning the Qatar Masters on Sunday, his second European tour victory in three weeks that all but assures the former Masters champion will have a full PGA Tour card in 2027.

Reed closed with a 2-under 70, turning back an early threat from Jacob Skov Olesen and a late charge by Calum Hill for a two-shot victory at Doha Golf Club.

In the last three weeks, Reed has won the Dubai Desert Classic, lost in a playoff in Bahrain and won in Qatar. No one has posted a lower 72-hole score in three

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb 9, (AP): Kawhi Leonard had 41 points and eight rebounds and the Los Angeles Clippers beat the slumping Minnesota Timberwolves 115-96.

John Collins had 15 points on 6-of-9 shooting, and Yanic Konan Niederhauser also scored 15 points. The Clippers took command with a 17-3 run closing out the third quarter.

Anthony Edwards led Minnesota with 23 points, and Julius Randle had 17. The Timberwolves have lost three of their last four, all to sub-.500 opponents. Minnesota made just 8 of 33 3-point attempts and committed 20 turnovers while being held under 100 points for just the second time this season.

Ayo Dosunmu, making his Timberwolves debut after being acquired in a trade with Chicago, had 11 points and two steals.

The Timberwolves were coming off one of their most frustrating losses of the season, when they blew an 18-point third-quarter lead in a home loss to the lowly New Orleans Pelicans.

Thomas averaged 15.6 points, 3.1 assists, 1.8 rebounds and 24.3 minutes in 24 games with Brooklyn this season. He had missed about seven weeks with a left hamstring strain but returned on Dec. 27.

Hamstring issues also limited Thomas to 25 games last season, though he scored 24 points per game when available. Thomas, who is 6-foot-3, averaged 22.5 points and shooting 56.6% from the field in 2023-24.

Monaco goalkeeper gets away with a blunder in draw at Nice

PARIS, Feb 9, (AP): Ballon d'Or winner Ousmane Dembélé starred with two goals and an assist as Paris Saint-Germain crushed bitter rival Marseille 5-0 to reclaim top spot in Ligue 1.

The win restored defending champion PSG's two-point lead over Lens after 21 rounds, with Marseille in fourth place behind Lyon after the humiliating defeat.

"We wanted to send a message that we're back," Dembélé said after PSG's biggest winning margin against Marseille.

"It was almost perfect," PSG coach Luis Enrique said. "It's an important day for our fans because we made history, 5-0 never happened before."

Despite PSG's attacking flair, Marseille coach Roberto De Zerbi's choices will be scrutinized following a truly dismal performance from his side lacking composure and fight. Marseille was eliminated from the Champions League following a 3-0 defeat against Club Brugge less than two weeks ago.

"Once again, I say sorry to the fans," De Zerbi said. "I'm not in the players' heads. I thought we had prepared well for this game but clearly not. We need to understand why we played this way in Bruges and here."

Top scorer Mason Greenwood, fellow forward Amine Gouiri and new signing Ethan Nwaneri were anonymous in attack, with veteran Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang on the bench.

De Zerbi dropped goalkeeper Gerónimo Rulli after a couple of poor performances and replaced him with Jeffrey de Lange, who was out of sorts, albeit not helped by his defense.

De Lange was easily beaten when Dembélé side-footed in a cross from left back Nuno Mendes in the 12th minute following a quick break launched by Désiré Doué.

However, PSG could have been down to 10 players before then. Midfielder Vitinha caught defender Leonards Balerdi's ankle with a late tackle but escaped with a yellow card.

PSG's Joao Neves scored a goal in the 10 second-half minutes, with Facundo Medina scoring an own-goal over the head of De Lange, and Dembélé setting up Khvicha Kvaratskhelia for a clinical volley before Lee Kang-in slotted home the fifth.

51.8-second margin.

The duo also topped the rally-ending Power Stage and placed second in the Super Sunday classification, ensuring a valuable points haul at the season's opening round.

Ogier and Landais completed the podium in third after a closely fought

Gremaud again denies Gu Oly gold medal in freeski slopestyle

US defends title

LIVIGNO, Italy, Feb 9, (Agencies): Mathilde Gremaud successfully defended her Olympic freeski slopestyle title and denied Eileen Gu a gold medal for a second straight Winter Games.

Gremaud won the final with a score of 86.96 from the best of her three jumps, while Gu again took silver behind her Swiss rival with her best effort of 86.58.

Gremaud, who took her career medal haul to four at the Olympics including a silver eight years ago, said that her winning run was the best of her life.

She also said that the final was about her performing better than ever before, not beating Gu.

Gu needed a huge score on her final run when she had one last chance to better Gremaud, but that effort barely lasted. Gu skittered off the first rail and toppled to her side, dashing her title hopes.

Knowing she had locked up the gold after Gu fell, Gremaud tied a Swiss flag around her neck and wore it like a cape as she cruised down the course on her victory lap. After coming off the course, she embraced her teammates to celebrate her fourth career Olympic medal. Nearby, ecstatic supporters waved Swiss flags.

Gremaud, who turned 26 the day before the final, has now beaten Gu twice in Olympic finals by the slightest of margins: 0.33 points in

2022, and 0.38 in 2026.

Canada's Megan Oldham claimed bronze.

Strong as Gremaud was in the jumps, Gu was undone by the rail section at the start of her run.

Gu led after the first of three runs when she nailed her routine, but Gremaud laid down her winning run on her second go to move to the top of the points table. Gu then wobbled off the rail on her second run; even though she kept her balance, but the mistake resulted in a low score.

That same rail section had caused Gu to fall during Satur-

day's qualifying, when she had to execute perfectly on a second go to advance to the final.

But when it mattered most on Monday and Gu had her last shot to snatch a win, the result was the same: Just seconds into her run she went tipping off the rail and tumbled in the snow.

Gu also said her first run was her best ever, and she was feeling good about even topping that on her final go - until she hit that fatal snag.

Gu, who was born in America but competes for China, became a global star at the 2022 Beijing Games where she won three med-

als, including gold in freeski half-pipe and big air. She will now turn to defending her titles at these Games.

Gremaud's medal chest includes a bronze in big air from 2022. She is also a two-time world champion in slopestyle in 2025 and 2023, among other titles.

The United States successfully defended its title in the figure skating team event at the Milan-Cortina 2024 Winter Olympics on Sunday, with Japan finishing a close second and host Italy taking bronze.

The United States and Japan entered the men's free skate - the final segment of the competition - tied atop the overall standings.

American star Ilia Malinin did not land his signature quad Axel but electrified the crowd with a backflip in his routine. Despite minor errors, the 21-year-old scored 200.03 points to win the free skate and earn the maximum 10 points, sealing victory for Team USA.

Skating last under intense pressure, Japan's Shun Sato delivered a clean performance and posted a season-best 194.80 points, placing second.

Italy's Matteo Rizzo, competing in his third Olympic Games, scored 179.62 points to finish third, helping the host nation secure a podium place.

Real wins in Valencia, Betis takes Copa revenge

MADRID, Feb 9, (Xinhua): Second-half goals from left back Alvaro Carreras and Kylian Mbappe gave Real Madrid a 2-0 win away to Valencia, keeping the defending champion one point behind FC Barcelona in the La Liga title race.

Italy's long-awaited World Cup debut ends with big defeat against Scotland

KOLKATA, India, Feb 9, (AP): Italy's 45-year wait ended in a disappointing 73-run defeat against Scotland at the T20 World Cup on Monday, with captain Wayne Madsen dislocating his shoulder inside the first six overs of Group C game.

Italy, where the sport's national federation was formed in 1980, crashed to 137 all out in 16.4 overs as Madsen didn't take further part in the historic game after damaging his left shoulder while attempting a catch at mid-wicket.

There was some silver lining in Italy's maiden appearance in a major global tournament when Benjamin Manenti scored 52 off 31. Benjamin and his brother Harry (37) briefly threatened the tall target with a 73-run stand before both fell in successive overs and Italy lost the last six wickets for 21 runs.

Opening batter George Munsey's blazing knock of 84 off 54 balls, which featured 13 fours and two sixes, had led Scotland to 207-4 - the highest-ever total by an associate nation in the tournament - after Madsen won the toss and elected to chase.

"I imagine everyone will be flat in the

dressing room and disappointed," vice-captain Harry Manenti said. "We wanted to show the world what we have. We get another chance in a few days' time and hopefully we can bounce back."

Munsey was the star for Scotland and also held four catches, including a brilliant low catch at point to dismiss opener Justin Mosca off the first ball before Italy succumbed to off-spinner Michael Leask, who finished with an impressive 4-17.

Under-prepared Scotland, which replaced Bangladesh, lost to the West Indies at the same venue in its first game, but came back strongly to get its first points in the tournament.

Scotland originally missed out after losing to Italy in the qualifiers, but was drafted in late as a replacement for Bangladesh in Group C. The ICC rejected the Bangladesh Cricket Board's request to shift its games from India to Sri Lanka due to security concerns.

Munsey set the tempo of a strong total with the first century partnership of the tournament and added 126 runs with his opening partner Michael Jones (37).

'No alternative but to beat Zakho'

Maaloul: Al-Qadsia's destiny is in its hands

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 9: Al-Qadsia head coach Nabil Maaloul has underlined that victory is the only acceptable outcome for his side as it targets all three points.

Speaking at a press conference yesterday, the Tunisian coach said: "We have no alternative but to beat Zakho," adding that "Al-Qadsia now controls its own destiny after the win over Si-tra."

Maaloul described the group as highly competitive, while stressing his team's full readiness to claim victory in today's clash.

He also pointed out that Al-Qadsia's performances have improved markedly following the return of injured players and changes to some of the foreign professionals, noting that the primary goal is to win and make the club's supporters happy.

For his part, defender Youssef Al-Haqqan said that lifting the Super Cup has given the squad a major morale boost, emphasizing that the match against Zakho will be approached with the clear objective of securing all three points.

Al-Qadsia will be determined to secure a crucial victory when it hosts Iraq's Zakho at 8:00 pm today at Mo-

hammed Al-Hamad Stadium, in the fifth round of Group A of the 2025-2026 Gulf Clubs Champions League.

In the same group, UAE side Al Ain visit Bahrain's Sitra at 6:00 pm.

Zakho has already clinched the first semifinal berth, leading the group with 10 points, while the second spot remains wide open among Al Ain (6 points), Al-Qadsia (4 points) and Sitra (2 points).

Al-Qadsia heads into today's clash looking to achieve more than one ob-

jective. It is keen to avenge its 3-1 defeat in the first leg, a match in which it had taken the lead before Zakho mounted a comeback, and it also aims to keep its semifinal hopes alive.

The "Yellows" are enjoying a strong run of form and stability. They recently lifted the Super Cup after edging Al-Arabi 4-3 in the semifinals and then defeating Kuwait Club on penalties (4-3) following a 1-1 draw in the final. They also shared a 1-1 draw with Ku-

wait Club last Friday in the 13th round of the Zain Premier League, leaving them third in the standings, two points behind second-placed Al-Arabi.

Despite the absence of several players, including Abdulaziz Wadi, Khaled Sabah, Ahmed Al-Yahya and Ali Jaragh, head coach Nabil Maaloul still has a wealth of options capable of delivering the result. Key names include Badr Al-Mutawa, Mubarak Al-Fanafiri, Rashid Al-Dossary, Moaz Al-Dhafiri, Athbi Shehab and Khaled Ibrahim, alongside foreign professionals Mehdi Humaidan (Bahrain), Abilay (Nigeria), Sofiane Bouchard and Tayeb Mziani (Algeria), and Neeskens Kebano (DR Congo), as well as promising youngsters Abdulla Al-Awadi, Abdulla Al-Ghanim and Abdulla Mutawa.

Zakho, meanwhile, arrives amid a period of instability, with a noticeable dip in form in the Iraqi league. It currently sits eighth with 27 points, 10 points adrift of leader Al-Quwa Al-Jawiya after 17 rounds.

These results prompted the club to part ways with Qatari coach Wissam Rizk, appointing Iraqi assistant Mohammed Nomi as interim head coach. Several names have been linked with the role, including Syrians Firas Al-Khatib of Al-Fahheel and Nizar Mahrous, as well as Iraqis Ayoub Odisho and Adnan Hamad.

Seahawks win 2nd Super Bowl with 'ferocious' defensive performance

Seattle pummels Patriots

SANTA CLARA, Calif., Feb 9, (AP): The "Dark Side" defense carried Sam Darnold and the Seattle Seahawks to a Lombardi Trophy.

Devon Witherspoon, Derick Hall, Byron Murphy and the rest of Mike Macdonald's ferocious unit pummeled Drake Maye, and the Seahawks beat the New England Patriots 29-13 to win the franchise's second Super Bowl.

"We never waver, man. We believe in each other. We love each other, and now we're world champions," Macdonald said.

Darnold threw a touchdown pass to AJ Barner, Kenneth Walker III ran for 135 yards and Jason Myers set a Super Bowl record by making all five of his field-goal tries.

"To do this with this team, I wouldn't want it any other way," Darnold said. "So proud of our guys, our defense. I mean, I can't say enough great things about our defense, our special teams."

Walker became the first running back to win the Super Bowl MVP award since Hall of Famer Terrell Davis did it with Denver 28 years ago.

Uchenna Nwosu punctuated a punishing defensive performance by snag-

ging Maye's pass in the air after Witherspoon hit his arm and running it back 45 yards for a pick-6.

"We went through a lot, but we believed," Witherspoon said. "All of you all doubters out there who said all that other stuff, you all don't know what's going on in this building. We're one of one over here."

Seattle won its first Super Bowl a dozen years ago behind its "Legion of Boom" defense, then was denied a repeat when New England's Malcolm Butler intercepted Russell Wilson at the goal line. The Seahawks hadn't been back to the Super Bowl since.

Darnold became the first quarterback in the 2018 NFL draft class to win a Super Bowl, ahead of Josh Allen, Baker Mayfield and Lamar Jackson.

Labeled a bust, dumped by two teams and considered expendable by two others, Darnold proved his doubters wrong while helping the Seahawks go 17-3.

After leading the NFL with 20 turnovers in the regular season, Darnold didn't have any in three playoff games. He wasn't particularly sharp against a solid Patriots defense but protected the ball and made enough plays, finishing 19 of 38 for 202 yards.

"I know we won the Super Bowl, but we could have been a little bit better on offense, but I don't care about that right now," Darnold said. "It's an unbelievable feeling, man. I'm just so happy

for the guys in the locker room and the coaches that put in so much effort throughout the whole season."

The Seahawks sacked Maye six times, including two apiece by Hall and Murphy. Hall's strip-sack late in the third quarter set up a short field and Darnold connected with Barner on 16-yard scoring toss to make it 19-0.

Julian Love's interception set up another field goal that made it 22-7 with 5:35 left.

The Patriots (17-4) punted on the first eight drives, excluding a kneeldown to end the first half.

"Just reminding them that we're 307

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picked by Love and the Patriots trailed by 15 when they got the ball back with 5:35 left. Maye said after the game that he had a pain-relieving injection in his right shoulder, which he injured in the AFC championship win at Denver, but said it didn't affect his play.

Then came Nwosu's touchdown, a fitting way to cap an overwhelming effort by the NFL's stingiest defense.

"Definitely hurts. They played better than us tonight," Maye said.

Maye's 7-yard TD pass to Rhamondre Stevenson late in the game only made the margin smaller.

The Seahawks took a 3-0 lead on Myers' 33-yard field goal on the game's opening drive. Myers connected from 39 and 41 yards to extend the lead to 9-0 at halftime. He was good from 41 on Seattle's first drive of the third quarter to make it 12-0.

Cornerback Christian Gonzalez made two outstanding plays to prevent potential touchdowns in the second quarter. He raced back and leaped in the air to slap away a deep pass to Rashid Shaheed that could have been a 76-yard TD.

On Seattle's last drive in the first half, Gonzalez knocked down a pass to All-Pro wide receiver Jaxon Smith-Njigba that would have been a 23-yard TD.

Rylie Mills pushed left guard Jared Wilson into Maye and took both of them down on one of Seattle's sacks.
