Kuwait leads fake degree purge

Employees told to update academic credentials

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 12: The Committee for Examining Academic Credentials has stressed to government and private sector entities the importance of updating their employees' data within a deadline that will be specified in notifications sent to each employee through the government application Sahel, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

Assistant Undersecretary for Scholarships and Study Leaves at the Civil Service Commission (CSC) Narjes Abdulrasoul told Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) on Thursday that the Committee for Examining Academic Credentials of employees in the public and private sectors, including citizens and expatriates, organized an orienta-

tion forum at the CSC headquarters.

Present at the forum were representatives of ministries, government departments, public authorities and institutions, as well as State-owned companies. It aimed to clarify the role of the committee and the responsibilities of participating entities in achieving its objectives.

Abdulrasoul explained that one of the primary objectives of the committee is to ensure the accuracy and integrity of employee data and to verify the academic qualifications of employees in the public and private sectors, whether citizens or expatriates, in order to guarantee the continuation of their financial and employment benefits.

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Weekend weather whiplash brings rain, fog, dust

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 12, (KUNA): The Meteorological Department forecasted cloudy conditions with scattered rainfall, fog and variable winds that could raise dust over the weekend.

The department indicated that the weekend weather will be warm to hot, with mild conditions during the early evening hours and cooler temperatures at night.

Acting Director of the department Dharar Al-Ali told Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) that the weather charts and numerical forecasts showed that Kuwait is affected by the extension of a surface low-pressure system combined with a warm and humid air mass, which started Thursday and will continue on Friday. This is expected to increase low and mid-level cloud cover and bring scattered rain showers.

Al-Ali revealed that winds will be variable, turning southeasterly, and will range from light to moderate in speed. There is also a possibility of fog developing in some areas during the evening and early morning hours, potentially reducing horizontal visibility.

He revealed that beginning Saturday, the low-pressure system will gradually subside and will be replaced with a relatively dry air mass. As a result, winds will shift from southwesterly to northwesterly, becoming moderate to occasionally active, and raising dust particularly in open areas.

Court upholds jail for colonel, expats over fake licenses

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 12: The Court of Cassation upheld the four-year prison sentence with hard labor imposed on a colonel, head of the licensing unit at the Jahra Traffic Department, and several expatriates, for involvement in the issuance of forged driving licenses and the use of forged work permits and academic certificates.

Investigations proved the defendants' involvement in processing driving license applications based on falsified documents, including work permits and academic certificates that were proven to be forged.

The Court of Cassation rejected the appeals filed by the defendants and upheld the ruling of the lower and appeals courts, which found them guilty of forgery.

Also, the court acquitted the colonel of bribery charges due to insufficient evidence.

Digital payments lead Kuwait spending habits

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 12, (KUNA): Digital payment adoption in Kuwait has surged, leaving cash with just a 30 percent share of everyday spending. Visa's Country Manager for Kuwait Mohammad Reyad attributes this to a rapid national embrace of digital payment solutions.

In an interview with KUNA, Reyad said the shift reflects a fundamental change in consumer payment habits by prioritizing digital solutions for daily needs as Kuwait is building a more efficient financial system and a digital economy, directly supporting the goals of Kuwait Vision 2035.

Visa's third edition of "Where Cash Hides" report shows 59 percent of Kuwait consumers are largely non-cash users, making most of their payments with cards or mobile devices, an increase of percent compared with last year.

KUWAIT CITY: Minister of Social Affairs, Family and Childhood Affairs **Dr. Amthal Al-Huwailah** affirmed Thursday the approval of detailed internal regulations for the Women's Shelter, supporting family protection.

'Sudan indebted to Kuwait for support'

First country to send aid: Al-Eisir

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 12: Sudanese Minister of Culture, Information, Tourism and Antiquities Khalid Al-Eisir expressed the deep appreciation of the Sudanese government for the support that the brotherly State of Kuwait — its leadership, government and people — provided to Sudan in facing the aggression perpetrated by the Rapid Support Forces militia.

In a press conference, Al-Eisir affirmed that the Kuwaiti assistance was provided at the humanitarian and economic levels, contributing significantly to ongoing efforts to alleviate the suffering of Sudanese citizens. He said Kuwait was among the first countries to help Sudan through the establishment of an airbridge of 36 flights carrying food, medicine and shelter supplies.

He added that three relief ships were dispatched from the ports of Safaga and Jeddah, Islamic ports, in coopera-

tion with the King Salman Humanitarian Aid and Relief Center.

This is in addition to life-saving medications for kidney failure and cancer patients sent from the Turkish port of Mersin, which reached the Sudanese refugees in Chad.

On the economic front, Al-Eisir disclosed that Kuwait Fund for Arab Economic Development (KFAED) approved the \$5 million grant to support the cholera response efforts in Khartoum, River Nile and Gezira states in cooperation with UNICEF.

He added the Fund also approved the following:

- \$4 million grant to enhance the resilience of internally displaced persons (IDPs), including \$2 million to support 500 smallholder farms in White Nile, Gezira, Kassala and Red Sea states

- \$3.2 million grant to improve the conditions of Sudanese refugees in Chad, in cooperation with UNHCR

- \$2.5 million to improve the conditions of IDPs and strengthen host communities

He expressed his deep gratitude to His Highness the Amir Sheikh Meshal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, His Highness the Crown Prince Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Sabah, and His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Ahmad Abdullah Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah, affirming that the Sudanese people deeply appreciate the support of Kuwait for the unity and stability of Sudan.

Epstein's scandals are far from over

THE Jeffrey Epstein case is the story of a system laid bare. Files of this kind do not distribute verdicts. They distribute suspicion. And in the worlds of finance and politics, suspicion alone can redirect careers, freeze deals, and place public figures and institutions under an uncomfortable spotlight long before any evidence matures into a courtroom verdict.

Will the newly released documents affect Arab, Gulf, and Kuwaiti figures whose names appear in them? Most likely yes. Not through street protests or domestic pressure, but through international institutions, business partners, and corporate boards. The decisive metric here is reputation. Governance rules, compliance departments, and risk commit-

tees treat ethical exposure as an investment variable even when personal convictions are absent because public opinion in open markets can be unforgiving.

A recent oversight hearing in Washington shows how political turbulence amplifies that uncertainty. US Attorney General Pam Bondi, questioned about the Justice Department's handling of the Epstein files, repeatedly avoided direct answers and drifted into partisan talking points as the session escalated into heated exchanges. When Governments and global investors see the official source of information in Washington turn into theater, they act defensively to protect their brands from anyone perceived as tainted, Arab or otherwise.

The harsh conclusion is that Arab figures who remained close to Epstein after his 2008 conviction may never face automatic prosecution, yet they lose the simplest defense, "we did not know." Questions will linger until convincing answers emerge and with more than three million documents now in circulation, further revelations are almost certain.

Progress on major projects discussed

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 12, (KUNA): Minister of Public Works Dr. Noura Al-Mashaan chaired on Thursday the 46th meeting of the ministerial committee tasked with following up the executive status of major development projects in the country. The meeting reviewed updates on major projects included in memoranda of understanding signed between Kuwait and other countries, notably cooperation on Mubarak Al-Kabeer Port, electricity systems, renewable energy development, and low-carbon waste recycling initiatives.

Discussions also addressed housing development, environmental infrastructure for wastewater treatment plants, free and economic zones, land reclamation, ecosystem rehabilitation, expansion of afforestation programs, environmental protection efforts, and measures aimed at combating sand encroachment nationwide.

Al-Mashaan affirmed that the executive contract for the North Kabd Wastewater Treatment Plant project will be signed in February with the designated Chinese state-owned company, under the patronage of His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Ahmad Abdullah Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah and senior officials.

Assistant Foreign Minister for Asian Affairs and committee rapporteur Ambassador Sameeh Johar Hayat said the meeting falls within periodic reviews of agreements and memoranda signed with other governments, stressing continued coordination among state bodies to accelerate implementation of major projects. The committee also reviewed progress on Mubarak Al-Kabeer Port, including a proposal by China Baowu Steel Group to establish an iron and steel plant on Boubyan Island, with Kuwait expressing interest in supporting and potentially co-investing in the project.

The meeting was attended by Minister of State for Municipal Affairs and Minister of State for Housing Affairs Abdulatif Al-Mishari, Minister of Finance Dr. Yaqoub Al-Refai, Director General of KDIPA Sheikh Dr. Meshal Jaber Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, Head of the Fatwa and Legislation Department Counselor Salah Al-Majed, Assistant Foreign Minister for Asian Affairs and committee rapporteur Ambassador Sameeh Johar Hayat, Undersecretary of the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy Dr. Adel Al-Zamel, and senior officials from the Ministries of Defense and Foreign Affairs.

However, the current political landscape raises a fundamental question: Does the problem lie in the Parliament and its oversight role, or in the mechanism for selecting ministers?" Eng. Adel Al-Jarallah Al-Kharafi wrote for *Al-Seyassah* daily.

"Today, despite the executive authority possessing full powers, we find that ministerial appointments still revolve around the same traditional names. Undoubtedly, the problem of ministerial appointments in our region is not a recent phenomenon, rather, it is the fruit of decades of relying on personal trust, or what is known as 'good guy,' at the expense of political and technical competence.

"This approach has remained unchanged in Kuwait for 60 years, rendering any change in names a mere cosmetic procedure that fails to address the core of reform.

"In advanced countries, the selection of ministers is not left to chance or personal connections. There are what are called 'leadership labs' and technical committees that work for months to examine the resumes and the social and political conduct of officials nominated for ministerial positions.

"In some major countries, nominated candidates undergo rigorous vetting that includes their criminal record, financial integrity, intellectual leanings, past political stances and crisis management skills.

"The complete file is presented to the Prime Minister, who selects based on technical criteria, rather than searching for names to fill vacancies at a later date.

"In reality, however, a true minister is not someone who waits for a predetermined 'ceiling' to be set for him, but rather someone who comes to office with his own vision and professional convictions.

"Competent national figures do not accept positions merely to fill vacancies, they strive to establish a new reality and transform the ministry from an administrative center into a center of productivity.

"The method of selecting ministers has not changed till today, meaning that the National Assembly has, for many years, been nothing more than a scapegoat for selection errors and mismanagement.

"It has become clear that the problem lies at the root and in the selection process, which requires a comprehensive overhaul.

"For months, we have witnessed the circulation of names of potential Cabinet reshuffle candidates, to the point that some officials were certain they would become ministers, but things changed later.

"While we acknowledge the constitutional right of the executive branch and the Prime Minister's right to choose his team, the situation remains unchanged. Despite the absence of the National Assembly, which was always used as a pretext for 'obstruction' and hindering the formation of the Cabinet, we find ourselves facing the same predicament. We witnessed this in recent days."

Also:

"Legends say that there was once a lion cub living in the Cuckoo Island forest. His father, the king of the jungle, assigned him a task, alongside a monkey known for his energy and speed in completing tasks," Hamad Salem Al-Marri wrote for *Al-Seyassah* daily.

"The cub was lazy, which prompted his father, the lion, to constantly reprimand him for his lack of productivity. The lion praised the monkey and urged the cub to be as productive and efficient as him, thus, planting a deep-seated resentment towards the monkey in the cub's heart.

"As the years passed, the cub grew up to be a lion and was crowned king of the jungle, succeeding his father. The animals of the jungle gathered to congratulate and pledge their allegiance to him. When he saw the monkey among them, he called him over and asked, 'Where is your hat?' The monkey replied, 'I do not wear a hat.' The lion slapped him hard across the face and banished him. Every time he saw the monkey, he called him back and asked, 'Where is your hat?' The monkey would give the same answer, and the lion would slap him hard. This continued for many days until the news spread among all the animals, and talk began to circulate that the lion was a dictator and a tyrant, for beating the monkey without any good reason.

"After the lion persisted in beating the monkey, the wolf asked him why he kept hitting the monkey without any justification. The lion replied that he hated the monkey and could not stand him, and that he just wanted an excuse to beat him. The wolf advised him, 'Your actions will only increase the people's hatred for you. You should ask him a logical question, like asking him to bring you an apple. If he brings you a red one, slap him and say, 'I want a green one.' If he brings you a green one, slap him and say, 'I want a red one.' As the lion was walking through the forest, he saw the monkey working diligently. He called him over in front of all the animals and asked him to bring him an apple. The monkey asked, 'Do you want a red one or a green one?' The lion, without hesitation, slapped him hard and said, 'Where is your hat?'"

"This story applies to some employees who were promoted and given an administrative position through favoritism or administrative corruption, especially since the current job evaluation system prioritizes attendance and punctuality over productivity, proficiency and respectful interaction with the public and colleagues. Once they assume their positions, they become arrogant towards their colleagues and harbor resentment, particularly if those colleagues are more active and efficient. This is done to mask their low productivity and lack of administrative knowledge.

"This type of manager is more prevalent in the public sector than the private sector. The private sector focuses on productivity and evaluates employees according to high-quality standards, unlike the bloated public sector, which suffers from disguised unemployment, low productivity, and the absence of a proper mechanism for evaluating employee performance.

"Furthermore, promotions in the public sector are based on length of service rather than experience, productivity and innovation.

"The real tragedy is when this type of official assumes a leadership position. He will use his position to attack anyone who was previously better than him, trying to portray himself as decisive and knowledgeable, while in reality, he is draining the ministry of competent individuals who flee from his tyranny and injustice."



"The city of Samarra, north of the Iraqi capital Baghdad, was teeming with life and knowledge, boasting of its great university headed by esteemed scholar Abu Al-Hasan, one of the leading thinkers in Iraq, around whom students from all over the Arab world gathered," Mohammad Al-Fawzan wrote for *Al-Seyassah* daily.

"One of the students was a poor but sharp-witted and ambitious young man who dreamed of one day becoming a pillar of knowledge in his country. On a hot day, this student left his teacher's class hungry, possessing only a fil and a half, while his simple meal - a loaf of bread and a radish - cost two fils.

"The student bought a loaf of bread for one fil, then went to the greengrocer, saying, 'I only have half a fil, can I buy a bunch of radishes with it?'"

"The greengrocer replied sarcastically that a bunch of radishes cost one fil.

"The student pleaded with him to give him the radishes for half a fil and he would share with him some useful piece of Islamic jurisprudence.

"The vendor laughed loudly and said disdainfully, 'If your knowledge were of any use, it would have brought you half a penny to complete the price of the radishes. Go, soak your knowledge in water and drink it to satisfy your hunger.'

"These words struck the student like a dagger to the heart. He stood stunned and thought to himself, 'Truly, what good is knowledge that does not feed its possessor? Ten years of studying have not even provided me with half a penny.'

"At that moment, the student decided to quit his studies and find a job to sustain himself. A few days later, Abu Al-Hasan noticed his smart student was missing and inquired about him in the classroom. He was told that the student quit his studies to work, because poverty overwhelmed him.

"The teacher, pushed by compassion, went to the student's house and asked him why he abandoned his studies. The student recounted his story, tears streaming down his face. The teacher reached out, removed his ring, and said, 'Take this ring, sell it, and improve your situation.'

"The student went to the goldsmiths market and offered the ring for sale. One of them exclaimed in surprise, 'This ring is precious! I will buy it from you for a thousand dinars. But, how did you get it?'"

"The student replied that the ring was a gift from his teacher, Sheikh Abu Al-Hasan. "The goldsmith went with him to the teacher to verify his claim, and Abu Al-Hasan confirmed that he indeed gave him the ring.

"The goldsmith paid the price and left. When the student returned, his teacher asked him, 'Who did you go to when you wanted to sell the ring?'"

"He replied, 'To the goldsmiths market, of course.'

"The teacher asked him why he did not go to the radish seller. The student answered, 'Because only goldsmiths know the value of jewels and metals.' The professor smiled and said, 'My son, you have answered your own question. Why did you let a radish seller judge your knowledge? Does anyone truly value knowledge except those who recognize its worth? Resume your studies, and do not let someone who does not know your value put you on their scale. My son, do not let someone who does not know your worth evaluate you. Not everyone who sees you understands your true essence. Only goldsmiths know the value of gold, and only scholars understand the worth of a scholar.'

"How many among us have lost ourselves because we believed a cheap opinion from an unworthy tongue? Value yourself in the eyes of those who see your essence, not in the eyes of those who see you as merchandise in a radish market."

Fire drill conducted at KU students housing

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 12: The Security and Safety Department at Kuwait University, in collaboration with the Student Housing for International Students, organized an evacuation drill at the International Student Housing Complex in Sabah Al-Salem University City.

The drill involved several agencies, such as Kuwait Fire Force (KFF) and the Emergency Medical Services Department in the Ministry of Health.

The goals of the drill include ensuring preparedness, raising safety awareness, and strengthening the emergency response capabilities of university staff and students.

Officials and supervisors from various security and safety departments were present to observe the drill.

During the drill, the functionality of alarm systems, emergency exits, designated shelter procedures, and response times to external assembly points were rigorously tested. The results confirmed the readiness of all involved authorities and the reliability of the approved emergency protocols.

Director of the Security and Safety Department Yousef Al-Khamis disclosed that this drill is a component of the regular training schedule of the department.

He said the purpose is to assess response speed and raise awareness of the university community in order to improve the ability to respond swiftly and systematically to different emergency situations.

He added that such level of commitment underscores the dedication of the university to apply the highest security and safety standards.

Faleh Al-Masoud, Director of Student Housing for International Students, added that the precautionary drill included the evacuation of four residential buildings. He stated that the student housing facilities are equipped with 58 emergency exits and designated shelters.

The drill consisted of injury scenarios to ensure highly efficient handling of medical emergencies. It concluded within record time -- 12 minutes and 18 seconds, during which 235 people were evacuated.

This record is an affirmation of the exceptional level of preparedness, organization and coordination among all participating entities.

Funds scandal case shelved

Tow cars, stick to rules

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 12 : The Criminal Court, presided over by Judge Abdullah Al-Osaimi, overturned the decision of the Public Prosecution to dismiss the case regarding the embezzlement of public funds in a thermal camera maintenance tender at the Ministry of Interior.

The court also ordered referral of the nine defendants for trial, including former senior officials in the Ministry of Interior, an engineer, technicians and representatives of two contracting companies.

The defendants are accused of involvement in the embezzlement of KD1,889,000 of public funds by one of the companies, harming national interests, forgery and negligence of duty.

The case was based on the report of the State Audit Bureau (SAB) about the thermal camera maintenance contract for 2012 and 2013. The report included remarks on the supply and installation of an underground invisible system, as well as network and

equipment maintenance.

The Public Prosecution previously decided to close the case and dismiss the suspicion of crimes, but the Criminal Court, while considering the appeal against the closure decision, returned the case to the prosecution to complete the investigations.

After completing the procedures, the court decided to cancel the closure decision and refer the accused for trial.



Tow cars, stick to rules: The General Traffic Department issued awareness brochures, reminding motorists about the ministerial decree regulating the towing and hauling of vehicles and equipment on public roads, reports Al-Anba daily.

The department stressed that drivers of towing and hauling vehicles (cranes) must ensure they remain on the right side of the road, comply with the minimum and maximum speed limits, maintain the safety and security of towing connections, and prevent the presence of persons inside the towing vehicle cabin other than the driver.

It also underscored the need to obtain a towing and hauling permit from the vehicle inspection units.

Furthermore, the department confirmed that the length of the towed vehicle must not exceed 15 meters, and the height of the towing vehicle, along with its load, must not exceed four meters.

Mahmoud Radwan... and 'The Time of Souad'

An English proverb says: "The jack of all trades is the master of none."

If we were given the choice between being treated by a consultant surgeon who knows his job and knows nothing outside of surgery, and someone who does not perform any work professionally but knows a little about everything, whom would we choose? The answer is simple yet difficult at the same time.

For example, if we want to undergo open-heart surgery, it is safer to consult the best cardiologist. But, if we want to choose someone to accompany us on a trip or an evening out, we will not care whether they are a consultant on 'fun' or a specialist in the art of travel, we will most likely choose the one closest to our hearts and sensibilities.

Even more wonderful is to find Abdulhusain Abdulredha and Ibrahim Al-Rashdan combined in one person. My next article (for Friday) will be about the latter.

I see in consultant dermatologist Dr. Khaled Montasser what I am looking for. He is a charming and elegant man, his smile not merely etched, but indelible on his face. He is an unparalleled speaker, a brilliant novelist, a fierce fighter, a serious researcher, and a liberal with vast knowledge.

Dr. Montasser stopped practicing medicine, choosing instead to wield the pen rather than the scalpel or stethoscope, dedicating himself entirely to defending the security of his homeland and his family, upholding reason within his country, promoting love and peace, rejecting extremism, and combating the ideologies of extremist groups who demand that others parrot their words, read what they approve of, advise against reading, consume what they deem permissible, wear what they approve of, and follow them to paradise... even by force.

In a tweet by Mahmoud Radwan, critiquing Dr. Montasser's latest novel, "The Time of Souad," he describes it as a testament to the complex relationship between art, homeland and political transformations

in modern Egypt. The novel does not portray Souad Hosny merely as an artist in the history of Egyptian cinema, but rather, through a keen narrative awareness, transforms her into a concentrated icon or symbol of the Egyptian State itself: its rise, its defeats, its alienation and its unfulfilled dreams.

Dr. Montasser weaves intricate dramatic and psychological threads, linking the tragedy of Souad Hosny (the Cinderella) to the trajectory of the nation, so that the individual body becomes a mirror of the nation's collective body.

The personal biography becomes a key to understanding political and cultural transformations. Thus, the novel here is not simply a story about an Egyptian artist, but an anatomy of an entire era. On screen, Souad was a source of laughter, joy and spectacle. Her smile was iconic and her presence was always accompanied by happiness.

But behind the scenes, Souad Hosny suffered from profound psychological anguish, severe physical pain, and a crushing loneliness unseen by the public.

Such was the condition of Egypt, which exported various forms of artistic and cultural delight, while at its core, it was grappling with political crises, defeats and deep intellectual fractures. Her joy here is not genuine, but a defensive mask concealing her pain.

Then came the rise and the fall, or the transition from enlightenment to regression. Souad Hosny, or rather Egypt, was once at the height of her brilliance, especially during the years of liberation, progress and diversity. Souad was a daughter of an era that dreamed, experimented, and took artistic and intellectual risks.

But this rise did not last. With the decline of her health and mental state, Cinderella Souad withered, and so did Egypt. Beauty eroded as the attack of isolation paved the way for cultural desolation.

The exploitation and plundering of Souad's body, or rather the body of Egypt, culminated in the assassination of her body, both physically and spiritually, through silence, abandonment and defamation. Almost everyone participated in the crime. Did Souad Hosny commit suicide or she was murdered? The same question applies to Egypt.

He underscored the importance of national unity and the collaboration of

official and civil institutions in serving the community and reinforcing its cohesion, explaining that 'Peace Carnival 2' is a reflection of the national partnership and institutional integration among various entities.

The carnival featured the participation of several State ministries, including the ministries of Education, Interior, Defense, Health and Public Works, underscoring the complementary roles of government institutions in serving society.

Kuwait leads

She added that the procedures for applying for equivalency of academic qualifications obtained outside Kuwait are explained through the website of the Ministry of Higher Education or its services on the Sahel application, including a detailed step-by-step guide on how to obtain electronic equivalency. She praised the efforts of the sub-teams at the CSC, Ministry of Higher Education, and Public Authority for Manpower (PAM) in this regard.

She underscored the importance of cooperation among liaison officers of various entities to ensure the smooth implementation of the process and the immediate achievement of its objectives.

She warned that forging certificates is a crime as per Article 259 of Kuwaiti Penal Code No. 16/1960.

The article stipulates that anyone who forges an academic or professional certificate and uses it while being aware that it is forged shall face imprisonment for a term not exceeding five years and a fine not exceeding KD5,000, or any one of these penalties.

Abdulrasoul affirmed that combating this crime is vital to the preservation of the integrity of official documents, ensuring the validity of qualifications, and guaranteeing the continuous entitlement of their holders to financial and professional benefits within a legal framework.

She stressed that deterrent penalties are an effective means of addressing this phenomenon and strengthening trust and transparency.

It is worth mentioning that the Cabinet tasked Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs Sharida Al-Maousherji with forming the committee, which is headed by the Legal Advice and Legislation Department and includes representatives from five government entities -- Ministry of Higher Education, Ministry of Interior, Ministry of Health, Ministry of Justice and the CSC.

Weekend weather

He predicted high sea waves, with the possibility of scattered light rain. He disclosed that the weather on Friday will be warm, with reduced horizontal visibility due to fog that is expected to improve later in the day. Winds will be light to moderate, shifting from variable to southeasterly at speeds between eight and 30 kilometers per hour, with some scattered clouds.

Al-Ali indicated that Friday night will be mild to cool and partly cloudy, with light to moderate southeasterly to variable winds between 10 and 32 kilometers per hour, and a chance of fog in some locations.

Minimum temperatures will range between 18 and 20 degrees Celsius, and sea conditions will be slight to moderate, with waves ranging from two to four feet.

On Saturday, the country will experience an increase in temperatures under partly cloudy skies.

Winds will shift from southwesterly

to northwesterly, light to moderate in speed, occasionally becoming active with gusts ranging from 15 to 50 kilometers per hour. There is a chance of dust in open areas, along with scattered light rain.

Maximum temperatures on Saturday are expected to range between 32 and 34 degrees Celsius, and the sea will be slight to moderate, occasionally reaching waves between two and six feet.

Al-Ali added that Saturday night will be cool, with northwesterly to variable winds that are light to moderate, ranging between 10 and 35 kilometers per hour. Some scattered clouds are expected, along with a chance of light scattered rain.

Minimum temperatures will range between 15 and 17 degrees Celsius, and the sea will be slight to moderate, with waves ranging from two to five feet.

Lebanese minister

years, its generous contributions, and its role in the Arab efforts that helped end the war and restore stability.

On the security front, he stressed the need to strengthen State authority in the South, where the Lebanese Army has operational control now. He added that efforts are underway to bolster the Army's deployment in the northern part of Litani River.

He also highlighted efforts to secure the northern and eastern borders, the fight against drug manufacturing and trafficking, the killing of some major drug dealers during security operations conducted by the Lebanese Army, and thwarting attempts to smuggle to neighboring Arab countries. He underscored the commitment of Lebanon to maintain its security and that of its Arab neighbors.

Asked about the decision of Kuwait to include eight Lebanese hospitals on its terrorism list, he stated that the Ministry of Information does not issue official statements on its own, as it acts based on data or findings issued by the concerned authorities in Lebanon.

He clarified that, as of the time of his statement, no official statement has been issued by the concerned authorities in this regard, emphasizing that as soon as an official position is released, he will not hesitate to share it to the public, as each ministry has its specific role, and the Ministry of Information handles the clarification process upon completion of official data.

On Hezbollah, Morcos stated that the government, in its ministerial statement and as per the oath of office, adheres to the constitutional frameworks, the National Reconciliation Document (Taif Agreement), the relevant international resolutions, particularly Resolution 1701, and the arrangements aimed at ending hostilities.

He asserted that the objective is clear -- to extend State authority over all Lebanese territories and to control the use of force. He revealed that the government has initiated gradual practical steps, which include assigning the Lebanese Army to implement certain phases.

He said the first phase, southern part of Litani River, has been completed, while a decision regarding the second phase is pending, based on the assessment of the Army Commander of the needs and capabilities.

He asserted that the government is employing wisdom, expertise and clarity in establishing this path despite the ongoing Israeli aggression, continuous occupation of certain areas, and absence of positive indicators to counter it.

He added that the overall direction is to strengthen State authority and achieve stability.

He then credited Kuwait's regulatory framework for fostering trust and innovation necessary to accelerate digital commerce and the widespread adoption of electronic payments.

Digital payments are now a vital driver of Kuwaiti business productivity, by partnering with banks and the government, Visa is actively expanding payment acceptance and modernizing the nation's financial infrastructure.

Suspect in Canada shooting identified: The suspect in a school shooting in Canada was an 18-year-old who had a history of police visits to her home to check on her mental health, authorities said Wednesday, a day after the attack that killed eight people in a remote part of British Columbia.

Police said Jesse Van Routselaar was found dead from an apparent self-inflicted wound following the assault on a school in the small mountain community of Tumbler Ridge.

Royal Canadian Mounted Police Deputy Commissioner **Dwayne McDonald** said Van Routselaar first killed her mother and stepbrother at the family home before attacking the nearby school. She had a history of mental health contacts with police, he said. The motive was unclear. Police initially said nine people were killed Tuesday, but McDonald clarified Wednesday that there were eight fatalities. (AP)

Multi-car crash in immigration operation: A federal immigration operation in the US city of Saint Paul in the state of Minnesota ended in a car crash on Wednesday and injured several people.

The Saint Paul Police Department said federal agents were pursuing a person in a vehicle when it crashed into other cars in Cathedral Hill neighborhood, adding that the pursued driver and another motorist were hospitalized with non-life-threatening injuries.

US Department of Homeland Security official Tricia McLaughlin told Patch and Newsweek that immigration

and Customs Enforcement (ICE) authorities attempted to stop a targeted vehicle, as its driver, who had entered the United States from Honduras, tried to evade law enforcement. He drove recklessly and crashed into multiple vehicles, including an ICE one.

Saint Paul's Mayor Kaohly Her said in a statement that the incident showed the ongoing ICE presence was creating chaos and endangering residents in the city, according to Minnesota Public Radio.

Because of the reckless way ICE was running its operation, one person ended up in the hospital and several residents had their cars damaged, she added, calling for an end to the federal immigration enforcement campaign in the region known as Operation Metro Surge. (Xinhua)

Nurses on strike in NY approve contracts: Nurses on strike at two major New York City hospital systems have approved new contracts, but ones striking at another system rejected the proposal, ensuring that the monthlong walkout will continue at some of the city's major medical centers.

The New York State Nurses Association announced Wednesday that its members at Montefiore and Mount Sinai approved new three-year deals while nurses at New York Presbyterian rejected the proposal.

The nurses who will be returning to work in the coming days represent about 10,500 of the roughly 15,000 nurses who walked off the job Jan. 12 in what the union said is the largest and longest strike of its kind in city history.

"This hard-earned victory shows hospitals that they can't cut corners on patient care," Nancy Hagans, the union's president, said in a statement. "Now it's time for New York-Presbyterian to do the right thing, agree to a fair contract and bring all our nurses back to work."

Brendan Carr, CEO of Mount Sinai, urged hospital staff to come together with empathy and respect and a "shared culture" as its unionized nurses return to work starting Saturday. (AP)

Democrats decry indictment attempt, warning it 'could break this institution'

WASHINGTON, Feb 12, (AP): US Democrats took to the Senate floor Wednesday to deliver impassioned speeches denouncing the Justice Department's attempt to indict a group of lawmakers who last year urged US military members to resist "illegal orders," framing the episode as a dire test for their chamber and the rule of law.

"The fact that they failed to incarcerate a United States senator should not obviate our outrage. They tried to incarcerate two of us," said Sen Brian Schatz, D-Hawaii. "I am not entirely sure the United States Senate can survive this if we do not have Republicans standing up."

Schatz was among a string of Democratic senators who spoke a day after a Washington grand jury declined to indict six Democratic lawmakers, including Sens Elissa Slotkin and Mark Kelly, over a 90-second video that drew fierce backlash from President Donald Trump.

While Democrats blasted the Trump administration, they also challenged their Republican colleagues to speak out. Sen. Chris Murphy called it a "test for the Senate" that "could break this institution permanently."

Earlier Wednesday, Slotkin and Kelly praised the grand jury's decision,

with Slotkin saying that "if things had gone a different way, we'd be preparing for arrest." "A group of anonymous Americans upheld the rule of law and determined that this case should not proceed," she said.

The failed indictments mark a high-profile setback for the Justice De-

partment, which has faced mounting scrutiny from Democrats and some Republicans over investigations seen as aligned with Trump's political grievances. The episode has raised stark First Amendment questions about the potential prosecution of sitting members of Congress for their speech.

'Legislation is needed to prevent voter fraud'

US House Republicans push strict proof-of-citizenship requirement for voters

WASHINGTON, Feb 12, (AP): US House Republicans rushed to approve legislation on Wednesday that would impose strict new proof-of-citizenship requirements ahead of the midterm elections, a long shot Trump administration priority that faces sharp blowback in the Senate.

The bill, called the Safeguard American Voter Eligibility, or SAVE America Act, would require Americans to prove they are citizens when they register to vote, mostly through a valid US passport or birth certificate. It would also require a valid photo identification before voters can cast ballots, which some states already demand. It was approved on a mostly party-line vote, 218-213.

Republicans said the legislation is needed to prevent voter fraud, but Democrats warn it will disenfranchise millions of Americans by making it harder to vote. Federal law already requires that voters in national elections be US citizens, but there's no requirement to provide documentary proof. Experts said voter fraud is extremely rare, and very few noncitizens ever slip through the cracks. Fewer than one in 10 Americans don't have paperwork

proving they are citizens.

"Some of my colleagues will call this voter suppression or Jim Crow 2.0," said Rep. Bryan Steil, R-Wis., presenting the package at a committee hearing.

But he said "those allegations are false," and he argued the bill is needed to enforce existing laws, particularly those that bar immigrants who are not citizens from voting. "The current law is not strong enough," he said.

The GOP's sudden push to change voting rules at the start of the midterm election season is raising red flags, particularly because President Donald Trump has suggested he wants to nationalize U.S. elections, which, under the Constitution, are designed to be run by individual states.

The Trump administration recently seized ballots in Georgia from the 2020 election, which the president insists he won despite his defeat to Democrat Joe Biden. The Department of Justice is demanding voter rolls from states, including Michigan, where a federal judge this week dismissed the department's lawsuit seeking the voter files. Secretaries of state have raised concerns that voters' personal data may

be shared with Homeland Security to verify citizenship and could result in people being unlawfully purged from the rolls.

"Let me be clear what this is about: It's about Republicans trying to rig the

next election," said Rep Jim McGovern of Massachusetts, the top Democrat on the Rules Committee, during a hearing ahead of the floor vote. "Republicans are pushing the Save America Act because they want fewer Americans to

vote. It's that simple."

The legislation is actually a do-over of a similar bill the House approved last year, which also sought to clamp down on fraudulent voting, particularly among noncitizens. It won the support of four House Democrats, but stalled in the Republican-led Senate. Only one Democrat, Rep. Henry Cuellar of Texas, voted for the revised bill.

This version toughens some of the requirements further, while creating a process for those whose names may have changed, particularly during marriage, to provide the paperwork necessary and further attest to their identity.

It also requires states to share their voter information with the Department of Homeland Security, as a way to verify the citizenship of the names on the voter rolls. That has drawn pushback from elections officials as potentially intrusive on people's privacy.

The new rules in the bill would take effect immediately, if the bill is passed by both chambers of Congress and signed into law.

But with primary elections getting underway next month, critics said the sudden shift would be difficult for state

election officials to implement and potentially confuse voters.

Voting experts have warned that more than 20 million US citizens of voting age do not have proof of their citizenship readily available. Almost half of Americans do not have a US passport.

"Election Day is fast approaching," said Sen. Lisa Murkowski, R-Alaska. "Imposing new federal requirements now, when states are deep into their preparations, would negatively impact election integrity by forcing election officials to scramble to adhere to new policies likely without the necessary resources."

In the Senate, where Republicans also have majority control, there does not appear to be enough support to push the bill past the chamber's filibuster rules, which largely require 60 votes to advance legislation.

That frustration has led some Republicans, led by Sen. Mike Lee of Utah, to push for a process that would skip the 60-vote threshold in this case, and allow the bill to be debated through a so-called standing filibuster - a process that would open the door to potentially endless debate.

US allies at NATO focus on Europe as Trump administration steps back

BRUSSELS, Feb 12, (AP): European allies at NATO on Thursday brushed aside concerns that the United States has stepped back from its leadership role of the world's biggest security organization, leaving them and Canada to do the lion's share of defending Europe.

US Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth did not attend Thursday's gathering of defense ministers at NATO headquarters in Brussels. His no-show came after Secretary of State Marco Rubio skipped the last meeting of NATO foreign ministers in December.

It's rare for members of a US administration to miss a meeting of the organization's top decision-making body, the North Atlantic Council, at the level of ministers, let alone two meetings in a row. Under Secretary of Defense Elbridge Colby was sent in Hegseth's place.

"Sadly for him, he is missing a good party," Icelandic Foreign Minister Porgerður Katrín Gunnarsdóttir told reporters. "Of course, it's always better that the ministers attend here, but I would not describe it as a bad signal."

"I'm not disappointed," German Defense Minister Boris Pistorius said. "Each of us has a full agenda. And one time the American defense minister is here, and one time not, so it's his deci-

sion and his duties he has to fulfill."

When asked what NATO's purpose was in its infancy in 1949, NATO's first secretary-general, the British general and diplomat Lord Hastings Ismay, was reputed to have replied: "To keep the Americans in, the Russians out and the Germans down."

Nowadays, Germany is stepping up. After Russia invaded Ukraine four years ago, it vowed to spend 100 billion euros (\$118 billion) to modernize its armed forces in coming years.

A big part of NATO Secretary-General Mark Rutte's job is to keep the Americans in.

"They have to take care of the whole world. This is the United States," Rutte told reporters before chairing the meeting. "I totally accept it, agree with it."

"They have always consistently pleaded for Europe doing more, Canada doing more, taking more care of the defense of NATO territory, of course in conjunction with the United States," he said. That means more European spending on conventional weapons and defense, while the US guarantees NATO's nuclear deterrent.

But doubts linger, and surprises from the Trump administration cannot be ruled out. Allies still wonder whether more US troops will be withdrawn from Europe.

"What for me is the most important is the no-surprise policy that has been agreed between the NATO secretary-general and the US," Dutch Defense Minister Ruben Brekelmans said.

Publicly at least, the Trump administration is doing much less at NATO. A year ago, Hegseth warned that America's security priorities lie elsewhere and that Europe would have to look after itself, and Ukraine in its battle against Russia's full-scale invasion.

Supplies of US guns and money that were sent to Ukraine by the previous administration of President Joe Biden have dried up under Trump. European allies and Canada are obliged to buy weapons from the United States to donate now.

Western backers of Ukraine were also meeting at NATO on Thursday to drum up more military support. A scheme proudly championed by the Pentagon under Biden, the Ukraine Defense Contact Group is now chaired by the U.K. and Germany.

U.K. Defense Secretary John Healey announced that Britain would provide "an extra half a billion pounds (\$682 million) in urgent air defense to Ukraine. This is Britain being a force for good in the world, building a new deal for European security within NATO."

Russia launches barrage of drones, missiles at Ukrainian cities: officials

KYIV, Ukraine, Feb 12, (AP): Russia launched a barrage of ballistic missiles and drones at Ukrainian cities in overnight attacks, officials reported on Thursday as Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said Moscow was "hesitating" about another round of US-brokered talks on stopping the fighting.

Washington has proposed further negotiations next week between Russian and Ukrainian delegations in Miami or Abu Dhabi, in the United Arab Emirates, which was the location of the last meeting, Zelenskyy said late Wednesday. Ukraine "immediately confirmed" it would attend, he said. "So far, as I understand it, Russia is hesitating," Zelenskyy told reporters in a messaging app interview late Wednesday.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said on Thursday that another round of talks was expected "soon" but gave no further details.

American officials made no comment on the possibility of further talks as part of a yearlong peace effort by the Trump administration. Zelenskyy said last week that the United States has given Ukraine and Russia a June deadline to reach a deal.

But with Russia's invasion of its neighbor marking its fourth anniversary later this month, disagreements between Moscow and Kyiv over key

issues have held up a comprehensive settlement. The issues include who keeps the Ukrainian land that Russia's army has so far occupied, especially in the eastern Donbas industrial heartland, and Moscow's demands for Kyiv to surrender more territory.

Ukraine wants Western-backed security guarantees, including a date for joining the European Union, and a postwar reconstruction package in

place before it can contemplate signing a proposed 20-point settlement, Zelenskyy said.

Russia has meanwhile continued to pound Ukrainian civilian areas, including residential areas and the power grid, and Moscow has not responded to a U.S. proposal for an "energy ceasefire" that would also halt Ukrainian drone strikes on Russian oil facilities, Zelenskyy said.

Bulgaria appoints caretaker govt until elections

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Feb 12, (AP): Bulgarian President Iliana Yotova moved Thursday to quell the country's chronic political instability by appointing a senior central bank official as interim prime minister until national elections in April.

Andrey Gyurov, deputy governor of the Bulgarian National Bank, will lead a caretaker government whose main task will be to organize a free and fair vote in a country that is holding its eighth election in five years.

The political uncertainty that has plagued the EU and NATO member state during this period has eroded public trust in institutions, created an opening for populist and nationalist groups, and paved the way for Russian hybrid influence.

President Yotova, who announced the appointment, said that she expects Gyurov to propose the members of his cabinet within seven days. She would then have to approve the proposal and set the election date, which she had previously indicated would be April 19.

Gyurov, 50, holds a bachelor's degree in economics from Truman State University in Missouri and a Ph.D. from the University of Vienna in Austria. Having held senior positions in

academia and European financial institutions, he was appointed deputy governor of the central bank in Sofia in 2023. Before that he was also a lawmaker and floor leader of the reformist "We Continue the Change" group in parliament.

Nationwide protests erupted at the

end of 2025, sparked by public anger over corruption, injustice, and perceived oligarchic influence, forcing the resignation of the governing coalition led by the center-right GERB party. Several subsequent attempts to form a new government within the current fragmented parliament have failed.

S.Korea former interior minister gets 7-year sentence for aiding martial law

Kim's daughter close to being designated North Korea's future leader: spy agency

SEOUL, South Korea, Feb 12, (AP): South Korea's spy agency told lawmakers on Thursday that it believes the teenage daughter of North Korean leader Kim Jong Un is close to being designated as the country's future leader as he moves to extend the family dynasty to a fourth generation.

The assessment by the National Intelligence Service comes as North Korea is preparing to hold its biggest political conference later this month, where Kim is expected to outline his major policy goals for the next five years and take steps to tighten his authoritarian grip.

In a closed-door briefing, NIS officials said they are closely monitoring whether Kim's daughter - believed to be named Kim Ju Ae and around 13 years old - appears with him before thousands of delegates at the upcoming Workers' Party Congress, said lawmaker Lee Seong Kweun, who attended the meeting.

First appearing in public at a long-range missile test in November 2022, Kim Ju Ae has since accompanied her father to an increasing number of events, including weapons tests, military parades and factory openings. She traveled with him to Beijing last September for Kim's first summit with Chinese leader Xi Jinping in six years on the sidelines of a World War II event.

Speculation about her political future intensified last month when she joined her parents on a New Year's Day visit to Pyongyang's Kumsusan Palace of the Sun, a sacred family mausoleum displaying the embalmed bodies of her late grandfather and great-grandfather, the country's first and second-generation leaders. Some experts saw the visit as the clearest sign yet that she's positioned to be the heir to her 42-year-old father.

South Korean officials initially expressed doubt that she could be chosen as a North Korean leader, citing the country's deeply conservative culture and tradition of male-dominated leadership. But her increasingly prominent appearances in state media have prompted a reassessment.

In its previous assessment of Kim Ju Ae's status in September, the NIS told lawmakers that Kim Jong Un's decision to bring her along on his trip to China was likely part of an effort to build a "narrative" possibly paving the way for her succession.

"In the past, (NIS) described Kim Ju Ae as being in the midst of 'successor training.' What was notable today is that they used the term 'successor-designate stage,' a shift that's quite significant," Lee said.

According to Lee, the agency cited her growing presence at high-profile military events, her inclusion in the

family visit to Kumsusan, and signs that Kim Jong Un was beginning to seek her input on certain policy matters.

Despite her increased visibility in propaganda, North Korean state media have never published the name of Kim Jong Un's daughter, only referring to her as his "respected" or "most beloved" child.

his wife also likely have an older son and a younger third child whose gender is unknown.

Since its foundation in 1948, North Korea has been ruled by male members of the Kim family, beginning with the country's founder Kim Il Sung and followed by his son, Kim Jong Il.

Also:

SEOUL: South Korea's former interior minister was sentenced Thursday to seven years in prison for abetting then-President Yoon Suk Yeol's brief declaration of martial law in 2024.

The verdict for Lee Sang-min came a week before a different judge at the same Seoul court rules on whether Yoon's actions amounted to rebellion, a crime for which prosecutors are seeking the death penalty.

Lee, who led the ministry of interior and safety, was convicted for helping carry out the declaration and passing along Yoon's orders to the country's police and fire chiefs to cut water and electricity to news organizations that were critical of his policies. The instructions weren't carried out since martial law was lifted quickly after lawmakers broke through a military and police blockade at the National Assembly and unanimously voted to lift it.

Lee denied receiving or issuing instructions to cut off utilities to the news organizations, disputing testimony

from other officials, including former National Fire Agency Commissioner General Heo Seok-gon, who said Lee conveyed such orders by phone. Lee also denied conspiring about or planning the martial law declaration.

Judge Ryu Kyung-jin said testimony from other officials, security camera footage and other evidence clearly showed Lee attempted to carry out Yoon's orders and that it was indisputable Lee played an important role in enforcing martial law.

The judge, however, acquitted Lee of lesser charges of abusing his power, citing a lack of evidence.

Lee smiled quietly after the verdict. His legal team didn't immediately say whether he would appeal. Prosecutors had sought a 15-year sentence.

Lee is the second member of Yoon's Cabinet convicted in connection with martial law. Former prime minister Han Duck-soo received a sentence of 23 years in prison but has appealed.

The conservative Yoon has defended martial law as a necessary act of governance against the liberals, whom he described as "anti-state" forces obstructing his agenda with their legislative majority.

He was later removed from office and has been under arrest since July while facing multiple criminal trials, with the rebellion charge carrying the most severe punishment.

Wang calls for joint efforts to deepen China-Hungary friendship, cooperation

BUDAPEST, Feb 12, (Xinhua): Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi on Wednesday called on China and Hungary to make joint efforts to advance bilateral ties.

Wang, also a member of the Political Bureau of the Communist Party of China Central Committee, made the remarks as he and Hungarian Minister of Foreign Affairs and Trade Peter Szijarto met the press following their talks in Budapest, the Hungarian capital.

Noting that the two sides enjoy a traditional friendship, Wang said that over the more than 70 years since establishing diplomatic ties, China and Hungary have consistently adhered to mutual respect, equality and win-win cooperation, setting an example of a new type of international relations and forging an all-weather comprehensive strategic partnership for the new era.

Wang said his visit to Hungary was aimed at deepening friendship and expanding cooperation, adding that he and Szijarto reached broad consensus during their talks and are fully confident about the future development of bilateral relations. Looking ahead, Wang called on the two sides to continue making efforts in five aspects.

First, jointly consolidate the foundation of mutual trust. High-level political mutual trust guarantees the steady and long-term development of China-Hungary relations, Wang said.

Guided by the important consensus reached between the leaders of the two countries, both sides are ready to enhance strategic communication and deepen strategic mutual trust, while supporting each other on issues concerning their core interests and major concerns, he said.

China highly appreciates Hungary's steadfast commitment to the one-China principle and will, as always, support Hungary in safeguarding its sovereignty, security and development interests and in pursuing a development path suited to its national conditions, Wang said.


Second, jointly deepen mutually beneficial cooperation. Highlighting high-quality, practical cooperation as the driving force for the robust growth of bilateral relations, Wang said the two sides will continue to align the Belt and Road Initiative with Hungary's Opening to the East policy and advance flagship projects such as the Hungary-Serbia railway toward early

operation.

Wang noted that it is precisely because of the friendly China-Hungary relationship that Hungary has become one of the most important European destinations for Chinese investment. He expressed hope that Hungary will create a more favorable business environment and provide greater policy support for Chinese companies investing and operating in the country.

He added that China will remain committed to high-level opening-up, sharing opportunities and pursuing common development with countries around the world. Wang welcomed Hungary to ride the "fast track" of Chinese modernization and expand cooperation in emerging fields such as artificial intelligence, the digital economy, new energy, green development and high-end equipment, continuously upgrading China-Hungary cooperation.

Third, jointly enhance people-to-people exchanges. Wang said the people-to-people bond is the source of vitality for bilateral relations, noting that the recently unveiled seventh Confucius Institute in Hungary has built another bridge of friendship between the two peoples.

Bangladesh votes in first election since ousting former PM Hasina

DHAKA, Bangladesh, Feb 12, (AP): Voters cast ballots across Bangladesh on Thursday in a parliamentary election seen as a critical test of the country's democracy after years of political turmoil.

After a slow start, crowds came to polling stations in the capital, Dhaka, and elsewhere by mid-morning. Balloting will continue through Thursday with results expected Friday.

More than 127 million people are eligible to vote in Bangladesh's first election since former Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's government collapsed in 2024 after weeks of mass protests, dubbed by many as a Gen Z uprising. Hasina fled the country and her party is banned from the polls. She is living in exile in India.

Tarique Rahman of the Bangladesh Nationalist Party is a leading contender to form the next government. He is the son of former Prime Minister Khaleda Zia and returned to Bangladesh in December after 17 years in self-exile in London. Rahman has pledged to rebuild democratic institutions, restore the rule of law and revive the struggling economy.

Challenging the BNP is an 11-party alliance led by the Jamaat-e-Islami, the country's largest Islamist party, which was banned under Hasina but

has gained prominence since her removal. The conservative religious group's growing influence has fueled concern, particularly among women and minority communities, that social freedoms could come under pressure if they come to power. Bangladesh is more than 90% Muslim, while around

8% are Hindu.

Shafiqur Rahman, chief of Jamaat-e-Islami, expressed optimism after casting his vote in a polling station.

"It (the election) is a turning point," he told The Associated Press. "People demand change. They desire change. We also desire the change."

Taylor plans to run for Liberal leader: Angus Taylor confirmed he plans to stand for Australian Liberal leadership on Thursday, as more shadow ministers quit from the Liberal leader Sussan Ley's front bench on Thursday to back him.

"Our country is in trouble," he said. "I'm running to be the leader of the Liberal Party. Because I believe that Australia is worth fighting for."

As of Thursday morning, a total of six shadow ministers have resigned from Sussan Ley's front bench to call for a leadership spill.

Local media revealed that a spill motion has been given to Ley, and a party room meeting to hold a spill is in prospect.

Taylor resigned from Ley's front bench on Wednesday, following recent opinion polls that have shown voter support for the Liberal Party has fallen further under Ley's leadership. (Xinhua)

Child killed in Australia ATV accident: One child has died and another has been hospitalized after an All-Terrain Vehicle (ATV) rolled over on a rural property in the Australian state of Queensland on Tuesday, the Australian Broadcasting Corporation reported.

Emergency services were called after the vehicle that was being driven by a child rolled on a property near the small town of Chinchilla, 250 km west of Brisbane, around 6 p.m. local time on Tuesday.

A five-year-old girl who was thrown from the ATV was declared deceased at the scene.

A second child, a 9-year-old boy who was driving the vehicle at the time of the incident, was treated by ambulance paramedics before being taken to the hospital in a stable condition. (Xinhua)

Principal dead in Thailand school shooting:

A school shooting that occurred in southern Thailand's Songkhla province on Wednesday left the school principal dead, according to a notice issued by the school on Thursday.

The Royal Thai police said on social media on Thursday that the attack had left one principal killed and two students injured.

The suspect, a 17-year-old local male, has been taken into custody. He committed the crime with a rifle stolen from the police, according to the police. (Xinhua)

Philippine ferry death toll rises to 52: The death toll has risen to 52 in the sinking of a ferry off Basilan province in the southern Philippines on Jan. 26, with 27 people remaining missing, the Philippine Coast Guard (PCG) said on Wednesday.

Based on verification with various parties, the total number of individuals on board the MV Trisha Kerstin 3 has been reconciled to 372, the PCG said, which released updated figures following a two-week investigation into the ferry sinking incident.

The number of confirmed survivors has been adjusted to 293 from the initial 316, a revision following a thorough identity verification process that included both manifest-listed passengers and undeclared crew members, the PCG said. (Xinhua)

Argentina's Senate backs President Milei's contentious labor overhaul after protests

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Feb 12, (AP): Argentina's Senate early Thursday gave its overall approval to a labor overhaul that is considered crucial to President Javier Milei's shock therapy program after hours of debate that unfolded in the shadow of a mass protest outside Congress.

Thousands of workers mobilized by powerful trade unions converged on a central square of downtown Buenos Aires earlier Wednesday, blocking traffic and clashing with police as the marathon session got underway.

The fiery standoff underscored the sensitivity of labor rights in this nation dominated since the 1940s by Peronism, a populist movement that has swung right and left ideologically, but has always claimed to champion workers' rights.

At around 1:30 a.m., senators backed the labor bill in principle by a vote of 42-30 after 13 hours of debate, handing Milei an initial victory that underscored the radical libertarian's newfound leverage in Congress and more pragmatic approach to legislating. After granting the bill general approval, lawmakers began a lengthy article-by-article vote.

The bill still faces a test next month in the lower house, where some Senate amendments could be changed or

reversed.

Supporters of Milei's revamped labor law say high severance payouts and taxes make it almost impossible to fire employees, constraining productivity and discouraging business from formal employment. Almost half of Argentines work off the books. Private sector job

growth has remained stagnant for 14 years. "With the modernization of the labor system, more people will have access to formal, legal employment," Milei's La Libertad Avanza party said in a statement as the debate kicked off. "We are rebuilding Argentina from the ground up, starting with employment."

Africa

N.Sudan ferry sinking kills 21: The death toll from the ferry accident in River Nile State of northern Sudan has climbed to at least 21, local authorities announced on Thursday.

"Twenty-one bodies have been recovered from the boat that sank on Wednesday," the River Nile State government said in a brief statement.

It added that search operations for missing persons are ongoing, with civil defense teams continuing rescue efforts. An eyewitness from the area told Xinhua that the boat was carrying more than 30 passengers. (Xinhua)

2 dead in Sudan drone strike: A drone strike at a mosque killed two children and injured 13 others in Sudan's central region of Kordofan early Wednesday, a local doctors group said, as the country's civil war continues.

The Sudan Doctors Network, which monitors the conflict, said the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces, which are fighting the army, carried out the strike in al-Rahad city in North Kordofan.

A spokesperson from the doctors' network, Mohamed Elsheikh, told The Associated Press that the children had been attending a lesson at dawn.

Targeting children inside mosques "represents a dangerous escalation in the pattern of repeated violations against civilians," the network added. (Xinhua)

Madagascar cyclone death toll rises to 31:

Tropical Cyclone Gezani collapsed houses in Madagascar's main port city and left at least 31 people dead as it crossed the Indian Ocean island with high winds and rain, authorities said Wednesday.

Madagascar's weather service issued red alerts for several regions warning of possible floods and landslides as the storm made landfall late Tuesday with wind speeds of more than 195 kph (121 mph). It then roared across the large island of 31 million people, many of whom live in poverty and have inadequate shelter from storms.

Madagascar is especially vulnerable to cyclones blowing in off the Indian Ocean and was battered by another deadly cyclone less than two weeks ago. (AP)

Kuwait oil price surges to \$66.98 pb

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 12, (KUNA): The price of Kuwaiti oil went up 58 cents to reach 66.98 per barrel on Wednesday, compared to USD 66.40 pb the previous day, reported the Kuwait Petroleum Cor-

poration (KPC) on Thursday.

In global markets, the price of Brent crude went up by 60 cents to reach USD 69.40 per barrel, and the West Texas Intermediate rose 67 cents to reach USD 64.63 pb.

General index inches up 0.10% to 8,703.86 points

Bursa closes higher amid modest gains

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 12, (KUNA): The Boursa Kuwait ended Thursday's trading session on a positive note, as the general market index rose by 8.86 points, or 0.10 percent, to close at 8,703.86 points.

Trading volume reached 146.2 million shares, executed through 11,847 cash transactions, with a total value of KD 45.9 million (approximately USD 140 million).

The main market index advanced 19.28 points, or 0.24 percent, to 8,083.03 points. Around 58.4 million shares changed hands across 4,595 transactions,

valued at KD 8.9 million (USD 27.14 million).

Similarly, the premier market index edged up 7.07 points, or 0.08 percent, to settle at 9,287.18 points. It saw 87.7 million shares traded through 7,252 transactions, with a total value of KD 37 million (USD 112.8 million).

In contrast, the Main 50 Index slipped 19.86 points, or 0.23 percent, finishing at 8,627.01 points. Trading volume in this segment stood at 49.6 million shares across 3,441 deals, worth KD 7.7 million (USD 23.4 million).

US energy chief visits Venezuela to push oil overhaul

Trump administration moves to revive Venezuela's oil industry

CARACAS, Feb 12, (AP): United States Energy Secretary Chris Wright arrived Wednesday in Venezuela for a firsthand assessment of the country's oil industry, a visit that further asserts the U.S. government's self-appointed role in turning around Venezuela's dilapidated energy sector.

Wright met Venezuela's acting President Delcy Rodríguez at the Miraflores presidential palace in the capital, Caracas. He is expected to meet with government officials, oil executives and others during a three-day visit to the South American country.

Wright's visit comes as the administration of U.S. President Donald Trump continues to lift sanctions to allow foreign companies to operate in Venezuela and help rebuild the nation's most important industry. It follows last month's enactment of a Venezuelan law that opened the nation's oil sector to private investment, reversing a tenet of the self-proclaimed socialist movement that has ruled the country for more than two decades.

"I bring today a message from President Trump," Wright told reporters as he stood next to Rodríguez with flags from both countries behind them. "He is passionately committed to absolutely transforming the relationship between the United States and Venezuela, part of a broader agenda to make the Americas great again, to bring our countries closer together, to bring commerce, peace, prosperity, jobs, opportunity to the people of Venezuela."

Rodríguez was sworn into her new role after the brazen Jan. 3 seizure of then-President Nicolás Maduro in a U.S. military attack in Caracas. She proposed the overhaul of the country's energy law after Trump said his administration would take control of Venezuela's oil exports and revitalize the ailing industry by luring

foreign investment.

Rodríguez on Wednesday acknowledged that Venezuela's relationship with the U.S. has had "highs and lows" but said both countries are now working on a mutually benefiting "energy agenda."

"Let diplomatic dialogue ... and energy dialogue be the appropriate and suitable channels for the U.S. and Venezuela to maturely determine how to move forward," she said.

Rodríguez's government expects the changes to the

country's oil law to serve as assurances for major U.S. oil companies that have so far hesitated about returning to the volatile country. Some of those companies lost investments when the ruling party enacted the existing law two decades ago to favor Venezuela's state-run oil company, PDVSA.

The new law now grants private companies control over oil production and sales, ending PDVSA's monopoly over those activities as well as pricing. It also allows for independent arbitration of disputes, remov-

ing a mandate for disagreements to be settled only in Venezuelan courts, which are controlled by the ruling party.

Foreign investors view the involvement of independent arbitrators as crucial to guard against future expropriation.

Wright told reporters the reform "is a meaningful step in the right direction" but "probably not far and clear enough to encourage the kind of large capital flows" the U.S. would like to see in Venezuela.

Wright planned to visit oil fields Thursday. Venezuela, which has the world's largest proven oil reserves and produces about 1 million barrels a day, has long relied on oil revenue as a lifeblood of its economy.

Trump imposed crippling sanctions on Venezuela's oil industry during his first term, locking out the state-owned company Petróleos de Venezuela S.A. of the global oil markets in an attempt to topple Maduro. That pushed his government to rely on a shadowy fleet of unflagged tankers to smuggle deeply discounted crude into global supply chains.

In December, Trump ordered a blockade of all "sanctioned oil tankers" entering or leaving the South American country, ramping up pressure on Maduro in a move that seemed designed to put a tighter chokehold on Venezuela's economy. U.S. forces that month also began seizing oil tankers off Venezuela's Caribbean coast.

Since Maduro's Jan. 3 ouster, the Trump administration set out to control the production, refining and global distribution of Venezuela's petroleum products and oversee where the revenue flows. The administration also began lifting broad sanctions, but also continued seizing tankers - now in agreement with Venezuela's government - including one this week in the Indian Ocean after it was tracked from the Caribbean Sea.

Wright on Wednesday told reporters the blockade is "essentially over" as the U.S. is "flowing Venezuelan crude out, selling it at a much higher price than Venezuela was selling it before," and the revenue is being used in specific projects benefiting Venezuelans.

Economists urge stronger action as economy falters

Britain records weakest quarterly growth amid investment slowdown

LONDON, Feb 12, (AP): The British economy barely grew in the final three months of 2025, official figures showed Thursday, with critics blaming uncertainty surrounding the government's budget for lower than anticipated business investment and consumption.

The Office for National Statistics said the British economy, the world's sixth-largest by many measures, expanded by only 0.1% on a quarterly basis, the same rate as that recorded in the third quarter.

The economy grew by 1.3% over the year as a whole, up from 1.1% the previous year. It's the highest annual level of growth since 2022.

Economists said uncertainty ahead of the Labour government's budget in late November meant businesses and consumers took a wait-and-see approach.

For much of the period, there had been expectations that Treasury chief Rachel Reeves would break key promises not to raise income tax levels. In the end, the tax rises were far more modest than anticipated.

"The underwhelming final quarter caps off another disheartening year for the U.K. economy with growth tailing off unnervingly quickly after the strong start to 2025, as rising taxes, heightened uncertainty and poor productivity increasingly squeezed activity," said Suren Thiru, economics director at accounting body ICAEW.

Some recent economic indicators have pointed to a pickup in growth in the early part of 2026. However, growth is not expected to rise dramatically over the full year. Last week, the Bank of England cut its growth forecasts for

the next two years, from 1.2% to 0.9% for 2026, and from 1.6% to 1.5% for 2027.

Britain's Labour government, which has lost significant support since it won the general election in 2024 partly because of the economy, is hoping that with growth tepid and with inflation expected to fall sharply this year, the Bank of England will cut its main interest rate by a further quarter of a percentage point in March to 3.50%. Last week, the bank kept it unchanged at 3.75%.

"The task for 2026 is for the government to double down on its growth agenda to build a sustained economic recovery that will eventually flow into people's pay packets," said Simon Pittaway, senior economist at the think tank Resolution Foundation.

Fed rate cut outlook hinges on hiring trends

US unemployment claims fall to 227,000

WASHINGTON, Feb 12, (AP): The number of Americans applying for unemployment benefits fell last week, remaining within the historically healthy range of the past few years.

Applications for jobless aid for the week ending Feb. 7 fell by 5,000 to 227,000 from the previous week, the Labor Department reported Thursday. That's basically in line with the 226,000 new applications that analysts surveyed by the data firm FactSet had forecast.

Filings for unemployment benefits are viewed as representative of U.S. layoffs and are close to a real-time indicator of the health of the job market.

On Wednesday, the government reported that U.S. employers added a surprisingly strong 130,000 jobs in January and the unemployment rate fell to a still-low 4.3% from 4.4%. However, government revisions cut 2024-2025 U.S. payrolls by hundreds of thousands. That reduced the number of jobs created last year to just 181,000, a third of the previously reported 584,000 and the weakest since the pandemic year of 2020.

While weekly layoffs have remained in a historically low range mostly between 200,000 and 250,000 for the past few years, a number of high-profile companies have announced job cuts recently, including UPS, Amazon, Dow and the Washington Post in recent weeks.

Mounting layoff announcements in the past year, combined with the government's own sluggish labor market reports, have left Americans increasingly pessimistic about the economy.

The Labor Department also recently reported that job openings fell in December to the lowest level in more than

five years, another sign that the American labor market remains sluggish, even though the economy is registering solid growth.

Data over the past year has broadly revealed a labor market in which hiring has clearly slowed, hobbled by uncertainty raised by President Donald Trump's tariffs and the lingering effects of the high interest rates the Fed engineered in 2022 and 2023 to tamp down a spike of pandemic-induced inflation.

Economists are conflicted about whether the stronger-than-expected January job gains are a one-off or possibly the first sign of a recovering labor market, which could lead the Fed to further delay more cuts to its key interest rate.

Some Fed officials have specifically argued that last year's weak hiring shows that borrowing costs are weighing on growth and discouraging companies from expanding. A sustained pickup in hiring could undercut that theory.

Fed officials signaled in December that they expect to reduce their key rate once more this year, while Wall Street investors expect two reductions, according to futures pricing.

Thursday's unemployment benefits report from the Labor Department also showed that the four-week moving average of jobless claims, which balances out some of the weekly volatility, rose by 7,000 to 219,500.

The total number of Americans filing for jobless benefits for the previous week ending Jan. 31 increased by 21,000 to 1.86 million, the government said.

Nvidia and TSMC fuel Taiwan's rapid growth - and rising risks

AI boom supercharges Taiwan's economy but deepens inequality

TAIPEI, Feb 12, (AP): In Taipei, real estate agent Jason Sung is betting that home prices around a high-tech industrial park in the northern part of Taiwan's capital will soon take flight - because of computer chip maker Nvidia.

The area is where Nvidia plans to build its new Taiwan headquarters as it rapidly expands on the island, set to surpass Apple to become the biggest customer of Taiwan semiconductor maker TSMC, the biggest contract manufacturer of the advanced chips needed for artificial intelligence.

Nvidia CEO Jensen Huang describes Taiwan as the "center of the world's computer ecosystem." It's riding high on the global AI frenzy. Its economy grew at an 8.6% annual pace last year, and it's hoping to maintain that momentum after it recently sealed a trade deal with U.S. President Donald Trump that cut U.S. tariffs on Taiwan to 15% from 20%.

"We have been lucky," said Wu Tsong-min, an emeritus economics professor at National Taiwan University and a former board member of Taiwan's central bank.

But Taiwan's heavy reliance on computer chip makers and other technology companies carries the growing risk of the AI craze turning out to be a bubble.

"What if the AI bubble is real, and what if its rapid growth pace slows, what's next for Taiwan? That's the question many have been asking," Wu said.

Escalating tensions with Beijing, which claims independently governed Taiwan as mainland China's territory, are another abiding threat, despite the island's vital role in global chip and AI supply chains.

An island of about 23 million people, Taiwan depends heavily on exports. They jumped nearly 35% year-on-year in 2025, as shipments to the U.S. surged 78% due to ballooning AI demand.

That's thanks largely to TSMC, or Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Corp., and electronics giant Foxconn, which makes AI servers for Nvidia and is a major supplier to Apple.

Taiwan has undergone massive economic changes while shifting from mainly labor-intensive industries such as plastics and textiles to advanced manufacturing like semiconductor fabrication.

The AI frenzy has made TSMC one of the world's top 10 most valuable companies. Its profit jumped 46% last year to \$1.7 trillion Taiwan dollars (\$54 billion).

The chipmaker is investing heavily both in Taiwan and in new factories in Arizona in the U.S. It produces more than 90% of the world's most advanced chips.

Foxconn, formally known as Hon Hai Precision Industry Co., has doubled its value since 2023. The maker of Apple's iPhone and iPads now produces AI servers and racks and has a partnership with OpenAI to supply AI data center equipment.

Taiwan's heavy reliance on its technology industry means its biggest risk is that growth will be "very highly contingent on the AI boom and tech race continuing," said Lynn Song, chief economist for Greater Chi-

na at ING Bank.

Worries that the AI craze may prove to be a bubble prone to a bust similar to the dot.com crash in 2000 that swept through markets, alarming many in Taiwan.

"I'm also very nervous about it," C.C. Wei, TSMC's chairman said when asked about a potential AI bubble during an earnings call in January. "Because we have to invest about \$52-\$56 billion (this year)."

"If we did not do it carefully, that will be a big disaster to TSMC for sure," he said. "I want to make sure that my customers' demands are real."

In a recent report, analysts from Fitch Ratings argued that AI demand will remain strong at least in the near term. In the longer term, however, the risks "will depend on the evolution of AI, as well as trade and investment policies and the adaptability of Taiwanese firms," they wrote.

Taiwanese electronics company Asia Vital Components, a key supplier of liquid cooling systems for Nvidia, is investing heavily in research and development. Its chairman, Spencer Shen, said he saw no signs of a slowdown in AI-related demand so far. The company is already designing thermal solutions for 2028 AI servers, he said.

"We do not believe this is a bubble," Shen told The Associated Press in an interview. "AI is driven by companies with real products and massive cash flows, like Amazon, Microsoft, Google and Meta."

"In fact, AI infrastructure is still in short supply," Shen added. "I expect AI to trickle through to our everyday level and change the way that things will work fundamentally."

Some in Taiwan believe that its pivotal role in the technology sector,

especially as a maker of computer chips whose main material is silicon, helps to protect the island from attack by communist-ruled Beijing, whose leaders have vowed to reunite the island with the Chinese mainland, by force if necessary.

The two governments split in 1949 during a civil war. Beijing has been stepping up pressure, conducting military drills nearby. Exercises in late December included live rounds landing closer to the island than before, Taiwan officials said.

Such geopolitical factors cloud the economic outlook, though many in Taiwan including its former President Tsai Ing-wen believe its importance to global chipmaking would deter China from attacking.

The risk of an invasion is unclear. Both global tech companies and Chinese industries would suffer from massive disruptions of the chip supply chain, said Wu of National Taiwan University.

Still, some companies have been identifying contingency scenarios in recent years on how to respond in case of military action by China, said Chen Shin-hong, vice president of the semi-official Chung-Hua Institution for Economic Research.

"We need to understand the potential risk, potential damages to Taiwan," said Chen.

While many of its core research and development activities are in Taiwan, TSMC already has plants in China, Japan and the U.S., and it's expanding its offshore production in the U.S., Germany and Japan.

Roughly 65% of Foxconn's manufacturing is in China, and the company has factories in other parts of the world such as India, Mexico and the U.S. AVC has been expanding its production capacity in Vietnam.

While some have called for Taiwan to diversify its economy away from technology to reduce risks, others argue that doubling down on its world-leading technology is the way forward. "It is our greatest strength," said Shen of AVC.

The AI boom has done wonders for Taiwan's stock exchange, where the benchmark Taiex has climbed nearly 250% over the past decade, making many investors rich. Economists have significantly upgraded forecasts for Taiwan's economic growth for 2026 based on its robust AI-related exports.

But as is true elsewhere, the wealth is not evenly spread. Many Taiwanese feel they have been left behind.

Taiwan's wealth gap, according to official data, has roughly quadrupled over the past three decades.

The pay of tech workers already earning high wages, especially chip engineers and managers, has skyrocketed. For other traditional industries, such as plastics and machine toolmakers, growth has lagged.

Economists say that gap might widen as the AI frenzy continues.

"It can be tough to make a living," said Jean Lin, a 30-something manager of a takeaway outlet selling bento meals in a Taipei neighborhood where Foxconn's office is located.

"Many of the younger generation still can't afford to buy an apartment," Lin, who wishes to start her own business one day, added. "A lot of young people still feel they don't have much money."

Police activity lifts hopes

FBI combs desert terrain for clues in Guthrie case

TUCSON, Ariz., Feb 12, (AP): Fresh surveillance images from Nancy Guthrie's porch the night she went missing, coupled with intense police activity across Arizona and the detention of a man had raised hopes that authorities were nearing a major break.

But then the man was released after questioning, leaving it unclear Wednesday where the investigation stood into last week's disappearance of Guthrie, the 84-year-old mother of "Today" show host Savannah Guthrie.

FBI agents carrying water bottles to beat the 80-degree F (26.7-degree C) heat walked among rocks and desert vegetation at Guthrie's Tucson-area home. They also fanned out across a neighborhood about a mile (1.6 kilometers) away, knocking on doors and searching through cactuses, bushes and boulders. Several hundred detectives and agents are now assigned to the investigation, which is expanding in the area, the Pima County Sheriff's Department said.

In a nearby neighborhood, two investigators emerged from daughter Annie Guthrie's home with a paper grocery sack and a white trash bag. One, still wearing blue protective gloves, also took a stack of mail from the roadside mailbox. They drove away without speaking to reporters.

Barb Dutrow, who was jogging through a neighborhood where teams were searching, said an FBI agent told her they were looking for anything that might have been

tossed from a car. Dutrow, who was visiting from Louisiana at a convention, said she "can't imagine the feeling of the family of having their mother taken."

A day earlier, authorities said they had stopped a man near the U.S.-Mexico border, just hours after the FBI released videos of a person wearing a gun holster, ski mask and backpack and approaching Nancy Guthrie's home in Tucson. The man told media outlets early Wednesday that he was released after several hours and had nothing to do with Guthrie's disappearance last week.

Authorities have not said what led them to stop the man Tuesday but confirmed he was released. The sheriff's department said its deputies and FBI agents also searched a location in Rio Rico, a city south of Tucson where the man lives.

It was the latest twist in an investigation that has gripped the nation since Nancy Guthrie disappeared on Feb. 1. Until Tuesday, it seemed authorities were making little headway in determining what happened to her or finding who was responsible.

The black and white images released by the FBI showing a masked person trying to cover a doorbell camera on Guthrie's porch marked the first significant break in the case. But the images did not show what happened to her or help determine whether she is still alive. FBI Director Kash Patel said investigators spent days trying to find lost, corrupted or inaccessible images.

Even though the images do not show the person's face, investigators are hopeful someone will know who was on the porch. More than 4,000 calls came into the Pima County sheriff's tip line within the past 24 hours, the department said Wednesday afternoon.

'It's time to tell my story'

Michael Douglas announces 'raw' memoir for Oct release

NEW YORK, Feb 12, (AP): Oscar-winner Michael Douglas will have a memoir out this fall, a "raw, sweeping" account he says will illuminate his storied personal and professional lives.

"After being asked for many years, I've finally decided it's time to tell my story on my own terms," Douglas said in a statement released Wednesday through Grand Central Publishing, which has set an Oct. 6 release date.

"Not the highlight reel, not the version shaped by headlines or box office numbers, but the real one, I've lived a life that unfolded in public while be-

ing deeply private at the same time, and there's a difference. This is about where I came from, what I fought against, and what I chose for myself. Fame can blur the truth; this is my attempt to bring it back into focus."

Douglas' book, written in collaboration with Michael Fleming, is currently untitled. Financial terms were not disclosed; Douglas was represented by Shane Salerno of the Story Factory.

The 81-year-old actor has been on screen, and in the news, for decades. The son of Hollywood giant Kirk Douglas, he broke through in the 1970s in the hit TV series "The Streets of San Francisco" and went on to star in such cultural touchstones as "Fatal Attraction," "Wall Street" and "Basic Instinct." He also produced the Oscar-winning "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest," a project that Douglas' father had longed to take on himself.

BAFTA winners feel the weight of glory

How the coveted BAFTA mask trophies are made

LONDON, Feb 12, (AP): Those winning a prize at the upcoming British Academy Film Awards will bag a coveted bronze mask trophy - and get a bit of an arm workout taking it home.

Along with the honor of being named the best of the year in the industry, winners at the BAFTA ceremony on Feb. 22 will be awarded one of the dozens of the 3-kilogram (6.6-pound) prizes.

This year the cast and crew of "One Battle After Another," "Sinners," "Hamnet," "Marty Supreme," and "Sentimental Value" are in the running for the trophies at the EE BAFTA ceremony, to be held at London's Royal Festival Hall.

As with many things in show business, all that glitters is not gold. The BAFTA masks are made of phosphor bronze, polished to a mirror finish that will reflect the happy face of its new owner.

Craftsmen at the AATI Foundry in Braintree, about 50 miles (80 kilometers) northeast of London, use

a sandcasting technique to make about 350 bronze trophies each year for all the BAFTA ceremonies - covering the film, television and gaming industries.

They are created in batches, and making one from start to finish takes around a week, the foundry's director Hugh Bisset said Tuesday.

The process starts with a pattern by the tooling team, often out of timber or 3D printing. That tool moves to the molding team which uses sand to make two recessed impressions of the mask, one each side. They are then closed together, ready for molten hot bronze - up to 1,200 degrees Celsius (2,192 Fahrenheit) - to be poured into it.

The metal takes about three or four hours to cool down, when it can then be removed from the sand. The masks' surfaces look dull and a bit rough around the edges at this stage, but after fettling, threading and polishing they are ready to be assembled before being checked over extremely carefully.

Bisset says it's important that the masks are shiny and have no polish left on them.

"The thing I'm always conscious of is that these amazing actors and actresses, they pick up their awards and my big concern is that a smudge of polish will end up over their lovely, beautiful white dress," he said. "There's lots of things we need to think about."

Bisset reckons the diligence and care that his skilled team puts into the making of the masks reflects the hard work of the winning filmmakers and movie stars.

And while it's still unknown if favorites Jessie Buckley, Timothée Chalamet and Teyana Taylor will get the glory on Sunday, whoever does win will take home something worth more than its heavy weight in bronze. "There's a lot of metal in it," but each mask also has "a lot of time and love being put into it," Bisset said.

'Dawson's Creek' star mocked his own hunky persona

Actor James Van Der Beek dies at 48

NEW YORK, Feb 12, (AP): James Van Der Beek, a heartthrob who starred in coming-of-age dramas at the dawn of the new millennium, shooting to fame playing the titular character in "Dawson's Creek" and in later years mocking his own hunky persona, has died. He was 48.

"Our beloved James David Van Der Beek passed peacefully this morning. He met his final days with courage, faith and grace. There is much to share regarding his wishes, love for humanity and the sacredness of time. Those days will come," said a statement from the actor's family posted on Instagram. "For now we ask for peaceful privacy as we grieve our loving husband, father, son, brother and friend."

Van Der Beek revealed in 2024 that he was being treated for colorectal cancer.

Van Der Beek made a surprise video appearance in September at a "Dawson's Creek" reunion charity event in New York City after previously dropping out due to illness.

Appeared

He appeared projected onstage at the Richard Rodgers Theatre during a live reading of the show's pilot episode to benefit F Cancer and Van Der Beek. Lin-Manuel Miranda subbed for him on stage.

"Thank you to every single person here," Van Der Beek said. A one-time theater kid, Van Der Beek would star in the movie "Varsity Blues" and on TV in "CSI: Cyber" as FBI Special Agent Elijah Mundo, but was forever connected to "Dawson's Creek," which ran from 1998 to 2003 on The WB.

The series followed a group of high school friends as they learned about falling in love, creating real friendships and finding their footing in life. Van Der Beek, then 20, played 15-year-old Dawson Leery, who aspired to be a director of Steven Spielberg quality.

With Paula Cole's "I Don't Want To Wait," as its moody theme song, "Dawson's Creek" helped define The WB as a haven for teens and young adults who related to its hyper-articulate dialogue and frank talk about sexuality. And it made household names of Van Der Beek, Katie Holmes, Michelle Williams and Joshua Jackson.

"While James' legacy will always live on, this is a huge loss to not just your family but the world," Sarah Michelle Gellar wrote to his widow on Instagram. Katharine McPhee Foster added: "This is just beyond devastating news." Others posting messages of mourning were Jenna Dewan and Olivia Munn.

The show caused a stir when one of the teens embarked on a racy affair with a teacher 20 years his senior and when Holmes' character climbed through Dawson's bedroom window and they

curled up together. Racier shows like "Euphoria" and "Sex Education" owe a debt to "Dawson's Creek."

Van Der Beek sometimes struggled to get out from under the shadow of the show but eventually leaned into lampooning himself, like on Funny Or Die videos and on Kesha's "Blow" music video, which included his laser gun battle with the pop star in a nightclub and dead unicorns.

"It's tough to compete with something that was the cultural phenomenon that 'Dawson's Creek' was," he told Vulture in 2013. "It ran for so long. That's a lot of hours playing one character in front of people. So it's natural that they associate you with that."

More than a decade after the show went off the air, a scene at the end of the show's third season became a GIF. Dawson was watching as his soul mate embarks on a love affair with his best friend and bursts into tears.

"It wasn't scripted that I was supposed to cry; it was just one of those things where it's a magical moment and it just happens in the scene," Van Der Beek told Vanity Fair. He seemed exasperated when he told the Los Angeles Times: "All of a sudden, six years of work was boiled down to one seven-second clip on loop." (Van Der Beek himself recreated the GIF in 2011 for Funny or Die and gave it a second life.)

While still on "Dawson's Creek," Van Der Beek hosted "Saturday Night Live" - the musical guest was Everlast - and landed a plumb role in "Varsity Blues," playing a second-string high

school quarterback who leaps into the breach when the star suffers an injury.

Van Der Beek's character, Mox, turns out to not be a football fanatic, preferring to read Kurt Vonnegut and yearning for the college education that will allow him to escape the jock mentality of his Texas town.

"I don't want your life," he screams at one point. Critic Roger Ebert called him "convincing and likable."

Projects

Some of his projects after "Dawson's Creek" included co-creating and playing Wesley "Diplo" Pentz, a dull but likable music producer in the mockumentary satire on Viceland, "What Would Diplo Do?" In 2019, he made it to the semifinals of ABC's "Dancing with the Stars" and played a balding, out-of-shape ex-boyfriend on "How I Met Your Mother." "The more you make fun of yourself and don't try to go for any kind of respect, the more people seem to respect you," he told Vanity Fair in 2011. "I've always been a clown trapped in a leading man's body."

Between 2003 and 2013, he made appearances in shows like "Criminal Minds," "One Tree Hill," and "How I Met Your Mother." He played himself with a crackpot intensity in the Kristen Ritter-led ABC drama "Don't Trust the B- in Apartment 23," and the short-lived "CSI" spinoff "CSI: Cyber" and CBS' "Friends With Better Lives."

He's also appeared in movies such as Kevin Smith's 2001 comedy "Jay and Silent Bob Strike Back" and its 2019 sequel, "Jay and Silent Bob Re-

boot." He was in the Bret Easton Ellis adaptation of "The Rules of Attraction" in 2002 opposite Jessica Biel and Kate Bosworth.

In 2025, he was unmasked as Griffin on "The Masked Singer," after singing a cover of John Denver's "Take Me Home, Country Roads" and "I Had Some Help" by Post Malone and Morgan Wallen.

Van Der Beek, who was raised in Cheshire, Connecticut, started acting at 13 after suffering a concussion playing football that prevented him from playing for a year. He landed the role of Danny Zuko in his school production of "Grease." He stuck with theater, landing at 16 in 1994 an off-Broadway role in "Finding the Sun" by Pulitzer Prize-winner Edward Albee and one of the sons in a revival of "Shenandoah" at the prestigious Goodspeed Opera House in his home state.

He earned a scholarship to New Jersey's Drew University but left school early when he was cast in "Dawson's Creek." In 2024, he returned to campus to accept an honorary degree for his "selfless service and exemplary commitment to the mission of Drew," the university said.

Drew University President Hilary Link welcomed Van Der Beek with a popular quote from his "Dawson's Creek" character: "Edge is fleeting," she said, "but heart lasts forever. So on this morning, we pay tribute to that heart." He is survived by his wife, Kimberly, and six children, Olivia, Joshua, Annabel, Emilia, Gwendolyn and Jeremiah.

CHICAGO: Cardi B was part of Bad Bunny's Super Bowl halftime show. What she did exactly, well, that turned into a perplexing question for two major prediction markets. At least one Kalshi trader filed a complaint with the Commodity Futures Trading Commission over how the prediction market handled Sunday's appearance by the Grammy-winning rapper. The result of a similar event contract on Polymarket also drew the ire of some users on that platform.

Prediction markets provide an opportunity to trade - or wager - on the result of future events. The markets are comprised of typically yes-or-no questions called event contracts, with the prices connected to what traders are willing to pay, which theoretically indi-

cates the perceived probability of an event occurring.

The buy-in for each contract ranges from \$0 to \$1 each, reflecting a 0% to 100% chance of what traders think could happen. More than \$47.3 million was wagered on Kalshi's market for "Who will perform at the Big Game?" A Polymarket contract had more than \$10 million in volume.

Cardi B joined singers Karol G and Young Miko and actors Jessica Alba and Pedro Pascal on a stary front porch during the halftime spectacle. She danced to the music, but it was unclear whether she was singing along during the show, which included performances by Ricky Martin and Lady Gaga. (AP)

NEW YORK: Actor Blake Lively and director Justin Baldoni came to a New York courthouse on Wednes-

day to see if her lawsuit alleging sexual harassment on the set of the 2024 romantic drama "It Ends With Us" could be settled before a May trial.

The talks between lawyers went on over a six-hour period before Lively and Baldoni left the Manhattan federal courthouse separately and went straight to their waiting cars without saying anything. Lively looked stern as she walked out while Baldoni was smiling. Their lawyers did not immediately comment.

Mandatory settlement talks are generally required before a civil case proceeds to trial. They are not held in public.

Their acrimonious yearlong litigation has cast a wide net across the entertainment world, drawing into the headlines other actors, musicians and celebrities and raising questions about the power, influence and gender dynamics in Hollywood. (AP)

Court examines Insta's impact on teens and body image

Social media cannot cause clinical addiction: Instagram chief

LOS ANGELES, Feb 12, (AP): Adam Mosseri, the head of Meta's Instagram, testified Wednesday during a landmark social media trial in Los Angeles that he disagrees with the idea that people can be clinically addicted to social media platforms.

The question of addiction is a key pillar of the case, where plaintiffs seek to hold social media companies responsible for harms to children who use their platforms. Meta Platforms and Google's YouTube are the two remaining defendants in the case, which TikTok and Snap have settled.

At the core of the Los Angeles case is a 20-year-old identified only by the initials "KGM," whose lawsuit could determine how thousands of similar lawsuits against social media companies would play out. She and two other plaintiffs have been selected for bellwether trials - essentially test cases for both sides to see how their arguments play out before a jury.

Mosseri, who's headed Instagram since 2018 said it's important to differentiate between clinical addiction and what he called problematic use. The plaintiff's lawyer, however, presented quotes directly from Mosseri in a podcast interview a few years ago where he used the term

addiction in relation to social media use, but he clarified that he was probably using the term "too casually," as people tend to do.

Mosseri said he was not claiming to be a medical expert when questioned about his qualifications to comment on the legitimacy of social media addiction, but said someone "very close" to him has experienced serious clinical addiction, which is why he said he was "being careful with my words."

He said he and his colleagues use the term "problematic use" to refer to "someone spending more time on Instagram than they feel good about, and that definitely happens."

It's "not good for the company, over the long run, to make decisions that profit for us but are poor for people's well-being," Mosseri said.

Mosseri and the plaintiff's lawyer, Mark Lanier, engaged in a lengthy back-and-forth about cosmetic filters on Instagram that changed people's appearance in a way that seemed to promote plastic surgery.

"We are trying to be as safe as possible but also censor as little as possible," Mosseri said.

In the courtroom, bereaved parents of children who

have had social media struggles seemed visibly upset during a discussion around body dysmorphia and cosmetic filters. Meta shut down all third-party augmented reality filters in January 2025. The judge made an announcement to members of the public on Wednesday after the displays of emotion, reminding them not to make any indication of agreement or disagreement with testimony, saying that it would be "improper to indicate some position."

During cross examination, Mosseri and Meta lawyer Phyllis Jones tried to reframe the idea that Lanier was suggesting in his questioning that the company is looking to profit off of teens specifically.

Mosseri said Instagram makes "less money from teens than from any other demographic on the app," noting that teens don't tend to click on ads and many don't have disposable income that they spend on products from ads they receive. During his opportunity to question Mosseri for a second time, Lanier was quick to point to research that shows people who join social media platforms at a young age are more likely to stay on the platforms longer, which he said makes teen users prime for meaningful long-term profit.

"Often people try to frame things as you either priori-

tize safety or you prioritize revenue," Mosseri said. "It's really hard to imagine any instance where prioritizing safety isn't good for revenue."

Meta CEO Mark Zuckerberg is expected to take the stand next week.

In recent years, Instagram has added a slew of features and tools it says have made the platform safer for young people. But this does not always work. A report last year, for instance, found that teen accounts researchers created were recommended age-inappropriate sexual content, including "graphic sexual descriptions, the use of cartoons to describe demeaning sexual acts, and brief displays of nudity."

In addition, Instagram also recommended a "range of self-harm, self-injury, and body image content" on teen accounts that the report says "would be reasonably likely to result in adverse impacts for young people, including teenagers experiencing poor mental health, or self-harm and suicidal ideation and behaviors." Meta called the report "misleading, dangerously speculative" and said it misrepresents its efforts on teen safety.

Meta is also facing a separate trial in New Mexico that began this week.

'Swords into Plowshares' captivates viewers

Epic drama revives forgotten Chinese history

HANGZHOU, Feb. 12, (Xinhua): Emperors topple, heads roll, and cities burn: China's latest historical epic TV series, "Swords into Plowshares," brings to life one of ancient Chinese history's most chaotic eras.

Yet, the series' counterintuitive Chinese title, "Peaceful Years," hints at the drama's deeper ambition to be more than a spectacle of war and political intrigues, but an "oriental epic" that portrays a nation's profound longing for peace.

The series has proved a hit. Since its global premiere on Jan. 23, it has dominated viewership charts, achieving a CVB (China video and audio big data) rating of 2.938 percent and accumulating over 647 million valid online playbacks. Related hashtags across social media platforms, such as Weibo, Douyin and Rednote, have exceeded 3.6 billion views.

Some have called it "China's Game of Thrones," though fans argue it holds deeper resonance than the HBO fantasy epic by being rooted entirely in history.

Notably, it has ignited a desire to delve into the Five Dynasties and Ten Kingdoms (907-979) period of ancient Chinese history -- a tumultuous era that history textbooks tend to rush through.

During this lesser-studied period, the once-glorious Tang Dynasty (618-907) had crumbled, five short-lived dynasties then succeeded one another on China's Central Plain -- or the imperial heartland -- and 10 major almost-concurrent kingdoms held power mainly across southern China, with or without submitting to emperors of the Central Plain.

Through a sprawling ensemble cast, viewers follow the lives of the historical heavyweights of the age -- framed as one generation passing the baton to the next in the search for a glimmer of peace amid turmoil, according to Yang Lei, the drama's chief director.

Central to the plot is King of Wuyue Qian Hongchu, whose realm, primarily in present-day Zhejiang Province and part of Fujian Province in east China, became a rare haven of peace and prosperity. The series traces his transformation from a carefree prince to a ruler steering a southern kingdom through turbulence. Along the way, he witnessed the depths of human suffering in an era so brutal that it descended at times into cannibalism.

His legacy culminated in the bloodless surrender of Wuyue territory to the Song Dynasty (960-1279) -- a pivotal act that helped reunify China. By choosing to end the conflict rather than prolong it, he brought lasting peace to his realm, embodying the drama's central metaphor: turning swords into plowshares.

As the epic series presents history authentically with refined, archaic dialogue and immaculate attention to detail, many viewers have taken to reading, with young people in particular turning to social media platforms and AI chat-

bots to learn about their history and deepen their understanding of 10th-century China.

Reading lists with titles like "10 books to accompany 'Swords into Plowshares'" have proliferated online, and sales of related history books have surged. On JD.com, more than 68,000 copies of seven relevant titles have been purchased, and an eight-volume history book of the era has trended on WeChat's reading platform.

Vloggers like 29-year-old Liu Zhanyuan are riding this wave of interest by posting detailed historical accounts related to the series. Just two of the explanatory videos he has posted helped him gain over 30,000 new Rednote followers in two weeks. "I was concerned viewers might abandon a brilliant drama simply for lack of context," he said of his motivation.

The history aficionado said he admires the series for several reasons, including its rare focus on a neglected historical era, its nuanced and non-judgmental portrayal of complex characters.

Ancient Chinese history is often

framed through a binary lens of order versus chaos or unity versus division. The Five Dynasties and Ten Kingdoms period is not an era that later generations look back on with pride.

Yet, as Liu observed, "The series illuminates the transition between the two powerful dynasties, Tang and Song, providing the missing link in understanding the history's continuity."

On the newfound enthusiasm, Liu said that while history has often been regarded by many young people as a dry, academic subject, this series is igniting their interest, driving them to explore the enduring strengths.

As depicted in the drama, the Kingdom of Wuyue emerged as an oasis of peace and prosperity while war and devastation swept much of China amid dynastic upheaval, regional conquests, and conflicts with the nomadic Khitan people from beyond the Great Wall.

The story of the Wuyue Kingdom has also brought to life obscure historical sites, such as a temple commemorating the kings of the Qian family, located near the famed West Lake in Hangzhou, Zhejiang's capital. Visits to the temple have surged by 30 to 40 percent year-on-year on the weekends following the series premiere, according to official statistics.

On Jan. 28, the newly opened Yijun City archaeological site museum in Hangzhou drew large crowds. Visiting the ruins of Wuyue Kingdom, local visitor Guo Shengxia, 36, said, "I've lived within the old city walls all my life, but only now do I feel a deeper connection to this land. Every inch of land beneath my feet is rooted in the history of Wuyue."

The series' lead actor, Bai Yu, who plays Qian Hongchu, reflected, "Having gone through this creative journey, what stays with me most is a deeper appreciation for the peace we enjoy today."

'Optional, extreme' tool

Everything to know about iPhones' Lockdown Mode

NEW YORK, Feb 12, (AP): A little known security feature on iPhones is in the spotlight after it stymied efforts by US federal authorities to search devices seized from a reporter.

Apple's Lockdown Mode recently prevented FBI agents from getting into Washington Post reporter Hannah Natanson's iPhone.

Agents seized the phone, as well as two MacBooks and other electronic devices, when they searched Natanson's home last month as part of an investigation into a Pentagon contractor accused of illegally handling classified information. But the FBI reported that its Computer Analysis Response Team "could not extract" data from the iPhone because it was in Lockdown Mode, according to a court filing.

So what is Lockdown Mode? Here's a rundown of how it works and how to use it:

Apple says Lockdown Mode is an "optional, extreme" protection tool designed to guard against "extremely rare and highly sophisticated cyberattacks." It's not for everyone, but instead for "very few individuals" who could be targeted by digital threats because of who they are or what they do.

"Most people will never be targeted by attacks of this nature," Apple's support page says.

It's available in Apple's newer operating systems, including iOS 16 and macOS Ventura. It works by putting strict security limits on some apps and features, or even making some unavailable, to reduce the areas that advanced spyware can attack. It also restricts the kinds of browser technologies that websites can use and limits photo sharing.

Apple has previously rejected U.S. government requests to build so-called backdoor access for its devices.

In 2016, Apple refused a request by authorities to help bypass lock-screen security for an encrypted iPhone belonging to a shooter who carried out a terrorist attack in San Bernardino, Calif. The company also declined to add an ability to input passcodes electronically, which would make it possible to carry out "brute force" attempts to guess the combination using computers.

"It would be wrong to intentionally weaken our products with a government-ordered backdoor," Apple said in explaining its decision.

Updated

Make sure your iPhone, iPad or MacBook has been updated. You'll have to turn the feature on separately for each of your Apple devices.

On your iPhone, go to Settings, then to the Privacy and Security section, scroll down to the bottom and tap on Lockdown Mode. Enter your passcode - not a facial or fingerprint scan - to activate it. The device will restart and then you'll again have to use your passcode to unlock it. On MacBooks, follow a similar procedure from the System Settings menu.

Apple recommends that you switch it on for all of the company's devices that you own.

You might assume that requiring facial or fingerprint recognition to unlock your phone is good enough to protect it from snooping. But experts say passcodes are better than biometrics at protecting your devices from law enforcement, because they could compel you to unlock your device by holding your phone up to your face or forcing you to put your finger on the scanner.

FBI agents told Natanson that they "could not compel her to provide her passcodes," but the warrant they used to execute the search did give them the authority "to use Natanson's biometrics, such as facial recognition or fingerprints, to open her devices." According to a court filing, Natanson said she didn't use biometrics to lock her devices but agents were ultimately able to unlock her MacBook with her finger.

Apple says some apps and features will work differently when Lockdown Mode is on.

Some websites might load slowly or not work properly, and some images and web fonts could be missing because they block "certain complex web technologies."

In Messages, most types of attachments are blocked, and links and link previews won't be available. Incoming FaceTime calls are blocked unless it's from a number you've called in the past month.

In Photos, location information is stripped from shared photos and shared albums are removed from the app. Focus mode won't work normally.

There are also tighter restrictions on connecting your phone or computer to unsecured Wi-Fi networks or to other computers and accessories. When I tried it out on my own iPhone, some apps warned me that certain functions might not work. I noticed that one of my news apps started using a different font and photos on some websites didn't appear, replaced by a question mark.

The biggest disruption happened when I went to the gym, which involved checking in by scanning a QR code with the phone camera. But the camera wouldn't work in Lockdown Mode. I had to turn it off in order to get in.

WASHINGTON: As the Trump administration prepares to close the Kennedy Center for a two-year renovation, the head of Washington's performing arts center has warned its staff about impending cuts that will leave "skeletal teams."

In a Tuesday memo obtained by The Associated Press, Kennedy Center President Richard Grenell told staff that "departments will obviously function on a much smaller scale with some units totally reduced or on hold until we begin preparations to reopen in 2028," promising "permanent or temporary adjustments for most everyone." THE HAGUE, Netherlands: Cees Nooteboom, a Dutch novelist, travel writer and journalist who was lauded for his insights into European history and culture and often tipped as a possible winner of the Nobel Prize for Literature, died Wednesday, his publisher announced. He was 92.

Publishing house De Bezige Bij said in a statement emailed to The Associated Press that Nooteboom "died very peacefully on his beloved

island of Menorca." The publisher said the message was written on behalf of his wife, photographer Simone Sassen.

"We will miss the friendship, erudition, passion, and idiosyncrasy of this internationally acclaimed writer," the publishing house added. It did not give a cause of death. (AP)

NEW YORK: Herman Diaz's first novel since his Pulitzer-Prize winning "Trust" is a futuristic thriller in which a young orphan survives by stealing electricity from the grid and selling it on the black market.

Riverhead Books announced Wednesday that the 464-page "Ply" will be published Sept. 29. At least in one way, the book marks a shift from his previous work. "Trust," published in 2022, was set around the stock market crash of 1929. Diaz's "In the Distance," a Pulitzer finalist in 2018, takes place in the American West in the 19th century.

"After rewriting America's past with his two previous novels, Herman Diaz now gives us a glimpse into the future," Riverhead's announcement reads in part. "Ply" questions the place of technology in the American experiment with a plot that grabs both heart and mind." (AP)

Kuwait hosts dermatology conference to boost medical standards

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 12: Minister of Health Dr. Ahmed Al-Awadhi affirmed the commitment of the ministry to push for the advancement of the healthcare system, improve medical services, and build a qualified national workforce in line with the highest international standard.

This was part of the speech that Al-Awadhi delivered on Thursday at the inauguration of the Kuwait Conference on Dermatology, Laser and Aesthetic Medicine.

Participants in the three-day conference include doctors and consultants from the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries, other Arab nations, Europe, the United States of America, India and countries in the Far East.

Al-Awadhi stressed that the commitment of the ministry is rooted in its belief in the importance of continuing medical education and staying abreast of the latest scientific developments in various specializations.

He pointed out that organizing the conference is in line with the vision of the ministry to support scientific and professional developments. He praised the achievements of Kuwaiti Dermatologists Association, including the organization of more than 30 workshops and training

He also cited the launching of an advanced training course on hidradenitis suppurativa in cooperation with a specialized European institution, as well as the strengthening of partnership with the European Society for Laser and Energy-Based Devices to facilitate the transfer of the latest treatment technologies.

He highlighted the implementation of more than 15 community awareness campaigns on shingles and chronic skin diseases, such as psoriasis, eczema, vitiligo and alopecia, which benefited over 50,000 people.

He mentioned as well the activation of cooperation with Gulf and international associations through the signing of scientific agreements and the organization of joint conferences and workshops.

He said the dermatology departments in the facilities of the ministry provide services to more than 500,000 patients annually, indicating that these departments have witnessed significant development through the introduction of the latest laser and phototherapy technologies and the provision of innovative and internationally approved

medications.

He also underscored the development of infrastructure, reduction of waiting times, and enhancement of the efficiency of specialized clinics.

He emphasized that the conference is an important scientific platform for exchanging expertise and showcasing the latest advancements in the diagnosis and treatment of skin diseases, as well as the medical applications of laser technology.

Cholera deaths decrease

'Severe malnutrition' in Sudan up by 14 pct: WHO

GENEVA, Feb 12, (Agencies): World Health Organization (WHO) Director-General **Tedros Ghebreyesus** warned of a sharp rise in severe malnutrition in Sudan, stressing that an estimated 4.2 million people could be affected

by 2026 including more than 800,000 cases of severe acute malnutrition, a 14 percent increase compared to 2025. Speaking at a press conference in Geneva, Ghebreyesus said,

"The humanitarian situation is worsening due to the lack of sustained access to aid threatening the lives of millions of people".

He emphasized that ongoing attacks on healthcare facilities since the start of the conflict are "exacerbating the crisis".

Speaking to the latest International Food Security Phase Classification (IPC), he noted that "two new areas in North Darfur have surpassed thresholds for acute malnutrition, one of three key metrics used to determine famine", while famine conditions were previously confirmed in two other cities in November last year.

Ghebreyesus also revealed that WHO has verified "about 205 attacks on healthcare facilities resulting in 1,924 deaths and 529 injuries", underlining the urgent need to protect medical facilities and healthcare workers.

He called for intensified humanitarian efforts to provide food and medical aid to Sudan's most vulnerable populations, warning that "without urgent intervention the situation could escalate into a deeper humanitarian catastrophe".

Meanwhile, South Sudan has managed to reduce cholera cases and prevent around 94,000

deaths since the confirmation of the outbreak in September 2024, the WHO said joint efforts involving the health ministry and partners, including government agencies, have reduced new cholera cases from an average of 1,000 at the peak of the outbreak in December 2024 to 114 in the last week of September 2025.

WHO Representative in South Sudan Humphrey Karamagi said the country's experience highlights the importance of sustained investment in preparedness, early detection and rapid response to infectious disease threats.

South Sudan's Ministry of Health activated a multisectoral response within 24 hours of outbreak confirmation, with the number of affected counties down to 12 from 55. The outbreak is now restricted to 29 out of 517 administrative divisions, according to the statement.

The WHO noted that this is South Sudan's largest and longest cholera outbreak since its independence in 2011.

The outbreak began in Renk, a border town receiving large numbers of returnees and refugees fleeing conflict in neighboring Sudan, where cholera transmission was already ongoing. Population movements contributed to the rapid spread of the disease.

The 13th batch of the Chinese medical team in South Sudan on Wednesday provided first-aid training to local staff at the clinic of the University of Juba.

Emmanuel Abdalla Lokosa, a 43-year-old laboratory technician at the clinic, was among 10 medics who attended the program, with a focus on wounds and fractures caused by falls and accidents.

He told Xinhua that the training facilitated by Chinese orthopedic doctor Fang Yong had reawakened and furnished his mind with knowledge.

Millions struggle to lower 'LDL' despite statins

Scientists test gene-editing therapy as one-time fix for high cholesterol

WASHINGTON, Feb 12, (AP): Scientists are testing an entirely new way to fight heart disease: a gene-editing treatment that might offer a one-time fix for high cholesterol.

It's very early stage research, tried in only a few dozen people so far. But gene-editing approaches being developed by two companies show hints that switching off certain genes could dramatically lower artery-clogging cholesterol, raising hopes of one day being able to prevent heart attacks without having to take pills.

"People want a fix, not a bandage," said Dr. Luke Laffin, a preventive cardiologist at the Cleveland Clinic. After co-authoring a promising study published in the New England Journal of Medicine, he said he was flooded with queries about how to participate in the next clinical trial.

Everyone needs a certain amount of cholesterol. But too much, especially a "bad" kind called LDL cholesterol, builds plaque in the artery walls and is a main driver of heart attacks and strokes. Cardiovascular disease is the nation's - and world's - leading killer.

Millions take cholesterol-lowering medicines such as statins, the cornerstone of treatment. But many still struggle to lower their cholesterol enough, and sticking with the drugs for life is difficult, with some quitting because of side effects.

While your diet contributes, your liver produces the cholesterol your body needs, according to the American Heart Association, and genes play a role in how it's managed. Some people inherit genes that trigger very high cholesterol. Others have cholesterol that's naturally extremely low over their lifetime and seldom develop heart disease.

Years ago, Dr. Kiran Musunuru, a cardiologist now at the University of Pennsylvania, reported some of those lucky people harbor a mutation that turns off a gene named ANGPTL3, lowering their levels of both LDL cholesterol and another bad fat, triglycerides.

Separately, geneticists at UT Southwestern Medical Center found still other people's extremely low LDL was due to loss of function of another gene

named PCSK9.

"It's a natural experiment in what would happen if we actually changed the gene," said the Cleveland Clinic's Dr. Steven Nissen, who with Laffin oversaw an ANGPTL3 study funded by Swiss-based CRISPR Therapeutics.

Today there are injected medicines that block proteins produced by the PCSK9 and ANGPTL3 genes in the liver, thus helping the body clear away cholesterol. The new research uses CRISPR, the Nobel Prize-winning gene-editing tool, to try switching off one of those genes in people at high risk from uncontrolled cholesterol.

In one study, 15 adults received a single infusion of tiny particles that carried the CRISPR tool to the liver, switching off the ANGPTL3 gene inside that organ's cells. Within two weeks, those getting the highest dose saw their LDL and triglyceride levels both drop by half, Laffin and Nissen reported in November.

Boston's Verve Therapeutics, a subsidiary of pharmaceutical giant Eli Lilly, earlier reported that its PCSK9-targeted editing infusion cut LDL cholesterol by a similar amount in a small study.

Both companies' initial studies

were done in Australia, the U.K. and other countries. A Lilly spokesperson said U.S. study sites are opening. Nissen said a next-step study of CRISPR Therapeutics' approach should start later this year, with sites yet to be announced. Each company is pursuing several gene targets.

While people with naturally non-functioning ANGPTL3 or PCSK9 have no apparent bad consequences, longer studies of the gene-editing approach in far more people are needed, said Penn's Musunuru, who co-founded Verve. He said some participants in an earlier Verve study have been tracked for two years, their cholesterol still lowered.

Gene editing is considered permanent. If edited liver cells reproduce, their progeny contain the altered genes, and Musunuru said the edits have lasted a lifetime in mice.

There are major safety questions to be answered, cautioned Dr. Joseph Wu of Stanford University, who wasn't involved in either study. CRISPR-based therapies for any disease haven't been used enough to know long-term safety - and the particles carrying the gene-editing tool can irritate or inflame the liver, he said.

WHO urges aid

'Millions denied cataract surgery'

GENEVA, Feb 12, (Xinhua): The World Health Organization (WHO) said in a press release on Wednesday that nearly half of all people worldwide facing cataract-related blindness still lack access to surgical treatment.

WHO urged countries to accelerate efforts to ensure that millions of people with cataract can undergo surgery, one of the most effective and affordable interventions to prevent blindness from the condition.

Cataract -- the clouding of the eye's lens that causes blurred vision and can lead to blindness -- currently affects more than 94 million people globally, WHO said, noting that cataract surgery, a simple 15-minute procedure, provides immediate and lasting restoration of sight.

WHO is calling on governments, civil society and partners to take necessary measures to transform cataract surgery from an intervention out of reach for millions of patients to a universally accessible procedure, through sustained commitment and investment.

The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) has supported 47 health centers operated by the Afghan Red Crescent Society across Afghanistan, delivering primary healthcare services to more than 1.2 million patients over the past year, local media outlet Tolo news reported on Wednesday.

According to the report, women and girls made up 64 percent of the total number of patients who received medical treatment at the supported facilities. During the reporting period, over 337,000 doses of vaccines were administered, helping curb the spread of communicable diseases in vulnerable communities.

In addition to medical services, the ICRC also provided professional and technical training to hundreds of healthcare workers to enhance the capacity and quality of local health services, the report said.

Afghanistan's health sector has encountered serious challenges in recent years amid economic constraints and a decline in international funding, increasing the need for sustained humanitarian assistance.

Human activities made wildfires up to 3 times more likely

Climate change set the stage for deadly wildfires: study

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Feb 12, (AP): Human-caused climate change had an important impact on the recent ferocious wildfires that engulfed parts of Chile and Argentina's Patagonia region, making the extremely high-risk conditions that led to widespread burning up to three times more likely than in a world without global warming, a team of researchers warned on Wednesday.

The hot, dry and gusty weather that fed last month's deadly wildfires in central and southern Chile was made around 200% more likely by human-made greenhouse gas emissions while the high-fire-risk conditions that fueled the blazes still racing through southern Argentina were made 150% more likely, according to World Weather Attribution, a scientific initiative that investigates extreme weather events soon after they happen.

That probability will only increase as humans continue to burn fossil fuels and blanket the planet with more heat-trapping gases, researchers added.

The blazes that tore through Chile's Biobio and Nuble regions in mid-January killed 23 people, destroyed over 1,000 houses and other structures and forced tens of thousands of people to flee their homes. All were caused by human activity, whether through arson or negligence.

In southern Argentina, the fires first ignited by lightning forced the evacuation of thousands of tourists and residents and burned through over 45,000 hectares (174 square miles) of native forest, including vast swaths of the Los Alerces National Park, a UNESCO World Heritage site home to 2,600-year-old trees.

The study, confirming what had been widely suspected, brings the first scientific assessment of global

warming's role in intensifying some of the most serious wildfire emergencies to grip Chile and Argentina in years.

It's the latest in an emerging subfield of climate science known as weather attribution, which is evolving rapidly in response to a growing thirst for public information about how climate change influences natural disasters.

The World Weather Attribution report has not yet been peer-reviewed or published in a scientific journal, but it relies on widely accepted methods, including the analysis of data and computer model simulations to compare today's climate with past weather patterns.

"Overall, we're confident in saying that the main driver of this increased fire risk is human-caused warming," Clair Barnes, a research associate with World Weather Attribution, said in a briefing with reporters. "These trends are projected to continue in the future as long as we

continue to burn fossil fuels."

Record droughts and scorching temperatures created conditions conducive to wildfires in Chile and Argentina, the study found, while single-species plantations of highly flammable trees like pines helped the fires spread more easily in both areas. The invasive species have replaced native, more fire-resistant ecosystems in the region, turning shrub, brush and grass into kindling.

In Argentina's Patagonia, the town of El Bolsón recorded its highest January temperature on record - 38.4 degrees Celsius (101 degrees Fahrenheit). The town of Esquel, near Los Alerces National Park, logged 11 consecutive days of maximum temperatures in January, its second-longest heat wave in 65 years. Temperatures in Chile ahead of the fires were high but not record-breaking.

The researchers estimated that seasonal rainfall from November to January, before the peak burning

period, was around 25% weaker in Chile and 20% less intense in Argentine Patagonia than it would have been without a rise in global temperatures of at least 1.3 degrees Celsius (2.3 degrees Fahrenheit) since pre-industrial times.

"This, together with higher-than-average temperatures, led to vegetation being submitted to stress, very low humidity in the soil," said Juan Antonio Rivera, an Argentine researcher and author of the study. "Once the wildfires began ... there was sufficient fuel to extend and be sustained over time."

Chile has increased its budget for fighting wildfires by 110% in the last four years under left-wing President Gabriel Boric, improving fire forecasting and investing in new equipment.

But in Argentina, a harsh austerity program under libertarian President Javier Milei may have hobbled the country's ability to respond to the fires, researchers said, citing budget cuts to firefighting crews, a lack of planning and deregulation of tourism activities in Patagonia's national parks. It's a claim echoed by The Associated Press by firefighters, park rangers and officials involved in disaster relief.

Milei, like his ally U.S. President Donald Trump, has denied that climate change is related to human presence. His office did not immediately respond to a request for comment early Wednesday.

"Unfortunately, with a government that does not understand climate change and its connection to human activities, where nature is secondary in terms of priorities, these situations get worse and wildfires end up having greater impacts than they should," said Rivera. "The situation is still not under control."

Coffee chains cut default sugar content in a new health push

BANGKOK, Feb 12, (AP): For many Thais, a meal doesn't feel complete without an iced coffee or tea so sugary it could pass for dessert. The government, concerned about the health consequences, wants them to dial it back.

Starting Wednesday, nine major coffee chains across the country have pledged to cut the default sugar content in some of their drinks by half in a government initiative aimed at tackling excessive sugar consumption.

According to the Health Department, Thais consume an average of 21 teaspoons of sugar per day, more than three times the World Health Organization's recommended limit of six teaspoons. Health officials warn that such high intake increases the risk of obesity, diabetes and other diseases.

The initiative is the first significant step to change consumers' sugar consumption behavior, said Amporn Benjapontitak, the director general of the department.

Pakorn Tungkasereerak, the department's deputy, said 2025 data show that about 45% of Thais aged 15 and older are obese, while 10% of the population has diabetes.

A survey by the Bureau of Nutrition found that a 22-ounce (650-milliliter) iced coffee contains an average of nine teaspoons of sugar, while a 10-ounce (300-milliliter) serving of bubble milk tea - an iced milk tea with tapioca pearls known as boba - can contain as much as 12 teaspoons.

Sirinya Kuiklang, an office worker, said she approves of the changes. She already orders her drinks at just 25% of the standard sugar level, but she is aware that many others consume too much sugar.

"It's good for Thai people," she said. Another office worker, Porwares Tantikanpanit, said he has enjoyed his non-coffee beverages at their current sugar levels but is willing to adjust if shops reduce the sweetness.

Leonard comes up big as Clippers snatch win from Rockets

OKC cruises past the Suns, Cavs beat Wizards in Harden's home debut

HOUSTON, Feb 12, (AP): Kawhi Leonard scored 27 points and his three-point play with two seconds remaining lifted the Los Angeles Clippers to a 105-102 victory over the Houston Rockets.

Leonard, who had 12 rebounds, scored 19 points in the fourth quarter to extend his career-best streak of 20-point games to 33.

The Clippers led by four points when Kevin Durant made one of two free throws before a layup by Alperen Sengun cut the lead to 102-101 with 43 seconds left. Leonard missed a 3-pointer and Jabari Smith Jr. grabbed a rebound to give Houston the ball.

Sengun shot 1 for 2 from the line with 7.2 seconds left to tie it and Leonard got the rebound before the Clippers called a timeout. Leonard then made a fadeaway jumper as he was fouled and hit the free throw to make it 105-102.

Thunder 136, Suns 109

In Phoenix, Jalen Williams scored 28 points, Isaiah Joe added 21 and the hot-shooting Oklahoma City Thunder cruised to victory over the Phoenix Suns. Oklahoma City led by at least 20 points for the entire second half, pushing the advantage to 37 in the third. Williams shot 11 of 12 from the field and added five assists and four rebounds. Joe made 6 of 8 3-pointers.

Kenrich Williams added 15 points and Chet Holmgren had 13. The defending champion Thunder - who have won four of six - shot 58.4% from the field and got 74 points from players coming off the bench.

Cavaliers 138, Wizards 113

In Cleveland, Sam Merrill scored a career-high 32, Donovan Mitchell added 30, and the Cleveland Cavaliers rolled to a victory over the Washington Wizards in James Harden's first home game.

Harden had 13 points and 11 assists in 28 minutes for his second double-double in three games since being traded by the LA Clippers to the Cavaliers on Feb. 4. He was only 1 of 4 from the field, but went 10 of 12 from the foul line.

Cleveland has won five straight

and 10 of its last 11. It was the fifth time this season the Cavaliers haven't trailed in a game.

Knicks 138, 76ers 89

In Philadelphia, Jose Alvarado scored a season-high 26 points and Mikal Bridges added 22 points as the New York Knicks beat the Philadelphia 76ers. The Knicks bounced back from an overtime home loss to the Indiana Pacers on Tuesday night for their 10th win in 12 games. Two of those victories have come against the Sixers. The teams split their four-game season series.

Spurs 126, Warriors 113

In San Francisco, De'Aaron Fox scored 27 points and Victor Wembanyama added 26 to send the San Antonio Spurs into the All-Star break on a six-game winning streak after beating the Golden State Warriors.

Wembanyama followed up his 40-point performance against the Los Angeles Lakers on Tuesday night with another strong outing to give the Spurs a 38-16 record at the break. After missing the playoffs the past six seasons, the Spurs have the

second-best record in the Western Conference.

Keldon Johnson scored 21 for San Antonio.

Nuggets 122, Grizzlies 116

Denver, Nikola Jokic and Jamal Murray warmed up for their appearances in the NBA's All-Star festivities by teaming up to help the Denver Nuggets hold off the Memphis Grizzlies.

Jokic had the 184th triple-double of his career with 26 points, 15 rebounds and 11 assists. Murray added 22 points and was 4 for 4 from the

foul line in the final 11.7 seconds.

Tim Hardaway Jr. added 21 points for the Nuggets, who head into the break at 35-20 despite an injury-riddled season that has seen all five starters miss time and six of their top rotation players go out for significant stretches.

Jazz 121, Kings 93

In Salt Lake City, Jaren Jackson Jr scored 23 points in his home debut to lead the Utah Jazz to a 121-93 victory over the Sacramento Kings.

Lauri Markkanen scored 19 points to help the Jazz win their second

straight game. Isaiah Collier added 12 points and 14 assists. Brice Sensabaugh added 19 points off the bench.

Heat 123, Pelicans 111

In New Orleans, Bam Adebayo had 27 points, 14 rebounds and four blocks and the short-handed Miami Heat beat the New Orleans Pelicans in the final game for both teams before the All-Star break. Miami used only nine players, with Tyler Herro, Norman Powell, Pelle Larsson and Andrew Wiggins sidelined. Herro missed his 15th straight game.

Timberwolves 133, Blazers 109

In Minneapolis, Julius Randle had 41 points and the Minnesota Timberwolves beat Portland to end the Trail Blazers' winning streak at three.

Randle, who also had seven rebounds, capped his night with a windmill dunk that put the crowd at the Target Center on its feet. Jaden McDaniels added 21 points for the Timberwolves, playing their final game before the All-Star break.

Jrue Holiday scored 23 points for the Trail Blazers.

Pacers 115, Nets 110

In New York, Jarace Walker had 23 points, Kam Jones secured the victory with a 3-pointer with 16 seconds remaining, and the short-handed Indiana Pacers beat the Brooklyn Nets.

Micah Potter had 19 and Ethan Thompson had 15 for the Pacers, who won for the second straight night after winning in overtime over the New York Knicks on Tuesday night to end a four-game losing streak.

Hornets 110, Hawks 107

In Charlotte, Brandon Miller had 31 points and nine rebounds, LaMelo Ball made seven 3s and scored 24 points and Charlotte held on to beat the Atlanta Hawks, just hours after two of the Hornets' starters were suspended by the NBA for fighting.

Kon Knueppel added 18 points on four 3s, and Miller hit five 3s as the Hornets finished 19 of 51 from beyond the arc for their 10th win in 11 games.

Dyson Daniels scored 21 points for Atlanta. Jalen Johnson added 19 points, 13 rebounds and nine assists.

The NBA suspended Hornets forwards Miles Bridges and Moussa Diabate for four games for their role in a fight on Monday night against the Detroit Pistons.

Gunners close in on quarterfinal meeting against Chelsea

Maanum shines with two goals, Arsenal routs Leuven in 1st leg

LEUVEN, Belgium, Feb 12, (AP): Defending champion Arsenal took a big step toward the Women's Champions League quarterfinals by routing OH Leuven 4-0 in the first leg of their knockout playoff round.

After the victory in the inaugural Women's Champions Cup on Feb 1, Arsenal dominated from the start in Belgium to close in on a quarterfinal meeting against London rival Chelsea.

Frida Maanum led the visitors with two goals, and Olivia Smith showed she was worth the record transfer fee Arsenal paid Liverpool for her in July. Also, Kim Little came on as substitute to play her 400th game for Arsenal.

Maanum headed in the opener after meeting a cross by Caitlin Foord from the right in the 22nd minute.

Smith doubled the advantage a quarter of an hour later with a clinical finish as the Canada forward found the far corner of the net with a first-time low shot. Maanum was left unmarked in the box to add her second, with Foord setting her up again early in the second half before substitute Alessia Russo completed the rout with her fifth of the campaign.

The revamped Women's Champions League format has followed the men's competition with an opening league phase of six rounds instead of eight.

The top four in the standings -

Barcelona, Lyon, Chelsea and Bayern - advanced directly to the quarterfinals. Teams placed fifth to 12th went to the playoffs round.

Arsenal finished the league phase in fifth while Leuven was 12th in its first campaign in the European top competition.

The two met in the 18-team league phase with Arsenal beating Leuven 3-0 away.

Real Madrid remains on course for an all-Spanish quarterfinal against three-time champion Barcelona after coming from a goal down to win 3-2 at Paris FC.

After going behind in the 10th minute, Madrid needed just six min-

utes to turn the game around before halftime in the French capital.

Caroline Weir equalized on a rebound from close range in the 39th and Athena's low shot finished off a fast counter in the last minute of the first half to put the visitors ahead.

The 20-year-old forward Linda Caicedo controlled goalkeeper Misa Rodriguez's long pass before making it 3-1 in the 83rd before Maeline Mendy pulled a goal back in the 89th to narrow the deficit ahead of the second leg. Paris had taken the lead through Kaja Korosec, who was at the far corner to volley the opener into the roof of the net off a corner kick from Maelle Garbino.

'Al-Khelaifi's leadership has been instrumental'

Infantino and Ceferin call agreement to end Super League as a victory for soccer

BRUSSELS, Feb 12, (AP): FIFA President Gianni Infantino praised the agreement to formally end the divisive Super League project and said, "Football wins when we unite."

UEFA President Aleksander Ceferin also hailed the consensus as a victory for soccer.

Their comments came during the 50th UEFA Congress in Belgium on Thursday, a day after Super League's end was signaled by an agreement of principles between Real Madrid and UEFA.

Madrid, the 15-time European champion, and its president Florentino Pérez looked even more isolated after Barcelona formally pulled out of Super League.

"Yesterday, we heard the great news about the agreement between UEFA, the EFC (European Football Clubs) and Real Madrid," Infantino said.

He congratulated Ceferin, EFC leader al-Khelaifi and Pérez for having reached the agreement.

"I would like to ask you to clap hands for Alexander, for Nasser and for Florentino," he said. "Because football wins when we unite."

Infantino in the past was accused of being complicit in the formation of the breakaway plans by Europe's elite clubs before belatedly denying he colluded with the rebels after months of silence.

Ceferin said he was "very happy" that Madrid and Barcelona "joined the family again."

"Honestly speaking, we were all tired of these disputes," he said. "We had some disagreements with the president of Real Madrid but let me be clear, we never lost respect to ourselves, to each other, and we never lost the love for the game. And let me be even clearer, the only winner of this situation is football, nobody else."

Ceferin said Al-Khelaifi's "leadership has been instrumental in turning dialogue into a shared direction of travel, so thank you very much for that."

Madrid and Barcelona won a ruling at the European Court of Justice in Luxembourg against Champions

League organizer UEFA more than two years ago, but no new clubs publicly came forward to join the breakaway project which had no clear path forward.

The agreement on Wednesday between Madrid, UEFA and the influential EFC group said principles were agreed that "will also serve to resolve their legal disputes."

It was announced as European soccer leaders met in Brussels on the eve of UEFA's annual congress of 55 member federations.

Madrid had been at the head of 12 Spanish, Italian and English clubs who challenged UEFA in April 2021 by launching a breakaway Super League which hoped to start play with 20 teams. But the project collapsed within 48 hours amid a fierce backlash in England by fans and the government which threatened legislation to protect the traditional structure of European soccer.

Busch's Daytona 500 pole sets stage for redemption run

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Feb 12, (AP): Kyle Busch won the pole for NASCAR's season-opening Daytona 500 to give the driver with the longest active losing streak in "The Great American Race" a shot at the victory that has escaped him his entire career.

Busch is 0 for 20 in the Daytona 500 and hasn't started in the top five since 2016, when he still drove for Joe Gibbs Racing. He started fourth and finished third that year, then was a career-best second to then-teammate Denny Hamlin in 2019.

"Kyle, we've got to get him this 500," said team owner Richard Childress.

No driver has ever won their first Daytona 500 after 20 previous attempts. The

late Dale Earnhardt won for Childress in his 20th start in 1998 - three years before Earnhardt was killed in a crash on the final lap of the 2001 race.

"Sounds really good right now - being able to qualify on my first pole for the Daytona 500, that's pretty special," said Busch, who wore custom-designed Olympic-themed racing shoes at Daytona International Speedway.

He earned the pole Wednesday night with a lap at 183.925 mph in a Chevrolet for Richard Childress Racing, the team that signed him before the 2023 season when his contract was up with Gibbs and his salary was too high for most teams.

But his time in the No. 8 has been rocky for the two-

time NASCAR champion. He's won three races since joining RCR - all in his first season - and takes a 93-race losing streak into the Daytona 500.

Busch starts the year with new crew chief Jim Pohlman, who led Justin Allgaier to the 2024 championship in NASCAR's second-tier series.

The pole runs continues a strong few weeks for Busch and his family: Older brother, Kurt, was inducted into the NASCAR Hall of Fame last month.

"Feels really good for RCR as a group," Busch said. "Just a valiant effort by everybody here. It would be really nice to be doing an interview like this about being No. 1 come Sunday night."

RCR last put a car on the

pole for the Daytona 500 in 2014 when Austin Dillon, grandson of the team owner, qualified first. Dillon won the race in 2018.

Chase Briscoe, last year's pole-sitter, qualified second in a Toyota for Joe Gibbs Racing.

"It's a really big deal, not only for myself, but I haven't even checked my phone, I'm sure (Bass Pro Shops owner) Johnny Morris is ballistic already," Briscoe said of his sponsor. "He gets super fired up for this race. He's called me two or three times this week telling me he's so excited to get here and asking me how the car is. It's a big deal for him, as well. It should be awesome to be on the front row again Sunday."

Although 37 drivers were locked into the race ahead

of time trials, the starting order is not determined until after a pair of Thursday night qualifying races. Of those locked in, 36 drive chartered cars that guarantee a spot in every race. An additional slot went to seven-time NASCAR champion Jimmie Johnson under a provisional rule that allows for a 41st "world-class driver" trying to enter a Cup event.

Johnson is a two-time Daytona 500 winner and finished third last year. He left full-time NASCAR racing after the 2020 season.

There were two spots open for those not already locked in and they were claimed by Corey Heim for 23XI Racing and Justin Allgaier for JR Motorsports. They were the fastest cars in time trials.

Heim, last year's Truck Series champion, will be making his Daytona 500 debut. Allgaier is in for the fourth time in his career and the second consecutive year while driving for two-time race winner Dale Earnhardt Jr.

Historic World Cup win for Italy as Sri Lanka eases past Oman

Captain Shanaka breaks own record

MUMBAI, India, Feb 12, (AP): Italy earned a momentous maiden cricket win at the T20 World Cup when it stunned Nepal by 10 wickets.

Brothers Anthony and Justin Mosca sealed the victory with an unbeaten stand for 124-0 after Nepal was bowled out for 123 at iconic Wankhede Stadium.

Italy's first win at a global cricket tournament came in its second outing, and the Azzurri joined the Netherlands as the only two non-British European teams to win a game in the T20 World Cup.

Earlier, captain Dasun Shanaka broke his own record for the fastest Twenty20 half-century for Sri Lanka as they crushed Oman by 105 runs in Pallekele.

Italy gained associated member status in 1995 and played its first T20 international in 2019 against Germany.

The team is mainly comprised of immigrant cricketers: The Mosca and Manenti brothers are Australian-born; injured skipper Wayne Madsen was born in Durban and played international field hockey for South Africa; allrounder JJ Smuts played ODIs and T20s for South Africa until 2021. Allrounder Jaspreet Singh - born in Punjab - brings the Indian flavour and Crishan

Kalugamage - the player of the match against Nepal - comes from Sri Lanka's spin heritage. For all of them, this World Cup is about laying roots for the future.

Nepal, at its third T20 World Cup, was riding high after giving England a mighty scare at the same venue on Sunday.

But Kalugamage picked 3-18, including Nepal captain Rohit Paudel. Ben Manenti (2-9) dismissed Lokesh Bam - hero of the England game - for 3 and Nepal couldn't recover. The last seven wickets fell for 30 runs and Nepal was shot out with three balls to spare.

The Sydney-based Mosca

brothers hit nine sixes and eight boundaries - Anthony was 62 not out off 32 balls and Justin 60 not out off 44 - to dismantle the Nepal attack in just 12.4 overs.

Their unbeaten 124 runs was the highest partnership between siblings in men's T20 World Cups, surpassing the 96 by Pakistan's Kamran and Umar Akmal against Australia in 2014.

The first ever 10-wicket win for Italy was only the second ever by an associate nation in tournament history.

"It is pretty extraordinary," stand-in Harry Manenti said. "It is something that a lot of people in Italy, and a lot of people in this team dreamt for a long time.

When we qualified (for this World Cup) it was a special moment. But our goal was always to compete in this competition and compete at this level, and we showed that today."

Shanaka's 19-ball 50 after Kusal Mendis' 61 and Pavan Rathnayake's 60 against a weak bowling attack propelled Sri Lanka to a tournament-best 225-5.

Oman labored to 120-9 in reply, the wickets shared by five bowlers. Off-spinner Maheesh Theekshana led with 2-11 off four overs.

Sri Lanka has two wins from two games but was yet to meet Group B rivals Australia and Zimbabwe.

Oman's 43-year-old Mohammad Nadeem became the oldest man to score a half-century in the history of the T20 World Cup with an unbeaten 53 from 56 balls. Nadeem was one of the only two Oman batters to reach double figures with Wasim Ali scoring 27.

Sri Lanka lost Pathum Nissanka and Kamil Mishra inside the power play but Rathnayake and Mendis featured in a brisk 94-run third-wicket stand off 52 balls.

Shanaka smacked five sixes to surpass his previous Sri Lanka record of a 20-ball half-century against India in 2023 before he holed out at long-off off the next ball.

Frustration over mistakes grows

Bundesliga referees and VAR under scrutiny

BERLIN, Feb 12, (AP): Germany's referees are under scrutiny after a plethora of questionable decisions and incorrect calls compounded by anger over the video assistant referees' failure to correct them.

It's leading to widespread frustration among players and coaches, while fans' patience is tested by lengthy VAR checks that don't always bring clarity, or contentious calls that aren't checked at all.

The latest example came in the German Cup on Wednesday when Leipzig was aggrieved not to be awarded at least a free kick after Bayern Munich defender Josip Stanišić clearly fouled Antonio Nusa on the edge of the penalty area early in Bayern's 2-0 win.

"It's absolutely crazy," Leipzig coach Ole Werner said. "If four people can't see that as a foul then it's not quarterfinal level, I'm sorry."

Bayern also had a questionable call go its way in the Bundesliga against Hoffenheim last weekend, when defender Kevin Akpoguma was sent off early. There was no VAR intervention.

The previous weekend, there were contentious decisions in Bundesliga games between Eintracht Frankfurt and Bayer Leverkusen, Leipzig and Mainz, Hoffenheim and Union Berlin, and Augsburg's match against

St. Pauli.

Augsburg midfielder Elvis Rexhepaj called for VAR to be scrapped altogether after he was incorrectly penalized in the subsequent game against Mainz. A minutes-long delay for VAR failed to correct referee Patrick Ittrich's erroneous call. Ittrich acknowledged his mistake after the match but by then it was too late.

"The biggest problem is there's no common denominator," Dortmund coach Niko Kovac said. "Whoever is sitting in the studio or whoever is refereeing has a different perception and that makes it difficult. Regardless of who's sitting there the decisions should be consistent."

Bayern visits relegation-threatened Werder Bremen on Saturday. The league leader has recovered from an uncharacteristic two-game run without a win and shouldn't face many problems against a team that failed to get a bounce in new coach Daniel Thone's debut last weekend. Bremen is 11 games without a win.

Borussia Dortmund hosts Mainz on Friday when it will aim to maintain some pressure on Bayern by provisionally cutting the gap to three points with its sixth consecutive win. But Mainz has won its last three.

The battle for Champions League qualification remains

intense with six points between third-placed Hoffenheim and sixth-placed Leverkusen. Only the top four qualify for Europe's most lucrative competition. Hoffenheim hosts Freiburg on Saturday, when Leverkusen hosts St. Pauli and fifth-placed Stuttgart hosts Cologne. Leipzig, which is ahead of Stuttgart on goal difference, welcomes Wolfsburg on Sunday.

Colombia star Luis Díaz is in arguably the form of his life with five goals in his last three games for Bayern, including Wednesday's cup win over Leipzig and a hat trick against Hoffenheim last weekend.

Christoph Baumgartner scored two in Leipzig's 2-1 win over Cologne and the Austria midfielder is instrumental to the team's Champions League push.

Nadiem Amiri has led Mainz's revival under new coach Urs Fischer. Amiri scored two penalties last weekend to lift Mainz up to 14th. The team has lost only once in eight league games under Fischer. There were nine defeats in 13 games before that.

South Korea forward Lee Jaesung has extended his contract at Mainz. The 33-year-old Lee has 28 goals in 159 games for Mainz since joining in a free transfer from Holstein Kiel in 2021. Mainz did not divulge the length of his new deal. His contract had been due to expire at the end of the season.

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 12: Burgan secured a commanding 34-20 victory over Al-Nasr in their Round 10 clash of the Premier League, held at Sheikh Saad Al-Abdullah Sports Complex. In the same round, Al-Arabi defeated Al-Sulaibikhat 35-27.

Round 11 actions begin on Saturday with Al-Nasr facing Al-Salmiya at 5:00 pm, followed by a high-profile showdown between Al-Qadsia and Al-Arabi at 7:00 pm. The action continues on Sunday, when Al-Sulaibikhat meets Burgan and Kuwait Club takes on Kazma.

Kuwait Club sits atop the standings with 20 points. Kazma are second with 13 points, while Burgan moved into third with 12. Al-Qadsia and Al-Arabi share fourth and fifth place on 10 points each. Al-Salmiya is sixth with seven points, Al-Salmiya seventh with six, and Al-Nasr remains at the bottom with two points.

The Premier League is contested over three

rounds, with the championship awarded to the team accumulating the highest total of points.

Rosenior returns to Hull in FA Cup fourth round, Macclesfield seeks another upset

LONDON, Feb 12, (Xinhua): Chelsea coach Liam Rosenior can expect a warm welcome when he takes his side to play former club, Hull City in the fourth round of the FA Cup on Friday night.

Rosenior was surprisingly sacked by the Championship (second division) club after a relative successful spell after he helped the team from the north of England avoid relegation and then led it to within a whisker of the play-offs to the Premier League.

He returns after a successful start at Chelsea and could have Liam Delap in his side, with Delap also returning to the club where he had a successful loan spell.

Hull City is enjoying an excellent season under current coach Sergej Jakirovic and is fourth in the Championship, although both coaches are likely to make changes to their regular starting 11s.

The round has two all-Premier League ties with Aston Villa at home to Newcastle United where both coaches Unai Emery and Eddie Howe will be tempted to rest tired players while also knowing the Cup offers the best chance of lifting a title this season.

Liverpool is at home to Brighton, who is currently struggling for form in the league, but knocked Manchester United out of the third round with a 2-1 win at Old Trafford.

Manchester City should have a comfortable passage into the fifth round, although Pep Guardiola's tie at home to Salford City (League Two) is a local derby that helps to capture some of the old romance of the Cup.

Arsenal coach Mikel Arteta will rest regular starters for the visit of Wigan Athletic, who currently sits third from bottom of League One. The game highlights how fortunes can change in football given that 12 years ago the two teams met in the semifinal of the competition, with Arsenal reaching the final on penalties after 120 minutes ended 1-1.

West Ham should be able to forget its battle to avoid relegation with a visit to another League One struggler, Burton, while the Premier League's bottom club, Wolverhampton Wanderers travels to Grimsby Town of League Two.

Grimsby produced one of the biggest shocks of recent years earlier this season when it knocked Manchester United out of the EFL Cup and fans will be looking for another surprise against a rival that is virtually doomed to playing in the Championship next season.

Burnley should have few problems with Mansfield Town, although the League One side will look to defend deep against a Burnley that isn't exactly prolific in scoring goals.

Championship sides Stoke City and Oxford United could give some problems to Premier League rivals Fulham and Sunderland, while big-spending Birmingham City has an interesting game at home to Leeds United.

Macclesfield pulled off one of the biggest shocks in the entire history of the FA Cup in the third round when it knocked cupholder Crystal Palace out of the competition and now the team coached by John Rooney (Wayne Rooney's younger brother) is looking for a repeat.

Al-Nasser and Al-Asiri clinch gold

Kuwait dominates Weightlifting Championship in Abu Dhabi

ABU DHABI, Feb 12, (KUNA): Kuwait weightlifting team claimed three medals — two gold and one bronze — at the Masters Weightlifting Championship (Abu Dhabi 2026), currently underway in the UAE capital.

The championship features competitors from 43 countries, competing across official weight categories under the regulations of the International Weightlifting Federation. The event began on February 7.

Mohammad Al-Nasser won gold in the 110 kg category for the 45-year-old age group, showcasing his dominance and reaffirming his strong record in regional and international competitions.

Fellow Kuwaiti Yousef Al-Asiri claimed gold in the 35-year-old category after an outstanding performance, while Nawaf Al-Nasser secured the bronze medal in the 40-year-old group after advancing to the finals.

Speaking to KUNA, Mohammad Al-Nasser attributed his victory to long-term dedication, intensive training, and a disciplined preparation camp. He emphasized that the achievements of Al-Asiri and Nawaf Al-Nasser mark a significant milestone for Kuwaiti weightlifting on both regional and international stages.

He also noted that the Abu Dhabi Championship is regarded as one of the most competitive global events, given the participation of elite athletes from around the world.

Brignone completes dramatic comeback; Ukrainian excluded

Woods upsets Kingsbury for gold

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy, Feb 12, (AP): Italian skier Federica Brignone's long, painful climb back to the top is complete.

The 35-year-old earned the first Olympic gold medal of her decorated career by winning the women's super-G.

Less than a year removed from breaking multiple bones in her left leg - which resulted in two surgeries and months of rehab - Brignone navigated the tricky technical Trofane course in 1:23.41.

Romane Miradoli of France and Cornelia Huettner of Austria were in silver and bronze position as the back half of the field - typically filled with less-accomplished racers - prepared to hit the starting gate.

Racing in foggy conditions in flat light the can make the nuances of the course difficult to navigate, and with IOC President Kirsty Coventry and Italy President Sergio Mattarella near the finish below, Brignone triumphantly raised her poles after crossing the line.

Brignone's victory made her the oldest female gold medalist in women's alpine. The gold is also her fourth Olympic medal. Brignone claimed silver in the super-G and bronze in the team event in Beijing four years ago. She also earned bronze in the super-G in Pyeongchang in 2018. Brignone's four medals under the rings now match Deborah Compagnoni for most by an Italian women's skier.

Brignone was precise and fast, a

combination hard to come by for many top contenders whose runs were over long before the finish.

Downhill champion Breezy Johnson of the U.S. caught her right pole on a gate shortly after exiting the speed-building chute at the course and lost her balance. She ended up in the catch fence but was able to get to her feet.

Johnson was hardly the only one who ran into trouble. Italy's Sofia Goggia, currently atop the World Cup season standings in the super-G, 2018 Olympic gold medalist Ester Ledecka of Czechia and American Mary Bockey, in the race after U.S. star Lindsey Vonn severely injured her left leg in the downhill on Sunday, were all

unable to make it down safely.

Brignone was one of four flag bearers for Italy during the opening ceremonies. At one point, still bothered by the pain in her left leg nearly 10 months after her terrifying crash in Val di Fassa, Brignone asked curler Amos Mosaner to carry her on his shoulders. Mosaner obliged, leaving Brignone free to wave the flag.

The familiar combination of red, white and green was visible across a wide swath of stands on Thursday when Brignone finished, as a crowd emboldened by the early success of the host country roared at the 2026 Games roared its approval.

Vladislav Heraskevych was barred

from racing after refusing to give up his plan to race in a helmet commemorating athletes who have been killed since Russia invaded his country. The International Olympic Committee says it breaks rules against making statements on the field of play.

IOC President Kirsty Coventry turned up at the sliding track in a last-minute bid to change Heraskevych's mind ahead of the opening run of the competition Thursday morning.

Heraskevych, who had been a contender for the medals, refused and was excluded from the Olympics.

Heraskevych said it "looks like discrimination" to bar him from competing. Coventry, who said she'd hoped to find a compromise, was tearful on what she called an "emotional morning."

In a big upset, Cooper Woods of Australia won freestyle skiing gold in men's moguls by edging Canadian great Mikael Kingsbury - the sport's most decorated skier - on a tiebreaker.

American skier Jessie Diggins overcame bruised ribs to take bronze in the women's 10-kilometer cross-country skiing race. Frida Karlsson won her second gold medal of the Milan Cortina Games by leading a 1-2 finish for Sweden.

Alessandro Haemmerle of Austria and Canada's Eliot Grondin repeated as gold and silver medalists in men's snowboardcross after another close finish between the two rivals.

Grondin looked to be in position to flip the result from Beijing 2022 coming over the final roll, but Haemmerle closed the small gap over the final meters and thrust his board ahead of Grondin's to successfully defend his title.
