# Massive growth ahead for banks

Kuwait project boom reshapes economy

**KUWAIT CITY, Feb 14:** Former economic advisor and consultant at the Ministry of Finance Mohammad Ramadhan said the local banking sector is poised for enormous growth.

In an exclusive statement to the newspaper, Ramadhan

confirmed the increase in capital expenditures in the State budget -- from KD2.24 billion in the 2025/2026 budget to more than KD3 billion in the 2026/2027 budget.

He explained that the increased spending -- fueled by several major development projects launched under the plans of the State -- is expected to positively impact banks, as most companies executing these projects rely heavily on banks for financing.

## Agricultural and industrial holdings must be managed prudently

WHEN the government announces a budget deficit of approximately 40 percent, it calls for a closer examination of the figures and a review of whether efforts to diversify income sources have been successful or if the situation remains unchanged.

The estimated budget deficit of KD 9.8 billion is equivalent to nearly thirty billion US dollars.

This figure is comparable to the budgets of many African countries, several Arab nations, and even some Eastern European states. Unlike these countries, which have multiple sources of income, Kuwait still relies heavily on a single commodity subject to price fluctuations, making it an insecure primary source of revenue.

Above all, we must acknowledge that the state possesses considerable potential if managed in a modern manner, in contrast to past decades when welfare-state policies dominated economic decision-making.

During that era, subsidies became an absolute right for everyone, costing approximately KD seven billion annually. Furthermore, due to haphazard appointment policies, the first section of the budget, which is allocated to salaries, has ballooned to consume around 73 to 75 percent of the total budget, while the remaining productive sectors receive a comparatively much smaller share than in other countries.

For many years, I, along with many economic and financial experts, have been calling for a change in the approach to managing national income sources, aiming to maximize GDP and reduce reliance on oil as the primary source of revenue.

We have called for giving the private sector space to play its economic role without government obstruction.

However, it appears that financial officials hold a different view, which is a perspective known only to senior officials familiar with the attitudes of successive governments.

For the past three decades, the National Assembly has often been used as pretext to justify hindering the progress of government projects. Perhaps this viewpoint holds some truth.

Today, the government has huge potential to fulfill its role fully, without obstructive parliamentary interference.

Unfortunately, the opposite is happening. Restrictions on projects and decisions are increasing the deficits of companies and private-sector institutions. This includes the withdrawal of agricultural plots from beneficiaries who sought to reduce the burden on public funds by developing a small portion of the land for agrotourism activities to boost their income, similar to practices in other Gulf countries.

Moreover, industrial and service plots have been confiscated over minor violations or even based on the mood of an employee when he is unhappy with some beneficiaries.

## Youth mental health takes national priority

**KUWAIT CITY, Feb 14:** Minister of Health Dr. Ahmed Al-Awadhi inaugurated the First National Conference on Child and Adolescent Mental Health recently, with the participation of local, regional and international experts in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, Pediatrics, Developmental Medicine and Family Medicine.

In his speech at the opening ceremony, Al-Awadhi confirmed that Kuwait is prioritizing the mental health of children and adolescents, and it considers investment in this field vital for building

ing a cohesive society capable of facing contemporary challenges.

He stressed that mental health is not just a supplementary aspect of healthcare, as it is the essential foundation for the healthy development of children, ensuring their ability to learn, being creative, and to interact positively with their family and community to contribute to a prosperous future for the nation.

He said the Health Ministry is keen on developing holistic mental health services for young people. He explained that this system extends beyond psychiatric clinics and inpatient wards, as it includes specialized weekly clinics in government hospitals to guarantee

easy access to these services.

He cited the opening of Hiba Clinic for Autism and Communication Disorders last year -- an important step towards providing services for children with developmental and communication disorders, thus, giving them better opportunities for integration and learning.

He also affirmed the strength of cooperation with the Addiction Treatment Center in terms of the provision of awareness and treatment programs for adolescents in order to protect and support them.

The resolution aims to develop an investment framework for the funds of minors, individuals with diminished legal capacity, and those without legal capacity, while strengthening governance and oversight of their management.

The resolution provides for the implementation of the attached regulations outlining the committee's responsibilities and operational procedures, as well as determining the remuneration of its chairman and members in accordance with the policies and controls approved by PAMA's Board of Directors.

The Director General is tasked with implementing the resolution, which takes effect from the date of issuance and supersedes any previous conflicting decisions.

According to the regulations, the Standing Committee shall be formed by a decision of the Minister of Justice and will consist of three to five members representing the Public Authority for Investment, nominated and approved by the Board of Directors of PAMA. A substitute member shall be appointed in the event of a vacancy, following the same procedures.

The bylaws authorize the committee to prepare and approve strategies, policies, and regulations for investing PAMA's funds and assets, and to oversee their implementation in line with best risk-management practices and internationally recognized institutional investment standards, while adhering to the provisions and principles of Islamic Sharia.

The committee is tasked with preparing short-term and long-term investment plans, identifying funding sources, studying and approving investment opportunities, conducting feasibility studies, establishing guarantee and surety frameworks, and setting the

## 14mn pills seized in joint drug bust

### 3 held in Kuwait-UAE operation

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 14: In a remarkable security achievement proving the strong coordination and unity among Gulf states in combating the drug trade, the security authorities in Kuwait and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) confiscated about 14 million Captagon pills.

The Drug Control General Department (DCGD) at the Interior Ministry in Kuwait spearheaded the joint operation, which dealt a huge blow to drug smuggling networks.

In a press statement on Saturday, the Ministry of Interior confirmed that the intelligence and field operation was conducted jointly with the UAE under the guidance of First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior Sheikh Fahad Al-Yousef and Chairman of the National Anti-Narcotics Bureau in the UAE Sheikh Zayed bin Hamad Al-Nahyan. It affirmed that a total of 14,062,500 Captagon pills weighing 2,250 kilograms were confiscated during the operation.

According to the ministry, the contraband was meticulously concealed in commercial shipment of five containers of corn in Dubai. Security officers arrested three Arabs involved in the shipment.

The ministry affirmed that the joint operation dismantled the criminal network that attempted to flood the Gulf countries with such a huge quantity of psychotropic substances.

Under the leadership of DCGD Director Brigadier General Mohammad Qabaz and his assistant, Brigadier General Sheikh

Hamad Al-Yousef Al-Sabah, the department continues to record security achievements locally and internationally, directing security strikes against drug dealers and traffickers despite the constant development of their smuggling methods.

**No to ATVs on roads:** The Traffic Investigation Unit at the General Traffic Department has intensified security campaigns against all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) plying through public roads.

The latest campaign resulted in the arrest of seven individuals, including two minors. Five of those arrested were referred to the Traffic Detention Center, while the two minors were referred to the Juvenile Detention Center.

A security source explained that the ongoing campaigns aim to stop the use of ATVs on public roads, indicating that those arrested in the recent campaign endangered their lives and that of other road users. The source urged the public to refrain from using ATVs on public roads to avoid legal repercussions.

**95 citations issued:** The Public Relations Department at Kuwait Municipality announced that the Audit and Municipal Services Monitoring Department in Farwaniya Governorate conducted a field campaign to inspect health licenses for shops and advertising permits and to take regulatory action against violators, reports Al-Anba daily.

The department confirmed that the third field campaign in Farwaniya Governorate resulted in the issuance of 95 citations for violations of shop and advertising regulations and for unauthorized use of space, in addition to 11 warnings.

It indicated that this third campaign will be followed by several field visits in all governorates according to a schedule covering the coming weeks.

## MoCI crackdown on counterfeit items intensified

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 14: Director of the Commercial Control Department at the Ministry of Commerce and Industry Faisal Al-Ansari issued a directive to intensify field inspections, even during official holidays.

In a press statement, Al-Ansari disclosed that

Head of Rai Center Faraj Al-Mutairi and Commercial Inspector Ali Al-Owaian uncovered a violation during a recent field inspection, leading to the closure of a stall in the Friday Market for selling items bearing forged trademarks.

Around 800 counterfeit items, including women's shoes and handbags bearing fake trademarks, were confiscated. This is a violation of intellectual property rights and anti-commercial fraud laws.

Al-Ansari confirmed that a report was filed regarding the incident and it will be referred to the Commercial Prosecution to complete the necessary legal procedures.

He stressed that the ministry does not tolerate those who sell counterfeit goods in order to protect the rights of consumers and the original trademark owners, as well as to promote a fair and regulated commercial environment.

## Going to Khafji, Basra for cheaper goods is 'invalid'

"THERE is an economic analyst who publishes economic analyses on social media and represents a well-known media organization," columnist Engineer Adel Al-Jarallah Al-Kharafi wrote for *Al-Seyassah* daily.

"I have listened to him, and he sometimes reflects public sentiment, especially since he provides technical information related to the local economy."

"However, in his latest report, he claimed that Kuwaitis are turning to neighboring countries because, as he said, they are cheaper than Kuwait, even though some of these countries impose Value Added Tax (VAT)."

"On this point, I disagree with him, as there are many factors that Adel Al-Kharafi must be considered. Goods in some neighboring countries are not necessarily cheaper than in Kuwait, and many citizens from those countries come to Kuwait, where goods are often more affordable."

"Furthermore, goods in our country are subsidized, of good quality, and reasonably priced. Basic food items are subsidized in most Kuwaiti households, which is an important point to consider."

"The Gulf economies are similar in several aspects, so buying and selling often depend on individual preference."

"From the 1960s until a year before the invasion, Kuwaitis would travel to Basra every weekend to buy necessities, especially vegetables and basic food items, due to their quality and affordability. Residents of chalets near Khafji also travel there weekly, not only for shopping because it is cheaper, but also for tourism."

"Kuwaitis are naturally inclined to travel, which is why many frequent the popular markets of Paris, London, and other capitals during their holidays. Although most of the goods are made in China, they are often considered superior to those found in Middle Eastern markets. But are these countries really cheaper than Kuwait, despite their high and complex taxes?"

"We must also acknowledge that the Gulf states rely on imports for most goods, which means price differences are not significant."

"Regarding the point raised by the analyst, whom I respect, about encroachment on state property, I believe the state bears responsibility, not individuals. The government must implement a clear policy to determine fees for using state property. Real estate and rental prices are subject to supply and demand, as the Kuwaiti market operates freely."

"Therefore, the justifications given for going to Khafji, Basra, and other places to buy cheaper goods are, in my opinion, invalid."

"We should not make a flawed comparison between Kuwait and other countries. Although Kuwait has faced a budget deficit for 30 years, does that mean Kuwaitis have lost their common sense?"

"In reality, the issue lies in the lack of sound selection for those who assume senior financial and economic positions."

## Also:

"In today's fast-paced world, marked by growing financial and social pressures, wedding celebrations have sparked widespread discussion, with many calling for a return to simply announcing the marriage." Kuwaiti journalist **Hamed Al-Hamli** wrote for *Al-Seyassah* daily.

"Traditionally, these celebrations expressed the joy of the union, bringing together family and friends and lasting late into the night. Today, however, most guests offer their congratulations and leave within minutes. Many celebrations have turned into extravagant displays, sometimes costing hundreds of thousands."

"A new trend is emerging, promoting the simplification of wedding celebrations, not as forced austerity, but as a conscious choice that values substance over appearance."

"The idea to simplify weddings is driven by several social and economic factors, foremost among them financial pressures."

"In Gulf countries such as Kuwait, grooms often face huge debt, with wedding expenses including luxurious hall rentals, expensive attire, and lavish meals. These costs can reach 30,000 dinars."

"Such expenses place many young couples under financial strain, negatively affecting the beginning of their married lives."

"According to recent studies, more than 60 percent of young people in the Arab region prefer smaller weddings to avoid these expenses."

"With social changes and the rise of social media, weddings are often judged by how 'impressive' they appear on Instagram or TikTok."

"This pressure, however, comes at the cost of privacy and intimacy. Many couples now choose to celebrate with a small circle of friends and family, allowing for deeper connections rather than performing for hundreds of guests."

"The COVID-19 pandemic also shifted this perspective, forcing many to opt for smaller weddings, which they found to be more enjoyable and less costly."

"Large weddings have become a source of waste, whether in food, venues, or travel. Choosing a smaller wed-

ding saves money and can be seen as a socially responsible decision."

"Simplifying weddings offers multiple benefits. On a personal level, it allows couples to save money that can be invested in buying a home, enjoying a longer honeymoon, or building a more secure financial future. It also reduces psychological stress. Rather than worrying about complex arrangements, the couple can focus on each other, strengthening their emotional bond. Socially, this trend encourages a return to more authentic traditions."

"In Arab culture, weddings were traditionally simple celebrations without extravagance. Simplifying weddings restores balance and reduces the social competition that can strain relationships."

"Simplifying the celebration does not mean sacrificing joy, but rather redesigning it. Priorities can be set, with choices such as professional photography or folk music left to the couple."

"This trend has become evident in recent months, with couples increasingly announcing their marriages on social media among families. Simplifying weddings is not a rejection of tradition, but an adaptation to modern realities."

"Ultimately, a successful wedding is not one that dazzles others, but one that builds a strong foundation for married life. For those planning a wedding, cutting costs may be the wisest choice."

"The story of Jeffrey Epstein is not just an individual crime, but a mirror reflecting the darkness within power and mankind; a philosophical reflection exploring the pervasiveness of corruption among the elite class, the mechanisms of silent filth in the world, and the intersection of their shared illusions and desires," Kuwaiti writer **Hussain Al-Rawi** wrote for *Al-Seyassah* daily.

"Regarding the reasons that corrupt the powerful, Lord Acton said, 'Power corrupts, and absolute power corrupts absolutely.'

"Epstein rose from humble beginnings to billionaire status through a network of connections that placed him above the law. 'For the philosopher Nietzsche, the 'will to power' is a drive that transforms into boundless destruction, which Epstein used to turn others into instruments of his desires.'

"Arendt's 'banality of evil' appears here. Evil becomes routine within closed circles, expressed through financial deals and the exploitation of minors, until it becomes an ordinary part of the system."

"Evil deepened in Ghislaine Maxwell, the engineer of recruitment and cover-up, who exploited girls' need for opportunity, adding a second layer to the corruption. Even after being sentenced to 20 years in prison, she refused to testify before Congress in February 2026. She offered to cooperate in exchange for a presidential pardon from Trump, claiming she could exonerate prominent figures."

"Her silence functioned as a tool for preserving the system. If we ask how corruption is sustained, Rawls argues that elites design systems that protect their privileges and guarantee impunity. The poor are held accountable, while the powerful remain protected."

"For Foucault, power is a network that produces and controls knowledge. Epstein confined his actions to a separate world, his island and his private plane where everything seemed permissible, hidden from public scrutiny."

"Sex is often used as a tool of control, transforming desire into blackmail. Was Epstein's island merely a nightclub, or a project to control the powerful by holding their secrets?"

"This possibility exposes the fragility of power. The intersection of passion and vanity draws them together, united by a shared desire for attraction."

"Wealth amplifies illusion, and crime becomes an expression of exceptionalism. But the victims are real human beings, minors drawn into a network that exploited their innocence. Voices like Virginia Giuffre remind us that philosophy is incomplete unless it places the victim at the center."

"There is a lesson reminiscent of Shelley's Frankenstein - man creates a monster and then abandons responsibility, allowing it to escape and destroy. Elites construct networks of corruption and then evade their moral duty."

"After the publication of more than 3.5 million pages in 2026, which confirmed the absence of a clear official client list, a vast web of relationships emerged, accompanied by Dr. Hussain Al-Rawi persistent and suspicious obfuscation that continues to shield most of them."

"Maxwell calls for amnesty as if nothing happened. The monster has evolved and become part of the system. The open question remains - Is the problem Epstein, or a system that allows monsters to rise and remain hidden? Philosophy offers a lens to understand power."

"We refuse to justify bad faith and insist that corruption is not destiny, but the result of human choices."

"The Epstein story stands as a stark lesson in the fragility of morality and justice in a world shaped by influence and wealth, portraying those who live above the law as a result of a system that sustains them there."

## Birds near airport pose major threat

EPA, DGCA adopt measures

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 14: The Environment Affairs Committee at the Municipal Council held its meeting recently during which it recommended that the executive branch should coordinate with the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA), Environment Public Authority (EPA), Kuwait Oil Company (KOC), and other concerned entities to implement urgent measures to reduce bird congestion around Kuwait International Airport.

The recommendation includes addressing issues related to the plant nurseries, Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh slaughterhouse, livestock pens and camps located in the area.

Committee Chairperson Alia Al-Farsi stated that the meeting reviewed the decision of the Public Services Committee at the Cabinet about the request of DGCA to take urgent and temporary measures to prevent bird flocks near the airport. Al-Farsi added that the committee recommended gradually assessing the impact of temporary measures in coordination with the DGCA by establishing Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) to evaluate their effect on bird behavior and population density along the runway of the airport.

The discussion also touched on the need to find permanent solutions, such as identifying an alternative site for the landfill adjacent to the airport, given the risk it poses to the aviation sector.

Al-Farsi disclosed that the committee recommended clarifying the status of implementing the plan of Kuwait Municipality to convert the South Seventh Road landfill into a waste treatment facility.

This recommendation is based on the response of the executive body about the solid waste management plan and the need to expedite the implementation of the relevant Municipal Council resolution issued on July 14, 2025.

## Customs seizes 'booze' concealed in container

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 14: In the presence of Saleh Al-Omar, Deputy Director General for Ports, Search, and Customs Investigation at the General Administration of Customs, customs officers seized 3,144 bottles of alcoholic beverages from a container that arrived in Kuwait, reports Al-Anba daily.

The liquor was discovered during an inspection of a shipment declared to contain iron sheets.

According to a statement issued by the Ministry of Interior, the container was listed on its customs manifest as carrying iron sheets but had not been claimed by the concerned party within the legally specified period.

As a result, the shipment was opened and subjected to a pre-cautionary inspection, which uncovered the contraband concealed in an innovative manner inside the container.

The General Administration of Customs initiated the necessary legal procedures and coordinated with the Drug Control General Department to take custody of the seized items and complete the required steps in preparation for referring those involved to the competent authorities.

## Case dropped against ex-KFA head, officials

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 14: The Court of Cassation upheld the acquittal of former Kuwait Football Association President Haif Al-Daihani, his deputy Ahmed Aqla, and Secretary General Salah Al-Qanaei in the case filed against them for broadcasting false news and harming the interests of the country.

The charges stemmed from events related to the organization of the football match between the Kuwaiti and Iraqi national teams.

The Public Prosecution previously charged the defendants with disseminating information deemed offensive and detrimental to public interest, within the context of the controversy surrounding the arrangements and organization of the match.

The First Instance Court acquitted the defendants due to insufficient evidence, a ruling upheld by the Court of Appeals later.

## The doctor's advice

My acquaintance with cardiology and catheterization consultant Dr. Ibrahim Al-Rashdan is limited. I have met him only once for a few minutes.

However, from family and friends, I know that he is a distinguished cardiologist who is kind and is highly skilled in his work.

Recently, Dr. Al-Rashdan has been active in sharing informative interviews and short videos, in which he clarifies many aspects of heart health that patients often overlook.

He revealed that heart disease, particularly coronary artery disease, is the leading cause of death, surpassing even cancer and road accidents.

Dr. Al-Rashdan highlighted that conditions such as diabetes and obesity have a particularly dangerous impact on the coronary arteries.

He also emphasized that the heart never stops working from before birth until death, with its valves opening and closing approximately 100,000 times a day.

Dr. Al-Rashdan explained that many people with high blood pressure feel anxious when their readings are elevated. This anxiety is often unnecessary, as the high reading may result from testing under improper conditions. Complete relaxation is essential, free from worry or distractions, and certainly not during meals or after a meal.

He also noted that some people worry about losing muscle mass during weight loss, but this concern is generally unfounded, as some muscle loss is a natural part of the process. Muscle can be preserved by increasing protein intake and performing weight training exercises.

Dr. Al-Rashdan emphasized that blood pressure medications are beneficial and come in various forms with different effects.

He indicated that 90 percent of people with high blood pressure require two types of these medications to control their blood pressure, and some may need three.

Dr. Al-Rashdan went on to explain that acid reflux is often misdiagnosed. In many cases, it is not caused by the esophagus but by blocked arteries in the heart, particularly in people with high blood pressure, diabetes and high cholesterol, smokers, and the elderly. These individuals should monitor their condition by having their coronary arteries checked.

He said the common belief that cholesterol medication must be taken before bedtime is both unnecessary and unhealthy, as modern medications are often more effective when taken in the morning.

Dr. Al-Rashdan also noted that coffee is not only safe for the heart but can be beneficial, and it is recommended to drink it daily in moderation.

Some may comment on this advice by asking — what if future research shows that coffee is not beneficial for the heart?

The answer is simple. Medical science was not as advanced ten years ago as it is today. Modern science can now produce precise research results that were previously unavailable.

Until new evidence emerges, the latest discoveries, medical or otherwise, remain the best course of action.

## New office to enhance judicial cases 'solution'

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 14: Attorney General Saad Abdulkarim Al-Saqr issued a decree on the establishment of the Criminal Appeals Prosecution Office -- a step aimed at reinforcing judicial oversight, enhancing performance in felony and misdemeanor cases, and improving the efficiency and quality of appeal procedures, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

As per the decree, Attorney General Abdulaziz Yousef Al-Ghaith was appointed as head of the office. He will supervise appeals and oral pleadings, contributing to the reinforcement of justice principles and ensuring the integrity of judicial work.

The Criminal Appeals Prosecution Office will review court judgments, prepare appeal memoranda, keep pace with modern judicial principles, train prosecution personnel, and submit analytical reports to the Attorney General.

The office shall consist of two units specialized in reviewing acquittals and the reasoning behind them, in addition to establishing a digital library to document notable appeals and pleadings.

foundations and controls for establishing or participating in companies and acquiring real estate and securities. It is also responsible for preparing the proposed budget and submitting it to the Board of Directors.

The resolution authorizes the committee to contract with a specialized entity to provide Sharia advisory services to ensure compliance with Islamic Sharia provisions, with the option of referring Sharia-related matters to the relevant committee formed by a decision of the PAMA's Board of Directors for its opinion. It also permits the committee to contract internal and external auditors with expertise in auditing transactions that comply with Islamic Sharia.

The resolution further regulates the mechanism for holding committee meetings, which are convened at the invitation of the chairperson. A meeting shall be considered valid if attended by more than half of the members, provided that the chairperson or their representative is present. The committee may convene meetings remotely through modern means of communication.

### Youth mental

He stressed that the mental health of children and adolescents is a national responsibility requiring the concerted efforts of health, educational and social institutions, along with the vital role of the family as the primary caregiver of the child.

He added that investing in prevention, awareness and early intervention programs is the most effective way to protect children

and ensure that they are raised in a healthy and safe environment.

## US Homeland Security Department enters partial shutdown due to lack of funding

WASHINGTON, Feb 14, (Agencies): The US Department of Homeland Security (DHS) entered a partial shutdown as temporary funding for the department expired at the end of Friday.

The Senate on Thursday failed to advance a funding bill for the DHS, as Republicans and Democrats did not reach an agreement on reforming immigration enforcement regulations, following two fatal shootings by federal law enforcement officers in the city of Minneapolis in Minnesota.

The Congress has recently passed a funding package to fund multiple US federal agencies for the remainder of the fiscal year 2026, yet the DHS only received a two-week continuing resolution at current funding levels.

A shutdown of the US Department of Homeland Security that took effect early Saturday impacts the agency responsible for screening passengers and bags at airports across the country. Travelers with airline reservations may

be nervously recalling a 43-day government shutdown that led to historic flight cancellations and long delays last year.

Transportation Security Administration officers are expected to work without pay while lawmakers remain without an agreement on Homeland Security's annual funding. TSA officers also worked through the record shutdown that ended Nov. 12, but aviation experts say this one may play out differently.

Trade groups for the US travel industry and major airlines nonetheless warned that the longer DHS appropriations are lapsed, the longer security lines at the nation's commercial airports could get.

Here's what to know about the latest shutdown and how to plan ahead.

Funding for Homeland Security expired at midnight. But the rest of the federal government is funded through Sept 30. That means air traffic controllers employed by the Federal Aviation

Administration will receive paychecks as usual, reducing the risk of widespread flight cancellations.

nel and required to keep working. Democrats in the House and Senate say Homeland Security won't get funded until new restrictions are placed on federal immigration operations.

During past shutdowns, disruptions to air travel tended to build over time, not overnight. About a month into last year's shutdown, for example, TSA temporarily closed two checkpoints at Philadelphia International Airport. That same day, the government took the extraordinary step of ordering all commercial airlines to reduce their domestic flight schedules.

John Rose, chief risk officer for global travel management company Altour, said strains could surface at airports more quickly this time because the TSA workforce also will be remembering the last shutdown.

"It's still fresh in their minds and potentially their pocketbooks," Rose said.

It's hard to predict whether, when or where security screening snags might

pop up. Even a handful of unscheduled TSA absences could quickly lead to longer wait times at smaller airports, for example, if there's just a single security checkpoint.


That's why travelers should plan to arrive early and allow extra time to get through security.

"I tell people to do this even in good times," Rose said.

Experts say flight delays also are a possibility even though air traffic controllers are not affected by the DHS shutdown.

Airlines might decide to delay departures in some cases to wait for passengers to clear screening, said Rich Davis, senior security advisor at risk mitigation company International SOS. Shortages of TSA officers also could slow the screening of checked luggage behind the scenes.

Most airports display security line wait times on their websites, but don't wait until the day of a flight to check them, Rose advised.

### Shooting at South Carolina State University dorm kills 2

Two men were killed and another was wounded in a shooting in a dorm room at South Carolina State University just four months after another deadly shooting at the campus.

Henry L. Crittington, 19, died at the scene of the Thursday night shooting at the Hugine Suites hous-

ing complex, and Terrell Thomas, 18, died at the hospital, authorities said. The condition of the third man was not known, and his name was not released.

Both men killed were not students, while the wounded man was enrolled, officials said.

An eight-hour lockdown on cam-

pus was lifted Friday morning. No arrests were announced, but authorities said there was no longer a threat.

A police report indicated that there were two women in the room, but investigators did not release details about what led to the shooting. (AP)

Carney said he sat with people who are "living through something no one should ever have to endure."

"When you wake up tomorrow, and the world feels impossible, know that millions of Canadians are with you. When the cameras leave and the quiet sets in - know that we will still be here," Carney said.

A crowd of hundreds attended the

vigil. Some held photos of loved ones they lost.

Carney said the community has always been defined by people caring for each other.

"And when the unimaginable happened on Tuesday, you were there again. First responders at the school within two minutes. Teachers shielding their children," he said.

Poilievre commended Carney for his "tremendous grace." Canada's political leaders flew from Ottawa together.

British Columbia Premier David

Eby said the students of the school won't ever have to return to the building if they don't want to.

"I will promise that not one of you will ever be forced to go back to that school. We will provide a safe place for you to go back to school," Eby said.

Authorities on Thursday identified those killed at the school as Kylie Smith, Abel Mwansa, Zoey Benoit and Ticari Lamper, all age 12, as well as 13-year-old Ezekiel Schofield and assistant teacher Shannda Aviugana-Durand, 39.

### Navalny poisoned by Kremlin with dart frog toxin: European nations

LONDON, Feb 14, (AP): Russian opposition leader Alexei Navalny was poisoned by the Kremlin with a rare and lethal toxin found in the skin of poison dart frogs, five European countries said Saturday.

The foreign ministries of the UK, France, Germany, Sweden and the Netherlands said analysis of samples taken from Navalny's body "conclusively confirmed the presence of epibatidine." It is a neurotoxin found in the skin of dart frogs in South America that is not found naturally in Russia, they said.

The countries said in a joint statement that "Russia had the means, motive and opportunity to administer this poison." They said they were reporting Russia to the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons for a breach of the Chemical Weapons Convention.

They made the announcement as Navalny's widow Yulia Navalnaya attended the Munich Security Conference in Germany as the second anniversary of Navalny's death approaches.

Navalny, who crusaded against of-

an Arctic penal colony on Feb. 16, 2024. He was serving a 19-year sentence that he believed to be politically motivated.

"Russia saw Navalny as a threat," British Foreign Secretary Yvette Cooper said. "By using this form of poison the Russian state demonstrated the despicable tools it has at its disposal and the overwhelming fear it has of political opposition."

Navalny's widow, said last year that two independent labs had found that her husband was poisoned shortly before he died. Navalnaya has repeatedly blamed Putin for Navalny's death, something Russian officials have vehemently denied.

Navalnaya said Saturday that she had been "certain from the first day" that her husband had been poisoned, "but now there is proof."

"Putin killed Alexei with chemical weapon," she wrote on social network X, calling Putin "a murderer" who "must be held accountable."

Russian authorities said that the politician became ill after a walk and died from natural causes.

### Rubio's speech to EU allies takes softer tone but sticks to Trump's firm stance

MUNICH, Feb 14, (AP): US Secretary of State Marco Rubio offered a reassuring message to America's allies on Saturday, striking a less aggressive but still firm tone about the administration's intent to reshape the trans-Atlantic alliance and push its priorities after more than a year of President Donald Trump's often-hostile rhetoric toward traditional allies.

Reminding his audience at the annual Munich Security Conference about America's centuries-long roots in Europe, Rubio said the United States would remain forever tied to the continent even as it pushes for changes in the relationship and the international institutions that have been the bulwark of the post-World War II world order.

Rubio addressed the conference a year after Vice President JD Vance stunned the same audience with a harsh critique of European values. A series of statements and moves from the Trump administration targeting allies followed, including Trump's short-lived threat last month to impose new tariffs on several European countries in a bid to secure U.S. control of Greenland, a semi-autonomous territory of NATO ally Denmark.

On Friday, German Chancellor Friedrich Merz had opened this year's gathering by calling for the US and Europe

to "repair and revive trans-Atlantic trust together," saying that even the US isn't powerful enough to go it alone in a world whose old order no longer exists. But he and other European officials made clear that they will stand by their values, including their approach to free speech, climate change and free trade.

While offering a calmer and more reassuring tone than the one often heard over the past year, Rubio made clear that the Trump administration is sticking to its guns on policy. He denounced "a climate cult" and "an unprecedented wave of mass migration that threatens the cohesion of our societies."

### Storm aftermath leaves 2 dead in France

The aftermath of a deadly storm continued to disrupt parts of France on Friday, with flooding concerns persisting in the southwest even as wind alerts were lifted, according to weather service Météo-France.

Government spokesperson Maud Bregeon said on TF1 that France had recorded two deaths linked to Storm Nils: one on Thursday in the Landes department and a second "in

the last hours" in Tarn-et-Garonne.

She said the second victim was a man who was found in his garden.

Network operator Enerdis said the storm left up to 900,000 customers without power at its peak; by Friday morning it had restored service to about half of those affected and mobilized 3,000 personnel, including 2,100 technicians.

Flood vigilance remained high.

### Europe

**Britain's top civil servant resigns:** Britain's Cabinet Secretary and Head of the Civil Service, Chris Wormald, has become the third senior official to step down in less than a week amid the political fallout over former British ambassador to the United States Peter Mandelson, the Cabinet Office has announced.

"It has been an honour and a privilege to serve as a civil servant for the past 35 years, and a particular distinction to lead the Service as Cabinet Secretary," Wormald said in a statement.

The Cabinet Office added that Prime Minister Keir Starmer will appoint a new Cabinet Secretary "shortly."

According to the British government, the Cabinet Secretary is the Prime Minister's most senior policy adviser and acts as Secretary to the Cabinet, responsible to all ministers for the running of Cabinet Government.

Wormald was appointed to the post in December 2024. Previously, he served as Permanent Secretary at the Department of Health and at the Department for Education. (Xinhua)

**Météo-France maintained red flood alerts for Gironde and Lot-et-Garonne - to remain in place Saturday - due to a significant Garonne river flood episode.**

Météo-France said the storm had "uncommon strength" and swept in from France's western seaboard overnight Wednesday into Thursday and has now moved on tracking east into Europe. (AP)

**Fire in Budapest suburb kills 3:** At least three people died and nearly two dozen others were injured after a building used as temporary lodgings for workers caught fire early Friday in a suburb of Hungary's capital, authorities said.

Firefighters extinguished the fire in Budakeszi, about five miles (eight kilometers) west of Budapest, after it engulfed the two-story building in the early morning hours, according to Hungary's National Directorate General for Disaster Management.

More than 40 paramedics and 18 emergency vehicles were dispatched to the scene. Firefighters pulled several survivors and three gas cylinders from the building. The bodies of two men and a woman were found beneath the collapsed roof of the building, a spokesperson for the disaster management authority said. (AP)

**Germany's airport resumes operations:** Departures resumed at Germany's Cologne Bonn Airport on Friday after a brief suspension caused by a security incident.

Around 6:30 am (0530 GMT) in the morning, operations were halted and the security checkpoints were closed after the incident, police said.

An airport spokesman said that departures were disrupted for around two and a half hours. Around 12 flights were affected and delayed, with no cancellations reported.

An initial investigation revealed that a bag undergoing security checks had been handed to its owner despite being flagged for extra screening, police said. (Xinhua)

### N.Korea leader inspects memorial museum of overseas military ops

#### S.Korea's drone regret sensible but insufficient says Kim's sister

SEOUL, South Korea, Feb 14, (Agencies): The powerful sister of North Korean leader Kim Jong Un said Friday it was "sensible" for a South Korean government official to express regret for alleged civilian drone flights over North Korea but warned of counterattacks if they recur.

The statement by Kim Yo Jong came after South Korean Unification Minister Chung Dong-young on Tuesday expressed "deep regret" over the alleged flights and stressed that Seoul's liberal government seeks "mutual recognition and peaceful co-existence" between the war-divided rivals.

North Korea threatened retaliation last month after accusing South Korea of launching a surveillance drone flight in September and again in January.

The South Korean government has denied operating any drones during the times specified by North Korea but law enforcement authorities are investigating three civilians suspected of flying drones into the North from border areas.

The development threatens to further dampen prospects for a push by Seoul to resume long-stalled talks with North Korea amid a deepening nuclear standoff.

Kim Yo Jong said Chung's com-

ments displayed "sensible behavior" but were insufficient as a government response, demanding stronger measures from Seoul to prevent similar activities in the future.

"I give advance warning that re-occurrence of such provocation as violating the inalienable sovereignty of the DPRK will surely provoke a terrible response," she said, using the initials of North Korea's formal name,

the Democratic People's Republic of Korea.

"Various counterattack plans are on the table and one of them will be chosen without doubt and it will go beyond proportionality," she said without specifying.

The Unification Ministry, which handles inter-Korean affairs, said the alleged drone flights ran counter to the government's principles of reduc-

ing tensions and that it plans to take unspecified steps to prevent similar incidents.

Analysts say North Korea's drone accusations were likely driven by its efforts to dial up anti-South Korea sentiments ahead of the ruling Workers' Party congress in late February. North Korea could add leader Kim Jong Un's declaration of a hostile "two-state" system on the Korean Peninsula in the party constitution during the congress, the first of its kind in five years.

There have been no public talks between the Koreas since 2019 and drone flights are a source of animosity between the rivals.

Meanwhile, Kim inspected the Memorial Museum of Combat Feats at the Overseas Military Operations under construction, the official Korean Central News Agency reported Saturday.

During the inspection on Friday, Kim learned about the construction progress as well as the creation and installation of sculptures, the report said.

The DPRK leader stressed the importance of "successfully building the museum into a sacred monument, which will be glorified eternally as a symbol of the feats and immortality of the fallen fighters," it said.

### Junya Ogawa elected new leader of Japan's main opposition (CRA)

TOKYO, Feb 14, (Xinhua): Junya Ogawa was elected new leader of Japan's main opposition force, the Centrist Reform Alliance (CRA), on Friday.

Ogawa, former secretary general of the Constitutional Democratic Party of Japan (CDPJ), won a simple majority vote by the party's 49 lower house lawmakers against Takeshi Shina, the CDPJ's former acting policy chief.

The new leader's term will run until the end of March next year.

Ogawa told media before the leadership election in Tokyo that he would strive to achieve unity within the party and gain more external support, as the newly created party suffered a heavy loss in the recent general election.

## Thailand's ruling conservative party moves closer to forming new coalition govt

BANGKOK, Feb 14, (AP): Thailand's ruling conservative Bhumjaithai Party on Friday moved closer to forming a new government after the Pheu Thai Party, the third place finisher in the country's general election, agreed to join it in a proposed ruling coalition.

Bhumjaithai won 193 seats in the 500-member House of Representatives in Sunday's election, according to unofficial results from the Election Commission, positioning it to return incumbent Prime Minister Anutin Charnvirakul I to office with a Cabinet of his choosing.

The populist Pheu Thai Party, backed by former prime minister Thaksin Shinawatra, finished third with 74 seats. Together, the two parties would command 267 seats, surpassing the 251 seats required for a majority. Several smaller parties also pledged their support.

"Bhumjaithai and Pheu Thai will look into the future. We agreed that both our parties have with abilities great enough to lead Thailand into a stable and sustainable future," Anutin said in a news conference.

He was joined by Pheu Thai leaders, including Yodchana Wongsawat, a nephew of Thaksin who had been the party's candidate for prime minister.

The two parties had previously partnered after the 2023 election, when Pheu Thai - then the second-largest party - led negotiations as the senior partner in their government-to-be.

That alliance collapsed last year following controversy surrounding then-Prime Minister Paetongtarn Shinawatra, Thaksin's daughter, over border tensions with Cambodia. Anutin then secured enough parliamentary support in September to become prime minister.

Addressing their past disputes on Friday, Anutin said that "We must erase everything and move forward."

Bhumjaithai has announced that six smaller parties with a combined eight seats have also pledged to join its coalition.

The progressive People's Party, which finished second with 118 seats, has ruled out joining a Bhumjaithai government.

Pheu Thai's result was considered its worst performance in decades. Elec-

toral politics since 2001 had been dominated by populist parties loyal to Thaksin, who served as prime minister until he was ousted by an army coup in 2006, setting off a tussle for power against Thailand's conservative royalist-military establishment.

The party alienated some pro-democracy supporters in 2023 by breaking its

campaign promise not to align with pro-military parties and instead formed a government including them.

Last year it angered conservatives when Paetongtarn was found to be too chummy with Cambodia's leader Hun Sen in a leaked phone call. She was kicked out of office for an ethics violation, giving Anutin his chance to take her place.

"For the first time in its history, (Pheu Thai) will be a mid-sized party that can at most play the role of a junior coalition partner," said Ken Lohatepanont, a University of Michigan doctoral candidate in an online commentary on Thai politics. Especially galling was losing all the seats it had held in the northern city of Chiang Mai, Thaksin's hometown.

He and other election observers suggest that for Bhumjaithai to establish a more stable government, it will invite another major partner - either the fourth-place Kla Tham Party, with 58 seats, or the Democrat Party, Thailand's oldest, with 22.

Thailand's business community hailed Bhumjaithai's decisive victory, with the hope that it would bring stability as the country struggles with a lagging economy.

Negotiations on forming a new government unfolded amid mounting allegations of electoral irregularities, prompting frustrated voters to stage protests in several parts of the country. Demonstrators called for recounts and, in some constituencies, fresh by-elections.

The Asian Network for Free Elections, one of the observer groups in the polls, said the vote was conducted in a generally peaceful and orderly manner. But it flagged "procedural irregularities in several polling stations," including inadequate public information and inconsistent access for election observers.

The legal monitoring group iLaw, which also observed the election, reported receiving more than 4,000 complaints. These included cases where the number of ballots exceeded the number of eligible voters, officials denying observers access to vote counting, disputes over recount requests, and inaccuracies in the recording of final tallies.

Election results must be certified within 60 days of the election before Parliament can convene and elect a new prime minister.

## US strikes another drug boat in Caribbean, 3 dead

WASHINGTON, Feb 14, (AP): The US military said Friday that it has carried out another deadly strike on a vessel accused of trafficking drugs in the Caribbean Sea.

US Southern Command said on social media that the boat "was transiting along known narco-trafficking routes in the Caribbean and was engaged in narco-trafficking operations." It said the strike killed three people. A video linked to the post shows a boat moving through the water before exploding in flames.

US Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth declared last week that "some top cartel drug-traffickers" in the region "have decided to cease all narcotics operations INDEFINITELY due to recent (highly effective) kinetic strikes in the Caribbean."

However, Hegseth did not provide any details or information to back up this claim, made in a post on his personal account on social media.

President Donald Trump has said the US is in "armed conflict" with cartels in Latin America and has justified the

attacks as a necessary escalation to stem the flow of drugs. But his administration has offered little evidence to support its claims of killing "narcoterrorists."

Set up to "promote the unity and solidarity of the African States," analysts say the African Union faces a legitimacy crisis among youth for failing to meet their expectations. Meanwhile, several African countries battle military coups, disputed elections and protests inspired by economic hardship worsened by foreign aid cuts.

## Kuwait forecasts record KD 9.8 billion budget deficit

KUWAIT'S budget for the next fiscal year starting April 2027 is forecasted with a deficit of KD 9.8 billion, which is the largest in the country's history. Total income is estimated at KD 16 billion, with 79 percent coming from oil revenues, while total expenditures are projected at around KD 26 billion, resulting in a shortfall of nearly KD 10 billion.

This deficit will likely be covered by borrowing from international banks, while keeping Kuwait's overseas investments, valued at close to \$1 trillion, intact to continue generating income for the state and future generations.

The budget appears conservative, as it assumes oil prices could fall to \$57 per barrel, a scenario that is highly unlikely. OPEC+ will not allow crude oil prices to drop to such a level, which would harm all producers. A decline of more than \$1

per barrel from the current \$68 per barrel could even push some producers into bankruptcy.

Our budget is so conservative that next year's total income is expected to be more than KD 2 billion lower than the current year, while expenses are increasing by the same amount, resulting in a budget deficit of KD 2 billion.

It is unlikely that oil prices will weaken, and they are expected to remain around \$68-\$70 per barrel for the rest of this year, with a similar level anticipated next year. Once again, predicting lower prices next year is difficult.

The only scenario that could significantly weaken oil prices is if Iran resumes full oil exports and returns to the market, which would impact global prices. In

such a case, OPEC+ would almost certainly intervene, taking the necessary measures to stabilize the markets and maintain price levels, preventing any further decline.

Budget deficits will likely persist for Kuwait and other OPEC+ countries, as oil prices are expected to remain relatively weak. Global demand for oil continues to be low, while the market is supplied with an extra surplus of 2.5 million barrels in stock, putting downward pressure on prices. However, prices are not expected to fall as low as \$57 per barrel, resulting in an estimated KD 10 billion deficit for next year's budget.

Weak oil prices pose challenges for all producing countries, as none have developed alternatives to reduce dependence on oil. Transitioning away from a single source of income is difficult, and there is insufficient creativity so far to address this reliance. In Kuwait, we have adopted another mechanism, which is perhaps not the best, for generating income by creating our Sovereign Wealth Fund, now worth more than \$1 trillion in

overseas investments and producing revenue. However, this is not an industry that can provide jobs for the more than 15,000 new graduates entering the workforce each year. The government must create and make these jobs available, which contributes to recurring deficits in the annual budget, accounting for 76 percent of total expenditures.

The weakest area in the budget is capital spending for future developments and investments, which covers only 12 percent of the budget. This should be higher to support projects that create sustainable and meaningful job opportunities.

The KD 9.8 billion budget deficit can be addressed by borrowing from international banks, backed by our oil reserves and Sovereign Wealth Fund.

It is time to establish a think tank to explore additional sources of income beyond the two we currently rely on.

## Actress charms crowd at Cambridge event

# Byrne honored as Harvard's Hasty Pudding Woman of the Year

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Feb 14, (AP): Dozens of cheering fans lined the streets of Cambridge Friday to celebrate the Australian actress Rose Byrne, who was honored as the 2026 Woman of the Year by Harvard University's Hasty Pudding Theatricals.

Byrne, the Golden Globe Award winner and Oscar nominee for her leading role in "If I Had Legs I'd Kick You," waved to fans and blew kisses as her car made its way slowly near Harvard University campus. Byrne, who also has starred in "Bridesmaids," "Neighbors," "Insidious" and "Damages," later received her pudding pot award at a celebratory roast and attended a performance of Hasty Pudding Theatricals' 177th production "Salooney Tunes."

In her review of "If I Had Legs I'd Kick You," The Associated Press' Jocelyn Novek wrote that the film gave Byrne "a chance to display versatility and grit in surely the toughest dramatic role of her career."

"I'm so excited to be in the parade and to see Rose Byrne. I loved her movie 'If I Had Legs I'd Kick You,'" said Jacqueline Metzger, a junior at Harvard and president of the university's short-form improv group. "It was like so anxiety inducing and the best movie I've seen all year. So I'm super excited, and we love her. We love Rose Byrne."

The parade included a colorful cast of characters, some in bright wigs, one dressed as a cactus, and several dressed

as revolutionary soldiers. Before heading inside Farkas Hall for the roast, Byrne joined members of the Hasty Pudding Theatricals players in chorus line-style dancing.

At the roast, Byrne was put through a mock therapy session inspired by "If I Had Legs I'd Kick You."

Based on her work in previous "Peter Rabbit" movies, she was asked to read in a scene from a new, fake entry into the series. This one saw her confronting a rabbit under the influence of drugs who shows up late one night.

"I don't like it when you lie. Do you even care about the kids?" Byrne yells at the rabbit, who appears to be staggering. "How am I supposed to stay calm when you are ruining our lives? I know you are using again."

The roast closed with Byrne donning a wedding dress and marrying the pudding pot. "This is marvelous," she said, after getting her gold pudding pot.

Afterward, Byrne told reporters the day on campus with students had been "magical" and then spoke on what it's meant for "If I Had Legs I'd Kick You" to be recognized this awards season.

"It's a tougher subject; it isn't a typical kind of Oscar fair, I suppose, and so it is very meaningful that the work is being recognized," she said. "It really will live on and it's very fearless and kind of radical and I'm really proud of that."

Byrne also talked about returning to the stage in March af-

ter five years in the revival of "Fallen Angels" on Broadway, saying she was "absolutely terrified" but looking forward to starring opposite the "brilliant" Kelli O'Hara.

Friday's event comes more than a week after the Justice

Department released a huge trove of records surrounding Jeffrey Epstein, a longtime donor to the organization. The documents showed Epstein regularly donated \$50,000 per year to Hasty Pudding between 2013 and 2019 to secure top-tier donor status and received special perks totaling more than \$300,000.

In an undated news release announcing Epstein's donations, Hasty Pudding officials described Epstein as a "well-known science and Harvard philanthropist" and said he "put his substantial support behind Harvard's famous and oldest theatrical troupe."

The Pudding is the oldest theatrical organization in the nation and one of the oldest in the world. Since 1951, it has bestowed the award annually on women including actors Meryl Streep, Julia Roberts, Scarlett Johansson and Annette Bening. Last year, the winner was "Wicked" star Cynthia Erivo.

Byrne also acted in "Juliet, Naked," "Get Him to the Greek" and "28 Weeks Later." Her theater credits include "Medea, You Can't Take it With You" at the Brooklyn Academy of Music.

Actor Michael Keaton, known for his roles in films such as "Batman," "Birdman," "Beetlejuice" and "Spotlight," is the 2026 Man of the Year. He received his pudding pot Feb. 6.

### Road sealed

## Search intensifies for Nancy Guthrie

TUCSON, Ariz., Feb 14, (AP): Law enforcement investigating the disappearance of "Today" show host Savannah Guthrie's mother sealed off a road near Nancy Guthrie's home in Arizona late Friday night.

A parade of sheriff's and FBI vehicles, including forensics vehicles, passed through the roadblock that was set up about 2 miles (3.2 kilometers) from the house.

The Pima County Sheriff's Department said the activity was part of the Guthrie investigation but declined to detail specifics.

Guthrie, 84, was reported missing on Feb. 1. Authorities say her blood was found on the front porch of her Tucson-area home. Purported ransom notes were sent to news outlets, but two deadlines for paying have passed.

Authorities have expressed concerns Guthrie's health because she needs daily medication. She is said to have a pacemaker and has dealt with high blood pressure and heart issues, according to sheriff's dispatcher audio on broadcastify.com.

Investigators have studied surveillance video, sorted through thousands of tips and submitted DNA and other evidence for laboratory analysis.

The FBI said it has collected more than 13,000 tips since Feb. 1, the day Guthrie was reported missing. The sheriff's department, meanwhile, said it has taken at least 18,000 calls.

On Tuesday, authorities released footage showing an armed, masked person at Guthrie's doorstep on the night she was abducted. The videos - less than a combined minute in length - gave investigators and the public their first glimpse of who was outside Guthrie's home in the foothills outside Tucson.

Experts say the video could contain a mountain of clues.

Investigators are pleading with people to share home surveillance camera footage from specific dates leading up to the disappearance of Nancy Guthrie as they deal with thousands of tips in their hope to crack the case of "Today" show host Savannah Guthrie's missing mother.

### Investigation

It was unclear Thursday where the investigation stands. Fresh surveillance images of a masked person on Nancy Guthrie's porch the night she went missing, coupled with intense police activity across Arizona and the detention of a man, had raised hopes that authorities were nearing a major break. But then the man was released after questioning.

On Wednesday, FBI agents carrying water bottles to beat the 80-degree Fahrenheit (27-degree Celsius) heat walked among rocks and desert vegetation at Guthrie's Tucson-area home. They also fanned out across a neighborhood about a mile (1.6 kilometers) away, knocking on doors and searching through cactuses, brush and boulders.

"They were just asking some general questions wondering if there was anything, any information we could shed on the Nancy Guthrie issue. Wanted to look around the property and after that, cameras and such," Ann Adams, a neighbor of Nancy Guthrie's other daughter, Annie Guthrie, told The Associated Press on Wednesday. Annie Guthrie lives several miles away from her mother.

"They did ask specifically for the 31st of January and the morning of the first of February and then they wanted to know if we saw anything suspicious on cameras since then," Adams said.

Authorities have said Guthrie, 84, was taken against her will. She's been missing since Feb. 1. DNA tests showed blood on her porch was hers, and authorities say she takes several medications and there's concern she could die without them.

News stations in Tucson also reported Wednesday that people with Ring doorbell cameras in the area got an alert saying investigators are requesting footage from Jan. 11 between 9 p.m. and midnight regarding the Guthrie case. That's nearly three weeks before Guthrie went missing.

Ring allows local public safety agencies to submit requests to users in the community that appear publicly on the "Neighbors" feed, according to the Ring website. Users in a designated area receive a notification.

The stations also reported that a pair of black gloves were recovered during agents' search and have been submitted for DNA analysis.

Several hundred detectives and agents are now assigned to the investigation, which is expanding in the area, the Pima County Sheriff's Department said.

Two investigators emerged from daughter Annie Guthrie's home Wednesday with a paper grocery sack and a white trash bag. One, still wearing blue protective gloves, also took a stack of mail from the roadside mailbox. They drove away without speaking to reporters.

## Afghan political rom-com opens Berlinale

# Love found in unexpected places at Berlin Fest

BERLIN, Feb 14, (AP): A surprising and touching Afghan political rom-com that is said to feature the first ever on-screen intimate scene in an Afghan movie opened the 76th Berlin Film Festival Thursday.

Set in a Kabul newsroom in 2021, with the Taliban on the cusp of returning to power, "No Good Men" tells the workplace love story of camerawoman Naru, separated from her cheating husband and struggling to keep custody of her young son while trying to build a career in a male dominated industry and patriarchal society.

Director Shahrbanoo Sadat said the intimate scene cost her lead actor three weeks before shooting began, and forced her to step into the role herself.

"The joke was everyone who wanted to play Naru, they didn't want to do that scene, I wanted to do it, I didn't want to do the rest of the film," Sadat said.

And it wasn't just the casting that was met with resistance.

The Afghan film industry is small, she said, so the expectation is that the movie will be "good PR" for the country.

Sadat had her own ideas, though.

"I love Afghanistan, but I cannot close my eyes to patriarchy, sexism, all the big topics, and just say the good things about Afghanistan, so I'm disappointing my people," she said. Making an Afghan film in Europe, with European funding, she also felt added pressure to be a political and feminist filmmaker or make a war movie.

Sadat received multiple letters of complaint from funders who said it was inappropriate for them to support a rom-com given the political situation in Afghanistan.

"For me it was like, wait a minute, what? I feel offended that you feel offended about my project," she said. "I'm coming from a war country, and this is my way of expressing myself, to go through the oceans of unprocessed feelings, not only personal but also historical and also social, and trying to make a lighter film."

"I wanted to humanize Afghan characters and tell a story that is universal but also in Afghanistan," she added.

While she said she made the movie about one woman, she also made it for all the "good men" in Afghanistan who are "not taking advantage of the privilege that the patriarchal society is offering them for free."

"No matter what, they are standing next to the women in their life, I really wanted to tell them, I see you, I admire you, I respect you," she said. "Now I'm going to cry... because women's situation is not going to change alone."

Elsewhere in the festival, French-Lebanese filmmaker Danielle Arbid also leans into romance and humor instead of war and unrest to tell the tale of a Palestinian widow who finds love in Beirut with an undocumented Sudanese man 40 years her junior. "Only Rebels Win" opens the Panorama section of the competition. Arbid sees it as a feminist film.

"It's the idea that women can also fall in love at 70. It's not

only old rich men who can fall in love with young women. ... This is my way of thinking. I hope we are not out of the market," she joked.

While she admits people in Lebanon consider her provocative for the sexual references in her films, this one has no sex - though the "idea is already a problem."

"Succession" actor Hiam Abbass stars as Susanne and actor Amine Benachid, who is himself a Sudanese-Chadian refugee, plays her love interest Osmane.

Abbass, a Palestinian living in exile in France for the past 37 years, says it's no coincidence that these types of stories are setting the tone for this year's festival.

"We're a mixture of a lot of things, and to the contrary of what a lot of people think, we are very rich, but not in the sense of money. We're very rich because we are very rich in humanity," said Abbass.

"Today if we talk about things that happen in our own country, our language is very universal and basically what we say of the world corresponds to what a lot of people live today, and what a lot of people suffer from," she added.

Arbid said that war did not define her life when she lived in Lebanon as a teen.

"I was obsessed about falling in love with the neighbor. I wouldn't care. And I wanted the West to see me as a human being," she said. "I want to make the characters in my films human enough that you can love them and feel you can be like them."

## Over 70 years, Kuwait Radio achieves media milestones

## Kuwait marks World Radio Day under 'AI: A Tool, Not a Voice' theme

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 14, (KUNA): Kuwait joins countries around the world on Friday in marking World Radio Day 2026, commemorating a medium that has, for decades, enhanced awareness and knowledge while conveying key events across the globe.

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) proclaimed February 13 as World Radio Day in 2011, a date later endorsed by the United Nations General Assembly in 2012, which coincides with the anniversary of the launch of UN Radio in 1946.

On this occasion, the world recognizes radio's impact in connecting societies, promoting dialogue and raising public awareness of the importance of radio all around the world.

This year it is held under the theme "Artificial Intelligence: A Tool, Not a Voice," focusing on integrating modern technology into radio broadcasting while pre-

serving human oversight.

The theme underscores that AI should support, not replace, human judgment, warning that overreliance on automation could undermine credibility and increase risks of misinformation.

According to the UN, the 2026 initiative encourages radio stations to view AI as an opportunity for growth and innovation, provided it is used ethically and responsibly to uphold professional standards, creativity and public service values- thereby strengthening audience trust.

Recently, AI has enabled radio stations to better analyze audience preferences, tailor content in real time, improve production efficiency and enhance interactivity, reinforcing radio's sustainability in the information age.

In Kuwait, the first broadcast of Kuwait Radio began with the well-known phrase "This is Kuwait" at 7:00 p.m. on May 12, 1951, transmitted from a small device in a room at the former Police and Public Security building

headed by Sheikh Abdullah Al-Mubarak Al-Sabah.

In June 1960, Kuwait Radio introduced its first news bulletin, followed in October by four full newscasts and three brief bulletins daily.

The station today houses a comprehensive archive featuring recordings and interviews with prominent artists, scholars and public figures locally and across the Arab world.

During the Iraqi invasion in 1990, Iraqi forces occupied the radio station and Ministry of Information buildings. Within days, however, Kuwait Radio resumed broadcasting from Al-Khafji in Saudi Arabia, later moving to Ras Al-Zour and subsequently to Dammam at the onset of the liberation war.

It continued 24-hour transmissions, delivering news and messages in cooperation with coalition and friendly Arab stations.

Kuwait Radio also began broadcasting from Cairo on

January 1, 1991, via the Sawt Al-Arab network under the name "Kuwait Radio from Cairo," continuing until 1992.

In 1996, Kuwait Radio inaugurated the Middle East's largest news studio at the time, capable of linking more than four correspondents live to provide comprehensive regional and international coverage.

Over seven decades, Kuwait Radio has played a pivotal role in achieving its media objectives, earning numerous awards at regional and international festivals.

In 2019, the Arab States Broadcasting Union selected Kuwait Radio as the Arab hub for World Radio Day celebrations.

In November 2024, the Union endorsed Saad Al-Fendi, Director of the General Program at Kuwait Radio, as First Vice-Chairman of the Permanent Committee for Broadcasting (ASBU), coinciding with Kuwait's designation as Arab Capital of Culture and Arab Media Capital for 2025.

"Some events were also available last year but the fitness of the actions and the high-tech vibe are stronger" this time, Qui added.


"Technology is developing faster and becoming more advanced every day," Qui also said. "As long as we keep up with this trend, our ... fair will continue to evolve and rise with the times."

## Colon cancer rises among young adults, now top killer under 50

## Who is most at risk for colorectal cancer and key warning signs

WASHINGTON, Feb 14, (AP): Colorectal cancer is a threat not just to older adults but increasingly to young men and women, too. It's now the top cancer killer of Americans younger than 50.

The deaths of "Dawson's Creek" actor James Van Der Beek at 48 this week, and a few years ago "Black Panther" star Chadwick Boseman at 43, highlight the risk for younger adults.


"We're now starting to see more and more people in the 20-, 30- and 40-year-old range developing colon cancer. At the beginning of my career, nobody that age had colorectal cancer," said Dr. John Marshall of Georgetown University's Lombardi Comprehensive Cancer Center, who has been a cancer doctor for more than three decades.

That trend "is shaking us all, to be blunt," said Marshall, who is also medical consultant to the Colorectal Cancer Alliance.

Here's what to know about colorectal cancer - at any age - and how to protect yourself.

More than 158,000 cases of colorectal cancer will be diagnosed in the U.S. this year, according to the American Cancer Society. Among all ages, it's the nation's second leading cancer killer, behind lung cancer - expected to claim more than 55,000 lives this year.

For the population overall, cases and deaths have inched down in recent years. That's thanks in part to screening tests

that can spot tumors early, when they're easier to treat - or even prevent them if precancerous growths are found and

removed.

The vast majority of colorectal cancer cases and deaths still are in people 50 and older. That older age group has seen the most progress, with deaths dropping by about 1.5% a year over the past decade, according to cancer society statistics.

But while it's still relatively rare in the under-50 crowd, their colorectal cancer diagnoses have been rising since the early 2000s.

And last month, cancer society researchers reported that colorectal cancer mortality in Americans under 50 had increased by 1.1% a year since 2005, becoming the deadliest cancer in that age group. This year, the society estimates 3,890 people under age 50 will die of it.

Risk factors at any age include obesity, lack of physical activity, a diet high in red or processed meat and low in fruits and vegetables, smoking, heavy alcohol use, having inflammatory bowel disease or a family history of colorectal cancer.

Marshall advises everyone to eat lots of fruits and vegetables and whole grains. "Meat's not evil" but eat less of it, he said.

And a recent study found that a three-year exercise program improved survival in colon cancer patients and reduced cancer recurrence.

Symptoms include blood in stool or rectal bleeding;

changes in bowel habits such as diarrhea, constipation or narrowing of stool that lasts more than a few days; unintended weight loss; and cramps or abdominal pain.

"Don't ignore symptoms. Get it checked," Marshall stressed. Survival is far more likely when colorectal cancer is diagnosed early, before it spreads.

Medical guidelines say the average person should start getting screened at age 45 - too late for some young adults.

People known to be at higher risk are supposed to talk with their doctors about whether to start screening even earlier.

How often people need to get checked depends on the type of screening they choose. There are a variety of options, including yearly stool-based tests or colonoscopies that may be done every 10 years as long as no problems were found. There's also a newer blood test for adults 45 or older.

No one knows what's causing the rise in cases in younger adults. But Georgetown's Marshall said many young patients lack common risk factors. He wonders if changes in young people's gut bacteria - the microbiome - might play a role.

Also, where cancer occurs along the question mark-shaped colon - it starts on one side of the abdomen and swoops to the other before ending with the rectum - influences how aggressive it is and how it's treated. Marshall said there's a marked difference in where younger and older people's tumors tend to strike, another clue being explored.

## New crew to replace evacuated astronauts

## New astronauts launch to the ISS

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Feb 14, (AP): A new crew rocketed toward the International Space Station on Friday to replace the astronauts who returned to Earth early in NASA's first medical evacuation.

SpaceX launched the replacements as soon as possible at NASA's request, sending the US, French and Russian astronauts on an expected eight- to nine-month mission stretching until fall. The four should arrive at the orbiting lab Saturday, filling the vacancies left by their evacuated colleagues last month and bringing the space station back to full staff.

"It turns out Friday the 13th is a very lucky day," SpaceX Launch Control radioed once the astronauts reached orbit. "That was quite a ride," replied the crew's commander, Jessica Meir.

NASA had to put spacewalks on hold and deferred other duties while awaiting the arrival of Americans Meir and Jack Hathaway, France's Sophie Adenot and Russia's Andrei Fedyaev. They'll join three other astronauts - one American and two Russians - who kept the space station running the past month.

Satisfied with medical procedures already in place, NASA ordered no extra checkups for the crew ahead of lift-off and no new diagnostic equipment was packed. An ultrasound machine already up there for research went into overdrive Jan. 7 when used on the ailing crew member. NASA has not revealed the ill astronaut's identity or health issue. All four returning astronauts went straight to the hospital after splashing down in the Pacific near San Diego.

It was the first time in 65 years of human spaceflight that NASA cut short a mission for medical reasons.

With missions becoming longer, NASA is constantly looking at upgrades to the space station's medical gear, said deputy program manager Dina Contella. "But there are a lot of things that are just not practical and so that's when you need to bring astronauts home from space," she said

earlier this week.

In preparation for moon and Mars trips where health care will be even more challenging, the new arrivals will test a filter designed to turn drinking water into emergency IV fluid, try out an ultrasound system that relies on artificial intelligence and augmented reality instead of experts on the ground, and perform ultrasound scans on their jugular veins in a blood clot study.

They also will demonstrate their moon-landing skills in a simulated test drawing extra attention because of the impending launch of four astronauts to the moon on Artemis II, humanity's first lunar voyage in more than half a century.

SpaceX launched the latest crew from Cape Canaveral Space Force Station. Elon Musk's company is preparing its neighboring Kennedy Space Center launch pad for the supersized Starships, which NASA needs to land astronauts on the moon.

## Health worker succumbs to Nipah in India's West Bengal

NEW DELHI, Feb 14, (Xinhua): A 25-year-old nurse infected with the Nipah virus and undergoing treatment inside a hospital died Thursday, officials said.

According to health officials, the nurse died of cardiac arrest at a private hospital in Barasat, North 24-Parganas district, about 26 km north of Kolkata, the capital city of West Bengal.


The woman was one of two health workers in the state who tested positive for Nipah earlier this year. The other, a man, has recovered and was discharged from the hospital.

Typically, the human infection with Nipah presents as an encephalitic syndrome marked by fever, headache, drowsiness, disorientation, mental confusion and coma, which can potentially lead to death.

## A 'ring of fire' to dazzle Antarctica

NEW YORK, Feb 14, (AP): The first solar eclipse of the year will grace Antarctica, and only a lucky few will get to bask - or waddle - in its glow.

Tuesday's annular solar eclipse, known as a "ring of fire," will only be visible in the southernmost continent, home to research stations and diverse wildlife.

"The penguins down there are going to have a great show," said astronomer Joe Llama with Lowell Observatory.

Clear skies permitting, more people can catch a partial eclipse with small bites taken out of the sun from the tips of Chile and Argentina and bits of southeastern Africa including Madagascar, Lesotho and South Africa.

Solar eclipses happen when the sun, moon and Earth align just so. The moon casts a shadow that can partially or totally block out the sun's light from Earth.

It's "this beautiful coincidence between the size and the distance of the moon and the sun," said astrophysicist Emily Rice with the City University of New York.

During an annular, or ring-shaped, eclipse, the moon just happens to be farther away from Earth in its orbit so it doesn't totally cover the sun. Only a thin sliver remains visible.

"The sun essentially gets its core taken out," Llama said.

## Experts warn move will escalate climate pollution

## Trump's EPA revokes scientific finding that guided US climate regulations

WASHINGTON, Feb 14, (AP): The Trump administration on Thursday revoked a scientific finding that long has been the central basis for US action to regulate greenhouse gas emissions and fight climate change, the most aggressive move by the Republican president to roll back climate regulations.

The rule finalized by the Environmental Protection Agency rescinds a 2009 government declaration known as the endangerment finding that determined that carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases threaten public health and welfare. The Obama-era finding is the legal underpinning of nearly all climate regulations under the Clean Air Act for motor vehicles, power plants and other pollution sources that are heating the planet.

The rule eliminates all greenhouse gas emissions standards for cars and trucks and could unleash a broader undoing of climate regulations on stationary sources such as power plants and oil and gas facilities, experts say. Legal challenges are near certain.

President Donald Trump called the move "the single largest deregulatory action in American history, by far," while EPA Administrator Lee Zeldin called the endangerment finding "the Holy Grail of federal regulatory overreach."

Trump called the endangerment finding "one of the greatest scams in history," claiming falsely that it "had no basis in fact" or law. "On the contrary, over the generations, fossil fuels have saved millions of lives and lifted billions of people out of poverty all over the world," Trump said at a White House ceremony, although scientists across the globe agree that carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases are driving catastrophic heat waves and storms, droughts and sea level rise.

Environmental groups described the move as the single biggest attack in US history against federal authority to address climate change. Evidence backing up the endangerment finding has only grown stronger in the 17 years since it was approved, they said.

"This action will only lead to more climate pollution, and that will lead to higher costs and real harms for American families," said Fred Krupp, president of Environmental Defense Fund, adding that the consequences would be felt on Americans' health, property values, water supply and more.

The EPA also said it will propose a two-year delay to a Biden-era rule restricting greenhouse gas emissions by cars and light trucks. And the agency will end incentives for automakers who install automatic start-stop ignition systems in their vehicles. The device is intended to reduce emissions, but Zeldin said "everyone hates" it.

Zeldin, a former Republican congressman who was tapped by Trump to lead EPA last year, has criticized

his predecessors in Democratic administrations, saying that in the name of tackling climate change, they were "willing to bankrupt the country."

The endangerment finding "led to trillions of dollars in regulations that strangled entire sectors of the United States economy, including the American auto industry," Zeldin said. "The Obama and Biden administrations used it to steamroll into existence a left-wing wish list of costly climate policies, electric vehicle mandates and other requirements that assaulted consumer choice and affordability."

The endangerment finding and the regulations based on it "didn't just regulate emissions, it regulated and targeted the American dream. And now the endangerment finding is hereby eliminated," Zeldin said.

The Supreme Court ruled in a 2007 case that planet-warming greenhouse gases, caused by the burning of oil and other fossil fuels, are air pollutants under the Clean Air Act.

## World struggles to eradicate polio as cases rise

## Malawi vaccinates children against polio

BLANTYRE, Malawi, Feb 14, (AP): In a classroom in southern Malawi, children sit in rows on the floor as a health worker moves among them administering an oral vaccine that protects against polio.

The new vaccination campaign that began on Wednesday is another reminder that the world still hasn't managed to eradicate the ancient disease, which primarily affects children and can cause paralysis, despite a concerted effort for more than 35 years by the World Health Organization and its partners.

Health officials believe they came close several times, including five years ago, when just five cases of the natural polio virus were reported globally.

But a WHO report said that there were 38 cases of the natural polio virus between January and October 2025 - all in Pakistan and Afghanistan, the last two countries where it remains endemic - and another 151 cases of a vaccine-derived polio virus strain in 13 countries.

Those vaccine-derived cases have overtaken natural polio virus cases in recent years, and complicated the eradication effort as one of a number of

officials promoting the vaccination drive. It involves 1.7 million doses being administered to children at schools and taken door-to-door through some of the city's neighborhoods by health workers.

In an attempt to reassure people, Chilambula said that the doses will protect against the vaccine-derived form that's been discovered in Blantyre in environmental samples. Malawi's Health Ministry said that it's using the novel oral polio vaccine that's designed to stop circulating vaccine-derived Type 2 outbreaks.

"It's very important that we do the vaccine now, because it also deals with this virus which we have detected," Chilambula said.

Polio is a highly contagious incurable disease that affects the nervous system, and both the wild virus and the vaccine-derived strain can cause irreversible paralysis. It's spread through contaminated food or water. Around one in 200 cases results in paralysis, WHO says, typically affecting the legs.

In the early 20th century, polio struck fear in communities across the world and paralyzed hundreds of thousands of children annually before the advent of vaccines in the 1950s.

**BORMIO, Italy, Feb 14, (Agencies):** Brazilian ski racer Lucas Pinheiro Braathen turned in a powerful final run to win the Olympic giant slalom Saturday and earn South America's first medal at a Winter Games.

With snow falling and fog settling in, the 25-year-old Pinheiro Braathen remained cool and relaxed as he navigated his way through the technical Stelvio course. After seeing his place - No. 1 - he fell to the snow before starting to scream.

He finished in a two-run combined time of 2 minutes, 25 seconds. He beat Swiss racer Marco Odermatt, the defending Olympic champion, by 0.58 seconds. Odermatt's teammate, Loic Meillard, earned bronze.

Pinheiro Braathen is the fun-loving, samba-dancing skier who's ready to get this party started. On the back of his helmet, he has in big letters "Vamos Dançar" - "Let's Dance." Fittingly enough, it's Carnival season, too, a festival of parades, masquerades and partying made famous in places such as Brazil.

There's plenty to celebrate because, "Brazil is an Olympic champion in Alpine skiing," he said.

Pinheiro Braathen comes from a family where his mother is Brazilian and his father is Norwegian. He started racing for Norway until abruptly retiring before the 2023 season, only to return a year later representing Brazil.

Brazil's President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva celebrated his country's first ever Winter Olympics medal on his social media channels.

"This unprecedented result shows Brazilian sport has no limits. It is the reflection of talent, dedication and continuous work to strengthen sport in every dimension," Lula said. "Congratulations to Lucas Pinheiro and all the team involved in this historic achievement, which inspires new generations and widens the horizon for Brazilian sport." It's another medal at the Milan Cortina Games for the 28-year-old Odermatt. He added this to the silver in the team event, where he partnered with Meillard, and bronze in the super-G.

At the Lie McGrath of Norway wore a black armband in remembrance of his grandfather, who died on the day of the opening ceremony. He finished fifth.

Australia's Jakara Anthony rebounded from midweek disappointment to make history, winning gold in the Olympic debut of women's dual moguls at the Milan-Cortina 2026 Winter Olympics.

Anthony, the favorite in singles moguls who made a costly error earlier in the week, delivered under pressure at Livigno Snow Park, edging world champion Jaelin Kauf of the United States in the medal round to become the first Olympic champion in the head-to-head format.

"It's a really special one," Anthony said. "To turn it around from the disappointment of singles and come out with the performance I know I'm capable of - with my team behind me - that's what I'm most proud of." The dual moguls event pits two skiers side by side on the same course, directly comparing speed and style while adding the pressure of a rival in peripheral vision. Flat-light conditions added another challenge, prompting staff to scatter pine needles to break up the glare as light snow fell.

Anthony was sharper and faster in the super final, winning 20-15 to secure gold.

Kauf earned her second silver of the Games and the third Olympic silver of her career. American teammate Elizabeth Lemley, the singles champion, took bronze despite a sore elbow, beating France's Perrine Laffont.

In her Olympic debut, Maren Kirkeeide of Norway bested two Frenchwomen to take gold in a snowy women's 7.5-kilometer sprint biathlon race at the Milan Cortina Winter Games on Saturday.

Kirkeeide cleared all 10 of her shots and crossed the finish line in 20 minutes and 40.8 seconds. Océane Michelon of France also shot clean and came in 3.8 seconds behind. Lou Jeannmonnot missed one but held on for a podium position, 23.7 seconds back.

Jeannmonnot has stood on the podium in every race she has entered so far in these Winter Games. She took silver in the 15-kilometer individual race on Wednesday and joined Julia Simon, Eric Perrot, and Quentin Fillon Maillet to take gold in the mixed relay last Sunday.

Simon missed two of her standing shots and finished a disappointing 34th - 1 minute 55.8 seconds behind the Norwegian.

Reigning biathlon sprint champion Marte Olsbu Røiseland has retired. Elvira Oeberg of Sweden took silver in the sprint at the Beijing Olympics, while Dorothea Wierer of Italy won bronze.

Patrice Motsepe, speaking after a meeting of CAF's executive committee, said the tournament will be played in June and/or July and that the organization will be announcing dates soon.
