

Kuwait, Saudi sign cybersecurity MoU

RIYADH, Nov 2, (KUNA): Kuwait and Saudi Arabia signed on Thursday a memorandum of understanding in the field of cybersecurity.

Kuwait was represented in the MoU's signing, on the second day of the Riyadh-held Global Cybersecurity Forum, by the Head of National Center for Cybersecurity Major General Mohammad Bouarki, while Saudi Arabi was represented by Governor of the National Cybersecurity Authority (NCA) Majed Al-Mazyad.

In a statement to KUNA, Bouarki said that this MoU is aimed at opening broad horizons for transferring knowledge and sharing experiences in the cybersecurity field between the two sides, stressing the importance of cooperation in the field to better counter cyberattacks.

Central Bank gears up to combat electronic fraud

'Chamber' takes shape to curb menace

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 2: The Central Bank of Kuwait has asked the banks operating in Kuwait to provide it with the latest developments on the establishment of the central room that will be dedicated to dealing with cases of electronic financial fraud, designated to work 24/7, reports Al-Rai daily.

The banks response in principle is that it may be useful to point out that the coordination team for establishing the 'Chamber'

must include representatives from the Union of Banks, the Public Prosecution, the Ministry of Interior, and Communications and Information Technology Regulatory Authority (CITRA).

The reliable sources said the banks have informed the CBK that the last meeting came up with four main issues which can be limited to: Achieving the target - The banks are almost ready to establish the required "chamber", while the current open discussion is related to the appropriate technical and human mobilization to provide a specialized team in each bank capable of achieving the goals of the "chamber" and receiving financial fraud reports, following them up and dealing with them with

the required speed and efficiency, as each bank will allocate Specific employees for this purpose.

The sources stated that the banks coordinated with the relevant authorities to take the necessary precautionary measures to ensure that it does not happen again.

The sources explained that a preliminary vision had been de-veloped to limit electronic financial fraud operations, a mechanism for dealing with banking reports with those concerned in the Ministry of Interior, freezing decisions with the Public Prosecution, and a mechanism for dealing with phone numbers and Internet website addresses used in cases of fraud with CITRA, while suggesting that implementation of the construction of the "chamber" will begin in the next two weeks.

Freeze funds - The CBK reported that they received, during the meetings of their representatives in the coordination team, reassurances from the prosecution stating that the latter is moving towards accelerating the procedures for freezing funds derived or suspected of being the result of fraudulent operations, and that they are more prepared to respond as quickly as possible to requests for banking permission to block suspicious funds until they are disposed of and returned to their owners.

Although the prosecution's assurances to the banks did not include any indication that a specific department had been allocated

WASHINGTON: The US-EU Task Force on Energy Security has mulled the diversification of Europe's natural gas supply sources and the growing liquefied natural gas (LNG) trade between them.

Palestinian death toll above 9,000

Mediators push for 'pause' in Gaza

RAFAH, Gaza Strip, Nov 2, (AP): Israeli troops advanced toward Gaza City on Thursday, as the Palestinian death toll rose above 9,000. With no end in sight after weeks of heavy fighting, U.S. and Arab mediators intensified efforts to ease Israel's siege of the Hamas-ruled enclave and called for at least a brief halt to the hostilities in order to aid civilians.

U.S. President Joe Biden suggested a humanitarian "pause" the day before, as an apparent agreement among the U.S., Egypt, Israel and Qatar, which mediates with Hamas, allowed hundreds of Palestinians with foreign passports and dozens of wounded to leave Gaza for the first time. Dozens more left on Thursday.

Israel did not immediately respond to Biden's remarks, but Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has previously ruled out a cease-fire.

Arab countries, including those allied with the U.S. and at peace with Israel, have expressed mounting unease with the

war. Jordan recalled its ambassador from Israel and told Israel's envoy to remain out of the country until there's a halt to the war and the "humanitarian catastro-

phe" it is causing. More than 3,700 Palestinian children have been killed in 25 days of fighting, and bombings have driven more than half the territory's 2.3 million people from their homes, while food, water and fuel run low

Israeli troops pushed into Gaza in larger numbers over the weekend after three weeks of heavy airstrikes that have demolished entire neighborhoods. The war, the fifth and by far deadliest in Gaza, began when Hamas launched a bloody Oct. 7 rampage into Israel, killing hundreds of men, women and children. Some 240 were taken captive.

The U.S. has pledged unwavering support for Israel as it seeks to end Hamas' rule over Gaza and crush its military capabilities, even as the two allies seem to have no clear plan for what would come next.

White House officials said a pause in fighting would allow for more aid to be sent in and potentially facilitate the release of hostages. U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken is expected back in the region on Friday.

The departure of Palestinians through the Rafah crossing into Egypt on Wednesday came after weeks of talks. It was first time people left Gaza other than four hostages released by Hamas and another rescued by Israeli forces. Israel has also allowed more than 260 trucks carrying food and medicine through the crossing, but aid workers say it's not nearly enough.

At least 335 foreign passport holders left Wednesday and approximately another 100 left Thursday, according to Wael Abu Omar, a spokesman for the Palestinian Crossings Âuthority. Seventy-six Palestinian patients, along with their companions, were also evacuated, he said.

to these cases, and that the matter was still limited to increasing the working hours allocated to this scope, this move dispelled banking fears of exposure to the risks of freezing any clients' funds without permission from the prosecution, which It usually takes 3 business days to complete.

Local operations - The banks pointed out that any immediate freezing of fraudulent funds will be limited to the movement of funds from one bank to another inside Kuwait.

However, if the "hacker" succeeds in convincing the victim and withdrawing his money in transfers abroad or in "online" purchases, the "Chamber" will not be able to implement the plan. The urgent measures that you will take locally are to freeze the amounts of these operations immediately

To simplify, if a person is defrauded and his money is transferred to another local bank, the receiving bank will be asked to freeze the transaction funds, after obtaining permission from the prosecution to freeze immediately, in preparation for returning them again to the victim client's account.

However, if the "hacker" succeeds in luring the victim by transferring his amounts directly abroad or directing them for "online" purchases, the bank with which the customer's account is opened will have no choice but to activate its traditional procedures, which include contacting the intermediary bank to stop the flow of funds to the opposite party of the transfer or purchase process. Of course, the success of the procedure depends on the speed of reporting and many other considerations.

■ Withdrawal of money - There is a possibility that the bank receiving the money will not be able to freeze the fraudulent amounts immediately, even if the transaction was between two local banks, if the "hacker" succeeds in withdrawing the "cash" amounts before the issuance of permission from the prosecution, as he may withdraw the amount by simply depositing it in an account used as a bridge. Panel returns Sulaibikhat Bay project to executive branch

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 2: Head of the Technical Committee of the Municipal

Council Dr. Hassan Kamal said the committee, after reviewing the visual presentation presented by the Structural Planning Department of Kuwait Municipality regarding the project to develop the structural plan for Sulaibikhat Bay, has decided to return the project to the executive branch to update the response regarding it and match it with the country's fourth structural plan. It also sought to invite the Environment Public Authority, the General Traffic Department, the Public Authority for Industry, and other parties concerned with the project to obtain their testimonies regarding it.

In a press statement issued on the sidelines of the tech- Dr Hassan Kamal nical committee meeting yesterday, which he chaired, Dr.

Kamal explained that the boundaries of the Sulaibikhat Bay master plan project extend from Kuwait University to Ras Asherij at a length of 38 kilometers. It is divided into six zones with different uses and proportions, parking lots, infrastructure, and roads.

The first zone is concerned with innovation and consists of universities and

scientific institutions in addition to some of the attached spaces allocated for the use of government facilities, open areas, spaces and gardens with an area of 609,000 square meters.

The second zone is the Sulaibikhat Coast area, which has 25 percent residential use, in addition to commercial uses, government facilities, and recreational use, as well as squares, open areas, roads, services, and infrastructure.

Activities

The third zone, which is the Sulaibikhat Sports Area, contains residential use activities and government facilities. It has a high percentage of recreational use, approximately 42 percent, in addition to open spaces, gardens, and suburbs.

The fourth zone is the Ras Asherij area, with an area of approximately two million and 700 thousand square meters. It has various uses, the most important of which is recreational use, in addition to open spaces and specific percentages for commercial use.

As for the fifth zone, it is the Asherij residential area, which is designated for residential use in addition to commercial use. It also contains government facilities to a very limited extent.

The last zone is the Asherij Islands area, which contains two artificial islands with a total area of 890,000 square meters. It also contains commercial uses, gardens, and open and recreational spaces at a greater rate of up to 38

percent.

Dr. Kamal concluded by emphasizing the importance of the Sulaibikhat Bay project, which is characterized by its integration as it contains a large portion of recreational, residential and commercial facilities in varying proportions, in addition to its unique location overlooking Kuwait Bay.

Meanwhile, the committee also referred to the executive body the transaction regarding the acquisition of the remainder of Failaka Island, the exemption of the Kuwait International Fair Company from the fees imposed on internal advertisements, and the request of the group of owners of mobile vehicle projects to provide sites for mobile vehicles.

The committee retained the proposal submitted by member Fahad Musaed Al-Abd Al-Jader regarding abandoned real estate.

It also postponed the question of Municipal Council member Ismail Behbehani about the evaluation criteria for highway projects, but it invited the General Traffic Department, the Public Authority for Roads and Transportation, and the Ministry of Public Works.

The committee read the letter submitted by the Public Authority for Disabled Affairs regarding opening educational and rehabilitation institutions for persons with disabilities. It also read the letter submitted by member Munira Al-Amir regarding activating performance measurement standards in the municipal work system, and will direct it to the Minister of State for Municipal Affairs.

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 2, (KUNA): Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Sa-lem Abdullah Al-Jaber Al-Sabah left Kuwait Thursday, heading to Russia on an official visit that he and his accompanying delegation will conduct to hold multiple meetings with officials in Moscow to strengthen bilateral ties between both sides.

In the meetings, both sides will discuss several vital topics and issues regionally and internationally, especially developments in the region.

Sheikh Salem was bid farewell at the airport by Kuwait Deputy Foreign Af-

fairs Sheikh Jarrah Jaber Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah, Assistant Foreign Minister for Protocol Affairs Ambassador Nabeel Al-Dakheel, Ambassador of Russia to Kuwait Vladimir Zheltov and officials in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Meanwhile, Kuwait Deputy Foreign Minister Ambassador Sheikh Jarrah Jaber Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah received on Thursday Chairman of the Association of General Secretaries of the Arab Parliaments and Qatari Secretary General of the Shura Council Dr. Ahmed bin Nasser bin Ibrahim Al-Fadala on the occasion of his visit to the country.

1. Conflict of interests and abuse of power to dodge responsibility over fraud cases;

2. Negligence, abuse of power and exposing national security to risks; 3. Financial and administrative violations that severely affected public funds;

4. Misleading the State Audit Bureau (SAB) to dodge responsibility; 5. Failure to manage the National Fund for the Development of Small and Medium Enterprises and address the problems of its beneficiaries;

> 6. Failure to adjust and control prices, and granting privileges to dealers at the expense of citizens' interests.

Al-Azmi quoted HH the Deputy Amir and Crown Prince Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah who said at the inaugural session of the second round of the 17th parliamentary term that the performance of the government is not commensurate with the full support of the political leadership.

The lawmaker added that during the discussion of his grilling motion, he will expose catastrophic facts indicating the concerned minister must not stay in office. He asserted that if the minister remains in office, the performance of the government will be affected negatively and put it in an embarrassing situation; while the Assembly will lose its credibility if it remains silent over violations.

Meanwhile, MP Hani Shams has forwarded queries to Minister of Education, Higher Education and Scientific Research Adel Al-Manea about the statistics issued by the Ministry of Higher Education, showing that hundreds of students on overseas scholarship in the last five years have been facing difficulties in completing their studies including those who have been suspended, cancelled and delayed.

Requested

He requested for the list of students on overseas scholarship in the last five years, along with their specializations, scholarship term, exams they passed and failed; list of accredited and unaccredited universities, colleges and institutes in each country; total cost of overseas scholarship per year in the last five years; criteria for granting overseas scholarship; number of students facing difficulties categorizing them based on the secondary school where they enrolled prior to obtaining overseas scholarship; reasons behind their difficulties; reasons for the cancellation, suspension or extension of the scholarship term; if reasons behind the difficulties is personal or due to the low quality of education in Kuwaiti schools; and if the Ministry of Education conducted a study on improving the quality of education in these schools. Meanwhile, MP Badr Nashmi Al-Anzi strongly criticized the regulations laid down by the Civil Service Commission (CSC) to implement the law on allowing employees to pursue higher studies while working. He pointed out that the regulations stipulate impossible conditions, which could hinder the enforcement of the law. He affirmed that the concerned parliamentary committee held several meetings with senior officials at CSC and Ministry of Higher Education prior to the ratification of the law. "If the minutes of these meetings are revealed, the citizens will discover the mediocre thought process of some senior officials. There have been attempts to hinder the execution of the law under the pretext of improving the quality of education. In fact, education has been deteriorating due to the incompetence of senior officials. The decision to suspend the medical studies scholarship in Egypt and Jordan without providing alternative destinations is an example of a contradictory and erroneous decision. While such scholarships are suspended under the pretext that the quality of education in some universities is not as expected, the Ministry of Health continues to hire doctors and nurses who graduated from such universities. These scholarships were suspended and those affected have been allowed to continue studying the aforementioned courses at their own expense. The education minister should lift the scholarship suspension and push for the proper implementation of the law on allowing employees to pursue higher studies while working, without imposing impossible conditions. The minister's position is not as important as the future of the students," the lawmaker asserted. Moreover, Assembly Speaker Ahmad Al- Sa'adoun recently met Chairman of the Arab Parliament Secretaries General Society Dr Ahmed Bin Nasser Bin Ibrahim Al-Fadhalah who is currently in Kuwait. Secretary General of the Assembly Khalid Saad Busleeb and Secretary General of Arab Parliaments Secretaries General Society Jassem Al-Nisf attended the meeting.



few hours, Abu Daya told KUNA, noting that the Israeli occupation keeps interjecting the delivery process of the rest of the humanitarian aid to the Gaza Strip including medical equipment and ambulances. MEW bags over 1 bln in revenue

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 2: According to informed sources in the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy, the ministry achieved revenues estimated at KD 1.209 billion in the last three years, from the beginning of April 2020 to March 31, 2023, in return for 23 services provided by the ministry at a fee to Kuwaiti and non-Kuwaiti customers.

The sources explained that the ministry collected KD 1.117 billion in fees for providing electricity and water services, and KD 80.263 million for providing 15 services related to delivering power and inspecting electrical appliances during the same aforementioned period.

There are five services related to disconnecting and connecting water and electricity meters, which generated about KD 300 thousand, and about KD 12 million were obtained from servicing water filling stations.

The services provided by the Ministry for fees are - selling electricity and water, cutting or installing water and electricity meters and delivering them.

The ministry also provides water filling station services, connecting electricity to private housing for the first time, to private housing for the second plot, to commercial and investment housing, to factories with electrical loads of less than 350 kilowatts, to chalets and stables, and to farms with capacity of less than 350 kilowatts and more than five megawatts, and providing temporary electricity to private housing and projects.

The ministry also provides the service of restoring power or moving an electrical cable or meter for the purpose of demolition, transporting lighting equipment, drawing a receipt or transporting water exchange for more than 12 meters, and examining electrical and other appliances for approval in the country.


'Gaza battle has exposed regional regimes, Zionist fragility'

"The people of Gaza today, after the weak positions of many regimes have been exposed, only want the Arabs and Muslims to bring in the aid that has reached them. Is there anything simpler than this request?

Despite this atrocity, global silence continues regarding the crimes committed against Palestinians under occupation," columnist Abdulaziz Al-Kandari wrote for Al-Rai daily.

'The history of the Zionists with massacres is long, since 1948, and then the Deir Yassin massacres in 1948, the Kafr Qasim massacre in 1956, the Khan Yunis massacre in 1956, the Sabra and Shatila massacre in 1982, and the Ibrahimi Mosque massacre in 1994. This is in contrast to the savage images that we used to see on an almost daily basis of the Palestinians and the crime of bombing hospitals in Gaza and killing medical staff is not far from our minds.

"The occupation army claimed that the strike it directed in Jabalia was targeting a "senior leader" in the Islamic Resistance Movement "Hamas," who is responsible for the battles in northern Gaza since the start of the war, according to the army spokesman.

"Hamas also denied the allegation, saying, "The terrorist Zionist enemy's talk about the presence of a Hamas leader in Jabalia, the site of the massacre, is false and baseless.

"The Ministry of Health in Gaza stated that the massacre resulted in 400 martyrs and wounded, according to a preliminary toll, stressing that the number may be the largest, and may be close to the number of victims of the Baptist Hospital massacre. Because the area that was bombed was 'densely populated.

"It is a truly brutal and barbaric massacre, and the Israeli army used 6

bombs, each bomb weighing a ton, and internationally banned weapons. "It is as if the world gave the green light to the Zionists to kill without stopping. They kill men, women and children. If the world is on the side of the Zionists, then where is the role of the Muslims who are responsible for the cause?

"What happened in Jabalia camp is a painful reminder that innocent people in Palestine continue to suffer from Israeli oppression and violence.

The international community must speak out and condemn these atrocities and work to stop the Israeli violence and occupation. When the world remains silent in the face of such crimes, it encourages their continuation and makes them acceptable, and this is unacceptable in any way.

'To give the Zionists free rein to tamper with and kill them as they please without accountability or supervision, and even to do so and kill under international protection and guardianship, with all regret? This is a wrong path, because the arbitrary use of force by the Zionist occupier will not bring peace, but it will foster hatred against this illegal, criminal entity in the coming days, and its loss will be greater.

Household help number increased despite ban on Philippines workers

30 per cent rise from India, major fall from Lanka

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 2: The number of domestic workers working in Kuwait increased from 583,000 at the end of 2021 to 811,000 as of last October, despite the ban imposed on the recruitment of Filipino workers since last February, and the direct recruitment of domestic workers was limited only to India and Sri Lanka.

Labor statistics revealed an increase in the number of domestic workers coming from India by about 30 percent over last year, reaching about 361,000 as of last October, of whom only 28.7 percent were female, and the rest were men.

MEW waits for CSC nod

Bid to enforce flexible work hours

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 2: The Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy said "the Ministry is waiting for the Civil Service Commission to complete the programming of its integrated system to implement the flexible working hours that the Ministry proposed to the Bureau some time ago.

The Al-Rai daily has learned that there is a problem with the Bureau regarding the issue of how to calculate the period of prior permission granted to employees at certain times, indicating that the Ministry, due to this problem, has not yet been able to implement a flexible working system for its more than 35,000 employees.

The ministry explained it had previously addressed the Bureau regarding the flexible working hours system that it wanted to implement for its employees, as it decided to allocate one flexible hour from 7:00 am to 8:00 am, with an estimated grace period of half an hour, and the Ministry is still awaiting the Bureau's response to begin implementation.'

On the other hand, sources revealed that the Ministry has signed a contract with an international consultant for a period of 5 years to provide the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy with internal consulting engineering services for water sector projects.

The statistics recorded a significant decrease in the number of domestic workers recruited from Sri Lanka, from 79 thousand in 2022, to only 48.2 thousand in 2023, with an average of about 4,800 entering Kuwait monthly, of which female workers constitute more than 90 percent.

As for Filipino female workers, despite the ban on their recruitment, they still make the bulk of domestic workers, as their number in 2023 reached about 99.4 percent of the 201,000 Filipino domestic workers in Kuwait.

Explained

Bassam Al-Shammari, a specialist in domestic worker affairs, explained to Al-Rai that the increase in the number of domestic workers in general is due to the increasing demand for them, after the establishment of many new housing cities in Kuwait.

Al-Shammari stressed that the increased awareness of both the sponsor and the worker about the rights and duties of both parties, and the change in treatment with the domestic worker, is clearly evident in the low percentage of cases of escape from homes, and the lack of labor disputes.

Number of domestic workers as of last October:

■ India: 371,222 workers (71.3 percent male - 28.7 percent female)

Philippines: 201,110 workers (0.6 percent male -99.4 percent female)

■ Sri Lanka: 103,685 workers (20.6 percent males -79.4 percent females)

■ Bangladesh: 85,989 workers (99 percent males - 1 percent females)

■ Nepal: 25,540 workers (4.7 percent males - 95.3 percent females)

■ Ethiopia: 11 One thousand and 684 workers (8.2 percent males - 91.8 percent females)

■ Other nationalities: 11 thousand and 616 workers (59.1 percent males - 40.9 percent females)

Bassam Al-Shammari presented four proposals through Al-Rai that could contribute to solving employment problems, which are:

1. That there be equality for holders

of Article 20 regarding reports of absence under Article 18, and that the report be submitted on the date of absence and not be activated until after 60 days, as this procedure contributes to addressing 80 percent of labor problems and issues, and embarrassment over malicious reports that the majority of domestic workers

in embassies suffer from, due to the

difficulty of filing an absence report. 2. Activating the role of the shelter center affiliated with the Public Authority for Manpower, and coordinating with the embassies of countries exporting domestic workers.

3. Accelerating the end of labor disputes, and quickly restoring workers' rights in disputes through amicable solutions.

4. Seeking help from recruitment offices to resolve any dispute between the worker and the sponsor may reduce about 30 percent of cases.

Al-Dikaan said that the State of Kuwait affirms its commitment to supporting refugee issues in line with its humanitarian diplomacy, expressing the country's appreciation for the efforts made by the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA) in providing the basic needs of education and health care for Palestine refugees in several countries.

Al-Dikaan added that Kuwait supports the efforts of the United Nations High Commissioner for

Refugees, which includes the return or resettlement of refugees in various parts of the world, while providing them with protection. He renewed the country's call to ensure the safety of UNHCR workers, as many of them work in conflict zones or areas where climate change is widespread.

He pointed to the country's humanitarian efforts that have affected all parts of the world in the wake of the worsening crisis of refugees and displaced persons, in a fair manner without regard to race or affiliation, explaining that this approach has contributed to a positive impact on the lives of many by adopting policies based on development and non-discrimination when providing a helping hand.

He warned that the issues of asylum and displacement are not the exclusive result of armed conflicts, but are also the result of non-traditional threats such as climate change, the spread of epidemics, and ongoing human rights violations, noting

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 2: The Ambassador of the Federal Republic of Germany to Kuwait Hans-Christian Freiherr von Reibnitz praised the Kuwaiti-German relations, which he described as distinguished.

In a statement issued on the sidelines of a tourism exhibition held the day before yesterday evening at the ambassador's residence with the participation of nine German tourist offices and the Lufthansa Airlines company, the ambassador called on Kuwaitis to visit his country, which he described as a touristic country.

However, I say to Kuwaitis that there are great opportunities to actually pass through Germany."

In his response to a question about the visit of a German parliamentary delegation to Kuwait and the extent of cooperation, he said, "The visit was by the Speaker of the Parliament of Arabic-speaking countries. It falls within the framework of our two countries' preparations to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the establishment of bilateral relations. This is to link with the National Assembly and for the actual vision of preparing for a possible visit of Kuwaiti parliamentarians to Germany for unification, and at the same time to make clear to Kuwaiti friends that our government is not the only one that establishes relations.

190 apply for 25 supervisory posts in co-ops

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 2: The Acting Undersecretary of the Ministry of Social Affairs Abdulaziz Sari Al-Mutairi declared that the Quartet **Committee for Supervisory Po**sitions in Cooperative Societies has begun receiving applicants from Wednesday evening.

He highlighted the completion of the first phase involving 11 cooperative societies with 25 vacant supervisory positions, affirming that these vacancies will be filled by applicants among the citizens, as the total number of applicants is 190 Kuwaiti men and women.

Al-Mutairi explained that, "The committee will receive applicants for the positions of director, deputy director, and head

of the department. It will start with the Nuzha Cooperative Society for the position of deputy director, for which the total number of applicants is 24 Kuwaiti men and women.

We have asked the cooperative societies to adhere to the decision of the Council of Ministers so that all societies have a unified structure that includes ten departments, except for the cooperative societies with financial solvency. They need to contact us and their status will be reviewed as to whether the number of departments will be reduced or merged.'

Nomination

Meanwhile, the Head of the competent quartet committee to study nomination files and conduct personal interviews for appointment to cooperative societies, and the Director of the Supervision and Cooperative Inspection Department at the Ministry of Social Affairs Ahmed Al-Enezi confirmed the start of receiving applicants for supervisory positions in cooperative societies yesterday.

Al-Enezi explained that the quartet committee includes in its membership the Union of Consumer Cooperative Societies, the Ministry of Social Affairs, the Public Authority for Manpower, and the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the cooperative society that has vacancies.

The committee began conducting interviews for 24 applicants for positions in the Nuzha Cooperative Society according to the supervisory positions offered. Interviews will be conducted on a weekly basis for applicants to positions of each cooperative society separately.

He revealed that non-compliant cooperative societies were directed to a judicial police officer for not announcing supervisory positions, indicating that the number of such cooperative societies reached 14.

Al-Enezi affirmed that after the officer's directive, a large number of cooperative societies came forward to advertise the iobs.

Meanwhile, Chairman of the Jahra Co-

operative Society, Ahmed Al-Shammari, announced the success of the Awal Al-Khair Festival 2023 which was organized from October 23 to 31.

Al-Shammari said, the future will be on a greater level and of a distinctive quality, valuing the cooperation of the members of the board of directors among themselves for the benefit of the shareholders, reports Al-Rai daily.

Al-Shammari, in a press statement, said the sales of the Awal Al-Khair Festival 2023 was approximately 275 thousand dinars, distributed as follows -- 200 thousand from the Jahra Central Market and 75 thousand from the Al-Waha Central Market, stressing that the board of directors is moving towards developing and achieving the ambitions of the people of the region, especially the shareholders.

Al-Shammari promised shareholders and the people of the region that the coming period would witness more services and festivals, and that the quality offers would satisfy them.

Kuwait preps to witness astronomical events this month

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 2: The Space Museum of the Sheikh Abdullah Al-Salem Cultural Center announced that November 2023 will witness many distinctive astronomical events that can be observed from the skies of Kuwait, including the conjunction of the moon with bright planets, reports Al-Rai daily.

General Supervisor of Museums at the Center, Khaled Al-Jamaan, told Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) that the planet Jupiter, the giant of the solar system, will be at its closest point to Earth on the evening of Friday, November 3, and during this period it will be at its maximum in terms of brightness, and with a good telescope it can be distinguished.

He stated that the Kuwaiti sky will be on the evening of Sunday, November 12, with meteor showers known as "Taurus group showers," as the best time to view them will be after midnight in areas far from light pollution, and approximately 5 to 10 meteors can be seen during one hour

He stated that November 13 will be the best time dur-

ing the month to monitor and photograph the Galaxy River, in addition to observing faint celestial bodies such as galaxies and star clusters, in addition to the most prominent winter stars.

Al-Jamaan stated that on November 18, the periodic stream of meteors from the Leo Group returns, which arose from the remains of the transit of comet "Tempel-Tuttle" in 1866, indicating that the Leo Group meteors have a cycle that is repeated every 33 years in which the meteor showers increase significantly, reaching hundreds of meteors and the last peak. These meteors occurred in 2001, and the next peak date for these showers will be in 2033. This year, it is expected to see 15 meteors per hour.

He added that the moon will be associated during the month of November, during its journey in the sky from east to west, with a number of bright planets that appear in the form of bright stars in the sky near the moon in a distinctive view for the observer from Earth.

The two teams stated that the moon will be in conjunction with the planet Venus at dawn on Thursday,


Airstrikes on Tuesday and Wednesday destroyed apartment buildings in the Jabaliya refugee camp near Gaza City, but the number of dead and wounded remained unknown. Israel said the strikes killed militants and demolished Hamas tunnels.

Palestinian militants fired antitank missiles, set off explosive devices and hurled grenades at Israeli troops during an overnight battle, the Israeli military said Thursday. It said soldiers returned fire and called in artillery, as well as strikes. The report could not be independently confirmed.

Casualties on both sides are expected to rise as Israeli troops advance toward the dense residential neighbor-hoods of Gaza City. Israeli officials say Hamas' military infrastructure, including tunnels, is concentrated in the city and accuse Hamas of hiding among civilians.

At least 9.061 Palestinians have been killed in the war, mostly women and minors, and more than 32,000 people have been wounded, the Gaza Health Ministry said Thursday, without providing a breakdown between civilians and fighters. The death toll is without precedent in decades of Israeli-Palestinian violence, and is around four times the figure from the 2014 Gaza war, which lasted over six weeks.

Four Palestinians, including three teenagers, were shot dead in different parts of the occupied West Bank early Thursday, the Palestinian Health Ministry said. More than 130 Palestinians have been killed in the West Bank since the start of the war, mainly in violent protests and gunbattles during Israeli arrest raids.

Journalist expelled Putin expected to 'seek' re-election

TALLINN, Estonia, Nov 2, (AP): Vladimir Putin isn't quite the man he used to be - more than a decade has passed since the Russian president engaged in public stunts to boast of his vigor by hugging a polar bear or riding a horse barechested in the mountains. The war in Ukraine has further dented that strongman image.

Putin is still expected to seek another term when Russia holds presidential elections next March. In fact, he has pushed through changes in the constitution to allow him to run for two more six-year terms.

But 71 is an age when death or serious illness are hardly distant concerns for the man who has ruled Russia for 24 years. If Putin was not on the ballot for

some reason, it's not clear who might take his place.



At the national level, Russia's political system is hermetic. There are no primary elections where voters can choose a candidate; political parties select their own contenders and then present them to the electorate.

In Putin's absence, the loy-alist United Russia party could put forth a candidate, although

Putin

there's no fixed procedure for it to choose one. Officially, Putin ran in 2018 as an independent, a precedent adding uncertainty to how a replacement could emerge.

replacement could emerge. He submissively acceded to Putin's desire to run for a new term in 2012, serving as prime minister until 2020. He was then appointed to the new position of deputy head of the national security council. Although that post was low-visibility and often seen as a sinecure, Medvedev's prominence soared

last year when he abandoned his normally mild persona and became one of the most vehement defenders of the war in Ukraine, vividly denouncing the West.

That posture has appeal for Russian nationalists, but Medvedev could be tarnished by the perception he was too accommodating to the United States as president during the Obama administration's "reset" initiative, as well as a high-profile expose alleging corruption and garishly lavish living.

2 killed in eastern Ukraine: A Russian attack on Kherson in eastern Ukraine on Wednesday killed one person and caused serious damage in the city's center, the region's governor said, and a Russian drone strike killed another civilian in the frequently targeted city of Nikopol.

The attack on Kherson, which Russian forces seized early in the war but then abandoned a year ago, also wounded two people. Despite the withdrawal, Russian attacks from the other side of the Dnieper River persist.

"Again an apocalyptic scene," regional Gov. Oleksandr Prokudin said on the Telegram messaging app. "Broken glass, torn window frames, ruined homes. People with trembling voices telling about what they have been through."

Ciaran whips western Europe, blowing record winds in France, leaving mlns without power

Winds up to 180 kilometers per hour (108 mph) slammed France's Atlantic coast overnight as Storm Ciaran lashed countries around western Europe, uprooting trees, blowing out windows and leaving 1.2 million French households without electricity Thursday.

Heavy rain associated with the storm pushed ashore at the southwest tip of England, and the UK's national weather forecaster warned of flood risks and urged people to take precautions. Dutch airline KLM scrapped all flights from the early afternoon until the end of the day, citing the high sustained wind speeds and powerful gusts expected in the Netherlands.

A weather-related death already was confirmed in France. A truck driver was killed when his vehicle was hit by a tree in northern France's inland Aisne region, Transport Minister Clement Beaune said.

Nearly all coastlines of the French mainland were under severe weather warnings Thursday morning, from Calais on the English Channel to all the way down the shores of the Atlantic Ocean to Spain, as well as much of France's Mediterranean coast and Corsica. according to national weather service Météo-France. The weather service reported record-breaking

wind speeds of 108 mph (180 kilometers per hour) along the Brittany coast. The wind reached up to 96 mph (160 kph) on the Normandy coast and up to 90 mph (150 kph) inland. Waves of almost 33 feet (10 meters) were expected in the country's northwestern tip.

Local trains were canceled across a swath of western France, and all roads in the Finistere region of Brittany were closed Thursday morning. Beaune urged people to avoid driving and to at least exercise caution when traveling across areas with weather warnings. (AP)

WASHINGTON, Nov 2, (AP): US Rep George Santos easily survived a vote Wednesday to expel him from the House as most Republicans and 31 Democrats opted to withhold punishment while both his criminal trial and a House Ethics ee investigatio n proceed

The State Agency for National Security said Alexander Gatsak, a correspondent for Russian state-run newspaper Rossiyskaya Gazeta, was stripped of his residency rights and barred from entering Bulgaria and other European Union member nation.

The agency said Gatsak was summoned Sept. 29 to receive the expulsion order at the Interior Ministry migration office, but he did not show up and instead took refuge inside the Russian Embassy in Bulgaria's capital, Sofia.

The agency said in a statement that it sought the assistance of the Foreign Ministry and the journalist left Bulgaria on Wednesday. The statement did not elaborate on Gatsak's alleged activities but said his removal was carried out in strict compliance with European democratic norms and values.

Ex-defense min, ex-spy chief cases dropped:

Danish prosecution dismissed Wednesday two separate cases against a former defense minister and an ex-head of the country's foreign intelligence service due to the inability to divulge classified information in court. Both were charged with leaking state secrets,

Last week, Denmark's highest court ruled that the two cases which have been shrouded in secrecy, should be made public and sessions were to be closed off whenever sensitive information was presented.

In a statement, Denmark's prosecution authority said that "in the interests of the state's security, it is no longer safe to make highly classified information available in criminal proceedings." Prosecutor Jakob Berger Nielsen said in the statement that the legal process would have forced "the disclosure of confidential information.'

'Allow asylum-seekers to start working': The German government has approved legislation that would allow asylum-seekers to start working sooner and a plan to stiffen punishment for people who smuggle migrants.

The package backed by the Cabinet on Wednesday, which still requires parliamentary approval, is the latest in a series of steps taken recently by the government as it tries to defuse migration as a major political problem. The issue was one of several that led to a poor showing in state elections last month for Chancellor OIaf Scholz's quarrelsome three-party coalition and gains for a far-right party.


Last week, ministers approved legislation intended to ease deportations of unsuccessful asylum-seekers. On Monday, Scholz will hold a meeting with Germany's 16 state governors expected to center on responses to migration.

New oil leak reported: A ferry that had ran aground last month off southeastern Sweden and started leaking oil into the Baltic Sea was pulled free on Wednesday and anchored nearby, the Swedish Coast Guard said. During the operation, another oil leak was discovered, which the authorities described as small.

The Marco Polo, operated by the TT-Line of Germany, was operating a route along Sweden's coast between the cities of Trelleborg and Karlshamn when it ran aground on Oct. 22 and started leaking oil. It continued under its own power, but became stuck a second time.

Trump Jr testifies in father's trial: Donald Trump Jr testified Wednesday that he never worked on his father's financial statements, the documents now at the heart of the civil fraud trial that threatens former President Donald Trump's real estate empire. The ex-president's eldest son is an executive vice president of the family's Trump Organization and has been a trustee of a trust set up to hold its assets when his father was in the White House.

At least one of the annual financial statements bore language saying the trustees "are responsible" for the document. But Donald Trump Jr. said he didn't recall ever working on any of the financial statements and had "no specific knowledge" of them. (AP)

'Officer feared for his life'; A police officer charged with manslaughter and criminally negligent homicide in the 2019 death of Elijah McClain testified Wednesday that he put the 23-year-old Black man in a neck hold because he feared for his life after another officer said McClain grabbed for one of their guns.

Prosecutors have refuted that McClain ever tried to grab an officer's gun, and it can't be seen in body camera footage, which is shaky and dark before all the cameras fall off during the ensuing struggle. Lawyers for two other officers tried earlier in McClain's death also raised the alleged gun grab as part of their defense. (AP)

The mayors of Chicago, Denver, Houston, Los Angeles and New York are pressing to meet with President Joe Biden about get-

The effort to kick Santos out of the House was led by his fellow New York Republicans, who are anxious to distance themselves from a colleague infamous for fabricating his life story and accused of stealing from donors, lying to Congress and receiving unemployment benefits he did not deserve. 'Remove judge from trial': Attorneys for convicted murderer Alex Murdaugh are asking South Carolina's highest court to prevent the judge who presided over his murder trial from playing a role in the next phase of Murdaugh's legal odyssey.

Lawyers for the disbarred attorney want to block Judge Clifton Newman from hearing Murdaugh's request for a new trial. They also want the state Supreme Court to remove Newman from an upcoming case prosecuting Murdaugh over a string of financial crimes that prosecutors say he committed as his life spiraled out of control in the years before he killed his wife and son.

Wednesday's request was part of Murdaugh's appeal of the guilty verdicts and life sentence from his trial last spring.

His lawyers said elected Colleton County Clerk of Court Rebecca Hill allegedly tampered with the murder trial jury by asking jurors their opinions on his guilt or innocence before the trial was over, suggesting to them she thought he was guilty and pressuring them to reach a verdict quickly. (AP)

Brazil tackles crime Uruguay's foreign minister 'resigns'

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Nov 2, (AP): Uruguay's Foreign Minister Francisco Bustillo resigned late Wednesday, shortly after audio messages were published in which he appears to ask a former official to not hand over evidence in an investigation over a passport issued to an accused drug trafficker.

Bustillo said in a statement that he had submitted his resignation "to dispel any suspicion that, as an authority figure, I might exert undue influence over third parties, protected by the privileges of my position."

He resigned after audios were revealed in which he appears to call on former deputy Foreign Minister Carolina Ache to not hand over her phone to investi-



gators. According to the audios, Bustillo was trying to make sure investigators wouldn't see conversations Ache had with another official relating to the granting of a passport to Sebastian Marset while he was detained in Dubai in 2021. That official had warned Marset was a "dangerous" drug trafficker. Ache, who resigned last

year, testified before prosecutors earlier Wednesday as part

of an investigation into Marset's passport. "I was the only politician in this government who resigned and went home. And, paradoxically, it was not because I had done something wrong nor illegal, quite the opposite. It was because I was not willing to conceal communications from the judiciary and because I refused to commit a crime," Ache told journalists after she testified.

Following the release of the audios, leaders of the opposition called on President Luis Lacalle Pou, who is in the United States, to dismiss several top officials, including Bustillo and Interior Minister Luis Alberto Heber, among others.

Illegal

Bustillo, who had been foreign minister since July 2020, claims Ache "decontextualized conversations and acted in bad faith" and insisted there was "nothing illegal" in the passport that was granted to Marset. Bustillo said he would talk to the media after he

testifies before prosecutors, which he is scheduled to do Friday "I will be available to the media to shed light on the


accuracy of what has been done and on the distorted narrative that has been presented," Bustillo said in the statement he issued Wednesday evening.

Bustillo had previously testified before lawmakers that granting the passport to Marset involved an "administrative procedure" and was not political. He also alleged ignorance, saying that Marset's name was not as well known as it is now.

Authorities say Marset, 32, set up a criminal organization across Paraguay, Uruguay and Bolivia to export cocaine to Europe. He is also accused of being the mastermind behind the murder of Paraguay prosecutor Marcelo Pecci in Colombia in 2022.

Marset has eluded capture several times, most recently in August, when he was able to skirt an intense search in Bolivia, where authorities were embarrassed following revelations that he had been living in the country for months under a false identity.

NKorea likely sent missiles to Russia: Seoul

SEOUL, South Korea, Nov 2, (AP): North Korea has likely supplied several types of missiles to Russia to support its war in Ukraine, along with its widely reported shipments of ammunition and shells, South Korea's military said Thursday.

In a background briefing for local journalists, South Korea's military said that North Korea is suspected of sending an unspecified number of short-range ballistic missiles, anti-tank missiles and portable anti-air missiles to Russia, in addition to rifles, rocket launchers, mortars and shells.

The contents of the briefing were shared with The Associated Press.

North Korea has been pushing to expand cooperation with Russia and China in the face of protracted security tensions with the United States and pandemiccaused domestic hardships. In an apparent sign of its economic troubles, the country is moving to close some of its

overseas diplomatic missions. Last week, South Korea, the US and Japan strongly condemned North Korea's alleged supplying of munitions and military equipment to Russia, saying such weapons shipments sharply increased the human toll of Russia's war in Ukraine. Any weapons trade with North Korea would be a violation of multiple UN Security Council resolutions that Russia, a permanent U.N. Security Council member, previously endorsed.

has been operating its munitions factories at full capacity to meet Russian munition demands and has also been mobilizing residents to increase production.

The NIS said North Korea, for its part, is likely receiving Russian technological assistance over its plan to launch its first military spy satellite into space. North Korea's two recent attempts to launch a spy satellite ended in failure due to technical issues. The North failed to follow through with its vow to make a third launch attempt in October, without giving any reasons.

South Korea's military said North Korea also seeks to receive nuclearrelated technologies, fighter jets or related aircraft equipment and assistance on the establishment of anti-air defense networks from Russia.

North Korea is currently focusing on enlarging its nuclear arsenal while refusing to return to talks with the US and South Korea. The country's econand an outstanding proletarian revolutionist, statesman and leader of the party and the state," Xinhua said, repeating the language it had used earlier in his brief obituary.

RIO DE JANEIRO: Brazil's President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva said Wednesday he is sending the armed forces to boost security at some of the country's most important airports, ports and international borders as part of a renewed effort to tackle organized crime in Latin America's largest nation.

The decision comes days after members of a criminal gang set fire to dozens of buses in Rio de Janeiro, apparently in retaliation for the police slaying their leader's nephew.

"We have reached a very serious situation," Lula said at a news conference in Brasilia after signing the decree. "So we have made the decision to have the federal government participate actively, with all its potential, to help state governments, and Brazil itself, to get rid of organized crime."

Brazil will mobilize 3,600 members of the army, navy and air force to increase patrols and monitor the international airports in Rio and Sao Paulo, as well as two maritime ports in Rio and Sao Paulo's Santos port, the busiest in Latin America - and a major export hub for cocaine.

The deployment is part of a government's broader plan that includes increasing the number of federal police forces in Rio, improving cooperation between law enforcement entities and boosting investment in state-of-the-art technology for intelligence gathering.

State and federal authorities have said in recent weeks they want to "suffocate" militias by going after their financial resources.

Rio's public security problems go back decades, and any federal crackdown on organized crime needs to be supported by a far-reaching plan, the fruits of which might only be seen years from now, according to Rafael Alcadipani, a public security analyst and professor at the Getulio Vargas Foundation, a university in Sao Paulo.

MONTGOMERY, Ala: Natalee Holloway's parents gathered in a room at an Alabama jail on Oct 3 to watch the man long-suspected in their daughter's 2005 disappearance describe how he killed her.

For three hours Joran van der Sloot was questioned - first by his own attorney and then by FBI agents - about what happened to Holloway, said Mark White, an attorney representing Natalee's father, Dave Holloway.

"Chilling," White said of watching and listening to van der Sloot's account. "It was listening to a person who lacks any sort of moral compass.

Van der Sloot's admission that he killed Holloway came as part of a plea deal in a related extortion case after months of work and was agreed to by her parents in order to get answers about what happened to their daughter. The plea deal required van der Sloot to make a proffer - providing information about what he knew about the crime - and to let her parents witness the statement in "real time."

Van der Sloot then had to take a polygraph exam to test the truthfulness of his account, according to court documents.

Natalee Holloway, 18, went missing during a high school graduation trip to Aruba with classmates. She was last seen May 30, 2005, leaving a bar with van der Sloot, a Dutch citizen. The disappearance quickly became an international story.

Van der Sloot was extradited in June from Peru where he was in prison for killing another woman - to the United States to face trial on federal charges that he tried to extort money from Holloway's mother to reveal the location of her daughter's body.

Charles meets Kimathi's family: King Charles III on Wednesday held a private meeting with the family of the executed leader of the Kenyan rebellion against British colonial rule, a day after the monarch expressed "greatest sorrow and the deepest regret" for the violence of the colonial era.

The family of Dedan Kimathi, who was hanged by the British administration, and relatives of other well-known Kenyan freedom fighters didn't immediately comment a change from their past outspoken calls for an apology and compensation from Britain, along with any information on the whereabouts of Kimathi's body.

The British High Commission said only that the meeting was an "opportunity for the king to hear firsthand about the violence committed against Kenyans during their struggle for independence." Attendees included the chair of the Mau Mau War Veterans Association. (AP)

Extremists kill 37 villagers: Extremists in northeastern Nigeria killed at least 37 villagers in two different attacks, residents said Wednesday, highlighting once again how deadly islamic extremist rebels have remained in their 14-year insurgency in the hard-hit region.

The extremists targeted villagers in Yobe state's Geidam district on Monday and Tuesday in the first attack in the state in more than a year, shooting dead 17 people at first while using a land mine to kill 20 others who had gone to attend their burial, witnesses said.

The Boko Haram Islamic extremist group launched an insurgency in northeastern Nigeria in 2009 in an effort to establish their radical interpretation of Islamic law, or Sharia, in the region. At least 35,000 people have been killed and more than 2 million displaced due to the extremist violence concentrated in Borno state, which neighbors Yobe.

Nigeria's President Bola Tinubu, who took office in May, has not succeeded in ending the nation's security crises both in the northeast and in northwest and central regions where dozens of armed groups have been killing villagers and kidnapping travelers for ransom. (AP)

HEFEI, China: Hundreds, possibly thousands, of people gathered Thursday near a state funeral home in Beijing as China's former secondranking leader, Li Keqiang, was put to rest, while a steady stream of mourners showed their respects at the expremier's childhood home in central China.

Li, who was China's top economic official for a decade, died last Friday of a heart attack at age 68.

"The remains of Comrade Li Keqiang ... were cremated at the Babaoshan Revolutionary Cemetery in Beijing on Thursday," the official Xinhua News Agency reported.

State broadcaster CCTV showed President Xi Jinping accompanied by his wife, Peng Liyuan, bowing before Li's body, which was surrounded by greenery and covered with a Communist Party flag.

Xi was followed by the other six members of the all-powerful Politburo Standing Committee.

"Li was extolled as an excellent (Communist Party) member, a time-tested and loyal Communist soldier

CANBERRA, Australia: The host of a weekend family lunch at her Australian country home was charged with murdering three guests with poisonous mushrooms and attempting to murder a fourth who was left fighting for life,

police said on Thursday. Police arrested **Erin Patterson**, 49, earlier Thursday at her home in Leongatha in Victoria state where her former husband's parents Gail and Don Patterson, both aged 70, Gail Patterson's sister Heather Wilkinson, 66, and her husband Ian Wilkinson, 68, were invited for lunch on July 29.

All four guests were hospitalized the next day and only Ian Wilkinson survived.

Erin Patterson was also charged with three counts of attempting to murder her former husband Simon Patterson, 48, who became ill after eating three meals in 2021 and 2022, a police statement said.

He did not attend the July lunch with his parents, who both died.

Erin Patterson will remain in police custody until she appears in a local court on Friday, when she can potentially apply to be released on bail. Bail for murder is usually a decision referred to a higher court.

She has publicly denied any wrongdoing.





'Humans are no longer the only entities using human language'

Al-powered businesses pave way for legal compliance of 'artificial entities'

Only "persons" can engage with the legal system - for example, by signing contracts or filing lawsuits. There are two main categories of persons: humans, termed "natural persons," and creations of the law, termed "artificial persons." These include corporations, nonprofit organizations and limited liability companies (LLCs).

Up to now, artificial persons have served the purpose of helping humans achieve certain goals. For example, people can pool assets in a corporation and limit their liability vis-àvis customers or other persons who interact with the corporation. But a new type of artificial person is poised to enter the scene - artificial intelligence systems, and they won't necessarily serve human interests.

As scholars who study AI and law we believe that this moment presents a significant challenge to the legal system: how to regulate AI within existing legal frameworks to reduce undesirable behaviors, and how to assign legal responsibility for autonomous actions of AIs.

One solution is teaching AIs to be law-abiding entities. This is far from a philosophical question. The laws governing LLCs in several U.S. states do not require that humans oversee the operations of an LLC. In fact, in some states it is possible to have an LLC with no human owner, or "member" - for example, in cases where all of the partners have died. Though legislators probably weren't thinking of AI when they crafted the LLC laws, the possibility for zero-member LLCs opens the door to creating LLCs operated by AIs.

Many functions inside small and large companies have already been delegated to AI in part, including financial operations, human resources and network management, to name just three. AIs can now perform many tasks as well as humans do. For example, AIs can read medical X-rays and do other medical tasks, and carry out tasks that require legal reasoning. This process is likely to accelerate due to innovation and economic interests.

Humans have occasionally included nonhuman entities like animals, lakes and rivers, as well as corporations, as legal subjects. Though in some cases these entities can be held liable for their actions, the law only allows humans to fully participate in the legal system.

One major barrier to full access to the legal system by nonhuman entities has been the role of language as a uniquely human invention and a vital element in the legal system. Language enables humans to understand norms and institutions that constitute the legal framework. But humans are no longer the only entities using human language

known as the internal affairs doctrine, even if only one U.S. state allowed AI-operated LLCs, that entity could operate nationwide - and possibly worldwide. This is because courts look to the law of the state of incorporation for rules governing the internal affairs of a corporate entity

We believe the best path forward, therefore, is aligning AI with existing laws, instead of creating a separate set of rules for AI. Additional law can be layered on top for artificial agents, but AI should be subject to at least all the laws a human is subject to.

We suggest a research direction of integrating law into AI agents to help ensure adherence to legal standards. Researchers could train AI systems to learn methods for internalizing the spirit of the law. The training would use data generated by legal processes and tools of law, including methods of lawmaking, statutory interpretation, contract drafting, applications of legal standards and legal reasoning.

In addition to embedding law into AI agents, researchers can develop AI compliance agents - AIs designed to help an organization automatically follow the law. These specialized AI systems would provide third-party legal guardrails.

Researchers can develop better AI legal compliance by fine-tuning large language models with supervised learning on labeled legal task completions. Another approach is reinforcement learning, which uses feedback to tell an AI if it's doing a good or bad job - in this case, attorneys interacting with language models. And legal experts could design prompting schemes - ways of interacting with a language model - to elicit better responses from language models that are more consistent with legal standards.

If an LLC were operated by an AI, it would have to obey the law like any other LLC, and courts could order it to pay damages, or stop doing something by issuing an injunction. An AI tasked with operating the LLC and, among other things, maintaining proper business insurance would have an incentive to understand applicable laws and comply. Having minimum business liability insurance policies is a standard requirement that most businesses impose on one another to engage in commercial relationships.

Boursa Kuwait sees huge monthly decline in a year

GCC markets slip as Gaza conflict continues

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 2: A recent report from Kamco Invest reveals that, due to the ongoing conflict in Gaza, the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) stock markets experienced a third consecutive month of decline in October. This prolonged instability prompted investors to reduce their activities in the region, resulting in foreign investors becoming net sellers in GCC stock exchanges. This trend reflects concerns about the potential spread of geopolitical instability throughout the region, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

The decline in stock performance affected all GCC countries, causing all markets to enter the red zone during the same month. Qatar was the most severely impacted, with a monthly loss of 7.1 percent, followed by Dubai and Kuwait, which saw declines of 6.9 percent and 5.2 percent, respectively. The negative trend also affected the Morgan Stanley Gulf Index, which experienced a 4.4 percent decline during the month, marking its most significant drop in eight months. Consequently, the index has entered the red zone for the year-to-date, with a 7.2 percent loss and declines in four out of seven stock exchanges. Meanwhile, Dubai, Bahrain, and Saudi Arabia have managed to maintain positive performances since the beginning of the year, while Qatar and Kuwait have suffered doubledigit losses.

The Kuwait Stock Exchange recorded its most substantial monthly decline since October 2022, primarily influenced by the widespread downturn that affected most sectors globally and regionally. In terms of market indicators, the Main Market Index 50 led the decline with a 7.6 percent drop, reflecting a downturn in the constituent stocks. The Premier Market Index and the General Market Index both experienced a monthly decrease of 5.0 percent and 5.2 percent, respectively, while the Main Market Index declined by 5.6 percent during the month.

Regarding year-to-date perfor-mance in 2023, all Kuwaiti stock market indices ended the month in the red. The Premier Market Index decreased by 12.0 percent, the General Market Index fell by 10.4 percent, and the Kuwaiti Market Index dropped by 12.0 percent. In contrast, the Main 50 and the Main Market Index increased by 7.7 percent and 3.6

percent, respectively.

Looking at sectoral performance across GCC countries, nearly all sector indices were in the red during October 2023, with the excep-tion of the healthcare sector index. The pharmaceutical index suffered the most significant loss at 15.9 percent, followed by double-digit declines in the long-term goods and real estate sector indices, which recorded losses of 13.6 percent and 10.1 percent, respectively. The de-cline in the Gulf real estate sector index reflects the challenges faced by major regional stocks, as rising interest rates affected credit facilities for the sector in addition to geopolitical issues.

On the global stage, almost all major stock markets experienced a decline, primarily due to the hawk-ish stance adopted by central banks, which signaled higher long-term interest rates that could impact global economic growth. The MSCI World Index declined for the third consecutive month, falling by 3.0 percent in October 2023, indicating a widespread decline across the world's markets.

In terms of monthly stock performance, Rasiyat Holding Company showed the most significant gains with a 16.3 percent increa lowed by Unicap Investment and Finance and Sokouk Holding, which saw gains of 15.7 percent and 13.6 percent, respectively.

Consumer spending surges 0.4% in Sept

US consumer confidence index fell to 102.6

WASHINGTON, Nov 2, (AP): American consumers are feeling increasingly less confident these days as fears of an oncoming recession remain elevated.

The Conference Board, a business research group, said Tuesday that its consumer confidence index fell to 102.6 from 104.3 in September.

The index measures both Americans' assessment of current economic conditions and their outlook for the next six months.

The index measuring Americans short-term outlook for income, business and job market declined again, to 75.6 in October from 76.4 in September. Readings below 80 for future expectations historically signal a recession within a year.

"The continued skepticism about the future is notable given U.S. consumers - at least through the third quarter of this year - continued to spend heavily on both goods and services," said Dana Peterson, chief economist at The Conference Board.

Spending by consumers rose by a brisk 0.4% in September - even after adjusting for inflation and even as Americans face ever-higher borrowing costs. However, economists warn that such strong spending isn't likely to continue in the coming months, which would be bad news for businesses as the holiday shopping season ramps up.

Consumer spending accounts for around 70% of U.S. economic activity, so economists pay close attention to the mood of consumers to gauge how it may affect the broader economy.

Though they continue to spend, inflation, geopolitical conflicts and inflation remain at the forefront of American consumers' minds.

Confidence improved late in the spring as inflation eased in the face of 11 interest-rate hikes by the Federal Reserve. But the recent downturn reflects consumer anxiety over spending on non-essential goods, particularly if they have to put it on a high-interest rate credit card.

Consumers' view of current conditions also fell this month, to 143.1 from 146.2 in September.

US sees modest increase in job openings, reaching \$ 9.6 million

WASHINGTON, Nov 2, (AP): Employers posted 9.6 million job openings in September, up from 9.5 million in August and a sign that the U.S. job market remains strong even as the U.S. Federal Reserve attempts to cool the economy.

Layoffs fell, and the number of Americans quitting their jobs - a sign of confidence they can find better pay elsewhere - was virtually unchanged.

The September openings are down from a record 12 million in March 2022 but remain high by historical standards. Before 2021 - when the American economy began to surge from the COVID-19 pandemic - monthly job openings had never topped 8 million. Unemployment was 3.8% in September, just a couple of ticks above a half century low.

The Federal Reserve's inflation fighters would like to see the job market cool. They worry that strong hiring pressures employers into raising wages - and try-

ing to pass the higher costs along with price increases that feed inflation.

The Fed has raised its benchmark interest rate 11 times since March 2022 in an effort to contain inflation that hit a four-decade high in 2022. In September, consumer prices were up 3.7% from a year earlier, down from a peak 9.1% in June last year but still above the Fed's 2% target.

The combination of sturdy hiring, healthy economic growth and decelerating inflation has raised hopes the Fed can pull off a so-called soft landing raising rates just enough contain price increases without tipping the economy into recession.

The central bank is expected to announce later Wednesday that it will leave its benchmark rate unchanged for the second straight meeting as it waits to assess the fallout from its earlier rate hikes.

Brokerages to pay almost \$1.8 bln in damages

Real-estate industry facing blows to traditional rules setting agent commissions on home sales

LOS ANGELES, Nov 2, (AP): A series of court challenges seek to upend longstanding real estate industry practices that determine the commissions agents receive on the sale of a home - and who foots the bill.

A federal jury in one of those cases on Tuesday ordered the National Association of Realtors along with some of the nation's biggest real estate brokerages to pay almost \$1.8 billion in damages, after finding they artificially inflated commissions paid to real estate agents.

The class-action lawsuit was filed in 2019 on behalf of 500,000 home sellers in Missouri and some border towns. The verdict stated that the defendants "conspired to require home sellers to pay the broker representing the buver of their homes in violation of federal antitrust law."

If treble damages - which allows plaintiffs to potentially receive up to three times actual or compensatory damages - are awarded, then the defendants may have to pay more than \$5 billion.

"This matter is not close to being fi-nal as we will appeal the jury's verdict," Mantill Williams, a spokesman for the NAR, said in a statement. "In the interim, we will ask the court to reduce the damages awarded by the jury." Williams said it will likely be several

years before the case is resolved.

But already the NAR and several real estate brokerages are facing another lawsuit over agent commission rules. Fresh off winning the verdict in the 2019 case, the lawyers filed a new class-action lawsuit in the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Missouri that seeks class-action status covering anyone in the U.S. who sold a home in the last five years. It names the trade association and seven brokerage companies, including Redfin Corp., Weichert Realtors and Compass Inc.

"What's at issue nationwide is costing Americans about \$60 billion in extra real estate commissions," said Michael Ketchmark, one of the attorneys representing the plaintiffs in the lawsuits.

The focus of the lawsuits is an NAR rule that requires that home sellers offer to pay the commission for the agent representing the homebuyer when they advertise their property on a local Multi-

ple Listings Service, where a majority of U.S. homes are listed for sale. This is in addition to also having to cover the commission for their listing agent or broker.

The NAR's rules also prohibit a buyer's agent from making home purchase offers contingent on the reduction of their commission, according to the complaint.

"Defendants' conspiracy forces home sellers to pay a cost that, in a competi-tive market and were it not for defendants' anticompetitive restraint, would be paid by the buyer," the plaintiffs argued in the lawsuit filed Tuesday.

Plaintiffs also claim that the NAR requirement effectively keeps commissions for a homebuyer's agent artificially high.

If NAR's "Mandatory Offer of Compensation Rule" were not in place, then homebuyers would foot the bill for their agent's commission, which would open the door for competition - and lower commissions - among agents vying to represent a homebuyer, the plaintiffs contend.

The NAR argues that the practice of listing brokers making offers of compensation to buyer brokers is best for consumers.

"It gives the greatest number of buyers a chance to afford a home and professional representation, while also giving sellers access to the greatest number of buyers," Williams said.

The NAR spokesman also noted that the trade association's policies have always required that an offer of agent compensation be made without specifying an amount, adding that it could be as little as \$1 or even a penny.

In July, the independent Bright MLS, which covers some states in the eastern part of the country, changed the rules so that it's OK for a home listed in that region's MLS to not include an offer of agent compensation at all. That still falls within NAR's guidelines.

"In addition, regardless of the offer, those offers are always negotiable,' Williams said.

As home prices have soared in recent years, pushing the national median sales price to \$394,300 as of September, so have agents' commissions.

"Today, what effectively happens is the buyer agent's commissions are added to the sale price of the house, inflating the sale price," said Stephen Brobeck, senior fellow at the Consumer Federation of America.

Kenya is raising passenger fares on Chinese-built train

Kenya announced Wednesday a sharp increase in passenger fares on the Chinese-built Standard Gauge Railway as the country struggles with repaying loans owed to Beijing and others along with higher fuel prices. State-owned Kenya Railways

State-owned Kenya Railways said in a statement that the 470-kilometer (290-mile) journey between the port city of Mombasa and the capital, Nairobi, will cost around \$30 in first class, up from \$19, and \$10 in economy, up from \$6. Kenya Railways cited the

global rise in fuel prices: "This increase is informed by changes in the energy and petroleum sector, where prices of fuel have significantly increased, thus affecting the cost of our operations."

Wednesday's announcement came days after Kenya's central bank governor, Kamau Thugge, said the Kenyan shilling had for years been overvalued by 25%, which " led the country to maintain an artificially strong exchange rate."

Two weeks ago President William Ruto was in China, where he sought a \$1 billion loan to finish stalled infrastructure projects despite Kenya's overall debts at a record \$70 billion.

The new train fares come into effect on Jan. 1, 2024. (AP)

decline in sales of COVID-19 products clips revenue at Pfizer

Pfizer lost more than \$2 billion in the third quarter as an expected COVID-19 product sales decline clipped revenue.

Sales of the drugmaker's COVID treatment Paxlovid and the vaccine Comirnaty slid 97% and 70%, respectively, as Pfizer, like its competitors, switched to selling on the commercial market instead of to governments.

Both the company and ana-

lysts who follow it expected revenue from those key products to tumble this year before eventually rebounding as commercial sales take hold. But two weeks ago, Pfizer Inc. warned that sales of its COVID-19 drugs were weaker than it had expected, and it cut its annual revenue expectations by \$9 billion.

lion. Falling sales of both Paxlovid and Comirnaty also trimmed sales in the second quarter, but Pfizer said in August that it expected a rebound in the second half of 2023.

In the third quarter, the drugmaker booked a non-cash, \$5.6 billion charge for inventory writeoffs of the COVID products.

Outside those products, the drugmaker said its operational revenue grew 10%, helped in part by growth from its Prevnar pneumonia vaccines. (AP)

Auto strike deal will raise costs for Detroit's 'Big 3'

Will they be able to raise prices?

DETROIT, Nov 2, (AP): From generous pay and benefits to stronger job security, the United Auto Workers union won significant concessions in tentative settlements that have ended their strikes against Detroit's three automakers.

Now, General Motors, Ford and Stellantis are facing sharply higher labor costs, estimated by some analysts at exceeding \$1 billion per year, per company. The automakers will try to absorb those cost increases through expense reductions and efficiencies while still aiming to post strong enough profits to please Wall Street. In addition, analysts say, the companies will likely try to offset their cost increases by raising vehicle prices for consumers. How much they'll be able to do so, though, remains unclear. American auto buyers are already facing enormous price runups since the pandemic: The average new-car price has soared roughly 25% since the pandemic struck three years ago. Customers might assume that nonunion automakers, like Toyota, Tesla or Hyundai-Kia, will now be able to price their vehicles well below what the Detroit automakers can. But history shows that the nonunion companies will eventually feel compelled to raise their factory wages, too, in their effort to ward off the UAW's efforts to unionize their factories. As their own labor costs rise, they, too, would likely impose price increases. At the same time, the breadth of competition means that while GM, Ford and Stellantis will seek to raise vehicle prices, it might prove difficult to make significant price hikes stick "I don't think consumers will necessarily readily absorb all the price increases," said Jonathan Smoke, chief economist for Cox Automotive. "We are bound to see continued growth in discounting, which has just started to recover as supplies improve.' If approved by 146,000 union members, the settlements that ended the strikes mean that automakers will raise top assembly plant worker pay by more than 30% to around \$42 an hour by the time new contracts end in April of 2028. Lesssenior workers and temporary hires will receive much bigger increases. Ford estimates that the contract will raise labor costs by \$850 to \$900 per vehicle. All three automakers said they have taken steps to pare costs and become more efficient, having known for months that they would have to begin raising worker pay. But they also face huge capital expenses to develop and build electric vehicles as the world transitions from gasoline to battery power.

"When the dust settles from this UAW debacle, the Detroit auto stalwarts find themselves with a bigger cost profile with competition increasing," said Dan Ives, an analyst at Wedbush.

Natalie Knight, the chief financial officer of Stellantis, the parent company of Chrysler, Jeep and Ram, said her company has already pulled out of two auto shows in the United States to save on expenses.

"You can imagine that is not the end of our activities," Knight said Tuesday. "That's an issue for all of our business and something we are working very, very consciously on to LONDON, Nov 2, (AP): The Bank of England kept its main interest rate unchanged on Thursday at the 15-year high of 5.25% and indicated that borrowing costs will likely remain at these sort of elevated levels for a while, especially if oil and gas prices increase sharply in light of the conflict between Israel and Hamas.

In a statement, the bank's nine-member Monetary Policy Committee indicated that inflation, as measured by the consumer price index, is set to fall quite dramatically in the next month but will need time to get toward its 2% target rate over the coming year.

"We've held rates unchanged this month, but we'll be watching closely to see if further rate increases are needed," Bank of England Governor Andrew Bailey said.

Minutes to the meeting showed that three of the nine members of the policy committee backed a quarterpoint increase to 5.5% in order to push down harder on the inflation rate, which stood at 6.7% in the year to September.

In economic projections accompanying the decision, the bank said inflation is set to fall to below 5% in October as domestic energy bills fall. However, it cautioned that oil and gas prices may start to rise again in light of the Israel-Hamas war.

Officials had previously thought that inflation would return to the 2% target by the second quarter of 2025. But they revised the forecast on Thursday to say that inflation would remain above 2% until the final quarter of 2025.

The bank in September ended a nearly two-year run of interest rate rises. The U.S. Federal Reserve and the European Central Bank have also held interest rates over the past week.

The Bank of England, like other central banks,

raised interest rates aggressively from near zero as it sought to counter price rises first stoked by supply chain issues during the coronavirus pandemic and then Russia's invasion of Ukraine, which pushed up food and energy costs.

Higher interest rates, which cool the economy by making it more expensive to borrow and bearing down on spending, have contributed to bringing down inflation worldwide.

Though most economies have avoided falling into recession, fears remain that the British economy could start to see output shrinking in coming months, hardly the best backdrop for the governing Conservative Party ahead of a general election.

The bank predicted Thursday that a recession was unlikely but that growth will be modest, at best.

Privacy officials widen the ban on Meta's behavioral advertising to most of Europe

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov 2, (AP): European officials widened a ban on Meta's "behavioral advertising" practices to most of Europe on Wednesday, setting up a broader conflict between the continent's privacy-conscious institutions and an American technology giant.

Behavioral advertising, used by Meta's Facebook and Instagram among many other tech companies, involves observing individual behavior such as browsing habits, mouse clicks and app usage, then sing that data to build profiles for targeting ads. The decision by the European Data Protection Board represents a sharp escalation of a tussle that began in Norway, where privacy officials imposed a daily fine of 1 million kroner (roughly \$90,000) on Meta for obtaining that data without adequate consent. Those fines have been piling up since August 14.

nounced plans to give Europeans the opportunity to consent to data collection and, later this month, to offer an ad-free subscription service in Europe that will cost 9.99 euros (\$10.59) a month for access to all its products. The latest decision "unjustifiably ignores that careful and robust regulatory process," the company said in a statement following the European board's action.

Meta has been under fire over data privacy for some time. This year, computer chips started flowing before the strike, and companies were making more vehicles. Supplies increased, and by September, prices dropped to just under \$48,000, said Smoke, the Cox economist.

As factories crank back up after the strikes, Smoke foresees pressure on the companies to keep prices affordable, especially with auto loan rates around 10% driving up monthly payments. Discounts, he said, will likely have to come out of the automakers' profits.

Detroit's automakers, Smoke noted, have been jettisoning smaller, lower-cost vehicles for years and instead ramping up production of higher-profit trucks and SUVs that can cover their higher cost of labor.

At present, he said, U.S. auto dealers have more than 2.4 million vehicles on their lots, the highest supply since the spring of 2021. That means that competition for buyers is intensifying as pent-up demand from the pandemic wanes, making it difficult for any automaker to raise prices.

During the contract talks, UAW President Shawn Fain stressed that the Detroit automakers were making billions in profits and needed to share some of the profits with workers, who for years gave up pay raises and other benefits to help the automakers survive the aftermath of the Great Recession. Worker wages and benefits, Fain argued, make up only about 4% to 5% of a vehicle's costs and can be easily absorbed by the companies.

Ford, GM and Stellantis combined posted net income of \$24.5 billion during the first nine months of the year. (That doesn't include profits from Stellantis, which reports them only twice a year.) But if the Detroit companies report lower income, Wall Street will register its disappointment, and stock prices could fall.

Another force that could keep prices up, though, is wages for nonunion competitors. Art Wheaton, director of labor studies at Cornell University, said history has shown that foreign automakers with U.S. factories have raised wages after UAW contract agreements to try to prevent the union from unionizing their plants.

Countries at a UK summit make pledge to tackle AI's potentially 'catastrophic' risks

BLETCHLEY PARK, England, Nov 2, (AP): Delegates from 28 nations, including the U.S. and China, have agreed to work together to contain the potentially "catastrophic" risks posed by galloping advances in artificial intelligence.

The first international AI Safety Summit, held at a former codebreaking spy base near London, focused on cutting-edge "frontier" AI that some scientists warn could pose a risk to humanity's very existence.

British Prime Minister Rishi Sunak said the declaration was "a landmark achievement that sees the world's greatest AI powers agree on the urgency behind understanding the risks of AI - helping ensure the long-term future of our children and grandchildren."

But U.S. Vice President Kamala Harris urged Britain and other countries to go further and faster, stressing the transformations AI is already bringing and the need to hold tech companies accountable - including through legislation. In a speech at the U.S. Embassy, Harris said the world needs to start acting now to address "the full spectrum" of AI risks, not just existential threats such as massive cyberattacks or AI-formulated bioweapons.

"There are additional threats that also demand our action, threats that are currently causing harm and to many people also feel existential," she said, citing a senior citizen kicked off his health care plan because of a faulty AI algorithm or a woman threatened by an abusive partner with deep fake photos.

The ÅI Safety Summit is a labor of love for Sunak, a tech-loving former banker who wants the U.K. to be a hub for computing innovation and has framed the summit as the start of a global conversation about the safe development of AI. Harris was due to attend the summit on Thursday, joining government officials from more than two dozen countries including Canada, France, Germany, India, Japan, Saudi Arabia - and China, invited over the protests of some members of Sunak's governing Conservative Party.

Getting the nations to sign the agreement, dubbed the Bletchley Declaration, was an achievement, even if it is light on details and does not propose a way to regulate the development of AI. The countries pledged to work toward "shared agreement and responsibility" about AI risks, and hold a series of further meetings. South Korea will hold a mini virtual AI summit in six months, followed by an in-person one in France a year from now. Meta said it has cooperated with regulators and pointed to its an-

Bid to lessen Chinese influence

Yellen calls for more US-Latin America trade

WASHINGTON, Nov 2, (AP): Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen wants Latin America to trade more with the United States as part of an initiative that so far has failed to disrupt China's dominance in global manufacturing.

Still, U.S. efforts to diversify supply chains with "trusted partners and allies" including select South American nations have "tremendous potential benefits for fueling growth in Latin America and the Caribbean," Yellen said in a speech delivered Thursday.

Yellen kicked off an Inter-American Development Bank investment event on the sidelines of the inaugural Americas Partnership for Economic Prosperity Leaders' Summit, which will be hosted at the White House on Friday.

The heads of state of Peru, Chile, Ecuador, Uruguay, the Dominican Republic and Costa Rica were in attendance.

Yellen, who regularly talks about her friendshoring strategy for increasing supply chain resilience by working primarily with friendly nations as opposed to geopolitical rivals like China, laid out her vision of new U.S. investment in South America at the development bank on Thursday.

Latin American businesses "will increasingly have the chance to lead in new areas of clean energy, for example, helping create vertical supply chains by using locally extracted lithium in local battery production," Yellen said.

"Medical equipment and pharmaceutical companies can grow and innovate to meet increased demand," Yellen said, and skilled workers can produce automotive chips necessary for electric vehicles.

The Inter-American Development

Bank, which is the biggest multilateral lender to Latin America, would support new projects through grants, lending and new programs. The U.S. is the bank's largest shareholder, with 30% of voting rights.

Increasingly, policymakers in the U.S. have expressed concern about China's influence at the bank. While the Asian superpower holds less than 0.1% voting rights, it holds large economic stakes in some of the 48 member countries of the bank.

In 2022, Latin American and Caribbean trade with China rose to record levels, exporting roughly \$184 billion in goods to China and importing an estimated \$265 billion in goods, according to a Boston University Global Development Policy Center analysis.

And diplomatic relations between

Latin America and China have also increased. In March, Honduras cut diplomatic ties with Taiwan in favor of China, following the steps of El Salvador, Nicaragua, Panama and the Dominican Republic in turning their backs on Taiwan. China claims Taiwan as its own territory and has been increasingly sending ships and warplanes across the Taiwan Strait in an effort to intimidate the population of 23 million, who strongly favor the status quo of de-facto independence.

The IDB's president, Ilan Goldfajn, told The Associated Press that the U.S. is still a most influential member at the bank.

"Whenever we have a U.S. company in the bidding process, the probability of winning is 70 to 80%," he said. "So what we need is more U.S. companies involved. But if you're not involved, this opens the door for anybody" to invest in Latin America.

U.S. lawmakers this year proposed the Inter-American Development Bank Transparency Act, which would require the Treasury Department to issue a report every two years on the scope and scale of Chinese influence and involvement in all aspects of the bank, including a list of Chinese-funded projects and an action plan for the U.S. to reduce Chinese involvement at the bank. The bill has not moved out of committee.

Latin America will be a region of increased focus in the next year, as Brazil takes the presidency of the Group of 20 international forum. A Treasury official told the AP that Yellen will be traveling frequently to South America and Latin America over the next year, due to Brazil's G-20 presidency.

Derbez shines as Sergio in an uplifting educator story

Inspiring teacher drama 'Radical' breaks classroom barriers

LOS ANGELES, Nov 2, (AP): On their first day sixth grade, the students of Jose Urbina Lopez Elementary School in the Mexican border city of Matamoros find their new teacher rolling on the floor surrounded by overturned desks.

They're not desks, he exclaims. They're lifeboats.

So begins Christopher Zalla's "Radical," an inspirational based-on-a-true-story drama about an unconventional teacher named Sergio Juarez Correa (Eugenio Derbez). His day-one lesson is ultimately about buoyancy. But the metaphor isn't hard to grasp. In Lopez's classroom, education is a life raft.

"Radical," which opens in theaters Friday, is a conventional but stirring entry in the crowded canon of uplifting educator tales like "Stand and Deliver," "Lean on Me" and "The Class."

"Radical," though, isn't set at an inner-city school in Los Angeles, New Jersey or Paris, like those films are. Matamoros, along the Rio Grande and across from Brownsville, Texas, is considered a lawless place, known for extreme violence and migrant encampments. "Radical" is also set in 2011, among the bloodiest years of Mexico's drug war.

That makes for an especially unlikely backdrop for classroom revival. The school, itself, is known as "The School of Punishment." For safety, its gates are locked during the school hours. Sergio's self-empowering method is to allow kids to follow their curiosity and find answers for themselves. They're skeptical at first but soon are engaged and excited by their freedom to lead their own learning. More than once, Sergio says the students don't even really need him.

There are plenty of familiar beats as the school year moves along. Sergio's ways draw the ire of other teachers. Parents are distrustful, wondering if he's giving kids facing a harsh future false hope. But while "Radical," an audience winner at the Sundance Film Festival, is formulaic in its approach, it gets enough out of it likable cast to earn at least a passing grade.

Impression


Derbez, the Mexican actor and comedian, already made an impression in the classroom as the encouraging music teacher of the best picture-winning "CODA." Here, he takes center stage, playing Sergio with a winning sincerity and full-bodied resistance to the rules.

Three of the students are brought into focus: Paloma (Jennifer Trejo), a math whiz with astronaut dreams who lives beside the landfill her father works at; Lupe (Mia Fernanda Solis), a budding philosopher whose pregnant mother expects her to help with childcare; and Nico (Danilo Guardiola), a plucky kid who's being trained by a local dealer as a drug courier.

Their stories are never quite at the center of "Radical," which sticks closest to its star teacher. But each young actor is natural, particularly Trejo. Her real-life character, Paloma Noyola Bueno, was the central figure in a Wired article that "Radical" is partially derived from.

But the best relationship captured in "Radical" is the one between Sergio and the school's cautious, less energetic principal Chucho (a wonderful Daniel Haddad). He at first seems like an impediment to Sergio, warning him not to "kick the hornet's nest." But before long, he's a co-conspirator, willing to - in a further experiment on buoyancy - cannonball into a cold tub. Together, Derbez and Haddad help make "Radical" float, too.

LAS VEGAS: The former street gang leader charged with orchestrating the 1996 drive-by killing of **Tupac Shakur** in Las Vegas is expected to plead not guilty Thursday to murder, amid questions of whether he'll hire a defense lawyer or a judge appoints a public defender.

Duane Keith "Keffe D" Davis, who is described as the only person still alive who was in the vehicle from which shots were fired that night, killing Shakur, is due for arraignment in a Nevada courtroom despite losing his bid to hire local defense attorney Ross Goodman. Goodman spoke for Davis outside court two weeks ago, saying that prosecutors lack key evidence and witnesses to the killing committed 27 years ago. The attorney didn't give a reason Wednesday

why Davis couldn't hire him. Davis, 60, is originally from Compton, **California**. He was arrested Sept. 29 outside a home in suburban **Henderson** where Las Vegas police served a search warrant July 17, drawing renewed attention to the unsolved murder of one of hip-hop music's most enduring icons.

His indictment alleges Davis provided a gun to someone in the Cadillac from which car-to-car gunfire mortally wounded Shakur and wounded rap music mogul Marion "Suge" Knight at an intersection just off the Las Vegas Strip. Shakur died a week later at age 25.

Knight is now 58 and serving a 28-year prison sentence in California for the death of a Compton businessman in 2015.

Prosecutors allege that Shakur's killing in Las Vegas came out of a fierce rivalry between East Coast and West Coast groups for dominance in a musical genre then dubbed "gangsta rap," and followed a brawl at a Las Vegas Strip casino involving Shakur and Davis' nephew, **Orlando "Baby Lane" Anderson.** (AP)

Coppola turns her lens on US icon

LOS ANGELES, Nov 2, (AP): In her 25 years of making films, Sofia Coppola has always found the poetry behind the headlines, the banality in the glamour, the soul in the superficial. Her dreamy, lyrical portraits of girl culture and gilded cages have brought her to 18th century Versailles, 1970s suburban Michigan, the 1860s South, noughties Calabasas and modern-day Tokyo, West Hollywood and Manhattan.

In Priscilla Presley's 1985 memoir "Elvis and Me," Coppola saw something that was glamourous and wild, something that would provide an opportunity for beautiful filmmaking in a setting she had yet to explore - the world of 1960s American rock royalty. But even she was a little surprised to find in this wholly unrelatable tale something, well, relatable: A young woman, isolated, figuring out who she is, in the shadow of a powerful man.

"Priscilla," now playing in New York and Los Angeles and expanding nationwide Friday, emerged from a disappointment: Coppola's ambitious adaptation of Edith Wharton's "Custom of the Country" had fallen apart, and a friend encouraged her to dive into something else.

"(Priscilla) wasn't looking to make a movie out of the story," Coppola told The Associated Press in a recent interview. "But she said that because she liked my movies, she would let me do it."

Making a film about - and for - someone who is going to see it was a unique challenge. She wanted to do justice to her subject, while maintaining her creative expression. But the tension worked: "Priscilla" has landed Coppola some of her best reviews since "Lost in Translation," and already won her star, Cailee Spaeny, the best actress award from the Venice Film Festival.

"Priscilla" is a kind of culmination of all her previous experiences, both thematically and practically. Coppola learned some time ago that to have the true creative freedom she craved, she'd have to get creative in other ways, mostly with budgets and timelines. For "Priscilla," she had only 30 days to shoot a story that takes her heroine from Germany to Graceland, with detours in Las Vegas, Los Angeles and Palm Springs, and covers over a decade of an opulent and well-documented life, with many, many costumes.

"It's such a grand moment," Coppola said. "Our budget was pretty small for what we were trying to pull off."

Mostly, Coppola wanted it all to feel "big enough for her story."

This would involve a lot of "creative solutions" with her trusted filmmaking team, including cinematographer Philippe Le Sourd, production designer Tamara Deverell and costume designer Stacey Battat. They shot digitally instead of on film. To save some money on costumes without compromising quality, they enlisted the help of high-profile fashion houses: Chanel made the wedding dress while Valentino handled Elvis's knitwear and suits. They borrowed some walls from a just-wrapped Netflix show on a neighboring stage that Deverell then repurposed for a Vegas suite. They used platforms to cheat the height difference between Spaeny, who is 5'1", and Jacob Elordi, who is 6'5", and get them in frame together. They shot out of order: On some days, Spaeny was teenage Priscilla in the morning and adult, pregnant Priscilla after lunch.

Costume

And after many years of filming on location - among them Versailles, the Park Hyatt Tokyo, Bemelmans and the Chateau Marmont - for "Priscilla," Coppola had to build sets and "find Graceland in Toronto." The Graceland living room was even built to scale, though the ceiling was made taller for their Elvis.

"They were really building everything there and it was really fun to be working on a stage, almost like an old Hollywood studio, where the costume department was next to the props and the art department was building the Graceland gates," she said. "It's sort of that movie magic."

The Graceland set became a special place, too. One night, Coppola and her kids snuck into it and had a birthday cake in the dining room for her daughter's 16th birthday. When the production wrapped, the crew had champagne in the living room.

"There was something about making this movie where I just felt so in my element," she said. "It was hard work but I really had so much fun." She, Le Sourd and her actors also spent a lot of time in Elvis' bedroom, filming in the only place the characters ever really got to be alone. In the book, Presley writes that they would sometimes dabble in costumed role-play and document it with Polaroids. Though there are endless photographs and video footage of Elvis and Priscilla, those photographs have disappeared, Coppola said.

"I felt so lucky that I was able to ask her questions throughout the process. But with that scene, I had to ask her, like, 'What kind of costumes?" Coppola said with a smile. "You're trying to get inside, but not pry and still be polite. She kind of hesitated and was like, 'Well, you know, like secretary."

Presley's book, nearly 40 years old at this point, reveals things about Elvis that are, at best, unflattering. Everyone knows they met when she was 14 and he was 24. But his controlling and sometimes volatile behavior, dictating exactly what she looked like, what she was allowed to do and whom she was allowed to spend time with, might still come as a surprise to some. Before the film's premiere in Venice, Coppola said she wasn't making "Priscilla" for Elvis fans.

"I didn't mean it to be brazen," she said. "I was just getting pressured to cut out anything negative about him and I was being firm. I was really clear that I wanted to tell her story and that was my priority."

"I really didn't want to make him a villain," she continued. "I know she has so much love for him. And so much of the dark side of him comes from vulnerability and frustrations and to sort of show him as a human was important to me."

The Elvis Presley estate did not participate in "Priscilla" and did not let Coppola use any of his music though that just opened possibilities. She worked again with Phoenix, her husband Thomas Mars' band, used the Phil Spector-produced Ramones song "Baby I Love You" and, in a big coup, got Dolly Parton's permission to use "I Will Always Love You" for a pivotal moment.

The story also made Coppola think about her own mother, Eleanor Coppola, who was born nine years before Priscilla, and similarly struggled to find an outlet for her creative expression.

He's had other hits such as "U Got It Bad," "U Remind Me," "You Make Me Wanna" and "Love in the Club" - lots of material to cover during one of the year's biggest cultural moments. "Don't take the moments for granted because you only get 13 of them," said the singer, who is currently headlining his "Usher: My Way" sold-out residency in Las Vegas. "The hardest part is trying to figure out how to squeeze it all in when you actually have a large catalog, or a lot of records people celebrate and love." (AP)

'The Woman In Me' Spears' new tell-all book gets personal

LOS ANGELES, Nov 2, (AP): **Britney Spears**' highly anticipated memoir "The Woman in Me" released recently, revealing the pop superstar's personal take on events that have played out publicly in her decades as one of the most scrutinized figures in American life, along with private moments that she previously kept under wraps.

The book, which The Associated Press obtained a copy of, details her childhood and rise to stardom, along with her marriages, her nearly-14-year court conservatorship and even a brief mention of a July incident where she was hit in the face by security for NBA player Victor Wembanyama. Much of "The Woman in Me" focuses on the fa-



ther and sons, the husbands and boyfriends, who have dominated her life, for better and for worse. Several chapters are devoted to her relationship with Justin Timberlake, including deeply personal details about a pregnancy, abortion and painful breakup. In others she chronicles her custody fight with ex-husband Kevin Federline, and how it fueled what was viewed as a public meltdown.

Spears

Spears speaks much less of recent events, making no mention of her pending divorce from Sam Asghari, whom she describes as holding her hand while she addressed a judge during a key hearing that freed her from court control in 2021.

In the opening dedication, she writes simply, "For my boys, who are the loves of my life."

Here are some of the details revealed in "The Woman in Me":

For a period at the turn of the millennium, Spears and Timberlake were America's it couple. As Spears writes, they were in love - but purity was a facade. "There were a couple of times during our relationship when I knew Justin had cheated on me. Especially because I was so infatuated and so in love, I let it go, even though the tabloids seemed determined to rub my face in it," she writes.

Relationship

Although Spears was painted in the press as the unfaithful one, she says she only stepped out on the relationship once, to kiss choreographer Wade Robson, confirming a long-speculated rumor.

She also writes of her pregnancy and Timberlake's dismay, first reported in excerpts published by People earlier this week.

"I'm sure people will hate me for this, but I agreed not to have the baby. Abortion was something I never could have imagined choosing for myself, but given the circumstances, that is what we did," she writes.

They decided she would not go to a doctor or hospital: "It was important that no one find out about the pregnancy or the abortion, which meant doing everything at home," she writes, adding that they didn't tell her family.

She describes the physical pain of the medication abortion as "excruciating."

"I kept crying and sobbing until it was all over." she writes. "It took hours, and I don't remember how it

Lewis takes his music to Broadway

NEW YORK, Nov 2, (AP): Huey Lewis, who with his band The News stormed radio in the 1980s with such rock-pop hits as "The Power of Love" and "I Want a New Drug," is about to take his music to a Broadway stage.

Lewis and executive producer Hunter Arnold tell The Associated Press that the jukebox musical "The Heart of Rock & Roll" - constructed from Lewis' songs - will play the James Earl Jones Theatre starting March 2024, capping more than 10

Music supervisor and orchestrator Brian Usifer has reworked the tunes for a word-driven show, and the production will feature a book by Jonathan A. Abrams. Alongside Hunter as producers are Tyler Mitchell, who initially proposed a show based on the band's music, and Kayla Greenspan. Casting will be announced later.

The story centers on a blue-collar guy who used to be in a rock band in his 20s. He finds himself in his 30s prepared to take the leap to middle"Finally Found a Home," "Walking on a Thin Line" and "The Heart of Rock & Roll."

Lewis was an unlikely pop star, with earnest and sweet songs that verged on corny, delivered by a singer substantially older than his counterparts on the charts. "It's the weirdest thing because the man who defied the '80s in many ways now also defines the '80s," said Arnold.

"I think more than ever, people are looking for something that makes them feel hopeful, happy. Nostalgia

ended, but I do, twenty years later, remember the pain of it, and the fear."

The song that launched Spears' solo career, "... Baby One More Time" was directly inspired by Soft Cell's "Tainted Love." Spears was listening to it the night before she was going in to record with famed Swedish producer Max Martin (who Spears describes simply as "magic.") She wanted to mimic the English synthpop duo's sound, so she stayed up late, giving her voice the fried, raspy tone that would become iconic.

The concept for the music video, too, was her idea. Jive Records wanted her to "play a futuristic astronaut," she writes. "I told the executives at the label that I thought people would want to see my friends and me sitting at school, bored, and then as soon as the bell rang, boom-we'd start dancing.'

She says Timberlake broke up with her via text message while making his 2002 solo debut album, "Justified."

"He started being very standoffish with me. I think that was because he'd decided to use me as ammunition for his record, and so it made it awkward for him to be around me starting at him with all that affection and devotion," she writes.

In the period following the breakup, Spears became isolated, writing that she experienced 'serious social anxiety

She found herself living in an apartment alone in New York for a few months, rarely leaving. (One of her few visitors? Madonna, who dreamt up their 2003 kiss at the MTV Video Music Awards as a reclamation of personal autonomy.)

Not long after, Spears felt pressured by her father to do what would become an infamous interview with Diane Sawyer, in which the host pushed her to explain what she did to Justin Timberlake to cause him "so much pain.'

Sadness

"I felt like I had been exploited," she writes, "set up in front of the whole world.

In 2004, Spears married dancer Kevin Federline and they had two sons together. After the children were born, she says she suffered from perinatal depression, displaying symptoms of sadness, anxiety and fatigue.

"Being a new mom is challenge enough without trying to do everything under a microscope," she writes. "With Kevin away so much, no one was around to see me spiral-except every paparazzo in America.'

The couple divorced in 2007.

Spears describes what she calls a "SWAT team" bursting into a bathroom where she was holding 16-month-old son Jayden, instead of returning him to Federline as required. The moment in January 2008 led to her being hospitalized on a 72-hour psychiatric hold and was a major factor in the establishment of a court conservatorship that took over her life.

She said that amid a custody battle, she felt that Federline and his lawyers were keeping her kids from her for longer and longer stretches. She had already put 2-year-old Sean Preston in the car of a security guard who had come to get him when she became "terrified that I wouldn't get the kids again if I gave them back.'

That's when she fled to the bathroom.

An attorney for Federline did not immediately respond to an email seeking comment.

Other moments in her slide toward the conservatorship became were anything but private, and Spears gives her take with a degree of emotion previously kept in check by those surrounding her.

Event to highlight radiation exposure dangers and prevention

MoH to hold an awareness day on radiation protection

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 2: The Radiation Protection Department at the Ministry of Health is organizing an awareness day on Tuesday at the Ministry of Health headquarters in Sulaibikhat to celebrate the World Day for Radiation Protection and Medical Physics.

In this regard, the Chief Nuclear Medicine Specialist and Head of the Organizing Committee for the Awareness Day for Radiation Protection and Medical Physics Dr. Hanan Awad Al-Dousari affirmed the keenness of the Ministry of Health, represented by the Radiation Protection Department, to celebrate this occasion every year to raise awareness about the dangers of exposure to radiation through the distribution of awareness leaflets and brochures about the sources and types of radiation and ways to prevent it.

In a special press statement, Dr. Al-Dousari explained that international organizations and departments of medical physics and radiation around the world celebrate the International Day of Medical Physics on November 7 every year, in appreciation and respect for the Polish scientist Marie Curie, who won two Nobel Prizes for Chemistry for her discovery of the elements radium and polonium. She was the first person to receive two Nobel Prizes in two different fields.

The awareness day this year includes many levels, including awareness of radiation and ways to protect from it, awareness of the importance of specializing in medical, radiation and nuclear physics and their fields, and the importance of radiation protection management and the services it provides to the workers in the Ministry of Health, health and industrial facilities, factories, private hospitals, and others.

There are two types of radiation - natural radiation, which comes from the universe such as food, soil, and other things, and man-made radiation, which is used in the medical and industrial fields and other fields.

As for medical physics, it includes many types, such as radiation therapy physics, nuclear medicine physics, diagnostic radiology physics, magnetic resonance physics, health physics, ultrasound physics, and others.

The basics of radiation protection are based on three axes: time, distance, and shielding (protective shield).

The smaller the distance between people and the radioactive source, the less radiation exposure, and vice versa. The longer the duration of radiation exposure, the greater the radiation exposure.

Shielding against radiation varies according to the radioactive material, such as lead, iron, or others.

She went on to explain that the Radiation Protection Department - the regulating body includes four basic departments:

1. The Department of Environmental Protection from Radiation, which is specialized in taking samples of soil, water and air to ensure that the air is free of pollution.

2. The Calibration and Radiation Exposure Measurement Department, which is concerned with measuring radiation doses for employees working with radiation on a monthly basis to ensure that the employee is exposed to the internationally permissible radiation limit.

3. The Ionizing Radiation Licensing and Inspection Department, which is responsible for obtaining licenses for all private and public establishments that work in radiation, as well as licenses for workers in this field.

4. The Department of Non-Ionizing Radiation Licensing and Inspection, which specializes in inspection campaigns to ensure radiation safety, implement all laws and principles of ra-

'Early detection linked to long-term survival rates'

Increased awareness key to fighting breast cancer

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 2: The Women's Voluntary Association for Community Development emphasized the importance of spreading awareness among segments of society, especially women, about the importance of early detection, the risk factors that increase the possibility of breast cancer, ways to prevent it, and changing behavioral patterns to serve the purpose of performing early detection tests.

In a speech during the awareness symposium organized by the association yesterday with the cooperation of the Cancer Awareness Nation (CAN) campaign, Chairman of the Board of Directors Sheikha Fadia Saad Al-Abdullah Al-Salem Al-Sabah said breast cancer awareness is an attempt to raise awareness and reduce the stigma of breast cancer by identifying its symptoms and treatment.

She expressed hope that such awareness-raising events would increase knowledge, which in turn would lead to early detection of breast cancer, as it is associated with higher long-term survival rates, and improve the availability and accessibility of early detection services.

Sheikha Fadia called for the need to raise the level of awareness among society about breast cancer and its prevention, ensure the development of cooperation frameworks and partnerships between various parties, and work to create a supportive environment to provide the necessary data to make sound decisions about early detection tests for breast cancer.

Integrate

She said, "In order to combat these diseases, the efforts of civil society institutions and public benefit associations must be combined with governmental and private agencies to integrate health into all policies within the concept of shared responsibility."

Meanwhile, the Secretary of the association Dr. Mona Al-Qattan affirmed the keenness of the association to carry out its societal role and cooperate with various parties to spread health awareness among members of society. She stressed that women's health is a priority for the association, which is represented in its awareness programs and the promotion of breast cancer screening campaigns.

System

Dr. Al-Qattan highlighted the importance of the role of civil society as an essential partner in the development process, as participation is no longer just a choice, but rather a requirement in light of the current challenges, adding that participation between the tripartite system (the state, the private sector, and civil society organizations) has become a basic and urgent necessity.

In this regard, an oncologist at the Breast Oncology Unit at the Kuwait Cancer Control Center Dr. Rehab Sayed said, "Cancerous tumors occur when some breast cells start growing in an abnormal way and these cells mutate more quickly than healthy cells and continue to accumulate and form a mass or tumor. The cells may spread through the breast to the lymph nodes or to other parts of the body. Most of the causes of breast cancer are unknown, and a small percentage is due to genetic factors, but there are reasons that may increase the chance of developing breast cancer, such as excess weight, hormones, smoking, and alcohol, a sedentary lifestyle and unhealthy food, all of which may also increase the chance of infection.

Women are more susceptible to breast cancer than men. With age, the chance of infection increases. The presence of a medical history of problems or diseases related to the breast, previous infection with breast cancer, and a family history of the disease increase the probability of contracting it, which requires an annual mammogram test to detect any small lumps.

Survival rates for breast cancer patients have increased, and the number of deaths associated with this disease has decreased on a regular basis. This is mostly due to a number of factors such as early detection, adopting a new treatment method that takes into account the condition of each patient, and improving our level of understanding of the nature of this disease."

Lakers hold off Clippers in OT to snap 11-game losing streak

Celtics rout Pacers 155-104 to remain unbeaten

LOS ANGELES, Nov 2, (AP): LeBron James had 35 points and 11 rebounds, Austin Reaves scored seven of his 15 points in overtime and the Los Angeles Lakers snapped an 11-game losing streak against the Los Angeles Clippers with a 130-125 victory Wednesday night.

D'Angelo Russell scored 27 points and Anthony Davis had 27 points and 10 rebounds for the short-handed Lakers, who beat their local rivals for the first time since July 2020 in the Florida bubble. The 17-time NBA champion Lakers hadn't beaten the Clippers on the Lakers' home court at their shared arena since Christmas 2016, losing 11 in a row.

With James Harden watching in street clothes on the Clippers' bench after his trade from Philadelphia, Kawhi Leonard scored 38 points in the Clippers' second loss of the young season. Paul George scored 20 of his 35 points in the fourth quarter, including eight points in the final minute, before fouling out 30 seconds into overtime.

Although the Lakers used just eight players due to five significant injury absences, they rallied from an early 19-point deficit before blowing an eight-point lead in the final 90 seconds of regulation.

George, who had six 3-pointers, hit three free throws with 17 seconds left to tie it. Russell had an open shot at the buzzer, but missed.

Swiatek beats Gauff at WTA Finals

CANCUN, Mexico, Nov 2, (AP): U.S. Open champion Coco Gauff doublefaulted four times in a row while serving for the second set and wound up losing 6-0, 7-5 to four-time major title winner Iga Swiatek in round-robin action at the WTA Finals on a windy Wednesday night.

She said the wind didn't help things, nor did a recent break of about two weeks without serving because of a shoulder injury.

There were plenty of empty seats at the temporary hard court - and Swiatek noticed.

The WTA's decision to host the event in Cancun was not announced until September.

In the other singles match on Day 4 at the season-ending championship - which is for the top eight players in women's tennis - three-time major runner-up Ons Jabeur defeated Wimbledon champion Marketa Vondrousova 6-4, 6-3. Jabeur lost to Vondrousova in the final at the All England Club in July.

TENNIS

Jabeur, a Tunisian who was the first Arab woman to reach a Grand Slam singles final, told the crowd after her win Wednesday that she will donate part of her prize money "to help the Palestinians. ... It is not a political message. It is humanity. I want peace in this world."

Israel has been carrying out military operations in Gaza in response to the attack by Hamas on a Jewish holiday last month.

The two women who will advance to the semifinals from this group will be determined Friday, when Swiatek (who is 2-0 so far) faces Jabeur (1-1), and Gauff (1-1) meets Vondrousva (0-2)

 On Wednesday, Gauff led 4-2 in the second set, then was a game away from forcing a third while serving at 5-4. The teenager from Florida went up 15-love, then dropped the game with the series of double-faults. After the fourth, Gauff spiked her racket, then picked it up and tossed it at her bench as she walked to the sideline.

That was part of a stretch in which the American lost nine points in a row and 12 of the last 13 against Swiatek, who improved to 9-1 against Gauff.

PARIS, Nov 2, (AP): Novak Djokovic demonstrated his desire to finish the season as the No. 1 men's player for a record eighth time by beating Tomas Martin Etcheverry 6-3, 6-2 in the second round of the Paris Masters on Wednesday.

Djoković was competing in his first singles match since mid-September when he played for Serbia in the group stage of the Davis Cup.

"At the beginning of the match, it was a bit difficult for me to find the rhythm," the top-seeded Djokovic said on court, "but at the end of the second set, it was really good."

Djokovic won five straight games to take the opening set with an ace and lead 2-0 in the second set.

The Serbian player only faced one break point that he saved with a forehand cross-court winner at 1-0 in the second set.

A six-time champion at the Paris Masters, Djokovic increased his lead to 5-1 before converting his third match point when Etcheverry netted a backhand.

Djokovic can widen the gap with No. 2 Carlos Alcaraz in the race for the year-end top spot after the Spaniard lost to qualifier Roman Safiullin on Tuesday.

TENNIS

Alcaraz is the only player who can overtake Djokovic after Daniil Medvedev dropped out of contention after he was beaten by Grigor Dimitrov 6-3, 6-7 (4), 7-6 (2) earlier Wednesday.

Djokovic had racked up 500 more points than Alcaraz this season before the Paris Masters.

Djokovic won't be able to clinch the year-end No. 1 spot in Paris since Alcaraz still gets 10 points for his second-round defeat.

There are 1,000 points for the Paris Masters winner and 1,500 points for a perfect run at the ATP Finals.

Djokovic holds the men's record with seven year-end No. 1 finishes, one more than Pete Sampras. Women's tennis great Steffi Graf holds the record with eight.

"Of course, my greatest motivation is still love for the game. I really like competing. So, as simple as that," Djokovic had told a news conference on Saturday. "And then, you know, I always have goals, you know, and to win another slam, to be No. 1 again, to finish the year as No. 1. Those are let's say the big goals."

Medvedev was booed off the court after remonstrating with the crowd during the match.

The crowd got under Medvedev's skin in the 11th game of the second set, jeering him as he was about to serve after he had thrown his racket. The third-ranked Russian went back to his chair and complained to the referee before talking directly to the spectators in French.

"If there's one who whistles, I don't play," Medvedev told the crowd.

"You don't whistle, I play. So, you shut your mouths."

From that moment, the crowd overwhelmingly threw its support behind Dimitrov, and Medvedev appeared to make a rude hand gesture toward some spectators as he walked off the court after the loss.

"I play in Bercy much better when there is no crowd at all in attendance," Medvedev joked afterward, referring to winning the Paris Masters title in 2020 during the pandemic in an empty arena. "That's the only time I won the tournament."

Dimitrov lost to Medvedev in the second round of the Erste Bank Open in Austria last week, but the Bulgarian hit 45 winners on Wednesday compared to 22 for the Russian, who double-faulted eight times.

Dimitrov whipped a forehand passing shot to break for a 4-2 lead in the final set but he failed to serve out the match at 5-3 as Medvedev saved four match points, including one 47-shot rally.

Medvedev saved two more match points on his serve at 6-5 but Dimitrov jumped out to a 5-0 lead in the decisive tiebreaker and converted his seventh match point with a forehand volley.

Meanwhile, the 12th-seeded Tommy Paul can no longer qualify for the ATP Finals after losing to qualifier Botic Van de Zandschulp 6-4, 2-6, 6-3. Stefanos Tsitsipas, Hubert Hurkacz and Alex de Minaur stayed in contention for the three remaining spots at the eight-man tournament that will be played in Turin from Nov. 12-19.

Before the Paris Masters, Djokovic, Alcaraz, Medvedev, Jannik Sinner and Andrey Rublev had already qualified for the ATP Finals.

American team top wrestling medal table

Oly medalist Snyder leads US wrestlers to gold medal sweep at Pan Am Games

SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov 2, (AP): Two-time Olympic medalist Kyle Snyder led the United States wrestling team to four Pan American gold medals on Wednesday, the first day of the event in Santiago. The 27-year-old, one of the top athletes competing in Chile, easily won all his bouts to secure his third consecutive continental title.

The star wrestler's teammates came close to dominating just as much, and just like Snyder they are likely to secure a spot in the Paris Olympics next year and fight for medals there, too. The athlete from Maryland was Olympic champion in Rio de Janeiro in 2016 and won silver in Tokyo in 2021.

Snyder later said he had his mind in 2024 as soon as he won the final

in Chile.

Snyder has been affected by injuries during the current Olympic cycle, but still won three world championship medals recently. He is currently riding the longest Olympic and World medal streak in American history; nine in a row since 2015.

Later, the 24-year-old Mason Parris, a bronze medalist in this year's world championships, beat Venezuela's José Díaz 2-0 in the 125-kilogram category. Despite the tight score, the American faced little risk of losing; his opponent clearly played for a late takedown, but failed.

When asked about being teammates with Snyder, Parris' face immediately lit up.

The 29-year-old Zane Richards brought the U.S. its third gold medal in wrestling with a 10-0 victory over Venezuela's Óscar Tigreros in the 57-kilogram category. The last final of the day had

The last final of the day had 27-year-old Tyler Berger topping Cuba's Franklin Marén 3-0 in the 74-kilogram category.

The U.S. team finished first in the wrestling medal table in the past two editions of the continent's largest multi-sports event, in Toronto and in Lima. Cuba came out on top in the sport's medal table at the 2011 Pan American Games in Guadalajara.

TEHRAN, Iran, Nov 2, (AP): Iranian soccer team Sepahan were penalized with a 3-0 loss and a fine over a canceled Asian Champions League match against Saudi Arabia's Al Ittihad, Iranian media reported.

MANCHESTER, England, Nov 2, (AP): Manchester United's season descended deeper into crisis after a 3-0 home loss against Newcastle ended their defense of the League Cup and heaped more pressure on Defeat in the round-of-16 game was United's eighth loss in all competitions this season and the latest blow for English soccer's It is 10 years since United were last competing for club soccer's biggest prizes when they won the Premier League title in former manager Alex Ferguson's final season. The wait to return to their former glories looks as far away now as at any point since then, with their current form pointing toward another season of

disappointment. The League Cup may not be a priority for a club of United's stature, but it provided Ten Hag's finest moment in the job when in February he

led the team to the trophy by beating Newcastle at Wembley Stadium and ended their six-year wait for silverware. That is a distant memory as United's season continues to slide.



United suffered a 3-0 loss at home to Manchester City in the Premier League on Sunday, and Saudibacked Newcastle's repeat of that scoreline raises further questions for Ten Hag.

The Dutch coach, who won three league titles with Ajax, was mocked by Newcastle's fans throughout the game as they chanted that he would be fired in the morning. While there has been no suggestion Ten Hag's position is under threat, United's poor form is of growing concern.

After the game he described himself as "a fighter," adding he was confident he would overcome a troubled start to the campaign.

Newcastle were too much of a challenge y as first-half goals from substitute Miguel Almiron and Lewis Hall put the visitors in control by the break and Joe Willock completed the scoring after an hour.

Defeat came despite Ten Hag naming a starting lineup that had cost around half a billion dollars even without \$82 million off-season signing Rasmus Hojlund, as well as Bruno Fernandes and Marcus Rashford.

By the time those players were called for in an attempt to turn the game around in the second half, Ten Hag had fielded around \$720 million of talent

It made little difference to the outcome.

United had offered little penetration in the first half and went behind in the 28th minute after being caught on the break. Alejandro Garnacho lost possession in Newcastle's half, which gave Tino Livramento the chance to burst forward and find the run of Almiron, who beat Andre Onana from inside the box.

The lead was doubled eight minutes later, with United once again guilty of creating problems for itself.

Indecisiveness at the back eventually led to Harry Maguire tamely heading Willock's cross from the left. His clearance only went as far as the edge of the area, where Hall was waiting to volley through a crowd of players and into the bottom corner.

Ten Hag made changes at halftime, notably taking off his captain Casemiro. But Newcastle extended

its lead when Willock carried the ball to the edge of the area and swept a low shot past Onana.

Newcastle now travel to Chelsea in the quarterfinals.

Chelsea put their troubles in the league behind them with a 2-0 win against second division Blackburn.

Defeat against Brentford over the weekend left the London club in 11th place in the standings and facing a fight to challenge for Champions League qualification. But manager Mauricio Pochettino moved a step closer to his first trophy in charge as goals from Benoit Badiashile and Raheem Sterling secured the win against Blackburn at Stamford Bridge.

Everton are also finding joy in this competition. While they look like being another league battle for survival for the Merseyside club, they saw off Burnley 3-0 at Goodison Park and now face a home match against Fulham in the quarterfinals. Fulham secured their place in the last eight with a 3-1 win against second division Ipswich.

Darwin Nunez scored a 70thminute winner as Liverpool won 2-1 at Bournemouth. Jurgen Klopp's team won the competition in 2022 and are back in the hunt for more silverware after ending last season trophyless.

Liverpool are the highest-ranked team left in the cup and next host West Ham, which beat Arsenal 3-1.

There will be a team from outside of the Premier League in the semifinals after third division Port Vale was drawn against second-tier Middlesbrough.

MUMBAI, India, Nov 2, (AP): India became the first team to secure a semifinal spot at the Cricket World Cup after Mohammed Siraj bowled a stellar opening spell to help the hosts dismantle Sri Lanka for a 302-run win on Thursday.

Siraj took three wickets for nought in the first seven balls as Sri Lanka lost their first four wickets for just three runs within 19 deliveries.

Mohammed Shami then took four wickets in three overs in his opening spell, as Sri Lanka were bowled out for 55 runs in 19.4 overs. That was after Shubman Gill's 92 and a quick-fire 82 off 56 balls from Shreyas Iyer helped India reach 357-8. It was the second biggest margin of victory in World Cup history.

Shami finished with 5-18 in five

overs, his second five-wicket haul in this tournament. Siraj finished with 3-16 in seven overs.

Virat Kohli also scored 88 runs, and he and Gill put on 189 for India's second wicket. It was the highest team score without an individual hundred in a World Cup.

India rose atop the points' table with a perfect record after seven games and are the only unbeaten side in the tournament. They will play their semifinal at the same venue on Nov. 15, unless they meet archrivals Pakistan in the last four - in which case the game would be played in Kolkata on Nov. 16.

With a fifth defeat in seven games, Sri Lanka still have a mathematical chance of reaching the semifinals by winning its remaining two games, but will also need other results going their

way. Siraj's stunning opening spell began with Jasprit Bumrah sending back opener Pathum Nissanka for a first-ball duck, out lbw. He then trapped Dimuth Karunaratne lbw for a golden duck, Sadeera Samarawickrama was caught at slip for a four-ball duck, while Kusal Mendis was bowled for one run.

The scorecard read an astonishing 3-4 after 3.1 overs - the joint lowest total for the top four batsmen in ODIs, matching Pakistan's one run against West Indies in 2015.

Sri Lanka's problems weren't over yet, as India deployed Shami at the other end and he picked up three wickets in his first nine deliveries.

Charith Asalanka was out for one, while Dushan Hemantha and Dushmantha Chameera were caught behind without troubling the scorers.

Only Angelo Mathews managed more than a run amongst the first eight batsmen, and then reached double digits, scoring 12 off 25 balls.

The 1996 champions were down to 14 runs for six wickets in 9.4 overs. It became 22-7 in 11.3 overs, and Shami then bowled Mathews to make it 29-8 in 13.1 overs. Five Sri Lankan batsmen were out for a duck, and only three managed to reach double digits.

Shami picked up his fifth wicket as Kasun Rajitha was caught at slip, making him India's leading bowler in World Cups with 45 wickets. He went past Javagal Srinath and Zaheer Khan, both with 44 wickets.

Put into bat, India had made a poor start as Dilshan Madushanka stunned the Wankhede into silence by bowling Rohit Sharma for four off the second ball of the Indian innings.

Milan's American owner Gerry Cardinale met with Ibrahimović on two successive days in September and could be set for further talks when Cardinale returns to the city for Tuesday's Champions League match against Paris Saint-Germain.

So the Rossoneri are gearing up for a crucial week on an off the field as they look to turn their form around.

Milan started October top of Serie A but have now slipped to third place - albeit only three points behind league leaders Inter Milan. They struggled to a narrow 1-0 win at promoted Genoa, lost at home to Juventus and then gave up a two-goal lead to draw 2-2 at Napoli.

They should find things easier on Saturday against lowly Udinese, which are one of only two teams yet to win a match in Serie A this season.

But coach Stefano Pioli will have to decide whether to take the risk of resting some players ahead of the match against PSG three days later in the Champions League, where the situation is even more dire.

Milan have yet to record a win or even score a goal in Europe this season and sit bottom of Group F with just two points. They lost 3-0 in Paris last week.

After that loss - which came just three days after the defeat to Juventus - Milan appeared to have bounced back when it took a 2-0 lead at halftime in Naples with two goals from Olivier Giroud but it ended up with just a point.

Giroud clearly showed his frustration when he was substituted with nine minutes remaining. The veteran France forward yelled out "no" and hit his hands on his legs as he looked at Pioli before walking off and sitting on an ice box next to the bench for the rest of the match.

Teammate Rafael Leão also reacted angrily toward the coach when he was taken off at the same time.

Pioli's job doesn't appear to be at risk at the moment, although anything but a win over Udinese could change matters.
