Kuwait is tweeting out of the flock

A FEW days ago, the United Arab Emirates, as part of the legal system that it established over the past years to seek the services of geniuses, talented people and investors, granted its citizenship to the artist Ahmad Al-Owainan.

The Vice President of the UAE and the Ruler of Dubai Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid announced that the UAE opens its doors to everyone who has a talent. He wrote, "Under the directives of the President of the State, the Council of Ministers approves an amendment to the executive regulations of the Citizenship Law and allows the granting of citizenship and Emirati passports to investors, talented people, and those with specialized professions.

The UAE revealed that it is in the process of granting citizenship to neurologist Dr. Hamad Al-Enzi with four other distinguished Kuwaiti "Bedoun" individuals.

In this regard, the UAE, a few years ago, also approved granting golden residency to high school graduates and their families, as well as made room for foreigners to own real estate there.

All of this increased its GDP to AED 1.623 trillion during the year 2022, and the non-oil output amounted to AED 1.174 trillion. This is evidence of the presence of a fixed vision related to state management, which seeks to develop and not close in on itself.

In the Emirates and other Gulf countries except Kuwait, there is no such thing as "foreigner complex". Everyone works according to the law, and facilities are granted to those who seek development and progress.

Saudi Arabia, which is the largest population bloc among the Gulf states, made room for foreign ownership and provided facilities to investors. Qatar began strengthening its workforce through benefits offered to residents, as did Bahrain and the Sultanate of Oman.

In these countries, there is a state project with its own system that everyone is working on at a steady pace. Kuwait, on the other hand, does not benefit from the capabilities it has, and does not allow any initiative from outside to enter. A pathetic decision has been imposed on experienced residents in Kuwait to pay exorbitant fees after reaching the age of sixty. The same applies to those who have resided in the country for 20, 30,


or 40 years, and those of who came today. In other countries that are more prudent in management, a resident is granted citizenship after five years, or permanent residency, as is the case in Switzerland and other European countries that seek to revive their society and strengthen their local economy.

With us, there is a clause in the nationality law about "great deeds," but it is like a unicorn... We

Russian strike on village

about 50 European leaders in Spain to drum up support from Ukraine's allies. He denounced the strike in the village of Hroza as a "demonstrably brutal Russian crime" and "a completely deliberate act of terrorism."

Presidential chief of staff Andrii Yermak and Kharkiv Gov. Oleh Syniehubov said a 6-year-old boy was among the dead, adding that seven other people were wounded. Hroza, which had a population of about 500 before the war, is located in the northeast-

About 60 people were in the cafe, attending a wake after a funeral, said Internal Affairs Minister Ihor Klymenko, who provided the death toll.

According to preliminary information from Kyiv, the village was struck by an Iskander missile. Emergency crews searched the smoldering rubble of damaged buildings. Ukrainian prosecutors released photos showing bloodied bodies.

Hroza and other parts of the eastern Kharkiv region were seized by Russia early in the war and recaptured by Ukraine in September 2022.

The village is only 30 kilometers (19 miles) west of Kupiansk, a key area of the Russian military effort. Zelenskyy had visited the area Tuesday to meet with troops and inspect equipment supplied by the

Citizens at forefront

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 5: MP Muhammad Al-Rujaib revealed that he has submitted the priorities for the upcoming parliamentary term to the coordinating committee.

Based on his perspective, he divided the priorities in the following manner:

1. Improving the citizens' standard of living, which include increasing the cost of living allowance from KD 120 to KD 250 per month, increasing the children allowance, amending the laws concerning the retirees to increase the minimum amount of pension, sharing the profits of the Public Institution for Social Security with the retirees, canceling usury loans for retirees, increasing rent allowance and increasing the allowance allocated

to students to meet the growing inflation rates.

2. Dealing with infrastructure and housing issues, which include buying the houses located in Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh and distributing the plots to the housing applicants, toughening the penalties imposed on the violating contractors, completing the infrastructure in the new residential areas before starting the distribution of plots, and continuing to pay rent allowance to beneficiaries for two years after connecting electricity.

3. Tackling employment-related issues, which include ratifying the strategic alternative, increasing the national labor allowance allocated to citizens working in the private sector, amending the law of the National Fund for Small and Medium Enterprises, compensating the owners of small enterprises who suffered damages during COV-ID-19 crisis, amending chapter 5 of the law of the Public Institution for Social Security, allowing the appointment of citizens in all public institutions with no exceptions, and linking the employment systems of the entire public institutions to the automated system of the Civil Service Commission

Move threatens progress

'Iraqi court ruling disrespect to law'

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 5, (KUNA): Iraq's Federal Supreme Court's ruling annulling a 2012 agreement on Khor Abdullah displays Iraq's dishonesty in commitment to respecting international law, political agreements and treaties, a scholar has said in a research paper.

The State of Kuwait and Iraq entered in 2012 a joint agreement concerning regulation of maritime navigation in Khor Abdullah. The accord was ratified by parliaments in the two countries

in 2013, and subsequently submitted to the UN. However, the court declared, in a ruling on September 4, 2023, the agreement was unconstitutional which ran counter to established international law governing bilateral agreements.

The ruling "not only demonstrated its immaturity and irresponsibility but also jeopardizes the recently improving relationship between the two countries. This situation threatens to reset the progress made between them," Dr. Faisal Al-Wazzan, Assistant Professor of History at Kuwait University said in his research paper.

"On the international stage, Iraq is displaying a lack of seriousness and dishonesty in its commitment to respecting and adhering to international law, political agreements, and treaties," added Al-Wazzan, also Advisor at the Center for Research and Studies on Kuwait.

The move was part of Iraq's consistent pattern of reneging on these agreements with Kuwait, periodically sparking border crises, which have been spanning more than 90 years.

Al-Wazzan said Iraq's reversals on border agreements typically coincided with domestic turmoil, with Iraqi politicians restoring to rhetorical discourse on Kuwait-related issues to divert attention away from international problems while appearing patriotic.

The court's ruling, he noted, extended beyond the technical aspects of the agreement. "It delves into longstanding and recurring Iraqi claims (in Kuwait). This stance disregards all agreements between the two nations dating back in 1932, including UN Security Council resolution 833.

Al-Wazzan sheds light on history of border issues between Kuwait and Iraq. When Iraq ceased to be part of the Ottoman Empire, it sought to resolve its administrative structures and borders independently.

The establishment of the new Iraqi state, he added, was orchestrated by the British Empire, which installed a Hashemite King in 1921, contrary to Kuwait which functioned as an indepen-

dent emirate under British protection since 1899. In 1932, some 11 years after establishment of Kingdom of Iraq, it sought to become member of the League of Nations, and to fulfill admission requirements, it needed to define its borders with

neighboring countries. Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri Saeed, said Al-Wazzan, wrote a letter to British Ambassador in Baghdad Sir F. Humphrys officially acknowledg-

ing land borders with Kuwait. The letter, dated July 21, 1932, was approved by Sheikh Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah on August 10, 1932, to serve as foundation for subsequent

agreements, said Al-Wazzan. In 1938, Iraq's Foreign Minister, Tawfiq Al-Suwaidi, rejected the agreement and expressed a desire to annex Kuwait. He based his position on a misunderstanding of relationship between the Ottoman Empire and the Emirate of Kuwait from 1870 to 1899, mistakenly believing that Kuwait

was a part of the Ottoman Empire. **Continued on Page 4**

They highlight that activating awareness campaigns significantly contributes to raising consciousness about breast cancer, its prevention methods, symptoms, and treatment options

Flexible working hours at MC

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 5: The Acting Secretary General of the Municipal Council (MC) Dr. Fahad Al-Otaibi issued an administrative circular yesterday to declare that the official working hours in the Secretariat General of the Municipal Council will be as per the flexible working hours, which is seven working hours from Sunday to Thursday.

According to the circular, the start of work will be between 7:00 am and 9:00 am. An employee is allowed to report at any time within that period, and they can leave work after completing seven working hours from the time they reported to work.

This timing is applied without prejudice to the grace period specified for the employee at the beginning of the work which is 30 minutes, or the 15-minute grace period set for female employees at the end of work, or the permission system or other rules and provisions contained in Civil Service Council Resolution No. 41/2006 regarding the rules and provisions governing flexible official work in government agencies.

The circular specified three controls for

calculating the grace period and the delay period for reporting in at the beginning of work, as follows:

1. The grace period is calculated at the beginning of the work day after the end of the last attendance time, that is, after 9:00 am. 2. The minutes of delay at the start of work

riod set at the start of work from 9:30 am. 3. The hours for seeking permission to leave work are calculated after the employer approves, at the beginning of the work day from the time specified by the employee

during the period from 7:00 am to 9:00 am.

The aforementioned controls are not applied to those subject to reduced working hours or those subject to the system of partial absence without pay for any reason. The working hours for this category are from 7:00 am to 2:00 pm or from 7:30 am to 2:30 pm, or from 8:00 am to 3:00 pm or from 8:30 am to 3:30 pm.

In addition, the employees in the aforementioned category are obligated to notify the Administrative Affairs Department about the timings they have chosen through their departments, within five working days of the issuance of the circular.

Cut in burn patients going abroad

Most ops done at Babtain Center

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 5: Head of the Department of Plastic, Cosmetic and Congenital **Deformities at the Saud Al-Babtain Center** for Burns and Plastic Surgery Dr. Aqeel Lari highlighted the center's success in reducing by about 60 percent in less than two years the referral of patients abroad for the treatment of congenital deformities and reconstructive surgeries after deep burns and severe injuries.

In a televised interview, Dr. Lari explained that the Saud Al-Babtain Center is not only for burns, but also for reconstructive operations and congenital deformities in children, including the palate, cleft lip, and skull deformities, which are complex medical conditions that previously required traveling abroad for treatment. Due to the modern technologies and the efforts of doctors at the center, the rate of overseas referrals have reduced significantly, saving the state millions of dinars.

Dr. Lari revealed that the center will launch a hyperbaric oxygen therapy unit next week in order to stimulate tissues damaged by burns and chronic wounds for diabetics as well as other diseases and problems through hyperbaric oxygen.

In addition, the center's anesthesia and critical care specialist Dr. Ahmed said in a similar statement that treating doctors face a major problem in dealing with burn cases, especially at the beginning of burns.

He highlighted the center's capabilities in dealing with burn cases of various types, such that there are almost no deaths resulting from burns, as well as severe burns, the rate of which reaches about 90 percent, as they are treated with a success rate of about 100 percent.

UK parliament nods to hike in entry visa fees

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 5: The United Kingdom has announced that the British Parliament has given the go ahead to increase entry visa fees effective from October 4, reports Al-Qabas daily.

The alterations pertaining to fee increments will not impact the new Electronic Travel Authorization (ETA) system, set to be implemented in February 2024, for citizens of Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Qatar, Bahrain, Oman, and Jordan. Similarly, the electronic visa exemption will remain unchanged at around 30 British pounds, approximately 12 Kuwaiti dinars.

Consequently, individuals applying at the visa center will be subject to the new prices following Wednesday's activation of the increases. However, citizens from Gulf countries can utilize the electronic visa currently in effect, which maintains its value at 12 dinars.

As per the updated fees, the cost of a tourist visa (short-term visit for 6 months) has been raised to 115 British pounds, equivalent to 46 Kuwaiti dinars. The cost of a student visa will see an increase to 490 British pounds, approximately 196 Kuwaiti dinars.

Furthermore, the cost of the "urgent" priority service will surge to approximately 500 British pounds, equivalent to 200 dinars. This service's price will encompass

It's worth noting that, based on the proposal, a visitor visa for travelers from around the world for a period of less than six months will be priced at 115 pounds sterling. For a two-year period, it will cost 400 pounds sterling, and for a five-year period, it will be 771 pounds sterling. Additionally, student visa fees will increase by 127 pounds sterling to 490 pounds sterling for travelers globally.

Finance minister in GCC meeting

'Official end of summer begins'

Kuwait may see above normal rainfall in Nov - meteorologist

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 5: Meteorologist Fahd Al-Otaibi expected that during the transitional period between summer and winter, the country will witness rainfall within the annual normal rate or slightly above this rate, pointing out that the maximum temperature would drop below 40 degrees Celsius after the middle of this

Al-Otaibi told Al-Rai that "according to medium-term expectations, the country will witness heavy rains during the transitional period compared to the rainfall that the country witnessed last season during the same period."

He pointed out that the classification of rain rates from light to medium and heavy depends on the amount of rain that falls within an hour, meaning, "If we notice that the rainfall reaches 10 mm per hour, it can be classified as heavy rain."

He added, "The occurrence of water accumulations as a result of rain expected to fall at the end of this month or the beginning of next November depends on the readiness of rainwater drainage networks for the quantities that will be recorded by rain measuring stations," explaining that a rainfall of 25 mm or more means the presence of water accumulations in many

For his part, meteorologist Issa Ramadan said that tomorrow marks the first day of the Surfah horoscope, which is the beginning of the end of the heat, the official end of summer, and the beginning of autumn in Kuwait, where maximum temperatures begin to drop below the 40 degree Celsius barrier during the day, and are below 30 at night and drop to 22 at dawn on land during the coming days.

He pointed out that during this period, the movement of air depressions begins, clouds appear, and the first sign occurs after the 15th of this month.

Ramadan warned of some heavy rainfall next November due to the global El Nino phenomenon (an irregular change in winds and temperatures in the eastern tropical Pacific Ocean).

'Kuwait Hackathon' proposal to help ID and hire exceptional talents'


"IF you spend more on coffee than you do on IT security, you're going to get hacked. Moreover, you deserve to be hacked, – Richard Clarke.

"MP Abdul Wahab Al-Issa and Dr. Abdulaziz Al-Sagabi have put forth a proposal advocating for the National Center for Cyber Security to organize a "hackathon" competition, aimed at attracting skilled professionals in programming and hacking operations. The objective is to identify exceptional talents and hire them, bypassing conventional government agency requirements such as certifications and age restrictions," columnist **Abdulaziz Al-Kandari** wrote for Al-Rai daily.

"First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior, Sheikh Talal Al-

Khaled, has embraced and endorsed the "Kuwait Hackathon" proposal. The proposal's goal is to enhance the cybersecurity apparatus's recruitment process and evaluate government systems' effectiveness using innovative and contemporary approaches. Prompt action was taken by his excellency the minister, given the urgency

"Cybersecurity involves safeguarding systems and networks from digital threats, with cyberattacks aiming to access critical information for theft or destruction, often demanding financial compensation through blackmail. In 2021, individuals in the United States lost approximately \$7 billion due to cybercrime, as reported



"Preparedness is crucial. Consider the scenario if hackers gained control over and infiltrated the electricity network and bank accounts, obtained private security information, disrupted air traffic at the airport, or targeted any vital ministry or institution in the country. It is imperative to act proactively and not wait for such events, preparing through the youth of Kuwait. This initiative must be integrated into the government's agenda. Students should be sent to top global universities specializing in this field, focusing on cybersecurity as a defense priority surpassing the significance of conventional weaponry.

"The responsibility lies heavily on the government and representatives. Urgently ceasing disputes and allegations, reaching a consensus on a legislative roadmap that incorporates cybersecurity, alongside previously agreed-upon topics through coordination between the government and the National Assem-

bly, is paramount.
"Currently, the nation faces formidable challenges that even the mightiest

armies cannot withstand -- the armies of science, progress, and technology. Adequate preparation is imperative to face this transformation responsibly, within the context of our time, leaving behind past conflicts and false heroics. Failure to do so may relegate us to early retirement and a marginalized existence, mirroring the fate of numerous Arab countries indicated by economic failures and other markers.

"I receive several calls, repeatedly from time to time, from numbers unknown to me, to the extent that such calls have become an almost daily occurrence. It should not come as a surprise that many of these calls are intended to ask about my desire to invest in banking through various platforms," columnist Tariq Boursely wrote for Al-Anba daily

"Not only that, but a "link" is also sent via private message or text message as if it was from a bank or an official body.
"Many people have been deceived, mostly under the pretext of electronic

investment. There are many ways of doing so, and electronic fraud is a reality. Perhaps I will write this article to address this modern type of theft. "This type of theft and fraud is global, not just in our Arab and Gulf

region. These thefts are more dangerous than bank robberies in broad daylight. The saddening thing is that this fraud has happened to many male and female citizens. The amount withdrawn may even reach hundreds of thousands of dinars. In fact, these stories have become a topic of conversation. 'Who protects us from electronic fraudsters? Shouldn't the specialists

and stakeholders look into the issue and tighten the penal punishment? What about arrests, summons, imprisonment and fines, as this is a type of advanced fraud that sometimes makes us lose everything we have? They need to check whether these networks are managed from Kuwait or from outside Kuwait.

"We need awareness and guidance on how to protect ourselves when these intruders barge into our lives, take our money, and tamper with the future of our children. How much wealth has been lost due to the promotions practiced by these people through persuasion in e-commerce or to purchase a commodity or consumer product through gentle questions and naive responses?!

"It is time for us to know how to protect ourselves by activating the role of cybersecurity to maintain the systems of official countries, including banks, government companies, and others.

"When a hacker sends a message claiming to be from a bank or an official body, it may mean that there are electronic security breaches taking place, which requires technical intervention to confront it.'

"Our democracy is going through a severe crisis, and we fear that it will turn from a blessing into a curse as long as there is a shift from participation

to monopolization, and from the public good to personal benefit and gain!" columnist **Dr. Mohammad Al-Moqatea** wrote for **aljarida** daily.

"Although our democracy started with unity and proceeded rationally, it became distorted and went on to destroy the state in a remarkable and sad

way!
"The political and democratic system, as established by the founding fathers and embodied in the 1962 Constitution, is a balanced, robust, and advanced system of government that is capable of accommodating changes.

"However, what is sad is that it has been distorted, first with frequency limits, then with fanaticism, and finally with interests that diverted it from its path by transforming members into transaction brokers. "Instead of their concern being the general interest of the state and the

people and their development, their focus eventually was to tamper with the entity of society politically, which is the most dangerous of all, with files and arrangements that threaten national sovereignty and security.

"Tampering with the demographic structure is one of the most dangerous things this country has been exposed to. When it occurs, it is difficult to rectify and its risks are unsafe," columnist Ahmad Al-Mulaifi wrote for Annahar daily. "There is an abnormal exodus to Kuwait from the north and south, some of

which may have economic and livelihood reasons. However, we cannot ignore the political and security reasons, especially since ambitions have existed throughout history and still exist. Unfortunately, the ruling authority participated in a large part of this absurdity in order to achieve temporary balances, rather imbalances, which have become permanent and fatal. Politicians and financiers participated in this absurdity for commercial and financial interests.

"Whatever is happening in Kuwait in terms of population imbalance is represented by random naturalization that is not matched by the inculcation of good citizenship, and forgery that is difficult to detect. There is also the tampering with the demographic structure through marginal workers, something that is not accompanied by a strict application of the law.

"Putting the country's important facilities such as the Amiri Diwan, the Council of Ministers, and the National Assembly in the hands of non-Kuwaitis, along with the sensitive sites of a security and information nature in the Ministry of Interior, the Kuwait Army, and the financial and IT departments of the ministries and government agencies, has turned the country into an open book. It is open to anyone who wants to exploit it to use the information, or sell it to those who are interested in it.

"A group of politicians and parliamentarians are still continuing this absurdity through legislative proposals whose interests do not go beyond the noses of those who propose them, and are met with governmental indifference and negligence that sometimes reaches the point of submission.

Info inks deal to set up joint 'digital platform

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 5: The Ministry of Information announced the signing of the contract for the bidding for the establishment of an integrated digital platform for the Ministry, visual and audio, via the Internet, with a five-year contract worth 5.5 million dinars, which includes the Ministry obtaining 10% of the net profits of the platform, with the winning company bearing the responsibility for establishing, operating and marketing the platform, reports Al-Seyassah

The Ministry's official spokesman, Badr Al-Enezi, said in a statement that, under direct instructions from the Minister of Information and Minister of Awqaf and Islamic Affairs, Abdul Rahman Al-Mutairi, the contract was signed, after obtaining all necessary approvals from the regulatory authorities in the country, and ensuring the validity of all procedures related to the contract, which is the first of its kind and the highest in terms of revenue in the field for the ministry, with returns expected to be unprecedented.

Al-Enezi added that this platform is concerned with broadcasting media content in a way that goes beyond traditional methods and models, to transmit content through all possible applications, which gives the user the opportunity to access the television content he desires via the Internet through his subscription to the platform.

He explained that the subscriber will receive many services, including watching the live broadcast of all Kuwaiti TV channels, in addition to listening to all Kuwaiti radio stations, with the ability to watch archived and new television works, and listen to archived and new radio programs.

He stated that the operating company will work to produce and purchase programs, series and films in accordance with the controls followed by the Ministry of Information to display them through the plat-

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 5: Dr. Ahmad Al-Awadhi, the Minister of Health, has given his approval for the imposition of 2,176 penalties on several companies with contracts with the Ministry of Health since the beginning of the fiscal year on April 1, reports Al-Rai daily.

Reliable sources indicated that these penalties, which are part of safeguarding public funds, were imposed on various companies involved in health service implementation or the supply of medical consumables.

The fines and penalties imposed by the Minister of Health on these companies, in accordance with the correct contractual procedures, amounted to approximately 5 million dinars.

The sources affirmed that these penalties were imposed to uphold the protection of public funds and to enforce penal conditions outlined in the contracts signed between the ministry and the concerned parties. Notably, this number of fines is being applied for the first time, and these measures aim to address a multitude of observations from regulatory authorities that have persisted for years.

Drug dealer admits crime: When a Kuwaiti drug dealer was produced before the Criminal Court he admitted to bringing in 50 kilograms of hashish by sea, reports Al-

When the judge asked him if he admits to bringing in the drugs, he said, "Yes, I am a drug dealer and I am the one who brought these drugs into the country via the sea. I know that I will be put to death or put behind bars for life. I am now 50 years old, and I want to say that the rest of the three defendants who are no more than 20 years old had no knowledge of drugs. I took advantage of their youth and their need for money since they are bedoun and unemployed. "I was previously imprisoned on charges of drug trafficking," he added. The court has set another date to issue a verdict in the case.

Factory shut down: Inspectors from the Commercial Control Department at the Ministry of Commerce, with the help of technical inspectors from the General Traffic Department have shut down a factory that manufactured "exhaust systems" that made annoying noises, reports Al-Rai daily.

The daily quoting GTD sources said this is considered a violation of environmental law.

The Ministry of Commerce stated that more than 100 manufactured hydrators ready for sale and installation were seized and the issue has been referred to the Commercial Prosecution

'Fake' text messages: The Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy warned the public against dealing with text messages, claiming to be sent from the ministry, that contain an electronic payment link, reports Aljarida daily.

Through its official account on the "X" platform, the ministry stressed the need to verify the sending party and the attached images to differentiate between what is real and what is fake.

Drenched in blood: A 50-year old man who is wanted by law and has a criminal record was found drenched in blood in a building in Mangaf area.

According to security sources, when the Operations Room of the Ministry of Interior received information about a screaming man who was covered in blood, police officers, paramedics and investigators immediately rushed to the building in Mangaf. They attended to the man, who was covered in blood, and referred him to the nearest hospital.

I srael fully understands the significance of normalizing ties with Saudi Arabia, an understanding reciprocated by Crown Prince Muhammad bin Salman, who recognizes the strategic leverage he holds for both Israel and

its ally, the USA.
In July 1972, former Egyptian president Anwar Al Sadat abruptly expelled 20,000 Soviet experts, aiming for a purely Egyptian victory in the anticipated conflict with Israel in October 1973.

However, Sadat missed the opportunity to obtain benefits for rejecting Soviet influence in Egypt. This unwise move led Henry Kissinger, the then National Security advisor to US president Richard Nixon, to regret the lack of prior

knowledge, stating they would have paid the price had they known in advance.

It's evident that Crown Prince Muhammad bin Salman is determined not to repeat Sadat's mistake. He is not willing to sacrifice the strategic advantage he possesses for minimal gains. He intends to craft a mutually beneficial deal, particularly advantageous for his own country.

As days pass, we edge closer to the much-discussed "deal of the century," anticipated to be settled before the spring of 2024, preceding the start of the presidential elections campaign.

In an interview with Fox News, Crown Prince Muhammad bin Salman expressed that negotiations are progressing positively. He emphasized that if the deal is reached, it will be the most significant one since the end

hear about it but we never see it. This is why the state suffers from a drought of ideas, projects, industries, and innovations. On the other hand, those with a shortsighted outlook adhere to a naive saying that "All is well.

In Switzerland, for example, there are professions that citizens do not take up, such as construction workers. The state seeks the services of craftsmen and masons from Eastern European countries, and sponsors them. There is no heresy of "Kuwaiti sponsor," or the "kafala" system, which is why there is no human trafficking. Its citizens work in banks, the watch industry, chocolate factories, etc.

Kuwait cannot develop in light of the cur-

rent prevailing mentality, which has caused the country to close down and pushed many Kuwaitis to flee with their money to neighboring countries.

This is what happened with the young owners of small and medium enterprises, who found themselves suffering from the poor performance of their support fund, just as the state did not benefit from those with experience.

It is as if there is someone intentionally making Kuwait tweet out of the region's flock. For this reason we will continue to suffer from isolation until the current situation comes to pass.

4. Solving education-related issues, which include amending the education and teacher profession law, and improving educational levels to meet the international criteria related to the classification of educational institutions.

5. Enhancing the health sector, which include establishing a national center for health to ensure the quality of medical service provided to patients, and amending the law on the establishment of health zones.

6. Handling matters related to the national identity and citizenship, which include amending the law related to the Administrative Court to extend its authority to judge the cases concerning granting and withdrawal of Kuwaiti citizenship, ratifying the law on granting civil right to the illegal residents (Bedoun residents), and amending the audiovisual law to increase freedoms and nullify the imprisonment penalties.

Al-Rujaib insisted that cooperation with the government is linked to the latter's commitment to respond to popular demands as well as the need for the government to take the necessary procedures to carry out the execution of the Amiri amnesty and ensure it covers all the beneficiaries.

MP Jinan Boushahri said she supports the grilling motion especially the first item concerning the failure to carry out any road maintenance, which she had highlighted a few days back. Also, the response of the State Audit Bureau (SAB) to questions revealed that the relevant tenders do not match the statements issued by MP Bu-

MP Abdul Kareem Al-Kandari said Dr. Bugamaz fulfilled none of her commitments, affirming his support for the grilling

MP Muhammad Al-Rujaib stressed the need for Dr. Buqamaz to face the grilling motion for citizens to figure out who supports corruption and for the government to realise the fact that the MPs will not flatter anyone against the citizens' interests.

MP Hamad Al-Obaid also supported the grilling motion, insisting that Dr. Buqamaz has been granted enough time but she has not made any serious efforts to maintain the roads or punish those responsible.

MPs Muhammad Al-Mahan and Bader Nashmi Al-Anzi stressed the fact that Dr. Bugamaz took more than enough time but ended up wasting the chance to meet the promises through her inaction.

MP Badr Sayyar Al-Shammari said it

is better for Dr. Buqamaz to resign willingly in order to save the time of the parliament.

However, the British Ambassador in Baghdad, Maurice Peterson, refuted his claim in a legal response. Peterson pointed out that according to Article 16 of the Treaty of Lausanne, Turkiye's rights and titles, which it had relinquished in 1923, could not be reclaimed by another country through heredity. In 1963, the Baath Party, which had toppled Abdulkareem Qassem, the leader who had threatened to invade Kuwait and had refused to acknowledge the independence of the state of Kuwait, re-acknowledged Kuwait's sovereignty and its borders as outlined in the 1932 letters. Prime Minister Ahmad Al-Baker signed an agreement with Kuwait's head of delegation, Sheikh Sabah Al-Salem Al-Sabah.

In 1994, following the failed Iraqi attempt to re-invade Kuwait, the Saddam Hussein regime agreed to acknowledge the sovereignty of Kuwait and its borders. Iraq sent letters to UN to substantiate and authenticate its position before the international community.

On the maritime borders, Al-Wazzan said that in 1959, Iraq sought to appoint a Norwegian hydrographer and maritime border expert to assist the Baghdad government in demarcating its maritime borders with Kuwait and Iran.

Consequently, Captain Coucheron-Aamot accepted the position and authored a report that established a median line as the boundary in the Khor Abdullah. This report received authentication from the Iraqi Ministry of Petroleum.

Minister Al-Ostad calls for accountability and penalties

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 5: The Minister of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy Dr. Jassim Al-Ostad says the Contract No. 18053001 for the construction of three new substations with a capacity of 132/132 KV and related power line cables of KV 132, which was issued by the Council of Ministers' Decision No. 56 on 10/01/2022, confirmed the soundness of the opinion of the Public Authority for Housing Welfare (PAHW). The matter has been referred to the Deputy Prime Minister and the Minister of Oil to take a decision that he deems necessary and

in the public interest, in line with the measures taken by the Ministry of Electricity and Water and Renewable Energy regarding the rehabilitation of a company.

In response to a parliamentary question submitted by the National Assembly member MP Muhalhal Al-Mudhaf, Al-Ostad explained that the report of the investigation committee that was formed by the ministerial Resolution No. 50/2022 and amended by the ministerial Resolution No. 51/2022concluded with the soundness of the opinion of PAHW in terms of the validity of the qualification of the company under investigation.

The insistence of the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy in the letter dated 16/08/2022, which included confirmation of the validity of the qualification, was contrary to real-

ity and the law, which requires that whoever signed it be held accountable and should be disciplined.

The committee recommended that the undersecretary of the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy issue a decision to cancel the decision to qualify the

company and leave the assessment of the appropriate penalty to the undersecretary of the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy (at the time).

This is either by imposing a warning based on article 60 of the civil service law or referring him to the Civil Service Council as a disciplinary body. Likewise, a senior electrical specialist engineer may be sanctioned with a warning penalty due to a violation of negligence in performing job duties based on articles 24 and 28 of Decree Law No. 15/1979.

Recommendations

Al-Ostad stressed that the committee's recommendations included punishing a senior electrical specialist engineer with a warning due to a violation of negligence in performing job duties based on Articles 24 and 28 of the Decree Law No. 15/1979, and punishing a department head with a penalty of deducting two days from his monthly salary due to the violation of negligence in performing job duties based on articles 24 and 27 of the Decree Law No. 15/1979.

News agency marks 47th anniversary

KUNA commits to professional, responsible media message

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 5, (KUNA): Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) marks the 47th anniversary of its establishment on Friday by restating its commitment to delivering its professional and responsible media message, maintaining credibility and objectivity and keeping abreast of cutting-edge

Since it was founded on October 6, 1976, Kuwait's official news agency has been striving to revamp its media services, boosting its national staff's capabilities, establishing its regional and world status and highlighting Kuwaiti issues and activities at home and abroad.

KUNA was established under an Amiri decree with the goal of gathering and generating news for distribution to individuals and media institutions, providing them with news reports in an objective and unbiased manner.

In March 1978, KUNA started local transmission for six hours per day and doubled it in June to 12 hours and then 16 in October, while Arabic transmission was launched in November 1978 for three hours before increasing broadcasting time to 12 hours a day.

In November 1979, the agency launched a special bulletin for Kuwaiti embassies abroad, providing news services to 38 embassies and con-

In January 1980, KUNA began local transmission in English for four hours a day, increasing it to eight hours a day in February 1981. It then boosted English local and foreign broadcasting hours to nine and four a day in January 1982.

During the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait in August 1990, Iraqi army forces seized the agency's equipment and archives and sent them to Baghdad. However, thanks to its national staff, the agency managed to re-operate and transmit its news reports in October 1990 through its office in the British capital, London.

The agency had reported a total of 16,110 news stories until November 1991.

Following the liberation of Kuwait in February 1991, the agency returned to its main headquarters in Kuwait on November 15 of the same year. It was honored to broadcast the liberation news, with its cameramen having documented the country's devastation caused by the Iraqi occupation forces.

In 1992, it began to depend upon a network of its correspondents in Arab and foreign capitals, covering Kuwaiti main events and activities

The agency invented a new trend in 1992 for choosing the year's personality, whether an individual or institution, as a model for others to follow in view of serving humanity, spreading peace and achieving a better life for humanity.

The agency then launched its SMS news service in 1994 in a bid to deliver local, Arab and world news stories to subscribers through its

phone number: 120 round the clock

Out of its belief in the significance of staff training, KUNA launched a media training center in 1995 with a view to upgrading the capabilities of media staff in both public and private sectors, along with Gulf media figures.

On March 31, 1997, the late Kuwaiti Minister of Information Sheikh Saud Nasser Al-Sabah inaugurated the new building of the agency in Kuwait City's Shuwaikh area, to commence a fresh shift in its developed services.

Having launched its website to cope with media technology, the site came second on the list of the best government sites in Kuwait in 2006.

In 2011, KUNA announced a new service giving people access to its news stories in both Arabic and English languages through social media, and in 2012 a new website covering news and informative services as well as photographic archives was launched.

Publish

The agency, further, began in 2014 to publish a quarterly magazine highlighting Kuwait's major events, ancient and modern facilities, development plans and future projects. In the same year, KUNA Al-Sagheer, a children's periodical, was published at the advent of the new school year in a bid to boost children's media knowledge.

Furthermore, a French bulletin was launched in 2018 as part of KUNA's plan to develop its news services, while its Arabic and English sites were updated in order to keep abreast of internet technological advancement.

In 2016, the agency won the best Arab news agency award from a Lebanese newspaper thanks to its credible and objective coverage of local, regional and international events. In 2018, it was also given the Sharjah Government Communication Award.

Since its inception, the Kuwaiti agency has committed itself to promoting and developing its relations with media organizations from different world countries

In 2000, KUNA joined the Organization of Asia-Pacific News Agencies (OANA) and effectively participated in a summit of world news agencies in Moscow in 2004.

Last May, Kuwait News Agency launched its space on the Spatial metaverse platform, the first step of its kind amongst news agencies in the region. On

May 4, it launched its first virtual news anchor. Barjas Al-Barjas was the agency's board chairman and director general from 1976 to 1992. Youssef Al-Sumait held the post between 1992 and 1998. Mohammad Al-Ujairi took over from

Border checks in Slovakia

Nearly 50 EU leaders stress Kyiv 'support'

GRANADA, Spain, Oct 6, (AP): Almost 50 European leaders used a summit in the southern Spanish city of Granada on Thursday to stress they stand by Ukraine at a time when Western resolve appears somewhat weak-

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said that besides maintaining such unity, more military aid to get through the winter was just as essential.

Despite the political, economic and military support, the desperate struggle to rid Ukraine territory of invading Russian forces has ground to a stalemate, and Zelenskyy insisted that it was no time for wavering in the face of Russian President Vladimir Putin. And espe-

cially now that questions about continued support are growing in the United States too.

"Europe must be strong" despite what happens in other places around the globe, Zelenskyy said, calling for more air defense systems, artillery shells, long-range missiles and

He said that victory or defeat in Ukraine would determine Europe's fate.

Zelenskyy Zelenskyy flew in early in the morning to the third meeting of the European Political Community forum, which was formed in the wake of Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine in February 2022 that drastically reset the continent's political agenda and fundamentally undermined long-held beliefs on peace and stability on the continent.

Support from Europe has become all the more important after US Congress hastily sent President Joe Biden legislation over the weekend that kept the federal government funded, but left off billions in funding for Ukraine's war effort that the White House had vigorously backed.

Aid

Biden called other world powers on Tuesday to coordinate on Ukraine in a deliberate show of US support at a time when the future of its aid is questioned by an important faction of Republicans who want to cut off money to Kyiv.

"The main challenge that we have that is to save unity in Europe," Zelenskyy said.

Last weekend's election in Slovakia, where pro-Russia candidate Robert Fico was the big winner, and Hungary's continued recalcitrance to fully back Ukraine have cast increasing shadows on Europe's commitment. That counts especially for the European Union where many decisions on Ukraine need unanimity among the bloc's 27 members.

In Slovakia early this week, the president refused a plan by her country's caretaker government to send further military aid to Ukraine, saying it doesn't have the authority and parties that oppose such support are in talks to form a government following last week's election.

On Thursday, though, the overall mood was supportive. Like most leaders, summit host and Spanish caretaker Prime Minister Pedro Sánchez stood firmly behind Ukraine and offered Zelenskyy a new package of anti-aircraft and anti-drone systems and training for Ukrainian soldiers to use them.

And just as Zelenskyy maintained a steadfast belief that the United States would come through with continued aid, EU leaders also felt U.S. issues could be overcome.

Timing

"I am very confident of support for Ukraine from the United States. What the United States is working on is the timing," European Commission President Ursula von der Leven said.

Even if the EU promised to continue its support for Kyiv, it could never replace Washington's contribution if funds were to dry up there, EU foreign affairs chief Josep Borrell said

"Éverybody that doesn't want Putin winning this war is to look for ways for the U.S. to retake this issue and continue supporting Ukraine," Borrell said. "Certainly we can do more. But the U.S. is something irreplaceable for the support of Ukraine.'

Zelenskyy insisted that Putin's attempts to divide the West would not cease.

"Russia will attack by information, disinformation, by fakes, etc.," he said.

SAHY, Slovakia: Slovakia began conducting traffic checks on its border with neighboring Hungary on Thursday amid what it says is a dramatic rise in migrants crossing onto its territory. The policy joins a flurry of similar border measures other Central European countries have imposed in recent days.

The increased border protection came as a reaction to Slovakia's neighbors, including Austria, the Czech Republic and Poland, reintroducing controls at their own borders with Slovakia on Wednesday to curb migrants coming in from the country. Each of the border control policies are set to last for at least

At a border crossing in Sahy, Slovakia - a 90-kilometer (55-mile) drive north of Hungary's capital, Budapest - two Slovakian police flagged down vehicles Thursday to conduct inspections. It's a departure from the ease of travel long afforded to members of Europe's visa-free Schengen area, last restricted when some countries sealed their borders in the early months of the COVID-19 pandemic.

LONDON: Scottish authorities have signed an extradition order for an American fugitive accused of faking his own death to avoid a rape charge in Utah.

In response to a freedom of information request, the Scottish government on Thursday said an extradition order for the man local officials refer to as Nicholas Rossi had been signed on Sept. 28. The government provided no other information.

The suspect has fought a prolonged court battle to prevent his return to the United States since he was arrested in December 2021 at a Glasgow hospital, where he was being treated for COVID-19. Rossi, who insisted he was an Irish orphan named Arthur Knight and had never set foot on American soil, repeatedly appeared in court in a wheelchair using an oxygen mask and speaking in a British accent.

The government signed the order after Judge Norman McFadyen of Edinburgh Sheriff Court on Aug. 2 ruled that the suspect could be extradited, saying he was "as dishonest and deceitful as he is evasive and manipulative.'

The man had said he was framed by authorities who took his fingerprints while he was in a coma so they could connect him to Rossi.

WH waives 26 federal laws: The Biden administration announced it waived 26 federal laws in South Texas to allow border wall construction on Wednesday, marking the administration's first use of a sweeping executive power employed often during the Trump presidency

America

The Department of Homeland Security posted the announcement on the US Federal Registry with few details outlining the construction in Starr County, Texas, which is part of a busy Border Patrol sector seeing "high illegal entry." According to government data, about 245,000 illegal entries have been recorded so far this fiscal year in the Rio Grande Valley Sector which contains 21 counties.

"There is presently an acute and immediate need to construct physical barriers and roads in the vicinity of the border of the United States in order to prevent unlawful entries into the United States in the project areas," Alejandro Mayorkas, the DHS secretary, stated in the notice.

The Clean Air Act, Safe Drinking Water Act and Endangered Species Act were some of the federal laws waived by DHS to make way for construction that will use funds from a congressional appropriation in 2019 for border wall construction. (AP)

Shooting claims life of baby: A shooting claimed the life of a baby that was delivered after its mother was one of several people hit by gunfire during a fight Wednesday on a downtown street in the western Massachusetts city of Holyoke, authorities said.

The pregnant woman was shot in the afternoon while seated on a public bus and taken to a hospital in critical condition, the Hampden District Attorney's Of-

fice said.
"The infant, who was delivered, and needed life-saving medical services, tragically passed away," it added.

Police responded to the shooting at 12:38 p.m. and said it appeared three male suspects were involved in an altercation before gunshots were fired. All involved suspects were believed

to have been identified, taken to hospitals and are in custody, according to the District Attorney's Office. No further information was immediately given on their conditions. (AP)

McCarthy's ouster could cost GOP its best fundraiser

US Republicans urged to stop chaos

NEW YORK, Oct 5, (AP): Most of the top Republican candidates running for president in 2024 reacted grimly to the ouster of House Speaker Kevin McCarthy by a faction of hard-liners in their own party, while one contender embraced the chaos and the front-runner for the nomination notably did not denounce the move.

Many agreed that it was a clear sign that new leadership was needed, not just in the House of Representatives but also in the party as a whole.

Former President Donald Trump, who has shown an unabashed willingness to go after his fellow Republicans, asked: "Why is it that Republicans are always fighting among themselves?"

He has not weighed in on whether McCarthy, an ally, should have been removed by a flank of the party also closely aligned with him, though he did say Wednesday that he had not encouraged the effort.

Downfall

McCarthy's downfall as House leader is in many ways a reflection of how Trump's influence has upended and reshaped the party over the years. Almost nowhere is that influence more apparent than in the 2024 GOP presidential race, which polls show Trump is leading by a large margin.

Trump, speaking Wednesday outside the New York courtroom where he is facing a civil fraud trial, said that his focus is on his presidential campaign and that there are "some great people" in the party who could do a great job in the role.

"I'll do whatever it is to help, but my focus - my total focus - is being president and quite honestly, making America great again because we are living in a country in decline.

Former New Jersey Gov Christie, a presidential rival and one of Trump's strongest critics, called McCarthy's ouster "unfortunately incredibly predictable" and a "political assassination."

Christie, speaking on MSNBC's "Morning Joe" on Wednesday, said he would tell voters who think his party seems ungovernable that "you've got to judge each Republican on their own

UN probe into Ethiopia rights abuses set to end


GENEVA, Oct 5, (AP): A UN backed probe of human rights abuses in Ethiopia is set to expire after no country stepped forward to seek an extension, despite repeated warnings that serious violations continue almost a year since a cease-fire ended a bloody civil war in the Éast African country.
While the European Union led talks on the issue,

in the end, no resolution was submitted to extend the mandate of the independent International Commission of Human Rights Experts on Ethiopia before a deadline expired Wednesday at the Human Rights Council in Geneva.

The probe will therefore be disbanded when its mandate expires this month.

The commission's experts all but pleaded on Tuesday with the council to extend the investigation, warn-

ing that atrocities continue in Tigray, Ethiopia's war-battered northernmost province.

The commission was established in December 2021 after a joint report by the UN and Ethiopia's state human rights commission recommended further independent investigations into abuses. Since then it has published two full-length reports.

It concluded that all sides committed abuses during the Tigray war, some of them amounting to war crimes. Its first report accused Ethiopia's government of using hunger as a weapon of war by restricting aid access to the region while rebels held it.

In their second report, published last month, the commission experts said a national transitional justice process launched by Ethiopia "falls well short" of African and international standards.

On Tuesday, the European Union announced a 650-million-euro (\$680 million) aid package for Ethiopia, the bloc's first step toward normalizing relations with the country despite previous demands for

accountability first. A diplomat from a EU country acknowledged that the bloc had agreed not to present a resolution, and called on the Ethiopian government to set up "robust, independent, impartial and transparent" mechanisms to foster transitional justice in light of the "extreme gravity of crimes" and rights viola-

tions in Ethiopia. 'We expect quick and tangible progress in the coming months," the diplomat said, speaking on condition of anonymity to discuss the subject. "Lack of progress could jeopardize the ongoing gradual normalization of relations between the EU and Ethiopia.'

Critics decried the inaction at the 47-member-country council.

Laetitia Bader, Horn of Africa director at Human Rights Watch, said the failure to renew the mandate in essence allows Ethiopia to drop off the council's agenda, and amounts to "a scathing indictment of the EU's stated commitment to justice.'

"It's yet another blow to countless victims of heinous crimes who placed their trust in these processes, she added.

The UN probe was the last major independent investigation into the Tigray war, which killed hundreds of thousands and was marked by massacres, mass rape

In June, the African Union quietly dropped its own probe into the war's atrocities, after extensive lobbying by Ethiopia - which has played up its own domestic efforts at transitional justice after the cease-fire.

Opposition lawmaker Anthony Oluoch told a session of Parliament's lower house that the conditions for foreign deployment hadn't been met under the National Police Act.

He also said that the country's security needs "ought to take first precedence before any foreign commitments," alluding to the internal attacks by the East Africa-based al-Shabab extremist group, which has links to al-Qaida.

Another lawmaker, Junet Mohamed, said the matter should be tabled in Parliament for approval "before any police officer leaves the country" for what he called a "dangerous mission," citing Kenyan police officers' inexperience in combating local crime.

The mayor of Tokyo's busy Shibuya shopping and entertainment district is asking Halloween celebrants not to visit, fearing that a large number of partygoers following the COVID-19 pandemic could cause a disaster similar to last year's fatal crowd surge in South Korea's capital.

"This year, we are making it clear to the world that Shibuya is not a venue for Halloween events," Shibuya city Mayor Ken Hasebe said at a news conference Thursday. "Please, do not come to the Shibuya station area for Halloween.

Hasebe said he understands that Halloween is a fun celebration around the world, but noted that a crowd crush like the one that killed about 160 people celebrating Halloween last year in Seoul's Itaewon district could happen in Shibuya.(AP)

Flash floods kill at least 14 in India

NEW DELHI, Oct 5, (AP): Rescue workers were searching for more than 100 people on Thursday after flash floods triggered by a sudden heavy rainfall swamped several towns in northeastern India, killing at least 14 people, officials said.

More than 2,000 people were rescued after Wednesday's floods, the Sikkim State Disaster Management Authority said in a statement, adding that state authorities set up 26 relief camps for more than 22,000 people impacted by the floods.

The Press Trust of India news agency reported that 102 people were missing and cited state government officials saying 14 people died in the

Affecting

Among the missing were 22 army soldiers, officials said. One soldier who had been reported missing on Wednesday was later rescued by authorities, local media reported. Some army camps and vehicles were submerged

under mud following the floods. Eleven bridges were washed away by the floodwaters, which also hit pipelines and damaged or destroyed more than 270 houses in four districts, officials said.

The flooding occurred along the Teesta River in the Lachen Valley in Sikkim state and was worsened when parts of a dam were washed away.

Several towns, including Dikchu and Rangpo in the Teesta basin, were flooded, and schools in four districts were ordered shut until Sunday, the state's education department said.

Parts of a highway that links Sikkim, the state capital, with the rest of the country were washed away.

bursts - sudden, very heavy rains which are defined as when more than 10 centimeters (3.9 inches) of rainfall occurs within 10 square kilometers (3.8 square miles) within an hour. Cloudbursts can cause intense flooding and landslides affecting thousands of people.

The mountainous Himalayan region where Sikkim is located has seen heavy monsoon rains this season.

Nearly 50 people died in flash floods and landslides in August in nearby Himachal Pradesh state. Record rains in July killed more than 100 people over two weeks in northern India, as roads were waterlogged and homes collapsed.

Disasters caused by landslides and floods are common in India's Himalayan region during the June-September monsoon season. Scientists say they are becoming more frequent as global warming contributes to the melting of glaciers there.

"This is, incredibly sadly, another classic case of a cascading hazard chain that amplifies as you go downstream," said Jakob Steiner, a climate scientist with the International Center for Integrated Mountain Development, commenting on Wednesday's flash flooding.

Earlier this year, Steiner's organization published a report saying that Himalayan glaciers could lose 80% of their volume if global warming isn't controlled. In February 2021, flash floods killed

The device measuring the wind speeds broke shortly afterward, Huang said.

Images shared on social media from Orchid Island showed buildings with broken windows and boats sunk in a harbor. On Thursday evening, Koinu's

Climate change could affect where, when people travel

Travelers encountered many weather surprises this summer, from wildfires in Europe to knee-deep mud at Burning Man. Indeed, it was the hottest summer on record around the globe, according to the European Union's Copernicus Climate Change Service.

"The dog days of summer are not just barking, they are biting," said UN Secretary-General António Guterres in a prepared statement published Sept. 6. "Our planet has just endured a season of simmering - the hottest summer on record. Climate breakdown has begun."

Shifting weather patterns are raising questions about where, when, how and whether tourists will travel.

For example, does it still make sense to visit Italy in July, despite high temperatures, large crowds and minimal air conditioning? Or should "peak" Travel season move to the more hospitable autumn or spring months?

Tourism destinations are starting to take note - and get worried - about the toll climate change could take on this enormous industry.

Hot destinations

Escaping to the Spanish coast for the summer used to sound like a dream. This year it turned into more of a nightmare for Mediterranean Travelers. The coastal city of Valencia, Spain, saw temperatures reach 116 degrees Fahrenheit in August, a record high. That came amid Spain's limits on air conditioning use in public spaces, leaving tourists to sweat it out.

These trends are only likely to get worse, driving Travelers away from hot beachside destinations in Europe, according to a July report from the European Commission's Joint Research Centre. Southern coastal regions such as Greece, Italy and Spain are expected to see a drop in tourism if temperatures continue to increase.

On the other hand, colder destinations in Northern Europe could actually see more vacationers. Denmark, France and the United Kingdom could receive more tourists because of higher temperatures, according to the report. Greenland, which is mostly covered with ice, is expecting to see far more tourists in the coming decades, with a new airport set to open in 2024.

Closer to home, many popular destinations have already been affected by rising temperatures. The namesake glaciers of Glacier National Park have lost an average of 40% of their size between 1966 and 2015, according to the National Park Service. Florida's coral reefs were bleaching and dying under the stress of record ocean temperatures this summer.

Travel season

Summers are for vacations - that's a truth so universally acknowledged as to be almost self-evident. Families Travel while kids are out of school, and office workers flee to vacation in ideal weather.

Yet, as summers continue to warm, these vacations could give way to "shoulder season" alternatives in spring and autumn months. In other words, tourists could change when (rather than where) they visit.

Indeed, this change may already be taking place. Short-term rental analytics platform AirDNA reported that occupancy rates at mountain and lake destinations in October 2022 were nearly as high as 2019's peak occupancy (in July), bucking the typical sharp downward trend after the summer.

Young Filipino Americans explore their roots though travel

Manila aims at young Fil Am travelers

NEW YORK, Oct 5, (AP): As the head of her own marketing agency in Los Angeles, Shaina Renee Manlangit has made it a mission to elevate Filipino American talent and culture. But, it occurred to her last year, she still had never actually been to the Philippines.

Knowing there were other young Filipino Americans who felt that gap, the 28-year-old promptly "coldemailed" the Philippine Department of Tourism. That led to her visiting the country in March for the first time.

"It was a very big cultural shock," Manlangit said. "Once I got a taste of it, I just wanted to learn more."

She tasted regional foods, saw both cities and beaches. She learned that the Philippines is a top diving destination, and now she is trying to learn the Tagalog language. Manlangit has since parlayed her journey of discovery into a collaboration with the government to launch trips especially geared toward young Filipino Americans.

The Philippines has long been interested in attracting Filipino Americans to come and add to the economy, but its incentives have mostly drawn retirees or immigrants catching up with relatives. Today, they are aiming a younger generation of Filipino American professionals who live on TikTok and Instagram.

Two Filipino American influencers were recruited to join a group VIP tour in July. Manlangit also has a state-endorsed, eight-day tour slotted for 2024 through the capital city, Manila, and the islands of Cebu and Coron is being marketed as a vibrant introduction for any Filipino American willing to join.

Generations (cross head)

For some young Filipino Americans, or Fil Ams, unfamiliarity with their parents' home country and language makes the idea of planning a trip there overwhelming. But younger generations also have grown up encouraged to show cultural pride. So as adults, some are searching for a connection to the Philippines.

October is Filipino American History Month, and Manlangit is hoping her peers might focus on exploring their family roots through travel.

Alexander Martin Jr., 31, has already committed to one of the 10 spots on the trip she designed. Born and raised in San Leandro, California, the entrepreneur only knows the Philippines from family photos and stories. School, sports and then work always seemed to make it impossible to squeeze in a visit.

Also, the thought of planning a trip to the Philippines was intimidating somehow. It feels reassuring to be going with other young Filipino Ameri-

"I'm just hoping to get familiar with my culture, and be familiar with it so one day I can bring my son to all these places I got to experience," Martin

Nobody was more elated than his mother.

"If I were to go with family," Martin said, "it's gonna be like a lot of visiting cousins or visiting family out there. But this trip, she's excited that I get to experience like the whole Philippines in its entirety."

The Philippines' efforts to integrate Filipinos in America goes back more than a century. After the Philippine-American war and the ensuing US occupation, both countries passed the Pensionado Act in 1903. Exchange students from the Philippines were chosen to travel to the US. The goal was they would further their education and advocate for the American way of governing upon their return.

"Those were like the first sort of American or Americanized Filipinos," said Evelyn Ibatan Rodriguez, a sociology professor and part of the University of San Francisco's Philippine Studies Program. "I think that kind of sets the tone, this idea that what is native to the Philippines is less than."

the Philippines is less than.' Incentives

In 1973, Philippine President and dictator Ferdinand Marcos, whose son and namesake is the current president, enacted the Balikbayan Program to draw Filipinos residing in the US to come work part-time. Incentives included an extended visa for a year and lower taxes. Roughly 30 years later, President Gloria Macapagal Arroyo's administration granted dual citizenship to Filipino Americans born in the US after 1973 to a Philippine national.

"That becomes the game changer because then you've got US 'foreign' Filipinos like myself... who can be-

come dual citizens and then benefit under this Balikbayan legislation," Rodriguez said.

Rodriguez hadn't heard of tourism efforts targeting young Filipino American adults. But she knows a lot of college students and college-educated Filipino Americans who have expressed interest in visiting the Philippines. And they want something that isn't just visiting relatives or playing tourist.

"Coming to university... where Asian Americans are such a significant presence, it's sort of given them permission to be like, 'Wait a second, there's actually something I can learn from the Philippines,'" Rodriguez said. "Not just the Philippines is sort of a 'charity case."

Even Gen Zers with social media may "want more than an Instagramfriendly visit to their parents' or grandparents' homelands, she added.

EP extends rules on preferential trade scheme

The European Parliament (EP) voted on Thursday with 561 in favour, five against and two abstention to extend current rules on the scheme of generalised tariff preferences (GSP) for over 60 developing countries until 31 December 2027

The current GSP regulation was set to expire at the end of 2023, and the negotiations between the Parliament and the EU Council of member states began in January 2023 to establish new rules.

In June, talks were paused as the gap between the position of the Parliament and

member states could not be bridged, and as a result, the current rules were prolonged, said an EP press release.

The extension gives more time for the European Parliament and EU member states to agree on the new rules.

The Generalised System of Preferences (GSP) has been the EU's preferential trade arrangement with developing countries since 1971. Under this scheme, developing countries get to pay reduced import duties when exporting to the EU. (KUNA)

Dhaman: Arab trade in goods, services grew by 32.4 pct in '22

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 5, (KUNA): Arab trade in goods and services grew by 32.4 percent during 2022 to reach USD 3.5 trillion, the Arab Investment & Export Credit Guarantee Corporation (Dhaman) said

The Corporation's Director-General Abdullah Al-Sabeeh said in a press release, on the occasion of issuing the second quarterly bulletin for 2023, that Arab merchandise trade increased by 32.6 percent to USD 2.9 trillion, as a result of the record growth of the region's merchandise export by 43

Arab merchandise trade share rose to 5.7 percent of the global total, and about 13.2 percent of merchandise trade in developing countries, he

Raw materials still represent the largest share of Arab exports by more than 75 percent as fuel exports alone make up around 62 percent of total merchandise trade, while manufactured goods represent 60 percent of Arab merchandise imports during 2022, he added.

Al-Sabeeh pointed out the continuation of geographical concentration in merchandise trade in the Arab region in 2022, with five oil exporters

contributing 81 percent of total exports, while five countries contributed 74 percent of total imports. The UAE alone accounted for more than a third of total Arab merchandise trade in 2022.

Based in Kuwait, the Arab Investment & Export Credit Guarantee Corporation (Dhaman) was established in 1974. It comprises as members all Arab countries and four joint Arab financial institutions. It provides specialized insurance services against credit and political risks with a view to facilitating the inflow of foreign direct investments into Arab countries, and promoting Arab exports and imports.

Layoffs remain historically low

US applications for jobless 'claims' up

WAHINGTON, Oct 5, (AP): Slightly more Americans applied for jobless claims last week, but layoffs remain low and the labor market continues to show resiliency amid elevated interest

rates imposed by the Federal Reserve.
Applications for unemployment benefits ticked up by 2,000 to 207,000 for the week ending Sept. 30, the Labor Department reported Thursday. Jobless claim applications are con-

sidered a proxy for the number of layoffs in a given week. The four-week moving average of claims, a less volatile measure, fell by

2.500 to 208.750. Though the Federal Reserve opted to leave its benchmark borrowing rate alone at its meeting two weeks ago, it is well into the second year of its battle to knock down persistent inflation. The central bank has raised its benchmark rate 11 times since March of 2022, with part of its goal to cool hiring and bring down wages. But the labor mar-

ket has held up better than expected. On Tuesday, the government reported that job openings jumped un-expectedly in August, with American employers posting 9.6 million job openings, up from 8.9 million in July and the first uptick in three months. Analyst were expecting vacancies to remain flat from July.

The government reported that U.S. employers added a healthy 187,000 jobs in August. Though the unemployment rate ticked up to 3.8%, it's still low by historical measures. The Labor Department issues its September jobs report on Friday.

U.S. businesses have been adding an average of about 236,000 jobs per month this year, down from the pandemic surge of the previous two years, but still a strong number.

Besides some layoffs early this year - mostly in the technology sector companies have been trying to retain workers.

Overall, 1.67 million people were collecting unemployment benefits the week that ended Sept. 23, about 5,000 fewer than the previous week

Local bank deposits with foreign

Kuwait cbank actively working to maintain the attractiveness of the dinar

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 5: Local banks experienced a significant drop in their deposits with foreign banks during the first eight months of 2023, registering a 17.6 percent decline, which amounts to 1.16 billion dinars. This decline is noteworthy, especially when comparing it to the figure of 6.614 billion dinars in December, which had decreased to 5.446 billion dinars by August. On an annual basis, this reduction stands at 16.6 percent or 1.09 billion dinars, as it was 6.535 billion dinars in August 2022. Furthermore. on a monthly basis, deposits fell by 4 percent, equivalent to approximately 226.7 million dinars, compared to the 5.673 billion dinars reported at the end of July.

In contrast, deposits of foreign banks with local banks showed a positive trend over the same eightmonth period in 2023, increasing by 2.8 percent, amounting to 144.5 million dinars. This growth brought the figure down from 5.082 billion dinars at the end of December 2022 to 4.897 billion dinars in August. However, on an annual basis, there was a decrease of 240.3 million dinars, or 4.6 percent, as it was 5.137 billion dinars in August 2022. On a monthly basis, deposits dropped by 3.6 percent, or approximately 184.9 million dinars, compared to the 5.082 billion dinars reported at the end of July.

Decline

Regarding foreign currencies, deposits in foreign currencies held by the private sector in local banks also witnessed a decline of 6.7 percent, totaling 120.2 million dinars. This decrease occurred between December 2022 when it was 1.774 billion dinars and August, where it reached 1.654 billion dinars. On a monthly basis, there was a 1.4 percent drop, approximately 25 million dinars, from the 1.679 billion dinars reported in July. Yearly, there was a decrease of 4.4 percent, equivalent to 76.4 million dinars, from 1.73 billion dinars in August 2022.

The Central Bank of Kuwait is actively working to strengthen the flow of cash between the banking sector and the national economy. It seeks to maintain the attractiveness of the Kuwaiti dinar as a secure and profitable currency for savings, thereby increasing the appeal of deposits with Kuwaiti banks. These measures align with the Central Bank's conservative policies, mirroring the decisions of the US Federal Reserve to ensure the competitiveness of the Kuwaiti dinar against the dollar. These policies aim to navigate local and global economic conditions, as well as geopolitical developments, particularly the substantial increases in global inflation rates driven by rising energy and commodity prices, and supply chain disruptions, which contribute significantly to imported inflation and its impact on the con-

sumer price index in Kuwait. In the realm of interbank deposits,

Breakthrough low wind speed innovation achieved

Masdar launches UAE's first utility scale wind project

ABU DHABI, UAE, Oct. 5, (PR Newswire): Under the directives of the UAE President, His Highness Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan, HH Sheikh Khaled bin Mohamed bin Zaved Al Nahvan, Crown Prince of Abu Dhabi and Chairman of Abu Dhabi Executive Council, inaugurated the UAE Wind Program.

The 103.5 megawatt (MW) landmark project developed by Abu Dhabi Future Energy Company PJSC - Masdar, demonstrates for the first time the latest technology and innovation to capture low wind speeds at utility scale, adopting advances in material science and aerodynamics to make wind power possible in the country. The project marks the debut of cost-effective, large scale, utility wind power on the UAE's electricity grid, diversifying the country's energy mix and advancing its en-

ergy transition.
The UAE Wind Program is expected to power over 23,000 UAE homes a year. It will displace 120,000 tonnes of carbon dioxide, equivalent of removing over 26,000 cars from the road annually. The development underscores the UAE's commitment to tackling climate change as it looks forward to hosting an inclusive COP that focuses on deliver-

ing results. The project spans four locations including the picturesque Sir Bani Yas Island, Abu Dhabi, which is home to free-roaming wildlife. A 45 MW capacity wind farm plus 14 MWp (megawatt peak) solar farm has been developed on the island. The other wind farm locations include the historical pearl-diving center, Delma Island (27MW) in Abu Dhabi, Al Sila, Abu Dhabi (27MW) and Al Halah, Fujairah (4.5MW).

HH Sheikh Khaled bin Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan attended the inauguration ceremony held on Sir Bani Yas Island, where he witnessed the signing of a landmark Power Purchase Agreement between EWEC (Emirates Water and Electricity Company) and Masdar for the wind power generation from the Sir Bani Yas Island, Al Sila, and Delma Island projects. With the addition of wind power, EWEC's portfolio now encompasses multiple sources of strategic green energy, solidifying the UAE's energy transition leadership.

The event was also attended by H.E. Dr. Sultan Al Jaber, UAE Minister of Industry and Advanced Technology, Chairman of Masdar and COP28 President-Designate; H.E. Eng. Awaidha Al Marar, Chairman of the Abu Dhabi Department of Energy; Mr Chen Guanfu, President of PowerChina International; and Mr Wu Kai, Chairman of Goldwind Group. PowerChina was the main Engineering, Procurement and Construction contractor for the program and GoldWind Group was the main supplier of equipment.

H.E. Dr. Sultan Al Jaber, UAE Minister of Industry and Advanced Technology, COP28 President-Designate and Chairman of Masdar, said, "The UAE Wind Program is a great source of national pride and a demonstration of Masdar's ability to pioneer and implement innovations in wind and renewable energy technologies. More than twenty years ago, before Masdar was created however, His Highness Sheikh Zayed, our founding father, someone who cared deeply about the environment, oversaw the completion of a wind turbine on Sir Bani Yas Island. As the UAE's clean energy powerhouse, Masdar continues this legacy by supporting the nation's vision as a global leader in sustainability and climate action as it unlocks the new potential of wind power. For a viable energy transition, the world must triple renewable energy capacity by 2030 to meet the Paris Agreement goals. As we look forward to hosting COP28, today's inauguration shows the UAE's firm commitment to this target, boosting clean energy investments both at home and abroad.

The project marks the first time that the UAE has added utility-scale wind power to its energy mix. Energy generated by landmark solar, nuclear and waste-to-energy plants already feeds into the UAE's national grid and earlier this month the country was recognized as a world leader in solar energy use, according to the latest data from The Energy Institute Statistical Review of

World Energy.
Mohamed Jameel Al Ramahi, Masdar's Chief Executive Officer, said: 'As the UAE's flagship renewable energy company, this is an incredibly proud moment for Masdar. Today's launch of the UAE's first utility-scale wind program is the result of years of hard work and collaboration. It would not have been possible without the vision and the unstinting support of the UAE's leadership, we were able to pioneer cutting-edge technology to overcome the UAE's low wind speeds and harness the power of this formidable natural resource. As we accelerate our path to Net Zero by 2050, the UAE wind program shows that anything is possible when you have vision, passion and a pioneering

Previously wind energy was not viable due to low wind speeds in the UAE, but innovations within climate technology and UAE-led expertise made wind power possible. Bigger turbine sizes, lower hardware prices and the discovery of a unique weather phenomenon that generated high winds at night made this project scalable and economically viable. As wind power is strongest at night in the UAE this complements the country's existing solar power generation, further diversifying the nations renewable energy mix.

By working with global technology leaders and turbine manufacturers, this project is paving the way for the commercialization of further utility scale, low-wind speed projects. The project is creating a foundation of critical scientific wind data, which will form the basis of the UAE's next phase of development.

Led by its founding CEO and now COP28 President-Designate, Dr Sultan Al Jaber, Masdar has been pioneering clean energy since 2006. A decade ago, the company launched the 100 MW Shams project, which was the first concentrated solar power plant to be developed in the Middle East. In Indonesia, Masdar is at the final stages of developing the Cirata Floating Solar Plant, Southeast Asia's largest floating solar

hawking a dental plan. Pope Francis wearing a stylish puffer jacket. U.S. Sen. Rand Paul sitting on the Capitol steps in a red bathrobe. But what happens next year ahead of a U.S. presidential election? Google was the first big tech com-

pany to say it would impose new labels on deceptive AI-generated political advertisements that could fake a candidate's voice or actions. Now some U.S. lawmakers are calling on social media platforms X, Facebook and Instagram to explain why they aren't doing the same.

Two Democratic members of Congress sent a letter Thursday to Meta CEO Mark Zuckerberg and X CEO Linda Yaccarino expressing "serious concerns" about the emergence of AI-generated political ads on their platforms and asking each to explain any rules they're crafting to curb the harms to free and fair elec-

"They are two of the largest platforms and voters deserve to know what guardrails are being put in place,' said U.S. Sen. Amy Klobuchar of Minnesota in an interview with The Associated Press. "We are simply asking them, 'Can't you do this? Why aren't you doing this?' It's clearly technologically possible.'

The letter to the executives from Klobuchar and U.S. Rep. Yvette Clarke of New York warns: "With the 2024 elections quickly approaching, a lack of transparency about this type of content in political ads could lead to a dangerous deluge of election-related misinformation and disinformation across your platforms - where voters often turn to learn about candidates and issues.

X, formerly Twitter, and Meta, the parent company of Facebook and Instagram, didn't immediately respond to requests for comment Thursday. Clarke and Klobuchar asked the executives to respond to their questions by

The pressure on the social media companies comes as both lawmakers are helping to lead a charge to regulate AI-generated political ads. A House bill introduced by Clarke earlier this year would amend a federal election law to require disclaimers when elecadvertisements AI-generated images or video.

"That's like the bare minimum" of

what is needed, said Klobuchar, who is sponsoring companion legislation in the Senate that she hopes will get passed before the end of the year. In the meantime, the hope is that big tech platforms will "do it on their own while we work on the standard,' Klobuchar said.

Google has already said that starting in mid-November it will require a clear disclaimer on any AI-generated election ads that alter people or events on YouTube and other Google products. This policy applies both in the U.S. and in other countries where the company verifies election ads. Facebook and Instagram parent Meta doesn't have a rule specific to AI-generated political ads but has a policy restricting "faked, manipulated or transformed" audio and imagery

used for misinformation. A more recent bipartisan Senate bill, co-sponsored by Klobuchar, Republican Sen. Josh Hawley of Missouri and others, would go farther in banning "materially deceptive" deepfakes relating to federal candidates, with exceptions for parody and

AI-generated ads are already part of the 2024 election, including one aired by the Republican National Committee in April meant to show the future of the United States if President Joe Biden is reelected. It employed fake but realistic photos showing boardedup storefronts, armored military patrols in the streets, and waves of immigrants creating panic.

Klobuchar said such an ad would likely be banned under the proposed rules. So would a fake image of Donald Trump hugging infectious disease expert Dr. Anthony Fauci that was shown in an attack ad from Trump's GOP primary opponent and Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis.

As another example, Klobuchar cited a deepfake video from earlier this year purporting to show Democratic Sen. Elizabeth Warren in a TV interview suggesting restrictions on Republicans voting.

"That is going to be so misleading if you, in a presidential race, have either the candidate you like or the candidate you don't like actually saying things that aren't true," Klobuchar said. "How are you ever going to know the difference?'

Klobuchar, who chairs the Senate Rules and Administration Committee, presided over a Sept. 27 hearing on AI and the future of elections that brought witnesses including Minnesota's secretary of state, a civil rights advocate and some skeptics.

Fears about Amazon and Microsoft cloud computing dominance 'trigger' UK probe

Ofcom says found features that could limit competition

LONDON, Oct 5, (AP): Concerns from regulators about the dominance of Amazon and Microsoft in Britain's cloud computing market have triggered a investigation into the competitiveness of the key industry.

The U.K. communications regulator Ofcom said Thursday that its yearlong study of the cloud communications services market found features that could limit competition. British businesses face barriers when they try to switch or use multiple cloud suppliers, it

Cloud computing uses data centers around the world to store photos and emails or run software. It has become a vital service for many businesses, which turn to cloud providers to avoid the cost of buying expensive equipment and real estate to run their own data centers.

Ofcom asked the U.K. antitrust watchdog, the Competition and Markets Authority, to take a closer look at the 7.5 billion-pound (\$9 billion) cloud market. The watchdog said it was opening an in-depth investigation that's expected to wrap up by April 2025.

"Some U.K. businesses have told us they're concerned about it being too difficult to switch or mix and match cloud provider, and it's not clear that competition is working well," Ofcom's director responsible for the market study, Fergal Farragher, said in a press release. "So, we're referring the market to the CMA for further scrutiny, to make sure business customers continue to benefit from cloud services.

Ofcom said it was concerned about the position held by Amazon and Microsoft, which together account for 70% to 80% of the cloud market. Google trailed behind with 5% to 10% of the share, and smaller players

Amazon Web Services, the online retail giant's cloud computing business, said it disagrees with Ofcom's findings, which it said "are based on a fundamental misconception of how the IT sector functions, and the services and discounts on offer.'

"The cloud has made switching between providers easier than ever. Any unwarranted intervention could lead to unintended harm to IT customers and competition," the company said in a statement.

Both companies said they would work constructively with the CMA. "We are committed to ensuring the UK cloud industry remains innova-

tive, highly competitive and an accelerator for growth across the economy," Microsoft said in a statement. Ofcom said it was concerned about fees, technical barriers and dis-

counts that could discourage customers from changing or using more than one provider. The CMA said it would investigate whether competition is working well and what needs to be done if it isn't.

KYIV, Ukraine, Oct 5, (AP): Officials from the International Monetary Fund say they expect the United States will continue playing its key role in amassing multinational support that has helped keep Ukraine's economy afloat during Russia's inva-

That's despite Congress recently passing a short-term funding package that averted a U.S. government shutdown but dropped \$6 billion in aid to Ukraine. It's not clear if, when or how that aid installment might be restored.

The U.S. has already sent or committed \$69.5 billion in military, financial and humanitarian aid to Ukraine, according to the Institute for the World Economy in Kiel, Germany.

" President Biden has made an announcement ... that he is fully committed to supporting Ukraine," Uma Ramakrish-nan, IMF European department deputy director, said at a news conference Wednesday in Kviv. "And so from our standpoint, the baseline assumption remains that the U.S. remains committed."

She added that "it is premature for us to comment on what will materialize or not, because we have to wait for the process to play out."

Officials from the Washingtonbased IMF also said Ukraine's economy was showing surprising resilience despite widespread damage from Russia's war.

The Ukrainian economy has shown improving growth and lower inflation this year after the disastrous loss in 2022 of around a third of its output, including from war destruction and Russian occupation of key industrial

Key to that improvement has been foreign financial aid, which gets less attention than military supplies but helps Ukraine keep paying civil servants and pensioners. It also has helped keep people's savings and salaries from vanishing due to price spikes.

budget aid means Ukraine's government can avoid using the central bank to print money to cover its bills - an emergency necessity it turned to in the first days of the invasion, but a practice that can lead to runaway inflation.

Annual inflation has fallen from 26% in January to 8.6% in August. The central bank on Monday was confident enough in the stability of Ukraine's currency to drop a fixed exchange rate imposed at the start of the war.

The IMF is lending Ukraine \$15.6 billion over three years. That should clear the way for a total of \$115 billion from donor countries that is expected to cover the government's financing needs. The IMF loan helps bring in funds from other donors who are reassured by the IMF's review of Ukraine's economic practices and requirements to improve governance and fight cor-

Ukraine is "making good progress" on passing legislation on a specialized anti-corruption prosecutor, said IMF Ukraine mission chief Gavin Gray. Bills were introduced in September ahead of a December deadline under the loan agreement.

IMF loan agreements with Ukraine before the war had stalled due to lack of progress in curbing corruption and the influence of politically influential business moguls. These oligarchs have kept a low profile since the invasion, and President Volodymyr Zelenskyy has fired several top government officials suspected of misconduct to show he is serious in fighting corruption.

Ukraine's economy "is certainly adapting to the war environment and showing remarkable resilience," with increasing consumer demand boosting growth, deputy mission chief Nathan Epstein said.

He added that economic growth should be at the upper end of the IMF forecast of 1%-2% this year.

'SNL' returns with Davidson and Bad Bunny slated to host

NEW YORK, Oct 5, (AP): Live from New York ... it's the return of 'Saturday Night Live' after last season was cut short because of the writers strike.

The long-running sketch comedy show will premiere Season 49 on Oct. 14, NBC announced Wednesday. Former cast member Pete Davidson will host, making good on a plan to have him host last May. The comedian will be joined by first-time musical guest Ice Spice.

The following week, Bad Bunny will pull double duty as host and musical guest. While the Grammy winner has performed on the show before, it'll be his hosting debut.

The entire cast from Season 48 will return, along with one new addition: Chloe Troast, as a featured player.

Davidson had been set to host May 6, alongside musical guest Lil Uzi Vert, but his episode was the first to be cut after the writers strike started just days before. The writers strike was declared over Sept. 26 after Writers Guild of America board members approved a contract agreement with studios. While Hollywood actors are still on strike for most television and theatrical work, the "SNL" cast can resume performing as variety shows operate under a different contract.

Other late-night shows like "The Tonight Show Starring Jimmy Fallon", "Jimmy Kimmel Live!", "Last Week Tonight with John Oliver" and "The Late Show with Stephen Colbert" have also returned.

"I'm excited to do some more 'SNL," cast member James Austin Johnson, known for impressions of Donald Trump and Joe Biden, told The Associated Press earlier this week. "It moves quick."

Meanwhile, Hollywood actors are in talks with studios over labor issues. Negotiations have been centered on pay, the use of artificial intelligence, and self-taped auditions. Key figures in these negotiations include Duncan Crabtree-Ireland, national executive director for the Screen Actors Guild-American Federation of Television and Radio Artists, and Carol Lombardini, head of the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers.

Negotiations

"I get asked to talk to law students about careers from time to time, and I always preface the story by saying I can't, I don't encourage you to try to replicate this because I've no idea how it happened," Crabtree-Ireland told the AP in an interview. "I never thought I'd be here."

Crabtree-Ireland, originally from Memphis, became involved in labor negotiations after working as a criminal prosecutor in Los Angeles. His first contract talks for film and TV actors led to their first strike in over 40 years.

Lombardini, the president and chief negotiator of the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers, has been negotiating with Hollywood's unions and guilds for 14 years. She has faced the challenges of strikes during her tenure.

The industry's giants, including Disney CEO Bob Iger, Warner Bros. Discovery CEO David Zaslav, and Netflix co-CEO Ted Sarandos, are directly involved in strike negotiations. Iger's large contract and comments drew attention, while Sarandos signifies the industry's shift to streaming. Zaslav represents a shift toward reality TV and other programming.

Fran Drescher, known for her role in "The Nanny," is the face of the strikes as SAG-AFTRA's president. She made a passionate speech at the strike announcement, resonating with the actors.

The negotiating committee supporting Crabtree-Ireland includes actors like Sean Astin, Anthony Rapp, Sheryl Lee Ralph, and others who represent the majority of union members who are not famous and make less than \$27,000 a year from acting.

Ellen Stutzman, an attorney, is celebrated for her role in negotiating major gains for writers. She took over as chief negotiator for the Writers Guild just two weeks before contract talks began and played a key role in the writers' 2019 fight with agents.

Overall, these negotiations involve a diverse group of individuals from different backgrounds and positions in the entertainment

ground in horror than "The Exorcist." As endlessly as William Friedkin's 1973 film has been ripped off and resurrected, its power remains unalloyed, its place in movie history consecrated. Why is it that, after we've seen so many heads

twist around, "The Exorcist" can still turn heads? Much, surely, is owed to its patient, restrained approach, icy atmospheres and and evocative, uncluttered imagery - all conjured in the dawning dread of post-1960s America.

But the possession of young Regan MacNeil still haunts, I think, for its absolute belief in good and evil. It's a supernatural movie that treats the supernatural as straightforwardly natural. The devil is as real and present as all those concrete steps.

There were flop sequels that followed and plenty of spinoffs that failed to grip. But now, just two months after the death of Friedkin and a few months shy of the original's 50th anniversary, comes a sequel from director David Gordon Green.

Hollywood's propensity for reaching back to old classics may be, by now, enough to inspire the kind of projectile vomiting Friedkin made famous. "The Exorcist: Believer" was produced by Blumhouse with the intent of launching a new series of films, but it feels guided largely by affection and respect for Friedkin's original rather than more cynical mo-

The film's main additions are that, this time, there are two possessed girls (double the fun?) and the Catholic Church is no longer the sole or even the primary demon battler. This is a multidenominational "Exorcist," yet also a less profoundly spiritual one.

Green, one of today's most protean filmmakers, has been at this before. He rebooted the "Halloween" films in a trilogy that started off promisingly with an update to the slasher suburban nightmare before devolving in subsequent films.

It's easier to recycle "Halloween" than it is "The Exorcist." Yet the first thing you notice about "Believer" is its sure-handedness. Green, working from a script he wrote with Peter Sattler from a story by Green, Danny McBride and Scott Teems, moves nimbly in setting the atmosphere, refraining from the kinds of flashy camera movement or schlocky scares

often found in horror films. There's craftsmanship in

'Believer' tries to revive a horror classic

how "Believer" is stitched together - at least at first. Thirteen years after the death of his pregnant wife in an earthquake in Haiti, Victor Fielding (Leslie Odom Jr.) lives with his 13-year-old daughter Angela (Lidya Jewett). They are close and Victor is a little overprotective. When Angela and a friend Katherine (Olivia O'Neill) walk through the woods after school and start performing a seance by candlelight, it's not hard to guess where this might be going.

But "The Exorcist: Believer" initially gets its hooks into you thanks to the agility of the filmmaking, the levelheaded presence of Odom Jr. and a fine performance by newcomer Jewett. The girls go missing for several days and, when they return, no longer seem themselves. As things begin to get ugly, the film's attention shifts to the parents - this is more a movie about parenting than it is about faith - including the blurrily characterized parents of Katherine (Norbert Leo Butz and Jennifer Nettles), whose bond with their daughter may be less than Victor's with Angela.

If "The Exorcist" seemed to summon demons, the best "The Exorcist: Believer" can do is to conjure tropes. Fingers claw. Heads turn. Bodies levitate. Once the film gets both possessed girls tied down in chairs, back to back, with a cobbled-together team of spiritual defenders around them, "Believer" bogs down in a prolonged torture chamber of horror cliches.

Green, who has long had a keen eye for casting, populates the film with some fine actors. Ellen Burstyn, Oscar-nominated for "The Exorcist," returns as Chris MacNeil, though it may be the film's biggest mistake to so quickly and gruesomely dispatch its most potent performer. Ann Dowd, as a nurse who lives next door, also adds to the film's dramatic heft.

But "The Exorcist: Believer" never manages an-

ything like the deep terror of the original, and the film's climactic scenes pass by with a lifeless predictability. Been there, exhumed that. It may be that to get near the dark danger of "The Exorcist" you have

to climb your own steps and fight your own demons. "The Exorcist: Believer," a Universal Pictures release is rated R by the Motion Picture Association for or some violent content, disturbing images, language and sexual references. Running time: 111 minutes. Two stars out of four.

LOS ANGELES: William Friedkin died in August but the legendary filmmaker of "The French Connection" and "The Exorcist" left one movie behind. "The Caine Mutiny Court Martial," which premiered at the Venice Film Festival in early September, is Friedkin's final film. The movie, which streams Friday on Showtime and Paramount+, adapts Herman Wouk's oft-revived 1950s play, a courtroom drama about mismanagement and mutiny aboard a US Navy destroyer. Friedkin, whose long filmography is dotted with stage adaptations (including Tracy Letts' "Bug" and "Killer Joe"), transplants the story from World War II to post-9/11 America. It stars Keifer Sutherland, Jason Clarke and the late Lance Reddick.

Meanwhile, with the calendar turning to October, a long line of horror films is dutifully making its way to screens. "The Haunted Mansion" slides in on the spookier (rather than the scary) end of the spectrum. The film, based on the Walt Disney theme park attraction, is directed by Justin Simien ("Dear White People") and stars LaKeith Stanfield as an inspector called on to investigate a haunted house. Rosario Dawson, Owen Wilson, Danny DeVito, Tiffany Haddish and Jamie Lee Curtis make up the ensemble cast. In her review, AP Film Writer Lindsey Bahr credited their performances but said the film strains for coherence: "By no means a terrible movie, or even an unpleasant watch, but it's just missing the magic that makes the trip to the theaters (or Disney World) worth it.

Jones offers life advice

Brown gives romantic twist to WWII disaster

LOS ANGELES, Oct 5, (AP): The actor who plays Eleven on "Stranger Things" wrote a romance novel! That'll be the headline for too much coverage of "Nineteen Steps," so let's set that aside and consider the debut book from Millie Bobby Brown on its own merits.

It's a love story set in London, spanning the wartime years of 1942-1945. Nellie is the protagonist, an 18-year-old young woman who works as a secretary for the mayor of Bethnal Green, in the city's East End. She lives with her mother, father, brother and little sister, and next door to her best friend Babs, whose brother, Billy, is besotted with Nellie after a childhood spent together.

In the wake of the Blitz, Germany continues to selectively bomb England, forcing Nellie and the rest of Bethnal Green's citizens into an underground air raid shelter many nights. That's where those foreboding titular steps come in: Every time they descend to the shelter, Nellie "counted them like usual. Nineteen, turn right and seven more.

Spoiler fans can stop at this point and Google the "Bethnal Green steps," but what's the fun in that? Brown dedicates the book to her grandmother ("Nanny Ruth, who told me this story"), but the book is being marketed as fiction, with all the usual disclaimers about how any "references to real people, events, etc.... are intended only to provide a sense of authenticity, and are used fictitiously.

The story starts to sing when Nellie meets Ray, a US Air Force pilot stationed nearby. The prose describing their first kiss fits the moon-eyed mood as the young couple falls hopelessly in love. "If ever she had to pick a moment she'd want to last for eternity, she thought, this would be the one she'd choose," writes Brown.

Honestly, most readers could predict the rest of the plot at this point. The love triangle involving Nellie, Billy and Ray, plays a central role, and, of course, what happens on those steps, but the book is really about making your way when consumed by grief. And in that aspect it succeeds, painting a brave portrait of Nellie and her family and friends as they struggle to survive and find happiness in a world gone mad.

Time will tell if Brown has more stories in her, but her late, beloved grandmother would assuredly be proud of this first effort.

Leslie Jones wants to set one thing straight in her memoir: She is undeniable. The word pops up 11 times in the book. Indefatigable is another good word to describe a comic whose career didn't really take off until she joined the cast of "Saturday Night Live" at the age of 47, though perhaps it's too many syllables for a standup routine.

Jones' memoir, "Leslie F(asterisk)cking Jones," which takes the name on her Memphis, Tennessee, birth certificate, **Annette Leslie Jones**, and drops the first name she never liked while adding her favorite adjective in the middle, is like her comedy — no-holds-barred. The focus is not on how Jones survived child abuse or racism or sexism, just that she did, she's here now, and the world better shut up and listen to her. Even if they don't, she's not going to stop speaking her truth, even when it sometimes paints her in an awful light.

"One day, when I was probably around five," writes Jones, "I was walking through the trailer park... and I saw a puppy just lying on the side of the road... for some reason I just started kicking this little puppy... I tell you this because I know that this is a moment my life when the road split, and I could have gone one of two ways, and the second way is to be a serial killer or even worse.

In hindsight, Jones writes, "The psychology of what I was doing is clear: When your power is taken away, you need to reassert it somehow, and what better way than dominating something less powerful than you?" Jones doesn't go too deep into her childhood abuse at the hands of a babysitter, but you sense that hours of therapy — and a personal relationship with God she found later in life — helped her become a confident adult.

A Norwegian master of spare Nordic writing

Norway's Fosse wins literature Nobel

STOCKHOLM, Oct 5, (AP): Jon Fosse, a master of spare Nordic writing in a sprawling body of work ranging from plays to novels and children's books, won the Nobel Prize in literature on Thursday for works that "give voice to the unsayable.

Fosse's work, which is rooted in his Norwegian background, "focuses on human insecurity and anxiety," Anders Olsson, chair of the Nobel literature committee, told The Associated Press. "The basic choices you make in life, very elemental stuff.'

One of his country's most-performed dramatists, Fosse said he had "cautiously prepared" himself for a decade to receive the news that he had won.

"I was surprised when they called, yet at public broadcaster NRK. "It was a great joy for me to get the phone call."

The author of 40 plays as well as novels, short stories, children's books, poetry and essays, Fosse was honored "for his innovative plays and prose which give voice to the unsayable," according to the Swedish Academy, which awards the prize.

Fosse has cited the bleak, enigmatic work of Irish writer Samuel Beckett - the 1969 Nobel literature laureate - as an influence on his minimalist style.

His first novel, "Red, Black," was published in 1983, and his debut play, "Someone is Going to Come," in 1992. His major prose works include "Melancholy;" "Morning and Evening," whose two parts depict a birth and a death; "Wakefulness;" and "Olav's Dreams."

His plays, which have been staged across Europe and in the United States, include "The Name," "Dream of Autumn" and "I am the Wind." His work "A New Name: Septology VI-VII" - described by Olsson as Fosse's "magnum opus" - was a finalist for the International Booker Prize in 2022.

Fosse has also taught writing - one of his students was best-selling Norwegian novelist Karl Ove Knausgaard - and consulted on a Norwegian translation of the Bible.

Mats Malm, permanent secretary of the academy, reached Fosse by telephone to inform him of the win. He said the writer was driving in the countryside and promised to drive home carefully.

Fosse is the fourth Norwegian writer to get the literature prize, but the first in nearly a century. Bjørnstjerne Bjørnson got it in 1903, Knut Hamsun was awarded it in 1920 and Sigrid Undset in 1928.

Fosse writes in Nynorsk, one of the two official written standards of Norwegian that is chiefly spoken in and around Bergen, where the writer lives. It is used by just 10% of Norway's 5.4 million people, according to the Language Council of Norway, but completely intelligible

with the other written form, Bokmaal. Guy Puzey, senior lecturer in Scandinavian Studies at the University of Edinburgh, said Bokmaal is "the language of power, it's the language or urban centers, of the press," while Nynorsk is used mainly by people in rural

guage," he said.

In recognition of his contribution to Norwegian culture, Fosse was granted use of an honorary residence in the grounds of the Royal Palace owned by the Norwegian state.

"A great recognition of outstanding authorship that makes an impression and touches people all over the world," Norway's Prime Minister Jonas Gahr Støre wrote on X, formerly known as Twitter. "All of Norway offers congratulations and is proud today!"

In a statement released by his publishing house, Samlaget, Fosse said he saw the prize 'as an award to the literature that first and foremost aims to be literature, without other

considerations. The Nobel Prizes carry a cash award of 11 million Swedish kronor (\$1 million) from a bequest left by their creator, Swedish inventor Alfred Nobel. Winners also receive an 18-carat gold medal and diploma at the award

ceremonies in December. Last year, French author Annie Ernaux won the prize for what the prize-giving Swedish Academy called "the courage and clinical acuity" of books rooted in her small-town background in the Normandy region of northwest France.

Ernaux was just the 17th woman among the 119 Nobel literature laureates. The literature prize has long faced criticism that it is too focused on European and North American writers, as well as too male-dominated.

In 2018, the award was postponed after sex abuse allegations rocked the Swedish Academy, which names the Nobel literature committee, and sparked an exodus of members.

The academy revamped itself but faced more criticism for giving the 2019 award to Austria's Peter Handke, who has been called an apologist for Serbian war crimes.

Earlier the most prestigious and secretive prize in science ran headfirst into the digital era Wednesday when Swedish media got an emailed press release revealing the winners of the Nobel Prize in chemistry and the news prematurely went public.

The Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences said it was investigating.

About four hours before the official announcement was planned Wednesday, several Swedish media received a press release from the academy revealing that US-based scientists Moungi Bawendi, Louis Brus and Alexei their work on quantum dots.

The Associated Press did not receive the press release in advance and decided not to publish the names until confirmed by the academy, but many Swedish media organizations did. Many were suspicious of the email at first. They published the information, however, since the academy didn't write it off as false, merely insisting that the final decision on a winner had not yet been taken.

"We don't know what happened," the academy's secretary-general, Hans Ellengren, told The Associated Press. "This is very unfortunate, and we regret very much that that this happened. Exactly what happened I can't tell, because we don't know ourselves.'

The five-member Nobel Prize committees spend months whittling down lists of nominations before the full academy makes its official decision on the day of the award, announcing Nobel winners at a scheduled news conference. Wednesday's premature press release rein-

forced suspicions that the final decision is just a formality, since material including background information on the winners must be prepared in advance.

More importantly, it showed the difficulty of keeping anything secret for long in the age when virtually everything is online.

"It is an important principle that the prize winners are the first to find out, and that everyone else finds out afterward at the same time," the former head of the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences, Göran Hansson, told news agency TT. "But in the electronic era the leaks can occur in different ways than in the newspaper era.'

WINCHESTER, Va.: An animal trainer featured in the popular Netflix series "Tiger King" has received a suspended two-year sentence after being convicted of wildlife trafficking in Virginia, the state attorney general's office announced.

Bhagavan "Doc" Antle also was banned from owning and dealing in exotic wild animals in the state for five years, Attorney General Jason **Mivares** said Tuesday in a statement. Antle was accused of illegally buying endan-

gered lion cubs in Frederick County, Virginia, for display and profit at his South Carolina zoo. A jury convicted him in June of two felony counts each of wildlife trafficking and conspiring to wildlife traffic. He had faced up to 20 years in prison.

Antle, who owns the Myrtle Beach Safari, appeared in "Tiger King: Murder, Mayhem and Madness," a Netflix documentary miniseries that focused on tiger breeders. (AP)

UK to up smoking age

Biden urges women to get mammograms

WASHINGTON, Oct 5, (AP): Jill Biden is urging women to consult their doctors about getting mammograms or other cancer screenings, saying in a new public service announcement for Breast Cancer Awareness Month that early detection saves

"October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, and I'm asking you to put your health first," the first lady says in the 30-second spot recorded amid flower blooms in the White House Rose Garden.

"Take a moment to talk to your doctor about whether it's time for your mammogram or other cancer screenings," she says in the announcement airing this week on the Lifetime cable network. "There is no one-size-fits-all approach, but we

know that early detection of cancer saves lives. Biden's ad is part of an annual breast cancer awareness



campaign by Lifetime, according to the cable network. A separate public service announcement featuring similar messages from actor Keshia Knight Pulliam and TV correspondent Rachel Lindsay will also be broadcast by the network.

The first lady is a longtime advocate for breast cancer education and prevention dating to 1993, when four of her friends were diagnosed with the disease. Shortly afterward, she launched the Biden Breast Health Initiative to teach high school girls in Delaware

about the importance of early detection. In the White House, she and her husband, President Joe Biden, are driving efforts to prevent more than 4 million cancer deaths by 2047 and improve the experience for people who are touched by cancer, including patients, their families and their caregivers.

Breast cancer is the most common cancer in U.S. women after skin cancer, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Breast cancer deaths have declined over time but remain the second leading cause of cancer death among women overall, the CDC said.

One in eight women in the U.S. will be diagnosed with breast cancer in her lifetime.

The first lady is among the millions of people in the U.S. who have been touched by cancer.

Earlier this year, she had cancerous lesions removed from above her right eye and her chest. In 2015, she and the president lost their 46-year-old son, Beau, to brain cancer.

Smoking: UK Prime Minister **Rishi Sunak** on Wednesday proposed raising the legal age that people in England can buy cigarettes by one year, every year until it is eventually illegal for the whole population and smoking will hopefully be phased out among young people.

Setting out his plan at the annual Conservative Party conference, Sunak said he wanted to "stop teenagers taking up cigarettes in the first place.

It is currently illegal for anyone to sell cigarettes or tobacco products to people under 18 years old throughout the U.K.

Sunak's office said the incremental changes would stop children who turn 14 this year and those younger than that now from ever legally being sold cigarettes in England.

If Parliament approves the proposal, the legal change would only apply in England - not in Northern Ireland, Scotland and

"People take up cigarettes when they're young. Four in five smokers have started by the time they're 20," he said. "Later, the vast majority try to quit ... if we could break that cycle, if we could stop the start, then we would be on our way to ending the biggest cause of preventable death and disease in our country.

The government said that smoking won't be criminalized, and the phased changes mean that anyone who can legally buy cigarettes now won't be prevented from doing so in the future.

The number of people who smoke in the U.K. has declined by two-thirds since the 1970s, but some 6.4 million people in the country - or about 13% of the population - still smoke cording to official figures.

Britain's government raised the legal age of sale for tobacco from 16 to 18 in 2007. That succeeded in reducing the prevalence of smoking among 16 and 17-year-olds by 30%, Sunak's

Health experts welcomed the prime minister's plan to steadily increase the legal smoking age. A similar measure was approved in New Zealand last year.

"This government's plan to introduce 'smoke-free generation' legislation could become its defining legacy, righting a century-old wrong, with tobacco products being the only legally available commodity that, if used as intended, will kill over half of its lifelong users," said Lion Shahab, an academic who co-directs the tobacco and alcohol research group at University College London.

Sunak also said his government would introduce measures to restrict the availability of vapes, or e-cigarettes, to children. It is currently illegally to sell vapes to children under 18 in the U.K., but officials say youth vaping has tripled in the past three years and more children now vape than smoke.

Zimbabwe announces 100 suspected cholera deaths

Zimbabwe has recorded 100 suspected deaths from cholera and more than 5,000 possible cases since late last month, prompting the government to impose restrictions to stop the spread of the disease, including limiting numbers at funerals and stopping some social gatherings in affected areas.

The health ministry announced the death toll late Wednesday and said 30 of the deaths had been confirmed as from cholora through laboratory toots.

confirmed as from cholera through laboratory tests. It said 905 confirmed cases had been recorded, as

well as another 4,609 suspected cases.

Cholera is a water-borne disease that can spread rapidly in areas with poor sanitation and is caused

by the ingestion of contaminated water or food. Zimbabwe struggles with access to clean water.

Large gatherings at funerals, which are common in the southern African country as people flock to mourn the dead, have been stopped in some of the most affected areas in parts of the Manicaland and Masvingo provinces. No more

than 50 people are allowed to attend funerals, while people should avoid shaking hands and are not allowed to serve food at the funerals, the government said.

The government has also said people should stop attending open markets, some social gatherings and outdoor church camps, where there is usually

no sanitary infrastructure. Zimbabwe has often imposed restrictions during its repeated outbreaks of cholera. (AP)

Expert explains when and how cells decide to die

'Cell death is essential to your health'

Living cells work better than dying cells, right? However, this is not always the case: your cells often sacrifice themselves to keep you healthy. The unsung hero of life is death.

While death may seem passive, an unfortunate ending that just "happens," the death of your cells is often extremely purposeful and strategic. The intricate details of how and why cells die can have significant effects on your overall health.

There are over 10 different ways cells can "decide" to die, each serving a particular purpose for the organism. My own research explores how immune cells switch between different types of programmed death in scenarios like cancer or injury.

Programmed cell death can be broadly divided into two types that are crucial to health: silent and inflammatory

Cells can often become damaged because of age, stress or injury, and these abnormal cells can make you sick. Your body runs a tight ship, and when cells step out of line, they must be quietly eliminated before they overgrow into tumors or cause unnecessary inflammation where your immune system is activated and causes fever, swelling, redness and pain.

Your body swaps out cells every day to ensure that your tissues are made up of healthy, functioning ones. The parts of your body that are more likely to see damage, like your skin and gut, turn over cells weekly, while other cell types can take months to years to recycle. Regardless of the timeline, the death of old and damaged cells and their replacement with new cells is a normal and important bodily process.

Silent cell death, or apoptosis, is described as silent

because these cells die without causing an inflammatory reaction. Apoptosis is an active process involving many proteins and switches within the cell. It's designed to strategically eliminate cells without alarming the rest of the body.

Sometimes cells can detect that their own functions are failing and turn on executioner proteins that chop up their own DNA, and they quietly die by apoptosis. Alternatively, healthy cells can order overactive or damaged neighbor cells to activate their executioner proteins.

Āpoptosis is important to maintaining a healthy body. În fact, you can thank apoptosis for your fingers and toes. Fetuses initially have webbed fingers until the cells that form the tissue between them undergo apoptosis and die off.

Without apoptosis, cells can grow out of control. A well-studied example of this is cancer. Cancer cells are abnormally good at growing and dividing, and those that can resist apoptosis form very aggressive tumors. Understanding how apoptosis works and why cancer cells can disrupt it can potentially improve cancer treatments.

Benefit

Other conditions can benefit from apoptosis research as well. Your body makes a lot of immune cells that all respond to different targets, and occasionally one of these cells can accidentally target your own tissues. Apoptosis is a crucial way your body can eliminate these immune cells before they cause unnecessary damage. When apoptosis fails to eliminate these cells, sometimes because of genetic abnormalities, this can lead to autoimmune diseases like lupus.

Another example of the role apoptosis plays in health is endometriosis, an understudied disease caused by the overgrowth of tissue in the uterus. It can be extremely painful and debilitating for patients. Researchers have recently linked this out-of-control growth in the uterus to dysfunctional apoptosis. Whether it's for development or maintenance, your

cells are quietly exiting to keep your body happy and healthy.

Sometimes, it is in your body's best interest for cells to raise an alarm as they die. This can be beneficial when cells detect the presence of an infection and need to eliminate themselves as a target while also alerting the rest of the body. This inflammatory cell death is typically triggered by bacteria, viruses or

Rather than quietly shutting down, cells undergoing inflammatory cell death will make themselves burst, or lyse, killing themselves and exploding inflammatory messengers as they go. These messengers tell your immune cells that there is a threat and prompts them to treat and fight the pathogen.

An inflammatory death would not be healthy for maintenance. If the normal recycling of your skin or gut cells caused an inflammatory reaction, you would feel sick a lot. This is why inflammatory death is tightly controlled and requires multiple signals to initiate.

Despite the riskiness of this grenadelike death, many infections would be impossible to fight without it. Many bacteria and viruses need to live around or inside your cells to survive. When specialized sensors on your cells detect these threats, they can simultaneously activate your immune system and remove themselves as a home for pathogens. Researchers call this eliminating the niche of the pathogen.

Inflammatory cell death plays a major role in pandemics. Yersinia pestis, the bacteria behind the Black Death, has evolved various ways of stopping human immune cells from mounting a response. However, immune cells developed the ability to sense this trickery and die an inflammatory death. This ensures that additional immune cells will infiltrate and eliminate the bacteria despite the bacteria's best attempts to prevent a fight. (AP)

Pakistan still searching for right starting lineup ahead of WC game against Dutch

NEW DELHI, Oct 5, (AP): Pakistan captain Babar Azam feels like he's playing a Cricket World Cup at home, even if his lineup is unsettled.

The world's top-ranked ODI batter for more than two years - is searching for the right balance for his starting XI going into Pakistan's opening day-nighter against Netherlands on Friday at Hyderabad.

Babar was in good touch despite Pakistan's losses in warm-up games to New Zealand and Australia, scoring 80 and an unbeaten 90. Mohammad Rizwan, Saud Shakeel and Iftikhar Ahmed were also among the runs as Pakistan went close to 350-run marks in both games before finishing on the wrong side of the results.

The tall legspinner Usama Mir was the most impressive of the three spinners -- better than Shadab and left-arm spinner Mohammad Nawaz at times -- in the warmups. The form of Usama could give Babar some selection headaches.

Netherlands had a remarkable entry into the World Cup after sensationally beating the two-time champions West Indies in a Super Over in the qualifying tournament at Zimbabwe in July and then advancing over Scotland.

The likes of Logan van Beek, Bas de Leede, Max O'Dowd, Roelof van der Merwe and captain Scott Edwards all contributed in lifting their team to the main event.

Fluminense reach Copa final

PORTO ALEGRE, Brazil, Oct 5, (AP): Brazil's Fluminense beat local rivals Internacional 2-1 on Wednesday with two goals in six minutes to reach the final of the Copa Libertadores and seek their first title in the tournament.

The first leg between the two teams ended 2-2 last week at the Maracana Stadium in Rio de Janeiro, where the final will be played on Nov. 4.

Internacional opened the scoring in the 9th minute with a header by Gabriel Mercado. Fluminense kept the pressure through the second half, but offered the hosts several counterattacks that could have ended its hopes of playing the decider if striker Enner Valencia had been more accurate in two finishes.

GENEVA, Oct 5, (AP): Newcastle capped a stellar day for Saudi Arabia's soccer project with a 4-1 win over Paris Saint-Germain in the Champions League that left Kylian Mbappé a picture of despair.

Hours before kickoff at Newcastle, which were struggling when bought by the Saudi sovereign wealth fund just two years ago, the kingdom became the strong favorite to host the 2034 World Cup in a fast-track bidding contest opened by FIFA.

On the field, a Newcastle team fueled by the fervor of their passionate fans, swept aside Mbappé and a PSG team bought by Saudi neighbor Qatar 12 years ago after it was picked as 2022 World Cup host.

Newcastle have raced to the top of the tough Group F where seven-time European champions AC Milan drew 0-0 at Borussia Dortmund, the 1997 title winners.

Manchester City further restored Premier League pride one day after Arsenal and Manchester United both lost their games in the second round of the group stage.

City won 3-1 at Leipzig and the Abu Dhabi-backed defending champions already look comfortable atop the Group G standings with lower-ranked Red Star Belgrade and Young Boys drawing 2-2.

SOCCER

Barcelona also earned a second straight win, 1-0 at Porto where the Spanish team's starlet Lamine Yamal became the youngest player to start a European Cup game in the 68-year history of the competition at 16 years, 83 days.

Lazio scored a stoppage-time winning goal at Celtic in a 2-1 victory to join Atletico Madrid on four points in Group E. Atletico trailed twice before outlasting Feyenoord in a 3-2 win.

Shakhtar Donetsk also won 3-2 after trailing at Royal Antwerp, which wasted a 2-0 lead at halftime and missed a penalty in stoppage time.

Newcastle's first home game in the

Champions League for more than 20 years was pulsating in the famously atmospheric St. James' Park.

Alonso marks successful yr in charge at Leverkusen 'ahead' of Rhine derby

DUESSELDORF, Germany, Oct 5, (AP): From the relegation zone to the top of the standings. Not a bad first year in charge for Xabi Alonso at Bayer Leverkusen.

Man City, Barcelona also win

Alonso marked his first anniversary at the German club on Thursday and has a game against local rivals Cologne on Sunday, another test of Leverkusen's credentials to challenge Bayern Munich for the Bundesliga title.

A World Cup and Champions League winner as a player, Alonso had never coached a club's first team until he was appointed at Leverkusen on Oct. 5, 2022. At the time, Leverkusen had slumped to 17th in the 18-team league under predecessor Gerardo Seoane.

One year later, Leverkusen are in first place after climbing to the top of the standings last week with a 3-0 win over Mainz as Bayern dropped points in a 2-2 draw with Leipzig. Alonso also won praise for reaching the Europa League semifinals last season before a narrow loss to Jose Mourinhocoached Roma.

A squad of young, ambitious players have been key to Leverkusen's rise, with Alonso getting the most out of the likes of German playmaker Florian Wirtz and speedy Dutch right back Jeremie Frimpong, who signed a new contract through 2028 on Tuesday. Victor Boniface has scored eight goals in eight games since the Ni-

gerian striker signed from Union Saint-Gilloise in July.

Alonso marked his anniversary in Leverkusen in the unfamiliar surroundings of Molde, a town of 20,000 people in Norway where the team played a Europa League

Sunday's game at home to Cologne - called the Rhine derby because of the river running between Leverkusen and Cologne - looks deceptively easy in the standings but could prove anything but. Cologne have only one point from its opening six games but have saved their best performances for their biggest opponents, including a 1-0 loss to Borussia Dortmund on an 88thminute goal in their first game of the season.

A win over Cologne played a key role in getting Alonso established in Leverkusen a year ago, too. He had only one win from his first seven games in all competitions but turned it around by hammering then-league leader Union Berlin 5-0 and following up with a 2-1 win over Cologne.

Alonso's record over the last year has fueled speculation he could be a contender to take over at his old club Real Madrid when Carlo Ancelotti's contract runs out at the end of the season. Alonso signed a contract extension at Leverkusen to 2026 in August in a sign he's sticking around, for now



HANGZHOU. China. Oct 5, (AP): Bahrain won their 10th gold medal Thursday at the Asian Games as runner Eunice Chebichii Paul Chumba took first place in the women's marathon.

Chumba was only a few seconds in front of silver medalist Zhang Deshun at 35 kilometers, but broke away to finish 1 minute, 41 seconds ahead of her in a winning time of 2:26:14.

Sardana Trofimova of Kazakhstan finished third for the bronze. The 30-year-old Chumba, who

Biles leads US women to record 7th straight team title

ANTWERP, Belgium, Oct 5, (AP): Simone Biles and her teammates were far from perfect, and yet nothing could stand in the way of a victory that set a record for both the U.S. women's team and the greatest gymnast in history.

The U.S. women earned a record seventh consecutive team title at the gymnastics world championships on Wednesday night. For Biles, it was also her 33rd major championship medal - across the worlds and Olympics - to make her the most decorated female gymnast ever.

And it's fitting that it came in Antwerp, the Belgian port city where Biles came to international prominence 10 years ago by winning her first world title in 2013.

"It wasn't Team USA's best day," Biles said. "It's crazy, we still pulled it out. So I'm really, really proud of the team.

GYMNASTICS

The American team of Biles, Shilese Jones, Skye Blakely, Joscelyn Roberson and Leanne Wong combined for a total of 167.729 points to edge second-place Brazil and France.

The U.S. team won by a margin of 2.199 points as the final proved to be a closer contest than anticipated after the Americans put up a dominant performance in qualifying to finish more than five points ahead of the field.

"We had some mistakes here and there, but just keep going, keep relying on our training," Biles said. "But I think this team that we have brought this year has the most great courage and fight. ... We had so many emotions going

The U.S. women have won gold in the team event at every world championship that included a team competition since 2011. Their victory in Antwerp broke a tie with the Chinese men for the longest streak of consecutive team titles.

Biles now has 26 world championship medals, 20 of them gold, to go with her seven Olympic medals, including the 2016 Olympic title. Her 33 combined medals at the sport's two biggest events are one more than what Larisa Latynina of the Soviet Union achieved.

Russia was banned from the event because of sanctions imposed by the International Gymnastics Federation (FIG) as a result of the war against Ukraine. In the absence of their Russian rivals - the defending Olympic champions - the Americans were the overwhelming favorites.

But the U.S team overcame an early scare as Roberson was forced out of the event even before it started after she seemed to hurt an ankle while warming up at the vault. She was helped off the mat and subbed by Wong.

"My ankle just ... popped," Roberson said. Jones then kicked off the competition smoothly for the Americans with a Double Twist Yurchenko, with only a small hop. Wong responded to the last-minute call with a clean effort before Biles opted for the slightly safer "Cheng" vault rather than the Yurchenko Double Pike she performed during qualifying on Sunday.

The Americans amassed 42.966 points and were second behind China after the first rotation following the Chinese gymnasts' excellent display on uneven bars.

Biles and her teammates then bested their Chinese opponents' performance on bars as they took the overall lead with a margin of 1.467 points. They increased it a bit further after the beam - despite a sixth-place finish on that apparatus as Biles made up for the modest 11.700 Wong received by scoring 14.300 with a solid routine.

Biles capped off a successful night for the U.S team with a spectacular floor routine rewarded by a 15.166.

Chumba places 1st in women's marathon

began competing for Bahrain in 2014, said her training in her native Kenya, a country with a strong tradition of long-distance running, helped her win the gold in Hang-

zhou.

Arabian Gulf, is the third smallest country in Asia after the Maldives and Singapore, but they are among the top 10 in gold medals on Day 12 of the 15-day Asian Games. "We have a lot of talent," Chum-

ba said of Bahrain's contingent. "The country must be happy for me."

The Asian Games feature 12,500 participants from 45 nations and territories - more than the 10,500 from about 200 delegations expected at next year's Paris Olympics.

Hosts China have dominated, with more than 320 medals overall, more than half gold, followed by South Korea and Japan.

In the men's marathon on Thursday, He Jie of China took gold, finishing 25 seconds ahead of North Korean runner Han Ilryong with a time of 2:13:02. Yang Shaohui of China took bronze.

He said his training this year had been centered on the Asian Games competition, knowing that they would be "held in China and 1.4 billion Chinese people are watch-

China won gold in both the men's and women's 500-meter dragon boat races.

The regionally-popular sport features a team of 12 paddlers in long, narrow boats decorated with Chinese dragon heads, who row to the beat of a drummer in the bow, with a steerer in the stern to guide the boat.

China's men's team edged out Indonesia by a fraction of a second for the gold, with Thailand finishing just behind in third place for the bronze.

China's women's team beat silver-medalist Indonesia by nearly two seconds for the gold, with Myanmar taking bronze more than 4 seconds behind the leader.



"(Sunday's game) is a way we can put a stamp on the season and really make sure the rest of the league knows we're aiming to do the same as last season.

Blacks Caps gain measure of revenge

New Zealand 'rout' England in cricket World Cup opener

AHMEDABAD, India, Oct 5, (AP): The cricket World Cup opened Thursday with New Zealand gaining a measure of revenge for how the last one ended four years ago.

The rematch of the extraordinary 2019 final got a very different result as the Blacks Caps powered to a nine-wicket thrashing of England, whose title defense is off to an alarming start.

England, without star batter Ben Stokes because of a hip injury, were put into bat and posted 282-9 - a score that always seemed well below par at Narendra Modi Stadium in Ahmedabad.

That's how it proved as New Zealand raced to their target in just 36.2 overs, with Devon Conway (152 not out) and Rachin Ravindra (123 not out) putting on a virtually chanceless second-wicket stand of 273 to help the team to 283-1. The chase was achieved without captain Kane Williamson, who still has yet to recover from a knee injury.

Conway's 83-ball hundred was the Black Caps' fastest at a World Cup - but only until the 23-year-old allrounder Ravindra went quicker, off 82 balls, to also become New Zealand's

youngest century-maker. The duo had come together when Sam Curran dismissed Will Young for a golden duck.

Joe Root top-scored with 77 for England, which at least made some history after all batters scored double figures. It's the first time that has happened in the history of ODIs, totaling 4,658

There was a sparse crowd for the start of the 13th edition of the 50-over World Cup, though the cavernous 134,000-seater stadium was slightly fuller by the time the one-sided match

ended Conway hit 19 fours and three sixes, while Ravindra hit 11 fours and five sixes, a total boundary count of 38 that

exceeded England's 27. None of the English bowlers were able to trouble the duo, with Mark Wood taken for 0-55 in his five-over

spell. It was the first time two batters making their debut in the World Cup scored

centuries in the same match. Put into bat, England didn't get off to a quick start as anticipated. Jonny Bairstow scored 33 off 35 balls, while Dawid Malan managed only 14 runs despite being dropped early.

They added 40 for the first wicket in 7.4 overs and New Zealand didn't allow the run-rate to take off. When the spinners came on, the runs dried up further as Mitchell Santner dismissed Bairstow in the 13th over.

Harry Brook tried to cut loose with 16 runs off Ravindra in the 17th over, but he ended up getting out caught off the last ball.

England countered the two left-arm spinners by sending Moeen Ali up the order. It didn't work as part-time offspinner Glenn Phillips clean bowled

him for 11 runs. Root held the fort at one end after England was down to 118-4 in 21.2 overs. He then added 70 runs for the

fifth wicket with skipper Jos Buttler. The duo batted in damage control mode, although Buttler did hit two fours and two sixes in his 43 off 42 balls.

Root scored his first half-century in 10 ODI innings off 57 balls. But New Zealand got the breakthrough when Buttler was caught behind off Matt
