KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: The Council of Ministers has taken a significant step to support entrepreneurs, particularly those funded by the National Fund for Small and Medium Enterprises, especially those who may be facing financial challenges.

In response to a proposal put forth by the Minister of Trade and Industry and the Minister of State for Youth Affairs, Muhammad Al-Aiban, the Council of Ministers has approved a 6-month postponement for loan installments owed by entrepreneurs who own small and medium enterprises financed by the National Fund.

## We live in anxiety

IT seems that we are outside the region, or even the world, as if we are on a planet light years away from here, considering what is happening in the region. It seems as if the country is without a prime minister who is enjoying a long vacation even though internal or external events require him to be at the helm of his work.

Certainly, Kuwait must be present in all files and should have its say, as it did throughout the past six decades, especially with regard to its regional and global political role.

Whenever you ask a minister about an issue, he tells you that His Highness the Prime Minister is on vacation, and no step can be taken without his presence.

In local affairs, parliamentary agendas are filled with intimidations and threats to grill more than four ministers. There is also the threat to hold His Highness the Prime Minister personally accountable. As the session approaches, there must be an effective movement internally.

Also, with regard to crystallizing the vision for the next stage, a parliamentary group of 48 MPs announced its plan, and is waiting for the ministerial coordination committee to agree on the plan, even though it does not meet the people's ambitions.

Indeed, since the announcement of the formation of the new Council of Ministers, we have not seen any achievement either in health, housing, or infrastructure sectors, or in addressing citizens' loans, or the problems of retirees and students.

Rather, all that we see are published pictures of His Highness the Prime Minister on his long vacation; this of course leaves citizens multiplying fifties by sixths.

Even when the chief executive officer in any country goes on leave, there is a team or office that monitors and works to develop a solution to the problems, informs the boss of the problems first and foremost, and makes proposals for solutions, which are quickly approved.

This is due to the fact that the responsibilities placed on the shoulders of the fourth man in the state are much greater than any duties or comfort.

There is no doubt that everyone needs to relax, but not in times of the complex circumstances transpiring in the region. The local and regional challenges are many, and the drums of war are beating to the point of deafening the ears.

As the Council of Ministers is deaf, have some of our officials become disconnected from reality to this extent?

In other countries, officials do not leave the field, but instead follow people's concerns and learn about what is disturbing their lives.

Some of them even disguise themselves in order to avoid attracting attention, follow the work of government departments, and not miss out on events, as vacations are canceled in the event of any emergency.

Even in countries with long-standing democracy, the person responsible for monitoring is never absent, because he is followed by the people and the representatives. What if many files are open regarding developments, some of which determine the national destiny?

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### Day by Day

IN nearly all Gulf nations, barring Kuwait, and indeed globally, there exists a platform for citizens to communicate with the ruler or the designated decision-maker.

This platform allows them to raise concerns about injustices, flawed implementation of laws, or judicial decisions marred by errors.

In some countries, the ruler is surrounded by individuals pursuing their own interests or influential people whose counsel can detrimentally impact the public at large.

The people desire an ombudsman court comprising honorable individuals, overseen by authoritative figures capable of monitoring its operations and decisions.

## Minister urged to stay amid grilling

### Sasahara appointed as new US Ambassador to Kuwait

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: The US Senate has unanimously confirmed Karen Sasahara as the new Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the United States of America to Kuwait. Ambassador Sasahara's appointment received the final vote earlier today, and she is now set to be sworn in and will arrive in Kuwait shortly to assume her diplomatic duties, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

Ambassador Sasahara brings a wealth of experience to her new role, having previously held several key positions within the US State Department. She served as Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for North Africa since November 2020, and before that, she

held the position of Chargé d' Affaires at the US Embassy in Jordan. Her diplomatic career also includes a role as Consul General in Jerusalem and Senior Advisor to the Office of Intelligence and Research.

Notable among her previous assignments, she served as Deputy Chief of Mission in Sana'a, Yemen, from July 2013 to June 2015 and as Foreign Policy Advisor to the Commanding General of Special Operations Command Central at MacDill Air Force Base in Tampa, Florida from 2012 to 2013. Her diverse diplomatic experience also spans assignments in Baghdad, Beirut, Mexico City, London, Jeddah, and Washington.

Karen Sasahara's remarkable career at the US Department of State has been recognized with multiple performance awards, including five high-level awards in the Foreign Service. In addition to her diplomatic expertise, she is multilingual, with proficiency in Arabic, Spanish, French, and Russian.

### Allegations of manipulation surface

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: MP Dawoud Marafie urged the Minister of Public Works Dr. Amani Buqamaz not to resign before facing the grilling motion, as several facts will be exposed to the citizens.

He explained that the minister has been working on filling some positions which remained vacant for a long time. The process adopted by her is aimed at winning the loyalty of some MPs whose support she wants in the grilling motion.

The cases of appointment of supervisory officials in violation include one related to the Directorate General of Civil Aviation, which published a job advertisement and gave only three days of deadline to apply. When the violation was highlighted, another advertisement was published to change the deadline to ten days.

The committee assigned to conduct the recruitment process consists of nine members

but actually they are only five. One member is counted as three because he occupies three different positions. Another member is counted as two because he occupies two different positions. This means if only those two officials met, they will be counted as five, which means the quorum is available and then the decision they take for recruitment will be enforced. This process is considered as manipulation of the defined regulations aimed at achieving the desired conclusions, even if they are illegal.

In another development, MP Hamad Al-Elyan, a member of the fact finding committee formed by the National Assembly to investigate the corruption case of the Public Institution for Social Security during the term of the former chairman of the Board of Directors Fahad Al-Rajaan, disclosed that the committee will soon complete its report on the matter.

He revealed that several meetings have been conducted with representatives of different relevant institutions including State Audit Bureau (SAB) and Fatwa and Legislation Department, in addition to senior officials from the Ministry of Justice as well as the whistleblower in the case Dr. Fahad Al-Rashed.

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## Israel airstrikes hit Gaza's designated safe area

### Aid access sought

KHAN YOUNIS, Gaza Strip, Oct 17, (AP): Israel bombed areas of southern Gaza where it had told Palestinians to flee to ahead of an expected ground invasion, killing dozens of people on Tuesday in attacks it says are targeted at Hamas militants that rule the besieged territory.

With no water, fuel or food being delivered to Gaza since Hamas' brutal attack on Israel last week, mediators struggled to break a deadlock over delivering supplies to increasingly desperate civilians, aid groups and hospitals.

U.S. President Joe Biden prepared to head to the region as he and other world leaders tried to prevent the war from sparking a broader regional conflict. Violence flared Tuesday along Israel's border with Lebanon, where Iranian-backed Hezbollah militants operate.

In Gaza, dozens of injured were rushed to hospitals after heavy attacks outside the southern cities of Rafah and Khan Younis, residents reported. Basem Naim, a senior Hamas official and former health minister, reported 27 people were killed in Rafah and 30 in Khan Younis.

An Associated Press reporter saw around 50 bodies brought to Nasser Hospital in Khan Younis. Family members came to claim the bodies, wrapped in white bedsheets, some soaked in blood.

An airstrike in Deir al Balah reduced a house to rubble, killing nine members of the family living there. Three members of another family that had evacuated from Gaza City were killed in a neighboring home. The dead included one man and 11 women and children. Witnesses said there was no warning before the strike.

The Israeli military said it was targeting Hamas hideouts, infrastructure and command centers. "When we see a target, when we see something moving that is Hamas, we'll take care of it," Lt. Col. Richard Hecht, an Israeli military spokesman, said.

A strike in the Bureij refugee camp in central Gaza killed a top Hamas commander, Ayman Nofal, the group's military wing said - the most high-profile militant known to have been killed so far in the war. Nofal was in charge of Hamas militant activities in the central Gaza Strip and was associated with the creation of the group's "joint operations" room that coordinated between Hamas, the Palestinian Islamic Jihad and other militants in the territory.

The U.N. human rights office decried "appalling reports" that civilians who were trying to flee to southern Gaza were killed by a military strike. Spokeswoman Ravina Shamdasani urged Israeli forces to avoid "aerial bombardments, indiscriminate or disproportionate attacks" and to "take precautions to avoid - and in any case, to minimize - loss of civilian life, injury to civilians and damage to civilian objects."

Israel sealed off Gaza since the militant attack on southern Israel Oct. 7 killed over 1,400 people, mostly civilians, and resulted in some 200 taken captive in Gaza. Hamas militants in Gaza have launched rockets every day since, aiming at cities across Israel.

Israeli strikes on Gaza have killed at least 2,778 people and wounded 9,700, according to the Gaza Health Ministry. Nearly two-thirds of those killed were children, a ministry official said.

Another 1,200 people across Gaza are believed to be buried under the rubble, alive or dead, health authorities said. Emergency teams struggled to rescue people while cut off from the internet and mobile networks, running out of fuel and exposed to unceasing airstrikes.

On Monday Israeli warplanes struck the headquarters of the Civil Defense in Gaza City, killing seven paramedics. Another 16 medics and doctors have been killed on the job, Gaza officials said.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said Tuesday that his country's retaliation against Hamas aims to eradicate the group's political and military rule over Gaza.

## Finance minister seeks investment collaboration

ABU DHABI, Oct 17, (KUNA): Kuwaiti Finance Minister Fahad Al-Jarallah stressed Tuesday the importance of concerted efforts between public and private sectors in various regional and international forums in order to highlight the promising investment climate in the State of Kuwait.

This came in remarks to KUNA during his visit to the pavilion of the Kuwait Direct Investment Promotion Authority and the Kuwaiti Public-Private Partnership Authority in the Eighth World Investment Forum.

Highlighting the image of the Kuwaiti investment scene is a responsibility for all concerned bodies to help shed light on the investment map in Kuwait, he added.

Kuwait Direct Investment Promotion Authority (KDIPA) has seized opportunity during its participation in the Global Investment Forum in Abu Dhabi to highlight promising investment opportunities in the country to achieve the desired goals of diversifying economy and backing private sector entrepreneurship in national economy.



### KIO's London office faces legal action for violations

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: The Minister of Finance and Chairman of the Board of Directors of the General Investment Authority, Fahd Al-Jarallah, has referred the violations of the Kuwaiti Investment Office in London to the Public Prosecution, through a report submitted to the Attorney General, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

The report came after the investigation committee completed its first report on the observations and violations that were monitored from 2018 to 2022, which included illegal entry, disclosure of confidential information, and destruction of information related to the authority, in addition to many other violations.

It is noteworthy that the decision to form the committee was previously issued by former Finance Minister Abdul Wahab Al-Rasheed following his interrogation by MP Mubarak Al-Hajraf, to investigate what was mentioned in the interrogation axes.

KUWAIT CITY: Kuwait Institute for Scientific Research (KISR) discussed along with Union of Automobile Agents in the country mechanisms boosting cooperation on electric car projects, as well as suggestions and recommendations guaranteeing suitability of such vehicles with extremely hot climates.

A man opened fire in the capital on Monday evening, killing two people and seriously injuring a third. The 45-year-old man was shot dead by Belgian police in a café in Brussels earlier today.

Presenting its sincere condolences to the families of the victims, the Council called "for solidarity and vigilance, but also for balance and the refusal of stigmatization in these difficult times." (KUNA)

# 'China's trade with Belt and Road countries doubled in 2013'

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: The Chargé d'Affaires of the Embassy of the People's Republic of China in Kuwait Counselor Liu Xiang says the Chinese President Xi Jinping proposed the "Belt and Road" initiative in 2013. Over the past decade, the countries along the "Belt and Road" have been working to embody the Silk Road's spirit of peace and cooperation, openness, tolerance, mutual learning and mutual benefit.

In his speech during the symposium on the high-quality joint construction of the "Belt and Road" between China and Kuwait the day before yesterday evening, he explained that his country had signed cooperative documents for the "Belt and Road" initiative with more than 150 countries and more than 30 international organizations. A multi-layered and multi-level infrastructure network is being formed, based on the framework of "six corridors, six roads, and multiple countries and ports."

China's trade in goods with the Belt and Road countries doubled from USD 1.04 trillion in 2013 to USD 2.07 trillion in 2022, with an average annual growth of 8 percent. Two-way investments between China and the Belt and Road countries exceeded USD 270 billion during that period.

This contributed to stimulating investment worth nearly a trillion dollars, creating more than 3,000 cooperation projects, providing 420,000 job opportunities, and lifting about 40 million people out of poverty. Last month Jinping and His Highness the Crown Prince Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad held a historic meeting in the Chinese city of Hangzhou. The two leaders drew a road map to deepen the strategic partnership, and jointly build a high-quality "Belt and Road" between the two countries.

Counselor Liu Xiang said, "Our symposium today is a step to implement the outcomes of the two leaders' meeting. The two sides must make joint efforts in the next stage. The Chinese side is ready to work with the Kuwaiti side to advance the joint construction of the Belt and Road in the long term, and create a better future for Chinese-Kuwaiti relations."

Meanwhile, the Secretary General of the Supreme Council for Planning and Development Dr. Khaled Mahdi affirmed that the

Chinese-Kuwaiti relations are more than distinguished.

He revealed that the State of Kuwait is the first country in the Middle East to respond to the Chinese President's initiative in 2014, and this was a moral commitment to the Belt and Road Initiative, which was followed by many consultations and agreements.

Dr. Mahdi indicated that the first of these agreements was the recent visit of His Highness the Crown Prince Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad to China, where a group of memorandums of understanding and agreements were signed that will take the principle of implementation.

He said, "There are two questions that are always asked about the extent of the Kuwaiti side's seriousness about entering into the initiative. The recent agreements that were signed brought us into a great atmosphere of seriousness for implementation, which is what Kuwait will move with China towards implementing these agreements. That is why the agreements came in specific areas and were not just a comprehensive framework."

The symposium will address a group of amended projects related to the energy, transportation, and housing sectors, which are vital and important sectors within the New Kuwait 2035 vision. This vision was developed with the Chinese side, and a joint five-year plan was developed between the two sides, which is the 2024/2028 plan to implement the projects."

The Kuwaiti Ambassador to China Jassem Al-Najem confirmed Tuesday that the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) is a development initiative that is consistent with the vision of New Kuwait, according to Kuwait News Agency (KUNA).

This came during his participation as a representative of Kuwait in the celebration of the book launch of Chinese President Xi Jinping, within the activities of BRI's third forum and the tenth anniversary of the initiative.

In a phone call to KUNA, Al-Najem said that this initiative constitutes a real opportunity to revive the Silk Road project and create a vital commercial region that contributes to the prosperity of the global economy. Kuwait is the first country in the Middle East to take the initiative to sign a memorandum of understanding (MoU) for cooperation with China in BRI after its announcement in September 2013, he pointed out.

Al-Najem underlined the depth of the historical bilateral ties that go back over 50 years between Kuwait and China, citing a recent visit by His Highness the Crown Prince Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, during which the prospects for cooperation were consolidated and several MoUs were signed in various fields.

He also stressed Kuwait's keenness on its strategic partnership with China and ways to support and develop it in various fields in a way that contributes to achieving mutual benefit and common interests.

# Cabinet nods cut in plots cost

Goal to support citizens, alleviate burdens: PAHW

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: The Public Authority for Housing Welfare (PAHW) announced the Cabinet's approval of its proposal to reduce the value of the symbolic price for government plots allocated for housing purposes in South Khaitan, Abu Halifa and Sabahiya to KD 5,000 per plot.

In a statement issued yesterday, PAHW affirmed that it will soon announce, through its official accounts and the media, to citizens benefiting from the decision the mechanism for returning the difference in financial amounts, as the symbolic price of one plot ranged between KD 10,000 and KD 15,000 depending on the area.

PAHW explained that the goal is to support citizens and alleviate their burdens, especially since they are building and finishing their homes currently. It will continue to support plot holders and accelerate the pace of contract work on projects being implemented, and operate public services in conjunction with citizens' housing, based on the recommendations of the Council of Ministers.

PAHW stressed the keenness of the State Minister for Housing Affairs and his directives regarding cooperation with all relevant government agencies to complete citizens' transactions smoothly, and to work on reducing their financial burdens in order to achieve the public interest.

According to informed sources, the total value of the amounts that are supposed to be returned to the accounts of the citizens concerned with the aforementioned decision is about KD 16 million. The value of the amount that will be returned to plot owners in Khaitan is KD 14 million and 480 thousand, after reducing the value of one plot from KD 10,000 to KD 5,000. KD 775,000 would be returned to plot owners in Sabahiya, and KD 855,000 in Abu Halifa, where the value of a plot was KD 15,000.

**'Let students work':** The Acting Prime Minister and Minister of Interior Sheikh Talal Al-Khaled addressed the Minister of Education, Higher Education and Scientific Research Dr. Adel Al-Manea to allow students to combine student reward with work in the private sector, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

According to a statement issued by the Ministry of Interior, the directives of the Acting Prime Minister and Minister of Interior come within the framework of developing work mechanisms in the private sector, which enables Kuwaiti youth to gain practical and professional experience while they are studying, and to invest their time in a way that benefits them and develops their practical skills.

This project also contributes to addressing demographic imbalances by providing young manpower to work in various professions needed by the labor market, in addition to the project's role in refining students' time and money management skills and developing a sense of responsibility and self-reliance.

In addition, the Public Authority for Manpower called on private sector companies, as a matter of social and national responsibility, to open the doors of employment and benefit from national cadres of male and female university and institute students, because of the great importance of the project in developing the labor market and providing Kuwaiti youth with the posts.

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: The Minister of State for Municipal Affairs and the Minister of Communications Fahad Al-Shoula affirmed that the opening of the Government Center Mall in West Abdullah Al-Mubarak comes as a continuation of the ministry's plan to open government buildings in all governorates of the country.

The ministry is proceeding according to a plan and time schedule to implement its development projects in accordance with the comprehensive development plan of the state. The ministry has made long strides in order to complete its program for providing comprehensive government service centers.

Meanwhile, the acting Undersecretary of the Ministry of Communication Dr. Ahmad Al-Majren announced the opening of the Government Center Mall in Sabah Al-Ahmad City within the next two weeks.

During the meeting, the Foreign Minister stressed the ICRC's role and noble humanitarian efforts, especially regarding the deliver of humanitarian, medical and relief aid to those in need, emphasizing the need to stop the ongoing escalation in Palestine, occupied territories, and the Gaza Strip.

The minister also underlined the need to protect civilians, ensure the opening of crossings to deliver humanitarian and relief supplies to the people of Gaza, and mobilize international efforts in this context, a statement by the Foreign Ministry said.

For his part, Mamadou Sow presented a review of the efforts made by the ICRC within the framework of the planned immediate humanitarian response and the urgent needs of the people of Gaza.

He expressed his deep appreciation for the pioneering and distinguished humanitarian role played by the State of Kuwait in supporting the afflicted and affected peoples, and lauded the continuous Kuwaiti

support offered to the organization and its humanitarian activities around the world.

The meeting also discussed the close cooperation relations between Kuwait and the International Committee of Red Cross and their future prospects, and ways of strengthening international humanitarian action and supporting joint activities in response to humanitarian crises and disasters in the region.

Meanwhile, the International Islamic Charitable Organization (IICO) continues on Tuesday to support the current humanitarian situation in the Gaza Strip by implementing multiple various relief projects with the aim of containing the chaos there as a result of the ongoing Israeli occupation's aggression against Gaza.

Deputy Director General of IICO Ibrahim Al-Bader confirmed to KUNA that IICO is working hard to secure urgent relief aid and is harnessing all its capabilities to keep pace with the humanitarian situation in Gaza.

IICO has been working through its partners inside Palestine since the outbreak of events in Gaza to implement several relief projects, including those related to medical affairs, by supplying the Ministry of Health with medical supplies, treatments, surgical and emergency tools, operating electric generators, and sponsoring 150 nurses and pharmacists, he said.

Also, IICO is trying to strengthen the capabilities of several hospitals in Gaza, including Al-Durrah Children's Hospital, Al-Karama Hospital, Hayfa Charity Hospital, and others, with the aim of maintaining the medical and civilian staff, he added.

## 'Ample experience crucial to replace those in executive posts'

"THE minister of finance spearheads an extensive pension reform initiative, as reported in last Sunday's edition of Al-Rai. This has been a longstanding demand, extending beyond retirement arrangements and the introduction of new talent. The focus should also encompass accountability and a careful selection of replacements," columnist Turki Al-Azemi wrote for Al-Rai daily.

"The prolonged absence of leadership in key positions is concerning, indicating a potential for chaos due to the resulting leadership vacuum. Our apprehensions and warnings revolve around this.

"Consequently, it's crucial to appoint individuals with ample experience in executive roles to succeed those retiring. Based on the information we've gathered, it's imperative to advertise vacant leadership positions. This will enable seasoned professionals with extensive experience and distinguished academic backgrounds to apply.

"The emphasis should move away from the notion of 'young blood.' Maturity is a fundamental criterion for an influential leader. They should possess a forward-thinking vision and demonstrate tangible accomplishments. It's not necessary for them to be current employees of the organization, as a leader is defined by specific attributes and well-established standards.

"This retirement campaign is comprehensive, aiming to retire not only individuals in high-ranking positions who evade accountability but also the detrimental practices of quotas, favoritism, and nepotism. The concept of exceptions in accountability must be discarded, treating everyone equally before the law. This includes those who view their positions as a means for swift wealth accumulation or leaders who have failed to enhance performance or have been involved in financial or administrative misconduct.

"Do they not observe the evolving world around us? Do they not comprehend or think? The disconcerting silence from our beloved, wise, and experienced individuals is perplexing. They witness the continuation of a corrupt approach that shatters the aspirations of future generations. Private educational institutions and health centers are now profit-driven entities. Other sectors face similar challenges.

"Embracing the transition to a digital government and diversifying income streams beyond oil necessitates an understanding of the ongoing shifts in the global economy and the modern approach to work. Competencies and skills should be prioritized alongside productivity and numerical data.

"When we witness the establishment of major factories, strategic partnerships driving commercial zones, and international medical centers overseeing the operation of our health facilities, with talented individuals leading our institutions, we can affirm that we stand at the brink of the desired development.

"Seek individuals of integrity and do not shy away from speaking the truth in the face of the arrogant and stubborn, driven solely by monetary gain and influence. We seek a nation-building endeavor; otherwise, it's a path we ought to retire."

Also:

"Given the widespread repercussions of Operation Al-Aqsa Flood, a pressing concern is whether it will escalate into a regional war. This question arises from multiple compelling pieces of evidence observed since the outset of Operation

Al-Aqsa Flood," columnist Dr Dana Al-Enezi wrote for Al-Rai daily.

"Firstly, Israel is waging a destructive war against the Gaza Strip, aiming to restore its shaken dignity and reassure its citizens, preventing a surge in emigration and preserving the dream of Greater Israel. Israel's actions hint at a potential ground invasion to eradicate Hamas, the resistance movement, within the Gaza Strip.

"Several pieces of evidence support this concern. Israel's call-up of 300,000 reserve forces strongly suggests preparation for a ground invasion, potentially leading to a regional war according to Israel. The United States has moved its largest aircraft carrier, the "Gerald Ford," to the eastern Mediterranean, expressing full support for Israel and supplying advanced combat weaponry. England has also deployed warships in the region to support Israel. The overwhelming Western support for Israel in its war on Gaza further reinforces this.

"It is inferred that there is an understanding or a Western, primarily American, green light for Israel to take whatever action it deems necessary in Gaza to eliminate Hamas, even if it requires a ground invasion, disrupting Israeli expansion ambitions.

"The critical factor that could trigger a regional war is Israel's ground invasion of the Gaza Strip. The West, especially the United States, seems prepared for such an eventuality, intensively protecting Israel.

"Israel has hinted at a ground invasion despite recognizing the complexities of Gaza, possibly convinced that it's unavoidable after suffering a significant defeat. Should Israel proceed with an invasion, it could ignite a regional war.

"Statements by parties supporting Hamas continually warn Israel against continuing its war and anticipate a response if a ground invasion occurs. These warnings are considered serious, and in the event of an invasion, Hezbollah and various resistance movements are likely to be involved, along with their supporters from regional countries. They would oppose Israel's plan to eliminate Hamas, fearing its repercussions on armed resistance against the Zionist occupation and the Palestinian cause.

"In summary, the potential outbreak of a regional war hinges on Israel's continuation of its war in Gaza, potentially leading to a ground invasion. Israel's intentions suggest a serious likelihood of a ground invasion, which could escalate into a regional war, involving the West in defending Israel, exposing it to battle fronts on all its borders.

"To avert this dire scenario, there is a pressing need for strong proactive mediation involving China, Kuwait, and Qatar to calm the situation and revive the Palestinian issue, which has been largely neglected since the Arab Spring uprisings."

"When the last ministerial formation was issued, the Ministry of Information and the Ministry of Awqaf and Islamic Affairs were merged and placed under the management and supervision of one minister, which came as a shock to some people. Some among them even went so far as to turn the matter into a mockery, the reasons for which are clear," columnist Ahmad Al-Mulaifi wrote for Annahar daily.

"Merging some ministries and dismantling others is one of the suggestions that I had previously submitted to His Highness the former Prime Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled to create an unconventional ministerial formation.

"There are two ministries in the Ministry of Education and Higher Education that must be separated. The goals and outcomes of each ministry differ from

other, and require different mentalities and a great effort that a single minister cannot handle. I say this from experience.

"Likewise, the Ministry of Finance's goal is to monitor budgets and collect state funds resulting from the provision of services. There is also the need to establish a Ministry of Investment as the second source of income, if not the first, at times when the oil prices decline. For this, a specialized minister is also required to follow up on it.

"We return to the merging of the Ministry of Information and the Ministry of Awqaf and Islamic Affairs, and the reason to merge them. These are two ministries that deal with reason and thought, which means they are responsible for directing the national discourse in the country.

"Citizens and residents gather by their own free will to hear this speech fifty times a year in mosques in the Friday sermons and the two Eid sermons.

"If this opportunity had been utilized correctly and taken advantage of in a targeted and deliberate manner for directing the national discourse to focus on values and morals and for addressing the negative aspects of actions and words left by the media discourse on radio and television, it would have been possible to address many of the wrong practices and deviant behavior and instill the values of good citizenship in citizens, and good behavior among all residents."

"Indeed, we need to establish foundations and standards, and focus on the positive aspects of life and the turning points we are going through," columnist Dr. Thaher Hadi Al-Markaz wrote for Al-Anba daily.

"Through the challenges that individuals face in various situations and experiences, and mistakes that they learn from, their personality is refined. Day after day, they become mature in the sea of life, riding its waves, armed with knowledge, experiences and skills through which they can achieve successes and reach social levels to serve their country, religion and society.

"We have many examples throughout the human ages and civilizations that rose up and developed with knowledge and science.

"In Kuwait, we have reached a developed stage through achievements and successes at the individual and societal levels, starting with laying the basic building block for the state organization through the 1962 Constitution, which established political life, organized laws, and activated the role of the individuals, institutions, and NGOs.

"All of this contributed to achieving progress and prosperity, placing Kuwait on the international map and making it a center for humanitarian work through the efforts of the wise political leadership.

"In our current time, and with the challenges we are experiencing at the individual and state levels, we need a real critical review that examines the political, economic and social reality to identify the deficiencies and address them by activating the role of the law and its institutions. Conferences and discussion circles must be held at the state level to reach radical solutions to problems, which could be the reason for Kuwait not being among the countries of the developed world.

"National anti-corruption plans should also be activated to confront this scourge that the entire world suffers from, and eliminate all negative consequences that hinder the desired progress."

## E-addiction ... epidemic threatening young people

Arab, Muslim values at risk

**KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: The conference "Arab and Gulf Family Issues in Light of Digital Transformation" was inaugurated yesterday by the Center for Gulf and Arabian Peninsula Studies under the auspices of the Ministry of Interior.**

The participants emphasized the advantages of modern technology and the enormous potential and capabilities it has made available to humans, but warned of the negative repercussions of modern technology on the Arab and Muslim family and its values, traditions and role.

The speakers at the conference highlighted the seriousness of the phenomenon of electronic addiction, which has become an epidemic threatening young people.

They stressed on the role of social media in spreading rumors, lies, and falsifying facts in some cases, in addition to spreading the culture of violence and hatred, due to which they called on parents to set limits and controls on children's use of mobile phones.

Director of the Center for Gulf and Arabian Peninsula Studies Dr. Yaqoub Al-Kandari said, "The conference comes in the context of the center's constant and ongoing keenness to pay attention to issues related to the family, women and society, based on its belief in the role of the family.

Modern technology has played a major role in social issues in the Gulf, the Arab world and the world as well as in the family, and has led to extraordinary transformations in human beings."

Dr. Al-Kandari explained that the era of technology began in the mid-nineties and was accompanied by warnings to protect families. At the beginning of the current millennium, social media increased in power and brought about tremendous changes. It continues to have many effects in an era in which the mobile phone has transcended the boundaries of time and space.

Meanwhile, the Secretary General of the International Organization for the Empowerment of Women and Capacity Building Dr. Taghreed Al-Hajji highlighted the importance of the conference in protecting the Arab and Gulf families from the dangers of digital transformation when it is used negatively.

Furthermore, a faculty member at the Saad Al-Abdullah Academy for Security Sciences Dean Dr. Mutlaq Al-Mutairi said technological development and social media have made a phone extend beyond its role as a means of communication.

He explained that the mobile phone has become a television, a camera, a recorder, and a newspaper. Digital transformation has benefits, including that it brought the family closer together with their children studying abroad, made the world more open, became a platform for opinion, and helped scientific researchers. On the other hand, the most prominent disadvantage is children's addiction to the Internet and social media, so the family must not leave the phone in the hands of their children 24 hours a day.

Other negative aspects include the large number of traffic accidents resulting from the use of a mobile phone while driving, its contribution to some people becoming atheists, and its contribution to the spread of rumors and lies. This has become more dangerous with the emergence of artificial intelligence and its ability to falsify facts.

In the same context, Professor of Criminal Sociology and Crime at the Saad Al-Abdullah Academy for Security Sciences Dean Dr. Bader Al-Khubaizi stated that modern technology has positive effects on various social, political, educational and psychological levels. However, one of its most prominent negatives is the availability of unethical websites on the Internet, which negatively affects teenagers and young people, as well as exposure to fraud, bullying, threats, blackmail, and the dissemination of strange ideas that violate religious values, in addition to its negative role in disturbing people through hacking. Addiction to sitting in front of smartphones causes mental illness and social violence, and leads to an increase in crime rates.

In addition, a professor at the International University of Science and Technology Dr. Sami Al-Azmi said, "Electronic addiction has become a pathological epidemic that threatens young people, the mainstay of societies, causing serious harm to the efforts to achieve development. These harms are increasing in light of the weakness of religious motivation among children."

### Students on scholarship excluded from 'transfer'

**KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: The First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of the Interior, Sheikh Talal Al-Khaled, issued a decision excluding scholarship and academically licensed members of the Ministry from transportation, while restricting the transfer of officers from the rank of lieutenant to major to field work only.**

Resolution No. 1194 of 2023 included amending some provisions of Resolution No. 20-2021 related to regulating the transfer of members of the police force, as it added a final paragraph to Article 3 that states, "Those who are on scholarship and those who are academically licensed are excluded from all of the above."

The decision, a copy of which was obtained by Al-Seyassah, stated: "Article No. 4 of the aforementioned Ministerial Resolution No. 30-2021 shall be amended to become, without prejudice to Clause No. 10 of Article 3 of this decision, the transfer of officers from the rank of lieutenant up to the rank of major to Field work only, not administrative work, and "specialized officers, scholarship students, and those with academic license are excluded from this."

In Article 3 of the decision, a paragraph is added that states: "Scholarship students and those with academic leave are excluded from this."

In Article 4, a new article is added, No. 7 bis: "The provisions of this decision do not prejudice the jurisdiction of the Undersecretary to transfer members of the police force who are on scholarship and study leave without adhering to the dates specified for transfer in this decision."

**'Unfit' meat for sale:** In continuation of efforts to combat spoiled food in various consumer distribution markets, inspectors from the Commercial Control Department in the Ministry of Commerce and Industry closed meat sales outlets in four central markets in the Salmiya area for selling spoiled and adulterated meat, in violation of consumer protection decisions, reports Al-Rai daily.

The Ministry inspectors during a field tour of consumer markets, discovered the meat section of four markets were actively involved in thawing frozen meat, displaying it, and selling it to consumers. The sources added that the legal procedures are being completed, in preparation for referring the violators to the prosecution to take the appropriate legal procedures.

**Kitchen fire tackled:** Firefighting teams swiftly managed to control a minor fire in the fifth floor kitchen of a restaurant in a commercial complex in the Sharq area.

The General Fire Force's Public Relations and Media Department reported that the Central Operations Department received an alert early this morning regarding a fire and dispatched a fire-fighting team from Al-Hilali Center to the location.

### Scattered rainfall expected on Thursday

**KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: Meteorologist Issa Ramadan expects clouds to increase in the coming days, starting Wednesday, with the first depressions approaching the region, as the winds shift to the southeast, and the winds become active on Thursday in the midst of increase in humidity, reports Al-Qabas daily.**

Ramadan said in a statement said the temperature has begun to drop significantly, and starting Thursday there is a chance of scattered rain that will continue until Friday morning, and it will be the first good news for the region.

He stated that scattered clouds will continue on Saturday and Sunday, with northwest-

erly winds and moderate autumn weather at night, and the chances of seasonal rain will return again at the end of the month with the continuation of low weather in November.

**Lunar eclipse Oct 28:** Al-Ajiri Scientific Center announced that the skies of Kuwait and the world will witness a partial lunar eclipse on October 28, which is expected to occur at 11 pm, reports Al-Rai daily.

The center stated, "the eclipse will be observed at 10:34 hours, while the moon will be in the center of the eclipse at 11:13 minutes," indicating that "the end of the eclipse will be at 11:53 minutes."

### 'No change seen in working hours'

**KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: The Minister of Education and Minister of Higher Education and Scientific Research, Dr. Adel Al-Mana, has issued a decision regarding flexible working hours in the ministry's sectors, reports Al-Rai daily.**

An educational source said according to the decision the timings remain the same as those approved by the former Minister of Education, Dr. Hamad Al-Adwani, with the exception of the Information Systems

Department, where the working hours of its employees were moved forward from 7 am to 2 pm. For the rest of the sectors the timings remain the same from Sunday to Thursday, 7 hours per day.

The source said that these dates were approved at the request of all sectors of the ministry during a meeting with the administrative sector who confirmed their desire to continue working on the same pattern without any change.

# Work in some power stations not dangerous, says minister

EPA team, MEW experts visit Doha East and West stations

**KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: The Minister of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy Dr. Jassim Al-Ostad says the work in some power stations does not fall within the category of arduous or hazardous professions.**

In response to a parliamentary question by MP Marzouq Al-Ghanim, Dr. Al-Ostad explained that the ministry held several meetings with representatives of the Public Institution of Social Security and the Ministry of Health's Occupational Health Department about including the work in power stations and water distillation plants among the difficult and hazardous professions. There are ongoing communications between the two parties in this regard. The Public Institution of Social Security said the Occupational Health Department concluded

that these works do not fall within the category of arduous, dangerous, or harmful jobs in accordance with Kuwaiti occupational environmental standards.

A committee was formed by the undersecretary of the ministry through resolution No. 382/2023, for making field visits to work sites, reviewing the type of work and describing it, estimating the extent of its danger, damage, and difficulty, and determining the proportions in that regard.

## Question

In the parliamentary question submitted by MP Marzouq Al-Ghanim to the minister, he stressed that work in power stations and water distillation plants is considered one of the jobs in which workers are exposed to occupational and health risks.

He revealed that a team from the Environment Public Authority and the ministry's engineers visited the Doha East and West stations and came to the conclusion that workers in the two stations are exposed to health damage and pollutants at a concentration higher than the permissible limits and submitted its report to the undersecretary of the Ministry of Electricity and Water to take the necessary measures to categorize work in those stations as difficult and risky.

# Radical solutions to housing issue, PAHW way of handling it discussed

**KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: A symposium titled "The Housing Issue... Where to?" was held in the office of Lawyer Abdullah Al-Elaaj recently, with the participation of urban planner and housing activist Fawaz Al-Mutairi, and the Head of the Voluntary Committee of Mutlaa City Mishal Al-Hajri.**

They discussed a number of radical solutions to the housing issue, and the way the Public Authority for Housing Welfare (PAHW) dealt with it.

It started with Lawyer Al-Elaaj stressing that he considers the housing plan to be "fragile" even though there are 92,000 housing applications from citizens waiting for a solution to the problem, according to statistics of August.

He revealed that the signs of the crisis began in 1999, indicating that PAHW deleted about 30 applications three months ago due to missing requirements.

Lawyer Al-Elaaj said he wondered what can be done in order to meet the 92,000 outstanding applications.

He highlighted the inability of the relevant government agencies to link the Mutlaa City project to Jahra Road.

Lawyer Al-Elaaj said, despite the calls to overcome all obstacles facing the Mutlaa city project on the residential map, he wondered how PAHW could remain without an appointed general director for an entire year despite all citizens' need for it.

Meanwhile, Fawaz Al-Mutairi, during the same symposium, said the citizens have been working hard and then dividing their monthly salary for themselves and the real estate dealers for many years, which he considers as a form of slavery.

He wondered why the governments charge public money "rent allowance" in increasing amounts and for whose benefit.

Al-Mutairi indicated that what

the representatives are proposing, other than the housing crisis, is a "provocation to the citizens."

He said controlling the real estate prices is in the government's interest primarily, citing the era of the nineties during which the price of real estate was affordable.

Al-Mutairi said, "Thus, 50 percent of government applicants were exempted from finding housing for themselves because they took the loan that covered the household expenses", warning against tampering with the housing plan by some landlords.

Furthermore, Mishal Al-Hajri said housing has become a dream for most Kuwaiti families in light of the rise in real estate prices and rents, adding that there are more than 200,000 families suffering from the housing crisis, and the state is tired of paying them rents worth KD 30 million per month.

He stressed that many heads of household are no longer able to meet their obligations, which amount to more than 50 percent of their salary, adding that they still dream of implementing housing projects and building their dream house.

In those countries, there is a government office that reports directly to the prime minister or whoever is in charge of the matter. It measures the concerns of public opinion and problems, but takes opinions that are in the interest of the state, works to crystallize them into proposed laws, monitors the implementation of the laws, extracts the bad from them, and works to amend them.

As for what we have, there are laws that have become outdated and are no longer valid for this era. When any problem occurs, the response is that the law restricts us to its provisions, whether it is in the municipality, finance, public works, investments, internal and external, and many other institutions.

With all these problems and crises facing the region including Kuwait, the first executive official is absent, and the Council of Ministers becomes effectively without a head, as if Kuwait is left to the unknown. This calls for the question - Isn't this what raises concerns about what lies ahead if things continue like this?

Unfortunately, we do not have field officials knocking on the doors of problems and working to solve them, as is done in countries around the world. We live in anxiety, and perhaps in distress.

have been convicted, one of whom has been released according to a special amnesty decree, despite the huge sums of money that were stolen and distributed to 12 different countries.

He revealed that the committee discovered the confusion and lack of coordination among the relevant institutions.

Al-Elyan stressed that there is no verified information about the death certificate of the former chairman of the Public Institution for Social Security Fahad Al-Rajaan who was announced dead in Europe.

He said the investigation is aimed at finding all the involved individuals and verifying if pressure is being imposed by some parties to cover some suspicious offi-

cial. The lawmaker added that the committee will summon a number of former senior officials including former ministers of Finance to obtain all the necessary information.

Meanwhile, MP Fares Al-Otaibi asked the Minister of Education, Higher Education and Scientific Research Adel Al-Mane'e about the reasons behind suspending the master degree program in the College of Law in Kuwait University, and why the university administration procrastinated in fulfilling the requests of the graduates who wish to complete their higher studies in Kuwait. He wanted to know when the master degree programs in the College of Law will resume.

Furthermore, MP Fahad Al-Masoud submitted parliamentary questions to the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Oil Saad Al-Barrak, asking for copies of the two most recent strategies prepared by the Kuwait National Petroleum Corporation (KNPC), along with the bases and criteria prepared to implement the strategies, and the office assigned to implement the strategies.

This decision has been met with positive feedback, with Representative Abdul Wahab Al-Issa expressing that it aligns with the demands presented by the Committee for Improving the Business and Small Enterprise Environment.

Representative Jarrah Al-Fawzan has described this postponement as a well-deserved and necessary step, emphasizing the need for the government to comprehensively address the Small Enterprise Fund, including tackling previous issues and holding accountable those who may have been negligent.

Informed sources have revealed that the postponement will benefit between 700 to 800 borrowers, out of the 990 entrepreneurs who received loans from the National Fund for Small and Medium Enterprises to kick-start their projects.

Some entrepreneurs had faced difficulties in meeting their repayment schedules, largely due to having signed borrowing contracts with the fund before the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 17: On the anniversary of the Great Arab Victory Day, a ceremony was organized by the military office of the Embassy of the Arab Republic of Egypt to mark the golden jubilee of the October 1973 victories. ### «Mujezat Al-Shifa»: Royal jelly enhances the protection of the liver and kidneys from the side effects of medications

Nutrition Consultant at Mujezat Al-Shifa Company, Dr. Hoda Ahmed, revealed a study conducted by Professor Maria Graça at the Faculty of Science at the University of Coimbra in Portugal in January 2020, regarding the benefits of eating royal jelly in protecting liver and kidney cells from the side effects of medications, which may lead to kidney and liver failure. They found that giving infected experimental mice a dose of 200 mg/kg of animal weight for a week showed a strong protective response against kidney poisoning.



Ahmed said: Royal jelly is a safe food substance that can be safely consumed by liver and kidney patients to help them overcome the stage of complications and deterioration and also help in treating them by taking their medications while protecting them from their harmful side effects.

## Nez runs for Congress

## GOP in Nevada split over '24 nominations

RENO, Nev., Oct. 17, (AP): Nevada's dueling contests of presidential nominees have split the field of Republican contenders, with Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis opting to compete against former President Donald Trump in the caucus run by the state GOP while three major rivals face off instead in the early state-run primary.

Though DeSantis' supporters were among those warning that the Nevada Republican Party had created rules that tilted the process in favor of Trump, the Floridian announced Sunday he would run in the Feb. 8 caucus and try to win delegates that help a candidate become a nominee.

Former United Nations ambassador Nikki Haley on Monday filed as a candidate for the Feb. 6 primary, run by the state. The primary offers an opportunity to prove electability, at least symbolically, before crucial contests in South Carolina and a slate of primaries on Super Tuesday.

Former Vice President Mike Pence and South Carolina Sen. Tim Scott on Friday also filed for the primary. Nevada holds a prominent place in the 2024 nominating contests as the third state to weigh in on the GOP field next year.

The Nevada GOP says it will only award delegates to the Republican national convention based on the results of its caucuses. The party has also barred candidates from participating in the caucuses if they also run in the primary election.

## Earn

Andrew Romeo, the communications director for the DeSantis campaign, said in a statement on X, formerly known as Twitter, that the governor is committed to "earning every single delegate available as he works to earn the Republican nomination for president, and Nevada is no exception."

"It is disappointing that the Nevada Republican Party changed the rules against the will of the people just to benefit one candidate," Romeo said. "However, Ron DeSantis will fight to overcome these tactics, just like he will stop the Democrats' attempts to bend the rules in their favor in November 2024 when he challenges, and ultimately defeats, Joe Biden - something Republicans failed to do in 2020."

Former New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie, Republican businessman Vivek Ramaswamy and North Dakota Gov. Doug Burgum are among the other GOP candidates who filed earlier to participate in the caucus along with Trump.

President Joe Biden and eight others, including self-help author Marianne Williamson, have filed to run in the Democratic presidential preference primary Feb. 6 in Nevada.



US President **Joe Biden's** 2024 campaign launched an account on **Donald Trump's** Truth Social on Monday, attempting to poke online fun at the Republican candidate he may well face again in next fall's election.

Under the handle @BidenHQ, the campaign posted: "Well, let's see how this goes. Converts welcome!" It began its time on Truth Social by following just one account: Trump's.


The former president has built a commanding early lead in the Republican primary, setting up a potential 2020 rematch, despite Trump being indicted in four separate cases and facing 91 criminal charges.

Biden's campaign noted its move on X, the social media platform formerly known as Twitter, writing, "We just joined Truth Social, mostly because we thought it would be very funny."

## Campaign

It added, "Follow us there for truths and retruths or whatever they call them." A senior campaign aide said their joining might make Truth Social a little fun.

It's not the first time the Biden campaign has attempted to troll conservatives online, coopting their messaging and online spaces. In July, it turned a clip of staunch Trump supporter and Republican U.S. Rep. **Marjorie Taylor Greene** of Georgia comparing Biden to Presidents **Franklin D. Roosevelt** and **Lyndon B. Johnson** into an online ad.



Former Navajo Nation President **Jonathan Nez** announced Monday that he's running for Congress. Nez, a 48-year-old Democrat, will vie for the seat occupied by incumbent **Eli Crane**, a Republican who has represented Arizona's redrawn 2nd Congressional District since last year.

The district covers a large portion of northern and eastern Arizona and includes 14 of the 22 federally recognized tribes within the state.

"I grew up in a rural, low-income home, in a long-overlooked community where my family lived paycheck-to-paycheck, worried about how we'd make ends meet. I understand the struggles that many Arizona families are facing right now," Nez said in a statement Monday.

Nez was born in Tuba City and grew up in Shonto, both located on the vast Navajo reservation.

He was the Navajo Nation's president from 2019-23 after serving four years as the tribe's vice president.

Nez lost in his presidential reelection bid last year and now hopes to become the first Native American to represent Arizona in Congress.



Democratic Gov. **Andy Beshear** and Republican Attorney General **Daniel Cameron** accused each other of taking extreme stands on abortion policy Monday night as they wrangled over an issue that's become a flashpoint in their hotly contested campaign for governor in **Kentucky**.

During an hourlong debate at Northern Kentucky University in Highland Heights, Kentucky, the rivals fielded questions over education, taxes, public safety and the monthlong strike by autoworkers, which has spread to Ford's highly profitable Kentucky Truck Plant in Louisville.

The candidates tried to one-up the other in their support for public education. Some of their sharpest exchanges during the televised debate, however, came when asked to lay out their stands on abortion.

Their remarks, which took place about three weeks before the Nov. 7 election, came against the backdrop of Kentucky's current abortion law, which bans the procedure except when carried out to save a pregnant woman's life or to prevent a disabling injury.

Beshear said that his challenger celebrated the abortion ban's passage and pointed to Cameron's long-running support for the law as written, without exceptions for pregnancies caused by rape or incest.

"My opponent's position would give a rapist more rights than their victim," Beshear said. "It is wrong. We need to change this law. We need to make sure that those individuals have that option."

## Russia sending more forces to eastern Ukraine city after its assault slows

Russia is throwing more units into its effort to take a key eastern Ukraine city, Western analysts say, after apparent setbacks that have slowed its dayslong onslaught.

The attempt to storm Avdiivka, a heavily defended city that stands in the way of Moscow's ambition of securing control of the entire Donetsk region, is Moscow's most significant offensive operation in Ukraine since the start of the year, the UK defense ministry said Tuesday.

The Kremlin's push to claim Avdiivka comes after months of fending off Ukraine's counteroffensive, which Kyiv launched some 16 months after Russia's full-scale invasion.

Both sides are looking for battlefield advantages ahead of winter. They are also looking to secure future weapons supplies for what is shaping up as a protracted war of attrition.

The Kremlin's forces deployed to Avdiivka are likely making slow progress and sustaining high casualties in what is proving a costly effort, the UK defense ministry said on X, the social media platform formerly known as Twitter.

The pace of Russia's attack on the heavily fortified target has reportedly slowed in recent days since its launch last week, a Washington-based think tank said.

Citing the Ukrainian General Staff, the Institute for the Study of War said Ukrainian forces pushed back 22 Russian attacks on Monday, down from 30 reported assaults the previous day. Kyiv officials said Russia mounted up to 60 attacks per day in the middle of last week.

**MOSCOW:** The lower house of the Russian parliament on Tuesday gave preliminary approval to a bill

revoking the ratification of a global nuclear test ban in what Moscow has described as a move to put itself on par with the **United States**.

The **State Duma** voted unanimously to rescind the ratification of the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty known as the CTBT, in the first of three required readings. The final vote is scheduled for later this week.

The vote follows a statement from Russian President **Vladimir Putin**, who warned earlier this month that Moscow could revoke its 2000 decision to ratify the bill to "mirror" the stand taken by the United States, which has signed but not ratified the nuclear test ban.

Speaking during Tuesday's session, Duma speaker **Vyacheslav Volodin** said the Russian move was a response to what he described as the U.S. "boorish attitude to performing its obligations to ensure global security."

## Czech govt faces no-confidence vote in Parliament

## Polish election marks huge win for Tusk

WARSAW, Poland, Oct. 17, (AP): Three opposition parties that vowed to restore democratic standards in Poland together won over 54% of the votes in the nation's weekend parliamentary election, putting them in a position to take power, according to a complete ballot count reported Tuesday.

The conservative Law and Justice party, which has governed the country for eight turbulent years, won slightly over 35% of the votes, making it the single party with the most votes. But the party and its leader **Jaroslav Kaczyński** lost their majority in parliament and appeared to have no way to hold onto power.

The official ballot announced by the National Electoral Commission aligns closely with an exit poll released after voting ended Sunday.

Turnout was nearly 75%, a record that surpassed the 63% turnout of 1989, a vote that triggered the collapse of the oppressive Soviet-backed communist system.

Law and Justice had been taking the country on an illiberal path, taking control of courts in a manner that violated the country's constitution. The party politicized state institutions, including taxpayer-funded public media which it used as a crude propaganda tool to praise itself and vilify opponents.

The result was a huge victory for **Donald Tusk**, the head of the largest opposition group, Civic Coalition. He appeared likely to return to his past

role as Polish prime minister, a job he held from 2007-14. He also served as the European Council president, a top job in the bloc, from 2014-19.

Tusk's success is all the more remarkable given that state media went into overdrive to portray him as a stooge of Germany and Russia. That portrayal, which appeared baseless, also won him much sympathy.

The result was a huge relief for Poles concerned about the country's international isolation at a time of war across the border in Ukraine and the constant bickering with the European Union. Many feared it could cause the country's eventual ejection from the 27-member bloc.

## Help

Young people and women were among those who voted in droves to get rid of the Law and Justice party, which won in 2015 vowing to fight corruption and help even out economic inequalities. While its social spending did help many Polish pensioners and families, the party has increasingly faced allegations of corruption.

The National Electoral Commission said that Law and Justice won slightly over 35% of the votes, and the far-right Confederation, a possible ally, about 7%.

Three opposition groups won a collective of 53.7%, enough for a comfortable majority in the 460-seat lower house of parliament, or Sejm; The Civic Coalition garnered 30.7% of the vote while the centrist Third Way got

14.4% and the New Left about 8.6%.

The three ran on separate tickets so they are not formally part of the same coalition, but all promised to cooperate to restore the rule of law.

The opposition, which had a razor-thin majority in the outgoing Senate, has now obtained an overwhelming majority of 66 out of 100 seats in that upper chamber. The Senate is far less powerful than the Sejm, but still has some limited influence over the legislative process. Law and Justice will only have 34 seats.

## Also:

**PRAGUE:** The Czech coalition government on Tuesday faced a parliamentary no-confidence vote over opposition claims that it is incompetent in handling the economy and in controlling immigration.

The main opposition centrist ANO (YES) movement led by populist billionaire **Andrej Babis** accused the government of failing to deal with high inflation driven by energy prices and a new wave of migration, among other issues. Inflation has been on the decline this year, dropping from 17.5% in January to 6.9% in September.

The government has rejected the allegations.

The two opposition parties, including ANO and the anti-migrant Freedom and Direct Democracy party, are unlikely to oust the five-party coalition government led by Prime Minister **Petr Fiala**, which has a comfortable majority in the lower house of Parliament.

**NYC limits shelter stays:** New York City Mayor **Eric Adams** announced Monday that he is limiting shelter stays for migrant families with children to 60 days, bidding to ease pressure on a city housing system overwhelmed by a large influx of asylum seekers over the past year.

The Democrat's office said it will begin sending 60-day notices to migrant families who live in shelters, though they could reapply for housing if they are unable to find a new place to live. The city also will provide "intensified casework services" to help families secure housing, according to a news release.

It's the mayor's latest attempt to provide relief to the city's shelter system and finances as it grapples with more than 120,000 international migrants who have come to New York, many without housing or the legal ability to work. More than 60,000 migrants currently live in city shelters, according to his office. (AP)

**3 plead guilty in theft scheme:** Three members of a California family pleaded guilty Monday to conspiracy for their role in a ring that shipped \$600 million worth of stolen catalytic converters from California to New Jersey, federal prosecutors said.

Brothers **Tou Sue Vang**, 32, and **Andrew Vang**, 28, along with their mother, **Monica Moua**, 58, were part of "a national network of thieves, dealers, and processors" who provided the stolen auto anti-smog devices to a metal refinery for more than \$600 million, according to a statement from the U.S. attorney's office.

Twenty-one people from California and New Jersey have been charged in the case,

prosecutors said. The three Sacramento family members pleaded guilty to conspiring to transport the devices in return for more than \$38 million. (AP)



**Georgia deputy kills man:** A Black man who spent more than 16 years imprisoned in

Florida on a wrongful conviction was fatally shot Monday by a sheriff's deputy in Georgia during a traffic stop, authorities said.

The Georgia Bureau of Investigation, which is reviewing the shooting, identified the man as **Leonard Allen Cure**, 53.

Cure had been represented in his exoneration case by the Innocence Project of Florida.

The group's executive director, **Seth Miller**, said he was devastated by news of the death, which he heard from Cure's family.

The Georgia Bureau of Investigation said a Camden County deputy pulled over Cure as he drove along Interstate 95 near the Georgia-Florida line. He got out of the car at the deputy's request and cooperated at first but became violent after he was told he was being arrested, a GBI news release said. (AP)



**Buyer's request rejected:** Former US rep **Steve Buyer** cannot defer his surrender next month to serve a nearly two-year prison sentence resulting from his insider trading conviction because there was overwhelming evidence of his crimes, a federal judge said Monday.

Judge **Richard M. Berman** ruled there was no substantial question nor any close question of law to warrant letting the Indiana Republican remain free until his appeal is decided. He said prosecutors had presented "compelling testimony and documentary evidence" of Buyer's crimes and "devastating evidence of an attempted cover-up."

The judge noted that a jury capped a nine-day trial by returning its March verdict in less than four hours. Prosecutors say he made illegal stock trades based on insider information while working as a consultant after serving in the House from 1993 to 2011. (AP)

## Venezuela and oppn reach electoral deal

NEW YORK, Oct 17, (AP): Venezuela's government and opposition have reached an agreement on new electoral conditions that once signed Tuesday will trigger relief from US energy sanctions on President Nicolás Maduro's administration, according to a person familiar with the outline of deal.

Venezuela's government agreed to open up the electoral process, including allowing European Union observers and creating a process for lifting bans that have blocked his top opponents from running for president, to level what is widely seen as an unfair playing field, the person said Monday.

If Maduro doesn't live up to his end of the bargain, the sanctions will be imposed again, according to the person, who insisted on not being quoted by name as a condition to discuss the agreement before it was signed.

Venezuela's government and opposition were scheduled to resume their Norway-mediated dialogue in Barbados on Tuesday, the Norwegian Embassy in Mexico said. But it appeared an agreement was already within reach because a signing ceremony was scheduled for Tuesday afternoon.

Mexico hosted multiple rounds of talks in 2021 and 2022. When the sides last met, in November 2022, they agreed to create a UN-managed fund to finance health, food and education programs for the poor while the US government agreed to allow oil giant Chevron to pump Venezuelan oil.

Colombia and other countries have tried in recent months to restart negotiations between the sides, but Maduro has demanded that the US drop economic sanctions and unfreeze Venezuelan funds held overseas as a condition of resuming talks.

Norway's statement Monday said the two sides had decided to resume the dialogue "with the objective of reaching a political agreement."

## Sanctions

On Monday evening, Maduro said on Venezuela's national television that "we are going to move ahead with sanctions or without sanctions. If we manage to get them lifted, great, if they're kept in place, we move forward and we will overcome."

US State Department spokesman Matthew Miller welcomed the announcement of negotiations in Barbados and said in a statement that the US government would "continue its efforts to unite the international community in support of the Venezuelan-led negotiation process."

Earlier Monday, a US official who requested anonymity to discuss the sensitive negotiations said there was no "deal" between the US government and Venezuela.

The official said the Biden administration supported Venezuelan-led negotiations and was prepared to provide relief from sanctions in response to concrete actions toward holding competitive elections.

The dialogue formally began in September 2021, but President Maduro's delegates walked away from negotiations in October 2021 after Colombia-born businessman Alex Saab was extradited on money laundering charges from Cape Verde to the US. Maduro conditioned a resumption on the release of Saab.

The political, social and economic crisis that has come to define Venezuela has evolved since it began a decade ago as a result of a global drop in the price of oil, Venezuela's most valuable resource, mismanagement by the self-proclaimed socialist administration and government repression of its opponents.

A brief period of relative economic stability has again been shaken by jumping food prices, business closures and another wave of emigration.

Some members of the Venezuelan opposition celebrated Norway's announcement.

Luis Florido, a former exiled opposition lawmaker, said on X that only through negotiations would Venezuelans be able to restore democracy through the ballot box.

**BOGOTA, Colombia:** Colombia's government and the rebel group known as FARC-EMC on Monday signed a three-month cease-fire and formally began peace talks, as President Gustavo Petro tries to bolster his plans to pacify rural areas ahead of regional elections that will take place at the end of October.

In an event that took place in the township of Tibu, near Colombia's border with Venezuela, both sides also agreed to cease attacks on civilians and set up a group that will monitor the cease-fire and could include United Nations personnel.

"Peace today seems to have been eclipsed when sirens, bombs, shouts of pain and desperation can be heard in places like the Middle East, Europe or sub-Saharan Africa" said Camilo González, the government's lead negotiator. "These peace talks (in Colombia) are a bet on life and freedom."

FARC-EMC are currently Colombia's third largest armed group, with around 3,500 members. The group is led by left-wing guerrilla fighters who refused to join a 2016 peace deal between Colombia's government and the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia in which more than 12,000 rebels laid down their guns.

The talks with the FARC-EMC are part of President Petro's total peace strategy, which includes negotiating with various armed groups.

**GUATEMALA CITY:** One person died and at least two more were injured by gunshots near a pro-democracy demonstration in Guatemala on Monday, local authorities said.

Victor Gomez, spokesman for the volunteer firemen in Malacatan, near the border with Mexico, said it was not clear whether the victims were protesters themselves, or just caught nearby.

The incident marked the beginning of a third week of demonstrations against Attorney General Consuelo Porras, who protesters accuse of attempting to undermine a popular vote for progressive President-elect Bernardo Arévalo.

Videos from Malacatan circulating on social media painted a chaotic picture. Some appear to show civilians and police officers fleeing as bursts of gunfire are heard. In one recording, a vehicle and a police patrol are burning. It is not clear who fired the shots.

In response to the incident, Guatemalan President Alejandro Giammattei said authorities were "carrying out corresponding investigations" and promised more details in due course.

The National Police later announced the arrest of 11 people.

## NZ's Hipkins to stay on as Labour leader

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Oct 17, (Agencies): Defeated New Zealand Prime Minister Chris Hipkins said Tuesday he will continue to lead his liberal Labour Party - for now, at least - despite its big election loss over the weekend.

"I've still got a bit of fight left in me," Hipkins told reporters.

Hipkins made the comments after a meeting with his party's caucus, during which there was no immediate move to oust him. Still, Hipkins acknowledged that he and others in the party would be reflecting on their futures over the coming months and figuring out what would be best for the party going forward.

"Obviously the election result was one that was very disappointing to us as a team," Hipkins said.

Former businessman Christopher Luxon will be the nation's next prime minister after his conservative National Party won 39% of the vote during the election, by far the largest share of any single party.

Under New Zealand's proportional system, National plans to form a coalition with the libertarian ACT Party.

The two parties combined hold only a slim majority, which could evaporate once the remaining 20% of outstanding votes are counted. In that instance, the parties would also need the support of a third party, New Zealand First, which is led by 78-year-old maverick Winston Peters.

Luxon said he wouldn't be revealing the "blow-by-blow" details of the negotiations between the various parties until a deal is finalized.

"We had a mandate on Saturday night. We're going to work our way through our arrangements," Luxon told reporters.

He said the only roles that were locked in so far were his own as prime minister, and his deputy, Nicola Willis, as finance minister.

The final vote tally will be announced in early November.

Hipkins spent just nine months as prime minister after replacing Jacinda Ardern, who unexpectedly stepped down after five years in the top job. She won the last election in a landslide, but this time the Labour Party won just 27% of the vote.

**TOKYO:** South Korea lambasted North Korea on Monday for its sus-

pected arms transfer to Russia, amid persistent speculation that the two nations may have reached an arms deal during a rare summit between their leaders last month, Yonhap News Agency reported.

"North Korea has denied an arms trade with Russia several times, but relevant circumstances are emerging one by one," Unification Ministry spokesman Koo Byoung-sam said in a press briefing in Seoul.

"The true nature of North Korea, which has attempted to deceive the whole world, has been exposed," said Koo.

On Friday, John Kirby, the US National Security Council coordinator for strategic communications, said Pyongyang has delivered more than 1,000 containers of military equipment and munitions to Russia in recent weeks for use in Ukraine.

More than 1 million Rohingya refugees have fled from Myanmar to Bangladesh over several decades, including about 740,000 who crossed the border starting in August 2017, when Myanmar's military launched a brutal counter-insurgency operation following attacks by a guerrilla group.

The United States said last year that the oppression of Rohingya in Myanmar amounts to genocide, after U.S. authorities confirmed accounts of atrocities against civilians by the military in a systematic campaign against the ethnic minority. The Rohingya, who are Muslim, face widespread discrimination in Buddhist-majority Myanmar, with most denied citizenship and many other rights.

Tuesday's meeting was attended by delegates from Bangladesh, Britain, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, Thailand and the United States, as well as representatives of Rohingya-led organizations. There was no representative from Myanmar, said Babar Baloch, a U.N. spokesperson.

**TOKYO:** Japan criticized Russia's announcement that it's joining China in banning the imports of Japanese seafood in response to the release of treated radioactive wastewater from the wrecked Fukushima nuclear power plant.

Russia said it will start implementing import restrictions on Japanese seafood on Monday, nearly two months after the tsunami-wrecked Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power plant started releasing treated and diluted radioactive wastewater into the ocean.

The wastewater discharges, which are expected to continue for decades, have been strongly opposed by fishing groups and neighboring countries including South Korea, where hundreds of people have protested. China immediately banned all imports of Japanese seafood the day the release began in August, badly hurting Japanese seafood producers and exporters.

tributary, on Monday reached its lowest level since official measurements began near Manaus 121 years ago. The record confirms that this part of the world's largest rainforest is suffering its worst drought, just a little over two years after its most significant flooding.

In the morning, the water level in the city's port went as low as 13.5 meters (44.3 feet), down from 30.02 meters (98.5 feet) registered in June 2021 - its highest level on record. The Negro River drains about 10% of the Amazon basin and is the world's sixth largest by water volume.

Madeira River, another main tributary of the Amazon, has also recorded historically low levels, causing the halt of the Santo Antonio hydroelectric dam, Brazil's fourth largest.

Throughout Brazil's Amazon, low river levels have left hundreds of riverine communities isolated and struggling to get access to drinkable water. The drought also has disrupted commercial navigation that supplies Manaus, a city of 2 million with a large industrial park. Brazil's president Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva.

Manaus is the largest city and capital of Amazonas, the state hit hardest by the drought. In late September, 55 of 62 municipalities there entered states of emergency due to the severe drought.

"There is no more water to go through. Navigation is over," boatman Cleudson Lopes Brasil told The Associated Press. (AP)

### LinkedIn cuts more than 600 workers

LinkedIn said Monday it is laying off hundreds of employees amounting to about 3% of the social media company's workforce.

The Microsoft-owned career network is cutting about 668 roles across its engineering, product, talent and finance teams.

"Talent changes are a difficult, but necessary and regular part of managing our business," the company said in a statement.

The job cuts follow another more than 700 layoffs LinkedIn announced in May, as well as thousands more this year from parent company Microsoft, which has owned the professional-networking service since buying it for \$26 billion in 2016.

LinkedIn keeps growing and said its annual revenue surpassed \$15 billion for the first time in the fiscal year that ended

in June. The service, headquartered in Sunnyvale, California, makes money from advertisements on the platform as well as from users who pay to subscribe for premium features.

LinkedIn reports having about 19,500 employees.

Redmond, Washington-based Microsoft as of July had a global workforce of 221,000 full-time employees, with more than half of those in the U.S. (AP)

Jet engine maker Rolls-Royce said Tuesday it's cutting up to 2,500 jobs globally as part of a corporate overhaul that its new CEO is carrying out.

The aerospace company was hit hard by the COVID-19 pandemic that decimated demand for air travel. Tufan Erginbilgic, who took over as chief executive in January, said the layoffs are aimed at making Rolls-Royce "more streamlined and

efficient."

Rolls-Royce, based in Derby, central England, didn't disclose where jobs will be cut, but around half of its 42,000-person workforce is based in the United Kingdom.

The cuts will remove duplication and bring cost efficiencies in the latest stage of its "multi-year transformation," the company said.

"We are building a Rolls-

Royce that is fit for the future," Erginbilgic said.

The company slashed 9,000 jobs globally in 2020 as it grappled with the collapse of air travel during the pandemic.

The new turnaround plan also includes creating a new company-wide procurement division that can take advantage of Rolls-Royce's size to cut costs and reduce supply chain delays. (AP)

## Facebook moderators accuse Meta of not negotiating sincerely

NAIROBI, Kenya, Oct 17, (AP): The lawyer representing 184 former Facebook content moderators based in Kenya who sued the site's parent company, Meta, over working conditions and pay told the judge Monday that Meta has not been sincere in trying to reach an out-of-court settlement as agreed in the last court session.

Lawyer Mercy Mutemi said the talks had collapsed and the former moderators want to proceed with a contempt of court case against Meta.

"The petitioners gave it their best effort. They attended every mediation. The respondents asked for information which we gave them. They kept saying they would get back to us by a certain date but only got back to us at the end of last week with a very small amount that cannot even take care of the petitioners' mental health," she told the court. She described Meta as "not genuine."

The moderators were employed via Sama, a San Francisco subcontractor that describes itself as an ethical AI company, to work in its hub in the capital, Nairobi. Their job entailed screening user content in 12 African languages and removing any uploads deemed to breach Facebook's community standards and terms of service.

Some of the petitioners have told The Associated Press that their job required them to watch horrific content for eight hours a day that overwhelmed many of them while being paid 60,000 Kenyan shillings, or \$414 a month.

They accused Sama of doing little to ensure post-traumatic professional counseling was offered. They are seeking \$1.6 billion in compensation.

Meta and Sama lawyers told the court they thought the mediation

was making good progress, with long hours involved, until the moderators' lawyer wrote to them in protest.

Justice Nduma Nderi said the failed talks were a "missed opportunity" to find a balance between the parties involved as opposed to the court issuing an order.

The parties will now appear at a hearing on Oct. 31 on the moderators' application to find Meta and Sama in contempt of court.

The lawsuit is the first known court challenge of its kind against Facebook outside the United States. In 2020, Facebook agreed to pay \$52 million to U.S. content moderators who filed a class action lawsuit after they were repeatedly exposed to beheadings, child and sexual abuse, animal cruelty, terrorism and other disturbing content.

Facebook and Sama have defended their employment practices.

## Vehicle data can become a turbo for the European digital economy

MUNICH, Oct 17, (Business Wire): A new EU law aims to make data from connected vehicles usable - for the benefit of vehicle owners, to improve road safety and to enable sustainable digital innovation.

The EU Data Act was the main topic at the 11th Allianz Motor Day on October 17, 2023. Experts discussed the new regulation at the Allianz Center for Technology (AZT) in Ismaning.

Allianz's assessment was clear: "We welcome the EU Data Act," said Klaus-Peter Röhrler, Member of the Board of Management of Allianz SE. "The new law stands for innovation and competition - it is a European initiative to strengthen the European digital economy. The new EU regulation follows a convincing principle: 'My device, my data' - we support this idea." Users of a connected car, according to the new legislation, will in future be able to demand from the manufacturer that the data collected in the vehicle be transferred to third parties. For "easily accessible data," the EU Data Act even requires the data to be made available in real time.

This, Röhrler said, could lead to real innovations: "We want to convince our customers in car insurance, through attractive offers, to share their data with us. The EU Data Act would also give other companies and start-ups the chance to become inventive. Using millions of live camera and position data from vehicles could solve the parking-space problem in inner cities. This would not only be a win for drivers, it would also save significant amounts of energy, help climate protection and improve air quality. If vehicle data is used wisely, it has the potential to make our transportation system safer, cleaner and smarter overall."

With detailed data from the vehicle, completely new insurance offers can be provided and new services made available in the future. "In case of an accident, it would be possible to automatically record the extent of the damage in real time by evaluating position data and data from crash sensors. Allianz could immediately inform a towing service, reserve a rental car, order suitable spare parts and make a workshop appointment for our customer. In the case of serious accidents, medical assistance could be provided," Röhrler said.

"In the past, the customer had to inform us. In the future, we'd contact our customers proactively, providing relief when customers need us most."

Röhrler also pointed out that by using car data, Allianz can offer the fairest possible price to every customer. "We can calculate insurance offers that are significantly more risk-adjusted, taking into account both the driving style and whether the vehicle is equipped with safety systems and whether those are switched on or off. At the same time, the sensor and camera data can be used for the proper, correct and fair investigation of an accident and for liability clarification," Röhrler said.

Data sent directly from the vehicle will take on special significance when

autonomous and AI-supported systems control the vehicle in the future. "Those affected - as well as society - have a right to know whether the human or the machine caused the accident," Röhrler said.

A recent Allianz survey conducted in five European countries shows that a majority of car drivers are willing to share their car data with their insurer if they receive comprehensive service support in return: in Germany it's 53 percent, in Great Britain even 61 percent. "This is a very important message for us, which we can be proud of: our customers know that they can trust us, because we will handle their data with care and in their own best interest," Röhrler said, commenting on the survey results.

Discussions at the 11th Allianz Motor Day also revolved around the question of how third parties can access in-car data in practice. The EU Data Act stipulates that "easily accessible data" must be transmitted in real time - but what data is that? And what price may the car manufacturer charge for transmitting the data to third parties? "Real competition can only emerge if vehicle manufacturers demand fair prices. Otherwise, third parties have no chance to innovate," Röhrler said.

But what should an individual customer do with the data of their vehicle? And above all, how should they access the data and pass it on? This can only work if there is a very simple way for the individual to transfer the data in practice. "The EU Data Protection Act only creates the legal basis for the transfer of data from the vehicle to third parties. However, the legal framework is still missing that specifies in which technical way the data from the vehicle can be made usable for all market participants," Röhrler said. "Legislators must find a practicable solution for this as quickly as possible, otherwise the treasure trove of data cannot be mined for the benefit of customers and of all participants."

1. Vehicle owners must be given full transparency about the data collected in their vehicle. Every car owner must be given a precise overview so that they know what data is being collected in their vehicle. In addition, it must be possible to see which of these data points can be transmitted to third parties in real time.

2. In order for car owners to be able to make good use of the newly acquired sovereignty over their vehicle data, a standardized minimum data set is needed to enable new services regardless of the car manufacturer and to allow data to be shared quickly and easily in real time via defined interfaces if the owner so desires.

3. Allianz calls for a regulated marketplace and an independent data trustee who ensures the secure exchange of vehicle data. This independent institution must ensure that authorized parties can access data.

4. So that drivers can benefit from the many conceivable innovations, we need fair prices for data transmission to third parties. The costs must be calculable to enable broad competition.

### Russia aiming to redirect trade towards Asia

**BEIJING, Oct 17, (AP): China is hosting its third international forum centered around President Xi Jinping's signature policy, the Belt and Road Initiative, which over the past 10 years has built infrastructure across continents, burdening some smaller countries with debt.**

The forum brings a flurry of diplomacy to Beijing, including at least 20 heads of state and government, mostly hailing from developing markets in Southeast and South Asia, the Middle East, Africa and Latin America.

Here are some key leaders visiting Beijing and an overview of their countries' involvement in the Belt and Road projects.

#### Russian president Vladimir Putin

Russian President Vladimir Putin landed in Beijing on Tuesday, on his first trip outside the former Soviet Union since the International Criminal Court issued a warrant for him in March over his alleged involvement in the mass abduction of children from Ukraine.

Putin's visit underscores China's economic and diplomatic support for Moscow amid the isolation brought by its war in Ukraine. In an interview with Chinese state media ahead of his visit, Putin described BRI projects - which the U.S. has called a "debt trap" for smaller countries - as China's "desire for cooperation" in the global arena.

Russia has been aiming to redirect trade toward Asia after being shut out by the European Union over its Ukraine war. China-Russia trade soared 30% in the first half of the year and is expected to exceed \$200 billion this year, according to the Russian government.

One of Russia's priorities in terms of joint infrastructure projects with China is building the Power of Siberia-2 pipeline, which is set to traverse Mongolia and enable Moscow to sell more natural gas to China.

#### Sri Lankan president Ranil Wickremesinghe

Sri Lanka, along with Zambia, is one of the countries that have defaulted on their debt to China and other international lenders. The country's former president, Gotabaya Rajapaksa, stepped down in July 2022 amid protests over soaring inflation and a severe economic crisis.

Sri Lanka had accessed Chinese financing to build highways, a port, an airport and a coal power plant, raking in \$7 billion in debt.

As part of its efforts to repay Beijing, Colombo handed it over control of a strategic port, in a move often referenced by BRI critics as an example of China's "debt trap" diplomacy.

Last week, Sri Lanka reached an agreement with the Import-Export Bank of China to cover about \$4.2 billion of that debt as part of a broader restructuring plan involving deals with other international creditors including India and Japan.

Sri Lankan President Ranil Wickremesinghe, who took office last year, is attending the forum as part of his first official trip to China. He is expected to hold a bilateral meeting with Xi.

#### Kenyan president William Ruto

One of the key BRI projects in Africa is the Mombasa-Nairobi Railway, extending for 592 kilometers (368 miles) and connecting Kenya's largest port to its capital.

Opened in 2017, China touts the project as a success story, saying it has supported Kenya's economic growth.

But work on a second section of the railway, which was meant to reach neighboring Uganda and serve other landlocked countries halted after Kampala pulled out and opted instead for a partnership with a Turkish firm. Kenya owes about \$6 billion to China, according to national data.

President William Ruto is expected to explore funding options for the remaining section of the railway during the Belt and Road summit.

#### Indonesian president Joko Widodo

In Southeast Asia, one of the most prominent BRI projects has been the construction of a high-speed 142-kilometer (88-mile)

railway linking Indonesia's capital, Jakarta, to the economic hub of Bandung. Indonesian President Joko Widodo inaugurated the \$7.3 billion China-funded project earlier this month.

He is expected to meet Xi and discuss a plan to extend the railway by about 700 kilometers (435 miles) to the city of Surabaya, as well as new potential investments in renewable energy projects and trade.

**Hungarian prime minister Viktor Orban** Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban is the only E.U. head of state or government to attend the Belt and Road forum.

Hungarian media reports last month suggested a Chinese-backed railway project connecting Budapest with Belgrade has hit snags and China would halt funding.

Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi earlier this month told his Hungarian counterpart the project would continue as planned.

Orban's participation as the sole E.U. leader at the event comes in contrast with the 2019 edition of the forum when then-Italian Prime Minister Paolo Gentiloni attended right as Italy had formally joined the initiative.

Italy this year signaled its intention to drop out of the scheme as major China-backed infrastructure projects haven't materialized, while Italy's trade deficit with China has more than doubled, to 48 billion euros (around \$50 billion), since 2019.

#### Argentina's president Alberto Fernandez

Argentina's President Alberto Fernandez also arrived in Beijing on Tuesday. Argentina is one of the countries that joined the BRI relatively recently, in 2022, seeking Chinese investment in areas such as railways, nuclear energy, solar and hydropower, agriculture and digital infrastructure. Argentina has asked China to fully finance a new \$8.3 billion nuclear power plant.

China's focus in Latin America lies in green technology and the extraction of minerals, according to experts.

Chinese companies are involved in dozens of lithium extraction projects in Argentina and Chile, according to research by Facultad Latinoamericana de Ciencias Sociales in Buenos Aires.

# Grisham brings back 'The Firm' star McDeere in 'The Exchange'

NEW YORK, Oct 17, (AP) — Thirty-two years after “The Firm” launched his career as a legal novelist who churns out bestselling books that almost invariably become movies, John Grisham returns with a sequel starring Mitch McDeere.

In “The Exchange,” it’s 2000 and McDeere is now a high-powered partner at the world’s largest law firm, Scully & Pershing, having “established a reputation as a sort of legal SWAT team leader sent in by Scully to rescue clients in distress.” He lives a very privileged life in Manhattan with his wife and two young boys.

Grisham fans will love the first 37 pages, as McDeere travels back to Memphis for the first time since the events in “The Firm” and meets with an old friend. It’s an excuse for Grisham to fill in the 15-year time gap since Mitch and his wife Abby fled Memphis on the run from the Chicago mob, who was hunting him for his role exposing crimes at Bendini, Lambert & Locke, but it’s inconsequential to the new story Grisham has to tell.

That narrative kicks off when Mitch is called to Rome to take the lead on a case involving a Turkish company that built a \$400 million bridge to nowhere in the Libyan desert that Colonel Gaddafi (yes, it’s the year 2000 and the Libyan dictator is still alive) is now refusing to pay for. When Mitch assigns a London-based Scully associate to go on a fact-finding mission to the bridge, she is taken hostage and this legal thriller pretty much drops the adjective and just becomes a thriller.

Mitch’s job is not to legally outsmart his colleague’s captors, but to try and make sure she’s not beheaded by terrorists by working every angle to come up with their ransom. The action skips from New York to Rome to London to Tripoli to Istanbul and it’s very easy to imagine the establishing aerial shots in the movie version as the plot crosses continents.

### Characters

Grisham fans will devour it; but there were times when this reader wished the action would slow down a little so we could spend some time with the characters. Mitch is always on the move - in a car, on a plane, in a boardroom - conversations are clipped, and the plot pace is furious.

Grisham certainly reflects the urgency of Mitch’s mission in his writing, but some of the best parts of the book are when the story gets a chance to breathe a little, as in this scene on a boat off the coast of Maine:

“Tanner inched the throttle up a notch and the wake grew wider. They were nearing a cove with the Atlantic not far away. The water was deep blue and flat, but an occasional wave sent mist over the boat and refreshed everyone. With his left hand, Mitch reached over and took hers.”

It’s not much, but in this frenetic novel, it’s a moment that conveys the love between Mitch and Abby without words and maybe, just maybe,

the promise of an extended future where they aren’t always on the run.

### Also:

**TIRANA, Albania:** Albanian novelist **Ismail Kadare** was awarded the Grand Officer of the Legion of Honor title by French President **Emmanuel Macron** on Monday.

Macron arrived in Tirana after a summit of European Union leaders with Western Balkan countries earlier in the day. He didn’t attend the talks because of the attack in which a teacher was fatally stabbed and three other people were wounded at a school in northern **France**.

In a long speech describing Kadare’s different novels throughout his writing career and how he had resisted Albania’s communist government, Macron awarded the title “for his works, his courage to rise up against a dictatorial system ... and a defender of freedom, a great writer of humanity.”

Kadare, 87, has long been mentioned as a possible contender for the Nobel Literature Prize. He has been well-known internationally since his “The General of the Dead Army” novel was published in 1963 when Albania was governed by the communist government of late dictator **Enver Hoxha**.

Before Albania installed political pluralism after a students’ protest in December 1990, Kadare fled to France asking for political asylum. He lived in **Paris** and recently returned to Tirana.

‘The Holdovers,’ a timeless tale of students and teachers

# Payne recreates classic cinema

NEW YORK, Oct 17, (AP) — The great films of the 1970s have long loomed in the imagination of filmmakers raised during one of the most fertile periods of American movies. But Alexander Payne wanted to take it a step further.

Payne’s latest film, “The Holdovers,” isn’t just set in 1970, it seeks to imbibe the humanistic spirit of films like “The Last Detail.”

“Harold and Maude,” “The Landlord” and “Paper Moon” - all movies he screened for his cast and crew.

“We were very fully making a ’70s movie,” Payne says, recently speaking by phone from his desk in Omaha, Nebraska.

Payne, 62, shot “The Holdovers,” set at a New England boarding school, largely with filmmaking equipment and camera lenses from that period. He mixed it in mono. “We were trying to play the exercise of: We are in 1970 making this movie,” he says.

“The Holdovers,” which Focus Features will release Oct. 27 and expand on Nov. 10, is Payne’s first film in six years and it’s one of his best. Payne, the filmmaker of “Election,”

“Sideways” and “The Descendants,” has long made “the kind of films they don’t make anymore”: smart, funny, melancholic dramas for adults. And yet he’s kept making them. After decades of making contemporary films that in some way evoke a ’70s sensibility of cinema, he’s finally made the genuine article.

“I was just trying to replicate the experience of the movies I love as much as possible,” says Payne. “I don’t think it makes the movie quaint. I hope it lends it the warmth of nostalgia, the warmth of a lost time, maybe even some traces of memory.”

“The Holdovers” reunites Payne with Paul Giamatti nearly two decades after the actor’s memorable, merlot-loathing breakthrough performance in “Sideways.” This time, Giamatti plays a curmudgeonly Barton Academy classics teacher named Paul Hunham tasked to stay at school with a handful of kids without family plans over the Christmas break.

The set-up could be broad: a gang of outcasts and troublemakers sneaking joints while the widely loathed

Hunham chases them down the halls. And while there is some of that, Payne pares the group down to Hunham, Angus (Dominic Sessa), a bright student who’s one mishap away from being sent to a lesser school (and thus likely to Vietnam) and Mary (Da’Vine Joy Randolph), a grieving school cook whose son has recently died in the war.

Something remarkably tender and stirring follows. Digging into each character’s life, “The Holdovers” ruminates on privilege in class and race, while steadily building an anti-authoritarian streak for the much-espoused supposedly high-minded ideals of Barton.

If Giamatti’s “Sideways” character - a lonely unpublished writer with a manuscript no one wants to read - was in need of a road trip to jostle him out of a rut, his Hunham is likewise due for some self-reflection and maybe a little encouragement.

### Reunion

For Payne, it was a long-overdue reunion. “I wanted to work with that guy again for 20 years,” he says. “I was waiting for the right thing - and created it. I told (screenwriter) David Hemingson: ‘We’re writing for Paul Giamatti. That’s who we’re writing for.’”

“He’s just the best actor,” adds Payne. “He’s the finest actor. Not casting aspersions on others, I just think there’s nothing he cannot do.”

When Payne screened “The Holdovers” for buyers at last year’s Toronto International Film Festival, it prompted heated interest. Focus snapped it up for \$30 million - far more than is typical - a sign of the indie distributor’s belief in the movie as a crowd-pleaser and an awards contender. The three lead actors are likely to be in the Oscar mix.

But while Giamatti and Randolph are well-known performers, Cessa is appearing in his first film. After sitting through some 800 submissions, Payne felt like he still hadn’t found someone to play Angus. He and the casting director decided to call up the schools they were going to be shooting in to see if their drama departments had anyone to recommend.

“One of the schools we were going to be shooting was Deerfield Academy in Western Massachusetts. We called up the drama teacher who said, ‘Oh, yes, we have quite a few who would be happy to try out for your little movie.’ And Dominic was one of them.”

Cessa was a senior when he shot “The Holdovers.” He hadn’t acted in front of a camera before, though you’d be hard-pressed to tell by the naturalness of his presence on screen.

“What you see is some people are born with it. You see all these people in New York taking classes on film acting. This guy can just do it,” Payne says. “I learned a long time ago that the best actors are also the best technically. From day one, man, this guy could hit his marks and do his dialogue backward and forward. He’s built to do it. And then you see him go toe-for-toe with Paul Giamatti, give him a run for his money.”

Payne’s last film was his biggest budget gambit: “Downsizing,” a sci-fi satire of an overpopulated Earth in which people can be made miniature. After “Downsizing” struggled at the box office and found mixed reviews, Payne dabbled in a number of projects (he had been attached to direct, among others, “The Menu” and “Landscapers”), but “The Holdovers” is the one that stuck.

It started for him years earlier after seeing a similarly plotted 1930s French film by Marcel Pagnol called “Merlusse.” Payne, who had written all of his films except “Nebraska,” didn’t feel he had the right personal experience. (He attended an all-boys Jesuit day school in Omaha, Nebraska.) Instead he turned to Hemingson and “beveled the edges” of the witty and soulful script he turned in.

But as long-term and ’70s-oriented as making “The Holdovers” was, it struck Payne as a contemporary story, too. “Trump years and Nixon years,” he says.

“Gravity led me and my collaborators to 1970 for some reason. I can’t necessarily articulate it,” Payne says. “It’s obviously not a message film or any crap like that. As Marx would say, all films are political films.”

**DALLAS:** A miniature X-wing Starfighter used in a “Star Wars” film sold for over \$3 million during an auction over the weekend of items both collected and created by longtime Hollywood model-maker **Greg Jein**.

The collection amassed by Jein, who died last year at the age of 76, brought in about \$13.6 million during an event at Heritage Auctions in Dallas. The auction house said that everyone from model-makers to collectors and science-fiction fans attended, making the event its best-attended in years.

**Joe Maddalena**, Heritage’s executive vice president and a longtime friend of Jein’s, said in a news release Monday that the auction was “a profound testament to my friend as both a visual-effects master and one of the great collectors.”

Jein not only had an Oscar and Emmy-nominated career making miniature models for nearly half a century, but he also spent a lifetime collecting costumes, props, scripts, artwork, photographs and models from the shows he loved.

The Red Leader X-wing Starfighter that was used in the 1977 film “Star Wars: Episode IV - A New Hope” sold for about \$3.1 million after a bidding duel between two collectors, the auction house said. Also going for an eye-popping amount was a “Star Wars” Stormtrooper costume that sold for \$645,000.

A rare surviving spacesuit from **Stanley Kubrick’s** 1968 film “2001: A Space Odyssey” sold for \$447,000.

Jein was a fan of “Star Trek” before he worked on the franchise - and some of the items that he collected were popular at the auction. A filming model of the “SS Botany Bay” vessel from “Star Trek: The Original Series” from the 1960s went for \$200,000 while prop devices from that series like a hero phaser went for \$187,500 and a tricorder garnered \$175,000.

Jein, who grew up in Los Angeles, was still early in his career when he led the team that created the mothership for **Steven Spielberg’s** 1977 film “Close Encounters of the Third Kind.” The model that appears gigantic in the movie is just over 5 feet (1.5 meters) long and now part of the collection at the Smithsonian’s National Air and

Space Museum in **Washington, D.C.** A small preliminary model, which is about 5 inches (12 centimeters) long, brought in \$55,000 at the auction. (AP)

## Debuts cookbook

## Natasha riding high with simple dishes

NEW YORK, Oct. 17, (AP) — It started with a simple salad. **Natasha Kravchuk** began building a cooking mini-empire by combining cucumber, tomato and avocado. When a TV anchor shared the recipe on Facebook in 2015, the dish went viral.

"I think that was the recipe that kind of gave us the first lift," says Kravchuk, whose online hub Natasha's Kitchen has grown to some 13 million followers across social media. "I think that's trademark for what you can find on Natasha's Kitchen."

Kravchuk's philosophy is indeed mixed into that salad - flavorful food that doesn't take a long time, uses regular ingredients and doesn't hurt the pocket-book.

"It's turning humble and just simple ingredients into something really delicious," she says. "That just has always carried through with me. I don't think you need saffron to make something taste incredible, you know?"

This fall, Kravchuk has put her expertise into her debut cookbook, "Natasha's Kitchen: 100+ Easy Family-Favorite Recipes You'll Make Again and Again," which includes dishes such as Salmon Piccata and Turkey Meatball Soup, and Crispy Bacon Jalapeno Poppers.

"It's approachable. You can look at the list of ingredients and be like, 'OK, I have most of those things already.' The steps are simple and they are recipes that work," she says.

The book is classic, chicken-soup cooking - and, indeed, there's a recipe for that on page 115. There's even a dish - Zuppa Toscana - inspired by an Olive Garden offering. "I make it better," she says, laughing.

There are American classics like baked mac and cheese and blueberry muffins, and gentle nods to Mexico, Italy, France and Asia. There's a heavy lean on traditional Ukrainian recipes passed down from Kravchuk's mother, like classic borscht and pierogies.

"We cook a little bit of everything now, but I think people trust our taste in food and they can relate to the values that we have," she says.

## Persecution

Ukrainian-born Kravchuk and her family fled religious persecution in the 1980s and eventually found their way to Meridian, Idaho. At one point, they relied on food banks, a fact not lost on her these days. "I was telling my husband, 'God has a sense of humor to give this refugee a cookbook,'" she says.

She didn't start cooking until later in life and started blogging in 2009. "When I got married, I wanted to recreate the same foods we grew up loving and enjoy. So I started learning how to cook. I started going to the library, getting stacks of books, asking my mom, my mother-in-law for recipes and friends."

Susan Roxborough, Kravchuk's editor at Clarkson Potter, loved Kravchuk's personal story and her book proposal - especially the teriyaki salmon, with brown sugar, hoisin, soy sauce, garlic and ginger. She found the author down-to-earth and relatable.

"It was easy to imagine her as your next-door neighbor or maybe a fellow parent at a bake sale at your kid's school," Roxborough says.

Roxborough and her daughter made Kravchuk's pierogi together - a fun time bonding, as well as delicious - and says she's become obsessed with the recipe for Tres Leches Cupeakes. "It's dangerously good," she says.

The cookbook, which last week debuted at No. 2 on The New York Times' Advice, How-To & Miscellaneous list, contains a dozen or so reader favorites, but most of the recipes are new, split into breakfast, snacks, salads, soups, mains, sides and desserts. A battalion of over 300 testers have kicked the tires on each dish.

The book includes Kravchuk's mother's Ukrainian pancakes, which call for yeast batter. She says they puff up like donuts when they hit the hot oil, and have a subtle sourdough-like flavor.

Another favorite is a chicken pot pie, which Kravchuk says is a top 10 favorite on her site. "It's such a comforting meal. There is just no comparison to store-bought," she adds. "It really isn't complicated. I think people realize that the first time they make it, that it's just such a comforting thing to make. And it reheats well, too."

Kravchuk spotted two items to put together during warm weather - beef bacon and corn - and came up with a dish that will cause every parent to slap their forehead because they didn't already do it by now. One of her nieces named it "Ba-Corn" and that simply can't be improved upon.

Kravchuk didn't follow the food world's traditional route for a rising chef.

**Natasha Kravchuk's mom (or Baba, as her kids call her) "Baba's Fluffy Oladi Pancakes"**.

Serves: 6-8

1 cup water, warmed to 115°F; 1 cup buttermilk; 1 large egg, room temperature; 2 tbs extra-light olive oil or vegetable oil, plus more for the pan; 2 tbs sugar; 1½ tps instant yeast; 1¼ tps fine sea salt and 2¼ cups all-purpose flour

For Serving: Honey or jam of your choice and sour cream

1. In a large bowl, whisk together the water, buttermilk, egg, oil, sugar, yeast and salt. Add the flour, 1 cup at a time, whisking to incorporate each addition before adding more. Continue whisking until the batter is smooth with a thin, cake-batter consistency.

2. Cover the bowl with plastic wrap and let the batter rise at room temperature for 1½ to 2 hours, or in a warm place (about 100°F) for 1 hour. The mixture should become very bubbly and almost double in size.

3. In a large nonstick or cast-iron skillet over medium heat, add enough oil to coat the bottom of the pan. Working in batches, add heaping tablespoons of the batter to the hot skillet, spacing them just far enough apart that they aren't touching and can still be flipped easily. Cook the pancakes for about 1½ minutes per side, until golden brown, adding more oil as needed after flipping. Feel free to reduce the heat if you find they're browning too quickly. Continue with the remaining batter, keeping the skillet well-oiled between batches to ensure crisp, tasty, and beautifully golden edges on the pancakes.

4. Transfer the pancakes to a platter and serve warm with honey, raspberry sauce and sour cream.

This recipe yields a big batch, but you could halve the ingredients for a smaller number of servings. These also reheat very well, so you could make the entire batch and reheat them in the toaster.

## Scorsese's film explores Native American land theft

## 'Killers' illuminates dark history of US

Director Martin Scorsese's new movie, "Killers of the Flower Moon," tells the true story of a string of murders on the Osage Nation's land in Oklahoma in the 1920s. Based on David Grann's meticulously researched 2017 book, the movie delves into racial and family dynamics that rocked Oklahoma to the core when oil was discovered on Osage lands.

White settlers targeted members of the Osage Nation to steal their land and the riches beneath it. But from a historical perspective, this crime is just the tip of the iceberg.

From the early 1800s through the 1930s, official US policy displaced thousands of Native Americans from their ancestral homes through the policy known as Indian removal. And throughout the 20th century, the federal government collected billions of dollars from sales or leases of natural resources like timber, oil and gas on Indian lands, which it was supposed to disburse to the land's owners. But it failed to account for these trust funds for decades, let alone pay Indians what they were due.

I am the manager of the University of Arizona's Indigenous Governance Program and a law professor. My ancestry is Comanche, Kiowa and Cherokee on my father's side and Taos Pueblo on my mother's side. From my perspective, "Killers of the Flower Moon" is just one chapter in a much larger story: The US was built on stolen lands and wealth.

In the standard telling, the American West was populated by industrious settlers who eked out livings from the ground, formed cities and, in time, created states. In fact, hundreds of Native nations already lived on those lands, each with their own unique forms of government, culture and language.

In the early 1800s, eastern cities were growing and dense urban centers were becoming unwieldy. Indian lands in the west were an alluring target - but westward expansion ran up against what would become known as "the Indian problem." This widely used phrase reflected a belief that the US had a God-given mandate to settle North America, and Indians stood in the way.

Starting in the 1830s, Congress pressured Indian tribes in the east to sign treaties that required the tribes to move to reservations in the west. This took place over the objections of public figures such as Tennessee frontiersman and congressman Davy Crockett, humanitarian organizations and, of course, the tribes themselves.

Forced removal touched every tribe east of the Mississippi River and several tribes to the west of it. In total, about 100,000 American Indians were removed from their eastern homelands to western reservations.

## Reservation

But the most pernicious land grab was yet to come.

Even after Indians were corralled on reservations, settlers pushed for more access to western lands. In 1871, Congress formally ended the policy of treaty-making with Indians. Then, in 1887, it passed the General Allotment Act, also known as the Dawes Act. With this law, US policy toward Indians shifted from separation to assimilation - forcibly integrating Indians into the national population.

This required transitioning tribal structures of communal land ownership under a reservation system to a private property model that broke up reservations altogether. The General Allotment Act was designed to divvy up reservation lands into allotments for individual Indians and open any unallotted lands, which were deemed surplus, to non-Indian settlement. Lands could be allotted only to male heads of households.

Under the original statute, the US

government held Indian allotments, which measured roughly 160 acres per person, in trust for 25 years before each Indian allottee could receive clear title. During this period, Indian allottees were expected to embrace agriculture, convert to Christianity and assume U.S. citizenship.

In 1906, Congress amended the law to allow the secretary of the interior to issue land titles whenever an Indian allottee was deemed capable of managing his affairs. Once this happened, the allotment was subject to taxation and could immediately be sold.


Indian allottees often had little concept of farming and even less ability to manage their newly acquired lands.

Even after being confined to western reservations, many tribes had maintained their traditional governance structures and tried to preserve their cultural and religious practices, including communal ownership of property. When the U.S. government imposed a foreign system of ownership and management on them, many Indian landowners simply sold their lands to non-Indian buyers, or found themselves subject to taxes that they were unable to pay.

In total, allotment removed 90 million acres of land from Indian control before the policy ended in the mid-1930s. This led to the destruction of Indian culture; loss of language as the federal government implemented its boarding school policy; and imposition of a myriad of regulations, as shown in "Killers of the Flower Moon," that affected inheritance, ownership and title disputes when an allottee passed away.

Today, about 56 million acres remain under Indian control. The federal government owns title to the lands, but holds them in trust for Indian tribes and individuals.

These lands contain many valuable resources, including oil, gas, timber and minerals. But rather than acting as a steward of Indian interests in these resources, the US government has repeatedly failed in its trust obligations. (AP)

**FORT MILL, S.C.:** Ed Currie, the South Carolina hot pepper expert who cross-bred and grew the Carolina Reaper that's hotter than most pepper sprays police use to subdue unruly criminals, has broken his own world record with a pepper that's three times hotter.

Pepper X was publicly named the hottest pepper in the world on Oct. 9 by the Guinness Book of World Records, beating out the Reaper in Currie's decade-long hunt to perfect a pepper that he says provides "immediate, brutal heat."

Currie said when he first tried Pepper X, it did more than warm his heart.

"I was feeling the heat for three-and-a-half hours. Then the cramps came," said Currie, one of only five people so far to eat an entire Pepper X. "Those cramps are horrible. I was laid out flat on a marble wall for approximately an hour in the rain, groaning in pain."

Heat in peppers is measured in Scoville Heat Units. Zero is bland, and a regular jalapeno pepper registers about 5,000 units. A habanero, the record-holder about 25 years ago, typically tops 100,000. The Guinness Book of World Records lists the Carolina Reaper at 1.64 million units.

Pepper X's record is an average of 2.69 million units. By comparison, pepper spray commonly holstered by police is around 1.6 million units. Bear spray advertises at 2.2 million units.

Pepper X has been in the works since Currie last set the hottest pepper record in 2013 with the Carolina Reaper, a bright red knobby fruit with what aficionados call a scorpion tail. The goal was to offer an extremely hot pepper flavored with sweetness.

Pepper X is greenish-yellow, doesn't have the same shelf appeal and carries an earthy flavor once its heat is delivered. It's a crossbreed of a Carolina Reaper and what Currie mysteriously classifies as a "pepper that a friend of mine sent me from Michigan that was brutally hot."

The chemical in peppers that causes the burn is called capsaicin and not dangerous unless pounds of it are consumed. Even so, the minds of humans and other mammals perceive capsaicin as a threat and send a strong burning signal to the body. Because birds don't have the same reaction, they are able to spread pepper seeds while sparing the plant.

The burning sensation spurred in humans also releases endorphins and dopamine into the body. Currie, who went all in to growing peppers after kicking drug and alcohol addictions, considers that kick a natural high. He shares his peppers with medical

researchers, hoping they can use them to cure disease and help people who suffer chronic pain or discomfort.

For Currie, having the hottest pepper in

the world has been a two-decade obsession. It took 10 years to get Pepper X from the first crossbreed experiment to the record, including five years of testing to prove it

was a different plant with a different fruit and documenting its average heat over different plants and generations. (AP)

**LOS ANGELES:** National park officials are planning to gather and reduce the bison herd in Theodore Roosevelt National Park in North Dakota, rehoming the animals to a number of Native American tribes.

The "bison capture" has started and will continue through the week in the park's South Unit near Medora. The operation will be closed to the public for safety reasons.

The park plans to reduce its roughly 700 bison to 400. The park will remove bison of differing ages.

Bison removed from the park will be rehomed and come under tribal management, Intertribal Buffalo Council Executive Director Troy Heinert told The Associated Press.

The bison will provide genetic diversity and increase numbers of existing tribal herds, he said. The Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation and the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe will receive bison; more bison could go to other tribes, depending on demographics, said Heinert, who is Sicasu Lakota.

A helicopter will herd bison into a holding area, with a survey of the landscape and a population count before the gathering of the bison. (AP)

# Horseback riding ... healing experience for autistic people

KUWAIT, Oct 17, (KUNA): At several Kuwaiti horse stables, parents take their kids of special needs or diagnosed with autism to ride horses aiming to improve their condition, working with doctors and specialists to benefit from their successful experiences at treating those kids, and seek information from medical institutes on the positive effect of horseback riding.

Consultant Developmental Pediatrician Dr. Abeer Awadh said that any movement skill can have a good effect on autistic kids, whether it's horseback riding, swimming or any other sport, noting that it's important to keep them away from electric devices as much as possible.

She noted that its possible to heal autism if it was tackled in its early stages through using different treatment methods including horseback riding, as well as cooperation between parents, doctors and trainers.

On her part, owner of Al-Muzaini Equestrian Maai Al-Muzaini said to KUNA that three years ago, she established Al-Muzaini Equestrian in Abu AlHassany area to help treat her son and as she saw his condition improve, she opened the stable offering services for low fees for the sake of kids with special needs and autism to help them get treated as well.

Al-Muzaini explained that the horse's walk impacts blood circulation of kids with autism which in turn helps increase their concentration, in addition to the horse's body warmth that helps in calming them down.

**Training**

Through successful experiences, it is shown that autistic kids do not necessarily have to enroll in specific training courses because horseback riding is enough to start their healing process, Al-Muzaini added, noting that it can also help hyperactive kids.

Al-Muzaini also started a monthly seminar called "you're not alone" to exchange expertise between mothers and benefit from successful experiences, in addition to organizing a periodic session to communicate with horses, aimed

at enhancing the kid's linguistic skills.

On her part, Specialist Samar Al-Kandari said to KUNA that during her experience treating kids with special needs or autism at Kuwait Riding Center (KRC Stars), she noticed that most cases of autism improved, as well as their psychological health and social skills, stressing the need to enroll them in training sessions at an early age for better results.

Dr. Dalal Al-Mansouri, who also works as a trainer at KRC Stars, said that autistic kids don't have a sense of danger, so they let the kids sit on the horse without a saddle to help simulate a sense of caution and be more stable on the horse.

**Balance**

In a statement to KUNA, Reem Al-Sabbagh, a Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA), noted the importance of horseback riding in enhancing social skills and emotional understanding, considering it encourages empathy and understanding the non-verbal communication through interacting with horses, adding that this method can help alleviate stress, enhance calmness, movement skills and balance.

On his part, horseback riding coach for kids with special needs and autism Ahmad Al-Omran said to KUNA that he uses Hippotherapy, a technique he learned in Germany, to help improve the kid's back, hip and leg muscles which essentially helps them balance and leads to feeling more confident.

Al-Omran recommended using old European horses because they are calmer than Arabian ones which can be unstable if they are not specifically trained for this field.

He called upon the concerned authorities to establish a center specialized in Hippotherapy to all those with special needs and autism, to make equestrianism free or with a minimal price and open more equestrianism centers in Kuwait.

Al-Omran noted his keenness on raising awareness about equestrianism and its therapeutic effect via his podcast where he interviews trainers, players and specialists in nutrition

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# Sabitzer sends Austria to European Championship

Match between Belgium and Sweden suspended

**BRUSSELS, Oct 17, (AP):** Substitute Marcel Sabitzer scored from the penalty spot shortly after entering the game to secure a 1-0 win for Austria at Azerbaijan and send his country to next year's European Championship in a day overshadowed by a deadly shooting in Brussels which saw Belgium's game against Sweden halted at halftime.

"Due to the incidents in Brussels earlier tonight, play is suspended. Our thoughts are with all those affected," a post from the Belgian national team read on X, formerly known as Twitter.

European soccer governing body UEFA confirmed the Group F match had been called off following consultation with both teams and local police.

## SOCCER

The score was 1-1 at the time. Viktor Gyokeres gave Sweden a 15th-minute lead, but Romelu Lukaku had Belgium level just after the half-hour.

Belgium had already qualified for Euro 2024 while Sweden's chances of a top-two place had been ended by Austria's victory earlier.

Thousands of soccer fans were kept inside Belgium's national stadium for about 2 1/2 hours after a game between host Belgium and Sweden was suspended at halftime following a gunman fatally shooting two Swedes in Brussels before kicking off.

The European Championship qualifier was being played some 3 miles (5 kilometers) from the shooting in

the center of the Belgian capital city, with over 35,000 fans attending the match.

With the suspect still at large, Belgian authorities kept fans inside the venue for security reasons before

they started the evacuation around midnight local time.

Fans chanted "All together, All together" inside the King Baudouin Stadium after the match was halted, with thousands of supporters from

both sides also shouting "Sweden, Sweden!"

After losing 3-2 to Belgium in Vienna last week in the fight for Group F supremacy - Austria's only defeat in seven qualifying games so

far - Sabitzer and his teammates knew a win in Baku would secure a spot at the tournament hosted by Germany.

With several key players sidelined because of injuries, Austria struggled

to create real chances in the first half. It was awarded a penalty just minutes into the second half after a hand ball. Sabitzer was clinical in converting with a strike into the corner in the 48th.

Sabitzer, who plays for Borussia Dortmund, recently returned to competition after recovering from an adductor injury he picked up last month in a Champions League match against PSG.

Austria finished with 10 men after striker Guido Burgstaller was sent off in stoppage time for a second yellow card.

Austria became the seventh team to qualify after Belgium, France, Portugal, Scotland, Spain and Turkey, along with host Germany.

Cristiano Ronaldo scored twice for Portugal in a 5-0 demolition of host Bosnia in Group J.

Bruno Fernandes, Joao Cancelo and Joao Felix also scored with all goals coming in the first half.

Iceland routed Liechtenstein 4-0 and Slovakia won 1-0 at Luxembourg in the same group.

Netherlands came away from Greece with a 1-0 win in Group B to revive their hopes. Virgil Van Dijk's penalty in second-half stoppage time sent the Netherlands above their opponents and into second in their group. Both have 12 points.

Wout Weghorst earlier failed to convert his penalty.

"We do not have a specialist for penalties, corners and free kicks," said Netherlands coach Ronald Koeman. "When Virgil was behind the ball for the second one, I suddenly thought 'Surely it won't be one of those evenings when this one goes wrong too.' But Virgil took it well and decided the match."

Ireland thrashed Gibraltar 4-0 in the group's other game.

France have already qualified from Group B.

## England slams Farrell critics and semifinal underdog status

# Erasmus thinks Springboks' running game might be key in Rugby World Cup defense

**PARIS, Oct 17, (AP):** Playing pretty rugby has never been high on the Springboks' agenda, especially when it comes to the business of winning a World Cup in tense knockout games.

South Africa director of rugby Rassie Erasmus still claimed something of an evolution for the defending champions on Monday after a scintillating victory over host France in an ultra-close quarterfinal kept the Boks in with a chance of retaining the title, and getting their country's name etched on the trophy for a record fourth time.

The Springboks are unlikely to ever go too far from the power game that has always defined them, but Erasmus and coach Jacques Nienaber have spoken often this year about finding another method of attack to complement - and not replace - South Africa's big pack of forwards. That's meant more backline tries.

The primary motivation for that is, of course, winning. Aesthetics are of little consequence.

"As a team we don't want to be this wonderful rugby playing team that the whole world loves," Erasmus said. "But we do want to score tries."

The Springboks ground to the 2019 title with a massive focus on scrumming, lineout mauls and tactical kicking. The South African brains trust of Erasmus and Nienaber concluded that was 2019 rugby and few teams wouldn't know what South Africa would bring. How to stay a step ahead has largely revolved around putting faith in playmaking flyhalf Manie Libbok to release a backline with razor-sharp wings in Cheslin Kolbe and Kurt-Lee Arendse a little more often.

They were both on the scoresheet against France as the first three of South Africa's four tries were scored by backs, even if they were more well-timed counter-punches than free-flowing attacking moves.

Backs scored 66% of South Africa tries at the 2019 Rugby World Cup. The speedsters have 76% of their tries at this World Cup so far. It's not a mas-

sive shift, but a significant tweak.

Erasmus said the change came a year ago when South Africa lost 30-26 to France in an epic physical battle. France worked out the Springboks, but Erasmus also said they found referees were finding it much harder to officiate the Boks' constant "close-contact work."

"We had to adapt. Also to try and score tries through more open, fluent, running rugby. And you could see in our try-scoring tally there's a lot scored by our backs, more than our forwards," Erasmus said.

"If you only rely on a certain aspect of the game which is very tough for the referee to referee and he gets two (decisions) wrong but you are only relying on those three or four of five opportunities that you get, 50% of your opportunities are gone. But if you fire shots in open play, general play from the top of lineouts or counterattack, it's clearer decisions for the referee and easier to make."

## RUGBY

South Africa's forwards ground down England in the 2019 final in Japan before adding the coup de grace with two tries out wide. The English are the semifinal opponents next weekend in France, and have noticed that new willingness for South Africa to go wide, and go at any time.

"(With) South Africa, those threats are all across the field," England attack coach Richard Wigglesworth said. "But (Manie) Libbok and their outside backs . . . incredible ball movement, talented runners, they get the ball into space early and let those guys do the damage."

Booing by England supporters greeted the name of captain Owen Farrell when the team was announced before their Rugby World Cup quarterfinal in Marseille on Sunday.

Farrell is a divisive figure for his tackling technique, captaincy of a mediocre team, and debate about his

best position. He was suspended for England's first two Rugby World Cup games and in his absence George Ford impressed in wins against Argentina and Japan.

But Farrell and England had their best performance in two years on Sunday to beat Fiji 30-24 and reach the semifinals.

Farrell's drop goal in the 72nd minute broke a 24-24 deadlock, and his 78th-minute penalty ended Fiji hopes. Farrell hauled in 20 points.

He doesn't have to prove anything, England attack coach Richard Wigglesworth said on Monday.

"The tallest trees catch the most wind and he seems to catch a fair bit," Wigglesworth said. "He is incredibly serious about his career, he's an incredibly proud Englishman . . . and he was brilliant for us as we knew he would be."

"That was the maddening part of any noise, we knew what was coming."

Wigglesworth gave the inside backs combination of Farrell, Manu Tuilagi and Joe Marchant a pass. Tuilagi and Marchant scored England's only tries in the first 23 minutes.

"It was good at times; we created a few opportunities that we didn't take," he said. "We looked reasonably sharp early on. We just need to make sure there is a balance. What that looks like this week might be different from last week in terms of what the opposition pose and what we want to do with the ball."

They face South Africa on Saturday in Paris. They were crushed by the Springboks in the 2019 final in Japan and Wigglesworth brushed off England being a heavy underdog.

He said he was reassured by England's experience of tight matches and record of winning World Cup knockout matches.

"Why does everyone turn up to sport? Because you don't know the result beforehand," he said. "It would be boring if you knew the result, wouldn't it? We are not there for a holiday; we are not there just to turn up."

## VAR officials recalled after failure to award Diaz's goal for Liverpool against Tottenham

**MANCHESTER, England, Oct 17, (AP):** Two soccer officials involved in Luis Diaz's wrongly disallowed goal for Liverpool against Tottenham last month will return to Premier League duty this weekend.

Video Assistant Referee Darren England and his assistant, Dan

Cook, have been recalled for the first time since their error in Tottenham's 2-1 victory.

England will be the fourth official for Brentford's game against Burnley on Saturday and Cook is an assistant for Sheffield United's match against Manchester United on the same day.

Their failure to award what would have been an opening goal for Diaz prompted Liverpool manager Jurgen Klopp to call on the Premier League to have the game replayed. It also led to the Professional Game Match Officials Limited, which is the governing body of referees in England, to announce changes to video review protocols.

## SOCCER

The body admitted the mistake after VAR failed to award Diaz's goal, despite replays clearly showing the forward was inside when he scored. When audio of the decision-making process was released, it became evident the video review official mistakenly believed the goal had been awarded by the onfield officials and did not overrule that call. Diaz had, however, been whistled for offside.

Liverpool issued a statement saying they would "explore the range of options available given the clear need for escalation and resolution."

Klopp went further when calling for a rematch.

"I'm used to wrong and difficult decisions, but something like this never happened and so that is why I think a replay is the right thing to do," he said.

After that loss, Liverpool dropped further points in a draw with Brighton the following week. Tottenham, meanwhile, moved to the top of the standings after a 1-0 win over Luton.

Changes to protocol implemented by the PGMOL include improved communication between Video Assistant Referees. It also said it would reiterate that the speed of decision-making must not be at the expense of accuracy.

## Best of the Rest

**Disqualification reversed:** NASCAR on Monday rescinded Ryan Blaney's disqualification at Las Vegas Motor Speedway when series officials found a problem with the template used during post-race inspection.

The reversal restored Blaney's sixth-place finish from Sunday's race, which had been stripped hours after the checkered flag for an alleged illegal front shock on his Ford. The disqualification dropped Blaney to last in the race and would have crippled his championship chances.

Blaney went from last in the round-of-eight field to seventh, but his deficit below the cutline was reduced significantly.

"NASCAR has shown a tremendous amount of integrity throughout the process which has led to this conclusion," Team Penske said in a statement that lauded the reversal.

"We are proud of the effort and the results by the No. 12 team during the 2023 season. We look forward to continuing the pursuit of the NASCAR Cup Series Championship."

NASCAR did not reveal what about the template used in the inspection led to the initial disqualification.

"Monday morning during its race weekend debrief, NASCAR discovered an issue with the damper template used for inspection. NASCAR then conducted a detailed investigation, and has restored the No. 12's stage and race finishing positions from Sunday," NASCAR said in a statement.

**Woods announces loaded field:** Tiger Woods has another world-class field for his Hero World Challenge in the Bahamas. Still to be determined is whether he is part of it.

Woods has not played competitively since withdrawing from the Masters after making the cut. He had ankle surgery a short time later for injuries related to his February 2021 car accident, though he was seen hitting wedges during a foundation event at Pebble Beach last week.

Viktor Hovland, the two-time defending champion in the Bahamas, is among three players from Europe's winning Ryder Cup team in Rome.

Sponsor exemptions were awarded to Rickie Fowler and Justin Thomas. Both are among the top 25 in the world ranking, which illustrates the strength of the field. Players must be among the top 50 to get an exemption, part of the provision for the unofficial event getting world ranking points.

The criteria allows for an exemption to be used on the tournament host - Woods - if he needs one. (AP)

MUMBAI, India, Oct 17, (AP): Oscar-winning actor Michelle Yeoh has been elected as a member of the IOC.

The International Olympic Committee on Tuesday voted in eight new members to make a total of 107 drawn from royal families, sports officials, current and former athletes plus leaders from politics and industry.

Members' work at annual meetings includes approving recommended candidates as future Olympic Games hosts. They could be asked in Paris next July to change Olympic rules that would let IOC president Thomas Bach seek a third leadership term in 2025 beyond the current 12-year limit.

Yeoh, who has ties to the United Nations representing her home country Malaysia, was elected in a 67-9 vote by her new colleagues. The accolade came in the same year as her Oscar win for best actress in "Everything Everywhere All at Once."

Yeoh also is an international campaigner for road safety in partnership with her husband, Jean Todt, the former head of the Ferrari team in Formula One racing.

He was president of the motorsports governing body known by its French acronym FIA.

The only unanimous vote was the 76-0 result in favor of Cecilia Tait, a twice-elected congresswoman in Peru and a three-time Olympian in volleyball. Tait helped Peru's women take silver at the 1988 Seoul Olympics.

The first Israeli to win an Olympic medal, Yael Arad, also was elected Tuesday, 71-5. Now president of Israel's national Olympic body, she took silver in judo at the 1992 Barcelona Olympics.

Other new members include Hungarian government sports executive Balázs Fűrjes and officials from Germany, Michael Mronz, and Tunisia, Mehrez Boussayene.

Two recently elected presidents of governing bodies in Olympic sports got membership: Petra Sörling of Sweden from table tennis and Kim Jae-youl of South Korea from the International Skating Union.

The new members swore the Olympic oath in front of their colleagues before the closure of a three-day meeting in Mumbai, India.

# Pakistan earn first-ever win in WC qualifying

ISLAMABAD, Oct 17, (Agencies): Pakistan's national soccer team won a World Cup qualifying game for the first time on Tuesday, beating Cambodia 1-0 in Islamabad to advance to the second round.

loss. They also participated in a second match against the Syrian national team, marking their final encounter before hosting the Indian national team for the start of the qualifying campaign.



## Fagioli gets 7-month ban

ROME, Oct 17, (AP): Juventus midfielder Nicolò Fagioli was banned for seven months by the Italian soccer federation on Tuesday for betting violations.

Fagioli agreed to a plea bargain with the FIGC that included therapy for a gambling addiction.

The 22-year-old Fagioli, who has already been seeing a therapist for his problem, alerted the Italian soccer federation's prosecutor about the case and has been co-operating with authorities to mitigate his punishment.

That allowed the minimum ban of three years for players betting on soccer matches to be greatly reduced. Fagioli has reportedly never bet on matches involving Juventus.

More than 10 months after the Reyna family pressured U.S. Soccer Federation staff to give more playing time to **Gio Reyna** at the World Cup, the team have not yet adopted rules to prevent similar lobbying.

"That's something that U.S. Soccer leadership is discussing, and as of now, nothing's been put in place," coach **Gregg Berhalter** said Monday, a day ahead of the Americans' exhibition against Ghana. Gio Reyna didn't play in the Americans' World Cup opener against Wales on Nov. 21. The following day, the midfielder's father, former U.S. captain **Claudio Reyna**, sent a text message to then-USSF sporting director Earnie Stewart, according to a report last March for the federation by the firm **Alston and Bird**.

"What a complete and utter ... joke," Claudio Reyna texted. "Our family is disgusted in case you are wondering. Disgusted at how a coach is allowed to never be challenged and do whatever he wants."

Claudio Reyna sent a text message to then general manager Brian McBride that read: "Our entire family is disgusted, angry, and done with you guys. Don't expect nice comments from anyone in our family about US Soccer."

"I'm being transparent to you not like the political clown show of the federation."

The report details complaints from the Reyna family dating to 2016.

## Man United Sale: Ratcliffe bid, Sheikh Jassim withdrawing, Glazers could remain in control

MANCHESTER, England, Oct 17, (AP): Nearly a year after Manchester United was put up for sale, the storied English soccer club could still remain in the hands of the Glazer family - much to the dismay of the team's most fervent supporters.

News on Saturday that Qatari banker Sheikh Jassim bin Hamad Al Thani was withdrawing from the bidding process appeared to leave the door open for British billionaire Jim Ratcliffe. However, the owner of petrochemicals giant Ineos is reportedly only looking to buy a minority 25% stake in United, which would leave the Glazers as majority shareholders.

"Someone coming in as a minority partner and propping up the Glazers indefinitely is a nightmare scenario," Manchester United Supporters Trust spokesperson Chris Rumfitt told The Associated Press. "What the club need is real change and they need real investment and we struggle to believe that can happen whilst the Glazers own the majority of the shares permanently. Twenty-five percent for Ratcliffe could be OK, but only if it was the start of a clear path to 51%."

The Glazers, an American family that also owns the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers, announced plans last November to seek new investment and instructed U.S. merchant bank Raine to oversee the process, which included the potential of a full sale.

Raine had previously conducted the sale of Chelsea to Todd Boehly and Clearlake Capital for 2.5 billion pounds (\$3 billion) plus a commitment of 1.75 billion pounds (\$2 billion) of further investment.

While the Glazers were prepared to consider offers for an outright buyout, United said at the time it planned to "explore strategic alternatives," which

always included the possibility of taking on new investment without the owners ceding control.

The late tycoon Malcolm Glazer bought United in 2005 for 790 million pounds (then about \$1.4 billion). United supporters have been critical of the leveraged nature of the Glazers' buyout that loaded debt onto the club, as well as a perceived lack of investment and the dividends taken out by the owners.

The team still had a series of successes on the field. Under the Glazers, United won the Champions League title in 2008, five Premier League titles, one FA Cup, five League Cups and the Europa League.

Ratcliffe, who was born in the Manchester area and has been a United fan since childhood, has long-harbored ambitions to buy the club. Through Ineos, he initially planned to buy out the Glazers' share of about 69% and spoke of a "modern, progressive, fan-centered approach to ownership."

He was also focused on helping United win the Champions League for the first time since 2008 and making it the "No. 1 club in the world once again."

Sheikh Jassim is the chairman of Qatar Islamic Bank and the son of a former Qatari prime minister. He was bidding to take 100% ownership of United, which appealed to fans who are desperate to rid the club of the Glazers.

He also vowed to clear the team's debt, while investing in the stadium, training center and playing squads in a bid to "return the club to its former

glories both on and off the pitch."

Ratcliffe and Sheikh Jassim were the only two bidders to publicly declare their intention to take control of United, while other minority investors were also reported.

It was anticipated the process would be concluded in time for the off-season transfer window, which opened in June, after a series of rounds of bidding.

It appeared to be a straight battle between Ratcliffe and Sheikh Jassim over who would be chosen as the preferred bidder. But as the process dragged on, fans became increasingly impatient and staged protests outside Old Trafford, while chants of "Glazers out" are regularly heard at games at the stadium.

News of Sheikh Jassim's plans to withdraw came after months of silence and uncertainty around the process, which raised questions about whether the Glazers intended to sell.

On Saturday, the news came that Sheikh Jassim was withdrawing from the process. While the size of his bid was not confirmed, a person with knowledge of his proposal told the AP it was almost double United's current market valuation of \$3.2 billion.

The person spoke on condition of anonymity because of confidentiality restrictions around the process.

While concerns had been raised about Qatar's human rights record and the potential that United could be used as a "sportswashing" project, fans wanted to see the club compete with the exorbitant spending of Abu Dhabi-backed Manchester City.

Ratcliffe is one of Britain's richest people and is said to be worth \$15.1 billion.

He previously tried to buy Premier League club Chelsea and already owns French club Nice, cycling franchise Team INEOS, is one-third shareholder of the Mercedes-AMG Petronas Formula One team and competes in the America's Cup with sailing team INEOS Britannia.

Reports say he would seek to take over soccer operations at United after a sustained period of decline since the retirement of former manager Alex Ferguson. United has not won the Premier League since Ferguson's last title in 2013.

Over the past decade, the club have been overtaken by City, which won three trophies last season - the Premier League, Champions League and FA Cup. Liverpool have also won the Premier League and Champions League in recent years.

United have endured a turbulent period the post-Ferguson era. Erik ten Hag is their fifth permanent manager in that time.

Under Ten Hag, United won the English League Cup last season and secured a return to the Champions League. But the team have struggled this season and are currently in 10th place after losing four of their eight league games. They also face a fight to advance from the group stage of the Champions League after losing their opening two games.

United will reportedly hold a board meeting on Thursday, but it is not clear if Ratcliffe's bid will be voted on.
