Gender impersonation in Kuwait faces KD 3,000 fine, 2 years jail

MPs tackle family visa, bank account dormancy

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: MPs Fahd Falah Bin Jame'e, Falah Al-Hajri, Hamad Al-Matar, Osama Al-Shaheen and Hamdan Al-Azmi have submitted a bill to toughen penalties on whoever acts like the opposite gender.

According to the bill, those convicted will be imprisoned for two years maximum and fined KD3,000 maximum. In case the convict occupies a public sector job, the punishment is tougher - maximum of three years imprisonment and a fine ranging from KD3,000 to KD7,000. In all cases, those convicted are obligated to remove all

signs of acting or behaving like the opposite gender.

MP Badr Nashmi Al-Anzi has submitted a proposal to allow Kuwaiti women married to non-Kuwaitis to obtain family visa for their non-Kuwaiti children as long as the mother is alive.

He suggested that there should be no age limit for the beneficiaries of the proposal, and that they should be exempted from the health insurance fees.

MP Osama Al-Shaheen submitted a proposal for the Central Bank of Kuwait to publish the names of the owners of inactive bank accounts in Kuwait Gazette and grant them a grace period to contact the banks. Once the grace period ends, the deposits in inactive accounts whose owners did not respond will be transferred to charitable organizations as donations to be distributed to the needy in the country.

Meanwhile, The Environment, Food and Water Security Af-

fairs Committee on Wednesday discussed the assignment given by the National Assembly to investigate the reasons behind the participation of Kuwait in Doha Horticultural Exhibition EXPO 2023. Present at the meeting were representatives of the Ministry of Finance, State Audit Bureau (SAB) and Environment Public Authority (EPA).

The Family, Women and Children Affairs Committee on Wednesday met with representatives of the Ministry of Social Affairs, Ministry of Education, Supreme Council for Family Affairs, Civil Service Commission (CSC) and Public Authority for Manpower (PAM). They talked about the enforcement of the laws on protection from family violence and the rights of children, as well as following up the issuance of the executive regulations for both laws.

RIYADH: The Saudi Cabinet, chaired by Custodian of the Two Holy Mosques King Salman bin Abdulaziz Al Saud, approved Tuesday a number of memoranda and agreements to boost cooperation with several friendly countries.

In a statement, aired by the official news agency (SPA) following the meeting, Saudi Minister of Information said the Cabinet agreed on a memorandum of understanding for enhancing mutual direct investment with Turkiye. (KUNA)

BEIRUT: The United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (UNIFIL) stated Wednesday that assassination of Hamas Official, Saleh Al-Arouri, could carry devastating implications on people on the sides of the Blue Line.

Deputy Director of UNIFIL's information office, Candice Ardil, revealed to Lebanon's National News Agency (NNA) that she is deeply concerned over the chance of escalation. (KUNA)

LONDON: UK Foreign Secretary David Cameron discussed, via phone Tuesday, with US counterpart Antony Blinken Houthi attacks on ships in the Red Sea and the worsening humanitarian situation in the Gaza Strip.

Kuwait reforms target Sheikh Ahmad Al-Fahad chairs Arab Planning Institute meeting

labor market stability **Kuwait Defense Minister emphasizes joint Arab action**

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: In response to the chal-lenges faced by the country in recent years, including random employment and growing chaos due to visa trade and other violations, the government took significant steps in 2023 to address demographic imbalances and enhance the labor market, reports Al-Qabas daily.

The Council of Ministers appointed Sheikh Talal Al-Khaled, the First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of the Interior, to spearhead efforts in this crucial area. This appointment led to the implementation of numerous regulatory and encouraging measures, significantly activating Law No. 74 of 2020, which pertains to the regulation of demographics.

In line with the Kuwaitization plan and the directives of Sheikh Talal Al-Khaled, Chairman of the National Committee for Demographics and Labor Market Development, various decisions were taken to achieve social, economic, and job security. Following the issuance of executive regulations for the demographic law, the Council of Ministers outlined mechanisms to address demographic imbalances, effectively implementing the law.

To safeguard Kuwaiti families from loose labor practices and commercial fraud, and combat visa traders who exploit workers the "Electronic Worker ID" was introduced through the My ID application. This digital ID contains comprehensive worker data, contributing to the regulation of the labor market.

Aligned with the worker's smart identity, the "Kuwait Visa" application was launched, featuring an electronic entry visa (e-Visa) aimed at reducing forgery and tampering with entry visas. This initiative ensures fast and accurate electronic verification before workers board planes and enter the country, thereby protecting society and preventing the entry of individuals with criminal records or infectious diseases.

In a bid to increase the proportion of national workers in the private sector and create attractive job opportunities, several decisions were made. Notably, the Kuwaitization of cooperative societies' project aims to generate 3,000 job opportunities for Kuwaiti youth, including supervisory and leadership roles. This initiative has witnessed high demand, and the first phase has seen national workers employed in leadership positions

Iran blasts claim 103, wound 188

DUBAI, Jan 3, (AP): Two bombs exploded minutes apart Wednesday at a commemoration for a prominent Iranian general slain in a U.S. drone strike in 2020, officials in Iran said, killing at least 103 people and wounding at least 188 as the Middle East remains on edge over Israel's war on Hamas in the Gaza Strip.

No one immediately claimed responsibility for what appeared to be the deadliest militant attack to target Iran since its 1979 Islamic Revolution. The blasts shook the city of Kerman, about 820 kilometers (510 miles) southeast of the capital. Tehran, and sent shrapnel hurtling into a screaming crowd fleeing the first explosion.

The gathering marked the fourth anniversary of the killing of Gen. Qassem Soleimani, the head of the Revolutionary Guard's elite Quds Force, in a U.S. drone strike in Iraq in January 2020.

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: The obstetrics and gynaecology departments in government hospitals recorded a total of 27 births on the first day of the

year, including 13 Kuwaitis -- one of whom is the first baby (a boy) born at the beginning of the year, specifically at 12:01 am in Jaber Al-Ahmad Hospital, reports Al Anba daily.

The second baby is an Egyptian boy born at 1:08 am in Farwaniya Hospital, third is a Kuwaiti baby boy born at 1:49 am in Jaber Al-Ahmad Hospital, fourth is a Kuwaiti baby boy born at 2:04 am in Adan Hospital, fifth is a baby girl of unspecified nationality born at 2:17 am in Jahra Hospital and sixth is a Syrian baby girl born at 2:25 am in the Maternity Hospital.

Adan Hospital also witnessed the birth of two sets

of twins through Caesarian section -- the first are Kuwait baby girls born

at 6:22 am and the second are Kuwaiti baby boys born at 8:44 am. Chairman of the Council of Obstetrics and Gynecology Departments and Head of the Obstetrics and Gynecology Department at Farwaniya Hospital Dr Amal Khadr disclosed that there were seven births on the first day of the year -- five males and two females.

In a statement to the daily, Khadr revealed that first birth was of a male Egyptian baby at 1:08 am through natural method, second is an Indian baby boy born at 3:33 am through Ceasarean section, third is an Indian baby girl born at 3:45 am through natural method, fourth birth is a male baby of unspecified nationality through natural method at 6:55 am, fifth is a Syrian baby girl through natural method at 7:23, sixth is a male Syrian baby born at 7:26 am through natural method and seventh is a male Egyptian baby born at 7:43 am through natural method.

Head of Obstetrics and Gynecology Department at Adan Hospital Dr Abeer Al-Dhaidi said the hospital recorded seven births -- all of them Kuwaitis, including two sets of twins -- male and female. She told the daily that the first birth is a Kuwaiti baby boy via natural birth at 2:04 am, second is another Kuwaiti baby boy born at 2:49 am via natural birth, third are the female twins born at 6:22 am through Caesarean section, fourth are the male twins at 8:45 am via cesarean sections, fifth is a female baby born at 8:52 am, sixth is a male baby born at 7:10 am and seventh is a male baby born at 11:45 am through Caesarian section.

Head of the Obstetrics and Gynecology Department at the Maternity Hospital Dr Iman Al-Shamali the first baby born at the hospital is a female Syrian at 2:25 am, second is a male Syrian baby born at 2:45 am, third is a male Syrian baby born at 3:00 am, fourth is a male baby of unspecified nationality born via cesarean section at 5:12 and fifth is an Indian baby boy born at 7:14 am.

Head of the Obstetrics and Gynaecology Department at Jahra Hospital Dr Hanan Al-Husseini confirmed four births on the first day of the year - first is a female baby of unknown nationality born at 2:17 am, second is an Indian baby girl born at 2:54 am, third is a Kuwaiti baby born at 5:34

am and fourth is a Kuwaiti baby girl born at 9:13 am. Jaber Al-Ahmad Hospital recorded four births, the first of which is a Kuwaiti baby boy born at 12:01 am, second is a Kuwaiti baby boy born through caesarean section 1:49 am, third is a Kuwaiti baby boy at 5:18 am and fourth is a Kuwaiti baby boy born at 11:02 am.

'No laxity in enforcing law in whole of Jahra'

Hospital brawls down: Brig Gen Al-Azmi

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: The Acting Director of Jahra Security Directorate Brigadier General Saleh Oqla Al-Azmi has affirmed that there will be no laxity in enforcing the law in all areas of Jahra Governorate, and in pursuing reckless people, drug dealers and users, violators, and outlaws, in accordance with direct instructions from the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior Sheikh Talal Al-Khaled, the acting Undersecretary Lieutenant General Salem Al Nawaf, and the Assistant Undersecretary for Public Security Affairs Major General Abdullah Al-Rujaib.

In an interview with Al-Seyassah, Brigadier General Oqla Al-Azmi explained that the directorate refers all who are involved in quarrels in public facilities, hospitals, associations, and other places to the concerned authorities such as the General Administration of Investigations or the Public Prosecution. There has been a decrease in the

and grocery stores has been organized, as they are located in sites determined by the municipality. Any grocery store or food truck found in desert areas will be banned and necessary legal measures will be taken against it.

Q: Tell us more about the quarrels that occur, especially in hospitals. How do you deal with them?

A: We have new procedures regarding quarrels. Any quarrel that occurs in a public facility, whether it is in a hospital, association, or government department, legal measures will be taken, and the case will be referred for investigations or to the public prosecution depending on the type of case.

Previously, when disputes arose between two parties, a resolution was reached at the police station following the incident. However, this issue is now over, and appropriate measures are implemented. We have noticed a reduction in conflicts after the implementation of these measures

Q: How do you deal with reckless motorists?

A: Patrol teams rush to the sites in residential areas where reports about the presence of reckless motorists. Security men arrest them and refer them to the concerned authorities. For example, we caught 23 individuals including juveniles who had gathered for driving recklessly in Sulaibiya Block 8. They were detained and referred to the concerned authorities for necessary legal action.

'Camping licenses will be pulled if parties held during mourning'

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: Kuwait Municipality teams have intensified their monitoring efforts on spring camps across multiple locations in the Jahra and Al-Ahmadi governorates and issued warnings of cancelling camping licenses if any celebrations are held during the official mourning period in the country, reports Al-Rai daily.

During the official holiday, municipal teams collaborated with street vendor departments in the hygiene and road works departments of Jahra and Al-Ahmadi governorates and joint efforts resulted in the removal of 46 illegal camps and the dismantling of 140 others, along with 20 mobile grocery stores.

These structures were relocated to the municipal reservation sites in Al-Naeem

and Mina Abdullah areas.

Additionally, 70 street vendor violation reports were issued, and the violators were referred to the relevant authorities for further legal actions.

Camp license holders are urged to strictly adhere to the municipality's conditions, regulations, and laws, refraining from organizing any celebrations during the official mourning period.

The municipality emphasizes the immediate withdrawal of licenses upon detection of any non-compliance.

The municipality underscores that inspection teams will promptly remove any camps found violating terms and conditions, emphasizing the importance of adhering to the established rules for setting up spring camps.

Job evaluation for 2023 begins

'Staff can submit grievances online'

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: Director of the Evaluation and Measurement Department at the Ministry of Health Elham Akbar has confirmed the creation of a mechanism for submitting annual evaluation grievances electronically starting this year under the

directives of Health Minister Dr Ahmad Al-Awadhi, acting Undersecretary of the ministry Dr Abdulrahman Al-Mutairi and Assistant Undersecretary for Administrative Affairs Abdulrahman Al-Faris, indicating that the Evaluation and Measurement

first in the Administrative Affairs Sector that has become fully digital, reports Al-Anba daily

In an exclusive interview with the daily. Akbar announced the start of the annual evaluation of employees for the year 2023 -- a total of 68,574 male and female employees; urging the concerned officials to be precise in evaluating competency without favoritism and to give everyone his dues.

She added the application of institutional governance in the Evaluation and Measurement Department; which is based on the principles of transparency, justice, integri-

ty, and raising the quality of service and efficiency of performance. She said "the new electronic system enables us to follow the evaluation process in all sectors and facilities of the ministry by determining the number of employees that were evaluated, and ensuring that the evaluation runs smoothly, quickly and without problems.

Out of the 68,574 employees whose performance for 2023 will be evaluated include 11,959 doctors, 3,087 dentists, 10,822 administrators, 2,569 pharmacists, 22,544 nurses, 362 technical support workers, 13,788 medical technical workers, 2,718 non-medical technical workers, 460 support staff and 265 in the rodent control project contract.

A special e-mail address was created for the evaluators -- direct superiors, in cooperation with the Digital Health Affairs Sector headed by Eng Adel Al-Rashidi. All circulars and login information for the evaluation system (secret numbers) were sent to them, and the evaluators will complete the process from the beginning of January until the end. The new electronic system makes it easier for them to evaluate the performance as they can access the evaluation system any time and from any computer device.

The evaluation report will be printed, approved with the signature and seal of the direct superior, and referred to the next superior before the end of January, so that he can express his opinion during the first seven days of February.

Bedoun gets three years in official docus forgery

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: The Criminal Court, presided over by Judge Ahmad Al-Sadi, sentenced a Bedoun man to three-year imprisonment with hard labor for forging a ruling issued in 1972 for demanding the Ministry of Interior to issue a Kuwaiti citizenship certificate.

According to the case file, the suspect tried to implement the ruling issued in an "executive form" by going to the Nationality and Passports Department and requesting the implementation of a final ruling in favor of his deceased father. Upon examination of the ruling by the Nationality and Passports Department and referring it to the Investigations Department, it was revealed that the ruling's registration number does not exist and that the ruling was a forgery. He was referred to the Public Prosecution, which investigated him and referred him to court.

Detention extended: The detention renewal judge decided to extend for ten more days the detention of the individuals

who assaulted security personnel while they were performing their duty in Jabriya. They had been referred to Central Prison based on the directives of the First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior Sheikh Talal Al-Khaled.

The Ministry of Interior had issued a statement regarding the incident of assault on a securityman while he was performing his duty in Jabriya.

It stated that legal measures had been taken against those involved in the incident and a number of cases have been registered against them, namely assault-

ing a public employee while performing work, insulting a public employee, and misusing a phone for illegal photography.

Funds misappropriated: The Criminal Court upheld the prosecution's decision to file the report submitted by Nazaha concerning the misappropriation of public funds in the Ministry of Health, totaling around KD 800,000 for purportedly treating Kuwaiti men and women abroad using falsified invoices

It is worth highlighting that the Court of Cassation, in a previous ruling, had acquitted the defendants of forgery due to a gap in the financial control regulations within the Overseas Treatment Department and Accounting Department of the Ministry of Health

Scout camp postponed: The Ministry of Education has postponed the 77th annual scout camp until February, reports Al-Anba daily

The daily obtained a copy of the decision issued by acting Undersecretary Anwar Al-Hamdan, stating that in view of the State of Kuwait mourning the death of His Highness the late Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, may Allah have mercy on him.

Based on what is required in the interest of work, it was decided to change the date of holding the 77th annual scout camp, which was scheduled to be held from Jan 6-11 to Feb 5-10. The camp will be held in the morning and evening periods at the Sea Scouts Club in Fintas with the cubs stage taking place on Feb 5-6, while the boys stage will be on Feb 7-8 and the advanced stage on Feb 10.

He revealed the opening of three new police stations in Jahra Governorate in Qasr, Naseem, and Mutlaa. There are plans to open another police station in Saad Al-Abdullah City, coinciding with the urban expansion and population density.

The goal of the security deployment is to ensure the safety of everyone and achieve security discipline.

There is an increase in the number of security checkpoints during the weekdays and weekends to arrest wanted individuals and outlaws, including three security checkpoints in Mutla'a, Subiya, and Salmi to deal with all reports that reach the Control Room with speed.

Question: What are the security measures taken to achieve security discipline in camps and rural areas?

Answer: Jahra Governorate is one of the largest governorates in the country in terms of area. It includes areas for farms, livestock pens, camps, and reserves. Many people go to these places during holidays.

We have established three fixed security checkpoints - one in Subiya, one at the end of Jaber Causeway, and one on Mutlaa Road. On Salmi Road, we have intensified the security deployment in the desert areas to deal with all reports quickly.

The heads of police stations and commanders are constantly present in these areas, as the field presence of officers in these locations achieves the required discipline, and addresses any negatives. They also give appropriate directions to non-commissioned officers and individuals for dealing with reports and cases in sound legal ways.

Q: Have new police stations been opened in Jahra Governorate?

A: Following the urban expansion in the governorate, a new police station was opened in the Mutlaa Ĉity, although the area has not yet been fully inhabited. We are also in the process of opening another police station in this area. Qasr police station and Naseem police station have been opened. We are in the process of opening another police station in Saad Al-Abdullah city to serve the region, as it includes a large number of residents.

Q: What about security campaigns?

A: We hold security campaigns around the clock, and these campaigns are intensified during the weekends. Night checkpoints are set up with officers supervising these points to arrest violators, wanted persons, and outlaws. Through these checkpoints, we have arrested drug users, those sentenced to prison, and violators of the residency law, and referred them to the concerned authorities.

Q: What about grocery stores and food trucks?

A: There are no grocery stores or food trucks inside the mainland, which has greatly contributed to the decrease in gatherings around them, as well as decrease in the sale of prohibited items. Quarrels no longer occur like the way they usually did in these places. Work in these restaurants dings has started to appear again recently What are the causes, and how do you deal with them?

A: This phenomenon has actually started to disappear due to the strict legal procedures followed in monitoring and controlling shooters. Nevertheless, there are some violations but they are limited.

In the recent past, an individual had opened fire in front of a wedding hall. The groom and his father were summoned to the police station, and the shooter was arrested and referred to the Public Prosecution. We are currently distributing patrol teams to wedding sites to prevent such violations.

Q: What are the reasons for the deportation of some expatriates?

A: There are several reasons, including committing acts contrary to public morals and violating residency and work laws. After confirming and verifying that an expatriate committed such an act, measures are taken to deport him from the country for the public good.

Q: What about drug seizures? Do you have any statistics on these seizures in 2023?

A: In 2023, about 570 people were arrested in possession of narcotic substances, and were referred to the concerned authorities. This is because of the security deployment and the instructions of the senior leadership in the Ministry of Interior to deal firmly with the promoters and users of illicit drugs.

In conclusion, Brigadier General Saleh Oqla Al-Azmi affirmed that the Jahra Security Directorate, based on instructions and directives from the First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior Sheikh Talal Al-Khaled, the acting Undersecretary Lieutenant General Salem Al-Nawaf, and the Assistant Undersecretary for Public Security Affairs, Operations and Traffic, Major General Abdullah Al-Rujaib, works to provide all kinds of security assistance and deal quickly with reports that reach the emergency hotline No. 112, in addition to security deployment in all areas and provision of the highest levels of security.

'Lack of real reforms by govt leads to frustration in public'

"WHEN the legislative and executive branches veer away from addressing citizens' concerns and instead engage in opportunistic and conciliatory ac-tions of limited benefit, such as raising retiree salaries and pushing for general salary increases to tackle the high cost

of living amidst a genuine financial deficit, they divert the National Assembly's atten-

tion from pressing public matters, columnist Naji Al-Mullah wrote for Al-Jarida daily. "This often in-

volves pursuits unrelated to popular priorities and only

hinders the attainment of meaningful gains. Electoral campaigns or attempts to raise thresholds become distractions, facilitating the perpetuation of a council that mirrors its unproductive predecessors.

"I cautioned against making impractical demands, as they only provide grounds for dissolving the council, potentially leading to bitter outcomes in subsequent elections (refer to our article dated 01/15/2021).

"The current landscape differs as there are no opposition forces actively undermining the National Assembly's effectiveness. On the contrary, since His Highness Sheikh Meshal, may God protect and preserve him, assumed leadership responsibilities delegated by the late Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad, support has been extended to streamline the electoral process and ensure its neutrality by curbing government interference.

The leadership refrains from meddling in the election of the National Assembly Speaker and Council committees.

Notably, before the last elections, His Highness urged voters to choose assembly members wisely, cautioning candidates against populist demands that strain the public treasury amid financial deficits.

"However, despite leadership support, the government's inability and hesitancy to match the swift project completion seen in Saudi Arabia, Qatar, and the United Arab Emirates has caused frustration.

"The government's failure to fulfill people's demands and expedite societal development has led to mounting dissatisfaction. Collusion between some parliamentarians and the government, attempting to circumvent votes of no confidence and weaken final interrogations through amnesty, employment tactics, transfers, and demands for state employee salary hikes, triggered

"The closest path to amendment, any amendment, begins with good choices and the approach of dialogue that many sincere Kuwaiti men are calling for ... May God help us.'

Vendors decry too many restrictions, fish scarcity

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: Several stall vendors at the Souk Sharq have given up their rented stalls due to challenges such as unmet operational expenses, labor shortages, the scarcity of local fish, and the overwhelming imported fish flooding the local market each month, reports Al-Anba daily.

The transformation of the fishing profession, stringent regulations on fishermen, the forced relocation of many without repatriation, and the burgeoning online fish trade might collectively signal the irreversible conclusion of the fish market era. This sentiment is echoed by numerous observers, sellers, and specialists in the field.

Abu Rudaina, a seller at the fish market in the Sharq region, affirmed that local fish is scarcely found, and market demand is notably weak, particularly during extended vacations.

Fisherman Ala'a Khawaja voiced concerns about the imminent threat of extinction to the fishing profession, attributing it to stringent regulations on fishermen and the reduction of diesel subsidies, resulting in a diminished local catch this season.

Khawaja highlighted the influx of imported fish, amounting to around 40 containers from various countries, adversely impacting the local market. He noted the recent decision to conclude the shrimp fishing season on January 1, adversely affected fishermen who are accustomed to extending the season by an additional month to offset losses.

Khawaja expressed hope for a reversal of the decision and an extension of the fishing season by a month. He appealed to relevant authorities to consider extending the fishing season until at least February when the Nuwaibi season begins.

Khawaja emphasized that the fish market currently relies heavily on imports from Egypt, Pakistan, India, Iran, Saudi Arabia, Turkey, and Norway, while the local product is nearly stagnant and faces a threat of unavailability in upcoming seasons due to fishermen's reluctance.



an example of a person committed to what he wrote and what he preached. It demands the necessity of respecting work, the law. and being honest with oneself before being honest alsarraf with others









KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: Director of the Public Relations and Media Department at the Ministry of Health Dr. Mohammad Al-Azmi held meetings with his counterparts in the Ministry of Information, represented by the Director of Public Relations Department Jamal Al-Badeh, and the Ministry of Interior, represented by the Director of Public Relations and Security Media Department Brigadier General Tawhid Al-Kandari, with the aim of exchanging expertise and experiences in order to develop skills, training, and joint work.

In a press statement, the Director of the Public Relations and Media Department at the Ministry of Health Dr. Muhammad Al-Azmi said he seeks, through these meetings, to develop means of communication with the relevant authorities in order to build and keep pace with new visions that focus on strengthening ties with various media authorities in the sectors, and to build bridges of communication and cooperation.

He explained that these meetings also seek to deliver effective messages through cooperation with the concerned authorities in everything that would serve the nation and citizens. They emphasized on taking advantage of national capabilities and competencies to be in line with the aspirations of the Ministry of Health with the cooperation of relevant authorities such as the Ministry of Information and the Ministry of Interior.

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: The deployment of Jahra rescue patrols near the Sulaibiya farms led to the arrest of three persons who were in possession of drugs.

According to a security source, the rescue patrol members encountered the suspects at the onset of the New Year.

In the first arrest of the year, the suspects riding in a vehicle showed signs of confusion and when they asked to pull over, one of them climbed out of the vehicle and attempted in vain to escape.

As he was running a sachet of heroin fell from his pocket. Upon conducting a precautionary search, eight hashish-filled cigarettes, a sachet of heroin, and a bag of chemical substances were found with the suspects.

The security source added the two detainees are Kuwaitis and the third a bedoun.

Meanwhile, support patrols from the Ahmadi Security Directorate, yesterday morning, detained a person in his twenties in the Umm Al-Hayman area for drug abuse and possession of narcotic substances and paraphernalia.

Traffic cop run over: Personnel from the Jahra Governorate Search and Investigation Department are looking for an unidentified person for running over a first lieutenant from the General Traffic Department, reports Al-Anba daily.

A reliable security source said the suspect is expected to be arrested soon, since all the details pertaining to the vehicle involved have been gathered by the security authorities.

A hit-and-run report was filed at the Al-Qashaniyah police station following the incident two days ago when police received a report about reckless behavior.

In response police patrols closed the road for safety reasons, but the driver of a vehicle collided with the patrol, reversed the vehicle, ran over the first lieutenant, and fled the scene.

The injured officer was hospitalized with minor injuries.

Traffic diverted: The General Traffic Department of the Ministry of Interior has diverted the traffic on the fifth loop with the Riyadh Street following a crack in one of the water pipes which led to flooding of the area, reports Al-Jarida daily.

The Public Relations and Security Media Department of the Ministry of Interior said the traffic on the "loop" on the Fifth Ring Road with the Riyadh Street coming from Salmiya and from the Jahra area has been diverted towards the Airport Road parallel to the Khaitan area.

The Ministry of Public Works has called on vehicle drivers to adhere to the instructions of traffic police and take alternative routes until the accident is dealt with, in the best interest of public safety.

Consumers decry rise in prices of onions, call for MoCI intervention

'Need to take action against violating markets, grocery stores'

KUWAIT CITY. Jan 3: A number of consumers and specialists expressed their dissatisfaction regarding the rise in the prices of onions by more than 100 percent recently, as well as the scarcity of onions in some cooperative societies and markets. Even though the price hike is evident to everyone, the Ministry of Commerce has failed to acknowledge the rise in these prices.

In meetings with the daily, they called on the Ministry of Commerce and Industry to monitor and hold various sales outlets accountable, as the price of one kilogram of onion varies from one outlet to another. Earlier, the price ranged from 190 to 250 fils, but now it ranges from 450 fils to 550 fils.

In this regard, a Kuwaiti citizen Abu Hamoud said he bought a five-kilo onion bag for KD 2.475 recently, but prior to the current crisis, one kilogram of onion cost less than 250 fils.

He expressed his surprise by the lack of intervention by the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, as it

seems it does not recognize the current crisis.

Abu Hamoud called for the need to import huge quantities of onions in the coming period to prevent any rise in the prices, especially since there is a group of merchants who increase prices automatically.

Reduced

Another citizen Ali Al-Hajri said, "Indeed, onion prices have increased in nearly two weeks. There are some markets that sell onions at reduced prices of around 290 fils, but this type is almost rotten, while the clean and fresh onions are sold for 450 to 570 fils per kilogram."

Meanwhile, Adel Hassan highlighted that an Arab country's cessation of exporting onions to Kuwait was one of the fundamental reasons

behind the rise in its prices. He called on the Ministry of Commerce and Industry to hold inspection campaigns to monitor prices and compare them before and after the escalation of the crisis.

Hassan said, "As long as the ministry confirms the availability of onions, it must take action against the violating associations, markets, and grocery stores that raise prices, and deter them from continuing in this unreasonable manner.'

In this regard, Lawyer Salem Al-Kandari, who is interested in economic affairs, said the current onion crisis brought to mind the scarcity of this item during the COVID-19 pandemic, indicating that the price of one kilogram of onions has actually increased to about 500 fils.

He stressed the importance of the Ministry of Commerce and Industry to reconsider its import strategy, and the need for the Public Authority for Agricultural Affairs and Fish Resources to expand the cultivated areas of main vegetables such as onions, garlic and tomatoes so that the Kuwaiti market does not suffer from a scarcity of onions in the future.

He also stressed the need for the availability of cold warehouses for onion stocks.

Lawyer Al-Kandari called on the government to expand the areas of agriculture in the first place so that the local market does not remain dependent on imports only. He highlighted the need to emu-

late Saudi Arabia, which has expanded its agricultural sector to a very high extent.

Furthermore, Bou Hamad, a vegetable marketing official at a coop-erative society, affirmed that onion prices have increased in varying proportions among consumer societies in recent days.

Significant

He confirmed that a five-kilo Iranian onion bag used to be sold for KD 1.6 in his cooperative society but it is currently being sold for KD 2.470. which is a significant increase, adding that the price of one kilogram of onion has increased from 190 fils to more than 450 fils.

In addition, Head of the Kuwait Farmers Union Jaber Al-Azmi explained that Kuwaiti onions are planted in the months of December, January, and February, and are harvested in March, April, and May. However, even at the peak of their harvest, they do not cover the entire local market due to which it is necessary to expand their cultivation, especially since they are crops that are easily grown.

He indicated that red onions are imported from some countries, such as Egypt, India, Sudan, and others, but when some countries stop exporting them, a crisis occurs, adding that the state should therefore allow farmers to expand their cultivation so that the country is not exposed to any crises of this kind.

KPC sets \$70 per barrel estimate for fiscal 2024/'25 budget

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) has estimated the indicative price of a barrel of Kuwaiti oil at \$70 for the budget for fiscal 2024/2025, which starts in April, reports Al-Anba daily quoting sources. Sources disclosed that the price estimated by KPC is ultimately

subject to the estimates and considerations of the Ministry of Finance when preparing the draft State budget in its final form.

The figures show that the corporation's estimate of the price of \$70 per barrel means fixing the indicative price for the second year in a row,

as it was \$70 per barrel during the 2023/2024 budget with an oil production volume of 2.676 million barrels per day, compared to \$80 per barrel in the 2022/2023 budget, during which the estimated production volume was 2.73 million barrels per day.

According to data from the Min-

istry of Oil, Kuwait's oil production during the period from January until the end of March 2024 will reach 2.413 million barrels per day in compliance with OPEC+ decisions, which included an additional voluntary reduction of 135,000 barrels per day in that period.

The training programs, studies and economic consultations launched by the Arab Planning Institute over the past year helped greatly in formulating the Arab vision towards climate change.

The development report was published within the Conference of the Parties to the Climate Convention in Abu Dhabi (COP 28) to confirm the Arab vision in the field of combating the impacts of global warming.

It is worth mentioning that the Arab Planning Institute is an independent non-profit Arab institution based in the State of Kuwait. It was established in 1980 with the aim of supporting economic and social development in the Arab countries through research, studies, consultations and various training programs.

On the other hand, MP Abdulhadi Al-Ajmi forwarded queries to Minister of Communications, Endowments and Islamic Affairs Abdulrahman Al-Mutairi regarding ministerial Decision No. 95/2022 and 96/2022 on the two-year suspension of the written exams for those applying for supervisory and teaching posts in the educational sector, as well as the recruitment of new employees in the departments and centers concerned with the Holy Quran and Islamic Studies.

He wants to know why these decisions were applied only on the teaching posts, excluding the supervisory positions; if new teachers were hired after the issuance of the decision to suspend the written exams; recruitment criteria adopted if the answer is 'yes'; and if the employees who complained about the results of exams taken prior to the issuance of the decision were appointed after hearing their complaints.

MP Hamad Al-Matar asked Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior Sheikh Talal Khalid Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah about the reasons behind the closure of Sulaibikhat Police Station even if it is badly needed to maintain security in the area, especially since many bachelors are residing there. He wants to know the alternative police station, and the number of cases and security reports filed in Doha in the last five years.

MP Muhammad Al-Hewaila forwarded queries to Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Oil, Economic and Investment Affairs Saad Al-Barrak; Minister of Education, Higher Education and Scientific Research Adel Al-Manea; Minister of Commerce and Industry and State Minister for Youth Affairs Mohammad Al-Aiban; Minister of Information, Endowments and Islamic Affairs Abdulrahman Al-Mutairi; Minister of Finance Fahd Al-Jarallah; Minister of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy and acting Minister of Public Works Jassem Al-Ostad; Minister of State for Municipal and Communication Affairs Fahad Al-Shaulah; Minister of Justice and State Minister for Housing Affairs Faleh Al-Raqaba; Minister of Health Ahmed Al-Awadhi; and Minister of Social Affairs and State Minister for Family, Women and Children Affairs Sheikh Feras Al-Sabah. He wants to know the measures taken by each ministry to complete the public facilities in Wafra Residential Area, number of ongoing projects, number of completed projects, cost of each project, and target completion dates for the ongoing projects. MP Fahd Falah Bin Jame'e asked HH the Prime Minister Sheikh Ahmad Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah about the number of vacant senior positions in the ministries and public institutions. MP Jarrah Al-Fawzan asked Minister of Education, Higher Education and Scientific Research Adel Al-Manea to provide him with the names and number of consultants at the ministry, if any of them requested to appoint certain individuals to supervisory positions, if any of the consultants have been subjected to disciplinary action, if the consultants are authorized to interfere in the executive functions of departments at the Ministry of Education MP Muhammad Hayef asked Minister of Commerce and Industry and State Minister for Youth Affairs Mohammad Al-Aiban about ministerial Decision No. 67/2020 issued on March 11, 2020 to fix the prices of commodities and consider the prices specified prior to the issuance of the decision as the maximum, which should not be increased unless a new decision in this regard is issued. He cited the decision highlighting the penalties stated in Law No. 117/2013 against whoever manipulates the prices of commodities; including the confiscation of commodities, and then sell them in the outlets specified by the ministry. He wants to know if the ministerial decision is still valid. If yes, why did the Con-sumer Cooperative Societies Union issued a decision to increase the prices of some basic foodstuff? Was the decision taken through the coordination of the union and the Ministry of Commerce and Industry? What measures have been taken regarding the increase of prices and if the commodities whose prices increased were determined? Did the concerned department at the Ministry of Commerce and Industry object to the price hike decision? If yes, he demanded for copies of all the relevant correspondences. In addition, National Assembly Speaker Ahmed Al-Saadoun presided over the meeting of the Assembly Office recently, during which they decided to terminate all the expatriate, Bedoun and Kuwaiti employees at the National Assembly TV under the wages item. They also decided to limit the television's activity to broadcasting news.

Democracy at a crossroads Biden launches campaign year with urgent 'warning'

WASHINGTON, Jan 3, (AP): US President Joe Biden is starting the campaign year by evoking the Revolutionary War to mark the third anniversary of the deadly insurrection at the U.S. Capitol and visiting the South Carolina church where a white gunman massacred Black parishioners - seeking to present in the starkest possible terms an election he argues could determine the fate of American democracy. On Saturday, Biden will travel to near Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, where George Washington and the Continental Army spent a bleak winter nearly 250 years ago. There, he'll decry former President Donald Trump for the riot by a mob of his supporters who overran the Capitol in an attempt to overturn the 2020 presidential election.

'Ukraine seeks to embarrass Putin'

MOSCOW, Jan 3, (AP): Russia said Wednesday it shot down 12 missiles fired at one of its southern regions bordering Ukraine, as Kyiv's forces seek to embarrass the Kremlin and puncture President Vladimir Putin's argument that life is going on as normal despite the 22-month war.

The situation in the border city of Belgorod, which came under two rounds of shelling on Wednesday morning, "remains tense," said regional Gov. Vyacheslav Gladkov, writing on Telegram.

"Air defense sys-tems worked," he said, promising more details about possible damage after inspecting the area later in the day, part of a New Year's holiday week in Russia.



Tochka-U missiles and six Vilkha rockets on Wednesday, the Russian Defense Ministry said.

Putin

The Soviet-built Tochka-U missile system has a range of up to 120 kilometers (75 miles) and a warhead that can carry cluster munitions. Ukraine has received some cluster munitions from the United States but the Tochka-U and Vilkha can use their own cluster munitions.

The Russian side of the frontier has come under increasingly frequent attack in recent days. Throughout the war, border villages have sporadically been tar-geted by Ukrainian artillery fire, rockets, mortar shells and drones launched from thick forests where they are hard to de-

Lately, as Russia fired missiles and drones at Ukrainian cities, Kyiv's troops have aimed at Belgorod's regional capital, which is about 100 kilometers (60 miles) north of Kharkiv, Ukraine's second-largest city.

Belgorod, with a population of about 340,000, is the biggest Russian city near the border. It can be reached by relatively simple and movable weapons such as multiple rocket launchers.

On Saturday, shelling of Belgorod killed 25 people, including five children, in one of the deadliest strikes on Russian soil since Moscow's full-scale invasion. Another civilian was killed Tuesday in a new salvo. Hitting Belgorod and disrupting city life is a dramatic way for Ukraine to show it can strike back against Russia, whose military outnumbers and outguns Kyiv's forces.

In response to this act, the Somali government recalled today its ambassador to Ethiopia for urgent consultation.

It cautioned the Ethiopian government to refrain from any actions that infringe upon Somalia's sovereignty, independence, and territorial integrity.

"Furthermore, the Federal Government of Somalia reserves the right to lawfully respond to any egregious measures undertaken by the Federal Government of Ethiopia," it warned.

"The Government of Somalia, drawing upon the strength of its citizenry, is prepared and obligated to defend, safeguard, and maintain the nation's sovereignty, dignity, territorial integrity, and social cohesion.

It called on the United Nations Security Council, the African Union, the Organization of Islamic Cooperation, the Arab League, IGAD, and other international partners concerned with peace and stability in the region and the world, to observe the rules they are founded upon and to fulfill their established responsibilities by supporting Somalia's right to maintain its territorial integrity and to exert pressure on Ethiopia to return to the confines of international laws.

It also requested that the United Nations' Security Council and the African Union convene urgent meetings to address Ethiopia's violations and interference with Somalia's sovereignty and territorial unity.

In a related development, Somali President Hassan Sheikh Mohamud phoned Egyptian President Abdelfattah Al-Sisi and discussed with him efforts to strengthen the historical ties that bind the Somali and Egyptian people, and to address the common issues facing the region, such as security, stability, and development.

President Mohamud thanked President Al-Sisi for Egypt's continued support to Somalia, especially in the fields of education, health, and capacity building. He also expressed his appreciation for Egypt's role in the African Union and the Arab League, and its efforts to promote peace and dialogue in the region. President Al-Sisi praised Somalia's progress in the political, economic, and security spheres, and reiterated Egypt's readiness to provide all forms of assistance to Somalia in its reconstruction and development process.

Kennedy has met the 1,000-signature requirement needed to qualify for the Utah ballot and can officially file to run as a presidential candidate in the state before a March 5 deadline, state Elections Director Ryan Cowley said.

Utah is the first state where Kennedy's campaign submitted signatures and qualified for ballot access, campaign spokesperson Stefanie Spear said. She did not indicate which day he would file for candidacy.

A scion of one of the nation's most famous Democratic dynasties, the longtime environmental lawyer veered from the party last fall and announced his independent bid for the White House. He is a son of former senator and U.S. Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy and a nephew of Democratic President John F. Kennedy.

The candidate rose to prominence during the COVID-19 pandemic for his embrace of public health conspiracy theories and has a loyal following of people who reject the scientific consensus that vaccines are safe and effective.

His success at gaining ballot access in Utah reignites questions of whether the independent could play spoiler for the eventual Democratic and Republican nominees. While it's unlikely that an independent or a third-party candidate would win the presidency, they could siphon support from the major candidates in a way that tips the scales. (AP)

Shapiro faces calls: In 2024, Democratic Gov. Josh Shapiro could face a more complicated sophomore year in charge of Pennsylvania after his first year brought a highway collapse, a budget stalemate and friction with allies and adversaries as he navigated the battleground state's political divides.

He is under pressure to respond to a court ruling that Pennsylvania's system of public school funding unconstitutionally discriminates against poorer districts.

His administration must also oversee a presidential election that, four years ago, was marred by a barrage of right-wing conspiracy theories, Donald Trump-allied efforts in court to overturn it and threats against election administrators.

And Shapiro, viewed nationally as a rising political star, must navigate the na-tion's only politically divided legislature in which allies and adversaries alike are wary of him.

He often emphasized the need to gain approval from both the Democratic-controlled House and the Republican-controlled Senate, and focused more on what his administration accomplished - what he called a "get stuff done" administration - rather than farther-reaching agenda items that are stuck in partisan stalemate. The president's reelection campaign has publicized Trump's repeating rhetoric used by Adolf Hitler when he suggested that immigrants entering the U.S. illegally are "poisoning the blood of our country," as well as the former president joking that he'd only seek to serve as a dictator on the first day of his second term.

"The leading candidate of a major party in the United States is running for president so that he can systematically dismantle and destroy our democracy," said Biden campaign communications director Michael Tyler.

Even if another Republican beats Trump in the GOP primary, Biden's reelection argues the victor would be similar enough to the former president that the campaign's themes would change little.

"Anybody who wins the MAGA Republican nomination is going to have done so by hard-tacking to the most extreme positions that we have seen in recent American history," Tyler said.

A majority of Americans are concerned about the future of democracy in the upcoming election - though they differ along party lines on whom poses the threat.

The Biden campaign also promised it would be "out in full force" to mark the Jan. 22 anniversary of Roe v. Wade, the Supreme Court decision that legalized abortion nationwide for nearly 50 years, before the high court overturned the ruling in June 2022.

Ukrainian officials rarely acknowledge responsibility for strikes on Russian territory.

In another Russian border region on Wednesday, the city of Zeleznogorsk was briefly cut off from the power grid after Ukrainian shelling, local officials said.

Authorities were forced to temporarily shut down an electricity substation in the city of 100,000 people in the Kursk region to repair the damage from an aerial attack, Kursk Gov. Roman Starovoit said on Telegram.

Residents were without power or heat, he said, although electricity was restored in most of the city about two hours later, he said.

BRUSSELS: NATO announced Wednesday that it would help buy up to 1,000 Patriot missiles so that allies can better protect their territory as Russia ramps up its air assault on Ukraine.

NATO's Support and Procurement Agency said it will support a group of nations, including Germany, the Netherlands, Romania and Spain, in buying the Patriots, which are used to defend against cruise and ballistic missiles as well as enemy aircraft.

According to industry sources, the contract could be worth around \$5.5 billion.

The purchase could help allies free up more of their own defense systems for Ukraine. The agency said that "other user nations are expected to benefit from the conditions of the contract," without elaborating.

"Russian missile and drone attacks on Ukrainian civilians, cities and towns show how important modern air defenses are," NATO Secretary-General Jens Stoltenberg said in a statement. "Scaling up ammunition production is key for Ukraine's security and for ours."

As an organization, NATO provides only non-lethal support to Ukraine, but its members send weapons and ammunition individually or in groups.

Rescuers race against time in search for survivors

Quake toll 73 as dozens believed trapped

SUZU, Japan, Jan 3, (AP): Japa-nese rescue workers and canine units searched urgently through rubble Wednesday ahead of predicted bitter cold and heavy rain in what the prime minister called a race against time after powerful earthquakes killed at least 73 people in western Japan.

Fifteen people were listed as officially missing and possibly trapped under ansed buildings Ishikawa prefecture and nearby areas were shaken by more aftershocks on Wednesday, adding to the dozens that followed Monday's magnitude 7.6 temblor centered near Noto, about 300 kilometers (185 miles) from Tokyo on the opposite coast. The quake set off tsunami warnings, followed by waves measuring more than 1 meter (3 feet) in some places. The first 72 hours are especially critical for rescues, experts say, because the prospects for survival greatly diminish after that.

Lee in ICU

Police raid premises of opp'n leader's attacker

SEOUL, Jan 3, (AP): South Korean police on Wednesday raided the residence and office of a man who stabbed the country's opposition leader, Lee Jaemyung, in the neck in an attack that left him hospitalized in an intensive care unit, officials said.

The assault occurred when Lee was passing through a throng of journalists after visiting the proposed site of a new airport in the southeastern city of Busan on Tuesday. The attacker, posing as a supporter, approached Lee asking for his autograph before he took out a 18-centimeter (7-inch) knife to attack him.

After receiving emergency treatment in Busan, Lee was transported by a helicopter to the Seoul National University Hospital for surgery. Cho Jeong-sik, the party's secretary general, said Wednesday the twohour surgery was successful and that Lee remained in the hospital's intensive care unit for recovery. Police and emergency officials earlier said Lee was conscious after the attack and wasn't in critical condition.

The suspect was detained by police immediately after the attack. Police said he told investigators he attempted to kill Lee and that he had plotted his attack alone, but his motive is unknown.

Busan police said they sent officers to search the suspect's residence and office in the central city of Asan on Wednesday as part of their investigation. Police said they plan to ask for a formal arrest warrant for the suspect over alleged attempted murder.

Police disclosed few further details about the suspect except that he was aged about 67 and bought the climbing knife online. Police refused to disclose what kind of office he has in Asan, but local media photos showed officers searching a real estate office.

Lee, 59, is a tough-speaking liberal who lost the 2022 presidential election to President Yoon Suk Yeol by 0.7 percentage points, the narrowest margin recorded in a South Korean presidential election. Their closely fought presidential race and post-election bickering between their allies have deepened South Korea's already-toxic conservative-liberal divide.

Recent public surveys have put Lee as one of the two leading early favorites for the next presidential election in 2027, along with Yoon's popular former justice minister, Han Dong-hoon.

Critical moment

"More than 40 hours have passed. This is a race against time, and I feel that we are at a critical moment," Prime Minister Fumio Kishida told reporters. "We have received reports many people are still waiting for rescue under collapsed buildings.

The narrow Noto Peninsula has added to the challenges in reaching some communities. Water, power and cellphone service were still down in some areas.

An orange fireball erupted from the aircraft, and the JAL plane continued down the runway covered in flames while spewing gray smoke. Within 20 minutes, all 379 passengers and crew members slid down emergency chutes and survived. The pilot of the coast guard plane, which exploded, evacu-

rain in Ishikawa, leading to worries about landslides and further damage to half-crumbled homes. Temperatures were expected to drop to around 4 degrees Celsius (39 degrees Fahrenheit) overnight.

Of the deaths, 39 were counted in Wajima city, while 23 people died in Suzu, according to Ishikawa prefectural authorities. The other deaths were reported in five neighboring towns.

More than 300 people have been injured, at least 25 of them seriously.

Ishikawa Gov. Hiroshi Hase encouraged everyone to use masks, antiseptic and soap to guard against the spread of infectious diseases as evacuees shelter together. Ensuring adequate water supplies and toilets for those who were displaced is a priority, he said.

GCC equity markets under-perform in global rally

\mathbf{G}^{CC} underperforms global rally as markets move in different directions...

Global equity markets closed the 2023 little short of a record level after consistent gains registered during the last two months of the year. Japanese and US indices were the top performers during the year with gains in the latter coming mainly from stellar gains seen in tech stocks. The Nasdaq index up by 43.4% mainly led by gain in seven tech stocks with their contribution reaching more than 17% of the MSCI All Country World Index. The growth in equity markets mainly reflected resilient economic growth against skepticism of geopolitical shocks, better-than-expected corporate profit growth and a forecasted end to the record rate hike cycle.

GCC equity market index closed 2023 with one of the smallest annual gains globally. The index closed the year at 714.69 points registering a gain of 3.7% after recording mixed performance at the country level. Out of the seven exchanges, four recorded gains while three closed in the red. Dubai was the best performing market in the region with a gain of 21.7% followed by Saudi Arabia, also with a doubledigit gain of 14.2%. Bahrain and Qatari indices also closed in the green, although with much smaller gains of 4.0% and 1.4%. On the other hand, Oman was the biggest decliner in the region with a fall of 7.1% followed by 6.5% decline in the Kuwait All Share index and 6.2% decline in ADX.

The performance in the GCC also highlighted the importance of a strong pipeline of IPOs that are critical for attracting international capital flows and generating resilient market performance. Both Saudi Arabia and Dubai exchanges saw IPOs of some of the key companies in the region garnering strong investor demand. The markets, especially Saudi Arabia, were also insulated from the decline in crude oil prices that is still essential for economic growth in the region

Global Market Performance

Global markets see biggest gain since 2019; reverse last year's performance...

Financial markets across the globe witnessed steep volatility towards the close of 2023 reflecting speculations around interest rate moves, inflation, economic growth and geopolitical situation. Shares have gained steeply over the last two months while benchmark bond yields dropped from a 16year high of 5.0% in October-2023 for 10-year US treasury bonds to reach 3.9% at the close of the year. The sharp decline in yields reflected increasing expectation of rate cuts in 2023 that got exaggerated towards the last few weeks of 2023 as investors and traders priced in higher-than-expected rate cuts in 2024, including in the EU. Equity markets witnessed a stellar year with a gain of 21.8% for the MSCI World Index,

the highest since 2019 and a reversal from last year's decline of 19.5%. The index has seen a sharp recovery of 16.0% from a 7-month low level reached at the end of October-2023. The MSCI world index reached a record level on the second-last trading day of 2023 but witnessed a small decline on the last day to reach 3,169.18 points. Meanwhile, the importance of ESG was once again reiterated with the associated S&P ESG index gaining 25.9% during the year. Although equity markets were the highlight of the year, global high yield corporate bonds also showed double digit-gains of 13.5% mainly led by falling yields amid a perceived decline in risk associated with economic growth and corporate failures. In terms of performance of safe haven assets, gold gained 13.1% during the year and hit all time highs in several countries, reflecting geopolitical issues while the greenback declined by 2.1% against a basket of currencies. On the other hand, commodities were the biggest decliners of the year mainly led by more than 10% decline in the price of crude oil.

Most global equity markets witnessed healthy double-digit gains during the year. Japanese equities were the best performers at the country level with a gain of 28.2% followed by the S&P 500 index that was up 24.2% during the year. The gain in US market was led by tech stocks with the associated Nasdaq index up 43.4% mainly reflecting strong gains in the 'Super Seven' tech stocks-Apple, Microsoft, Alphabet, Amazon, Nvidia, Tesla and Meta. This also supported the performance of global developed markets that recorded a gain of 20.1% while emerging markets lagged with a much smaller gain of 7.0%. GCC markets largely underperformed with one of the lowest gains of around 3.7% by the end of the year.

After years of outperforming global equity markets, GCC equity markets underperformed during 2023 by posting a smaller gain during the year as compared to double-digit gains for most major global equity markets. The MSCI GCC Index was up by 3.7% during the year after reporting a relatively smaller decline during 2022. The trend in the index showed volatile performance during the year. The index declined to a 2.5 year low during October-2023 led by geopolitical tensions related to the war on Gaza and its impact on the region as well as subdued oil prices since the start of the year due to demand growth concerns, especially related to the recovery in China. However, due to the minimal impact from the war, the region witnessed swift recovery, in line with the recovery seen in other key global equity markets. The MSCI GCC index recovered almost 15% since the end of October-2023. One of the most notable trend during the 2H-2023 was the stark disconnect between crude oil prices and the GCC index as both the asset classes moved in opposite direction.

The performance of individual markets in the GCC were mixed in 2023. Dubai was the best performing market in the region with a strong double-digit gain of 21.7% followed by Saudi Arabia also with a healthy gain of 14.2%. Gains in Dubai was led by almost 50% gain in the Consumer Discretionary index and 38.4% gain in the heavyweight Real Estate Index that were partially offset by decline in Consumer Staples, Communications and Materials indices while in Saudi Arabia, the gains were led by a broad-based positive performance across sectors. Bahrain and Qatari indices also reported positive gains of 4.0% and $1.4\hat{\%}$, respectively. On the other hand, Oman reported the biggest decline in the GCC during the year with the MSX 30 index recording a slide of 7.1%. Kuwait was next with the All Share index sliding by 6.5% closely followed by last two year's best performer Abu Dhabi with a decline of 6.2%.

The GCC sector performance chart showed gains across the board with all sectors in the green. The Pharma (+75.8%), Insurance (+57.9%) and Healthcare (+37.7%) indices topped yearly performance while heavyweight sectors like Banks and Energy showed relatively smaller gains of 6.1% and

20.0%, respectively.

Boursa Kuwait

After closing 2022 with minimum gains, the Boursa Kuwait All Share Index wrapped-up 2023 at 6,817.3 points with the second-biggest decline in GCC at -6.5%. The Premier Market index witnessed the biggest decline among the Kuwait benchmarks, witnessing a decline of 7.9% after 18 out of the 31 constituents in the large-cap index reported declines during the year. The Main 50 index receded 4.0% during the year, followed by the Main Market index that reported a small decline of 0.5%.

The sector performance chart for 2023 favored decliners over gainers. The Technology index reported the biggest yearly decline of 16.9%, led by an equivalent decline in the sector's sole constituent stock, Automated Systems Co. The Energy sector was the second biggest decliner with a fall of 16.6% followed by Industrials index with a decline of 15.8%. Prominent decliners in the energy sector included Senergy Holding Co. and Burgan Company for Well Drilling, Trading and Maintenance with de-clines of 32.1% and 22.7%, respectively. In terms of sectoral gainers, the Insurance index topped with a double-digit gain of 47.8% followed by Consumer Staples and Consumer Discretionary indices with yearly gains of 37.2% and 7.9%, respectively. Within the Insurance Index, shares of Gulf Insurance Group (GIG) and Kuwait Reinsurance Co. reported multi-fold gains during the year. The gain in GIG reflected the sale of 46.32% stake in the insurance company by Kipco to Fairfax. Gains in the Consumer Staples was mainly led by Mezzan Holding Co. which was up by 46.3%. Within the Consumer Discretionary sector, shares of IFA Hotels & Resorts Co. reported multi-fold gains during the year supported by strong earnings in 9M-2023.

Large-cap sectors like Banks recorded a decline of 8.2% during the year. Within the banking sector, Shares of all Kuwaiti banks declined barring Commercial Bank of Kuwait which posted gains of 4.0%. In the Telecom sector, shares of Ooredoo Kuwait was up by 5.0% while Hayat Communica-tions witnessed gains of 41.7%. On the other hand, shares of Zain and STC Kuwait witnessed declines.

The yearly best performers chart was topped by IFA Ho-tels & Resorts Co. with a gain of 713.1% followed by The Energy House Holding and Int'l Financial Advisors Co. with gains of 240.6% and 209.8%, respectively. On the other hand, the yearly decliners chart was topped by Salbookh Trading Co. with a fall of 47.4% followed by National Real Estate Co. and First Investment Co. with the declines of 47.1% and 41.7%, respectively. In terms of trading activity, total volume traded during the year declined by 29.3% to reach 39.6 Bn shares in 2023 as compared to 56.0 Bn shares in 2022.

U.S. small business job growth continues

U.S. small businesses experienced job growth for all of 2023 and extended a cycle of consistent job growth for 33-straight months, according to December data from the Paychex Small Business Employment Watch. KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: In 2023, Kuwaiti investors experienced a growth in their market trading activities, with their investments reaching 162.513 million dinars. This upward trend continued into December, with an additional increase of 13.72 million dinars during the month.

Analyzing the trading volume statistics on the Boursa Kuwait for 2023 based on nationality and trader category, individual Kuwaiti investors saw a rise in their investments by 57.298 million dinars. Simultaneously, Kuwaiti institutions and companies contributed to this surge with an increase of 134.5 million dinars. However, Kuwaiti investment funds faced a decline of 7.84 million dinars, and portfolio investments decreased by 21.479 million dinars.

Contrastingly, Gulf investments witnessed a decrease of 237.335 million dinars in 2023, with a further decline of 48.1 million dinars in December. Gulf individuals increased their investments by 14.557 million dinars, while Gulf institutions and companies experienced a reduction of 247.58 million dinars. Gulf investment funds faced a decline of 4.374 million dinars, but client portfolio invest-ments increased by 65.7 thousand dinars.

Foreign investments, on the other hand, marked an increase of approximately 74.822 million dinars throughout 2023, with an additional surge of 34.391 million dinars in December. Although

price cuts boost Tesla's 4Q sales, beating estimates

Steep price cuts helped electric vehicle mak-er Tesla Inc. increase its fourth-quarter vehicle sales by almost 20% as EV sales growth slowed across the industry.

The Austin, Texas, company said Tuesday that it sold 484,507 vehicles worldwide from October through December. That handily beat Wall Street estimates of 473,000 for the quarter, according to data provider FactSet.

For the full year, Tesla said it sold just over 1.8 million vehicles, up 37.7% from 2022 numbers. Full-year sales numbers fell far short of CEO Elon Musk's prediction of 50% sales growth in most years. But the company did exceed an internal target for the year of 1.8 million vehicle sales.

Tesla chopped prices in the U.S. multiple times during the year, at times by \$20,000 on some of its higher-priced models. Even its lowest-price model, the rear-wheel-drive 3, saw a cut of at least \$6,600. Industry analysts expect the price cuts to trim Tesla's profit margins when it reports earnings on Jan. 24 after the markets close.

The increase helped Tesla hold off Chinese powerhouse BYD to keep the title of the world's top seller of electric vehicles. Fast-growing BYD reported a 73% EV sales increase for last year to 1.57 million.

As usual, the bulk of Tesla's sales were its lower-priced Models 3 and Y, with deliveries of 461,538 globally in the fourth quarter. That was up 19% from a year ago. Sales of its other models, mainly the S and X with some new Cybertrucks, grew 34% to 22,969. The company didn't break out sales for individual models.

The company produced nearly 495,000 vehicles for the quarter, about 10,000 more than it delivered. (AP)

S&P GCC composite index up 6.2% in 2023

Global and GCC markets rally to end 2023 on a positive note: Markaz

KUWAIT CITY, January 3: Kuwait Financial Centre "Markaz" released its Monthly Market Review report for December 2023. Global equities rallied in 2023 due to the decline in inflation from the highs of 2022 and the indication from Fed's last two meetings that the rate hike cycle could be over with a pivot likely in H2 2024. The performance of GCC Equities were mixed as oil production cuts and escalation of geopolitical risks weighed on their performance. Dubai index outperformed GCC peers due to a strong real estate market and a rebound in the tourism sector.

Kuwait equities, which were among the top performers in 2022, fell in 2023 due to the expected decline in oil GDP and challenging operating environment for banks (Banking stocks account for more than half of Kuwait's equity markets by market capitalization). Kuwait's All Share Index posted a yearly fall of 6.5%, driven down by the banking index, which fell by 8.2%. Insurance and Consumer Staples gained the most for the year, rising 47.8% and 37.2% respectively. Insurance stocks were boosted by the increase in premiums written in 2023, which also had a positive impact on the profitability of Insurance companies. Reforms from the Insurance Regulation Unit (IRU), which began with the introduction of the New Insurance Law, have supported the sector. Among banking stocks, Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait (ABK) and Boubyan Bank fell the most during the year, with total returns of -20.6% and -19.6% respectively. ABK's share price witnessed a sharp decline in mid-2023 following the announcement that Gulf Bank and ABK are no longer pursuing a merger. Commercial Bank of Kuwait (CBK) was the only gainer among banking stocks, with a total return of 10.7% for the year. Among Premier market stocks, Kuwait Real Estate Company and Arzan Financial Group for Financing and Investment gained the most and registered total returns of 100.8% and 93.2% respectively, for the year. Kuwait Real Estate Company's gains were driven by strong 9M 2023 earnings due to boosted sales in residential properties and higher income generation from operational properties.

GCC Markets were mixed during the year, with only Dubai and Saudi Arabia equity indices ending the year on a positive note. Overall, the S&P GCC Composite



index registered a yearly gain of 6.2% in 2023. Within the GCC, Dubai and Saudi Arabia equity indices surged 21.7% and 14.2% respectively during the year on the back of positive investor sentiment and strong earnings growth from major blue-chip stocks. Dubai's outperformance was driven by a strong economic outlook supported by real estate and tourism sectors in addition to the relative undervaluation of the markets compared to GCC peers. Emaar Developers and Emaar Properties surged with total returns of 77.5% and 40.9% respectively during the year. Emaar Properties and its construction unit reported results in line with the market's high expectations, with a 42% and 43% increase in their 9M profits respectively on higher retail sales and a rise in real estate demand. Saudi Aramco recorded a total return of 18.5% in 2023 supported by high oil prices and strategic investments made by the company across the world. Abu Dhabi index fell the most at 6.2% for the year dragged down by the performance of major blue-chip stocks. Qatar equity index gained 1.4% for the year despite the drastic fall in natural gas prices.

Global and U.S. markets ended the year on a very positive note, due to the change in stance from the U.S. Fed, which was mostly hawkish during the year despite easing inflation. The MSCI World and S&P 500 indices rose 21.8% and 24.2% respectively during the year. The U.S Fed raised interest rates by 100 bps in 2023 to curb inflation. Following a string of eleven interest rate hikes in 2022 and 2023, the markets have priced in a scenario with a terminal benchmark funds rate of 5.25% to 5.5% a 75-bps rate cut in 2024. The technology sector led the outperformance of the U.S. markets, with the technology heavy Nasdaq 100 index gaining 53.8% in 2023. The main catalyst for the rally was the rising popularity of generative AI, which opened up opportunities in several sectors with the software and hardware space. The MSCI

EM index relatively underperformed with yearly gains of 7.0% due to the weakness in Chinese equities and the depreciation of several emerging market currencies for most parts of the year. Chinese markets (Shanghai SE A Share index) declined 3.7% in 2023, weighed down by the real estate property crisis, deflation, and lower demand for China's exports due to slower global economic growth. India was a notable outperformer in the Emerging market space, with the BSE Sensex registering yearly gains of 18.7% in 2023.

Kuwait's CPI inflation stood at 3.79% y/y in November 2023, relatively flat compared to the previous month. The UAE Central Bank increased its 2024 growth forecast for the economy to 5.7% from 4.3% previously, due to an expected rise in oil production next year. As reported by Moody's, Saudi Arabia's non-oil economy is projected to expand between 3-4% each year until 2030 and constitute 56% of Saudi's GDP.

U.S headline inflation moderated to 3.1% y/y in November 2023, compared to the highs of 6.4% y/y in January 2023. The core inflation eased to 4% y/y in November 2023, the lowest in the last 2 years and significant drop from the 5.6% y/y recorded in January 2023. UK CPI inflation dropped by more than expected to 3.9% y/y in November from 4.6% y/y in October. The drop in inflation was mainly driven by cheaper petrol costs allowing inflation to reach its lowest levels in 2 years

The yield on the 10-year US Treasury notes, which was close to 5% in October, dipped sharply in the last two months of 2023 to close the year at 3.88% after the change in stance from the U.S. Fed. There was a similar drop in yields across sub-segments within the fixed income space and across geographies.

Oil price settled at USD 77.0 per barrel, recording a yearly loss of 10.3%. Oil prices fell despite the OPEC+ oil cuts, voluntary oil production cuts by Saudi Arabia and Russia and the geopolitical tensions in the Middle East. OPEC+ had announced oil production cuts of about 3.66mn bpd in 2023, which supported oil prices for most parts of the year while the increase in production from non-OPEC+ members and weak demand from China added downward pressure. Gold prices closed at USD 2,062.6/oz., a gain of 13.1% in 2023 due to the rise in geopolitical risks and the weakening of the U.S Dollar in the last quarter of 2023. Natural gas prices fell sharply by 43.8% during the year due to a rise in output and U.S inventories coupled with the lower-than-anticipated demand for heating in Europe.

Kuwait's real estate market was stable in 9M 2023. In the initial two weeks of December 2023, real estate transactions in Kuwait reached a total value of roughly KD 98.5 million through 191 transactions, reflecting an increase of 20.2% compared to the corresponding period in the previous month.

The outlook for global asset classes for 2024 is largely dependent on the policy direction taken by the U.S. Fed. Global markets have already priced in a scenario of no further rate hikes, with a possible reversal of rates from H2 2024 or earlier. Any deviation from the current market expectation could affect investor sentiment. As the production cuts from OPEC+ have already had a bearing on the economic growth of GCC countries, the revival of growth depends on the recovery of oil demand. In such a scenario, oil prices are expected to remain at current levels with an increase in production that is driven by a gradual phasing out of oil production cuts. Recovery of Oil GDP, continual growth on non-oil sectors and regulatory reforms could support a rebound in GCC equities.

The value of shares traded also declined by 30.5% to reach KWD 10.4 Bn as compared to KWD 15.0 Bn. KFH was once again the most heavily traded stock in 2023 with yearly value traded at KWD 2.4 Bn followed by NBK at KWD 943.3 Mn.

Saudi Arabia (Tadawul)

Saudi Arabia's TASI was the secondbest performing market in the GCC reported positive performance during the year. The index closed the year at 11,967.4 points with a yearly gain of 14.2% as a significant number of the sectoral indices posted double-digit yearly growth in 2023. Moreover, the gains come despite the fall in crude oil prices during the year along with persistent worries about interest rates and global inflation as well as regional geopolitical issues. The performance got support from the vibrant primary market in Saudi Arabia. The Kingdom witnessed a series of IPOs during the year with 7 new listings in the main market and 32 in the Nomu-parallel market. ADES Holding was Saudi Arabia's largest IPO this year. On the regulatory front, the Saudi Exchange launched four new indices in September-2023 based on company size and IPO Performance. The Size indices reflect the market's composition, with Tadawul Large companies accounting for 70% of the free float market cap, Tadawul Medium-sized companies accounting for 20%, and Tadawul Small companies comprising the remaining 10%. The fourth index, Tadawul IPO, is designed to track the performance of companies listed on the exchange's main market over the last five years. The sector performance chart for the year showed gains for all the sectors barring REITS index which declined by 7.7% during the year. The Software & Services was up by 91.1% followed by Capital Goods and Pharma, Biotech & Life Science indices with full year gains of 90.0% and 69.0%, respectively. All the constituents in the index showed multifold increase in their share prices during the year. Large-cap sectors like Banking and Energy were up by 5.7% and 14.6%, respectively, during the year. The overall performance of the Energy sector was supported by 13.1% gain in the shares of Saudi Aramco. In the Banking sector, shares of 6 out of 10 banks reported declines, whereas shares of Alinma Bank and Al Rajhi Bank showed healthy gains yearly at 18.7% and 15.0%, respectively. Etihad Atheeb Telecommunication Co. topped the yearly stock performance chart with a gain of 261.2% followed by Saudi German Health, and Arabian Pipes Co. with gains of 247.0% and 219.0%, respectively. In terms of top yearly decliners, Alamar Foods Co. topped with a decline of 31.0% followed by Tanmiah Food Co. and Arab National Bank with declines of 21.5% and 21.1%, respectively. In terms of trading activity, Aramco topped the yearly trading activity chart with value traded reaching SAR 78.1 Bn followed by Al Rajhi Bank and The Saudi National Bank with SAR 76.2 Bn and SAR 46.1 Bn worth of shares changing hands during the year, respectively. On the economic front, Saudi Arabia's approved the state budget for 2024 Trillion (USD 312.5 Bn) and expenditure at SAR 1.25 trillion, leading to a deficit of SAR 79 Bn (USD 22 Bn). The Finance Ministry projected the King-dom's GDP to grow at 4.4% in 2024 an increase from the estimated 0.03% in 2023. The 2024 budget aims to boost growth in the non-oil economy by increasing spending and investment in infrastructure, local industry and services. In terms of sector-specific expenditures, the military sector received the largest allocation at SAR 269 Bn, an increase of 8.5% from 2023 budget. The health and social development sector

Abu Dhabi Securities Exchange

Abu Dhabi was the third worst performing major market in the GCC in 2023 recording a 6.2% fall in its General Index to close the year at 9,577.85 points. In contrast, Abu Dhabi was the best performing stock market in the GCC during the previous two years when it registered gains of 20.3% and 68.2% in 2022 and 2021, respectively. Nevertheless, despite recording a decline in the General Index, the total market cap of companies listed on the exchange increased by 12.3% to reach AED 2.9 trillion (USD 790 Bn) mainly due to the listing of new compa-nies in the exchange such as PureHealth, which had a successful listing after raising nearly USD 1 Bn in December-2023.

In terms of sectoral performance, the exchange saw evenly distributed sectors as five out of the ten sector indices recorded gains during the year while the other five declined. The Consumer Discretionary Index recorded a 43.7% gain during 2023, the biggest growth among the indices, followed by the Real Estate Index (23.5%) and Consumer Staples Index (19.4%). Comparatively, the Industrial Index declined by 18.8%, the biggest decline among the indices, followed by the Basic Material Index which recorded 15.5% fall in 2023. Furthermore, large-cap indices like the Financial and Telecom indices recorded yearly declines contributing to the overall decline in the Exchange's General Index.

Abu Dhabi National Hotels Company topped the yearly gainers chart, registering 193.0% increase in its share price, followed by Al Khaleej Investment and RAK Properties which witnessed gains of 175.6% and 72.1%, respectively. On the decliners' side, Apex Investment recorded the biggest yearly decline of 43.7% followed by RAK for White Cement and Gulf Pharmaceutical Industries which recorded declines of 36.3% and 33.7%, respectively, during the year. Trading activity on the exchange decreased y-o-y in 2023, as volumes traded declined by 32.7% to 49.6 Bn shares. Similarly, value traded droped 30.0% y-o-y to reach AED 287.3 Bn during 2023. In terms of most actively traded stocks, International Holdings Co topped with value traded reaching AED 85.1 Bn during 2023. Alpha Dhabi Holdings and Multiply Group followed with AED 32.5 Bn and AED 23.0 Bn worth of shares traded, respectively. Multiply Group led the most active stocks list in terms of volumes traded in 2023 as 6.3 Bn shares of the real estate company were traded. Eshraq Investments and ADNOC Gas followed with 4.5 Bn and 3.3 Bn shares traded during 2023, respectively.

NOC Gas was the world's largest IPO during the first quarter of the year ac-cording to EY. The listing of ADNOC Gas raised USD 2.5 Bn and was over 58 times oversubscribed. Similarly, the IPO of ADNOC Logistics and Services was hugely successful reaching the highest ever oversubscription (163 times) level for a UAE IPO.

Dubai Financial Market

Dubai was the best performing market in the GCC in 2023 with a gain of 21.7% during the year to close at 4,059.8 points. This was the third consecutive year of gain in the index. In terms of sector performance, out of the eight sectors in the exchange five witnessed growth during 2023 while the remaining three recorded declines. The Consumer Discretionary Index witnessed the biggest increase during the year recording a 49.6% growth to close the year at 1,473.5 points followed by the Real Estate and Industrial Sector Indices which registered 38.4% and 26.7% growth during the year, respectively. On the other hand, the Consumer Staples Index registered 34.8% decline during 2023, the largest fall among the indices followed by the Communications Index (-10.5%) and Materials Index (-3.0%)

In terms of yearly gainers, Gulf Navigation Holding topped the table with its stock price up by 431.9% in 2023. Al Firdous Holding and Al Salam Bank Bahrain followed, as their stock prices recorded gains of 224.8% and 106.8%, respectively. On the other hand, shares of Shuaa Capital and Dubai Islamic Insurance declined the most in 2023 as shares of both the companies dropped by 50.7% followed by Aramex with a decline of 34.9% during 2023.

In terms of trading activity for 2023, DFM witnessed robust growth as volume traded increased by 26.2% y-o-y to reach 47.8 Bn shares. In terms of value traded, the total value of shares improved by 7.6% y-o-y to reach AED 95.4 Bn indicating higher trades in large-cap stocks during the year. Emaar Properties was the most actively traded stock on the exchange for the third consecutive year as AED 22.7 Bn worth of shares were traded on DFM. Emirates NBD and Dubai Islamic Bank followed with value traded of AED 11.5 Bn and AED 7.1 Bn, respectively. In terms of volume traded in the exchange during 2023, Union Properties topped with a volume of 10.1 Bn shares as compared to 4.2 Bn in 2022. Deyaar Development and Ajman Bank followed at 3.9 Bn and 3.8 Bn shares, respectively. In market news, the value of real estate transactions in Dubai increased by 37% for the first ten months of the year to reach AED 500 Bn (USD 136.2 Bn) according to Emirates News Agency.

WASHINGTON, Jan 3, (AP): The federal government's gross national debt has surpassed \$34 trillion, a record high that foreshadows the coming political and economic challenges to improve America's balance sheet in the coming years.

The U.S. Treasury Department issued a report Tuesday logging U.S. finances, which have become a source of tension in a politically divided Washington that could possibly see parts of the government shutdown without an annual budget in place.

Republican lawmakers and the White House agreed last June to temporarily lift the nation's debt limit, staving off the risk of what would be a historic default. That agreement lasts until January 2025. Here are some answers to questions about the new record national debt.

The national debt eclipsed \$34 trillion several years sooner than pre-pandemic projections. The Congressional Budget Office's January 2020 projections had gross federal debt eclipsing \$34 trillion in fiscal year 2029.

But the debt grew faster than expected because of a multiyear pandemic starting in 2020 that shut down much of the U.S. economy. The government borrowed heavily under then President Donald Trump and current President Joe Biden to stabilize the economy and support a recovery. But the rebound came with a surge of inflation that pushed up interest rates and made it more expensive for the government to service its debts.

"So far, Washington has been spending money as if we had unlimited resources," said Sung Won Sohn, an economics professor at Loyola Marymount University. "But the bot-tom line is there is no free lunch," he said, "and I think the outlook is pretty grim.'

Finances

The gross debt includes money that the government owes itself, so most policymakers rely on the total debt held by the public in assessing the government's finances. This lower figure - \$26.9 trillion - is roughly equal in size to the U.S. gross domestic product.

Last June, the Congressional Budget Office estimated in its 30-year outlook that publicly held debt will be equal to a record 181% of American economic activity by 2053.

The national debt does not appear to be a weight on the U.S. economy right now, as investors are willing to lend the federal government money. This lending allows the government to keep spending on programs without having to raise

But the debt's path in the decades to come might put at risk national security and major programs, including Social Security and Medicare, which have become the most prominent drivers of forecasted government spending over the next few decades. Government dysfunction, such as another debt limit showdown, could also be a financial risk if investors worry about lawmakers' willingness to repay the U.S. debt

Foreign buyers of U.S. debt - like China, Japan, South Korea and European nations - have already cut down on their holdings of Treasury notes.

A Peterson Foundation analysis states that foreign holdings of U.S. debt peaked at 49 percent in 2011, but dropped to 30 percent by the end of 2022.

"Looking ahead, debt will continue to skyrocket as the Treasury expects to borrow nearly \$1 trillion more by the end of March," said Peterson Foundation CEO Michael Peterson. "Adding trillion after trillion in debt, year after year, should be a flashing red warning sign to any policymaker who cares about the future of our country.

The debt equates to about \$100,000 per person in the U.S. That sounds like a lot, but the sum so far has not appeared to threaten U.S. economic growth.

NHS faces turmoil

Junior doctors stage historic strike in UK

LONDON, Jan 3, (AP): Thousands of doctors walked off the job in Britain on Wednesday, the start of a six-day strike that was set to be the longest in the history of the state-funded National Health Service.

Managers said tens of thousands scheduled appointments and operations will be canceled during the walkout across England and Wales by junior doctors, those in the first years of their careers. The doctors, who form the backbone of hospital and clinic care, plan to stay off the job until 7 a.m. on Tuesday.

Senior doctors and other medics have had to be drafted in to cover for emergency services, critical care and maternity services.

Julian Hartley, chief executive of heath care manag-ers' organization NHS Providers, said the strike came at one of the toughest times of the year for the health service, "immediately after the Christmas and New Year period because of the pressures the demands, and of course we've got flu, we've got COVID.

"So there's going to be an impact on patients that will be significant," he said.

Britain has endured a year of rolling strikes across the health sector as staff sought pay rises to offset the soaring cost of living.

Instead, the risk is long term if the debt keeps rising to uncharted levels. Sohn said a higher debt load could put upward pressure on inflation and cause interest rates to remain elevated, which could also increase the cost of repaying the national debt.

And as the debt challenge evolves over time, choices may become more severe as the costs of Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid increasingly outstrip tax revenues.

When it could turn into a more dire situation, is anyone's guess, says Shai Akabas, director of economic policy at the Bipartisan Policy Center, "but if and when that happens, it could mean very significant consequences that occur very quickly.'

Collaborative efforts aim to promote ethical business practices within the private sector

AmCham Kuwait conducts workshops to combat forced labor, human trafficking

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 3: AmCham Kuwait collaborates with the International Labour Organization (ILO) to conduct an impactful training program aimed at preventing forced labor and trafficking in persons within the private sector. The comprehensive initiative, now completed, focused on familiarizing participants with the practical manifestations of forced labor (FL) and trafficking in persons (TIP), while providing essential information and practical guidance to employers.

The event commenced with opening remarks from Pete Swift, Chairman of Am-Cham Kuwait, who warmly welcomed the participants and emphasized the importance of continuing the collaborative efforts in promoting ethical business practices and ensuring a fair and just work environment within the private sector. Swift then intro-duced Siham Nuseibeh, Technical Officer at the UN's International Labour Organization (ILO).

The training program, a collaborative effort between AmCham Kuwait and ILO, aimed to empower private sector companies by equipping participants with the knowledge to identify potential risks of forced labor in company recruitment, employment, and sourcing practices. Employers received practical guidance on how to effectively address, prevent, and eliminate these risks, fostering ethical business practices. This initiative not only contributes to the ethical framework of companies but also plays a crucial role in

helping them enhance their reputation by ensuring fair and responsible employment practices throughout their operations.

The collaboration between AmCham Kuwait and ILO is particularly significant given that forced labor is a criminal offense. The

ILO Convention 29 on Forced Labour (1930) defines forced labor as work or service exacted from any person under the menace of any penalty, and for which the person has not offered themselves voluntarily.

Understanding forced labor involves recog-

nizing indicators such as isolation, restricted freedom of movement, retention of personal documents, abusive working conditions, violence, threats, abuse of vulnerability, excessive overtime, withholding/no payment of wages, and debt bondage, among others.

Similarly, the training addressed the defini-tion of Trafficking in Persons (TIP) as "the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harboring, or receipt of persons, by means of threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, for exploitation.'

The session provided insights into the 11 most common indicators of forced labor and trafficking in persons, offering practical examples to enhance understanding. Employers were also presented with the business case for combating forced labor, emphasizing the importance of avoiding legal risks, managing supply chain risks, maintaining a positive brand image, and meeting buyers' expectations. The training highlighted the session's focus on addressing risks throughout the employment process - from pre-employment to post-employment.

AmCham Kuwait and ILO remain dedicated to sustaining endeavors to advocate for ethical business practices and uphold a work environment characterized by fair practices within the private sector.

The first workday in January after the holidays hits a little bit differently: The parties are over, debt payments are soon due and it can feel like there's nothing to look forward to.

You may be able to minimize the doldrums with some planning and other steps to turn things around, financial experts say.

"Financial stress can be temporary," says Tonya Rapley, financial educator and founder of the millennial money and lifestyle blog My Fab Finance. She suggests focusing on small steps such as paying this month's bills, then reminding yourself that you can recover from December's overspending.

Here are a few more ways to fight this month's financial downers:

Make or update a budget The new year is a great time to create or update a budget, which can give you back a sense of control, says Mike Croxson, CEO of the National Foundation for Credit Counseling, a nonprofit financial coaching organization.

The popular 50/30/20 budget, for

the smallest dollar amount first is most important because they feel like they accomplished something," Croxson says. Small wins can give you momentum to continue.

Online calculators for those two methods, known as the avalanche and the snowball, respectively, can help you stay on track.

Track your payments carefully

If you purchased holiday gifts using 'buy now, pay later," which allows shoppers to split payments into multiple installments, then it's important to note when those bills are due, says Christine Alemany, chief marketing officer for i2c, a global banking and payments platform.

Alemany suggests tracking your buy now, pay later due dates with a financial management tool or spreadsheet to avoid late fees or interest "The variety of payment charges. methods that consumers now have gives them the option to choose what's best for them," she says, but "that convenience needs to be balanced by discipline.'

Build up savings

Amid all of that repayment, it's also important to find a way to save

"Paying off the highest interest rate balance first makes the most common sense, but for some people, paying off

money, Croxson says. "Having a savings line item in your budget is a critical step for virtually every consumer, even if it's \$20 or \$25 a month," he says. "There will be an emergency, and you will need it.' Being able to turn to savings in the future also helps you avoid building up debt again, he adds.

The good news for Americans is that positive signs in the economy, such as a slower rate of inflation and lower gas prices, means it's a little easier to find room for savings, according to Alan Gin, associate professor of economics at the University of San Diego's Knauss School of Business.

With gas prices coming down, Gin says, "not only will consumers be more confident, but they will have more money." (AP)

Al Muzaini's transfer and win campaign Traveling to wintry places can be magical

Planning a trip this winter? Yes, it's tempting to look for sunny spots where you can lie on a beach or play golf. But some of my favorite winter vacations have been to northerly destinations at their coldest, darkest times of year.

I don't ski, so I'm not looking for powder. But I have seen northern lights in Alaska, explored an ice cave in Iceland, and stood outdoors in 20-degree weather watching migrating cranes in Nebraska.

I've been to Detroit in December, Canada for Christmas, Finland in February. And I've taken visitors around my hometown, New York City, in January, when holiday crowds are gone and prices are lower.

Here are some tips and ideas for planning a trip in the depths of winter. There's a reason New York City runs Restaurant Week

prix fixe menus and 2-for-1 Broadway specials Jan. 16 to Feb. 4: It's a way to drum up business at a slow time of year. Hotels and theater tickets also dip in price in January and February. Plus, you can get reservations that are otherwise impossible to score, and popular attractions have fewer crowds and shorter lines.

Weather can be mild on a sunny day in January in Manhattan, but bitter cold and snow are not unusual. While city streets are no fun to navigate covered in slush, consider that most of your time will be spent indoors visiting museums, seeing shows, shopping and eating your way around town.

Similar price-and-crowd patterns hold true for other northerly cities like Boston, Chicago and Montreal, though all three are typically colder and snowier than New York. So check forecasts, wear warm and waterproof boots, and save a bundle - on airfare, too - compared to trips in May or October.

The northern lights flare on an 11-year cycle and 2024 is near the peak of that cycle. Of course, there are no guarantees you will see the aurora borealis, but at least this is a good year to try. Iceland, Alaska, and northern parts of Scandinavia and Canada are all good places for viewing, but do your research on weather data for cloud cover in specific destinations. You can't see northern lights in cloudy skies.

When my son was 9, we flew to Fairbanks, Alaska, in February, checked out the ice-carving festival (this year, Feb. 17-March 31), then headed 60 miles north to Chena Hot Springs. The resort is its own little world; there's no town, no cell service, limited Wi-Fi; and meals served with produce from greenhouses. We visited the resort's ice museum. went dog sledding and snowmobiling, soaked in a geothermally heated outdoor pool, and yes, we saw the aurora.

City lights make it hard to see the northern lights, but on a recent trip to Reykjavik, Iceland, my husband and I simply drove our rental car to a waterfront walkway where people gather nightly to search the skies. The view there faces away from the city, and our detour paid off: We saw the aurora, albeit briefly.

Any trip you plan hoping to catch the northern lights should include other adventures. In Finland, you'll want to visit Helsinki's cozy cafes, plus Market Square and Old Market Hall, and, of course, saunas. Loyly Sauna is perched on the Baltic Sea, so dare to take a cold plunge in the icy waters while you're there. (AP)



'May December' star reaping praise and racking up awards

Melton thinks it's good it took years to make it in Hollywood

LOS ANGELES, Jan 3, (AP): Fame didn't come overnight for Charles Melton.

The 32-year-old "May December" star, currently reaping praise and racking up awards and nominations for his scene-stealing performance alongside acclaimed Hollywood veterans Natalie Portman and Julianne Moore, has dutifully been chipping away at his resume since he moved to Los Angeles more than a decade ago. "I was walking dogs and working Chinese takeout seven years

ago," Melton recalled of his early days trying to make it as an actor. But his role in "May December" - which has already snagged him several accolades heading into awards season, including outstanding supporting performance at the Gotham Awards - has notched him a spot as one of The Associated Press' breakthrough Entertainers of 2023.

And while his story isn't one of instant success, he believes the maturity he gained along the way was instrumental in giving him the chops necessary to make his characters believable, particularly in the debatably campy Todd Haynes melodrama.

"I remember hearing this thing a while ago that Bryan Cranston said. And the message I received was that, in order to craft a character, you have to be a craftsman of your own life outside of what you do," Melton says. "The chipping away, I think - I don't know, I think it's good.'

That life experience and refined understanding of the human condition - combined with his foray into campy dramas with his role as (the second) Reggie in the cult teen series "Riverdale" - informed

Melton's "May December" character, Joe Yoo.

In the film, Gracie Atherton-Yoo (Moore), who years earlier become tabloid fodder for a sexual relationship with a seventh-grade Joe, agrees to let an actor (Portman) spend time with them to research an upcoming film about the decades-old scandal.

Now, Gracie is seemingly happily married to Joe, with kids of their own and a picturesque lifestyle in idyllic coastal Georgia.

"There's just so much that I looked at as far as repression and just how certain emotions we carry in our body and how that translates into the physicality of how someone moves and talks," Melton says

In the movie, Joe, now an emotionally stunted 36-year-old, is finally grappling with the trauma of his relationship's origins and questioning what that means for his marriage and life - a performance Haynes has said gave the director new insights into the character

That thoughtful approach to crafting a performance has also been augmented by Melton's ever-growing interest in film as an art form.

In addition to being a Haynes enthusiast even before the actor starred in one of his projects - "Safe" and "I'm Not There" are some of his favorites - Melton has also developed an appreciation for auteurs like Ingmar Bergman and Paul Thomas Anderson.

But his love of cinema began with more approachable stories. He cited fond memories of going to the theater often with his dad to see action movies and big blockbusters when they lived in South Korea.

"Growing up as an Army brat, there's not too many arthouse films that are being played, you know, in the military base markets internationally. So that was kind of the world that I lived in," Melton recalls

His family eventually returned to the United States and settled down in Kansas, where Melton spent his teenage years. He played football at Kansas State University, but eventually dropped out to move to Los Angeles as he became enamored with the idea of telling stories in front of the camera thanks to his ever-growing love of cinema

Though his role in "May December" and subsequent recognition for it has felt like a major "I made it" moment, each baby step along the way has also been a dream come true, from his first callback and his "43-second" guest star appearance on "Glee" to landing a lead role in Ry Russo-Young's romantic drama, "The Sun is Also a Star," alongside Yara Shahidi - a film he is proud of and a director he says he'd like to work with again.

But even as he relishes the critical acclaim he's garnered and looks forward to the future projects that come as a result, Melton has sought to be present in normal human moments amid the success, like going camping and making kimchi with his mom.

"There's a couple of things that I've been looking at that I'm really excited about, but right now, I'm just trying to breathe," he says

'Society of the Snow,' a gripping tale of survival and culture

Film revisits 1972 Andes crash tragedy

LOS ANGELES, Jan 3, (AP): When Gustavo Zerbino watched "La Sociedad de la Nieve," the 1972 plane crash survivor felt as if he was being submerged "into boiling water," reliving the roughly 70 days he and his teammates were stranded in the snow-covered Andes mountains.

Zerbino praised J.A. Bayona's raw and unfiltered film, which is being released Thursday as "Society of the Snow" on Netflix in the US, but said he also felt the same anxieties and emotions he felt while stranded as a young athlete more than 50 years ago.

"Fortunately, that feeling ended in 2 1/2 hours," he told The Associated Press this past October.

Bayona's movie is based on Pablo Vierci's book of the same title, and follows the story of the Uruguayan Air Force plane disaster. The Old Christians rugby team was traveling with relatives and friends to Chile for a match when their plane crashed, stranding them in the mountains where they faced snow storms, avalanches and starvation, forcing them to eat the flesh of those who had died.

The tale of the tragedy has been told numerous times. It's been referenced in shows like "Seinfeld," dramatized in countless films like the 1993 narrative film "Alive" with Ethan Hawke, served as the subject of documentaries and plays and even inspired Showtime's Emmy-nominated "Yellowjackets.'

"We always felt something was missing," says Zerbino, reflecting on past projects. "Society of the Snow' is the book that filled in that missing piece.'

Tackling the complex story of endurance and survival, Bayona wanted to do more than just direct a dramatic interpretation of real-life tragedy. He wanted to tell a story that honored the event's survivors and victims and their Uruguayan culture.

"It's more a reflection than an action book and ultimately helped me a lot in understanding the characters," the Spanish director said of Vierci's book. Vierci is an associate producer on the film.

Bayona, whose credits include 2018's "Jurassic

World: Fallen Kingdom," wanted to build on the connection between the living and the dead, including a seamless on-screen homage throughout the film to those who died.

"When he showed us the drafts of what he was working on, it sent shivers down our spines; our hearts stopped. I mean, we already saw that it was very real, very powerful, and we saw that there was genius at work," Zerbino said.

The Golden Globe-nominated film is narrated by Numa Turcatti, who died shortly before the rescue and is played here by Enzo Vogrincic. That decision was made by the director and supported by Vierci.

Compassion

"I was always attracted to the possibility and the need to tell it from the point of the view of the dead," Vierci said. "This is a story of 45 individuals providing a window through which we can observe how they endured major adversities and built a society where compassion and mercy prevailed."

Bayona's film seeks to honor the story and strays away from glamorizing or sensationalizing the horrors the passengers and crew members endured. Beyond speaking to the survivors, victims' loved ones and visiting the crash site, he wove in Candombe Uruguayan music at high points of tension and added Turcatti's favorite song from a popular Uruguayan band into one of the film's early blissful scenes.

"I was very interested in getting into the culture of Uruguay and the culture of the time," he said.

His approach even included crash survivors, like Carlitos Páez, who turned 19 while stranded and plays his own father in the movie.

"I wanted to get as close to reality as possible," said Bayona, who put his cast on a medically supervised weight-loss program and shot the avalanche scenes in freezing conditions

Zerbino watched the film with other crash survivors and victims' family members. The end credits were met with a standing ovation, he said.

According to the former rugby player, this was the first time many victims' relatives had engaged with retellings of the story.

"They hadn't read or watched past books or movies around the event because they didn't want to suffer. Some did, and others didn't, and well, they reconciled with the story through this film," said Zerbino who feels he made a commitment to preserve his late team members' legacies.

Bayona's film champions Zerbino and the other survivors' mission: to tell the story of those who gave up their literal selves to keep their friends alive.

"I have a commitment, a commitment from before leaving the mountain to be a witness and transmit the legacy of my dead friends," Zerbino said.

Influential people who died in 2023

NEW YORK, Jan 3, (AP): Yevgeny Prigozhin rose from being an ex-con and hot dog vendor to winning lucrative Kremlin contracts and heading a formidable mercenary army. But it all came to a sudden end when the private plane carrying him and others mysteriously exploded over Russia.

Prigozhin's Aug. 23 death put an exclamation point on what had already been an eventful year for the brutal mercenary leader. His Wagner Group troops brought Russia a rare victory in its grinding war in Ukraine, capturing the city of Bakhmut. But internal friction with Russian military leaders later burst into the open, with Prigozhin briefly mounting an armed rebellion - the most severe challenge yet to Russian President Vladimir Putin's rule.



The rebellion was called off and a deal was struck in less than 24 hours. However, just two months later, Prigozhin joined the list of those who have run afoul of the Kremlin and died unexpectedly. He was just one of a number

of noteworthy people who died in 2023. The world also said good-

bye to former US Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, who

died Nov. 29. Serving under two presidents, Kissinger's shadow loomed large in the foreign policy arena, prompting both admiration and criticism from around the globe. And he continued his involvement in global affairs even in his final months.

Another political figure who died this year was former U.S. first lady Rosalynn Carter, who died Nov. 19. She was the closest adviser to her husband, former President Jimmy Carter, during his one term in the White House and then across four decades of global humanitarian work.

Others from the world of politics who died this year include: former Italian Premier **Silvio Berlusconi**; former US senators Dianne Feinstein, James Buckley and James Abourezk; former British treasury chief Nigel Lawson; former Pakistani leader Pervez Musharraf; former US Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor; former Chinese Premier Li Keqiang; former Finnish President Martti Ahtisaari; former New Mexico governor and American ambas-sador to the United Nations **Bill Richardson**; former New Jersey Lt. Gov. Sheila Oliver; and former Greek Foreign Minister Theodoros Pangalos.

Among the entertainers who left the world this year was singer Tina Turner, who died May 24. Turner's powerful voice and stage presence brought her fame across multiple decades, first with her abusive husband, Ike Turner, in the 1960's and 70's. But after leaving their marriage, she found fame again in the 1980's with her hit "What's Love Got to Do With It."

MAYVILLE, N.Y.: Salman Rushdie's plans to publish a book about a 2022 attempt on his life may delay the trial of his alleged attacker, which is scheduled to begin next week, attorneys said Tuesday.

Hadi Matar, the man charged with repeatedly stabbing Rushdie as the author

was being introduced for a lecture, is entitled to the manuscript and related material as part of his trial preparation, Chautauqua County Judge David Foley said during a pretrial conference. Foley gave Matar and his attorney until

Wednesday to decide if they want to delay the trial until they have the book in hand, either in advance from the publisher or once it has been released in April. Defense attorney Nathaniel Barone said after court that he favored a delay but would consult with Matar. Jury selection is scheduled to begin Jan. 8.

"It's not just the book," Barone said. "Every little note Rushdie wrote down, I get, I'm entitled to. Every discussion, every recording, anything he did in regard to this book."

Rushdie, who was left blinded in his right eye and with a damaged left hand in the August 2022 attack, announced in October that he had written about the attack in a memoir: "Knife: Meditations After an Attempted Murder," which is available for pre-order. Trial preparation was already well under way when the attorneys involved in the case learned about the book

District Attorney Jason Schmidt said Rushdie's representatives had declined the prosecutor's request for a copy of the manuscript, citing intellectual property rights. Schmidt downplayed the relevance of the book at the upcoming trial, given that the attack was witnessed by a large, live audience and Rushdie himself could testify

"There were recordings of it," Schmidt said of the assault.

Matar, 26, of New Jersey has been held without bail since his arrest immediately after Rushdie was stabbed in front of a stunned audience at the Chautauqua Institution, a summer arts and education retreat in western New York.

Schmidt has said Matar was on a "mission to kill Mr. Rushdie" when he rushed from the audience to the stage and stabbed him more than a dozen times until being subdued by onlookers. (AP)

Amputations soar in Gaza amid ongoing conflict

Gaza war victims face grim choices: lose limb or risk death

DEIR AL-BALAH, Gaza Strip, Jan 3, (AP): The doctors gave Shaimaa Nabahin an impossible choice: lose your left leg or risk death. The 22-year-old had been hospitalized in Gaza for around a week, after her ankle was partially severed in an Israeli airstrike, when doctors told her she was suffering from blood poisoning. Nabahin chose to maximize her chances of survival, and agreed to have her leg amputated 15 centimeters (6 inches) below the knee.

The decision upended life for the ambitious university student, as it has for untold others among the more than 54,500 war-wounded who faced similar gut-wrenching choices.

"My whole life has changed," said Nabahin, speaking from her bed at the Al-Aqsa Martyrs Hospital in the central town of Deir al-Balah. "If I want to take a step or go anywhere, I need help."

Treatment

The World Health Organization and the Health Ministry in Hamas-run Gaza say amputations have become commonplace during the Israel-Hamas war, now in its 12th week, but could not offer precise figures. At the hospital in Deir al-Balah, dozens of recent amputees are in various stages of treatment and recovery.

Experts believe that in some cases, limbs could have been saved with proper treatment. But after weeks of Israel's blistering air and ground offensive, only nine out of Gaza's 36 hospitals are still operational. They are greatly overcrowded, offer limited treatment and lack basic equipment to perform surgeries. Many wounded are unable to reach the remaining hospitals, pinned down by Israeli bombardment and ground combat.

Sean Casey, a WHO official who recently visited several hospitals in Gaza, said the acute lack of vascular surgeons — the first responders to trauma injuries and best positioned to save limbs — is increasing the likelihood of amputations.

But also in many cases, he said, the severe nature of the injuries means some limbs are not salvageable, and need to be removed as soon as possible.

"People may die of the infections that they have because their limbs are infected," Casey told a news conference last week. "We saw patients who were septic."

Israel declared war after Hamas militants stormed across the border on Oct. 7, killing some 1,200 people, mostly civilians, and taking more than 240 hostages. Israel has vowed to keep up the fight until Hamas is destroyed and removed from power in Gaza and all the hostages are freed. More than 20,600 Palestinians have been killed in the fighting, about 70% of them women and children, according to Gaza's Health Ministry, which does not differentiate between civilians and combatants among the dead.

Before the war, Gaza's health system was overwhelmed after years of conflict and a border blockade enforced by Israel and Egypt in response to the 2007 Hamas takeover of the territory. In 2018 and 2019, thousands were wounded by Israeli army fire in weekly Hamas-led anti-blockade protests, and more than 120 of the wounded had limbs ampu-

: tated.

Even then, Gaza amputees had a hard time getting prostheses that would help them return to an active life.

Those joining the ranks of amputees now face near-impossible conditions. Some 85% of the population of 2.3 million have been displaced, crowding into tents, schools-turned-shelters or homes of relatives. Water, food and other basic supplies are scarce.

On Nov. 13, when an Israeli airstrike hit the home of Nabahin's neighbor in Bureij, an urban refugee camp in central Gaza, her ankle and arteries in her leg were partially severed by a clump of cement that blew into her home from the explosion next door. She was the only one of her family who was injured, while a number of her neighbors were killed, she said.

She was quickly taken to nearby Al-Aqsa Martyrs Hospital, where doctors managed to sew up her leg and and stop the bleeding.

But after that, Nabahin said she received minimal treatment or attention from doctors, who were dealing with a growing number of critically wounded people amid dwindled medical supplies. Days later, her leg turned a dark color, she said.

"They discovered that there was ... shrapnel that was poisoning my blood," she said.

The amputation went well, but Nabahin said she remains in acute pain and can't sleep without sedatives.

Jourdel Francois, an orthopedic surgeon with Doctors Without Borders, says the risk of post-op infections in war-stricken Gaza is high. Francois, who worked at Nasser Hospital in the southern town of Khan Younis in November, said hygiene was poor, mainly because of scarce water and the general chaos in a hospital that's overwhelmed with patients while hosting thousands of displaced civilians.

Surgery

He recalled a young girl whose legs had been crushed and urgently needed a double amputation, but she couldn't be booked into surgery that day because of the high number of other critical injuries. She died later that night, Francois said, likely from sepsis, or blood poisoning by bacteria.

"There are 50 (injured) people arriving every day, you have to make a choice," he told The Associated Press by phone after leaving Gaza.

"I wish I could meet the needs of my children, (but) I am unable," the mother of eight said, with tears streaming down her face.

Before the conflict, Nabahin had started her degree in international relations in Gaza and planned to travel to Germany to continue her studies.

FORT COLLINS, Colo., Jan 3, (AP): Patrick Cartier scored a season-high 21 points, Nique Clifford and Isaiah Stevens went a combined 8 of 9 on free throws down the stretch and No. 13 Colorado State held off New Mexico 76-68 Tuesday night in the Mountain West Conference opener for both teams.

Colorado State (13-1, 1-0) opened a 17-point lead with 5:15 remaining, only to see the Lobos (12-2, 0-1) storm back and make things interesting. Clifford and Stevens ended the comeback bid at the line as the Rams won their fourth straight since a home loss to Saint Mary's on Dec. 9.

"We weren't perfect, you're never going to be, but I thought our guys did a lot of really good things here tonight," Colorado State coach Niko Medved said.

Stevens had 18 points and eight assists in his 131st career start. He's one away from matching the program mark held by Nico Carvacho (2015-20). Stevens already holds school records for points (he went over 2,000 on Tuesday) and assists.

Clifford finished with 12 points and 10 boards on a night when 10 Rams players took the floor for at least five minutes of action.

"Coach says it all the time - we're at our best when the ball has energy. What that means is when we're sharing it," Cartier said. "That starts with (Stevens) and everyone follows suit."

The Lobos struggled from the free throw line, going 4 of 11 as their 11-game winning streak was snapped with their first loss in nearly two months.

"Terrific team," New Mexico coach Richard Pitino said of the Rams. "We will humbly watch (the game film), see where we can get better.'

New Mexico was at full strength for the first time since the first game of the season. Jamal Mashburn Jr. returned last game after missing seven with thigh and thumb injuries. He had 13 points.

Entering this one, standout guards Mashburn and House had only played 37 minutes together on the court.

"We've got a lot of offensively talented guys that can get their shot anytime they want," Mashburn said. "So when that hap-

It was a huge turnaround in shooting after halftime. The Blue Devils were 0-for-9 on first-half 3s, then built a double-digit lead by hitting seven in a row. "We talked about not making any 3s," Duke coach Jon Scheyer said. "I thought we missed maybe three or four that were good ones. We do make open shots, so just let it come. Maliq Brown had 26 points on 11-for-16 shooting and Judah Mintz added 18 points for Syracuse (10-4, 1-2), which was 4-for-16 on 3-pointers and committed 17 turnovers as a five-game winning streak was halted. "It was turnovers. I thought everything that happened, it was a lot on us," Syracuse coach Adrian Autry said. "Duke is a good defensive team, A lot of our turnovers were not making the right play, the right read. 

SYDNEY, Jan 3, (AP): Australia captain Pat Cummins took 5-61 for his third consecutive fivewicket haul as Pakistan's brittle top order was again exposed before a combative lower order rally helped the tourists to 313 on Day 1 of the third and final cricket Test.

At 96-5 shortly after lunch Wednesday, Pakistan was in grave danger of being bundled out cheaply after it had won the toss and chose to bat under bright, blue skies at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

But an enterprising counterattack led by wicketkeeper Mohammad Rizwan with a brisk 88, followed by a half-century from Agha Salmon and a stunning maiden Test half-century by Aamer Jamal helped Pakistan recover to a respectable total.

Australian pair David Warner, playing his final test, and Usman Khawaja had to survive one over from spinner Sajid Khan under fading light before stumps.

Warner (6 not out) in characteristic style smashed the first ball for four but was lucky later in the over as he somehow survived the ball bouncing over the stumps from a defensive shot. Australia was 6 without loss at stumps.

Much of the pre-match attention may have been on Warner's last test for Australia, but it was the pace bowlers who stole the spotlight early.

Mitchell Starc and Josh Hazlewood set the tone by each taking a wicket in the first two overs, before Cummins, coming off a ten-wicket haul in the Boxing Day Test at Melbourne, snared two wickets including the prize scalp of Babar Azam as Pakistan batters crumbled

Starc (2-75) struck with the second ball, teasing Shafique into an uncontrolled swipe which the opener could only edge through to Steve Smith at second slip.

Hazlewood (1-65) struck in the next over when he had test rookie Saim Ayub edging through to Alex Carey in his debut innings.

From 4-2, Babar and Massood started the rebuild for Pakistan, with Babar especially attacking the Aussie quick bowlers.

But the rally was short-lived as Cummins removed Babar (26) with a ball that came back at the right-hander and struck him on the pad. Umpire Michael Gough turned down the initial Australian appeal, but the TV umpire overturned the decision.

Saud Shakeel was Cummins' second wicket, edging behind to Carey to leave Pakistan's first innings in tatters at 47-4

Captain Shan Masood (35) and Rizwan shared a 49-run stand either side of the lunch break to steady Pakistan. Mitchell Marsh (1-27) ended that partnership by teasing an edge from Masood which flew through to Smith.

Rizwan went on the attack and made an enterprising half-century off 74 balls. He continued to play his shots but eventually holed out to Hazlewood as Cummins' brought himself back in to the attack to take his third wicket.

"If you look back at all the best bowlers in the history of cricket, they've always had that in them - the ability to come on and take a wicket when the team needs to,"," Marsh said of Cummin's uncanny knack of choosing the right time to bowl. "I think the best part about Patty is that he always finds a way for us.'

The Aussie skipper got his fourth when he had Sajid caught at midwicket by Nathan Lyon for 15 and a deserved fifth shortly after with Hasan Ali (0) picking out Starc in the deep.

In between Starc had ended Salman's impressive innings at 53 when he was caught by Travis Head at

square leg.

Pakistan's lower order continued, though, and a final-wicket partnership of 86 between Jamal and Mir Hamza frustrated Australia for almost 23 overs. Jamal, who made his Test debut in the series-opening match in Perth, blasted nine boundaries and four sixes in an enthralling 82 off 97 balls before finding Starc in the deep off Lyon (1-74) to end the innings.

The lead up to the match has been almost exclusively about Warner's last test for Australia, and the 112-Test veteran, flanked by his three daughters, led the home team out on to the SCG for his final Test.

On Tuesday, Warner took to social

media to plead for the return of his "baggy green" Test cricket cap which was in a bag that went missing in transit between Melbourne and Sydney this week. On Wednesday, he was wearing a new cap.

Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese joined the appeal for the caps to be returned.

"David Warner has represented Australia on more than one hundred occasions," Albanese said in Sydney on Wednesday. "The baggy green caps belong to him. He has earnt them and they should be returned."

Australia won the first two Tests in Perth and Melbourne to clinch the three-match series

Cagliari beaten 4-1

Jovi continues scoring streak as Milan reach Italian Cup quarters

MILAN, Jan 3, (AP): Luka Jović scored two goals to help AC Milan beat Cagliari 4-1 in the Italian Cup.

Milan has won the Italian Cup five times but it last lifted the trophy in 2003 and hasn't reached the final since 2018. The Rossoneri will face either Atalanta or Sassuolo in the quarterfinals

Milan coach Stefano Pioli was under pressure after a poor run that had seen his team eliminated from the Champions League at the group stage. The Rossoneri also had a lengthy injury list and rested a number of star players - starting with four teenagers -

but hadn't lost to Cagliari at San Siro since 1997.

Jović opened the scoring in the 29th minute following a delightful assist from Théo Hernandez and the duo combined again shortly before halftime.

The two goals took Jović's tally to five in his past six matches. It took the Serbia forward until December to score his first goal for Milan after joining from Fiorentina at the start of the season.

Teenager Chaka Traorè extended Milan's lead early in the second half, with his third Rossoneri goal in his first start for the team.

Rafael Leão capped a great night for Milan in stoppage time, shortly after Paolo Azzi netted a consolation for Cagliari.

England great Wayne Rooney was fired as the manager of second-tier club Birmingham after 15 games.

Rooney earned only two wins since his controversial appointment in October. Birmingham was sixth in the Championship when he started, and has fallen to 20th.

The club was taken over last summer by a company owned by American businessman Tom Wagner, and it got rid of popular coach John Eustace, who had been in charge for 15 months and steered the club away from relegation.

SOCCER

"Birmingham City has today parted company with manager Wayne Rooney and first-team coach Carl Robinson,' the club said in a statement. "Despite their best efforts, results have not met the expectations that were made clear at the outset. Therefore, the board feels that a change in management is in the best interests of the football club.'

Birmingham lost at Leeds 3-0 on Monday, and supporters called for the removal of Rooney, the former Manchester United and England striker.

NFL great Tom Brady became a minority owner of the club in August.

Rooney thanked Wagner, Brady and club CEO Garry Cook for the opportunity but said he wasn't given enough time.

Curry scores 36 points to lead Warriors past Magic

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan 3, (AP): That's another signature win for the Oklahoma City Thunder.

Shai Gilgeous-Alexander scored 36 points and Oklahoma City held off the NBA-leading Boston Celtics 127-123 on Tuesday night for its fifth straight victory.

Oklahoma City has won eight of nine. During that stretch, the Thunder have beaten defending champion Denver twice, ended the Los Angeles' Clippers win streak at nine, beaten Western Conference leader Minnesota and now topped the Celtics.

This one was tougher than some of the others. The Thunder beat Minnesota by 23 and Denver by 26 on the road last week.

This time, the Celtics trimmed an 18-point deficit in the fourth quarter to two before Oklahoma City held on. Josh Giddey had 23 points, eight rebounds and six assists, and Chet Holmgren added 14 points, seven assists and four blocks for the Thunder, who entered the night with the league's fourth-best record.

Kristaps Porzingis scored 34 points and Jayson Tatum had 30 for the Celtics, who had won six straight and 11 of 12

Boston led 61-58 at halftime behind 18 points from Porzingis. Gilgeous-Alexander kept the Thunder in it with

The Thunder got off to a strong start in the second half, and Giddey's deep 3-pointer gave Oklahoma City a 76-69 lead. It got so frustrating for the Celtics that Mazzulla was called for a technical during the third quarter. Gilgeous-Alexander scored 16 points on 7-for-10 shooting in the period to help Oklahoma City take a 98-86 edge into the fourth.

Oklahoma City started hot in the fourth. Jalen Williams took off on a fast break, cocked the ball back with his right hand and brought down the hammer on a dunk to give the Thunder a 108-90 lead.

The Celtics rallied late. Derrick White hit a 3-pointer with 41 seconds remaining to cut Boston's deficit to 121-119. Williams quickly responded with a short floater to push the lead back to four.

Porzingis was fouled with 15.2 seconds left, and he made both free throws to cut Oklahoma City's lead to 123-121.

Embiid is the reigning NBA MVP for a reason. With the big man back, the Sixers turned this into an early blowout against a Bulls team that had played well recently without injured guard Zach LaVine. LaVine can return to the lineup as early as Friday. Even the two-time All-Star wouldn't have helped much in this one as the Bulls fell to 10-6 this season without him.

The 76ers raced to a 43-18 lead after one quarter, with the Bulls missing all 10 3-pointers.

DeMar DeRozan led the Bulls with 16 points. Andre Drummond had 11 points, 17 rebounds and muffed a dunk to the delight of the home crowd when he was stuffed by the front of the rim. Forward Patrick Williams left with an injured right ankle.

Grizzlies 106, Spurs 98 In Memphis, Ja Morant had 26 points, 10 assists and a fourth-quarter dunk over Victor Wembanyama, Desmond Bane added 24 points and Memphis used a second-half spurt to beat San Antonio.

Santi Aldama added 13 points and 11 rebounds for Memphis, which snapped a three-game losing streak

Wembanyama led the Spurs with 20 points, seven rebounds and four blocks. Keldon Johnson finished with 19 points, along with six rebounds and four assists. Julian Champagnie and Jeremy Sochan scored 12 points apiece.

Morant brought the Memphis crowd to its feet with 9:11 left as he drove down the right side of the lane, cut left into the middle and dunked on the 7-foot-3 rookie from France, who leads the NBA in blocked shots. The dunk led to a scream, a shake of the head from Morant and an 88-70 lead for the Grizzlies.

Warriors 121, Magic 115

In San Francisco, Stephen Curry scored 36 points and delivered on key plays in the fourth quarter to help Golden State snap a three-game losing streak with a victory over Orlando.

Curry scored or set up 13 straight Warriors points in a four-minute stretch late in the fourth quarter that gave Golden State its first win in three tries on a season-high, seven-game homestand

Jonathan Kuminga added 19 points and Klav Thompson scored 15 for the Warriors.

Paolo Banchero and 27 points and 12 rebounds for Orlando, while Franz Wagner added 25 points. The Magic have lost their first two games on a four-game road trip. Hornets 111, Kings 104

In Sacramento, Terry Rozier scored 14 of his 34 points in the fourth quarter after missing a game due to illness, and Charlotte beat Sacramento to snap an 11-game losing streak.

Rozier added six assists and Charlotte outscored Sacramento 36-26 in the final period, finishing the game on a 10-0 run. Miles Bridges had 27 points and P.J. Washington added 17.

West Ham hasn't allowed a goal in its past four league matches - three of which were victories.

Brighton substitute Jakub Moder blazed a shot over the bar from close range in the 87th minute at London Stadium. The visitors threatened again minutes later but goalkeeper Alphonse Areola stretched to save Adam Lallana's shot from distance.

Just before the hour mark, Brighton's João Pedro beat several defenders but shot straight at Areola.

Tomas Soucek then missed on the other end, shooting wide in the 61st minute after Saïd Benrahma's cross fell to him.

Evan Ferguson provided a spark off the bench for Brighton. The 19-yearold Ireland striker shot just wide shortly after replacing Danny Welbeck.

Brighton midfielder James Milner made his 632nd top-flight appearance to tie Ryan Giggs for second-most in the Premier League. Milner could pass alltime leader Gareth Barry next season.

"It's quite a big number. It's taken a long time," Milner said before the game. "I think it's a nice thing but it's a big game for us tonight. We want to start the year with a win.'

The 37-year-old Milner is in his first season at Brighton after eight years with Liverpool. He debuted with Leeds in the 2002-03 season at age 16.

Both teams face second-tier opponents in the third round of the FA Cup. Brighton plays at Stoke on Saturday. West Ham hosts Bristol on Sunday.
