KUWAIT CITY, July 1: As per the directives of First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior and Defense Sheikh Fahad Yousuf Saud Al-Sabah and under the leadership of Interior Ministry Undersecretary Lieutenant General Sheikh Salem Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah, the Ministry of Interior launched an intensive security campaign at dawn Monday covering many areas like Bneid Al-Gar, Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh and Mutlaa.

This step was taken immediately after the grace period given to violators to

leave the country or legalize their status. The amnesty started on March 14, 2024 and was extended until June 30, 2024.

The ongoing campaign including Farwaniya resulted in the arrest of more than 750 violators of different nationalities, most of whom have absconding cases and were referred to the competent authorities for deportation.

Kuwait 'open door' policy goes digital

KUWAIT CITY, July 1, (KUNA): The Kuwait Government has adopted the "open door" policy in line with guidelines by His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah to bolster further confidence between state officials and the citizens and improve public services.

In addition to the removal of physical bureaucratic barriers in the face of the nationals, the citizens can easily

request meetings with top officials via the government "Tawasul System", available on the smart service "Sahel."

The Cabinet, during a session held on May 19, stressed on necessity "to open the doors for citizens seeking to work out transactions at the ministries

and other government authorities."

The digital service is designed to enable citizens to present queries and complaints quickly, boosting transpar-

ency and confidence between the nationals and the government.

Court rules disability care societal duty, not charity

PADA decision challenged

KUWAIT CITY, July 1: In application of the provisions of the Cassation Court, which stressed in its ruling that caring for persons with disabilities is neither a favor nor an act of pity, but a societal duty based on the Islamic concepts of interdependence and solidarity; the Court of Appeals upheld the ruling of a lower court that obliged the Public Authority for Disabled Affairs (PADA) to include a citizen's condition under the category of developmental, moderate and permanent disability and the consequences thereof, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

Details of the lawsuit filed by Attorney Youssef Hussein on behalf of his client's son, who was born on April 15, 2012 and suffered from permanent illnesses that led to a deficiency in his physical abilities are summarized below:

"The competent technical committee at PADA previously decided to include his condition under the moderate and permanent developmental disability category and issued him a certificate or proof of disability dated Sept 24, 2017. However, it later decided to exclude his condition from the disability category and notified him about it on Aug 29, 2022.

"The plaintiff filed a grievance against this decision in a letter addressed to the authority's Medical Grievances Committee on Sept 26, 2022; but his grievance was rejected on Nov 9, 2022.

"Since this decision is in violation of the laws and regulations and was tainted by abuse of power, as the person suffering from the same ailments has not been cured; the legal status he acquired should not be affected."

Hussein also presented a portfolio of documents that included scanned copies of the disability proof certificate dated Sept 24, 2017; text message received on Aug 29, 2022 notifying him about the decision of the competent technical committee not to include his son's condition under disability category; grievance submitted on Sept 26/2022; text message about the rejection of the grievance on Nov 9, 2023; and a number of translated medical reports confirming the ailments.

Judge extends detention of 15 in Mangaf fire case

KUWAIT CITY, July 1: The detention renewal judge has extended the detention of eight citizens, three Indians and four Egyptians in the Mangaf building fire case -- which killed 49 people and injured several others -- on charges of manslaughter, accidental injury and negli-

The Public Prosecution initiated investigation into the fire incident. It formed a team of Ahmadi and Mubarak Al-Kabeer prosecutors who inspected the crime scene and visited the hospitals to interview the injured. It also instructed the Criminal Evidence and Forensic Medicine departments to take the necessary measures.

Case files indicate that fire brigades were able to put out the fire in the Mangaf building, which claimed the lives of a number expatriates and injured others. An investigation was opened to determine the circumstances leading to the fire, confirming that the cause of the fire was an electrical fault.



Remembering Tariq bin Ziyad: Kuwait's Surra area's loss after street renaming

"ONE of the commendable decisions that came from the authorities and pleased the Kuwaiti people of all sects was the renaming of streets. Previously, many streets bore the names of personalities who had no significant achievements or contributions to Kuwait, making it unjustifiable to honor them with such recognition. This practice also led to confusion and difficulties in navigating the streets," columnist, former permanent envoy of the State of Kuwait to the United Nations (UN), the former Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) secretary general Abdullah Bishara wrote for Al-Qabas daily.

"We have encountered names that had no connection to Kuwait's history, names of individuals who

neither made notable discoveries nor led significant military campaigns in Kuwait's past. These names appeared on our streets out of courtesy, pressure, or other means, rather than genuine merit.

"The most important aspect of

the decision to use numbers for street names is the convenience it brings to Kuwaitis. It simplifies navigation, reduces confusion, and saves time. Previously, we saw names that had no relevance to Kuwait names unfamiliar to Kuwait names unfamiliar to

to Kuwait, names unfamiliar to the Kuwaiti people, both past and present.

"These names were introduced by external influences, such as Hassan Al-Banna Street in Rumaithiya, named after the leader of the Muslim Brotherhood in Egypt. Al-Banna is neither one of the Rightly Guided Caliphs nor connected to the expansion of Islamic conquests; his name often sparks historical disputes and controversy.

"Despite the joy of removing inappropriate names from the streets, residents of Surra will miss the historical significance carried by names like Tariq bin Ziyad, the conqueror of Andalusia in 712 AD. His journey was made possible by ships provided by the Spanish governor of Tangier, who, in conflict with the King of Spain, agreed to facilitate the crossing on the condition that the fleet be returned afterward.

"The truth is that the ships were owned by the Spanish ruler of Tangier. After withdrawing from wars with the Spanish ruler of the south, he seized control of Tangier and was determined to return to the throne once his preparations were complete. Therefore, he agreed to Tariq bin Ziyad's request to use the ships he owned, ensuring their return to Tangier.

"Tariq bin Ziyad's military competence as an Islamic leader was exemplary. He successfully controlled the most challenging sites in southern Spain, believing he was bringing the light of Islam to European soil. His name and achievements are engraved in the annals of human history.

"History also records that the name of Tariq bin Ziyad was given to the mountain where he and his forces disembarked from the ships onto European soil, leading to the name Gibraltar on world maps. This location, chosen by Tariq, became a significant geographical marker as he carried Islam with its light and values to Europe.

"Tariq ventured into an unknown land on unfamiliar boats, heading to a disembarkation point he had never seen before. He selected a fighting group, primarily composed of his sect, the Tsamheim of European Berbers.

"Historical records indicate that Tariq and his army, numbering between seven and ten thousand, landed in the area now known as Gibraltar. This mountainous region with narrow coasts has one main street, predominantly inhabited by people of Indian origin, working in a narrow street filled with locally made goods, which I visited years ago.

"Tariq bin Ziyad achieved victory, as history records, and the significance of this victory shaped subsequent events. Tariq bin Ziyad was a follower of the general Arab commander, Musa bin Nusayr, who grew jealous of Tariq's rising fame. Musa felt threatened by Tariq's newfound status in human history and began planning to eliminate him. The extent of the victory even reached Caliph Al-Walid bin Abdul-Malik in Damascus, leading to grand celebrations.

"The European historians' accounts of Tariq's conquests and his fate differ significantly from the Arab records. The Arab historical narrative highlights two key events: first, Tariq bin Ziyad's famous speech to his army, which we studied in schools. This eloquent speech, admired for its impact on soldiers, speaks of the eloquence of the Berber leader and his ability to motivate his troops by highlighting the dire situation they faced -- caught between the stormy sea and the enemy.

"However, the authenticity of this speech is debated. The beauty of its vocabulary and elegance of style makes it hard to believe that it was delivered by

a member of the Berber minority, who spoke Arabic only to a limited extent. This period saw Arab armies, led by Musa bin Nusayr and other Umayyad leaders, reaching North Africa from the East.

"Furthermore, there are no references to this epic speech in English translations of historical texts, leaving a lingering question about the truthfulness of what Arabs attributed to Tariq bin Ziyad's eloquence. The Berber soldiers, who formed the majority of his army, may not have fully grasped the speech's effectiveness or its meanings, casting doubt on the historical portrayal of Tariq's oratory skills.

"Another topic often attributed to Tariq bin Ziyad is his decision to burn the ships, so that his soldiers would realize they had no hope of returning by sea and that their only option for survival was victory. However, the truth is that the ships belonged to the ruler of Tangier, who was determined to return once his preparations were complete. He allowed Tariq, the commander who would bring Islam to the Spanish peninsula, to invade in order to eliminate the armies of his opponents.

"Tariq bin Ziyad's significance in Arab and Islamic history lies in his emergence as a leader who conquered the most challenging positions in southern Spain. Yet, after his glorious achievements, history records little about his life upon returning to North Africa.

"No books convey the facts about his life postfame. All that is documented are pages about Musa bin Nusayr's mistreatment of him, including insults, beatings, and his time in Damascus. History is silent on the details of his life in the Umayyad capital.

"Losing the name of Tariq bin Ziyad from our streets means losing a figure who still shines in Arab and Islamic history. Without his name, the street loses its permanent luster and the remembrance of his historical significance because the legacy of this great leader, who despite arousing jealousy and facing isolation instead of glory, remains an important chapter in history.

"We, the people of Surra, will miss the great hero Tariq bin Ziyad, who has been a part of our neighborhood for decades. It is said he was killed in Damascus in the palace of the jealous Caliph Suleiman bin Abdul Malik. Some accounts even suggest he lived as a beggar in the neighborhoods of Damascus before his death."

Also:

"A year or two ago, social media erupted with joy over the accusations against several prominent Kuwaiti figures for money laundering. The news spread widely and enthusiastically, especially since the accused included senior figures, some even from the ruling family. People on social media celebrated, viewing this as a victory for "public money" and a sign of the government's serious effort to protect it," columnist **Abdul Latif Al-Duaij** wrote for **Jarida** daily.

"However, money laundering is not solely a Kuwaiti issue; it is an international law imposed on us, which our government was compelled to adopt. We have little genuine interest in enforcing it, as it primarily aims to combat terrorism and protect Western countries from terrorist organizations. This suggests that our enthusiasm for the law's implementation, as seen on social media, may be misplaced.

"The money laundered by the accused was not Kuwaiti money, and although they violated the money laundering law and profited, they did not steal or misuse Kuwaiti funds. My point is to urge my enthusiastic brothers not to be overly zealous.

"The government and relevant institutions are not genuinely serious about defending public money, despite their declarations to protect it. The Malaysian Fund issue, as its name indicates, is an international matter, not a local one.

"The accused, in a way, served the country by investing the laundered money domestically and did not commit a crime against it. They broke the law, but they did not steal or harm public money, contrary to what some on Twitter might believe.

"Those who have plundered public money, or continue to do so, remain at large, continuing their embezzlement while government institutions tasked with oversight turn a blind eye. I am not defending the promotion of false corruption allegations, but I want to highlight that the Malaysian Fund the what is at the heart of the issue.

"Our institutions did not diligently investigate and apprehend public money thieves, as some might think. The Malaysian Fund is a case of money laundering, not theft, and addressing it serves Malaysia's interests and complies with an international law that has little to do with us.

"In short, looting and theft, if they exist, continue unabated, and the Malaysian Fund issue does not indicate a true commitment by our institutions to defend public money."

IDs issued to those whose nationalities have been revoked

KUWAIT CITY, July 1: The Central Agency for Illegal Residents announced, Sunday that it has begun issuing special cards for persons whose nationalities have been revoked, reports Al-Qabas daily.

Brigadier General Muhammad Al-Wahib, Director of the Status Adjustment Department at the agency, stated in a press release that these cards are being issued in compliance with Cabinet Resolution No. 296/2024.

This resolution mandates the Central Agency to coordinate with relevant government bodies to organize, amend,

and monitor the status of individuals whose Kuwaiti nationalities have been withdrawn.

Under this decision, the agency will provide a report to the Council of Ministers every three months detailing all actions taken in this regard.

Mol officer's 7-year jail upheld for assault leading to disability

Court sentences Al-Juwaihil to 28 months in prison

KUWAIT CITY, July 1: The Court of Cassation upheld the ruling on the seven-year imprisonment of an officer in the Ministry of Interior for beating a Bangladeshi man when the latter did not wash his car, causing quadriplegia to the victim.

The Public Prosecution charged the accused of hitting the victim, causing injuries that led to permanent disability estimated at 50 percent of the body's total capacity.

Earlier, the Criminal Court sentenced the accused to 10 years in prison. However, the accused denied the charges when he appeared in the Court of Appeals. His lawyer demanded for his acquittal, citing the inconclusive investigations and the victim's laxity in reporting the incident. The lawyer argued that the victim stumbled and fell on his own, and that he had an old injury, so he requested for the suspension of the implementation of the sentence.

The Court of Appeals, after refusing to release the accused, confirmed in the merits of its ruling that the evidence against the accused is correct, consistent and sound, including the testimony of witnesses, the victim, and the forensic medical report. It then ruled on the imprisonment of the accused for seven years with hard labor.

Al-Juwaihil 28 months in jail: The Court of Appeals has sentenced Mohammad Al-Juwaihil to two years and four months in prison with hard labor for insulting the tribes and violating the National Unity Law.

The Criminal Court had earlier ruled that the accused be imprisoned for three years with hard labor and fined him KD10,000 in the aforementioned case.

The accused denied the charges when he appeared in court, stressing that he did not insult any tribe, as he was referring to the Yemenis and Hou-

this outside the country.

Case files indicate Al-Juwaihil was arrested after the Public Prosecution issued an order to arrest him in response to the Interior Ministry's complaint that he undermined national unity.

Citizen's detention ordered: The Public Prosecution has ordered the detention of a citizen on charges of detaining a female citizen in ways other than those prescribed by law, torturing her, premeditated murder, violating the privacy of the deceased, and dealing and possessing narcotic substances with the intention of using them, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

The prosecution has started examining the body of the deceased and delegated the Criminal Evidence General Department at the Interior Ministry to take the necessary action.

It also interrogated the accused on the charges filed against him and investigations are still ongoing.

Citizen found murdered: A Kuwaiti citizen residing in the suburb of Rumaithiya area has been allegedly murdered by a compatriot, reports Al-Qabas daily quoting security sources.

The victim was reportedly working for the General Administration of Customs and without going into details of the incident, the daily said the suspect has been arrested.

The daily added, the investigations are ongoing to determine the motive behind the crime and to ascertain

Dr Al-Huwailah orders 'legal' action into child abuse video

KUWAIT CITY, July 1, (KUNA): Minister of Social Affairs, Family, Childhood, and Minister of Youth Dr. Amthal Al-Huwailah on Monday ordered an investigation to the Public Prosecutor regarding an incident related to child exploitation.

This came after a video circulating on social media showing a child - no more than ten years old - tied with ropes and compelled to pull a vehicle with his body, an act deemed as physical abuse, according to the statement.

Dr. Al-Huwailah directed the Supreme Council for Family Affairs to follow up the matter and take serious actions to protect children from violence, according to the law as she em-

abuse, protecting them from exploitation and raising awareness.

Under Article three of Law No. 21 of 2015, which outlined the rights of the child, every child is entitled to life, growth, and protection from all forms of violence, abuse, neglect and exploitation, the statement added.

It further noted that Article 6, Paragraph 3 of the same law underscored the state's obligation to provide a safe and healthy environment for children, actively combating practices detrimental to their well-being.

Psychological abuse, as defined in Article 71, includes any harmful behavior imposed on a child that exceeds their capabilities or forces them into self-destructive actions.

According to the source, the victim's body showed clear signs of beating and torture. An investigation is underway to uncover the causes of the crime.

The source confirmed that the Criminal Security Sector, under the leadership of Undersecretary Hamed Al-Dawas, with direct follow-up from First Deputy Prime Minister, Minister of Interior, and Minister of Defense Sheikh Fahd Al-Yousef, arrested the suspect in record time and is thoroughly investigating all aspects of the case.

Motorist jailed for 2 months: In a deterrent ruling for reckless motorists, the Traffic Court, headed by Judge Rashid Al-Tawhid, sentenced a citizen to two months in prison and suspended his driving license for one year for speeding, reckless reversing and causing a traffic accident.

The court stated in the merits of its ruling that the accused is convicted of speeding, driving negligently and recklessly, entering the opposite lane and causing an accident.

"Ensuring the safety of all members of society is a higher and more appropriate goal that goes beyond the moments of recklessness of drivers who tamper with public safety.

Hence, the judiciary has the right to

punish people like them. Consistent punishment brings about reform and serves as a deterrent for those who ignore the law," the court explained.

Move to hike traffic fines: The Min-

istry of Interior is currently advancing

a new traffic law aimed at increasing

fines for various traffic violations. This initiative follows studies indicating that such violations significantly contribute to rising rates of traffic accidents, reports Al-Anba daily.

The objective is not to impose financial burdens on citizens or residents but rather to foster safer roads and reduce fatalities and injuries resulting from accidents.

A security source emphasized that people often comply strictly with traffic regulations in other countries, including Gulf states, due to the high fines imposed there. Many admit to adhering to rules like wearing seat belts and avoiding phone use while driving simply because of the deterrent effect of hefty fines.

Highlighting the inadequacy of cur-

rent penalties in deterring violations, the source pointed out that fines introduced in the 1970s, such as 50 dinars for running a red traffic light, once represented a substantial portion of salaries but now constitute a mere fraction.

This disparity underscores the need

for updated penalties that align with current income levels, thereby promoting discipline and enhancing deterrence.

Worker electrocuted, dies: An unidentified worker died from electrocution after inadvertently coming into contact with an exposed electrical wire while performing electrical connections inside a Kuwaiti citizen's home in the Al-Mutlaa area, reports Al-Anba daily.

According to a security source, the incident occurred during routine work. The contractor who employed the worker stated uncertainty regarding the worker's nationality.

MoCl shuts down violating factories


KUWAIT CITY, July 1: The Public Authority for Industry has disclosed that several factories are currently non-operational, with some having pulled down shutters and failed to renew the licenses, reports Al-Jarida daily.

According to informed sources these factories have been found in violation of various regulations, including failure to conduct business activities, absence of manufacturing equipment in certain cases, and instances of complete closure.

In a related development, the MoCI has taken action by closing 11 establishments due to multiple infractions, primarily related to plot closures.

Additionally, warnings were issued to 8 others for similar violations. Among the most significant breaches observed were factories engaging in the production of aluminum doors and windows and blacksmithing without proper industrial licenses, along with aluminum and glass cutting workshops operating without the necessary permits.

The ministry has granted these non-compliant entities a grace period to rectify their status. However, if corrective actions are not taken within one month from the closure date, stricter measures will be enforced.

She underlined the importance of properly utilizing AI tools to benefit users in fields such as health, education, and environment.

Al-Dhafiri echoed the call of IPHRC Chairman Ambassador Talal Al-Mutairi, for extraordinary measures to bridge digital gaps and foster innovation, including creating a comprehensive global regulatory framework and unifying efforts to advance a free, open, and secure digital future centered on human rights.

Kuwait has kept pace with technological and digital advancements by establishing specialized bodies like the Communications and Information Technology Regulatory Authority (CITRA), Central Agency for Information Technology (CAIT), and National Cyber Security Center (NCSC), she explained.

Kuwait has made significant strides in AI, being a global leader in developing the communications and information technology sector for two consecutive years, with internet usage reaching 99.7 percent of the population, she said.

Moreover, the committee will conduct further study on a submission from the Mukhtar of the Cordoba District regarding mobile vehicles in the Qortuba Main Park parking lots.

Furthermore, the committee retained on its agenda a proposal by Dr. Hassan Kamal concerning the design and construction of longitudinal parking lots for the Dasma Association branch in Block 5.

MoSA to hold series of training courses

KUWAIT CITY, July 1: The Ministry of Social Affairs, through the Department of Charitable Societies and Foundations and in collaboration with local banks, will hold a series of training courses and several awareness lectures targeting the employees of the Ministry and those working for well-known charity organizations in the country, reports Al-Jarida daily.

PAFN unveils 15 recommendations to secure Kuwait's food systems

KUWAIT CITY, July 1: The fourth forum of the Public Authority for Food and Nutrition (PAFN) entitled, "Let us Work Together to Sustain Food Systems in Kuwait," resulted in 15 recommendations to guarantee food security in the country

The most important recommendations include training nationals to be professionals in the fields of food and agricultural security, animal production, and food technology; developing the infrastructure for food stores; generating jobs in the field of water efficiency; rationalizing water consumption in manufacturing and agricultural sectors; and raising awareness on the optimal use of these resources.


Representative of the organizing committee of the forum Eng. Saud Al-Gharib informed the newspaper on the sidelines of the inauguration of the forum at Kuwait Institute for Medical Specializations under the patronage of PAFN Director Dr. Reem Al-Fulaij that "the forum aims to develop food systems to be compatible with the needs of current and future generations in order to preserve the economic and environmental systems, and contribute to providing healthy and safe foods by discussing the most important challenges and solutions in this regard."

He affirmed the participation of various ministries, government agencies and related sectors, such as public benefit societies, private companies, and individuals as well. He said about 120 people interested in this sector participated in the discussion sessions during the forum.

He revealed that two dialogue sessions were organized; the first focused on most important problems and obstacles to the sustainability of food systems, and the second on the solutions and opportunities for the sustainability of food systems.

He pointed out that the difficulty of marketing the local product is one of the most important obstacles to the sustainability of food systems in the country, in addition to the delay in some procedures regarding imports and lack of awareness on managing food loss and waste.

He added Kuwait depends on 90 percent of food imports and a large percentage of these imports are wasted due to the lack of food loss and waste management, which aims to raise public awareness on food waste management. He also stressed the importance of establishing a college of agriculture to develop the agricultural sector and mitigate environmental risks.

KM approves transfer of Al-Shaqaya renewable energy complex to MEW

KUWAIT CITY, July 1: The Kuwait Municipality has approved a request from the Ministry of Electricity, Water, and Renewable Energy's to transfer dependency of the Al-Shaqaya Renewable Energy Complex from the Kuwait Institute for Scientific Research, located in the Al-Shiqaya area north of Al-Salmi Road, to the Ministry itself, reports Al-Jarida daily.

According to Saud Al-Dabbous, Director of Technical Opinion at the Kuwait Municipality, the municipality has endorsed cadastral plan No. "M/39118", originally allocated to KISR under Municipal Council Resolution No. "MBL C 2012/08/111/2" dated April 16, 2021, and Municipal Council Resolution No. "MB/1/G2017/1" dated February 20, 2017.

This approval includes transferring approximately 79.8 km2 of land to the Ministry of Electricity and Renewable Energy, while allowing the Kuwait Institute for Scientific Research to retain approximately 7.7 km2 of the site as indicated in the plan.

Deteriorating living conditions

Residents of Al-Mutlaa plead for immediate government attention

KUWAIT CITY, July 1: More than thirty families in Al-Mutlaa city have decided to leave due to severe deficiencies in essential services, particularly the chronic water shortage despite scorching summer conditions.

The concerned citizens have expressed their dismay over the deteriorating living conditions in Al-Mutlaa, causing potential new residents to reconsider moving there until infrastructure and basic services are improved, especially the continuous supply of water through functional pipelines and pumps operating round the clock.

Residents lament that "Al-Mutlaa is suffering from thirst," as water supplied by tankers has become scarce. They have appealed directly to Prime Minister Sheikh Ahmed Al-Abdullah to personally look into their plight and alleviate their suffering. One of the residents, reflecting his year-long residency in Al-Mutlaa, described the city's decline due to water scarcity and other challenges, making it increasingly unappealing for residents.

He emphasized how easy access to water had reversed dramatically after pump shutdowns, forcing dependence on a single overburdened pump shared with nearby areas, particularly Jahra. This has led to exorbitant tanker costs and severe disruptions in daily life, including difficulty in performing essential tasks like ablutions for prayer.

He and others have called on officials from the Ministry of Electricity and Water to urgently address the situation by either completing the water network or installing addition-

They stressed that the current conditions in Al-Mutlaa are untenable, pushing many families to leave their homes and seek refuge elsewhere due to the worsening quality of life and inadequate public services.

In addition to water issues, residents like Mubarak Al-Anqoudi cited concerns about security due to inadequate lighting and safety measures, describing the city as increasingly resembling a ghost town. He highlighted the presence of illegal workers posing risks to residents, alongside deteriorating infrastructure and public cleanliness.

Abdulaziz Al-Hassan echoed these sentiments, expressing disappointment over broken promises of improved infrastructure and basic services, which have failed to materialize despite assurances.

He emphasized the urgent need for governmental intervention to address the mounting challenges facing Al-Mutlaa, including suspending rent allowances and credit bank installments to alleviate financial burdens on residents unable to complete their homes due to lacking ser-

Overall, the residents of Al-Mutlaa are pleading for immediate government attention to prevent further abandonment of the city and restore essential services essential for a decent quality of life.

Also, present were Assistant Undersecretary for the Special Security Sector Major General Abdullah Saffah, senior security leaders, security directors and their assistants. They laid down a plan for each governorate before launching the campaign in the early hours of the morning on Monday, including the establishment of checkpoints along the public and internal roads to verify the residency documents of people. The Public Security, Rescue, Traffic and Special Forces patrols participated in the campaign.

The ministry added that it is continuing its inspection campaigns in all governorates, calling on everyone to refrain from harboring violators in order to avoid legal problems and to cooperate with police officers in reporting violators through the emergency number 112.

Moreover, Sheikh Fahad Al-Yousuf and Sheikh Salem Al-Nawaf issued directives to deal well with everyone during security campaigns, and to take into account the humanitarian aspect when arresting and deporting violators.

The following will be deported immediately:

■ Those with expired residency, ■ Those with absconding cases,

■ Those working for other sponsors even if their residency is valid, because they violated the Labor Law.

In addition, Farwaniya Governorate recorded the highest number of violators arrested on the first day of the campaign -- more than 150 expatriates with absconding cases.

It has been noted that the number of those arrested with absconding cases is higher than those with expired residency. The sponsor is absolved of responsibility for the violating expatriate in an absconding case, while he bears the cost of the ticket of the violating worker in other cases.

Le Pen party leads in 1st round of poll

PARIS, July 1, (AP): France's National Rally surged into the lead in the first round of legislative elections, according to results released early Monday, bringing the far-right party to the brink of power and dealing a major blow to President Emmanuel Macron's centrists in an election that could set the country, and Europe, on a starkly different course

The results confirmed polling that showed the party - with a history of racism and xenophobia and once shunned by the mainstream - is no longer taboo, confined to the fringes of French politics. There remains another torrid week of campaigning before the decisive final voting Sunday, and whether the National



Rally will be able to win an outright majority and form France's first far-right government since World War II remains uncertain.

Marked by high turnout of nearly 68% that reflected the high stakes, voters handed the Marine Le Pen's National Rally a strong lead, with about 33% of the vote. The number includes the votes from a group of conservative candidates of

The Republicans party who had allied with the far-right party in the first round. The New Popular Front, a leftist alliance, finished second with about 28%. The president's centrist group came third with around 20%, according to figures released by the Interior Ministry.

When Macron dissolved the National Assembly on June 9, after a stinging defeat at the hands of the National Rally in French voting for the European Parliament, the deeply unpopular and weakened president gambled that his rivals wouldn't repeat that success when the country's own fate was in the balance.

Efforts

He and his allies, as well as politicians on the left, are still hoping they can head off an outright win by the National Rally, and horse-trading began Monday, with some efforts to block far-right candidates taking shape. The leftist coalition said it would withdraw its candidates in districts where they arrived in third position in order to support other politicians opposed to the far right. Macron's centrist alliance also said some of its candidates would step down before the runoff.

In Sunday's voting, 78 of the National Assembly's 577 seats were won outright, by candidates who got more than 50% of the vote in their district, according to French newspaper Liberation's analysis of the Interior Ministry data. Of those, 38 were from the Na-

tional Rally, including Le Pen herself.

That triumph provided an additional boost for the far-right parties in Europe as Viktor Orbán's Hungary takes over the European Union's rotating presidency for six months.

To underline her party's triumph, Le Pen said that National Rally lawmakers would meet at the parliament on Monday and symbolically claim their seats.

Addressing a jubilant crowd waving French tricolor flags of blue, white and red, Le Pen called on her supporters and voters who didn't back her party in the first round to push it over the line and give it a commanding legislative majority. That scenario would make the party's young leader, Jordan Bardella, prime minister - and force him and and Macron into an awkward power-sharing arrangement.

THE HAGUE, Netherlands: Long-serving Dutch Prime Minister Mark Rutte urged his country to support Ukraine and international cooperation in his final address to his compatriots Sunday, as an inwardlooking new government is set to take over the Netherlands in two days.

"It is crucial that our country is embedded in the European Union and NATO. Together we are stronger than alone. Especially now," the 57-year-old Rutte said from his office in The Hague.

After leading the country for 14 years, he will take his experience with consensus-building to Brussels, where he will take over as NATO's new secretarygeneral later this year.

He stressed the need to continue support for Ukraine, "for peace there and security here." The new government, expected to take office on Tuesday, has pledged to maintain assistance. But far-right populist Geert Wilders, whose party won the largest block of seats in last year's election, has expressed pro-Russia views and Kremlin backers cheered his victory at the

Rutte described the MH17 tragedy in 2014 as "perhaps the most drastic and emotional event" during his tenure. The passenger jet was shot down over eastern Ukraine as it traveled from Amsterdam to Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, killing all 298 passengers and crew, including 196 Dutch citizens.

A Dutch court convicted two Russians and a pro-Moscow Ukrainian in 2022 of involvement in the downing of the Boeing 777.

Known for cycling to meetings and his dedication to politics, Rutte highlighted his country's positive at-

He acknowledged that there had been low points during his tenure, including a child benefits scandal that wrongly labeled thousands of parents as fraud-

SOFIA, Bulgaria: Bulgarian President **Rumen** Radev on Monday tapped the largest group in parliament, the center-right GERB-UDF coalition, to form the country's new government.

Accepting the mandate, Prime Minister-designate Rosen Zhelyazkov presented a proposal for a Cabinet and asked the president to send it to parliament for

The 56-year-old lawyer and former parliament speaker, who has served in different ministerial positions in previous governments, said that the new Cabinet was "a team of experts and seasoned politicians from GERB". He outlined stabilizing of public finances as a priority and stressed the need for continuity in Bulgaria's European perspective.

The GERB-UDF coalition finished first in the June elections but only has 68 legislators in the 240-seat National Assembly. The coalition picked Zhelyazkov to head a new government over its leader, Boyko Borissov, who led three governments between 2009 and 2021, when his third Cabinet resigned following major anti-corruption protests.

Trying to find coalition partners in the fragmented legislature, Borissov said immediately after the vote that he didn't want to be prime minister and invited his political opponents for talks.

Firefighters tackle blazes on Greek islands of Chios, Kos as PM warns of 'dangerous summer'

Firefighters were racing to tackle wildfires that broke out on the eastern Aegean islands of Chios and Kos Monday, as Greece's prime minister warned of a dangerous summer ahead and said the public's help was essential in limiting the impact of wildfires. Emergency services issued evacuation orders

for those in the Metohi area of western Chios, urg-

ing them to head to a nearby beach. Further to the south in the Aegean, on the island of Kos, the fire department said 20 firefighters, a helicopter and volunteers were tackling a brush fire that broke out in the center of the island.

The blazes come a day after the fire department managed to tame two large forest fires near Athens

that had been fanned by strong winds.

"We have had an exceptionally difficult June regarding weather conditions, with high levels of drought and unusually strong winds for this season," Prime Minis-ter Kyriakos Mitsotakis said Monday during a Cabinet meeting. This year's summer, he said, "is predicted to be particularly dangerous" for wildfires. (AP)

Virginia gym shooting kills 2: Two people are dead after a shooting at a gym in Virginia, according to police.

Officers responded to the shooting at OneLife Fitness, a gym and health club in southwest Alexandria, at about 4 p.m. on Saturday, according to the Alexandria Police Department. Two people, including the alleged shooter, initially had life-threatening injuries and were taken to the hospital, police said.

Both the male victim and the accused shooter were pronounced dead by police Saturday night. OneLife Fitness said neither man was an employee of the gym.

At the time of the shooting, about 60 people were inside and fled through the building's front and back exits, according to local news outlets.

"We are deeply saddened by the tragic events that occurred on Saturday at our Alexandria location. Our thoughts and prayers go out to the families of the people involved," OneLife Fitness said in a statement. (AP)

Biden's family tells him to stay in race

WASHINGTON, July 1, (AP): US President Joe Biden's family used a Sunday gathering at Camp David to urge him to stay in the race and keep fighting despite his dreadful debate performance, and some members criticized how his staff prepared him for the faceoff, according to four people familiar with the discussions.

Biden spent the day seg with first lady Jill Biden, his children and grandchildren. It was a previously scheduled trip to the presidential retreat in Maryland for a photo shoot with Annie Leibovitz for the upcoming Democratic National Con-

But the gathering was also an exercise in trying to figure out how to quell Democratic anxiety that has exploded following Thursday's performance.

While his family was aware of how poorly he performed against Donald Trump, they also continue to think he's the best person to beat the Republican presumptive nominee. They also believe he is capable of doing the job of president for another four years, according to the people who were not authorized to speak publicly about internal discussions and spoke to The Associated Press on condition of ano-

a problem leading for the next four vears," said one close ally. Democratic Rep. James Clyburn of South Carolina. "Joe Biden should continue to run on his record."

Sen. Raphael Warnock, a Georgia Democrat and Baptist minister, said there had been "more than a few Sundays when I wish I had preached a better sermon," relating the experience to Biden's debate performance.

"But after the sermon was over, it

was my job to embody the message, to show up for the people that I serve. And that's what Joe Biden has been doing his entire life," Warnock said. It was an echo of the message from other supporters that Biden had a bad debate, but a lifetime of good govern-

COLUMBIA, SC: When Tim Scott was a teenager, a Chick-fil-A manager named John Moniz offered him a sandwich, a job, and four years of indispensable mentoring about how to be a businessman and a citizen. Mauritania's prez 'wins' re-election

NOUAKCHOTT, Mauritania, July 1, (AP): Mauritania's President Mohamed Ould Ghazouani will be re-elected, provisional results from all polling stations showed on Sunday, after positioning the country as a strategic ally of the West in a region swept by coups

Ghazouani, who campaigned on a pledge of providing security and economic growth, obtained 56.1% of votes, the country's independent electoral commission said late on Saturday. His main rival, anti-slavery activist Biram Dah Abeid, received 22.1% of votes, but earlier on Sunday rejected the results, alleging fraud.

The country's constitutional court is now expected to review the results to announce the final outcome of the election, but it remained unclear when it would happen.

The turnout was 54% of the two million eligible voters, the commission said.

Although his opponents accused him of corruption and mismanagement, Ghazouani, a former army chief, remains popular among Mauritanians who see him as a beacon of stability. The vote is taking place in a tense regional climate, with Mauritania's neighbors shaken by military coups and

jihadi violence. Mauritania is rich in natural resources including iron ore, copper, zinc, phosphate, gold, oil and natural gas. It is poised to become a gas producer by the end of the year, with the planned launch of the BP-operated Greater Tortue Ahmeyin offshore gas project on

Yet almost 60% of the population lives in poverty, according to the United Nations, working as farmers or employed informally. With few economic opportunities for young people at home, many are attempting to reach Europe, and some are even trying to get to the United States through Mexico.

"The last word belongs to the Mauritanian voters," Ghazouni said after voting in Ksar, a suburb of the capital. "I commit myself to respecting their choice." Saturday's vote unfolded peacefully, according to observers.

"Nothing has been detected so far and the CENI has not received any complaints," said Taghioullah Ledhem, the spokesman for CENI, the country's independent electoral commission.

But some opposition candidates held a different view. CENI is made up of representatives of political parties and its president is appointed by the government, and some accused it of colliding with Ghazouani's regime. Biram Dah, who came second in the vote, rejected the provisional results and warned of an "electoral coup d'état for the benefit of Ghazouani, who was defeated by voters."

During a press conference Sunday morning, he accused the electoral commission of fraud by giving Ghazouni thousands of votes "out of nowhere.

Speaking later on Sunday from his home in Riadh, a poor suburb of the Mauritanian capital, he called for civil disobedience and appealed to the military and security forces to not "accept being used by the government against the people." "The battle is not over, we are not defeated," he said. "The people are not defeated and will not be defeated, we are there to defend the people until the last drop of blood.'

The African Union sent an observation mission to Saturday's vote but have yet to release their statement.

CAPE TOWN, South Africa: South African President Cyril Ramaphosa named a new Cabinet late Sunday night after his African National Congress, the former main opposition party, and nine other parties agreed on the makeup of a coalition government following weeks of haggling.

Ramaphosa's party retained the largest share of ministerial positions as he appointed ANC officials to 20 of the 32 Cabinet minister roles in the new coalition. But there were six ministers from the Democratic Alliance, once the main opposition and the fiercest critic of the ANC, and Ramaphosa shared out the remaining ministerial posts among some of the smaller parties.

Ramaphosa's announcement of his new, multiparty Cabinet came a month after the ANC lost its 30-year political dominance of Africa's most industrialized country in a national election, forcing it to seek coalition partners. The ANC's share of the vote slumped to 40% in the May 29 vote and it lost its parliamentary majority for the first time since it came to power at the end of the apartheid system of white minority rule in 1994.

The DA won the second largest share of the vote with 21%. Others have also joined what the ANC called a government of national unity that is open to any of the 18 parties represented in Parliament. Some have refused to take part.

The power-sharing coalition is unprecedented for South Africa. The country briefly had a coalition government at the end of apartheid, but that was under different circumstances. The ANC held a clear majority then after the first all-race election, but new President Nelson Mandela invited others into his government in an act of reconciliation.

ALGIERS, Algeria: Algerian authorities arrested two journalists for publishing a video showing businesswomen protesting how they were treated at a government-sponsored event.

Journalists in Algeria have faced mounting repression since President Abdelmadjid Tebboune came to power four years ago, with possible long jail time on flimsy charges, experts say. Many news outlets have also shuttered due to mounting legal fees.

Sofiane Ghirous and Ferhat Omar of the news website "Algerie Scoop" were detained last week for broadcasting material authorities claimed "constituted incitement and hate speech," according to a statement from the National Committee for the Liberation of Detainees, a local watchdog group, on Saturday.

In the video, women start-up founders accused the government of "humiliating" and treating them with contempt" at an innovation event organized by the Ministry of Education and Professional Training.

Ghirous is the editor-in-chief of Algerie Scoop - accredited by the government in 2021- and Omar is the website's director.

The press freedom group Reporters Without Borders has recently downranked Algeria on its freedom of expression index to 139th out of 180 in 2024 while decrying the country's "pressure on independent media and threats to arrest journalists.'

'Arce orchestrated self-coup': Former Bolivian president Evo Morales on Sunday accused his political ally-turnedrival President Luis Arce of deceiving Bolivians by staging a "self-coup" last week to earn political points among the electorate, marking a sharp downturn in an already fraught relationship.

Morales was initially among the country's most powerful voices to say the approximately 200 members of the military who marched on Bolivia's government palace alongside armored vehicles Wednesday had attempted a "coup d'état." He called for "all those involved in this riot to be arrested and tried." But on Sunday, Morales joined others who contend Arce himself orchestrated the incident in an attempt to win the sympathy of Bolivians at a time when his popularity is extremely low.

Arce "disrespected the truth, deceived us, lied, not only to the Bolivian people but to the whole world," Morales said in a local broadcast program Sunday. Morales also called for an independent investigation into the military action in a post on X.

Morales is throwing his support behind an accusation made by former Gen Juan José Zuñiga, who allegedly led the coup attempt. Morales said Zuñiga had informed colleagues and family of his plan beforehand and while in custody had told authorities that Arce had "betrayed" him. "The president told me: 'The situation is

very screwed up, very critical. It is necessary to prepare something to raise my popularity'," Zúñiga quoted Arce as saying.

That theory was quickly adopted by Arce's political enemies, who dubbed it a "self-coup." (AP)

North Koreans are required to wear pins over their hearts which for decades bore images of either the country's founder, Kim Il Sung, or his son Kim Jong II, or both. The existence of pins dedicated to Kim Jong Un had not been verified until state media published photos on Sunday showing officials wearing his pins at a ruling

The pins are part of a state-sponsored mythology surrounding the Kim family which treats Kim Il Sung and Kim Jong Il like heroes. MELBOURNE, Australia: Australia appointed Sam Mostyn on Monday as only its second woman governorgeneral, a largely ceremonial role representing the British monarch who is the nation's head of state.

It is the first such Australian appointment since the reign of **King Charles III** began in 2022 and the first by Prime Minister Anthony Albanese's center-left Labor Party government that wants to replace the British monarch with an Australian president as head of state.

The businesswoman and gender equality advocate, who in 2005 became the first woman Australian Football League Commissioner, was sworn in as Australia's 28th governor-general since 1901.

In her first speech in her new role, Mostyn quoted Australia's first woman governor-general Quentin Bryce, who described her role in 2013 as "striking a balance between observing traditions and protocol and being thoroughly contemporary."

"I will be an optimistic, modern and visible governor-general, committed to the service and contribution that all Australians expect and deserve from the holder of this of-

'Jail attorneys and officials': A judge in Ecuador on Sunday ordered that more than a dozen suspects including judges, attorneys and government officials be held in jail while authorities investigate judicial rul-

ings that allegedly favored criminals. The suspects were arrested Saturday following operations launched across Ecuador, with 14 of them ordered held. House arrest was ordered for two elderly suspects and a ban on leaving the country was issued for a pregnant woman. The judge also ordered that the suspects' bank accounts be frozen.

The suspects join 14 other defendants already linked to a case dubbed "Plague" as prosecutors investigate what they say is an illegal network that sold favorable sentences, prison releases and other favors to members of organized crime groups.

During a hearing that began Saturday afternoon and lasted until Sunday morning, the prosecution alleged that in exchange for \$70,000, one judge granted freedom to a collaborator of Fabricio Colón Pico, leader of Los Lobos, considered one of the largest drug trafficking organizations in the Andean country. (AP)

The Premier Market Index also dropped by 0.43%, or 32.61 points, ending at 7543.64 points. Liquidity was 28.2 million dinars, with 88.8 million shares traded through 5,982 transactions.

The Main Market Index declined by 0.44%, or 26.17 points, to 5912.40 points. Liquidity reached 9 million dinars, with 52.5 million shares traded in 3,430 transactions.

The day started positively with increased activity in the IFA bloc, particularly Kuwait Real Estate and IFA shares, which saw rising prices. Agility, Joint Stock Company, and Human Soft also contributed positively.

KUWAIT CITY: The recent period has seen many companies listed on the Boursa Kuwait opt to increase their capital through the sale of priority rights shares, reports Al-Jarida daily.

These rights, acquired by shareholders registered in the company's records on the day of the extraordinary general assembly, gove shareholders the opportunity to subscribe to new shares when a capital increase is approved, entitling them to subscribe to new shares at the offering price.

Fifteen companies have utilized this process since its approval, with notable participation in 2021 by Jazeera Airways, Gulf Insurance Group, Kuwait Projects, Burgan Bank, and Warba Bank. In 2022, National Industries Group, Boubiyan Bank, and National Consumer Holding Company followed suit. The trend accelerated in 2023 and 2024, with six companies raising their capital through subscription to priority shares, totaling an increase of 150.15 million dinars.

The National Bank of Kuwait led in 2023 with a capital increase from 187.4 million to 237.4 million dinars, followed by Kuwait International Bank and Gulf Bank.

In 2024, Arabi Holding Group's prospectus was approved by the Capital Markets Authority for a 50% increase in capital, primarily aimed at financing expansion plans, investments, and settling financial obligations, notably loans burdened with high interest rates.

Shareholders have options with priority rights, including selling, relinquishing, or subscribing to them. Selling rights forfeits the subscription privilege, transferring it to the buyer. This flexibility allows shareholders to participate or monetize their rights effectively. The companies resorting to this method typically enhance their financial position and attractiveness to investors, especially in sectors like banking, operations, and services, known for robust demand in subscription offerings.

Kuwait Benchmarks Fall in June 2024, Premier Index Down 1.8%

GCC index sees first monthly gain in June after three months of decline

A fter three consecutive months of decline, the GCC index monthly performance witnessed its first monthly gain during June-2024 amid mixed market performance in the region. A similar trend was seen in key global benchmarks mainly reflecting mixed messaging coming on the global inflation front. Nevertheless, the latest economic data from the US indicated growth possibility of

rate cut in the near term. The MSCI GCC index was up by 3.4% during the month mainly led by strong gains in Qatar and Abu Dhabi benchmarks further supported by low-single-digit gains in Saudi and Dubai benchmarks. Gains in Qatar came as a relief rally after the index witnessed consecutive declines over the last few months and was the worst performing market in the GCC with double digit declines. The gains of 7.0% during June-2024 lowered these declines YTD to 8.0%, still the biggest drop in the GCC. These monthly gains were partially offset by declines seen in the remaining markets, i.e. Oman, Kuwait and Bahrain. The 1H-2024 performance of the MSCI GCC index showed a relatively smaller decline of 5.1% reflecting equivalent gains and declines in individual markets. Oman, Bahrain and Kuwait continued to remain in the green during 1H-2024, albeit with low-single digit gains.

On the sector front, the Insurance index showed double-digit monthly gain of 10.6% during June-2024 followed by Healthcare and F&B indices with gains of 8.0% and 5.9%, respectively. Large-cap sectors like Banks and Telecom showed relatively smaller gains of 4.6% and 3.3%, respectively. On the decliner's side, the Utilities index topped with a decline of 4.8% followed by Materials and Consumer Durables indices with declines of 1.8% and 0.7%, respectively. The Energy index also showed marginal decline of 0.6%.

Boursa Kuwait

Kuwaiti benchmarks receded during June-2024 following a broad-based decline that affected most sectors on the exchange. In terms of market segments, the Premier Market Index witnessed the biggest monthly decline of 1.8% as the performance of constituent stocks in the index were skewed downwards. The Main Market Index and the Main 50 Index reported relatively smaller monthly declines of 0.8%, and 0.5%, respectively, while the All Share Market Index receded 1.6% during the month. The performance





during 1H-2024 also reflected relatively better performance of Main Market stocks with a gain of 6.2% while the Main 50 Index and All Share Market Index showed smaller gains of 5.0% and 1.8%, respectively. The Premier Market Index witnessed a gain of 0.9% during 1H-2024. In the primary market, the month saw Beyout Investment Group added to the Financial Services sector marking the first listing on the exchange in over two years and as a constituent of the Premier Market index bringing the total number of companies listed in the index to 34.

The sector performance chart also highlighted the broad-based decline in the market during the month with merely three sector witnessing gains. The gainer's side was topped by the Industrials index with a gain of 4.2% followed by Utilities and Insurance sectors with gains of 0.6% and 0.4%, respectively. On the other hand, the Basic Materials index witnessed the steepest decline of 10.1%, followed by the Technology and Consumer Staples indices with declines of 6.8% and 6.0%, respectively.

In the Basic Materials sector, shares of Kuwait foundry and Boubyan Petrochemicals declined by 20.1% and 11.1%, respectively. The Consumer Staples Sector was dragged down by a decline in the shares of Mezzan Holding which was down by 6.5%. The decline in the Technology sector was led by the fall in the shares of its sole constituent Automated Systems Co. Large-cap indices like Banking declined after shares of most banks dropped indicating seasonal weakness and profit booking on elevated prices. In the Telecom sector, most of the constituent stocks declined with shares of STC Kuwait fell 7.7%. Canada's second largest airline, WestJet, has reached a deal with its mechanics to end a strike that had disrupted the travel plans of tens of thousands of passengers over the Canada Day long week-

WestJet said late Sunday there will still be flight disruptions in the week ahead as its planes are brought back into service.

In its own news release, the Airplane Mechanics Fraternal Association urged its members to return to work immediately pending a

vote on the temporary agreement. Some 680 workers, whose daily inspections and repairs are es sential to airline operations, had walked off the job on Friday evening despite a directive for binding arbitration from the labor minister.

Since Thursday, WestJet has canceled 829 flights scheduled between then and Monday in the busiest travel weekend of the season in Canada.

The vast majority of Sunday's

trips were called off as WestJet pared down its 180-plane fleet to 32 active aircraft and topped the global list for cancellations among

major airlines over the weekend.

"The damage to Canadians and our airline is massive, a swift resoution was necessary; we take no victory laps on this outcome but will sleep better tonight knowing further harm has been prevented," Diederik Pen, President of WestJet Airlines and Group Chief Operating Officer, said in a statement. (AP)

EU accuses FB owner Meta of breaking digital rules with paid ad-free option

LONDON, July 1, (AP): European Union regulators accused social media company Meta Platforms on Monday of breaching the bloc's new digital competition rulebook by forcing Facebook and Instagram users to choose between seeing ads or paying to avoid them.

Meta has been giving European users the option since November of paying for ad-free versions of Facebook and Instagram as a way to comply with the continent's strict data privacy rules.

Desktop browser users can pay about 10 euros (\$10.50) a month while iOS or Android users will pay roughly 13 euros to avoid being targeted by ads based on their personal

The U.S. tech giant rolled out the subscription option after the European Union's top court ruled that under strict EU data privacy rules, Meta must first get consent before show-

ing ads to users. The European Commission, the EU's executive arm, said preliminary findings of its investigation show that Meta's "pay or consent" advertising model was in breach of the 27-nation bloc's Digital Markets

The commission said Meta's model doesn't allow users to exercise their right to "freely consent" to allowing their personal data to be used to target them with online ads.

The commission had opened its

investigation shortly after the rulebook, also known as the DMA, took effect in March. It's a sweeping set of regulations aimed at preventing tech "gatekeepers" from cornering digital markets under threat of heavy financial penalties.

"The DMA is there to give back to the users the power to decide how their data is used and ensure innovative companies can compete on equal footing with tech giants on data access," European Commisdata access," sioner Thierry Breton, who oversees the bloc's digital policy, said in a statement.

Meta now has a chance to respond to the commission, which must wrap up its investigation by March 2025. The company could face fines worth 10% of its annual global revenues, which could run into the billions of

"Subscription for no ads follows the direction of the highest court in Europe and complies with the DMA," Meta said in a statement. "We look forward to further constructive dialogue with the European Commission to bring this investigation to a close.

Under the Digital Markets Act, Meta is classed as one of seven online gatekeepers while Facebook, Instagram and its ad business are among about two dozen "core platform services" that need the highest level of scrutiny.

But while sentiment was positive, the level of confidence among purchasing managers fell to the lowest in over four-anda-half years due to worries over intense competition and uncertain market conditions, Caixin

The surveys offered scant insight into whether various measures to boost the property sector, such as cutting mortgage interest rates and down payments, have had much impact on an industrywide slump that followed a crackdown on excessive borrowing by developers.

"The PMIs for June were mixed but on balance suggest that the recovery lost some momentum last month," Capital Economics said in a report.

The official PMI reading for high-tech manufacturing rose to 52.3 in June from 50.7 in May, reflecting the government's drive to boost investment in upgrading factories and equipment in new industries such as computer chip and electric vehicles.

"This shows that the transformation and upgrading of China's manufacturing industry has continued to advance," Zhao was quoted as saying.

Under pressure on plane safety, Boeing buying stressed supplier Spirit for \$4.7b

ARLINGTON, Va., July 1, (AP): Boeing announced plans to acquire key supplier Spirit AeroSystems for \$4.7 billion, a move that it says will improve plane quality and safety amid increasing scrutiny by Congress, airlines

and the Department of Justice. Boeing previously owned Spirit, and the purchase would reverse a longtime Boeing strategy of outsourcing key work on its passenger planes. That approach has been criticized as problems at Spirit disrupted production and delivery of popular Boeing jetliners including 737s and 787s.

"We believe this deal is in the best interest of the flying public, our airline customers, the employees of Spirit and Boeing, our shareholders and the country more broadly," Boeing President and CEO Dave Calhoun said in a statement late Sunday.

Concerns about safety came to a head after the Jan. 5 blowout of a panel on an Alaska Airlines 737 Max 9 at 16,000 feet (4,876 meters) over Oregon. The Federal Aviation Administration soon after announced increased oversight of Boeing and Spirit, which supplied the fuselage for the plane.

No one was seriously injured in the Alaska Airlines door incident, which terrified passengers, but Boeing is under pressure from the U.S. Justice Department to plead guilty to criminal fraud in connection with two deadly plane crashes involving its 737 Max jetliners more than five years ago.

Boeing has until the end of the week to accept or reject the offer, which includes the giant aerospace company agreeing to an independent monitor who would oversee its compliance with anti-fraud laws, according to several people who heard federal prosecutors detail a proposed offer Sunday.

The Justice Department said in a May court filing that Boeing violated terms of a 2021 settlement allowing the company to avoid prosecution for actions leading up to the crashes in

Ethiopia and Indonesia, which killed 346 people.

Those crashes were blamed on a faulty sensor in a flight-control system and the investigation is separate from the probe of the more recent Alaska Airlines blowout, which involved

Boeing spun off Spirit, which is based in Wichita, Kansas, and not related to Spirit Airlines, in 2005. In recent years, quality problems have mounted, including fuselage panels that didn't fit together precisely enough and holes that were improperly

Spirit removed its CEO in October and replaced him with Patrick Shanahan, a former Boeing executive who served as acting defense secretary in

the Trump administration. Things seemed to be going more smoothly until the Alaska Airlines incident. Investigators said a panel used in place of an extra emergency door had been removed at a Boeing factory to let Spirit workers fix damaged rivets, and bolts that help hold the panel in place were missing after the repair job. It is not clear who removed the bolts and failed to put them back.

Spirit said in May that it was laying off about 450 workers at its Wichita plant because of a production slowdown since the January incident. Its total workforce was just over 13,000 people.
"Bringing Spirit and Boeing to-

gether will enable greater integration of both companies' manufacturing and engineering capabilities, including safety and quality systems," Shanahan

The acquisition's equity value of \$4.7 billion is \$37.25 per share, while the total value of the deal is around \$8.3 billion, which includes Spirit's last reported net debt, the aerospace company said.

Boeing common stock will be exchanged for Spirit shares according to a variable formula that depends on a weighted average of the share price over a 15-trading-day period ending on the second day before the deal closes, Boeing said.

IBADAN, Nigeria, July 1, (AP): Dimly lit and stuffy classrooms stir with life every morning as children file in. Rays of sunlight stream through wooden windows, the only source of light. Pupils squint at their books and intermittently the blackboard as teachers try to hold their attention.

It's a reality for many schoolchildren across Nigeria, where many national electricity grid. In Excellent Moral School in Olodo Okin in Ibadan, "the entire community is not connected, including the school," said school founder Muyideen Raji. It acutely affects pupils, he said, who can't learn how to use computers or the Internet and can't study in the evenings

About half of Nigeria's more than 200 million people are hooked up to a national electricity grid that can't provide sufficient daily electricity to most of those connected. Many poor, rural communities like Olodo Okin

are off the grid entirely. In a country with abundant sunshine, many are looking to solar energy to help fill the gaps, but getting risk-averse investors to finance major solar projects that would give Nigeria enough reliable energy is an uphill struggle. It means that millions in the country are finding ways to live with little to no electricity.

Studies have shown that Nigeria could generate much more electricity than it needs from solar energy thanks to its powerful sunshine. But 14 grid-scale solar projects in the northern and central parts of the country that could generate 1,125 megawatts of electricity have stalled since contracts were signed in 2016.

Those trying to develop solar projects in the country blame interest rates for borrowing which can be as high as 15 percent, two to three times higher than in advanced economies and China, according to the International Energy Agency

That means it's more costly for solar companies to work in Nigeria or other developing nations than in rich countries. Africa only has one-fifth the solar power capacity of Germany, and just 2% of global clean energy investments go to the continent.

The same project put up in Nigeria and Denmark; the Danish project will get funding for 2 to 3 percent" interest rate, said Najim Animashaun, director of Nova Power, one of the stalled solar projects. Meanwhile he struggles to get loans even with interest rates of 10 percent or higher, "even though my solar project can produce two and half times more power," than a Danish one.

Nigeria also does not set so-called cost-reflective tariffs, meaning the price consumers pay for electricity doesn't cover the costs to produce and distribute it. This means distribution companies can't fully pay producers and the industry relies on government interventions to stay afloat, scaring off lenders from investing in the solar industry.

Currently, power producers say they are owed up to 3.7 trillion Naira (\$2.7 billion) by the government, making it difficult to meet obligations to their lenders and contractors.

One option would be getting World Bank guarantees that would put investors at ease and make them more willing to put money into solar projects - but the government is wary signing up to anything that would force them to pay large sums even if electricity from the projects does not get the consumers because of inadequate transmission and distribution infrastructure.

But without World Bank guarantees "nobody will develop or finance a project with a government subsidy, because it can dry off," said Edu Okeke, the managing director of Azura Power. Azura Power has a stake in the now-stalled 100 megawatt Nova solar project in Nigeria's northern Katsina State.

With less than 8,000 megawatts of capacity and an average supply of less than 4,000 megawatts - less than half of what Singapore supplies to just 5.6 million people - power outages are an everyday occurrence in Nigeria.

Communities like Excellent Moral School's in Ibadan that have no access to electricity are often surrounded by more fortunate ones that are connected to the grid but experience frequent outages and have to use gasoline and diesel-run private generators.

With the long-running petroleum subsidies now removed, many households, schools, hospitals and businesses struggle with the cost of the fuel for their backup generators.

"We have stopped using a diesel generator as an alternative due to costs," said Abdulhakeem Adedoja, the head of Lorat Nursery and Primary School in Ibadan. He added that although the school is in an Ibadan area that is connected to the grid, they could go two weeks without a power supply.

The problem is not just the lack of electricity for computer-aided learning, proper lighting, and fans to make classes less stuffy for pupils and teachers, but also that students are unable to complete their school assignments at home, Adedoja said.

For more energy-hungry small businesses like restaurants, they either close shop or continue with alternative power generation, incurring high costs that hurt their capacity for expansion.

Ebunola Akinwale, the owner of Nature's Treat Cafe in Ibadan, said she pays 2.5 million Naira (\$1,700) monthly to power backup generators in her four branches.

"If nothing changes, I probably would have to close one or two branches," she said, though she is planning to go solar which she enthuses will help us cut "pollution from the diesel (generators)." She's in talks with her bank for a low-cost loan package specially designed for young women entrepreneurs to finance the solar alternative.

The improvement showed that the impact of factory shutdowns of Daihatsu Motor Co., a Toyota Motor Corp. subsidiary, due to a safety testing scandal reduced, and raw-material producers successfully passed on higher costs through price hikes.

Confidence among large retailers, banks, real estate companies, and other non-manufacturers worsened

by one point to plus 33, the first decline since June 2020.


The "tankan," which means shortterm economic outlook, is the most closely watched index of business confidence for the world's thirdlargest economy.

Looking ahead, large manufacturers expect their business sentiment index to improve by 1 point to plus 14 in the next survey in September, while major non-manufacturers predict a 6-point drop to plus 27.

The latest poll was conducted between May 29 and June 28, covering 9,076 companies, of which 99.2 percent responded.

NEW YORK, July 1, (AP): With summer having gotten off to a scorching start, workers across the country may be dreaming of a seaside escape or cutting out early to watch a movie in an air-conditioned

For some, that can be a reality. Business owners have found that offering summer hours - a reduced schedule on Fridays, usually between Memorial Day and Labor Day - can be a way to boost employee morale. Workers are able to deal with summer childcare gaps, return to the office refreshed and feel like their job values them,

businesses to stand out to prospec-

"When smaller employers have less resources and they want to

be more competitive with attracting and retaining quality talent, they want to be creative with the benefits that they offer. And one of the benefits they can offer would be flexible time in the summer," said Rue Dooley, a knowledge advisor at the Society for Human Resources Management. Special summer schedules don't

work for all types of industries, however. And it takes some trialand-error to figure out the best option for each company. Michael Wieder, co-founder of

Lalo, which makes baby and toddler products, thought summer hours were a good fit for his 32 employees because so many of them - about 75% -- are parents.

His staffers work remotely and are spread across the U.S. and several other countries. Since founding the company in 2019, he tried various summer hour schemes, such as offering every other Friday off, but the current system works the best, he said. On Fridays, the business closes at 1 p.m. local time. Staffers also get four-day weekends for Memorial Day, Labor Day and

"We know that childcare is harder during the summer," he said. "Summer is a time where people do like to take time with their family or take trips, and we want to be able to reward our employees with some additional time with their families."

Greg Hakim, owner of Corporate Ink in Boston, which offers PR services to emerging tech companies, said he uses summer hours as both a recruitment and retention tool. He plays up summer hours in job descriptions and said the perk has helped him retain staff - particularly during the pandemic when others found it hard to keep workers.

"It's just helped us retain our

team during the 'Great Resignation,' people are just like losing people left and right," he said. "And I think we went 23 months without having someone resign. And that's just such an important benefit and competitive advantage. Jim Christy co-owns Midwest

Cards, a trading card retailer based in Columbus, Ohio, with about 30 employees. He started offering summer hours - Fridays off after 2 p.m. -- in 2021, a year after founding the company, as the pandemic upended

normal ways of working.
The hardest part was figuring out what to offer people who worked in his brick-and-mortar shop, who also fill online orders, since they had to work normal hours to keep the store running. He decided to give logistics-side workers Friday afternoons off while the six staff who work on the brick-and-mortar side and do customer service for online

orders get off on Mondays, when the store was closed. Some workers can sign on remotely to answer customer queries if they want to, but it is not required.

"We couldn't just apply one situation to everybody. So that that was a little challenging," he said.

For some companies, summer hours work so well they've gone even further. Chris Langer, cofounder of digital marketing agency CMYK, has 14 staffers who all usually work in the company's studio.

In 2014, rather than offer Friday afternoons off, he started offering entire Fridays off during the summer -- every other week. Then, last year, Langer started hearing chatter about the four-day work week, so he decided to try that out during the summer.

Communicating with the company's tight knit staff, who have all worked together for years, makes the four-day week doable, Langer said.

"We're small, so, it's easy to have a discussion with everybody on like what's real and how everyone's feeling, if they're feeling stressed out, can they get their work done," he said.

If a big project is due, he might call people in on a Friday, but so far, that has only happened twice since CMYK instituted the four-day

"It is more stressful in terms of getting the work done throughout the week, but the day (off) was much more of a payoff," he said.

Of course, summer hours don't work for every company. Retail stores risk losing customers to big box stores or others that are open for more hours. And employees that are paid by the hour rather than set salaries can balk at getting paid for fewer hours.

Jennifer Johnson, owner of True Fashionistas, a consignment shop in Naples, Florida, thought she would try summer hours in 2022 because Naples is seasonal, with the busiest part of the year wrapping up around Easter. Beginning May 1, she changed her open hours from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. to 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. But the change didn't work.

"We have a staff of 45 to 50 employees, and it cut their hours and that upset them, and rightfully so," she said. "It also upset our customers who were used to our hours and wanted to shop.'

She abandoned the effort after two months and hasn't tried again.

"I really believe that with anything consistency is the key," she said. "The customers need to know they can rely on you to be open, you cannot always be changing your hours because that is a quick way to lose customers.'

'Equity concerns raised as states introduce AI education initiatives'

Al literacy programs aim to close skills gap in workforce

• Preparing today's workforce for tomorrow's technology ? HARTFORD, July 1, (AP): With many jobs expected to eventually rely on generative artificial intelligence, states are trying to help workers beef up their tech skills before they become outdated and get outfoxed by machines that are becoming increasingly smarter.

Connecticut is working to create what proponents believe will be the country's first Citizens AI Academy, a free online repository of curated classes that users can take to learn basic skills or obtain a certificate needed for employment.

"This is a rapidly evolving area," said state Democratic Sen. James Maroney. "So we need to all learn what are the best sources for staying current. How can we update our skills? Who can be trusted

Determining what skills are necessary in an AI world can be a challenge for state legislators given the fast-moving nature of the technology and differing opinions about what approach is best.

Gregory LaBlanc, professor of Finance, Strategy and Law at the Haas School of Business at Berkeley Law School in California, says workers should be taught how to use and manage generative AI rather than how the technology works, partly because computers will soon be

better able to perform certain tasks previously performed by humans.

"What we need is to lean into things that complement AI as opposed to learning to be really bad imitators of AI," he said. "We need to figure out what is AI not good at and then teach those things. And those things are generally things like creativity, empathy, high level problem solving.'

He said historically people have not needed to understand technological advancements in order for them to succeed.

"When when electricity came along, we didn't tell everybody that they needed to become electrical engineers," LeBlanc said.

This year, at least four states -Connecticut, California, Mississippi and Maryland - proposed legislation that attempted to deal with AI in the classroom somehow. They ranged from Connecticut's planned AI Academy, which was originally included in a wide-ranging AI regulation bill that failed but the concept is still being developed by state education officials, to proposed working groups that examine how AI can be incorporated safely in public schools. Such a bill died in the Mississippi legislature while the others remain in flux.

One bill in California would

require a state working group to consider incorporating AI literacy skills into math, science, history and social science curriculums.

"AI has the potential to positively impact the way we live, but only if we know how to use it, and use it responsibly," said the bill's author, Assemblymember Marc Berman, in a statement. "No matter their future profession, we must ensure that all students understand basic AI principles and applications, that they have the skills to recognize when AI is employed, and are aware of AI's implications, limitations, and ethical considerations.'

The bill is backed by the California Chamber of Commerce. CalChamber Policy Advocate Ronak Daylami said in a statement that incorporating information into existing school curricula will "dispel the stigma and mystique of the technology, not only helping students become more discerning and intentional users and consumers of AI, but also better positioning future generations of workers to succeed in an AI-driven workforce and hopefully inspiring the next generation of computer scientists.

While Connecticut's planned AI Academy is expected to offer certificates to people who complete certain skills programs that might

be needed for careers, Maroney said the academy will also include the basics, from digital literacy to how to pose questions to a chatbot.

He said it's important for people to have the skills to understand, evaluate and effectively interact with AI technologies, whether it's a chatbot or machines that learn to identify problems and make decisions that mimic human decisionmaking.

"Most jobs are going to require some form of literacy," Maroney said. "I think that if you aren't learning how to use it, you'll be at a disadvantage.'

A September 2023 study released by the job-search company Indeed found all U.S. jobs listed on the platform had skills that could be performed or augmented by generative AI. Nearly 20% of the jobs were considered "highly exposed," which means the technology is considered good or excellent at 80% or more of the skills that were mentioned in the Indeed job listings.

Nearly 46% of the jobs on the platform were "moderately exposed," which means the GenAI can perform 50% to 80% of the skills.

Maroney said he is concerned how that skills gap - coupled with a lack of access to high-speed internet, computers and smart phones in some underserved communities - will exacerbate the inequity problem.

A report released in February from McKinsey and Company, a global management consulting firm, projected that generative AI could increase household wealth in the U.S. by nearly \$500 billion by 2045, but it would also increase the wealth gap between Black and white households by \$43 billion annually.

Advocates have been working for years to narrow the nation's digital skills gap, often focusing on the basics of computer literacy and improving access to reliable internet and devices, especially for people living in urban and rural areas. The advent of AI brings additional challenges to that task, said Marvin Venay, chief external affairs and advocacy officer for the Massachusetts-based organization Bring Tech

"Education must be included in order for this to really take off publicly ... in a manner which is going to give people the ability to eliminate their barriers," he said of AI. "And it has to be able to explain to the most common individual why it is not only a useful tool, but why this tool will be something that can

'Quiet Place' makes noise at box office, Costner's Western stumbles

LOS ANGELES, July 1, (AP): "A Quiet Place: Day One" is making noise at the box office. The prequel earned an estimated \$53 million in its first weekend in North American theaters, according to studio estimates Sunday.

It's both a franchise best and significantly more than expected. Going into the weekend, prerelease tracking had "Day One" pegged for a \$40 million debut, but audiences were clearly more enthusiastic to see the action-horror starring Lupita Nyong'o and Joseph Quinn and released by Paramount. The same could not be said for Kevin Costner's " Horizon: An American Saga-Chapter 1," which opened to \$11 million.

The "Quiet Place" victory wasn't quite enough to snag the coveted first place spot on the charts, though. That honor again went to Disney and Pixar's juggernaut "Inside Out 2," which added an estimated \$57.4 million in its third weekend in theaters, and crossed \$1 billion globally.

There's a distant possibility that the places will shift when actuals are released Monday. But either way it's good news for movie theaters in a summer season that's finally heating up but still running far behind last year (down 19%) and pre-pandemic norms (down 36% from 2019).

"Inside Out 2" continues to be a box office phenomenon, the likes of which the industry hasn't seen since "Barbie" almost a year ago. In just three weeks of release, it's earned nearly \$470 million in North America and \$545.5 million internationally, bringing its global total to \$1.01 billion. The sequel is the only 2024 release to cross the billion dollar mark and it did it in just 19 days, a record for an animated film.

"The film's stunning global success once again illustrates that audiences the world over will respond to compelling, entertaining movies, and that they want to enjoy them on the big screen," said Michael O'Leary, president and CEO of the National Association of Theatre Owners, in a statement.

"A Quiet Place: Day One," directed by Michael Sarnoski and rated PG-13, is also fast approaching an important threshold out of the gates. Including the \$45.5 million from international showings in 59 markets, the \$67 million production has already made \$98.5 million.

Franchise

"There's a lot of love for the 'A Quiet Place' franchise," said Chris Aronson, the head of domestic distribution for Paramount. "We listened to the fans who wanted to expand the universe. In a rare feat for a third film, it opened higher than both "A Quiet

Place" and "A Quiet Place: Part II". John Krasinski, who wrote and directed the first two, continued serving as a producer. "It's one of those rare horror franchises that has generated incredible

goodwill with audiences and critics alike," said Paul Dergarabedian, the senior media analyst for Comscore. Playing on 3,708 screens in the US and Canada, nearly 40% of its

domestic earnings came from "premium screens" including IMAX and other large formats. It entered the marketplace with mostly positive reviews (84% on Rotten Tomatoes); Audiences gave it a B+ CinemaS-

core and four out of five stars on PostTrak.

"We put together a compelling package but also I think it shows people want to go to the movies," Aronson said. "The marketplace really works when there are choices and there's something for everybody.'

The start for "Horizon," meanwhile, was sluggish. Though older audiences, the ones most likely to support a Western epic, don't typically rush out to see films on opening weekend the way people often do for horrors and superheroes, the road ahead will not be easy: Reviews have not been great and it got an underwhelming B- CinemaScore.

The stakes are also a little different for "Horizon," a \$100 million production that Costner financed on his own and partnered with Warner Bros. to distribute. It opened in 3,334 locations. A decades-old passion project, he mortgaged property in Santa Barbara, Calif. to finance it and exited "Yellowstone" to see it through. In a bold, unconventional strategy, "Chapter 2" arrives in theaters later this summer, on Aug. 16. He also has plans for two more movies.

"The western genre is one of those that is very specific," Dergarabedian said. "It's going to be about the long game.

A quick glance at the top 10 shows that audiences are largely favoring franchises and "known commodities" over originals. "Bad Boys: Ride or Die" was right behind "Horizon" on the charts, and it's been in theaters for four weeks already.

"Audiences in the summer want the tried and true, they want the familiar," Dergarabedian said.

Usher honored, Smith returns at BET Awards

Albanian novelist Ismail Kadare has died after being rushed to a hospital in Tirana, his publishing editor said on Monday. He was 88.

TIRANA, Albania: Renowned

Kadare has long been mentioned as a possible contender for the Nobel Literature Prize.

Onufri Publishing House editor Bujar Hudhri said the noted author died Monday morning. A nurse at the hospital, who spoke on condition of anonymity because she was not authorized to talk to the press, said he was taken to the emergency room

after suffering a cardiac arrest. Kadare became internationally recognized after his novel "The General of the Dead Army" was published in 1963 when Albania was still governed by the communist government of late dictator Enver Hoxha.

Kadare fled Albania to France in the fall of 1990, just a few months before the fall of the communist regime following student protests the previous December. He lived in Paris and had recently returned to Tirana.

LOS ANGELES: Killer Mike is expected to avoid charges over a physical altercation that led to his arrest at the Grammys earlier this year after the rapper recently completed community service.

The Los Angeles City Attorney's Office said in a statement Thursday that Mike "successfully completed the office's hearing process, including a community service requirement that was imposed." The rapper was escorted in handcuffs by police at Crypto.com Arena in February and detained on suspicion of a misdemeanor offense.

Court documents shows Mike, whose real name is Michael Render, was never charged over the incident. His representatives did not immediately return a message seeking comment.

In some instances, Los Angeles city prosecutors can opt to resolve an incident without filing misdemeanor charges if a person

completes certain conditions. Mike said an "over-zealous" security guard contributed to the altercation that occurred in the joyous moments after he won

LOS ANGELES, July 1, (AP): Usher accepted the lifetime achievement award at the 2024 BET Awards even if the superstar mused it might be a bit early.

Penn regains movie magic with 'Daddio'

SANTA MONICA, Calif., July 1, (AP): **Sean Penn** says he hadn't felt joy making a movie in 15 years.

At the time, the actor couldn't quite put his finger on why, but he at one point became so disillusioned that he resigned himself to the reality that his love for the craft may never return.

"I'd felt misery in making movies," the two-time Oscar winner recalled during a recent interview. "At first you're putting it off to, 'Well, this script is a problem, and this director is a problem.' But then I caught myself a few times working on great things with great people and just as miserable."

That is until his neighbor, Dakota Johnson, knocked on his door with a script and an invitation to be her co-star. "No reservations at all. I felt like you would

feel getting your first movie," Penn recalled of his initial response to reading "Daddio," which hits theaters nationwide Friday.

But the film that re-enchanted Penn with the art of making movies is by no means a typical Hollywood flick. Instead, "Daddio" is an austere portrait of an ephemeral, serendipitous human connection that feels rare nowadays, if not nearly extinct.

Part of what Penn appreciated about the script was its characters' unfiltered frankness, something he thinks is missing in a lot of contemporary art and broader societal conversations.

"I think we're stripping whole generations of diversity of behavior and diversity of personality," he said, conceding that he understands concerns about sensitivity, but only to a point. "Changing one's vocabulary or altering it in certain circumstances becomes the full-time job and reflective thought is left behind."

"Daddio" follows Girlie (Johnson), a woman who is returning to New York after a trip out of state. The film begins with her getting in a cab at JFK airport and ends with her getting dropped off at home. The 90 minutes in between are filled with ostensibly mundane but revealing conversations between Girlie and her cab driver, Clark (Penn).

Feature

"Daddio" is the feature debut of writer-director Christy Hall, who, perhaps unsurprisingly given that the film is driven by dialogue, has a background in theater. Hall began working on the script in 2014, inspired in part by her nostalgia for the reality series, "Taxicab Confessions."

Penn, like he does in many of his roles, brings a masculine energy that gives life to a brash and foul-mouthed cabbie, but one who ultimately proves to have a tenderness. Similarly, Johnson's Girlie is a savvy, successful software engineer who appears to have it all together, but whose relationship with her father - or lack thereof - ultimately leads her to seek that love elsewhere.

"This movie is about the human condition, that there's two sides to all of us. We're always contending with our greater angels and our darkest demons. And I'm interested in characters that are always contending with both, because that's actually the truth." Hall said.

"Daddio" will undoubtedly test some viewers' attention spans, but others will find themselves drawn in by the candid and compelling conversation between these strangers about sex, daddy issues and being the "other woman."

Penn and Johnson have more in common than their neighborhood. Both are vocal about their frustrations with Hollywood and said this project was, coincidentally, a kind of epiphany for each of them.

"I just want to be really in love with what I'm working on and inspired," Johnson said.

It's only been a few months since she came off her press tour for "Madame Web," which was a critical and commercial flop. Shortly after the film's debut, Johnson affirmed criticism of the movie, saying she doesn't anticipate doing another one like it.

"This notion of executives, not necessarily creative people, deciding what is going to work in an artistic sense doesn't actually make sense to me at all," she said. "I think that a lot of the studios, well streaming platforms mostly, are run by people who don't even really like movies or watch them."

really like movies or watch them."

Johnson said she "attacked" the script for "Daddio" when she first read it because she loved it so much, and spent years through TeaTime, her production company, working with Hall to get the film financed. After years in limbo and studio execs asking why people would find a movie so devoid of action and drama entertaining, it was eventually picked up by Sony Pic-

Johnson hopes to savor the joy she feels coming off of this film, and to remember it the next time she's fighting for a project.

"I think that humans are craving human connection," Johnson said. "Maybe it's because of social media or what we have been sort of dealt in terms of entertainment in the last 5, 10 years. I think algorithms have really (expletive) us in that way. It doesn't give us the content that I think we subconsciously crave."

LOS ANGELES: When Veronika Slowikowska graduated from college in 2015, she did what conventional wisdom says aspiring actors should do: Work odd jobs to pay the bills while auditioning for commercials and background roles, hoping you eventually make it.

But the attention has opened doors for the 28-yearold, including a spot in this year's star-studded Netflix is a Joke Festival lineup in Los Angeles, which she did amid a live comedy show tour.

Often improvised and missing an obvious punch line, her videos encapsulate an absurdist, internet-saturated millennial and Gen Z humor that surely leave many viewers scratching their heads in confusion. But her chops and training as an actor and comedian, including from The Second City improv school in Toronto, set her apart from many content creators.

Soulful 'CASABLANCO' revives career

Ambrosius, Dre collaboration delivers

NEW YORK, July 1, (AP): Marsha Ambrosius was done with the demands required of a successful R&B star, including the wear-and-tear of touring and fickle music industry politics. She was at peace working behind the scenes and writing for other artists. But Dr. Dre had a prescription to rejuvenate her onstage desire.

"I didn't want to do a project," said the Grammy-nominated artist. "I've checked off my bucket list, everything that I've wanted to do. And Dre said, 'I just want to keep you inspired. Let's just create and see where this goes."

Their musical travels carried them to her new album, "CASABLANCO," available now. The combination of Ambrosius' writing and singing prowess with one of this generation's greatest producers have made it a highly anticipated project after years of teasing.

pated project after years of teasing.

"I haven't had the opportunity to not only create, but have no limits, no boundaries. Dre was very much, 'Whatever you want to do can be done,'" said the Britain-born singer who has writing and producing credits on every song. "It breathed new life into me creatively, knowing that I hadn't really done everything I was capable of doing until we created this."

The 11-track project is a sonically-opulent collage, masterfully fusing jazz and hip-hop - a compound only the Dr. could mix. "CASABLANCO" - a play off the luxurious lifestyle of the iconic "Casablanca" film and Moroccan city,

marks the singer's fourth solo studio album, following 2018's "NYLA." (The "A" in the title was replaced by Dre to represent the grit of hip-hop sound.)

Entirely produced and mixed by "The Chronic" architect with support from Erik "Blu2th" Griggs, Focus... and Dem Jointz, the album was recorded during a two-week span in 2021 while much of the world was still held captive by the COVID-19 pandemic and as Dre recovered from a brain aneurysm. Signed to Dre's Aftermath label via Interscope Records, the pair have a lengthy collaborative history, last officially joining forces on his 2015 album, "Compton"

Creative

"CASABLANCO" separates itself from today's trap-beat, atmospheric R&B in both sound and construction. Eight of the 11 songs are more than four minutes, with three tracks exceeding five minutes, including substantial instrumental breaks and creative, nontraditional verse and bridge and chorus arrangements. Jazzy instrumentation precede many of the tracks before switching to Dre's unmistakable hiphop sound, referring to the combination as "tux and Chucks."

But the project, backed by a 27-piece live orchestra and filled with intricately woven samples from many artists including Michael Jackson, Duke Ellington, George Benson, The Wu-Tang Clan and Nas - and even Ambrosius herself - took more than a year for clear-

ances. Singles from "CASABLANCO" include "The Greatest,"

"Greedy," and the "One Night Stand" which samples "All Night Long" by Mary Jane Girls.

"I was like, 'what if it was 'one night' instead of 'all night long?" said Ambrosius. "It still goes to the reason why we created the record: It was like if we have one more album to make, what would that be? So, it felt like a one night-only moment which ultimately could turn into forever. And mine did."

While "Best I Could Find" is reminiscent of Stevie Wonder's "Innervisions," "Cloudy With A Chance Of ...Real" is a dramatic longing for her lover, as she sings, "Feels like this is somebody else's, living this pain right through me/And I carry the weight of this rain falling down, and it's oh so lonely."

Referring to the song written during the pandemic, she said: "That was that fog, that haze, that uncertainty, that: What's going to happen if I can't love you the way I want to love you, or you're unwilling to receive what my love looks like because of where we are in the world right now."

Despite a solid solo career with songs like "Far Away" and "Late Nights & Early Mornings," singing hooks for major artists like Kanye West, Nas and Nipsey Hussle, and writing for H.E.R. and Alicia Keys, many fans still associate her with the duo Floetry.

These medications, readily available online and through medical pharmacies, have led some individuals to self-administer them without proper medical guidance, relying solely on package recommendations or online advice for desired results, reports Al-Qabas daily.

Dr. Muhammad Ibrahim, a consultant bariatric surgeon at Wara Hospital, cautions that while these injections generally have a good safety profile and rare health complications, they are potent medical

treatments with potential side effects and risks if not managed under medical supervi-

sion. "It's crucial anyone considering injecthese tions to consult specialized doctor rather than risk selfadministration. These medications are typically pre-

scribed for individuals with overweight or mild obesity, but comprehensive health evaluations are essential beforehand," Dr. Ibrahim emphasized in an interview with Al-Qabas.

Before initiating treatment with injections like "Mounjaro" or "Ozempic," Dr. Ibrahim stresses the necessity of undergoing several medical tests, including comprehensive blood tests, liver function evaluations, and assessments for thyroid and vitamin deficiencies. Routine monitoring every six months is also advised to manage any emerging health issues and nutritional deficiencies.

Understanding Ozempic vs. Mounjaro

Dr. Ibrahim delineates the distinctions between "Ozempic" and

"Mounjaro" injections:

Mounjaro injection: Contains GLP-1 and GIP hormones, impacting blood sugar levels and appetite suppression.

Özempic injection: Contains GLP-1, primarily regulating insulin secretion and aiding in blood sugar control, with additional benefits for cardiovascular health.

Efficacy and costs

In terms of effectiveness, "Mounjaro" injections are expected to induce a more pronounced weight loss of 20-25% compared to 15-20% with "Ozempic," albeit at a higher cost ranging from 150 to 300 dinars monthly for "Mongaro" versus 35 to 50 dinars for "Ozempic."

Potential side effects and contraindications

Both types of injections may cause nausea, fatigue, and gastrointestinal discomfort. Rare complications include pancreatitis, gallstones, severe allergic reactions, and depression, necessitating immediate medical attention.

Long-term commitment and comparisons with bariatric sur-

Dr. Ibrahim underscores the importance of long-term adherence to injection regimens for sustained weight management. While injections are suitable for modest weight loss goals, bariatric surgery remains a more effective and enduring option for severe

obesity cases, yielding weight loss of 35-50% with minimal risks.

"Injections are recommended for overweight individuals, whereas surgical interventions offer faster and more substantial weight loss for severe obesity," Dr. Ibrahim clarified. He highlighted the safety and efficacy of modern bariatric procedures, making them viable even for individuals with chronic conditions or older adults.

As the debate between injections and surgery continues, Dr. Ibrahim advocates for informed decision-making guided by individual health needs and goals, ensuring sustainable weight management and overall well-being.

Climate change heating weather

Extreme heat waves across globe are not 'just summer'

The heat wave that left more than 100 million people sweating across the eastern US in June 2024 hit so fast and was so extreme that forecasters warned a flash drought could follow across wide parts of the region.

Prolonged high temperatures can quickly dry soils, triggering a rapid onset drought that can affect agriculture, water resources and energy supplies. Many regions under the June heat dome quickly developed abnormally dry conditions.

The human impacts of the heat wave have also been widespread. In Ohio and Pennsylvania, emergency room visits for heat-related illnesses surged. Several Massachusetts schools without air conditioning closed to protect kids and teachers. In New York and New Jersey, electric wires sagged in the heat, shutting down trains into and out of New York City and leaving commuters stranded.

Outbreak

We study weather patterns involving heat. The June 2024 heat wave was unusually early and long-lasting compared with typical patterns for the Northeast US.

It was caused by a large high-pressure system called a heat dome that extended from the ground more than 10 miles up through the atmosphere. A heat dome is both a cause and an effect of extreme heat. Very large and strong heat domes, like the Northeast event which reached higher into the atmosphere than any previous June event - have a greater potential for higher temperatures impacting more people.

It was also part of a global outbreak of early season heat that put lives at risk in many countries around the world.

Record heat has hit several countries across the Americas, Europe and Asia in 2024. In Mexico and Central America, weeks of persistent heat, with temperatures as high as 125 degrees Fahrenheit (51.8 Celsius), combined with prolonged drought have led to severe water shortages and dozens of deaths.

Extreme heat turned into tragedy in Saudi Arabia as over 1,000 people on the Hajj, a Muslim pilgrimage to Makkah, collapsed and died. Temperatures reached 125 F (51.8 C) at the Grand Mosque in Makkah on June 17.

In Greece, where temperatures were over 100 F (38 C) for several

straight days in June, at least several tourists died or were feared dead after going hiking in dangerous heat and humidity.

India also faced temperatures around 120 F (49 C) for days in April and May that affected millions of people, many of them without air conditioning.

Although heat waves are a natural part of the climate, the severity and extent of the heat waves so far this year are not "just summer."

A scientific assessment of the US heat wave estimates that heat this severe and long-lasting was two to four times more likely to occur today because of human-caused climate change than it would have been without it. This conclusion is consistent with the rapid increase over the past several decades in the number of US heat waves and their occurrence outside the peak of summer.

Vulnerable

These record heat waves are happening in a climate that's globally about 2.2 F (1.2 C) warmer than it was before the industrial revolution, when humans began releasing large amounts of greenhouse gas emissions that warm the climate.

While a temperature difference of a degree or two when you walk into a different room might not even be noticeable, even fractions of a degree make a large difference in the global climate.

At the peak of the last ice age, some 20,000 years ago, when the Northeast US was under thousands of feet of ice, the globally averaged temperature was only 10.8 F (6 C) cooler than now. So, it is not surprising that 2.2 F (1.2 C) of warming so far is already rapidly changing the climate.

Countries promised in 2015 as part of the Paris Agreement to keep warming well under 2 C, but current government policies around the world won't meet those goals. Temperatures are on pace to continue rising, with the increase likely to more than double again by the end of the century.

While this summer is likely be one of the hottest on record, it is important to realize that it may also be one of the coldest summers of the future.

For populations that are especially vulnerable to heat, including young children, older adults and outdoor workers, the risks are even higher. People in lower-income neighborhoods where air conditioning may be unaffordable and renters who often don't have the same protections for cooling as heating will face increasingly dangerous conditions. China's FY-3F begins operations

Japan launches advanced Earth observation satellite

TOKYO, July 1, (AP): Japan successfully deployed an upgraded Earth observation satellite for disaster response and security after it was launched on a new flagship H3 rocket Monday.

The H3 No. 3 rocket lifted off from the Tanegashima Space Center on a southwestern Japanese island and released its payload about 16 minutes later, putting it into a targeted orbit as planned, the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency, or JAXA, said during a livestream.

The Advanced Land Observation Satellite, or ALOS-4, is tasked primarily with Earth observation and data collection for disaster response and mapmaking, including for volcanic and seismic activity and other land movements. It's also capable of monitoring military activity, such as missile launches, with an infrared sensor developed by the Defense Ministry.

JAXA President Hiroshi Yamakawa praised Monday's successful launch as "a big first step" toward ensuring Japan's access to space and international competitiveness. "I believe the two successful flights in a row would help gain trust from in and outside the country."

The ALOS-4 is a successor to the current ALOS-2 and can observe a much wider area. Japan will operate both for the time being.

The launch was the third of the H3 system, after the successful one on Feb 17. and the shocking failed debut flight a year earlier when the rocket had to be destroyed with its payload - a satellite that was supposed to be the ALOS-3.

Japan sees a stable, commercially competitive space transport capability as key to its space program and national security.

JAXA and its main contractor Mitsubishi Heavy Industries have been developing the H3 launch system as a successor to its current mainstay, H-2A, which is set to retire after two more flights. MHI will eventually take over H3 production and launches from JAXA and hopes to make it commercially viable by cutting the launch cost to about half of the H-2A.

Also:

BEIJING: The Fengyun-3F (FY-3F) satellite officially commenced operational services on Monday following ground and application system in-orbit testing reviews and operational trial runs, according to its ground application system operator, China Meteorological Administration (CMA).

The FY-3F satellite will take over the in-orbit duties of the FY-3C satellite and provide services in areas such as weather forecasting, climate prediction, disaster monitoring, and environmental monitoring.

Equipped with 10 operational instruments, the satellite is able to conduct full-spectrum, high-spectral, and quantitative observations. These capabilities significantly enhance the precision of observing global atmospheric and surface environmental conditions, including atmospheric temperature and humidity profile information, trace gases, and Earth's radiation balance.

Warning labels spark debate

Over 3-hr social media use doubles mental health risk

A mid growing concerns over the effects of social media on teen mental health, on June 17, 2024, US Surgeon General Vivek Murthy called for warning labels to be added to social media platforms, similar to surgeon general warnings on cigarettes and alcohol.

Murthy's warning cited research showing that teens who use more than three hours of social media a day face double the risk of mental health problems.

This comes a year after Murthy issued a major public advisory over the links between social media and youth mental health.

As a specialist in eating disorders and anxiety, I regularly work with clients who experience eating disorder symptoms, self-esteem issues and anxiety related to social media.

I also have firsthand experience with this topic: I am 16 years post-recovery from an eating disorder, and as a teenager, I grew up when people were beginning to widely use social media. In my view, the impact of social media on mental health, especially on diet and exercise patterns, cannot simply be mitigated with a warning label. However, it is an important starting point for raising awareness of the harms of social media.

Warnings

Experts have long suspected that social media may be playing a role in the growing mental health crisis in young people. However, the surgeon general's 2023 warning was one of the first government warnings supported by robust research.

Critics of the call for warning labels argue that it oversimplifies a complex issue and that limiting social media access in any way would do more harm than good. Some supporters feel that it is a step in the right direction and far less restrictive than trying to start with more widespread privacy regulations.

And so far, calls for action over regulating social media have fallen flat.

Researchers are limited to only studying associations, which make causal links difficult to establish. But there are numerous studies that do show a relationship between viewing media and worsened self-esteem, body image and mental health.

Additionally, there is scientific data that has shown the effectiveness of including warning labels to deter use of substances such as tobacco and alcohol. However, the strategy of warning labels has been used for eating disorder content and digitally altered images on the internet, with mixed results. These studies showed that the warning labels do not reduce the negative impact of the media on body image. Some of the research even found that the warning labels might increase body and appearance comparisons, which are thought to be key reasons why social media can be harmful to self-esteem.

Research shows that images of beauty as depicted in movies, social media, television and magazines can lead to mental illness, issues with disordered eating and body image dissatisfaction.

Body dissatisfaction among children and adolescents is commonplace and has been linked to decreased quality of life, worsened mood and unhealthy eating habits.

Development

The mental health of adolescents and teens has been declining for the past decade, and the COVID-19 pandemic contributed to worsening youth mental health and brought it into the spotlight. As the mental health crisis surges, researchers have been taking a close look at the role of social media in these increasing mental health concerns.

About 95% of children and adolescents in the U.S. between the ages of 10 and 17 are using social media almost constantly. A 2023 study found that teens spend about five hours per day on social media.

Research has shown that social media can be beneficial for finding community support. However, studies have also shown that the use of social media contributes to social comparisons, unrealistic expectations and negative mental health effects.

In addition, those who have preexisting mental health conditions tend to spend more time on social media. People in that category are more likely to self-objectify and internalize the thin body ideal. Women and people with preexisting body image concerns are more likely than others to feel worse about their bodies and themselves after they spend time on social media.

A recent review found that, as with mass media, the use of social media is a risk factor for the development of an eating disorder, body image dissatisfaction and disordered eating. In this review, social media use was shown to contribute to negative self-esteem, social comparisons, decreased emotional regulation and idealized self-presentation that negatively influenced body image. Pentathlon Junior World Championships conclude

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, July 1, (Xinhua): France spoiled Egypt's farewell party as Louison Cazaly and Diego Lavillat won gold in the Mixed Relay on the final day of the Internationale Union de Pentathlon Moderne (UIPM) 2024 Pentathlon **Junior World Champion**ships held in Alexandria, Egypt.

Although France managed to snatch the gold medal in the Mixed Relay, Egypt finished on top of the competition medal table, thanks to three gold medals, a silver, and two bronze.

Cazaly and Lavillat trailed behind Farida Khalil and Mazen Shaban of Egypt in the first three disciplines, but a strong performance in the laser run secured them the world title.

Poor shooting from the Egyptians in the final lap allowed Esther Fernandez Donda and Tim Leh of Germany to overtake them for silver, leaving the host nation with bronze.

Like last year's competition, South Korea missed out on a Mixed Relay medal, finishing 4th, while Hungary came 5th and Italy

This victory capped a successful week for Cazaly, who also secured her second gold as part of the Women's Team champions 24 hours earlier.

On Saturday, Pentathlon athletes Individual Neutral Athlete Viktoriia Sazonova and Moutaz Mohamed of Egypt made lifetime memories by winning their first junior individual gold medals in the Junior World Championships.

Sazonova and 13-year-old sensation Farida Khalil of Egypt set world records on their way to a duel at the top of the Women's Final leaderboard. Individual Neutral Athlete Elizaveta Skudnyakova secured silver behind her team-

France won the Women's Team gold medal, with three of their athletes finishing in the top 20, ahead of silver medallists Switzerland and bronze medallists Poland.

In the men's competition, Mohamed of Egypt earned 1,544 points to win gold. He earned six bonus points in his secondplace Fencing performance and maintained a strong position in swimming, with obstacle being his only discipline outside the top five. Egypt's consistent high performance throughout the day secured them the Men's Team gold, with silver medallists Ukraine and bronze medallists Germany trailing behind.

"I'm really happy to win a gold medal in my home country in the presence of my family," Mohamed told Xinhua after the contest. He noted that the competition was challenging due to the high caliber of athletes, adding that he prepared well to win a medal in this championship.

Meanwhile, Sherif El-Erian, UIPM Vice President and Head of the Egyptian Modern Pentathlon Federation, praised the hard work of Egyptian athletes in securing the maximum number of medals in this championship. We have also exerted great efforts to host this championship and are glad that the contest was a great success... we are now going to prepare for the Paris 2024 Olympics with hopes and determination to get more medals," he told Xinhua.

Young Chinese shuttler dies after collapsing on the court

Badminton players and officials in Yogyakarta paid tribute to Zhang by holding a minute of silence on the court Monday morning before the quarterfinals.

Barely a half-hour after the race stopped, a rainbow could be seen. NASCAR sent drivers back to their cars about 70 minutes after the red flag, and the stoppage lasted 81 minutes with 143 laps remaining. As cars hit the track under yellow, NASCAR sent Cindric

to the rear as a penalty for his crew having a fan on the pit wall pointed at his car during the red flag that was ruled as possibly cooling the vehicle for an extra edge.

John Hunter Nemechek raced to his second Xfinity Series victory of the year Saturday, then made his first Cup start at this track Sunday. The experience didn't carry over. Nemechek spun into the grass off Turn 4 of lap 117 to bring out the second caution of the race.

Alcaraz opens Wimbledon with straight-set victory

WIMBLEDON, England, July 1, (AP): Defending champion Carlos Alcaraz had goosebumps walking onto Centre Court before his opening match at Wimbledon on Monday, a 7-6 (3), 7-5, 6-2 win over qualifier Mark Lajal.

Lajal proved to be something of a speedbump for Alcaraz, who acknowledged that his 269th-ranked Estonian opponent "surprised me a little bit" on Day 1 at the All England Club.

Alcaraz, who won his third major championship at the French Open three weeks ago, defeated Novak Djokovic in last year's final on the grass at Wimbledon but said he was still nervous before Monday's match.

"When I walk into the court, I got goosebumps. I remembered last year. It was a great feeling," the 21-year-old Spaniard said in his on-court interview. "But I try not to think about it. It's a new year - totally different tournament. I have to be focused on my game just to play at the same level as last year if I want to repeat the same (success) as

Earlier, Aryna Sabalenka and Victoria Azarenka both pulled out of the tournament because of respective shoulder injuries.


Sabalenka, a two-time Australian Open champion, said she was "heartbroken " to announce her withdrawal after it became clear in a practice session that she wasn't ready

The No. 3 seed was seen as top contender at the All England Club, which has had seven different women win the title in the last seven years.

Azarenka is also a two-time champion at Melbourne Park.

Ninth-seeded Maria Sakkari was among the early winners on Monday, and said after beating McCartney Kessler 6-3, 6-1 that the women's draw is wide open.

McLaughlin-Levrone breaks world 400m hurdles record again at US Olympic trials

EUGENE, July 1, (AP): McLaughlin-Levrone lowered her world record once again, running the 400-meter hurdles in 50.65 seconds Sunday to win the U.S. Olympic trials. In only her fourth long hurdles race

of the season, the 24-year-old defending Olympic champion cleared all 10 barriers with ease, then went on a dead sprint to the line to break the record for the fifth time. Four of those marks have now come on track at University of Oregon's Hayward Field.

She held her hand over her mouth and stared in amazement when she saw the time come up. The mark was .03 seconds better than her run at Hayward in the 2022 world championships.

"My husband asked me yesterday, 'What do you think you can do?' and I told him "I don't know," McLaughlin-Levrone said in an interview over the stadium PA system. "Then today, I crossed the line and I'm like, 'Oh, snap. I'm blessed and happy to be here."

In an event that used to be decided by steps or slivers, McLaughlin-Levrone's victory was by 1.99 seconds over Anna Cockrell and 2.12 over Jasmine Jones.

It doesn't so much reset the storyline for the Olympics - McLaughlin-Levrone would've been the big-time favorite either way - as it makes track rethink what's possible.

From 2003-19, the world record in this event stayed stuck at 52.34. American Dalilah Muhammad broke it twice in 2019 - the second time at world championships in a race that demoral-

KFA has achieved the most important goals of 2030 strategy: Al-Shaheen

KUWAIT CITY, July 1: During the regular general assembly meeting at the Kuwait Football Association's headquarters in Jaber Al-Ahmad International Stadium, President Abdullah Al-Shaheen confirmed that the association had successfully achieved the main objectives of the 2030 strategy. These objectives include qualifying for the 2027 Asian Cup finals and reaching the decisive round of qualifiers for the 2026 World Cup. The meeting was chaired by Al-Shaheen and attended by Vice-Chairmen Ahmed Oqla and Hayef Al-Mutairi, Board Member Fatima Hayat, Secretary-General Hayat, Salah Al-Qenaei, representatives from clubs, members of the General Assembly, and representatives from the Inter-

national and Asian associations. In a press conference following the association's regular general assembly, Al-Shaheen stated, "The KFA continues to achieve its goals through concerted efforts, both governmental and in partnership with the private sector."

He elaborated that Kuwait is preparing for the decisive World Cup qualifiers, which necessitates raising the administrative and technical levels to match the Asian teams. The team is in Group B, which includes South Korea, Iraq, Oman, Jordan, and Palestine.

He remarked, "The Blue group is challenging, featuring the second and third best Asian teams and the Gulf champion.'

He added, "Anyone who does

not see the team's qualification for the Asian Cup after 20 years as an achievement should reconsider."

He also mentioned that the technical committee is evaluating candidates for the team's new coach, and that the team's plan and preparation programs will be different after qualifying for the decisive World Cup qualifiers. An announcement regarding this plan will be made within 10 days.

Regarding the exclusion of Badr Al-Mutawa and Khaled Al-Rashidi from the national team, Al-Shaheen explained that it was a "purely technical" decision aimed at lowering the average age of players from 32 to 26 to infuse young blood.

He emphasized that the decision to increase the number of professionals in clubs and change names benefits the national teams and strengthens the professional system.

He highlighted the association's focus on young players, organizing the Blue League for local players, which involves eight local players and three professionals, along with the potential use of players under 15 to increase experience.

Al-Shaheen called on national companies to support the team in the upcoming elections and foster a partnership between the public and private sectors to elevate Kuwait's status in international forums.

He added, "We are building a young team that competed in the recent West Asian Championship, forming the nucleus for the future of Kuwaiti football. We are preparing the players to participate with the first team in 2027, 2028, and 2030."

Cavendish crossed 113th but was given the same finishing time as Girmay as per rules that neutralize the times in case of crashes in the final five kilometers.

Pogacar dropped to second overall, with the same time as Carapaz, who is the first Ecuadorian rider to wear the yellow jersey.

The General Assembly approved the financial and administrative reports, the agenda, and the formation of judicial committees within the federation.
