KUWAIT CITY, July 27: First Deputy Prime Minister, Minister of Defense and Interior Sheikh Fahad Yousuf Al-Sabah has issued a resolution on amending some provisions of Article 29 of Ministerial Resolution No. 957/2019.

This article stipulates the executive regulations of the Expatriates Residency Law, specifically on allowing an expatriate who has no university degree to bring his wife and children to the country under the family visa provided his

> salary in the work permit is not less than KD800.

Article One of the resolution states that Article 29 of Minis-terial Resolution No. 957/2019 shall be amended as follows: To obtain a regular family visa for expatriates, the monthly salary of the applicant must not be less than KD800 based on the work permit.

On granting a regular family visa to those present or born inside the country, and those born outside the country -- who are not more than five years old -- to parents residing in the country; the director general of the Residency Affairs General Department at the Interior Ministry shall be responsible for exempting them from the salary requirement referred to in the first paragraph of this article in accordance with the regulations and conditions specified by the Residency Affairs Gen-

eral Department. Article Two stipulates that the undersecretary of the ministry (in charge) shall implement the de-cision, which shall be effective from the date of its publication in the Official Gazette.

The residency affairs departments in the governorates have started receiving the family visa applications of expatriates who do not hold a university degree salary of not less KD800.

Kuwait poised to meet low-sulfur fuel demand

KUWAIT CITY, July 27: Oil expert Kamel Al-Harami has affirmed Kuwait's capability to fulfill the global demand for low-sulfur fuel oil, citing substantial surpluses from the country's three main refineries - Al-Zour, Al-Ahmadi, and Mina Abdullah.

His remarks come as international news sources report a significant increase in Saudi Arabia's demand for this fuel, driven by a severe shortage of Russian supplies.

According to Al-Harami, Saudi Arabia is expected to import over 180,000 tons of low-sulfur fuel oil from Kuwait in July alone. This move is a rare occurrence, highlighting the growing need for alternative sources due to the decline in Russian fuel oil availability.

Al-Harami explained that Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) has increased production at its Al-Zour refinery, which has led to an oversupply. Despite the Ministry of Electricity and Water initially being allocated 30 percent of this production, it opted to use less expensive imported gas, resulting in a surplus that Kuwait can now export to Saudi Arabia.

The Ministry's decision to rely on imported gas has allowed Kuwait to allocate excess low-sulfur fuel oil to meet international demand.

Kuwait's three refineries collectively produce low-sulfur fuel oil at a rate of 10 to 15% of their total refined output.

Kuwaitis urged to throw weight behind compatriots at Paris Oly

PARIS, July 27, (KUNA): Minister of State for Youth Affairs Amthal Al-Huwaila has urged Kuwaitis to support their athletes during the 2024 Summer Olympic Games, which commenced on Friday in Paris. Leading the Kuwaiti delegation, Al-Huwaila, who also serves as Minister of Social Affairs, Family, and Childhood Affairs, made this statement to KUNA.

The Kuwait Olympic Committee is participating in the global event with

nine athletes competing in swimming, rowing, fencing, sailing, and shooting. Al-Huwaila praised Kuwait's involvement in the Games, which will continue until August 11, and highlighted the determination of Kuwaiti competitors.

Kuwait has taken part in the Olympics 14 times, beginning with the 1968 Games in Mexico City. The 1980 Moscow Olympics saw Kuwait's largest delegation of 56 athletes, and the Athens 2004 Games marked the debut of Kuwaiti female athletes.

Meanwhile, Chairman of the Kuwait Olympic Committee Sheikh Fahad Nasser Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah affirmed that Kuwait's participation in the Paris Olympics reflects the continued support of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah and His Highness the Crown Prince Sheikh Sabah Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah for the sports movement. Sheikh Fahad Nasser, in remarks to KUNA, expressed deep appreciation for Their Highnesses' backing, which ensures Kuwait's strong presence in international competitions with nine athletes competing across six different sports.

TEHRAN: A heat wave blanketing Iran has forced authorities to cut operating hours at various facilities Saturday and order all government and commercial institutions to shutter on Sunday.

The temperature ranged from 37 degrees Celsius (98.6 degrees Fahrenheit) to 42 \dot{C} (about 107 F) in the capital, Tehran on Saturday, according to weather reports. (AP)

No Hantavirus cases in Kuwait

KUWAIT CITY, July 27: Amid the wave of panic in the United States due to the spread of Hantavirus that has claimed the lives of four people. an internal medicine and epidemiology consultant at Adan Hospital Dr. Ghanem Al-Hujailan affirmed that the virus does not pose a risk to Kuwait.

In a press statement, he assured that, "Kuwait is completely distant from the hotspots of the virus's spread, and there is no need for concern.'

Dr. Al-Hujailan stated, "Hantavirus is a dangerous virus that became widespread among mice. It is unlikely to spread in Kuwait or be transmitted from travelers coming from abroad because it is transmitted from wild rodents to humans through contact with materials contaminated with rodent urine, saliva, or feces. It is not transmitted from person to person."

Kuwait 1st batch of drone pilots & techies graduates

ANKARA, July 27, (KUNA): The Kuwait Air Force announced Saturday the first batch of the Turkish-made TB2 combat drones', Bayraktar, pilots and technicians graduated during a ceremony held in Turkiye, in the presence of the military attaché.

Some pilots, personnel and technicians in varied specialties have passed the four-month training course, as part of a training program set to prepare technical teams and pilots of the drones, Kuwait Ministry of Defense said in a statement.

The Bayraktar was tested in Kuwait in 2019 when it flew a non-stop mission, reaching 27 hours and three minutes, in tough climate conditions.

In June 2023, the Ministry signed a contract with Turkiye to get the Bayraktar TB2, with the aim of enhancing Kuwaiti army's combat potential. The drone has high technical capabilities in carrying out multitasks to support security and military operations.

Meanwhile, the Air Force, represented by Abdullah Al-Mubarak Air Base, carried out recently an aero-medical evacuation exercise in cooperation with the Medical Services Authority of the Air Force.

The General Staff of the Kuwaiti Army said in a press statement that the exercise simulates the scenario of transporting patients and injured people by C17 and C130 transport aircraft.

It stated that the exercise aims to raise the level of cooperation, coordination, and speed of response in procedures between the Air Force and the Medical Services Authority in the field of aero-medical evacuation.



KUWAIT CITY, July 27: Flaming electronic campaigns, rumors, misinformation, and the distortion of facts are rampant on social media platforms. They contribute to damaging the reputation of countries and their people, stirring doubts, and undermining trust.

Social media has increasingly become a breeding ground for attacks on reputations of countries and for destabilizing them.

They called for the establishment of a truly independent State of Palestine in accordance with the relevant United Nations

the Gaza Strip, and the formation of a tem porary national reconciliation government.

The success of the dialogue reflects the confidence of the Palestinian groups in China and their recognition of China's diplomatic stance and mediation capabilities. It also sends a positive signal for peace in the context of the turbulent regional situation.

China was one of the first countries to recognize both the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) and the State of Palestine. It has always considered the Palestinian

issue as core to the Middle East issue, and firmly supports the Palestinian people's demand for an independent state.

The President of China Xi Jinping proposed initiatives and visions several times for resolving the Palestinian issue, contributing Chinese wisdom and solutions to resolving the Palestinian issue.

To address the current conflict impasse, the Chinese side is proposing a "three-step' initiative. They are:

1. To achieve a comprehensive, permanent and sustainable ceasefire in the Gaza Strip as soon as possible and ensure the smooth delivery of humanitarian aid and relief.

2. To bring about collaborative governance post-conflict in the Gaza Strip, in line with the principle of "Palestine is governed by the Palestinians".

According to observers and followers of electronic affairs, some parties and individuals use the names, images, and flags of countries and prominent figures to target and destabilize nations and their people by spreading misleading information and lies that tarnish the reputations of specific countries and incite discord among peoples

Observers say this exploitation could lead to the deterioration of diplomatic relations between countries, undermine trust between citizens and their governments, and incite hatred and internal conflicts . The goal of these activities may be to achieve hidden political or economic interests by attacking national unity.

While observers stress that government media outlets must rise to the occasion by enhancing public awareness, they urged them to respond and communicate constantly with newspapers and other media outlets with complete transparency, and clarity to deter these electronic wars.

They explained that these accounts exploit people's trust in well-known figures by using their photographs to spread false information and lies. The aim is often to destabilize political and social stability by impersonating influential figures or using national symbols to incite internal and external conflicts.

Observers have called for implementing measures to verify news and educate individuals on how to identify fake accounts and misleading content. They also emphasize the need for enhanced international cooperation and coordination among countries to combat these malicious activities, as well as working with media outlets to address and counter fake accounts and harmful content.

CAN warns against sun exposure in peak hours

KUWAIT CITY, July 27: Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Cancer Aware Nation (CAN) campaign Dr. Khaled Al-Saleh warned people against direct exposure to sunlight, especially during peak hours. He revealed that a total of 297 cases of skin cancer were

recorded in Kuwait in the last ten years, including 179 cases among men, constituting 60 percent, and 118 cases among women, constituting 40 percent.

Dr. Al-Saleh said this in a press statement he issued on the sidelines of the celebration of the Awareness Day for Sun Protection under the slogan "Protect Yourself from Skin Cancer", which was held with the cooperation of Jahra Hospital's Dermatology Unit.

He explained that the number of cases among Kuwaiti men is 55, constituting 1.1 percent, while the global standard rate is 1.6 percent per 100,000 people.

As for Kuwaiti women, the number of infections is 58, constituting a rate of 0.7 percent, while the global standard rate is 1.2 percent per 100,000 people.

The infection rate among non-Kuwaiti men is 124 cases at a rate of 1.9 percent, while the global standard rate is 1.5 percent per 100,000 people.

The number of infections among non-Kuwaiti women reached 60 cases, at a rate of 0.9 percent, with the global standard rate being 1.2 percent per 100,000 people.

Kuwait's EPA, Japan embassy eye boost in environment cooperation

KUWAIT CITY, July 27, (KUNA): The Environmental Public Authority (EPA) and the Japanese embassy in Kuwait discussed ways to enhance cooperation within the sustainable environment, exchange expertize within this domain.

Speaking to KUNA after meeting with Japanese Ambassador Morino Yasunari, Deputy Director of Technical Affairs at the EPA Dr. Abdullah Al-Zaidan commended the cooperation between the two sides, affirming that it came within the framework of Kuwait's sustainable development goals and international agreements and commitments on climate change and biological diversity signed by both countries.

Issues of mutual interest were discussed namely boosting cooperation for sustainable environmental and social development as well as protection of the ecosystem from climate change and pollutants, he added.

He went on to reveal that cooperation to develop healthy environmental systems for future generations were also discussed during the meeting, which touched also on the negative impact of climate change on earth and Kuwait in particular.

The Kuwaiti official also touched on the issue of recycling, noting that waste could be used to generate power, and leading to less load on current electrical power generating structures

He thanked the Japanese embassy for its continuous efforts to help Kuwait tackle issues of prominent environmental importance.

On his part, Ambassador Morino commended the EPA for its keenness on bolster ecological cooperation with Japan, expressing gratitude for its ongoing involvement in "Operation Turtles" cleaning campaign marking its 25th anniversary.

Crackdown pledged on fake degrees

KUWAIT CITY, July 27: For the second time in 22 days, the Minister of Education and Minister of Higher Education and Scientific Research, Dr. Adel Al-Adwani, has referred a number of academic certificates to the Public Prosecution as part of an ongoing campaign to combat the phenomenon of forged certificates, reports Al-Rai daily.

Following the referral of a batch of certificates on July 3, based on the recommendations of the Ministry of Education's investigation committee, Dr. Al-Adwani announced yesterday the approval of the

Ministry of Higher Education's investigation committee recommendations to refer another set of post-secondary academic certificates to the Public Prosecution.

This second batch includes documents that have been found to be fraudulent, with alterations made to the data contained in the academic certificates to obtain equivalency.

In a press statement, Dr. Al-Adwani emphasized the importance of this campaign, linking it to the directives of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad to combat corruption and work towards national progress.

'Educational reforms crucial to produce competent workforce'

"WE ARE tired of the convoluted language that often pervades research introductions, filled with explicit and vague assumptions, comparisons, and oppositions, ultimately culminating in the research problem," columnist AbdulRahman Al-Jeeran wrote for Al-Rai daily.

"What we seek is a clear understanding of the true position of human beings in the context of civilizational (human) "Without a future for the complete

True development of this personality requires a leadership quality rooted in conscience and free from deficiencies and shortcomings. "Human

sonality comprises mind, emotion. and conscience it is more than just

organs, functions, cells, and nerves. The essence of human development lies in nurturing this personality through its growth stages.

"According to the constitution, there is no obstacle preventing the state from caring for and protecting the young from neglect, exploitation, or misuse. Yet, we see continued cliques and bureaucratic inertia preventing progress.

"In higher education and among some university deans, we observe that we are far from producing individuals who have developed to the point of a strong conscience or "religious restraint." Instead, we see individuals who are only concerned with avoiding treatment as minors and continuing the wasteful practices of a rentier state.

"We long for the day when our educational system produces advanced individuals with a heightened sense of conscience, capable of leading and reforming education. We do not want individuals who are like donkeys turning in a waterwheel with closed eyes or blind creatures laboring in darkness, oblivious to their role in building a future for self-serving interests.

"We expect that promotions and educational outcomes will foster individuals who recognize their role as pioneers for the next generation. They should understand that they are shaping the future through their efforts and academic endeavors.

"Every individual must remember that the laws and values of the past remain relevant today. Struggle is ongoing, shifting from material concerns to spiritual and ethical values.

"One must maintain dignity and integrity, striving against comprehensive corruption with genuine national motives. This is the spark of reform within you, a choice you must embrace or neglect. Your decision impacts your work for the greater good, reflecting your commitment

edgeable authority, will decide what is right and wrong.

"It is crucial to address issues such as fictitious employment in the private sector and examine expenditure distribution across ministries and government departments. Solutions may involve re-evaluating and possibly cutting some expenditure to better manage our financial resources.'

"Is it time for a government-owned company to handle home maintenance? The answer is a big YES," columnist Dr. Khaled Ahmad Al-Saleh wrote for Al-Rai daily.


"The public in Kuwait is today raising a complaint about the maintenance prices. Options have dwindled, and there is a notable disparity in maintenance costs. For instance, if your air conditioner malfunctions during the scorching weather, the repair quotes given by the technicians can cause additional anxiety. Whether it is plumbing or electrical issues, or damage to flooring, homeowners have limited choices and often feel compelled to accept rates that strain many families' budgets. Workers in Kuwait seem unified in their pricing, leaving you with few options, and sometimes surpassing the financial means of many families.

"Some cooperative societies tried to alleviate the problem by employing workers and setting the service prices, something for which the residents are grateful. However, there are many ways these workers follow to circumvent offering this service. Also, many areas of Kuwait do not provide this service.

"Most of the workers do not have specialized skills. You will find them spread throughout Kuwait and active in getting customers. They compete to place advertisements for their services. They have to save a large sum of money to give to their sponsors who brought them to Kuwait. In order to save money for the sponsor, as well as for themselves and their families, they raise prices for the services they offer the consumers, even though the level of their professionalism is weak. "As usual, in every problem, the or-

dinary citizens are the ones who have to pay the price. Both the citizens and the residents need a solution to this problem today. The budget of many families is no longer capable of maintaining their homes and ensuring their cleanliness and beauty.

"The government must provide trained workers through a joint-stock company. They should be free from exploitation by sponsors, and provided with good housing facilities. The service prices must be set and continuously monitored for any unjustified hikes. It is the company's responsibility to provide trained workers in all parts of Kuwait. It gives confidence to the Kuwaiti consumers in helping families and also preserving the dignity of workers away from exploitation. "Are we able to do that? Today, with

KUWAIT CITY, July 27: Sheikh Abdullah Salem Al-Ali, the Governor of the Capital, has lauded the significant efforts of security forces in apprehending residency law violators and wanted individuals. A security operation took place in Khaitan at dawn, led by Major General Abdullah Safah, in collaboration with the Residency Affairs Investigations of numerous violators. These individuals are processed according to the law and referred to the appropriate authorities for necessary actions, including deportation.

The Ministry of Interior has resumed its campaigns against residency violators, which were briefly paused at the beginning of Muharram to focus on securing Husseini councils during Ashura nights.

A recent security operation in Khaitan, spearheaded by Major General Abdullah Safah, resulted in the arrest of 30 individuals. These included people with expired residency permits, those absent without leave, individuals with expired visit vi-

MoH building center to treat drug addicts

KUWAIT CITY, July 27: The Minister of Social, Family and Childhood Affairs and Minister of State for Youth Affairs Dr. Amthal Al-Huwaila confirmed that the ministry is keen on implementing the recommendations of the political leadership and directives of the Council of Ministers to contribute to the ongoing efforts to address the drugs issue and enhance its social role by supporting national projects that serve the community, reports Al-Rai daily.

The ministry revealed this in press statement it

issued following the inspection tour of Al-Huwaila in the addiction treatment center project site to personally look into the latest developments in the implementation of the project and the quality of work.

Acting Undersecretary of the ministry Dr. Khaled Al-Ajmi, several ministry officials, members of the National Projects Committee, Union of



Consumer Cooperative Societies and the company implementing the project were present during the inspection.

Al-Huwaila stressed the need to overcome all obstacles to speed up the completion of the center, which will be operated by the Ministry of Health using the latest systems.

The minister also inspected the facilities of the building, which consists of four floors with a capacity of 208 beds, a swimming pool, a health club, a pharmacy, specialized clinics and other services.

During the tour, the minister was briefed on the progress of work and the requirements for equipping the center, which will be received from the implementing company soon. The project is funded and implemented by the National Projects Committee under the umbrella of the Ministry of Social, Family and Child Affairs.

2 die in building fall

Decomposed body of Asian woman 'found'

KUWAIT CITY, July 27: A decomposed body was discovered in a building in the Bneid Al Qar area, according to a security source. Initial information suggests that the body is that of a Filipino woman. The Public Prosecution and the Criminal Evidence Department were immediately notified. The Public Prosecution has ordered the removal of the body and its referral to the forensic medicine department to ascertain the cause of death, reports Al-Rai daily.

2 crushed to death: Two expatriates, born in 1988 and 1985 respectively, tragically lost their lives when a government building under construction collapsed, reports Al-Anba daily.

Authorities promptly arrived at the scene on Friday to assess the situation, examining the extent of the construction and investigating the cause of the collapse. A security source reported that the Ministry of Interior was notified of the incident around 7:00 am. It was discovered that the two expatriates were working on the construction when a wall fell on them.

Top official probed: The Public Authority for Combating Corruption (Nazaha) announced that, following an investigation and the collection of evidence, a former senior official of the National Council for Culture, Arts, and Letters has been referred to the Public Prosecution, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

This referral is based on the suspicion of unintentionally harming public funds, in accordance with Article No. 14 of Law No. 1 of 1993 on the protection of public funds and Article No. 22 of Law No. 2 of 2016, which established the Public itv for Combating Corruption





to the nation and its leadership."

"Many are apprehensive about the recent statements by the Minister of Finance, whether in local newspapers or at the "General Budget Forum." "However, following the Minister's disclosure about the public treasury's assets, the extent of our financial predicament is now clearer. It is crucial for the government to address its wasteful practices seriously, as they impact our future.

"While we may not have desired such candidness, and while fame and wealth are not the primary goals, it is essential for the government to focus on internal and external rationalization. This includes not just helping other nations -- a moral obligation that does not significantly impact public income --but also ensuring that our financial blessings are preserved.

"Although I am not an economist, I am reminded of a story about a merchant's son. After his father admitted he could no longer cover the family's increasing expenses, the sons were perplexed. They only accounted for 20% of the expenses and were unsure of what action to take.

"One suggested that the father should consider divorcing one of his wives to reduce costs, but the father refused, as divorce was against his beliefs, leaving the family in a quandary

"Turning back to the Minister's statements, rather than viewing them as part of the problem, they may offer insights into the solution. His comments raise questions about the impact on the Kuwaiti dinar and whether the increase in salary percentages to 30% of GDP is justifiable, particularly for employees with salaries ranging from 650 to 1300 dinars.

"The Minister should scrutinize the lists of those receiving substantial financial benefits and exceptional salaries to understand the disparity.

"Additionally, subsidies are provided to some who may not need them, based on the principle of "increasing good for the good."

"Finally, are the Minister's media presentations meant to solicit public input for solutions? We believe not. The government, being the most knowl-

the new Kuwait, the long list of exploiters no longer has much power. There are steps to limit those fake companies, institutions and individuals who grant residency to expatriates in exchange for money. They are the main reason for the spread of marginal untrained workers in Kuwait who exploit citizens and residents without mercy. Mercy is something that they did not get from the sponsors so that they could give it to the consumers."

"According to Abu Hurairah (May Allah be pleased with him), the Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) stated, "Come closer, act righteously, and know that none of you will attain salvation sole-ly through deeds." "Delaying the stay and then praying for funerals, especially after the burial has started following dinner, leads to an unnecessary prolonging of the process. This results in mourners remaining at the Sulaibikhat cemetery until nearly 11:00pm, making it difficult for them and worshippers alike. The imam would not be at a disadvantage if he were to expedite the prayer and simplify matters for the people. "Al-Muqarābah" refers to the intention without any exaggeration and negligence.

"The term "Al-Sadad" means uprightness and correctness. In another hadith, the Prophet Mohammad (PBUH) says, "Whoever among you leads the people in prayer, let him make it slow, for among them are the young, the elderly, the weak, and the needy. And when one of you prays alone, let him prolong it as he wishes.

"As for waiting for worshippers to arrive, it is merely talk; the opportunity may pass, so those interested in attending funerals should arrive early, even before the prayer. All we ask of the "hijacked" ministry is to consider the circumstances of the people and advise the imam to expedite matters, especially since most now only offer their condolences at the cemetery.

"Does the mosque's imam enjoy such dense crowds and traffic? Mourners and honking horns with traffic congestion, particularly during times of multiple funerals, prompt us to adopt the "innovation" of offering condolences at the cemetery. Must we thus spend the evening there"?

PAFN destroys 90kg spoiled popular fish

Violators face law

KUWAIT CITY, July 27: The Public Authority for Food and Nutrition (PAFN) recently destroyed 90 kilograms of spoiled fish and issued 31 reports of various violations during an inspection tour at the Mubarakiya Market in Murghab.

In an exclusive statement to the newspaper, Head of the Mubarakiya Market Department at PAFN Mohammad Al-Kandari revealed that the inspection teams in the Capital Governorate conducted an inspection tour of fish shops; which resulted in the seizure of large quantities of grouper, pomfret and shrimp whose natural properties changed like the color, shape and smell.

He said the inspectors discovered many violations; such as selling food items unfit for human consumption and adulterated food, workers selling food without obtaining a health certificate, employing workers without obtaining a health certificate, failure to adhere to the rules on public and personal hygiene at work, operating a food facility with an expired health license, opening a food facility without obtaining a health license, and failure to adhere to the general regulations concerning food establishments.

He affirmed the inspection teams will continue their tours to track down anyone who dares harm the health of citizens and expatriates, stressing that legal measures will be taken against violators.

Meanwhile, inspectors from the Capital Inspection Department at the Public Authority for Food and Nutrition (PAFN) recorded 10 violations in their most recent inspection tour in food establishments in Murghab, reports Al-Rai daily

KUWAIT CITY, July 27: The Civil Service Commission has announced the nomination of 752 male and female citizens to fill various job positions in government agencies. This new batch is part of the bureau's ongoing efforts to address job needs and provide employment opportunities for registered candidates, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

In a press statement on its official social media account X, the CSC detailed that this nomination is part of the job needs plan and targets specializations that were previously stagnant.

This batch includes all registered holders of a Bachelor's degree in Petroleum Engineering, totaling 220 citizens. Additionally, 344 candidates with degrees in Chemical Engineering and

nical work performed at these stations.

The Audit Bureau's reports have consistently flagged these discrepancies, prompting the Ministry to take corrective action.

The Administrative Affairs Department has decided to suspend these allowances retroactively, effective from the beginning of the current fiscal year. This decision aims to address the audit observations and ensure compliance with accounting standards.

The ministry has asked employees affected by the suspension to transfer to departments that align with their specializations.

Industrial Engineering have been nominated. This nomination marks the first batch for these specializations, with more batches to follow based on the needs of government agencies.

The nominated candidates are expected to fill newly created engineering positions such as contracts engineer, environmental engineer, project engineer, and safety engineer.

The CSC has advised the nominated candidates to visit their respective employers directly without the need to visit the bureau.

This initiative underscores the bureau's commitment to addressing employment stagnation and meeting the evolving needs of government institutions

However, many employees have resisted moving, preferring to stay in their current roles to retain the allowances. As a result, the Administrative Affairs Department has proceeded with the suspension.

Approximately 50 employees visited the Ministry's building in South Surra recently to seek clarification on the suspension of these allowances, which will affect their salaries from August onwards

The ministry's actions are intended to prevent further audit issues and ensure proper allocation of allowances based on job roles and responsibilities.

Clause 7 of Article 15 of the current regulations states: "The establishment of these advertisements shall be limited to industrial areas, and the municipality may permit their establishment in front of independent stores, provided that they are not connected to other stores and have their own services, and are far from residential buildings.

The proposed amendment suggested adding cooperative societies to this clause, allowing advertisements in industrial zones and cooperative societies, provided they are not connected to other shops, have their own services, and are far from residential buildings.



The Department of Health Services in the state of Arizona confirmed the increase in the number of Hantavirus cases. The US health authorities revealed that from the beginning of this year, seven cases of Hantavirus pulmonary syndrome were confirmed with three deaths in Arizona, and two cases in California including one death.

The health authorities said, "The most severe and sometimes fatal respiratory disease is caused by the Hantavirus. The main symptoms of infection are fever, headache, and muscle pain that quickly make breathing difficult. This virus may be present in many areas of the southwestern United States where there is rodent activity, even if mice have never been seen."

1. Gradual enforcement of citations with warnings or orders for reconciliation, particularly in unfenced areas where the prohibition is not widely known, such as sidewalks without clear signage.

2. Collaborate with the municipality to clean up scattered debris along the Seventh Ring Road, Salmi Road, and Abdali Road. Remove remnants of fixed stables and abandoned spring camps scattered throughout the Kuwaiti des-

3. Organize the pigeon coops, which currently span areas exceeding one kilometer, posing obstacles to livestock movement for grazing. Specific designated areas should be allocated for them, ensuring they do not exceed these boundaries and expand their stable areas..

4. Establish a joint committee between Kuwait Municipality and the Environment Public Authority dedicated to overseeing spring camps, fixed stables, and pigeon coops. Permits will be issued specifying the area and duration allowed, with periodic enforcement campaigns in the spring to penalize those operating without permits. This initiative aims to safeguard the environment by defining and monitoring the exact coordinates of each camp or stable. It is also mandated that upon departure, operators notify the committee within ten days to prevent fines for leaving waste in the same location.

5. Issue a 48-hour crossing permit aimed at easing the movement of livestock owners. Currently, navigating around the reserve to access the opposite side compels them to travel considerable distances and cross highways. Allowing crossing within the reserve, with the condition of avoiding damage to crops, significantly reduces travel time and effort for livestock owners

6. Set up a WhatsApp number to facilitate cooperation and receive notifications about privately owned reserves located in designated grazing areas assigned by the joint committee. These notifications will enable prompt removal of unauthorized structures, ensuring the designated areas are used appropriately for grazing purposes.

'Agreement with Russia deal with devil': Signing an agreement with Russia to stop the war with Ukraine would amount to signing a deal with the devil, a top adviser to Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said, as pressure mounts on the country to seek an end to more than two years of fighting.

A deal would only buy time for Russian President Vladimir Putin to strengthen his army and usher in another, potentially more violent chapter in the war, Mykhailo Podolyak told The Associated Press in an interview Thurs-

"If you want to sign a deal with the devil, who will then drag you to hell, well, go for it. This is what Russia is,' Podolyak said when asked about the prospects for a peace deal for Kyiv, whose forces are locked in a bloody war of attrition with Moscow's troops in eastern Ukraine. "If you sign anything today with

Russia, that will not lose the war and will not be legally responsible for mass

crimes, this will mean that you have signed yourself a ticket to continue the war on a different scale, with other protagonists, with a different number of killed and tortured people," he said.

It is a view held across Zelenskyy's camp and reflected broadly among Ukrainians. But it also increasingly comes up against the current of Western pressure, as Kyiv continues to face difficult front-line conditions against Moscow's larger, better equipped army, as well as uncertainty over the level of future political support from Ukraine's closest ally, the US. War fatigue also appears to be eroding the morale of Ukrai-

nians, who have struggled with constant bombardment, elec-tricity outages and the loss of loved ones. (AP)

Dam bursts in west-central Russia: About 200 people have found themselves in a flood zone near the city of Karabash in Russia's west-central region of Chelyabinsk following a dam burst at the Kialimskoye Reservoir, local authorities said on Friday

"Water broke through the dam in the Kialim reservoir, one of the major sources of drinking water for the city of Karabash. People are veing evacuated from the villages of Kialim and Mukhametovo. Around 200 people are staying in the flooded area," the Karabash municipal administration was quoted by

TASS News Agency as saying. A state of emergency has been declared in the Karabash municipal district.

According to the Chelyabinsk Center for Hydrometeorology and Environmental Monitoring, up to 73 mm of rainfall fell in the region during the 24 hours of July 25 and the night of July 26, which amounts to 1-1.5 monthly norms in some places.

Due to the dam breach at the Kialimskoye Reservoir, one settlement has already been flooded. As a precautionary measure, evacuation efforts are currently underway in three communities. (Xinhua)

Russia detains ex-deputy defense minister: A former Russian defense ministry official was arrested on corruption charges, the Russian security services said Friday, the latest in

a series of high-profile military arrests. Former Deputy Defense Minister Gen. Dmitry Bulgakov was detained in Moscow and ordered held in custody pending an investigation and trial, Russia's Investigative Committee said in a statement without giving further details.

Bulgakov was deputy defense minister from 2008 to September 2022, when he was dismissed. He was in charge of logistics at the time, and while the ministry had said that he was taking another job, the move was seen as punishment for flaws in supporting operations in Ukraine.

Seven top military figures have now been arrested on charges of fraud, bribery or abuse of office in recent months, including Deputy Defense Minister Timur Ivanov who was arrested for bribery in April and later dismissed from his position. (AP)

California's largest wildfire explodes in size as fires rage across US West

California's largest active fire exploded in size on Friday evening, growing rapidly amid bone-dry fuel and threatening thousands of homes as firefighters scrambled to meet the danger. The Park Fire's intensity and dramatic spread led

fire officials to make unwelcome comparisons to the monstrous Camp Fire, which burned out of control

in nearby Paradise in 2018, killing 85 people and torching 11,000 homes.

More than 130 structures have been destroyed by this fire so far, and thousands more are threatened as evacuations were ordered in four counties: Butte, Plumas, Tehama and Shasta. It stood at 480 square miles (1,243 square kilometers) on Friday night and

was moving quickly north and east after igniting Wednesday when authorities said a man pushed a burning car into a gully in Chico and then calmly blended in with others fleeing the scene. "There's a tremendous amount of fuel out there and

it's going to continue with this rapid pace," Cal Fire incident commander Billy See said at a briefing. (AP)

Beshear apologizes for barb, but not to Vance

ATLANTA, July 27, (AP): Former US president Barack Obama and former first lady Michelle Obama have endorsed Kamala Harris in her White House bid, giving the vice president the expected but still crucial backing of the nation's two most popular Democrats.

The endorsement, announced Friday in a video showing Harris accepting a joint phone call from the former first couple, comes as Harris builds momentum as their party's likely nominee after President Joe Biden's decision to end his reelection bid and endorse his second-in-command against Republican nominee and former president Donald Trump. It also highlights the friendship and potentially historic link between the nation's first Black president and the first woman, first Black woman and first person of Asian descent to serve as vice president, who is now vying to break those barriers at the presidential rank.

"We're gonna have some fun with this too, aren't we?" Harris said.

The Obamas are perhaps the last major party figures to endorse Harris formally, a reflection of the former president's desire to remain, at least publicly, a party elder operating above the fray. Russian man accused of staging bombing held: Russia's top security agency said Friday that it arrested a man accused of staging a car bombing on Ukrainian orders.

The Federal Security Service, or FSB, showed a video of the handcuffed suspect walking off a plane from Turkey escorted by masked officers.

Turkish authorities said that they detained the suspect, Yevgeniy Serebryakov, on Russia's request on Wednesday. He arrived in Turkey's resort of Bodrum hours after a car bomb went off in Moscow.

Russian authorities said that two people were injured by the bomb that detonated after they got into the car in northern Moscow. Russian media said that the car belonged to a senior military intelligence officer.

The FSB said the suspect was acting on orders from Ukraine's spy agency and released a video of his confessions. It was impossible to verify the claims that he made under duress. Ukrainian officials have denied involvement. (AP)

French train networks partially restored: French railway company SNCF said Saturday it has made progress in partially restoring high-speed train services after acts of sabotage disrupted three major lines ahead of Friday night's Olympic Games opening ceremony on the Seine River.

SNCF said its agents worked through the night in adverse weather conditions to improve the TGV traffic from the north, east and west to Paris. As of Saturday morning, normal service had resumed on the Eastern high-speed line.

"On the North, Brittany and South-West high-speed lines, seven out of 10 trains on average will run with delays of one to two hours," SNCF said.

The company added that traffic will continue to be disrupted on the North axis on Sunday, but conditions are expected to improve on the Atlantic axis for weekend returns. Customers are being contacted via text message and email to confirm the running of their trains.

Despite the disruptions, SNCF said all transportation for Olympic teams and accredited personnel will be maintained as planned. (AP)

Hungary seeks to resolve Ukraine spat: Hungary will seek to resolve a dispute with Ukraine over the transfer of Russian oil by September to avoid a potential energy crisis, an aid to Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orbán said on Friday,

Orbán's chief of staff, Gergely Gulyás, alleged that Kyiv was "blackmailing" Budapest by blocking the transfer of some Russian crude across its territory.

Ukraine last month adopted sanctions against Lukoil, Russia's largest non-state firm. Hungary receives most of its crude from Russia via the Druzhba or "Friendship" pipeline which runs into Central Europe through Belarus and Ukraine, about half of which it receives from Lukoil.

The move angered officials in Slovakia and Hungary, which argued the blocked supply would endanger their energy security. (AP)

Governor of Italy's Liguria region resigns: The governor of Italy's northern Liguria region resigned on Friday after being held under house arrest since May as part of a corruption investigation by local prosecutors.

Giovanni Toti, a right-wing governor who is accused of providing political favors in exchange for election campaign funds, has denied any wrongdoing.

In a hand-written letter published by Italian news websites, Toti announced his decision to step down and call new elections within three months to allow citizens of Liguria to "decide about their future."

According to the judge's order signing off on Toti's arrest, he was accused of doing favors for local figures in exchange for money to fund four local elections in 2021 and 2022. (AP)

Plane crash causes fatalities: A plane crash in a remote area of northeastern Wyoming caused an unspecified number of fatalities and sparked a wildfire, authorities said Friday.

The plane crashed at about 1 pm north of the town of Gillette near the Wyoming state line, Campbell County officials said in a social media post. The number of fatalities was not immediately released. A distress signal was sent out by the

plane before the crash, Campbell County Undersheriff Quentin Reynolds told the Gillette News Record. Callers later reported seeing smoke columns rising into the air near the suspected crash site, he said.

The wildfire that resulted from the crash was being suppressed using aircraft, heavy equipment and engine crews, officials said. (AP)

Trump struck by bullet - FBI: Nearly two weeks after Donald Trump's near assassination, the FBI confirmed Friday that it was indeed a bullet that struck the former president's ear, moving to clear up conflicting accounts about what caused the former president's injuries after a gunman opened fire at a Pennsylvania rally.

"What struck former president Trump in the ear was a bullet, whether whole or fragmented into smaller pieces, fired from the deceased subject's rifle," the agency said in a statement.

The one-sentence statement from the FBI marked the most definitive law enforcement account of Trump's injuries and followed ambiguous comments earlier in the week from Director Christopher Wray that appeared to cast doubt on whether Trump had actually been hit by a bullet. (AP)

Inmate found dead at prison: An inmate was found dead inside his cell at a Mississippi prison, about 90 miles (145 kilometers) east of the state's capitol, authorities said Friday.

Sinaloa cartel leaders held Oppn leader provides hope for Venezuelans

CARACAS, Venezuela, July 27, (AP): **Maria Corina Machado** has hiked overpasses, walked highways, ridden motorcycles, sought shelter in supporters' homes and seen her closest collaborators detained and persecuted. She has held the calloused hands of crying men, worn dozens of gifted rosaries and listened to the pleas of the young and old while crisscrossing Venezuela.

The ruling party has blocked Machado from running in Sunday's hotly contested presidential election, but fueled by that ban, she has become the driving force for the main opposition coalition and a symbol of hope, courage and perseverance for millions of Venezuelans. Machado, once a political outcast, is their freedom fighter and the main threat to President Nicolás Maduro's reelection aspirations.



Supporters scream "Freedom! Freedom! Freedom!" as she arrives at rallies and while she speaks, some overwhelmed to the point of tears. The thousands-strong crowds include opponents of the self-professed socialist revolution that Maduro's predecessor began at the turn of the century, as well as voters who supported those ideals but abandoned them because of Venezuela's ongoing

Machado

crisis. Such is her power to commandeer millions of votes, that the ruling United Socialist Party of Venezuela has

taken to intimidating Machado and her supporters. The government has arrested collaborators and closed businesses associated with her, from a hotel where she stayed during a campaign stop to women that sold empanadas to her from their homes. Her campaign manager has sheltered at an embassy in the capital, Caracas, for months.

And all this when the name Machado, her face and party do not appear on the ballot, while Maduro shows up 13 times.

Machado was cemented as leader of the Unitary Platform coalition - the main opposition faction - in October, when she won the presidential primary with more than 90% of the vote.

Leadership

But Machado's road to leadership has been long and winding. Just months before the primary, even some opposition members considered the free-market firebrand a radical because of her unwillingness to negotiate with Maduro's government and her harsh criticism of those who did. As recently as 2021, she urged voters to boycott elections, arguing that their participation in an uneven playing field implicitly legitimized the ruling party.

The industrial engineer and daughter of a steel magnate began challenging the ruling party in 2004, when the non-governmental organization she co-founded, Súmate, promoted a referendum to recall then-President Hugo Chávez. The initiative failed, and Machado and other Súmate executives were charged with conspiracy.

A year later, she drew the anger of Chávez and his allies again for traveling to Washington to meet President George W. Bush in the Oval Office. Chávez considered Bush an adversary.

She formally entered the political arena in 2010

ASEAN diplomats condemn Myanmar violence

VIENTIANE, Laos, July 27, (AP): Southeast Asian top diplomats on Saturday condemned violence in Myanmar's ongoing civil war and urged for "practical" means to defuse rising tensions in the South China Sea during the last of the three-day regional talks with allies including the U.S., Russia and China.

Foreign Minister Saleumxay Kommasith of Laos, which currently chairs the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN), hailed dialogue partners for "frank, candid and constructive exchanges" on key issues revolving around regional security.

The weekend talks in the Laotian capital were dominated by the increasingly violent and destabilizing civil war in ASEAN-member Myanmar as well as maritime disputes of some of the bloc members with China, which have led to direct confrontations that many worry could lead to broader conflict.

In a joint statement issued at the end of the talks, the bloc said there's an urgent need to address the humanitarian crisis in Myanmar, and called for "all relevant parties in Myanmar to ensure

Sri Lanka to hold presidential poll on Sept 21 after 'economic crisis'

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka, July 27, (AP): Sri Lanka will hold a presidential election on Sept. 21 that will likely be a test of confidence in President Ranil Wickremesinghe's efforts to resolve the country's worst economic crisis.

The date was announced by the independent elections commission Friday, which said nominations will be accepted on Aug 15.

Wickremesinghe is expected to run while his main rivals will be opposition leader Sajith Premadasa and Anura Dissanayake, who is the leader of a leftist political party that has gained popularity after the economic debacle.

It will be the first election in the South Asian island nation after it declared bankruptcy in 2022 and suspended repayments on some \$83 billion in domestic and foreign

WASHINGTON: A powerful Mexican drug cartel leader who eluded authorities for decades was duped into flying into the US, where he was arrested alongside a son of Joaquín "El Chapo" Guzmán, according to a US law enforcement official familiar with the matter.

Ismael "El Mayo" Zambada got on an airplane to the US believing he was going somewhere else, said the official, who spoke on the condition on anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss the matter. The official did not provide additional details, including who persuaded Zambada to get on the plane or where exactly he thought he was going.

Upon arriving in the **El Paso** area, Zambada and Joaquín Guzmán López, a son of notorious drug kingpin "El Chapo," who was sentenced to life in a US prison in 2019, were immediately taken into custody by US authorities, officials said.

Zambada, 76, appeared in federal court in El Paso on Friday morning, where a judge read the charges and informed Zambada of his rights. Zambada, who is being held without bond, has entered a plea of not guilty to slew of drug trafficking charges, court records show. His next court hearing is scheduled for Wednesday.

Frank Perez, a lawyer listed for Zambada, said in a message to AP that his client "did not come to the US voluntarily."

Zambada, one of the most powerful drug lords in the world, has been a key target for the US government for years in its bid to take down leaders of the Sinaloa cartel that's responsible for trafficking huge sums of drugs across the border.

His arrest "strikes at the heart of the cartel that is responsible for the majority of drugs, including fentanyl and methamphetamine, killing Americans from coast to coast," said US Drug Enforcement Administration chief **Anne Milgram**.

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina: Argentine President Javier Milei and French President Emmanuel Macron met Friday in Paris where they appeared to put aside recent controversy stemming from their countries' fierce soccer rivalry.

The meeting comes after a video clip spread online showing the Argentine national soccer team's postmatch racist chants, prompting backlash from French officials over lyrics considered offensive toward French players of African descent.

The song originated from fans' chants ahead of Argentina's 2022 World Cup final against France in Qatar, and resurfaced after the Argentina team's Copa America triumph over Colombia.

Exacerbating matters, Argentine Vice President **Victoria Villarruel** rushed to the defense of the Argentina players recorded singing the derogatory chants and publicly lambasted the French government as hypocritical for its criticism of Argentina.

The Argentine presidency said that Macron expressed gratitude Friday for efforts by Milei's sister and general secretary of the presidency, **Karina Milei**, to defuse the diplomatic crisis by apologizing



3 days of mourning in Ethiopia: Ethiopian lawmakers declared three days of mourning Friday as diggers continued their search for bodies of mudslide victims in a remote part of the East African country.

Heavy rain triggered deadly slides on Sunday and Monday in Ethiopia's south, killing at least 257 people, according to the UN humanitarian office, known as OCHA. It said in its latest update that the death toll could rise to as many as 500, citing local officials.

"More than 15,000 affected people need to be evacuated" from the area, OCHA said.

The national assembly said a three-day period of national mourning would begin on Saturday. Ethiopian Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed said earlier in the week that he was "deeply saddened by this terrible loss."

Many people were buried in the Gofa Zone of Kencho Shacha Gozdi district on Monday, as rescue workers searched the steep terrain for survivors from mudslides the previous day. Photos from the scene show residents

Photos from the scene show residents standing over the shrouded bodies of mudslide victims who are being pulled, one by one, from the muddy earth. Diggers have been using hand shovels to pick through the mud. **Antonio Guterres**, the UN secretarygeneral, said on the social platform X that UN agencies were dispatching food and other critical supplies to help affected people. (AP)

Ruto mulls changes to laws: Kenyan President William Ruto on Friday said his government will soon be proposing changes to the relevant laws to seal the loopholes that undermine the fight against corruption.

Ruto, who has faced pressure from young Kenyan protesters demanding accountability, said the legal amendments will include cracking down on corrupt officials and those displaying opulence and wastage in government spending amid high cost of living.

"We cannot continue to tolerate those who steal from the public and then obtain injunctions while their cases drag on for years," he said in the coastal city of Mombasa during an inspection of development projects.

The Kenyan leader said the Executive will work together with the criminal justice system to ensure corruption cases are resolved within six months, promising that it will no longer be possible for the corrupt to use injunctions to evade prosecution or delay justice. (Xinhua)

KUWAIT CITY, July 27: Boursa Kuwait experienced a noteworthy upturn in the market value of its listed shares, rising by approximately 341 million dinars to reach 42.3 billion dinars by the end of the week, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

This marks a significant recovery following several weeks of mixed trading conditions.

Despite fluctuations in recent weeks, the Boursa closed the week on a positive note, with an impressive 0.341 billion dinars (\$1.12 billion) increase in the market value of shares

According to "Direct Information" statistics the Premier Market Index rose by 0.54% to 7800.84 points, a gain of 42 points from the previous week.

The General Market Index in-creased by 0.74%, reaching 7,154.88 points, up by 52.7 points; the Main Market Index noted a 1.73% growth, closing at 6021.77 points, with a rise of 102.34 points and Main Market Index 50 saw a 2.57% increase, reaching 5852.21 points, up by 146.38 points for the week.

Ministry issues 1,495 certificates of origin to GCC countries

Kuwait's non-oil exports drop by 9.6% in June

KUWAIT CITY, July 27: The Min-istry of Commerce and Industry has reported a decline in Kuwait's non-oil exports for June, with total local exports amounting to 7.21 million dinars approximately \$9.70 million), reports Al-Seyassah daily.

This marks a decrease of 9.6% compared to 8.23 million dinars (about 8.77 million) in May.

Saleh Al-Azmi, Undersecretary of the International Organizations Affairs and Foreign Trade Sector, provided insights into the export data in a statement to KUNA.

He noted that in June, the Ministry issued 1,495 certificates of origin for exports to Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries, valued at 68.11 million dinars (approximately \$38 million). This is a slight decrease from May, when 1,502 certificates were issued, valued at 7.14 million dinars (around \$48 million).

For Arab and Islamic countries, the Ministry issued 403 certificates in June with a value of 3.9 million dinars (about \$4.30 million), up from 308 certificates worth 5.7 million dinars (about \$5.24 million) in May.

In contrast, the number of certificates issued to European countries decreased, with 11 certificates worth 515,276 dinars (about \$7.1 million) issued in June, compared to 13 certificates valued at 1.1 million dinars (around \$6.3 million) in May.

Similarly, exports to African countries saw a decline, with four certificates issued in June totaling 115,949 dinars (about \$376,000), down from seven certificates worth 240,891 dinars

(approximately \$784,000) in the previous month.

For the Americas, five certificates were issued in June for a total of 77,216 dinars (around \$251,000), compared to six certificates worth 141,590 dinars (about \$461,000) in May.

Asian exports also saw a reduction, with two certificates issued in June valued at 1,345 dinars (about \$4,000), down from three certificates worth 11,647 dinars (around \$38,000) in May. Al-Azmi emphasized that some Kuwaiti exports do not require a certificate of origin. Therefore, the figures provided reflect only those exports for which certificates were issued by the Ministry of Commerce and Industry.

Central bank faces rate cut dilemma

Turkey's economic recovery boosts foreign investment

ANKARA, July 27, (Xinhua): Türkiye's economic turnaround is drawing back foreign investors and showing signs of recovery, but the timing of potential interest rate cuts is sparking debate. While some experts advocate for continued disinflation efforts, others see room for monetary easing.

Since last year's elections, Türkive has shifted towards conventional economic policies to combat inflation, which peaked at 75.4 percent in May. Annual inflation dropped to 71.6 per-cent in June, the first decline in eight months. The central bank forecasts a year-end rate of 38 percent.

The centerpiece of the disinflation program, launched last summer, was significant policy rate hike from 8.5 percent to 50 percent. Some economists now believe Türkiye should hold off on rate cuts until inflation is under tighter control.

"Premature easing could reignite inflation, making things very difficult in the current climate," said Istanbulbased economist Mustafa Sonmez. He expressed concern that households squeezed by inflation haven't yet felt the full impact of disinflationary mea-

Turkey offers \$30 bln high-tech incentive program

ISTANBUL, July 27, (Xinhua): Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan on Friday introduced a national high technology incentive program.

Speaking at a launching event in Istanbul, Erdogan said the government planned a series of grant and tax incentives totaling 30 U.S. billion dollars to spur investments in electric vehicles, battery production, semiconductor manufacturing, and renewable energy for 2024-2028.

The program aimed at a strong revival in interna-



Modernizing math content to align with career needs

'Real equity in math education is about more than good grades and test scores'

Math education outcomes in the United States have been unequal for decades. Learners in the top 10% socioeconomically tend to be about four grade levels ahead of learners in the bottom 10% - a statistic that has remained stubbornly persistent for 50 years.

To advance equity, policymakers and educators often focus on boosting test scores and grades and making advanced cours-es more widely available. Through this lens, equity means all students earn similar grades and progress to similar levels of math.

With more than three decades of experience as a researcher, math teacher and teacher educator, I advocate for expanding what equity means in mathematics education. I believe policymakers and educators should focus less on test scores and grades and more on developing students' confidence and ability to use math to make smart personal and professional decisions. This is mathematical power - and true equity.

To understand the limitations of thinking about equity solely in terms of academic achievements, consider a student whom I interviewed during her freshman year of college.

Jasmine took Algebra 1 in ninth grade, followed by a summer online geometry course. This put her on a pathway to study calculus during her senior year in an AP class in which she earned an A. She graduated high school in the top 20% of her class and went to a highly selective liberal arts college. Now in her first year, she plans to study psychology.

Did Jasmine receive an equitable mathematics education? From an equity-as-achievement perspective, yes. But let's take a closer look.

Jasmine experienced anxiety in her math classes during her junior and senior years in high school. Despite strong grades, she found herself "in a little bit of a panic" when faced with situations that require mathematical analysis. This included deciding the best loan options.

In college, Jasmine's major required statistics. Her counselor and family encouraged her to take calculus over statistics in high school because calculus "looked better" for college applications. She wishes now she had studied statistics as a foundation for her major and for its usefulness outside of school. In her psychology classes, knowledge of statistics helps her better understand the landscape of disorders and to ask questions like, "How does gender impact this disorder?"

These outcomes suggest Jasmine did not receive an equitable mathematics education, because she did not develop mathematical power. Mathematical power is the know-how and confidence to use math to inform decisions and navigate the demands of daily life - whether personal, professional or civic. An equitable education would help her develop the confidence to use mathematics to make decisions in her personal life and realize her professional goals. Jasmine deserved more from her mathematics education.

Experiences like Jasmine's are unfortunately common. Ac-cording to one large-scale study, only 37% of U.S. adults have mathematical skills that are useful for making routine financial and medical decisions

A National Council on Education and the Economy report found that coursework for nine common majors, including nursing, required relatively few of the mainstream math topics taught in most high schools. A recent study found that teachers and parents perceive math education as "unengaging, outdated and disconnected from the real world."

Looking at student experiences, national survey results show that large proportions of students experience anxiety about math class, low levels of confidence in math, or both. Students from historically marginalized groups experience this anxiety at higher rates than their peers. This can frustrate their postsecondary pursuits and negatively affect their lives.

In 2023, I collaborated with other educators from Connecticut's professional math education associations to author an equity position statement. The position statement, which was endorsed by the Connecticut State Board of Education, outlines three commitments to transform mathematics education.

1. Foster positive math identities: The first commitment is to foster positive math identities, which includes students' confidence levels and their beliefs about math and their ability to learn it. Many students have a very negative relationship with mathematics. This commitment is particularly important for students of color and language learners to counteract the impact of stereotypes about who can be successful in mathematics.

A growing body of material exists to help teachers and schools promote positive math identities. For example, writing a math autobiography can help students see the role of math in their lives. They can also reflect on their identity as a "math person." Teachers should also acknowledge students" strengths and encourage them to share their own ideas as a way to empower them.

2. Modernize math content: The second commitment is to modernize the mathematical content that school districts offer to students. For example, a high school mathematics pathway for students interested in health care professions might include algebra, math for medical professionals and advanced statistics. With these skills, students will be better prepared to calculate drug dosages, communicate results and risk factors to patients, interpret reports and research, and catch potentially life-threatening errors.

3. Align state policies and requirements: The third commitment is to align state policies and school districts in their definition of mathematical proficiency and the requirements for achieving it. In 2018, for instance, eight states had a high school math graduation requirement insufficient for admission to the public universities in the same state. Other states' requirements exceed the admission requirements. Aligning state and district definitions of math proficiency clears up confusion for students and eliminates unnecessary barriers.

As long as educators and policymakers focus solely on equalizing test scores and enrollment in advanced courses, I believe true equity will remain elusive. Mathematical power the ability and confidence to use math to make smart personal and professional decisions - needs to be the goal. (AP)

Marvel teases post-'Deadpool & Wolverine' plans at Comic-Con

SAN DIEGO, July 27, (AP): Marvel Studios is returning to San Diego Comic-Con for its iconic Saturday night panel, which is expected to feature big announcements and surprise guests.

After Marvel skipped the convention last year due to the Hollywood strikes, which prevented writers and actors from speaking on panels, anticipation for its session in Comic-Con's famed Hall H is palpable among fans

The studio is expected to announce news teasing their upcoming titles in its "Phase 5" plan and beyond, with Marvel President Kevin Feige as the only confirmed speaker. He will be joined by several special guests, who may include stars of upcoming Marvel titles like "Captain America: Brave New World," "Thunderbolts(asterisk)" and "The Fantastic Four."

Fans are speculating that Marvel will confirm cast members and show clips or trailers for upcoming films and Disney+ series.

Marvel already took over Hall H on Thursday with an electric panel celebrating "Deadpool & Wolverine," in which the audience was treated to a full screening and surprise guests joining stars Ryan Reynolds and Hugh Jackman on stage.

The mounting enthusiasm for the film at Comic-Con was reflected across the country as the fans rushed to see it in theaters, securing the film as the new record holder for the Thursday preview for an R-rated movie. The comic book film sold an estimated \$38.5 million worth of movie tickets from preview screenings Thursday.

The "Deadpool & Wolverine" success woke up a sleepy year for Marvel and assuaged worries about its box-office underperformance in late 2023. The superhero factory hit a record low in November with the launch of "The Marvels," which opened with just \$47 million.

Prior to the studio's latest opening, which is on track to break more records, the idea of "superhero fatigue" became a popular talking point in the film world

"Deadpool & Wolverine" and Thursday's packed panel have dampened discussion of audience apathy for comic book movies.

Previews

Meanwhile, "Deadpool & Wolverine" has gotten off to a supercharged start at the box office, breaking the Thursday preview record for an R-rated movie. The comic-book film sold an estimated \$38.5 million worth of movie tickets from preview screenings Thursday, Disney said Friday.

The previous R-rated record-holder was "Deadpool 2," released by Fox's 20th Century Studios in May of 2018. That made \$18.6 million from Thursday previews and went on to make \$125.5 million in its first weekend.

In fact, the previews played more like "Star Wars: The Rise of the Skywalker" (\$40 million) and "Avengers: Infinity War" (\$39 million) than the previous two "Deadpool" movies.

The arrival of "Deadpool & Wolverine" has been long awaited by


both audiences and theater owners. The box office as a whole continues to trail last year (down 17%), partially due to ripple effects of the actors strike affecting release schedule and a lack of major hits. Compared to the pre-pandemic 2019, 2024 is down over 34%.

"Deadpool & Wolverine" is also the first Marvel movie of the summer season - a crucial 123 day earnings corridor for Hollywood that often accounts for some 40% of the annual box office total. Unlike many summers over the past decade, this year did not kick off with a blockbuster Marvel film; The business has been struggling to regain that footing since.

Also at play is the idea of "superhero fatigue" at the box office, in which there have been more disappointments than runaway hits lately. But "Deadpool & Wolverine" seems to be immune from that crisis.

With positive reviews and genuine fan enthusiasm, it is cruising to break more records over the weekend, where it's playing on over 4,200 screens in the United States and Canada. Analysts expect it to earn at least \$160 million through Sunday, which would make it the biggest R-rated opener of all time, unseating the first "Deadpool," and the biggest debut of 2024.

To crack the top 10 openings of all time, however, "Deadpool & Wolverine" would have to vastly overperform and make at least \$191.3, or enough to bump "Avengers: Age of Ultron" into 11th place. It's also playing in 48 markets internationally where it's earned \$64.8 million in its first two days.

'The police made a number of very significant errors in this case, he said. "In court today, you heard the district attorney try to fix one of those errors. But that's just one and there are many others. Sometimes the police make mistakes and this is just one of those instances.

Timberlake respects law enforcement and the judicial process and cooperated with officers and treated them with respect throughout his arrest last month, Burke added.

Tierney's office declined to respond to Burke's comments. We stand ready to litigate the

underlying facts of this case in court, rather than in the press," O'Neil said.

Midler, Sarandon and Ralph cherish longtime friends

Third-act buddy comedy in 'Fabulous Four'

Scheduling a movie's release date is an imperfect sci-ence and occasionally an art. Just look at the masterpiece that was "Barbenheimer."

While most are open to experimentation in figuring out just what audiences want and when in the wild west of modern theatrical moviegoing, there's also an unwritten rule that it's best to leave big superhero movie weekends clear of competition. But whoever thought to open the third-act female friendship comedy "The Fabulous Four" alongside " Deadpool & Wolverine " deserves a raise. Because if any audience is being underserved on the opening weekend of an oxygen-sucking, violent and self-referential superhero mashup, it's women over 60.

So, what better way to escape the merc with a mouth than a trip to Key West with Bette Midler, Susan Sarandon, Sheryl Lee Ralph and Megan Mullally?

In the vein of "80 for Brady" and "Book Club," "The Fabulous Four" may not be a great movie, but it's also better than it looks. Although it strains for raucousness with edibles and a parasailing expedition gone wrong, there is something admirably sane about it too even if you don't believe a single moment. It begins, as many of these kinds of films do, with a somewhat tortured explanation of why these women became friends in their youth. Though it nods at a slight age difference between college peers Lou (Sarandon) and Marilyn (Midler) and the two gals they met in New York, Alice (Mullally) and Kitty (Ralph), it's better to not do the math.

Besides, the more interesting question is not why four single girls in the same building became friends, but rather how they maintained that closeness over the decades. This big life mystery goes largely unexplored, instead focusing on the 40-year estrangement between Lou (now a heart surgeon) and Marilyn. It's a drama that for utterly incomprehensible reasons Alice (a rock star, seriously) and Kitty (a cannabis entrepreneur grandma) are still entangled in.

Marilyn, recently widowed, is newly engaged and desperately wants Lou to be at her wedding. Alice and Kitty lure Lou to Key West under false pretenses, telling her that she's won a polydactyl (six-toed) cat and can visit the Hemingway House. They don't have anything more elaborate in store in this lie. Their plan, it seems, is just to roll up to Marilyn's house and surprise their unwitting hostage. This seems misguided at best but becomes retroactively cruel when the cause of the fallout is finally revealed. Why meddle now?

The movie was directed by Jocelyn Moorhouse, the Australian filmmaker behind great and varied femalefocused films like "How to Make an American Quilt," "The Dressmaker" and "Muriel's Wedding," and written by Jenna Milly and Ann Marie Allison. And it never quite harmonizes. These characters, fabulous as they may be individually or on paper, aren't greater together somehow.

Character

As Marilyn and Lou dance around this ancient feud, you start to feel bad for Alice and Kitty, who would have much more fun ditching them and going off on their own adventure. Midler plays Marilyn so big and broad that she's more parody than person, although there is a grain of intrigue in the 70-something who gets engaged two months after her beloved husband dies and becomes obsessed with creating TikToks. Sarandon's Lou is the most thoughtfully developed character, as a rule-abiding woman whose life is in desperate need of a shakeup. She has some cringey moments too (the aforementioned edibles), but also several charming flirtations with the bachelors of Key West (Bruce Greenwood and Timothy V. Murphy).

This is a movie that should have probably leaned far less on wild hijinks with diminishing returns and more into the smaller moments of what it means to be friends for 40 years. But it's not without its charms, either. I'm not going to argue with them breaking into song out of nowhere. That kind of break from reality, especially with this cast, is always welcome.

Meanwhile, from "Beaches" to "First Wives Club" and "Hocus Pocus," Bette Midler has starred in a number of projects where women aren't just at the center of the story - but also female friendship is a major theme.

"The most fun ones are the women ones, I have to say," said Midler in a recent interview.

Her latest project is working alongside Susan Sarandon, Sheryl Lee Ralph and Megan Mullally in "The Fabulous Four." Midler plays Marilyn, a widow getting married who wants her besties from her 20s to be bridesmaids. The production was granted a waiver to film last year during the Hollywood strikes which meant they had to be nimble and open to last-minute changes to get the job done quickly.

"It was like someone blew the whistle and we all got on a plane," recalled Sarandon. "It really was lucky that we had four women who were such pros and who were game to go under those circumstances.

While she and her co-stars were focused because they were working under a special circumstance, Sarandon says they made a point to cheer each other on for a big on-camera moment or scene.

"When it was somebody's time to be celebrated, we celebrated that person. And when somebody else had their scene, we were all standing around while they got their moment," Sarandon said, adding that on some sets, actors choose to "not be really involved when it's not about them.

As for friendships, Midler says "there's nothing like having an old friend because they knew you when." Two particular people come to mind when she thinks about her own friendships. One is the sister of a close friend who died. "The other is the girl that I came to New York with when we were both 19.3

"They don't take any bs from you, and you really can be yourself," said Midler.

Sarandon relies on "six women" and "scores of gay guys that have been in my life for 30, 40 years.'

"We've been through kids and divorces and whatever, and I definitely count on them and sometimes disagree with them, but they are definitely in my tribe," she said.

Ralph, an Emmy winner for her role on ABC's "Ab-bott Elementary," still keeps in touch with her childhood best friend, Elizabeth. "I'll hear from her on social media every now and again," she said.

"My friend Carol - we met at the Miss Black Teenage America pageant. We're still friends to this day. All the ladies from 'Dreamgirls,' - Loretta Devine, Jenifer Lewis, Jennifer Holliday - we still talk. There are just so many of those relationships, and you don't have to start from the beginning. You can just pick up right where you were." (AP)

Cher's memoir soon

Brown offers a raw look on hacktivism

NEW YORK, July 27, (AP): His talents in full flower and basking in public admiration, gonzo journalist and inveterate anti-establishment troublemaker Barrett Brown is jailed in his native Texas on various federal felony charges.

It is 2013 and Brown's adventures have included helping Anonymous hacktivists publicly expose private US intelligence contractors engaged in deep-state power abuses at a time of rising concerns over Big Brother surveillance.

Brown has done this in swashbuckling style - often in a drug-altered state, chatting with executives whose hacked emails have been dumped online while on opiate maintenance medication. Brown was in withdrawal from antidepressants and opioids, he would later

testify, when he threatened an FBI agent in a video posted to YouTube.

"I wanted to become famous for overthrowing things," Brown writes in his muchawaited memoir, "My Glorious Defeats: Hacktivist, Narcissist, Anonymous.

Mainstream press coverage at the time of Brown's prosecution was uneven and sometimes just plain inaccurate. Beyond seeking to set the

record straight, the book snapshots a pivotal moment in online activism, and pulls no punches.

Although not a hacker, Brown was a well-known actor/provocateur in the rise of hacktivism, a powerful skein of political activism pioneered by the likes of WikiLeaks that tapped the internet to expose wrongdoing and spur change. That includes supporting Tunisia's 2011 popular uprising.

Those shenanigans preceded Edward Snowden's 2013 revelations of wholesale unauthorized National Security Agency surveillance of the US public, which would erase doubts about their righteousness.

Freedom

Brown is a showman, a gifted writer in the tradition of William Burroughs and Hunter S. Thompson. He also has a knack for self-sabotage and has struggled with heroin addiction and depression. He is currently in Britain engaged in a legal struggle for political asylum.

A self-described "anarchist revolutionary with a lust for insurgency," Brown became a cause celebre of press freedom champions a decade ago, a hero of stick-it-to-the-man radicals.

The bulk of the charges he faced in 2013 were unfounded computer crimes, absurd overreach. The likes of the Committee to Protect Journalists and Electronic Frontier Foundation insisted they be dropped - and they were. But Brown had crossed too many folks at the Department of Justice and FBI. Pleading guilty to reduced charges, including for interfering with a federal investigation, Brown would end up spending four years in prison, ordered to pay more than \$800,000 in restitution.

His escapades would extend to prison activism and, later, exposing allegedly racist police misconduct. Among observations from his experiences with Aryan gangs behind bars: "An American prison is many things, among them a Nazi training camp."

'Melania,' a powerful and inspiring story Melania to tell her story in memoir

NEW YORK, July 27, (AP): Former first lady Melania Trump has a memoir coming out this fall, "Melania," billed by her office as "a powerful and inspiring story of a woman who has carved her own path, overcome adversity and defined personal excellence." It's the first memoir by Trump, who has been mostly absent as her husband, former President Donald Trump, seeks to return to the White House.

"Melania" will be released by Skyhorse Publishing, which has published such Donald Trump supporters as former New York City Mayor Rudolph Giuliani and attorney Alan Dershowitz Skyhorse also has worked with third-party candidate Robert F. Kennedy Jr. and former Trump insider Michael Cohen, who later became one of his harshest critics. Some Skyhorse books include forewords by Trump ally Steve Bannon.

Prince Harry links tabloids crusade to royal family rift LONDON, July 27, (AP): Prince Harry said his crusade against the British titude of "never complain, never explain" by taking the press to court. tabloids has contributed to his royal

His father opposed his litigation, Harry said in legal filings. He also revealed that his older brother Wil-liam, Prince of Wales and heir to the throne, had secretly settled a complaint against Rupert Murdoch's News Group Newspapers for a "huge" sum.

The lawsuits, however, are not the only source of family friction.

Before his 2015 sentencing, Brown was for a time under a judicial gag order because he wouldn't stop discussing his case with reporters. So he began penning a series of jailhouse articles that included a scathing takedown of the novelist Jonathan Franzen. Some netted him a National Magazine Award.

"The public wants to be entertained. And unlike most wrongfully prosecuted political dissidents the world over, I just so happened to be an entertainer," Brown writes of his winning formula.

Indeed, Brown's persona in those articles is pretty much what we get in the memoir - "charmingly selfdeprecating, winkingly narcissistic, comprehensively self-aware — and even candid." Publications that carried his byline have included The Guardian, Vanity Fair, The Huffington Post and The Intercept.

But the fun-and-games end after Brown's 2016 prison release. Some former close allies become "despised enemies." A close collaborator dies of an overdose. An ambitious online project for researching and exposing wrongdoing – Pursuance – fizzles.

This is far from a happily-ever-after story. Having alienated many who once held him in high esteem, Brown attempted suicide in 2022, alerting the world on Twitter.

In an email exchange this week, Brown said he's now "actually pretty happy on a day-to-day basis" but also said "I don't read anymore and I'm no longer able to bring myself to write, which hurts a great deal."

The memoir's last chapter was difficult to pen.

"I was deeply wounded by much of what I discovered about the last decade when it became my job to see all this completely and accurately," he writes.

Long gone is the "formidable and serious network of noble saboteurs" who encouraged Brown to action, in the words of NBC News at the time, as "a defiant and cocky 29-year-old college dropout" who called himself a senior strategist for Anonymous.

This reviewer will refrain from further delving into the drama of Brown's troubled legacy and current legal predicament. Between the memoir and continued online feuding, there's plenty more to come.

NEW YORK: Cher has long known only one person could take on the job of telling her story.

And she's telling it in two parts.

Dey Street Books announced Wednesday that "Cher: The Memoir, Part One" will come out Nov. 19, with the second volume to follow in 2025. Dey Street, a HarperCollins imprint, is promising a "true story, in intimate detail," starting with her "often-chaotic childhood and famed and troubled partnership with Sonny Bono.

"With her trademark honesty and humor, 'Cher: The Memoir' traces how this diamond in the rough succeeded with no plan and little confidence to become the trailblazing superstar the world has been unable to ignore for more than half a century," the publisher's announcement reads in part. "'Cher: The Memoir, Part One' follows her extraordinary beginnings through childhood to meeting and marrying Sonny Bono - and reveals the highly complicated relationship that made them world-famous, but eventually drove them apart.'

Cher, 78, is the only woman to top the Billboard charts in seven consecutive decades, her hits including "Dark Lady," "Believe" and "DJ Play a Christmas Song." She won an Oscar for her starring role in "Moonstruck" and has received numerous other honors, including membership in the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.



10% of the global population affected by chronic pain

New treatments bring hope for chronic pain sufferers

Hundreds of millions of people around the world experience chronic pain – meaning pain that lasts longer than three months. While the numbers vary from country to country, most studies estimate that about 10% of the global population is affected, so more than 800 million people.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that in 2021, about 20% of U.S. adults - or more than 50 million people - were experiencing chronic pain. Of those, about 7% experienced what's called high-impact chronic pain, which is pain that substantially limits a person's daily activities.

In the past, physicians have been quick to prescribe medication as an easy solu-tion. But the opioid crisis in the US has led doctors to reevaluate their reliance on drugs and look at new treatments for patients with chronic pain.

The Conversation spoke with Rachael Rzasa Lynn, a pain management specialist from the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus for our podcast The Conversation Weekly. She explains some of the new developments in pain treatment and why there's hope for patients with chronic pain.

In general, pain is a complex interplay between tissue injury or inflammation, nerves and brain processing.

There are several different biological processes that can result in pain. The one that's happening to most people when they experience acute pain is called nociceptive pain. This is pain that occurs when tissue is being injured or potentially harmed in some way, which triggers the activation of surrounding nerves. These nerves are like electrical wires that send signals from the injured tissue, through the spinal cord and to the brain, where pain is ultimately perceived.

But activation of those nerves alone does not equal pain, because those electrical signals are amplified or diminished at multiple points throughout their transit to the brain. The brain's perception of pain is critical because pain does not occur when people are unconscious.

Nociceptive pain can also result from ongoing tissue injury or inflammation, as in the case of arthritis. With these injuries, the peripheral nerves are chronically reporting to the brain, resulting in an ongoing perception of pain.

There are other disease processes, such as diabetic peripheral neuropathy, in which nerves themselves become injured. In these cases, the nerves send pain signals to the brain that are reflective of injury to the nerves themselves, not the tissues they report from. This is called neuropathic pain.

In other forms of chronic pain called nociplastic pain, the initial tissue injury may fully heal, but the brain and nervous system continue to generate pain signals. Many chronic pain conditions actually involve a combination of all three of these phenomena - nociceptive, neuropathic and nociplastic pain - which adds to the difficulty of diagnosis and treatment.

Complex

I think everybody who's been to a hospital, at least in the United States within the past decade, is familiar with the numerical scale where you're asked to rate your pain. That is a one-dimensional assessment of pain that only asks how severe it is.

But pain is a very complex phenomenon that has a lot more pieces to it than just the severity. So a single numerical value based on severity of pain really misses the impact that pain may be having on a patient's daily life, such as their activities, their relationships, their ability to sleep, their happiness and their overall satisfaction with their life.

I think the most difficult thing about all pain, truly, but especially many forms of chronic pain, is that you cannot see it. There's no external, validated way to really know how much pain someone is in. We do have newer methods for measuring pain that attempt to get at some of those more complex aspects, but it's still a very incomplete science. It's all still subjective based on what the patient tells you their experience is.

One newly popular treatment is called pain reprocessing therapy, which takes a behavioral approach to eliminating pain.

Here at our medical campus, therapists guide patients in understanding what causes chronic pain and then reevaluating the sensations they experience as painful - for example, while engaging in typically painful movements. The goal of pain reprocessing therapy is to help patients perceive the pain signals being sent to their brain as less threatening, so that their brain "unlearns" the pain.

Another approach being applied in new ways is called nerve ablation, a procedure in which the nerves around an area of pain are numbed with medication and then purposely damaged. In those cases, doctors inject a chemical around the nerves or gently heat them so they can no longer effectively send pain signals for months or even years. This approach has been used for spine pain for decades, but it is now being applied more widely to pain from other areas of the body.

A similar approach is to use electricity to stimulate the nerves serving a painful area in order to alter or block the way pain signals flow through them. This method involves placing a tiny electrical device alongside the nerve to deliver the low level of electricity. This is an example of neuromodulation, which is increasingly being used to treat a wide variety of chronic pain conditions throughout the body. from foot pain to migraines. It has even shown promise in the management of acute pain after surgeries like knee replacement.

A classic example of neuromodulation is spinal cord stimulation, which is used to treat a variety of conditions that cause chronic pain. A surgeon places wires underneath the bones of the back, but outside of the spinal cord and the spinal fluid. The wires connect to a battery, much like a pacemaker battery, that delivers electrical signals to the nerves in the spinal cord in order to scramble the pain signals. These new treatment options for patients with chronic pain may not have pro-

gressed as quickly as they have if not for the opioid crisis.

For decades, opioids were too widely prescribed for chronic pain. However, there are some patients with chronic pain for whom opioids truly provide benefit in terms of pain relief and quality of life. In my view, doctors have overcorrected a bit to the point where it can now be difficult for such patients to gain access to the opioid therapies that have worked so well for them. Due in part to a slowdown in manufacturing opioids over the past several years, in some parts of the US, many patients are no longer able to access these drugs at all. (AP)

A neurological disorder stole her voice

Experts work on Earth-space data transmission in historic House speech after illness

NEW YORK, July 27, (AP): When Jennifer Wexton rises Thursday to speak on the House floor, something she has done countless times before, the congresswoman will be using a voice she thought was gone forever.

After a rare neurological disorder robbed her of her ability to speak clearly, Wexton has been given her voice back with the help of a powerful artificial intelligence program, allowing the Virginia Democrat to make a clone of her speaking voice using old recordings of speeches and appearances she made as a congresswoman. She will use that program to deliver what is believed to be the first speech on the House floor ever given via a voice cloned by artificial intelligence.

"It was a special moment that I never imagined could happen. I cried happy tears when I first heard it," Wexton told The Associated Press in the first interview she's participated in since attaining her new voice.

Process

Wexton's voice played out of her iPad, propped up using a rainbowcolored floral case on her dining room table in Leesburg, Virginia. The congresswoman types out her thoughts, uses a stylus to move the text around, hits play and then the AI program puts that text into Wexton's voice. It's a lengthy process, so the AP provided with a few que of the interview to give the congresswoman time to type her answers Wexton was diagnosed with progressive supranuclear palsy in 2023, an aggressive neurological disorder that impacts many aspects of life, including speech. Sitting across from a credenza filled with photos marking the high points of her personal life - weddings, family trips, her children - the congresswoman called the diagnosis "cruel" for someone whose "entire professional life has been built around using my voice,' from Virginia prosecutor to state Senator to member of Congress. "A politician who can't do public speaking will be a former politician before too long. But this AI voice model has given me a new opportunity to have my voice heard and it reminds listeners that I am still me," Wexton said.



A few days later, Wexton publicly debuted her cloned voice in a video, leading to an outpouring of support and thrusting the congresswoman into a debate over artificial intelligence.

"This is never a situation I imagined myself in" and it is "not the way I thought I would be leaving Congress," she said. "I didn't anticipate being at the forefront of a debate over the future of AI.

NASA spots a super Jupiter

NASA says no return date for astronauts, Boeing capsule WASHINGTON, July 27, (Xinhua): NASA's Perseverance Mars rover has discovered a spotty, arrowhead-shaped rock with features that could hint at microbial life billions of years ago on Mars.

During its exploration on July 21 of Neretva Vallis, an ancient river valley on Mars, the Perseverance rover encountered a captivating rock known as 'Cheyava Falls.'

The Perseverance science team analyzed the rock using X-rays and lasers. Their analysis revealed the presence of white calcium sulfate veins, a reddish middle area, and small off-white splotches on the rock.

"On Earth, these types of features in rocks are often associated with the fossilized record of microbes living in the subsurface," said David Flannery, an astrobiologist at Queensland University of Australia and a member of the science team.

While the features observed in the rock suggest the possibility of microbial life on Mars during a warmer and wetter period, alternative explanations such as high temperatures rendering the environment uninhabitable cannot be ruled out. To confirm whether the rock indeed contains evidence of microbial life, further examinations on Earth are required.

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla.: A super Jupiter has been spotted around a neighboring star by the Webb Space Telescope - and it has a super orbit.

The planet is roughly the same diameter as Jupiter, but with six times the mass. Its atmosphere is also rich in hydrogen like Jupiter's.

One big difference: It takes this planet more than a century, possibly as long as 250 years, to go around its star. It's 15 times the distance from its star than Earth is to the sun.

WELLINGTON: New Zealand and Australian researchers have been collaborating on projects transmitting large volumes of data between Earth and space, addressing a critical need in modern space exploration and commu-nication, as well as innovative space traffic management.

Novak Djokovic also won in straight sets as he, like Swiatek and Alcaraz, opened a bid for a first Olympic gold medal. Djokovic's second-round opponent could be longtime rival Rafael Nadal, who was scheduled to play his opening singles match Sunday.

Nadal, the Spaniard who won a re-cord 14 of his 22 Grand Slam titles at the French Open and owns two Summer Games golds, was a surprise torch

Warner Bros. Discovery sues NBA for not accepting matching offer

WASHINGTON, July 27, (AP): Warner Bros. Discovery has sued the NBA after the league did not accept the company's matching offer for one of the packages in its upcoming 11year media rights deal.

The lawsuit was filed on Friday in New York state court in Manhattan.

WBD, the parent company of TNT Sports, is seeking a judgement that it matched Amazon Prime Video's offer and an order seeking to delay the new media rights deal from taking effect beginning with the 2025-26 season.

The NBA signed its deals with Disney, NBCUniversal and Amazon Prime Video on Wednesday after saying it was not accepting Warner Bros. Discovery's \$1.8 billion per year offer. The deals will bring the league around \$76 billion over 11 years.

"Given the NBA's unjustified rejection of our matching of a third-party offer, we have taken legal action to enforce our rights," TNT Sports said in a statement. "We strongly believe this is not just our contractual right, but also in the best interest of fans who want to keep watching our industryleading NBA content with the choice and flexibility we offer them through our widely distributed WBD videofirst distribution platforms - including TNT and Max.'

NBA spokesman Mike Bass said in a statement that "Warner Bros. Discovery's claims are without merit and our lawyers will address them.'

WBD says in the lawsuit that "TBS properly matched the Amazon Offer by agreeing to telecast the games on both TNT and Max. The Amazon Offer provides for Cable Rights, including TNT Rights, because the offer is for games that TBS currently has the right to distribute on TNT via Non-Broadcast Television, which includes both cable and Internet distribution."

WBD also claims under its contract it "has the right to 'Match a Third Party Offer that provides for the exercise of (NBA games) via any form of combined audio and video distribution.'

The lawsuit is another chapter in a deteriorating relationship between the league and Turner Sports that has gone on nearly 40 years. Turner has had an NBA package since 1984 and games have been on TNT since the network launched in 1988.

TNT's iconic "Inside the NBA" show has won numerous Sports Emmy Awards and has been a model for studio shows.

However, the relationship started to become strained when Warner Bros. Discovery CEO David Zaslav said during an RBC Investor Conference in November 2022 that Turner and WBD 'don't have to have the NBA.'

Warner Bros. Discovery and the league were unable to reach a deal during the exclusive negotiating period, which expired in April. Zaslav and TNT Sports Chairman/CEO Luis Silberwasser said throughout the process, though, that it intended to match one of the deals.

WBD had five days to match a part of those deals after the NBA's Board of Governors approved the rights deals on July 17.

WBD received all of the contracts the next day and informed the league on Monday that it was matching Amazon Prime Videos offer.

The NBA announced on Wednesday that it was not considered a true match.

"Throughout these negotiations, our primary objective has been to maximize the reach and accessibility of our games for our fans," the league said when it did not accept the WBD deal. "Our new arrangement with Amazon supports this goal by complementing the broadcast, cable and streaming packages that are already part of our new Disney and NBCUniversal arrangements. All three partners have also committed substantial resources to promote the league and enhance the fan experience."

China secure first diving gold in pursuit of unprecedented sweep

SAINT-DENIS, France, July 27, (AP): One down. Seven to go.

China won its first gold medal in diving on Saturday on the first full day of competition in the Paris Olympics, a perfect start for the team of Chang Yani and Chen Yiwen.

China has ruled diving for decades, and three years ago in Tokyo it won seven of eight gold medals. But it has never pulled off the elusive gold sweep. That's the goal this time.

The Chinese were first on Saturday in the women's synchronized 3-meter springboard with 337.68 points on five dives. They were followed by Sarah Bacon and Kassidy Cook of the United States 314.64 points and the British team of Yasmin Harper and Scarlett Mew Jensen with bronze and 302.28 points.

The same Chinese duo also won gold in the last three world championships and were heavy favorites going in.

"We're very happy to get the gold medal, of course," Chen said.

The Americans followed China on all of their dives, seeing their performance and knowing what they had to do to match it. They also performed the same five dives as China.

"The Chinese have been the gold stan-

dard in diving for decades," Cook said. "But we are peers with them, and the goal is to beat them one day. They are amazing competitors and hardly ever mess up. "We're not too far off," Cook added.

"You may see another flag being raised for a gold medalist at these Olympic games." Cook and Bacon noted that, as the favorites, the pressure is always on China. Less so on everyone else.

"Following China certainly helped us dive better," Bacon added. The crowd, heavy with Chinese

fans and and flags, chanted "jiayou" - roughly translated "let's go" - each time the Chinese walked out to dive.

First 10-time female Olympian

Georgian shooter makes history

CHATEAUROUX, France, July 27, (AP): Georgian shooter Nino Salukvadze has become the first woman to compete at 10 Olympic Games in a career which began representing the Soviet Union.

Salukvadze has competed at every Summer Olympics since 1988 - when she won gold as a 19-yearold Soviet prodigy. She set her latest record when she stepped into the shooting range for qualification in the women's 10-meter air pistol Saturday.

Salukvadze placed 38th and didn't advance to Sunday's eightshooter final, but she gets another shot at a medal Friday in qualification for the 25-meter pistol event.

In a career spanning five decades, Salukvadze has competed on three different Olympic teams first with the Soviet Union in 1988, then the Unified Team which was organized for ex-Soviet athletes in Barcelona in 1992 after the Soviet Union collapsed. For the last eight Summer Olympics, she's represented her home country of Georgia following its independence.

Salukvadze was in the spotlight again in 2008, when Russia fought a brief war with Georgia during the Beijing Olympics. Salukvadze won bronze and embraced Russian silver medalist Natalia Paderina on the podium in what was widely seen as a gesture for peace.

"Why did this gesture surprise everyone? We are athletes, there is no conflict between us," she said at the time.

In 2016, Salukvadze and her son Tsotne Machavariani, who's also a pistol shooter, became the first mother-and-son duo in Olympic history to compete at the same Games.

Salukvadze had considered retiring after the last Summer Olympics in Tokyo three years ago but was persuaded to continue by her father and coach Vakhtang, who died this year.

Olympic officials issue apology for SKorean athletes' NKorea 'mix-up'

PARIS, July 27, (AP): Olympic Games organizers said they "deeply apologize" for introducing South Korea'st athletes as North Korea during the opening ceremony in Paris.

As the South Korean athletes waved their nation's flag on a boat floating down the Seine River on Friday evening, they were announced in both French and English as the Democratic People's Republic of Korea. South Korea is the Republic of Korea. to file "a strong government-level complaint" with the French government.

The statement said South Korea's Olympic committee separately asked the organizers of the Paris Games to prevent the recurrence of similar incidents.

IOC spokesperson Mark Adams on Saturday called the error "clearly

"We deeply apologize for the mistake that occurred when introducing the Korean team during the opening ceremony broadcast," the International Olympic Committee said in a post on X in Korean.

Jang Mi Ran, the second vice minister of South Korea's Culture, Sports and Tourism Ministry, requested a meeting with IOC President Thomas Bach over the incident, the ministry said in a statement Saturday.

It said the ministry also asked South Korea's Foreign Ministry

deeply regrettable."

"An operational mistake was made. We can only apologize, in an evening of so many moving parts, that this mistake was made," Adams said in response to a question from a South Korean journalist during a news conference.

The Korean peninsula has been bitterly divided into South Korea and North Korea since the end of World War II in 1945.

The blue sign on the boat carrying the South Korean athletes did show the correct name.

The mix-up echoed another during the 2012 Olympics in London, where organizers posted the South Korean flag on a jumbo screen as a North Korean player was introduced before a women's soccer match, leading the North Koreans to refuse to take the field for nearly an hour.

In another opening ceremony glitch Friday, the Olympic flag featuring the five rings was upside down when it was hoisted toward the end of the ceremony. "It's regrettable," Adams said.

"It's regrettable," Adams said. "In a four-hour show occasionally things happen. We can all move on from that one, it's not the end (of the world)."

After the flag was raised, the broadcast by the IOC's own television operations did not show any close-up images of it. Typically, flagpoles at Olympic ceremonies have a mechanism that blows a breeze across the flag to stretch it out. On Friday, the Olympic rings flag hung limply down next to the pole.

Historic Olympic streak ends in a shock upset as Szilagyi finally beaten

PARIS, July 27, (AP): An era-defining winning streak in Olympic fencing was snapped in a shock upset Saturday as Hungarian fencer Aron Szilagyi lost his opening bout while chasing a fourth consecutive gold medal.

Szilagyi won Olympic gold in men's individual saber in 2012, 2016 and 2021 - the only male fencer to be a three-time individual champion. In Paris, he was trying to become the only fencer in Olympic history with four individual gold medals. Instead, the streak ended in Szilagyi's first bout of the Paris Games as he was beaten 15-8 by the 27th-seeded Canadian Fares Arfa in the round of 32 for one of the biggest upsets so far at the 2024 Olympics. Arfa, a first-time Olympian, racked up six unanswered points to start the bout. Szilagyi closed the gap to 6-4 but couldn't catch the Canadian.

"I'm in a bit of shock right now, so I'm not even disappointed or angry at myself yet. It happened so fast, and I've never thought that my individual competition here in Paris would be so short," Szilagyi said.

"It's really a shock. It's like my opponent read me. I was an open book to him," he added. "In every touch, what he wanted, it happened. All his parries worked, all his attacks landed."

Szilagyi was on a run of 15 wins in individual saber competition at the Olympics and had not lost in that event since a defeat to Keeth Smart of the United States in the round of 16 at the 2008 Beijing Olympics. Arfa won team gold with Canada at last hadn't fenced at the Olympics year's Pan-American Games but before.

"It was like as if he'd been the three-time Olympic champion, and I was some kind of first-time Olympian," Szilagyi added.

Szilagyi's early exit wasn't the only big upset in fencing Saturday.

Last year's men's saber world champion Eli Dershwitz of the United States was beaten 15-10 by Hungarian Csanad Gemesi in the round of 32. Sun Yiwen, the defending Olympic champion in women's epee, lost her opening bout 14-13 to Miho Yoshimura of Japan.

Paris dazzles with rainy Oly opening ceremony

Australia's Brown takes gold medal in rain-soaked women's cycling time trial

PARIS, July 27, (AP): A hot-air balloon brought an Olympic ring of fire into a rainy sky and singer Celine Dion belted from the Eiffel Tower as Paris kicked off its first Summer Olympics in a century Friday, with a four-hour-long, rulebreaking opening ceremony that unfurled along the Seine River. On-and-off showers did not seem to hamper the enthusiasm of the athletes. Some held umbrellas as they rode boats down the river in a showcase of the city's resilience as authorities investigated suspected acts of sabotage targeting France's high-speed rail network. With the ambitious ceremony, the stakes for France were immense. Dozens of heads of state and government were in town, and the world was

before that, the five-ring Olympic flag was raised upside down at the Trocadero across from the Eiffel Tower. Grace Brown of Australia won the first cycling gold medal of the Paris Olympic Games on Saturday when she won the women's time-trial by an impressive margin of a minute and 31 seconds. Brown covered the 32.4-kilometer course in 39 minutes, 38 seconds, with the British rider Anna Henderson claiming the silver medal in 41 minutes, 9 seconds, and the American Chloe Dygert a second behind Henderson in third. The race was contested in horrible conditions, with constant rain making the course very slippery and dangerous on corners, with Dygert among a number of riders who suffered a crash. Enditem World champion shooters Huang Yuting and Sheng Lihao set off China's Paris Olympics campaign to a golden start, winning the Games' first gold medal with victory in the 10m air rifle mixed team event here on Saturday. Keum Ji-hyeon and Park Ha-jun of South Korea 16-12 in the gold medal match at the Chateauroux Shooting Center. Earlier on Saturday, Kazakhstan's Alexandra Le and Islam Satpayev beat Germany's Anna Janssen and Maximilian Ulbrich 17-5 to claim the bronze medal. "I feel very happy and privileged to win this gold medal," said a calm Huang at the press conference. "This medal is a periodical result, but at the same time a new beginning." The gold medal match was intense with China taking a 6-2 lead, but South Korea gnawed closely behind. Chinese sharpshooters were once onestep away from the title at 14-8, but the South Koreans refused to give up, closing the gap to 14-12, thanks to a double 10.7 points. Seeing the chance to equalize, Keum shot 10.5 and Park 10.6, putting pressure on the Chinese team. Sheng responded with a 10.7, leaving the final shot to Huang, who secured the victory with a 10.8. "I was extremely nervous at the moment," recalled 17-year-old Huang on the key moment of her Olympic debut. "I kept telling myself to focus on my performance and stay concentrated, giving myself positive mental cues." The victory echoed China's triumph in the event's Olympic debut three years ago in Tokyo, where Yang Qian and Yang Haoran were crowned. After the win, the Chinese teenagers allowed themselves a moment of celebration, with Sheng raising his fist in response to their excited coach Yao Ye.

launch that lifted spirits and joyous French cancan dancers early on. A humorous short film featured soccer icon Zinedine Zidane. Plumes of French blue, white and red smoke followed.

Lady Gaga sang in French in a prerecorded bit, with dancers shaking pink plumed pompoms, injecting a cabaret feel. On the Eiffel Tower, Dion closed the show with her first live performance since the French-Canadian singer was diagnosed stiff person syndrome, a rare neurological disorder, at the end of 2022.

More than three hours into the show, French President Emmanuel Macron declared the Games open. In a gaffe
