

Minister of Social Affairs. where's the zakat money?

ONE of the most frequently asked questions in Kuwait is — Where do the zakat funds go? This question is also usually asked when corruption involving the fund is discovered. In recent years, newspapers have been publishing about the corruption in the donation of these funds. No reliable investigation has been conducted in this regard, and the matter is under a microscope.

It is also known legally that zakat must first be given to the needy people of the country to which donors belong, and whatever remains



is sent abroad. However, to allocate all of it abroad and deprive citizens who are in need is in violation of the legitimate and legal principle of the concept of zakat. Almost every day, we come across reports about sending the zakat funds abroad, and that the zakat funds are be-

Al-Jarallah ing used to establish projects in Asia and Africa. In fact, some of those countries are richer

than Kuwait, but no one is held accountable for this major defect. indicated that some of these donations go to terrorist groups abroad. This undoubtedly means that corruption is rampant in these funds and associations, and this in turn harms

Kuwait's global reputation. This is why we call for limiting donations to those in need in Kuwait such as those in debt, and specifically those imprisoned for is-

suing dud cheques to usurers and loan sharks. Our objective here is to relieve people of the dilemma imposed on them. Therefore, it is necessary to have transparency when spending these zakat funds in a way that pleases Almighty Allah, and inspire reassurance into the donors, instead of those with pot-bellies who swindle people by spending on projects that no one knows about.

Given that, remembrance is good for those who believe, we are reminded of the biography of the eighth Caliph of the Umayyad Dynasty Omar bin Abdulaziz. It is said that when zakat money was brought to him, he ordered it to be spent on the poor. After finding no poor person under his rule to spend on, he ordered the surplus to be spent on equipping his army. After that, he ordered young men to be married with the surplus of the zakat. He then ordered to settle the debts of those in debt, and the remaining surplus, he ordered that it be used to buy wheat and scatter it on the tops of the mountains so that no one will say that a bird went hungry under his rule.

We do not say you must scatter wheat in the desert, but when we talk about debtors, especially those who issue dud cheques, we are not talking about large sums. We are also not talking about commercial debts.

The debt we are talking about involves an insolvent person who was unable to pay KD 5.000 or KD 6,000, and got imprisoned for that. We are talking about the debts of women who were duped by their husbands and forced to take loans and sign dud cheques, for which they were issued heavy sentences reaching five to ten years.

As for the one who forced her to do this, he took the money and divorced her, and then married another woman. Others got travel bans imposed on them, and all their transactions with the state got suspended. His case is almost, if not worse, similar to a criminal.

All of these problems can be solved quickly if there is an intention to close this annoying

Al-Azmi appeals disqualification

Kuwait Municipality sets '24 Assembly election strategy

KUWAIT CITY, March 26: Former MP and parliamentary election candidate Ahmed Mutei Al-Azmi has filed an appeal at the Court of Cassation against the verdict of the Court of Appeals, which upheld the decision of the Ministry of Interior to disqualify him. On the other hand, former MP and

candidate for the upcoming parliamentary election Marzouq Al-Hebeini, who was also disqualified, said the decisions of the committee assigned by the Ministry of Interior to review the candidacies do not meet the conditions as per the relevant laws. He wondered why he was disqualified despite the fact that he was allowed to contest the previous election and he has neither been involved in any crime nor subjected to court penalties since then.

The Cassation Court is expected to issue its final ruling on the disqualification cases next week.

SANAA: An attack by al-Qaida in southern **Yemen** killed at least two troops loyal to a secessionist group, officials said Monday, in the first attack since the extremist group's branch in the Arab country announced the death of its leader earlier this month.

The attack, which took place late Sunday in the mountainous Wadi Omran area of Abyan province, also wounded four troops from the Southern Armed Forces, which is loyal to the secessionist Southern Transitional Council, according to a statement from the southern forces. (AP)

BAGHDAD: An Iraqi police officer previously sentenced to death for the murder of a prominent security analyst who had criticized powerful Iran-backed militias was released from prison following a retrial, officials said

An intelligence official with the Ministry of Interior said Ahmed Hamdawi al-Kinani was released after the case was reopened and the court issued an acquittal. It was not clear on what grounds he was acquitted. (AP)

Kuwait welcomes UNSC's Gaza ceasefire resolution

KUWAIT CITY, March 26, (Agencies): The State of Kuwait welcomed Monday the UN Security Council (UNSC) Resolution 2728 demanding an immediate ceasefire in Gaza.

In a statement, the Kuwaiti Ministry of Foreign Affairs expressed regret for the inability of the UNSC to carry out its responsibilities stipulated in the UN Charter and to stop the aggression and crimes committed by the Israeli occupation forces against defenseless Palestinian civilians in the Gaza Strip during the past five months.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs reaffirmed Kuwait's firm position in supporting the Palestinian people and their legitimate political rights and their right to self-determination and establish their independent state on the 1967 borders with East Jerusa-

lem as its capital. The Secretary-General of the Cooperation Council for the Arab States of the Gulf (GCC), Jassim Al-Budaiwi, welcomed Monday the UN Security Council (UNSC) resolution 2728 demanding an immediate ceasefire In a press statement, the Secre-

tary-General stressed the necessity of adopting the resolution to reach a permanent and sustainable ceasefire, the release of all hostages, the parties' compliance with their obligations under international law,

Kuwaiti women vital component in Assembly election campaigns

KUWAIT CITY, March 26, (KUNA): Becoming an essential part of the democratic process via voting and running, Kuwaiti women also proved vital in making or breaking candidates chances for the coveted seat at the National As-

Women in Kuwait contributed immensely in various election campaigns, promoting candidates to eligible voters throughout Ku-

wait. Women Kuwait play a key role as campaign managers and activists to promote candidates, professor of political science at Kuwait University (KU) Wafa Al-Aradi told KUNA.



She indicated that women usually promote male candidates more effectively due to the social fabric of society, noting that they were strong in social networking, which contribute to the success of candidates.

Women represent around 50 percent of the population and it is very important to gain their votes to sway the polls, Al-Aradi affirmed, stressing that they were an important factor and a vital human resource during election

Meanwhile, Eman Dashti -- a political activist vying for rights of women to reach the highest levels in parliament -- from the level of voters to becoming Members of Parliament, women were a force to be reckoned with.

It is very important to educate women on political participation in decision-making, Dashti noted, and added that this would enable women to gain prominent positions in the country.

On her part, member of the board of the women Cultural and Social Society Sharifa Al-Khamis affirmed that women played a part in the logistic part of election campaigns via coordinating committees works and highlighting candidates messages.

The active social nature of Kuwaiti society made women crucial for the task of luring voters to vote for certain candidates, she indicated.

She said that gaining full voter and campaign rights in 2005, Kuwaiti women had complied a decent recording in the political scene and hopefully this would continue for the future.

The US-China TikTok war

 \mathbf{T} he United States is facing intense competition from China across various industries, including the automotive sector where Chinese production now nearly triples that of the US. This competition extends across tens

thousands industries, including advanced sectors such as memory chips, next-generation Internet technologies, Huawei's and innovations.

Tok, originally recognized as a platform for short video clips. Since its launch in 2016, TikTok has garnered widespread popularity due to its high-quality content, captivating

sound effects, and addictive nature. It has emerged as a significant source of entertainment and revenue for advertisers, with 36% of its user base aged between 18 and 24, and children spending an average of 75 minutes daily on the platform. In February alone, the app recorded over 4.7 billion downloads, and its revenues for 2023 exceeded \$16 billion.

TikTok, like many other social media platforms, has been under scrutiny for its handling of user data, particularly given its Chinese ownership. Concerns regarding the potential misuse of private information have led several countries, including India, Bangladesh, and Indonesia, to ban its use.

In July 2020, then-US President Donald Trump intensified the pressure on TikTok, citing national security concerns. He threatened to ban the app from the United States over fears that the Chinese government

could exploit user data for espionage purposes. Trump demanded that Tik-Tok be sold to American interests to mitigate this perceived threat.

Despite efforts by American investors to acquire the company, all attempts were unsuccessful. TikTok now faces an uncertain future in the US and the European Union. Legislative attempts to ban its use have faltered due to its popularity and the lobbying efforts of its parent company, ByteDance, which boasts a market capitalization of \$120 bil-

The gravest accusations against TikTok revolve around the potential for the Chinese government to access American user data and influence users through the platform's algorithm, particularly the "For You" function. This algorithm remains opaque to Americans and could potentially be exploited for political messaging or interference in US elections.

Following the recent approval by a significant majority in the US House of Representatives, a draft law aimed at banning the social media application "TikTok" has gained momentum.

The proposed legislation stipulates that TikTok must be separated from its Chinese parent company within 180 days. Failure to comply with this requirement would result in TikTok being banned from American app stores, and web hosting services in the United States would be instructed to block access to the platform.

However, the fate of this legislation remains uncertain as it heads to the Senate for further consideration. If passed into law, it would mark a significant development in the ongoing debate surrounding TikTok's ownership and its potential implications for national security.

National campaign launched to pay off debts of Kuwaiti citizens

PAAET to disburse bonus for 850 employees

KUWAIT CITY, March 26: Sheikh Firas Al-Malik, the Minister of Social Affairs, Family, and Childhood Affairs, announced the initiation of the national campaign named "Your Dismay is a Joy for Them 2" in cooperation with various government entities and charitable organizations. The campaign aims to collect donations to pay off the debts of Kuwaiti citizens who are burdened by financial obligations, reports Al-Jarida daily.

The primary objective of the campaign is to bring joy to the faces of Kuwaiti families grappling with debt, thereby presenting an honorable image of charitable work and demonstrating Kuwait's commitment to easing the burdens of its citizens. Sheikh Firas emphasized the importance of relieving the distress of debtors, highlighting the significant merit and reward associated with helping those in need.

Acting Undersecretary of the Ministry of Social Affairs, Abdulaziz Sari, clarified that the campaign targets Kuwaiti debtors, both male and female, who are unable to repay their debts, resulting in enforceable civil court rulings against them. Executive procedures, such as salary withholding, vehicle seizure, and travel bans, have been taken against these individuals.

Sari further elaborated that a committee comprising representatives from relevant government agencies, including the Ministries of Justice and Endowments, as well as charitable organizations, will be formed to discuss the requirements and controls for repaying the debts of debtors. The committee will also determine the maximum amounts of money allowed to be paid towards these debts.

Importantly, the process for debt repayment under this campaign will not require individuals to visit any government agency or submit any documents. The names of beneficiaries will be automatically included by the General Administration for Implementation in the Ministry of Justice. An electronic link has been provided for individuals to donate, and a hotline has been established to receive donations from various entities.

The campaign aligns with the directives of Kuwait's political leadership and the Council of Ministers, reflecting the country's commitment to localizing charitable work and prioritizing assistance to its citizens, particularly during the holy month of Ramadan.

Cooperative societies have been urged to participate in the campaign by donating from their annual zakat funds, thereby contributing to the localization of charitable efforts within the

Coops willing to participate must issue a check for the donation amount to the Ministry of Justice, General Administration of Implementation.

The previous national campaign organized during Ramadan last year raised 11.5 million dinars, with approximately 59 thousand donors contributing to the cause.

80 states go to polls in 2024: NWG

'Geopolitical developments to impact Kuwait, GCC countries'

KUWAIT CITY, March 26: The National Wealth Group (NWG) has highlighted the significance of 2024, which is poised to witness a historic wave of elections across 80 countries, involving more than two billion voters, reports Al-Qabas daily.

KD2,000 fine for insulting doctor

KUWAIT CITY, March 26: The Misdemeanor Court has imposed a fine of KD2,000 on a citizen for insulting a doctor at Mubarak Al-Kabeer Hospital, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

The Public Prosecution had earlier charged the citizen with insulting the victim, who works as an emergency doctor at Mubarak Al-Kabeer Hospital, as he grabbed the stethoscope that the doctor was wearing around her neck.

Case files indicate that when the doctor examined the accused, the latter asked if he could speak to her alone. Then, he told her that he took a dose of Shabu. She then reassured him that his condition was stable, but she was surprised when he shouted angrily: "Shut up!" He also assaulted her and

grabbed her stethoscope.
Attorney Elaf Al-Saleh, representative of Kuwait Medical Society, submitted a surveillance camera recording of the incident, in addition to the statements of wit-

After the issuance of the ruling, Al-Saleh pointed out "it is unfortunate that the assault on doctors is no longer an anomaly, as it has become a widespread phenomenon, up to the point that many of the victims requested for transfer to other workplaces after they were insulted and assaulted in front of their colleagues." She promised to continue filing such cases and demand compensation for damages.

'Eye on Asherij coast': Acting Director General of the Environment Public Authority (EPA) Eng Samira Al-Kandari has confirmed the continuation of inspection campaigns along Asherij coast as part of joint efforts between the authority and the Ministry of Interior to protect the environ-

ment, reports Al-Anba daily.
In a statement to the daily, Al-Kandari confirmed that EPA's teams, in cooperation with the ministry, carried out a number of campaigns during Ramadan; which resulted in the issuance of 16 citations for various violations.

Commenting on viral video clips showing some people violating Environmental Protection Law No. 42/2014 and its amendments by driving on the tidal zone, Al-Kandari affirmed that there is coordination with the ministry to summon those who committed violations to complete legal procedures against them. She pointed out these violations are against articles 100 and Article 108 of the law, the penalty for which ranges from KD250 to KD50,000.

She added the judicial officers affiliated with EPA and the Environmental Police have been dispatched to Asherij coast, stressing the need to adhere to environmen-

"Many of the wrong practices that have become behavior in the state come from a reactionary ideology that urges voting in the name of democracy but calls for self-interest. Developed countries criminalize racist and sectarian calls, and in 2024 there are many who call to vote according to sect, race, sect, or family.

"Those who use democracy must also practice it in a healthy and sound manner for society. Using advanced terminology to implement reactionary practices and instill them in the next generation is nothing but a crime against civilization, development and modernity.

"The scene of appeals, advertisements, and videos with modern technical production of candidates is only an image that may not reflect the reality that those who claim advanced legislation carry.

"This statement highlights the challenges and complexities associated with the implementation of development and modernization in political culture, particularly within the context of democratic processes. It emphasizes the importance of monitoring the political situation, analyzing voter behavior, and understanding the dynamics of democracy to ensure its integrity.

"The statement condemns uncivilized behavior in the electoral process, including the manipulation of voters through various means such as buying votes or exerting pressure to support a particular candidate. It also criticizes the misuse of resources, including financing campaigns, controlling media channels, and engaging in corrupt practices to influence government decisions or commercial tenders.

"Moreover, the statement warns voters to be vigilant against those who seek to exploit their votes for personal gain or to advance divisive agendas that could harm the country. It calls for accountability and transparency in political processes to prevent the abuse of power and resources for narrow interests, ultimately safeguarding democracy and promoting the common good. Stay safe!"

1,770 traffic mishaps, 20,352 violations in one week; 14 juveniles caught driving

Gang of three held in 11 campsite robberies

KUWAIT CITY, March 26: The General Traffic Department in the Ministry of Interior has announced that its operation units dealt with 1,770 traffic accidents from March 15-22; indicating 276 accidents caused injuries while 1,494 accidents that did not lead to injuries, reports Al-Anba daily.

The statistics showed that the campaigns carried out within the abovementioned week, under the supervision of Assistant Undersecretary for Traffic Affairs Major General Yousef Al-Khadda resulted in the referral of 55 individuals to the traffic police for committing serious violations. They were released after the issuance of citations for their violations.

Also, 14 juveniles were arrested for driving their parents' vehicles without a license. They were referred to the Juvenile Prosecution. A total of 22 persons wanted by law were arrested as well and they were referred to the competent authorities.

In addition, 20,352 citations were issued for various traffic violations; while 138 vehicles and bicycles were impounded. These violations include non-compliance with security, safety and shading regulations.

Campsite robberies: Officers from the Criminal Investigation Department in the Ministry of Interior closed 11 theft cases in Jahra Governorate after arresting a threemember gang involved in robbing camping sites, reports Al-Anba daily.

Acting on a tip-off, the officers put the gang under surveillance, then the gang members were searched and investigated. It turned out that they are three young men whose ages did not exceed 29 years old. They have previous convictions including the consumption of narcotic substances.

After verifying the tip-off, the officers arrested the suspects in Amghara scrapyard while they were selling the stolen items. When they were interrogated, they admitted to carrying out 11 theft operations in a number of camps in Barr Sulaibiya, Rahiya and Kabd. They also confessed to selling the stolen items at the Friday Market and Amghara scrapyard.

Drug addict arrested: Ahmadi Security Directorate patrol officers arrested a man, in his 40s, for the consumption and possession of narcotic substances, reports Al-Anba daily.

A security source disclosed that the offi-

cers got suspicious when they noticed a car parked on the side of the road in Ahmadi. They approached the car to verify their suspicions and then the suspect tried to escape. He was arrested and found to be under the influence of drugs.

Upon inquiring about him, the officers

Upon inquiring about him, the officers found out he has a criminal record. They also discovered an undisclosed quantity of narcotics when they searched his car.

narcotics when they searched his car.

A case was registered and the suspect was referred to the concerned authorities, along with the confiscated drugs.

522 adverts removed: Kuwait Municipality's Hawalli Governorate's Audit and Services Follow-up Department has conducted rigorous inspection campaigns over the past three weeks, resulting in the removal of 522 violating advertisements. The municipality disclosed that the violations encompassed a range of infractions, including 130 advertisements related to the upcoming 2024 National Assembly elections, with 392 cases already addressed, reports Al-Jarida daily.

In a statement, Kuwait Municipality emphasized its commitment to ongoing field campaigns across governorates to address advertisement violations, especially during the forthcoming election period slated for April 4. The municipality assured the public of its continued vigilance in ensuring compliance with advertising regulations.

Lightning kills expat

KUWAIT CITY, March 26: An expatriate employed as a guard in Jakhour tragically lost his life when struck by lightning in Bar Al-Liyah. The incident occurred the evening before last, reports Al-Anba daily.

A swift report reached the Ministry of Interior's operations room, informing them of the lightning strike on a guard stationed in Jakhour, Bar Al-Liyah. Responding promptly, security personnel and ambulances rushed to the scene.

Upon arrival, it was confirmed that the guard, aged in his forties, had succumbed to the lightning strike. His body was swiftly transported to the designated area.

Meanwhile, the General Department of Forensic Medicine commenced their procedures as security officials initiated an investigation into the incident.

Collection confiscated

Four 'unknown' charity boxes found in mosques

KUWAIT CITY, March 26: The inspection and monitoring teams for charitable work recently found four boxes for collecting cash donations in mosques, reports Al-Anba daily quoting a reliable source from the Ministry of Social Affairs.

The source said these boxes do not belong to any charitable organization and do not bear the name of any party.

On the measures being taken, the source revealed the Charitable Societies Department has confiscated the funds and a violation is recorded in each case; including the name of the mosque, time and the collected amount, and then submitted to the Ministry of Endowments and Islamic Affairs to take the necessary action concerning the Imam of the mosque where the violation was discovered and with regard to the confiscated funds, which will later be handed over to one of the charitable work agencies.

The source confirmed that the charitable organizations participating in the charitable project for the month of Ramadan are committed to the rules and regulations, as they did not commit any serious violation. The source pointed out the only observation recorded is the failure of 'mandoobs' to follow the approved fundraising schedule for mosques.

On the other hand, the daily has obtained information that the Cooperatives Sector has finalized the schedule of the general assemblies and elections of the boards of directors after the Eid Al-Fitr holiday. The April schedule is for 13 cooperative societies as follows: Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh, Abdullah Al-Mubarak, Al-Shamiya & Shuwaikh, Al-Nuzha, Al-Naeem, Bayan, Sulaibikhat, Doha, Al-Ittifar, Al-Daiya, Al-Sabahiya, Al-Fahaheel, Al-Shaab and Ali Sabah Al-Salem. The source confirmed that elections will be conducted using the automated voting system.



Calls for legal action as social media insults 'hurt' Kuwait's national unity

Cursing a person without legal right is forbidden: religious figure

KUWAIT CITY, March 25: Religious figures in the country have rejected what was reported about the exchange of insults that ensued on social media between some components of society.

They called on the government to intervene and stop both sides from escalating lest it ignites strife in the country.

In this regard, the Director of the Center for Promoting Religious Moderation Sheikh Dr. Abdullah Al-Sharika said in a press statement that cursing is forbidden, and those who insult each other

must be stopped by the force of the law. He said, "Islam has forbidden harming one another. It also forbids insults and cursing. Almighty Allah has ruled profanity upon anyone who insults

another or disgraces another undeservingly.

Prophet Mohammed (PBUH) said, "... if anyone makes an untruthful accusation against a Muslim, Allah will make him dwell in the corrupt fluid flowing from the inhabitants of Hell till he retracts his statement.." If this is against individuals, then how about attacking a component of Kuwaiti so-

Al-Sharika said he considers this as one of the reasons behind harming national unity, provoking strife, and tampering with societal peace.

He called on the state to prevent these phenomena by force of law, and to address all involved

Al-Sharika said, "We noticed an exchange of insults from several parties in a disgusting way that threatens the ignition of strife in the country. However, we believe in the wisdom of the esteemed wise Kuwaiti government in being the first to close these mouths and prevent the trumpets that provoke and ignite internal strife in society."

Meanwhile, an imam and preacher at Kuwait's Ministry of Awqaf and Head of the Scientific Committee of the Society for the Revival of Islamic Heritage Sheikh Dr. Mohammad Al-Najdi said the cursing that occurred is forbidden, and it is necessary to guard tongues and consider the consequences of speech.

În a press statement, he stressed that cursing a

person without a legal right is forbidden.
Al-Najdi quoted a hadith, which is, "... another one speaks a word displeasing to Allah without considering it of any importance, and for this reason he will sink down into Hell", explaining, "So his saying without considering it of any importance means without confirmation.

As for someone who unjustly insults an entire tribe or an entire people, he is exposed to the possibility of the sin of every man among them, or anyone who satirizes or insults him unjustly, and the rights of all of these are attached to his responsibility.

If the Sharia has warned and feared the attachment of the right of one Muslim, then what about the one who is exposed to the rights of an entire tribe or to whom the rights of all men are attached?

Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) said, "Indeed, the worst of people in the eyes of Allah is a man who satirizes another man and the latter satirizes the entire tribe. The one who reviles people has been subjected to the sin of every man who did not deserve what he reviled against them. Has he forgotten that among them are the truthful ones, the martyrs, the righteous, the imams, and the preachers? Will he be able to dispute all these?.

The ministry also obtained the approval of the Central Agency for Public Tenders to award this tender, while its finance counterpart has approved



Total number of beneficiaries hits 143K

Kuwait disburses around KD3.7 bln for rent allowance in past 33 years

KUWAIT CITY, March 26: Over the past 33 years, approximately 3.7 billion dinars have been disbursed for rent allowance, with 255 million dinars spent in the last fiscal year alone. The total number of beneficiaries of the rental allowance reached 143,000 citizens, with the allowance remaining in effect until the citizen submits a request for a power receipt or 38 months from receiving the voucher, whichever comes first, according to official data a copy of which has been obtained by the Al-Rai daily.
The Public Authority for Housing Wel-

fare has submitted several current and future construction projects to the concerned authorities to address the housing crisis in Kuwait. These projects are accompanied by detailed data on distributions, requests, and rent allowance. From 1956 to 2013, 97,000 housing units were distributed, and from 2014 to 2023, approximately 71,500 units were distributed, accounting for 74 percent of the planned total distributions.

Housing applications have fluctuated in recent years, with 91,794 applications submitted in 2020, increasing to 94,781 in 2021, but declining to 90,683 in 2023. This decline in applications underscores the need for legislative measures to expedite housing projects and reduce the backlog of applica-

Currently, there are 39 housing contracts under implementation, valued at approximately 526 million dinars, including projects in various cities such as Al-Mutlaa City and Sabah Al-Ahmad Complex. Additionally, there are approximately 45,000 plots and units in the planning, tendering, and awarding phase, with future projects totaling 52,000 in Sabriya, 25,000 in Nawaf Al-Ahmad City, and 45,000 in Al-Khiran City.

If factors like residential land costs and infrastructure subsidies are considered, the costs could exceed 100 billion dinars. Addressing these challenges requires strategic planning and government support to ensure the timely completion of housing projects and meet the needs of eligible citizens.

Kuwait's efforts towards effective project management

SCPD's Gen-Sec executes automated system for gov't work monitoring

KUWAIT CITY, March 26: The General Secretariat of the Supreme Council for Planning and Development has instructed government agencies to designate their specialists to input project data and legislative requirements into the automated system for preparing and monitoring the government's work program at the Secretariat, reports Al-Rai daily.

Several government agencies have initiated the necessary measures to validate project data and legislative requirements within the automated system, enabling the submission of periodic reports on the program's implementation status to the Council of Ministers.

According to informed sources, this initiative will facilitate accurate tracking of project completion rates and provide insights into the progress of each ministry and government agency in project execution. It will also enable identification of challenges and obstacles, facilitating efforts to address them effectively.

Among the potential challenges highlighted by the sources are those related to the work environment, such as sudden administrative changes, coordination gaps between responsible departments, and competency overlaps. These challenges extend to human resource issues. including excessive layers of supervision and decision-making, skills shortages, and insufficient accountability.

Furthermore, technological hurdles pose challenges, including limited digitization and project management capabilities, outdated infrastructure with unreliable data, and methodological obstacles in measuring work indicators. Notably, the lack of performance indicators for project stages and delayed error reporting are significant concerns.

Addressing these challenges will be crucial for ensuring the successful implementation of the government's work program and achieving its objectives.

expanding the scope of the flow of humanitarian aid to civilians in the entire Gaza Strip, and enhancing their protection.

He hoped that this decision would lead to alleviating the suffering of the people of Gaza and would contribute to stopping the escalation, targeting and forcibly displacing Palestinian civilians, achieving a comprehensive cessation of the crisis, and ending the siege imposed on the Gaza Strip to alleviate the suffering of the Palestinian people.

He also called on the Israeli occupation forces to immediately comply with this resolution and adhere to United Nations resolutions and the requirements of international humanitarian law, while immediately stopping targeting civilians in Gaza and humanitarian institutions and headquarters, including hospitals, schools and shelters.

Earlier, the United Nations Security Council issued its first demand for a ceasefire in Gaza, with the U.S. angering Israel by abstaining from the vote. Israel responded by canceling a visit to Washington by a high-level delegation in the strongest public clash between the allies since the war be-

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu accused the U.S. of "retreating" from a "principled position" by allowing the vote to pass without conditioning the cease-fire on the release of hostages held by Hamas.

White House national security spokesman John Kirby said the administration was "kind of perplexed" by Netanyahu's decision. He said the Israelis were "choosing to create a perception of daylight here when they don't need to do that.

Kirby and the American ambassador to the U.N. said the U.S. abstained because the resolution did not condemn Hamas. U.S. officials chose to abstain rather than veto the proposal "because it does fairly reflect our view that a cease-fire and the release of hos-

tages come together," Kirby said. The 15-member council voted 14-0 to approve the resolution, which also demanded the release of all hostages taken captive during Hamas' Oct. 7 surprise attack in southern Israel. The chamber broke into loud applause after the vote

The U.S. vetoed past Security Council cease-fire resolutions in large part because of the failure to tie them directly to the release of hostages, the failure to condemn Hamas' attacks and the delicacy of ongoing negotiations. American officials have argued that the cease-fire and hostage releases are linked, while Russia, China and many other council members favored uncondi-

tional calls for a cease-fire. The resolution approved Monday demands the release of hostages but does not make it a condition for the cease-fire for the month of Ramadan, which ends in April.

Hamas said it welcomed the U.N.'s move but said the cease-fire needs to be perma-

"We confirm our readiness to engage in an immediate prisoner exchange process that leads to the release of prisoners on both sides," the group said. For months, the militants have sought a deal that includes a complete end to the conflict.

U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres tweeted: "This resolution must be implemented. Failure would be unforgivable.

The U.S. decision to abstain comes at a time of growing tensions between President Joe Biden's administration and Netanyahu over Israel's prosecution of the war, the high number of civilian casualties and the limited amounts of humanitarian assistance reaching Gaza. The two countries have also clashed over Netanyahu's rejection of a Palestinian state, Jewish settler violence against Palestinians in the occupied West Bank and the expansion of settlements there.

In addition, the well-known antagonism between Netanyahu and Biden - which dates from Biden's tenure as vice president deepened after Biden questioned Israel's strategy in combating Hamas.

Then Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, a Biden ally, suggested that Netanyahu was not operating in Israel's best interests and called for Israel to hold new elections. Biden signaled his approval of Schumer's remarks, prompting a rebuke from Netanyahu.

During its U.S. visit, the Israeli delegation was to present White House officials with its plans for a possible ground invasion of Rafah, a city on the Egyptian border in southern Gaza where over 1 million Palestinian civilians have sought shelter from

Last week, Netanyahu rebuffed a U.S. request to halt the planned Rafah invasion vowing during a visit by Secretary of State Antony Blinken to act alone if necessary. Blinken warned that Israel could soon face growing international isolation, while Vice President Kamala Harris said Israel could soon face unspecified consequences if it

launches the ground assault. The Security Council vote came after Russia and China vetoed a U.S.-sponsored resolution Friday that would have supported "an immediate and sustained cease-fire" in the Israeli-Hamas conflict. That resolution featured a weakened link between a ceasefire and the release of hostages, leaving it open to interpretation, and no time limit.

Municipal Council approves criteria for 'private housing' constructions

Nod given for revisions to ministerial decree on advt regulations

KUWAIT CITY, March 26: During its regular session Monday, which was chaired by Abdullah Al-Mahri, the Municipal Council gave its endorsement to the criteria and standards governing private and model housing constructions, reports Al-**Qabas daily.**

The Council also gave nod for revisions to the ministerial decree pertaining to advertising regulations, specifically amending the fifth article to introduce an annual fee of 75 dinars per square meter for dynamic electronic advertisements and 50 dinars per square meter for static and non-animated electronic commercial ads.

Council President Abdullah Al-Mahri commenced the session by formally approving the resolutions outlined in the minutes of Council Meeting No. 15 of 2024, followed by addressing correspondence from the Chair of the Joint Committee comprising Technical and Legal Committees concerning the prerequisites and specifications for private and model housing constructions.

Subsequently, council members endorsed the building guidelines for private and model housing zones, incorporating amendments suggested by the executive branch and council members themselves.

Amendments

The amendments included setting the maximum building height at 20 meters and making one basement, and allowing the owner or owners of the plot the freedom to design the building in one of the following ways, provided that it does not exceed three floors, including the ground floor, according to the following:

■ Design it as a single unit ■ Make two apartments on the second floor only, provided that the other floors (ground and first) are designed as one unit.

■ Only the second floor must be as one separate unit, provided that the other floors, ground and first are designed (as one unit) Each floor work in its entire-

ty as one unit, separate from (ground, first, second).

In all cases, if there is a basement, the ground floor and the basement must form a single unit.

The council decided to approve an increase in the construction percentage for plots with an area larger than 400 square meters, not to exceed 210 percent or 960 square meters, whichever is great-

The new regulations stipulate that the following are not counted among the prescribed building percentages:

Basement area; elevators per floor, and drawer dispensers, provided that the dispensers are specific and their area does not exceed 7 square meters per floor, and anything more than that is counted within the percentage; covered corridors open to one side, open and covered unused suspensions from the main building on the ground floor, provided that their area does not exceed 5 percent of the plot area, and canopies for open-sided entrances from the main building up to Bab al-Surah, so that their width does not exceed 3 meters.

Moreover, the staircase on the roof of the second floor, with an area not exceeding 25 square meters; the machine room on the roof of the second floor, with an area not exceeding 25 square meters within 100 square meters.

The Council has sanctioned specific regulations governing construction in private and model housing, outlining several key

Asian markets for crude oil export growth in focus

KPC plans to increase production capacity to 3.2 million barrels per day in fiscal 2026/'27

KUWAIT CITY, March 26: Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) is working according to ambitious plans, through which it is considering its strategic international marketing schemes to seize opportunities to increase its market share in growing markets, reports Al-Anba daily.

According to the studies that KPC is conducting, the Asian markets will remain the main importer of Kuwaiti crude oil; while the Arab, Gulf and Asian countries will be the largest importers of refined materials.

The daily obtained information that KPC aims to reach crude oil production capacity of 3.2 million barrels per day by fiscal 2026/2027 - a growth of 32 percent compared to 2.422 million barrels per day in fiscal 2020/2021.

The data revealed that the country's production capacity in fiscal 2023/2024 reached 2.9 million barrels and it is expected to

UK court orders to delay extradition of Assange: A British court ruled Tuesday that Julian Assange can't immediately be extradited to the United States on espionage charges, in a partial victory for the WikiLeaks founder.

Two High Court judges said they would grant Assange a new appeal unless US authorities give further assurances about what will happen to him. The ruling means the legal saga, which has dragged on for more than a decade, will

> The case has been adjourned until May 20.

Judges Victoria Sharp and Jeremy Johnson said that if no assurances are filed by the US, they will grant Assange permission to appeal extradition on grounds including breach of freedom of expression, and because he might receive the death penalty. "If assurances are not given then we

will grant leave to appeal without a fur-ther hearing," they said. "If assurances Assange are given then we will give the parties an opportunity to make further submissions before we make a final

decision on the application for leave to appeal. During a two-day hearing in the High Court in February, Assange's lawyer Edward Fitzgerald said American authorities were seeking to punish him for WikiLeaks' "exposure of criminality on the part of the US government on an unprecedented scale," includ-

ing torture and killings. Assange's supporters have argued he is a journalist protected by the First Amendment who exposed US military wrongdoing in Iraq and Afghanistan that was in the public interest. They have argued his prosecution is politically motivated and he can't get a fair trial in the US. (AP)

Ukraine ramps up spending on homemade arms: Ukraine needs any edge it can get to repel Russia from its territory. One emerging bright spot is its small but fast-growing defense industry, which the government is flooding with money in hopes that a surge of homemade weapons and ammunition can help turn the

The effort ramped up sharply over the past year as the US and Europe strained to deliver weapons and other aid to Ukraine, which is up against a much bigger Russian military backed by a thriving domestic defense industry.

The Ukrainian government under its president Volodymyr Zelenskyy, budgeted nearly \$1.4 billion in 2024 to buy and develop weapons at home - 20 times more than before Russia's full-scale

And in another major shift, a huge portion of weapons are now being bought from privately owned factories. They are sprouting up across the country and rapidly taking over an industry that had been dominated by state-owned companies.

A privately owned mortar factory that launched in western Ukraine last year is making roughly 20,000 shells a month. "I feel that we are bringing our country closer to victory," said Anatolli Kuzmin, the factory's 64-year-old owner, who used to make farm equipment and fled his home in southern Ukraine after Russia invaded in 2022. (AP)

US, Baltic states affirm support for Ukraine: The United States and Baltic countries have affirmed joint resolve in backing Ukraine to defend itself in the face of the Russian military operation launched three years ago.

US State Department Matthew Miller said in a statement that the common stance was expressed during a meeting that grouped US Secretary of State Antony J. Blinken, Estonian Foreign Minister Margus Tsahkna, Latvian Foreign Minister Krisjanis Karin, and Lithuanian Foreign Minister Gabrielius Landsbergis, late on Monday in Washington.

Secretary Blinken and the Baltic foreign ministers affirmed the strength of the NATO Alliance and its role in ensuring security and prosperity in Europe, noting in particular the importance of securing NATOs eastern flank.

The Secretary also congratulated the three foreign ministers on their upcoming 20th anniversary in the Alliance.

The Secretary and the foreign ministers underlined that the United States, Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania stand united in support of Ukraine as it defends itself against "Russias aggression and are committed to holding Russia accountable." (KUNA)

Russia extends arrest of US reporter: A Moscow court on Tuesday ordered Wall Street Journal reporter Evan Gershkovich to remain in jail on espionage charges until at least late June, court

The 32-year-old US citizen was arrested in late March 2023 while on a reporting trip and has spent nearly a year behind bars. His arrest was extended until June 30.

Photos from the courtroom released by court officials showed Gershkovich, clad in a black checkered shirt, smiling from the

Gershkovich and his employer have denied the allegations, and the U.S. government has declared him to be wrongfully detained. His arrest in the city of Yekaterinburg rattled journalists in Russia, where authorities have not detailed what, if any, evidence they

have to support the espionage charges. Gershkovich is being held at Moscow's Lefortovo prison, which is notorious for its harsh conditions.

US ambassador to Russia Lynne Tracy attended the court hearing on Tuesday and reiterated that "the accusations against Evan are categorically untrue.'

Analysts have pointed out that Moscow may be using jailed Americans as bargaining chips in soaring US-Russian tensions over the Kremlin's military operation in Ukraine. (AP)

'Masterminds are yet to be found': Russian President Vladimir Putin said Monday that the gunmen who killed 139 people at a suburban Moscow concert hall are "radical Islamists," but he repeated his accusation that Ukraine could have played a role despite Kyiv's strong denials.

Two days after the Islamic State's Afghanistan affiliate claimed responsibility for Friday night's attack at the music venue, Putin acknowledged during a meeting with government officials that the killings were carried out by extremists "whose ideology the Islamic world has been fighting for centuries.

Putin, who declared over the weekend that the four attackers were arrested while trying to escape to Ukraine, said investigators haven't determined who ordered the attack, but that it was necessary to find out "why the terrorists after committing their crime tried to flee to Ukraine and who was waiting for them there.

The IS affiliate claimed it carried out the attack, and US intelligence said it had information confirming the group was responsible. French President Emmanuel Macron said France has intelligence pointing to "an IS entity" as responsible for the attack. (AP)

Russian ambassador a no-show: The Russian ambassador to Poland did not show up Monday for a meeting at the Polish Foreign Ministry where he had been summoned because of a Russian cruise missile that violated Polish airspace on the weekend, the Polish ministry's spokesman said. Russian Ambassador Sergey Andreev was to be given a note of protest after the Russian missile entered the airspace of the NATO member for 39 seconds early Sunday amid a Russian attack targeting western Ukraine.

Paweł Wroski, the Polish Foreign Ministry spokesman, told reporters in a brief statement outside the ministry that Andreev did not come to the meeting, and that his failure to appear has led the Warsaw government to wonder "whether he is able to properly

represent the interests of the Russian Federation in Warsaw." Wroski said the Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations "clearly defines the duties of an ambassador in a host state." (AP)



Cargo ship hits Baltimore's Key Bridge, bringing it down

A major bridge in Baltimore snapped and collapsed after a container ship rammed into it early Tuesday, and several vehicles fell into the river below. Rescuers were searching for at least seven people in the

The vessel appears to have hit one of the supports of the Francis Scott Key Bridge, causing the roadway to break apart in several places and plunge into the water, according to a video posted on X, formerly known as Twitter. The ship caught fire, and thick, black smoke billowed out of it

"This is a dire emergency," Kevin Cartwright, director of communications for the Baltimore Fire Department, told The Associated Press. "Our focus right now is trying to rescue and recover these peo-

Emergency responders were searching for at least seven people believed to be in the water. Cartwright said, though he said it's too early to know how many people were affected. He called the collapse a "developing mass casualty event."

He added that some cargo appeared to be

dangling from the bridge, which spans the Patapsco River, a vital artery that along with the Port of Baltimore is a hub for shipping on the East Coast. Opened in 1977, the bridge is named for the writer

of "The Star-Spangled Banner."

Cop killed during traffic stop: A New York City police officer was shot and killed Monday during a traffic stop, the city's mayor said. It marked the first slaying of an NYPD officer in two years.

"We lost one of our sons today and it is extremely painful. It is extremely painful,' Mayor Eric Adams said, addressing reporters at a hospital in Queens. The shooting happened just before 5:50 pm in the Far Rockaway section of Queens, police said. Officer Jonathan Diller and his partner were part of the NYPD Community Response Team and were conducting a traffic stop at the time.

As they approached the vehicle, the suspect pointed a gun toward the officers and shot Diller beneath his bullet-proof vest, said Police Commissioner Edward Caban, who identified the slain officer on X, formerly known as Twitter. He said Diller's partner returned fire and shot one of the people in the vehicle, who was taken to an area hospital. (AP)

Biden, Harris discuss migration with Arévalo

WASHINGTON, March 26, (AP): US Vice President Kamala Harris welcomed Bernardo Arévalo, the newly elected president of Guatemala, to the White House on Monday to praise his battle against corruption and promote their work on stemming migration from

"Your leadership can help rebuild the Guatemalan people's trust in their institutions, and give them a sense of hope and opportunity," Harris said.

President Joe Biden met privately afterward with Arévalo to congratulate him on his inauguration, the White House said later Monday. They discussed good governance, effective migration management, the importance of upholding democracy and other issues, the White House said.

The Democratic vice president announced that her efforts to address the root causes of migration by improving economic opportunity in the region have generated \$5.2 billion in private sector commitments.

"The problems, of course, did not occur overnight, and the solutions will not be achieved overnight," Harris said. But there has been short-term progress,

Migrants from Guatemala, El Salvador and Honduras - an area known as the Northern Triangle - have long made the journey north to the US-Mexico border. Successive administrations have struggled to manage the flow of migrants, and it's become a humanitarian and political challenge for Biden during this year's election. Some Republicans who supported Haley still 'refusing' to back Trump

COLUMBIA, SC, March 26, (AP): Now that Nikki Haley has shuttered her presidential campaign, one person who voted for her refuses to back former President Donald Trump and plans to reluctantly vote for US President Joe Biden.

Another Haley primary supporter acknowledges that he was probably always a "closet Trump fan" and will vote for the former president again in November.

The former UN ambassador's base was never big enough to seriously challenge Trump before he clinched a third straight Republican nomination. But in what's shaping up to be a tight rematch between Trump and Biden, the apparent splintering of Haley's voters and donors could hurt Trump's general election chances, particularly in battleground states full of suburban voters who remain dubious of

a Trump return to the White House. For now, interviews with Haley's supporters suggest they could go in a variety of directions - some backing Trump, some going to Biden and others seeking third-party options or avoiding making a decision about the presidential race yet.

Haley has not spoken publicly since leaving the race and urging Trump to reach out to all Republicans. She has not endorsed Trump and suggested she may not at all. "She said it's up to him to earn the support of those who supported

her, and he's got to earn it," said Eric Tanenblatt, a longtime GOP donor who was Haley's Georgia campaign's co-chairman. "Right now, I'm definitely not there. It tells me there are things

Senegal prez-elect to 'fight' corruption

DAKAR, Senegal, March 26, (AP): Senegal woke up Tuesday to a new president-elect, Bassirou Diomaye Faye, a former tax inspector and political newcomer who was released from prison just weeks ago and had inspired voters, many of them unemployed youth, with a vow to fight corruption and reform the economy.

Faye was catapulted into a presidential campaign after popular opposition leader Ousmane Sonko, who was barred from running due to a prior conviction, had backed him. As he gave his first speech as presidentelect on Monday evening, it represented a dramatic rise for the 44-year-old who is due to be the youngest leader of the West African nation.

"I pledge to govern with humility and transparency, and to fight corruption at all levels. I pledge to devote myself fully to rebuilding our institutions," he said, restating promises made during his



The election followed months of unrest ignited by Faye and Sonko's arrest last year, and concerns that the president would seek a third term in office despite constitutional term limits. The violence shook Senegal's reputation as a stable democracy in a region that has seen a wave of coups. Rights groups said dozens were killed in the protests, while some 1,000 people were jailed.

Considered the anti-establishment candidate, Faye's campaign messages of economic reform and anti-corruption resonated with the youth. Almost a third of young people are unemployed with thousands risking their lives on dangerous journeys in search of jobs in the West. Faye has vowed to improve Senegal's control over its natural resources by promoting national companies to prevent the country from falling into what his campaign called "economic enslavement." His manifesto promised to renegotiate Senegal's oil and gas contract and introduce a new currency.

On Monday night, Faye outlined some early foreign policy priorities, which included reforming the troubled West African regional bloc known as ECOWAS.

"A win by the opposition also means major changes ahead in domestic and foreign policies," said Rida Lyammouri of the Policy Center for the New South, a Morocco-based think tank, adding that a promise to move away from former colonial power France could define the foreign policy of the country's new government.

Pan-African Parliament chief re-elected: The senator from Zimbabwe and Geo-Political Chief Representative of South Africa Fortune Charumbira, was reelected on Monday as president of the Pan-African Parliament to continue his term and represent the continent from 2022 until 2025

During the same electoral session, which was held in Midrand, South Africa, two vice-presidents (the "renew confidence in the former officials and allow them to carry out their duties in their positions in order to preserve stability in appointments within the structures of this continental body.'

More than 130 Nigerian kids back home: More than 130 Nigerian schoolchildren rescued after more than two weeks in captivity arrived Monday in their home state in northwestern Nigeria ahead of their anticipated reunions with families, following the latest in a series of mass school abductions in the West African nation.

Six of the 137 students remain in hospital, and one staff member who was abducted along with the children died in captivity, military officials said.

The children were seized by motorcycle-riding gunmen at their school in the remote Kaduna state town of Kuriga on March 7, triggering a wide-ranging rescue operation. They were rescued Sunday by the military in a forest about 200 kilometers (more than 120 miles) to the north in neighboring Zamfara state, though authorities have provided no details of the rescue or said whether any suspected kidnappers were arrested.

'SAfrica's parliamentary speaker took \$135K': South African prosecutors said Monday they intend to charge the parliamentary speaker with corruption, alleging that she took \$135,000 and a wig in bribes over

a three-year period while she was defense minister. Speaker Nosiviwe Mapisa-Ngakula hasn't been arrested or charged. The prosecutors spoke at a court hearing over her claims that authorities hadn't properly informed her of allegations or followed correct procedure in their investigation.

Judge Sulet Potterill said that she would deliver a ruling on April 2 on Mapisa-Nqakula's application for a temporary block on police arresting her. Mapisa-Nqakula is also asking for access to documents outlin-

ing the evidence prosecutors have against her. Prosecutors have rejected her request and say she is asking for special treatment.

Explosion in northern Kenya kills 4: An explosion at a small hotel located near a police station in northeastern Kenya killed four people, including three officers, and wounded several others on Monday, au-

The blast in the town of Mandera, which is on the border with Somalia, was caused by an improvised explosive device that had been planted at the hotel and was detonated as a crowd of people sat down to eat

breakfast, police said. Mandera police chief Samwel Mutunga said that two of those wounded were in critical condition and would be flown to the capital, Nairobi.

Investigators have blamed east Africa-based extremist group al-Shabab for the attack. The group, which hasn't claimed responsibility for the explosion, has staged major attacks in Kenya and neighboring Somalia. The latest attack followed another one on Sunday in coastal Kenya's Lamu County, where two police reservists were killed.

Japan to sell fighter jets to other nations

TOKYO, March 26, (AP): Japan's Cabinet on Tuesday approved a plan to sell future next-generation fighter jets that it's developing with Britain and Italy to other countries, in the latest move away from the country's postwar pacifist principles.

The contentious decision to allow international arms sales is expected to help secure Japan's role in the joint fighter jet project and part of a move to build up the Japanese arms industry and bolster its role in global security.

The Cabinet also endorsed a revision to Japan's arms equipment and technology transfer guidelines to allow coproduced lethal weapons to be sold to countries other than the partners.

Chief Cabinet Secretary Yoshimasa Hayashi said the changes are necessary given Japan's security environment, but stressed that Japan's pacifist principles remain unchanged.

"In order to achieve a fighter aircraft that meets the necessary performance and to avoid jeopardizing the defense of Japan, it is necessary to transfer finished products from Japan to countries other than partner countries," Hayashi told reporters, adding that Tokyo will follow a strict approval process for jet sales. "We have clearly demonstrated that we will continue to adhere to our basic philosophy as a peaceful nation," he said.

Japan has long restricted arms exports under the country's pacifist constitution, but has rapidly taken steps to deregulate amid rising regional and global tensions, especially from near-

Kuwait oil refineries expect strong profits in 2024-2025

Global market relies on Kuwaiti & Gulf refineries

KUWAIT CITY, March 26: Oil sources have confirmed to Al-Seyassah that the Kuwaiti oil refineries, namely Al-Zour and Al-Ahmadi, along with Mina Abdullah and Duqm, which are jointly owned by Kuwait and the Sultanate of Oman, are poised for significant profits in the years 2024 and 2025. KUWAIT CITY, March 26: According to information obtained by Al-Jarida daily from a reliable oil source, the merger between Kuwait National Petroleum Company (KNPC) and Kuwait Integrated Petroleum Industries Company (KIPIC) is progressing rapidly, reports Al-Jarida daily.

The merger procedures are expected to conclude at the beginning of the next month, coinciding with the retirement of KIPIC's CEO, Walid Al-Badr, by the end of the current month.

The source indicated that the entity known as "KIPIC" will be dissolved, with its financial and legal status carcelled, and it will henceforth operate under the umbrella of the Kuwait National Petroleum Company.

Following the merger, the company will be structured into three sectors: production and operations, comprising the Quebec refinery along with maintenance and operations; refinery servic-

es, dedicated to the Quebec refinery's services; and the export sector.

Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) is continuing its strategy to consolidate its eight affiliated oil companies, aiming to merge similar activities within the oil sector to enhance integration and operational efficiency, thereby maximizing the value derived from hydrocarbons.

Pakistani trade delegation visits Kabul

A delegation from Pakistan's Ministry of Commerce arrived in Kabul on Monday to meet its Afghan counterparts to discuss how to improve trade relations, after tensions have risen over cross-border militant attacks.

Last week, Pakistan's military carried out rare airstrikes against suspected hideouts of the Pakistani Taliban inside Afghanistan, killing eight people and prompting Afghan forces

The March 18 exchange came after seven Pakistani soldiers were killed in a suicide bombing and coordinated attack in northwest

Pakistan. It had further strained ties between the sides, and officials believe that Monday's visit by a senior bureaucrat, Mohammad Khurram, will play a role in easing tensions.

In Kabul, Abdul Salam Jawad, spokesman for the Afghan Commerce Ministry, said that the Pakistani delegation had arrived at the invitation of Afghan Minister of Industry and Commerce Nooruddin Azizi.

Pakistan's Foreign Ministry spokesperson, Mumtaz Zahra Baloch, said the visit was aimed at promoting trade and people-to-people ties with Afghanistan. (AP)

Boeing CEO to step down in management shake-up

A leadership shake-up at Boeing, including news Monday that its top executive plans to step down, highlights the difficult path facing the iconic aircraft manufacturer as it tries to navigate through yet another

safety crisis. CEO David Calhoun, who has been under unrelenting pressure since a panel blew off a Boeing 737 Max jetliner during a January flight, said he would retire at the end of the year. He said the decision to leave

was his and the timing would allow for an orderly transition.

The head of the company's commercial airplanes unit, Stán Deal, is already out. Boeing said he was replaced immediately by Stephanie Pope, a fast-rising insider who just became chief operating officer on Jan. 1.

In a third high-profile decision board Chairman Lawrence Kellner a former Continental Airlines chief, won't stand for reelection in May Boeing said. A former Qualcomm CEO who was appointed to succeed Kellner will lead the search for Cal-

houn's replacement.
Calhoun was on the Boeing board during its worst time - the crashes of two 737 Max planes in 2018 and 2019 that killed 346 people. He leaves with the company under intense scrutiny from regulators and lawmakers since a door-plug panel blew off a brand-new Alaska Airlines Max jet in midflight on Jan. 5. (AP)

Japan escapes technical recession, BOJ pivots away from negative interest rates

US economic growth proceeds apace while Europe struggles




Global economic prospects have diverged in recent months, with the US seeing solid growth and proving resilient to the current elevated interest rate environment. However, within Europe, conditions are much weaker with - alongside high interest rates - more restrictive fiscal policy, less exposure to the booming tech sector and greater exposure to sluggish global trade weighing heavily on activity. Meanwhile, in a historic move, the Bank of Japan tightened monetary policy on a view that inflation is finally heading sustainably back up to the 2% target, despite still-muted domestic activity. Elsewhere in Asia, the Chinese economy got off to a decent start in Q1, though structural issues compounded by a moribund property sector continue to pose questions over the strength and durability of the recovery. More positively, India continues to deliver above-expected growth rates, and remains the fastest-growing major economy

US economy powers ahead on resilient consumer spending amid a tight labor market

Underpinned by a robust job market and resilient consumer spending, the US economy has defied slowdown predictions, growing by a solid 3.2% (annualized) in Q4 2023 versus expectations of a 2% rise. (Chart 1.) Although softened from +4.9% in Q3, there seem to be no major signs of a downturn. Household consumption remained largely intact (+3% y/y), while residential investment rose for the second quarter and business investments increased. This said, economic indicators thus far in Q1 have been relatively underwhelming, with retail sales (+0.6% m/m) and industrial production (+0.1% m/m) recovering somewhat in February after outsized drops in January, and consumer sentiment still somewhat subdued. As a result, GDP growth could slow to 1.5-2% in Q1, near its trend rate. Offering support to the ongoing momentum, the labor market remains solid despite a mixed set of data in February, with strong job gains (+275K) but substantial downward revisions to the previous two months' data, ebbing but still-robust wage growth (4.3% y/y), and a pickup in the unemployment rate (3.9%), albeit historically a low level.

Consumer price inflation has broadly decelerated, with the core rate receding to 3.8% y/y in February. Although well off its peak of 6.6% in September 2022, progress on disinflation seems to have lost steam, with the core rate moderating only marginally from 4% in October. With the Fed funds target rate now at 5.25-5.50%, real policy rates are in positive (and restrictive) territory, which risks





causing a sharp downturn if rates are kept too high for too long. But given the robust economic picture, the Fed wants to achieve greater confidence that inflation is heading back to the 2% target before shifting policy. For now, the FOMC, in its latest dot-plot projections, continued to see three rate cuts later this year and looked set to slow the pace of the bank's quantitative tightening program despite hotter inflation data so far this year.


Europe remains stuck in a weaker growth pattern Euro Area GDP was unchanged in Q4 2023 after falling 0.1% q/q in Q3. Growth could edge up to 0.8% this year based on the European Commission's forecast, following a 0.5% rise in 2023 – though this is still a downgrade from an earlier forecast of 1.2%. France, Germany,


and Italy will likely see slower growth, while others like Greece and Spain could deliver better outcomes. Growth should be helped by easing inflation, rises in real wages, and likely ECB interest rate cuts. However, the composite PMI in February remained in contraction for a ninth straight month at 47.2, signaling still-weak business conditions overall. Inflation fell to 2.6% y/y (from 2.8% in January), with the core rate coming in at 3.1% from 3.3% the previous month. Wages were up 5.6% in Q3 but could start to tick down as inflation drops towards the ECB's 2% inflation goal in 2025. Given weak growth and inflation now below that in the US, the ECB could now start cutting interest rates earlier (and more aggressively) that the Fed, not later than the bank's meeting in June.

The UK economy showed some signs of recovery, growing 0.2% m/m in January 2024 versus -0.1% in December after recording a minor recession in H2 2023. The IMF expects growth to reach 0.6% in 2024 versus 0.1% in 2023, with a somewhat positive outlook stemming from resilient wage growth (5.2% in December) and moderating inflation (3.4% in February). Additionally, the March budget announced that fiscal policy will be tightened by less than previously planned (ahead of a likely general election later this year), providing some help for household disposable incomes. With inflation trending steadily lower, the Bank of England could also start to cut interest rates in June.

Japan escapes technical recession, BOJ pivots away from negative interest rates

GDP growth was revised up for Q4 2023 to +0.1% q/q from -0.1% q/q in the previous estimate, following a large 0.8% drop in Q3, helping the country to avoid a technical recession. (Chart 3.) This was due to an upgrad-





partly offset weak domestic activity, with Japanese goods more competitive amid a weaker yen. Sluggish economic growth is expected in the current quarter, with leading indicators, including the PMI, signaling a continued contraction in manufacturing, weak household consumption, and a modest rise in retail sales. However, the expanding service activity in February, strong exports, and tumbling energy imports could provide some support.

Consumer price inflation reversed the declining trend and rose 2.8% in February from 2.2% in January, while core inflation also accelerated to 2.8% from 2% y/y. However, recent union negotiations have delivered decades-high wage growth to workers, moving wages into positive territory – a prerequisite for inflation being sustained at or above the 2% target according to the Bank of Japan (BOJ). This pushed the bank in March to abandon its eight-year negative interest rate policy and discontinue yield curve control (which capped long-term bond yields). But the small size of the widely anticipated rate move, the absence of commitment to further increases and the BOJ's pledge to keep buying government bonds all signaled a continuation of the bank's accommodative stance and resulted in the yen and government bond yields falling post-announcement.

Chinese economy picked up last year but outlook remains tentative

Economic growth surpassed the government's target of 5% in 2023, accelerating to 5.2% y/y, helped by base effects from severe "Covid-Zero" lockdowns in the preceding year. (Chart 4.) But excluding the pandemic period 2020-22, this was a multi-decade low. Recent economic indicators have painted a rosier picture. The trade data surprised positively as exports grew 7.1% y/y in the January-February period (on average) while imports edged up 3.5% y/y, signaling a slight pickup in domestic consumption. Industrial production and retail sales were also above forecast. Consumer prices rose 0.7% y/y in February following four months of deflation, though this could have been impacted by the Lunar New Year holiday falling in February compared to January in the previous year. Moreover, the decline in producer prices worsened to 2.7% y/y in February, signaling further deflationary pressure in the pipeline. The composite PMI remained steady in the first two months of the year at 50.9, but manufacturing activity was in contraction for the fifth month in a row. The uneven economic performance highlights the challenges the government will face in achieving its "around 5%" GDP growth target for 2024, considering property market and demographic headwinds.





Chart 4: China GDP growth

bps in January. In addition, state-owned banks earmarked \$8 billion in funds for eligible property projects. The authorities also introduced measures to boost stock market valuations, such as restrictions on short selling, increasing margin requirements, and suspending broker lending of shares. The government has reaffirmed its commitment to supporting economic conditions, but details are scant.

India's growth surprisingly accelerates to a sixquarter high

India's economy continued to surprise positively, growing by a solid 8.4% y/y in Q3 of FY23/24 (October-December), much higher than the 6.6% forecast, accelerating from an upwardly-revised 8.1% in Q2 on strong public investments. A continued push by the government to accelerate capital spending and potentially create more job opportunities before this year's general election has been a key growth driver in recent periods. However, private consumption lagged, rising at a slower 3.5% pace, though better than +2.4% the previous quarter. On the back of a solid performance in Q3 and upward revisions to H1 growth, the government raised the growth forecast for the full-year to 7.6% from the 7.3% projected earlier. Despite the latest improvement, headwinds persist for private consumption, mainly in the rural segment where the impact of erratic rains is more visible, as the official forecast projects the slowest private consumption growth in over two decades outside the pandemic period at 3% for the current fiscal year.

Consumer price inflation remained broadly stable at 5.1% y/y in February on elevated food prices after irregular rains impacted agricultural production. The Reserve Bank of India has kept the repo rate steady at 6.5% since April 2023 as it grapples with food price uncertainty and an unclear inflation outlook amid worsening geopolitics and volatile oil prices

Roadmap to inclusive education

Schools can close summer learning 'disparities' with these 4 strategies

When it comes to summer learning, the benefits are well documented. Students who consistently attend well-planned, high-quality programs achieve higher scores on math and language arts testing. They also earn higher ratings from teachers on their social and emotional skills, research shows. Unfortunately, research also shows that students from low-income and minority backgrounds are less likely to attend - and benefit from - summer learning programs than their affluent and white peers.

Summer learning can play a crucial role in helping these students - and all kids - recover learning lost during the pandemic. The federal government has also acknowledged the importance of summer learning through its Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund, or ESSER. The fund infused states with nearly US\$190.5 billion, with 20% allocated to academic recovery, including summer programs.

So how can school districts capitalize on the crucial summer months and make learning more equitable?

In partnership with the Wallace Foundation and the District Summer Learning Network implemented by the nonprofit development organization FHI 360, our team at the Center for Policy, Research, and Evaluation at New York University is studying how districts implement high-quality summer programs with an eye toward equity. We analyzed 2022 summer planning documents from 26 districts and identified four strategies they're using to make the programs more

equitable. Of the summer learning plans we analyzed, we found that half prioritized students who need academic or behavioral support.

Additionally, 42% mentioned English-language learners, and 35% mentioned students with disabilities.

Other distinct groups included low-income students, migrants, racial and ethnic minorities and gifted and talented students. Among districts that prioritized special groups, almost all of them included more than one group in their strategic outreach.

Which students get served in summer learning programs, and how they are served, has implications for equity. For instance, research has found that middle-income students often benefit more from summer learning programs than lower-income students.

This could be because highquality programs tend to serve higher-income students, which raises concerns that summer learning programs may actually increase the summer gap if they are not targeted. High-quality programs that target lower-income students and other minority students can move the needle toward equity.

For students to access programs outside of the regular school day in an equitable way, simple accommodations, such as transportation, are key.

Several district summer learning plans we analyzed went above and beyond academics. They provided not just transportation but also free and nutritious meals, outreach material in different languages and extended day care services to support working families.

Students learn best when they feel a sense of safety and belonging. By affirming and nurturing the unique identities of students, districts can make summer programming more equitable and accelerate learning. Research shows, for instance, that summer supports for English-language learners are key for their overall academic development.

Some districts tailored their programming to the individual interests and cultural needs of their students. (AP)

MSNBC hosts object to McDaniel's hiring as paid contributor

NEW YORK, March 26, (AP): The internal furor over NBC News' decision to hire former Republican National Committee head Ronna McDaniel as a paid contributor spread Monday, with MSNBC personalities Rachel Maddow, Jen Psaki, Nicolle Wallace, Lawrence O'Donnell and Joe Scarborough all using their shows to publicly object.

Maddow, MSNBC's most popular personality, compared it to putting a mobster to work in a district attorney's office.

"I find the decision to put her on the payroll inexplicable and I hope they will reconsider that decision," she said on her weekly program Monday night.

There was no immediate comment on Monday from NBC News or McDaniel about the extraordinary public revolt against network management that began with former "Meet the Press" moderator Chuck Todd a day earlier. Todd said that many NBC News journalists were uncomfortable with the hiring because of McDaniel's "gaslighting" and "character assassination" while at the RNC.

The network announced McDaniel's hiring on Friday, two weeks after she stepped down as the RNC leader, saying McDaniel would add to NBC News' coverage with an insider's perspective on national politics and the future of the Republican Party

Maddow said she'd been told that MSNBC management had signed off on the hiring, but that when staff "expressed outrage," it was made clear that McDaniel would not appear on the cable network, which appeals primarily to liberal viewers. Since then, she said there's been an effort in other parts of the company to "muddy that up in the press" and make it seem like that's not what happened.

"I can assure you, that is what happened at MSNBC," she said. Maddow told her viewers - and presumably her bosses - that "it is a sign of strength, not weakness, to acknowledge that you're wrong.'

The on-air MSNBC rebellion stretched from pre-dawn to late in the evening, starting with "Morning Joe" hosts Scarborough and Mika Brzezinski promising viewers they would not see McDaniel in her NBC News capacity. Brzezinski said it's fair to seek Republican voices to balance election coverage, but "not a person who used her position of power to be an anti-democracy election denier.'

Controversy

Wallace said that with the hiring, NBC has said to election deniers "not just that they can do that on our airwaves, but that they can do that as one of us, a badge-carrying employee of NBC News, as a paid contributor to our sacred airwayes.

Said O'Donnell: "There is an easy way to avoid the controversy that NBC News has stumbled into. Don't hire anyone close to the crimes." Psaki said she decided to speak up because, as a former press secretary to President Joe Biden, her name has been used by McDaniel supporters to point out that a former Democratic political appointee

was hired by MSNBC without internal objection. She said that for a television personality, that kind of experience in government "only matters and only has value to viewers if it is paired with honesty and good faith."

One of those GOP critics was US Sen. Ted Cruz of Texas, who mentioned Psaki among several others who switched to news after working

in politics for Democrats, including the late "Meet the Press" moderator Tim Russert.

"But NBC hired a Republican??!!" he wrote on X, formerly Twitter. "It's the end of the world."

In a social media posting on Monday, Todd said that those who are trying to make it an issue of left vs. right were being intentionally dishonest. "This is about whether honest journalists are supposed to lend their credibility to someone who intentionally tried to ruin ours," he

The "Morning Joe" hosts aired an exchange from McDaniel's in-terview the day before on "Meet the Press" with current moderator Kristen Welker, who wondered why the former RNC chairwoman didn't speak up earlier after saying Sunday she disagreed with Trump's contention that people jailed for their part in the Jan. 6, 2021, attack on the Capitol should be freed.

"When you're the RNC chair you kind of take one for the whole team, right?" McDaniel said. "Now I get to be a little bit more myself, right? This is what I believe.'

It's not unusual for television news outlets to hire politicians as analysts and commentators. One of McDaniel's predecessors at the RNC, Michael Steele, is an MSNBC contributor who hosts a weekend news program there. CBS News faced some backlash for hiring two former officials in the Trump administration, Reince Priebus and Mick Mulvaney, as analysts. Alyssa Farah Griffin, a former White House communications director during the Trump administration, became a CNN political commentator.

LOS ANGELES, March 26, (AP): Shakira, the boundary-breaking Colombian performer, has been remarkably consistent since beginning her career in the early '90s. Without fail, she toured, released albums, won awards, woven global, genre-defying sounds into her pioneering singles, performed at the Super Bowl halftime show and more. Then, things slowed. Or so it appeared.

In reality, the last few years haven't been kind to Shakira. In 2022, after 11 years and two children together, she separated from soccer player Gerard Piqué, leading to what she's called the "dissolution of my family." She faced charges of tax evasion in Spain; in November 2023, she received a suspended three-year sentence and paid a fine of 7.3 million euros (\$8 million) in addition to previously unpaid taxes and inter-

On "Las Mujeres Ya No Lloran," her first new album in seven years, Shakira transforms her pain into art - from the bachata "Monotonía" to the electro-pop "Te Felicito" to the mega viral "Shakira: Bzrp Music Sessions, Vol. 53" and beyond.

"I've been through so much in these past few years that I had to literally pick up the pieces of myself and put them back together," Shakira told The Associated Press over Zoom from Miami. "And during that process, I think that music was the glue.'

This interview has been edited for clarity and brev-

AP: It has been seven years since your last album, "El Dorado." What did you learn about yourself, musically, in that time?

Shakira: Well, in those seven years I've been raising kids, I've been learning a lot about myself as a mother, as a woman. But I've also been making music. It's just that it's been more of a sporadic thing, you know, here and there. Whenever I had a chance to put out a song, I did that. But I didn't have the time to really put a whole body of work. This time, it was a compulsion and a need. It was really important for me to be able to express, in and through these songs, so many life experiences and to find catharsis, you know, and to be able to find the therapeutic effects of writing and see

myself back in the studio.

AP: You've called "Las Mujeres Ya No Lloran" a concept album. What story is it telling?

Shakira: Because there's a great diversity in this album - I know it's a conceptual album - but it didn't happen on purpose. Nobody chooses to go through the kind of life experiences that I went through when I was writing and creating this album, you know, life gives you lemons. So what do you do? Make lemonade. So I made songs. But there is a great variety within this album. There's pop, there's Afrobeat, there's reggaeton. There's some Mexican regionals as well. Rock. But there is a common thread. And that is based off of genuine, authentic life experiences and the process of elaborating those intense emotions and feelings that I've

been having to deal with during this past couple of years. **AP:** You're no stranger to embracing global sounds. On this album, you worked with Grupo Frontera and Fuerza Regida — two regional Mexican artists who are bringing their music to the global stage. That's something you know a thing or two about.

Shakira: When I first started out in this industry, it was predominantly male. It was difficult for a Colombian girl. I had to knock (on) so many doors, just do a lot of convincing. Convince all the gatekeepers, the directors of radio stations who would decide back in the day, who would like what music would get pro-

grammed, what music wouldn't. But now it is different, you know, now people decide for themselves. I think music has been democratized in a way. And that's why, Latin artists have really, found a platform for their music not like it was 10, 20 years ago... And now, Latin artists have a lot more opportunities. And it's true that the Mexican regional artists are also among that group of artists that are now being played in so many more stations in Colombia and other places of the world and here in the United States as well.

Mexico has been such an important part of my career. It's a country that I owe so much to. And it's been just a wonderful experience to be able to collaborate with some Mexican artists as well on this album. It's my small homage to Mexican music, that genre and to the Mexican people.

AP: "She Wolf" turns 15 this year. As a listener, that album felt like a shift in your career — and so does this

one. Do you see parallels? Shakira: I do, because it is the renaissance of the "She Wolf," in a way. It is the rebirth of that primal force that I feel that all women have within ourselves. It's that force that allows us to give birth, feed our offsprings, guarantee their survival of their species, fight

whatever fight we have to fight against. I had to resort to that She Wolf within me to be able

to survive. I was in a fight or flight sort of mode for a while and I think it is that She Wolf' within us women today that is taking society to where it's going, you know, at the moment. Women are natural multitaskers. We can do everything. We can really survive wars and rebuild cities after they're destroyed. So, my life was in pieces after, you know, the dissolution of my family, and so

many other things that I had to go through. That's why this album is called "Women No Longer Cry." Because I feel that women, you know, for ages have been sent to cry with a script in their hands. And just because we women conceal our emotions in front of our kids and just show good manners and accept it all, and now it's different. I think that as women now we decide when to cry, when not to cry and how to do it, if we decide to cry. So, it's like no one has to tell us

AP: I haven't seen anyone refer to this as a "divorce

Shakira: This is not a divorce album. It's an album that gathers many different life experiences, that gathers the transformation of vulnerability into resilience, the empowerment of finding your strength.

It doesn't only talk about pain; it also talks about triumph. And that's why these tears are not tears made of resentment anger or just sadness, but tears of triumph and tears of self-recognition and finding confidence within.

It's not linear. There's ups and downs and valleys and peaks. And this album is made of all of those dy-

lawyer said.

Feds search Comb's homes amid 'probe'

LOS ANGELES, March 26, (AP): In the first nine months of 2023, **Sean "Diddy" Combs** triumphantly performed at the MTV VMAs, released an R&B album that garnered a Grammy nomination and was a suitor to buy the BET network.

But several lawsuits filed late last year raised allegations of sexual assault and rape against Combs - one of hip-hop's most recognizable names as a performer

The music mogul's homes in Los Angeles and Miami were searched Monday by federal agents with Homeland Security Investigators and other law enforcement. Officials said the searches were connected to an investigation by federal authorities in



The officials spoke to The Associated Press on conditions of anonymity because they were not authorized to publicly discuss details of the investigation. Combs' attorney and other representatives didn't immediately respond to a request for comment, and his whereabouts are unknown.

Although Diddy was embroiled in one high-profile business dispute for part of 2023, it was a case filed by his former girlfriend and R&B singer Cassie that opened

the door to other claims of sexual violence. Combs has vehemently denied the allegations. It is not clear whether the search is related to any of the allegations raised in the lawsuits, which include one from a woman who claims Combs raped her when

she was 17. Here are some things to know about Combs and the

investigation. Combs is among the most influential hip-hop producers and executives of the past three decades. He built one of music's biggest empires, blazing a trail with several entities attached to his famous name. He is the founder of Bad Boy Records and a three-time Grammy winner who has worked with a slew of toptier artists including Notorious B.I.G., Mary J. Blige, Usher, Lil Kim, Faith Evans and 112.

Justice

The music mogul created the fashion clothing line called Sean John, was associated with a well-known vodka brand and launched Revolt TV network, which focuses on music and social justice issues targeting African Americans. He also produced the reality show "Making the Band" for MTV.

In 2022, BET honored Combs with the Lifetime Achievement Award for his ability to shape culture through his career.

Combs won Grammys for his platinum-selling 1997 album "No Way Out" and the single "I'll Be Missing You," a song dedicated to the late Notorious B.I.G. who was killed earlier that year. He won another Grammy for "Shake Ya Tailfeather" with Nelly and Murphy Lee.

Last year, Combs released his fifth studio album "The Love Album: Off the Grid," which was nominated for best progressive R&B album at February's Grammy Awards, which he did not attend. The album was his first solo project since his 2006 chart-topping "Press Play," which had two top 10 hit singles: "Last Night" with Keyshia Cole and "Come to Me" featuring Nicole Scherzinger.

In 2004, Combs played Walter Lee Younger in the Broadway revival of "A Raisin in the Sun," which aired as a television adaption four years later. He's also appeared in films including "Get Him to the Greek" and "Monster's Ball."

In November, Combs' protege and singer Cassie sued him for alleging years of sexual abuse including rape. The lawsuit alleged he forced her to have sex with male prostitutes while he filmed them.

Combs and Ventura began dating in 2007 and had an on-and-off relationship for more than a decade. The suit was settled the day after it was filed, but the

lawsuits against Combs kept coming against. Combs had said in a December statement, "I did not

do any of the awful things being alleged." In February, a music producer filed a lawsuit alleging Combs coerced him to solicit prostitutes and pressured him to have sex with them. Combs' attorney Shawn Holley has said of those allegations that "we

Another of Combs' accusers was a woman who said the rap producer raped her two decades ago when she

The filings detail acts of sexual assault, beatings and forced drugging allegedly committed in the early 1990s by Combs, then a talent director, party promoter and rising figure in New York City's hip-hop com-

Last year, Combs stepped down as chairman of his cable television network Revolt amid the sexual abuse allegations against him.

Revolt announced Combs' decision via social media. It's not clear if he will ever return to the media company - which said Combs previously had "no operational or day-to-day role" at the network.

"This decision helps to ensure that Revolt remains steadfastly focused on our mission to create meaningful content for the culture and amplify the voices of all Black people throughout this country and African diaspora," the network said.

The network had been preparing to celebrate its 10th anniversary.

Combs also created an online marketplace called Empower Global that featured Black-owned brands. The website for the curated marketplace is still active, but shows no products being sold.


Earlier this year, Combs withdrew the lawsuit filed last year against Diageo as part of a settlement with the London-based spirits giant.

Combs said the company didn't make promised investments in Ciroc vodka and DeLeon tequila - two brands Combs promoted in the past - and treated them as inferior "urban" products. He also accused Diageo In court filings, Combs said Diageo leadership told

him race was one of the reasons it limited distribution to "urban" neighborhoods. Combs said he was also told some Diageo leaders resented him for making too much money

In legal filings, Diageo accused Combs of resorting to "false and reckless" allegations "in an effort to extract additional billions" from the company.

Combs' reputation took a serious hit after the lawsuit was filed. Diageo became the sole owner of Ciroc and DeLeon after the lawsuit was withdrawn.

LONDON: A London court is scheduled Tuesday to rule whether WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange gets one final appeal in England to challenge extradition to the **United States** on espionage charges.

Two judges are due to issue a judgment in the High Court that could put an end to Assange's long legal saga - or further

If he fails in winning the right to appeal, his legal team fears he could be swiftly sent to the US to face charges, though they're likely to ask the European Court of Human Rights to block any transfer.

Assange, 52, has been indicted on 17 espionage charges and one charge of computer misuse over his website's publication of a trove of classified US documents almost 15 years ago. American prosecutors allege that Assange encouraged and helped US Army intelligence analyst Chelsea Manning steal diplomatic cables and mili-

tary files that WikiLeaks published. During a two-day hearing last month, Assange's lawyers argued that he was a secrecy-busting journalist who exposed US military wrongdoing in Iraq and Afghanistan. Sending him to the United States, they said, would expose him to a politically motivated prosecution and risk a "flagrant denial of justice." (AP)

LONDON: The newest endangered baby gorilla at the London Zoo is more than six weeks old but doesn't vet have a name. Zookeepers aren't even sure if it's a male or female because they haven't been able to get close enough to examine it.

Author talks balancing reality and fantasy

Serle on magic of 'Expiration Dates'

LOS ANGELES, March 26, (AP): In Rebecca Serle's new book "Expiration Dates: A Novel," the protagonist, Daphne, knows when her relationships will end. A slip of paper always shows up with a name and a number for how long they will date.

We meet Daphne on her way to a blind date with Jake — whose paper doesn't have a number. This must mean he's the one. Or is he? Is it helpful or a hinderance to have the answers?

"I was thinking about fate and free will and which one wins," Serle said recently over Zoom from her home in Los Angeles. "How much is within our control and how much is going to happen regardless of the decisions we make and the choices that we make?"

Serle's recent novels have blended fantasy and realism. In her last book, "One Italian Summer," a woman meets a younger version of her mother while on vacation.

In "Expiration Dates," Serle, who married in 2023, was inspired by her own dating history.

"I was single for a really long time," she said. "I remember relationships would end and I would feel like, "This again? Didn't I already learn this lesson?" Looking back, I see who I had to become before I met my husband, but it's hard to see in the moment. That's where the wish fulfillment of 'Expiration Dates' comes in. There is something so compelling about the idea how you might see a relationship if you weren't entering into every one, as I did, thinking This could be the one.

Serle spoke to The Associated

Press about philosophy, what she tells her husband about her books, and why running and writing are a lot alike.

Remarks have been edited for clarity and brevity. AP: What inspired you to start

adding fantasy elements to your

Serle: In college I would write magical realism short stories. I read a lot of Aimee Bender and Haruki Murakami and enjoyed the way they would open up a universe and not explain it. Something about that just sparkled. I published four young adult novels before writing my first novel for adults which was "The Dinner List" in 2018. With that, I went back to how I began by writing magical realism.

AP: Did you by chance study philosophy in school?

Serle: I was actually obsessed with philosophy in high school. I remember reading Plato's "The Allegory of the Cave" and being blown away

AP: Your readers enjoy the magic elements in your book. Do you ever feel pressure to continue to include those?

Serle: I'm working on a book right now that might be the last book that has some kind of magic in it. I want to keep reinventing myself as a writer and growing. But I'm also aware that I have an audience that for whatever reason, lovingly and wonderfully and surprisingly really likes what I do. We'll see. Once the thing is no longer interesting to me, the books are not going to be interesting to read. That's just the truth.

AP: What has it been like introducing your husband to your writ-

Serle: I said to my husband early on, and I remind him all the time, "Happy marriages doesn't make interesting books." He's going to inevitably recognize himself in everything that comes next, because the fabric of our lives are now woven together. We live together. We share a life together He's going to recognize details of himself in a husband character. Of course he is. I'm writing it. But just because that person you know, has an affair doesn't mean that that's how I feel about him. That's a hard thing sometimes for non-writers to under-

AP: You've recently started running regularly and say running is like writing. How so?

Serle: By the way, by running I mean like, 3 miles. I'm not marathoning, OK? But I never ran a mile in my life. I really had never run five minutes in my life. I recently started running because it was something I really wanted to learn how to do. My knees would hurt when I ran for five minutes, but they don't hurt now that I run for half an hour. Your ability to keep moving and your lung capacity adapts, but I think what really adapts is your brain. Your brain says, 'I know I can do this; I know I can complete this.' I think that is exactly what it means to write a book. Every time I sit down to do it, it gets a little bit easier, because I've done it before, and I know I can do it again You keep on and eventually some-

New technology paving way for personalized care

Al can help predict patient response to TB treatments

Duberculosis is the world's deadliest bacterial infection. It afflicted over ■ 10 million people and took 1.3 million lives in 2022. These numbers are predicted to increase dramatically because of the spread of multidrug-resistant

Why does one TB patient recover from the infection while another succumbs? And why does one drug work in one patient but not another, even if they have the same disease?

People have been battling TB for millennia. For example, researchers have found Egyptian mummies from 2400 BCE that show signs of TB. While TB infections occur worldwide, the countries with the highest number of multidrug-resistant TB cases are Ukraine, Moldova, Belarus and Russia.

Researchers predict that the ongoing war in Ukraine will result in an increase in multidrug-resistant TB cases because of health care disruptions. Additionally, the COVID-19 pandemic reduced access to TB diagnosis and treatment, reversing decades of progress worldwide.

Rapidly and holistically analyzing available medical data can help optimize treatments for each patient and reduce drug resistance. In our recently published research, my team and I describe a new AI tool we developed that uses worldwide patient data to guide more personalized and effective treatment of

My team and I wanted to identify what variables can predict how a patient responds to TB treatment. So we analyzed more than 200 types of clinical test results, medical imaging and drug prescriptions from over 5,000 TB patients in 10 countries. We examined demographic information such as age and gender, prior treatment history and whether patients had other conditions. Finally, we also analyzed data on various TB strains, such as what drugs the pathogen is resistant to and what genetic mutations the pathogen had.

Studies

Looking at enormous datasets like these can be overwhelming. Even most existing AI tools have had difficulty analyzing large datasets. Prior studies using AI have focused on a single data type - such as imaging or age alone - and had limited success predicting TB treatment outcomes.

We used an approach to AI that allowed us to analyze a large and diverse number of variables simultaneously and identify their relationship to TB outcomes. Our AI model was transparent, meaning we can see through its inner workings to identify the most meaningful clinical features. It was also multimodal, meaning it could interpret different types of data at the same time.

Once we trained our AI model on the dataset, we found that it could predict treatment prognosis with 83% accuracy on newer, unseen patient data and outperform existing AI models. In other words, we could feed a new patient's information into the model and the AI would determine whether a specific type of treatment will either succeed or fail.

We observed that clinical features related to nutrition, particularly lower

BMI, are associated with treatment failure. This supports the use of interventions to improve nourishment, as TB is typically more prevalent in undernour-

We also found that certain drug combinations worked better in patients with certain types of drug-resistant infections but not others, leading to treatment failure. Combining drugs that are synergistic, meaning they enhance each other's potency in the lab, could result in better outcomes. Given the complex environment in the body compared with conditions in the lab, it has so far been unclear whether synergistic relationships between drugs in the lab hold up in the clinic. Our results suggest that using AI to weed out antagonistic drugs, or drugs that inhibit or counteract each other, early in the drug discovery process can avoid treatment failures down the line.

Our findings may help researchers and clinicians meet the World Health Organization's goal to end TB by 2035, by highlighting the relative importance of different types of clinical data. This can help prioritize public health efforts to mitigate TB.

While the performance of our AI tool is promising, it isn't perfect in every case, and more training is needed before it can be used in the clinic. Demographic diversity can be high within a country and may even vary between hospitals. We are working to make this tool more generalizable across regions.

Our goal is to eventually tailor our AI model to identify drug regimens suitable for individuals with certain conditions. Instead of a one-size-fits-all treatment approach, we hope that studying multiple types of data can help physicians personalize treatments for each patient to provide the best outcomes. (AP)

US cattle test bird flu positive

Early intervention ignored in aging population

epidemic as cases increase

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, March 26, (AP): Puerto Rico's health secretary declared an epidemic on Monday following a spike in dengue

The US territory of 3.2 million people has reported at least 549 cases so far this year, compared with a total of 1,293 cases for all of last year. The majority of cases have been reported in the capital of San Juan.

More than 340 people have been hospitalized for the mosquito-borne virus, according to the island's health department.

Puerto Rico last declared a dengue epidemic

More than 5 million dengue cases were reported worldwide last year, with nearly 80% of them occurring in the Western Hemisphere, according the World Health Organization. The region has reported some 3 million cases so far this year, with health officials noting that higher rainfall along with humidity and heat linked to climate change have contributed to a rise in cases.

The virus can cause crushing headaches, fever, vomiting, a rash and other symptoms. While most infected people don't get symptoms, severe cases can lead to plasma leakage and death.

Bird flu: Milk from dairy cows in Texas and Kansas has tested positive for bird flu, US officials said Monday.

Officials with the Texas Animal Health Commission confirmed the flu virus is the Type A H5N1 strain, known for decades to cause outbreaks in birds and to occasionally infect people. The virus is affecting older dairy cows in those states and in New Mexico, causing decreased lactation and low appetite.

It comes a week after officials in Minnesota announced that goats on a farm where there had been an outbreak of bird flu among poultry were diagnosed with the virus. It's believed to be the first time bird flu - also known as highly pathogenic avian influenza - was found in US

The commercial milk supply is safe and risk to people is low, according to the US Department of Agriculture. Dairies are required to only allow milk from healthy animals to enter the food supply, and milk from the sick animals is being diverted or destroyed. Pasteurization also kills viruses and other bacteria, and the process is required for milk sold through interstate commerce, the agency said.

"At this stage, there is no concern about the safety of the commercial milk supply or that this circumstance poses a risk to consumer health," the USDA said in a statement.

The federal government said its tests in the cattle did not detect any changes to the virus that would make it spread more easily to people.

Dairy farmers in Texas first became concerned three weeks ago when cattle started falling ill with what officials called "mystery dairy cow disease," Texas Department of Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller said. Milk production fell sharply and the cows were lethargic and weren't eating much.

"We hadn't seen anything like it before," he said. "It was kind of like they had a cold."

The state's animal health commission began an investigation that included tests for bird flu, spokeswoman Erin Robinson said. Based on findings from Texas, USDA officials think the cows got the virus from infected wild birds.

Experts say livestock appear to recover on their own within seven to 10 days. That's different than bird flu outbreaks in poultry, which necessitate killing flocks to get rid of the virus. Since 2022, outbreaks in have led to the loss of about 80 million birds in U.S. commercial

Smoking ban: West Virginia, which has the highest rate of adult cigarette use in the nation, became the 12th state to ban smoking in vehicles with children present under a bill signed by Republican Gov. Jim Justice on Friday.

But violators can only be fined up to \$25 if they're pulled over for another offense. Smokchildren present cannot be the main reason a driver is stopped.
About 22% of West Virginia adults smoked

in 2021, the latest year available, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The CDC says there is no safe level of exposure to secondhand smoke.

Justice didn't comment on the bill, which was among 15 he signed Friday. West Virginia's 60day legislation session ended on March 9.

The bill originated in the Republican-dominated state Senate, whose majority leader, Tom Takubo, is a lung doctor. Takubo has said he made a promise long ago to a patient whose father was a heavy smoker that he would try to get such legislation passed. Takubo has made it almost an annual effort since 2017 to introduce the legislation.

The biggest hurdle came in the House of Delegates finance committee, where it won narrow passage after Republican Del. John Hardy called it "just another big government bill."

Puerto Rico declares dengue Silent struggle: Millions unaware of mild cognitive impairment: research

ild cognitive impairment - an early stage of dementia - is widely underdiagnosed in people 65 and older. That is the key takeaway of two recent studies from our team.

In the first study, we used Medicare data for about 40 million beneficiaries age 65 and older from 2015 to 2019 to estimate the prevalence of mild cognitive impairment in that population and to identify what proportion of them had actually been diagnosed.

Our finding was sobering: A mere 8% of the number of cases with mild cognitive impairment that we expected based on a statistical model had actually been diagnosed. Scaled up to the general population 65 and older, this means that approximately 7.4 million cases across the country remain undiagnosed.

In the second study, we analyzed data for 226,756 primary care clinicians and found that over 99% of them underdiagnosed mild cognitive impairment in this population.

Mild cognitive impairment is an early symptom of Alzheimer's disease in about half of cases and progresses to dementia at a rate of 10% to 15% per year. It includes symptoms such as losing the ability to remember recent events and appointments, make sound decisions and master complex tasks. Failure to detect it might deprive patients of an opportunity to get treated and to slow down disease progression.

Mild cognitive impairment can sometimes be caused by easily addressable factors, such as medication side effects, thyroid dysfunction or vitamin B12 deficiency. Since mild cognitive impairment has the same risk factors as cardiovascular disease, such as high blood pressure and cholesterol, medication management of these risks combined with diet and exercise can reduce the risk of progression.

In 2023, the Food and Drug Administration approved the drug lecanemab as the first disease-modifying treatment

for Alzheimer's disease, the most common cause of mild cognitive impairment. In contrast to previous drugs, which can temporarily improve symptoms of the disease, such as memory loss and agitation, this new treatment addresses the underlying cause of the disease.

Progression

Lecanemab, a monoclonal antibody, reduces amyloid plaques in the brain, which are toxic protein clumps that are believed to contribute to the progression of the disease. In a large clinical trial, lecanemab was able to reduce the progression of early-stage Alzheimer's disease. A similar drug, donanemab, also succeeded in a clinical trial and is expected to be approved sometime in 2024.

However, these drugs must be used in the early stages of Alzheimer's disease, ideally when a patient has only mild cognitive impair-

Many factors contribute to the lack of timely detection. But researchers don't have a good understanding of the relative importance of those individual factors or how to reduce the high rate of underdiagnosis.

While distinct, symptoms are subtle and their slow progression means that they can be overlooked or misinterpreted as normal aging. A neurologist in China told our research team that diagnosis rates spike in China after the New Year's holiday, when children who haven't seen their parents for a year notice changes that are harder to pick up when interacting with someone daily.

Doctors also commonly discount memory concerns as normal aging and doubt that much can be done about it. While cognitive tests to distinguish mild cognitive impairment from pathologic decline do exist, they take about 15 minutes, which can be hard to come by during the limited time of a doctor's visit and may require a follow-up appointment. People, particularly those in their 60s and be-

yond, as well as their families and friends need to be vigilant about cognitive decline, bring it up during doctor's appointments and insist on a formal assessment. The Medicare yearly "wellness" visit is an

opportunity to explore such concerns, but only about half of beneficiaries take advantage of it. Just as physicians ask patients about unex-

plained weight loss and take those concerns seriously, we believe questions that explore a patient's cognitive state need to become the norm.

Dispute over medical school plan deepens

Tensions rise as senior doctors quit in S. Korea

SEOUL, South Korea, March 26, (AP): Senior doctors at major hospitals in South Korea began submitting their resignations en masse on Monday in support of medical interns and residents who have been on strike for five weeks over the government's push to sharply increase medical school admissions.

The senior doctors' action isn't likely to cause an immediate worsening of hospital operations in South Korea because they have said they would continue to work even after submitting their resignations. But prospects for an early end to the medical impasse were dim, as the doctors' resignation submissions came after President Yoon Suk Yeol called for talks with doctors while suggesting a possible softening of punitive steps against the striking junior doc-

About 12,000 interns and medical residents have faced impending suspensions of their licenses over their refusal to end their strikes, which have caused hundreds of canceled surgeries and other treatments at their hospitals.

They oppose the government's plan to increase the country's medical school admission cap by two-thirds, saying schools can't handle such a steep increase in students and that it would eventually hurt South Korea's medical services. But officials say more doctors are urgently needed because South Korea has a rapidly aging population and its doctorto-population ratio is one of the lowest in the developed world.

MANCHESTER, England, March 26, (AP): Ricky Hill packed his bags and prepared to uproot his life again. Next stop: Chicago. The former England international soc-cer player is accustomed to make ing sacrifices and traveling far to build his coaching career, an effort he says has been stymied because

"It is something that I hate to do because home is where the heart is," Hill said of leaving behind his wife of 38 years and his 99-year-old mother to chase a rare management opportunity.

Racism has long permeated the world's most popular sport, with players subjected to racist chants and taunts online. While soccer governing bodies such as FIFA and UEFA have taken steps to combat the abuse of players, the lack of diversity in the upper ranks at major clubs remains an unsolved problem.

"It's two fights for equality," Hill told The Associated Press.

Hill - who as a teenager in the 1970s was among the first generation of Black players in England says he routinely faced racist abuse from fans when he played for Luton

"You would hear songs about you, see people spitting, that kind of vitriolic behavior."

That racism, he says, has continued to hold him back in the pursuit of his top-flight coaching dream.

"The difficulty we've had as racially diverse individuals and Black individuals, specifically, is there is no way of showing your worth as a coach or manager without actually having the opportunity to do so," he

The issue needs to be considered "through a Black lens," Delroy Corinaldi, co-founder of the British-based advocacy group Black Footballers Partnership, told The

SOCCER

A BFP report in 2022 found that while some 43% of players in England's Premier League are Black, only 4% land coaching jobs in English professional soccer. There are currently only two Black managers in the Premier League.

Under-representation is not just an English problem. There are only two Black head coaches in France's Ligue 1, one in Italy's Serie A, and none in the top divisions of Spain and Germany.

Wilfried Nancy, who is French, built his coaching career with Montreal in Canada and he now leads Ohio's championship-winning Columbus Crew. He is the only Black head coach in MLS.

Nancy is puzzled by the lack of diversity in soccer coaching in Europe and the U.S.

"A lot of people like me, we have a lot of competency, but they don't have the opportunity for the moment to do it," he said.

Hill is standing up to racism in the sport. In 2022, he sued MLS and the USL Championship claiming discrimination after repeatedly being overlooked for jobs despite his decorated coaching career with Tampa Bay Rowdies and in Trinidad and Tobago.

A lack of diversity in boardrooms may be the root of the problem.

The Football Association in England launched a leadership diversity code in 2020, setting hiring targets to address inequality. Yet its most recent report in November said workforce representation still does not reflect the diversity of players. Of last season's hires, the report said, 9% of senior leaders, 11% of team operations, 16% of coaches and 9% of senior coaches were Black, Asian or of mixed

heritage. FA chief executive Mark Bullingham admits there is "still a huge amount of work to be done.

Burnley coach Vincent Kompany, who is Black, said this must be addressed to effect real change.

"If you have a boardroom that's diverse, you can't brush things under the carpet," Kompany said.

The Premier League's Coach Inclusion and Diversity Scheme aims to increase minority representation in coaching. The initiative provides coaches with a bursary and work placements.

Yet the BFP's latest report found that non-Black former players are 50% more likely than their Black counterparts to progress into management in England, and Black managers or assistants are 41% more likely to be fired.

"They are less likely to get in. Once they get in they are less likely to get promoted. And once they do get promoted they are more likely to get fired," one of the report's authors, Stefan Szymanski, a professor of sport management at the University of Michigan, told

"I'd like to hear what an explanation of this is, other than racism."

Two of the biggest coaching jobs in soccer will become available at the end of the season. And

while it is not yet clear who will fill the positions at Liverpool and Bayern Munich, it's highly unlikely the successful candidates will be Black.

The standout favorite is Xabi Alonso, who is less than two years into his first job as head coach with Bayer Leverkusen. Alonso, who is white, had a distinguished playing career with Liverpool, Real Madrid and Bayern, and Bayer is on course to win the German title this season.

"You have to be fair. Who's qualified to do that job?" former Premier League player Troy Deeney told AP. "Part of the argument isn't to just say, 'Give Black people, women, whoever you think is marginalized, just give them the job.' Who's the Black manager that's doing really well at the moment that deserves that job?"

Ruud Gullit, then one of the most celebrated players in the world, became the Premier League's first Black manager when he was appointed by Chelsea in 1996. Multiple Champions League-winner Clarence Seedorf was hired by Italian giant AC Milan in 2014. He lasted only four months.

But high-profile Black players are more commonly hired as coaches to low-level teams.

Former England internationals Paul Ince and Sol Campbell began their managerial careers with thenfourth division team Macclesfield. Ince's only top-flight job was with Blackburn in 2008. He was fired after less than six months and has no been hired by a Premier League club

Meanwhile, Campbell's ex-England teammate, Frank Lampard, who is white, has held three Premier League coaching positions on the back of his one year at second division Derby.

Deeney was hired as head coach of fourth-tier Forest Green Rovers in December, but was fired less than a month later. He remains determined.

"If the reports coming out are suggesting the scale is tipped not in my favor, it doesn't mean I don't play the game. It just means I've got to play the game harder than everybody else," he said.

Hill had a four-month spell as manager of Luton, then in the third tier of English soccer, and has struggled to find work in England ever since. He has just taken a position as executive director of Evolution Soccer in suburban Chi-

"The industry is such that everyone wants to stay in it and only a certain number of people can," he said. "But, disproportionately, Black people do not manage to stay within the game at a far greater rate than

Inspiration could be drawn from the U.S., where the formerly whitedominated NFL implemented rules to try to level the playing field for people of color seeking positions as head coaches, general managers and executives.

The Rooney Rule requires teams to interview at least one person of color for a head coach position, and if any team loses a minority coach or executive to another team, it is awarded compensatory picks in upcoming drafts.

The system has paid off.

In the NFL, four minority head coaches have been hired this year and there's a record nine coaches of color entering the 2024 season.

A similar scheme was adopted by England soccer's lower divisions in 2019, but statistics show diversity remains an issue.

Last week, the government introduced legislation to create an independent regulator in English soccer. Szymanski said this could push clubs to commit to diversity where FA and Premier League incentives have failed. "I would say voluntary arrange-

ments have shown themselves not to be satisfactory," he said. "You need some kind of regulation to push the clubs to embrace change."

NOTTINGHAM, England, March 26, (AP): Nottingham Forest lodged an appeal against the four-point penalty imposed by the English Premier League last week for breaching the competition's financial rules. Forest issued a terse statement confirming the course of action the club has taken. It was in contrast to a lengthy and indignant response published by Forest when the sanction was handed out.

Forest was found to have breached the league profitability and sustainability regulations, which typically allow clubs to lose a maximum of 105 million pounds (\$133 million) over a three-year period or face sanctions.

Forest's assessment period ended in 2022-23 and therefore included two seasons when the club was in the second-tier Championship.

Sabonis had 11 points, 13 rebounds and 10 assists to become the fifth player in NBA history with at least 25 tripledoubles in a season, joining Nikola Jokic, Russell Westbrook, Wilt Chamberlain and Oscar Robertson.

Sabonis also posted his 54th consecutive double-double, breaking a tie with Kevin Love for the longest streak since the 1976-77 merger between the NBA and ABA. Sabonis is nowhere close to the all-time record of 227 straight double-doubles held by Chamberlain, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

Nuggets 128, Grizzlies 103

In Denver, Nikola Jokic had 29 points, 11 rebounds and eight assists, Christian Braun scored 17 points and the Denver Nuggets beat the Memphis Grizzlies.

Jokic, who left the game with 27 seconds remaining in the third quarter and Denver leading by 21 points, finished two assists shy of his 23rd triple-double of the season.

Lamar Stevens matched a season high with 19 points for the Grizzlies. Scotty Pippen Jr. added 17. In the last two games between the

teams, both in Denver, the Nuggets have won by a combined 62 points.

Knicks 124, Pistons 99

In New York, Donte DiVincenzo was on the verge of history and in a hurry to

Needing one more 3-pointer to break a franchise record, DiVincenzo found himself a bit flustered by a crowd that wanted him to fire as soon as he touched the ball from wherever he was, the way fans usually respond to Stephen Curry. So he did, until he finally hit his

franchise-record 11th 3-pointer. Di-Vinzenzo scored a career-best 40 points, leading the New York Knicks to a rout of Detroit for their 15th straight victory over the Pistons.

Rockets 110, Trail Blazers 92

In Houston, Jalen Green scored 27 points to lead the Houston Rockets to

a 110-92 win over the Portland Trail Blazers on Monday night.

It was the Rockets' ninth straight win, their longest winning streak since 2019. At 36-35, Houston is now just a half game behind Golden State for the final

spot in the NBA Play-In Tournament. Green entered Monday tied for fourth in the NBA in scoring in March with 27.8 points per game on 51.4% shooting. Against Portland, he made 9 of 26 shots, including 4 of 12 from 3.

Mavericks 115, Jazz 105

In Salt Lake City, Luka Doncic had 29 points, 13 assists, and 12 rebounds, and the Dallas Mavericks beat the Utah

Kyrie Irving scored 27 points for the Mavericks, who earned their fourth consecutive victory. P.J. Washington had 16 points, and Daniel Gafford finished with 13 points and 10 rebounds.

Lauri Markkanen made six 3-pointers and scored 34 points for Utah. Markkanen ranks third among NBA 7-footers with 1,001 made 3-pointers for his career in his seventh season.

John Collins added 21 points and 11 rebounds for the Jazz, who lost to Dallas for the second time in five days. Collin Sexton had 20 points.

Nets 96, Raptors 88

In Toronto, Dennis Schroder scored 19 points against his former team, Trendon Watford had 11 of his season-high 19 points in the second quarter and the Brooklyn Nets snapped a six-game losing streak by beating the short-handed Toronto Raptors.

Mikal Bridges scored 13 points and Jalen Wilson added 12 as the Nets outscored Toronto 28-19 in the fourth quarter to help Brooklyn win for the first time since March 10 at Cleveland.

Suns 104, Spurs 102

In San Antonio, Jeremy Sochan hit a key 3-pointer in the final minute and finished with 26 points and a career-high 18 rebounds as San Antonio beat the Phoenix Suns with Spurs rookie Victor Wembanyama sidelined due to injury.

Devin Vassell added 26 points for San Antonio and celebrated the victory by yelling into the house microphone after the game: "That's a big win. That's a big win.'

Devin Booker scored 36 points and Kevin Durant added 29 as Phoenix split a two-game set in San Antonio

The Suns outscored the Spurs 14-7 in the final five minutes, but Sochan's 3-pointer with 29 seconds was the difference. Booker and Durant missed potential game-winning 3-pointers in the

Pacers 133, Clippers 116

In Los Angeles, Pascal Siakam scored 31 points to lead the Indiana Pacers to win over the Los Angeles Clippers.

Myles Turner had 24 points and seven rebounds, helping the Pacers to their sixth win in their last seven road games. Tyrese Haliburton finished with 21 points and nine assists.

Los Angeles dropped its fifth consecutive home game. Kawhi Leonard and Paul George each scored 26 points for the Clippers, and Russell Westbrook had 14 points and seven assists in his return after missing 12 games because of a fractured left hand.

Cavaliers 115, Hornets 92

In Cleveland, Marcus Morris Sr. threw a high, intentional elbow that flattened one of the Hornets.

It awakened the Cavaliers. Evan Mobley and Jarrett Allen each scored 17 points, and Cleveland bounced back from an embarrassing loss at Miami 24 hours earlier by beating Charlotte

Shakib back in Bangladesh squad

Perth to host Australia season-opening Test in a five-match series against India

MELBOURNE, Australia, March 26, (AP): Perth will host the first cricket test between Australia and India in November, replacing Brisbane's Gabba ground as the traditional opening venue for international series Down Under.

Cricket Australia officials announced the 2024-25 schedule on Tuesday, confirming the Western Australian capital will kick off the five-test series against India on Nov. 22. Adelaide will host the second Border-Gavaskar test from Dec. 6 before the series moves to Brisbane on Dec. 14 and to Melbourne and Sydney for the traditional Boxing Day and New Year's tests.

Australia is undefeated in 31 season-opening tests at the Gabba since 1989. Its only two test defeats at the ground in that time have come when it closed out the summer schedule, including a series-deciding loss to India in 2021. Organizers of the Brisbane Olympics had originally



planned to redevelop the Gabba as the centerpiece of the 2032 Games but scrapped the contentious proposal earlier this month.

Cricket Australia operations chief Peter Roach said the hard and fast Optus Stadium pitch Perth, where Australia has won all four tests it has played at the relatively new venue, was now more than comparable to the one traditionally used at

"The clear advice from our national team is there is a preference to start series strongly at venues where they're really comfortable," Roach said. "Perth and Brisbane they believe are somewhat comparable in terms of the advantage they get, in that they're the hardest and bounciest pitches in Australia. Australia will also play a three-match oneday international series and three Twenty20 against Pakistan over a two-week period starting Nov. 4.

Allrounder Shakib Al Hasan was passed fit after an eye problem to be

picked in the Bangladesh squad for the second and final test against Sri Lanka starting on Saturday in Chattogram.

Bangladesh lost the first test by 328 runs inside four days.

Shakib has been out of the national team since November at the Cricket World Cup in India. The captain hit 82 and took two wickets to beat Sri Lanka. But he broke his left index finger, and a vision problem was revealed.

He's been playing for the last two months in the Bangladesh and Dhaka Premier Leagues with success. Shakib's last test was in April 2023 against Ireland in Mirpur.

Batter **Towhid Hridoy** has been dropped to accommodate Shakib.

Also out is pace bowler Mushfik Hasan, who has picked up a left ankle injury. Fellow pacer Hasan Mahmud, who has played 39 matches for Bangladesh in white ball cricket but has yet to feature in a test, replaced him. Mahmud has 49 wickets from 16 first-class outings.
