Security plan underway

'Massive sweep' targets 18,000 violators in Jleeb

KUWAIT CITY, May 30: The concerned authorities are currently preparing a comprehensive security plan to arrest around 18,000 Residency Law violators in Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh, reports Al-Qabas daily quoting a reliable source from the security sector.

The source pointed out that the Ministry of Interior has been exerting tremendous efforts to put an end to the random and illegal activities in Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh, but it is impossible to address the problem with such efforts alone; hence, the need for the concerted efforts of all concerned authori-

According to recent statistics from the Public Authority for Civil Information (PACI), the total number of people residing in Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh has reached 268,601 expatriates including 46,000 women; and that 100,000 bachelor expatriates are residing in the area.

The source revealed the security plan is being prepared in coordination with the concerned authorities with the aim of eliminating violations in the area, strictly enforcing the law, maintaining security and rehabilitating the area.

He stated this is in compliance with the directive of Deputy Prime Minister, Minister of Defense and Interior Sheikh Fahad Yousuf Al-Sabah; indicating that the plan will be implemented through the coordinated efforts of several institutions including the Kuwait Army, National Guard, Kuwait Fire Force, Ministry of Health and Kuwait Municipality.

It is worth mentioning that the Council of Ministers discussed the situation in Jleeb Al-Shuy-oukh in September 2023; specifically the conditions of buildings, traffic and security.

Kuwait FM leads delegation at China-Arab States forum

KUWAIT CITY, May 30, (KUNA): Kuwaiti Minister of Foreign Affairs Abdullah Al-Yahya headed his country's delegation partaking in the 10th ministerial conference of the China-Arab States Cooperation Forum, held in Beijing

Addressing the gathering, Al-Yahya commended bilateral cooperation and successful partnership between the Arab League and China, as well as the level of strategic relations between Kuwait and China.

He touted the 20th anniversary of forging Arab-Sino cooperation, pointing out shared views at regional and international events, particularly regarding Arab causes.

He also announced that Kuwait would host the third Arab-Chinese summit in 2030, underling that his country commits itself to pushing forward Arab-Chinese cooperation to broader horizons.

The Kuwaiti foreign minister pointed out challenges the region is facing, primarily the Palestinian cause, which remains to be "a bleeding wound in the hearts of all Arab peoples"

In this context, he restated Kuwait's condemnation of the ongoing military aggression by Israeli occupying forces in Rafah City and its concomitant unprecedented humanitarian crisis as well as breaches of international humanitarian law.

Sounding the alarm about conflict spillover, the minister underlined that it is essential to cease military operations and allow humanitarian and relief aid into the Gaza Strip

Furthermore, Al-Yahya stressed the need to keep funding the UN refugee agency, UNRWA, and to throw much weight behind a full UN Palestinian membership, along with an independent and sovereign Palestinian state on the 1967 borderline with East Jerusalem as its capital.

On the other hand, he expounded on Kuwait's national plan designed to achieve sustainble development goals, including infrastructure, human capital, human resources, and technology localization.

Electricity load nears critical levels as temperatures soar

Minister sounds alarm on energy crisis, urges conservation

KUWAIT CITY, May 30: The electricity load index will continue to rise with temperatures approaching 48 degrees Celsius, as it recorded 15,450 megawatts Wednesday, thereby approaching the

orange zone.

According to informed sources at the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy, the number recorded by the index today separates us from the expected maximum load of 1,275 megawatts, as the ministry expected the maximum load for the summer of this year to be 16,707 megawatts.

The sources indicated that loads will rise in the coming days due to the expected temperature increases.

They stressed the need to rationalize electricity consumption by citizens, residents and government agencies during the current stage by turning off lights and appliances in rooms and unused areas, and replacing and renewing air conditioners with modern ones that conserve electricity because air conditioners consume 70 percent of energy production during the summer.

Meanwhile, the Meteorological Department announced that weather maps and numerical models indicate the country will be affected by an extension of a high-pressure area accompanied by a hot, dry air mass and light to moderate northwesterly winds that may be active at times, raising dust. The weekend weather is expected to be generally very hot

ANKARA: Turkey won't hesitate to carry out a new offensive in northern Syria if Kurdish-led groups, which Ankara accuses of links to outlawed Kurdish militants, proceed with plans to hold local elections in the region. Turkey's president said Thursday.

A Kurdish-led autonomous administration that controls northern and eastern parts of Syria has announced plans to hold municipal elections on June 11. The vote to choose mayors will be held in the provinces of Hassakeh, Raqqa, Deir el-Zour and eastern part of Aleppo province. (AP)

Kuwait economy to rebound strongly in 2024: World Bank

KUWAIT CITY, May 30: A recent World Bank report on the Gulf region's economic developments projects a recovery in Kuwait's economic growth to 2.8 percent in 2024, reports Al-Oabas daily

This resurgence is attributed to expansionary fiscal policies, increased oil production, and enhanced output from the Al-Zour refinery

The report, anticipates a 3.6 percent growth in oil production and a 2.1 percent increase in the non-oil sector. However, relatively high interest rates may limit domestic consumption, preventing the economy from achieving its full potential. The report highlights a positive economic outlook for the

Gulf region, driven by a recovery in oil production as OPEC+ gradually liberalizes production quotas in the latter half of 2024, coupled with strong momentum in the non-oil economy. The Gulf countries' commitment to diversifying their economies is seen as a strategic approach to enhancing resilience

and achieving sustainable development amid global economic Despite diversification efforts, oil revenues remain crucial in shaping public finances and external transaction account balances in the medium term. The Gulf countries' public fi-

nance surplus is expected to decline to 0.1 percent of GDP in 2024, while the current account surplus is projected to be 7.5 percent of GDP, down from 8.4 percent in 2022. The report underscores the importance of education qual-

ity in promoting sustainable economic growth in the Gulf region. Economic growth in the Gulf countries is expected to reach 2.8 percent in 2024 and 4.7 percent in 2025. Safaa Al-Koqali, Regional Director of the Gulf States Department at the World Bank, emphasized that good education prepares young people for better job opportunities and higher wages,

Minister issues 3 decisions to improve administrative sector

KUWAIT CITY, May 30: The Minister of Health Dr. Ahmed Al-Awadhi issued three regulatory ministerial decisions to strengthen the administrative apparatus and achieve sustainable development.

The first decision stipulates the transfer of the technical subordination of the accounting departments, financial support departments, and their divisions and units in all health zones and central departments directly to the Assistant Undersecretary for Financial Affairs.

The second decision is related to the transfer of technical affiliation for monitoring engineering affairs and engineering affairs offices in all health zones directly to the Assistant Undersecretary for Engineering Affairs and Projects.

The third decision stipulates that the technical subordination of the warehouses' subdivisions, divisions, and units in all health zones and central departments be transferred to the Assistant Undersecretary for Financial Affairs.

In another development, the Ministry of Health is set to unveil an organ transplant center in the Al-Sabah Specialized Medical District next week, reports Al-Jarida daily.

This move signifies the beginning of a series of openings in specialized healthcare facilities across the nation to cater to patients and visitors in all regions.

The forthcoming center will cater to patients requiring organ transplants, offering comprehensive outpatient services for examination and diagnosis. It will be equipped to perform kidney, liver, and heart transplants using state-of-the-art medical technology. Notably, the center boasts highly skilled medical professionals renowned for their professionalism and efficiency.

In a related development, the Hamed Al-Issa Center for Organ Transplantation witnessed a significant milestone in 2023, conducting 140 kidney transplants, including 78 from living donors and 62 from deceased donors, with an additional 80 kidney transplants performed abroad.

The success rate of kidney transplants in Kuwait, exceeding 90 percent in the first year, is attributed to the availability of advanced medications and meticulous tissue matching between donors and recipients.

Furthermore, common causes of kidney failure in Kuwait, such as diabetes, hypertension, and glomerular nephritis, mirror global trends.

'Need to address deep-rooted issues of Kuwait health system'

"ONCE again, we find ourselves at a crossroads related to a vital sector that affects the lives of every citizen and resident in Kuwait, which is the health system. After years of patchwork and painkillers, it has become clear that the situation requires a serious pause and a comprehensive reconsideration of all its aspects, including the culture of quality,

starting with laws and transactions, all the way to the inflated health insurance marcolumnist Mohammed Al-Jadei, wrote for Al-Qabas daily.

cially after the implementation of the "Afiya" program, which drained huge amounts of money from the state treasury, as the value of previous contracts exceeded the barrier of one billion Kuwaiti dinars, with insurance coverage exceeding 17 thousand dinars annually for each insured person, and we are heading towards a fourth renewal of more than a quarter of a billion dinars for another two years.

"Despite the large amount of this amount, the most important question remains: Does this contract, which was entrusted to an insurance company, guarantee the quality of health services that the beneficiaries receive?

"Moreover, who is monitoring this huge number of health centers that have spread like mushrooms after the rain? Who guarantees that this coverage is not exploited to achieve huge profits at the expense of the health of citizens? Who will stop the torrent of advertising campaigns that aim to exhaust insurance coverage instead of directing the patient towards the optimal treatment?

'The government seems to lack a clear vision for the private health sector, which has often turned into a purely commercial business far removed from the humanitarian aspect. It is true that this sector is subject to the laws of supply and demand, but its role in preserving the health of a citizen is no less important than its economic role.

"Despite some positive efforts, such as unifying standards for medical disasters among private hospitals, and generalizing accreditation opportunities pro-vided by insurance and the Ministry of Health, including prohibiting licensing for one-day operations and laboratories without medical accreditation, these efforts appear faltering and unclear.

"Most health centers need education and guidance about the importance of accreditation and how to use it to improve the quality of their services, rather than simply imposing it as a routine procedure. The benefit or positive impact of imposing quality standards for health care providers must first be determined, and this includes unifying the price reg-

ulations for the services provided. "We do not lose sight of the importance of continuously developing medical personnel in the private sector, and ensuring that they receive the necessary training to deal with the latest medical technologies and reduce medical errors.

"The quality of health service is not measured only by buildings and equipment, but also by qualified and trained human cadres.

"In the face of this reality, there must be a firm stance and a comprehensive reconsideration of the Kuwaiti health system. The issue is not just tinkering here and there, but rather rebuilding on sound foundations that guarantee the health and safety of citizens and preserve public money.3

"The concerns and aspirations of citizens primarily revolve around enhancing their standard of living, often through salary increases, higher wages, and improved pensions," columnist Hassan Al-Issa wrote for Al-Jarida

daily.
"This longstanding priority has been echoed by successive governments, albeit with limited success, as evidenced by the adage 'The eye is all-seeing and the hand is short'. Despite pressing issues like deteriorating infrastructure, inadequate education, and rampant corruption, the urgency of addressing these challenges pales in comparison to the immediate need for financial better"So, what steps will the current government take to address these pressing economic challenges, especially with the influx of hundreds of thousands of graduates in the coming years? Unlike previous times, the government cannot afford to sidestep the livelihood issues of its citizens. Will it chart a clear path for reform and confront these challenges head-on, or will it resort to piecemeal solutions out of habit?

"In a recent report, Muhammad Al-Baghli highlighted the hollow allure of excessive consumerism, especially among the younger generation, serving as a cautionary tale against the dangers of false luxury. With a significant portion of Kuwait's population being under 19 years old, the nation faces formidable obstacles that cannot be overcome simply by injecting money into educa-

tion, services, and the job market.
"A looming crisis is the specter of widespread unemployment, particularly among recent graduates. The public sector is already overstretched and cannot absorb the influx of new entrants into the job market, while the private sector remains heavily reliant on government spending. Furthermore, attempts to nationalize the workforce face resistance from private sector employers who prefer cheaper foreign labor.

"The solution to this impending crisis lies in abandoning the entrenched "rentier" economic policies that have stifled Kuwait's development for years. It's time to embrace change and overhaul the system to foster genuine economic diversification and sustainable growth. Otherwise, we risk consigning future generations to a lifetime of studying economics and politics without ever seeing meaningful progress."

Court rejects mother's bid for kids custody over past actions

Shepherd dies in landmine blast; 322 tobacco cartons seized

KUWAIT CITY, May 30: According to the Court of Appeals, if a woman loses custody of her children due to her deviant behavior, it will not be restored to her even if years have passed since her action and even if the mother claims that she has rectified her behavior.

The Court of Appeals overturned the verdict issued by the First Instance Court that returned to a woman the custody of her children. The court instead ruled to retain the father's custody due to the mother's dishonest and deviant behavior, and because she did not seek to see her children until years had passed, because of which it is not permissible to remove the father's cus-

The defense counsel representing the father was Lawyer Hawraa Al-Habib, who confirmed to the court during her plea that the interest of the children was for them to remain

She highlighted that the passing of many years since the discovery of the mother's deviant behavior does not restore her custody, even if she is upright as she claims.

Lawyer Al-Habib said, "We encourage the mother to be righteous and repent, and we pray for her and extend a helping hand to her. However, she should not be given the right of custody, as she did not appreciate this blessing before. She was the one who neglected this right in the past, and we believe that it is in children's best interest to remain with



Landmine blast kills shepherd: Although more than three decades have passed since the brutal Iraqi invasion of Kuwait; it continues to affect the country as manifested in the death of an expatriate sheepherder after a landmine exploded in Salmi recently, reports Al-Anba daily.

A security source disclosed that the Operations Unit at the Ministry of Interior received a report that a landmine exploded with a depth of 10 kilometers along Salmi Road going towards Salmi border (Kilometer 65). Upon arrival at the scene, the securitymen found out that

the sheepherder already died.

The deputy public prosecutor went to the site, during which the landmine was inspected and it was confirmed to be among the remnants of the Iraqi invasion. A death case with criminal suspicion was registered and

classified as felony at Salmi Police Station. On the other hand, a water tanker and a vehicle collided on the Sixth Ring Road going towards Jahra.

322 cartons of tobacco seized: Customs officers assigned at Salmi border foiled an attempt to smuggle 322 cartons of chewing tobacco into the country, reports Al-Anba

In a press statement, Kuwait General Administration of Customs (KGAC) revealed that Deputy Director General for Customs and Ports Affairs Yousef Al-Kandari received information that a truck entering the country through Salmi border contained prohibited items, even though the items mentioned in the customs declaration are tobacco and its derivatives. Accordingly, the customs officers monitored the

movement of the truck and a thorough inspection was conducted upon its arrival at the border. This led to the discovery of 322 cartons of chewing tobacco weighing 6,043.610 kilograms.

All these details are totally different from the data in the customs declaration. Therefore, the items were confiscated and handed over to the competent authorities.

Betrayal of trust case: A citizen has filed a complaint at a police station in Hawally against his expatriate employee who allegedly betrayed his trust as the latter took KD560 and claimed to be holding a driving license that qualifies him to drive a motorcycle or a vehicle to deliver orders, reports When the expatriate was arrested, he denied the accusa-

tions; stating that he stopped working because he did not receive his monthly salary, and that he does not hold a driving license, so he cannot deliver the orders. The security database confirmed this information.

The detectives decided to hear the statements of the citizen once again and he stuck to his story. This prompted the detectives to refer the case to the concerned authority to reinvestigate both parties.

Security drive at Shuwaikh Industrial Area

KUWAIT CITY, May 30: On Wednesday evening, the Five-Year Committee orchestrated a comprehensive security operation in the Shuwaikh Industrial Area, collaborating with various government bodies including the ministries of Interior, Commerce and Industry, Electricity and Water, the Public Authority for Food and Nutrition, the Kuwait Municipality, the Public Authority for Industry, and the General Administration of Residency Investigations, reports Al-Jarida daily.

Lieutenant Colonel Abdullah san, representing the Public Relations and Traffic Awareness Department at the General Traffic Department, reported significant outcomes as the inspection teams disconnected power supply from 21 workshops and documented eight summons reports by MEW inspectors.

Moreover, the GTD intensified its field campaigns against non-compliant workshops in industrial zones, with guidance from Major General Yousef Al Khadda, Assistant Undersecretary of the Ministry of Interior for Traffic and Operations Affairs.

Brigadier General Jamal Al-Foudari, Director General of the General Traffic Department, along with Brigadiers-General Ghazi Bourgba and Ashraf Al-Amir, provided field supervision. Addition-



ally, inspectors from PAI recorded 4 summons reports for workshop and garage owners. MEW inspectors reported 21 workshops and garages, while MCI inspectors issued 8 violation reports.

The Kuwait Municipality inspectors addressed issues such as abandoned vehicles, cleanliness violations, and impeding traffic flow, leading to 90 warning stickers placed, 18 violations issued, and 6 neglected vehicles and debris removed.

Furthermore, three street vendors were arrested. Bu Hassan highlighted that PAFN inspectors issued eight violations for delivery vehicles and motorcycles, and addressed violations related to refrigerator trucks and ice cream carts that contravened PAFN regulations.

MEW announces 9 tender contracts for customer service sector modernization

Al-Seyassah/Arab Times Staff KUWAIT CITY, May 30: According to informed sources in the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy, the Customer

Water and Renewable Energy, the Customer Service Sector has nine tender contracts in the current fiscal year of 2024/2025 for developing and modernizing work mechanisms within the sector to carry out the roles assigned to provide integrated services to customers and raise the revenues of the ministry.

The sources explained that one of the most prominent and important contracts to be offered is for the development and maintenance of the smart meter system (hardware systems and software) and its communications network for the sector's main and exchange site. The contract work will include maintenance and development of software, computers and infrastructure for the smart meter system, supply, installation, operation and maintenance of the smart meter connection service, and installation, operation and maintenance of network lines for sites affiliated with the customer services sector.

There are two contracts to carry out building construction work and all maintenance and restoration work for the facilities of the customer services sector in the six governorates, with the aim of providing a suitable work environment for employees and customers, especially since most of the buildings have been constructed for many years.

Among the contracts is the supply, installation and maintenance of smart water filling card devices, along with installing surveillance cameras in the 26 water filling stations nationwide, which contributes to the development of a new system to keep pace with technological development in this field. There are also two contracts for discon-

nection and connection work and for the replacement of electricity and water meters in all governorates, as well as a contract for cleaning work for the sector's facilities and customer services.

There is also a contract for reading utility meters for electricity and water consump-

tion in all governorates, which includes distributing bills to customers, field survey work, and distributing warnings to customers to visit the ministry to update data, pay bills, and inspect meters.

The sector's contracts also include a contract to carry out civil maintenance work for 26 water filling stations nationwide through the contract, and the construction of new buildings that will replace the existing

them.

Basins and rainwater streams are considered insufficiently exploited water resourc-


es in the country, which results in the loss of large quantities of water and land, and valuable economic and environmental op-

In their proposal, they called for conducting a survey of all water basins and rainwater streams and studying how to benefit from them and their feasibility in coordination with the relevant authorities, taking into account basic conditions,

which are:
1. The use of collected water for multiple purposes, such as agricultural irrigation, industries, and energy generation,

2. The use of collected water to recharge groundwater and benefit from it as drinking

3. The use of rainwater collection basins as a resource that can be used to enhance tourism and economic opportunities for the state by creating resort projects or similar projects and green reserves.



On the other hand, the Capital patrolmen arrested a citizen, in his 30s, who was driving a four-wheel vehicle in Shuwaikh Industrial Area for consuming drugs with narcotic substances and drug paraphernalia in his possession.

The arrest happened after the patrolmen noticed a speeding vehicle. The officers chased the vehicle and forced the driver to stop. When the officers searched him and his vehicle, they found the abovementioned items. He was referred to the Drug Control General Department, along with the confiscated items.

Spain gives final approval to amnesty law: More than six years since Catalonia's separatist movement took Spain to the brink of rupture, the nation's Parliament gave its final approval Thursday to a controversial amnesty for hundreds of secessionists in hopes of putting a definitive end to the trau-

The legislation was backed by Spain's left-wing coalition government, two Catalan separatist parties and other smaller parties. It passed by a vote of 177-172 in the lower house with the conservative Popular Party and far-right Vox opposing it.

The amnesty could benefit former Catalan regional President Carles Puigdemont, who is a fugitive from Spanish law in Belgium after fleeing his country following the failed October 2017 breakaway bid that he led. It should also help

hundreds more, including former government officials in Barcelona, average citizens who participated in the secession attempt or protests, and some police officers involved in the crackdown on an illegal independence referendum held by Puigdemont's government.

The passing of the amnesty law,

however, does not immediately clear up the legal mess of the separatists.

The law is likely to face legal challenges and will be reviewed by higher courts. It also must be applied by courts on a case-by-case basis. There are experts who question its constitutionality since they say it would create inequality between Spanish citizens by favoring some

over others. (AP) Int'I police op takes down ransomware networks: Police coordinated by the European Union's justice and police

agencies have taken down computer networks responsible for spreading ransomware via infected emails, in what they called the biggest ever international operation against the lucrative form of cybercrime The European Union's judicial cooperation agency, Euro-

just, said Thursday that police arrested four "high value" suspects, took down more than 100 servers and seized control of over 2,000 internet domains

The huge takedown this week, codenamed Endgame, involved coordinated action in Germany, the Netherlands, France, Denmark, Ukraine, the United States and United Kingdom, Eurojust said. Also, three suspects were arrested in Ukraine and one in Armenia. Searches were carried out in Ukraine, Portugal, the Netherlands and Armenia, EU police agency Europol added.

It is the latest international operation aimed at disrupting malware and ransomware operations. It followed a massive takedown in 2021 of a botnet called Emotet, Eurojust said. A botnet is a network of hijacked computers typically used for malicious activity. (AP)

US pledges \$135m to Moldova: US Secretary of State Antony Blinken on Wednesday pledged \$135 million in aid to Moldova for energy security and to counter Russian disinformation as the Western-leaning nation struggles to blunt Moscow's push for influence that has been buoyed by recent successes in its war in neighboring Ukraine.

Blinken opened a short visit to Eastern Europe with a stop in Chisinau, Moldova's capital, where he announced the assistance at a news conference with President Maia Sandu. America's top diplomat said \$85 million would go to bolster energy infrastructure and \$50 million was aimed at overhauling the energy and farming industries and deterring disinformation.

That in turn will bolster the ability of Moldovans to resist Russian interference, to hold free and fair elections, to continue down the path to the European Union and Western integration, to create more economic opportunity," Blinken said. "One of the other things that's so important is sharing information about disinformation and misinformation, which is one of the most potent hybrid tools that Russia uses - and that's something that we are doing." He planned to travel to the Czech Republic later. (AP)

Hungary's foreign minister visits Belarus: Hungary's top diplomat visited Belarus on Wednesday for talks on expanding ties despite the European Union's sanctions against the country. Hungarian Foreign Minister Péter Szijjártó declared that "our

position is clear: the fewer sanctions, the more cooperation!"

The EU has slapped an array of sweeping sanctions on Belarus for the repression, which followed mass protests fueled by the 2020 presidential election that was widely seen by the opposition and the West as rigged. Belarus' isolation further deepened after authoritarian President Alexander Lukashenko allowed Russian troops to use his country's territory to launch a full-scale invasion of Ukraine on Feb. 24, 2022.

While saying that "sanctions don't work," Szijjártó noted, however, that Hungary was "increasing economic cooperation with Belarus in areas not affected by sanctions." (AP)

'Help political prisoner dying of cancer': UN human rights experts have appealed to Belarusian authorities to help a political prisoner who has been diagnosed with an advanced form of cancer.

The experts expressed the "utmost concern" about the denial of medical assistance to Pavel Kuchynski, 29, who was detained in 2022 and sentenced to four years and nine months in prison on charges on insulting the president and threatening to use violence.

Kuchynski was diagnosed with advanced Hodgkin's lymphoma, which worsened in prison where conditions make it impossible for him to receive a bone marrow transplant, the U.N. experts said in a statement.

Belarusian authorities have cracked down harshly on any form of dissent since the country was rocked by mass protests during President Alexander Lukashenko's disputed 2020 reelection. The Belarusian opposition and the West denounced the result of the vote as fraudulent. (AP)

Dutch police homing in on robbers: An international investigation is homing in on a gang of robbers believed to be responsible for a brazen multimillion-dollar jewelry heist at an art show in the Netherlands and two stolen gemstones have been recovered, Dutch police said Wednesday.

Smartly dressed robbers wielding sledge hammers snatched jewelry from display cases at an international art fair in the southern Dutch city of Maastricht nearly two years ago, triggering an international police operation to hunt them down and re-

cover the loot that police say is worth tens of millions of dollars. In their latest update on the progress of the investigation, police in the southern Dutch province of Limburg said they now have narrowed down the location of the robbers, who they previously said came from the Balkans.

The investigation team also said that a diamond taken from a necklace that was stolen in the robbery had been found in Israel and another in Hong Kong. (AP)

Iceland volcano spews red streams of lava: A volcano in southwestern Iceland erupted Wednesday for the fifth time since December, spewing red lava that once again threatened the coastal town of Grindavik and led to the evacuation of the popular Blue Lagoon geothermal spa.

The eruption began in the early afternoon following a series of earthquakes north of the town of 3,800 people that was largely evacuated in December when the volcano came to life after centuries of dormancy and put on an impressive show of nature's power.

Although activity began to calm down by early evening, the eruption was estimated to be the area's most vigorous so far, as lava shot 50 meters (165 feet) into the sky from a fissure that grew to 3.5 kilometers (2.1 miles) in length, the Icelandic Meteorological Office said. (AP)

Seattle police chief dismissed: Seattle's embattled police chief has been dismissed, Mayor Bruce Harrel said Wednesday.

Harrell said at a news conference that he met with Adrian Diaz on Tuesday and they agreed Diaz should step down. He will work on special assignments for the mayor with the police department, Harrell said.

Diaz's departure comes about a week after police Capt. Eric Greening filed a lawsuit alleging that he discriminated against women and people of color, news outlet KUOW reported.

Greening is one of at least a half-dozen officers who have sued the department alleging sex and racial discrimination, and naming Diaz specifically. Last month several female officers filed a tort claim for \$5 million, alleging harassment and sex discrimination.

Diaz has vehemently denied the allegations. Harrel said earlier this month that he would hire an outside investigator to examine some of the allegations.

On Wednesday, Harrell said the lawsuits were a distraction for Diaz. He praised Diaz, who appeared with him at the news conference, but said the two agreed that change could "be better served with him stepping aside." (AP)

4 dead in road accident: Four motorists were killed when a car crossed the center line of a Virginia road and struck vehicles going in the opposite direction, state police said on Wednesday.

The multi-vehicle crash occurred shortly before noon on Tuesday south of the Sheppards community in Buckingham County, about 70 miles (113 kilometers) west of Richmond.

Virginia State Police said in a news release that a Ford Fusion traveling south on US Highway 15 crossed over the line and hit a transit van traveling north. The Fusion then continued heading the wrong way in the northbound lane before striking a Nissan Versa head-on. The Versa then ran off the road and overturned, the release said

Police said Fusion driver Erika M. Henshaw, 77, of Dillwyn, and passenger Alvin P. Henshaw, 85, died at the scene, as did Versa driver Runping Z. Rhett, 66, of Alton and passenger Eric D. Truscott, 37. (AP)

PHILADELPHIA, May 30, (AP): US President Joe Biden renewed his election-year pitch to Black voters on Wednesday, lashing out at Donald Trump's "MAGA lies" and saying the winner of this year's White House race will make crucial decisions, including on nominees for the Supreme Court, that could affect the country for decades.

Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris, in a joint appearance at a Philadelphia boarding school, thanked Black voters in Pennsylvania and beyond for being the lynchpin to their 2020 victory and they made the case that their agenda has had an enormous impact on improving lives for Black voters

The Democratic president also argued that an "unhinged" Trump is peddling misinformation in an effort to

"I'll be ... if I'm going to let Donald Trump turn America into a place of anger, resentment and hate," Biden said, calling on the crowd to help him and Harris win a second term. "My question is a simple one: Are you with

At Girard College, which has a predominantly Black student body, Biden warned about the threat he said a second Trump presidency would pose and cited some of the racial controversies fanned by the presumptive Republican nominee during his life.

The Philadelphia visit was the start of what the Biden campaign describes as a summerlong effort to engage Black student organizations, community groups and faith centers. It reflects in part how much of their support of him has frayed as Trump aims to make inroads into the longtime Democratic constituency.

The issue of abortion rights and the judiciary also featured in the remarks from Biden and Harris. Biden pledged to codify the protections of Roe vs. Wade, the now-nullified Supreme Court decision that had legalized the right to an abortion, if he and enough Democratic lawmakers are elected, while Harris noted that Trump dramatically shaped the Supreme Court as she invoked the name of Thurgood Marshall, the high court's first Black justice. Trump, she said, "handpicked three

ruling. "And as he intended, they did." "Who sits in the White House matters," she said. Underscoring that point later, Biden said the next president is "going to be able to appoint a couple justices.'

With some vacancies on the Supreme Court, Biden said he could "put in really progressive judges, like we've always had."
"Tell me that won't change your

life," he said.

Among Black adults, Biden's approval has dropped from 94% when he started his term to just 55%, according and would seek to reduce the military's costs by retiring older ships and aircraft.

Wicker acknowledged it would be "a hill to climb" to convince Congress to break from the spending caps at a time of deep political upheaval. long advocated for robust defense spending, Wicker's plan goes a step further, calling for a broad shift in the US defense posture that would amount to a reshuffling of national priorities. Under his proposal, the military would eventually consume 5% of America's gross domestic product, or total economic output.

Alito rejects calls to quit case: Justice Samuel Alito is rejecting calls to step aside from Supreme Court cases involving former president Donald Trump and Jan. 6 defendants, saying his wife hoisted the two controversial flags that flew above their homes.
"My wife is fond of flying flags. I am

not," Alito wrote Wednesday.

In letters to members of Congress, Alito said his wife, Martha-Ann, was responsible for flying both an upside-down flag over their home in 2021 and an "Appeal to ..." flag at their New Jersey beach house last year. Both flags were like those carried by rioters who violently stormed the Capitol in January 2021 while echoing Trump's false claims of election fraud.

Neither incident at Alito's homes merited his recusal, wrote the justice, who has rejected calls from Democrats in the past to recuse on other issues. (AP)

MEXICO CITY, May 30, (AP): Mexico held the last day of campaigning Wednesday before Sunday's nationwide election, but the closing rallies were darkened by attacks on candidates and the country's persistently high homicide rate.

Opposition candidate Xóchitl Gálvez started her last campaign rallies early Wednesday on the outskirts of Mexico City, and she focused her ire on President Andrés Manuel López Obrador's "hugs not bullets" policy of not confronting the drug cartels.

Gálvez is facing the candidate of López Obrador's Morena party, former Mexico City Mayor Claudia Sheinbaum. Sheinbaum, who leads in the race, has promised to continue all of López Obrador's policies. "Are we going to continue

with hugs, or are we going to apply the law to criminals?" Gálvez asked a cheering crowd. "Mexico wants peace,

needed to fight the drug gangs. Obrador Gálvez promised to return the funding to police forces and guarantee them wages of at least \$1,200 per month.

Gálvez also pledged to reconcile a country that has been highly polarized by the outgoing president's rhetoric, saying "enough division, enough hatred ... we are all Mexicans. Sheinbaum held her final rally later Wednesday in

Mexico City's vast, colonial-era central square. She delivered a strongly nationalistic speech to a large crowd.

"Mexico is respected in the world, it is a reference

point," Sheinbaum said, claiming that López Obrador's government "has returned to us the pride of being Mexicans."
"Mexico has changed, and for the better," she said.

On the violence issue, Sheinbaum vowed to continue López Obrador's policy of offering apprenticeships to encourage youths not to join drug cartels.

"We will deepen the strategy of peace and security, and the progress that has been made," she said. "This is not an iron fist" policy, Sheinbaum said. "This is

While López Obrador has increased the country's minimum wage and increased government benefit programs, he has been unable to significantly reduce the historically high homicide rate, which currently runs at more than 30,000 killings per year nationwide. That gang-fueled violence has also cast a shadow over

Late Wednesday, a mayoral candidate in the violent southern state of Guerrero was shot to death in the town of Coyuca de Benitez. Gov. Evelyn Salgado identified the dead candidate as Alfredo Cabrera, but gave no further details on his killing. Local media reported he was shot in the head at his closing campaign

A mayoral candidate in the western state of Jalisco was shot multiple times by intruders in his campaign offices late Tuesday. Two members of Gilberto Palomar's campaign staff were also wounded, and all three were hospitalized in serious condition, according to Jalisco state security coordinator Sánchez Beruben.

Mexicans will vote Sunday in an election weighing gender, democracy and populism, as they chart the country's path forward in voting shadowed by cartel violence. With two women leading the contest, Mexico will likely elect its first female president. More than 20,000 congressional and local positions are up for grabs, according to the National Electoral Institute.

SABANA DE MENDOZA, Venezuela: One of the most influential politicians in Venezuela once deemed images of his fellow citizens abandoning their home country the result of a professionally scripted, "Hollywood-type blockbuster.'

Migration, **Diosdado Cabello** said, was an issue conjured by a "media apparatus." Similarly, his boss, President Nicolás Maduro, denied for years, at least publicly, that millions of people were literally walking away from Venezuela.

Nothing, however, could have pushed them out of denial and into acceptance faster than the existential threat that their self-described socialist government is facing for the first time in years.

As Maduro works toward reelection with a divided, diminished and disappointed base, he has slowly transformed into a defender for migrants, challenging news reports linking some to criminal activities and accusing immigration authorities in other countries of abusing Venezuelans.

Maduro, like the chief opposition coalition, is promising job opportunities to lure people to return or not leave. But unlike the opposition's proposals, his no longer ring true for many voters, and they have already made up their minds: If Maduro wins on July 28, they will become migrants.

"I love Venezuela. I would like to pursue a medical career here, but one must think about the future,' said **Arnaldo Benitez**, 18. "I want my family to have a decent life and not be thinking 'I can't afford this or that.' So, I have to plan for a better future even if it unfortunately means leaving Venezuela.

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina: A criminal court in Argentina has postponed to Oct 1 the start of a trial in a criminal negligence case brought against eight people allegedly involved in the death of soccer legend Diego

The trial was set to start on June 4, but the criminal court in San Isidro, on the outskirts of Buenos Aires, said in a decision published by local media Tuesday night that "several questions have been raised" by all parts involved in the homicide case, adding that "at this date they are still to be resolved." The court did not elaborate further on its decision.

The 1986 World Cup winner died at age 60 on Nov. 25, 2020 due to a cardiorespiratory arrest.

The investigation started by request of members of Maradona's family days after his death. The eight people on trial, including doctors and nurses, are accused of being responsible for the death of the legendary footballer, who was being treated at a rented home after a surgery to extract a bleeding in his brain.

The defendants have denied any violations or irregularities in Maradona's treatment.

'7m people internally displaced': The number of internally displaced people in Sudan has topped 7 million, a UN spokesman said on Wednesday.

More than half of the 7 million internally displaced people are children. In addition, some 2 million people have fled across borders into neighboring countries, said Stephane Dujarric, chief spokesman for UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres, quoting figures from the International Organization for Migration.

"For our part, we and our humanitarian partners continue to ramp up efforts to respond to rising hunger and food insecurity

across the country," said Dujarric.

He said the World Food Programme (WFP) reports that 1,200 metric tons of food supplies are en route for some 116,000 men, women and children in Darfur.

They are nearing their final destinations: Central Darfur and 12 locations across South Darfur, including displacement camps in Nyala, Dujarric said. The WFP convoy crossed into Sudan

from Chad, he said. Elsewhere in Sudan, food distributions

are ongoing for 135,000 people in South Kordofan near the border with South Sudan, said the spokesman. (Xinhua)

30 suspected terrorists killed: At least 30 suspected terrorists were killed recently when the Nigerian military launched a series of airstrikes on their hideouts in the country's northern region, the air force said

The airstrikes targeted the hideouts of the suspected terrorists in the northern states of Borno and Katsina on Monday, following credible intelligence, Edward Gabkwet, the spokesman for the air force, said in a state-Several terrorists from the camp of

Babura, a known terrorist commander in the Kankara local government area of the northwestern state of Katsina, were killed in one of the airstrikes, according to the statement. Babura narrowly escaped being killed, unlike several of his foot soldiers, it said. The suspected terrorists in that area had

regrouped at a once-abandoned hideout but were decimated by the airstrike after intelligence surveillance, it added. (Xinhua)



Anthem sparks criticism: Nigeria adopted a new national anthem on Wednesday after lawmakers passed a law that replaced the current one with a version dropped nearly a half-century ago, sparking widespread criticism about how the law was hastily passed without much public input.

NKorea fires missile barrage toward its sea

SEOUL, South Korea, May 30, (AP): North Korea on Thursday fired a barrage of suspected ballistic missiles toward its eastern sea, according to South Korea's military, days after its attempt to launch a military reconnaissance satellite ended in failure but still drew strong condemnation from its rivals.

South Korea's Joint Chiefs of Staff said it detected the North firing around 10 projectiles that appeared to be short-range ballistic missiles from an area near its capital, Pyongyang. It said the suspected missiles flew around 350 kilometers (217 miles) before landing in waters off the North's eastern coast. It said the South Korean military has increased surveillance and vigilance and is closely sharing information with the United States and Japan.

Condemns

Japan's coast guard issued a maritime safety advisory over the North Korean launches and urged ships to exercise caution if they find any fallen objects. Japan's Prime Minister Fumio Kishida told reporters that the suspected missiles were believed to have anded in waters outside of Japan's exclusive economic zone and there were no immediate reports of damages. He said Tokyo "strongly condemns" the launches, which are in violation of UN Security Council resolutions against the North.

Tensions on the Korean Peninsula have increased in recent months as the pace of both North Korea's weapons testing and South Korea's combined military exercises with the United States and Japan have intensified in a cycle of tit-for-tat.

Thursday's launches came after North Korea flew hundreds of trashcarrying balloons toward the South since Tuesday night in retaliation against South Korean activists flying anti-North Korean propaganda leaflets across the border. North Korean leader Kim Jong Un had warned of unspecified "overwhelming actions" against South Korea after it staged an aerial exercise involving 20 fighter jets near the inter-Korean border hours before North Korea attempted to launch its second military reconnaissance satellite.

The rocket exploded shortly after liftoff, but Kim has urged his military scientists to overcome the failure and continue developing space-based reconnaissance capabilities, which he described as crucial for monitoring US and South Korean military activities and enhancing the threat of his nuclear-capable missiles. Foreign govts slam verdict

14 convicted in HK nat'l security case

HONG KONG, May 30, (AP): Fourteen pro-democracy activists were convicted in Hong Kong's biggest national security case on Thursday by a court that said their plan to effect change through an unofficial primary election would have undermined the government's authority and created a constitutional crisis.

After a 2019 protest movement that filled the city's streets with demonstrators, authorities have all but silenced dissent in Hong Kong through reduced public choice in elections, crackdowns on media and the Beijing-imposed security law under which the activists were convicted.

Those found guilty of conspiracy to commit subversion included former lawmakers Leung Kwok-hung, Lam Cheuk-ting, Helena Wong and Raymond Chan, and they could face up to life in prison when sentenced later. The two defendants acquitted were former district councilors Lee Yue-shun and Lawrence Lau. But the prosecution said it intends to appeal against the acquit-

The activists were among 47 democracy advocates who were pros-

ecuted in 2021 for their involvement in the primary. Prosecutors had accused them of attempting to paralyze Hong Kong's government and topple the city's leader by securing

the legislative majority necessary to indiscriminately veto budgets. In a summary of the verdict dis-tributed to media, the court said the election participants had declared they would use their legislative power to veto the budgets.

The conviction drew condemnation from human rights groups and expressions of concern from foreign governments.

The conviction "marks a further deterioration of fundamental freedoms and democratic participation in Hong Kong," the European Un-ion's foreign affairs office said. It added that the defendants "are being penalized for peaceful political activity that should be legitimate in any political system that respects basic democratic principles.

The case calls into question Hong Kong's commitment to openness and pluralism, the cornerstones of the city's attractiveness as an international commercial and financial center, the office said.

Boursa Kuwait sees 'mixed' trading day

KUWAIT CITY, May 30: The Boursa Kuwait witnessed a mixed day of trading, with the General and Premier Market indices experiencing gains while the Main Market index declined, reports Al-Jarida

The general market index saw an increase of 0.13 percent, closing at 7067.37 points, while liquidity remained stable at 45.5 million dinars, with 173.9 million shares traded through 15,346 transactions.

On the other hand, the Premier Market Index rose by 0.19 percent to close at 7,707.31 points, with liquidity at 36.5 million dinars and 91.2 million shares traded. However, the main market index declined by 0.18 percent, closing at 5,940.95 points, with liquidity at 8.9 million dinars and 82.7 million

Trading began with a decline in prices for leading and speculative stocks, but activity remained robust, particularly for leading stocks such as KFH and NBK. Notably, Arzan stock saw significant liquidity, surpassing its rates from the previous three months.

The session saw fluctuations in leading shares, with NBK experiencing a strong increase of 6 fils and KFH gaining one green penny. Boubyan rose by four fils, and Al-Mabani by ten fils, while Agility saw the highest rise of 1.7 percent.

While some stocks experienced declines, such as Unicap and GFH, others like Al-Eid and Rasiyat continued to rise.

Overall, the market showed mixed performance, with the general and primary market indices in the green while the main index declined due to Commercial Bank stock. The market awaits the outcome of the MSCI Morganstall indicators review for emerging markets, scheduled for today's auction period.

At the international level, the GCC market indices showed varied performance, with some rising and others declining by less than 1 percent, amidst increasing oil prices nearing \$85 per barrel for Brent

Oil dependency highlighted

Kuwait faces potential GDP contraction for second year

KUWAIT CITY, May 30: A recent report has indicated that Kuwait may experience a GDP contraction for the second consecutive year due to the weak oil market and production cuts, reports Al-Qabas daily. Kuwait ranked fifth in the MEED In-

dex of Economic Activity, which evaluates the short-term economic health of regional markets. The report highlighted Kuwait's heavy dependence on oil, with 95 percent of its exports and 90 percent of government revenues originating from the oil sector, making its real GDP highly susceptible to oil price fluctuations. Despite this, Kuwait still maintains a fiscal surplus.

The report also noted the underper-

formance of Kuwait's project market, with contracts awarded 40 percent below the long-term average and 25 percent below the completion rate.

Meanwhile, the UAE has regained the top position in the MEED Index, surpassing Saudi Arabia. Both countries started 2024 with optimistic growth forecasts of 4 percent real GDP from the International Monetary Fund

However, their economic trajectories have since diverged. The IMF revised its 2024 growth forecast for the UAE to 3.5 percent and for Saudi Arabia to 2.6 percent. The World Bank offered a more positive outlook for the UAE, forecasting 3.9 percent real GDP growth, while it projected a lower 2.5 percent growth for Saudi Arabia.

The trade and financial balances between the two nations also show significant differences. The UAE is expected to achieve a current account surplus of 7.8 percent of GDP and a fiscal surplus of 4.5 percent of GDP. In contrast, Saudi Arabia's current account surplus has decreased to 0.5 percent of GDP, and its budget has slipped into a deficit of 2.8 percent of GDP.

Despite these differences, both the UAE and Saudi Arabia remain at the top of the MEED Index, largely due

to their thriving enterprise markets. The value of contracts awarded in the past 12 months in both countries was double the long-term average. Furthermore, new projects in the UAE outpaced completed projects by two times, while in Saudi Arabia, new projects outnumbered completed ones by

This report underscores the economic challenges faced by Kuwait due to its oil dependency and highlights the contrasting economic trajectories of the UAE and Saudi Arabia, driven by their robust enterprise markets.

Kuwait oil price rises to \$86.39 per barrel

KUWAIT CITY, May 30, (KUNA): The price of Kuwaiti oil went up by 86 cents to USD 86.39 pb on Wednesday, compared to USD 85.53 pb record-Petroleum Corporation (KPC) cents to USD 79.23 pb.

Oil exports vital for economy

Iraq exports over 102 mln barrels of crude oil in April

BAGHDAD, May 30, (Xinhua): Iraq exported about 102.38 million barrels of crude oil in April, the country's Oil Ministry announced on Wednesday.

During the month, about 100.92 million barrels were exported from oil fields in central and southern Iraq via the port of Basra, and 1.016 million barrels from the Qayyara oilfield in the northern province of Nineveh, the ministry said in a statement, citing statistics from the State Organization for Marketing of Oil, an Iraqi company. A total of 448,606 barrels were sent to neighboring Jordan in April, said the ministry.

In March, Iraq exported about 106.11 million barrels of crude oil, according to the ministry. Iraq's economy heavily relies on crude oil exports, which account for more than 90 percent of the country's revenues.

Bread price to surge 300%

Egypt raises bread price for first time in 'decades'

CAIRO, May 30, (KUNA): The Egyptian government has decided to increase the price of subsidized bread for the first time in decades as of early next June in a bid to curtail the gap between the production cost and sale price.

Under the decision, the bread price will shoot up by 300 percent to 20 piasters (USD 0.0042) from just five piasters, Egyptian Prime Minister Mostafa Madbouli said at a press conference following a cabinet

The State has kept the subsidized

bread policy unchanged for more than 30 years, Madbouli said, adding that the cost of a loaf of bread is 125 piasters, while its price is only five.

Bread subsidy costs the State more than 120 billion Egyptian pounds (around USD 2.5 billion), he estimated, noting that the price should be increased in order to cut the subsidy.

As the world's biggest wheat importer, Egypt imported roughly 10.88 million metric tons of wheat in 2023, up 14.7 percent from 9.48 million tons in 2022.

Gitex Africa opens in Marrakech

The 2nd edition of Gitex Africa Morocco kicked off in Marrakech on Wednesday, the participation of over 1,500 exhibitors from more than 130 countries,

Moroccan prime minister underlined that digitalization could introduce tangible solutions to challenges the African continent is facing, stimulate development, and provide a congenial atmosphere for deepening pan-African integration. (KUNA)

Chief commercial officer exits

American Airlines lowers 2nd quarter expectations

WASHINGTON, May 30, (AP): American Airlines is lowering some of its second-quarter financial forecasts and has announced the departure of its chief commercial officer.

Shares slid more than 14% Wednesday and shares of all other airlines fell as well. Passenger airlines were among the worst performers on the S&P.

American Airlines said in a regulatory filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission that it now anticipates second-quarter adjusted earnings in a range of \$1 to \$1.15 per share. Its prior forecast was for \$1.15 to \$1.45 per share. Analysts surveyed by FactSet forecast second-quarter earnings per share of \$1.20, on average.

Total revenue per available seat mile is now expected to be down approximately 5% to 6%. Its prior forecast was for a decline

of about 1% to 3% The airline said in the filing that CCO Vasu Raja will be leaving the company next month. He joined the company in 2004. Stephen Johnson, vice chair and chief strategy officer, was named to lead the commercial organization and assist with the search for a new chief commercial officer.

Issued

In February American Airlines announced that starting with tickets issued on May 1, customers would have to buy tickets directly from the airline or its partner carriers or from preferred online travel agencies if they wanted to earn points in its AAdvantage loyalty program. The airline said at the time that it would list the preferred travel agencies in late April.

When the changes were announced, Raja said in a prepared statement that American Airlines was looking to make travel more convenient for customers and that by booking directly with the airline customers would get the best fares and it would be the most rewarding for its loyalty program members.

But the changes were met with criticism by some customers, who were unhappy with the limitations being placed on how they could earn points for the loyalty program.

Airlines CEO American Robert Isom, speaking at the Bernstein Strategic Decisions Conference on Wednesday, said that Raja was an innovator and disruptor, but that a change was needed.

Executing

"He is a good friend, but sometimes we need to reset. And in this case, we do," Isom said. "We have to be better at executing those long-range plans. We have to be more attentive to the marketplace. We have to be more detail-oriented, and we have to go forward as a team and really make it easy for American to do business with."

Isom said at the conference that American Airlines no longer plans to differentiate who earns AAdvantage miles and who doesn't, based on where they booked.

"We're not doing that because it would create confusion and disruption for our end customer, and we're going to make sure that we take care of it," he said. "We're listening to feedback. We're learning and adapting."

In April the pilots union at American Airlines said that there had been "a significant spike" in safety issues at the airline, including fewer routine aircraft inspections and shorter test flights on planes returning from major maintenance work.

American Airlines, based in Fort Worth, Texas, said at the time that it has an industry-leading safety management system. An airline spokesperson said then that the airline is in regular contact with regulators and unions "to further bolster our strong safety record and enhance our ever-evolving safety cul-

US consumer confidence rises in May after 3 mths of declines

Most economic indicators show economy in good shape

WASHINGTON, 30, (AP): Consumer confidence in the U.S. rose in May after three straight months of declines, though Americans are still anxious about inflation and interest rates.

The Conference Board, a business research group, said Tuesday that its consumer confidence index rose in May to 102 from 97.5 in April. Analysts were expecting the index to decline again.

The index measures both Americans' assessment of current economic conditions and their outlook for the

next six months. The measure of Americans' shortterm expectations for income, business and the job market climbed to 74.6 this month from a dismal 68.8 in April. A reading under 80 can signal a potential recession in the near future.

Consumer expectations of a recession in the next year rose again in May but are still well below their peak in May of 2023. More than two-thirds of respondents to the survey said they believe a recession is "somewhat" or "very" likely in the next 12 months. That's in contrast to the Conference Board's survey of CEOs, only about a third of whom foresee a recession in the next 12 to 18 months.

The number of respondents who said they planned to buy a car rose slightly for a second straight month and those who said they planned to buy a major appliance rose for the first time in several months, the board said

Energy prices rise

ConocoPhillips buying Marathon Oil for \$17.1 billion in an all-stock deal

DALLAS, May 30, (AP): ConocoPhillips is buying Marathon Oil in an all-stock deal valued at approximately \$17.1 billion as energy prices rise and big oil companies reap massive profits.

The deal is valued at \$22.5 billion when including \$5.4 billion in debt.

Crude prices have jumped more than 12% this year and the cost for a barrel rose above \$80 this week. Oil majors put up record profits after Russia's invasion of Ukraine in 2022 and while those numbers have slipped, there has been a surge in mergers between energy companies flush with cash.

Chevron said last year that it was buying Hess in a \$53 billion acquisition, though that deal faces headwinds. The company warned the buyout may be in jeopardy because it will require the approval of Exxon Mobil and a Chinese national oil company, which both hold rights to development of an oil field off the coast of the South American nation Guyana where Hess is a big player.

In July of last year, Exxon Mobil said that it would pay \$4.9 billion for Denbury Resources, an oil and gas producer that has entered the business of capturing and storing carbon and stands to benefit from changes in U.S. climate policy. Three months later, Exxon announced the proposed acquisition of shale operator Pioneer Natural Resources for \$60 billion.

All of the proposed acquisitions could face pushback from the U.S. which, under the Biden administration, well, such as tech.

has stepped up antitrust reviews for energy companies and other sectors as

Consumers who said they plan to purchase a home remained at its lowest level since August 2012. Sales of existing homes slumped in April as high mortgage rates and rising prices discouraged potential buyers.

Consumers' view of current conditions rose to 143.1 in May from 140.6 in April. Most economic indicators show the

U.S. economy in good shape by historical standards, though there have been some signs that it is cooling off.

The nation's economy slowed sharply in the first quarter to a 1.6% annual pace in the face of high interest rates, down from a brisk 3.4% growth rate in the final three months of 2023.

Retail sales were flat in April from March's 0.6% gain as prices remained elevated and high interest rates made shoppers more hesitant to put purchases on credit cards.

More cautious spending in the face of inflation has some big retailers offering discounts this summer. The latest quarterly earnings reported by big retailers show that while consumers have not stopped spending, they are becoming more price-conscious and

The board's survey also showed that consumers' confidence in the labor market improved in May, despite a slowdown in hiring a month earlier.

The labor market continues to churn out jobs, though not at the furious pace during the pandemic rebound. U.S. employers added 175,000 jobs in April, fewer than economists had projected and down from 315,000 in March. Even though the unemployment rate ticked up to 3.9%, it was the 27th straight month that joblessness has been below 4%, the longest stretch since the 1960s.

Mining giant BHP pledges to invest in South Africa economy

LONDON, May 30, (AP): Australian mining giant BHP Group on Wednesday pledged to invest in South Africa's economy as it seeks support for a 38.6 billion pound (\$49.3 billion) bid to acquire Anglo American, which was founded in the country more than a century ago and remains one of its biggest employers.

London-based Anglo American last week rejected BHP's latest offer, raising concerns about its complex structure. The proposed deal would require Anglo American to spin off two

South African units, Anglo American Platinum and Kumba Iron Ore, as BHP seeks to focus on copper and other products expected to benefit from a transition to green energy.

BHP on Wednesday said the South

African government and economy would benefit from Anglo Platinum and Kumba Iron becoming independent companies listed on the Johannesburg Stock Exchange. It also made a series of commitments to invest in South Africa and support charitable projects in the country.

"BHP believes that its proposal will contribute to South Africa and allow the benefits of South African mining to be shared with more South African stakeholders," the company said in a statement. The latest chapter in the takeover battle came as South Africans went to the polls in the country's most important election since the end of white minority rule 30 years ago. High unemployment, lingering inequality and poverty affecting the Black majority are key issues in an election that could see the governing African Na-

tional Congress lose its parliamentary majority for the first time.

BHP said it would maintain current employment levels at Anglo American's Johannesburg office and keep funding the company's charitable commitments in South Africa if the takeover goes ahead.

The company also promised to list its own shares on the Johannesburg Stock Exchange and establish a mining center of excellence to support research and development and promote the country's mining industry.

China's hit show spotlights Xinjiang's nomadic culture

URUMQI, May 30, (Xinhua): For thousands of years, many herders in today's Altay Prefecture in northwest China's Xinjiang Uygur Autonomous Region have been following a nomadic life, leading their livestock on journeys to different pastures at certain times throughout the year.

Recently, this millennia-old tradition has been thrust back into the spotlight following the release of "To the Wonder," a TV series adapted from Li Juan's prose collection "My Altay." The show, which aired lately, became an instant hit. The spring migration in Altay has basically concluded, and the summer migration will begin in early June.

A month ago, 600 heads of livestock belonging to Adalbek Beldumulati, a Kazak herder from a village in Altay, were loaded onto multideck trucks and transported to a pasture over 200 kilometers away from

After a five-hour drive, they arrived at the Sarbulak spring pasture in Altay's Fuhai County. "In the past, it would take at least a week to complete the migration. Now, we can leave in the morning and arrive in the afternoon," said Adalbek Beldumulati, who is in his 50s.

Sarbulak, meaning "yellow spring," is a place where melting ice and snow form rivers that flow through the mountains. At the foot of these mountains, lush green grasslands stretch out, dotted with herds of cattle

The TV series has scored 8.8 out of 10 on China's popular rating platform Douban. The series portrays nomadic life during migration journeys, highlighting the collision of old and new ideas and the integration of traditional and modern ways of life, drawing significant attention to the nomadic culture in Altay.

Altay, one of the pastoral areas in Xinjiang, is home to vast grass-

lands stretching between the Altay Mountains and the Junggar Basin. Nomadic ethnic groups migrate in search of water and grass throughout the year, leading their livestock on long-distance journeys to different pastures based on the growth cycle of the grass. This unique nomadic culture has existed for thousands of years.

Even today, the herders in Altay maintain different pastures for each season. Every year, they migrate back and forth from south to north, and vice versa, covering distances ranging from a few dozen kilometers to more than 1,000 kilometers. In the spring of 2024, over 2.2 million livestock in Altay were part of this migration.

Resources

In the vertical mobile grazing practiced by the Kazak ethnic group, migration allows for the efficient use of forage resources. "The grazing style is adapted to the fragile alpine grassland natural ecosystem," said Chen Xiangjun, professor at the School of Ethnology and Sociology in South-Central Minzu University.

In recent years, local government has increased investment in infrastructure in the pastoral areas, transforming some traditional pastoral trails into highways to facilitate the transportation of herders. Over 100 posthouse facilities have also been established along the herders' migration routes, providing them with easier access to services such as accommodation, food and bathing, as well as supplies for their livestock.

Today, many herders use modern equipment, such as motorcycles and walkie-talkies, and the younger generation enjoys communicating with the outside world through the internet.

Bota, a "post-90s" herder in Altay, has an innate love for pastoral

life. She often livestreams and creates videos while grazing, capturing everything from making felt blankets to preparing food with modern kitchenware and electricity. Through her videos, netizens can experience the scenery of the Altay pastures and see how modern life preserves traditions while embracing change.

The nomadic culture has also become a tourism attraction in Altay, drawing visitors and shutterbugs alike.

An important stopover for herders during their migration journeys, Sarbulak town in Fuhai has been hosting a migration-themed tourism festival for years. Traditional activities like horse racing and wool knitting offer tourists from home and abroad a chance to immerse themselves in the nomadic culture.

"An increasing number of tourists have been coming to the pasture to experience the slow-paced life and the unique folk culture," said Waspan Malek, owner of a homestay in Altay's Burqin County. He added that when he first started the business, there were only two to three guest rooms, but with Altay's increasing popularity, he had to expand the homestay to encompass more than 50 guest rooms.

Jilin New Village, a filming location of the series "To the Wonder," located in Altay's Habahe County, welcomes nearly 5,000 tourists daily. Among them is An Meimei, 21, who hails from central China's Hubei Province.

"I was drawn by the breathtaking scenery portrayed in the TV series. While I had previously seen images of the migration, witnessing the herders' journey firsthand allowed me to truly grasp the essence of their nomadic lifestyle. It's an epic tale of harmony between people and animals," An said.

they are evaluating more claims of sexual misconduct made against Harvey Weinstein and could TOKYO, May 30, (AP): The incarceration of 120,000 Japanese Americans, including children, labeled enemies during World War II is an historical experience that has traumatized, and galvanized, the Japanese

> American community over the decades. For George Takei, who portrayed Hikaru Sulu aboard the USS Enterprise in the "Star Trek" franchise, it's a story he is determined to keep telling every opportunity he has.

"I consider it my mission in life to educate Americans on this chapter of American history," he said in a recent interview with The Associated Press.

He fears the lesson about the failure of US democracy hasn't really been learned, even today, including among Japanese Americans. "The shame of internment is the government's.

They're the ones that did something unjust, cruel and inhuman. But so often the victims of the government actions take on the shame themselves," he said. Takei, 87, has a new picture book out for children

ages 6 to 9 and their parents, called "My Lost Freedom."

It's illustrated in soft watercolors by Michelle Lee. Takei was 4 years old when President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed Executive Order 9066 on Feb. 19, 1942, two months after the Japanese bombing of Pearl Harbor, declaring anyone of Japanese descent an en-

emy of the United States and forcibly removing them from their West Coast homes. Takei spent the next three years behind barbed wires, guarded by soldiers with guns, in three camps: the Santa Anita racetrack, which stunk of manure; Camp Rohwer in a marshland; and, from 1943, Tule Lake, a high-secu-

rity segregation center for the "disloyal. "We were seen as different from other Americans. This was unfair. We were Americans, who had nothing to do with Pearl Harbor. Yet we were imprisoned behind barbed wires," Takei writes in the book.

Throughout it all, his parents are portrayed as enduring the hardships with a quiet dignity. His mother sewed clothes for the children. They made chairs out of scrap lumber. They played baseball. They danced to Benny Goodman. For Christmas, they got a Santa who looked Japanese.

Takei's is a remarkable story of resilience and a pursuit of justice, repeated throughout the Japanese

American experience. It's a story that's been told and retold, in books like the 1973 "Farewell to Manzanar" by Jeanne Wakatsuki Houston; "Only What We Could Carry," edited by Lawson Fusao Inada more than 20 years ago; and "The Literature of Japanese American Incarceration," which just came out, compiled by Frank Abe and Floyd Cheung.

David Inoue, executive director of the Japanese American Citizens League, headquartered in Washington, D.C., believes the message of Takei's book remains relevant.

He said discrimination persists today, as seen in the anti-Asian attacks that flared with the COVID-19 pandemic. Inoue said his son has been taunted in school in the same way he was growing up.

Honest

"One of the important things about having books like this is that it humanizes us. It tells stories about us that show we're just like any other family. We like to play baseball. We have pets," Inoue said.

Takei and his family were sent to Tule Lake in northern California because his parents answered "No" to key questions in a so-called loyalty question-

Question No. 27 asked if they were willing to serve in the US armed forces. Question No. 28 asked whether they swore allegiance to the US and would forswear allegiance to the Japanese emperor. Both were controversial questions for people who had been stripped of their basic civil rights and labeled enemies.

"Daddy and Mama both thought that the two questions were stupid," Takei writes in "My Lost Freedom." "The only honest answers were No and No."

Takei said the questions did not explain what would become of families with young children. The second question was also a no-win, he said, because his parents felt there was no loyalty to Japan to denounce.

Tule Lake was the largest of the 10 camps, holding

Young men who answered "Yes" became part of the all-Japanese American 442nd Regimental Combat Team, which fought in Europe while their families remained incarcerated. The 442, with their famous "Go for Broke" motto, is the most decorated unit of its size and length of service in US military history.

"They were determined to prove themselves and get their families out of barbed wires," Takei said. "They are our heroes. I know I owe so much to them.

After Japan surrendered, Takei and his family, like all Japanese Americans freed from the camps, were each given \$25 and a one-way ticket to anywhere in the U.S. Takei's family chose to start all over again in Los Angeles.

In 1988, the Civil Liberties Act - after years of effort and testimonies by Japanese Americans, including Takei - granted redress of \$20,000 and a formal presidential apology to every surviving US citizen or legal resident immigrant of Japanese ancestry incarcerated during World War II.

Takei's voice became choked when he recalled how his father did not live to see it.

He noted with pride the diversity depicted in "Star Trek," a TV series that started in the mid-1960s and developed a devout following. There, the crew that flew together through the galaxies was of various backgrounds.

"Star Trek" writer, creator and producer Gene Roddenberry wanted to portray the turbulent times and the civil rights movement on a TV show but had to do it metaphorically to make it acceptable, Takei said.

"Different people, different ideas, different taste, different food. He wanted to make that statement. Each of the characters was supposed to represent a part of this planet," Takei said.

Takei recalled how his father taught him how the government "of the people, by the people and for the people," as Abraham Lincoln put it in his Gettysburg Address, could also prove a weakness.

"All people are fallible, even a great president like Roosevelt. He got stampeded by the hysteria of the time, the racism of the time. And he signed Executive Order 9066," Takei said.

Hyped 'spellers' see their hopes dashed

OXON HILL, Md., May 30, (AP): When Achyut Ethiraj's final appearance in the Scripps National Spelling Bee (NSB) ended far earlier than he anticipated, the 14-year-old grimaced at the microphone, walked off the stage quietly and exited the ballroom with his mother's arm draped around his back.

Achyut had plenty of company among the 140 spellers eliminated on Wednesday, spelling's saddest day.

"I didn't expect to get out, but I did, and I guess I have to accept the truth now," said Achyut, an eighthgrader from Fort Wayne, Indiana. "I'm happy to do high school and do other things, but I'm kind of confused what to do now that I'm done with spelling."

"It's my last year, and I expected to do better, but I guess it is what it is," he said. "And I have to move



changes over time, but over the past three years under executive director Corrie Loeffler, the competition has gotten very hard, very fast for spellers who make it past the preliminary rounds.

The morning began with 148 spellers. By the end of the first quarterfinal round, there were 59 left, and 46 of those

got through a vocabulary round to reach the semifinals. By the end of the day, eight finalists remained. They will return Thursday night, when the winner will receive a trophy and more than \$50,000 in cash and

The champion won't be Shradha Rachamreddy, who finished third last year and was a consensus favorite to go all the way. She was eliminated on exactly the sort of "super short, tricky word" she said she concentrated on studying after misspelling "orle"

Mistake

This year it was "varan," a type of lizard. She added an extra "r," and former spellers in the audience gasped at her mistake.

"I am in shock and despair," said Dev Shah, the 2023 champion.

"We all thought she was going to win," added Charlotte Walsh, last year's runner-up.

Starting in the quarterfinals, the bee's word panel can use any of the more than half a million words in Webster's Unabridged dictionary, plus some geographical names that aren't even listed in that volume. While the panel tries to maintain a consistent level of difficulty in each round, it can vary from word to

That's when luck comes into play. Achyut was asked to spell the word "sistine." Derived from the Sistine Chapel, it's an adjective meaning "a light blue color." He went with "cistine," and his coach, Grace

Walters, was second-guessing herself. "I'm sure when I was making my lists, I just assumed, 'Oh, everybody knows the Sistine Chapel.' But the reality is these kids are like 10 to 14. They might not have the ... cultural knowledge that us older people have," said the 22-year-old Walters, a former speller. "So that's definitely something I feel like I overlooked in helping him prepare.'

Two years ago, Achyut finished in a tie for 14th place, and last year he tied for 23rd. This year, he tied for 60th place alongside the 88 others eliminated in

"My rank has been going lower. But the reality is my preparation has been increasing a lot," Achyut said. "And I don't know how that matches up, but I know that I know the words and I deserve a good

He has plenty of company. Rare is a speller like Vanya Shivashankar, who came in with enormous buzz in 2015 after years of strong finishes and ended up winning. Even Shivashankar had a setback the previous year when a written spelling and vocabulary test kept her out of the finals.

Naysa Modi, the 2018 runner-up, didn't make the finals the following year. Ishika Varipilli, who hoped to make a run at the trophy this year in her third and final attempt, bowed out in a tie for 47th after missing a vocabulary word, "swanky," and said afterward she was "trying to keep it together."

In the semifinals, Shradha was followed to the exit by two more top-ten finishers from 2023: Aryan Khedkar and Sarah Fernandes. Aryan got a long hug from fellow competitor Faizan Zaki before leaving the

Pressure

"These kids put a lot of pressure on themselves. I think they get nervous. They get worried. They get more focused on, 'What if I don't make it? What if this happens? What if that happens?'" Walters said. "The kids feel it around them that, you know, they're being looked up to as previous finalists, previous semifinalists, and they internalize that people expect

something from them. Aliyah Alpert, who finished ninth in 2022, missed the bee entirely last year because she flubbed the word "recoup" in the Yavapai County spelling bee in her home state of Arizona.

"It was on-list, I totally knew the word, but I blanked. Choked," said 13-year-old Aliyah, who returned this year and was ousted in the semifinals.

Matthew Bader came in knowing he might not improve upon his finish last year, a tie for 57th. "The farther you make it in the competition one year,

that's the more chance you'll do worse next year," said Matthew, a 14-year-old from Peachtree City, Georgia. "Actually, I didn't really mind getting out. Win or lose, to be here, it's a pretty big accomplishment."


Ananth Chepuri of Bradenton, Florida, thought his daughter, 11-year-old Amara, was eliminated by one of the most difficult words ("ephectic") of what he called an inconsistent round.

"It's been brutal," Chepuri said. "The first kid, I felt so sorry for him. This was a bloodbath!"

Last year's champion, Dev Shah, wrote in a Washington Post op-ed that to become a champion speller, you must accept that you'll be asked a word you don't know - and be calm enough to figure it out.

"The skill of guessing is everything," he wrote. Aryan Khedkhar, a 13-year-old from Rochester Hills, Michigan, who finished tied for fifth last year, breaks down tricky words into categories.

"There are words with roots and words without roots that you just have to memorize. The ones that you have to memorize, I use language patterns. That really helps. If it doesn't have language patterns, I just try to use the simplest way possible," Aryan said. 'That's what the spelling bee is about. It's not about knowing as many words as you can.'

Jessica Stone relishes Tony nod for musical

'Water for Elephants,' a director's tale

NEW YORK, May 30, (AP): You don't initially see a full elephant at the Broadway musical "Water for Elephants." It's more like a tease. First come a pair of enormous ears. Then a trunk. And then the legs.

The execution is by director Jessica Stone, who wanted to make it extra special for the audience when they finally get to see the big reveal at the end of Act 1. She thought it had to be awe-inspiring, tender and the spirit of an elephant.

"People were talking about how moved they were when they finally were seeing her in full and I was like, 'OK, I think it's going to be OK,'

It's been more than OK for Stone, whose show earned seven Tony Award nominations, including one for best new musical and one for her heroic efforts to seamlessly create a big Broadway musical with elements of circus.

Stone knits puppets and vaudeville acts, songs and somersaults, as well as melds two groups of people who might not have shared a lunch table in high school - the jocks and the theater

"It's a very humble, disciplined, hard-working, loving cast," she says. "I overuse this metaphor, but it couldn't be more true: We literally and figuratively hold out our arms and catch each other." The show - adapted by Sara Gru-

en's popular 2006 historical romance novel and with music by the band PigPen Theater Co. - follows a love triangle in a traveling circus during the Depression. The New York Times called it "a

stunning, emotional production that "leads with movement, eye candy and awe." Variety raved that Stone brought "it all under one spectacular tent without forgetting its human and animal - hearts.

Her skill is on show with the first big song - "The Road Don't Make You Young" - a nine-minute, upbeat number that involves 23 performers, singing, dancing and flipping. It leans on circus designer Shana Carroll, who co-choreographs with Jesse Robb, both who also earned Tony nods.

"You actually have to have a little wiggle room for circus because you don't fly through the air on the exact same counts every single time," she says. "So everywhere throughout the show and the number, there's always a little bit of wiggle room. We've had to build it in for safety.

Rick Elice, the playwright of 'Jersey Boys' and "Peter and the Starcatcher" who earned a Tony nod for "Water for Elephants," said he was intrigued when Stone auditioned as director and spoke her mind even about elements that seemed nonnegotiable, like his initial framing

"She's brilliant. She's funny. She's totally prepared. She's fast on her feet. She's somebody that you just love to have lunch with because you laugh a lot and you bat ideas back and forth, which to me is a great lunch," he says.

"Water for Elephants," framed as an elderly former circus worker fondly looking back, joins a raft of recent memory plays on Broadway like "Mother Play," "The Notebook," "A Beautiful Noise" and "Harmo-

New treatments halt disease progression by 95%

Kuwait tops Middle East in MS cases: Over 3,000 affected

KUWAIT CITY, May 30: According to a consultant in diseases related to the nervous system and multiple sclerosis (MS) Dr. Raed Abdullah Al-Roghani, about 3,000 citizens and residents have been infected with atherosclerosis in the country. The infection rate among citizens has reached 85 percent, with a

total of 2,550 cases. In an exclusive statement to Al-Sevassah on the occasion of the celebration of World Sclerosis Day, Dr. Al-Roghani stressed that Kuwait has the highest number of MS cases in the Middle East region, with about 105 cases per 100,000 people.

He indicated that MS is an acquired disease and is not hereditary, and it affects women more than men by a ratio

Dr. Al-Roghani attributed the reasons for the spread of MS infection in Kuwait to several factors, including the change and development of diagnostic standards in the country, the availabili-ty of specialized medical personnel and competencies, and modern diagnostic devices, in addition to some environmental factors, such as the spread of viruses that lead to increased infection rates including the Epstein-Barr Virus (EBV), which is a virus widespread in all countries of the world.

Regarding the symptoms of the disease, he explained that blurry eyesight or blindness, numbness in the face or limbs, lack of balance, and muscle weakness are among the basic symptoms of infection. The continued appearance of one of these symptoms for more than 24 hours is one of the most important indicators of the disease.

Dr. Al-Roghani highlighted the tremendous therapeutic renaissance that Kuwait and other countries around the world have witnessed in the last ten years, with the emergence of highly efficient treatments capable of stopping the disease by up to 95 percent.

Meanwhile, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Kuwait Sclerosis Society Yousef Al-Kandari revealed that the "Best MS Patient" competition will be held at the Radisson Blu Hotel on Tuesday, June 4 under the patronage of the Minister of Health, Dr. Ahmed Al-Awadhi and in the presence of an elite group of specialists, to celebrate

In a statement to Al-Seyassah, Al-Kandari revealed that three stories had been selected from more than 100 stories submitted to compete for the grand prize for an MS patient.

He explained that the heroes of these stories are from different nationalities between Egypt, Jordan and Kuwait. These stories highlight the patient's struggle in living with the disease, as it is considered a chronic disease that cannot be cured.

Al-Kandari expressed his appreciation and pride that Kuwait is considered the first country in the world to include MS in the educational curricula for 12th grade students, confirming with the International Federation's certificate that Kuwait is a pioneer in providing this educational educational service, which reflects the great interest that Kuwait attaches to MS.

He highlighted the provision of free sclerosis treatments for inpatients at a rate of up to 90 percent, in coordination with the Ministry of Health and the Patient Helping Fund.

WHA approves \$11b global health strategy

VIENNA, May 30, (KUNA): The World Health Assembly (WHA) approved a four-year USD 11.1 billion strategy for global health to promote, provide, and protect health and wellbeing for all people.

This came during the 77th meeting of the assembly, with delegates calling for an emphasis on climate change, aging, migration, pandemic threats, and equity, and adapted for a time of fast-moving geopolitics, science and technology, the WHA said in a press release.

The strategy, the Fourteenth General Programme of Work (GPW 14), treats 2025-2028 as an exceptional window of opportunity to build resilient, fit-for-future health systems and, in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, to get back on track to reach the health-related Sustainable Development Goals, it said.

GPW 14 has six strategic objectives which reflect major areas of focus for this four-year period, including responing to the escalating threat to health posed by climate change, addressing health determinants and root causes of ill health in key policies across sectors.

The objectives also include advancing primary health care and essential health system capacities for universal health coverage, improving health service coverage and financial protection to address inequity and gender inequalities, preventing, mitigating, and preparing for health risks from all hazards, and rapidly detecting and sustaining the response to health emergencies, it added.

Youth vulnerable to strong nicotine addiction

Vaping, smoking at young age can have long-lasting effects on brain

CLEVELAND, May 30: There is no safe form of tobacco use and young people are particularly vulnerable to developing a strong addiction to nicotine, says an expert from global health system Cleveland Clinic, speaking ahead of World No Tobacco Day, arranged by the World Health Organization (WHO) each year May 31. According to the WHO, which

this year aims to give a platform to young people across the world to "urge governments to shield them from predatory tobacco marketing tactics," children are using ecigarettes, or vaping, at rates higher than adults in all regions. Worryingly, the health body estimates that, globally, 37 million young people aged 13 to 15 years use to-

"Young people are at particular risk from smoking or vaping, as doing so as a child or teenager can have life-long effects on brain de-velopment," says Cleveland Clinic pulmonologist Humberto Choi,

All forms of nicotine use have health risks, from vaping liquid nicotine and chewing tobacco to smoking cigarettes and shisha even occasionally or without inhaling, Dr. Choi says. He points out that anything containing nicotine is addictive, and almost all nicotine-delivery methods also contain chemicals such as acetaldehyde and formaldehyde, known to cause cancer, and acrolein, diacetyl and diethylene glycol, known to cause lung disease.

"Vaping is particularly challenging as we do not yet know the full implications for health, even though it has already been linked to acute lung inflammation, strong levels of addiction and dental problems, among others, and we know that the many of the same mechanisms that cause lung issues in smoking are involved," says Dr. Choi. In addition to

Dr. Choi adds that there are short- and long-term dangers associated with tobacco use. Short-term effects could include a persistent cough, asthma attack and acute lung inflammation, while long-term use could see the user develop conditions such as heart disease and emphysema.

Particularly concerning, though, is developing an addiction at a young age. "Using nicotine as a teenager can have life-long effects on brain development," Dr. Choi cautions. "Studies suggest that smoking from a young age could increase the likelihood for prolonged tobacco addiction or the risk of addiction to other problematic substances.In addition, the compulsion to smoke can interfere with concentration and daily life. Another issue is that young people might be using tobacco to self-medicate if they have anxiety or depression, thereby masking the symptoms so that the condition remains undiagnosed and untreated.

Dr. Choi points out that the harmful effects of nicotine use are cumulative, and people often do not realize the extent of the harm they are doing to themselves until they develop a chronic health condition.

"No matter which type of nicotine delivery method individuals are addicted to, or the frequency of use, they can benefit from quitting at any point, but the earlier the better," says Dr. Choi. "Research has shown that no amount of smoking is risk-free and even light smokers can develop deadly lung diseases, while even a new smoker can develop inflammation and damage to their lungs.'

Dr. Choi encourages parents to keep the lines of communication open, so that they can talk to their children about the risks of using tobacco, and also offer support to quit if needed.

"Giving up nicotine can be really difficult and people often make several attempts before they are successful," says Dr. Choi. He adds that there is no 'one size fits all' solution, which is why programs such as Cleveland Clinic's Smoking Cessation Program take a comprehensive and multi-pronged approach.

Liberty beat Mercury

WASHINGTON, May 30, (AP): Allisha Gray scored 19 points, Tina Charles had 17 points and 15 rebounds, and the Atlanta Dream beat the winless Washington Mystics 73-67 on Wednesday night.

Washington (0-7) is off to its worst start since 2007, when it set a franchise record with eight straight losses. The Mystics head on the road for games against the New York Liberty and the undefeated Connecticut Sun.

Gray made a steal and fast-break layup to extend Atlanta's lead to 63-58 midway through the fourth quarter.

Rhyne Howard took over the scoring for Atlanta down the stretch, scoring eight of her 11 points in the fourth quarter. Howard sank a one-footed jumper from the top of the key with 1:02 left in the fourth quarter and she added two free throws on the Dream's next possession for a nine-point lead.

Maradona's heirs lose court battle to block auction of the World Cup Golden Ball trophy

PARIS, May 30, (AP): A French court ruled the auction of a trophy awarded to the late Diego Maradona after the 1986 World Cup can go ahead as planned despite opposition from his heirs, their lawyer told The Associated Press on Thursday.

Maradona's heirs tried to stop the auction of the Golden Ball trophy he received for being the best player of the 1986 World Cup by starting an urgent judicial procedure. Lawyer Gilles Moreu told The AP the court's ruling "was not favorable to the heirs of Diego Maradona."

The trophy is set to be auctioned next Thursday in Paris by the Aguttes auction house.

The Golden Ball was missing for decades after it disappeared in uncertain circumstances and only recently resurfaced. Maradona's heirs say the trophy was stolen and claimed the current owner wasn't entitled to sell it. Aguttes said the trophy reappeared in 2016 among other lots that were acquired from a private collection at auction in Paris.

Moreu said the president of the Nanterre court outside Paris considered the current owner of the trophy, identified as Mr. Benchaieb, "should be considered as acting in good faith."

Benchaieb and Aguttes claimed that when he bought the trophy years ago he was not aware it had been stolen.

Maradona received the award in 1986 at a ceremony at the Lido cab-

aret on the Champs-Élysées. It subsequently disappeared, giving rise to rumors. Some say it was lost during a poker game or sold to pay off debts. Others say Maradona stored it in a safe in a Naples bank that was robbed by local gangsters in 1989 when he played in the Italian league. Maradona's heirs believe it

was stolen from the bank.

Moreu added he and his clients
were "both surprised and saddened"

by the ruling.

"We intend to use all available

means of recourse between now and June 6," he said.

Maradona, who died in 2020 at age 60, captained Argentina in its 3-2 win over West Germany in the 1986 final in Mexico City. In a quarterfinal win over England he scored the "Goal of the Century."

PARIS, May 30, (AP): There's no making up for what Olympic hurdler Lashinda Demus lost on the day she finished .07 seconds behind a Russian opponent who, everyone found out later, was doping.

What the American 400-meter hurdles champion will get is a great day under the Eiffel Tower where she'll be presented with the gold medal she was denied 12 years ago at the London Olympics.

Demus, now 41 and the mother of four boys, said so much time had passed that she wasn't all that excited when she learned last year that the medal first captured by Natalya Antyukh would go to her.

"But one thing I did know was that

I was on an international stage," Demus said. "And whatever happens, I wanted to receive this upgrade on an international stage."

With the help of a lawyer and the

With the help of a lawyer and the determination not to take the IOC's first offer - normally a presentation at a national or world championship - Demus negotiated a deal to receive

the medal on Aug. 9 at the Paris Olympics, at the Champions Park in the shadow of the Eiffel Tower.

This will mark the first time the IOC has held a "reallocation" ceremony at a Summer Games.

Demus will bring her husband and kids along for the trip. She has started a Go Fund Me page to raise money to bring parents, maybe her grandmother and other friends and family.

She said she holds no ill will against the IOC for the decade-plus that it took to get this medal to her. But she wanted more than a mere pro forma commemoration of the moment. What she really wanted was a ceremony at the track stadium, but the IOC told her that wasn't possible. The Eiffel Tower isn't a bad backup plan.

"I would have appreciated a little more, I guess, glitz and glam for people who are receiving their medals" belatedly, Demus said. "It's a work in progress. I'm pushing on in good faith. I'm glad I'm at the forefront in this. I can literally say that I am the trailblazer of this movement."

Among the others slated to receive medals that day will be Zuzana Hejnová of the Czech Republic and Kaliese Spencer of Jamaica, who finished behind Demus in the 400. Also in the group of 10: American high jumper Erik Kynard, who finished second to a Russian found to be doping.

Demus estimates she lost in the seven figures when it came to what she could have made had she returned home in 2012 as a gold medalist. She had battled injuries all that season

and felt getting to the starting line at the Olympics was a victory of sorts.

When Antyukh beat her to the finish line by less than half a step, Demus said it crossed her mind that the Russian had never beaten her before.

"But it wasn't in my mindset that anyone who beats me is automatically dirty. I didn't let that infiltrate my thinking," she said. "I just kind of accepted that I lost and I tried my best to move on. But it was a five- or six-year process of me just getting over failing at something I'd trained my whole life to do."

Not until details emerged about a widespread Russian doping scandal that began in the early 2010s did Demus start viewing her loss in a different light. Even then, it took years for Antyukh to be tagged for doping.

After stepping away from the sport for a handful of years, Demus is back coaching at Culver City High School near Los Angeles. She works as a clinical researcher for a medical care company. She has 16-year-old twin boys and two more sons, ages 4 and

She said she's thrilled that she'll get to feel like a gold medalist this summer at the Olympics, even if the prize will come some 12 years after her race was run.

She also is under no illusions that her journey to gold - 400 meters, plus 4,384 days - will mark a grand turning point in the fight against doping in world sports. Due to doping and, this year, the war in Ukraine, the last Olympics the Russians will have brought a full track team to remains the same 2012 Games that eventually made Demus an Olympic champion.

"It doesn't break my heart," she said. "But what comes to mind is that (doping) is never going to leave. I don't think anything has changed since the big Russian scandal. I think it's always going to be there."

Financial difficulties cited

Melbourne Rebels are out of Super Rugby from 2025

MELBOURNE, Australia, May 30, (AP): The Melbourne Rebels have been dumped from Super Rugby due to financial difficulties just as they've reached their first playoffs in their 14 seasons.

The Rebels have been in voluntary administration since January with debts owed to creditors exceeding 23 million Australian dollars (\$15.2 million), half of that amount owed to the Australian Taxation Office.

A private consortium put forward a plan to fund the club from 2025-30, which was supported by the administrator, but Rugby Australia voted against the deal. RA decided not to give Melbourne a license to play in the 2025 Super Rugby Pacific.

Staff and players were called to Rebels headquarters on Thursday as they were preparing to fly to Fiji for their last regular-season match against the Drua on Saturday.

"Deadly silent, just absolute devastation. No one said a word," Rebels coach Kevin Foote said of the players' reaction. RA chief executive Phil Waugh and chairman Daniel Herbert flew to Melbourne to speak with the team.

It comes as the Rebels are seventh in the standings and guaranteed their first berth in the eight-team playoffs. "We said we've really got the

opportunity to finish strong and the group and playing staff are really motivated to do that," Foote said. "We're going to hold our heads high and have a crack."

Waugh said credit should go to the players, who have continued to perform despite the uncertainty facing the club.

Rugby Australia cut staff and took over player and coaching payments for the 2024 season, with the Rebels handing over their competition

Most of the leading Rebels players were recruited from the rugby strongholds of Queensland and New South Wales states and the national capital, Canberra. Seven Rebels were at the 2023 Rugby World Cup including captain Rob Leota, frontrowers Taniela Tupou and Jordan Uelese, and backs Andrew Kellaway

and Carter Gordon.

The fate of the Rebels women's team in Super Rugby W wasn't included.

"The focus right now is on supporting the impacted staff and players at the Rebels," Waugh said. "We have a plan that will ensure rugby has a strong future in Victoria (state) - the infrastructure and the systems remain unchanged despite the change to the professional game in 2025, and we will continue to look for opportunities to increase that investment in the game in Victoria."

The rugby union franchise struggled for traction in a Melbourne winter sports market that is dominated by the Australian rules Australian Football League and which already had a powerful established club in the National Rugby League.

In an earlier statement, Rugby Australia said the consortium's projections for revenue growth and cost savings were "overly optimistic" and requiring additional funding from head office.

"Given the lack of detail made available to RA, the lack of transparency and the significant doubts over the consortium's proposed financial model, RA has determined that there is an unacceptable level of risk associated with entering into a participation agreement with this consortium for the 2025 Super Rugby Pacific season," Rugby Australia said.

"RA does not take this decision lightly, however, it must act in the best interests of the game and its stakeholders, and to provide certainty for the Rebels' players and staff, and all Super Rugby clubs in planning for the 2025 Super Rugby Pacific season."

The Rebels were due to play the touring British and Irish Lions in July next year between the first and second tests. RA said it was talking to the Lions about a new opponent.

Swiatek survives scare against Osaka

Pole extends Roland Garros winning streak to 16

PARIS, May 30, (AP): Iga Swiatek played like the current No. 1 and the two-time defending champion at the French Open. No surprise there. That Naomi Osaka looked like the former No. 1 that she is - and on clay, no less -

Surging down the stretch as Osaka faded, Swiatek saved a match point and grabbed the last five games to sneak her way to a 7-6 (1), 1-6, 7-5 victory in the second round of the French Open on Wednesday night in a thrill-a-minute contest befitting two women who both own

expected. For sure, I'll be more ready next time," Swiatek said. "Naomi played amazing tennis, ...

I'm happy that she's back and she's playing well." For Swiatek, this extended her Roland Garros winning streak to 16 matches as she pursues a third consecutive trophy at the clay-court major. For Osaka, who cried when she left the court after letting a 5-2 lead in the concluding set slip away, this amounted to a return to her big-hitting best.

They went back-and-forth for nearly three hours as rain loudly pelted the outside of the closed roof at Court Philippe Chatrier - showers forced the postponements of 23 singles matches until Thursday - and a riveted, if hardly full, crowd alternated their support between the two players. Sometimes, spectators called out before a point was done, prompting admonishment from chair umpire Aurélie Tourte during the match. And from Swiatek afterward.

"Sometimes, under a lot of pressure, when you scream something during the rally or right before the return, it's really, really hard to be focused," Swiatek said. "The stakes are big and there is

a lot of money here to win. So losing a few points may change a lot. So please, guys, if you can support us between the rallies but not during, that would be really, really amazing." Osaka served for the victory at 5-3 in the final set, and was a point away from winning, but she put a backhand into the net. Soon, when Osaka missed another backhand, this one long, Swiatek finally converted a break point on her 10th chance of that set, and they played on.

Maybe the lack of high-level matches caught up to Osaka, because her mistakes continued to mount, including a double-fault that put Swiatek in control 6-5. Swiatek. who has led the WTA rankings for nearly every week since April 2022, then held serve one last time.

"I don't necessarily feel like I regret anything," Osaka said.

Still, this was, without a doubt, Osaka's top performance since she returned to the tour in January after 15 months away while becoming a mother. (Her daughter, who is 10 months old now, accompanied Osaka to Paris and recently started walking.) was watching Iga win this tour ment last year, and I was pregnant. It was just my dream to be able to play her," Osaka said. "When I kind of think of it like that, I think I'm doing pretty well. And I'm also just trying not to be too hard on myself. I feel like I played her on her better surface. I'm a hard-court kid, so I would love to play her on my surface and see what happens." Because of the weather, only nine matches were completed Wednesday, and winners included Coco Gauff, Ons Jabeur, Sofia Kenin, Carlos Alcaraz, Stefanos Tsitsipas and Andrey Rublev.

It's been a few years since Osaka played this capably and confidently, hammering big serves at up to 122 mph (197 kph) and imposing groundstrokes. Her quick-strike capabilities were on full display: Osaka won 82 of the 139 points (59%) that lasted four strokes or fewer, and she finished with a 54-37 advantage in total winners.

All of those familiar mannerisms were back, too. She turned her back to Swiatek to reset between points, hopped in place, tugged at her pink visor's brim and slapped her palm on her thigh. Osaka celebrated points by shaking a clenched fist and shouting "Come on!" She grabbed nine of 10 games to dominate the second set and lead 3-0 in the third. Then 4-1.

As one ball or another would fly past Swiatek, zipped near a corner or right at a line, she turned toward her guest box and shot a look of confusion or concern in the direction of her coach and her sports psychologist.

She helped usher in a change in the way athletes, sports fans and society at large understood the importance of mental health - and prompted those in charge of various sports, including tennis, to take the issue seriously and try to accommodate and protect them better.

Osaka entered with an 0-4 record on the red stuff against opponents ranked in the top 10 and never has been past the third round at Roland Garros. This also would have been her first win anywhere against a top-10 opponent since January 2020.

Instead, though, it is Swiatek who moves on and continues her bid to become the first woman with three championships in a row in Paris

Real eye record-extending 15th European Cup

LONDON, May 30, (AP): Real Madrid is going for a record-extending 15th European Cup.

Borussia Dortmund is aiming to pull off one of soccer's biggest upsets in recent memory.
Whoever wins the Champions

League final on Saturday will be defying the odds in their own way. Madrid's domination of European club soccer's biggest prize confounds belief. Its record of 14 titles

is twice as many as its closest rival "The club has created its history in this competition," coach Carlo An-

celotti savs Madrid's record in the Champions League era is even more impressive: Eight wins since the tournament was

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rebranded in 1992; three in a row from 2016-18 and five in the last 10 years. In the same period, Madrid has won La Liga only four times. Madrid has also been a semifinal-

ist in 12 of the last 14 seasons. "It's something special for the

club, for all the madridistas (fans) and for us, who are also madridistas. It's a competition where we're more focused," says Ancelotti, who can win a record-extending fifth Champions League as a coach.

Teams are not supposed to enjoy such superiority in a competition filled with the biggest and richest clubs in the world. Not even great teams of recent times such as Pep Guardiola's Barcelona or Alex Ferguson's Manchester United - both repeat finalists - could come close to the kind of hold Madrid has had on the Champions League. And even in the face of competition from statebacked teams like Manchester City and Paris Saint-Germain, the alltime king of Europe refuses to be dethroned.

Which is why this final is so in-

It is a clash between the old money and glamor of Madrid and the savvy approach of a Dortmund team that has found an alternative way to compete with Europe's superpowers.

There is no better illustration of the contrast between the rivals than Jude Bellingham, who swapped Dortmund for Madrid last year in a deal worth up to \$139 million.

Bellingham could well be the

match-winner, having helped fire Madrid to the Spanish title in a spectacular debut season. Yet, in his absence, Dortmund stands on the brink of adding to its

lone Champions League triumph in 1997 in its third final ever. Selling the likes of Bellingham is part of the German club's strategy of buying emerging talents and then

cashing in. A year earlier, it was Erling Haaland who was sold to Man City. The roll call of stars who have passed through the club includes Jadon Sancho, Christian Pulisic, Pierre-

Dortmund's willingness to give opportunities to young players before selling them to bigger clubs has made it an appealing option for the likes of Haaland and Bellingham. who were both targets of Manchester United before choosing to develop their careers in Germany.

"I was at Dortmund for three years, I took a path that's a bit unfamiliar for players in England," Bellingham has said. "But I am grateful for the opportunities I've been given in European football. Maybe they wouldn't be as accessible in England."

Bellingham's move has paid off for all parties. He is playing beside Vinicius Junior and Eduardo Camavinga, and they are expected to be joined next season by Kylian Mbappe.

Such talent has been the bedrock of Madrid's Champions League dominance. Many of the game's greats have worn the white shirt from Zinedine Zidane to Cristiano Dortmund do it a different way.

Olympiakos clinch first European title

El Kaabi provides dramatic ending against Fiorentina

ATHENS, Greece, May 30, (AP): Setting off wild celebrations in Athens, Olympiakos won Greece's first European club title by beating Fiorentina 1-0 with a goal in extra time of the Europa Conference League final.

Ayoub El Kaabi provided the dramatic ending, diving to nudge in a last-gasp goal in the second period of extra time, with fans erupting in celebration after a lengthy wait for a VAR check for offside.

"Praise be to God, we promised our supporters we'd do this today and we did it," El Kaabi said.

The Morocco striker - who finished as the competition's top scorer - struck in the 116th minute of the match and dropped to his knees as he waited to see if the goal would stand after he had met a cross from Santiago Hezze.

The goal decided a game that had looked destined for a penalty shootout following an energetic but largely riskfree encounter at AEK Arena, and condemned Fiorentina and its coach Vincenzo Italiano to a second straight defeat in the final of the Europa Conference League after losing last year to West Ham.

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"We created chances and had the opportunity to lift the cup but unfortunately it didn't happy - I'm sorry,' Italiano said. "In Europe it's not an easy thing to get this far and lose.'

Olympiakos coach Jose Luis Mendilibar secured a second straight European title after winning the Europa League with Sevilla last sea-

"It's an honor to have made all these people happy, I feel immense joy and happiness to have made people feel this way and I dedicate it to them," Mendilibar said.

"We have achieved something that our club has never achieved before. We will celebrate it and celebrate it the way we should. Then we will start working on what comes next." Tens of thousands of Olympiakos fans joined boisterous celebrations across the Greek capital after attending outdoor viewing parties. Youths held up lit flares in the port city of Piraeus, near

Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis described Olympiakos as "a true legend," adding in an online post: "Olympiakos has won the Europa Conference League and made history! A sensational night for the club itself,

but also for Greek football as a whole.' The third-tier European club competition took place amid a massive security operation, with some 5,000 police officers forming concentric cordons around a northern area of the capital - amid Europe-wide security concerns this summer for major sporting events including the Paris Olympics and European soccer championship in Germany.


