STAGNATION continues its course as confusion increases and paralysis advances above everything else. This is due to the fact that the government is shackled by laws issued by its predecessors and cannot deviate from them. At the same time, it seeks to further shackle itself in the absence of a clear existence purpose. or so the majority of observers believe, to get rid of the cocoon in which it found

In all issues raised by the people, there is always a legal obstacle, caused by the deep state that is able to pass all its benefits through the law. The Council of Ministers has no tool through which it can overcome that.

Likewise, the National Assembly is not in a better condition than its predecessor, as it almost surpasses everyone through its threats with the thick baton of interpellations that the government is soon subjected to, which means running around in a vicious circle.

Therefore, the advancement of the country is not considered serious, but it is just a slogan that tickles the feelings of the citizens. This happens while the people are waiting for a firm decision, starting with resolving the problems they suffer from either regarding loans that concern the majority of people, or the physical coercion that results from them. because of an old law that was inherited from the custom that existed when there was no modern state

The law must be developed in order to suit the changing times, especially when it comes to civil cases and dud cheques that other countries ended a long time ago, whereas Kuwait, or rather the deep state, is still insisting on it to keep benefiting from people's misfortunes.

Those old and outdated laws not only shackle the government, but also society as a whole, and limit individual initiatives, such as the law to prevent coeducation, which annually costs the state more than KD 150 million.

This means there is a waste of half a billion dollars solely to satisfy a strict desire to which governments have submitted to in order to prevent the grilling of some minister. In reality, such an environment did not improve the level of education, but only increased its disadvantages, which is one of the chronic problems in the state.

Also, when the e-government was announced, people were optimistic, thought that Kuwait had started a step forward, and were waiting for the rest of the steps. However, people collided with the documentary cycle "stagnation" based on an outdated law dating back to the 1960s.

This happened while no government moved a finger in facilitating this session, but rather abandoned it because the e-government saves one from moving in and out of about 20 institutions and ministries to complete a transaction.

It is unfortunate that this is the situation in Kuwait when the countries of the Gulf Cooperation Council, and even many around the world, have made great strides in e-governance, to the extent that a citizen there finishes his or her transactions from the comfort of his home or from anywhere in the world. This indicates the extent of backwardness of the Kuwaiti administration which is restricted by many chains of underdevel-

High profile oversight panel formed

KUWAIT CITY, Aug 22: The Cabinet has approved the formation of a coordination committee headed by the Minister of Defense Ahmed Al-Fahad Al-Ahmed Al-Sabah to boost non-oil revenues, reports Al-Qabas daily.

The committee members will be Minister of State for Economic Affairs and Investment, Minister of State for Municipal Affairs, Minister of Commerce and Industry, Minister of Finance, and Dr. Abdulaziz Al-Osaimi and Director of the Macroeconomics and Financial Policy Department at the Ministry of Finance.

The Council assigned the new committee a

number of tasks such as considering all issues related to enhancing and maximizing the state's non-oil revenues in the State of Kuwait, examining work mechanisms and proposals submitted by various parties in this regard, and directing them as required by the higher interest of

This is in addition to supervising the followup of the actions taken by government agencies to maximize their revenues and overcome the obstacles that they may face and forming work teams -- if necessary -- to support it in order to accomplish its tasks.

"Mohajer" means "immigrant" in Farsi and has been a drone line manufactured by the Islamic Republic since 1985.

IRNA said the drone is able to fly up to 24,000 feet with a speed of 210 kph (130 mph), carrying a bomb payload of up to 300 kilograms (660 pounds).

> It also said the drone could carry electronic surveillance equipment and a camera. Iran's hard-line President Ebrahim Raisi, a protégé of Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, also viewed the drone on Tuesday.

> "Today, we can firmly introduce Iran as an advanced and technologic nation to the world," Raisi said in comments aired on state television.

> He reiterated Iran's stance about friendly relations with "all countries in the world," adding that Iran's armed forces will cut off any hand that reaches out in an attempt to invade Iran, state TV reported.

> The Associated Press could not immediately verify the claims about the drone's capabilities, though an arm of state television shared a video of it taking off from a runway. Long-range drones like the Reaper also require ground stations and satellite communications.

> Officials in Israel, which flies its own long-range, high endurance drones, did not immediately respond to a request for comment Tuesday.

ANKARA, Aug 22, (AP): Turkey's foreign minister accused the United Nations of abandoning its neutrality on Tuesday, a day after the U.N. Security Council criticized construction work by Turkish Cypriots inside the buffer zone dividing Cyprus and condemned their assault on U.N. peace-

In a statement issued Monday, the Security Council described the construction of a road as a violation of the status quo that is contrary to council resolutions. The statement came at the end of emergency closed consultations by the council's 15 members.

Angry Turkish Cypriots last week punched and kicked a group of international peacekeepers that blocked crews working on a road that would encroach on the island's U.N.controlled buffer zone. The road is designed to connect the village of Arsos, in the Turkish Cypriot north, with the multi-ethnic village of Pyla, which is inside the buffer zone and abuts the Greek Cypriot south.

UN reports 200 Afghan killings

ISLAMABAD, Aug 22, (AP): More than 200 extra-judicial killings of former Afghan government officials and security forces have taken place since the Taliban took over the country two years ago, according to a U.N. report

released Tuesday. The groups most targeted by the Taliban have been former army, police and intelligence forces, according to the United Nations Assistance

Mission in Afghanistan. UNAMA documented at least 800 human rights violations against former Afghan government officials and security forces between Aug. 15, 2021, when the Taliban seized pow-

er, and the end of June 2023.

JERUSALEM, Aug 22, (AP): Israeli security forces stormed into a town in the north of the West Bank on Tuesday, leading to fighting that killed a 17-yearold Palestinian, according to Palestinian health officials, the latest violence to grip the occupied ter-

ritory. Israel also released on Tuesday the results of a military investigation into the death of a soldier killed during its major raid into the Jenin refugee camp last month, concluding that the soldier was killed by a bullet fired by Israeli forces.

The Israeli military conducted an arrest raid before dawn in the town of Zababdeh south of Jenin, local medics said. The Palestinian Health Ministry reported that 17-year-old Othman Abu Kharj was fatally shot in the head. The Palestinian Islamic Jihad militant group claimed Abu Khari as a fighter.

Meanwhile, Israeli security forces were still searching for the Palestinian gunman who carried out a shooting in the northern Palestinian city of Hawara that killed an Israeli father and son on Saturday.

The army said its forces arrested 15 Palestinian suspects in several northern West Bank towns. In Zababdeh, Israeli security forces said they opened fire at those who threw explosive devices at them.

In the southern West Bank, the Israeli army captured two Palestinians who were suspected of carrying out a shooting attack the day before that killed an Israeli woman and seriously wounded a man near the Palestinian city of

While recently the vast majority of Palestinian attacks have been concentrated in the northern West Bank, the latest shooting reveals that Palestinian militancy is "spreading to other areas in the center and southern regions,' wrote Haaretz military correspondent Amos Harel, describing an explosive mix of forces that risks amplifying the surge in

" Revenge attacks by Jewish terrorists only intensify the mounting tensions," he wrote, referring to the rise in Jewish settler attacks on Palestinians. "The fact there are Cabinet ministers and members of Knesset from the coalition who openly encourage such acts only adds fuel to the fire."

The Israeli military said it confiscated the rifle used to shoot at the victim's car and that the two suspects had confessed to their involvement during interrogation. A car without a license plate that was allegedly used to carry out the attack was found burned north of Hebron, said mayor of the town of Halhoul.

Palestinian media identified the two suspects arrested near Hebron as Saqer and Muhamad al-Shantir.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's far-right government has come under pressure from coalition members that want to exert more control over the occupied West Bank and take harsher measures against Palestinians.

UNITED NATIONS: The Israeli-Palestinian conflict has killed over 200 Palestinians and nearly 30 Israelis so far this year - already surpassing last year's annual figures and the highest number since 2005, the U.N. Mideast envoy said Monday.

Tor Wennesland told the U.N. Security Council that the upswing in violence is being fueled by growing despair about the future, with the Palestinians still seeking an independent state.

"The lack of progress towards a political horizon that addressed the core issues driving the conflict has left a dangerous and volatile vacuum, filled by extremists on all sides," he said.

While Israelis and Palestinians have taken some actions toward stabilizing the situation, Wennesland said unilateral steps have continued to fuel hostilities.

The village, which comprises two rows of homes and a mosque, "can teach us a lot of the modern history of the UAE," said Ahmad Sukkar, an assistant professor at the University of Sharjah who is part of a team research ing the site.

It was built as part of a public housing project after the 1971 formation of the United Arab Emirates, a federation of seven sheikhdoms. The discovery of oil 13 years earlier was just starting to reshape the country.

The village housed around 100 members of the al-Ketbi tribe, Sukkar said.

They were one of several Bedouin tribes that until then had led a semi-nomadic existence, raising animals, traveling among the desert oases and visiting Dubai and Abu Dhabi when they were small port towns reliant on fishing and pearl diving.

The modern cement houses, built to ease the transition to settled life, featured local flourishes. The interior walls were brightly colored, and some were adorned with mosaics. The homes also featured spaces where village elders could host local councils, known as "majalis" in Arabic. One house had wallpaper depicting a lush green landscape, a stark contrast to the monotonous sandscape outside.

It's unclear what exactly sparked the exodus just two decades after the homes were

In local lore, the residents were driven away by evil spirits, but Sukkar says it's more likely that they left to seek a better life in the UAE's fastgrowing cities. The village had limited access to electricity and water, and was buffeted by sandstorms. Families would have also had to contend with a long commute across the desert to reach government jobs and schools in Dubai.

Nowadays the desert is slowly reclaiming the village. Drifts of sand have blown into the homes, and in some rooms, they obscure walls and nearly reach the ceiling. Only the mosque remains as it was, thanks to regular sweeping by maintenance workers from nearby al-Madam.

Some descendants of the camel-mounted Bedouin who once plied the desert sands still reside in the Emirates' rural stretches, though many now live in cities with glimmering skyscrapers, cavernous, air-conditioned malls and a sprawling network of modern highways. Expatriates from all corners of the earth make up the vast majority of the UAE's population, and some have taken an interest in its humbler

On a recent day, tour guides could be seen leading groups of visitors through the abandoned village. It's also been the setting for music videos and social media posts featuring the foreign models, fancy cars and displays of opulence for which Dubai is now best known.

"I wonder why they left," said Nitin Panchal, an Indian expatriate visiting the site. "Could it be a genie, could be black magic? We'll never know.

The municipality recently installed fencing around the perimeter, along with a security gate, garbage bins and a parking lot. Past visitors had left graffiti, scraped décor from the walls and climbed atop fragile

roofs for photos. The new measures have drained some of the mystery from the site and raised the prospect of it becoming yet another tourist attraction in a

country filled with them. Danny Booth, an expatriate from the Isle of Man, a British Crown Dependency in the Irish Sea, said he had decided to "come and have a look before

things start to change here.' "Sometimes these places are better left undisturbed, as they lose their charm when they become crowded," he said. (AP)

Temps to soar to 50 C at weekend

KUWAIT CITY, Aug 22: The Director of the Meteorology Department of the General Administration of Civil Aviation, Abdulaziz Al-Qarawi, said the summer rains are due to the high relative humidity and temperature differences between the earth's surface and the upper layers of the atmosphere, and the winds forming cumulus thunderstorm clouds, reports Al-

News spread on social media, quoting Al-Rai newspaper, stating that Jazeera Airways is ready to buy 35% of Kuwait Airways.

Representative Shuaib Al-Muwaizri hastened to issue a statement denouncing the attempt to acquire the "national carrier" and warned the government against the consequences of approving the deal. Then it became clear that the news dates back to 8 years, and the deputy should not have believed it in the first place, as this news lacks logic in the first place.

The other distinguished



MP, Fayez Al-Jumhour, also confirmed the news, condemning it and anyone who seeks to harm the reputation and credibility of Kuwait Airways, and threatened to interrogate the Prime Minister. I do not know what is the relationship of the Kuwait Airways credibility and reputation with the good intention of a party to buy 35% of it?

The belief in the news about the purchase shows their understanding of things!

What Shuaib does not know, or who wants to buy an asset like the Kuwaitia, is that neither its financial conditions nor its functional structure nor the quality of its aircraft, nor anything in it tempts to buy it, because the size of its problems is greater than the ability or strength of any president or board of directors who manages the company, as it represents the shining model.

What the "government joker" Minister Saad Al-Barrak warned against was that the government is a failed merchant, as its losses began in the early vears of its establishment, and it is said that it cost public money more than \$35 billion over 70 years. with repeated raising of its capital and write-off

What Al Muwaizri or any party aiming to buy as-

sets of Kuwait Airways is that the latter cannot attract anyone to buy it because of several facts concerning its financial conditions, job organization and the air-

The troubles of Kuwait Airways are beyond the capability of any chairman or board of directors to tackle. Kuwait Airways is a real model of what Deputy Prime Minister, Minister of Oil, State Minister of Economic and Investment Affairs and Acting Minister of Finance Saad Al Barrak when he said the government is a failed trader.

Losses of Kuwait Airways have started too early since it was established. It is said that it cost the national economy over KD 35 billion in 70 years and through increasing its capital and writing off

Outstanding and genius US economist Milton Friedman who won Nobel Prize in 1976 and whose theories concerning free economy and political freedoms are adopted by several countries such as Chile, Estonia, India and Hong Kong said the failure of a private sector company ends up with bankruptcy and

He added that the opposite happens with public sector companies pointing out that in such a case, the government pumps money to the company's capital ignoring its frequent failure.

This is exactly what happened with the Kuwait Airways which no one knows definitely how much it cost the Treasury and how big is the corruption committed

KUWAIT CITY, Aug 22: MPs Fares Al-Otaibi, Muhammad Hayef, Hamad Al-Obaid. Mubarak Al-Tasha and Khalid Al-Otaibi have submitted a bill on organizing charities and public benefit associations.

The bill specifies the activities of the above-mentioned organizations in and outside Kuwait; such as supporting the needy, implementing and contributing to humanitarian projects in different fields like education, rescue operations during disasters and wars, health and societal development.

Charities and public benefit associations are allowed to sign cooperation and partnership agreements with local and foreign public institutions, other similar entities, and international and regional organizations according to the regulations stipulated in the executive decree of the bill once ratified, and after obtaining approval from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

They are allowed to collect donations internally and externally for the implementation of licensed charitable projects. They can open branches in Kuwait or overseas after obtaining approval from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

They are prohibited from engaging in any activities unless they obtain a license from the Ministry of Social Affairs, which will open a file for every charity or public benefit association. They ministry is obliged provide public institutions with copies of these files. The public can access these files on the official website of the ministry.

They are not allowed to implement projects or engage in activities that violate the relevant laws or public morals, collect donations for rescue operation purposes unless they obtain a license, engage in political activities, promote sectarianism, damage the social fabric, interfere in the internal affairs of countries where they carry out humanitarian work, or be involved in political and sectarian disputes.

They are obligated to submit annual reports to the Ministry of Social Affairs and respond to the latter's questions. They are also exempted from tax.

In order to obtain a license, a charity must consist of at least 50 Kuwaiti members above 21 years old who should not have been convicted of committing honor crimes unless they have completed rehabilitation. The license application must include the name of the charity or public benefit association, sources of money and financial audit

The Ministry of Social Affairs has the authority to reject an application for the establishment of a charity or public benefit association, or demand for amendment of the organization's basic structure. The ministry should respond within 60 days after submission of the application.

The Board of Directors of a charity or public benefit association shall consist of five to 25 Kuwaiti members who should not receive salary for their work. None of these members could provide services to the organization through their own business or company unless it is done free of charge. A board member should not occupy the same position in more than three charities or public benefit associations.

Charities and public benefit associations are allowed to establish their own union whose regulations will be specified in the executive decree. Their sources of money include donations, grants, charities, Zakat, revenues from the assets and profitable projects of the organizations, and others approved by the Ministry of Social Affairs. The money of charities and public benefit associations are transferred only through the banks accredited by the Central Bank of

Charities and public benefit associations are subject to the oversight of the Social Affairs Ministry, which will assign inspectors with judicial arrest power to check these organizations during official working hour in order to review the files and documents, and then record violations if any.

The Social Affairs minister has the authority to dismiss the Board of Directors for certain reasons and then assign an interim board. If the board is dissolved as per the decision of the minister, fresh elections should be conducted within one year. The Social Affairs minister has the power

to dissolve a charity or public benefit association in the following cases:

- the number of founding members is reduced by half unless the required number is achieved within 90 days,

- failure to fulfill financial obligations, - violation of this law and involvement in illegal activities,

- suspension of activities for more than one year without valid reasons.

If the organization is dissolved, its assets and money are transferred to Zakat House and Secretariat General of Awgaf at the Ministry of Awgaf and Islamic Affairs.

Whoever engages in charitable activities under the name of an unlicensed charity will be imprisoned for three years or fined


Whoever collects donations without obtaining a permit from the Ministry of Social Affairs will be imprisoned for two years or fined KD2,000; and then the collected donations will be confiscated.

Whoever engages in activities that violate the purpose of establishing a charity or concealed important information is imprisoned for one year or fined KD3,000.

Whoever deliberately harms the funds of a charity is imprisoned for five years or fined

The existing charities and public benefit associations must modify their status in order to meet the conditions stipulated in this bill and obtain a license within two years of implementation. The law on collecting donations for public purposes enacted in 1959 is then cancelled.

In another development, MP Muhammad Al- Mahan asked State Minister for Municipal and Communication Affairs Fahd Al-Shulah about the number of cleaning contracts that Kuwait Municipality signed for Wafra residential area from Jan 1, 2017 till date; including the duration, value and name of contractor for each





committed by any of the con-Hassan Jowhar tractors, penalties imposed on erring contractors, and number of complaints submitted by the residents of Wafra residential and agricultural areas

since Jan 1, 2017 till date. MP Hassan Jawhar forwarded to HH the Prime Minister Sheikh Ahmad Nawaf Al- Ahmad Al-Sabah about the commitment of the government to submit a bill on regulating the salaries and appointment of senior officials. He said the government affirmed its commitment to submit the bill within the first 100 days after presenting its program but it has not done so till date considering more than 200 days have passed. He urged HH the Prime Minister to submit the bill before the next parliamentary session; otherwise, the government will be held responsible for squandering public funds

and depleting the State budget. In addition, MP Shuaib Al-Muwaizri has called on the Ministry of Health to stop randomly taking samples from individuals to make sure they are free of Covid-19. He claimed the World Health Organization (WHO) is implementing a plan aimed at reducing the number of inhabitants on the planet as a prelude to gaining full control over nations through a new pandemic and the administration of fatal vaccines. He urged Minister of Health Ahmed Abdulwahab Al-Awadhi to close the WHO office in Kuwait and conduct investigations on the fatal vaccines.

Furthermore, the Ministry of Information has completed a bill on organizing the information and media sectors. The Ministry of Justice, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Kuwait Municipality, Communications and Information Technology Regulatory Authority, and Cybercrimes General Department will review the bill and revised it, if necessary.

Racing against time **Schools repairs continue**

KUWAIT CITY, Aug 22: As the concerned authorities in the Ministry of Education are racing against time to complete the readiness of schools for the new academic year, and ensure the requirements for the start of the new academic year are provided, educational sources affirmed that the maintenance teams are working according to the capabilities available to them to carry out the necessary maintenance and repairs in schools, reports Aljarida daily.

They explained that the ministry has a plan to complete the necessary maintenance before the start of the school year on September 10. The concerned sectors have completed the procedures for seven maintenance contracts that include all six educational zones, the ministry's head office, and affiliated central departments. The contracts are in the custody of the State Audit Bureau and awaiting their approval, in preparation for completing their procedures and starting to

complete the awarding procedures. The ministry hopes for the speedy settlement of tenders for the maintenance contracts of the educational zones, in the light of which all required works and maintenance can be carried out, and to ensure the provision of an appropriate educational environment for students.

The ministry may resort to conducting some emergency and rapid maintenance works through direct contracts according to procedures and the regulations that allow it to do so within the budget limits in order to address the necessary problems at the present time until the completion and signing of contract procedures, and the start of their implementation.

The preparation teams formed by the Public Education Sector are working in coordination with the rest of the sectors to ensure that companies are able to carry out their work inside the schools, especially since the work of these teams will continue until the beginning of the school year.

Joint Arab 'efforts' vital to tackle societal perils

CAIRO, Aug 22, (KUNA): Chairman of the Arab Permanent Committee on Human Rights (AHRC) Talal Al-Mutairi underlined recently that it is essential to coordinate and unify Arab efforts to address threats to the society, family and common sense by legal, political, diplomatic and media

Al-Mutairi, who is Kuwaiti Assistant Foreign Minister for Human Rights, made the remark while addressing the 52nd session of the committee, with member states' concerned bodies, human rights agencies and nongovernmental organizations attending.

He said that today's gathering marks 55 years since the AHRC was launched, urging its members to take it upon themselves to review terms of references, retain gains, coordinate stances, prop up partnerships, ensure unity and address challenges.

He added that the meeting also came as settlers carried on breaking into Al-Aqsa Mosque, aggressions on Palestinian villages continued, religious hatred alarmingly mounted and children's sanctity was still in jeopardy. He emphasized that amid the current serious threats and

challenges, it is imperative to unify ranks and move in an orderly and coordinative way and lead an international initiative to put forward draft resolutions that would serve the region's priorities and interests.

He underscored that Palestine has always been the prime priority of the Arab world, calling on the occupation force to put an end to its occupation of Palestinian territories and to release all Palestinian prisoners immediately. "This is the voice of wisdom, the voice of logic and the

voice of international law," Al-Mutairi said, calling for ensuring accountability, stopping impunity and blatant defiance of international legitimacy. Furthermore, the Arab human rights panel's chief strongly condemned the desecration of the Holy Quran in the West as

a disgraceful and provocative act and unacceptable behavior.

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Calls for development of beaches

Coasts of Kuwait still lack services

KUWAIT CITY, Aug 22: Despite the voices calling for the development of beaches for years so that they can be benefitted from, the coasts of Kuwait still lack the services, plants and activities that can be provided to the public, reports

Al-Qabas daily.

The country's beaches suffer from the ongoing encroachments, environmental neglect and the absence of a supervisory and educational role in monitoring violations, in addition to the lack of interest in providing facilities and services on the beaches in order for the public to benefit from them and

This was affirmed by experts in environmental affairs and activists who have been monitoring encroachments on the marine environment. They stressed that Kuwait is still suffering from the continued chaos of sewage and untreated water being dumped through the rainwater drainage system into the Kuwait Bay and a number of other areas.

Head of the "Kayak for Kuwait" team and environmental activist Bashar Al-Hunaidi said, "The encroachments on Kuwait's beaches are continuing. The emission of unpleasant odors from the sea water is increasing in many adjacent areas as a result of the continued pouring of sewage water and other liquids into these waters at

raise the level of tourist attractions.

different periods and times.

Many of the beaches are unfit for use particularly due to the encroachments of building contractors on the coasts and the throwing of waste. Also, many owners of plots and chalets work for elderly people and close the beaches, which is a flagrant encroachment on the environment. There is a clear failure in the process of following up these encroachments and violations from Environment Public Authority (EPA).

Violations

The environmental activity by the volunteers is prominent in monitoring violations and guiding those concerned to stop them. We do not find anyone moving on their own to search for defects and stop the encroachment on the marine environment."

Furthermore, environmental activist Dr. Finis Al-Ajmi stated that Kuwait is one of the few countries that do not have beaches equipped for the public, except in specific areas.

He said, "The beaches are supposed to be completely reorganized. Many of them are now used as private beaches in front of chalets and villas, which is contrary to the law and regulations in force in the country."

Dr. Al-Ajmi highlighted the necessity of rehabilitating the beaches for public interest and evaluating the situation, especially since the beaches in the country lack cleanliness, services, toilets, activity halls, facilities, markets, cafes, restaurants, children's activities and swimming areas.

He stressed the lack of environmental awareness in the matter of preserving the marine environment, adding that environmental protectors must do what is required immediately, especially those concerned in the regulatory authorities, as there is overfishing, snail collecting, and the destruction of beaches with sewage and oil waste from industrial areas, not to mention medical waste.

Africa Cyber Surge II operation

Kaspersky assists INTERPOL in operation to 'disrupt' cybercrime in African nations

DUBAI, Aug 22: Kaspersky has supported INTERPOL with threat intelligence data in its Africa Cyber Surge II operation, which enabled investigators to identify compromised infrastructure and apprehend threat actors suspected of cybercrimes across the African region. The operation resulted in the arrest of 14 perpetrators and the identification of network infrastructure, linked to financial losses of more than \$40 million.

The Africa Cyber Surge operation is a continuous multi-stakeholder effort aimed at fighting cybercrime and protecting communities in the region. The first part of the Africa Cyber Surge operation, in which Kaspersky has also taken part, was carried out from July to November 2022, and resulted in a series of operational and investigative activities against the threat actors behind the cybercrimes in the African region.

The Africa Cyber Surge II operation was launched in April 2023 and lasted for four months, spanning across 25 African countries. cooperation between African law enforcement agencies to investigate and disrupt cyber criminals suspected of cyber extortion, phishing, business email compromise and online scams.

"The Africa Cyber Surge II operation has led to the strengthening of cybercrime departments in member countries as well as the solidification of partnerships with crucial stakeholders, such as computer emergency response teams and Internet Service Providers. This will further contribute to reducing the global impact of cybercrime and protecting communities in the region," said Jürgen Stock, INTERPOL Secretary General.

"In its mission to build a safer world, Kaspersky has been giving due credit to the importance of multilateral cooperation, involving the private sector, international law enforcement and national authorities," commented Yuliya Shlychkova, Public Affairs Director at Kaspersky. "Only by harnessing the power of effective private-public partnership, can we give an impetus to the further strengthening of the cybersecurity industry in the African region to ensure that African countries can realize their outstanding potential without hindrance and regard for cybercrimes."

For example, they are today talking about housing cities, when they should instead learn from the delay in issuance of building orders for about 30,000 homes in various new areas. Therefore, the tedious conditions will prevent the implementation of these projects, something that the neighboring countries solved years ago.

Also, there are laws that restrict people's freedom. As soon as someone publishes an article, a tweet, or even an opinion, restrictions are placed on him because the law that was put in place for the interests of some parliamentary blocs in the past is still stifling people.

Indeed, there must be a revolution against all outdated laws, as there is no solution for the government except to work with an open mind, be a pioneer in that matter, and undermine the legal legacy inherited from the deep state, as it has brought all institutions to the point of impotence and even paralysis.

Iran has in the past captured U.S. drones or pieces of them, but there's no evidence that it has taken a General Atomics' Reaper, which is flown by the U.S. Air Force and allied American nations as a "hunter-killer" drone that can operate at high altitudes for long hours and fol-

low a target before attacking. North Korea in July showed off drones mirroring the Reaper, possibly designed from publicly available information about the aircraft.

In December 2011, Iran seized an RQ-170 Sentinel flown by the CIA to monitor Iranian nuclear sites after it entered Iranian airspace from neighboring Afghanistan. Iran later reverse-engineered the drone to create their own variants.

In 2019, Iran shot down a U.S. Navy RQ-4A Global Hawk in the Strait of Hormuz amid high tensions over its collapsed nuclear deal with world powers.

The Reaper also carries special significance for Iran, as one reportedly carried out the 2020 strike in Baghdad that killed Qassem Soleimani, a top Iranian general in its paramilitary Revolutionary Guard.

Iran separately said it had provided two types of ballistic missiles to its army and the Guard on Tuesday, including one named for Soleimani.

Iran has unveiled a series of drones it describes as capable of long-endurance flights over the last several years. It remains unclear how they've been used in combat.

But other Iranian drones have been a key element of Russia's continued war on Ukraine. Tehran has offered a series of contradictory explanations about the drones, first denying they supplied them to Moscow and then claiming they sold drones only before the war began. However, the volume of drones used in the conflict show a steady supply by Iran of the bomb-carrying weapons in the war.

In June, the White House said Iran is providing Russia with materials to build a drone manufacturing plant east of Moscow as the Kremlin looks to lock in a steady supply of weaponry.

Among those administratively deported in the public interest are 10,000 women who have transgressed the law and committed vio-

> The Ministry of Interior has prepared a security plan to arrest 100,000 violators who are hiding. Intensive campaigns will be launched to arrest them, within the framework of a comprehensive move to purify the country from all violators.



The number of deportees is likely to cross the 35,000 barrier by the end

Dozens of drug users and promoters were arrested during the past week and referred to the deportation

The source highlighted the strict instructions issued by Sheikh Talal Al-Khaled to intensify efforts to tighten the security, adjust the demographics, and purify the country from random employment, adding that penalties will be applied on any company or sponsor that covers up

He explained that the General Administration for Residence Affairs Investigation came at the forefront of the security departments that referred expatriates for deportation due to the expiry of their residency permit or for the violation of the labor law, and other reasons. The Public Security Sector ranked second in referring expatriates for deportation.

The current year witnessed the largest movement of deportation of expatriates.

The number of expatriates deported due to the use and peddling of narcotic substances has increased significantly since the beginning of this year.

The plan drawn up by the General Department of Residency Affairs Investigation about six months ago bore fruit and resulted in the arrest of thousands of marginal workers, residency law violators and those involved in crimes.

2-kg heroin seized: The Ministry of Interior has announced on Tuesday a significant achievement by the General Department for Narcotics Control. Their proactive efforts have successfully thwarted an attempt by drug dealers and promoters to smuggle approximately two kilograms of

pure heroin into the country. In a statement released by the General Department of Security Relations and Media, the ministry explained that this accomplishment is a result of the comprehensive security endeavors carried out by the criminal security sector. The intensified focus on search and investigation operations has been instrumental in preventing the entry of narcotic substances into the nation. These measures are crucial in safeguarding the population against the hazards posed by such illicit activi-

The ministry reported that the diligent efforts of the Anti-Narcotics unit led to the disruption of the aforementioned smuggling operation. An individual of Asian nationality was apprehended while attempting to introduce around two kilograms of pure heroin into the country. This illicit substance was concealed within a postal parcel dispatched through an air freight company. Ingeniously, the contraband was hidden within steel tubes to evade detection.

The ministry affirmed that the apprehended suspect and the seized contraband have been handed over to the appropriate legal authority for

necessary legal actions. The ministry underlined the determination of the security forces to proactively combat drug dealers and smugglers. A strong message is being sent to anyone attempting to jeopardize the well-being of the nation's youth: there will be zero tolerance for such

The ministry called upon the public to collaborate with security personnel by promptly reporting any suspicious activities or negative phenomena. 'Motives tied to govt's bid to evade responsibilities over employment'

"AN announcement has been made regarding the resurgence of the privatization initiative, commencing with the Shuaiba station. Concurrently, licenses for various professions have been unveiled, and a commitment to bolster the local product has been declared," columnist Khaled Abdullah Al-Qahs wrote for Al-Qabas daily.

"This series of events unfolded over a span of three days. The motives behind these actions extend beyond mere economic objectives; and, they signify the government's attempt to evade its responsibilities pertaining to public employment.

This move comes after a series of unsuccessful administrations that were unable to advance the development of indigenous talent within this sector. Noteworthy points include

-- remuneration doesn't solely correspond to labor; it can also function as a means of wealth distribution; the Gulf nations have invigorated their public sectors, rendering them integral components of their national economic landscape; these nations serve as prime examples

of how such sectors can flourish. "It's unlikely that the private sector will be able to significantly accommodate domestic employment. Nationals face competition from a substantial influx of ex-

patriates willing to accept lesser benefits.

"Europe leans on expatriates to fuel its private sector, with its own citizens predominantly occupying supervisory roles. The public sector is primarily indigenous. A considerable portion of their populace benefits from subsidies and light occupations. Their commitment to their citizens is underscored by the absence of abundant resources like oil.

"Regarding the unveiling of professional licenses, it's worth noting that from firsthand experience, its effectiveness is questionable, saying a conducive environment should be provided by the government to enable citizens to choose vocations that align with their "Given these considerations, any form of privatiza-

tion is met with resistance, and the potential for catastrophic failure over an extended period is evident. To succeed, the private sector must guarantee through legislation that Kuwaitis receive fair wages, reasonable working hours, and job security. "Failing such measures, the government must bear

the responsibility of governing the state in alignment with the values of a society that transcends material wealth. The prosperity derived from such wealth should correspond to affording citizens stimulating, gratifying, opulent, and comfortable work environments.

"Notably, the past six decades have witnessed a select few benefiting from this abundance, while the majority grapples with exclusion, conflict, inadequate services, and prejudicial treatment. "In conclusion, efforts to establish a new power

structure wherein both government and commerce reign over the populace, and are in turn subject to their dominion, is categorically rejected. Conversely, any progress from a populist perspective is praiseworthy

Also:

"A short while ago, the Education Committee of the National Assembly organized a panel discussion to promote a proposed law that activates the Supreme Education Council. Its aim is to govern the educational system by limiting conflicts of interest, minimizing the powers of the competent minister, and distributing educational tasks according to an organizational structure that guarantees soundness and correctness of decisions," columnist Dr. Khaled Al-Saifi wrote for Al-Anba daily.

"The method of presenting the law to the specialists and those interested, and transmitting it on the screen of the Council's channel, is considered an appreciated initiative that established a positive precedent in involving public opinion in the formation and development of legislative work, as the attendees discussed and expressed their observations on the law presented in an effective manner that is expected to be met with a similar interaction from the adopters of the law and members of the educational committee.

"Despite our participation in the discussion of the

law, the time did not allow us to present all the observations and ideas, the most important of which is the dismantling of the Ministry of Education (the ministries of Education and Higher Education) and placing its responsibility under the management of several ministers instead of the current situation, where the amount of responsibilities and tasks are entrusted to one minister.

It will not help him in running the ministry and following up on its daily work, not to mention developing it and improving its performance according to well-studied plans and procedures that are feasible and beneficial to the educational body in the country, and with paths that keep pace with the ongoing challenges and are linked to the labor market and its requirements.

"How can we expect the success of a minister responsible for this number of public and private universities, many colleges and institutes, 1,300 schools and cultural offices abroad, an academic accreditation body and a research institute, and the affairs of thousands of affiliates of these institutions, including students, teachers, teaching and training staff members, administrators, researchers and scholarship students, and the consequences of that?

This is in addition to holding meetings with committees in parallel with attending the long sessions of the National Assembly and what this entails in terms of political alignment and parliamentary pressure? It is a heavy legacy and a great burden that no one person can be held accountable for, regardless of his abilities, experience and administrative wisdom.

This dilemma does not have a ready and clear solution, except that the intervention made by a member of the National Assembly a few days ago related to amending the constitution to allow an increase in the number of government ministers, opened the way for suggesting that the sectors affiliated to the ministries of Education and Higher Education be distributed to more than one minister, for example the responsibility of public education, which is represented in schools and educational areas, is to be assigned to a separate

"Likewise, government universities and colleges must have a full-time minister, a third minister specialized in external and internal scholarships, and another minister for scientific research who supervises research institutes, studies, and specialized libraries.

'These ministers must be placed under a higher council for education headed by the prime minister. Thus, we will have a mini-government for educational institutions that will guarantee joint coordination in their work and draw up general policies for education.'

"His Highness the Prime Minister took good steps when he decided to freeze exceptional pensions and issued a directive on the need to make programs for the improvement of the living conditions of retirees, provided all those concerned are covered," columnist Abdulmohsen Al-Husseini wrote for Al-Anba daily.

The correct decision of His Highness the Prime Minister is in response to the question of MP Dr Jenan Bushehri. Obviously, he wants his decisions to be in line with the people's wishes. His decision is based on what he deems to be the retirees' need — someone who will pay attention to their needs and feelings. This group is considered one of the most important human

"This decision came at the right time as it aims to improve the conditions of retirees. His Highness the Prime Minister felt the need to take care of retirees. We salute His Highness the Prime Minister for his kind initiative. We hope that he will continue adopting development projects in line with the political leadership's plan to correct the path in the interest of the people.

"We must also salute Bushehri for adopting projects beneficial to the citizens. We hope this will be a good initiative for the National Assembly and Council of Ministers to continue their march towards improving the conditions of retirees, employees and all segments of society, in order to achieve the desired goal of improving the living conditions of all citizens.

CITRA blocks 2,426 violating websites

CSC lifts ban on hiring foreigners for 773 jobs in Ministry of Health

KUWAIT CITY, Aug 22: The Civil Service Commission (CSC) has lifted the ban on hiring non-Kuwaitis for 773 vacancies in the Ministry of Health, reports Al-Anba daily. The daily obtained a copy of the

CSC's letter to the ministry; stating that the ban was applied on 46 slots for doctors, 708 for nursing staff, 13 for technicians and six for pharmacists. The CSC instructed the Health Min-

istry not to fill up these positions until

the end of the legal period for paying the leave balance of the outgoing staff. It added the Ministry of Finance should not remove these job slots from the budget of the Ministry of Health for the next fiscal year.

Websites blocked: The Communica-

tions and Information Technology Regulatory Authority (CITRA) has blocked 2,426 websites since the beginning of the year in response to the escalating trend of websites non-compliant with laws in terms of content and regulatory standards, reports Al-Rai daily. The daily added, during the same

period, five requests were granted for the removal of these blocks. Within the framework of vigilant oversight, CITRA collaborates with other government institutions and relevant entities to identify websites that warrant blocking. To facilitate this, the authority has enacted regulations that delineate procedures for obstructing prohibited electronic content. This effort aligns with its mandate to formulate internet access policies and protocols.

The sources highlighted that since the start of the year, CITRA received a total of 2,431 website-blocking reports from various sources. Notably, government agencies led the roster of informants during this period, accounting for 1,651 reports, constituting roughly 68 percent of the overall tally.

Private entities followed suit with 688 reports, contributing approximately 28.3 percent, while individual submissions made up the remainder with 92 reports, totaling about 3.8 percent.

The submitted reports to CITRA encapsulated a range of concerns, spanning breaches of local laws, intellectual property and publishing right infringements, instances of malware, electronic phishing, and inappropriate content.

Among the counterfeit websites subjected to blocking were approximately 33 imitating the Ministry of Commerce, 22 posing as Kuwait Post, 14 operating under the guise of the Kuwait Stock Exchange, and three fraudulent websites falsely using the names of the Ministry of Interior and other governmental institutions.

Problems to cut salaries: Despite the government's issuance of directives aimed at significantly reducing the salaries of oversight bodies' boards of directors even prior to the elections, the concerned ministries have not taken substantive actions in this regard for various reasons. One of the primary reasons is the hesitancy to nominate competent individuals for these positions, reports Al-Rai daily.

Reliable sources said the directives that were issued called for salary reductions; however, implementing these reductions within the current councils proves challenging due to legal considerations stemming from previous judicial rulings related to Kuwaiti employees. This indicates that the implementation may be postponed until the end of the terms of current councils and upon the approval of new council

The sources emphasized the need for a gradual and deliberate implementation approach. The projected savings resulting from salary reductions within these bodies are estimated to range between 3 to 5 million dinars, a relatively modest figure.

However, this endeavor also carries the risk of compromising the quality of work. It was noted that addressing this matter necessitates a balanced approach, ensuring fairness in remuneration. which holds considerable significance. It has been recognized as a pivotal issue and is considered one of the government's focal points in the upcoming period across ministries and agencies.

Nevertheless, the distinctive nature of oversight bodies might call for a unique arrangement.

The sources highlighted that individuals who hold stable financial and administrative positions are unlikely to accept nominations for these bodies unless the benefits offered can cover their specific responsibilities, as cus-

Wall St drifts a day after a rare 'climb' for August

Asian stocks follow Wall Street higher

NEW YORK, Aug 22, (AP): Wall Street is holding relatively steady Tuesday ahead of a couple potentially market-shaking events later in the week. The S&P 500 was 0.1% lower in

midday trading, coming off a rare August gain that was powered by Big Tech stocks Monday. The Dow Jones Industrial Average was down 132 points, or 0.4%, at 34,3331, as of noon Eastern time, and the Nasdaq composite was 0.3% higher.

Stocks have struggled this month as yields have shot upward in the bond market, which cranks up the pressure on other investments. The yield on the 10-year Treasury drifted up and down Tuesday, a day after reaching its highest level since 2007.

Nvidia, one of Wall Street's most influential stocks, swung from an early gain to a loss of 2.5% ahead of its earnings report on Wednesday, one that could be pivotal for the stock market.

The chipmaker has been at the center of Wall Street's frenzy around artificial-intelligence technology, which investors believe will create immense profits for companies. Nvidia's stock has already more than tripled this year, and it likely faces a high a bar to justify the huge move.

Analysts expect Nvidia to say on Wednesday that its revenue swelled by nearly \$4.5 billion to \$11.19 billion during the spring from a year earlier.

Another Big Tech stock, Microsoft, was the strongest single force pushing the S&P 500 higher. It rose 0.6% as U.K. regulators consider a revamped bid by the company to buy video game maker Activision Blizzard, which would be one of the biggest deals in tech history

Also pushing upward on the S&P 500 was Lowe's, which rose 3.6% after reporting stronger profit for the latest quarter than analysts expected. The home improvement retailer also stood by its forecast for results over the full year, and it said it gave over \$100 million in bonuses to its front-line workers.

On the losing side of Wall Street, Dick's Sporting Goods plunged 24.2% after its profit for the latest quarter fell well short of expectations. It also cut its forecast for earnings over the full year,

Apache Corp. plans to invest USD 1.4 bln in Egypt in '24 - CEO

CAIRO, Aug 22, (KUNA): Apache Corporation plans to invest around USD 1.4 billion in Egypt in 2024, its CEO and President John Christmann said Sunday.

He made the remarks during a meeting with Egyptian Prime Minister Dr. Mustafa Madbouli to discuss Apache's future plans and investment, the premiership said in a statement.

Christmann said Apache, which has strong friendship and business relationship with Egypt, upgraded its work mechanisms in Egypt that contributed to increasing oil production by 10 percent to over 150,000 barrels per day.

Apache, he said, was committed to its investments in Egypt and was looking foward to sustainable partnership

Madbouli said Egypt looked forward for more investment by Apache as well as expanding its oil and gas exploration operations

He commended the partnership with Apache, whose relationship with Egypt over two-decade old.

Surpasses 2019 figure

Dubai International Airport sees 41.6m passengers in H1 of 2023

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates, Aug 22, (AP): Dubai International Airport, the world's busiest for international travel, announced Tuesday it served 41.6 million passengers in the first half of this year - exceeding figures for the same period in 2019 as travelers return to the air after the lockdowns of

the coronavirus pandemic. The airport, home to the longhaul carrier Emirates in skyscraper-studded Dubai, long has served as a barometer for the aviation industry worldwide. The new figures at the airport known as DXB reflect figures offered by the International Air Transport Association that traffic worldwide is at 94% of pre-COVID levels.

"Dubai International Airport has once again recorded for the ninth year running that it is the world's busiest international airport with a very, very strong first half," Paul Griffiths, the CEO of Dubai Airports, told The Associated Press. "The most important part of that is that we've reached 100% of our pre-pandemic numbers, the same numbers as recorded in the first half of 2019.

The 41.6 million passengers is up some 50% from the 27.9 million recorded the same time last year, as airlines now have more planes and routes running again.

Passenger traffic this year largely has been driven by the airport's standard travel destinations - India, Saudi Arabia, the United Kingdom and Pakistan. Russia has also been a major market as Dubai remains one of the few places still open to Russians amid Moscow's war on Ukraine.

Dubai was among the first cities to reopen to tourists in the pandemic. That helped boost the city-state's tourism industry, as attractions like the Burj Khalifa, the world's tallest building, and the sail-shaped Burj Al-Arab luxury hotel draw both visitors and transit passengers out of airport lounges.

Dubai surpassed its pre-pandemic, half-year tourist figures this year with 8.55 million international visitors. Dubai hotels saw an average occupancy of 78% during that period - ranking among some of the world's top destinations.

"What happened pre-pandemic is we saw 60% transit and 40% point to point, but that's actually reversed," Griffiths said. "What we're now seeing is 60% of that traffic number is point to point and 40% is transit. So that's a very notable statistic and underpins the appeal of Dubai as a very, very

strong tourist destination."

Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport remains the planet's busiest passenger airport

Emirates also saw its most profitable year ever in 2022, earning \$2.9 billion as passengers returned to its long-haul Boeing 777s and its double-decker Airbus A380s. The return of the A380 has seen the average number of passengers per flight jump at DXB to 214, Griffiths said.

Griffiths said given the demand, the airport has bumped its projected passenger numbers for 2023 to 85 million, just shy of 2019's annual traffic of 86.3 million passengers. The airport saw 89.1 million passengers in 2018 - its busiest-ever year before the pandemic. DXB had 66 million passengers pass through it in 2022.

For Dubai International Airport, however, the swift business also revives a major challenge forgotten during the pandemic - it is boxed in. The airport sits in the northern reaches of Dubai, bracketed by two major highways to the east and west and vast neighborhoods to its north and south. That prohibits expanding the size of the two-runway airfield.

"We are landlocked on all four sides because I think back in the 60s when this airport was a very small single runway field, no one really saw at that time the huge development" coming, Griffiths said of DXB. "I think it's testament to the developments we have undertaken that within that landlocked site, we've been able to produce real estate, which has become the world's busiest international airport.'

He said the airport has a plan to spend as much as \$2.7 billion to expand and upgrade its three terminals and increase the number of remote aircraft parking spaces on the airport's apron. Those improvements "will probably see us right for about the next 12 to 13 years," he said.

That likely will extend the horizon further for major work at Al Maktoum International Airport at Dubai World Central, the citystate's second airfield some 45 kilometers (28 miles) away in its far southern reaches. While used by commercial airlines when Qatar hosted the 2022 FIFA World Cup, the second airport that opened in 2010 largely sees cargo and private aircraft flights.

Dubai International Airport now serves 257 destinations across 104 countries.

A Thai Cabinet minister is threatening to try to shut down Face-book in the country, saying the social media platform does not do enough to screen the advertisements it runs, leaving people vulnerable to costly scams.
Chaiwut Thanakamanusorn,

Thailand's minister of Digital Economy and Society, said in a statement Monday that he is ready to go to criminal court by the end of the month arguing

for Facebook to be shut down in Thailand.

He said Thai authorities have already appealed to Facebook parent company Meta to take down fraudulent ads, leading to more than 5,000 being blocked, but that the problem persists.

He said ads or fake profiles on Facebook frequently purport to represent reputable financial and investment advisers offering high profits, luring people into

scams in which they lose their

money Reached by phone on Tuesday, Meta in Thailand asked for queries to be sent by email to its press department, which did not immediately respond to a request for comment on the minister's allegations.

It was not immediately clear how quickly the court might rule on the case if it is filed by the ministry. (AP)

American Airlines pilots ratify a new contract that includes big pay raises

DALLAS, Aug 22, (AP): American Airlines pilots have approved a new contract that will raise their pay by more than 40% over four years and increase company contributions to retirement plans, their union said

Monday. The Allied Pilots Association said that 73% of pilots who took part voted in favor of the four-year contract, which it valued at \$9.6 billion.

"This contract is a big first step toward restoring the wages, benefits, and work rules that were lost during the past two decades while our profession was under continuous assault, said union President Ed Sicher. He said pilots deserved to be compensated in line with the "tremendous amount of responsibility" they take with every

CEO Robert Isom said the agreement will help American immediately expand its pilot training and provide pilots with more opportunities for career advancement.

American has about 15,000 pilots. Airline unions are enjoying leverage to get big pay raises because a boom in travel is lifting airline revenue. Texasbased American earned \$1.3 billion in the second quarter alone, helped by strong ticket sales, record revenue, and a drop in the price of jet fuel. Pilot unions have been in particularly strong position because of a shortage that is being felt most keenly at smaller carri-

Pilots at American rejected an offer last November. They reached another agreement in late July, which was renegotiated again after United Airlines approved a tentative deal with its pilots. Pilots at Delta Air Lines won big pay raises earlier this year. Pilots at Southwest Airlines are still

in negotiations. Wage rates for American pilots will rise at least 41% and perhaps more if United pilots ratify their agreement,

according to a spokesman for the Allied Pilots Association. The union said its new contract with American includes \$1.1 billion in onetime payments and ratification bonuses and immediate pay raises averaging 21%. Annual raises, plus increased company contributions to retirement plans, will raise the value of total com-

Airline industry labor contracts do not expire - that's part of a federal law designed to make strikes nearly impossible. Rather, they become open for change or "amendable" at their conclusion. Bargaining on the next contract for American's pilots could begin as soon as November 2026.

KUFPEC makes a new oil discovery in Geisum and Tawila West concession

KUWAIT CITY, Aug 22: Kuwait Foreign Petroleum Exploration Company, K.S.C.C. (KUF-PEC) is pleased to announce that its wholly owned subsidiary, KUFPEC Egypt Limited (KUF-PEC Egypt), has made a new oil discovery in the Geisum and Tawila West Concession in the

Gulf of Suez, Egypt. KUFPEC CEO Mohammad Salem Al-Haimer stated "the discovery was made through the GNN-11 exploration well which was drilled into a fault block to the east of the GNN oil field development. The well encountered 165 feet of good quality vertical net pay in the Nubia formation, and this is the first time the Nubia has been found to be oil bearing in the GNN area of the Concession". The producing reservoir is in the main GNN field and is located in the Nukhul formation.

The well was drilled by the recently installed GNN Early Production Facilities and has been successfully placed on production at a rate of over 2,500 BOPD. As a result of the new well, and the successful drilling campaign conducted to date in the field, the gross oil production from the Concession has reached 23,000 BOPD, compared to 4,000 BOPD before the GNN field was developed.

GNN-11 is the fourth well to be completed by the Early Production Facilities which have been installed in the central area of the field, including a conductor support platform, a mobile offshore production unit and a 10-inch oil export pipeline, tied back to the existing Geisum Star production complex. Further, there are 3 remaining well slots on the platform, which will be used to complete the current phase of the exploration and development drilling program.

Cheiron (through its PICO GOS affiliate) holds a 60% working interest and operatorship of the Concession, with KUFPEC holding the remaining 40% interest. The field activities are run by the PetroGulf Misr Joint Operat-

The GNN field was discovered by the JV partners in 2019. The discovery came after the implementation of an extensive, multiyear exploration and development campaign by the JV parties and demonstrated the significant remaining exploration potential of the region, despite the Gulf of Suez being a relatively mature hydrocarbon province.

Leaders of emerging economies meet in South Africa

Putin stays away over arrest warrant

JOHANNESBURG, Aug 22, (AP): Russian President Vladimir Putin will be notably absent when Chinese President Xi Jinping and other leaders from the **BRICS** group of emerging economies start a three-day summit in South Africa on Tuesday.

The bloc, consisting of Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa, is holding its first in-person meeting since before the COV-ID-19 pandemic, but Putin will participate via video call after his travel to South Africa was complicated by an International Criminal Court arrest warrant issued for him in March over the abduction of children from Ukraine.

Xi, Brazilian President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva, Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi and South African President Cyril Ramaphosa will attend in person as the bloc - home to 40% of the world's population and responsible for more than 30% of global economic output - mulls a possible expansion.

That will top the agenda at Wednesday's main summit meeting in Johannesburg's financial district of Sandton. More than 20 nations have applied to join the bloc, according to South African officials, including Saudi Arabia, Iran and the United Arab Emirates.

Saudi Foreign Minister Prince Faisal bin Farhan will be at the summit, as will Iranian President Ebrahim Raisi.

The five BRICS countries will have to agree on the criteria for new members before any countries are admitted, but a bigger BRICS is seen as a policy favored by China and Russia as a kind of coalition amid their deteriorating relations with the West.

The BRICS group was formed in

2009 by Brazil, Russia, India and Chi-

na. South Africa was added in 2010. Overall, around 1,200 delegates from the five BRICS nations and dozens of other developing countries are expected in Johannesburg, including more than 40 heads of state, according to Ramaphosa. United Nations Secretary-General António Guterres also is expected to attend.

Kremlin spokesperson Dmitry Peskov stressed that Putin will fully participate despite appearing virtually and will make a speech. Russia will also be represented in person by Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov.

At the summit, there will be calls for more economic cooperation and collaboration in areas such as health, education and climate change - but under a growing sentiment in the developing world that it is not being served by what it sees as Western-led institutions such as the U.N., the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund.

Ramaphosa met with Xi in the capital, Pretoria, on Tuesday ahead of the summit. The South African leader said he was seeking "Chinese support for South Africa and Africa's call for the reform of global governance institu-tions, notably the United Nations Security Council.'

Africa and South America have no permanent representatives on the Security Council despite being home to

nearly 2 billion people.

Xi, who has gradually resumed foreign travel after the lifting of his country's strict COVID-19 restrictions, joined Ramaphosa to watch a ceremonial parade by soldiers at the Union Buildings, the official seat of the South African government. He then planned to travel 60 kilometers (27 miles) to travel 60 kilometers (37 miles) through South Africa's most important economic province of Gauteng to the summit in Johannesburg.

Xi made brief comments, saying China was ready for more cooperation with Africa's most advanced economy "to take our comprehensive strategic partnerships to new heights.'

BRICS officials have pushed back at characterizations that the bloc is taking an anti-West turn under the influence of China and Russia, saying it is rather looking out for the interests of the Global South.

But the BRICS stance is at odds with the United States and its Western allies on a number of issues, not least over Russia's invasion of Ukraine The European Union called on Xi, Lula, Modi and Ramaphosa to use this week's gathering to condemn Russia and Putin for the war in Ukraine, but that's unlikely to happen.

If anything, BRICS has been a forum for Russia to express its anti-Western rhetoric, with Lavrov using a BRICS foreign ministers meeting in June to lambast the West for its "hegemony" and using "financial blackmail" to serve its "selfish interests."

A small protest against Russia's invasion of Ukraine was held Tuesday at a public park more than 3 kilometers

(1.8 miles) from the summit venue.

The U.S. and EU will be closely monitoring events in Johannesburg, with the long list of countries lining up to join BRICS suggesting that the bloc's calls for a reorganization of the global governance structure might be hitting home with many.

Ahead of the meetings, the U.S. stressed its close ties with India, Brazil and South Africa.

Not officially on the agenda but an issue for closed-door negotiations will be food security, with the developing world especially eager to use its BRICS ties with Russia to seek more grain shipments out of both Russia and Ukraine.

Ramaphosa led a mission of African leaders to Russia and Ukraine in June, meeting Putin and Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy to press for more grain exports to Africa, with little result.

There's added urgency after Russia halted a deal allowing Ukraine to export through the Black Sea last month, exacerbating hunger and pushing food prices higher. Putin later announced free Russian grain shipments to six African nations and might offer more shipments this week, some analysts say, as a means of gaining favor among the dozens of developing nations represented at the BRICS summit.

The summit officially began with a business forum on Tuesday morning, and Xi, Lula, Modi and Ramaphosa were expected to arrive at the Sandton Convention Centre for the first meeting of the leaders in the afternoon. They will hold a retreat Tuesday evening at the luxury Summer Place estate in Johannesburg's plush Hyde Park

Russia and China will look to gain more political and economic ground in the developing world at a summit in South Africa this week, when an expected joint dose of anti-West grumbling from them may take on a sharper edge with a formal move to bring Saudi Arabia closer.

"If Saudi Arabia were to enter BRICS, it will bring extraordinary importance to this grouping," said Talmiz Ahmad, India's former ambassador to Saudi Arabia

Even an agreement on the principle of expanding BRICS, which already consists of a large chunk of the developing world's biggest economies, is a moral victory for the Russian and Chinese vision for the bloc as a counterbalance to the G-7, analysts say.

Both favor adding more countries to bolster a kind of coalition -- even if it's only symbolic - amid China's economic friction with the U.S. and Russia's Cold War-like standoff with the West because of the war in Ukraine.

"BRICS expansion has become the top trending issue at the moment," said Chen Xiaodong, China's ambassador to South Africa. "Expansion is key to enhancing (the) BRICS mechanism's vitality. I believe that this year's summit will witness a new and solid step on this front."

The U.S. has stressed its bilateral ties with South Africa, Brazil and India in an attempt to offset any outsized Russian and Chinese influence emanating from BRICS. In the buildup to the summit, the State Department said that the U.S. was "deeply engaged with many of the leading members of the BRICS association.'

The European Union also will closely follow happenings in Johannesburg, but with almost sole focus on the war in Ukraine and the bloc's continued effort to draw united condemnation for Russia's invasion from the developing world, which has largely failed so far. With Xi, Lula, Modi and Ramapho-

sa coming together, European Commission spokesman Peter Stano said the EU was calling on them to use the moment to uphold international law. "We look forward to their contri-

bution to make Putin stop his illegal, destabilizing behavior," Stano said.

If a BRICS foreign ministers meeting in Cape Town in June, the precursor to the main summit, is anything to go by, there will be no public criticism of Russia or Putin over the war. A planned protest by the Amnesty International rights group and the Ukrainian Association of South Africa outside the Sandton Convention Centre will likely be the only condemnation heard.

If anything, Russia might see the summit as an opportunity to leverage

Having halted a deal allowing the passage of grain out of Ukraine last month, Putin might use the BRICS gathering to announce more free Russian grain shipments to developing countries, as he has already done for several African nations, said Maria Snegovaya, senior fellow at the Europe, Russia, and Eurasia Program at the Washington-based Center for Strategic and International Studies.

It would allow Putin to demonstrate "goodwill" to the developing world, Snegovaya said, while cutting Ukraine out of the process.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said Putin would have "full fledged participation" in the summit despite appearing on a video link and would make a speech.

What's also likely to be aired regularly over the three days in Johannesburg is the developing world's gripes over current global financial systems. That has streamlined in the months and weeks leading up to the summit into a criticism of the dominance of the U.S. dollar as the world's currency for international trade.

"None of this is the big sword that's going to slay the dollar. That's not the play," said van Staden. "It's not one big sword wound, it's a lot of paper cuts. It won't kill the dollar, but it's definitely making the world a more complicated place.

"They don't need to defeat the dollar ... and they don't need to defeat the G-7. All they particularly want to do is raise an alternative to it. It's this much longer play."

Macy's swings to loss and posts sales decline in second quarter

NEW YORK, Aug 22, (AP): Macy's swung to a loss and reported a sales decline in the second quarter as worries about inflation continue to make shoppers pull back on clothing and other discretionary purchases.

However, the results, announced Tuesday, beat Wall Street expectations. Macy's reaffirmed its annual sales and profits forecasts, noting uncertainty about the economy in the second half. Shares were down less than 1% in premarket trading Tuesday.

Macy's is one of the last remaining retailers to report second-quarter results in an earnings season that shows how still high inflation, despite some easing, is forcing shoppers to continue to cut back on discretionary items like clothing in order to afford their larger grocery bills.

Target reported its first quarterly sales decline in six years last week, dragged down by cautious spending in addition to backlash by some customers to its Pride merchandise.

Home Depot, the nation's largest home improvement retailer, said last week that sales continue to decline, with a fall-off in bigticket items like appliances and other things that often require financing. That's become a problem with interest rates rising rapidly over the past year, making credit cards a much bigger burden for consumers.

But Walmart racked up another strong quarterly sales gain as its low-prices continue to attract budget conscious consumers looking for deals in a tough economic environment. The nation's largest retailer boosted its annual outlook last week after reporting better-than expected secondquarter results sending shares

Macy's reported a loss of \$22 million, or 8 cents per share, in the quarter ended July 29. That compares with a profit of \$275 million, or 99 cents per share, in the year-ago period.

The loss includes a non-cash settlement charge related to the transfer of pension obligations for certain retirees and beneficiaries under the company's pension plan. Adjusted earnings for the latest quarter were 26 cents per share.

Revenue fell to \$5.28 billion from \$5.83 billion from a year

Analysts had expected a profit of 14 cents on sales of \$5.06 bil-

Comparable sales - those from stores and digital channels opened at least a year - were down 8.2% in the quarter. The figure excluded licensed owned businesses like cosmetics.

Microsoft revamps deal for video game maker Activision Blizzard

LONDON, Aug 22, (AP): British competition regulators opened a new investigation Tuesday into Microsoft's revamped bid to buy video game maker Activision Blizzard, representing the last major hurdle to closing one of the biggest deals in tech history.

The Competition and Markets Authority said it has until Oct. 18 to decide whether to approve the deal or escalate its preliminary investigation into an in-depth review. The companies agreed earlier to extend the transaction's deadline to that same date. Xbox maker Microsoft has been on

a quest to acquire Activision, maker of the popular Call of Duty game franchise since announcing the \$69 billion deal in January 2022. The companies have secured ap-

provals from antitrust authorities covering 40 countries, including the European Union.

The blockbuster deal faced pushback in the United States, but the Federal Trade Commission lost a court fight to stop it, effectively clearing the way for it to proceed.

The purchase is now only held up in Britain, where authorities moved to block it earlier this year over worries about competition being stifled in the emerging cloud gaming market, where players can avoid buying pricey consoles and stream games to their tablets or phones.

Under the restructured deal, Microsoft will sell cloud streaming rights

the EU's 27 nations, Norway, Iceland and Liechtenstein. In an unprecedented move, the U.K. watchdog had delayed its final order to block the deal. That allowed it to consider an EU decision to accept Microsoft's pledge to automatically license Activision games to cloud gaming platforms and a licensing deal between Microsoft and rival Sony,

maker of the PlayStation console. The CMA said Tuesday that it found those developments wouldn't have changed its original decision and imposed an order to block the deal. At the same time, it's considering the new Microsoft proposal, which "is substantially different from what was put on the table previously," said Sarah Cardell, CEO of the U.K. watch-

dog.
"This is not a green light," Cardell said. "We will carefully and objectively assess the details of the restructured deal and its impact on competition, including in light of third-party comments.

The regulator's decision to launch a new investigation instead of approving the deal was an unexpected move and raises the prospect of another lengthy review, said Alex Haffner, competition partner at U.K. law firm Fladgate.

"In reality, however, it is hard to believe Microsoft would have taken this new course without a high degree of confidence it will now in due course (finally) get a regulatory green light from the CMA," he said by email.

China fines US firm \$1.5m for 'unapproved' work

An American research firm has been fined \$1.5 million by China's government in a crackdown on information-gathering that has rattled foreign investors. Mintz Group was one of a series of foreign consultants that were raided starting in April after Chinese leader X Jinping's government announced expanded anti-spying rules that left companies unsure what they were allowed to do.

Mintz Group illegally engaged

in "foreign-related statistical investigation activities without obtaining approval," the Beijing Municipal Bureau of Statistics said in a notice dated July 14 on its website. It gave no details of the violation but said Mintz Group was fined 10.7 million yuan (\$1.5 million).

Mintz Group does background checks on employees and business partners and gathers other information for corporate clients.

Xi's government has tightened

the ruling Communist Party's control over the economy and society, including by launching data security crackdowns and expanding restrictions on what information can be moved

abroad.

That has shaken foreign companies at a time when Xi's government is trying to revive investor interest in China as part of efforts to reverse a deepening economic slump. (AP)

The test construct demonstrated Reliable's ability to execute vectoring, airspeed diverts, and fly under various simulated weather conditions in simulated Class B airspace.

Warnock, who helped invent PDF, co-founded Adobe Systems, dies at 82

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug 22, (AP): John Warnock, who helped invent the PDF and co-founded Adobe Systems, has died. He was 82.

The Silicon Valley entrepreneur and computer scientist died Saturday surrounded by family, Adobe said in a statement. The company didn't give a cause of death or say where Warnock died.

"John's brilliance and innovations left an indelible mark on Adobe, the technology industry and the world," Adobe said.

Warnock worked for Xerox before he and colleague Charles Geschke created a company around a rejected idea in 1982. Nearly a decade later, Warnock outlined an early version of the Portable Document Format, or PDF, transforming the way documents are exchanged.

Originally from the Salt Lake City suburb of Holladay, Warnock described himself as an average stu-

dent who later flourished in math-

He earned an undergraduate in math and doctorate in electrical engineering, or computer science, from the University of Utah and maintained close ties with his home state after he retired as CEO

Warnock was the son of a prominent local attorney but was an average student until a teacher at Olympus High School took an interest in him, he told the University of Utah's alumni magazine, Continuum, in

"I had an amazing teacher in high school who, essentially, completely turned me around," Warnock said. "He was really good at getting you to love mathematics, and that's when I got into it."

He continued to be a self-described "mediocre" student as he earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics and philosophy, but he made a mark while working on his master's degree.

Training

In 1964, he solved the Jacobson radical, an abstract algebra problem that had been a mystery since it was posed eight years before. The following year he met his wife, Marva Mullins, and married her five weeks

After a summer spent working at a tire shop, he decided the low-paying field of academia wasn't for him and applied to work at IBM, starting his training in computer science. He earned a doctorate at the University of Utah, where he joined a group of cutting-edge researchers working on a Department of Defensefunded precursor to the internet in the 1960s. Even then, Warnock was working on rendering images on computers.

In the late 1970s, Warnock moved to Palo Alto, California, to work for Xerox on interactive computer graphics. There, he met Geschke and went to work developing InterPress, a printing and graphics protocol that they were convinced would be the wave of the future. When Xerox balked, they decided to create their

They founded Adobe in 1982 and created PostScript, a program that helped make small-scale printing feasible for the first time. The company later created the PDF, which let people create electronic versions of documents that could be preserved and sent it to other users, who could search and review them.

own company.

With that, Adobe took off, and PDF eventually replaced many paper copies in legal, business and personal communication.

Other iconic programs, such as Adobe Illustrator and Photoshop, followed before Warnock stepped down as CEO in 2000. He and Geschke remained as co-chairs of the company's board of directors until 2017, and Warnock remained a board member until his death.

"John has been widely acknowledged as one of the greatest inventors in our generation with significant impact on how we communicate in words, images and videos," Adobe chair and CEO Shantanu Narayen said in an email to company employees.

After his retirement, Warnock and his wife devoted more time to hobbies such as collecting rare books, many of which he's scanned and put online at rarebookroom.org. They also collected Native American art, including moccasins, shirts, and beadwork that has toured the country in exhibitions.

Warnock is survived by his wife and their three children.

Social media algorithms 'warp' how people learn from each other: study

People's daily interactions with online algorithms affect how they learn from others, with negative consequences including social misperceptions, conflict and the spread of misinformation, my colleagues and I have

People are increasingly interacting with others in social media environments where algorithms control the flow of social information they see. Algorithms determine in part which messages, which people and which ideas social media users see.

On social media platforms, algorithms are mainly designed to amplify information that sustains engagement, meaning they keep people clicking on content and coming back to the platforms. I'm a social psychologist, and my colleagues and I have found evidence suggesting that a side effect of this design is that algorithms amplify information people are strongly biased to learn from. We call this information "PRIME," for prestigious, in-group, moral and emotional information.

In our evolutionary past, biases to learn from PRIME information were very advantageous: Learning from prestigious individuals is efficient because these people are successful and their behavior can be copied. Paying attention to people who violate moral norms is important because sanctioning them helps the community maintain

But what happens when PRIME information becomes amplified by algorithms and some people exploit algorithm amplification to promote themselves? Prestige becomes a poor signal of success because people can fake prestige on social media. Newsfeeds become oversaturated with negative and moral information so that there is conflict rather than cooperation.

The interaction of human psychology and algorithm amplification leads to dysfunction because social learning supports cooperation and problem-solving, but social media algorithms are designed to increase engagement.

We call this mismatch functional misalignment One of the key outcomes of functional misalignment to form incorrect perceptions of their social world. For example, recent research suggests that when algorithms selectively amplify more extreme political views, people begin to think that their political in-group and outgroup are more sharply divided than they really are. Such "false polarization" might be an important source of greater political conflict.

Functional misalignment can also lead to greater spread of misinformation. A recent study suggests that people who are spreading political misinformation leverage moral and emotional information - for example, posts that provoke moral outrage - in order to get people to share it more. When algorithms amplify moral and emotional information, misinformation gets included in the amplification.

In general, resea there are new studies emerging that examine key components of algorithm-mediated social learning. Some studies have demonstrated that social media algorithms clearly amplify PRIME information.

Whether this amplification leads to offline polarization is hotly contested at the moment. A recent experiment found evidence that Meta's newsfeed increases polarization, but another experiment that involved a collaboration with Meta found no evidence of polarization increasing due to exposure to their algorithmic Facebook

More research is needed to fully understand the outcomes that emerge when humans and algorithms interact in feedback loops of social learning. Social media companies have most of the needed data, and I believe that they should give academic researchers access to it while

also balancing ethical concerns such as privacy. A key question is what can be done to make algorithms foster accurate human social learning rather than exploit social learning biases. My research team is working on new algorithm designs that increase engagement while also penalizing PRIME information. We argue that this might maintain user activity that social media platforms seek, but also make people's social perceptions more accurate. (AP)

What to know about new digital rules

Europe's sweeping rules for tech giants about to kick in

LONDON, Aug 22, (AP): Google, Facebook, TikTok and other Big Tech companies operating in Europe are facing one of the most far-reaching efforts to clean up what people encounter online. The first phase of the European

Union's groundbreaking new digital rules will take effect this week. The Digital Services Act is part of a suite of tech-focused regulations crafted by the 27-nation bloc - long a global leader in cracking down on tech giants.

The DSA, which the biggest platforms must start following Friday, is designed to keep users safe online and stop the spread of harmful content that's either illegal or violates a platform's terms of service, such as promotion of genocide or anorexia. It also looks to protect Europeans' fundamental rights like privacy and free speech.

Some online platforms, which could face billions in fines if they don't comply, have already started making changes. Here's a look at what's happening this week:

So far, 19. They include eight social media platforms: Facebook, TikTok, Twitter, YouTube, Instagram, Linked-In, Pinterest and Snapchat.

There are five online marketplaces: Amazon, Booking.com, China's Alibaba AliExpress and Germany's Zalando. Mobile app stores Google Play and Apple's App Store are subject, as are Google's Search and Microsoft's Bing search engine.

Platforms

The EU's list is based on numbers submitted by the platforms. Those with 45 million or more users - or 10% of the EU's population - will face the DSA's highest level of regulation.

Brussels insiders, however, have pointed to some notable omissions from the EU's list, like eBay, Airbnb, Netflix and even PornHub. The list isn't definitive, and it's possible other platforms may be added later on.

Any business providing digital services to Europeans will eventually have to comply with the DSA. They will face fewer obligations than the biggest platforms, however, and have another six months before they must fall in line. Citing uncertainty over the new rules, Meta Platforms has held off launching its Twitter rival, Threads, in the EU.

Platforms have started rolling out new ways for European users to flag illegal online content and dodgy products, which companies will be obligated to take down quickly and objec-

Amazon opened a new channel for reporting suspected illegal products and is providing more information about third-party merchants.

TikTok gave users an "additional reporting option" for content, including advertising, that they believe is illegal. Categories such as hate speech and harassment, suicide and self-harm, misinformation or frauds and scams, will help them pinpoint the problem.

Then, a "new dedicated team of moderators and legal specialists" will determine whether flagged content either violates its policies or is unlawful and should be taken down, according to the app from Chinese parent company ByteDance.

TikTok says the reason for a takedown will explained to the person who posted the material and the one who flagged it, and decisions can be ap-

Canada PM slams Facebook for 'blocking' wildfire news

TORONTO, Aug 22, (AP): Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau on Monday accused Facebook of putting profits over people's safety during the emergencies created by Canada's record wildfire season.

Meta, the parent company of Facebook and Instagram, announced earlier this summer it would keep its promise to block news content from Canada on its platforms because of a new law that requires tech giants to pay publishers for linking to or other-

wise repurposing their content online. Fires raging in Canada have pushed tens of thousands of people from their homes and threatened cities such as Yellowknife, the capital of the Northwest Territories. About 30,000 people were under evacuation orders in British Columbia.

"Right now, in an emergency situation where up to date local information is more important than ever, Facebook is putting corporate profits ahead of people's safety," Trudeau said at a news conference in Cornwall on Prince Edward Island.

"It is so inconceivable that a company like Facebook is choosing to put corporate profits ahead of insuring that local news organizations can get up to date information to Canadians," the

pealed.

prime minister said. Government ministers called on Meta on Friday to lift its Canada news ban, which applies to local outlets as well as national media such as the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

Decision

The company, which is headquartered in Northern California, stood by its decision and said in a statement about the wildfires that people in Canada can continue to use Instagram and Facebook "to connect with their communities and access reputable information, including content from official government agencies, emergency services and non-governmental organizations."

The country's residents and visitors are not able to view or share news on the Meta-owned social networks, including news articles, videos and audio posted by outlets inside or outside of Canada.

Meta has not been alone in its action. Google's owner, Alphabet, also said it planned to remove Canadian news links in response to the new law, although it hasn't followed through yet. The Online News Act, passed in late June after lengthy debate, is set to take effect later this

TikTok users can turn off systems that recommend videos based on what a user has previously viewed. Such systems have been blamed for leading social media users to increasingly extreme posts. If personalized recommendations are turned off, TikTok's feeds will instead suggest videos to European users based on what's popular in their area and around the world.

The DSA prohibits targeting vulnerable categories of people, including children, with ads.

Snapchat said advertisers won't be able to use personalization and optimization tools for teens in the EU and U.K. Snapchat users who are 18 and older also would get more transparency and control over ads they see, including "details and insight" on why

they're shown specific ads. TikTok made similar changes, stopping users 13 to 17 from getting personalized ads "based on their activities on or off TikTok."

Zalando, a German online fashion retailer, has filed a legal challenge over its inclusion on the DSA's list of the largest online platforms, arguing that it's being treated unfairly.

Nevertheless, Zalando is launching content flagging systems for its website even though there's little risk of illegal material showing up among its highly curated collection of clothes, bags and shoes.

The company has supported the DSA, said Aurelie Caulier, Zalando's head of public affairs for the EU.

"It will bring loads of positive changes" for consumers, she said. But "generally, Zalando doesn't have systemic risk (that other platforms pose). So that's why we don't think we fit in that category." Amazon has filed a similar case with a top EU court.

Officials have warned tech companies that violations could bring fines worth up to 6% of their global revenue - which could amount to billions - or even a ban from the EU.



Explore ways to cover costs

Create a 'care plan' for older parents or yourself

A t some point, most older people will need help getting through the day. Someone turning 65 today has a 70% chance of eventually requiring assistance with basic living activities, such as bathing, dressing and using the toilet, according to the US Department of Health and Human Services.

That's the grim reality. Even grimmer is that Medicare typically doesn't pay for such help. Plus, families often don't try to figure out how to provide this care until there is a health crisis, which can lead to unnecessary stress, conflicts and escalating costs, says certified financial planner and physician Carolyn McClanahan of Life Planning Partners in Jacksonville, Florida.

Making a care plan well in advance allows families to get organized, locate appropriate resources and figure out ways to pay for care before a crisis hits.

"A care plan is thinking through the logistics of what you're going to need as you age, so that when the poop hits the fan with aging, then you are prepared," McClanahan says.

Deal with denial first

The biggest barrier can be our own wishful thinking, says Katy Butler, author of the books "The Art of Dying Well" and "Knocking on Heaven's Door." We want to picture a perfectly healthy life followed, if absolutely necessary, by a quick and painless death.

The reality may be quite different, and that can be awful to contemplate, Butler acknowledges.

One way to cope is to plan for temporary rather than permanent disability. For example, what kind of help might you or your loved one need after a hip or knee replacement? How well is the home set up for recovery? Who would help with household tasks? Contemplating a two- or three-month disability with an eventual return to health is less daunting, but involves much of the same planning as a more lasting decline, says Butler, who lives in Mill Valley, California.

"I think that really would help people visualize without terrifying them," Butler says.

Where you'll get care

Many people want to remain in their current homes as they age, something called "aging in place." That typically means relying on family members for care, or using paid workers, or both.

If family members will be tapped, discuss the logistics, including whether and how much they will be paid. If home health aides will be hired, consider who will supervise

the process.

Costs can mount quickly. Nationally, a full-time home health aide costs an average of \$5,148 a month, according to long-term care insurer Genworth. (You can use Genworth's cost of care calculator to estimate costs in your area.)

Explore ways to cover costs

Are there savings that can be tapped? Does the older person have long-term care insurance or can they get a reverse mortgage? Will other family members chip in? Does the older person qualify for government help, such as veterans benefits, Medicaid or state programs? Benefitscheckup.org, a site run by the nonprofit National Council on Aging, can help you search for resources that help people age in place. Families may want to consult an elder law attorney for personalized advice. (You can get a referral from the National Academy of Elder Law Attorneys at www. naela.org.)

Also consider whether the current home is "aging friendly," McClanahan says. An occupational therapist can suggest adaptations that could allow the older person to remain in the home if they're disabled. Some changes might be simple, such as removing throw rugs that could cause falls, while others - like widening doorways or constructing a walk-in shower - might be part of a larger remodel. The sooner you get this evaluation, the more time you will have to plan and pay for it, McClanahan says.

"I recommend everybody do this when they hit their 50s if they're planning on staying in their home," she says.

Consider the community

Even if the home supports aging in place, the neighborhood might not, Butler says. Consider how the older person will socialize, get groceries and make it to health appointments if they can no longer drive.

An independent living or senior living facility could provide more amenities, but these typically don't provide long-term care, Butler says. Is the older person OK with moving again later, or should they start with an assisted living or continuing care facility that can provide more help?

Once you have a plan, write down the details and consider sharing it with family members or other people who may be involved, McClanahan suggests. Revisit the document periodically as circumstances change.

"Aging planning is not a one and done thing. It's an ongoing process," she says. (AP)

Study uncovers patient behaviors leading to preventative care barriers

One in four American adults would rather not know they have cancer

WHIPPANY, N.J., Aug 22: A new study from The Harris Poll, commissioned by Bayer, suggests fear factors have an impact on diagnoses and preventative care – one in four American adults would rather not know they have cancer (27%) and nearly a third (31%) avoid doctor visits due to fear of what they might learn.

In addition to fear factors, many American adults site lack of knowledge about key physical health topics, demonstrating the need for greater education on disease risks:

- 49% are not knowledgeable about prostate cancer
- 49% didn't know that a man's race impacts his risk for prostate cancer
- 38% are not very knowledgeable about breast cancer

■ 48% were unaware that breast density impacts cancer risk/diagnosis

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Trump's debate decision tests Fox News ability to pivot again

NEW YORK, Aug 22, (AP): If 2023 has taught anything to the people

running Fox News, it's the importance of being able to pivot. The decision by former President Donald Trump to skip Wednesday's first debate of the 2024 presidential primary season likely deprives Fox of a huge late-summer audience. Even worse for the network, Trump has talked of appearing in an online interview with former Fox star Tucker Carlson at the same time.

Trump's announcement on Sunday wasn't necessarily a surprise. Fox debate moderators Bret Baier and Martha MacCallum had been preparing for two events - one if he were there and one if he wasn't.

Several Fox personalities this summer publicly urged Trump to attend the event, and Fox executives privately made the same argument to the former president. His former press secretary, Kayleigh McEnany, called Trump's decision a "huge political miscalculation" Monday Despite Trump's lead over other Republicans in polls, MacCallum

cautioned potential viewers against dismissing a debate without him as a junior varsity event. She cited a recent poll by The New York Times and Siena College, taken July 23-27, that showed nearly half of Trump backers in Iowa said they were open to other candidates.

"I don't think as members of the media or people who watch politics it's our place to say, 'Oh, this is over, these people aren't going to be the nominee," she said. "It's way too soon to say that."

Trump's first appearance in a GOP primary debate brought 24 million viewers to Fox in 2015. It would be next to impossible to reach those numbers again, given his novelty has worn off and cord-cutting has diminished cable news audiences. Yet when only 12.5 million watched a January 2016 Fox debate that Trump skipped, that gave an indication of his drawing power.

This summer's debate has been anticipated as a beacon for Fox News, which endured months of embarrassing headlines earlier this year related to Dominion Voting Systems' defamation lawsuit for the network's coverage of bogus claims by Trump after the 2020 election.

Impact

As the trial was about to start, Fox agreed to pay \$787.5 million to Dominion in a settlement.

The lawsuit had little discernible impact on Fox's viewers, but when Fox fired Carlson with no explanation a week later, those fans hit back hard. The network never publicly explained why Carlson was fired, although his appearance in court papers released with the Dominion case led to several public theories being advanced.

As it has in the past, Fox relied on its bench in establishing a new lineup that debuted in July, giving prime time shows to Jesse Watters and Greg Gutfeld, popular panelists on "The Five." Their shows sandwich Sean Hannity on the schedule, offering a continuation of biting conservative commentary.

Fox's prime-time audience averaged 2.5 million this year through Carlson's firing, and 1.6 million for the nearly two months before the new lineup premiered. Its prime-time audience has since rebounded to 2.2 million, according to the Nielsen company.

"There has been a sense of stabilization with the new lineup," said Steve Krakauer, publisher of the "Fourth Watch" newsletter and author of "Uncovered: How the Media Got Cozy with Power, Abandoned its

Principles and Lost the People. How much Trump's four criminal indictments will be discussed on-

stage in Milwaukee is an open question, in part dependent upon what his opponents want to talk about.

Even without Trump's participation on Wednesday, "he will be on the stage even if he's not on the stage," Baier said in an interview.

The Siena College-Times survey suggests that it wouldn't be a popular topic among regular Fox viewers. The poll found 78% of people who regularly get news from Fox said Trump has not committed any serious federal crimes, and that 80% said that the GOP should stand behind Trump in the cases.

Krakauer said Fox would hardly be unique among the media in wanting to give its audience what it wants, and suggested there may be some "indictment fatigue" among the audience.

Even a debate that avoids the indictments as a major topic would

ins during a rehearsal on the set of "Rust" on Oct. 21, 2021. An attorney for Gutierrez-Reed has described the fatal shooting as a tragic accident and says the film's armorer committed no crime. Gutierrez-Reed is currently the sole criminal defendant.

Prosecutors are weighing whether to refile a charge against Baldwin after receiving a new analysis of the gun fired at Hutchins. Special prosecutors dismissed an involuntary manslaughter charge against Baldwin in April, saying they were informed the gun might have been modified before the shooting and malfunctioned.

Baldwin has said he pulled back the hammer — but not the trigger — and the gun fired fatally wounding Hutchins and injuring director Joel Souza.

In March, "Rust" assistant director and safety coordinator David Halls pleaded no contest to a conviction for unsafe handling of a firearm and received a suspended sentence of six months of probation. He agreed to cooperate in the investigation of the shooting.

Defense attorneys said they plan to present evidence that Gutierrez-Reed asked Halls to call her back into rehearsal if Baldwin planned to use the gun. They say that didn't happen before Hutchins was shot.

The filming of "Rust" resumed this year in Montana. under an agreement with the cinematographer's widower, Matthew Hutchins, that made

LOS ANGELES, Aug 22, (AP): Hours before doors would open, thousands of K-pop fans lined up in downtown Los Angeles, stretching long city blocks in the warm August sun. In pleated skirts and platform shoes, toting the clear bags that have become arena staples, they danced and traded homemade stickers, banners, bracelets and photocards. Inside was their paradise: an IRL space to commune over their URL passions.

If anything, the 2023 LA KCON was a microcosm of K-pop's macro influence on the music industry as

Held from Friday to Sunday at the Los Angeles Convention Center and adjacent Crypto.com Arena, an estimated 140,000 fans from all over the world celebrated their favorite K-pop idols across three days of panels. premium meet-and-greets, interviews, dance breaks, concerts, and more.

Inside the convention center, fans carried lightsticks of their favorite groups, showed off DIY shirts with simple, direct slogans like "I HEART MINGI", collected sticker books and K-beauty products, and lined up for tteokbokki.

KCON started 11 years ago in Irvine, California, drawing 10,000 people to its inaugural celebration of Korean culture, says Steve Chung, chief global officer of organizers CJ ENM. Now it's a global event, taking place in multiple countries: So far in 2023, KCON has hit Thailand, Japan and the US.

"We've welcomed something like half a million people in those (11) years all throughout the world," he savs.

In Los Angeles, panels were held on K-pop songwriting and cup sleeve creations (K-pop fan events are held at cafes on an idol's birthday, anniversary, or some other special date). Up-and-coming groups like NMIXX led dance classes on one stage, while another stage allowed rookie groups to introduce themselves to a wider audience.

Over the course of the weekend, The Associated Press spoke to an incredible diversity of fans who, among them, drove 12 hours straight from Utah, flew in from the UK and South America and represented a range of ages, genders, races, and socioeconomic backgrounds.

"The culture of inclusiveness is huge," said 40-year-old Annya Holston from Florida who got into K-pop through

her daughter. "We've made so many friends, being here." At \$500 a day, premium tickets allowed attendees to access a "Red Carpet" area, where acts posed for portraits and answered two or three questions in a 30-minute window - along with entry to the convention and concert. For an additional \$100, fans could pay for "Hi-Touch" - a quick meet-and-greet where fans and performers high-five - with one group of their choice. With renewed concerns about the spread of COVID-19, "Hi-Touch" became "Hi-Wave" (exactly what it sounds like, to the chagrin of a few fans hoping for that physical connection; others were

happy with the sheer proximity). Those experiences served as a welcome reminder of a facet of the music industry that K-pop knows remark-ably well, and far better than most: fandom is this business' most lucrative and enduring resource.

As Peyton Tran, a 17-year-old L.A. native and dancer told AP at KCON, "It's just cool to see how much people can support these businesses out here.'

In 2023, the music industry faces unique challenges, including what Mark Mulligan, a MIDiA Research music industry analyst, has referred to as the "fragmentation of fandom." New artists suffer a kind of competition unheard of before the streaming age, a direct effect of algorithmic listening. Think of it this way: It is rare for a new act to reach the level of monolithic pop star - the ranks of Taylor Swift, Beyoncé, Harry Styles, all who started performing pre-streaming - because listen-

ership is hyper-specific. In K-pop, where companies are typically fully integrated institutions - a record label and a talent agency all in one - and hyper-consumerism is welcomed, business focuses on building a community of superfans and inspiring those loyal listeners to advocate for their group, fueling a sense of participation beyond their purchasing power. It doesn't hurt that K-pop audiences have a tendency to coordinate global fan actions on their own and create rituals and events, communicating on bespoke fandom platforms like WeVerse and Vlive.

Niche doesn't mean small; it means specialized. KCON is proof.

At the concerts, held all three nights for the first time,

fans witnessed K-pop groups and soloists from across 'generations": Taemin from the second-generation boy band SHINee,

Rain - the first K-pop idol to take off internationally, and now a manager himself - fourth-generation boy bands ATEEZ and Stray Kids, and rookie groups like XG and ZEROBASEONE.

XG performed songs like the Kesha -channeling "TGIF," with production pulling heavily from the current liquid drum-and-bass/UK garage trend in global pop music, a welcomed retro-futuristic sound from a group and convention with eyes set on the future.

Notably, these concerts placed a lot of emphasis on K-pop girl groups, reflecting a recent trend in listener-ship. Historically, boy bands were thought to be more lucrative - but girl groups like IVE, ITZY, NMIXX, Kepler, (G)I-DLE, and EVERGLOW proved that's vintage thinking in their explosive KCON sets.

A particularly unique and effective moment during the concert was called the "Dream Stage," where a few dozen fans who auditioned to perform a dance with a K-pop group earlier in the day were brought out to do exactly that.

On the second day of the convention, iHeartRadio's KIIS-FM set up a new, open-to-the-public "K-pop Village," where the K-pop-curious could experience free performances from newer acts - like LEO, who made his U.S. debut on the outdoor stage.

"2023 is like a crossover event. The last 10 years has been about sort of serving the endemic fanbase of people who already know K-pop and who love K-pop,' Chung says. "As evidenced by the iHeartMedia partnership, it's really like a crossover moment where K-pop goes mainstream."

On the last day of the convention, not even Tropical Storm Hilary could stop the most devoted fans from lining up in the rain to see their favorite acts. On the train the night before, the AP asked a K-pop fan from Massachusetts, who publishes fan cam videos on YouTube under the name Toadcola, if he was worried about the weather. Not so much.

But, if the weather canceled his flight home, he thought that wouldn't be so bad: maybe, just maybe, the idols would be stuck at the airport with him.

'Epoch' nostalgic

Troubadours back with resilience and gratitude

Turnpike Troubadours, "A Cat in the Rain" (Bossier City Records/Thirty Tigers)

When a band steps aside just as it appears to be peaking, it sets itself up for a unique challenge.

That's what the Turnpike Troubadours did a few years ago, taking a hiatus to deal with personal challenges of the their first five allowers had turned them. lenges after their first five albums had turned them from an Oklahoma roadhouse band into a phenom-

But the Troubadours are back with "A Cat in the Rain," their first new album since 2017. And they've returned with the kind of ferocity that feels destined to put them right back on that long-term upward tra-

> The album combines the Troubadours' signature blend of country and rock - the tight sound built around the plaintive singing and vulnerable lyrics of front-man Evan Felker — with a new message of resilience and gratitude. The fresh material will only endear them to their extremely devoted fans, and it's compelling enough to introduce a really good band to



newcomers. On "Brought Me," a Felker composition, he spells out how happy the band is to be back.

"Oh now, still beats steady, this heart I handed you for free/Should you ever need a thing, it won't be hard to find me/Standing at the ready, with a dance or two still left in me/Wager that it won't appear that I forgot who brought me.

The earnestness is palpable. The band's bass player, R.C. Edwards, says it's a love song to Felker's wife. Felker himself describes it as a message to fans who stuck with the band through difficult times, including his own fight for sobriety. It's probably both.

But stick with them they did. The Troubadours have been touring to sold-out shows, adding dates to meet demand and bonding warmly with concert halls full of people who know every word to every song and sing them right back at the band.

That's quite an achievement for a group that always conveyed a sense that its default venue should be a country dance hall with beer-soaked, bootscuffed wood flooring. It's a tribute to a red-dirt sound that was always too smart, maybe even too heartfelt to fit in neatly with some of the metricstested country emerging inauthentically from Nash-

More than anything, though, it's a sign that the Troubadours haven't lost a step in their time away. They're back with more of the sound that won over all those people in the first place — resilient, weathered by life's difficulties and, ultimately, still on the

"Epoch," DeYarmond Edison (Jagjaguwar Re-

cords Before **Justin Vernon** burrowed in the woods to

make the music that became the Grammy-winning Bon Iver, he had an indie folk band with his childhood buddies that changed their lives forever. DeYarmond Edison, a moniker taken from Ver-

non's actual middle names, lasted a mere two years. It evolved from the high school act Vernon played with brothers Brad Cook and Phil Cook in Eau Claire, Wisconsin. The split came suddenly in 2006 in Raleigh, North Carolina, when the quartet — then including **Joe Westerlund** — reached a creative im-

But the band's spirit lives on in "Epoch," a five-LP, 83-song compilation out Friday that includes previously unreleased tracks, live recordings, and other epilogues to the two studio albums by **DeYar**mond Edison. Hints of Counting Crows, Sufjan Stevens and even Lead Belly are tucked in a wideranging release, which spans teenage battle-of-thebands nostalgia to gospel to blues.

The boxed set is packaged with a 60,000word mini-book by music writer and friend of the band Grayson Haver Currin. It details the impulsive move these innocent Midwesterners made to stretch themselves in the South - and their wistful post-breakup reflections. The Cooks and Westerlund stayed in North Carolina to form Megafaun, eventually graduating to other ventures. An ailing Vernon felt the pull of home and famously wintered in a family cabin to heal and carve out his own path and sound.

Currin's eloquent report is required reading to fully appreciate this wandering collection of comingof-age tunes that carry many of Bon Iver's genes. Without it, the albums could overwhelm a casual

There are 20 songs from an art gallery residency the band played in North Carolina. "A Satisfied Mind" features Vernon's first use of his now-familiar falsetto at Brad Cook's suggestion. In a subset of Vernon's solo recordings, "hazelton" starts with a cascading guitar that birthed the 2011 hit "Holocene."

The 83rd track, "Set Me Free," sounds like a nineminute elegy to the band, except it was recorded in its infancy. In the lyrics, "I've been dragging my feet in the sand / They've been bleeding all over this land," it sounds as if the band knew what had to happen to set everyone free.

De Tommaso reflects on his 'star is born' moment

UK sensation makes US opera debut

SANTA FE, N.M., Aug 22, (AP): "British Tenor Saves Night at Opera," proclaimed the Daily Mail.

The opera was Puccini's "Tosca," and the tenor was then-28-year-old Freddie de Tommaso, jumping in at London's Royal Opera House when the scheduled singer withdrew after Act 1 because of illness.

That was nearly two years ago. Now de Tommaso has just made his US debut at the Santa Fe Opera in the same role, appearing to enthusiastic applause on Aug. 12, five days after a bout of laryngitis forced him to cancel his first performance. His final performance is Saturday.

And he'll return in the 2024-25 season for another debut, this time at the Metropolitan Opera, where he'll again be Tosca's lover, Mario Cavaradossi.

In an interview at the opera house here, de Tommaso reflected on his career so far and the "star is born" moment in London that first brought him

"So many people thought I was like an understudy or somebody they found walking down the street whistling 'Tosca,' and that wasn't the case," he recalled. In fact, he had been part of the second cast and was already scheduled to perform the role three nights later.

"But it was incredibly exciting," he said, his animated tone reflecting his exuberant personality. "From the moment I put my costume on until I took my bow two hours later, it felt like about 90 seconds.3

De Tommaso's exposure to opera began while he was growing up in Tunbridge Wells, where he sang in his school choir. His mother took him to performances and his Italian-born father, who ran a restaurant, serenaded diners with Luciano Pavarotti record-

Once he decided to study singing seriously, he applied to the Royal Academy of Music. Mark Wildman, who became his teacher, remembers hearing him audition.

"My first impression of his voice was that it was a robust but roughhewn diamond of a baritone voice with a surprisingly easy top for one so young," Wildman said. "He looked like a singer: big broad shoulders, barrel-chested, together with a very strong physique and a voice that matched."

"So I kind of made a trifle of singers," de Tommaso said, a joking reference to the traditional English dessert in which a chef embellishes sponge cake with whatever ingredients he likes, from fruit to jelly to custard to

De Tommaso's breakthrough came at age 23 when - on a lark, to hear him tell it - he entered the 2018 Tenor Viñas International Singing Competition in Barcelona. He ended up winning three awards- the first prize, the Verdi Prize and the Domingo Prize.

The response was immediate. "It was mental, actually," de Tommaso said. "I remember afterwards being in the hotel in Spain and getting all these emails and Facebook messages from agents. Who are these people, I thought naively."

Among those listening in Barcelona was Peter Katona, casting director for the Royal Opera.

"I was quite startled when I heard him," Katona said. "It was immediately clear that he was above everybody else in terms of vocal quality. Often with young singers, there's something that is not quite there. With him, you could just lean back and enjoy his sing-

Now at 30, he's in demand at all the

major European houses. "It's almost a little frightening that everything has been going so well for him," Katona said. "With such a special talent one is always wary that he can pick the wrong role, overstretch.

in "maybe five to 10 years." But sparingly. "These little bits of flesh, they can only take so much punishment for so long," he said pointing to his vocal cords. "And if you're singing the most dramatic parts like Otello, you can't keep it up forever. I would quite like to sing until I'm 55 or 60."

With all the pressures of a blooming international career, de Tommaso still marvels at the opportunities coming his way.

"What a job I have!" he said. "Just going around the world to places like Santa Fe, one of the most beautiful places I've ever been." He rattled off the list of other spots where he's performed this summer: Verona, Italy; Verbier, Switzerland; Peralada, Spain.

In Santa Fe, de Tommaso has been spending much of his time between rehearsals and performances playing

"I'm not very good, but the reason I like it is my life is so hectic, and when you play golf you can't think about anything else but hitting that ball," he said. "Everything else takes a back seat just for the three hours."

With such a crowded schedule, de Tommaso said his manager has to remind him that he needs to take the occasional vacation. "After five or six days I get itchy feet," he said.

'Shark bite victim had 5 ops': The 65-year-old woman who was bitten by a shark at a New York City beach has undergone five surgeries since the attack and will require more, her daughter said in a

Tatyana Koltunyuk's recovery from the Aug 7 shark bite will also take years of physical therapy and close medical monitoring, daughter Darya Koltunyuk

"Though the full impact of her injury is not yet known, it has left her with a permanent disability," Darya Koltunyuk said in an online statement posted on Go-FundMe to raise money for her mother's medical care.

Tatyana Koltunyuk was swimming off Rockaway Beach when a shark bit into her left leg, leaving a wound several inches wide and deep. Lifeguards pulled Koltunyuk from the water and applied a tourniquet to her leg. She was taken to a hospital in critical condition.

Darya Koltunyuk, a pianist and the outreach manager at Princeton University Concerts, said her mother will remain hospitalized for at least several more

Tatyana Koltunyuk emigrated to the United States from Ukraine with her husband and then 3-year-old daughter in the 1990s. Koltunyuk's husband died of a heart attack a few weeks after the family arrived, their daughter said.

Tatyana Koltunyuk worked tirelessly to support her daughter on her own and had hoped to enjoy her retirement, her daughter said.

"She talked about swimming in the ocean every day, walking around the city with a new puppy, and traveling with us, Darya Koltunyuk said, referring to herself and her husband, Gregg Kallor, a composer and pianist. "My husband and I will do everything

Dead stars help measure gravitational waves

A symphony of ripples in spacetime

An international team of astronomers has detected a faint signal of gravitational waves reverberating through the universe. By using dead stars as a giant network of gravitational wave detectors, the collaboration - called NANOGrav - was able to measure a low-frequency hum from a chorus of ripples of spacetime.

I'm an astronomer who studies and has written about cosmology, black holes and exoplanets. I've researched the evolution of supermassive black holes using the Hubble Space tel-

Though members of the team behind this new discovery aren't yet certain, they strongly suspect that the background hum of gravitational waves they measured was caused by countless ancient merging events of supermassive black holes. Gravitational waves are ripples in

spacetime caused by massive accelerating objects. Albert Einstein predicted their existence in his general theory of relativity, in which he hypothesized that when a gravitational wave passes through space, it makes the space shrink then expand periodically. Researchers first detected direct evi-

dence of gravitational waves in 2015, when the Laser Interferometer Gravitational-Wave Observatory, known as LIGO, picked up a signal from a pair of merging black holes that had traveled 1.3 billion light-years to reach Earth. The NANOGrav collaboration is also trying to detect spacetime ripples,

but on an interstellar scale. The team

used pulsars, rapidly spinning dead

stars that emit a beam of radio emissions. Pulsars are functionally similar to a lighthouse - as they spin, their beams can sweep across the Earth at regular intervals. The NANOGrav team used pulsars that rotate incredibly fast - up to 1,000 times per second - and these pulses can be timed like the ticking of an extremely accurate cosmic clock. As gravitational waves sweep past a pul-

sar at the speed of light, the waves will

very slightly expand and contract the

distance between the pulsar and the

Pulsars are such accurate clocks that it is possible to measure their ticking with an accuracy to within 100 nano-

Earth, ever so slightly changing the

seconds. That lets astronomers calculate the distance between a pulsar and Earth to within 100 feet (30 meters). Gravitational waves change the distance between these pulsars and Earth by tens of miles, making pulsars easily sensitive enough to detect this effect. The first thing the NANOGrav team

had to do was control for the noise in its cosmic gravitational wave detector. This included noise in the radio receivers it used and subtle astrophysics that affect the behavior of pulsars. Even accounting for these effects, the team's approach was not sensitive enough to detect gravitational waves from individual supermassive black hole binaries. However, it had enough sensitivity to detect the sum of all the massive black hole mergers that have occurred anywhere in the universe since the Big Bang - as many as a million overlapping signals.

Detect

In a musical analogy, it is like standing in a busy downtown and hearing the faint sound of a symphony somewhere in the distance. You can't pick out a single instrument because of the noise of the cars and the people around you, but you can hear the hum of a hundred instruments. The team had to tease out the signature of this gravitational wave "background" from other competing signals.

The team was able to detect this symphony by measuring a network of 67 different pulsars for 15 years. If some disruption in the ticking of one pulsar was due to gravitational waves from the distant universe, all the pulsars the team was watching would be affected in a similar way. On June 28, 2023, the team published four papers describing its project and the evidence it found of the gravitational wave background.

The hum the NANOGrav collaboration found is produced from the merging of black holes that are billions of times more massive than the Sun. These black holes spin around one another very slowly and produce gravitational waves with frequencies of one-billionth of a hertz. That means

the spacetime ripples have an oscillation every few decades. This slow oscillation of the wave is the reason the team needed to rely on the incredibly accurate timekeeping of pulsars.

These gravitational waves are different from the waves LIGO can detect. LIGO's signals are produced when two black holes 10 to 100 times the mass of the Sun merge into one rapidly spinning object, creating gravitational waves that oscillate hundreds of times per second.

If you think of black holes as a tuning fork, the smaller the event, the faster the tuning fork vibrates and the higher the pitch. LIGO detects gravitational waves that "ring" in the audible range. The black hole mergers the NA-NOGrav team has found "ring" with a frequency billions of times too low to

Astronomers have long been interested in studying how stars and galaxies first emerged in the aftermath of the Big Bang. This new finding from the NANOGrav team is like adding another color - gravitational waves - to the picture of the early universe that is just starting to emerge, in large part thanks to the James Webb Space Telescope.

A major scientific goal of the James Webb Space Telescope is to help researchers study how the first stars and galaxies formed after the Big Bang. To do this, James Webb was designed to detect the faint light from incredibly distant stars and galaxies. The farther away an object is, the longer it takes the light to get to Earth, so James Webb is effectively a time machine that can peer back over 13.5 billion years to see light from the first stars and galaxies in the universe.

It has been very successful in the quest, having found hundreds of galaxies that flooded the universe with light in the first 700 million years after the big bang. The telescope has also detected the oldest black hole in the universe, located at the center of a galaxy that formed just 500 million years after the Big Bang.

These findings are challenging existing theories of the evolution of the

It takes a long time to grow a massive galaxy. Astronomers know that supermassive black holes lie at the center of every galaxy and have mass proportional to their host galaxies. (AP)

Famously host to a statue of mammoths succumbing to the tar, the La Brea Tar Pits are an ice age fossil site in the middle of Los Angeles. They contain species that represent the last 50,000 years of Southern California life. Still today, the pit attracts and inadvertently immobilizes mammals, birds and insects like "flies on flypaper," according to Bird Center's statement on the incident

Bird Rescue's Director of Operations Julie Skoglund said the combination of the oil's elements and the birds' extreme stress were the leading causes in their deaths. The tar can burn the animals' skin, restrict their movement and put them at risk of suffocation. (AP)







In basketball-crazed Philippines, WCup will be a shining moment

MANILA, Philippines, Aug 22, (AP): Considering that about 110 million people live in the Philippines, it's not feasible to expect that they all would be basketball fans.

"But it's close," said Tim Cone, the country's top professional coach. And that might not be an understate-

ment, either. Basketball's World Cup Tournament, spread out over three nations - the Philippines, Japan and Indonesia. It'll be centered in Manila, where the medal rounds will be held in early September, where the favored U.S. team will play all its games in the event and where fans have been waiting for years for this chance at seeing some of the game's

biggest names competing in their city. "It's so for big players to come here, unlike China. Everyone comes there, said Inigo Herrera, 25, who works in sales for his family's Manila business. "For us, it's like a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. If this is your first time in the Philippines and you go around, you will see kids playing basketball everywhere.

Everywhere. The Americans arrived on Tuesday morning (Monday night EDT) in Manila. They were greeted by local and tournament officials at the airport, had fans on motorcycles waving at the motorcade as their buses drove away, and were greeted at their hotel by more fans.

Herrera was among those who stood in the lobby for just a glimpse of the Americans.

"I have goosebumps right now," another of Herrera's friends, RJ Tan, said as he held an Anthony Edwards jersey. And yes, he did have goosebumps, even several minutes after the Americans walked past him to get to the elevators leading to their rooms after about 10

hours of flying from Abu Dhabi. The home nation - which has declared Friday a national holiday of sorts, closing schools and some businesses to mark the occasion - is in the World Cup and has its sights on history. While there is little chance of a magical run by the Philippines to win the tournament, there is an effort to get at least 32,617 fans to the Philippines' first game in the tournament and break the World Cup attendance record set at Toronto in 1994 when the U.S. rolled past Russia in the gold-medal game.

"I had the good fortune of visiting Manila in 1996," USA Basketball men's national team managing director Grant Hill said. "The love for the game there is absolutely incredible.'

FIBA secretary general Andreas Zagklis was asked last week about the excitement level that the Philippines has shown for the World Cup. His response: "You have not seen

anything yet."

Basketball is a passion in the Philippines. There are about 25,000 indoor courts in the country, countless outdoor courts - they're everywhere, with rims even fashioned out of barbed wire in some places. Data collected by the NBA shows that the league's online store can send deliveries to 215 cities and provinces in the Philippines; there isn't one place on that list where the league hasn't

official merchandise.

"It is the No. 1 sport in the country and you can't definitively say that about basketball in the United States or anywhere else," said Miami Heat coach Erik Spoelstra, an assistant coach on the U.S. team this summer and a national hero in the Philippines - his mother is Filipina. "There's such great passion for the sport. I've flown into Manila with my staff and some of my friends, and on the ride from the airport, anywhere you look you can see groups of kids playing on a makeshift basket on a telephone pole, on the side of a building, in 3 feet

"It's a powerful visual of seeing what you would think would be extreme poverty, which it is, and the juxtaposition of seeing great joyfulness of people coming together and playing basketball in a way that doesn't exist anyplace else.

Legend says that American teachers

brought basketball to the Philippines for the first time around the turn of the 20th century, and it immediately took off. Unlike other parts of Asia, where baseball or soccer can reign supreme, basketball stands alone in the Philippines. Its only real challenger in recent years has been boxing, simply because of Manny Pacquiao - who won 12 world championships in eight weight divisions. Pacquiao's popularity is such that he even served 12 years in politics in his homeland.

But the basketball bug even found him: The 5-foot-5 Pacquiao has played and coached in the Philippines Basketball Association, the nation's top pro

"People are raised on basketball from the age of 2 and 3 years old," said Cone, whose teams have won more than two dozen league titles in the Philippines 'All they do is play one sport and it's played throughout the year. We have three seasons: rainy season, wet season and basketball season, and we play basketball through it all. That's the passion. We always say we have three things in the Philippines: sport, basketball and

Unlike politics, basketball seems to be the thing that everyone can agree on. The NBA has been airing games there for nearly a half-century, and staged one of its first ever international exhibition games in the Philippines - sending the then-Washington Bullets over to play a

team of Philippine All-Stars. If New York's heartbeat of outdoor basketball is Rucker Park, then Manila's is Tenement Court - located in the courtyard between several tenement



chez said later Tuesday. "And the apologies offered by Mr. Rubiales are not sufficient, I would call them inappropriate, so he must continue taking further steps to clarify what we all saw.

The country's leading opposition party has joined in denouncing Rubiales' behavior, leaving him without any support from major public or political figures.

Asked if Rubiales should go, Sánchez said that it was not his call to make because the Spanish Soccer federation is not controlled by the government. But Sánchez did say Rubiales "has yet to be clear and compelling in his apologies.'

Coco Gauff's improved play makes her serious contender at US Open

WASHINGTON, Aug 22, (AP): After losing in the first round at Wimbledon last month, Coco Gauff holed up at her London hotel to be alone and think

About what happened at the All England Club. About how she felt. About what she wanted to do to avoid that sort of result at the next Grand Slam tournament, the U.S. Open, which starts Monday in New York.

"I didn't leave the room for two days. I like literally didn't. I got my food ordered to the room," Gauff said in an interview with The Associated Press. "I realize: Those two days were necessary, because I got time to reflect and just allow myself to be sad. A lot of times on tour, we don't have time to allow ourselves to be sad, so then those emotions build up into the next match. And I think that those two days, honestly, probably helped me. I really completely changed my mentality.

That wasn't all she changed, and just look at Gauff now: Ranked No. 6, the 19-year-old from Florida must be counted among the leading contenders at Flushing Meadows for the sort of trophy she has set her sights on, and appeared destined to hold, for quite some time.

"Obviously the goal is to win a Slam," said Gauff, the runner-up to Iga Swiatek at last year's French Open, "but I'm not going to be (thinking), 'OK, well, I'm supposed to be the U.S. Open champion.' That's not the mindset that I have. And when people put that on me, I have no choice but to accept it and just know that it comes from the heart."

With a new coaching arrangement, reworked footwork on her forehand and a commitment to aggression early in points, Gauff is playing as well as anyone. She has won 11 of 12 matches and her two biggest titles - in Washington and Cincinnati, both on hard courts - since that defeat against 2020 Australian Open champion Sofia Kenin at Wimbledon. One of the recent victories came over 2022 U.S. Open champion Swiatek, who claimed all 14 previous sets they played.

"Wimbledon was tough for all of us to digest," said Pere Riba, Gauff's full-time coach since last month, alongside temporary consultant Brad Gilbert. "But we talked about things she can improve. And Coco was open to that.'

It was at Wimbledon in 2019 that Gauff became someone everyone noticed. Just 15, she was the youngest qualifier in tournament history, then beat Venus Williams while reaching the main event's fourth round.

The next two majors were also big deals: Gauff got to the third round at the U.S. Open before losing to defending champion Naomi Osaka, then eliminated Osaka - again the reigning champ - at the 2020 Australian Open.
