'Kuwait, Arab, Muslim nations lose wise leader'

KUWAIT CITY, Dec 17, (KUNA): The grieving people of Kuwait on Sunday paid tribute to the late Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah as regular life came to a standstill throughout the country and traffic that usually jam the roads at start of the weeks turned quite thin.

As Kuwait was predominated with an air of sorrow and sadness with shutdown of businesses, schools and government facilities, the newlyannounced Amir, His Highness Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, took part in prayers for the deceased at Bilal bin Rabah Mosque in Al-Siddeeq district, accompanied by sheikhs and senior officials.

Upon their departure from the mosque with uniformed elite personnel carrying the coffin, wrapped in the green-black-white-red Kuwait Flag, the freshly-proclaimed new Amir, His Highness Sheikh Mishal, was visibly quite sad while sitting in his vehicle, while the coffin was laid in a large darkcolored Amiri Diwan vehicle, as the motorcade proceeded to the cemetery.

A number of sheikhs took part in the actual burial, looked upon by a throng of tearful mourners, deeply saddened along with many Kuwaiti citizens and non-Kuwaiti peoples here and abroad, watching the sorrowful event live on television.

Kuwait has declared shutdown of businesses and facilities for three days and 40 days mourning for demise of Sheikh Nawaf, as the audio-vidoe media stopped regular programs, broadcasting Quranic verses round the clock.

Yesterday, after the sorrowful announcement of Sheikh Nawaf's death, Sheikh Mishal (the Crown Prince), was proclaimed the new Amir of the State of Kuwait -- the 17th ruler of the North Gulf country.



Russia ruling party backs Putin's 'bid' for reelection

MOSCOW, Dec 17, (AP): Delegates from Russia's ruling party unanimously backed President **Vladimir** Putin's bid for reelection at a party conference in Moscow on Sunday, state agencies reported, just a day after the Kremlin leader's supporters formally nominated him to run in the 2024 presidential election as an independent.

A little-known Russian presidential hopeful who calls for peace in Ukraine also inched closer towards formally registering as a candidate, securing a nomination from a group of more than 500 supporters in the Russian capital.

Dmitry Medvedev, United Russia's chairman and a former Russian president and prime minister, called on fellow party members to "mobilize all activists and supporters" in support of Putin before the vote, scheduled for March 15-17, according to reports by Russian

state agencies



In a speech at the conference, Medvedev referred to Putin as "our candidate," and asserted that his reelection for a fifth term as head of state 'should be absolutely logical, legitimate and absolutely indisputable." We must mobilize all ac-

tivists, all supporters in order to prevent any disruptions during the election campaign, stop any attempts to influence the course of the campaign from the outside, arrange

provocations, disseminate false, harmful information or violate public order," Medvedev said.

Russia, Ukraine exchange attacks: Russia and Ukraine launched over a dozen drones at each other's territory for a second straight day Sunday, one of which apparently targeted a Russian military airport.

At least 35 Ukrainian drones were shot down overnight over three regions in southwestern Russia, the Russian Defense Ministry said in a post on the messaging app Telegram.

A Russian air base hosting bomber aircraft used in the war in Ukraine was among the targets, according to a Russian Telegram channel critical of the Kremlin. The channel posted short videos of drones flying over low-rise housing in what it claimed was the Russian town of Morozovsk, whose air base is home to Russia's 559th Bomber Aviation Regiment.

Vasily Golubev, the governor of Russia's Rostov province, separately reported "mass drone strikes" near Morozovsk and another town farther west, but did not mention the air base. Golubev said most the drones were shot down and and there were no casualties. He did not comment on damage. (AP)

Pope Francis turned 87: Pope Francis turned 87 on Sunday, closing out a year that saw big milestones in his efforts to reform the Catholic Church as well as health scares that raise questions about his future as pope. Francis celebrated his birthday with cake during a festive audience with children Sunday morning, and there were "Happy Birthday" banners in St. Peter's

Square during his weekly noon blessing. One early present came Saturday, when a Vatican tribunal handed down a mix of guilty verdicts and acquittals in a complicated trial that Francis had supported as evidence of his financial reforms. The biggest-name defendant, Cardinal Angelo Becciu, was convicted of embezzlement and sentenced to 5½ years

Populists tighten grip on power: Serbia's populist President Aleksandar Vucic is looking to further tighten his grip on power in an election on Sunday that has been marred by reports of major irregularities during a tense campaign.

The main contest in the parliamentary and local elections is expected to be between Vucic's governing right-wing Serbian Progressive Party, or SNS, and a centrist coalition that is trying to undermine the populists who have ruled the troubled Balkan state since 2012. The Serbia Against Violence opposition list is expected to mount the biggest challenge for the city council in Belgrade. An opposition victory in the capital would seriously dent Vucic's hard-line rule in the country, analysts say.

"Changes in Serbia have started and there is no force that can stop that," said Dragan Djilas, the opposition coalition leader, after he voted in Belgrade. "We, as the strongest opposition list, will defend people's will by all democratic means." (AP)

Political prisoners face abuse: During his three years in a Belarusian penal colony, human rights activist Leanid Sudalenka says he and other political prisoners were regularly deprived of family visits, phone calls and parcels. He nearly died when COV-ID-19 swept through the facility. And he was forced to spend the last nine days of his sentence in a damp punishment cell, sleeping on the concrete floor with a

roll of toilet paper for a pillow. He had to wear a yellow tag on his uniform - as do all the estimated 1,473 political prisoners held in Belarus - so they're easily identifiable to guards who he said routinely bullied, abused and humiliated them.

"The Belarusian authorities deliberately create terrible detention conditions for political prisoners, which qualify as torture," Sudalenka said in an interview with The Associated Press after he finished his time behind bars and fled to neighboring Lithuania. (AP)

Cardinal convicted of embezzlement: A Vatican tribunal on Saturday convicted a cardinal of embezzlement and sentenced him to 51/2 years in prison in one of several verdicts handed down in a complicated financial trial that aired the city state's dirty laundry and tested its justice system.

Cardinal Angelo Becciu, the first cardinal ever prosecuted by the Vatican criminal court, was absolved of several other charges and his nine co-defendants received a mixed outcome of some guilty verdicts and many acquittals of the nearly 50 charges brought against them during a 2½ year trial. (AP)

Author receives German prize: The Russian-American writer Masha Gessen received a German literary prize Saturday in a ceremony that was delayed and scaled down in reaction to an article comparing Gaza to Nazi German ghettos.

The comparison in a recent New Yorker article was viewed as controversial in Germany, where government authorities strongly support Israel as a form of remorse and responsibility after Adolf Hitler's Germany murdered up to 6 million Jews in the Holocaust.

Top strategist resigns from DeSantis-backing super PAC

The top strategist for the embattled super PAC backing Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis ' campaign for the White House resigned Saturday night in the latest sign of trouble for the GOP hopeful less than one month before voting begins with lowa's kickoff

Jeff Roe, the top adviser to Never Back Down, is the latest senior staffer to exit Never Back Down, which has been the largest outside group supporting DeSantis' candidacy

He announced his departure on X, the site formerly known as Twitter, hours after The Washington Post published a story focused on internal disputes and suspicions between Never Back Down, the campaign, and other DeSantis allies that included accusations of "mismanagement and conduct issues, including numerous unauthorized leaks containing false information."

"I can't believe it ended this way," Roe wrote on X, sharing a statement in which he said he "cannot


in good conscience stay affiliated with Never Back Down given the statements" in the story, which he said were false.

Numerous senior members of Never Back Down have been fired or resigned in recent weeks, including two chief executives, the group's chairman and its communications director. Giuliani awaits criminal trial: A criminal trial awaits Rudy Giuliani in Georgia. He is an alleged unnamed co-conspirator in a federal indictment against Donald Trump. And now he's been ordered to pay a sum he surely cannot afford.

The \$148 million verdict in a defamation case brought by two former Georgia election workers marks a new low point for the man once lauded as "America's mayor," whose advocacy of Donald Trump's false election claims has led to criminal charges and hefty legal bills. And the jury's verdict could be a troubling sign for Giuliani as he gears up to defend himself against charges in Georgia that could land him behind bars.

A defiant Giuliani vowed Friday to appeal, calling the damages award for Ruby Freeman and her daughter, Wandrea "Shaye" Moss, "absurd." Outside Washington's federal courthouse after the verdict, he repeated his claims that the 2020 election was stolen from Trump. And in a video later on X, formerly known as Twitter, he insisted he did nothing wrong, and suggested he will keep pressing his claims even if it means losing all his money or ending up in jail.

"If they want to put me in jail for it, if you want to shoot me for it ... you're not going to get me to lie," Giuliani said. (AP)

Newly-formed party emerges

South African ex-Prez Zuma denounces ANC

JOHANNESBURG, Dec 17, (AP): Former President Jacob Zuma on Saturday denounced the governing African National Congress party and announced that

he would vote for a newly-formed political formation in South Africa's general election next year.

Zuma, who was president of the ANC from 2007 to 2017, said that he's backing the newly-formed Umkharte was Circus party that is named after the ANC's honto we Sizwe party that is named after the ANC's now-defunct military wing, which was disbanded after the liberation struggle.

Zuma, 81, called on other South Africans to vote for the new formation, saying it would be "a betrayal to vote for the ANC" of President Cyril Ramaphosa.

The country's general election scheduled for 2024 is expected to be highly contested, because the ruling ANC, which has governed the country since Nelson Mandela became South

Africa's first democraticallyelected leader in 1994, faces a myriad of challenges. Recent polls have suggested that the ANC could for the first time garner less than 50% of the national vote in next year's

election and may need to form a coalition government to remain in power. Briefing journalists in Johannesburg's Soweto township

on Saturday, Zuma described the ANC and Ramaphosa as a "proxy for white monopoly capital," and he described his decision as part of rescuing the ANC.

UN peacekeeping lauds strong support: The United Nations peacekeeping chief says he was very satisfied with the strong support of many countries for its far-flung operations at a recent ministerial meeting, despite "headwinds and challenges and problems."

Jean-Pierre Lacroix, the undersecretary-general for peace operations, said in an interview with The Associated Press that the biannual ministerial meeting in Ghana's capital, Accra, earlier this month was attended by nearly 100 countries.

He said that 33 countries made pledges of 117 military and police units for the U.N.'s peacekeeping operations - and 45 countries made more than 100 pledg-

es related to training peacekeepers and partnerships. "We had really a strong level of support towards peacekeeping, which is great ... and the pledges were very good," Lacroix said.

There are now 12 peacekeeping operations in Africa, Asia, Europe and the Middle East and that number will drop again following demands by the leaders of Mali and Congo for U.N. troops to leave, complaining that the peacekeepers failed in their primary mandate to protect civilians from armed groups. (AP)

Kanu's terrorism charges upheld: Nigeria's Supreme Court on Friday overturned a lower court ruling dismissing terrorism charges against a popular separatist leader whose trial has been blamed for an outbreak of violence in the country's southeast region.

The Court said Nnamdi Kanu, leader of the Indigenous People of Biafra (IPOB) separatist group that seeks independence for Nigeria's southeastern region, still faces terrorism charges despite the lower court ruling. Kanu, who also holds British citizenship, has already pleaded not guilty to the charges.

In announcing the decision, Justice Garba Mohammed said that although Nigeria's secret police violated Kanu's rights during his arrest and extradition from Kenya in 2021, the Court of Appeal was wrong to rule in October last year that the violation was grounds for the dismissal of the charges. (AP)

Kenya's death toll rising: Kenya's military hastened efforts Thursday to evacuate hundreds of people trapped by raging floods that have hit many parts of

the East African country. Floods have killed at least 170 and displaced more than 600,000 since the onset of heavy rains in November, according to the Red Cross, which is helping to coordinate the rescue efforts.

Tens of thousands of people in Northern Kenya have lost livestock, farmland and homes due to the floods described by aid groups as the worst in 100 years. An international team of scientists reported last week that human-caused climate change has made the ongoing rains in Eastern Africa up to two times more intense. (AP)

ECOWAS accused of destabilizing acts: Nigerien

military spokesman Col. Amadou Abdramane strongly denounced the Economic Community of West African States for inviting the prime minister of the deposed regime to the ECOWAS summit meeting held in Abuja, capital of Nigeria, on Sunday.

The Nigerien transitional government, army and people are firmly opposed to such provocative acts by ECOWAS which seed to destabilize Niger, he told reporters on Thursday.

The repeated provocations can only undermine the efforts to reach a negotiated settlement to the political situation in Niger, he said, noting that the West African grouping should not persist in disregarding the incumbent rulers of Niger or invite fugitive to represent the country illegally at such summits. (KUNA)

Senegal's Sonko could run for prez: Senegal's opposition leader Ousmane Sonko was ordered to be reinstated on the electoral list Thursday, which could allow him to run for president in February's

The court of first instance's decision overturned a November ruling by the Supreme Court that effectively barred the detained opposition leader's bid to run. The state has 10 days to appeal, but has yet to

North Korea fires ballistic missile toward South Korean eastern waters

South Korea's military said Sunday that it had detected that North Korea fired at least one ballistic missile toward its eastern waters, adding to a torrent of weapons' tests in recent months that has elevated tensions.

South Korea's Joint Chiefs of Staff didn't immediately say what type of missile it was or how far it

Tensions on the Korean Peninsula are at their

highest in years, with North Korean leader Kim Jong Un accelerating the expansion of his nuclear and missile program, and flaunting an escalatory nuclear doctrine that authorizes the preemptive use of nuclear weapons.

The United States, South Korea and Japan have responded by increasing the visibility of their trilateral partnership in the region, and strengthening their combined military exercises, which Kim condemns

as invasion rehearsals.

North Korea's latest launch followed high-level security talks between American and South Korean officials in Washington over the weekend, where they agreed on plans to incorporate nuclear operation scenarios in their combined military exercises next year to cope with the North's evolving threats, according to details announced by Seoul's presidential office. (AP)

Chileans to vote on new charter: Chileans are voting Sunday on whether to approve a new constitution that will replace the country's dictatorship-era charter.

The vote comes over a year after Chileans resoundingly rejected a proposed constitution written by a left-leaning convention and one that many characterized as one of the world's most progressive charters. The new document, largely written by conservative councilors, is more conservative than the one it seeks to replace because it would deepen free-market principles, reduce state intervention and might limit some women's rights.

If the new charter is rejected, the Pinochet-era constitution - which was amended over the years -- will remain in effect.

One of the most controversial articles in the proposed new draft says that "the law protects the life of the unborn," with a slight change in wording from the current document that some have warned could make abortion fully illegal in the South American country. Chilean law currently allows the interruption of pregnancies for three reasons: rape, an unviable fetus and risk to the life of the mother.

Another article in the proposed document that has sparked controversy says prisoners who suffer a terminal illness and aren't deemed to be a danger to society at large can be granted house arrest. Members of the left-wing opposition have said the measure could end up benefiting those who have been convicted of crimes against humanity during the 1973-1990 dictatorship of Gen. Augusto Pinochet. (AP)

Int'l court rules against Guatemala: Guatemala violated Indigenous rights by permitting a huge nickel mine on tribal land almost two decades ago, according to a ruling from the Inter-American Court of Hu-

man Rights Friday.

The landmark verdict marks a monumental step in a four-decade struggle for Indigenous land rights and a long, bitter legal battle, which has at times spilled into the streets of northern Guatemala.

China defends bounties on Hong Kong dissidents

Japan, ASEAN bolster security, economy ties

TOKYO, Dec 17, (AP): Leaders from Japan and the Association of Southeast Asian Nations, at a special summit in Tokyo on Sunday, adopted a joint vision that emphasizes security and economic cooperation while respecting the rule of law, amid growing tensions with China in regional seas.

Ties between Japan and the 10-member ASEAN bloc used to be largely based on Japanese assistance to the developing economies, in part due to lingering bitterness over Japan's wartime actions. But in recent years the relationship has focused more on sertiveness in the South China Sea, while Japan's postwar pacifist stance and trust-building efforts have fostered friendlier relations.

The summit marks the 50th anniversary of official Japan-ASEAN ties, which started in 1973 with trade talks over Japanese synthetic rubber exports

The leaders, in a joint statement, called for strengthening their "mutually beneficial" partnership and working together for peace and stability in the Indo-Pacific, especially in maritime security. They also called for economic security and greater supply chain resilience for the region and to promote the movement of one another's nationals. "We affirm the shared view to promote a rulesbased Indo-Pacific region that is free and open (and) embraces key principles such as ASEAN's unity and centrality, inclusiveness (and) transparency," according to the joint statement.

The leaders stressed "respect for sovereignty and territorial integrity, settlement of differences or disputes by peaceful means and renunciation of the threat or use of force.'

They did not specifically mention China. During the summit meeting, they raised concerns over the "situation in East and South China Sea" and noted the importance of upholding international law, the Japanese Foreign Ministry said in a statement.

It also comes at the close of the U.N.

climate summit COP28, which stressed the

importance of renewables and energy tran-

sition minerals like nickel more than ever.

The leaders adopted an implementation plan for 130 projects. Japan called for stepping up security and defense cooperation, such as arms technology and equipment transfers, cybersecurity and tackling disinformation. Tokyo also pledged to reinforce support for efforts against climate change, green technology and digital transformation, as well as investment, including in the region's automotive industry.

"As divisions and confrontations deepen and the world faces compounded crises, Japan will tackle the issues together with ASEAN, which is the linchpin of a 'free and open Indo-Pacific," Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida told a joint news conference with Indonesian President Joko Widodo, this year's ASEAN chair.

Mutual trust

"Based on our mutual trust, we will tackle new issues, and contribute to peace and prosperity of the region in order to create a world where people can benefit while their dignity is respected."

Japan adopted a new security strategy last year and has been rapidly building up its military and expanding its military partnerships to better counter China's growing assertiveness in the region. On Saturday, on the sidelines of the summit, Kishida held a series of bilateral talks as Japan seeks to step up bilateral security ties with ASEAN countries. Kishida and his Malaysian counterpart, Anwar Ibrahim, signed a 400 million yen (\$2.8 million) deal to bolster Malaysia's maritime security capability as part of a Japanese official security assistance program specifically for militaries of friendly nations to help strengthen their law enforcement and security capabilities.

Also:

BEIJING: China on Friday defended controversial bounties offered for the capture of Hong Kong dissidents who have fled abroad that have been heavily criticized by foreign governments and human rights groups.

Rewards of 1 million Hong Kong dollars (\$128,000) have been offered for information leading to the capture of 13 opposition figures accused of violating the semi-autonomous Chinese city's

sweeping National Security Law. Foreign Ministry spokesperson Mao Ning said China rejected the outside criticism, saying the arrest orders were 'necessary and justified and ... in line with international law and practice."

Without directly mentioning the bounties, Mao said other countries also have extraterritorial aspects to their laws on national security, adding that foreign governments' support for those on the list was merely cover for their aim of destabilizing Hong Kong, an Asian financial center that was roiled by 2019 anti-government protests.

"We strongly oppose and deplore the individual countries slandering Hong Kong's national security law and interfering in the judicial system," Mao told reporters at a daily briefing.

Chile arrests 55 people: Chile's police on Friday arrested at least 55 people in a fiscal fraud case that could be one of the biggest in the country's history, amounting to about \$275 million and implicating small and mid-sized companies in different parts of the country.

Marcelo Freyhoffer, a high officer at Chile's tax agency, told journalists those arrested were associated with companies that did not render real services and committed fraud through false tax documents. Their goal was to pay less tax or obtain fraudulent tax returns, he said.

Freyhoffer said the suspects will stand trial for tax crimes, criminal association, money laundering, customs fraud and making false declarations, and could be jailed for up to 15 years in what he called the country's biggest fraud case ever.

The investigation started in 2016 and touched companies operating in a wide range of areas, varying from construction to exporters of cell phones. (AP)

Nissan boosts research collaboration in China

Nissan Motor Co. is expanding its research ties with a leading Chinese university as it and other foreign car companies try to claw back market share in the important Chinese market. The Japanese automaker announced Sunday that it would launch joint research next year with Tsinghua University on reaching Generation Z - defined for this project as those born between 1995 and 2009 and on the social responsibility of

automakers in battery recycling, charging stations and other electric vehicle-related issues.

The major auto companies were caught flat-footed by a boom in electric vehicles in China that has given rise to new Chinese competitors that have gobbled up market share at home and are now moving into Southeast Asia, Europe and other overseas markets. Nissan's sales in China plunged 34% in the six months from April to

September compared with a year earlier.

"Market conditions in China have become extremely tough," Masashi Matsuyama, the head of Nissan's Chinese investment company, said at a news conference in Beijing. Nissan plans to develop 10 further new-energy vehicles for the Chinese market, four under its own brand by 2026 and the other six for Chinese joint venture partners. (AP)

Turkish Airlines orders 220 Airbus jets

Turkey's national carrier, Turkish Airlines is placing an order for 220 new planes from Airbus as it seeks to expand its fleet.

In a statement to Turkey's public disclosures platform, KAP, Turkish Airlines announced that it will buy 150 narrow-body A321 Neo aircraft in addition to 50 wide-body A350-900 jets, 15 of the A350-1000 planes and five A350F cargo aircraft.

The company also would pro-

cure engine maintenance services and spare engines for the A350 aircraft from Rolls-Royce, according to the statement.

Airbus said the latest order increases Turkish Airlines' total order to 504 planes, adding that 212 have already been delivered.

"By modernizing our fleet with more efficient and environmentally friendly aircraft, we are reinforcing our leading position in global aviation and contributing to the nation's prominence as an aviation hub," Turkish Airlines board Chairman Ahmet Bolat said in a news release from Toulouse, France-based Airbus

Airbus.

The airline is vying to turn its hub in Istanbul into a major center for international transport.

Turkish Airlines spokesman was not available for further information on the deal. (AP)

US homelessness soars 12pct amid rent hikes, aid reduction

'For those on frontlines of this crisis, it's not surprising'

WASHINGTON, Dec 17, (AP): The United States experienced a dramatic 12% increase in homelessness to its highest reported level as soaring rents and a decline in coronavirus pandemic assistance combined to put housing out of reach for more Americans, federal officials said Friday.

About 653,000 people were homeless, the most since the country began using the yearly point-in-time survey in 2007. The total in the January count represents an increase of about 70,650 from a year earlier.

The latest estimate indicates that people becoming homeless for the first time were behind much of the increase.

A rise in family homelessness ended a downward trend that began in 2012.

"For those on the frontlines of this crisis, it's not surprising," said Ann Oliva, chief executive officer at the National Alliance to End Homelessness, an advocacy group. Housing and Urban Development Secretary Marcia Fudge said the data underscored an "urgent need" to support proven solutions that help people quickly exit homelessness and that prevent homelessness in the first place.

Going back to the first 2007 survey, the U.S. then made steady progress for about a decade in reducing the homeless population as the government focused particularly on increasing investments to get veterans into housing. The number of homeless people dropped from about 637,000 in 2010 to about 554,000 in 2017.

The numbers ticked up to about 580,000 in the 2020 count and held relatively steady over the next two years as Congress responded to the COVID-19 pandemic with emergency rental assistance, stimulus payments, aid to states and local governments and a temporary eviction moratorium. Jeff Olivet, executive director of the U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness, a federal agency, said the extra assistance "held off the rise in homelessness that we are now seeing."

He said numerous factors are behind the problem.

"The most significant causes are the shortage of affordable homes and the high cost of housing that have left many Americans living paycheck to paycheck and one crisis away from homelessness," Olivet said.

Within the overall rise, homelessness among individuals rose by nearly 11%, among veterans by 7.4% and among families with children by 15.5%.

People who identify as Black make up about 13% of the U.S. population but comprised 37% of all people experiencing homelessness. People who identify as Hispanic or Latino make up about 19% of the population but comprised about 33% of those experiencing homelessness. Also, more than a quarter of the adults experiencing homelessness were over age 54.

HUD said that rental housing conditions were "extraordinarily challenging" in 2022, with rents increasing at more than twice the rate of recent years. It noted that trend has subsided since the January count. Such relief could show benefits when volunteers and housing officials around the country begin the next homeless count in just a few weeks.

Budget

Officials also noted that President Joe Biden's budget for this fiscal year has recommended guaranteed vouchers for low-income veterans and youths aging out of foster care, among other investments designed to reduce homelessness.

More than half the people experiencing homelessness in the country were in four states: California, New York, Florida and Washington. While about 28% of the nation's homeless are estimated to be in California, its increase was only about half the national rate. New York's homelessness went up more than three times the national rate, according to HUD's report.

New Hampshire, New Mexico and Colorado along with New York saw the largest percentage increases in homelessness. In all, the number of people experiencing homelessness increased in 41 states and the District of Columbia, and decreased in just nine states.

Dave Giffen, executive director of The Coalition for the Homeless in New York City, said the cost of rental housing soared after the pandemic.

"So when we saw the pandemic-era protections go away, we did start to see homelessness starting to increase again. We saw more people being evicted, housing instability," Giffen said. "But then all of that got kind of masked by the sudden, very rapid influx of new asylum seekers, and that is a crisis for which the city and state were more unprepared to deal with."

Starting in the summer of 2022, New York City's homeless shelter system has been overwhelmed by waves of international migrants who are being bused into the city from southern U.S. border states. More than 150,000 migrants have been in the city's shelters for some period of time.

Mayor Eric Adams has pleaded with the federal government for aid to help defray the cost of housing migrants, which he says will run into the billions of dollars over the next few years. He has chastised the governor of Texas, for arranging to bus migrants out of that state to New York. Adams, a Democrat, has also asked for legal and bureaucratic changes that would allow migrants to get work permits more easily.

HUD did not get data that enabled it to separate out the specific impact of migrants and asylum seekers on homelessness, but some communities indicated it did affect their increase. The Biden administration has provided more than \$1 billion in grant funding to cities and states to fund critical needs for migrants. It's also identifying potential federal land and buildings that can be made available for shelter and other services for migrants, said a senior HUD official not authorized to publicly discuss the report.

Fed tackles inflation, averts recession

WASHINGTON, Dec 17, (AP): It was the most painful inflation Americans had experienced since 1981, when "The Dukes of Hazzard" and "The Jeffersons" were topping the TV charts. Yet the Federal Reserve now seems on the verge of defeating it - and without the surge in unemployment and the deep recession that many economists had predicted would accompany it

Inflation has been falling more or less steadily since peaking in June of last year at 9.1%. And when the Fed's preferred inflation gauge for November is reported next week, it's likely to show that in the past six months, annual inflation actually dipped just below the Fed's target of 2%, economists at UBS estimate.

The cost of goods - such as used cars, furniture and appliances - has fallen for six straight months. Compared with a year ago, goods prices are unchanged, held down by improved global supply chains.

Housing and rental costs, a major driver of inflation, are growing more slowly. Wage growth has cooled, too, though it still tops inflation. Milder wage growth tends to ease pressure on restaurants, hotels and other employers to increase their prices to cover their labor costs. "I think it's really good to see the progress that we're making," Chair Jerome Powell said at a news conference Wednesday after the Fed's latest policy meeting. "If you look at the ... six-month measures, you see very low numbers"

On Friday, the Congressional Budget Office, a nonpartisan agency, estimated that inflation will drop to 2.1% by the end of next year.

There will likely be bumps on the road toward getting inflation fully under control, officials have said. Powell insisted that "no one is declaring victory." And he reiterated that the central bank wants to see further evidence of falling inflation before it would feel confident that it is sustainably headed back to the 2% target.

Yet many economists, normally a cautious lot, are now willing to declare that inflation is nearly back under control after two-plus years in which it imposed hardships on millions of American households.

"It appears that inflation has returned to 2%," said Tim Duy, chief economist at SGH Macroeconomics. "The Fed looks like it has won that battle."

Prices spikes are also moderating overseas, with both the Bank of England and European Central Bank keeping their benchmark interest rates unchanged this week. Though inflation is still at 4.6% in the United Kingdom, it has fallen to 2.4% in the 20 countries that use the euro currency.

With inflation cooling, Powell said the 19 officials on the Fed's policy setting committee had discussed the prospects for rate cuts at this week's meeting. The officials also projected that the Fed will cut its key interest rate three times next year.

That stance marked a drastic shift from the

That stance marked a drastic shift from the rate-hiking campaign the Fed began in March 2022. Beginning then, the central bank raised its benchmark rate 11 times, from near zero to roughly 5.4%, its highest level in 22 years, to try to slow borrowing, spending and inflation. The result was much higher costs for mortgages, auto loans, business borrowing and other forms of credit.

Powell's suddenly more optimistic words, and the Fed's rate-cut projections, sent stock market indexes soaring this week. Wall Street traders now foresee a roughly 80% likelihood that the first rate cut will occur when the Fed meets in March, and they are forecasting a total of six cuts in 2024.

On Friday, John Williams, president of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York and a top

lieutenant of Powell's, sought to pour some cold water on those expectations. Speaking on CNBC, Williams said it was "premature to be even thinking" about whether to cut rates in March. But he also mentioned that his forecast was for inflation to move down "sustainably" to 2%.

The week's events represented a departure from just two weeks ago, when Powell had said it was "premature" to say whether the Fed had raised its key rate high enough to fully conquer high inflation. On Wednesday, he suggested that the Fed was almost certainly done with rate increases.

Recent data appeared to have helped shift

Powell's thinking. On Wednesday, a measure of wholesale prices came in lower than economists had expected. Some of those figures are used to compile the Fed's preferred inflation gauge, which, as a result, is expected to show much lower inflation numbers next week.

Powell said some Fed officials had even updated their economic projections on Wednesday, not long before they were issued, in light of the lower-than-expected wholesale price report. "The speed at which inflation has fallen has been like an earthquake at the Fed," Duy wrote in a note to clients Wednesday.

Fears

And yet in the meantime, the economy keeps growing, defying widespread fears from a year ago that 2023 would bring a recession, a consequence of the much higher borrowing rates the Fed engineered. A report on retail sales Thursday showed that consumers grew their spending last month, likely encouraged by increased discounting that will also lower inflation. Such trends are supporting the growing belief that the economy will achieve an elusive "soft landing," in which inflation is defeated without an accompanying recession.

"We think the Fed cannot believe its luck: We are back to 'immaculate disinflation,' " Krishna Guha, an economic analyst at investment bank Evercore ISI, wrote in a client note.

Economists credit the Fed's rapid rate hikes for contributing to inflation's decline. In addition, a recovery in global supply chains and a jump in the number of Americans - and recent immigrants - searching for jobs have helped cool the pace of wage growth.

Jon Steinsson, an economics professor at the University of California, Berkeley, said that by aggressively raising their key interest rate in about 15 months - the fastest such pace in four decades - Fed officials kept Americans' inflation expectations largely in check. Expectations can become self-fulfilling: If people expect higher inflation, they often take actions, such as demanding higher wages, that can send prices higher still.

"They played a crucial role," Steinsson said. Still, a continued decline in inflation isn't guaranteed. One wild card is rental prices. Real-time measures of new apartment leases show those costs rising much more slowly than they did a year ago. It takes time for that data to flow into the government's figures. In fact, excluding what the government calls "shelter" costs - rents, the cost of homeownership and hotel prices - inflation rose just 1.4% last month from a year earlier.

But Kathy Bostjancic, an economist at Nationwide, said she worries that a shortage of available homes could raise housing costs in the coming years, potentially keeping inflation elevated.

The Fed's rate hikes, Bostjancic said, could actually prolong the shortage. Today's higher mortgage rates may limit home construction while also discouraging current homeowners from selling. Both trends would keep a lid on the supply of homes and keep prices elevated.

'Treasury is finally realizing it'

US Treasury issues tax credit for aviation fuel

WASHINGTON, Dec 17: The Biden administration released long-awaited guidance on Friday around tax credits for aviation fuel that reduces emissions of greenhouse gases compared with fuel made from crude oil.

Some environmentalists expressed concern that the Treasury Department guidelines could allow credits for fuel made from corn and other crops that they consider poor choices because of the water and other resources needed to grow them.

Midwest lawmakers and companies that produce corn-based ethanol praised the guidelines, although their enthusiasm could be short-lived.

Congress approved the credits as part of President Joe Biden's Inflation Reduction Act of 2022, which included provisions designed to boost cleaner energy. The credits are designed to increase the supply and bring down the current high price of sustainable aviation fuel, or SAE

Producers will be eligible for tax credits ranging from \$1.25 to \$1.75 per gallon, depending on how much their fuel reduces emissions compared with conventional products such as kerosene-based jet fuel.

On a key issue - and after months of deliberations - the Treasury Department accepted measuring those emission reductions by using a model that was developed by the U.S. Energy Department and which is supported by the ethanol industry.

However, Treasury said the Biden administration plans to update the model by March 1, leaving uncertainty around the eventual tax treat-

ment of ethanol used to power airplanes.

Treasury said the update will include "new modeling of key feed-stocks and processes used in aviation fuel," and will consider the impact on emissions from growing crops used to make the fuel.

crops used to make the ruel.

The Environmental Defense Fund said it would withhold final judgment on the guidelines until March, but that Friday's guidelines could put the U.S. out of step with international standards.

"Our initial assessment is that this would be a blank check for fuels made from sugar cane, soybean and rapeseed - none of which are sustainable or consistent with Congress' intent," said the group's senior vice president, Mark Brownstein.

Ethanol supporters countered that the Energy Department model provides a precise way to measure the benefits of agricultural feedstocks used in sustainable aviation fuel.

The standard "is great, and I'm glad that Treasury is finally realizing it," said Sen. Joni Ernst, a Republican from Iowa, a major corn-producing state. Airlines for America, a trade group for the biggest U.S. carriers, praised the Treasury guidelines, which it said "will help to accelerate the production and availability of SAF and stimulate new investment."

Around 2% to 3% of global greenhouse gas emissions come from aviation, according to estimates, but that share is expected to grow as air travel continues to boom. Widespread use of electric-powered airplanes is generally considered decades away.

'Introduces new tax tools'

Airbnb agrees to \$621 million settlement in Italy tax dispute

ROME, Dec 17, (AP): Short-term rental platform Airbnb has agreed to pay 576 million euros (\$621 million) to settle a years-long dispute over unpaid taxes in Italy but said it won't try to recover the money from its hosts.

In November, Italian prosecutors said AirBnb owed about 779 million euros (\$840 million) in short-term rental taxes it had failed to pay on behalf of Italian landlords who used the platform between 2017 and 2021.

The San Francisco-based company

said in a statement on Wednesday that it was working on introducing new tools for hosts to have their taxes withheld automatically and paid to the Italian tax authorities on their behalf.

"The vast majority of hosts on Airbnb in Italy are ordinary families that are using the platform for supplemental income," the company said in its statement. "We hope the agreement with the Italian Revenue Agency and recent legislative changes will provide these families with certainty about the rules around hosting for years to

come."

The Court of Justice of the European Union ruled in 2022 that member countries could require short-term rental platforms to collect income taxes.

Airbnb said it welcomed clarity provided by the Italian government in next year's budget law on how platforms should withhold income taxes for non-professional hosts in Italy. "These improvements will make it

easier for historic centers such as Venice and Florence to see who is hosting and how often, and to develop proportionate policy solutions in response. Airbnb is committed to working with Italian authorities to make the rules a success," the company added.

Italy is a key market for Airbnb, with tens of thousands of hosts using the platform to rent their properties.

The far-right government led by Premier Giorgia Meloni has pledged to crack down on tax evasion related to short-term rentals and aims to raise the tax rate for owners from 21% to 26%.

\$273 million dodged

Amazon prevails as EU court ends long-running tax battle

LONDON, Dec 17, (AP): Amazon won't have to pay about 250 million euros (\$273 million) in back taxes after European Union judges ruled in favor of the U.S. e-commerce giant Thursday, dealing a defeat to the 27-nation bloc in its efforts to tackle corporate tax avoidance.

The ruling by the EU's top court is final, ending the long-running legal battle over tax arrangements between Amazon and Luxembourg's government and marking a further setback for a crackdown by antitrust chief Margrethe Vestager.

The Court of Justice backed a 2021 decision by judges in a lower court who sided with Amazon, saying the European Commission, the EU's executive branch, had not proved its case that Amazon received illegal state sup-

port.
"The Court of Justice confirms that
the Commission has not established
that the tax ruling given to Amazon by
Luxembourg was a State aid that was
incompatible with the internal market"
of the EU, the court said in a press
release.

Amazon welcomed the ruling, saying it confirms that the company "followed all applicable laws and received no special treatment."

"We look forward to continuing to

focus on delivering for our customers across Europe," the company said in a statement.

The commission said it "will care-

fully study the judgment and assess its implications."

The case dates back to 2017, when

Vestager charged Amazon with unfairly profiting from special low tax conditions since 2003 in tiny Luxembourg, where its European headquarters are based. As a result, almost three-quarters of Amazon's profits in the EU were not taxed, she said.

The EU has taken aim at deals between individual countries and companies used to lure foreign multinationals in search of a place to establish their EU headquarters. The practice led to EU states competing with each other and multinationals playing them off one another.

True Account tests the limits of reality

Hannah Masury, for a brief time, was a pirate. At least, according to the mysterious manuscript that shows up on Professor Marian Beresford's desk. brought by a bright-faced student excited at the possibility of finding the treasure that Hannah left behind.

Novelist and historian **Katherine Howe** em-

barks on a dazzlingly fun historical fiction, "A True Account: Hannah Masury's Sojourn Amongst the Pyrates, Written by Herself: A Novel" — aptly named given the way it tests the boundaries between reality and imagination.

When undergrad Kay Lonergan brings Hannah's found manuscript to her professor, Marian's years of



ticity and even points out the more doubtful details, verging on breaking the fourth wall. But Kay convinces Marian to approach her famous explorer of a father and persuade him, and his expedition society club, to back their trip in search of long-lost pirate booty. And is that jealousy we de-

tect in the professor? The further the story gets, the more it seems that Kay is everything Marian wishes she was:

young, exciting, fashionable, carefree, commanding, self-assured. But Hannah's manuscript might be just the thing to spark some excitement into Marian's dull life — and to finally win her father's attention and ap-

History buffs will appreciate the accurate inclusion of figures such as pirate William Fly and Puritan preacher Cotton Mather. Those who aren't so thrilled about history will enjoy Hannah's wry take on the happenings of the early 1700s.

Mirrored in Hannah's restlessness with the status quo is Marian's inability to fit into the mold set for women of the early 1900s. She quickly becomes endeared to the young pirate who disguised herself as a cabin boy and went bravely adventuring with one of the world's most notoriously vicious pirates, Edward

Manuscript

Hannah's manuscript, which is about half of the book, follows only hints of the linguistic style of 18thcentury American literature. Mercifully, she's far more readable than Mathers.

"A True Account" is a slow start that picks up quickly into a wild voyage of satisfying twists and an even more satisfying ending. The story ties threads of fact and fiction into an intricate knot that's just as enjoyable to look at as it is to untangle.

Susan Kiyo Ito always knew she was adopted, but uncovering her birth family became a decadeslong process marked by moments of warm connection and icy divides - raw stories compiled into a memoir that's alternately touching and heartbreaking.

Opening on the fateful moment when Ito is about to meet her birth mother for the first time, "I Would Meet You Anywhere" transcends a title and becomes a refrain throughout the book.

Ito's relationship with Yumi is fraught from the beginning, but her birth mother holds the key to the information she needs to find the other half of her DNA. Ito meets Yumi when and where the latter deems convenient - New Jersey, California, a small Midwestern town; in a house, a hotel, a hospital. And Ito would meet her anywhere.

In the process of finding her birth parents and piecing together her origins, Ito explores the theme of family - and what it means to occupy the various roles within it - pondering the symmetry in the first 17 years she spent living with her mom, Kikuko, taking care of her to the last 27 years of her mom's life when their roles reversed.

Meanwhile, Yumi flits in and out of the story, leaving the impression of her taking up more space than her physical presence.

Ito is left wondering about the reproductive choices that have shaped her life, starting with her conception. After all, what choice did Yumi have? Her family had started over with nothing after the United States forced them into internment camps, along with an estimated 120,000 other Japanese Americans and Japa-

nese nationals. There aren't many things Yumi refuses to talk about, but these topics are frustratingly the most important ones, big question marks that threaten to burn answerless into oblivion.

Unlike Yumi, the author is totally open about her thoughts, feelings and experiences. Ito's prose follows her mood; the default of easy conversational writing becomes stilted when she's upset, flowing when she's

Part 2 ends in a burst of poetry disguised as prose, an astounding compilation of similes and squishy adjectives that perfectly capture a feeling that rests right on the periphery of language. It's an absolutely surreal moment of her life described the only way one can truly capture such a confluence of happenstance: with uncanny poetic prose that verges on nonsense, if it weren't so utterly fitting.





LOS ANGELES: Australian drummer **Colin Burgess**, an original member of the hard rock band AC/DC in the early 1970s, has died, the band confirmed on its social media accounts. He was 77.

"Very sad to hear of the passing of Colin Burgess," says an unsigned post on the band's official Facebook page late Friday. "He was our first drummer and a very respected musician. Happy memories, rock in peace Colin.'

No cause of death was given. Burgess was recruited in November 1973 to help form AC/DC with Malcolm Young on rhythm guitar and his brother Angus on lead guitar, lead vocalist Dave Evans and bassist Larry Van Kriedt.

The band fired Burgess in February 1974, accusing him of being drunk on stage, and he later said someone had spiked his drink. He was followed by a succession of drummers and filled in for one for a few months in 1975.

Before AC/DC, Burgess played with the Australian rock group The Masters Apprentices, which was inducted into the Australian Recording Industry Association Hall of Fame in 1998. (AP)

LOS ANGELES: Mayim Bialik won't be giving answers as a host of "Jeopardy!"

"The Big Bang Theory" actor posted news of her departure on Instagram on Friday.

"Sony has informed me that I will no longer be hosting the syndicated version of Jeopardy!" Bialik wrote. "I am incredibly honored to have been nominated for a primetime Emmy for hosting this year and I am deeply grateful for the opportunity to have been a part of the Jeopardy! family.'

Former show champion Ken Jennings has been hosting season 40 of the syndicated show by himself.

Sony Pictures Television in a statement noted Bialik was the one who announced her departure.

"We made the decision to have one host for the syndicated show next season to maintain continuity for our viewers, and Ken Jennings will be the sole host for syndicated Jeopardy!" Sony said.

Unforgettable terms that shaped 2023

A year in expressions and phrases

NEW YORK, Dec 17, (AP): Many sentiments are universal. Many words are not. As 2023 ends, The Associated Press reached out to colleagues around the world for terms that emerged this year and seized or crystalized the popular mood.

Some were newsy, some cultural. A couple were kind of delightful. Whatever the language, the emotions came through. Some might consider AI, or artificial intelligence, as "the" word of 2023, while Merriam-Webster went with "authentic" and Oxford University Press named "rizz," a riff on charisma.

We wanted to share diver amples of what folks in Germany call a "gefluegeltes Wort," or "word with

Password child: Australia

The Macquarie Dictionary in Australia has named a "word of the month" all year. One was "cozzie livs," slang for cost of living. Another was "murder noodle" for snake, both cute and accurate in a country that's home to the world's most venomous one.

But we're going with "password child," which families anywhere can appreciate. It refers to a child seen as favored over siblings because their name is used in parents passwords.

■ Kitawaramba: Kenya (kiSwahili) It will come back to haunt you

This was uttered by Kenyan pastor Paul Mackenzie, who was accused of leading a starvation doomsday cult that led to the deaths of more than 400 people.

He said it as people confronted him while he waited to be driven to court. The unfamiliar word appeared to be a threat, and it quickly took on a life of its own. Kenyans used it to warn others that something bad may happen to them for their actions.

The word captured the mood with the rising cost of living. With every new economic policy by President William Ruto's administration, some Kenyans say the related term "kimeturamba" - that electing him has come

back to haunt them. ■ Bwa kale: Haiti (Creole) Peeled

wood This became a death cry against violent gangs in Haiti this year. Civilians chanted the phrase as they pursued suspected criminals. The vigilante movement has killed more than 300 suspected gang members, according to

the United Nations. The term had long been used in Haitian street slang to insinuate male dominance and power. Now it has spread overseas, with a video on social media showing a group of Latino soccer fans - it was not clear from what country chanting "Bwa kale!" after their team beat an opponent.

phrase to promote their wares. One restaurant featured a "bwa kale" special: a hamburger skewered by a stick with two small chunks of meat on top. It came with a side of nachos and three

bottles of Prestige, a local beer. ■ Spy balloon: United States

Perhaps no other term this year defined the growing wariness between the world's two largest economies. It began, movie-like, with Americans noticing a mysterious white orb in the sky. Some watched as fighter jets circled and shot down the balloon that for days had wandered across the continental United States

"I did not anticipate waking up to be in a 'Top Gun' movie today," one wit-

ness said. China rejected allegations of surveillance and insisted that balloon and others were purely for civilian purposes. It never used the term (zhen tan qi qiu), or spy balloon, and instead used (qi xiang qi qiu), meaning "weather balloon.

■ Kuningi: South Africa (isiZulu) It's a lot

This word gained popularity among South Africans to express frustration over multiple controversies occurring at the same time.

In 2023, some South Africans wondered if they could handle much more. They faced record electricity outages. The government was under fire for its close relationship with Russia. Soaring incidents of crime included a daring prison escape by a convicted murderer

who faked his death. On days that seemed too much, "kuningi" captured how overwhelmed South Africans could become.

■ C'est la hess: France (French) It's a bummer

Young people insist on keeping the French language plastic despite efforts, backed by law, to preserve it from foreign encroachment.

"C'est la hess" speaks to the multiculturalism of France even as some views continued to harden this year against immigration, shown by the steady progression of the far right.

The phrase is among dozens of words and expressions derived from Arabic, which those under 25 in France have made their own. France has the biggest Muslim population in Western Europe and a long history of immigration from former colonies in North Africa.

■ (**zei**): Japan (Japanese) Taxes In a closely watched event on Tuesday, the top Buddhist monk at the Kiyomizu Temple in Kyoto used a brush to write the kanji character of the year on the temple balcony.

The Japanese public chose "zei" to best represent 2023 amid speculation about tax hikes to fund the country's military buildup.

Under the latest national security strategy, Prime Minister Fumio Kishida's government is pursuing a five-year plan to double Japan's annual defense spending to about 10 trillion yen (\$69 billion). That would make the country the world's No. 3 military spender after the United States and China.

■ **The nones:** Global: Nonbelievers

In many countries, there has been a dramatic increase in the number of people who are nonbelievers or unaffiliated with any organized religion. They have become known as the "nones" - atheists, agnostics, or nothing in particular - and they comprise 30% or more of the adult population in the United States and Canada, as well as numerous European countries. Japan and Uruguay are among other nations where large numbers of people are secular.

In a recent package of stories, The Associated Press Religion Team took an in-depth look at how this phenomenon is playing out in several places.

■ (shan dao hou zi): Taiwan (Mandarin) Mountain roadmonkey

This first emerged as a grumbling way to refer to riders who treated Taiwan's winding mountain roads as a racetrack. But the term became a popular shorthand for young people's economic pressures in August, when a YouTube user dropped a 20-minute film called the "Life of a Mountain Roadmonkey." It touched a nerve, attracting nearly 7 million views.

The "roadmonkey" is a motorcyclist who tries to become an Instagram influencer. He lends his girlfriend money to upgrade her bike, but she cheats on him and leaves him. In debt, he works overtime to rebuild his savings, becoming isolated from friends. Ultimately, he dies in a crash. His story touched off a discussion

about the low wages and long hours for many in Taiwan, where housing and traditional "success" are often out of reach.

■ Bharat: India (Sanskrit) India When a dinner invitation sent to guests of the G20 meeting in India featured the word "Bharat," the immediate question for many was whether the country of more than 1.4 billion people would now be called by its ancient

Sanskrit name.

Many saw "Bharat" as a political move by Prime Minister Narendra Modi's Hindu nationalist government. The word resonated with Modi's supporters, who argued it would salvage the country from the taint of colonialism. But Muslims and other minority groups felt even more uncomfortable.

The name has now been used at various international forums. But there has been no formal announcement of a

High costs, complex procedures limit access in developing nations

Promising sickle cell therapies out of reach where needed most

NEW YORK, Dec 17, (AP): Gautam Dongre's two children in India and Pascazia Mazeze's son in Tanzania live with an inherited blood disorder that turns blood cells into instruments of pain.

New gene therapies promise a cure for sickle cell disease, and Dongre says he's "praying the treatment should come to us."

But experts say the one-time treatment is out of reach in India and Africa - places where the disease is most common. Vast inequities cut much of the world off from gene therapy in

While access to all sorts of medicine is limited in developing countries, the problem is especially acute with these therapies, some of the most expensive treatments in the world.

Beyond their sky-high prices, these therapies are extremely complex to give patients because they require long hospitalizations, sophisticated medical equipment and specially trained doctors. So far, the two gene therapies for sickle cell have only been approved in wealthier countries: both in the US, and one in Britain and Bahrain as well.

Progress

"The vast, vast majority of patients live in an area where they have no access to this kind of therapy," said Dr. Benjamin Watkins, who treats sickle cell at Children's Hospital New Orleans. "We as medical professionals, and as a society, have to think

Access to gene therapies was a major focus of this year's international summit on human genome editing in London. A subsequent editorial in the journal Nature said high prices leave low- and middle-income countries "entirely in the lurch" and could stymie progress across the field.

Some scientists worry that new cures won't reach their potential, future treatments may never be invented and the prospect of wiping out diseases like sickle cell will remain a distant dream.

For gene therapy to even be an option, people in developing nations must stay alive long enough to get it. There, sickle cell disease is more likely to disable or kill than in wealthy regions. Late diagnosis is common and basic care can be hard to come by.

Sickle cell disease affects hemoglobin, the protein in red blood cells that carries oxygen. A genetic mutation causes the cells to become crescent-shaped, which can block blood flow and cause problems such as excruciating pain and organ damage.

Global estimates of how many people have the disease vary, but some researchers put the number between 6 million and 8 million - with more than 1 million in India and more than 5 million in sub-Saharan Africa.

Dongre, who lives in Nagpur in central India, has seen the struggles in his own family and among people he's met as a leader of India's National Alliance of Sickle Cell Organizations.

He recalled how his newborn son Girish cried constantly from stomach and leg pain. Doctors didn't diagnose him with sickle cell for 2 1/2 years. When their daughter Sumedha was born, he and his wife had her tested immediately and learned she had the disease too.

Surveys show people use CBD and other hemp compounds to treat everything from anxiety and sleep issues to pain. But experts say there is not enough clinical research on the compounds. The FDA warned CBD can cause liver injury and can poorly interact with certain medications.

Delta-8 THC is of particular concern, because of adverse side effects and because of how it is chemically manufactured.

Several states, including Colorado, ban or regulate delta-8 THC, though it is sold in many states due to a loophole in federal law.

"The implication in the paper, and I think it's accurate, is that if you don't have access to legal delta-9, then you're going to seek out delta-8," Bryan said. "But we know even less about delta-8 than we do about del-

The experiences motivated Thompson to seek assistance for her daughter, who also was missing developmental milestones. Abbie, now 3, was diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder in October of last year.

By March, Thompson enrolled her in applied behavior analysis - a therapy based on learning and behavior focused on improving communicative, social and motor skills - at a local facility in northern Indiana for 40 hours a week. Abbie, nonverbal most of her life, has since said her first word: "Mom."

"It brought tears to my eyes" Thompson said.

But Thompson and other families reliant on Medicaid worry changes coming in January will limit access to the therapy as Indiana attempts to limit the cost and, along with other states, cut the size of the low-income health care program.

Reimbursement

Indiana's Family and Social Services Administration said the cost of Medicaid reimbursement for the behavioral therapy, commonly referred to as ABA, has ballooned in recent years because of the growing number of children seeking the services and the amount that providers have billed the state. The state plans a universal, hourly reimbursement rate for the therapy, but the planned amount is lower than what providers have previously received on average.

Advocates and centers worry this will mean accepting fewer patients or even closing, as has happened in other states such as Colorado this year.

"Companies just kept leaving and it just kind of turned into a crisis situation," said J.J. Tomash, who leads an ABA provider in Colorado called BehaviorSpan. He blamed Medicaid reimbursement rates that have not kept up with the cost of living. Medicaid began covering the services

in 2016, and providers in Indiana set their own rates until now. But centers say the new rates are still not enough to keep them running and are far below the previous statewide average of \$97 per hour. Indiana Act for Families, a coalition

opposing the new rates, said the proposal is 10% below providers' operating costs. Although Indiana has said the new rates are aligned with pay in other states, the coalition argued the state used outdated data in their comparison.

Miles Hodge, owner and co-founder of Shine Pediatric Therapy in Indianapolis, said the effects of the new rates will take their toll over time. The state said the rates will be up for review every four years, a time frame Hodge said does not keep up with inflation.
"It could leave a lot of people under-

water," he said.

About 6,200 children and young adults received the services under Medicaid in 2022, the state said.

With a standard patient to therapist ratio of 1-to-1, ABA is an "extremely staff intensive model," Hodge said. Across the state, he expects staff pay and benefits to be hit, which he said could lead to high turnover and inconsistent care for patients.

Hodge predicted his center will have to take fewer patients who are on Medicaid because of the changes.

The Indiana agency overseeing Medicaid said the therapy is the only major service category that did not have a uniform reimbursement rate, and the rising cost of the services was unsustainable. ABA expenditures increased more than 50% per year for the last three years, according to the

In 2022, ABA claims represented \$420 million in Medicaid spending, the state said. Total Medicaid expenditures in state fiscal year 2022 totaled more than \$16 billion.

The move comes at the same time as states unwind pandemic-era protections that kept millions of people covered by Medicaid. In Indiana, the number of people enrolled in Medicaid steadily grew every month from March 2020 until May 23, when the federal budget law ended the protections.

Indiana's total enrollment has fallen every month since then.

States setting universal rates is common, but low reimbursement endangers access to key services for individuals with disabilities, said Jennifer Lav, senior attorney with the National Health Law Program.

Lower rates in a time of high inflation can lead to staff turnover and shortages, issues that can compound in rural areas, she said.

ABA is not without critics. Zoe Gross, advocacy director at the Autistic Self-Advocacy Network, said ABA's goal is to eliminate behaviors considered autistic and teaches children to conform with neurotypical behaviors. "It teaches you that the way you

naturally behave is not OK," she said. But families who have found it help-

ful find it hard to imagine a future with-

In Westfield, a suburb of Indianapolis, 29-year-old Natasha Virgil said her family's ability to participate in activities outside their home markedly improved once 6-year-old Elijah Hill began ABA therapy.

"My biggest thing is making sure that he has a fighting chance to be able to live in this world and have the skills to survive," Virgil said, holding her 4-month-old daughter and watching Elijah play with soap bubbles near the family's Christmas tree. It's difficult already for parents of

children with disabilities to hold jobs between numerous therapy sessions and doctor's appointments, Virgil said. "I don't think I would ever be able

to be where we are if we didn't pursue ABA," she said

Chanel McClure, mother of 2-yearold King, said she has lost sleep over the pending change. She interviewed multiple centers before finding the ABA therapy she wanted for King. He was on a waiting list for another 11 months.

Now almost 3, King is nonverbal and attends speech, occupational and developmental therapy. Since beginning ABA, McClure said he has learned new ways to communicate and is comfortable playing with other children. His therapists are working to address elopement or wandering that can

Brignone dominates to win World Cup super-G

VAL D'ISERE, France, Dec 17, (AP): Federica Brignone dominated to win a World Cup super-G on Sunday and trim the gap in the overall standings to Mikaela Shiffrin, who skied out at Val

Brignone beat Kajsa Vickhoff Lie by almost half a second, finishing 0.44 ahead of the Norwegian skier, who was a surprise second to prevent an Italian one-two in the French Alps.

The 33-year-old Brignone, who won a pair of giant slaloms at Tremblant, Quebec earlier this month, yelled in joy and put her head in her hands when she saw her time after crossing the line.

It was Lie's fourth podium and her first in super-G since another second place in Garmisch, Germany almost three years ago.

SKIING

Brignone's Italian teammate Sofia Goggia was third after impressively managing to atone for an early mistake. Goggia, who is shaking off a cold, won the only other super-G so far this season earlier this month.

Shiffrin failed to finish after missing a turning gate on a blind section that troubled several athletes on Sunday. Olympic champion Lara Gut-Behrami also skied out.

Shiffrin, who skipped Saturday's downhill on the Saslong course, still leads the overall World Cup standings where she is bidding for a record-tying sixth title.

However, the American skier saw her lead cut to 63 points ahead of 2020 champion Brignone, who is enjoying her best start to a season.

Meanwhile, Marco Odermatt won another World Cup giant slalom Sunday at Alta Badia but by a more slender margin than the two-time defending overall World Cup champion is

Odermatt heaved a sigh of relief as the Swiss star crossed the line with a combined time just 0.19 seconds faster than Filip Zubcic, who could only shake his head and smile wryly.

Zubcic had seemed set for a first victory in nearly three years and yelled in joy after a perfect run down the Gran Risa saw the Croatian finish more than two seconds ahead of Žan Kranjec.

"When I came to the finish area I saw the gap, it was like two seconds in front of everybody, but I knew that Marco is on the start so I wasn't celebrating yet because you know this guy he's absolutely ... crazy," Zubcic said.

"I want to say congratulations to him because in 99.9% with this run you win but today was not enough obviously.'



India rout South Africa in first ODI with dominant all-round display

JOHANNESBURG, Dec 17, (AP): Left-arm pacer Arshdeep Singh picked up his maiden five-wicket haul as India beat South Africa by eight wickets in the first ODI on Sunday.

Singh recorded 5-37 in 10 overs, and shared nine wickets with Avesh Khan, who took 4-27 in eight overs, as the Proteas were bowled out for a paltry 116 in 27.3 overs.

In replay, India coasted to 117-2 in 16.4 overs with debutant opener Sai Sudharsan scoring an unbeaten maiden half-century.

The victory gives India a 1-0 lead in the three-match series. Gqeberha will host the second ODI on Tuesday, while the third will be played in Paarl on Thursday.

Opting to bat first, South Africa's batting line-up duly collapsed. Singh bowled Reeza Hendricks for an eightball duck, and then trapped Rassie

Australia crush Pakistan by 360 runs in first Test 'inside' 4 days

Lyon achieves 500-wicket landmark

PERTH, Australia, Dec 17, (AP): Australia skittled Pakistan on a treacherous Perth pitch to record a thumping 360-run victory in the first Test inside four days with Nathan Lyon achieving the elusive landmark of 500 Test wickets on Sunday. Pakistan was blown away for 89

all out in 30.2 overs in the final session on Day 4 for its 15th consecutive Test defeat in Australia after the home team set up a daunting 450-run target when it declared its second innings at 233-5 around half an hour after lunch.

Pakistan's top-order batters crumbled against the relentless pace of Mitchell Starc, Josh Hazlewood and captain Pat Cummins on a wicket that had variable bounce with plenty of batters taking body blows.

Hazlewood and Starc snared six wickets between them, while Cummins nicely setup former Pakistan captain Babar Azam (14) before finding the outside edge of his bat as the visitors had no answer to Australia's nippy fast

CRICKET

Lyon reached the 500-wicket landmark when he successfully went for a leg before wicket referral against Faheem Ashraf and was embraced by his teammates. The off-spinner raised the ball to the applause of the Perth crowd as he became the third Australian bowler after the late Shane Warne and Glenn McGrath to join the exclusive club of eight players.

Lyon said the match victory doubled his delight at reaching the landmark.

Lyon then clean bowled Aamer Jamal in the same over off a delivery that bounced no higher than ankle height to finish with 2-18 in his memorable test match.

Pakistan slumped to 17-3 inside the first seven overs of its daunting runchase. Opener Abdullah Shafique fell caught behind to a brilliant Starc delivery in the first over as the leftarm fast bowler got his 200th test wicket at home.

Captain Shan Masood could make only 2 before he played a loose drive off Hazlewood and Imam-ul-Haq was pinned leg before wicket by Starc with another gem of a delivery that came sharply into the left-hander.

Hazlewood quickly folded Pakistan's fragile batting by having top-scorer Saud Shakeel (24) leg before wicket and dismissing No. 11 batter Khurram Shahzad off successive deliveries

Earlier, Usman Khawaja fell short of his century before he holed out for 90 against out of sorts Shaheen Shah Afridi as Australia looked for quick runs after lunch. Afridi had a disappointing start to the series as Pakistan's premier fast bowler returned with match figures of 2-176 off his 45.2 overs.

Left-handed Khawaja and Mitchell Marsh, who remained unbeaten on 63, shared a run-a-ball 126 with Marsh scoring his second successive half century at his home ground.

Resuming Sunday at 84-2, Australia lost Steven Smith and Travis Head in the first hour of the day as Pakistan's bowlers took advantage of the tricky




