Rocket fired at Iraq air base

WASHINGTON, Dec 21, (Agencies): A 122mm rocket was fired at Al-Assad Air Base in Iraq without causing damage or injuries, stated the United States Central Command (CENTCOM) late Wednesday.

On social media platform "X, the CENTCOM posted that "approximately around 7:30am (Iraqi time), a 122mm rocket was launched at Al-Assad Air Base in Iraq.' "The combined joint task force located the point of origin and passed the

location to the Iraqi Security Forces (ISF) who moved to the site to investigate," CENTCOM added. The ISF seized a flatbed truck modified to launch up to five 122mm

rockets that was located at the site. The total number of targeted attacks the US Army was exposed to, in

both Iraq and Syria, has increased to 74 attacks since October 17th, announced the United States Department of Defense (Pentagon). In other news, Turkish warplanes carried out new airstrikes Wednesday

against Kurdish militant targets in neighboring Iraq, the Turkish defense ministry said, a day after Turkish and Iraqi officials held high-level security talks in Ankara. Turkey often launches strikes against targets in Syria and Iraq that it be-

lieves to be affiliated with the Kurdistan Workers' Party, or PKK, a banned Kurdish separatist group that has waged an insurgency against Turkey

According to a statement from the ministry, the fighter jets struck a total of 14 suspected PKK targets in northern Iraq's Gara, Hakourk and Qandil regions where the aircraft destroyed caves, shelters and warehouses used by the militants. Measures were taken to avoid harming civilians, historic or cultural heritage and the environment, the ministry added.

Sulaiman and his noble silence

No Kuwaiti citizen has managed to elevate Kuwait onto the global cultural stage quite like the accomplished artist and director Sulaiman Yahya Âl-Bassam.

However, a perplexity arises within me, primarily associated with the state of culture in my country. Each time I witness his productions, a sense of pride washes over me, accompanied by a profound melan-

choly and disquietude. This stems from the almost deliberate oversight by the state machinery to accord him the respect and recognition he rightfully deserves. It is not merely for the brilliance of his theatrical endeavors or his meticulous craftsmanship but also for his selfless dedication,



investing his time and resources to produce and direct outstanding international works.

His efforts are not solely driven by personal gratification or the pursuit of perfection in artistic creation but also by the altruistic motive of elevating the name of his country on the global

His latest play, "Silence," which I had the privilege of witnessing about three weeks ago in a special screening at Dar al-Athar al-Islamiyyah, was staggering in its magnificence and subject matter, stringent in all its dimensions.

This marked the fourth work I have observed by the artist and director Suleiman, and one cannot help but notice the extent of his commitment. It goes beyond presenting a comprehensive artistic piece, venturing into the realm of innovation, holding the audience's breath for over an hour, with all eyes captivated by the splendor of the performance, despite the stage being occupied by only one actress, a proficient international talent, and two musicians.

The genesis of this international work saw its first workshop held in Switzerland in October 2022. Subsequently, the crew moved to Tunis, where the play was presented in collaboration with the Tunisian National Theater in March 2023, on the sidelines of the Tunis International Theater Festival. An open rehearsal was then staged on July 22, 2023, at the Fondazione Giangiacomo Feltrinelli Theater in Milan, Italy, as part of the annual Summer Theater and Dance Festival.

Director Al-Bassam's connection with the Carthage Film Days in 2021, where his distinctive play "iMedia" received three welldeserved awards, paved the way for "Silence" to be showcased again in Tunisia at its international festival. Once more, it earned three international awards.

The play "Silence" transcends the ordinary, delving into the profound and harrowing repercussions of the human, security, and political tragedy that struck the core of Beirut and the less, without banks, currency, independence, vision, or a foreseeable future.

"Silence" emerges as a testament to the director's commitment to political theater in the face of this extensive destruction and despair, which has left nothing untouched within the psyche of the Lebanese citizen. It is our hope that this work reaches and is presented in theaters across Arab countries, or what remains of them. Simultaneously, it is our fervent wish that international director Sulaiman Al-Bassam receives due recognition from the state, placing his name at the forefront of those deserving the state's accolades.

KUWAIT CITY, Dec 21: The Criminal Court sentenced two Saudi citizens to seven-year imprisonment for impersonating a Kuwaiti citizen who has been missing since 1995, and forging his citizenship and civil identification card.

During the court session, the court asked who the individual is who disappeared in 1995, and the first defendant replied that he is that individual. In response, the judge asked where he had been hiding, and the defendant replied that he had been traveling to different countries.

The court then asked the second defendant about his identity, and he said he is the individual who had disappeared in 1995, adding that he was living outside Kuwait.

Both defendants denied the accusations, and the court decided to send both of them to Central Prison.

It is worth highlighting that the Public Prosecution had charged the first suspect with committing forgery in official documents such as passport, birth certificate and civil identification card under the name of the missing Kuwaiti citizen, and claiming that they belong

The second suspect was charged Kuwaiti citizenship file, passport and

He was charged with giving false information to the employees of the concerned departments and taking advantage of their good faith to convince them that he is the son of the missing

On the first working day following the holiday period, Kuwaiti courts have issued 486 verdicts in the name of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, reports Al-Oabas daily.

A reliable source said, the Farwaniya courts issued 46 judgments in civil and commercial cases, along with 19 in appealed misdemeanor cases. Additionally, these courts issued 74 judgments in municipal cases and 75 in misdemeanor cases.

The source emphasized that the Hawalli Court issued 25 civil rulings and 27 criminal rulings, while the courts in the capital issued 50 verdicts in civil commercial cases, 4 administrative judgments, 21 in rental cases, and 7 grievance decisions.

Jahra courts issued 5 commercial verdicts and 16 criminal decisions, and the Ahmadi courts were responsible for 17 judgments in misdemeanor cases, 14 in labor cases, and 7 in commercial

In family law, a total of 45 judgments were issued, with Hawalli courts delivering 15 rulings, Al-Ahmadi courts issuing 10, Farwaniya courts contributing with 9, and both the capital and Mubarak Al-Kabeer courts each providing 5. Jahra courts, on the other hand, issued just one verdict in family cases.

Furthermore, the President of the Court of Cassation issued a circular instructing the secretaries of the sessions and court typists to prioritize accuracy in the preambles of the rulings announced, effective from Dec 20, in the name of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah.

Meanwhile, the Court of Appeals, presided over by Judge Nasr Salem Alheid, issued the first ruling under the name of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah. It sentenced an employee of the Public Prosecution to five-year imprisonment for manipulating court verdicts and entering wrong data in order to ensure the release of some convicted individuals through the issuance of fake acquittal decisions.

Tracing the journey of KSE's restructuring

KUWAIT CITY, Dec 21: About 150 companies are currently trading on the Kuwait Stock Exchange, compared to approximately 220 stocks that were listed locally before the global financial crisis that erupted at the end of 2008, which constituted a sharp decline in the number of companies traded over the past 15 years, with 70 companies representing a third of the stock market's strength, reports Al-Rai daily.

In practice, the state of the large exit of listed companies from the stock exchange between 2008 and 2023 sheds light on the first-generation companies that were listed since the start of trading in the local stock market in 1984 and are still trading.

At the beginning, it must be noted that the current entity of the stock exchange began under the name of the Kuwait Stock Exchange or the Kuwait Stock Exchange, which is a stock trading market that includes 5 markets: the official, parallel, fractional, options and futures markets.

Looking at the list of the first generation companies in the stock exchange, it is clear that it includes 27 stocks that began trading in the Kuwait Stock Exchange on September 29, 1984, as these companies represent a historical operational legacy of the Kuwaiti capital market due to the weight they represent in terms of weight and market value, noting that there are other companies. She participated in the launch of the market in 1983, but left it in light of the repercussions of the financial crisis.

The list of the first companies listed on the stock exchange so far includes 8 banks: "NBK", "KFH", "Al Khaleej", "Tijari", "Kuwait United", "Al Ahli", "Burgan", and "KIB" (formerly International), in addition it includes 19 diversified investment companies -- "Kuwait Investment Company", "Facilitations", and "KIPCO", in addition to 4 insurance companies: "Al-Khaleej Insurance", "Warba", "Kuwait Insurance", and "Al-Ahlia"



Kuwait projects market continues its long-term decline: MEED

KUWAIT CITY, Dec 21: The project market in Kuwait continued its long-term decline, losing \$20 billion, or 10.2% of its total value, in one year (from December 3, 2022 to December 1, 2023), noting that it recorded \$178 billion in the month of December, according to data related to the Med Projects Index, reports Al-Qabas daily.

MEED reported that the region's project market expanded at its fastest rate ever over the past year, with the value of the entire market growing by 21.4% to reach more than \$3.76 trillion, while the GCC market expanded by 26% to reach \$3.16 trillion.

This significant rise this year was driven by growth in most markets,

but led by Saudi Arabia and the UAE, which achieved growth of more than 31%, adding more than \$590 billion in value between them.

Saudi Arabia, the largest project market, added a value of \$425 billion, as activity was driven by a combination of expansion in the oil and gas business and pipeline from mega projects linked to Vi-

sion 2030. The project market in the UAE also expanded by \$165 billion; a rise in activity led by projects. Important new oil and gas and real estate market recovery and related activities.

The next most improved market was Oman, which grew by just under 30% and added \$51 billion in project value, driven by the launch

of plans for multi-billion-dollar hydrogen projects in the Sultanate. The Omani projects market also outperformed the Qatari market in terms of the total value of active projects.

Qatar's project market grew by nearly 10%, adding value of \$19 billion in a sign that activity in the country is rebounding from a lull in project activity in the run-up to the

2022 FIFA World Cup. The Bahraini project market added \$10.5 billion of The value is approximately 17%.

Outside the Gulf states, the Iraqi project market grew by 7.5%, adding a value of \$22.6 billion. The Iranian project market, still affected by US sanctions, fell by 4.4%, losing nearly \$13 billion in value.

Elsewhere, the Public Health Authority of Saudi Arabia has announced the rapid spread of the new COVID-19 variant called JN.1 in Saudi Arabia.

It is worth highlighting that the Saudi Public Health Authority (Weqaya) recently announced the increase in the number of JN.1 cases, which reached 36 percent.

On its X account, the authority explained that none of the reported cases required admission in the intensive care units, adding that the vaccine for COVID-19 works on JN.1 variant also.

It stressed that there is no cause for worry and no need to implement any strict measures. It also urged the public to ignore the rumors about the possibility of a new epidemic, and called on everyone to seek information from accredited sources only.

PAHW to float two tenders for over 13K plots in S. Jaber Al-Ahmad City

Authority sets Dec 24 as date for floating bids

KUWAIT CITY, Dec 21: The Public Authority for Housing Welfare (PAHW) announced the approval of the tender committee to issue two tenders for the construction, completion and maintenance of road works and infrastructure networks for 13,812 plots in the South Jaber Al-Ahmad Residential City project.

In a press statement, the Deputy Director General for Control and Information Systems Affairs Amina Abdul Kareem Al-Awadhi revealed that PAHW has sent December 24, 2023 as the date for floating the two tenders.

She explained that the first tender is related to the construction, completion and maintenance of road works and infrastructure networks for 7,623 housing units located in the N5, N7, N9 and N10 suburbs.

The second tender is related to the construction, completion and maintenance of road works and infrastructure networks for 6,189 housing units located in the N4, N6, and N8 suburbs.

Al-Awadhi revealed that the closing date for the two tenders will be February 1, 2024, and the project implementation period is scheduled to be 900 days for each tender.

She went on to explain that the work of the two tenders will include the establishment of networks for rainwater, sewage, irrigation, treated water, fresh water, telephone lines, electricity and traffic works. It will also include application of three layers of asphalt on all the main roads in the project, installation of 15 irrigation tankers and construction of 600 electrical substations.

Urgent need for investments

Kuwait's oil industry 'grapples' with challenges, striving for 2040 targets

KUWAIT CITY, Dec 21: Standard & Poor's credit rating agency "S&P" said that Kuwait faces challenges to raise the production capacity of crude oil to the desired levels within the country's 2040 strategy, before peak demand deadline set for carbon neutrality in the middle of the century, indicating that Kuwait must overcome the challenges, lack of foreign investments, and aging oil fields to add new production capabilities, reports Al-Anba daily

The agency stated that the exploration and production sector in Kuwait requires investments. Large, as the Great Burgan field faces a natural decline, and any addition to production capacity will be consumed by the continuing decline in the production of the second largest oil field in the world, which is already producing approximately 95% of its full capacity, as current production is about 1.6 million barrels per day, Supported by enhancing the extraction process through gas injection and water flooding.

Assistant Professor of History at Kuwait University, Badr Al-Saif, said that Kuwait, which is considered the fourth largest oil producer in OPEC and possesses the seventh largest reserves in ... The world will continue its plan as usual without being affected by many changes in energy policy that are usually left to technocrats

to deal with. The agency added that the neutral zone is another potential source of production capacity additions, but operational challenges face any serious development. For the joint fields, whose operation was only resumed in 2020 after a hiatus that lasted more than 4 years, indicating that Kuwait faces the possibility of falling behind its regional counterparts when it comes to the energy transition pe-

During the COP 28 climate talks

in Dubai, Kuwait said that it will not support a decisive text calling for the gradual elimination of fossil fuels, and OPEC Secretary-General Haitham Al-Ghais also urged producers not to support the text in a message he addressed to its members during the climate negotiations

The UAE consensus that was eventually adopted called for countries to transition away from fossil fuels and triple renewable capacity, something that does not exist in Kuwait.

During a comprehensive overhaul of the strategy announced in October Kuwait Petroleum Corporation has outlined plans to develop technology, including the use of carbon capture and storage, as part of goals to reach net greenhouse gas emissions in Scopes 1 and 2 by 2050.

KPC is studying the issue of green hydrogen. Second-generation biofuels, renewables, storage, recycled plastics, energy efficiency, retail, and carbon offsetting are part of its strategy, but it has not set specific plans and timelines.

Independent oil analyst Kamel Al-Harami said that Kuwait needs to develop green hydrogen and carbon capture.

It should be noted that Kuwait reviewed its plans for crude oil production capacity in October, with the aim of reaching 4 million barrels per day by 2035, in addition to two billion cubic feet per day of non-associated gas by 2040, and capacity additions will come from its domestic fields as well as the neutral zone it shares with Saudi Arabia.

The country's declared production capacity is 2.9 million barrels per day of hydrocarbons, while the restricted production due to OPEC+ cuts reached about 2.55 million barrels per day last November, according to the latest survey conducted by Platts, affiliated with Standard & Poor's.

Kuwaitis spend 3.53 bln dinars on travel in 9 months this year

Q3 2023 sees 13.92% surge over previous quarter

KUWAIT CITY, Dec 21: The spending by Kuwaitis on travel in the third quarter of this year increased by about 13.92 percent compared to the second quarter of the same year, reaching 1.157 billion dinars compared to 1.016 billion in the previous three months from April to June.

According to balance of payments data issued by the Central Bank of Kuwait, spending on travel in the third quarter of 2023 recorded an increase of about 1.57 percent over its level in the same quarter of last year, which amounted to about 1.139 billion dinars, while Kuwaitis spent about 3.534 billion dinars on travel during the nine months.

The first months of this year, an increase of 13.65 percent compared to their spending during the corresponding period in 2022, amounting to about

Central Bank data showed that remittances from expatriates abroad during the third quarter of this year amounted to 867.7 million dinars, down by about 2.74 percent from their value in the second quarter, which amounted to 892.1 million, while they recorded a decline of about 31.46 percent compared to their value in the third quarter of the last year, amounting to 1.266 billion.

Remittances

As for the nine-month period, expatriate remittances during the period from January to September of this year recorded about 2.98 billion dinars, down by about 29.67 percent from their level in the first nine months of last year, which amounted to about 4.24 billion dinars.

The data revealed that the current account, which shows the summary of receipts and payments between the local economy and other economies with regard to transactions of goods, services and income, recorded a surplus during the third quarter of the current year amounting to about 4.72 billion dinars, bringing the total surplus achieved during the first nine months of the year. This year, about 12.22 billion dinars.

According to the data, the current account surplus decreased in the third quarter of 2023 by about 11.2 percent from its level in the same quarter of last year, amounting to 5.32 billion dinars, and it also declined during the first nine months of the current year by about 16.6 percent from its level in the corresponding period of 2022, amounting to about 14.66 billion dinars.

The value of Kuwait's merchandise exports during the third quarter of 2023 amounted to about 6.77 billion dinars, down by about 16.9 percent from their value in the second quarter of this year, which amounted to 8.15 billion dinars, while the value of merchandise exports during the period from January to September of the current year amounted to 19.52 billion. dinars, down 18.6 percent from its level in the same period last year,

amounting to 23.98 billion. The value of Kuwait's oil exports during the months of July, August and September of this year reached approximately 6.28 billion dinars, declining by about 17 percent from their value in the same period in 2022, which amounted to about 7.57 billion, while the value of oil exports recorded a decline of about 19.6 percent during the nine months. The first of 2023 to reach 18.06 billion dinars, compared to about 22.46 billion in the same period of 2022.

Students kick off first semester exams

KUWAIT CITY, Dec 21: Examinations for the first semester of the 2023/2024 academic year began for the intermediate level and the tenth and eleventh grades of the secondary level in both scientific and literary sections, for a total of 193,186 male and female students.

Yesterday morning, 129,503 students of intermediate schools from grades six to nine sat for the transfer tests.

A total of 63,683 male and female students in the tenth and eleventh grades in the scientific and literary sections applied for the exams. The number of tenth grade male and female students was 33,430, and the number of eleventh grade male and female students

The tenth grade students sat for the Biology test, and the eleventh grade science students sat for the Geology test. The literary students sat for the French language test, and the intermediate level students took their standardized tests at the level of educational zones and private Arab schools. The testing committees witnessed the implementation of procedures to control the exam process and prevent cheating.

According to educational sources, instructions were issued to all heads of examination committees to avoid arbitrarily applying the cheating regulations or restricting students in a disruptive and confusing manner that may confuse students inside the examination halls, and to deal in accordance with the regulations and in a calm and smooth manner without affecting the students' concentration and the work of the committees.

Inspection tours were carried out yesterday morning by a number of the ministry's leaders to check on the course of work of the examination committees and their discipline, record their observations, and address any deficiencies that may arise in terms of the examination questions or the work of observers in the committees.

Biden needs new approach to Black voters

Democrats urged to rethink strategies

ATLANTA, Dec 21, (AP): Some top Democrats are worried that a dip in Black voter turnout, along with other challenges, could doom President Joe Biden and his party in 2024.

A group of Democrats is offering a new analysis of the most recent campaigns in Georgia and Michigan, pitching those battlegrounds as models for drawing in more Black voters next year and beyond. They argue that Democratic power players need to think - and spend money - in new ways, going beyond efforts that can be last-minute or superficial as they try to reassemble Biden's 2020 coalition.

"The days of the symbolic fish fry and one-time church visit are over, wrote the authors of the analysis by strategists widely credited for helping flip Georgia and Michigan to Biden. "Black voters have always required an approach to voter engagement as diverse as the Black voting coali-

Biden has long depended on Black voters - first as a Delaware senator and most notably in the 2020 South Carolina primary, which delivered him a decisive win that led much of the Democratic field to consolidate behind him.

But just 50% of Black adults said they approve of Biden in a December poll by the Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs. That is compared with 86% in July 2021, with the gap fueling concerns about

his reelection prospects.

The new report, shared exclusively with The Associated Press and being

presented privately to Democratic power players, contends as part of several recommendations that the left must regularly engage all Black voters, including the most reluctant, while amplifying arguments about abortion rights in Black communi-

Said Lauren Groh-Wargo, a leader of the push and longtime adviser to Georgia Democrat Stacey Abrams: "People need to see something dif-

abortionrights referendum and re-elect Gov. Gretchen Whitmer. Abrams lost her second bid against Georgia Gov. Brian Kemp, but Democratic Sen. Raphael Warnock beat Herschel Walker to retain his Senate seat, bolstered in part by years of work by Abrams and other organizers.

The report explores why the two states' 2022 electorates differed from other racially diverse battlegrounds. The contributors want to share their conclusions with the party's biggest donors and top strategists, including those running Biden's 2024 campaign. One of Biden's top campaign aides managed Warnock's campaign.

Arizona, Georgia, Michigan, Nevada, North Carolina, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin are the seven states that will be critical in deciding the Electoral College next year. Across those states in 2022, Black turnout dropped, on av-

erage, about 22% from the 2018 midterms, according to multiple Democratic firms' data analysis. Lagging Black support for Biden in any three of those states next fall could cut off his path to the required 270 electoral votes.

Michigan's Black turnout in 2022 was about 90% of its 2018 totals, according to the analysis. But among Black voters under 35, the 2022 turnout was 96% of 2018 levels - notably outpacing other battlegrounds, Georgia included. That bolstered Whitmer's nearly 11-point victory and the abortion rights referendum, which passed by 13 points. The analysis found Michigan's Black voters supported the initiative by a higher proportion than any other race or ethnicity; that finding was repeated recently in Ohio's abortion referendum, authors said.

Research

"We were open to the research that showed us just how much this would resonate in Black communities," said Michigan Democratic Chairwoman Lavora Barnes, the first Black woman to hold her post and a co-author of the

"We made it part of a broader message about rights and freedom," she added, saying Black Americans, because of their historical experience with oppression, are especially attuned to "having our rights taken

Whitmer, who embraced the nonpartisan abortion-rights campaign, said the lessons must carry forward as some Republicans propose national abortion restrictions.

"My generation assumed that these rights would always be intact for us and our children," the governor, 52, said recently. "Lo and behold, here we are having to fight over and over again to protect these rights.

Black turnout in Georgia, meanwhile, was about 92% of 2018 levels; Black voters over 50 exceeded their 2018 marks.

If Georgia's Black turnout had tracked the 2022 battleground average, the analysis calculates that about 175,000 fewer voters would have cast November ballots. With Warnock winning more than 9 out of 10 Black votes, that shortfall almost certainly would have meant his defeat to Walker, the only GOP statewide nominee who lost in Georgia last year.

And if Black turnout in other 2022 battlegrounds reflected Georgia's, Democrats almost certainly would have defeated Republican Sen. Ron Johnson in Wisconsin and may have won a North Carolina Senate seat, expanding their narrow majority, the authors argue.

Some recommendations from Georgia are challenging and expensive. Abrams' operation began a decade ago trying to expand voter participation in Georgia, focusing on Black and other nonwhite residents who rarely or never voted. Now Georgia's political footprint involves hundreds of paid canvassers, sophisticated digital outreach, voter registration drives and door-knocking campaigns even in non-campaign

The report argues that the investment over time creates socalled "super voters" who make the Democratic investment worth it. The document details tactics Georgia and Michigan Democrats have used and that the authors say can be scaled in other states.

The authors note that in 2018, when Abrams first ran for governor, Georgia had more than 1.1 million Black voters deemed "low propensity" and unlikely to vote. After the 2022 election, that has dropped to between 700,000 and 800,000

Is it a shift to the right?

Macron defends divisive immigration bill

PARIS, Dec 21, (AP): French President **Emmanuel Macron** said Wednesday that a contentious immigration bill negotiated with conservatives is imperfect and needs some fixes but is "what the French wanted," and is not a victory for the far-

The president on a much-listened-to talk show explained and defended the divisive immigration bill that critics claim plays into the hands of Marine Le Pen, the leader of the far-right National Rally group at the National Assembly.

"It's the fruit of a compromise," Macron said.

Tuesday's vote on the bill at parliament came after lawmakers from Macron's centrist alliance and the conservative Republicans party found a deal to allow the text to make its way through the legislative process, which many perceived as a sign of a shift of the government to the

Critics claim the bill in part mimics the far-right party's long-standing demand for "national preference" by which the French, not foreigners, must profit from the riches of the land.

The bill strengthens France's ability to deport foreigners considered undesirable and makes it tougher for foreigners to take advantage of social welfare, among other measures. Some decried it as a betrayal of French values.

It passed the lower house of parliament, the National Assembly, with a 349-186 vote late Tuesday. It had already been adopted by the Senate.

Parliament lifts Berisha's immunity: Albania's parliament voted Thursday to lift the legal immunity of former Prime Minister Sali Berisha, who leads the opposition Democratic Party and is accused of corrup-

Opposition lawmakers inside the hall boycotted the vote and tried to disrupt the session by collecting chairs and flares, but security guards stopped them. Berisha declined to take the floor to speak against the

The ruling Socialist Party holds 74 of the 140 seats in Albania's national legislature, and 75 lawmakers agreed to grant a request from prosecutors to strip Berisha of his parliamentary immunity. Thursday's vote clears prosecutors to seek a court's permission to put Berisha under arrest or house arrest. (AP)

Poland's media faces makeover: Poland's new pro-European Union government has begun to wrestle control of the country's state media and some other state agencies from the conservative party that consolidated its grip on them during eight

years in power.
The Cabinet of Prime Minister Donald Tusk, which took office last week, said Wednesday it had fired and replaced the directors of the state television and radio outlets and the government-run news agency. It seeks to reestablish independent media in Poland in a legally binding and lasting way.

Tusk's government has made it a priority to restore objectivity and free expression in state media, which the previous government, under the Law and Justice party, used as aggressive propaganda tools, attacking Tusk and the opposition and spreading its euroskeptic views. (AP)

US, Venezuela swap prisoners: The United States freed a close ally of Venezuelan President Nicolás Maduro in exchange for the release of 10 Americans imprisoned in the South American country and the return of a fugitive defense contractor known as "Fat Leonard" who is at the center of a massive Pentagon bribery scandal, the Biden administration announced Wednesday.

The American detainees were back on U.S.

soil late Wednesday, White House national security adviser Jake Sullivan said. Six of them arrived at Kelly Airfield Annex in San Anto-

Texas begins flying migrants: Texas sent a plane with more than 120 migrants from the U.S.-Mexico border to Chicago in an escalation of Republican Gov. Greg **Abbott**'s busing operation that has given more than 80,000 migrants free rides to Democratic-led cities across the country since last year.

The first flight, which Abbott's office said left from El Paso and arrived Tuesday, was arranged a week after Chicago's city council took new action over the busloads of migrants that have drawn sharp criticism from Mayor Brandon Johnson. The city has said bus operators began trying to drop off people in neighboring cities to avoid penalties that include fines, towing or impoundment. (AP)

Wisconsin Republican leader pivots: The Republican leader of Wisconsin's Assembly who had threatened possible impeachment of a new liberal state Supreme Court justice over her views on redistricting now says such a move is "super unlikely."

Assembly Speaker Robin Vos originally threatened to impeach Justice Janet Protasiewicz if she did not recuse herself from the redistricting challenge, which is backed by Democrats seeking to throw out Republican-drawn electoral maps. After Protasie-wicz refused to step down from the case, Vos raised the possibility of impeachment based on how she rules. (AP)

Territorial tensions escalate

Beijing-Manila bilateral ties at crossroads: Wang

BEIJING, Dec 21, (AP): China's Foreign Minister Wang Yi says the country will maintain military pressure on the Philippines amid a dispute over sovereignty in the South China Sea that could involve U.S. forces defending their treaty partner.

In a phone conversation Wednesday with his Philippine counterpart, Enrique A. Manalo, Wang "warned that if the Philippine side misjudges the situation, goes its own way, or even colludes with ill-intentioned external forces to continue to stir up troubles, China will defend its rights in accordance with law and respond resolutely," the official Xinhua News Agency report-

Wang's comments follow China's mobilization of its coast guard and maritime militia to block Philippine supply missions to support its soldiers and fisher-

men. China claims sovereignty over virtually the entire South China Sea, one of the world's most crucial waterways for shipping, putting it at odds with the Philippines, Vietnam, Malaysia, Taiwan and Brunei, who all maintain claims over islands, reefs and undersea resources in the region.

In particularly sharp comments, Wang was quoted as accusing the Philippines of having "changed its policy stance so far, reneged on the promises it has made, provoked

troubles at sea, and undermined China's legitimate and lawful rights. "Noting that the bilateral relationship now stands at a crossroads, with its future yet to be decided, Wang

said the Philippine side must act with caution," Xinhua reported Thursday. "Instead of continuing in the wrong direction, the Philippine side should return to the right path as soon

as possible, with properly handling and managing the current maritime situation as a top priority," Wang was quoted as saying. Wang gave no details on what agreements Manila had allegedly abandoned.

Manalo's office described the the conversation as a "frank and candid exchange," saying the sides had reached a "clearer understanding of our respective positions on a number of issues.

Territorial disputes have grown tenser as China seeks to cement its territorial claims in defiance of the U.S. and its allies, the Philippines, Japan, South Korea and close partner Taiwan, which China claims as a breakaway province and threatens to annex by military force.

Kim again threatens use of nukes: North Korean leader Kim Jong Un said his country has a policy of not hesitating to launch a nuclear strike on its rivals if provoked, as he praised troops involved in its recent intercontinental ballistic missile test, state media reported Thursday.

Since adopting an escalatory nuclear doctrine last year, Kim has repeatedly threatened to use nuclear weapons preemptively. But many foreign experts say North Korea has yet to obtain functioning nuclear missiles and is also unlikely to use its nukes first because it's outgunned by the U.S. and its allied forces.

North Korea on Monday conducted its first intercontinental ballistic missile test in five months, calling the drill a warning over confrontational U.S. and South Korean moves. North Korea cited a recent U.S.-South Korean meeting on boosting their nuclear deterrence plans.

The North's Korean Central News Agency said Kim met troops from the General Missile Bureau on Wednesday to congratulate them on the launch of the developmental solid-fueled Hwasong-18 missile, the North's newest and most powerful ICBM.

During the meeting, Kim said the launch demonstrated the evolution of the North's nuclear doctrine and strategy "not to hesitate even with a nuclear attack when the enemy provokes it with nukes," KCNA said.

Kim said peace is guaranteed by a war posture of being willing to launch preemptive strikes on the enemy anywhere to make it feel fear, KCNA said.

Last year, North Korea adopted a law that stipulates a broad range of situations in which it can use nuclear weapons. Since the beginning of 2022, it has also test-fired about 100 ballistic missiles, many of them nuclear-capable weapons targeting the U.S. and South Korea. Monday's Hwasong-18 launch was the weapon's third test-flight this year.

Outcry over church elder's detention: Ding Zhongfu was awakened by loud pounding on his door. Five police-

men greeted Ding, an elder in a Chinese church. The officers pinned him to the wall that Thursday morning in November and interrogated him while searching the apartment he shared with his wife, Ge Yunxia, and their 6-year old daughter.

Ding's family now pleads for his release after he was taken from his home in China's central Anhui province on suspicion of fraud. In their first public comments on the case, the family denies that Ding committed any fraud.

Instead, they told The Associated Press in an interview, it is part of a wider crackdown on religious freedoms in China.

Four others were detained, all senior members of the Ganquan church, a name that means "Sweet Spring," according to the family. All were taken on suspicion of fraud, according to a bulletin from the church.

"Under the fabricated charge of 'fraud,' many Christians faced harsh persecution," said Bob Fu, the founder of a U.S.-based Christian rights group, ChinaAid, who is advocating for Ding's release.

Police have started using fraud charges in recent years against leaders of what are known as house churches, or informal churches not registered with the government in China.

While China allows the practice of Christianity, it can only legally be done at churches registered with the state. Many who choose to worship in house churches say that joining a state church means worshiping the supremacy of the government and Communist Party over God, which they reject.

Beijing in the past several years has increased the pressure on house churches. In 2018, Chinese leader Xi Jinping issued a five year-plan to "Sinicize" all the nation's officially allowed religions, from Islam to Christianity to Buddhism, by infusing them with "Chinese characteristics" such as loyalty to the Communist Party. Heeding the call, local governments started shutting down house churches through evictions, police interrogations and arrests. (AP)



NEW DELHI, Dec 21, (AP): Dozens of opposition lawmakers suspended from Parliament by Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government for obstructing proceedings held a street protest on Thursday accusing the government of throttling democracy in the

They briefly marched outside the Parliament building in New Delhi behind a huge "Save Democracy" banner and carried placards reading "Democracy is in danger." The suspensions came as legislators were due to debate a contentious criminal reform bill.

More than 140 opposition lawmakers were suspended from the two houses of Parliament over the past week for demanding a statement from Home Minister Amit Shah about a Dec. 13 security breach when two intruders stormed the chamber by jumping from the visitors' gallery and releasing yellow smoke canisters. They created panic among lawmakers and disrupted parliamentary proceedings.

One of the intruders jumped from seat to seat before he was overpowered by some lawmakers and security staff and was later arrested. The police have also arrested several of their accomplices outside Parliament. The intruders claimed that they wanted to highlight the government's attention to rising unemployment in the country.

The opposition lawmakers demanded a discussion in Parliament about the breach of security, but were accused of creating disorder.

Sharad Pawar, a top opposition leader, said the government's action marked the highest-ever suspensions of lawmakers in a session of Parlia-

Imran Khan to contest elections: Pakistan's former premier Imran Khan will run in upcoming parliamentary elections from prison, his party said Wednesday, which legal experts said is possible while his appeal of his conviction in a corruption case is being considered.

"Imran Khan has decided to contest elections for three seats in the National Assembly," or the lower house of parliament, said Gohar Khan, head of the former premier's Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf party, or PTI. In Pakistan, politicians usually run for a seat from more than one constituency to expand their chances of winning.

The 71-year-old former prime minister, the country's most well-known opposition figure, is serving at a highsecurity prison in the garrison city of Rawalpindi. He was removed as prime minister in April 2022 following a vote of no confidence in Parliament by his political opponents.

Khan was disqualified from holding public office months ago. But he has challenged the ruling by the country's election commission. Kanwar Dilshad, a former com-

mission official, said Khan's political rivals may object to his filing of nomination papers.

"Imran Khan will have to fight a long legal battle to contest the elections, as technically he is eligible to run for the parliament, but practically there are multiple cases against him,' Dilshad said.

KUWAIT CITY, Dec 21: The Kuwait Stock Exchange received the swearing-in of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mesha'al Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah before the National Assembly as Amir of the country, succeeding His Highness the late Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, with clear trading momentum, punctuated by active movements by financial portfolio and fund managers on the leading stocks.

The Kuwait Stock Exchange closed trading on Wednesday, the first session after returning from the mourning holiday, covered in green, as it recorded an increase in its first market index, reaching 72.49 points to close at the level of 7,503.48 points, an increase of 0.98 percent from the

previous closing level in last Thursday's session. The general index of the stock exchange achieved gains of 54.3 points to close at the level of 6820.01 points following active trading amounting to 54.4 million dinars, of which 46.12 million were for the interface market and 8.3 million for the main market shares, which closed up by 8.04 points.

The total market value of listed stocks recorded gains estimated at 319 million dinars, bringing their total to 40.559 billion dinars, while the investment community is expected to continue exploiting the available opportunities, with funds keen to close the annual losses they recorded until the end of last month through more momentum on their components of stocks. operational.

The pace of trading was not without optimism regarding the completion of economic reforms that the country will witness under the leadership of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, which is expected to increase the rates of circulating liquidity paid by portfolios, local private and governmental institutions, in addition to foreign funds and enti-

Several investment portfolios intensified their purchases of medium- and small-cap stocks, while continuing to support their long-term strategic positions, which are represented in the shares of listed banks, service, real estate, and industrial companies.

According to what was published by Mubasher, citing the monthly report issued by the US Treasury Department, Kuwait's holdings of US bonds have declined since the beginning of this year by about 18.34 percent, equivalent to \$8.9 billion. It amounted to 48.52 billion at the end of 2022, and Kuwait's possession of bonds decreased on a monthly basis by 1.25 percent compared to its level last September, which amounted to 40.78 billion dollars.

Annual home sales down 7.3% YoY

US home sales rise 0.8% in Nov, beating expectations

LOS ANGELES, Dec 21, (AP): Sales of previously occupied U.S. homes rose in November, ending a five-month skid, as easing mortgage rates provided some breathing room for homebuyers.

Existing home sales rose 0.8% last month from October to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 3.82 million, the National Association of Realtors said Wednesday. That tops the 3.78 million sales pace economists were expecting, according to FactSet.

Sales were still down 7.3% compared with November last year, and are down 19.3% through the first 11 months of 2023 compared with the same period last year.

The pickup in sales helped push up home prices compared with a year earlier for the fifth month in a row. The national median sales price rose 4% from November last year to

The modest increase in sales arrives with mortgage rates in decline after a sharp runup that sent borrowing costs on home loans higher. The rising cost of borrowing money compounded hurdles for buyers because there are so few homes on the market, sending home prices higher

The average rate on a 30-year mortgage has eased after climbing to 7.79% in late October to its highest level since late 2000. The average dropped to 6.95% last week, accord-

ing to mortgage buyer Freddie Mac. "Home sales always respond to lower interest rates," said Lawrence Yun, the NAR's chief economist, adding that he has "no doubt" that

home sales have hit their low point in the current housing market cycle.

Despite the recent decline, the average rate on a 30-year home loan remains sharply higher than just two years ago, when it was around 3%. The large gap between rates now and then is contributing to the low inventory of homes for sale by discouraging homeowners who locked in rock-bottom rates two years ago from selling.

Homebuyers in many markets continue to face a low inventory of available homes for sale. There were 1.13 million homes on the market by the end of last month, down 1.7% from October, but up 0.9% from November last year, the NAR said. Before the pandemic, there were roughly twice as many homes on the

The available inventory at the end of last month amounted to a 3.5-month supply, going by the current sales pace. That's down 3.6% from the previous month, but up from 3.3% from November 2022. In a more balanced market between buyers and sellers, there is a 4- to 5-month supply.

"If the inventory levels were, say, 30% or 40% higher, surely home sales would be probably 10% or 20% above what (they are) today," Yun said. "A lack of inventory is clearly holding back some of the sales po-

Homebuyers still had to navigate a competitive market due to the shortage of properties on the market, especially the most affordable homes. Homes sold last month typically

within just 25 days after hitting the market, and about 19% of properties sold for more than their list price, a sign that many homes are still receiving multiple offers, the NAR said.

First-time homebuyers who don't have any home equity to put toward their down payment have had a particularly tough time getting into the housing market this year. They accounted for 31% of all homes sold last month, which is an improvement over 28% in October, but still well below the 40% of sales they've typically accounted for historically.

The pullback in mortgage rates in recent weeks has echoed a decline in the 10-year Treasury yield, which lenders use as a guide to pricing loans. The yield, which in mid October surged to its highest level since 2007, has been falling on hopes that inflation has cooled enough for the Federal Reserve to shift to cutting interest rates after yanking them dramatically higher since early last

Housing economists are generally forecasting that mortgage rates will continue to decline in 2024, helping lift home sales after a dismal 2023.

Yun is forecasting that the a 30year home loan will average 6.3% next year. He's also predicting sales of previously occupied U.S. homes will climb 13.5% next year to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 4.71 million, and expects the inventory of homes on the market will climb 30% to around 1.5 million by summer.

Biden admin balances energy demands

Oil companies bid \$382 mln for **Gulf of Mexico offshore leases**

WASHINGTON, Dec 21, (AP): Oil companies offered \$382 million for drilling rights in the Gulf of Mexico on Wednesday after courts rejected the Biden administration's plans to scale back the sale to protect an endangered whale species.

The auction was the last of several offshore oil and gas lease sales mandated under the 2022 climate law. It comes as President Joe Biden's Democratic administration tries to navigate between energy companies seeking greater oil and gas production and environmental activists who want to stop new drilling to help combat climate change.

Companies including Chevron, Hess and BP offered bids on more than 300 parcels covering 2,700 square miles (7,000 square kilometers), according to the U.S. Department of Interior's Bureau of Ocean Energy Management.

The dollar amount of the successful bids marked a sharp increase from the previous sale in March 2023, when the covering about 2,500 square miles (6,500 square kilometers) for \$250 million.

The next sale will be conducted in 2025, to the frustration of energy companies and Republicans who say the administration is hampering U.S. oil production.

Wednesday's online auction was originally scheduled for September but got delayed by a court battle after the administration reduced the area available for leases from 73 million acres (30 million hectares) to 67 million acres (27 million hectares) as part of a plan to protect the endangered Rice's

Chevron, Shell Offshore, the American Petroleum Institute and the state of Louisiana sued to reverse the cut in acreage and block the inclusion of the whale-protecting measures in the lease sale provisions

A federal judge in southwest Louisiana ordered the sale to go on without the whale protections, which also included regulations governing vessel speed and personnel. Environmental groups appealed, but the New Orleansbased 5th Circuit Court of Appeals last month rejected their arguments against the sale and threw out the plans to scale it back.

The lease sale was required under a compromise with Democratic Sen. Joe Manchin of West Virginia, a supporter of the oil and gas industry who

cast the deciding vote in favor of the landmark climate law. The measure was approved with only Democratic votes in Congress. Under the terms negotiated by Manchin, the government must offer at least 60 million acres of offshore oil and gas leases in any one-year period before it can offer offshore wind leases that are part of its strategy to fight climate change.

Only a small portion of parcels that are offered for sale typically receive bids, in areas where companies want to expand their existing drilling activities or where they foresee future development potential.

The administration in September proposed up to three oil and gas lease sales in the Gulf of Mexico over the next five years and none in Alaska waters. That was the minimum number the administration could legally offer if it wants to continue expanding offshore wind development. Environmental groups criticized the

Holly Hopkins, API vice president of upstream policy, called Wednesday's sale "a "positive step after multiple delays," and noted that it generated the highest dollar value for bids in nearly a decade.

The results demonstrate that the oil and gas industry "is working to meet growing demand and investing in the nation's long-term energy security," Hopkins said. "Just as today's record U.S. production was supported by investment and policy decisions made years ago, new leasing opportunities are critical for maintaining American energy leadership for decades to

US consumer confidence surges to summer levels

WASHINGTON, Dec 21, (AP): American consumers are feeling more confident than they have since summer, good news for businesses with the all-important holiday shopping season

The Conference Board, a business research group, said Wednesday that its consumer confidence index rose for the second straight month, to 110.7 in December from 101 in November. That's much better than analysts' forecasts of 104.5 and the highest reading since July.

Americans' expectations of a recession in the next 12 months declined to the lowest level so far this year. The index measures both Ameri-

cans' assessment of current economic conditions and their outlook for the next six months.

Consumer spending accounts for about 70% of U.S. economic activity, so economists pay close attention to consumer behavior as they take measure of the broader economy.

The index measuring Americans short-term expectations for income, business and the job market shot up to 85.6 in December from 77.4 in October. It's the first time in four months that its been above 80. A reading below 80 for future expectations historically signals a recession within a year.

The survey's write-in responses indicated that rising prices are still consumers' top concern, while worries over interest rates and geopolitical conflicts declined.

Consumers' view of current conditions also jumped this month, to 148.5, from 136.5 in November.

The survey also showed modest increases in consumers' intent to purchase homes, autos, appliances and

Toyota recalls 1M vehicles for airbag issue

Toyota Motor Co. said Wednesday it is recalling 1 million vehicles over a defect that could cause airbags not to deploy, increasing the risk of injury.

The recall covers a range of Toyota and Lexus vehicles with model years from 2020 to 2022. Included in the recall are Toyota Avalons, Camrys, Highlanders, RAV4s, Siennas and Corollas, plus some hybrids of those models.

The Lexus models in the recall include the ES250 seddan and the RX350 SUV, among others.

The vehicles being recalled have sensors in the front passenger seat that may have been manufactured improperly. Those sensors could potentially short circuit, causing the airbag system to not determine the occupant's correct weight and potentially not deploy in certain kinds of crashes.

Toyota and Lexus dealers will inspect the OCS sensors and replace them if necessary at no cost to owners. Toyota will notify customers by the middle of February 2024 if their cars are in the recall. (AP)

Daihatsu suspends shipments amid testing scandal

Japanese transport ministry officials inspected Toyota subsidiary Daihatsu on Thursday, one day after officials announced it was suspending the small car unit's shipments of all vehicles in and outside Japan after an investigation found improper testing involving 64 models.

The safety test irregularities earlier this year prompted an independent panel investigation, which found widespread and systematic problems at Osaka-based Daihatsu Motor Co. It is

the latest of safety or other violations found at at least five of Japan's major automakers in recent years.

On Thursday, transport ministry of

On Thursday, transport ministry officials began a deeper investigation at Daihatsu's offices over the systematic safety scandal that apparently persisted for decades.

"It's extremely regrettable," Chief Cabinet Secretary Yoshimasa Hayashi said Thursday. "It damaged the trust of car owners and has shaken the foundation of the automobile

certification system." Hayashi urged Daihatsu officials to fully explain the situation.

So far, there have been no reports of accidents or deaths due to the

fudging of those tests.

Toyota Motor Corp., citing results of the panel, said Wednesday that the Daihatsu probe found 174 new cases of irregularities in safety tests and other procedures in 25 test categories, on top of problems reported earlier. (AP)

Americans have bought record 1 million-plus hybrids in 2023

More US auto buyers are turning to hybrids as sales of electric vehicles slow

DETROIT, Dec 21, (AP): America's automakers have staked their futures on the notion that electric vehicles will dominate sales in the coming years, spurred by buyers determined to reduce carbon emissions and save on fuel.

But so far, while EV sales are growing, their pace is falling well short of the industry's ambitious timetable for transitioning away from combustion engines. Instead, buyers are increasingly embracing a quarter-century-old technology whose popularity has been surging: The gas-electric hybrid, which alternates from gas to battery power to maximize efficiency.

which alternates from gas to battery power to maximize efficiency. So far in 2023, Americans have bought a record 1 million-plus hybrids - up 76% from the same period last year, according to Edmunds.com. As recently as last year, purchases had fallen below 2021's total. This year's figures don't even include sales of 148,000 plug-in hybrids, which drive a short distance on battery power before a gas-electric system kicks in.

Though electric vehicle sales are nearing an annual record of over 1 million this year, their year-over-year growth rate has begun to stall. EVs still account for only about 7% of all U.S. auto sales.

The slowdown has raised concern among automakers that buyer interest in EVs is faltering. Some companies are cutting production and scaling down plans for new battery or assembly plants.

The reasons why hybrids have quickly become the preferred choice for many buyers vary. They range from the higher prices of comparable EVs to concern about the scarcity of charging stations to a recognition that hybrids provide many of the same advantages without the hassles of EVs.

Ford, the nation's No. 2 hybrid seller behind Toyota, expects to produce enough hybrids to quadruple sales within five years. General Motors, which abandoned most hybrids in the U.S. four years ago in favor of EVs, now says it's considering bringing them back.

In the meantime, surveys show that consumers remain uneasy about either the availability of charging stations or the sale prices of EVs - even factoring in tax credits that the federal government makes available for EV purchases in many cases.

"Your standard hybrid makes the most sense to most people," said Ivan Drury, a director at the Edmunds.com auto website. "I think you'll find that people don't want to deal with the hassle or the difficulties of charging."

Hybrids do emit some tailpipe pollution. But because they burn less fuel than autos equipped solely with gasoline engines, their emissions are less. What's more, purchase prices for hybrids are akin to those of gas vehicles and typically far less than for comparable EVs.

"People are perfectly fine with a car that gets 45 or 50 miles per gallon, and you don't have to do anything" different from current behavior, said Scott Adams, owner of a Toyota dealership in suburban Kansas City.

Here are some key reasons why hybrids, which use both a gas engine and battery power to efficiently turn the wheels, have taken off this year:

Saving the planet

The proliferation of wildfires, heat waves and more intense storms has led more people to view climate change as a grave crisis, one they can help mitigate by burning less carbon-spewing fuel. Yet even among those people, some remain skeptical that an electric vehicle will allow them to travel long distances or tow trailers.

"People want to participate in this - the idea of reducing carbon," said Jack Hollis, who heads North American sales and marketing for Toyota, which leads in hybrid sales and has moved only gradually toward EVs. "I think the hybrid gives them what they're most looking for."

A lower price

EV prices have being dropping, mainly a consequence of federal tax credits and price cuts by Tesla, the market leader. Yet they're still pricier than hybrids or gas vehicles

After peaking at nearly \$63,000 last year, the average EV sale price fell to just over \$60,500 in November, not including tax credits or prices from Tesla, which doesn't release them. Fewer EVs, though, will likely qualify for the tax credits in 2024 because of rules that will limit buyers from claiming a full credit if they purchase cars with battery materials from China or other countries that are considered hostile to the United States.

The average price of a hybrid has stabilized at roughly \$42,000. A typical hybrid costs somewhat more than its gasoline counterpart. A Toyota RAV4 hybrid with all-wheel-drive, for example, starts at \$32,825, \$1,600 more than a comparable gas version.

Like many hybrid buyers, Shalinder Singh, an Uber driver from Sunnyvale, California, said that for him, the gas savings helped tip the price equation in favor of a 2024 Honda CR-V hybrid over the corresponding gasoline model

"The mileage for the hybrid is too good," said Singh, who makes frequent trips to San Francisco and San Jose.

The Environmental Protection Agency says a front-wheel-drive CR-V Hybrid gets 40 mpg in city and highway driving, 10 mpg better than the gas version. The owner of a hybrid CR-V who drives 15,000 miles annually would save \$450 a year on fuel over the gas model.

ould save \$450 a Lifestyle needs

Angie Rodesky, who recently moved to Jefferson City, Missouri, said her children wanted her to buy a Tesla to replace her old vehicle. Though she did consider an EV to help reduce emissions, she settled on a RAV4 hybrid because she travels frequently to see children in Florida and Delaware.

"I have a fear of plugging something in and not being able to travel as far, because it's a 16-hour road trip from Delaware to Missouri," Rodesky, 55, said. "I needed to make sure I had a vehicle that was comfortable to ride in and had good gas mileage."

After buying a 2023 model from Adams Toyota near Kansas City, she had to wait a month for it to arrive, mainly because of heavy customer demand for the vehicle.

Brad Sowers, owner of Jim Butler Kia and other St. Louis-area dealerships, said customers who consider EVs often ask for hybrids or other alternatives.

"They look at it as a baby step into the EV world," Sowers said. "They're saying to themselves, 'I can't really do 100% battery psychologically.'"

Colder weather

Dealers say many hybrid buyers appear to have done research and know that cold weather reduces the range of an EV battery. Tests conducted in Norway, where nearly 80% of new vehicles are electric, found that EVs lose

between 10% and 36% of their range during winter.

Most U.S. EV purchases occur on the coasts, where charging stations are more prevalent and weather is often warmer. In the Midwest, where stations are farther apart, Sowers said consumers worry about decreased wintertime

"It's cold here," he said. "The (charging) infrastructure isn't that great." **Reliability**

In its auto reliability survey this year, Consumer Reports found that hybrids were the industry's most reliable type of power system. Electric vehicles were least reliable. EVs contain glitch-prone new technology, Consumer Reports said. Hybrids have less.

And with hybrids having been sold in the United States for more than two decades, automakers have had time to refine the vehicles' engineering and construction. In general, vehicles that have been manufactured for longer periods are more reliable, said Jake Fisher, senior director of auto testing at Consumer Reports.

Analysts say they still think more EVs than hybrids will eventually be sold in the United States. With government help, the industry is moving to build many more charging stations. Ford, GM, Hyundai and others have reached agreements for owners of their vehicles to charge them at many of Tesla's widespread stations. The industry is standardizing its plugs to match Tesla's.

With direct-current fast chargers, charging times are becoming faster.

Battery technology will likely improve cold-weather range, too.

In addition, next year, EVs' tax credits will be counted at the time of sale, thereby reducing the price and easing monthly payments. This year, buyers had to wait for income tax returns to receive their money. In addition, over time, tighter fuel economy and pollution regulations will likely compel automakers to sell more EVs.

NHS faces disruption as doctors begin 3-day walkout in England

Longest-ever doctor strike in health service's history

LONDON, Dec 21, (AP): Doctors in the early stages of their careers in England started a 72-hour strike Wednesday in their long-running dispute with the British government over pay levels.

Patients in Britain's state-owned National Health Service have been warned that there will be "significant disruption," with thousands of appointments and procedures postponed or even canceled. The strike began at 7 a.m. and will run until Saturday morning.

Tens of thousands of so-called junior doctors, which make up around half of the medical workforce in the NHS, will also go on strike for a six-day stretch early next year, the longest walkout in the health service's 75-year history.

They are seeking a 35% pay rise, a figure they say takes into account years of below-inflation rises and will prevent an exodus of staff to other countries. The government though is offering junior doctors an average increase of 8.8% and Prime Minister Rishi Sunak has indicated there won't be more on offer.

"I obviously appreciate that people are upset about missing elective appointments and outpatient appointments, but if we don't act now then five or 10 years down the line there won't be any doctors left and those appointments will become much worse and much longer than

British court rejects AI as patent creator

LONDON, Dec 21, (AP): An artificial intelligence system can't be registered as the inventor of a patent, Britain's Supreme Court ruled Wednesday in a decision that denies machines the same status as humans.

The U.K.'s highest court concluded that "an inventor must be a person" to apply for patents under the current law.

The decision was the culmination of American technologist Stephen Thaler's long-running British legal battle to get his AI, dubbed DABUS, listed as the inventor of two patents.

Thaler claims DABUS autonomously created a food and drink container and a light beacon and that he's entitled to rights over its inventions. Tribunals in the U.S. and the European Union have rejected similar applications by Thaler.

The U.K. Intellectual Property Office rejected Thaler's application in 2019, saying it's unable to officially register DABUS as the inventor because it's not a person. After lower courts sided with the patent office, Thaler took

his appeal to the Supreme Court, where a panel of judges unanimously dismissed the case.

"So there is no doubt this is going to be a challenging period and we will see disruption once again," he added.

The more senior consultant doctors from the BMA in England have reached a deal with the government, with members currently voting whether or not to accept the deal.

Specialist, associate specialist and

specialty doctors in England have also come to an agreement, which is being put to members.

While on strike, hospitals will provide minimal care similar to public holidays, when only emergency procedures are available and routine appointments or procedures are postponed or canceled.

The strikes across the NHS, which began last year, have so far affected more than 1 million appointments and procedures at a cost of around 2 billion pounds (\$2.5 billion).

Environmental groups challenge EU-backed Greek gas project

EU court nullifies approval of French aid to Air France

BRUSSELS, Dec 21, (AP): Low-cost airlines Ryanair and Malta Air won a court case Wednesday against the European Union's decision to approve billions of euros in state aid by the French government to Air France and holding company Air France-KLM during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Ryanair has filed several court chal-

by EU countries to help some airlines weather the fallout of coronavirus restrictions.

The Irish airline welcomed the decision and urged the European Commis-

lenges against measures introduced

sion "to order France to immediately recover this multi-billion euro illegal state aid package."

The bloc's 27 members must seek approval from the commission - which

approval from the commission - which is the EU's executive branch - when granting financial support to companies. Many countries across Europe did so to help keep their airlines afloat during the pandemic.

Back in 2020, French authorities notified the European Commission of an aid measure of 7 billion euros (\$7.67 billion), which was supposed to solely benefit Air France, to the exclusion of all the other companies in the Air France-KLM group. A year later, France told the commission about plans for 4-billion-euro (\$4.38 billion) recapitalization of Air France and the holding company.

In both cases, the European Commission didn't raise objections.

But the European General Court ruled that the Air France-KLM holding and KLM "were capable of benefiting, at least indirectly, from the advantage granted by the state aid at issue" and annulled the European Commission's decisions.

"Where there are grounds to fear the effects on competition of an accumulation of state aid within the same group, the onus is on the Commission to exercise particular vigilance in examining the links between the companies belonging to that group," the court said.

Air France-KLM and Air France said they will consider whether to lodge an appeal before the Court of Justice of the EU.

"In parallel, they will contribute to any exchange between the French State and the European Commission with a view to the adoption of possible new approval decisions," the companies said.

The European Commission is also the EU's anti-trust watchdog. As pandemic restrictions in 2020 brought travel to a halt and threatened the existence of airlines, the commission eased its policies, approving billions of euros in support for national flag carriers.

Under a fast-track system set up during what the commission described as "an unprecedented crisis," Brussels

approved around 3 trillion euros in state support across all sectors in member nations. Ryanair believes that 40 billion euros was granted to Europe's airline sector alone.

ATHENS: Five **Greek** and international environmental campaign agencies have launched legal action against a major natural gas project supported by the **European Union** as a regional alternative to Russian energy.

Greenpeace and the World Wide Fund for Nature led the request at Greece's highest administrative court, the Council of State, against a planned offshore natural gas storage and conversion plant, outside the northeastern port of **Alexandroupolis**.

The action was filed on Tuesday, the groups said in a joint statement.

The terminal, due to go online early next year, will operate on a modified tanker - also named the "Alexandroupolis" - to store liquefied natural gas and convert it into gas form, supplying the national distribution network.

The 288-meter (945-foot) long vessel arrived at its destination on Sunday, following a 10-month-long conversion at the **Keppel** shipyards in **Singapore**.

at the **Keppel** shipyards in **Singapore**. In their court challenge, the nature groups described the plant as "accident-prone" and said it posed a threat to the local marine environment that

includes a protected area.

"The installation in (protected) ar-

eas of such dangerous industrial units is expressly prohibited under current legislation," the groups said.

They also noted their expression to

They also noted their opposition to a new, publicly backed investment in fossil fuel projects, which they argued would underline global commitments to address climate change. Greece's government has won EU approval to provide more than 165 million euros (\$180 million) in state aid to the project, arguing that natural gas remains a key source of energy as countries transition to renewables.

Athens also backs broader Western goals to help reduce the historic dependence on Russian pipeline gas supplies by other countries in southeast Europe - a push that has gathered pace following Russia's invasion of Ukraine and the disruption of global energy markets.

The project will redefine the port of Alexandroupolis "as a critical hub for the energy security of the entire central and southeast Europe," said **Kostis Sifnaios**, managing director of Gastrade, the consortium that will operate the plant. His remarks came before the

legal action was announced.

The new terminal, set to launch in the next three months following tests, will have a regasification capacity of up to 5.5 billion cubic meters a year.

Unveiling the dark side of late-night scrolling

How your brain falls victim to social media advertising

m ver}$ found yourself scrolling through social media late at night and accidentally buying something you regretted? In this episode of The Conversation Weekly podcast, we talk to an advertising expert about recent research into how social media can overload our brains and make

us buy products we don't need or want. Matthew Pittman is a professor of advertising at the University of Tennessee in the US. In 2022, Pittman and his colleague Eric Haley, conducted three online studies on Americans aged 18-65 to examine how people under various mental loads respond to advertisements differ-

"Our brain has limited resources and it can also be taxed if we try to do too many things at once and once those resources are depleted, there are usually negative consequences," says Pittman.

If you're on the fence about a purchase and you're under cognitive load and you see a lot of likes or a lot of comments, or maybe it's very attractive people in the ad that look happy ... click, I'm gonna purchase it.

Pittman found that those who weren't under cognitive load made more balanced purchasing decisions. But the group that they told to scroll through their Instagram feed for 30 seconds and then look at an advert was more susceptible to cues such as the comments and likes associated with it.

When asked to describe their rationale for buying a product, Pittman was surprised that those under a high mental load had diminished sentence and language capabilities. He found that Instagram put subjects in a mentally exhausted state because they were consuming different types of text, photos and posts.

People that were not under cognitive load gave grammatically normal sentences that flowed logically, such as this ice cream looked tasty, or I liked the colors, but when people were under cognitive load, even their sentences

were more fractured. Which explains why I can't explain to my wife why I consistently make stupid purchases. Listen to the full episode of The Conversation Weekly to hear the different ways social media impacts our pro-



A helicopter father flies his duck family south in 'Migration'

▼llumination, maker of "Despicable Me," "Sing" and "The Super ▲ Mario Bros. Movie," has built its animation empire by mostly staying close to a child-like outlook. Illumination's in-house mascots, the Minions, are basically themselves careening toddlers

But the studio's latest, "Migration," carries a faintly more parental perspective. Its central character is a father duck, Mack Mallard (Kumail Nanjiani), whose fears and paranoia have kept his feathered family rooted to a small New England pond. But after much cajoling from his wife (Elizabeth Banks) and two ducklings (Caspar Jennings, Tresi Gazal), Mack and company take flight for their first winter migration

"Migration" is vividly animated with warm cartoon tones that would do Daffy proud. But it never quite spreads its wings. Stories of overly cautious moms or dads turned adventurers are not exactly fresh material, even if it is atypical that a helicopter parent like Mack can actually fly.

Written by "White Lotus" creator Mike White, "Migration" - a family road trip movie sans the road - mostly comes off as a gentle suggestion to take that Caribbean vacation you've been putting off. White, having mocked lavish trips to Hawaii and Italy on his HBO series, has less satire for the Mallards' excursion to Jamaica - though the journey to get there is certainly perilous.

Once the family sets off, with Uncle Dan (Danny DeVito) in tow, their stops include a fearful night with a bug-eyed heron (Carol Kane) who makes them a bed in a frying pan; a New York encounter with a flock of pigeons and their tough-talking leader (Awkwafina); a parrot (Keegan-Michael Key) caged by a chef who specializes in duck à l'orange; and a cult-like farm where ducks are being ominously well treated.

Creatures

These are not, you may be thinking, the most salient dangers that await most winged creatures making their way south. Loss of sanctuary or fluctuating climate are no issues here, though the duck à l'orange chef, who has his own helicopter, proves to be a surprisingly regular threat.

It's around then that "Migration" begins to feel more like a wild goose chase. That's not the worst thing for a holiday family movie, though it happens to make "Migration" very comfortably the secondbest heron-featuring movie in theaters right now. Hayao Miyazaki's "The Boy and the Heron" is far richer in both its imagination and its

Possibly sensing "Migration" needed a little boost, a "Despicable Me" short is playing along with it: "Mooned," in which the Minions get a taste of zero gravity.

"Migration" is directed by the French filmmaker Benjamin Renner, who crafted the enchanting 2012 film "Ernest and Celestine" with the delicacy of a cherished children's book. That touch is harder to discern in "Migration." (For a truly magical French-made movie on the subject, seek out the 2001 documentary "Winged Migration.")

But considering migration today is a word so often accompanied by crisis, there's pleasant enough diversion in Renner's film. Like Illumination's "The Super Mario Bros. Movie," the movie's most abundant resource is its lush sense of color. Though that's not enough to turn the tide on the long-running duck season, wabbit season debate, the superb

plumage of "Migration" makes for fine bird watching. "Migration," a Universal release in theaters Dec. 22, is rated PG by the Motion Picture Association for action/peril and mild rude humor. Running time: 92 minutes. Two and a half stars out of four.

LOS ANGELES: More than two decades after the release of "Chicken Run," Aardman Animations has returned to the adventures of its defiant feathered protagonist, Ginger, in the sequel "Chicken Run: Dawn of the Nugget." The 2000 original remains the highest grossing stop-motion animation flick ever with more than \$227 million in ticket sales. But "Dawn of the Nugget," which introduces an all-new voice cast including Thandiwe Newton, Bella Ramsey and Zachary Levi, debuted last week, on Netflix. In it, Ginger has escaped from Tweedy Farm and found sanctuary elsewhere, but again must lead the flock to freedom. (AP)

A must-watch wrestling saga on the Von Erich tragedy

Efron gives his all in gripping 'Iron Claw'

It doesn't take long to understand the level of commitment Zac Efron brings to "The Iron Claw" as Texas wrestling brother Kevin Von Erich. Just one look at the taut mass of muscle and sinew he's become for the role will do the trick.

It's also clear from the get-go how invested writer-director Sean Durkin was in telling the true-life tale of the Von Erich family wrestling dynasty, which - shockingly, to those of us unfamiliar with the story - suffered a set of tragic losses almost too staggering to imagine. It's hardly a spoiler alert to say that Kevin, by 35, was the only surviving brother of an original six. (He is now 66). Indeed, so devastating is the story that Durkin felt the need to excise brother Chris, one of three lost to suicide, from this retelling entirely.

Durkin has said he was a committed wrestling fan from his childhood in England, where he scoured magazines to learn more about the exploits of the Von Erichs, who made their name in the colorful, high-flying, entertainment-heavy wrestling world of the '70s and early '80s. And from that affection stems perhaps both the strength and weakness of "The Iron Claw." It's a film that tells its stunning tale with heart and conviction, yet seems somehow reticent about pointing a truly critical finger at either the brutality of a sport that broke this family, or the man who seemed to give his sons no choice in the matter: family patriarch Fritz Von Erich.

It is with Fritz that we begin. In a 1950s-era prologue rendered in black-and-white, the eventual patriarch and promoter (an excellent Holt McCallany) is in the ring himself, displaying his famed "Iron Claw" maneuver: a punishing two-handed grip on a doomed opponent's skull, crushing it

Waiting in the parking lot is Fritz's wife, Doris

(Maura Tierney) and their young kids. Doris is shocked that Fritz has acquired a spiffy new car to attach to their trailer, something they can't afford, but he tells her it's all part of the persona he's building: You need to be the toughest and the strongest,

and then nothing will be able to hurt you. Flash forward to 1979, and Fritz has passed the dream of becoming heavyweight champion onto his remaining sons. (One of them has died at a young age in a terrible accident.) Kevin is doing his best to be the son who gets there first. Among his exploits in the ring, Kevin climbs up on top of the ropes to attack from the air, leaping onto an opponent. These fight scenes are vivid and exciting, although if you're like me, eventually you'll be shouting at the screen, begging for it all to stop, lest one more son get hurt.

Championship

But at the kitchen table, there's never talk of stopping. Fritz tells Kevin, David and Mike that they all need to work harder to win that coveted championship belt. Mike, the youngest, is interested in music, but Fritz doesn't care. Privately, Kevin seeks out his mother and asks her to intervene on Mike's behalf. But Doris relies only on her faith; this wrestling business is between the men, she says. (It is horrifying to watch her, powerless, as the sadness multiplies.)

Who will achieve Dad's dream first? Will it be David, who's a great talker and taunter in the ring? Or Kevin, who possesses great physical strength but is awkward and unable to master the art of self-promotion? Suddenly, brother Kerry, a discus thrower with Olympic hopes, enters the scene. When President Jimmy Carter declares the United States won't be sending a team to Moscow in 1980, Fritz decrees that Kerry (Jeremy Allen White) will join his brothers in the ring.

There are a few lovely scenes of the brothers bonding, playing football, doing what brothers do. But the pace of the film, with its wrestling sequences and successive tragedies, doesn't allow for much relationship development. An exception is Kevin's relationship with Pam (a lovely and soulful Lily James), who woos the shy Kevin and eventually marries him, their wedding a brief joyful moment (with an infectious family linedancing scene).

But tragedy is not far off. For those unfamiliar with the Von Erich tale, we won't reveal more plot here, other than to say that loss does not soften Fritz. At one funeral, he orders his grieving sons to remove their sunglasses, then forbids them

Efron, with his rock-hard physique and '70s mullet, turns in some of the most affecting work of his career. White, too, is excellent if more inscrutable as Kerry, initially the golden boy until his own brush with disaster sends him into a downward spiral. Harris Dickinson as David and a heartbreaking Stanley Simons as Mike round out the strong ensemble. But the film does not spend a lot of time on the emotional tissue that connects the brothers, who seem more bound by loyalty and mutual hardship than anything else.

The film's emotional ending brings well-earned tears, thanks to Efron's delicate portrayal. But when we're informed by means of an epilogue that the Von Erich family in 2009 was admitted to the WWE Hall of Fame, it's hard not to consider a question that the film doesn't seem to be attacking head-on: Was any of this worth it?

'Power Broker' author feels like a movie star

NEW YORK, Dec 21, (AP): Since the release a year ago of the acclaimed documentary "Turn Every Page," Robert Caro has been feeling a bit like a movie star.

"I walk up Broadway and kids recognize me," the historian and author of "The Power Broker" says. "If I linger a bit, they start talking about a chapter that they like. It's so wonderful."

The 88-year-old Caro, winner of virtually every literary prize, has long held at least semi-celebrity status. His better known admirers range from Conan O'Brien to former Presidents Bill Clinton and Barack Obama, and impatient readers regularly send emails to his publisher, Alfred A. Knopf, asking for an update on his fifth and final Lyndon Johnson book. (Still no release date in sight, Caro says.)

On this December morning, he's seated at a small table in



the gift shop of the New-York Historical Society, engaged in another kind of ritual for public figures: autographs, available to anyone who buys one of his books from the society's store or website.

Caro has spoken around the country, and beyond, but he is also very much a New Yorker, a native Upper West Sider who

used to visit the historical society as a kid and, for years, has lived close by. Every few weeks, he comes here and signs copies of his books, including the four Johnson volumes released so far and his debut publication "The Power Broker," the landmark Robert Moses biography that next fall will be featured at a

society exhibit marking its 50th anniversary.

The signings are not public events, although one local resident, 28-year-old Shiloh Frederick, came in person so the author could autograph her copy of "The Power Broker." Frederick, who designs travel guides and other materials about New York City, has made several videos about Caro's epic narrative of Moses' reign as a municipal builder and its lasting impact.

Inspired

"I was reading the book and it inspired all of these video ideas I wanted to share with other people," she tells Caro.

"That's the best thing I could hear," he answers.

He signed dozens of books, which the society will ship to customers; he sometimes just includes his name and the name of the book's owner, and he sometimes adds a personal message. One book was ordered by a 90-year-old priest in Rhode Island to whom Caro wishes a happy birthday. For a reader self-identified as a "young budding historian obsessed with history," Caro inscribes, "To a fellow history lover." For Fred-

erick, he writes, "To Shiloh, who really understands." "This is incredible. I am going to cherish this," Frederick says. "It's getting a place of honor on my bookshelf."

Historical society officials say "The Power Broker" is the most popular of the Caro books, understandable for a Pulitzer Prize winner that serves as an unofficial history of New York City in the 20th century. The NYHS, which acquired Caro's archives in 2019, is calling the fall exhibit "Truth to Power," featuring "interview notes, manuscript drafts, and other artifacts connected with his writing process.

As well explained in "Turn Every Page," Caro and editor Robert Gottlieb fought bitterly while working on "The Power Broker," cutting hundreds of thousands of words from a book that still ran over 1,000 pages. The deleted sections, predating the internet era, have an aura among Caro followers that lost studio recordings might have for Beatles fans. Readers have long wondered if Caro preserved a chapter on the urban theorist and community activist Jane Jacobs, who successfully pushed back against Moses in the 1950s and '60s when he attempted to run an expressway through Lower Manhattan.

Caro grimaces when asked about the Jacobs section, not just because he's heard about it so often, but because, he says, he has no specific idea what's inside the boxes containing his "Power Broker" materials. "I couldn't stand to look at the stuff, so I never

opened the boxes," Caro says.

A society spokesperson declined to offer further de-

tails on the exhibit, saying it was too soon. Interest in "The Power Broker" remains strong among the general public. The Moses biography has sold more than 17,000 copies this year, double the total of a decade ago, according to Circana, which tracks around 85% of print sales. During the height of the pandemic, "The Power Broker" appeared in the background during so many televised Zoom interviews, it became an unofficial status symbol.

Responses

The book inspires responses in other formats Caro never imagined while writing it. This fall, Frederick used her Instagram page to help lead an effort to tear down monkey statues widely regarded as racist that Moses had placed in a Harlem playground. The podcaster Roman Mars plans a yearlong tribute to Caro's book on his show "99% Invisible," his guests includ-


"My show is about architecture and design, and 'The Power Broker' is basically the bible of this,' Mars says. "It made people like me think about how cities are built, how highways are made.

As readers await - and have awaited for more than a decade - the final Johnson volume, Caro's appearance at the historical society is a break from what has been an intense few months of writing since Gottlieb's death in June. The author has been working closely with Kathy Hourigan, who has served as a second editor on his books since he began the Johnson series in the 1970s. Hourigan is retiring this year as vice president and managing editor of Knopf Doubleday, part of a wave of buyouts at the publisher, but she will remain with Caro on a freelance basis.

The most Caro can say about the the fifth Johnson book is that it will be long, "very long." He has noted often that he already knows the last line, but that he does not work chronologically. He speaks of completing a "poignant" section on the funeral of Robert F. Kennedy, who was assassinated in 1968. But he is currently deep into the year 1965, when Johnson signed historic legislation on everything from voting rights to Medicare, while also making the ill-fated decision to send ground troops to Vietnam.

"The Vietnam War is so depressing. Honest to god, you find yourself just about crying to (hear about) these young kids who had to fight in the jungle," Caro


"The thing is," he says of Johnson and 1965, "it's everything about American power distilled through this one man, this one period.

Poivre d'Arvor

PARIS: A top French television presenter has been handed a preliminary charge of rape by a person abusing his authority as authorities investigate complaints by about 20 women who have accused him of sexual misconduct over a period of decades.

Patrick Poivre d'Arvor denies wrong doing, and has sued 16 of his accusers. A revered personality who hosted France's most popular news program for more than two decades, he insists that the sexual encounters were consensual.

The prosecutors' office in the Paris suburb of Nanterre said Wednesday that Poivre d'Arvor was given preliminary charges of rape by a person abusing his authority for alleged actions dating from 2009. He was also named as an "assisted witness" in another alleged rape from 2004.

Both incidents involved author Florence Porcel, who filed legal complaints in 2021. The Associated Press generally doesn't identify those who say they have been victims of sexual wrongdoing, except when they publicly identify themselves. Under French law, preliminary charges

mean magistrates have strong reason to suspect wrongdoing but allow time for further investigation before deciding whether to send a case to trial. The "assisted witness" status also allows time for further investigation that could lead to eventual charges or to a case being dropped.

The Nanterre prosecutors' office said it that opened two preliminary investigations in 2021 into numerous accusations against Poivre d'Arvor, including Porcel's. One investigation, involving complaints by about 20 women, was closed and the other is ongoing, prosecutors said in a statement to the AP.

Poivre d'Arvor's lawyers said in a statement published online that he "firmly contests the facts alleged by Madame Porcel, as he has since the first day, and has provided numerous elements of material evidence.

Lawyers **Jacqueline Laffont** and **Julie** Benedetti noted that prosecutors recommended dropping the case, but the investigating judges unusually filed the charge anyway. (AP)

LOS ANGELES, Dec 21, (AP): Looking for something to watch this holiday season? While Barbenheimer is enticing, 2023 was a great year for documentaries - particularly music documentaries, with titles that span the biggest names in the biz to considered studies of small, independent music communities.

So, hand us the remote: Here are some of The Associated Press' favorite music documentaries of the year - in no particular order - along with where to find them.

Was there ever a question of this film's placement on this list? "Renaissance: A Film by Beyoncé" chronicles the superstar's 39-city world tour and the blood, sweat and tears required to make the larger-than-life production happen. It's a welcome peek behind the curtain, spearheaded by one of music's great perfectionists. And while Bey has been largely mysterious over the last decade - interviews are a rarity - here, she is a master of giving her audience just enough access, including a few moments with daughter Blue Ivy.

As AP's Jonathan Landrum writes in his review, the film doesn't shoehorn in every song; rather, "'Renaissance' is more about getting a glimpse into Beyoncé's life - even for just a little bit."

Just don't expect any narrative breaks or behind-the-scenes insights. This is the full concert on the silver screen - no more, no less.

Lead poisoning tied to behavioral concerns, learning difficulties

Parents of children sickened by lead fear for their future

NEW YORK, Dec 21, (AP): When Cora Dibert went for a routine blood test in October, the toddler brought along her favorite new snack: a squeeze pouch of WanaBana cinnamon-flavored apple puree.

"She sucked them dry," recalls her 26-year-old mother, Morgan Shurtleff, of Elgin, Oklahoma.

Within a week, the family got an alarming call. The test showed that the 1-year-old had lead poisoning, with nearly four times as much lead as the level that raises concern. Only later did Shurtleff learn that that the fruit puree Cora's grandmother bought at a Dollar Tree store may have been the cause.

"That was the scariest thing that ever happened to me," Shurtleff says.

Cora is among dozens of young kids across the US poisoned by lead linked to tainted pouches of the cinnamonand-fruit puree.

The exact number of affected children is unclear. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports at least 205 confirmed, probable or suspected cases from 33 states. Using a different reporting method, the Food and Drug Administration counts at least 69 kids ages 6 and younger sickened in 28 states as of Dec. 14.

Contamination

Tests show victims had blood lead readings up to eight times higher than the federal reference level of concern, health officials said. Samples of the puree showed lead contamination more than 200 times higher than the FDA al-

The pouches were sold under three brands - WanaBana, Schnucks and Weis. The products were produced at a plant in Ecuador and first imported to the US in November 2022, the officials

Testing of cinnamon samples supplied to the factory showed "extremely high" levels of lead - more than 2,000 times higher than a proposed FDA maximum, the agency said.

FDA officials have raised the prospect that the contamination was intentional. One possibility is that the cinnamon was contaminated for economic reasons, the agency said. That could mean an ingredient such as lead may have been added to boost the value of the cinnamon

Spices such as turmeric, cinnamon and paprika have been known to be mixed with lead chromate or lead oxide, compounds that mirror the spices' colors, said Karen Everstine, technical director for FoodchainID, a company that tracks food supply chains.

"The intent is not to make people sick. Nobody wants to do that because then they get caught," Everstine said. "What they want to do is make mon-

That angers Shurtleff.

If it's true, "they made my child sick for a dime," she said. "The more I think about it, the angrier I get.'

At the same time, she and other parents are most concerned about the lasting effects on their kids.

"I'm pretty worried, considering the effects are irreversible," said Shurtleff, who works as a nurse.

No amount of lead exposure is safe for children and the effects on brain development can show up years later, said Dr. Jennifer Sample, a pediatric toxicologist who consults for industry and academics

"It's irritability. It's behavioral concerns. It's learning difficulties," she

When kids ingest lead, the heavy metal travels through the bloodstream and spreads to organs, including the brain, Sample explained. Once there, the lead substitutes inside cells for vital nutrients such as calcium and iron, causing permanent damage.

Because kids' brains are flexible and still growing, early detection and changes in diet may offset the harm, experts said. The children nevertheless will likely need years of monitoring

lular level are irreversible, but the downstream effects don't have to be,"

Sample said. Lead poisoning can be treated with chelation, a therapy that uses drugs that bind to metals in blood to remove them from the body. But it's only used with higher lead levels and it's usually difficult to administer to the very young.

Instead, affected kids should eat a diet high in vitamin D, calcium and iron and be given a stimulating environment that encourages brain devel-

The prognosis is sobering for families whose children were sickened.

Mustafa Al-Khaled, a Norfolk, Nebraska, civil engineer, sued WanaBana LLC because his 17-month-old son, Arian, was diagnosed with acute lead poisoning after eating the pouches regularly since August.

"As a parent, it's really hurtful to be in this situation," said Al-Khaled, who is among about a dozen parents of affected kids who contacted Ron Simon, a Houston food-safety lawyer who filed the case. "Why I'm here is to protect this child."

Al-Khaled and his wife, Dania, rushed Arian for testing in early November after learning that the Wana-Bana products had been recalled. The were already worried because Arian had been crying uncontrollably, losing weight and passing white-colored

Elevated

A test showed the boy's blood lead level was 15.3 micrograms of lead per deciliter of blood. That's more than four times higher than the 3.5 micrograms per deciliter that the CDC uses to identify children with elevated lead

Health officials in Nebraska re-trieved samples of the WanaBana pouches from Al-Khaled's home. Test results are still pending.

"We're really worrying about the fu-ture," Al-Khaled said. "Is this going to harm him later?"

That fear is shared by Talia Hurdle, of Mount Vernon, New York. Her 18-month-old son, Jamari, ate Wana-Bana apple cinnamon pouches two or three times a day for months, she said.

He's a picky eater, she explained, and the pouches that sold at the Dollar Tree for \$1.25 for a pack of three were an inexpensive way to give him food he liked. Jamari's blood level was 17.5 micrograms when he was first tested in September.

"It's sad because you give your baby stuff to help them continue to be healthy, but look what happened," Hurdle said.

A few weeks after Jamari stopped eating the puree, his lead level was down to 10.5 micrograms per deciliter. Levels dropped for Cora Shurtleff and Arian Al-Khaled, too, once they quit eating the pouches.

That's a good sign, said Sample, the toxicologist.

"These parents can breathe a sigh of relief that they're not going to be as harmed as they could have been with a longer exposure," she said.

Shurtleff worries that not all families know about the danger. The FDA said some Dollar Tree stores still have the fruit pouches on their shelves, weeks after they were recalled. Dollar Tree Inc. officials said in a statement they have added register locks to prevent sales of the products, instructed stores to destroy the affected packages and are working with a third party to confirm they're removed from shelves.

After Cora's diagnosis, Shurtleff was at work, preparing to give a vaccination, when she noticed her young patient was eating a WanaBana apple cinnamon pouch. She immediately told the parent about the recall.

They were just in shock. They hadn't heard anything about it," Shurtleff said. "Then they were like, 'We still have some in our pantry. I guess we should throw it out.

Measles threat looms

US promotes vaccinations 'amid' parental opposition

NEW YORK, Dec 21, (AP): When Idaho had a rare measles outbreak a few months ago, health officials scrambled to keep it from spreading. In the end, 10 people, all in one family, were infected, all unvaccinated.

This time, the state was lucky, said the region's medical director Dr. Perry Jansen. The family quickly quarantined and the children were already taught at home. The outbreak could have been worse if the kids were in public school, given the state's low

vaccination rates, he said. In Idaho last year, parents opted out of state-required vaccines for 12% of kids entering kindergarten, the highest

"We tend to forget that diseases like measles and polio used to kill people," said Jansen, medical director of the Southwest District Health Department, which handled the outbreak in September.

All states require children to have certain routine vaccines to go to public school, and often private school and day care, to prevent outbreaks of oncecommon childhood diseases like measles, mumps, whooping cough, chickenpox and polio. All provide exemptions for children who have a medical reason for avoiding the shots. Most also offer waivers for religious beliefs. Fifteen allow a waiver for any personal belief.

Misinformation

Last school year, vaccination waivers among kindergartners hit an alltime high: 3% in total, according to a recent Centers for Disease Control and Prevention report. Waivers for religious or person beliefs have been on the rise, driven by some states loosening laws, in others by vaccine misinformation and political rhetoric amplified during the COVID-19 pandemic.

In Idaho, "a parent only has to provide a signed statement," to get a waiver, the state's health department said. A change in state law before the 2018-19 school year made it easier to get waivers. The state's exemption rate that year was 7.7%.

September's measles outbreak started when a resident of Nampa, the state's third largest city, returned home from a trip abroad. Measles is usually brought into the U.S. through travel since widespread vaccination has all but eliminated local spread of the dis-

Immunization

It takes a very high level of vaccination - around 95% - to protect against the spread of measles and other diseases, experts say. During the pandemic, the national rate for vaccinations among kindergartners dropped to

Health experts say interventions on every level are needed to get more kids immunized: doctors talking to parents, social media campaigns, easier access to vaccines in some areas, enforcement by schools in others.

Last year, most states had an increase in waivers. Hawaii, which allows medical and religious waivers, saw rates double from the previous school year. Nearly 6.5% of kindergartners have an exemption for at least one required vaccine.

It's impossible to know the reasons behind a waiver, said Ronald Balajadia, immunization program manager for Hawaii State Department of Health. But misinformation about COVID-19 vaccines "has bled through to routine vaccines where normally people would have not had a question about," Balajadia said. While some states have made it

easier to opt out, others have clamped down. Connecticut eliminated its longstanding religious waiver for vaccinations in 2021, joining California, West Virginia, New York and Maine in allowing only medical

NEW ORLEANS, Dec 21, (AP): At 19 months old, Elijah Jack, born with no femur bone in one leg and a short femur in the other, is unable to walk on his own like most toddlers his age. Another 19-month-old, Freya Baudoin, born prematurely at 28 weeks and delayed in her mobility, has finally taken her first step.

Special needs children like these

often take longer than most to become independently mobile, which can be a hardship for parents and others who care for them. Elijah is often carried because of his limb difference and clubfeet, meaning that instead of being straight, his feet are twisted inward and his toes point downward.

As a result, getting around on his

own is a challenge.
That was until this past Spring. Elijah was one of the first recipients of a specially designed rolling chair built by a team of biomedical engineering students at Tulane University. Today, Elijah has mastered getting around on wheels - turning, stopping and steering all on his own.

"He loves his chair," said Crystal Jack, Elijah's mom. "So, I get a lot of things done because I know in his chair, he's safe. He know how to go around the house with it and everything, so I get a lot of things done

Before the chair, Jack said her son was able to scoot on the floor to get where he needed to go but the chair offers a whole new level of independ-

"Like I said we come a long way, but I'm blessed to have him," Jack said, smiling warmly as he moved back and forth around the living room of her mother's home in Ventress, Louisiana.

The Tulane students partnered with the nonprofit MakeGood in 2022 to design and produce the chairs to help toddlers (roughly ages 1-4) build independence and strength, and for some, prepare for a real wheelchair. While it remains difficult to access precise numbers for total wheelchair use among children, there were about 2.8 million wheelchair users in the US in 2002, of whom 121,000 were under 15 years of age, according to the US

The students partnered with the nonprofits as part of a service-learning project - a graduation requirement at Tulane. But many say they had no idea when the project started the depth of impact their chairs would make in the lives of children in the community.

Dylan Lucia, a graduate student at Tulane from the San Diego, California area, said he chose the field of biomedical engineering to help people and this project has manifested that.

"Seeing that direct kind of patient feedback and seeing how much these (chairs) were improving their lives and helping them become a more independent person, even as a small toddler ... like, it was really, really endearing to see something like that and to see the positive change," Lucia said.

The chairs are particularly helpful for families whose children will eventually need wheelchairs. Noam Platt, director of MakeGood, said insurance companies typically don't cover the cost of a wheelchair for a child unless there is sufficient evidence that the child can use it effectively.

ate that evidence that their quality of life will be improved so they can get maybe a more durable assistive technology," Platt said.

Freya's chair was one of five made throughout several weekends early this fall at Tulane's Scot Ackerman MakerSpace, an enormous workshop with laser cutters, 3D printers and drilling

and sewing equipment. Students applied padding and safety straps to the chairs, and some required modifications to accommodate the needs of the children receiving them. For instance, Freya's chair needed a wider strap to help secure her torso, and another patient needed a space behind the chair big enough to hold his breathing vent. Freya's chair also had a bar added to the back, so that she could push it like a stroller. She took her first steps in early December after working with her physical therapist

and her chair. There's no word on how long Freya will have to use the chair but her mother said it has been more than a bless-

"At first, we thought the muscle tone in her ankles wasn't strong enough for her to walk at all, but the neurologists recently told us everything is looking good and she should be walking on her own or with limited assistance soon," said her mom, Heather Hampton, of Metairie, Louisiana.

Hampton said Freya's able to push the chair like a stroller on her own. She wishes they could've gotten it sooner but understands the adjustments that needed to be made.

'We're just happy that she'll ultimately be able to get around and walk independently," Hampton said.

Platt said the mobility chairs' original design and plans came from TOM Global but the parts were purchased in the US or made and then assembled by hand at Tulane. The wood panels used for the chair's frame were laser cut and then sanded by students to buff out any splinters and rough edges. Padded seats were stuffed into fabric cushions sewn by students. Wheels were purchased online and then screwed into

Therapy

Elijah has had his chair since the end of March. It was made in the first batch of about 10 chairs delivered to pediatric patients for use in occupational and physical therapy sessions.

"His chair shows him that, like, 'I could be up like other children.' You know, he don't let his (being) disabled get in the way," said Jack who added Elijah will likely need some type of mobility assistance for the rest of his Bumpers were added to the bottom

front of the most recent batch of chairs after parents from the first round said their furniture - and feet - were taking hits as their children became better and faster at using their chairs. Platt said there have been two

rounds, so far, of chair building and 15 chairs have been given away. But, he said they're aiming for at least 10 to 15 more by Spring 2024.

"We coordinate with our clinical partners to find kids that would be a good fit for these devices," he said. We work with the clinical team to make sure each chair fits the individuals and make customizations if neces-



Leverkusen stretched their unbeaten start to the season to 25 games across all competitions, beating the German record of 24 games without defeat set by Hamburger SV at the start of the 1982-83 season.

Hamburg's record stood at the time as 14 wins and 10 draws before a 2-1 loss at Hertha Berlin in the third round of the German Cup.

Leverkusen, meanwhile, have romped to 22 wins and three draws Leverkusen, since the season began.

The team's win over Bochum kept them four points clear of 11-time defending champion Bayern Munich going into the winter break, though Bayern have a game in hand.

JEDDAH, Dec 21, (AP): Deontay Wilder and Anthony Joshua were once the main characters in heavyweight boxing's soap opera.

Now they are extras. While Tyson Fury and Oleksandr Usyk continue preparations for a Feb. 17 unification bout in Saudi Arabia that will determine the division's first undisputed champion this century, Wilder and Joshua are in the kingdom this weekend and fighting simply to stay relevant.

Wilder, the WBC champion from 2015-20, was dethroned by Fury in February 2020 and has fought only twice since. What kind of shape will the 38-year-old American be in when he takes on Joseph Parker, the WBO champion from 2016-18?

After that comes the main event on what has been labeled the "Day of Reckoning" as Joshua, the former WBA, IBF and WBO titleholder, fights Otto Wallin, a New York-based Swedish journeyman. Joshua has underwhelming wins over Jermaine Franklin and Robert Helenius on his record since back-to-back defeats to Usyk that left his career at a cross-

Whether Wilder and Joshua have the belief after their damaging losses to become heavyweight champion again is open to question. They are most likely to fight each other next provided they both win in Jeddah - and the winner of what would be a bigmoney bout would, in theory, be in position to challenge for a world title.

Mbappé scores twice on 25th birthday as PSG sink Metz

PARIS, Dec 21, (AP): Kylian Mbappé celebrated his 25th birthday with two goals as Paris Saint-Germain beat lowly Metz 3-1 to head into the winter break with a five-point lead in the French league.

The France star got a birthday bonus, as well, when his 16-year-old brother Ethan Mbappé made his league debut as a stoppage-time substitute.

Kylian Mbappé extended his leagueleading tally to 18 goals. He has 21 goals overall this season, and since joining PSG from Monaco in 2017 he has netted a club record 233 goals in

Mbappé's contract expires at the end of the season and he has yet to say whether he will sign an extension or leave on a free transfer, possibly to long-time suitor Real Madrid.

The latest plans announced on Thursday would involve 64 men's teams and 32 women's clubs.

The European Club Association, which represents Europe's top football clubs, reiterated its staunch opposition to Super League.

"In short, the world of football moved on from the Super League years ago and progressive reforms will continue," the group said.

Reds to play Fulham

LIVERPOOL, England, Dec 21, (AP): After finishing last season emptyhanded, Liverpool kept their four-pronged trophy pursuit alive by advancing to the League Cup semifinals with a 5-1 win over West Ham.

Curtis Jones scored twice, with Dominik Szoboszlai, Cody Gakpo and Mo-Salah hamed getting goals in the largely onesided game at

Anfield. Jarrod Bowen struck a consolation goal for West Ham. Liv-

erpool will play Fulham in the twolegged semifinals, and second-division Middlesbrough will face Chelsea.

"The performance, the scoresheet, ne result and the individual performances put together to make a team on the pitch," Liverpool manager Jurgen Klopp said. "We were brave in our positioning, our second ball game was exceptional. It was a really, really good performance from start to finish.

Liverpool can move atop the Premier League when it hosts first-place Arsenal on Saturday, is in the Europa League round of 16, and starts its FA Cup campaign next month.

Liverpool form this term is in stark contrast to last season when they inconsistency saw them miss out on qualification to the Champions League

and fail to win a trophy. Now they look set to mount a serious challenge for the title and is one round away from advancing to their

first cup final of the campaign. Having been held to a 0-0 draw by Manchester United on Sunday, the goals came flooding back for Klopp's team against West Ham. Liverpool dominated the first half

and took the lead through Szoboszlai in the 28th. The home team's pressing paid off as West Ham struggled to get out of their half and Szoboszlai's rightfooted shot from about 25 yards (meters) powered into the bottom corner.

Liverpool could have scored a second later in the half, but Gakpo's header from inside the box bounced just

past the post.

After the break, Darwin Nunez forced a save from Alphonse Areola with a shot that was headed for the top corner and Jones doubled the score in the 56th.

Nunez's clever pass split West Ham's defense and put Jones in position to fire through the goalkeeper's legs from a tight angle on the left. Gakpo made it 3-0 in the 71st with a

low shot from the edge of the area that nestled into the bottom corner. Six minutes, later Bowen pulled

a goal back for West Ham when he turned Jarell Quansah in the box and curled a right-footed shot past Caoimhin Kelleher.

Liverpool should have restored its three-goal advantage when Nunez's shot hit the post and rebounded into the path of substitute Salah. But the Egypt international fired wide from right in front of goal with Areola on the ground. He made no mistake in the 82nd - converting when he went oneon-one with the West Ham keeper.
