

Crown Prince hosts supreme court head

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 3, (KUNA): His Highness the Crown Prince Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah received Tuesday at Bayan Palace Judge Dr. Adel Majed Bouresli who swore in as the new president of Kuwait's Supreme Judicial Council and the head of the Court of Cassation.

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 3: Najat Al-Yousef, Acting Deputy Director General for National Employment Development at the Public Authority for Manpower, has disclosed an ongoing project aimed at revising and modernizing the proportions of national labor within the private sector.

In a statement, she outlined that the Authority is meticulously assessing proposals and insights presented by various stakeholders concerning labor market regulation, including suggested rates, fees, and Kuwaitization of job roles. Kuwait deports 7,685 expats in two months for violations

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 3: Continuing their systematic efforts to filter out violators, the Ministry of Interior, represented by the Deportation Department in correctional institutions, deported 7,685 individuals who violated labor and residency laws during the past two months.

Informed sources told Al-Seyassah that the number of deportees in September reached approximately 3,837 individuals, including 2,272 men and 1,565 women. All of them were referred to the department from various security sectors, including runaway laborers and others accused of indecent activities.

Al-Yousef emphasized that the Kuwaitization program is applicable across the board, encompassing cooperatives, corporations, banks, and major institutions. The Authority, through its National Labor Development sector, plays an active role in this initiative. The Career Guidance Department, staffed by specialized professionals, conducts one-on-one interviews with job seekers interested in positions within the private, cooperative, or oil sectors. Furthermore, they organize guidance activities to aid individuals seeking employment in the private sector.

In a separate development, sources have disclosed a recent meeting convened at the Civil Service Commission, involving various government agencies, including the labor sector. During the meeting, there was a collective call for prioritizing the appointment of male and female citizens within the private sector, while ensuring they receive all necessary assurances and support.

Inquiries were also made regarding the labor support budget, its total cost, and the number of beneficiaries, with preparations underway for potential increases in this allocation. Citizens were encouraged to consider employment opportunities within the private sector.

On Monday, First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior, Sheikh Talal Khaled Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah, has reaffirmed the government's unwavering commitment to executing essential plans and procedures aimed at achieving the objectives of demographic modification and labor market development within the State of Kuwait.

O leadership ... Where is the Silk Road?

Editor-in-Chief, the Arab Times WHENEVER there is a signal from an official regarding the development of Kuwait, we rejoice and cheer.

When the late Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad visited Beijing in 2018 to sign agreements and memoranda of understanding with Chinese officials within the framework of the Silk Road project, the development of the Kuwaiti islands, and the Northern Economic Zone, we believed it represented a strong new beginning.

Likewise, when Sheikh Nasser Sabah Al-Ahmad announced, at the Belt and Road Forum in 2017, the start of concluded partnerships with Chinese companies, we were hopeful.

However, all this remained ink on paper, because the cause is not essentially the ideas, but rather the encroachment of one authority over another, and the undermining of projects if those who use everything for their own interests do not benefit from them.

In this regard, I remember what the late Sheikh Saad Al-Abdullah said during a major conference about 40 years ago "All of Kuwait will become a free trade zone. So what happened? Nearly two decades later, the free trade zone became merely a square in an industrial corner of Shuwaikh, mired in corruption because those who drafted its law were stakeholders, not national specialists! On the day the late Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad announced the Silk Road project, we believed that tens of thousands of Chinese workers would come to Kuwait to work in their country's companies, and that our country would become like Singapore, Malaysia, or even like China, of course with the difference in size and population.



But what happened was the opposite, because there were those who kept on deflating the wheels.

As for the Silk Road project, the poor implementation of paving roads that produced potholes with every rainfall caused it to become the "burlap road". With the country being closed off with "padlock and key," investors refrained from it. In fact, none of the talented and creative people would accept to visit it anymore.

Indeed, there is a global conviction that Kuwait does not want to develop.

In China, there are about 50,000 American and European companies, with hundreds of thousands of investors, who employ local workers, without requiring them to hold university degrees, and without requiring a woman to bring a certificate to prove she is not pregnant if she wants to visit the country.

MP Boushahri warns minister of Public Works

'Red flags' over road maintenance contracts

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 3: MP Jinan Boushahri has warned the Minister of Public Works Dr. Amani Buqamaz against signing any contracts concerning road maintenance before answering her questions about the nominated companies and whether they have local agents.

She referred to the statement made by Dr. Buqamaz on May 11, 2023, stating that she has an "out-of-the-box" plan to assign international companies without the need for local agents in Kuwait in order to maintain the roads.

The lawmaker said she had submitted parliamentary questions to Dr. Buqamaz, asking if the companies have local agents; but she has not yet received a response from the minister.

She explained that Dr. Buqamaz had invited 30 international companies to apply for the tenders on road maintenance but only six companies responded, which, according to MP Boushahri, represents the first failure of Dr. Buqamaz.

The second failure was that the companies presented price offers that were 200 percent more than the estimated amount.

The third failure, which according to MP Boushahri is a major disaster, is that five out of those six companies were discovered to already have local agents, and that the six companies have been present in the Kuwait market through contracts signed with different ministries and public institutions. In fact, some of those projects have been facing problems, while others have been reported by monitoring institutions to be dismissed from applying to the Central Agency for Public Tenders (CAPT).

The first of the six companies is Turkey's Limak, which has already signed a contract with the Ministry of Public Works to establish T2 terminal at the Kuwait International Airport, and its local agent is Al-Kharafi National.

The second is China's Gezhouba Group Company Limited, which is connected with the Public Authority for Housing Welfare (PAHW) by a contract worth KD 215 million to establish infrastructure projects in Mutlaa City, and its local agent is Universal Leaders Trading and Contracting Company.

The third company is China's First Way, which is connected with the Ministry of Public Works by a contract worth KD 88 million to maintain roads in South Surra, as well as Damascus Street and Fifth Ring Road. Its local agent is Combined Group Contracting Company.

The fourth company is China State Construction Engineering Corporation Limited, which is connected with Kuwait University (KU) by a contract worth KD 139 million to carry out the construction work in Sabah Al-Salem University. Its local agent is Al-Kharafi National.

The fifth company is the Chinese company Sinohydro, which is connected with the Ministry of Public Works by a construction contract. Its local agent is Copri Corporation.

MP Boushahri insisted that she wants Dr. Buqamaz not to justify the matter by saying the local agents of the international companies are connected to them by limited projects, which have nothing to do with the new contracts. In case the minister uses that justification, it means she is admitting to violating her commitment to assign the contracts to companies that do not have local agents.

She addressed His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Ahmad Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah, asking if Dr. Buqamaz had informed him about the above mentioned details or if she hid the facts as she did with the people and National Assembly.

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 3: The Technical Committee of the Municipal Council, headed by Dr. Hassan Kamal, yesterday referred to the executive body of Kuwait Municipality a letter by the Acting Mayor of Failaka Abdul Wahab Ali Al-Naqi regarding Failaka Island and the expropriation of Jleeb, as it is absolutely necessary to prepare a study on the matter.

The committee also referred for further study the proposal submitted by member Abdullah Al-Anazi regarding the Tourism Enterprises Company (a state-owned company) to address and expedite tourism projects, as well as a proposal submitted by the Head of the Municipal Council Abdullah Al-Mahri regarding the requirements and specifications for labor housing complexes.

In addition, the committee referred to the item related to reallocating the Ministry of Communication's sites.

It also returned to the executive branch the proposal submitted by member Munira Al-Amir regarding establishing a mechanism to resolve disputes between citizens and construction companies, in order to

update its response regarding the matter. It referred for discussion a letter submitted by Lawyer Khawla Al-Hassawi regarding increasing the use of the mezzanine floor in a building owned by the Hawally Governorate Committee.

The committee reserved the allocation of three sites to the Ministry of Communication, and the item related to following up the development plan projects of 2023/2024, and the waterfront project Corniche in Jahra, for the Kuwait Municipality.

Meanwhile, the Technical Committee of the Municipal Council agreed during its meeting yesterday to respond to the proposal of member Munira Al-Amir regarding setting a time limit for handing over the allocation sites to government agencies.

It responded to the proposal of the Municipal Council Head Abdullah Al-Mahri and member Farah Al-Roumi regarding adding the activity of selling flowers and plants to the activity of sweets in commercial areas and buildings for commercial use, in addition to approving the proposal submitted by member Abdullatif Al-Daei regarding providing buses for visitors to cemeteries.

'Smoking harms women

Diabetes main cause of Gulf heart disease

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 3: Professor of Cardiology at Kuwait University and a member of the Board of Directors of the Kuwait Heart Association Dr. Muhammad Zubaid announced that the association conducted a two-month study on 4,000 male and female heart patients at a ratio of 3:1 with the aim of following up on cases of acute seizures and clots, which require hospitalization, and special care and treatment methods.

In a press statement issued during the celebration of the women's health awareness campaign titled "Because You Are Different", Dr. Zubaid highlighted the importance of the campaign in raising the level of awareness about the symptoms of atypical heart attacks that affect women, and bridging the existing knowledge gap about their heart health by discussing the health risks facing women's hearts in different age stages.

He said the results of the study will provide great information in terms of ages, risks, and types of diseases found in women, and will help in knowing how to deal with them.

Dr. Zubaid thanked all the participants and workers of the event and the organizing company.

Women

Meanwhile, the Endocrinology and Diabetes Consultant and Head of the Kuwait Diabetes Association Dr. Walid Al-Dhahi said, "Heart disease is one of the most common diseases around the world. Although men are more susceptible to heart disease than women, women who smoke and suffer from obesity have a higher chance of heart disease than men.

Diabetes is the first cause of heart disease in the Gulf region. Any person who suffers from diabetes has a four times higher risk of heart disease than a normal person.

Furthermore, Director of the Professional Diploma Program in General Medical Practice and Head of the General Practitioner Program Committee at the Ministry of Health Dr. Hanan Al-Fadala said, "The committee aims to professionally develop primary health care doctors.

The committee is focusing on two goals. The first is to train newly appointed doctors and follow up on them for 12 months to qualify them to work in primary health care centers. The second is to organize lectures and workshops for doctors on various topics, with the aim of professional development and for them to learn about the latest developments in the field of primary care.'

Also, Head of the Internal Medicine team at Ahmadi Hospital and a member of the Kuwait Heart Association Dr. Rashid Al-Hamdan highlighted the dangers of cardiovascular diseases in women due to a lack of awareness and information about the symptoms and side effects of the disease, which may differ when compared to men.

He said women in the Middle East are at high risk of heart disease due to high rates of obesity, with 30 percent of them suffering from this chronic medical condition, compared to 16 percent of men.

In addition, Director of Organon in Kuwait, Bahrain and Oatar Ahmed Lashin said, "We always strive to improve the medical sector and conduct more research on heart diseases in women. We are committed to providing a platform to listen to women's problems and medical needs, and raise their voices to bring about a positive and radical change."

It is distinguished...that is why it is under attack

Some intellectuals and semi-intellec-tuals, particularly from Gulf countries, have voiced criticism against Kuwait's democracy and the impact this experience has had on Kuwait and its people, asserting that the Kuwaiti dem-

ocratic experience has placed them in dissatisfying situations. The adoption of democracy by a small Arab Gulf country was met with disapproval from many nations for various reasons. Those criti-

cizing Kuwait's democracy overlook the fact that democracy and the legitimacy of the Al Sabah Family were the foundation on which 34 countries based their decision to assist Kuwait in repelling the Iraqi invasion in 1991.

Conversely, when a major global power, with financial and logistical Gulf support, decided to overthrow the dictatorial regime of Muammar Gaddafi, there was little sympathy for his fate worldwide.

The same sentiment was echoed during the US invasion of Iraq when a greater number of people celebrated the over-throw of Iraq's foolish dictator Saddam Hussein than those mourning him.

The subsequent chaos in Libya and Iraq could have been avoided if regimes had respected their people and prioritized their prosperity. The present turmoil in both countries stems from the misguided actions of Saddam Hussein and Gaddafi, who failed to learn from historical lessons.

It is essential to repeatedly emphasize that the current political disputes, arguments, developmental slowdown, and increased problems in Kuwait have no direct connection to democracy.

Criticizing democracy for these issues is akin to blaming a high-class car manufacturer because one car is not functioning properly. The problem lies in the misuse and lack of proper maintenance by the car owner. Democracy, which is disliked by some, has consistently been the driving force behind Kuwait's innovation in various fields such as theater, art, sports, and science because innovation thrives on freedom. Some argue that unless democracy

leads to development, progress, equality, and justice, it is ineffectual and unnecessary. This viewpoint is similar to discarding a broken car without considering that its breakdown is due to the lack of regular maintenance and improper usage. Without maintenance and care, democracy can also deteriorate.

The opinion held by some individuals, including Saudi journalist Muhammad Alrotayyan, to forsake justice, free speech, and action for the sake of enjoying the impressive advancements in some Gulf cities concerning services, infrastructure, and superstructures is naive and illogical.

They contend that Kuwait's democracy failed to achieve development, overlooking its numerous accomplishments in various domains. Their repeated criticism of democracy only underscores its influence and righteousness. However, the root issue lies in the deliberate mishandling and improper utilization of democracy.

Ås long as Kuwait remains committed to its ruling Dynasty, Constitution, and democracy, the right course can be regained. A decision is all that is needed to steer in the right direction. It is a simplistic way of thinking to suggest abandoning democracy for the sake of better roads. Achieving better roads merely requires a decision and has no bearing on democracy.

Both Saddam Hussein and Muammar Gaddafi possessed the capabilities to satisfy their people and create respected and distinguished nations. However, they squandered the opportunity for any progress. The question arises: what guarantees that Kuwait will not follow in the footsteps of Iraq or Libya if democracy is abandoned?

"Late Egyptian President Anwar Al Sadat once admitted in a moment of candor, "I have always believed in dictatorship. Now I dare say that the mistakes of democracy committed over centuries are much less than the mistakes of dictatorship in one hour because of the devastating effect of the latter."

'Development is institutional and not an individual's work'

"ONE of the key reasons behind the lack of prog-ress in the Third World can be attributed to its reliance on individuals rather than institutions," columnist Ahmed Abdel Mohsen Al-Mulaifi wrote for Annahar daily.

"Development is often tied to the age of the leader rather than the age of the country and its people. Progress and development thrive under the guidance of an honest, proactive leader with a clear vision.

"However, a significant challenge arises when development is associated with a particular individual. The leader's name is often tied to the initiatives, resulting in various factions trying to gain influence and credit, leading to a focus on the leader's ideas rather than their practical implementation. This tends to occur regardless of the feasibility of these ideas.

Al-Mulaifi "Sadly, when such a leader either passes away

or steps down, the progress they initiated tends to crumble. Forward momentum is reversed, bureaucracy flourishes, and corruption spreads.

"Numerous examples illustrate this, including Malaysia's experience during the time of Mahathir Mohamad and subsequent leaders. Similarly, President Carlos Menem's economic revival in Argentina faced a downturn after his tenure, and the nation is currently heavily indebted.

"Linking development solely to a leader and their ideologies, actions, and legacy may foster short-term growth but not sustainable development. Furthermore, a leader's lifespan is finite, while the life of a state is enduring. Therefore, sustainable development necessitates an approach that transcends individual leadership.

"Sustainable development hinges on two critical components: firstly, individuals must serve as the driving force, the protective shield, and the implementers of development.

"Secondly, a robust institutional framework characterized by a just judiciary, good governance, absolute transparency, and protective mechanisms is vital. This system safeguards the development agenda, ensuring that subsequent leaders are compelled to carry forward the progress initiated by their predecessors.'

"What's the narrative behind the government's silence concerning both genuine and fraudulent social media accounts whose owners have compromised their principles for financial gain? Why hasn't the government taken action against these unscrupulous media and individual accounts that consistently spread slander, doubt, and poison through platforms like X, Snapchat, Instagram, WhatsApp, and numerous others?' columnist Walid Ibrahim Al-Ahmad wrote for Al-Rai daily.

"These accounts often malign the names of

decision allows the sale of only one month of vacation every ten years. It is considered a revolutionary correction to the previous government's decision, which cost one billion dinars in almost a year.

"The government is now looking at correcting other erroneous decisions, such as exceptional pensions, and decisions related to a large number of cadres, which caused the huge disparity in employee salaries.

"Thus, the government does not always adequately study financial decisions, and gives in to pressure from the council, perhaps for political reasons. When its effects become clear in the ongoing disbursement of billions and the failure to achieve justice, the government shouts.

"If we look at some of the financial disbursement decisions issued by the government on its own or under pressure from the council, and compare them to the value of the projects according to what some officials in the relevant authorities provided, we will find that their value was sufficient to solve major problems suffered by the Kuwaiti people. "The amount of KD 1 billion paid to sell va-

cations was enough to build a 3,000 kilowatt power station that supplies electricity to thousands of idle plots in Al-Mutlaa and South Saad Al-Abdullah.

"As for paying interests to postpone loans during the COVID-19 pandemic, which cost between KD 400 million and KD 500 million, it was enough to supply 20 areas the size of Qadisiya area, which contains more than 1,000 houses, with streets, and sewage and rainwater systems."

"I was happy when I read the Kuwait Army's report about establishing an agricultural reserve in the country to achieve food self-sufficiency for its sectors," columnist Mohammad Al-Saqr wrote for Al-Anba daily.

"The establishment of this reserve, whose area is estimated at one million square meters, is a blessed step towards providing food products. It is an important step in the process of achieving food security and reducing dependence on imports. It is a strategic goal that must be im-

plemented. "This reserve was completed in 2022. In 2023, it produced 30 tons each of onions and eggplants, 42 tons of potatoes and 50 tons of tomatoes.

"This comes within the framework of Kuait's effective strategy to achieve food security, which was launched in 2021. It relies on a number of initiatives and pillars, especially after the food crisis that struck the world as a result of the disruption of supply chains during the Corona pandemic.

Captain absolved, Filipino gets jail in liquor peddling

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 3: The Court of Cassation on Monday ruled to refrain from issuing punishment against a Kuwaiti captain and to imprison a Filipino expatriate for 3 years and 4 months in the case of smuggling alcohol on the yacht of a social media celebrity.

The Public Prosecution had ordered the exclusion of the owner of the seized yacht after the Filipino captain confessed to bringing the seized items.

It is noteworthy that the Criminal Court sentenced the Filipino captain to five-year imprisonment with hard work and deportation from the country after serving the sentence, and for the Kuwaiti captain to oneyear imprisonment with hard work.

Hacker case adjourned: The Criminal Court adjourned to Monday next week the case filed against a Kuwaiti hacker, who hacked into the website of the US Department of Defense and the Pentagon, and accessed sensitive weapons sites.

It is noteworthy that the accused, who is 28 years old, is of Kuwaiti nationality. He was able to hack the US Department of Defense website and access sensitive weapons sites, in a move that endangered Kuwait's relationship with an ally and also endangered Kuwaiti national security.

The State Security Department had referred the accused to the Public Prosecution for investigation, after he was suspected of hacking the US Department of Defense website.

Famous medical center shut for violating rules

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 3: The Drug Inspection Department of the Ministry of Health closed a famous medical center in Salmiya, which included an unlicensed nursery in the basement of the center, in violation of the license.

The Ministry of Health announced that inspectors from the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, with the participation of employees from the Health Licensing Department, Immigration Affairs Investigations, and the Public Authority for Manpower, closed the center.

The Ministry of Health explained that a number of secret unlicensed warehouses to store medicines and cosmetics for the purpose of selling to the public were discovered.

All these medical items were seized, due to the failure to meet storage and general hygiene conditions, in addition to the center not obtaining the

Consequently, we find ourselves amidst influential groups engaged in internal conflicts, with people passionately following and endorsing these divisive narratives.

"All of this comes at the expense of our homeland. Those who remain immune to punishment continue to engage in misconduct, and without deterrents, they will persist in their destructive path, potentially causing irreparable harm to the entire nation.

"We are certain that this digital chaos has become organized and directed against the country, and today it is managed from within and from abroad for dirty personal interests that must be (removed) before it destroys us!

'We began to suspect that many of these so-called fake accounts are in fact known to the government, but we prefer to follow them from a distance!"

"It is necessary for the government to study the financial proposals scientifically and technically with a view of the future. It will then discover that it can, with the same amounts demanded by some members and from which certain people benefit, ensure a better living situation for everyone, solve the problem of unemployment for thousands of young people, provide electricity to thousands of homes, and make a great deal of progress in solving the housing problem", columnist Ahmad Bager wrote for aljarida daily.

Whenever there is excessive political interference, such intervention leads to restricting the flexibility of the education system. The education sector in Kuwait currently suffers from the centralization of decisions and powers and their confinement to leaders who lack experience and ability to manage the education file.

"Third: Educational policies need stability and continuity to achieve the required goals. Repeated political interference leads to fluctuations and instability in education, such as the continuous change in the senior leadership of the Ministry of Education, which has created a kind of instability in departments and executive plans.'

Officer, doctor in bribe probe

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 3: The Public Prosecution has taken action by referring a Ministry of Interior senior official and a doctor to the Criminal Court in a case involving money laundering and bribery, reports Al-Qabas daily. This move comes follow-

ing the decision of Sheikh Talal Khaled Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah, the First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of the Interior, to refer the case to the prosecution. According to a reliable source, the Public Pros-

ecution has pressed charges against three individuals for accepting bribes. This charge comes after their involvement was uncovered in obtaining a suspended visa through illicit means.

The source highlighted that investigations revealed that each transaction was facilitated by the accused in exchange for an amount totaling 2,000 dinars.

Sheikh imposter's life imprisonment upheld

The complainant stated that the accused deceived her by impersonating a member of the ruling family, and luring her as a lawyer to consult her legally.


She was surprised when he assaulted her, and then he tricked her into marrying and defrauding her, and seizing a diamond ring and sums of money

According to the case file, the father of the three girls visited the healer in his residence in Mahboula in order to do the incantation on his daughters to rid them of envy.

However, they left crying, and told their father that the "healer" did immoral things to their bodies and harassed them.

The father then filed a report with the Ministry of Interior.

After investigations, the case was referred to the prosecution and then to the court.



Dr. Al-Mutairi explained that psoriasis is an autoimmune skin disease that affects men and women alike at various age levels, especially from 16 to 22 years, and from 57 to 60 years.

The different types of psoriasis include plaque and nail psoriasis, guttate psoriasis, flexural psoriasis, pustular psoriasis, and erythrodermic psoriasis.


The disease often appears in the form of itchy rashes and flaky spots on the knees, elbows, trunk, and scalp.

Meanwhile, in a similar press statement, the Head of the Dermatology Department at Farwaniya Hospital and the Secretary General of the Kuwait Dermatologists Association Dr. Abeer Al-Bathali affirmed the keenness of the association to organize this campaign for raising awareness and educating the community about the disease by organizing weekly events and activities in all dermatology centers, starting with Farwaniya Hospital and concluding at the Avenues Mall on October 28.

Dr. Al-Bathali stated that the goal of the campaign is to educate individuals and society about the dangers of psoriasis, stressing that it is a common disease that appears in the form of red spots covered with a crusty layer on the knees, elbows, and scalp.

She said there are diseases that may accompany psoriasis, such as metabolic syndrome, obesity, diabetes, high blood pressure, cholesterol, and high levels of uric acid and triglycerides.

Dr. Al-Bathali warned that patients suffering from psoriasis are among those at the highest risk for developing heart disease, due to which emphasis must be put on educating the community and correcting its concepts about the disease



In a press statement, Marwa Al-Rashidi, an official at SAB prior oversight department, said the bureau gave opinions on 1,793 topics, worth KD 2.5 billion (about USD 8.1 billion) during the above-mentioned period.

MP Hayef explained that some of the beneficiaries of the Amiri amnesty have not restored their withdrawn citizenships yet, despite the fact that a long time has passed since the issuance of the Amiri amnesty based on the recommendations of the relevant committee formed by the late Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah and headed by the former Prime Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khalid and former National Assembly Speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanim.

He wondered why most of the beneficiaries of the amnesty who have been convicted of storing weapons and attempting to collapse the ruling regime have been released but those convicted of minor crimes such as sharing posts on social media have not yet been freed.

MP Hayef stressed the need for the government to finalise this issue before the start of the upcoming parliamentary session scheduled on October 31, 2023.

He said the amnesty is aimed to address the consequences of the political positions taken in 2012 including the collection of donations for Syrian citizens, despite the fact that the donations have been collected clearly and under the supervision and with the permission of the government.

The current government adopted an unprecedented attitude in terms of punishing those convicted of participating in by-elections with the toughest penalty, i.e., two-year imprisonment. No politician in any other country is or has been punished in this manner.



EU rejects doubts over commitment to Ukraine

KYIV, Ukraine, Oct 3, (AP): The European Union's foreign policy chief on Monday led a delegation of top diplomats on an unannounced visit to Kyiv and dismissed concerns about political tension in the bloc over its long-term support for Ukraine's fight against Russia

Though largely symbolic, the informal meeting between EU and Ukrainian diplomats demonstrated the EU's "clear commitment" to Ukraine in its 19-monthlong war, Josep Borrell said

The EU remains united in its support to Ukraine ... I don't see any member state folding on their engagement," Borrell told a news conference in the Ukrainian capital

The gathering was the first time EU foreign ministers have met outside the bloc

- and in a war zone, according to Borrell.

The talks took place after the weekend election victory in EU member Slovakia of former Prime Minister Robert Fico, whose pro-Russian agenda has increased the question marks about the EU's continued support for Kyiv. The small eastern European

country could bring more tension to the EU's discussions

on Ukraine, as has happened with Hungary's at-times cool attitude toward Kyiv. Budapest has maintained close relations with Moscow and argued against supplying arms to Ukraine or providing it with economic assistance. Slovakia operates a key rail line used to transport western military hardware to Ukraine.

The EU, the United States and the United Kingdom have provided massive military and financial support to Ukraine, enabling it to stand up to the Kremlin's attack. The assistance is crucial for Ukraine's weakened economy and has so far been open-ended.

But uncertainty has set in over how long Kyiv's allies will keep sending aid worth billions of dollars (euros)

US President Joe Biden on Sunday reassured allies of continued US financial support for the war effort, after Congress averted a government shutdown by adopting a short-term funding package that dropped assistance for Ukraine in its battle against Russia.

White House press secretary Karine Jean-Pierre said Monday that Biden had rallied more than 140 countries to condemn Russia's invasion and built a coalition of more than 50 countries to provide aid to Ukraine. Meanwhile, Russia's finances are deteriorating in part over sanctions.

"There is a strong, very strong international coali-tion behind Ukraine," Jean-Pierre said. And if Russian President Vladimir Putin "thinks he can outlast us, he's wrong.

Many US lawmakers acknowledge that winning approval for Ukraine assistance in Congress is growing more difficult as the war grinds on.

Borrell, at his news conference, insisted the EU is devoted to "sustained engagement" with Ukraine. "Our resolve ... is firm and will continue," he said.

He ticked off a list of ongoing commitments the 27-nation EU has made and hopes to make, including proposed military aid of 5 billion euros (\$5.3 billion) next year, a target to train some 40,000 Ukrainian troops and possible joint arms industry ventures between EU and Ukrainian defense companies. Other signs of the EU's commitment include help with cyber defense, a demining program to enable Ukraine's postwar recovery and the reform of Ukrainian law enforcement to crack down on corruption, Borrell said.

Trump turns fraud trial into campaign stop

NEW YORK, Oct 3, (AP): After a fiery first day of opening arguments, lawyers in Donald Trump's business fraud trial in New York was to move on Tuesday to the more plodding task of going through years of his financial documents in what's expected to be a weekslong fight over whether they constitute proof of fraud.

An accountant who prepared Trump's financial statements for years was expected to be back on the witness stand for a second day.

Trump, who spent a full day Monday as an angry spectator at the civil trial, was contemplating a return to court as well.

After denouncing the judge and New York's attorney general, who brought the lawsuit, Trump said in a courtroom hallway that he "may" be back for a second day, though he noted, "I'd love to be campaigning instead of doing this."

Rep Gaetz files motion to oust McCarthy as US House speaker

WASHINGTON, Oct 3, (AP): US Speaker Kevin McCarthy is facing an extraordinary referendum on his leadership of the House after a conservative member of his own Republican majority, a longtime critic, moved to launch a vote to oust him from the helm.

Late Monday, Rep. Matt Gaetz, R-Fla., rose in the chamber as the House was almost done for the day to file the motion - a resolution that would set a snap vote in coming days that even Gaetz acknowledged may not have enough sup-

Gaetz soon retorted in a post, "Just did."

But the EU's "strongest security commitment" for Ukraine is to grant it membership of the bloc, he said.

Ukraine is bent on becoming a member of the EU, and EU officials have encouraged that course, even though it could take years amid a war of attrition with no end in sight.

"With every village, with every meter that Ukraine liberates, with every meter in which it rescues its people, it is also paving its way to the European Union," German Foreign Minister Annalena Baerbock told reporters in Kviv.

"Both Ukraine and the European side are determined to move forward at maximum speed, taking into account all the reforms that Ukraine has carried out, is currently carrying out and will continue to implement," Ukrainian Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba said.

Kuleba also offered reassurances about the country's allies after the UACongress left Ukraine aid out of its funding package.

Kuleba told reporters that Ukraine held discussions with representatives of both parties in Congress to ensure more help will arrive.

"The decision was taken as it was, but we are now working with both sides of the Congress to make sure that it does not repeat again under any circumstances," Kuleba said.

"The question is whether what happens in the US Congress last weekend is an incident or a system. I think it was an incident," he added.

Kuleba said he also urged the foreign minsters "to provide maximum support to their defense companies in building cooperation with Ukrainian defense companies.'

Such cooperation recently became a frequent topic in the talks between Ukraine and its partners.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said Monday that he did not doubt that Washington "will continue to be directly involved in the conflict.

At the same time, Putin is wagering that international support for Kyiv will sooner or later begin to flag. Peskov said the fatigue will eventually bring "fragmentation" of Ukraine's foreign assistance.

UK Defense Secretary Grant Shapps insisted Monday that the U.S. was "a long way" from withdrawing its support from Ukraine, and he reaffirmed the British commitment.

YEREVAN, Armenia: The Armenian parliament on Tuesday voted to join the International Criminal Court, which earlier this year indicted Russian President Vladimir Putin for war crimes connected to the deportation of children from Ukraine.

The move is likely to further strain Armenia's deteriorating relation with its ally Russia, which last month called Yerevan's push to join the ICC an "unfriendly step.

Countries that have signed and ratified the Rome Statute that created the ICC are bound to arrest Putin if he sets foot on their soil.

Cuellar cariacked at gunpoint: US

Rep Henry Cuellar, D-Texas, was carjacked Monday night by three armed attackers, his office said.

Cuellar's chief of staff Jacob Hochberg released a statement saying: "As Congressman Cuellar was parking his car this evening, 3 armed assailants approached the Congressman and stole his vehicle. Luckily, he was not harmed and is working with local law enforcement.

Hochberg said police recovered Cuellar's vehicle. The Washington Post reported that the robbery happened at 9:30 p.m. at New Jersey Avenue and K Street SE in Washington's Navy Yard area, about a mile from the U.S. Capitol.

Monday's incident was the second assault on a member of Congress in the District of Columbia this year. In February, Democratic Rep. Angie Craig of Minnesota was assaulted in her Washington apartment building, suffering bruises while escaping serious injury. Her chief of staff said the attack did not appear to be politically motivated. (AP)

Missing 9-year-old found safe: A 9-year-old girl who vanished during a family camping trip in upstate New York was "safe and in good health" Monday after a massive two-day search ended with her rescue and the arrest of a person suspected in her abduction, police said.

Charlotte Sena disappeared while riding her bike early Saturday evening at Moreau Lake State Park, a heavily wooded area some 35 miles (60 kilometers) north of Albany. Gov. Kathy Hochul said Monday night



Bid to fight gangs UN approves deploying Kenya-led force to Haiti

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, Oct 3, (AP): The UN Se-curity Council voted Monday to send a multinational armed force led by Kenya to Haiti to help combat violent gangs, marking the first time in almost 20 years that a force would be deployed to the troubled Caribbean nation.

The resolution drafted by the United States and Ec-uador was approved with 13 votes in favor and two abstentions from China and the Russian Federation.

The resolution authorizes the force to deploy for one year, with a review after nine months. The non-UN mission would be funded by voluntary contract tions, with the US pledging up to \$200 million. The vote was held nearly a year after Haiti's prime min-



ister requested the immediate deployment of an armed force, which is expected to quell a surge in gang violence and restore security so Haiti can hold long-delayed elections. Haiti's National Police has struggled in its fight against gangs with only about 10,000 active offic-ers in a country of more than 11 million people.

"More than just a simple vote, this is in fact an expression of solidarity with a population in distress," said Jean Victor Généus, Hai-ti's foreign affairs minister. "It's a glimmer of hope

for the people who have been suffering for too long." A deployment date has not been set, although UN Secretary of State Antony Blinken recently said a se-curity mission to Haiti could deploy "in months."

Kenyan Foreign Affairs Minister Alfred Mutua said last week that the force could deploy within two to three months, or possibly early January. He also noted

that key officers are being taught French. Hours after the vote, Haitian Prime Minister Ariel Henry thanked the UN Security Council, the UN's secretary general and Kenya and other countries who agreed to join the force, saying, "The bell of liberation sounded. ... We couldn't wait any longer!"


It wasn't immediately clear how big the force would be. Kenya's government has previously pro-posed sending 1,000 police officers. In addition, Jamaica, the Bahamas and Antigua and Barbuda have pledged to send personnel.

Vassily Nebenzia, the Russian Federation's UN ambassador, said he did not have any objections in principle to the resolution, but that sending an armed force to a country even at its request "is an extreme measure that must be thought through.

He said multiple requests for details including the use of force and when it would be withdrawn "went unanswered" and criticized what he said was a rushed decision. "Authorizing another use of force in Haiti ... is short-sighted" without the details sought by the Russian Federation, he said.

China's UN ambassador, Zhang Jun, said he hopes countries leading the mission will hold in-depth con-sultations with Haitian officials on the deployment and explained his opposition to the resolution.

"Without a legitimate, effective, and responsible government in place, any external support can hardly have any lasting effects," he said, adding that a con-sensus for a transition is urgently needed as well as a "feasible and credible" timetable. "Regrettably, the



Suspect in police custody

2 dead in Bangkok shopping mall shooting

BANGKOK, Oct 3, (AP): A shooter opened fire inside a major shopping mall in the center of Thailand's capital Tuesday afternoon, killing at least two people before being apprehended, authorities said.

Police said a suspect was taken into custody less than an hour after the first reported gunshots at the Siam Paragon Mall, long been seen as one of Bangkok's biggest and most upscale shopping destinations. Video uploaded to social media and broadcast on television showed a long-haired teenage boy in the custody of police. Major Thai media said he was 14 years old, though recently appointed police chief Torsak Sukvimol confirmed only that he is a minor and appeared to be suffering from mental illness.

Witnesses said crowds of people left the building, one of several shopping centers in the area popular with tourists and well-heeled Thais alike.

Chinese tourist Liu Shiying told the AP that she saw people running and saying someone had opened fire. She said she heard gunshots and an alarm ringing, and that the lights in the mall went out.

The president of the U.N. Security Council, Brazil's Sérgio França, noted that without a Haitian political solution based on free, transparent and fair elections, "no ... aid will guarantee lasting success."

International intervention in Haiti has a complicated history. A U.N.-approved stabilization mission to Haiti that started in June 2004 was marred by a sexual abuse scandal and the introduction of cholera, which killed nearly 10,000 people. The mission ended in October 2017.

The resolution approved Monday warns that mission leaders must takes measures to prevent abuse and sexual exploitation as well as adopt wastewater management and other environmental controls to prevent water-borne diseases, such as cholera.

But concerns remain.

Critics of the Kenyan-led mission have noted that police in the east Africa country have long been accused of using torture, deadly force and other abuses. Top Kenvan officials visited Haiti in August as part of a reconnaissance mission as the US worked on a draft of the resolution.

Linda Thomas-Greenfield, the US ambassador to the UN, told reporters that the resolution contains strong accountability and vetting language and that she's confident Kenya will be able to carry out the mission.

"I can assure you the US will engage on these issues very, very aggressively," she said. "We've learned from mistakes of the past."

Monday's vote comes nearly a year after Haiti's prime minister and 18 top government officials requested the immediate deployment of a foreign armed force as the government struggled to control gangs

amid a surge in killings, rapes and kidnappings. From Jan. 1 until Aug. 15, more than 2,400 peo-ple in Haiti were reported killed, more than 950 kidnapped and another 902 injured, according to the most recent U.N. statistics. More than 200,000 others have lost their homes as rival gangs pillage communities and fight to control more territory.

"We have taken an important step today, but our work to support the people of Haiti is not done," he said.

'Remove 41 diplomats': India has told Canada to remove 41 of its 62 diplomats in the country, an official familiar with the matter said Tuesday, ramping up a confrontation over Canadian accusations that India may have been involved in the killing of a Sikh separatist leader in suburban Vancouver.

The official spoke on condition of anonymity as they were not authorized to speak publicly ahead of public reaction from the Canadian government later Tuesday. The official confirmed an earlier report from the Financial Times.

Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has said there were "credible allegations" of Indian involvement in the slaying of Hardeep Singh Nijjar, a 45-year-old Sikh leader who was killed by masked gunmen in June in Surrey, outside Vancouver.

For years, India has said Nijjar, a Canadian citizen born in India, has links to terrorism, an allegation Nijjar denied. (AP)

Indian journalists targeted: Indian police raided the offices of a news website that's under investigation for allegedly receiving funds from China, as well as the homes of several of its journalists, in what critics described as an attack on one of India's few remaining independent news outlets.

The raids came months after Indian authorities searched the BBC's New Delhi and Mumbai offices over accusations of tax evasion in February. NewsClick, founded in 2009, is

known as a rare Indian news outlet willing to criticize Prime Minister Narendra Modi. A number of other news organizations have been investigated for financial impropriety under Modi's Hindu nationalist government, as international monitors warn that press free-dom is eroding in India.

Indian authorities registered a case against the site and its journalists on Aug. 17, weeks after a New York Times report alleged that the website had received funds from an American millionaire who, the Times wrote, has funded the spread of "Chinese propaganda." NewsClick has denied the charges.

The case was filed under a wide-ranging anti-terrorism law that allows charges for "anti-national activities" and has been used against activists, journalists and critics of Modi, some of whom have spent years in jail before going to trial. No one has been arrested in connection with NewsClick so far.

Prime Minister Srettha Thavisin told reporters that he was informed by police that one of the dead was a Chinese tourist about 30 years old.

"I would like to express my deepest condolences to the family of the deceased following the shooting inside Siam Paragon," Srettha, who took office in August, said in an earlier statement. "I would like to give my moral support to the families of all who died and were injured."

Gun violence is not uncommon in Thailand, though mass shootings are rare.

The incident happened days before Thais were planning to mark the anniversary of the country's biggest mass killing by an individual, a grisly gun and knife attack at a rural day care center in a northeastern province that killed 36

Two people, including NewClick's editor in chief, were detained during the raids, and police carried away boxes of documents

"We're temporarily hiding. Who dares to go out?" she said while taking cover. She was later able to leave.

Scary

Gautam Vora, 45, an Indian national who works in finance in Bangkok, was at the mall with his wife and child. He said it was "quite scary," even though he was initially unsure whether he had heard gunshots or "somebody playing a hoax with some firecrackers.

"Everybody was screaming and run-ning," he said. "There was a lot of chaos and that was almost like a stampede."

"I don't think they were well prepared for this," he added. "I think most of the staff inside the shopping mall were confused and they were running helterskelter. too.'

Multiple videos uploaded to social media showed people running out of the building, and several showed a person dressed in a baseball cap, dark shirt and camouflage pants inside the mall, holding a handgun. A video believed to be of the shooter after his arrest showed a long-haired boy wearing glasses dressed like that, with an American flag on his cap. Videos and photos also showed the pistol he was said to have been carrying before he was disarmed.

2 quakes hit Nepal: Two earthquakes struck northwestern Nepal on Tuesday, sending tremors through the region, the country's earthquake monitoring center said.

Kuwaiti investments surge by KD 137.27 million in 9 months

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 3: The latest market trading volume statistics, categorized by nationality, have revealed significant trends in investments during the first nine months of 2023. Kuwaiti investors demonstrated increased interest, with their investments growing by 137.27 million dinars over this period, and a noteworthy surge of 21.27 million dinars in September alone. Specifically, individual Kuwaiti traders increased their investments by 41.15 million dinars, while Kuwaiti institutions and companies contributed to the growth with a substantial 131.38 million dinars. However, Kuwaiti investment funds experienced a decrease of 7.09 million dinars, and client portfolio investments fell by 28.16 million dinars. On the other hand, Gulf investments encountered a decline of 136.63 million dinars over nine months, with an additional drop of 18.79 million dinars in September. Gulf individuals displayed increased investments totaling 12.368 million dinars during this ninemonth period, but Gulf institutions and companies witnessed a significant decline of 145.18 million dinars. Gulf investment funds also faced a decrease of 3.89 million dinars, while client portfolio investments increased by 70.1 thousand dinars. In contrast, foreign investments took a different path, declining by 641.8 thousand dinars since the beginning of the year, with a further decrease of 2.483 million dinars in September. Foreign individuals reduced their investments by 613 thousand dinars over nine months. On the flip side, foreign institutions and companies increased their investments by 4.6 million dinars, while foreign investment funds added 4.67 million dinars to their portfolios. Additionally, there were changes in the number of active trading accounts on the Kuwaiti Stock Exchange. Active trading accounts increased by 6.1% from the start of 2023, rising from 17,702 accounts in December to 18,790 accounts by the end of September, with a monthly increase of 2.5%. Nevertheless, compared to September 2022 when there were 19,590 accounts, there was a 4.1% decline on an annual basis. Dormant accounts increased by 0.95% during the first nine months of 2023, reaching 402.89 thousand accounts by the end of September. On a monthly basis, dormant accounts increased slightly by 0.06%, whereas on an annual basis, there was a 1.8% increase compared to September 2022 when there were 395.6 thousand accounts. Active Kuwaiti accounts in September totaled approximately 17.07 thousand accounts, compared to 16.63 thousand in August, and dormant Kuwaiti accounts increased marginally from 381.52 to 381.73 thousand accounts

Drawing parallels

How lessons from 'nanotechnology' can shape future of AI development

Twenty years ago, nanotech-nology was the artificial intelligence of its time. The specific details of these technologies are, of course, a world apart. But the challenges of ensuring each technology's responsible and beneficial development are surprisingly alike. Nanotechnology, which is technologies at the scale of individual atoms and molecules, even carried its own existential risk in the form of "gray goo." As potentially transformative AI-based technologies continue to emerge and gain traction, though, it is not clear that people in the artificial intelligence field are applying the lessons learned from nanotechnology. As scholars of the future of innovation, we explore these parallels in a new commentary in the journal Nature Nanotechnology. The commentary also looks at how a lack of engagement with a diverse community of experts and stakeholders threatens AI's long-term success. In the late 1990s and early 2000s, nanotechnology transitioned from a radical and somewhat fringe idea to mainstream acceptance. The U.S. government and other administrations around the world ramped up investment in what was claimed to be "the next industrial revolution." Government experts made compelling arguments for how, in the words of a foundational report from the U.S. National Science and Technology Council, "shaping the world atom by atom" would positively transform economies, the environment and lives.

worries about existential risks began to emerge, notably the possibility of self-replicating "nanobots" converting all matter on Earth into copies of themselves, resulting in a planet-encompassing "gray goo." This particular scenario was even highlighted by Sun Microsystems co-founder Bill Joy in a prominent article in Wired magazine.

IFC expertise available for Kuwaiti public and private sectors: official

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 3, (KUNA): The International Finance Corporation's (IFC) expertise is readily available and can be rendered to the Kuwait public and private sectors to boost their cooperation and achieve the state's comprehensive development plan, said an official on Tuesday.

Speaking to KUNA, Hela Cheikhrouhou -- Regional Vice President, Middle East, Central Asia, Turkiye, Afghanistan, and Pakistan -- said her visit to Kuwait mainly aimed at exploring venues of cooperation with the private sector and identifying the capabilities of Kuwaiti companies to enter the emerging market.

Cheikhrouhou stressed that it is important to bolster cooperation between the public and private sectors in Kuwait, revealing that she would be

meeting with several officials from the government and private entities during her visit.

Cheikhrouhou reiterated that the IFC

was a pioneer in public and private sectors partnerships, generating USD 46 billion since 2004 to better services to some 150 million individuals globally.

The IFC had previously worked on projects with the Kuwaiti private sector, she revealed.

The IFC official added that the corporation had worked with Kuwait's Zain telecommunication company on four projects in Iraq and Malawi, providing financial facilities worth USD 261 million and earning USD 414 million through the network expansion projects.

The IFC had worked with several countries in the region, pointed out Cheikhrouhou, revealing that the corporation worked with Jordan last March and invested in "green bonds" in cooperation with the Jordan Kuwait Bank (JKB) to fund environmental friendly projects in the kingdom.

Public pushback

But there was a problem. On the heels of public pushback against genetically modified crops, together with lessons learned from recombinant DNA and the Human Genome Project, people in the nanotechnology field had growing concerns that there could be a similar backlash against nanotechnology_if it were handled poorly.

These concerns were well grounded. In the early days of nanotechnology, nonprofit organizations such as the ETC Group, Friends of the Earth and others strenuously objected to claims that this type of technology was safe, that there would be minimal downsides and that experts and developers knew what they were doing. The era saw public protests against nanotechnology and - disturbingly - even a bombing campaign by environmental extremists that targeted nanotechnology researchers.

Just as with AI today, there were concerns about the effect on jobs as a new wave of skills and automation swept away established career paths. Also foreshadowing current AI concerns, though, were less speculative. Just as there's a growing focus on more immediate risks associated with AI in the present, the early 2000s saw an emphasis on examining tangible challenges related to ensuring the safe and responsible development of nanotechnology. These included potential health and environmental impacts, social and ethical issues, regulation and governance, and a growing need for public and stakeholder collaboration.

Complex landscape

The result was a profoundly complex landscape around nanotechnology development that promised incredible advances yet was rife with uncertainty and the risk of losing public trust if things went wrong.

One of us - Andrew Maynard was at the forefront of addressing the potential risks of nanotechnology in the early 2000s as a researcher, co-chair of the interagency Nanotechnology Environmental and Health Implications working group and chief science adviser to the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars Project on Emerging Technology.

At the time, working on responsible nanotechnology development felt like playing whack-a-mole with the health, environment, social and governance challenges presented by the technology. For every solution, there seemed to be a new problem.

Yet, through engaging with a wide array of experts and stakeholders - many of whom were not authorities on nanotechnology but who brought critical perspectives and insights to the table the field produced initiatives that laid the foundation for nanotechnology to thrive. This included multistakeholder partnerships, consensus standards, and initiatives spearheaded by global bodies such as the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development.

As a result, many of the technologies people rely on today are underpinned by advances in nanoscale science and engineering. Even some of the advances in AI rely on nanotechnology-based hardware.

In the U.S., much of this collaborative work was spearheaded by the cross-agency National Nanotechnology Initiative. In the early 2000s, the initiative brought together representatives from across the government to better understand the risks and benefits of nanotechnology. (AP)

Needy countries beyond Europe to potentially benefit

Ukraine, Poland & Lithuania reach deal to expedite grain exports

KYIV, Ukraine, Oct 3, (AP): Ukraine, Poland and Lithuania have agreed on a plan they hope will help expedite Ukrainian grain exports, officials said Tuesday, with needy countries beyond Europe potentially benefiting from speedier procedures.

The deal means that grain inspections will shift from the Ukraine-Poland border to a Lithuanian port on the Baltic Sea, according to a statement from the Ukrainian farm ministry.

The move seeks to facilitate the transit of Ukrainian exports through Polish territory, the statement said, without providing further details.

From the Lithuanian port of Klaipeda, where the inspections for pests and plant diseases will take place from Wednesday, the grain can be exported by sea around the world.

While the stated goal is to hasten Ukrainian grain exports, the agreement may also help defuse tensions over grain prices between Ukraine and Poland a time when some international support for Kyiv's efforts to throw back Russia's invasion may be fraying.

Agricultural exports have brought one of the biggest threats to European unity for Ukraine since Russia invaded.

Russia dealt a huge blow by withdrawing in July from a wartime agreement that ensured safe passage for Ukrainian grain through the Black Sea. That has left more expensive overland routes through Europe as the main path for Ukraine's exports.

Farmers in nearby countries have been upset that Ukraine's food products have flooded their local markets, pushing prices down and hurting their livelihoods. Sealed freight has helped combat that problem, and sending Ukrainian grain straight to the Lithuanian port may also be an answer.

Poland, Hungary and Slovakia announced bans on local imports of Ukrainian food after a European Union embargo ended in mid-September. Ukraine filed a complaint soon afterward with the World Trade Organization as the spat worsened. The EU countries said they would keep allowing those products to move through their borders to parts of the world where people are going hungry.

Ukraine is a major global supplier of wheat, barley, corn and vegetable oil and has struggled since Russia's invasion to get its food products to parts of the world in need.

Meanwhile, Ukrainian air defenses intercepted 29 out of 31 Shahed drones and one Iskander-K cruise missile launched over Ukraine early Tuesday morning, Ukraine's air force reported.

The attack was targeted at Ukraine's eastern Dnipropetrovsk region and the Mykolaiv region of southern Ukraine, it said. No injuries were reported but an industrial facility was damaged.

Ukraine's presidential office said Tuesday that at least two civilians were killed and 14 were wounded over the previous 24 hours.

The greatest number of casualties occurred in the south, where the Russian army shelled the regional capital Kherson nine times, it said.

South Asia is expected to grow by nearly 6% this yr

World's fastest-growing region on the horizon

NEW DELHI, Oct 3, (AP): South Asia is expected to grow by 5.8% this year, making it the fastest-growing region in the world even as the pace remains below pre-pandemic levels, the World Bank said on Tuesday.

The latest South Asia Development Update from the World Bank projected growth in the region to slow slightly to 5.6% in 2024 and 2025, as post-pandemic rebounds fade and reduced global demand weighs on economic activity.

At almost 6% this year, the region is growing faster than all other emerging markets, said Franziska Ohnsorge the organization's chief economist for South Asia. "While high inflation and interest rates have bogged down many emerging markets, South Asia seems to be forging ahead," the World Bank noted in its report Still, "for all of the countries here this represents a slowdown from pre-pandemic levels," Ohnsorge said, adding that the growth wasn't fast enough to meet various development goals set by countries in the region. Despite the progress, the region still has a long way to go, the report said. Per capita incomes in South Asia are around \$2,000 - one-fifth of the level in East Asia and the Pacific region. The current growth rates, while high, are not sufficient for South Asian nations to achieve high-income status within a generation, it said. Additionally, the growth is not necessarily equal. India, which accounts for most

Malaysia cbank reiterates economic resilience

KUALA LUMPUR, Oct 3, (KUNA): The Malaysian economy remains resilient and will continue to be supportive moving into 2024, anchored by domestic activities, said Malaysia's Central Bank Abdul Rasheed Ghaffour on Tuesday.

Ghaffour made the remark in his speech at the 13th International Conference on Financial Crime and Terrorism Financing (IFCTF) themed: "Trust Reinvented: Building a Sustainable Culture of Integrity, Transparency and Accountability".

He said labor market conditions, particularly employment and wages, had continued to improve, supporting households' ability to spend.

"Meanwhile, investments by the private and public sectors remain forthcoming, and these factors will continue to support the economy in 2024" he said, adding that the economy would also benefit from a gradual recovery in the tech cycle, and a rebound in external demand.

The governor noted that Malaysia, fortunately, does not face a severe inflation challenge such as in other economies, and core inflation continued to ease to 2.5 percent in August this year, in line with the lower global commodity prices and improving supply and demand conditions.

"We expect inflation to con-

tinue to trend lower, in line with slowing momentum of price increases. We will continue to monitor potential risks to the outlook, arising mainly from changes to domestic policy on fuel subsidies," Ghaffour added.

Facebook & Instagram users in Europe could get ad-free subscription option

LONDON, Oct 3, (AP): Meta plans to give Facebook and Instagram users in Europe the option of paying for ad-free versions of the social media platforms as a way to comply with the continent's strict data privacy rules, the Wall Street Journal reported Tuesday.

The company wants to charge users about 10 euros (\$10.50) a month to use Instagram or Facebook without ads on desktop browsers, the newspaper reported, citing unnamed people familiar with the proposal. Adding more accounts would cost 6 euros each.

Prices for mobile would be higher, at roughly 13 euros a month, because Meta needs to account for commissions charged by the Apple and Google app stores on in-app payments, the newspaper said.

Meta reportedly is hoping to roll out paid subscriptions in the coming months as a way to comply with European Union data privacy rules that threaten its lucrative business model of showing personalized ads to users. Meta would give users the choice between continuing to use the platforms with ads or paying for the adfree version, the WSJ said.

"Meta believes in the value of free services which are supported by personalized ads," the company said in a statement to The Associated Press. "However, we continue to explore options to ensure we comply with evolving regulatory requirements. We have nothing further to share at this time."

The EU's top court said in July that Meta must first get consent before showing ads to users - a ruling that jeopardizes the company's ability to make money by tailoring advertisements for individual users based on their online interests and digital activity.

It's not clear if EU regulators will sign off on the plan or insist that the company offer cheaper versions. The newspaper said one issue regulators have is whether the proposed fees will be too expensive for most people who don't want to be targeted by ads. of the regional economy, is set to remain robust with 6.3% growth in the 2023-24 fiscal year, while others like Maldives and Nepal are also expected to grow thanks to a rebound in tourism.

But things are bleaker in other countries. Bangladesh's growth may slow to 5.6%, while projections for Pakistan's growth -only 1.7% - are below the rate of its population growth, the World Bank said. Sri Lanka, whose economy collapsed last year, is recovering slowly from a severe recession, but the IMF last week held off from releasing a second tranche of a funding package after concluding that the country had failed to make enough progress in economic reforms.

The World Bank said another concern was that government debt in South Asian countries averaged 86% of GDP in 2022, which is higher than other emerging markets. It added the

high debt could increase the risk of defaults and raise borrowing costs.

The region's economic outlook could also be affected by the slowdown in China's economy and is vulnerable to further shocks from natural disasters, which have become more frequent and intense due to climate change, the report said.

Ohnsorge said that governments in South Asia could improve fiscal conditions by seizing on opportunities for energy transition, which could create jobs, reduce reliance on energy imports and cut pollution levels.

"Almost one-tenth of the region's workers are employed in pollution-intensive jobs," many of which are concentrated among informal and lower-skilled workers who are more vulnerable to changes in the labor market, the World Bank said. The region currently lags behind others in adopting energy-efficient

technologies and creating more green jobs, Ohnsorge added.

The World Bank on Tuesday also released its latest India Development Update, which found that despite a challenging global economic environment, India was one of the fastest-growing major economies in the previous fiscal year at 7.2%. This put it as the second highest among the Group of 20 countries and was almost twice the average for emerging market economies, it said.

With global challenges expected to continue on the back of high interest rates, geopolitical tensions and sluggish global demand, overall economic growth is likely to slow in the mediumterm. The World Bank forecasts India's GDP growth for the current fiscal year to be 6.3%, attributing it mainly to external factors and waning pent-up demand after the COVID-19 pandemic.

Actor Patrick Stewart looks back on his life in memoir

NEW YORK, Oct 3, (AP): Patrick Stewart, who famously played a "Star Trek" captain, has boldly gone where no one has gone before into his past.

The actor spent much of the pandemic at his computer writing his memoir, and the result is out this fall, "Making It So," borrowing his catchphrase from "Star Trek: The Next Generation."

"My long-term memory is very strong. It only needed me to turn the key on day one for the door to be open and memory after memory after memory and sensation and sensation and feelings all came scuttling back," said Stewart, 83, in a Zoom interview from his Los Angeles home.

It is a remarkable story of a boy who grew up poor in the north of England, became a great Shakespearean stage actor and then a sci-fi movie icon aboard the USS Enterprise and the "X-Men" movie franchise.

He grew up without a toilet or a bathroom in his home, sold furniture as a young man, worked up the rungs of regional theater in England including touring and crushing on Vivien Leigh - before a 14-year-run with the Royal Shakespeare Company and film and TV stardom in Los Angeles

"It's been a very therapeutic experience," Stewart says in the interview of writing the book. "I know that my therapist is one of the people who is most looking forward to the book. I know I'm going to be hearing, 'Why didn't you tell me this?"

If one shadow looms, it is that of Stewart's father, a former regimental sergeant major in the British Army who was prone to outbursts of repeated violence against his mother.

Stewart writes about how he and his older brother, Trevor, braced for nights when their dad came home drunk and angry. "Sometimes it was with an open hand, other times a closed fist. Always he aimed for her head.

Stewart wonders if the violence triggered his career. "The stage would prove to be a safe space, a refuge from real life in which I could inhabit another person, living in another place and time," he writes.

Other portraits emerge of people who were kind to Stewart along the way - Paul McCartney, Rod Steiger and Kirk Douglas - and some who were not: Director David Lynch was weird during the original "Dune" shoot and "Star Trek" creator Gene Roddenberry never liked the idea of Stewart piloting one of his starships.

Honest

"I wanted to be honest, but I wanted to be so respectful and careful as well. That was the most challenging part of the experience: How much I should say. What should I not say?" says Stewart.

"It's almost guaranteed that someone is going to come out and say, 'How dare you? That's outrageous.' Well, I've brought it on myself. But I did take it very, very seriously."

One highlight is in 1966 when Stewart, preparing to play in "Hamlet," is given a one-hour tutorial by the late great director Peter Hall, considered the single most influential figure in modern British theater.

"When the hour was up and I looked at my book, there was nothing but notes scribbled into it," Stewart says. "I realized that he had opened up this text to me in ways that no one had ever done before.'

Another is the grace with which he dealt with premature balding. Despite losing all his hair by 19, Stewart would audition with a hairpiece, remove it and then make his case: Two actors for the price of one.

Stewart dedicates the book to two key school teachers, who fed him a love of Shakespeare and prompted him toward acting. His adoration for Shakespeare would serve him well later in his 40s when he was asked to play Jean-Luc Picard, a 24th century starship commander.


"There is a formality to the way they speak and comport themselves that remind me of numerous Shakespearean situations I'd been in onstage. I should play Jean Luc, I realized, as if he were a character in 'Henry IV,' which is about brave men."

Later in life, Stewart has been exploring his sense of humor, whether dressing as a lobster or lending his voice to Seth MacFarlane animated shows. "People thought it would be fun to see me play against type," he writes.

Throughout the memoir, Stewart is as critical to himself as any other. Again and again, he admits to mistakes or being unnecessarily stiff, at one point calling himself a "pompous ass." Stewart describes his relationship with his children as "a work in progress."

"I needed to do better by the women with whom I was romantically involved," he writes in one section. "In a life chockablock with joy and success, my two failed marriages are my greatest regret.'

Writing the book became "some of the happiest days of my life," he says, even though there are a few areas in the audiobook where he had to stop because he was crying.

NEW YORK: A documentary chronicling Beyoncé's just-concluded 39-city Renaissance World Tour will premiere in North American theaters Dec. 1, AMC Theaters announced Monday.

The film adds a second blockbuster from a music superstar to a fall slate of movies that's been slightly thinned out by the ongoing screen actors' strike. Like "Taylor Swift: The Eras Tour," which debuts Oct. 13, "Renaissance: A Film By Beyoncé" is being released directly by AMC, the movie theater chain, without studio involvement.

Tickets will start at \$22 plus tax. The film will run for a minimum of four weeks, AMC said.

Beyoncé's previous films include the acclaimed 2019 Netflix film "Homecoming," which captured her Coachella performance in 2018. In the deals with AMC, Beyoncé and Swift are both reported to be receiving at least 50% of ticket sales.

The film charts Beyoncé's tour on behalf of her 2022 Grammy-winning album "Renaissance." It mixes concert footage and elements of a visual album while trailing the tour from its launch in Stockholm, Sweden, in May to the finale Sunday night in Kansas City, Missouri. Over the course of five months,

some 2.7 million concertgoers attended. The tour has grossed close to \$500 million, according to Billboard.

"It is about Beyoncé's intention, hard work, involvement in every aspect of the production. her creative mind and purpose to create her legacy, and master her craft,' reads the film's description. (AP)

LONDON: A second British police force is looking into sexual offenses allegedly committed by actor and comedian Russell Brand, British media reported Monday.

Coldplay brings empathy, Gomez on stage

PASADENA, Calif., Oct 3, (AP): In 2023, a Coldplay concert opens like a triumphant finale - LED wristbands flashing, confetti canons on overdrive, a singalong of 68,000 voices repeating "You've got a higher power," to match frontman Chris Martin's energy.

Flags representing attendees from Argentina, Puerto Rico, Guatemala, Colombia, Venezuela, South Korea and Brazil were raised: children and the elderly sang along to familiar radio hits. Live music isn't church, but for two hours on Sunday night, the British band got close.

A short film on the conservation efforts of Coldplay's global stadium tour for their 2021 album "Music of the Spheres" previewed the band's North American tour closer at the Rose Bowl, just outside of Los Angeles. Then: an explosion of rainbow lighting effects, tie-dye orbs, and wholesome bits - for "Paradise," Martin asked the audience to engage in the "quietest singalong ever," chanting the title in a whisper.

In one moment, he participated in a gender reveal - a couple handed him an envelope, which he opened for the cameras - blue for boy. In another, he read some of the signs held high above heads in the crowd before inviting two girls from Mexico on stage to sing "Let Somebody Go." When he was handed a small stool, he joked, "We're the most popular soft rock band in the world and we can't afford a stool?"

"This song you've chosen, we used to play it a bit, but we, when we recorded it, we recorded it with Selena Gomez," Martin told the two girls. They sang together, before Gomez herself emerged from the stage below for her verse. Then, opener H.E.R. joined and played guitar - an unex-

Elsewhere, the virtuosity of the band was apparent. Drummer Will Champion sang while lead-

pected surprise for a glorious final night.

ing the percussion; guitarist Jonny Buckland and bassist Guy Berryman took turns playing keys and synths. For a band that formed 26 years ago, there was a sense that this was a full-circle moment - that they still remember those early days of cigarettes and writing together in small practice spaces, and that allows them the ability to see their future.

The overarching sentiment for the night, of course, was empathy. Martin ran around with a trans-inclusive rainbow pride flag and routinely reminded the audience that "everyone is an alien somewhere," as his graphic t-shirt read. Routinely, he spoke in Spanish and asked the audience to sing in Korean for the BTS collaboration, "My Universe.'

At the end of the show: a killer series of singles, including "A Sky Full of Stars," "Fix You" and an acoustic encore of "Magic." Then, fireworks. There is a reason the band is beloved around the world - after the encore, Coldplay played the audience out with "Believe in Love," a welcome reminder.

Breaks are privileges awarded veteran acts, most often an effect of long-lasting relevancy. The opposite is also true: New acts are rarely given permission to take a beat, or risk slipping into obscurity. The horrible irony is that deadlines have never been muses for great art. The alternative is, of course, to say screw it all and work on your own timeline, likely as an independent artist.

That's something Jorja Smith knows well. Five years ago, the British musician released her debut LP, "Lost & Found," defining an era of R&B-pop-trip-hop. Or simply British soul, depending on who you ask - or which country you ask it in. Now she's released "Falling or Flying,"

an eclectic sophomore release built from the pieces of her past and present.

For it, Smith relocated to her hometown of Walsall, in the West Midlands of the UK, from London working largely with the local production duo DameDame. The grounding effects are immediate. These 16 tracks meander, but they never feel lost. Her revered ballads have a home here, like on "Broken is the man" and the slow burn "What if my heart beats faster?" (The latter will surely reprise early Amy Winehouse comparisons for Smith's rich, brassy tone. There are worse things to be compared to.)

In 2021, Smith dropped a short EP, "Be Right Back," to keep the loyalists satiated. At the time, she described it as a "waiting room" for this record that would inevitably follow. It certainly served that purpose.

On "Falling or Flying," surprises abound, from the Bombay Bicycle Club and the Kooks-inspired English-indie track "Go Go Go" to the glossy, soulful title track "Falling or Flying." Then there are the pop-punk riffs filtered through SZA, like on "Too many times," with echoes on "Backwards," before the string orchestral coda.

Collaborations are few and pointed: British rapper J Hus on "Feelings" and Jamaican reggae singer Lila Iké on "Greatest Gift," as well as a choir. Here, as before, as in every Jorja Smith record, even stripped-down production soars, like an R&B Radiohead, but it is her voice that enraptures.

Five years is a long time between a debut and sophomore release. "I like this world that I've just come into. And I'm still figuring things out. Always figuring things out," Smith said of releasing new music in the current era. "This is the first time I'm putting stuff out there that I can connect with right now." The outcome is transcendent.

PARIS: It was more than just another fashion show in the City of Lights. Louis Vuitton's latest extravaganza on Paris' most famous street, the avenue des Champs-Elysées, transformed an iconic 19th-century Art Nouveau space into an evolving artwork. 'Controversial tactic'

Parents in Pakistan risk jail for polio jab refusal

KARACHI, Pakistan, Oct 3, (AP): Authorities in one Pakistan province are turning to a controversial new tactic in the decades-long initiative to wipe out polio: prison.

Last month, the government in Sindh introduced a bill that would imprison parents for up to one month if they fail to get their children immunized against polio or eight other common diseases.

Experts at the World Health Organization and elsewhere worry the unusual strategy could further undermine trust in the polio vaccines, particularly in a country where many believe false conspiracies about them and where dozens of vaccinators have been shot and killed.

Adding to the problems faced by experts trying to persuade people of the vaccines' safety: The oral vaccines themselves now cause most polio cases worldwide.

WHO's polio director in the Eastern Mediterranean warned the new law could backfire.



'Coercion is counterproductive," said Dr. Hamid Jafari.

He said health workers have typically succeeded in raising immunization rates in vaccine-hesitant areas by figuring out the reasons for people's refusal and addressing those concerns, like bringing in a trusted political or religious leader to talk with people. "My own sense is that Pakistan

wants to have this legislation in their

Jafari

back pocket in case they need it," Jafari said. "I would be surprised if there's a willingness to actually enforce these coercive measures.'

Pakistan and neighboring Afghanistan are the only countries where the spread of polio has never been stopped. The potentially fatal, paralyzing disease mostly strikes children up to age 5 and typically spreads in contaminated water.

WHO and its partners have administered billions of vaccine doses since they first began trying to eradicate the disease in 1988. The effort costs nearly \$1 billion a year and is largely funded by donor countries and private organizations including the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

The immunizations, given to children as drops in the mouth, have reduced polio cases by more than 99%. But in very rare cases, the live virus in the vaccine can cause polio or mutate into a strain that triggers a new outbreak.

Virus

So far this year, there have been seven cases of polio caused by the wild virus - all in Pakistan and Afghanistan. Meanwhile, more than 270 cases have been caused by a virus linked to the vaccine in 21 countries across three continents

In January, roughly 62,000 parents, mostly in Pakistan's Sindh province, refused polio vaccinations for their children, prompting authorities there to propose the new law with penalties.

The bill is in the final stages of becoming law after the provincial assembly approved it in August. It would punish parents with up to a month in prison for failing to vaccinate their children against certain diseases; they could also be fined up to 50,000 rupees (\$168). Officials said their primary aim was to boost polio immunization rates, though diseases including measles, pneumonia and pertussis are also in the legislation.

Rukhsana Bibi, a health worker in Karachi, hopes the new law will reduce vaccine refusal rates and protect health workers. Karachi is considered at high risk for a polio resurgence.

Bibi noted that in the past, abusive or threatening parents have been detained by police. They were released on the condition that they have their children immunized, and that they help the polio team with outreach efforts.

There are multiple factors fueling vaccine hesitation in Pakistan.

Many people are suspicious of the outside entities funding the vaccines and of the Pakistan government itself.

Some "fringe elements" believe in a false conspiracy theory - that the vaccines are part of a plot by Western outsiders to sterilize people, Bibi acknowledged. But many parents would prefer that the government provide better health care, food or

STOCKHOLM, Oct 3, (AP): Three scientists won the Nobel Prize in physics on Tuesday for studying how electrons zip around the atom during in the tiniest fractions of seconds, a field that could one day lead to better electronics or disease diagnoses.

The award went to Pierre Agostini, Hungarian-born Ferenc Krausz and French-born Anne L'Huillier for their work with the tiny part of each atom that races around the center and that is fundamental to virtually everything: chemistry, physics, our bodies and our gadgets.

Electrons move around so fast that they have been out of reach of human efforts to isolate them, but by looking at the tiniest fraction of a second possible, scientists now have a "blurry' glimpse of them and that opens up whole new sciences, experts said.

"The electrons are very fast, and the electrons are really the workforce in everywhere," Nobel Committee member Mats Larsson said. "Once you can control and understand electrons, you have taken a very big step forward.

second - just like a photographer uses a quick shutter speed when photographing a hummingbird.

How small is it?

"Let's take one second, which is the time of a heartbeat," Nobel Committee chair Eva Olsson said. To get the realm of the attosecond, that would have to

be divided by 1,000 six times. Physicist Mark Pearce, a Nobel Committee member, said "there are as many attoseconds in a second as there are seconds which have passed since the Big Bang, 13.8 billion years ago. So it's an extremely short period of time."

Experiments

But even when they "see" the electron, there's only so much they can view

"You can see whether it's on the one side of a molecule or on the other," L'Huillier, 65, said. "It's still very blurry.

"The electrons are much more like waves, like water waves, than particles and what we try to measure with our technique is the position of the crest

At the moment, this science is about understanding our universe, but the hope is that it will eventually have many practical applications in electronics, diagnosing diseases and basic chemistry

But L'Huillier, of Lund University in Sweden, said her work shows how important it is to work on fundamental science regardless of future applications because she spent 30 years on it before possible real word uses became more apparent.

L'Huillier said she was teaching when she got the call that she had won. She joked that it was hard to finish the lesson.

"This is the most prestigious and I am so happy to get this prize. It's in-credible," she told the news conference announcing the prize. "As you know there are not so many women who got this prize so it's very special."

Over 100 dolphins die in Amazon: More than 100 dolphins have died in the Brazilian Amazon rainforest in the past week as the region grapples with a severe drought, and many more could die soon if water temperatures remain high, experts say.

The Mamiraua Institute, a research group of Brazil's Ministry of Science, Technology and Innovation, said two more dead dolphins were found Monday in the region around Tefe Lake, which is key for mammals and fish in the area. Video provided by the institute showed vultures picking at the dolphin carcasses beached on the lakeside. Thousands of fish have also died, local media reported

financial assistance.

"Parents believe that's because the government gets grants and donations for such vaccines, so it keeps focusing on (the polio vaccines) instead of providing basic health care," Bibi said. "It makes parents suspicious."

The public's already-shaken confidence in vaccine drives also took a dive in 2011, when the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency set up a fake hepatitis vaccination program in an attempt to gather intel on former al-Qaida chief Osama bin Laden. Militants have also gunned down health workers distributing vaccines and sent suicide bombers to blow up the police vehicles protecting them.

Heidi Larson, director of the Vaccine Confidence Project at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, said it was disheartening that people were so mistrustful of the government that they didn't believe the polio vaccine was in their children's best interests

"I don't think in this kind of situation that throwing parents in jail is going to help," she said. "Not only does it not work, but it's likely to ramp up the anger."

Experts believe high water temperatures are the most likely cause of the deaths in the lakes in the region. Temperatures since last week have exceeded 39 degrees Celsius (102 degrees Fahrenheit) in the Tefe Lake region.

The Brazilian government's Chico Mendes Institute for Biodiversity Conservation, which manages conservation areas, said last week it had sent teams of veterinarians and aquatic mammal experts to investigate the deaths.

There had been some 1,400 river dolphins in Tefe Lake, said Miriam Marmontel, a researcher from the Mamiraua Institute.

"In one week we have already lost around 120 animals between the two of them, which could represent 5% to 10% of the popula-

A game at Porto was the setting for Lionel Messi's debut for Barcelona 20 years ago. While Yamal is still far from reaching the level of the club's greatest player, he has shown flashes of excellence and is already contributing to victories.

He has yet to score for Barcelona despite generating several chances for himself and his older teammates. His most recent clutch contribution was on Friday when his headed pass into the box was inadvertently turned into his own net by Sevilla defender Sergio Ramos to gift Barcelona a 1-0 win.

Barcelona will be without midfielders Pedri González and Frenkie de Jong and forward Raphinha, who are all recovering from injuries.

Porto beat Shakhtar 3-1 last month when they played in Hamburg, Germany, where the Ukrainian champions have been forced to play since Russia's invasion of their country. Porto's Brazilian winger Galeno struck two goals in that victory.

Porto had won six and drawn one in the Portuguese league before they lost at Benfica 1-0 on Friday. They also lost to Benfica in the Portuguese Super Cup in August.



Fiorentina move level with Napoli

Las Palmas 'rally' late to beat Celta

MADRID, Oct 3, (AP): Las Palmas scored two late goals to come from behind and beat Celta Vigo 2-1 for its second win of the season in the Spanish league

Celta opened the scoring through Anastasios Douvikas in the 67th minute, but the hosts rallied with Jonathan Viera converting a penalty kick in the 84th and setting up Marc Cardona's winning goal seven minutes into stoppage time at Gran Canaria Stadium.

The result extended Las Palmas' unbeaten streak at home to four matches this season. They had lost three in a row against Celta in the league.

Celta dropped into the relegation zone with the loss, their fifth in eight matches. The team coached by Rafa Benítez also relinquished leads in their last two matches, against Alaves and Barcelona. They were leading 2-0 until the 81st against Barcelona.

MILAN, Oct 3, (AP): Fiorentina moved level with third-place Napoli in Serie A with a 3-0 win over bottom club Cagliari.

Nicolás González netted his sixth goal of the season to set Fiorentina on the way to victory and see them join the defending champions and Juventus. They're four points behind Serie A leaders AC Milan and Inter Milan.

It all got even bleaker for Cagliari and manager Claudio Ranieri even at this early stage of the season. The Sardinian team have just two points from their opening seven matches back in the top flight.

Fiorentina, which have lost just one match, got off to the perfect start as they took the lead with barely two minutes on the clock.

Cagliari goalkeeper Boris misjudged Nikola Radunović Milenković's free kick and could only flap at the ball, allowing González to slot it into an empty net. Fiorentina were dominating but

needed another bit of fortune to double their lead in the 21st minute. Some great play from Michael Kayode saw the Fiorentina right back weave his way into the area and his cross was turned into the back of the net by Cagliari defender Alberto Dossena.

Cagliari improved in the second half and almost got back into the match but Andrea Petagna hit the crossbar, although he was probably offside in any case.

M'Bala Nzola extended Fiorentina's lead in stoppage time when he raced onto a long ball from Rolando Mandragora and dinked it over Radunović.

Monza halted a four-match winless run with a 1-0 victory at inform Sassuolo.

Lorenzo Colombo scored a delightful solo goal in the 66th minute to give Monza their second win of the season. The young forward could have had another late on but it was ruled out for offside.

'Value of NBA teams continues to grow year to year'

Mavs, T-wolves play in Abu Dhabi as Gulf region's influence with NBA grows

LONDON, Oct 3, (AP): The NBA returns to Abu Dhabi this week as Arabian Gulf countries increasingly use their wealth to establish a foothold with the league.

The Dallas Mavericks and Minnesota Timberwolves play Thursday in the first of two preseason games in the United Arab Emirates capital, but most of the real action is taking place off the court.

Qatar's sovereign wealth fund is buying a minority stake in the Washington Wizards with the move coming less than a year after the league's Board of Governors opened the door to such institutional investors.

LeBron James recently visited Saudi Arabia on a trip that came a couple of months after the Los Angeles Lakers star joked on social media that he'd accept the kind of astronomical figures that the Saudis are paying to lure soccer stars.

The Milwaukee Bucks and Atlanta Hawks played preseason games in Abu Dhabi a year ago after the NBA signed a multiyear partnership with the emirate's department of culture and tourism. It was the first time the league had staged games in the oil-rich Arabian Gulf.

"We felt that bringing the live NBA experience to fans in Abu Dhabi was the next step in our ongoing efforts to grow the game in the region," said Mark Tatum, NBA deputy commissioner and chief operating officer.

The league's board of governors

decided in November 2022 "to permit passive, non-controlling, minority investments in NBA teams by institutional investors, including university endowments, foreign and domestic pension funds, and sovereign wealth funds, subject to a set of policy guidelines adopted at that time," the NBA said in a statement.

Those investors would then be subject to league review and NBA Board approval.

(AP) Qatar Sports Investments, which has majority control of French soccer club Paris Saint-Germain, is buying a roughly 5% stake in the parent company of the Wizards, the NHL's Washington Capitals and the WNBA's Washington Mystics. The NBA confirmed that the deal has been approved.

Similar agreements in the future seem likely.

"The value of NBA teams continues to grow year to year, helped by the value of live sports and the global reach of our league," Tatum said. "We anticipate our teams will receive continued interest from institutional investors around the world."

"Playing games internationally is a critical part of our year-round efforts to engage our passionate international fans, many of whom may not otherwise experience an NBA game in-person," Tatum said, noting the league has staged games mostly not regular-season ones - in more than 20 countries outside the United States and Canada.

Saudi Arabia, through its sovereign wealth fund, muscled its way into professional golf before spending heavily to recruit soccer players, including Cristiano Ronaldo.

Both preseason games will be at Etihad Arena on Yas Island - where the league opened an NBA Store last year. The second game is Saturday.

The Mavericks then travel to Spain for a preseason game against Real Madrid next Tuesday.

Al-Nassr took control against Tajikistan's Istiklol in the second half at Riyadh. Ronaldo, who joined the club in December, equalized with a delicate chip midway through the second half. Senin Sebai had put Istiklol ahead just before the break.

Ronaldo scored for the seventh successive game, and then two goals in quick succession from Brazilian forward Anderson Talisca gave Al-Nassr the win.

China continue dominance

HANGZHOU, China, Oct 3, (AP): India and Pakistan moved closer to a potential Asian Games showdown for the gold medal in cricket after picking up victories on Tuesday in the quarterfinals.

Any match between Pakistan and India draws a massive television audience and will be influential as the International Olympic Committee ponders cricket being added to the program for the 2028 Los Angeles Olympics.

The cricket final on Saturday, however, could be overshadowed

by the start of the Cricket World Cup in India, which opens on Thursday.

The IOC has given no clear timetable when a decision about cricket will be made.

Cricket appeared in the Olympics for the only time at the 1900 Paris Games.

Baseball and softball are also in the running to again be included in the Olympic program.

India managed a 23-run victory over Nepal on Tuesday. Yashasvi Jaiswal scored a century from 49 deliveries to help India reach 202-4 from its allotted 20 overs after winning the toss and electing to bat.

"I'm really proud and really happy and grateful," Jaiwsal said of getting the century. "It was a great feeling. It's a proud moment whenever you represent your country, especially India. I'm just so glad and happy to represent India and proud of myself for going out there to express myself and my game."

Nepal was restricted to 179-9 in reply, with Avesh Khan and Ravi Bishnoi each taking three wickets for India.

Pakistan put up a 68-run victory over Hong Kong in another quarterfinal match. Pakistan reached 160-10 and Hong Kong was limited to 92-10.

China has won every gold medal at the Asian Games through seven of 10 diving events.

Quan Hangchan won the wom-

en's 10-meter platform to produce the seventh, edging out Chinese teammate Chen Yuxi. Pamg Pandelela Rinong of Malaysia picked up the bronze.

Quan briefly trailed Chen, but she said her mind was elsewhere.

"I didn't notice that I was behind, but I was happy when I saw the score (after the fifth round)," Quan said. "Chen Yuxi and I did not communicate during the competition, but we will communicate afterwards."

China won seven of the eight gold medals two years ago at the delayed Tokyo Olympics.

Everywhere you look, China dominates. China won nine of 12 medals in canoe sprint, which

Canoe sprint athletes were also primed after appearing in the sport's world championships in August in Duisburg, Germany, which served as the main qualification event for next year's Paris Olympics.

"All four of us are very happy because we have been working hard for a long time," said Zhang Dong, a member of the winning 500-meter men's kayak four team.

"Including qualifying for the Olympics at the world championships, I really feel it's not easy," Zhang added. "We have already been preparing for two years, just to qualify for the Olympics, and to win the gold medal at this Asian Games, I'm so happy."

Three-time Olympic medalist Olga Zabelinskaya of Uzbekistan won the women's time trial in 24 minutes, 35.99 seconds. Zabelinskaya was a silver medalist at the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Olympics and won two bronze medals at the 2012 London Games.

The silver medal in the 20-kilometer race went to Eri Yonamine of Japan, who was 59.60 seconds behind. Rinata Sultanova of Kazakstan took bronze.

Alexey Lutsenko of Kazakhstan won the men's race in 48:05.75. Xue Ming and China took silver and Vincent Lau Wan Yau of Hong Kong won bronze. lost 1-0 at Sharjah.

Only the 10 group winners and the six best-performing runners-up will progress to the next stage.

Lionel Messi was on the practice field with Inter Miami on Tuesday, though it remains unclear when or if the seven-time Ballon d'Or winner will play with the team again this season.

Inter Miami coach **Gerardo "Tata" Martino** declined to provide any timetable regarding Messi when he spoke with reporters before the practice session.

The team - which is still trying to make Major League Soccer's playoffs - plays at Chicago on Wednesday. Messi has been listed as day to day for much of the past month and barely has played in that span.

The 36-year-old Messi has missed four of Inter Miami's last five matches, plus another for Argentina in that span because of what was first called fatigue - by both his club and country - and has evolved from there. The only game he didn't miss during that stretch was a 37-minute appearance against Toronto on Sept. 20, and he had to leave that match before halftime because of a hamstring issue.

Messi made an appearance Monday night at the team's stadium to promote the launch of a children's menu bearing his name at some Hard Rock properties around the world. He was not made available for comment to most media outlets that were in attendance at the event, and no update on his injury was provided.

Inter Miami enters the week 13th in the Eastern Conference, four spots and four points out of the last playoff spot from that side of MLS. A loss on Wednesday would not eliminate Inter Miami from the playoff mix, but it would put a sigAfter that match at Chicago, Inter Miami has three MLS games remaining - Saturday at home against Cincinnati, a rescheduled match at home against Charlotte on Oct. 18 and the finale at Charlotte on Oct. 21.

Inter Miami is 1-2-2 in its five matches without Messi since he joined the club.

Dutch right back **Jeremie Frimpong** has signed a new contract at **Bayer Leverkusen** taking him through the end of the 2027-28 season.

Frimpong still had nearly two years left on his current deal at Leverkusen, where he has played since signing from Scottish club **Celtic** in 2021.

"A lot has happened since then, we've experienced great things and continually improved as a team," Frimpong said in a statement Tuesday. "It's great fun to be part of this team."

The 22-year-old Frimpong, who was linked with possible moves to **Chelsea** and **Manchester United** in the off-season, has been a standout player for Leverkusen this season, contributing two goals and three assists as he helped the team stay unbeaten in eight games in all competitions. He also reached the Europa League semifinals with the team last season.



Two goals in the space of a minute in the first half from Mykhailo Mudryk and Armando Broja secured the points for Mauricio Pochettino's struggling team at Craven Cottage and moved them up to 11th in the standings.

It was Chelsea's first win in the league since Aug. 25 and only their

second in the top flight all season.

"It was a decent performance, maybe not as good as we would like, but the most important thing was three points and we desperately needed that," said Chelsea captain Conor Gallagher.

Mudryk, a \$108 million signing last season, fired Chelsea in front in the 18th minute after controlling Levi Colwill's ball and finishing past Fulham goalkeeper Bernd Leno.

what we deserved."

The victory should give Pochettino something to build on after such a troubled start to the season and comes after his side beat Brighton in the English League Cup last week.

It has not been easy for the Argentine who was hired at the end of last season and charged with the responsibility of returning Chelsea to their glory days. His appointment might have lifted the mood around the club after its worst-ever Premier League season last term, but there has been no instant uplift in form, with Chelsea going into game in 15th place.

Its one win in the league had come against newly promoted Luton and their only other victories had been in the League Cup.

That is despite owners Todd Boehly and Clearlake Capital spending big in the transfer market again in the off-season.

But Chelsea looked certain to ensure their first away win of the season after scoring two goals in quick succession in the first half.

After the break, substitute Ian Maatsen was close to adding a third when his side-footed effort came back off the post. Enzo Fernandez tried to convert the rebound, but his shot was blocked by Leno.

Fulham substitute Sasa Lukic had the chance to pull a goal back in the 77th with a shot from around six yards (meters). But he fired straight at Chelsea keeper Robert Sanchez.

"It is clear at this level and against these types of teams we cannot make the mistakes we made," said Fulham manager Marco Silva. "We were punished for the mistakes we made."
