Kuwait embraces sustainable energy transition

'Green future'

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 9, (KUNA): Deputy Prime Minister, Minister of Oil, Minister of State for Economic Affairs and Investment, and Chairman of the Board of Directors of Kuwait Petroleum Corporation Dr. Saad Al-Barrak stressed on Monday on the importance of developing the oil industry, despite the existential challenges posed by climate change.

Speaking at the Strategic Directions 2040, and Energy Transition 2050 Conference titled (Sustainable Energy for a Promising Future) Al-Barrak said that Kuwait faces challenges diversifying its sources of income and ensuring the sustainability of the national economy through the growth and development of the oil industry.

"Our sector is the backbone of the national economy since the discovery and production of oil shipment was exported in 1946, the oil sector has contributed to the building of the modern state" he added.

The minister stressed that Kuwait Petroleum Corporation remains committed to investing in the Kuwaiti oil sector to support its growth and ensure Kuwait's continued global role towards its customers around the world.

"Our world is witnessing a significant shift to the use of renewable and clean energy sources. This shift requires a long-term strategic vision, as we recognize the importance of oil as a strategic fuel source, but also work actively towards the energy transition and investments in our national workforce and new technologies." he added.

The minister noted that "in line with the government's work program for 2023-2027 and the National Development Plan of Kuwait, today we launch the strategic directions of the Kuwait Petroleum Corporation 2040 and we also unveil the roadmap to achieve net zero by 2050."

The conference will highlight the most important projects that aim to increase the production capacity of crude oil, increase the production of natural gas, and enhance refining capabilities.

U.S. CARRIER TO REGION KUWAIT RAISES CONCERN Israel vows complete Gaza siege

JERUSALEM, Oct 9, (Agencies): Israel's military ordered a complete siege on the Gaza Strip on Monday, halting entry of food, fuel and supplies to its 2.3 million people as it pounded the Hamas-ruled territory with waves of airstrikes in retaliation for the militants' bloody weekend incursion.

More than two days after Hamas launched its surprise attack from Gaza, the Israeli military said it had largely gained control in its southern towns where it had been battling Hamas gunmen. Israel's vaunted military and intelligence apparatus was caught completely off guard by Hamas, resulting in heavy battles in its streets for the first time in decades.

Tanks and drones were deployed to guard breaches in the border fence to prevent new incursions. Thousands of Israelis were evacuated from more than a dozen towns near Gaza, and the military summoned 300,000 reservists - a massive mobilization in a short time.

The moves, along with Israel's formal declaration of war on Sunday, pointed to Israel increasingly shifting to the offensive against Hamas, threatening greater destruction in the densely populated, impoverished Gaza Strip.

In Kuwait, the Cabinet reviewed a foreign ministry statement that expressed "concern" over the escalating violence in the Middle East, urging the international community to ensure the adequate protection of the Palestinians in the face of continued Israeli aggression.

The Cabinet went on to underline Kuwait's solidarity with the Palestinian people and the country's unwavering support for their aspirations of statehood based on 1967 borders with East Jerusalem as the capital of an independent Palestinian state.

Relief

Meanwhile, Kuwait Red Crescent Society (KRCS) launched Monday a donations campaign, "Aid Palestine" aimed at supporting Palestinian people, and providing them with the necessary relief and medical provisions. Society Chief of Board of Directors, Dr. Hilal Al-Sayer, stated to KUNA that the campaign, setting out to provide hospitals with the necessities to treat the wounded, is driven by KRCS's national and humanitarian sense of duty to the Palestinian cause. The Society, indicated Al-Sayer, is working urgently and in coordination with its Palestinian counterpart to deliver the necessary aid as soon as possible, as it will also be undertaking many initiatives in cooperation with national societies and humanitarian organizations. Moreover, Dr. Al-Sayer called on citizens and residents to donate through the Society's website, saying that the people of Kuwait are no strangers to humanitarian work. Al-Sayer stated that international community and humanitarian organizations alike are responsible for supporting Palestinian people, especially considering the current tragic conditions caused by Israeli occupation's aggression On Sunday, strikes leveled much of the Gaza town of Beit Hanoun, which Israel said Hamas was using as a staging ground. On Monday, the Israeli military blared messages to residents to evacuate Rimal, a residential and commercial district of central Gaza City where offices of The Associated Press and other international media are located, a signal that heavy strikes were to come. A major question remains whether it will launch a ground assault into the tiny Mediterranean coastal territory, a move that in the past has brought intensified casualties. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has vowed to destroy "the military and governing capabilities" of the militant group. As Israel hit more than 1,000 targets in Gaza, Palestinian militants continued firing barrages of rockets, setting off air raid sirens in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv. Video posted online appeared to show a plume of smoke near a terminal at Ben Gurion International Airport. There was no immediate word on casualties or damage from the latest bombardment.

WASHINGTON, Oct 9, (AP): Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin said Sunday he has ordered the Ford carrier strike group to sail to the Eastern Mediterranean to be ready to assist Israel after the attack by Hamas that has left more than briefing.

BRUSSELS: The European Union, Monday, extended the sanctions regime against the proliferation and use of chemical weapons for three years until October 16, 2026 and prolonged existing sanction against persons and entities for another year, until October 16, 2024.

According to an EU statement, currently, sanctions in place apply to 25 persons and 3 entities. Those targeted are subject to an asset freeze and EU persons and entities are forbidden from making funds, financial assets or economic resources available to them.

Additionally, individuals are subject to a travel ban, which prevents them from entering or transiting through EU territories. (KUNA)

ISLAMABAD: A senior Taliban delegation visited western Afghanistan's Herat province on Monday in the aftermath of the powerful earthquake that killed at least 2,000 people over the weekend and flattened entire villages, a statement said.

Saturday's magnitude 6.3 quake hit a densely populated area in Herat and was followed by strong aftershocks in what was one of the deadliest temblors to strike the country in two decades. (AP)

LONDON: An independent inquiry opened Monday to examine claims that British special forces murdered dozens of Afghan men during counterinsurgency operations in Afghanistan a decade ago, as well as allegations that authorities subsequently covered up the alleged illegal activity or failed to investigate it properly.

The inquiry, which opened at the Royal Courts of Justice in London, focuses on alleged unlawful killings that took place during night raids carried out by Britain's elite military units in the war-torn nation between 2010 and 2013. (AP) The daily has learned that the Kuwaiti executive and supervisory authorities are racing against time to complete technical and legal approvals regarding paving the way for the implementation of the consultative agreement regarding the completion of a high-speed railway line that will connect Saudi Arabia and Kuwait.

Informed sources expected that all approvals related to the Kuwaiti side would be completed during the current month or next at the latest, in order to begin studying the financial, economic and technical feasibility of the project, followed by the remaining steps to launch the subsequent stages, leading to the implementation process.

In June 2023, an Amiri decree was issued approving the agreement with the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia regarding the railway link project between the two countries. On September 26, the Saudi Council of Ministers also approved the railway link project agreement between Kuwait and the Kingdom, according to what was reported by the Saudi Press Agency.

Al-Qabas learned that Kuwait and Saudi Arabia, represented by the Ministry of Public Works and the Saudi Railway Company (SAR), agreed to appoint the French company SYSTRA -- one of the world's leading engineering and consulting groups specialised in public transport and mobility solutions. For more than 65 years, the Group has worked alongside cities and regions to contribute to their development by creating, improving and modernising their transport infrastructures -- to implement the feasibility study.

Informed sources revealed that, according to this agreement to appoint one consulting company, the Ministry of Public Works completed the contracting documents, and addressed the Audit Bureau therein, in order to obtain its approval to approve the consulting company SYSTRA, and the amount contracted with it, so that the Ministry can sign consulting contracts for the financial and economic feasibility study.

The sources said that the cost of the feasibility study for the link project rose to \$10.57 million, equivalent to approximately 3.270 million dinars, to be paid equally between the two parties, with 1.635 million dinars for each party. It is expected that SYSTRA will complete the feasibility study for the railway link project between Kuwait and Saudi Arabia in Within a period not exceeding 6 months.

The sources explained that according to the agreement concluded between Kuwait and Saudi Arabia, the project of the two brotherly countries is a separate project and different from the railway project of the Gulf Cooperation Council countries.

Regarding the "Gulf Train", the Public Authority for Roads and Land Transport about two months ago launched a special exercise to complete the feasibility study related to the project through the Central Agency for Public Tenders, and the offers of 9 local and international consulting companies competing to win the contract were accepted.

The sources indicated that the Roads Authority is now in the stage of sorting contracts to choose a company entrusted with conducting the feasibility study for the Gulf train project, expecting that the name of the winning consulting company will be announced before the end of this year.

The Kuwaiti-Saudi agreement stipulates that the railway line between the two countries will extend from the train station point located in the State of Kuwait -- which

military steps" to retaliate against Hamas. Along with the Ford the U.S. is sending the cruiser USS Normandy and destroyers USS Thomas Hudner, USS Ramage, USS Carney, and USS Roosevelt, and the U.S. is augmenting Air Force F-35, F-15, F-16, and A-10 fighter aircraft squadrons in the region.

"The U.S. maintains ready forces globally to further reinforce this deterrence posture if required," Austin said in a statement.

In addition, the Biden administration "will be rapidly providing the Israel Defense Forces with additional equipment and resources, including munitions. The first security assistance will begin moving today and arriving in the coming days," Austin said.

The Norfolk, Virginia-based carrier strike group already was in the Mediterranean. Last week it was conducting naval exercises with Italy in the Ionian Sea. The carrier is in its first full deployment.

Senior officials from the Pentagon and State Department briefed senators Sunday night, and Majority Leader Chuck Schumer said they were assured that the United States was giving Israel "everything they need."

"I asked the representatives of our Defense Department if they are giving Israel everything they need, and I was heartened that they said yes and that they are surging support," the New York Democrat said in a statement after the unclassified weekend Hamas attacks on Israel, raising the toll from four.

It says an undetermined number of American citizens remain missing and unaccounted for. On Sunday, an official said that number was fluid and had ranged from between six to 12. It is not clear whether the missing had been taken hostage, were killed or are in hiding.

The State Department is in touch with families "and providing all appropriate consular assistance," said spokesman Matthew Miller.

In related news, major airlines have suspended flights in and out of Israel after the nation declared war following a massive attack by Hamas.

Israel hit more than 1,000 targets in Gaza and Palestinian militants continued firing barrages of rockets, setting off air raid sirens in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv. Video posted online appeared to show a plume of smoke near a terminal at Ben Gurion International Airport.

Scores of arriving and departing flights at Tel Aviv's Ben Gurion airport were canceled or delayed, according to the airport's online flight board.

American Airlines, United Airlines and Delta Air Lines suspended service as the U.S. State Department issued travel advisories for the region citing potential for terrorism and civil unrest.

American suspended service to Tel Aviv through Friday. The airline said that it has issued a travel alert providing additional flexibility for customers whose travel plans are impacted.

"We continue to monitor the situation with safety and security top of mind and will adjust our operation as needed," American said.

United said it allowed two scheduled flights out of Tel Aviv late Saturday and early Sunday and accommodated its customers, crews and employee travelers who were at the airport. The airline said that its Tel Aviv flights will remain suspended until conditions improve.

Delta said its Tel Aviv flights have been canceled into this week. The airline said it's monitoring the situation and making schedule adjustments accordingly. The company said customers with canceled flights or who want to change their Tel Aviv ticket should check the Delta app, website or call Delta reservations to make adjustments.

Kuwait pursues OECD entry for tax pact

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 9: The government of Kuwait has submitted an official request to the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) about its desire to join the framework of the draft tax law agreement prepared by the organization regarding the minimum tax that is supposed to be applied to multinational companies, reports Al-Rai daily.

The sources indicated that Kuwait is not a member of the comprehensive framework of the organization or the draft "economic cooperation" law in which 140 countries participate, but major Kuwaiti companies with multi-market activities, specifically those whose annual revenues from more than one market reach 750 million Euros, will be affected by the outcomes of the tax law.

The sources pointed out that in order to achieve the best gains for Kuwait from this agreement, it requested joining the framework of understandings taking place between the members of the organization from the participating countries regarding the draft law, which will include its

Kuwait FM meets EU Special Rep., counterparts in Oman

Kuwait Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Salem Abdullah Al-Jaber Al-Sabah met on Monday with EU Special Representative (EUSR) for the Gulf Luigi Di Maio in Oman. The meeting took place on the sidelines of the joint ministerial meeting of the GCC countries Foreign Ministers with the European Union at its 27th session, which is held Monday in the Omani Capital, Muscat.

Kuwait Foreign Ministry said in a statement that the meeting tackled the historic bilateral relations between Kuwait and the EU and the strategic partnership on all levels.

It added that the meeting also discussed latest regional and international developments.

Sheikh Salem Abdullah Al-Jaber Al-Sabah also met Monday with Lithuanian counterpart Gabrielius Landsbergis on the sidelines of the 27th ministerial meeting of the GCC Foreign Ministers with the European Union, which will be held in the Omani capital, Muscat.

In a statement, the Kuwaiti foreign minister said that the two sides touched on bilateral ties between the two friendly countries and boosting economic cooperation.

The Minister of Foreign Affairs earlier met with the High Representative of the EU for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy Josep Borrell, on the sidelines of the 27th session of the Joint Ministerial Council between the Gulf Cooperation Council



The GCC-EU meeting, scheduled to take place today and tomorrow in the Omani capital of Muscat.

During Sheikh Salem meeting with Borrell, the two sides conversed about the close historical ties between Kuwait and the EU and the frameworks for strengthening the strategic partnership in various vital fields, foremost of which is support for the steps taken in the file of complete exemption for Kuwaiti citizens from the Schengen visa, and increase trade exchange between them, Ministry of Foreign Affairs said in a press statement.

The meeting also delved into current developments in the region, especially the repercussions of Iraqi Federal Supreme Court which ruled that the law ratifying the agreement regulating navigation in the Khor Abdullah waterway was unconstitutional, and Iraq's cancellation of the security swap protocol in Khor Abdullah with Kuwait, signed in 2008.

The two sides also discussed recent events taking place in the occupied Palestinian territories and the Gaza Strip along with ways to enhance joint cooperation and coordination in this context were discussed, as well as international efforts aimed at stopping the ongoing escalation and intensifying political efforts to maintain security and stability in the region. KUWAIT CITY, Oct 9: Parliament's Committee for Public Facilities held a meeting on Monday in the presence of the Minister of Public Works Dr. Amani Bugammaz and senior officials at the ministry.

Partial lunar eclipse on Oct 28

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 9, (KUNA): The Space Museum at the Sheikh Abdullah Al-Salem Cultural Center announced that the Kuwaiti sky will witness a partial eclipse with the full moon on Saturday, October 28.

General Supervisor of Museums and the Space Museum at the Center, Khaled Al-Jamaan, told Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) today, Monday, that the Earth's shadow obscures 6 percent of the moon's disk at its peak, and this eclipse can be seen in Europe, Asia, Africa, and Western Australia, indicating that the eclipse takes an hour and 17 minutes. He added that this eclipse is the second and last for this year, noting that the next lunar eclipse will be on September 18, 2024.

He explained that the eclipse will begin with the penumbra phase and then become an eclipse, indicating that the penumbra phase is the decline in the moon's illumination without the moon being eclipsed. This

phase begins at 9.01 p.m., then the partial eclipse phase begins at 10.35 pm and its peak is at 11.14 p.m. and ends at 11.52 pm.

Al-Jamaan reported that there are three types of eclipse. The first is total, when the entire moon enters the Earth's shadow area and the moon's disk is eclipsed, leading to a complete loss of its visibility in the middle of the night, especially in desert areas. He explained that the second type is a partial eclipse, which occurs when part of the moon enters the Earth's shadow area, causing part of the moon's disk to be eclipsed. The third type is a penumbra eclipse, which occurs when the moon enters only the semi-shadow area, and the moonlight becomes dim without being eclipsed.

He stated that the Space Museum will document the phenomenon as part of its plan to create an astronomical scientific archive of all phenomena in the skies of Kuwait.

Charges against Kuwaiti hacker dismissed

MP in forgery blame trial Nov 12

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 9: The Criminal Court yesterday adjourned to November 12 the trial of an MP who is accused of forging residency permits for expatriates. The trial was adjourned in order to address the National Assembly to lift the parliamentary immunity of the accused.

The Kuwaiti citizen, who lodged a complaint with the Public Prosecution against the MP, accused the latter of being responsible for the transfer of the residency permits of his workers to another company without his knowledge.

The citizen, in his complaint, demanded that the MP be jailed for seven years in accordance with the law.

The Public Prosecution accused the MP. in his capacity as a public employee, of changing the truth in the official documents on the transaction papers contrary to the truth, and using his authority as an officer while he was at the helm of his work in the Ministry of Interior.

'Hacker' charges dismissed: The Criminal Court ruled to dismiss the criminal charges leveled against a Kuwaiti hacker who infiltrated 200 American websites and seized money. This ruling is based on the fact that the accused could not be tried for charges, which were leveled more than ten years ago.

According to the case file, the Public Prosecution stated that the accused, during the period from December 2010 to June 2012, carried out a hostile act against a foreign country, namely the United States of America, without permission from the government of the State of Kuwait, by hacking protected government websites and databases belonging to the US Defense and the South Carolina National Guard. The United States of America expressed its protest in secret by taking legal measures, which included issuing an arrest warrant and an international red notice against the accused. This led to the arrest and detention of the accused.

Vote-buying case adjourned: The Criminal Court adjourned to next Monday the case filed against an Asian expatriate who sold votes in favor of candidates in the fifth constituency for KD 30,000.

According to the case file, security authorities uncovered a network of intermediaries and middlemen for vote-buying operations on behalf of two candidates of the 2023 National Assembly elections.

The accused, who works for one of the candidates, was found in possession of high sums of cash and lists of names and data of voters who wish to sell their votes.

The security authorities seized high amounts of cash and lists of names and voter data from the accused and others working for another candidate.

Serving under three prime ministers, Shavit led the Mossad and Israel through the end of the Cold War, the collapse of the Soviet Union, the First Gulf War, the rise of global terrorism and nuclear proliferation, and a period of intermittent rapprochement with the Palestinians.

He also had a hand in many assassinations that targeted Palestinian political and guerrilla figures. Shabtai Shavit was born in 1939. He was the son of a school principal. He learned Arabic as a child from Palestinian olive pickers. He received his education in Haifa and served in the Navy. He subsequently obtained a bachelor's degree in Middle Eastern studies from the Hebrew University and a Master's degree from Harvard.

that," he told Haaretz in 2013.

Shavit retired in 1996, headed an anti-terrorism institute, and provided advice to several parties, as a former head of the Mossad. He was known for his caution, and he once said: "I have never regretted the things I did not say." In subsequent years (and this is what concerns us) he became more frank when he expressed his support for the twostate solution to end the Israeli conflict with the Palestinians, asking: "Why do we live here? Why do our grandchildren continue to fight wars?

"What is this madness in which the land is more important than human life?" Shavit strongly opposed the efforts of Benjamin Netanyahu, the current Israeli Prime Minister, calling him "my so-called leader" and a prime minister who does not make decisions like a statesman.

Shabtai Shavit died a short time ago at the age of 84. We wonder with Shavit, as awareness returns to him before his death, despite all his crimes: When will Israel's leaders rationalize and realize that it is impossible to eliminate, or even silence, an entire people who want to regain their freedom, dignity, and homeland?

In a comment by well-known journalist Thomas Friedman, which he wrote yesterday: "When I usually need accurate news about Israel, I turn to my friend Nahum Barna, a veteran writer for the Israeli newspaper Yedioth."

"His answer astonished me. He said: 'This is the worst day I can remember from a military point of view in the history of Israel, including the blunder on Yom Kippur, which was terrible !!.?

There are those among us who say that the entire process was agreed upon between Israel and Hamas!!

Over 9K register for power meters

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 9: According to informed sources in the Ministry of Electric-ity, Water and Renewable Energy, 9,247 new subscribers were registered on the electricity network for installing meters during the period from December 31, 2021 to December 30, 2022.

They said the total number of subscribers of the Ministry of Electricity and Water nationwide is about 584,961, which is an increase by about 1.6 percent compared to the 575,714 customers last year.

The sources explained that the total increase in the number of clients included all housing sectors (private, investment, industrial, governmental, commercial, agricultural and others). Investment housing ranked first in terms of the number of clients with a total of 311,245. Private housing came in second place with a total of 181,179 clients, followed by the commercial sector with 69,235 customers.

The ministry provided 742,035 million kilowatts to cover the consumption needs of new customers during the same period. From this, the private residential sector accounted for the largest share with 58 percent, then the government sector with 14 percent, followed by the investment sector with 8.15 percent.

Meanwhile, the Minister of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy Dr. Jassim Al-Ostad canceled the ministerial resolution No. 87/2017 regarding amending the provisions of article 13 of the executive regulations of law No. 48/2005 issued by the ministerial resolution No. 334/2005 on chairing the committee to follow up the procedures for implementing the aforementioned law.

In addition, MP Osama Al-Zaid called upon the parliament's Committee for Legal and Legislation Affairs to hasten the approval of the proposal he submitted in August 2023, which aimed at referring to the Public Prosecution whoever deals with, supports, or shows sympathy towards Israel, based on law No. 21/1964 related to boycotting Israel.

'Are we going back to the harem era ... in view of separation of students?'

"THE Kuwait University began its new academic year 2023/2024 by implementing a law prohibiting mixing within academic classes at the university, amid great controversy, as some student unions at Kuwait University called for a sit-in because they did not accept this law," columnist Dr **Bahija Behbehani** wrote for **Al-Qabas** daily.

"The enforcement of gender segregation in higher education institutions was established by Law No. 26 of 1996. This legislation, ratified by the National Assembly through a voting pro-

cess, specifically delimited the application of the prohibition to gender mixing. Government schools are obligated to adhere to this regulation across all educational levels. In contrast, foreign schools implement coeducational systems at every tier, where female students typically don shirts and shorts above the knee.

"The rationale behind this divergence is clear: the govern-

ment lacks the authority to intervene in the management and regulations of foreign private schools. These establishments were primarily established to educate the children of foreign diplomats representing their respective nations in Kuwait. Certain Kuwaiti families chose to enroll their children in these schools seeking a higher quality of education compared to what government schools provided.

"On the contrary, the Kuwaiti government is dedicated to furnishing an education that prepares its youth for responsibilities, encourages interaction with diverse global cultures, and facilitates the utilization of modern technologies for promising careers and futures. Students attending private foreign schools in Kuwait typically hail from affluent backgrounds, given the substantial cost of education in these institutions. Additional expenditures include books, clothes, and related items.

"Parents of these students also contribute significant amounts towards celebrations, activities, and graduation ceremonies. Graduates from private schools often enjoy a competitive edge, excelling in the English language and international tests, enabling easy admission to international universities, where they continue to experience coeducational environments.

"This leads to a fundamental question: Can the minister and the representative enforce regulations against gender mixing on these students? Are Kuwaiti students attending private foreign schools considered part of the foreign school system, thereby exempt from the non-mixing law? Or should they be mandated to transfer to public schools, aligning with Kuwaiti educational policies?

"It's essential to acknowledge that in numerous countries today, various aspects of life involve gender mixing, including education, work, and healthcare. This prompts contemplation on whether reverting to a period of strict gender separation, akin to the historical concept of the harem, is a viable or desirable option in the contemporary age."

Also:

"In its size, degree of escalation, and strategic and military depth, Operation Al-Aqsa Flood may not resemble any other military operation, as it was initiated by Palestinian resistance factions of all orientations by firing thousands of rocket salvos towards Tel Aviv and the settlements surrounding the Gaza Strip, with a massive storming of the settlements, the detention of a number of settlers, and the capture of many Israelis. The Israeli occupation army reported a high initial toll of deaths, prisoners and wounded in this largest missile strike in decades against the Zionist entity,' columnist Suad Fahd Al-Mojil wrote for Al-Qabas daily "What draws attention about the Al-Aqsa Flood operation is that it coincides with the normalization projects that are expanding within the Arab map, which raises more than one question about the timing of the flood and its political repercussions later. "Normalization efforts and peace treaties began since the 1970s, and in all cases there were attempts to find conditions on the basis of which peace could be agreed upon in the Arab-Israeli conflict, starting with the Egyptian-Israeli peace treaty in 1979, the Jordanian-Israeli peace treaty in 1994, and the Abraham Accords, which normalize relations between Israel, the Emirates, and Bahrain in 2020, the normalization agreement between Israel and Sudan in 2020, and Morocco in 2020 as well, in addition to many members of the Arab League establishing semi-official relations with Israel. "Despite all these agreements to settle the conflict and curb wars, normalization according to the Israeli vision remained absent from all of the aforementioned attempts. The normalization that Israel wants is definitely not at the level of official systems and channels. It wants to open Arab and Islamic popular fronts that will make it part of the Middle East system in practice and not in form, which has not happened since the first normalization in 1979 until now. "The deal of the century came at the initiative of Trump, who moved his embassy to Jerusalem, and here is Biden brandishing his project for a new Middle East, in which Israel will be dominant economically, militarily, security-wise, and culturally. This will not happen at the popular level, as evidenced by the position of the peoples of the normalized countries that still see the Zionist entity as an enemy and usurper of Arab lands. "The Zionist entity, then, is the one that does not want peace or stability, which will inevitably threaten its security and strip it of its "right" to strike pockets of resistance and suppress the Palestinians politically, militarily, intellectually, and religiously.

more than one question about its political consequences, and whether it will put direct pressure on upcoming and previous normalization projects, or whether it will contribute to consolidating the "right" of the Zionist entity to defend its security, and thus redrawing its image internationally as a peaceful, democratic and surrounded state.

"It has enemies and deserves military, financial and moral support from the whole world, especially in light of the ugly image of the entity, which has become popular in the world with the increasing severity of its violations of peaceful civilians in Gaza and elsewhere.

"The political repercussions are usually greater in their impact than military wars. The Geneva Conventions and their protocols after World War II are what shaped the political map of the world later, and the Yalta Agreement is what determined how to divide Germany and prosecute members of the Nazi Party and declared the liberation of Europe and allowing its residents to establish democratic institutions in accordance with their choice.

"The Al-Aqsa Flood operation is profound in its size, and will inevitably carry with it political repercussions. We hope that the Arab parties will not emerge from it with normalization losses that will cost them what remains of their dignity, and will achieve for Israel its distant dream."

"There is a phenomenon that is no longer hidden from anyone. It is the major shortage of medicines in Kuwait that the public and private medical centers are suffering from", columnist **Sami Al-Nisreen** wrote for **Al-Nahar** daily.

"In the past, it was said that, if the disease was known and diagnosed correctly, it would be easy to find the medicine and treat it.

"The reason for the disappearance of some medicines in Kuwait, according to what I heard from many specialists, is the existence of a global shortage of medicines. What made matters worse is the fact that the concerned ministry has been accumulating bills to suppliers worth tens of millions for years. How can they then continue with the supply if their dues are not paid?!

"The concerned authorities also deliberately set the prices of medicines without considering the high prices from the source, and then the factories refrain from exporting to Kuwait, as they prefer other markets, leaving Kuwait only with what increases the needs of other markets, which have flexibility in pricing and the feature of quick payment.

"In addition, populist decisions were issued to reduce medicine prices by certain percentages, which forces factories to either stop or resort to new packaging that is less in quantity than before. Millions of dollars in fines are also imposed on suppliers.

"In all the countries of the world, medicine is imported, and a small profit margin is placed on it, as opening pharmacies to sell medicines does not cost more than the value of the store's decor.

"In Kuwait, the markets in all residential areas are monopolized by cooperative societies, some of which demand hundreds of thousands of dinars for a "manfree" shop, in addition to expensive rents due to monopoly. So how can medicines be imported when the prices are fixed without taking into account the increased costs from the factory, payments are delayed, and heavy fines are imposed?! "There is a Gulf agreement signed among the Gulf countries about 20 years ago. Its duration was five years, and it has expired but it has not been renewed yet. It tried to stabilize the prices of medicines in the Gulf, but no one adhered to it except for one country whose name you can guess!"

Municipality removes 16 abandoned cars, boats

The Public Relations Department of the Kuwait Municipality said the Public Cleanliness and Road Works Department of the Mubarak Al-Kabeer Governorate Municipality branch carried out field trips to raise the level of cleanliness, which resulted in the removal of 16 abandoned cars and boats, groceries, motorcycles, and scrap containers, reports Al-Rai daily. The daily added, during the campaign the inspectors also placed stickers 191 abandoned cars, boats, mobile groceries, and commercial containers in preparation for their removal after the lapse of the specified time frame, in addition to the replacement of 17 old containers.

In this context, the Director of the Public Cleanliness and Road Works Department in the governorate's municipality branch, Fahd Al-Qarifa, explained that the goal of the intensive field tours is to monitor violators and take all legal measures against them.

He pointed out the team pays great attention to raising the level of cleanliness in the areas that fall under its responsibility, as well as removing everything that distorts the aesthetic view of the governorate.

Police nab 15 bootleggers; 36 residency, labor law violators

Over 26K traffic citations issued; Asian held for drugs

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 9: Personnel from the General Administration of Residency Affairs Investigations in the Farwaniya Governorate have arrested 36 violators of the Residency and Labor Laws and 15 bootleggers, reports Al-Rai daily.

A majority of those arrested are Asians and they have been handed over to the concerned authority to take the necessary legal measures against them.

Traffic citations issued: Personnel from the General Traffic Department and the Rescue Police Department have recorded 26,430 traffic violations, arrested 46 violators, and referred 10 people to the Directorate-General for Drugs Control, reports Al-Rai daily. The GTD stated in statistics that over four days from September 30, 2023 to October 3 of this year, during the traffic campaigns, 49 vehicles and 11 motorbikes were impounded by the traffic police, and 11 wanted persons were arrested in connection with several cases. The sources also added, that 9 violators whose residency had expired were arrested, two people were in an abnormal condition, five people without any proof were detained, and an accused was referred to the General Administration for Drug Control and referred a juvenile to the Juvenile Prosecution.

"The Al-Aqsa Flood Operation comes today to raise

"The Civil Service Commission (CSC) has approved flexible working hours for all employees in various government agencies to facilitate their access to their workplaces and also organize the school start times for school students", columnist **Khalid Al-Ar-rafa** wrote for **Al-Anba** daily.

"In parallel, the Ministry of Interior prepared appropriate plans, and the traffic sector mobilized its efforts for organizing operations. Although there are some congestion, the matter also requires intensifying the security presence and imposing the authority of the law in the face of violators who deliberately create traffic chaos.

"There are those who do not adhere to traffic rules. For example, we find priority for bikers who have previously been in clear violation of the regulations. The same is true for highways. We find that there are some single-lane exits that end up being three lanes because of these violators, which has contributed to obstructing traffic, and causing congestion, in addition to the condition of some roads that create traffic chaos and accidents.

"The Ministry of Interior's General Traffic Department also allocated specific time periods for entry of trucks, but we unfortunately find that most of them do not adhere to this. During the times of the ban, we find them on the roads racing against employees at tremendous speed without any respect for the law that regulates their passage on those roads.

"We therefore call on the traffic department to intensify patrols in the mornings on highways to monitor and hold these violators accountable.

"Finally, the penalties and fines for traffic violations must be reconsidered. Their value must be increased and even doubled due to the increase in the number of accidents taking place on the streets due to the recklessness of some who do not respect the law.

"Increasing the penalties will force these people to respect the law. It has hence become necessary to expedite the amendment of the traffic law in order to preserve people's lives."

'1.2 mln passengers used Kuwait airport last Sept'

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 9: The Directorate-General of Civil Aviation said today the total passenger movement to and from the Kuwait International Airport last September was 1,250,456 passengers.

Acting Director General of the Department, Imad Al-Jalawi, told KUNA that last September, the Kuwait International Airport witnessed an increase in passenger traffic by 11 percent and an increase in aircraft traffic by 19 percent, while air cargo traffic increased by 8 percent, compared to the same month last year.

He explained the movement of arriving passengers reached 675,768 passengers last September, while the number of outgoing passengers was 574,688, while the total number of transit passengers reached 142,628, an increase of 44 percent over September of 2022.

He added that the total aircraft movement that was operated to and from the Airport during September was 11,814 flights, compared to 9,933 flights in the same month of last year, pointing out that the most popular destinations last September were Dubai, Cairo, Istanbul, Sabiha, Jeddah, and Doha.

Regarding air freight movement, Al-Jalawi reported that freight movement last September was about 18.9 million kilograms, with about 14.8 million kilograms of incoming freight and about 4.1 million kilograms of outgoing freight. **Smuggling bid foiled:** The Criminal Security Sector, in cooperation with the General Administration of Customs, was able to thwart an attempt to smuggle 2 kilograms of a drugs via air freight, reports Al-Rai daily.

The Public Relations and Security Media Department of the Interior Ministry said, "Through intensifying search and investigation operations by the Directorate-General for Drugs Control the drugs were found neatly concealed in a postal parcel of lamp shades.

The suspect was arrested when he came up to collect the parcel. The suspect and the contraband have been handed over to the concerned authority to take the necessary legal measures."

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 9: The Legal and Financial Committee of the Municipal Council yesterday organized its first workshop to discuss the naming of cities, suburbs, areas, streets and squares, as part of the committee's efforts to activate its previous approval of the draft controls and rules for naming.

In a press statement issued after the meeting, the Committee Chairman Fahad Al-Abduljader said the names of these places initially existed and are known, but the committee decided to review them for further study and verification by opening the plans for each area separately.

He explained that the workshop participants agreed to set several criteria for

choosing the names of the places, the most important of which is the historical name of the place, the historical events, and the geographical phenomena associated with it. in addition to environmental criteria related to the place.

The participants will undertake the formulation of criteria for choosing the names of the places, based on the Dixon maps and others. They will also hold technical discussions on the subject.

Al-Abduliader revealed that the committee, during its meeting next week, will dis-cuss the draft nomenclature.

It is worth highlighting that the workshop was attended by several parties, including representatives of Kuwait University, the National Council for Culture, Arts and Letters, and other parties concerned with nomenclature.

Civilians have already paid a high price. Around 700 people, including 73 soldiers, have been killed in Israel, according to Israeli media outlets, citing rescue service - a staggering toll by the scale of its recent conflicts. The Gaza Health Ministry said 493 people, including 78 children and 41 women, were killed in the territory. Thousands have been wounded on both sides.

Palestinian militant groups claimed to be holding over 130 people abducted in Israel and dragged into Gaza. The armed wing of Hamas claimed on its Telegram channel that four of them were killed in Israeli airstrikes. That could not be independently confirmed.

Private housing sector deals decline by 21.8%

22.1% decrease in value recorded in Q3 2023

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 9: A recent real estate study revealed that the private housing sector witnessed a decline in the number of deals by about 21.8% in the third quarter of 2023, with 483 deals, compared to 618 deals in the same period in 2022, while its value reached 251.45 million dinars in the third quarter of 2023, compared to 322.98 million in the third quarter of 2022, i.e. a decline of 22.1% on an annual basis with (Sabah Al-Ahmad Marine City and the coastal strip excluded), reports Al-Qabas daily.

According to Al-Hesbah Real Estate Company's study, which was specially conducted by Al-Qabas, investment housing transactions (buildings and lands) declined significantly by about 44%, as only 61 deals were recorded in the third quarter of 2023, compared to 109 deals in the same period of 2022.

Some disorders might include genetic causes, he revealed; however, the main culprits were daily life pressures and shocks that drive people towards mental instability.

People must pursue all venues to reach a balance psyche and this could be achieved via a system that starts with a person waking up for his or her day until it was time to rest and sleep, Dr. Guloom affirmed.

The most common disorder is depression, said the expert, noting that various and numerous studies showed that only around 40 percent sought treatment for this particular aliment.

He noted that depression could happen to anyone regardless of status or circumstances, stressing that it was important to seek help once being hit by this crippling feeling that might lead to disaster or in some cases suicide

Dr. Guloom also mentioned that anxiety also was a troubling mental disorder that drives individuals to obsessively think of matters that were trivial and did not deserve all the worry and depletion of physical and psychological health.

In contrast, panic attack is a serious case of physical and psychological symptoms that could occur without notice, causing severe fear, the pulsating of the heart, heavy breathing, and other alarming behavior.

Sway voters Polish candidates debate on state TV

WARSAW, Poland, Oct 9, (AP): Leading Polish candidates were gearing up for a debate Monday where they hope to sway undecided voters, six days before a national election that many Poles believe is the most important one since communism was toppled.

Debates in Poland's post-1989 democratic era have in some cases sealed the destiny of candidates, creating a sense of anticipation surrounding the debate.

The ruling conservative Law and Justice party is leading in the polls with around 35% support, yet it is at risk of losing its majority in parliament. Its nearest rival, the Civic Coalition led by Donald Tusk, is just a few points behind but has gained momentum lately.



The Civic Coalition and two other opposition groups together have greater support than the ruling party, but they are weakened by not running together. Small swings in the performance of the smaller parties could shift the final result.

The debate will be broad-cast starting at 6:30 pm (1630 GMT) by public broadcaster TVP, which is obligated by law to conduct such debates.

Kaczynski

Since the Law and Justice party won power in 2015, it has used TVP as a mouthpiece to praise its own policies and people and vilify the opposition, most notably Tusk.

The debate gives Tusk get a rare chance to address undecided voters and Law and Justice supporters on state media airwaves.

Notably absent from the debate lineup is ruling party leader Jaroslaw Kaczynski, the country's de-facto leader. He left Prime Minister Mateusz Morawiecki to represent their party.

Tusk and his allies accuse Kaczynski of eroding the democratic foundations of the country by taking control of the judiciary branch and public media, and putting the country on a path that could lead out of the European Union. Law and Justice insists it has no intention of leaving the EU. It is running on promises to safeguard the country's security after having built a high wall on the border with Belarus to keep out migrants.

Handle

Political commentators say Tusk stands to gain just by showing up in a forum hostile to him and friendly to Kaczyński. Tusk seized the opportunity last week to accuse Kaczynski of "hiding.

A Tusk-Kaczynski debate in 2007 strongly impacted that year's parliamentary race. Kaczynski, the incumbent then too, and his party lost after Tusk came across as more in touch with the problems of regular people, knowing the prices of basic items when Kaczynski did not. Tusk also appeared more down-to-earth, inviting Kaczynski to "call me Donek," the diminutive of Donald. His Civic Platform party won that election and governed Poland for the following eight years.

Others taking part include Szymon Holownia, the head of a centrist-agrarian coalition; Joanna Scheuring-Wielgus, a left-wing lawmaker representing her Left party; and far-right Confederation party co-leader Krzysztof Bosak. TVP is imposing the conditions of the debate in a way that would help Law and Justice. It was originally scheduled for the prime-time hour of 9 p.m. but was moved up to 6:30 p.m. when it became clear that Tusk would participate and Kaczvnski wouldn't. It is being held in a rented studio on the far edge of Warsaw rather than in TVP's studio closer to the center, where Tusk supporters were expected to rally to greet him.

NEW YORK, Oct 9 (AP): Robert F. Kennedy Jr, an anti-vaccine conspir-acy theorist and scion of the storied Democratic dynasty, was expected to launch an independent or third-party presidential bid on Monday. Cornel West, a philosopher and Black social leader, made the same choice last week And No Labels a new political week. And No Labels, a new political party, is intensifying candidate recruitment efforts.

While the politics are murky, the fresh frenzy of outsider candidates threatens to weaken both major parties as Democratic President Joe Biden and Republican former President Donald Trump tighten their grip on their parties' presidential nominations.

There's little concern that the independent or third-party candidates would actually win the presidency, but they could siphon support from the ultimate Democratic and Repub-lican nominees. A heightened sense of concern is spreading especially among Democratic officials, who see the outsiders as a dangerous wildcard that harkens back to 2016, when Green Party nominee Jill Stein may have enabled Trump's razor-thin victory by winning a small portion of the vote.

Impeachments from office emerge as 'partisan weapon' in the states

WASHINGTON, Oct 9, (AP): Republicans in Wisconsin are threatening to impeach a recently elected state Supreme Court justice and raised the possibility of doing the same to the state's election director.

A Georgia Republican called for impeaching the Fulton County prosecutor who brought rack-eteering charges against former President Donald Trump. Republicans in the Pennsylvania House have already impeached the top prosecutor in Philadelphia.

None of the targets met the bar

LUXEMBOURG: Luxembourg's three-party coalition led by liberal Prime Minister Xavier Bettel lost its decade-long hold on power in tight parliamentary elections, mostly because of a poor showing by the Green party, according to election results early Mon-

day. Bettel's DP liberal party surged from 12 to 14 seats in the 60-seat house in Sunday's elections and the socialist LSAP also added a seat to reach 11. But the fall of the Greens from nine to four seats meant that the coalition falls just short of the numbers needed for a continued five-year stint in government.

The Christian Democrat CSV remains the biggest single party in parliament with 21 seats and will be the power broker to form the next government.

Ten years ago, Bettel succeeded Jean-Claude Juncker, the Christian Democrat who had been Europe's longest serving democratically elected leader at the time. The CSV Christian Democrats have been left uncharacteristically on the sidelines for the past 10 years, despite being the single biggest party.

In the last elections, Bettel's coalition controlled 31 of the 60 seats in the Luxembourg parliament.

Coalition talks might take anywhere from a few days to several weeks. Luxembourg is the European Union's second-smallest country, with a population of 650,000 people, and is its richest per capita.

LONDON: Britain's main opposition Labour Party says that if it wins power, it will appoint a "COVID corruption commissioner" to try and recoup some of the billions lost to fraud and waste during the pandemic.

Labour economy spokeswoman Rachel Reeves is due to outline the plan in a speech Monday at the party's annual conference. She says the commissioner will bring together tax officials, fraud investigators and law enforcement officers will track down an estimated 7.2 billion pounds (\$8.8 billion) in lost public money spent on grants and contracts related to COVID-19.

Like many countries, the U.K. was forced to sidestep usual rules as it rushed to procure essential supplies and prop up people's livelihoods during the coronavirus pandemic.

Reeves told the BBC the Conservative government was "embarrassed" by the scale of the losses and "doing nothing to get that money back."

A multi-year public inquiry is examining Britain's handling of the pandemic, which left more than 200,000 people in the country dead.

Reeves' announcement comes during a four-day conference in Liverpool, where Labour is trying to cement its front-runner status in opinion polls before an election due in 2024.

'Pilot errors cause of crash': A pilot's error during landing caused a 2021 plane crash that killed four people on a Michigan island, federal investigators concluded.

The National Transportation Safety Board, which investigated the Nov. 13, 2021 crash on Beaver Island, said in a report released that the pilot lost control during landing and crashed 300 feet (91 meters) from the airport's runway.

While approaching the airport, the plane was observed flying slowly and 'wallowing' as if nobody was flying,' the report said. The pilot exceeded the "airplane's critical angle of attack during final approach, which resulted in an aerodynamic stall and loss of control at an altitude too low to recover," according to the NTSB report. (AP)

1 killed, 8 hurt in shooting: One person was killed and eight were wounded in a shooting during a private party at a Pennsylvania community center early Sunday, authorities said.

State police in Indiana County said troopers, local officers and emergency services responded at 12:35 am Sunday to the shooting at the Chevy Chase Community Center in White Township, about 50 miles (80 kilometers) northeast of Pittsburgh.

Nine people between the ages of 18 and 23 were shot, including a 22-year-old Pittsburgh man who died at the scene, police said. Lt Col George Bivens said investigators believe more than one shooter was involved but declined to say how many there were.

"Dozens of gunshots were fired within the confines of the building," said Bivens, acknowledging later that "It may well be that we had a gunfight inside this building." (AP)

Surge in rail traffic Cut Ukraine aid and 'boost' Taiwan: GOP

WASHINGTON, Oct 9, (AP): To Rep Mike Collins, China is a bigger threat to the United States than Russia. So the Georgia Republican has voted against providing military aid to Ukraine as he advocates for doing more to arm Taiwan, the self-governed island that's at risk of military aggression from Beijing.

For Collins and other Republican lawmakers, Taiwan and Ukraine are effectively rivals for a limited pool of US military assistance. But that's not necessarily how Taiwan and many of its supporters see it. They view Taiwan's fate as closely linked to that of Ukraine as it struggles to push back a Russian invasion

They say China is watching closely to see if the United States has the political



stamina to support an ally in a prolonged, costly war. The US aid to Ukraine also has led to weapons manufacturers stepping up production - something that could benefit Taiwan in a clash with China. "Ukraine's survival is Tai-

"Taiwan is grateful to have strong bipartisan support from the US We will continue to work with the U.S. to maintain the peace and stability of the Taiwan Strait," the Taipei Economic and Cultural Representative Office said in a statement emailed to The Associated Press

But Congress' refusal to include the aid raises "alarm bells" in Taiwan. said Bonnie Glaser, managing director of the Indo-Pacific program at the German Marshall Fund. She noted that the Taiwanese government "has argued that Ukraine's victory is existential for Taiwan.,

"These worries exist even though most Republicans who seek to end US support for Ukraine are still very pro-Taiwan and willing to do more to help defend Taiwan," she said.

Taiwan is the thorniest issue in the frayed US-China relationship. Beijing claims sovereignty over the island, which lies roughly 100 miles (160 kilometers) off the mainland's southeastern coast, and vows to seize it, by force if necessary, to achieve national reunification. The United States wants a peaceful resolution and has a security pact with the island, supplying it with military hardware and technologies to prevent any forced takeover by Beijing.

China's military actions near the island have fueled concerns over armed attacks. President Joe Biden has said he would send troops to defend Taiwan in case of war, while Chinese President Xi Jinping has demanded the US respect his country's "sovereignty and territorial integrity.

Evacuations ordered as remnants of Koinu hit China Myanmar flooding displaces more than 10K

BANGKOK, Oct 9, (AP): Flooding triggered by heavy monsoon rains in Myanmar's southern areas has displaced more than 10,000 people and disrupted traffic on the rail lines that connect the country's biggest cities, officials and state-run media said Monday.

A senior official at the Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement, Lay Shwe Zin Oo, said constant rainfall in the Bago region that began last week caused flooding in the lowlying areas of its capital, Bago township. She said there were no casualties reported so far, but that more than 10,000 people had to abandon their homes.

Recorded

Bago township recorded 7.87 inches (200 millimeters) of rainfall, its highest level in 59 years, Myanmar's Meteorological Department said Sunday. Rain or thundershowers was forecast for across the country until Monday evening.

One of the leaders of an emergency rescue team in Bago told The Associated Press that the flooding was at least 7-8 feet (2.44 meters) deep in low-lying areas and 3-4 feet downtown.

Alinn newspaper on Monday said trains that departed from Mandalay, the country's second-largest city in central Myanmar, and from southern Mawlamyine township were halted en route. Scheduled departures from Yangon, the biggest city in the coun-try, were canceled after rail lines were flooded by the rapid flow of water from mountain torrents and the spillage from dams in the Bago region.

Myanmar Alinn also said some neighborhoods in Kyaikto township in southern Mon state were flooded by water from mountain torrents, and 555 people there were taking shelters in three relief camps on Sunday.

Myanmar experiences extreme weather virtually every year during the monsoon season. In 2008, Cy clone Nargis killed more than 138,000 people. In July and August this year, floods in Mon, Kayin and Rakhine states and the regions of Bago and Magway killed five people and displaced about 60,000.

TAIPEI, Taiwan: People have been moved to shelters and nearly 2.000 boats recalled to port as the remnants of Typhoon Koinu slammed into southern China on Monday after leaving one dead and over 300 injured in Taiwan.

GANGTOK, India: Air force helicopters were able to land Monday to rescue people in India's Himalayan northeast after a 6-year-old hydroelectric dam cracked open last week in intense rain, flooding a valley with glacial lake water and washing away bridges and homes as thousands fled.

Police said rescuers have found 52 bodies so far, and the search was continuing while around a 100 people are still missing. As weather conditions improved in Sikkim state, helicopters arrived in the worst-hit Mangan district to help some 3,000 stranded tourists.

The design and placement of the Teesta 3 dam, the biggest hydroelectric dam in Sikkim state, were controversial from the time it was built. A 2019 report identified Lhonak Lake as "highly vulnerable" to flooding that could breach dams and cause extensive

Bradley Bowman, senior director of the Center of Military and Political Power at the Foundation for Defense of Democracies, disagrees with that logic.

SEOUL, South Korea: Recent satellite photos show a sharp increase in rail traffic along the North Korea-Russia border, indicating the North is supplying munitions to Russia, according to a U.S. think tank.

Speculation about a possible North Korean plan to refill Russia's munition stores drained in its protracted war with Ukraine flared last month, when North Korean leader Kim Jong Un traveled to Russia to meet President Vladimir Putin and visit key military sites. Foreign officials suspect Kim is seeking sophisticated Russian weapons technologies in return for the munitions to boost his nuclear program.

"Given that Kim and Putin discussed some military exchanges and cooperation at their recent summit, the dramatic increase in rail traffic likely indicates North Korea's supply of arms and munitions to Russia," Beyond Parallel, a website run by the Washington-based Center for Strategic and International Studies think tank, said in a report Friday.

"However, the extensive use of tarps to cover the shipping crates/containers and equipment makes it impossible to conclusively identify what is seen at the Tumangang Rail Facility" on the border, it said.

CANBERRA, Australia: Australians appear likely to reject the creation of an advocate for the Indigenous population in a referendum outcome that some see as a victory for racism.

Two opinion polls published in newspapers on Monday are the latest to show a majority of respondents oppose enshrining in Australia's constitution an Indigenous Voice to Parliament. Creating the Voice would aim to give Australia's most disadvantaged ethnic minority more say on government policies that effect their lives.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese on Monday would not concede defeat before voting on the referendum ends Saturday.

'We'll wait and see when they cast their vote. I'm not getting ahead of the Australian people," Albanese told Australian Broadcasting Corp.

"I know there's some arrogance has crept into the no-side campaign, but it's a campaign based upon fear," Albanese added.

Albanese has said the world will judge Australians on how they vote at their first referendum since 1999. Indigenous Australians account for 3.8% of Australia's population.



15 dead in Cameroon floods: At least 15 people were killed and more than 50 were injured in floods set off by heavy rains in Cameroon's capital, authorities said Monday as rescuers searched for those missing following the deluge the previous day.

The rains unleashed floodwaters in the district of Yaounde 2 of the country's capital on Sunday, sweeping away buildings and reducing many to rubble.

Rescue workers are still digging through the mud and rubble "with the hope of saving lives," Daouda Ousmanou, the top government official in the district, said Monday. Cameroon's president is Paul Biva

Floodings have been frequent in Cameroon in recent years, with experts often blaming climate change, and their impact has been exacerbated by shoddy construction that often circumvents regulations.

In the city's Mbankolo neighborhood, at least 30 houses were swept away while several collapsed on residents inside. Ousmanou said. Others drowned as they were swept away by floodwaters.

Ernest Zebaze, a 24-year-old university student said he identified the bodies of his mother and two siblings. "I am still looking for my father who was in the house during the downpour," Zebaze said.

Bodies of the victims have been laid out at a morgue while the injured were rushed to hospitals. (AP)

'Govt analyzes risks': A lawyer sought to assure the UK Supreme Court on Monday that the British government had adequately analyzed the risks of sending asylum-seekers to Rwanda and would have people "on the ground" to make sure it's safe and that deportees' rights are protected.

Attorney James Eadie said that the controversial policy was in the public interest of deterring immigrants from risking their lives crossing the English Channel in small boats and to stop smugglers from exploiting them. He said the British government would make sure Rwanda adheres to agreements to comply with the United Nations Refugee Convention and the European Convention on Human Rights.

The appeal is, at its heart, about the judgments made by government about the future conduct of a friendly foreign state," Eadie said. "Both the Government and the Rwandan government were fully aware of the likely controversy of the arrangements that were made when the deal was signed.'

"Almost the whole area of the town was flooded," That Zin Maung, chairman of the Mizzima Thukha Charity Foundation said by phone on Monday. "It is the third flood in the town this year and the worst in many years. All the monasteries in the town have opened relief camps. The woman, who spoke on condition of anonymity because Myanmar's military government prefers to tightly control the release of information, said the water was still rising steadily in her neighborhood, which had never flooded badly before.

Social Welfare Ministry official Lay Shwe Zin Oo said people were sheltering in 32 relief camps, schools and Buddhist monasteries in Bago, while the authorities were providing food, drinking water and other essential assistance

Koinu arrived a month after southern China and Hong Kong were lashed by Typhoon Saola, which triggered Hong Kong's highest storm signal on a scale of 11. A week later, Guangdong province and Hong Kong were hit with the heaviest rains in almost 140 years. The storm also broke a windspeed record off Taiwan's east coast, which faces the Pacific Ocean.

Ferry services connecting Hainan with mainland China were also suspended as Koinu moved across the island. The province is struggling to

deadly flood that began early Wednesday, the latest to hit northeast India in a year of unusually heavy monsoon rains. Experts say possible contributors were the intense rain and a 6.2-magnitude earthquake that struck neighboring Nepal on Tuesday afternoon.

The flood began when the glacial lake overflowed, cracking open the Teesta 3 dam. The icv waters then cascaded through towns in the valley below, carrying some bodies kilometers (miles) downstream, where they were found in the neighboring state of West Bengal and in Bangladesh.

On Sunday evening, as the skies cleared and rains subsided, 89 tourists stranded by washed-out roads were airlifted out of northern Sikkim. Some 10 tourists, including five Thai nationals, were able to trek to safety with assistance from rescuers. Police said Monday they would continue to fly the helicopters if the weather permits.

The flood destroyed multiple bridges, hit pipelines and damaged hundreds of houses in northern Sikkim. Of 23 Indian soldiers reported missing earlier, officials say one was rescued and nine were confirmed to have died, while the search for the others continued.

Military, rebels clash: New fighting erupted between the Malian military and armed rebel groups in an area south of Kidal late Friday, with both sides claiming to control the town of Anefis as night fell.

The armed movements, who have long been fighting for an independent state called Azawad, said in a statement that they had shot down an unspecified aircraft along with six other drones it said belonged to the Russian private military contractor Wagner.

The Malian military, however, said that it had broken through the rebels' defenses and had carried out "a very high death toll on the terrorist side" near Anefis, about 100 kilometers (62 miles) south of the town of Kidal.

The violence is the latest in a string of increasing attacks by the rebels, known as the Permanent Strategic Framework for Peace, Security and Development (CSP-PSD).

Analysts say it signals a breakdown of a 2015 peace agreement signed between the government and ethnic Tuareg rebels who once drove security forces out of northern Mali as they sought to create the state of Azawad there.

The 2015 peace deal called for the exrebels to be integrated into the national military among other things. But there are now concerns that ex-rebels who had joined the army under the 2015 deal "have joined the ranks of the terrorists," according to a letter signed by Malian Chief of Staff Gal Oumar Diarra that was leaked on social media networks. Experts say 'giving' helps

Does being in a good mood make you more generous?

NEW YORK, Oct 9, (AP): Those ads showing caged dogs and desperate looking cats while Canadian singer Sarah McLachlan's "Angel" played in the background have been not just effective at making viewers sad, but also remarkably successful at raising money for the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals since 2007.

However, a new study shows other strategies may also be effective at motivating people to give, apart from all that "sadvertising." Maybe try "Hakuna Matata."

The study from Nathan Chan, assistant professor at the University of Massachusetts Amherst, and Casey Wichman, assistant professor at the Georgia Institute of Technology, found that people in good moods are more likely to donate to a charitable cause

Donation

The study gathered posts made to Twitter, the social media platform now called X, from people who gave to Wikipedia and posted a hashtag acknowledging the donation. The researchers analyzed the posts from before and after the users made a donation and found that it improved shortly before they gave.

"It suggests that rather than this conventional notion that people give because it makes them feel good about themselves for doing the right thing, we found that people were in a good mood prior to donating, and that's potentially the causal factor for why they decided to give," Wichman said.

The findings indicate charities may want to improve a potential donor's mood before making the ask, Wichman said

Their study isn't the first to find a connection between well-being and generosity, said Lara Aknin, professor of social psychology at Simon Fraser University, but it does a provide a valuable look at a person's specific feeling at a specific moment in a real world example. One takeaway could be that it would be beneficial to reach people at times when they are already feeling good, like on holidays or a loved one's birthday, she said.

But people give for many reasons and many levers motivate that generosity, Aknin said, including showing how a potential donor can make a meaningful impact on other people, animals or causes they care about. She also warned that people are very attuned to ulterior motives attached to requests for help.

"If people feel that they're insincerely being fattened up before the request, then that could that could really spoil giving," she said, "which I think for many people is truly a pretty wonderful experience when they get to give in ways that they care about and feel like they've chosen to do so."

The researchers used natural language processing tools to analyze the sentiments of a person's tweets and identify their mood based on their posts.

They also designed a second experiment to test their findings where they asked online volunteers to decide how to split \$50 between themselves and a charity. They showed some a clip of "Hakuna Matata" from from "The Lion King," while others watched a science video about microbes. Those who watched the dancing warthog gave a little more to charity and were more likely to give the whole amount, though the results are less conclusive because of a small sample size.

Al-Seyassah/Arab Times Staff KUWAIT CITY, Oct 9: Local banks' managed assets, which include funds managed for third parties, exhibited annual growth, increasing by 0.6 percent to reach a value of 179.8m dinars by the end of August. This was a slight uptick from the 31.21 billion dinars recorded in August 2022, bringing the total to 31.39 billion dinars. However, on a monthly basis, these assets decreased by 1.9 percent or 600.8 million dinars, down from 31.99 billion dinars in July. According to data from the Central

Bank of Kuwait for August, assets managed by banks during the first eight months of 2023 experienced a significant decline of 11.3 percent, totaling approximately 4.014 billion dinars. This marked a considerable decrease from the 35.404 billion dinars reported at the end of December 2022.

Throughout 2023, bank-managed assets witnessed a continuous decline, starting at 35.404 billion dinars in December, then rising slightly to 32.3 billion in February, before falling again to 31.1 billion in May. They subsequently increased in June to 31.3 billion dinars and further rose in July to 31.99 billion dinars.

Asset Distribution:

Among the 12 items comprising bank-managed assets, the managed portfolios item decreased by 2 percent on a monthly basis, amounting to 1.299 billion dinars in August, compared to 1.326 billion dinars in July. Nevertheless, it increased by 9.8 percent from the beginning of 2023, reaching a value of 116 million dinars, in contrast to 1.183 billion dinars in December 2022.

The locally managed investment funds item saw a substantial 84 percent decrease, amounting to 16.8 million dinars in August, down from 105.4 million dinars in December. This item remained relatively unchanged on both a monthly and annual basis.

Assets managed as trusts decreased by 4.9 percent, totaling 4.63 billion dinars in August, down from 4.868 billion dinars in July. On an annual basis, these assets decreased by 9.7 percent to 497.2 million dinars, compared to 5.127 billion dinars in August 2022.

Total contingent liabilities stemming from indirect financing operations declined by 2 percent to 14.52 billion dinars in August, compared to 14.65 billion dinars in July. These obligations encompassed documentary letters of credit, letters of guarantee, bank acceptances, irrevocable obligations, and restricted investment deposit placements.

Documentary Credits:

Documentary credits decreased by 7.3 percent, amounting to 1.099 billion dinars in August, down from 1.18 billion dinars in July. In contrast, the letters of guarantee item experienced a slight increase of 0.01 percent, reaching 11.276 billion dinars in August, compared to 11.275 billion dinars in July. Over eight months, this item saw a 4.1 percent rise, totaling 452.1 million dinars, compared to 10.824 billion dinars in December.

Bank acceptances increased by 10.5 percent, reaching 858.8 million dinars in August, up from 777.1 million dinars in July. Irrevocable obligations, on the other hand, decreased by 9.2 percent, amounting to 1.285 billion dinars in August, down from 1.417 billion dinars, but they increased by 160 percent from the beginning of the year, reaching about 792.8 million dinars. Investments and restricted investment deposits remained stable, while other assets increased by 1.2 percent, totaling 829.9 million dinars.

Local banks' investments in financial derivatives declined by 2 percent in August, reaching a value of 10 billion dinars, down from 10.3 billion dinars in March.

STOCKHOLM, Oct 9, (AP): The Nobel economics prize was awarded Monday to Harvard University professor Claudia Goldin for research that has advanced the understanding of the gender gap in the labor market.

The announcement went a tiny step to closing the Nobel committee's own gender gap: Goldin is just the third woman to win the prize out of 93 economics laureates.

She has studied 200 years of women's participation in the workplace, showing that despite continued economic growth, women's pay did not continuously catch up to men's and a divide still exists despite women gaining higher levels of education than men.

"I've always been an optimist. But when I look at the numbers, I think something has happened in America, that we, in the 1990s, our labor force participation rate for women was the highest in the world, and now it isn't the highest in the world," Goldin told The Associated Press.

"We have to step back and ask questions about piecing together the family, the home, together with the marketplace and employment," she said.

Goldin's research does not offer solutions, but it allows policymakers to tackle the entrenched problem, said economist Randi Hjalmarsson, a member of the Nobel committee.

"She explains the source of the gap, and how it's changed over time and how it varies with the stage of development. And therefore, there is no single policy," Hjalmarsson said. "So it's a complicated policy question because if you don't know the underlying reason, a certain policy won't work."

However, "by finally understanding the problem and calling it by the right name, we will be able to pave a better route forward," Hjalmarsson said.

Goldin, 77, told AP that what happens in people's homes reflects what happens in the workplace, with women often taking jobs that allow them to be on call at home - work that often pays less.

"Ways in which we can even things out or to create more couple equity also leads to more gender equality," she said.

Morocco welcomes the annual meeting of the IMF & World Bank, a month after its deadly earthquake

MARRAKECH, Morocco, Oct 9, (AP): Less than a two-hour drive from where families sleep in tents and earthquake rubble remain in piles, the world's most powerful financial institutions are gathering for a week of discussions on economic challenges during times of war, inequality and climate change.

The International Monetary Fund and World Bank decided in 2018 to host their annual meeting in Marrakech, Morocco, bringing the affair to the African continent for the first time in 50 years.

Their original timeline was delayed by the pandemic, but the meeting beginning Monday arrives at an apropos time. After a devastating earthquake last month killed nearly 3,000 and wreaked \$11.7 billion in damages, both officials and civil society groups are eagerly anticipating discussions about how to promote economic resiliency in light of natural disaster.

"In no other area is the need for international cooperation as evident as in addressing the existential threat of climate change. The world has a responsibility to stand with vulnerable countries as they deal with shocks they have not caused," Kristalina Georgieva, the IMF's managing director said in a speech on Thursday. Often lenders of last resort, the IMF and the World Bank use billions in loans and assistance to buoy struggling economies and encourage countries operating in deficit to implement reforms they say promote stability and growth.

Still, they've been criticized for excluding the neediest nations from their governance and decisionmaking process, demanding painful spending cuts.

"It's a time of multiple crises, particularly for Arab and African countries who've been hit by various exogenous shocks not of their making," said Iskander Erzini Vernoit, the director of the Moroccobased Imal Initiative for Climate & Development. "There's this massive financing gap on the order of trillions for developing countries and also the key question of how affordable the financing can be."

Those shocks include the pandemic and rising energy and food costs spurred by the war in Ukraine. Those challenges are particularly pronounced in Africa, where many countries spend more on debt than health care and education combined. Critics say the terms of many loans offered force governments from Egypt to Zambia to choose between paying debt or implementing unpopular spending cuts.

In the aftermath of the earthquake,

Goldin had to become a data sleuth as she sought to fill in missing data for her research, Hjalmarsson said. For parts of history, systematic labor market records did not exist, and, if they did, information about women was missing.

"So how did Claudia Goldin overcome this missing data challenge? She had to be a detective to dig through the archives to find novel data sources and creative ways to use them to measure these unknowns," Hjalmarsson said.

In Goldin's analysis, a woman's role in the job market and the pay she receives aren't influenced just by broad social and economic changes. They also are determined partly by her individual decisions about, for example, how much education to get.

Often young girls make decisions about future work by looking at their own mother's participation, each generation "learning from the successes and failures of the preceding generation," Hjalmarsson said.

The process of evaluating prospects as times change "helps explain why change in labor market gender gaps has been so slow," she said.

Of receiving the Nobel, Goldin "was surprised and very, very glad," Ellegren said.

Her award follows the awards in medicine, physics, chemistry, literature and peace that were announced last week.

The economics award was created in 1968 by Sweden's central bank and is formally known as the Bank of Sweden Prize in Economic Sciences in Memory of Alfred Nobel.

Last year's winners were former Federal Reserve Chair Ben Bernanke, Douglas W. Diamond and Philip Dybvig for their research into bank failures that helped shape America's aggressive response to the 2007the IMF approved a \$1.3 billion loan to "help strengthen its preparedness and resilience against natural disasters" in Morocco - a longtime borrower who has used loans and credit to weather economic downturns, including most recently when the pandemic hit tourism and exports particularly hard. The institution has pushed Morocco to balance its budget and continue raising interest rates.

The earthquake, residents say, exacerbated disparities plaguing rural areas and compounded struggles facing already-impoverished communities.

Signs of the country's rapid economic development will be on display in Marrakech, where streets have been swept and damaged landmarks.

But laid-off miner Brahim Ait Brahim - who lives in Anerni, a mountain village near the quake's epicenter said he's still waiting for emergency financial and housing assistance one month after his house was destroyed in the earthquake.

"That's Marrakech. It's the capital for tourism," Ait Brahim said, describing it as the face of Morocco. "Here's it's hidden behind."

Only two of the 92 economics laureates honored have been women. A week ago, Hungarian-American Katalin Karikó and American Drew Weissman won the Nobel Prize in medicine. The prizes are handed out at awards ceremonies in December in Oslo and Stockholm. They carry a cash award of 11 million Swedish kronor (about \$1 million). Winners also receive an 18-carat gold medal and diploma.

'My greatest inspiration'

On 'Carolyn's Boy,' Rucker pays loving tribute to his mom



LOS ANGELES, Oct 9, (AP): In 1992, country star Darius Rucker 's mom died of a heart attack. That was two years before his band, Hootie and the Blowfish, would release their debut record "Cracked Rear View." It went No. 1 and eventually become diamond certified, twice.

Carolyn Rucker didn't get to experience her son's incredible success - either in the rock band, or in the 2000s, as a Grammy award winning country music superstar. It's been 10 years since he released his cover of "Wagon Wheel," one of the most popular country songs of all time.

But Darius Rucker never stopped thinking about her. On Friday, he released "Carolyn's Boy," his eighth solo full-length album in tribute to his mom.

"I was writing the record, I was having a bad day, you know, bad mental day. And I just remember I sat there, and I said to myself, 'At the end of the day, I'm just still my mama's boy.' And that was really the moment for me, you know, that's what the record is," he told The Associated Press. "It's me just being who she raised me to be.

And though it has been over three decades since her death, Rucker says he finally got to a point where he knew it was time to thank

her in this way - through a collection of 14 cheery country music tracks. "Now that I'm a dad, three times over with grown kids, I just wanted to pay tribute to my mom who never got to see any of this stuff, any of this success."

Songs that might sound like they're about a romantic relationship or a carefree afternoon - such as "Never Been Over," with its folky acoustic riff, or the laidback radio hit "Beers and Sunshine" - recall Carolyn. Especially the latter. "She worked hard. She was a nurse," he says. "When she came home, she wanted a Budweiser and to sit on the back porch."

Resonance

But, he adds, the listener could find resonance in these songs with any kind of relationship. "Love is love, even though there's different kinds of love," he adds, so to others, these songs could be about "your cousin or your uncle or your brother or your mom or your dad."

Still, "You never stop missing your mom," he says. She was his first fan - and as he describes her, a "much better singer." Rucker's mom inspired him to become a performer, because she was his first audience, watching a young Darius sing Al Green songs into the salt and pepper shaker.

There's nothing somber about this tribute album - "Carolyn's Boy" is about the good times. "Joyful is the word," Rucker says. "She was a happy person."

Optimism is found all over "Carolyn's Boy." Like in the only collaboration on the album, "Ol' Church Hymn," featuring the trio Chapel Hart, made up of sisters Danica Hart and Devynn Hart and their cousin Trea Swindle. Rucker saw a video of the group covering Dolly Parton's "Jolene" on Twitter, fell in love with their choirlike voices, and slid into their DMs to ask if they'd want to cut a record. "Those family harmonies, you can't match that," he says.

Then there's the nostalgic, romantic ballad "Sara," a song Rucker went to London to write with Ed Sheeran. He's known Sheeran since the English singer opened for Taylor Swift in the US early on, and they became friends.

"We just kept talking about writing together some day. And so, I said, 'All right.' And I actually go on a plane; I was there less than 24 hours," he says. "We sat around and wrote all day and then we got really drunk and I came home," he laughs.

If anything, that is the spirit Rucker carries hopes throughout "Carolyn's Boy": it should sound like a celebration.

LONDON: British filmmaker Terence Davies, best known for a pair of powerful, lyrical movies inspired by his childhood in postwar Liverpool, has died at the age of 77.

Davies' manager John Taylor said the director died "peacefully at home in his sleep" on Saturday after a short illness.

Raised in a large working-class Roman Catholic family in the English port city, Davies worked as a clerk in a shipping office and a bookkeeper in an accountancy firm before enrolling at a drama school in the city of Coventry and later the National Film School.

After making several short films, Davies made his feature debut as writer-director in 1988 with "Distant Voices, Still Lives," a dreamlike sometimes nightmarish - collage of

A captivating tale of 2 young female backpackers

'The Royal Hotel' is a subtle horror flick

LOS ANGELES, Oct 9, (AP): "The Royal Hotel" is a horror movie but don't expect any jump-cuts, scary masks or serial killers. It's more like the horror that dawns on a frog when it realizes it is being boiled alive.

Filmmaker Kitty Green tells a captivating tale of two young American female backpackers who find themselves tending bar for a few weeks in a very remote part of Australia.

The bar is a dump ironically called "The Royal Hotel" and the clientele are rough, hard-drinking miners unfamiliar with the etiquette of Miss Manners or even just respectful interaction.

Our two heroines - Julia Garner from "Ozark" and Jessica Henwick from "Glass Onion: A Knives Out Mystery" - really should not be in this situation. They are the recipients of dirty jokes, drunken behavior, offensive nicknames and constant propositions. One client pays for his beer by passive-aggressively tossing coins at them.

"Wouldn't hurt you to smile a bit?" they are asked.

Green, who directs with a screenplay she wrote with Oscar Redding, explores how women respond to a male-centered environment and how it can test their own friendship. The constant threat of violence hangs over this tale very uncomfortably, its wingman always being alcohol. Would-be heroes come and then show their true nature, slinking off.

It is a subtle movie, with the growing accretion of indignities building slowly until one of the women blurts out: "I'm scared. I'm scared of this place. I'm scared of everyone and everything in this place." And yet, they stay.

The remoteness of the bar - a bus is always several days away - helps explain some of the stasis, but the two women have the very human tendency to settle: They make excuses, they blame themselves, they point to cultural misunderstandings and another day begins.

Hugo Weaving plays the bar owner, the arbiter of

a film that evoked a childhood of poverty and violence leavened by music and movie magic. The film won the Cannes International Critics Prize in 1988, and in 2002 was voted the ninth-best film of the past 25 years by British film critics. Davies followed it in 1992 with

another autobiographical film, "The Long Day Closes," and later



"The Royal Hotel" has a pessimistic - OK, accurate - view of gender relations. The two sides simply don't understand each other - "I can't hear you," says one of the women early on to a would-be suitor - and attempts at conversation are so often drowned out by noise. It asks how you can rationalize ending up mopping up puke in a dive bar in rural Down Under.

The movie perfectly starts with a dark remix of Men at Work's "Down Under." Remember the lyrics: "Buying bread from a man in Brussels/He was 6-foot-4 and full of muscle/I said, 'Do you speak my language?' He just smiled and gave me a Vegemite sandwich."

"The Royal Hotel" shares a vibe with Alex Garland's sophisticated horror film "Men" - an arty indictment of toxic masculinity that often felt like a lecture. But Green's film doesn't feel like that. The final scene will make you cheer, even if the ultimate message is murky.

"The Roval Hotel," a Neon release, is rated R for "language throughout, sexual content and nudity." Running time: 91 minutes. Three stars out of four.

Trump's legal drama a blessing to MSNBC

NEW YORK, Oct 9, (AP): During a recent "Morning Joe" discussion of another development in the four indictments of former president Donald Trump, NBC News reporter Ken Dilanian predicted, "we are in for a real show next year."

MSNBC is not just counting on that to be true. The network is built around it.

The news outlet is hyper-focused on Trump's legal jeopardy, with a team of experts ready to dissect every has seen success - even with some Republicans - with potential for more and the obvious questions of what happens when the bubble bursts.

"MSNBC has pretty well-established themselves as the leading anti-Trump network, certainly of late," said Jon Klein, a former CNN president and news analyst. "Once you've chosen

your lane, you may as well go for it."

Certainly, the recipient of its attention has noticed.

In a late September post on Truth Social, Trump complained about "one-sided and vicious coverage" on NBC News and, particularly, MSNBC. He said they should Trump Trump of Russia and "other things" amounted to a campaign

contribution to Democrats.

The network would not make anyone available to talk about its strategy. MSNBC's prime-time viewership was up slightly over last year in the third quar-ter, while CNN and Fox News Channel saw double-digit declines, according to the Nielsen company. So far this year, Fox has averaged 2.18 million viewers, MSNBC 1.51 million and CNN 639,000. Without making clear how many of its viewers are Republicans, MSNBC said its GOP audience in-

creased 24% this spring, compared to 2022, and 37% in a middle America region that includes Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Illinois and Iowa.

The rapid advancement of cord cutting has shrunk the number of available viewers for cable networks, and it's still uncertain where news streaming will settle. That makes it more important than ever for a network to identify a specific audience it wants to serve. Fox News has made billions of dollars through that strategy.

Attention

Emphasizing one story to the near-exclusion of others has happened in spurts before, such as CNN's allconsuming attention to the missing Malaysia Airlines flight in 2014 and MSNBC during Trump's impeachments

This story is unlikely to fade from the headlines anytime soon.

During the first day of Trump's civil trial in New York on fraud charges Monday, it was the lead story on each one of MSNBC's shows from 3 p.m. to midnight. Nicolle Wallace discussed it for a half hour in the afternoon, capped off with some caustic com-mentary from a regular analyst, former Missouri Sen. Claire McCaskill.

Joy Reid predicted the trial would "completely shatter whatever remains of the myth of Trump as an extremely wealthy and successful businessman - you know, the original big lie." Half of Jen Psaki's prime-time show was devoted to the topic, with former Manhattan District Attorney Cyrus Vance Jr. and former New York US Attorney Preet Bharara as guests. Rachel Maddow, as is her wont, took a circuitous route to the story, comparing former President Jimmy Carter's effort to eliminate the guinea worm with Trump's ex-presidency.

Apollo opens his heart in 'Live For Me'

Other regulars are Neal Katyal, a former acting solicitor general who frequently argued before the US Supreme Court and co-authored the book, "Impeach: The Case Against Donald Trump"; Barbara McQuade, a former US attorney in Michigan; and Joyce Vance, a former US attorney in Alabama.

During a recent appearance, Weissmann worried that he was getting lost in the weeds discussing a judge's options to sanction Trump for speaking out on one of the cases against him.

"You're in a safe space, Andrew," host Psaki said. "This is a safe space for nerds."

LAS VEGAS: The man charged with murder in the 1996 killing of Tupac Shakur had little to say when he was arrested outside Las Vegas. But Duane "Keffe D" Davis knew the gravity of it, according to police body camera footage released Friday.

"So what they got you for, man?" an officer out of the frame later asks Davis. 60, who is sitting handcuffed in a police car parked outside the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department's headquarters.

"Biggest case in Las Vegas history," Davis replied, recounting the date, "September 7th, 1996.'

Shakur was fatally shot that night. "I ain't worried about ... I ain't did

(expletive)," Davis told the officer as his voice trails off.

Police and prosecutors allege Davis was the mastermind behind the drive-by shooting off the Las Vegas Strip. The four videos released Friday, totaling about an hour, show Davis arrested on Sept. 29 while walking near his home in an otherwise quiet neighborhood. In mid-July, police raided Davis' home, renewing interest in hip-hop's most enduring mystery.

Davis had been a long-known suspect in the case, and publicly admitted his role in the killing in interviews ahead of his 2019 tell-all memoir, "Compton Street Legend."

The self-described gangster hasn't yet entered a plea in the case, and he denied a request from The Associated Press for an interview from the jail where he's being held without bond. His longtime lawyer in Los Angeles, Edi Faal, said he had no comment on Davis' behalf. The body camera videos show officers approaching Davis and calling out to him from across the street.

"Hey, Keffe, Metro Police. Come over here," an officer said. (AP)

Verstappen follows up F1 title with victory at Qatar GP

LOSAIL, Qatar, Oct 9, (AP): Max Verstappen followed up his third Formula One title with yet another race win Sunday as he eased to victory in the Qatar Grand Prix.

The Red Bull driver, who clinched the title in Saturday's sprint race, started on pole and was comfortably ahead of the rest of the field on his way to his 14th Grand Prix win in 2023

Oscar Piastri and Lando Norris fin-

ished second and third in a double podium finish for McLaren.

"I think what made the race was my first stint, and after that I could just manage my pace, making sure that the tires were in a good window," Ver-stappen said. "But the McLarens were quick again today. I had to push for it. It's definitely a tough race out there." The two Mercedes of George Russell and Lewis Hamilton started behind Verstappen on the grid but collided at the first corner, ending seven-time champion Hamilton's race. Piastri charged through for second place as

Fernando Alonso and Charles Leclerc ahead of him slowed to avoid the crash. Second place continues an impressive streak for Australian rookie Piastri, who achieved his first career podium finish at the Japanese Grand Prix two weeks ago and won the Qatar sprint race Saturday. Piastri told his team it was "probably

the hardest race I've ever had in my life," adding his thanks for "whoever bowled everyone over at turn one," in

a reference to the Mercedes crash. Norris has been on the podium for

four races in a row including the sprint - though a first career win still eludes the British driver because of Verstappen's domination.

Hamilton told his team on the formation lap that he was concerned about being "a sitting duck" at the start with faster cars behind. His race was over at the first corner.

With Hamilton to his left and Verstappen to his right, Russell had no-

where to go when Hamilton turned in on him and both Mercedes span into the gravel. Russell was able to continue but had to pit for damage and dropped to the back. He fought his way back through the field to finish fourth ahead of Ferrari driver Leclerc and Aston Martin's Alonso.

Portugal pull off stunner at WCup

Fiji advance to last 8 despite loss

PARIS, Oct 9, (AP): Portugal will be by far the happiest of the teams going home early from the Rugby World Cup.

The Portuguese pulled off a stunner of an upset with a late try followed by a conversion in the dying seconds to beat Fiji 24-23 for their first ever World Cup win and a storming end to their campaign and the tournament's pool stage on Sunday.

Fiji squeaked through with a losing bonus point to be the last team to make it to the quarterfinals, but the manner of progression was nowhere near what the Flying Fijians, or the rest of the rugby world, were expecting.

RUGBY

Having twice led, Os Lobos - the Wolves - of Portugal were 23-17 down with two minutes to go and facing another near-miss. Right wing Raffaele Storti picked up from the back of a ruck, went belting down the short side and flicked inside to fellow wing Rodrigo Marta to score and set up a conversion for history.

Two weeks ago at the same stadium in Toulouse, Portugal missed a last-second kick and the chance of a breakthrough win in an 18-18 draw with Georgia.

This time, scrumhalf Samuel Marques stroked it sweetly home.

Marques' clutch kick and the result turned the Rugby World Cup on its head just for a moment, even if it ultimately had no bearing on the final eight teams in the competition.

But tell the Portuguese that it didn't meant anything. After flyhalf Jeronimo Portela hoofed the ball out to confirm the victory, Portugal's players leaped into each other's arms to celebrate their biggest result ever. Players streamed off the bench to join in.

tryline. He made up for that as Portugal twice went ahead early in the second half. Storti roared over in the right corner in the 45th after a scorching attack for 10-3, and 38-year-old prop Francisco Fernandes ground over from close range to make it 17-10.

Both times Fiji hit back to level, though flanker Levani Botia to make it 10-10 and then replacement prop Mesake Doge to tie it up again at 17-17.

Doge drove over following a period of play where Fiji's forwards started to gain dominance and it appeared the Portugal challenge had been subdued.

With Fiji rampaging forward in the last 10 minutes, scrumhalf Frank Lomani kicked penalties in the 74th and 76th minutes to push the Fijians to 23-17 and ahead for the first time since the first half. That appeared to be the end of it.

Portugal weren't done, and Storti set up Portuguese rugby history with his run down the right wing to catch out the Fijian defense. Two defenders finally closed him down, but Marta was on his shoulder to score and Marques was nerveless to make sure this opportunity didn't slip

Tonga leave the Rugby World Cup with a win after overpowering Romania in their pool finale.

Both teams were drowned by Ireland, South Africa and Scotland in the deepest pool of the tournament, but against each other the 'Ikale Tahi and Oaks found a contest in which they could express more of themselves and triggered an entertaining 10-try farewell.

Tonga blasted to 21-3 and Romania came back to close within four points twice. Tonga pulled away in the last quarter when its zippier backs added three more tries for seven in total.

The Tongans' highest score and biggest margin in Rugby World Cup history ensured a win at a fifth consecutive tournament.

Lukaku scores 2

Roma rout Cagliari, Napoli



Lukaku scored twice in Roma's 4-1 win at last-place Cagliari in Serie A on Sunday to raise his tally to seven goals in eight matches across all competitions with the Giallorossi.

"A lot of things were said about me but I worked hard over the summer," Lukaku said. "I'm a professional."

Dybala exited the match in the first half with a left knee issue - having missed long stretches of last season due to injuries. Lukaku used his chest to redirect in

a cross from Rick Karsdorp following a set up from Leonardo Spinazzola early on. Then he took a pass from Leandro Paredes to score again with a precise shot from inside the area in the 87th. Houssem Aouar had put Roma ahead a minute before Lukaku's first goal and Andrea Belotti also scored for the Giallorossi after replacing Dybala. Nahitan Nandez converted a late penalty for Cagliari. Lukaku, who joined Roma on loan in August, has also been key in the Europa League. He scored the winner in Roma's opening 2-1 vic-tory over Sheriff and had the first goal in a 4-0 win over Servette on Thursday. Lukaku said Roma coach Jose Mourinho was fundamental in his decision to move to the capital. "I have a special relationship with (Mourinho). He knows my family. He knows my kids," Lukaku said. "I really have confidence in him and he really has confidence in me."

Midfielder Vitinha, right back Achraf Hakimi and forward Randal Kolo Muani scored to hand Rennes their first defeat of the season. PSG star Kylian Mbappé, the league's top scorer with seven goals, blazed his shot over with the goal at his mercy late on.

Earlier, Gennaro Gattuso secured his first win as Marseille coach and striker Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang got his first league goal for the club in a 3-0 home win against 10man Le Havre to move up to sixth place.

Gattuso, the former Italy and AC Milan midfielder, took charge after Marcelino stood down amid tensions between fans and club management.

After midfielder Iliman Ndiaye's cross led to an own-goal from central defender Arouna Sangante in the 18th minute, the former Borussia Dortmund and Arsenal striker Aubameyang scored three minutes later with a clip over the goalkeeper after being set up by Morocco midfielder Amine Harit.

Le Havre midfielder Rassoul Ndiaye was sent off in the 40th minute for a second yellow card, and Aubameyang broke down the right before setting up Ismaila Sarr in the 84th.

Elsewhere, forward Martin Satriano scored in the third minute of injury time as Brest salvaged a 1-1 draw at

Clermont was trailing 4-2 away to Montpellier when the game was abandoned in injury time after a firework thrown from the stands landed next to Clermont goalkeeper Mory Diaw, who received treatment before being stretchered off.

It was not clear if the French league would award Montpellier the win.

Lens drew 1-1 at home to seventhplace Lille in their northern derby.

Bukayo Saka will miss England's two games in the upcoming international break because of a hamstring injury, Arsenal manager Mikel Arteta said

Saka missed Arsenal's 1-0 win over Manchester City in the Premier League after limping off during a Champions League loss to Lens in midweek. It ended Saka's run of 87 consecutive Premier League appear-ances and Arteta said after the game he will miss England's friendly against Australia on Friday and the European Championship qualifier against Italy four days later.

"No, he will not make it," Arteta said. "He has not trained for a single session. He is not available to play football at the moment."

Roma moved up to 10th while Cagliari remained winless - leaving coach Claudio Ranieri at risk.

Defending champions Napoli were beaten at home for the second time in the league this season, falling 3-1 to Fiorentina - last season's Europa Conference League finalists.

Giacomo Bonaventura scored the second goal for the Viola midway through the second half, shooting in from 12 yards after an accidental assist from Alfred Duncan.

The 34-year-old Bonaventura has been involved in the most goals among Serie A midfielders this season with four scores and two assists and on Friday was named to Italy's squad for the first time in three years.

Josip Brekalo had put Fiorentina ahead early on by shooting through the legs of Napoli goalkeeper Alex Meret from a tight angle. Then Victor Osim-hen equalized with a penalty in firsthalf stoppage time.

Substitute Nico Gonzalez sealed it for Fiorentina by finishing off a counterattack in second-half stoppage time.

Napoli was also beaten by Lazio at the Stadio Diego Armando Maradona in early September.

Fiorentina moved up to fourth, three points ahead of fifth-place Napoli.

It was the second home loss in six days for Napoli after also getting beat-en by Real Madrid, 3-2, in the Champions League on Tuesday.

Lazio gave up a two-goal advan-tage but still managed to beat visiting Atalanta 3-2 at the Stadio Olimpico.

Saudi Arabia formally informs FIFA of its wish to host 2034 World Cup

GENEVA, Oct 9, (AP): Saudi Arabia formally informed FIFA of its wish to host the men's World Cup in 2034 on Monday in a bidding contest that increasingly looks designed for the kingdom to win.

The Saudi Arabian soccer federation said it "submitted a letter of intent and signed declaration to FIFA to bid" in a vote that is open only to members of the Asian and Oceania soccer governing bodies.

FIFA fast-tracked starting the 2034 contest last week after its ruling body also agreed to accept only one candidate for the 2030 World Cup - now an unprecedented sixnation, three-continent co-hosting plan in Europe, Africa and South America that removed those continents from bidding to get back-toback tournaments.

The Spain-Portugal-Morocco-Argentina-Paraguay-Uruguay project in 2030 will follow the inaugural 48-team, 104-game tournament in 2026 in the United States, Mexico and Canada. That allows the 2034 edition to return to Asia 12 years after Qatar hosted the 2022 World Cup.

Last week, FIFA set tight dead-

lines of Oct. 31 to formally express interest in hosting and Nov. 30 to return a signed bidding agreement that requires the support of national governments.

Australian soccer officials have shown interest in the 2034 tournament after successfully co-hosting the 32-team women's edition with New Zealand two months ago, but they now have only eight weeks to produce a bidding agreement.

Australia also may be short of the FIFA-demanded seven existing stadiums on a minimum slate of 14 soccer-suitable venues of at least 40,000-seating capacity.

Saudi Arabia, which is preparing to host the 2027 Asian Cup, meets that FIFA criteria.

The Saudi Arabian soccer federation also cited public pledges of support from "over 70" of FIFA's 211 member federations. The aim is "unlocking new football

opportunities at all levels and commitment to support the growth of the game across all corners of the globe,"

said the Saudi federation, which has been signing working agreements with national and continental soccer bodies around the world over the past two years.

late next year, though the 37-member FIFA Council chaired by president Gianni Infantino has already shaped the process.

Infantino has built close ties to Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman on frequent visits to the oilrich kingdom since before the 2018 World Cup.

The Saudi soccer project has seen the sovereign wealth Public Investment Fund buy English club New-castle in 2021. PIF also took majority control this year of four leading Saudi clubs which have spent massively this season on bringing players from European clubs, including Neymar and Karim Benzema. A Saudi-hosted World Cup, as

in Qatar last year, likely would be played in November-December during the heart of the European season, and that will require dealing with influential European clubs and domestic leagues.

The FIFA Council which agreed to the 2034 World Cup bidding process included nine delegates from European soccer body UEFA, which now has the 2030 tournament.

The council was scheduled in June to approve bidding rules for 2030 but delayed that decision days after the Greek government said a speculated Saudi-led co-hosting plan that also included Egypt had been dropped.

New Zealand claim another emphatic Cricket WC victory

HYDERABAD, India, Oct 9, (AP): Mitchell Santner became the first New Zealand spinner to grab a five-wicket haul at a Cricket World Cup as the Black Caps thumped the Netherlands by 99 runs on Monday to claim their second successive victory in the tournament.

New Zealand didn't feel the absence of captain Kane Williamson for the second game in a row as it powered to 322-7 on a slow, dry wicket, with top-order batters Will Young (70), stand-in skipper Tom Latham (53) and Rachin Ravindra (51) all shining.

CRICKET

Santner, who also made a quickfire unbeaten 36 off 17 balls, then took 5-59 with his left-arm spin as the Netherlands was bowled out for 223 in 46.3 overs.

It was the Netherlands' second

their narrow defeat in the 2019 World Cup final after beating England by nine wickets in Ahmedabad last week.

One of the heroes of that win, Devon Conway, and opening partner Young provided a solid stand of 67, but not before the Netherlands had bowled three successive maidens up front.

Conway, who struck an unbeaten 152 against England, holed out at long-on after scoring 32 but Ravindra carried on where he left off in his magnificent unbeaten century against the defending champions.

Ravindra and Young complied a 77-run stand before New Zealand tried to switch gears in the latter half of the innings. Young was caught at mid-on after hitting seven fours and two sixes in his 80-ball knock and Ravindra edged left-arm spinner Roelof van der Merwe down the leg side soon after completing his half century.

Atletico keep winning

MADRID, Oct 9, (AP): **Barcelona teenager Lamine** Yamal added his name to the record books again on Sunday, becoming the youngest scorer in the Spanish league in Barcelona's 2-2 draw at Granada.

At the age of 16 years, 87 days, Yamal surpassed Malaga player Fabrice Olinga, who was 16 years, 98 days old when he scored against Celta Vigo in 2012.

Yamal scored his milestone goal by pushing a loose ball into the open net in first-half stoppage time.

He was already the youngest player to debut in the league, and the youngest to start in the Champions League. Yamal also has the record for youngest to play for Barcelona from last season. He became the youngest scorer in a European Championship qualifier after coming on last month as the youngest player to appear for Spain.

"When we see that a player can help the team, we give him the opportunity," Barcelona coach Xavi said. "Lamine is helping us a lot and making a difference. He scored an important goal."

Yamal's goal helped Barcelona pull

closer after Bryan Zaragoza put the hosts 2-0 ahead with a couple of goals in the first half-hour, including one less than 20 seconds into the match at Los Carmenes Stadium. His second came in the 29th minute after a couple of nifty moves to clear a defender inside the area.

Sergi Roberto equalized in the 85th for Barcelona, which almost left with the victory when João Félix scored in stoppage time but saw the goal called back because of an offside by Ferran Torres.

The result left defending cham-

pions Barcelona in third place, one point behind fellow Catalan club Girona and two behind rivals Real Madrid. Both Girona and Madrid won Saturday.

Barcelona were without striker Robert Lewandowski because of an injury. Midfielder Fermín López made his debut at 20 as a starter with the Catalan club.

Barcelona lost defender Jules Koundé with an injury just before halftime. It was the third straight draw for Granada, which stayed in second-tolast place.

Griezmann converted from the spot in the 89th minute following a hand ball to move the team to fourth place. Sociedad stayed sixth with their first setback after four consecutive wins.

Atletico had won three consecutive league games and beat Feyenoord 3-2 in the group stage of the Champions League on Wednesday. Diego Simeone's team are unbeaten at home since January, with 15 wins and one draw in all competitions.

Atletico's home winning streak in the league reached 13 matches, one short of their best-ever run from 2012-13.

Samuel Lino put the hosts ahead by scoring his first goal with Atletico in the 22nd before Mikel Oyarzabal equalized in a breakaway in the 73rd. Griezmann, a former Sociedad player, calmly rolled his penalty into the corner to secure Atletico the victory. The France forward has scored four goals in his last five matches with Atletico.

The result kept Atletico unbeaten in their last eight league matches against Sociedad, with five wins and three draws since 2019.

Sociedad had won four in a row and hadn't conceded in its last three games in all competitions, including a 2-0 win at Salzburg in the group stage of the Champions League, a competition it hadn't played in nearly a decade.
