Kuwaiti charity delivers much-wanted aid to Gazans



BAGHDAD: Iraq wants to build a sustainable partnership with the US based on mutual respect, and maintaining Iraq's security, sovereignty and territorial integrity, Iraqi Prime Minister Mohammad Al-Sudani said in a speech aired by his media office prior to his visit to Washington on Saturday.

The aim of Al-Sudani's visit is to discuss bilateral relations, and some regional dossiers and the war in the besieged **Gaza Strip**, the office said.

The meeting with US President **Joe Biden** would focus on conditions in the region, escalation and the joint role played in making lull and avoiding spillover of the conflict, it added. (KUNA)

WASHINGTON: US President Joe Biden, late Friday, warned of the consequences of an Iranian attack against the Israeli occupation in retaliation to the former attack on the Iranian consulate in Damascus earlier in April.

Speaking to the press, Biden said that Washington was committed to defending the Israeli occupation, warning **Tehran** from carrying out any attack.

He predicted that the attack would occur "sooner than later" without providing any further details. (KUNA)

WASHINGTON: The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) raised alarm Thursday about a looming Islamic Group coordinated attack inside the **United States**.

"Now increasingly concerning is the potential for a coordinated attack here in the homeland, akin to the ISIS-K attack we saw at the **Russia** concert hall a couple weeks ago," Director **Christopher Wray** told the Congress today, using an acronym for the Islamic State's Afghan affiliate. Al-Saadoun backs Amiri Decree constitutionality

KUWAIT CITY, April 13: The inaugural session of the 18th National Assembly will be held on April 17 in accordance with Article 87 of the Constitution despite the issuance of an Amiri decree on postponing the session until May 14 as per Article 106 of the Constitution.

MP-elect Saleh Ashour will chair the inaugural session as the oldest elected lawmaker.

The reason behind postponing the inaugural session is that the two-week grace period for holding the session after the elecion is not enough to form the new government, considering more than one personality have declined to head the new government.

On the other hand, some believe that Article 106 is not applicable to the inaugural session because it includes the election of parliamentary leaders, formation of committees, oath taking of the newly elected MPs, granting parliamentary immunity to the MPs, and launching of monitoring and legislation works.

They consider the postponement a hindrance to the legislative authority and a violation of Article 50 of the Constitution, which mandates the executive authority to monitor the performance of the legislature. They argued that it is unconstitutional to postpone the inaugural session, because it is not part of the urgent tasks of a caretaker government. GAZA, April 13, (Agencies): The Kuwaiti Relief Society has distributed meat to war-afflicted families in Gaza after the fasting month of Ramadan.

Omar Al-Thuwaini, the society's deputy director general, said in remarks to KUNA on Friday that the society, in coordination with the charities "Wafa" and "Rahma," distributed during the three-day Eid Al-Fitr 52 tons of meat to the poor, displaced families and those affected with the Israeli aggression on South Gaza.

The relief activity was supported by the State of Kuwait Al-Awqaf General Secretariat.

Meanwhile, "Wafa" director general Muhaisen Al-Atawneh, said 10,000 relocated families in the enclave received amounts of donated meat during the Eid. His peer at "Rahma," Mohammad Qaddous, said Kuwait, since the start of the Israeli aggression in early October, has doubled the aid sent to Gaza via the air, the land and sent in medical teams to treat the injured.

Much of the aid supplies that had been sent to Gaza or dropped from the air were cereals. The meat had been scarce in the shell-devastated and beleaguered strip.



Kuwaiti stabbed: Personnel from the Criminal Investigation Department are looking for an unidentified person for stabbing a Kuwaiti citizen born in 1998, reports Al-Ânba daily.

A security source told Al-Anba, after a report was received by the Jahra Operations Room at 3:15 am, Friday, a patrol was directed to the site of the report and it was found that the injured person was suffering from severe to moderate injuries.

Upon questioning the injured person stated that he was in his vehicle in the Al-Mutlaa area, kilometer 10, with his friend, who is residing in the country illegally, and that he stabbed him with a knife after a dispute, and then he took him to Al-Jahra Hospital, threw him in front of the hospital gate and escaped. The medical report shows a deep wound in the right forearm, another deep wound in the left forearm and suspected severing of the right brachial artery, and abrasions and bruises in the feet.

Drug peddlers held: Personnel from the Criminal Investigation Department have arrested two young men for promoting drugs.

The Al-Seyassah daily said the suspects were taken into custody in the Taima area, in possession of approximately 100,000 Lyrica pills and special tools for manufacturing narcotic pills.

Over 21,000 traffic violations in week; 130 cars impounded

KUWAIT CITY, April 13: In compliance with the instructions of Assistant Undersecretary for Operations and Traffic Affairs at the Ministry of Interior Major General Yousef Al-Khadda, the Traffic Sector carried out a weeklong campaign that resulted in the issuance of 21,858 citations for various violations; impounding of 130 vehicles; arrest of 48 violators and reckless persons; refer-

ral of 23 juveniles ٩ to the Juvenile Prosecution; arrest of 12 persons wanted by law for involvement in security and criminal cases; and six others for the possession and consumption of narcotic substances, reports

Al-Khadda Al-Jarida daily. Officer in the Public Relations and

Traffic Awareness Unit at the General Traffic Department (GTD) Lieutenant Colonel Abdullah Bu Hassan disclosed that the Traffic Sector had earlier laid down an integrated traffic and security plan; covering all roundabouts, main roads, highways and external roads to ensure the smooth flow of traffic in the last week of Ramadan.

He revealed that certain roads witnessed major traffic jams; especially those near the mosques, worship places, commercial complexes and public markets.

He said the continuous field monitoring indicated an increase in the number of reckless drivers including juveniles who were driving without a license before the breaking of fast.

He added the plan was implemented through the coordinated efforts of the traffic departments in the six governorates, Traffic Operations Department, Special Traffic Tasks Department and Traffic Investigation Department.

He affirmed that the traffic and rescue patrols from various departments controlled the security and traffic situation in front of mosques, places of worship, complexes and markets.

He stated that they arrested reckless people in residential areas and other locations throughout the country; in addition to the issuance of 21,000 traffic citations and impounding of 130 vehicles. He added serious traffic violations were uncovered, such as reckless driving, speeding and intentional disruption of traffic movement, particularly in front of commercial complexes.

He confirmed the traffic and rescue personnel arrested 23 juveniles for driving without a license, impounded 25 illegal motorcycles, nabbed some motorcycle riders who drove beyond the speed limit and performed stunts on the roads, and 48 individuals were arrested for recklessness on the roads. All those arrested were taken to the detention centers of the General Traffic Department, he added.

He went on to say that 12 persons wanted by law for involvement in security and criminal cases were arrested and referred to the Sentences Enforcement General Department; while six others were arrested for the consumption of narcotics with narcotic substances and drug paraphernalia in their possession. These six individuals were referred to the Drug Control General Department.

We are part of this world, and the closest to societies, whose members have been exposed to severe family shocks as a result of their situation changing to another in a very short period. The enormous wealth that fell upon many changed the souls and made every forbidden thing permissible in the eyes of the deprived. Drugs, lack of community and school awareness, and the spread of ignorance contributed to the expansion of all evils.

All attempts to "discipline" those who seek to shed light on the truth about the "ethics" of our societies are doomed to failure. The solution lies in the scientific and modern confrontation of these dangerous and deadly problems, and not in denying their existence!

Owner faces legal action

Team tours gold shops, detects some violations

KUWAIT CITY, April 13: The Farwaniya Emergency Team at the Ministry of Commerce and Industry conducted an inspection tour in a number of shops selling gold jewelry in Farwaniya to ensure their compliance with applicable decisions and laws, reports Al-Anba daily.

This is part of the extensive inspection tours carried out by the ministry's supervisory teams.


The recent inspection led to the discovery of the violation of one gold shop -- failure to provide data on the price of gold per karat and the price of workmanship. Legal measures were taken against the owner of the shop.

Director General of the department Brigadier General Muhammad Qabazard, resulted in curbing the trade and peddling of narcotic substances and confronting them by all means.

He highlighted the referral to the Public Prosecution five customs employees in two separate cases for facilitating the entry of narcotic substances into the country through the airport and Salmi port. The source explained that one of the most prominent seizures was that of one million Larica pills that were being brought in through the airport. Two Kuwaiti citizens were arrested in this regard.

Another important seizure was the confiscation of 350 kilograms of hashish that was coming from Iran via sea. About four Iranians, a Kuwaiti citizen, and an Egyptian were arrested in this case. The source affirmed that the anti-narcotics detective teams are continuing investigations and collecting information to arrest smugglers and drug dealers by tracking their movements and monitoring them.

Energy crisis looms as electricity production 'stagnant' for 4 years

'MEW need to take action in new government formation'

KUWAIT CITY, April 13: According to informed sources, it has been exactly four years since the launch of the project to install a combined cycle gas turbine at Subbiya Power Station with a production capacity of 932 megawatts on April 7, 2021.

They explained that the ministry, since that date, has not added a single megawatt to the electricity net-

work. The total production of electrical energy in the country stopped at 18,500 megawatts from all stations affiliated with the ministry. Stopping productivity at this number is not in line with the steady annual population increase and the government expansion in establishing new residential

cities that need large amounts of electrical energy as a basic service to be provided for any new urban community.

Failure

The stability of electricity productivity and the failure to establish new production stations and projects have exacerbated the problem and turned it into a real crisis that will prevent the ministry from being able to fully guarantee the continuity of these supplies and deal with the inability to confront the deficit in providing this necessary and vital service, and the smallest negative consequences caused in the country when it is interrupted.

The signs of the crisis had already begun during the summer of 2023, with loads reaching very high levels and power outages occurring in some areas of the country, either sudden or arranged by the ministry.

'Distillers out of service'

MEW uses strategic water reserve due to 'rising consumption' rates

KUWAIT CITY, April 13: As water consumption rates continue to rise, because distillers are out of service for periodic maintenance; the Ministry of Electricity and Water started using the strategic reserve, especially since the difference reached about 43 million imperial gallons last week, reports Al-Anba daily quoting sources.

Sources revealed that fresh water consumption is distributed across residential and investment sectors, and that citizens constitute 86.04 percent (79,119) of the total freshwater customers. The percentage of investment housing is 7.60 percent, followed by commercial housing with 4.35 percent, other types of housing like cabins and chalets with 1.11 percent, industrial housing with 0.41 percent, agricultural with 0.32 percent, and government with 0.17 percent.

Sources said the total capacity of the fresh

Sources pointed out that a number of distilleries are still under maintenance as scheduled, which usually end at the beginning of the peak season.

In another development, the ministry announced the complete restoration of power to Blocks Five and Six in Salmiya after the recent disruption, as four sub-feeders at the main substation 'Al-Ras M' were out of service.

The ministry affirmed that the emergency teams were immediately dispatched to the affected locations and the necessary repairs were made until power was restored.

for electricity specified for them, instead of resorting to patchwork solutions such as allocating a budget to purchase energy from the Gulf Cooperation Council countries, as it happened in the expired budget which allocated KD 30 million for this purpose and obtained approvals to contract with international companies to supply electrical energy if necessary.

The sources indicated that the ministry will skip the 2024 summer season in light of the very difficult challenges and risks due to limited productivity and expectations of high levels of loads during the summer.

They said, "Last summer, the country recorded the highest rates in the history of Kuwait at 16,500 megawatts. The maximum load will reach 17,250 megawatts during next summer, according to the ministry's expectations.'

Marwan was defeated and returned to the Levant. The Abbasids followed him, and he fled to Egypt. They pursued him and killed him in the village of Busir, in the last month of the same year. With his death, the Umayyad caliphate fell, because the caliph did not work to gather his family and stabilize his state.

Instead of spending on his people, he worked to please the Umayyads with money, but he did not satisfy their hunger, while the state was suffering from unrest. Each of its governors was working to turn his supporters against the other."

Municipality okays new parking space for Jahra Equestrian Club

KUWAIT CITY, April 13: Kuwait Municipality approved the request of the Public Authority for Sports (PAS) to allocate surface for parking in front of the Jahra Equestrian Club with dimensions of approximately 450mx17.50m and an area of 7,875 square meters, according to the coordinates shown in the sketch attached to the transaction, and linking them to the existing parking lots within the boundaries of the equestrian club.

The technical opinion for the transaction approved by the Director General of the Municipality Saud Al-Dabbous stipulated adherence to the requirements contained in the responses of the members of the Public Services Facilities Subcommittee at its meeting held on March 14, 2024, and coordination with them before implementation.

The most prominent among them is the confirmation of the Public Authority for Agricultural Affairs and Fish Resources to maintain distance from the agricultural and irrigation project on both sides of the road, which is 100 meters away from the right of way and 120 meters wide, as well as the necessity of keeping distance from the project boundaries by 10 meters on both sides, making minutes of a meeting before starting the work, and coordinating with the engineer responsible for the site.

In addition to this is the requirement of the General Traffic Department of the Ministry of Interior to provide it with detailed plans showing the entrances and exits to and from the project for study.

The administration is also authorized to modify the dimensions and area of the parking lots to no more than the designated spaces, in the event that it conflicts with any existing infrastructure services or any regulatory reasons during installation. MoSA extends debt payment campaign

KUWAIT CITY, April 13: Pahela Baishakh or Bangla Noboborsho is the first day of Bengali Calendar. It is celebrated on 14 April as a national holiday in Bangladesh. In Bengali, the word Pohela means 'first' and Boishakh is the first month of the Bengali Year. Bengali New Year is referred to in Bengali as Noboborsho where 'Nobo' means new and 'Borsho' means year.

Traditional roots

During the Mughal rule, land taxes were collected from Bengali people according to the Islamic Hijri calendar. This calendar was a lunar calendar, and its new year did not coincide with the solar agricultural cycles. According to some sources, the festival was a tradition introduced in Bengal during the rule of Mughal Emperor Akbar to time the tax year to the harvest and the Bangla year was there called "Bangabda".

The celebrations start at dawn with a rendition of Rabindranath Tagore's song "Esho he Boishakh" by Chhayanaut under the banyan tree at Ramna at Dhaka. An integral part of the festivities is the "Mangal Shobhajatra", a traditional colourful procession organised by the students of the Faculty of Fine Arts, University of Dhaka. "Mangal Shobhajatra" is a mass procession that takes place at dawn on the first day of the Bengali New Year in Bangladesh. of the year auspicious. Three ethnic communities come together to celebrate Pahela Baishakh. 'Boishuk' of the Tripura, 'Sangrai' of the Marma and 'Biju' of the Chakma are often celebrated together as 'Boi-Sa-Bi' These differ from traditional Pahela Baishakh celebrations. Festivities in the hills begin on the last day of the month of Chaitra (last month of Bengali Year) and continue for three or more days. Religious rituals are often part of these festivals. The festivals are celebrated in many ways. Children and youth people enjoy the day by wearing new dress, visiting friends and relatives house and take Panchan, a special vegetable dish prepared for the occasion.

they get prepared to recognize Palestine's state.

Speaking in a joint news conference following a meeting on the situation in Gaza and the Middle East region, Norway's Premier Jonas Gahr Store and his Spanish counterpart Pedro Sanchez stressed that they would back the recognition of Palestine's state as a UN full membership.

Store underlined the necessity of an immediate ceasefire, releasing hostages and facilitating Spanish aid, referring that both Spain and Norway are coordinating together in this regard.

Meanwhile, Sanchez said that the situation in Gaza is catastrophic and that it is not allowed to kill further innocent civilians.

He also warned against the spread of conflict to other parts in the Middle East region, affirming the need of an immediate ceasefire and allowing humanitarian institutions to work without any threats.

The two-state solution is the only way for security, safety and justice in the region, he said, affirming that it's time to recognize Palestine's state.

Sanchez renewed his call for holding an international peace conference as soon as possible to achieve peace in the region.

Spain will never spare efforts for peace and security in the Middle East region, he noted.

The Spanish premier is making a European trip, which started in Poland, to mobilize support to recognize Palestine's state.

In Riyadh, Saudi Foreign Minister Prince Faisal bin Farhan has discussed with US Secretary of State Antony Blinken the latest developments in the Gaza Strip.

This came in a phone call, initiated by Blinken Thursday, said the Saudi Foreign Ministry in a statement.

It added that the minister and the secretary reviewed efforts for de-escalation in the region and increasing the delivery of humanitarian aid into the Gaza Strip.

They also touched upon regional developments and several issues of common concern including the conflict in Sudan.

Egyptian President Abdelfattah El-Sisi called on the international community to assume its responsibility for de-escalation in the besieged Gaza Strip and protecting its people from the 7-month humanitarian crisis.

In a telephone call initiated by Austrian Chancellor Karl Nehammer on Thursday, El-Sisi warned against the perils of continued escalation and expanding the scope of the conflict, which poses threats to the region's security and stability.

Nehammer congratulated Al-Sisi on Eid al-Fitr, according to a statement by Egyptian presidential spokesman Ahmad Fahmy.

Dozens of Israeli settlers stormed into a Palestinian village in the Israeli-occupied West Bank on Friday, shooting and setting houses and cars on fire. Akbar asked the royal astronomer Fathullah Shirazi to create a new calendar by combining the lunar Islamic calendar and solar Hindu calendar already in use, and this was known as "Fosholi Shon (harvest calendar)". According to

Bengali calendar. According to the Bangladeshi academic and folklorist, the origin of the Bengali calendar is unclear. According to one, it is called Bangla shon or shaal, which are Arabic and Persian words respectively, suggests that it was introduced by a Muslim King or Sultan. In contrast, according to other, its traditional name is "Bangabda". It is also unclear, whether it was adopted by Alauddin Husain Shah or Akbar. The tradition to use the Bengali calendar may have been started by Husain Shah before Akbar. However, regardless of who adopted the Bengali calendar and the New Year, it helped collect land taxes after the spring harvest based on traditional Bengali calendar, because the Islamic Hijri calendar created administrative difficulties in setting the collection date.

There is another theory about the origin of the Bengali Calendar. Some historians attribute the Bengali calendar to the 7th-century King Shashanka. Because the term "Bangabda (Bangla year)" is also found in two Shiva temples of India many centuries older than Akbar era. These inscriptions suggest that the Bengali calendar existed before Akbar's time.

Celebration of Bengali New Year

The Bengali New Year is observed as a public holiday in Bangladesh. It is celebrated across religious boundaries by its Muslim majority and Hindu minority. The festival became a popular means of expressing cultural pride and heritage among the Bangladeshi.

The day is marked with singing, processions, and fairs. Traditionally, businesses start this day with a new ledger, clearing out the old. Singers perform traditional songs welcoming the New Year. People enjoy classical Jatra plays. People wear festive dress with women decorating their hair with flowers.

White-red color combinations are particularly popular.People of Bangladesh prepare and enjoy a variety of traditional festive foods The Bengali phrase "Mangal Shobhajatra" literally means "procession for well-being". Every year, thousands of people take part in the procession that features gigantic replicas of birds, fish, animals, folk tale and other motifs. The rally symbolizes unity, peace, and the driving away of evil to allow progress of country and humanity. It is considered as an expression of the secular identity of the Bengali people, uniting the country irrespective of class, age, religious faith, or gender.

Different cultural organizations and bands also perform on this occasion and fairs celebrating Bengali culture are organized throughout the country. Other traditional events held to celebrate Pohela Boishakh include bull racing, wrestling, boat racing, cockfights, etc.

UNESCO Recognition of "Mangal Shobhajatra"

In 2014 the Bangla Academy compiled a nomination file that was approved by the Ministry of Cultural Affairs of Bangladesh and submitted to UNESCO.On 30 November 2016 the "Mangal Shobhajatra" festival was selected as an intangible cultural heritage by the Inter-governmental Committee on Safeguarding Intangible Cultural Heritage of UNESCO at its 11th session, which was held in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

Boisabi Festival

Boisabi Festival is the celebration of the Bengali New Year by the indigenous communities living in Chittagong Hill Tracts in Bangladesh.

Some of the ethnic communities living in various parts of Bangladesh also celebrate the New Year but they each have a different name for it. The festivities get their respective unique approach. On this occasion the three hilly districts -- Rangamati, Bandarban and Khagrachhari -wear a festive look. The people of the hills consider the first day In the Marma community, they also celebrate by playing some games called Pani Khela (Sangrai), Alari khela and Dha-thu.

Goraia dance is very popular in the Tripura community. As a celebration of the festivals 10 to 100 artist perform the dance. The main theme of this dance is to show their daily lives and the steps of Jum cultivation.

The first day of the festival is called 'Phulbijhu' the second day is 'Mulbijhu' and third day or first day of the Bangla New Year is called 'Gojjya Pojjya Din'.

On the day of Phulbijhu, boys and girls wake up early in the morning and take birth with their parents and clean up houses and its surroundings and they decorate houses with different flowers. They also float flowers in rivers, canals and springs seeking blessing to God for eternal peace and prosperity.

Though the festival is related to the ethnic people but anyone can enjoy it with much enthusiasm. Tourists have flocked to the region to enjoy the traditional festival of the tribal people.

Secularism is one of the four fundamental principles according to the Constitution of Bangladesh. Over 90.4% of Bangladeshis are Muslims, the rest being Hindus 8.5%, Buddhists 0.6%, Christians 0.4%, and others 0.2%. People in Bangladesh observe various secular festivals at different times throughout the year with social and religion harmony and tranquillity

10 died from shelling in Zaporizhzhia region: At least 10 people, including children, died after shelling late on Friday struck a Russian-occupied town in Ukraine's southern Zaporizhzhia region, a local Kremlin-installed official said, blaming Ukraine for the attack.

Meanwhile, Ukrainian officials reported at least three civilian deaths elsewhere in the country that they said resulted from Russian attacks



Russian emergency services on Saturday were working in the rubble in hopes of saving civilians trapped undemeath the debris of their homes in Tokmak, in a part of southern Ukraine that Moscow has illegally annexed from Kyiv, according to the Kremlininstalled regional head Yevhen Balitsky. The Tokmak municipal adminis-

tration reported on Telegram that the shelling struck three apartment blocks on Friday evening. Five people were pulled alive from the rubble, Balitsky said, and a total of 13 people were hospitalized.

As of early afternoon on Saturday, Ukraine had not commented on the allegations. (AP)

Russia announces mass evacuation for Orenburg: Authorities in the Russian city of Orenburg, near the border with Kazakhstan, on Friday announced a mass evacuation from there after water levels in the Ural River rose further, threatening the area with more flooding. The Orenburg mayor, Sergei Salmin, called on the residents

in a statement on the messaging app Telegram in the morning to "urgently evacuate" as sirens rang out in the city.

"This is not a drill," Salmin wrote. "The flood situation in Orenburg is extremely dangerous. Over the past 10 hours, the water level in the Ural (River) has risen by 40 centim-eters and is now at 11.43 (meters). These values are dangerous.'

Images from the city showed entire districts submerged in water. (AP)

Draft docu could serve as starting point for talks: A draft peace agreement that Russia and Ukraine negotiated in the early days of the conflict could serve as a starting point for talks to end the fighting, the Kremlin said Friday, reviving a proposal that Ukraine had rejected.

Kremlin spokesperson Dmitry Peskov said that the draft document that was discussed in Istanbul in March 2022 could be "the basis for starting negotiations." At the same time, he noted that the possible future talks would need to take into account the "new realities.


In September 2022, Russia annexed four Ukrainian regions in a move that Kyiv and its Western allies have rejected as an unlawful. (AP)

Ukraine parliament passes controversial law: Ukraine's parliament passed a controversial law on how the country will call up new soldiers at a time when it needs to replenish depleted forces that are increasingly struggling to fend off Russia's advance.

The law was passed against a backdrop of an escalating Russian campaign that has devastated Ukraine's energy infrastructure in recent weeks. Authorities said overnight missile and drone attacks completely destroyed the Trypilska thermal power plant, the largest power-generating facility in the region of the country's capital.

Two years after Russia's full-scale invasion captured nearly a quarter of Ukraine, the stakes could not be higher for Kyiv. After a string of victories in the first year of the war, fortunes have turned for the Ukrainian military, which is dug in, outgunned and outnumbered. (AP)

House passes reauthorization of surveillance program

Biden and Trump did more harm than good

WASHINGTON, April 13, (AP): There's a reason why US President Joe Biden and former President Donald Trump are spending so much time attacking each other - people don't think either man has much to brag about when it comes to his own record. Americans generally think that while they were in the White House, both did more harm than good on key issues.

But the two candidates have different weak spots. For Biden, it's widespread unhappiness on two issues: the economy and immigration. Trump, meanwhile, faces an electorate where substantial shares think he harmed the country on a range of issues.

A new poll from the AP-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research finds that more than half of US adults think Biden's presidency has hurt the country on cost of living and immigration, while nearly half think Trump's presidency hurt the country on voting rights and election security, relations with foreign countries, abortion laws and climate change. "Considering the price of gas, the price of groceries, the economy - I did very well during those four years," Christina Elliott, 60, a Republican from Texas, said of the Trump presidency. "I didn't have to worry about filling up my tank or losing half of my paycheck to the grocery store."

criminalized the procedure in the state. When asked which president did more to help people like them, roughly one-third say Donald Trump and about one-quarter say Joe Biden. Yet 30% of adults said neither Biden nor Trump benefitted them. It's another data point reflecting an electorate that has been largely disappointed with this year's general election choices, generating little enthusiasm among key parts of the Biden and Trump political coalitions.

Americans rate Biden particularly negatively on a few specific issues. Only about 2 in 10 Americans think Biden's presidency helped "a lot" or "a little" on cost of living, and 16% say that about immigration and border security. Nearly 6 in 10 say his presidency hurt a lot or a little on these issues. Nearly half, 46%, of Americans, by contrast, say that Trump's presidency

Trump's advantage on the cost of living and immigration is driven partially by Democrats' lack of enthusiasm about Biden's performance. About one-third of Democrats, for example, think Biden's presidency hurt on cost of living, and another third think Biden neither helped nor hurt. Just one-third of Democrats think Biden's presidency helped on cost of living. Harris installed as Ireland's new PM: Lawmaker Simon Harris was elected Ireland's prime minister by a vote in parliament, becoming at 37 the country's youngest-ever leader.

Harris takes over as head of Ireland's three-party coalition government from Leo Varadkar, who announced his surprise resignation last month. Harris, who served as higher education minister in Varadkar's government, was the only candidate to replace him as head of the center-right Fine Gael partv.

Lawmakers in the Dáil, the lower house of Ireland's parliament, confirmed Harris as taoiseach, or prime minister, by a 88-69 vote. (AP)

Norway's health minister resigns: Norway's health minister resigned Friday, the second Norwegian government member to step down this year amid allegations they plagiarized academic works.

Ingvild Kjerkol resigned a day after a probe by Nord University in Bodoe in northern Norway, where Kjerkol, handed in her master thesis in 2021, concluded that "there is a not insignificant amount of plagiarism in her master's thesis.

"We have come to the conclusion that Ingvild should resign as minister," Prime Minister Jonas Gahr Støre told a press conference. He said the probe had concluded the plagiarism was "intentional."

Kjerkoll said she and a co-author "did not intend to plagiarize other people's assignments." (AP)

Belgium launches probe: Belgian Prime Minister Alexander De Croo announced on Friday an investigation into suspected Russian interference in June's Europe-wide elections, saying that his country's intelligence service has confirmed the existence of a network trying to undermine support for Ukraine.

"Belgian intelligence services have confirmed the existence of pro-Russian interference networks with activities in several European countries and also here in Belgium," said De Croo, whose country currently holds the rotating presidency of the European Union.(AP)

Belarus convicts dissident rock band: Belarusian authorities on Friday convicted a famous dissident rock band, designating the band and its three members as extremist and sentencing them to two years of correctional labor. It was the latest in a yearslong crackdown on dissent that has engulfed this country of 9.5 million people.

Nizkiz band members - Alyaksandr Ilyin, Siarhei Kulsha and Dzmitry Khalyaukin - were charged with "organizing and plotting actions grossly violating public order."

In 2020, when Belarus was rocked by mass protests that erupted after President Alexander Lukashenko won a sixth term in office in a disputed election, the band released "Rules," a song that became the protests' anthem. (AP)

A Texas semitrailer driver rammed a stolen 18-wheeler through the front of a public safety building where his renewal for a commercial driver's license had been rejected, killing one person and injuring 13 others, authorities said Friday.

The intentional crash into the single-story brick building off a highway in Brenham, a rural town outside of Houston, littered debris in the parking lot and left a gaping hole in the entrance. The crash damaged the front of the red semitrailer, which was hauling materials on a flatbed.

After crashing into the building the first time, the driver backed up the truck with the intention of smashing it again before being detained, Brenham Mayor Atwood Kenjura said

"It's unfortunate that we are here gathered for a really senseless tragedy," Kenjura said. (AP)

Judge refuses to dismiss Biden case: A federal judge in Delaware refused to throw out a federal gun case against Hunter Biden, rejecting the president's son's claim that he is being prosecuted for political pur-

poses as well as other arguments. US District Judge Maryellen Noreika's ruling increases the prospect that Biden could face trial in the case as early as June, in the midst of his father's reelection campaign. His efforts to scuttle the other criminal case he faces in California involving tax allegations have also failed.

Norieka denied several defense requests to dismiss the case charging Biden with lying about his drug use in October 2018 on a form to buy a gun that he kept for about 11 days.

Man gets 40 yrs to life: A California man was sentenced Friday to 40 years to life for the fatal shooting of a 6-year-old boy who was riding in the back of his mother's car on the freeway, prosecutors said.

Marcus Eriz, now 27, was sentenced in Orange County Superior Court in Santa Ana for killing Aiden Leos in May 2021 while the boy was on his way to kindergarten, the district attorney's office said in a statement.

Eriz was convicted by a jury in January of second-degree murder and shooting at an occupied motor vehicle.

"What he took was the life of a little six-year-old boy and the sense of security of drivers everywhere who worry that driving on our freeways could be a death sentence, not because of a crash but because of a bullet," Orange County District Attorney Todd Spitzer said in the statement. (ÅP)

Kenya flooding kills 13 Military trainers from Russia arrive in Niger

DAKAR, Senegal, April 13, (Agencies): Russian military trainers arrived this week in Niger to reinforce the country's air defenses as the west African nation pulls away from close cooperation with the United States in counterterrorism efforts, turning instead to Russia for security.

State television in Niger on Thursday broadcast footage of Russian military trainers arriving in the country aboard a plane equipped with military supplies. Two Russian trainers were filmed in front of the plane at night wearing military uniforms, caps and face coverings.

'We are here to train the Nigerien army to use the military equipment that is here," one of the Russian trainers said in the broadcast, speaking in French. "We



are here to develop military cooperation between Russia and Niger.'

Niger's ruling military council, known as the CNSP, has yet to order American troops out, U.S. officials have said. But the arrival of Russian forces makes it complicated for the US forces, along with diplomatic and civilian personnel, to remain in the country. It also throws into doubt the future of

joint Niger-U.S. counterinsurgency operations. Until recently, Washington considered Niger a key partner and ally in a region swept by coups in recent years, investing millions of dollars in an airbase in a desert area that served as the heart of American coun-

terinsurgency operations in Africa's sub-Saharan region known as the Sahel. The US also invested heavily in training Niger's forces to beat back insurgencies by militants linked to

al-Qaida and the Islamic State group, which ravaged the country and its neighbors. But last summer, some of those elite US-trained forces took part in a coup that ousted the elected president. Since then, relations between Niger's new leaders and Washington have deteriorated.

Following the visit last month of a US delegation led by the top US envoy to Africa, Molly Phee, the junta announced on state television that flights from the U.S.built airbase were illegal and that it no longer recognized the American military presence in the country.

Kenya flooding kills 13: Heavy rains pounding different parts of Kenya have led to the deaths of at least 13 people and displaced some 15,000, the United Nations said, as forecasters warned more rains can be expected until June.

The UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs, citing the Kenya Red Cross Society, said Thursday that nearly 20,000 people have been affected. That includes the estimated 15,000 displaced by heavy rains and flash floods across the country since the start of the wet season in mid-March.

The East African country has seen thousands of people killed by flooding in previous rainy seasons, mostly in the lake regions and downstream of major rivers.

The Kenya Red Cross Society told The Associated Press that five major roads were cut off by the floods, including Garissa Road in northern Kenya, where a

6 dead, attacker fatally shot by police in Sydney mall stabbings

A man stabbed six people to death at a busy Sydney shopping center Saturday before he was fatally shot, police said. Multiple people, including a small child, were also injured in the attack.

The suspect stabbed nine people at the Westfield Shopping Centre in Bondi Junction, which is in the city's

eastern suburbs, before a police inspector shot him after he turned and raised a knife, New South Wales Assistant Police Commissioner Anthony Cooke told reporters. Six of the victims and the suspect died. Police had no specific details on the condition of

the injured. Cooke said he believed that the

suspect acted alone, and he was "content that there is no continuing threat." He said officials didn't know who the offender was. "This is quite raw," he said, and a "lengthy and precise" investigation was just beginning.

He said there was "nothing that we are aware of at the scene that would indicate any motive or any ideology."

When asked whether officials were ruling out terrorism, he said: "We're not ruling anything out."

Cooke said the police inspector, a senior officer, was alone when she confronted the suspect and engaged him soon after her arrival on the scene, "saving a range of people's lives." (AP)

WASHINGTON, April 13, (AP): US President Joe Biden said that US defense commitment to Pacific allies was "ironclad" as he gathered Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. and Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida at the White House in the midst of growing concern about provocative Chinese military action in the Indo-Pacific.

The US and the Philippines have had a mutual treaty in place for more than 70 years. Biden's forceful reinforcement of the American commitment comes in the midst of persistent skirmishes between the Philippine and Chinese coast guards in the disputed South China Sea.

operations in the South China Sea, including efforts to impede the Philippines from resupplying its forces on the Second Thomas Shoal.

Chinese officials have bristled at criticism over their action in the South China Sea and blamed the U.S. for exacerbating tensions.

"No one should violate China's territorial sovereignty and maritime rights and interests, and China remains steadfast in safeguarding our lawful rights," Chinese Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Mao Ning said Thursday.

The White House billed the firstever trilateral summit with Japan and the Philippines as a potent response to China's attempts at "intimidation" and said it would send a message that China is "the outlier in the neighborhood," according to an administration official. The White House said in a statement that Biden and Marcos during the talks "underscored their commitment to international law in the South China Sea" and reaffirmed their countries treaty obligations to defend each other.

3 killed in Ethiopia shootout: A shootout between militiamen and police officers killed three people Friday in the Ethiopian capital in a rare case of the country's many regional rebellions spilling into the city.

The violence occurred near Millenium Hall in Addis Ababa's downtown as officers tried to apprehend three fighters from a militia known as Fano. The fighters were "on a mission to carry out a terrorist attack," a police statement said.

Two of the militia members were killed, and police arrested the third. A bystander also was killed during the gunbattle, and two police officers were injured.

The extremists were asked to surrender but refused to do so," the police statement said.

Mali junta bans media from reporting: In a deepening crackdown, Mali's ruling junta banned the media from reporting on activities of political parties and associations, a day after suspending all political activities in the country until further notice.

The order, issued by Mali's high authority for communication, was distributed on social media. The notice said it applied to all forms of the media, including television, radio, online and print newspapers.

Mali has experienced two coups since 2020, leading a wave of political instability that has swept across West and Central Africa in recent years. Along with its political troubles, the country is also in the grip of a worsening insurgency by militants linked to al-Qaida and the Islamic State group.

Somali Army kills 27 militants: The Somali National Army (SNA) announced killing 27 members of the Al-Shabaab militants in a military operation in the Lower Jubba region.

The operation, which took place in Bar Sangouni, an area within the Jamame district, marks a significant blow to the terror group's activities in the region, the Somali News Agency (SONNA) reported.

According to official reports, the army also captured five militants during the operation. This strategic victory came as a response to an attempted attack by the militants on a Somali National Army site.

The SNA troops, armed with critical intelligence, were able to thwart the attack and inflict a major defeat on the militants, added the agency.

EU to host Humanitarian Confab: France, Germany and the EU will co-chair an International Humanitarian Conference for Sudan and the neighboring countries in Paris on April 15th.

A statement by the High Representative of European Union (EU) Josep Borrell said, "the EU is appalled by the unprecedented man-made calamity created by the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) and their respective affiliated militias since 15 April 2023."

"One year into the conflict, the EU recalls its strong appeal on the warring parties for an immediate and durable ceasefire, as well as for the establishment of monitoring mechanism," the statement said.

'The magnitude of the conflict shows that silencing the guns is vital to put a halt to the destruction inflicted on the Sudanese people and the country," the statement added.



Haiti council established: A transitional council tasked with choosing Haiti's next prime minister and Cabinet was established Friday in a move supporters hope will help quell turmoil in the troubled Caribbean country where most of the capital remains under the grip of criminal gangs.

The formation of the council, announced in a decree published Friday in a Haitian government gazette, was ex-pected to soon trigger the resignation of Prime Minister Ariel Henry, but a new provision said he would step down when a new premier is chosen. Henry did not immediately comment.

Those awarded a seat on the council are Petit Desalin, a party led by former senator and presidential candidate Jean-Charles Moïse; EDE/RED, a party led by former prime minister Claude Joseph; the Montana Accord, a group of civil society leaders, political parties and others; Fanmi Lavalas, the party of former president Jean-Bertrand Aristide; the Jan. 30 Collective, which represents parties including that of former president Michel Martelly; and the private sector. (AP)

'Extradite Venezuelan citizens': Prosecutors in Chile said Friday they plan to formally request that Venezuela extradite two of its citizens to stand trial for charges related to the abduction and killing of a Venezuelan dissident in Chile earlier this year, a case that has strained relations between the South American nations.

Prosecutors ruled that the slaying of the activist and former army lieutenant was plotted in Venezuela. If proven, the grisly killing on Chilean soil could signal a new front in the widespread repression by the government of President Nicolás Maduro against the opposition ahead of his re-election contest later this year.

Venezuela has denied involvement.



Mexico filed its complaint Thursday at the International Court of Justice in the Netherlands asking the UN to suspend Ecuador, although a UN spokesman in New York said it would be up to other member states to decide on suspending a country. (AP)

gold prices surge amid rising geopolitical tensions

The allure of gold as a safe haven continues to grow as its value steadily rises, with expectations pointing towards a surge to \$2,500 per ounce amidst mounting geopolitical tensions in the Middle East, reports Al-Jarida daily.

Gold prices have surged by 14% this year, fueled by robust purchases from central banks and a heightened desire for safe havens in the face of persistent geopolitical risks, coupled with strong demand from funds aligned with market trends.

Hani Abu Aqla, the chief market analyst at XTB anticipates gold prices to approach the \$2,500 mark, supported by escalating geopolitical tensions. He notes that gold's ascent isn't solely at-tributed to anticipated interest rate reductions but is rather the outcome of a geopolitical premium alongside robust central bank purchases.

Notably, the Chinese Central Bank has recorded net gold purchases for 17 consecutive months, with total central bank purchases shifting from net selling to net buying, indicative of significant gold demand. Abu Aqla underscores the potent geopolitical tensions, notably stemming from the potential for Iranian involvement in ongoing regional conflicts, alongside developments such as Lufthansa's suspension of flights to Tehran.

global economic growth projected at 3% by IMF chief

Strong economic activity in the United States and emerging markets is projected to help drive global growth by about 3% this year, the International Mon-etary Fund's chief said Thursday, below the annual historic average and a warning sign about potential lackluster performances through the 2020s.

"Without a course correction, we are indeed heading for 'the Tepid Twenties' -- a sluggish and disappointing decade," said Kristalina Georgieva, the organization's managing director, in announc-ing the economic projection and longer-term outlook

She said global economic activity is weak by past

measurements and debt is up, posing major chal-lenges to public finances in many parts of the world. The scars of the pandemic are still with us. The global output loss since 2020 is around \$3.3 trillion,

with the costs disproportionately falling on the most vulnerable countries," she said. The anticipated growth rate of just more than 3%

is slightly above last year's projection. The historic average is 3.8%

"Global growth is marginally stronger on ac-count of robust activity in the United States and in many emerging market economies," Georgieva said. (AP)

'Investing in hedge funds, strategies to navigate market volatility'

Nobel Prize winner Harry Markowitz famously said, "Diversification is the only free lunch in finance." Diversification is indeed crucial for investors to navigate market volatility and to maximize their risk adjusted returns. Hedge funds can offer valuable diversification opportunities when implemented correctly.

The hedge fund industry has evolved from obscurity to over USD4 trillion in Assets Under Management (AUM). Originating in 1949, hedge funds were initially favored by high-net-worth individuals (HNWI). By the 1980s, they attracted a broader investor base, including pension funds and sovereign wealth funds. The 1990s witnessed accelerated growth as hedge funds attracted top talent leading to the emergence and refinement of additional trading strategies to cater to varying risk appetites and market conditions. The 2000s saw advancements in computing power, enabling sophisticated algorithmic trading programs that enhanced performance. The Global Financial Crisis

(GFC) of 2008 prompted regulatory reforms and stricter reporting standards to ensure transparency and stability in the industry.

Hedge funds are private, unconstrained investment vehicles that take long and short positions and use leverage. A long position involves buying an asset with the expectation of price appreciation, while a short position benefits from price decline. The hedge fund industry comprises various strategies that can broadly be categorized as Return Enhancers or Diversifiers.

Return Enhancers are typically net long stocks seeking to outperform through both long and short positions. These strategies aim to enhance portfolio returns while providing a moderate level of diversification. An example s the long-short equity strategy, which involves buying undervalued stocks (long positions) and selling overvalued stocks (short positions) based on fundamental analysis.

Diversifiers are strategies expected to provide greater diversification benefits to investors. These strategies also take long and short positions but without a structural long bias. Global Macro is an example of a diversifying strategy

where investment decisions are based on top-down analysis of global macroeconomic trends and events and their impact on various asset classes. Investors focusing on uncorrelated hedge fund strategies can achieve substantial diver-

sification benefits to enhance the risk adjusted performance of their portfolios. Given the significant dispersion among hedge fund managers, the importance of manager selection and a rigorous due diligence process cannot be overlooked. The due diligence process includes Investment Due Diligence (IDD) and Operational Due Diligence (ODD) to assess the manager's investment and risk management processes.

In conclusion, hedge funds provide valuable exposure for navigating market volatility, and investors should consider the diverse nature of hedge fund strategies when constructing their portfolios. Conducting thorough due diligence, including IDD and ODD, is essential to ensure the effective implementation of strategy allocation with top-tier hedge fund managers. OPEC+ in charge again!

There's no doubt that the oil organization's firm decision to reduce its global supply is effective, with all members fully committed. Even countries like Russia and Iraq, which initially delayed their decisions for a few

months, are now onboard. Russia has committed to reducing its output by 900,000 barrels per



Al-Harami day starting from the end of next month.

The true test will be in June when the organization will hold its meeting to determine their next course of action regarding the continuation of the agreed-upon production cuts.

With all members fully committed and in full agreement, any potential infrastructure challenges with oil production, particularly in Mexico and Russia, will further add more energy to strengthen the barrel price.

It now seems there is a consensus among financial institutions, including banks, and industry executives that oil prices will reach \$93-\$94 per barrel in the third quarter. However, it appears certain that OPEC+ will not welcome an oil price of \$100 per bar-

Global oil demand forecast steady for '24, OPEC report

Oil price drops to \$90.98 p/b on Friday

VIENNA, April 13, (KUNA): The global oil demand growth forecast for 2024 remains broadly unchanged from last month's assessment of 2.2 mb/d (million barrels per day), according to OPEC's Monthly Oil Market Report.

The MOMR - April 2024, released on Thursday, noted that slight adjustments were made to the 1Q-24 data, with a slight upward revision in OECD Europe and some non-OECD data, reflecting better-than-expected performance in oil demand data.

"This increase was offset by a downward revision to Africa in 1Q-24 and the Middle East in the first three quarters," it reads.

Accordingly, the OECD (Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development) is projected to expand by around 0.3 mb/d and the non-OECD by about 2.0 mb/d.

In 2025, global oil demand is expected to see robust growth of 1.8 mb/d, y-o-y (vear-on-vear).

The OECD is expected to grow by 0.1 mb/d, y-o-y, while demand in the non-OECD is forecast to increase by 1.7 mb/d.

one percent in 2025.

Meanwhile, China's economic growth forecast remains at 4.8 percent in 2024 and 4.6 percent in 2025. India's economic growth forecast is unchanged at 6.6 percent for 2024 and 6.3 percent for 2025.

Brazil's economic growth forecast remains at 1.6 percent for 2024, and 1.9 percent for 2025. The ongoing robust performance of Russia's economy leads to upward revisions for both the 2024 and 2025 growth forecasts, now standing at two percent and 1.4 percent, respectively.

Regarding crude oil price movements, the report said the OPEC Reference Basket (ORB) value increased by USD 2.99 or 3.7 percent in March, m-o-m, to average USD 84.22/b.

Oil futures prices averaged higher, with the ICE Brent front-month contract rising by USD 2.95, or 3.6 percent, m-o-m, to USD 84.67/b, and the NYMEX WTI front-month contract up by USD 3.80, or 5.0 percent, m-o-m, to average at USD 80.41/b.

The DME Oman front-month contract rose by USD 3.30, or 4.1 percent, m-o-m, to settle at USD 84.25/b.

The front-month ICE Brent/NYMEX WTI spread narrowed further by 85¢ to average USD 4.26/b. The market structures of oil futures prices strengthened and remained in backwardation as money managers turned increasingly bullish about oil.

This could push the barrel price to a range of \$90 and perhaps beyond by the end of the year. There are two fundamental factors that are working together to achieve this - a tightening supply and an anticipated increase in demand.

Energy analysts are predicting strong oil prices in view of these factors as well as OPEC+ commitment to its full adherence to the agreed production quota. A growth in oil is expected to reach the range of 1.85 million barrels per day this year. This in turn is pushing speculators to anticipate higher value for oil amidst tight supply and OPEC+ full adherence to its production cuts.

Turkey, Israel impose mutual trade barriers

ANKARA, April 13, (AP): Turkey and Israel announced trade barriers on each other Tuesday as relations deteriorated further amid the war in Gaza.

Turkey, a staunch critic of Israel's military actions in the territory, announced that it was restricting exports of 54 types of products to Israel with immediate effect. They include aluminum, steel, construction products, jet fuel and chemical fertilizers. In response, Israel said it was preparing a ban on products from Turkey.

The announcements came a day after Turkish Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan said Israel had barred Turkish military cargo planes from joining an operation to airdrop humanitarian aid to Gaza and vowed to respond with a series of measures against Israel until it declares a cease-fire and allows aid to flow in without interruptions.

"There is no excuse for Israel to block our attempt to deliver aid by air to starving people of Gaza," Fidan said.

Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan's government, which suffered major setbacks in local elections last month, is faced with intense pressure at home to halt trade with Israel. Critics accuse the government of engaging in double standards by leveling strong accusations against Israel while continuing lucrative commercial relations.

Erdogan, whose ruling party has roots in Turkey's Islamic movement, has been an outspoken critic of Israel's treatment of the Palestinians since taking office in 2003.

The Turkish leader stepped up his criticism of Israel following its military offensive in Gaza, describing Israel's actions as war crimes verging on "genocide" and asserting that the Hamas militant group, considered a terrorist organization by Israel, the United States and European Union, is fighting for the liberation of its lands and people.

In a post on X, Israeli Foreign Minister Israel Katz said Erdogan was "once again sacrificing the economic interests of the people of Turkey for his support of the Hamas murderers in Gaza.

In the same post, he said he had contacted organizations in the U.S. and asked them to stop investing in Turkey and refrain from importing Turkish goods.

Hamish Kinnear, senior Middle East and North Africa analyst at Britain-based risk intelligence company Verisk Maplecroft, said domestic considerations were behind Turkey's decision to slap trade restrictions on Israel, saying Erdogan's ruling party was trying to "rally its base in the wake of defeat in local elections.

"Reduced bilateral trade will be the result, especially if Israel retaliates with trade restrictions of its own," Kinnear said. "Turkey's government has likely made the calculation that damaged trade ties are worth it for the potential gain in domestic political support.'

Turkish exports to Israel amounted to \$5.4 billion in 2023, according to the Turkish Statistical Institute.

Turkey and Israel had normalized ties by appointing ambassadors to their respective countries in 2022, following years of tensions.

Since January, Turkish authorities have detained dozens of people, including private detectives, on suspicion of spying for Israel, mostly on Palestinians living in Turkey.

Switzerland lays out new 'too big to fail' rules

The Swiss government Wednesday announced steps to bolster its "too big to fail" rules aimed at avoiding potentially disastrous fallout from banking sector turmoil after woes last year at Credit Suisse before it was taken over by rival UBS.

Finance Minister Karin Keller-Sutter told reporters that the measures will aim to protect taxpayers - who were briefly on the hook to avoid a major banking sector collapse - and the Swiss economy overall.

She said the steps would also involve "targeted and effective" proposals that help boost liquidity at financial institutions and rein in excessive bonuses enjoyed by some bankers.

The announcement follows a monthslong review by Swiss authorities that "revealed gaps" in the current regulation, and involves a package of 22 measures, a government statement said.

"Implementation of the package

should significantly reduce the likelihood that another systematically important bank in Switzerland will experience a severe crisis and that emergency measures by the state will be necessary," it said.

Among the possible measures could be a move - long-sought by critics who say Swiss banking rules have been too lax - to strengthen the Swiss financial markets regulator FINMA to allow it to levy fines for wrongdoing. (AP)

FRANKFURT, Germany, April 13, (AP): The European Central Bank signalled Thursday it could cut interest rates at its next meeting in June, a big step as the rich world's central banks, including the U.S. Federal Reserve, wrestle with how soon declining inflation will let them lower credit costs for business and consumers.

The bank left its key rate benchmarks unchanged at a record high of 4%,

but bank President Christine Lagarde said a rate cut was now on the table. If incoming data confirm inflation's decline, "it would be appropriate to reduce the current level of monetary policy restriction," she said at her post-decision news

conference The policy meeting at the bank's skyscraper headquarters in Frankfurt was widely regarded as a prelude to the June 6 meeting, after Lagarde had dropped

a broad hint by saying that the bank would have more information on the path of inflation at that meeting.

Thursday's stance "officially opens the door to a June rate cut," said Carsten Brzeski, chief of global macro at ING bank. "This is the first time the ECB has talked about rate cuts in its official policy announcement.

The decision comes as the rich world's central banks are tilting toward undoing some of the sharp hikes to interest rates that were imposed with the goal of getting inflation under control. The Swiss National Bank was the first major central bank to cut rates in the current cycle on March 21. The big exception is Japan, which raised rates for the first time in 17 years on March 19.

It's a policy shift closely watched by stock investors. Markets soared in recent months on expectations of lower rates by this summer. Broad stock market index-

Japan not ruling out any options on excessive currency moves

TOKYO, April 13, (KUNA): Japanese Finance Minister Shunichi Suzuki said Thursday the government will respond appropriately to excessive currency moves without excluding any options, expressing displeasure with rapid foreign exchange movements

"We are not only looking at levels such as JPY 152 or JPY 153, but also analyz-ing the background behind this," Suzuki told reporters.

Stressing that currencies should move in a stable manner reflecting fundamen-

es fell immediately in the U.S. on Wednesday and bond prices rose after a hotter than expected inflation reading of 3.5% for March raised fears that the Fed may wait longer than previously thought to lower its benchmark interest rate.

Lagarde said the ECB's actions on rates were based on Europe's inflation data, and only took U.S. inflation into account as part of the bigger global picture including China, Japan and emerging markets. "We have to determine monetary policy decisions on the basis of the data that are produced by the euro area, on the basis of the global environment," she said

The drivers of inflation in the U.S. are different, she said, and "the two economies are not the same

Inflation in the 20 European Union member countries that use the euro currency, and where the ECB sets interest rate policy, has fallen to 2.4% in March, down from a peak of 10.6% in October 2023

Economists say U.S. inflation was driven by large-scale government spending, while Europe's price spike came from an outside shock: Russia cutting off most tals, Suzuki said the government is closely watching foreign exchange moves with "high sense of urgency."

Higher rates help squelch inflation by raising the cost of borrowing to buy things, which can cool demand for goods - but they can also slow growth if overdone or maintained for too long. The eurozone economy didn't grow at all in the last three months of last year and the outlook for the figures from the quarter just ended isn't much better.

The central bank's benchmarks guide the costs of borrowing for banks, and through that influence rates throughout the economy, from business credit lines to mortgages and credit cards to government bonds.

Rate cuts can boost stocks because they suggest the central bank sees a strong economy ahead that will boost corporate profits, and because lower interest rates make stocks relatively more attractive compared with interest-bearing holdings such as bonds or CDs.

LONDON, Steelworkers at Britain's largest steel production plant voted to strike for the first time in around 40 years to protest the planned loss of 2,800 jobs by Indian owner Tata Steel, union officials said Thursday.

Risks to China's public finances are rising, Fitch said, as Beijing works to resolve mounting local and regional government debts and to shift away from heavy reliance on its troubled property industry to drive economic growth.

But while slower growth is adding to the challenges of coping with heavy borrowing, Fitch said it kept China's A+ rating due to its "large and diversified economy," its vital role in global trade and its huge foreign exchange reserves.

The Finance Ministry said it was a "pity" that Fitch had downgraded its sovereign debt and faulted its methods, saying it had failed to take into account Beijing's moves toward "appropriately intensifying, improving quality and efficiency" of its government spending.

"In the long run, maintaining a moderate deficit and making good use of precious debt funds will help expand domestic demand, support economic growth, and ultimately help maintain good sovereign credit," the ministry said.

"Overall, our country's local government debt resolution work is progressing in an orderly manner and risks are generally controllable," it said.

Fitch's report noted that China's general government deficit was forecast to rise this year to 7.1% of its GDP, up from 5.8% in 2023. The median for countries with an "A" rating is 3.0%, it said. China's average deficit to GDP ratio averaged 3.1% in 2015-2019 but jumped to 8.6% in 2020, during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Tax relief measures and weaker property investments, which are usually a main source of local tax revenue, have eroded the government's capacity to collect tax revenues to offset higher spending, the report said.

Fitch forecasts that China's economy will expand at a 4.5% annual rate this year, down from 5.2% last year, due to the downturn in the property sector and lackluster consumer spending, though it said higher government spending is likely to help make up for some of that weakness.

BEIJING, April 13, (Xinhua): China remained the top merchandise exporter in 2023 for the seventh straight year with its share in world exports at 14.2 percent, almost the same as the level in 2022, the Ministry of Commerce said.

The ministry made the remarks in response to the latest edition of World Trade Organization's (WTO) "Global Trade Outlook and Statistics," which foresees a gradual recovery in world merchandise trade volume in 2024 and

Though noting that all central banks have had problems over the past few years as a result of a series of economic shocks, notably the coronavirus pandemic and the costof-living crisis heightened by Russia's invasion of Ukraine, Bernanke said the Bank of England's issues were made worse by out-of-date software that had not been properly maintained.

The review said that "insufficient resources have been devoted to ensuring that the software and models underlying the forecast are adequately maintained.³

Bernanke, who led the Fed between 2006 and 2014, a period that included the global financial crisis, made a series of recommendations that the Bank of England said it was committed to fulfilling.

Bank of England Gov. Andrew Bailey said the review was a "oncein-a-generation opportunity" for the central bank to update its models and make them fit for purpose to a "more uncertain world.

One recommendation is that the Bank of England start producing its own forecasts of what might happen to interest rates in future, something that could help inform its inflation forecasts.

Over the past couple of years, the Bank of England has faced criticism for being too slow to respond to surging inflation stoked by Russia's invasion of Ukraine, which sent energy costs soaring, and supply issues connected to the lifting of COVID-19 restrictions.

As a result, critics have argued that inflation ended up rising higher than it should have done to a multidecade high of more than 11% - 2 percentage points more than in the U.S., for example.

The consequence of that, they say, is that the Bank of England's rate-setting Monetary Policy Committee then had to rise interest rates by more than would otherwise have been required and will have to stay higher for longer. The bank's main interest rate has been held at 5.25% since August.

Higher interest rates, which cool the economy by making it more expensive to borrow, thereby bearing down on spending, have contributed to easing inflation worldwide, though they also have affected economic activity. The British economy has barely grown over the past year, and few economists expect much of an uptick in 2024.

In January, Tata said it would close both blast furnaces at Port Talbot as part of plans to make its unprofitable U.K. operation leaner and greener, replacing them with more environmentally friendly electric arc furnaces.

Unite said Tata has other choices after the union secured a commitment from the main Labour Party opposition that it will invest 3 billion pounds (\$3.8 billion) in U.K. steel, compared with the 500 million pounds pledged by the current Conservative government. those of the government reflect the short-term thinking of a clappedout disinterested government marking time to a general election," said Unite General Secretary Sharon Graham.

She said the vote in favor of striking happened despite threats from Tata that enhanced redundancy packages would be withdrawn if workers went on strike.

Tata has said that its plans to switch from coal-fired blast furnaces to an electric arc furnace, which produces steel from scrap metal, needs fewer workers and that 2,500 jobs will go by the middle of next year, with a further 300 at longer-term risk. Both blast furnaces are due to be shut this year, with the new electric furnace installed by 2027.

Tata said after the vote that its plan remains in place.

"Our ambition remains to move forward at pace with a just transition, and to become the center of a future green sustainable industrial ecosystem in the U.K.," a spokesperson for the company said.

The news of the closure of the blast furnaces is a major blow to Port Talbot, a town of about 35,000 people whose economy has been built on the steel industry since the early 1900s. Fewer than 1,000 people are expected to be employed at the plant if the restructuring takes place.

At its height in the 1960s, the Port Talbot steelworks employed around 20,000 people, before cheaper offerings from China and other countries hit production. More than 300,000 people worked in Britain's steel industry in 1971; by 2021 it was about 26,000.

The steel industry now accounts for 0.1% of the British economy and 2.4% of the country's greenhouse gas emissions, according to research by the House of Commons Library.

From bias to brain drain

Artificial intelligence threatens human decision skills

None of these three steps are terribly difficult to take. But, for most, they're not intuitive either. Making thoughtful and defensible decisions requires practice and self-discipline. And this is where the hidden harm that AI exposes people to comes in: AI does most of its "thinking" behind the scenes and presents users with answers that are stripped of context and deliberation. Worse, AI robs people of the opportunity to practice the process of making thoughtful and defensible decisions on their own.

Consider how people approach many important decisions today. Humans are well known for being prone to a wide range of biases because we tend to be frugal when it comes to expending mental energy. This frugality leads people to like it when seemingly good or trustworthy decisions are made for them. And we are social animals who tend to value the security and acceptance of their communities more than they might value their own autonomy.

Add AI to the mix and the result is a dangerous feedback loop: The data that AI is mining to fuel its algorithms is made up of people's biased decisions that also reflect the pressure of conformity instead of the wisdom of critical reasoning. But because people like having decisions made for them, they tend to accept these bad decisions and move on to the next one. In the end, neither we nor AI end up the wiser.

It would be wrongheaded to argue that AI won't offer any benefits to society. It most likely will, especially in fields like cybersecurity, health care and finance, where complex models and massive amounts of data need to be analyzed routinely and quickly. However, most of our day-to-day decisions don't require this kind of analytic horsepower.

But whether we asked for it or not, many of us have already received advice from - and work performed by - AI in settings ranging from entertainment and travel to schoolwork, health care and finance. And designers are hard at work on next-generation AI that will be able to automate even more of our daily decisions. And this, in my view, is dangerous.

In a world where what and how people think is already under siege thanks to the algorithms of social media, we

AI's hood are programmed by humans, it is just as biased and discriminatory as many of us. Throw in the lack of transparency about how AI is designed, and by whom, and it's easy to understand why so much time these days is devoted to debating its risks as much as its potential.

But my own research as a psychologist who studies how people make decisions leads me to believe that all these risks are overshadowed by an even more corrupting, though largely invisible, threat. That is, AI is mere keystrokes away from making people even less disciplined and skilled when it comes to thoughtful decisions. The process of making thoughtful decisions involves three common sense steps that begin with taking time to understand the task or problem you're confronted with. Ask yourself, what is it that you need to know, and what do you need to do in order to make a decision that you'll be able to credibly and confidently defend later?

The answers to these questions hinge on actively seeking out information that both fills gaps in your knowledge and challenges your prior beliefs and assumptions. In fact, it's this counterfactual information - alternative possibilities that emerge when people unburden themselves of certain assumptions - that ultimately equips you to defend your decisions when they are criticized. The second step is seeking out and considering more than one option at a time. Want to improve your quality of life? Whether it's who you vote for, the jobs you accept or the things you buy, there's always more than one road that

will get you there. Expending the effort to actively consider and rate at least a few plausible options, and in a manner that is honest about the trade-offs you are willing to make across their pros and cons, is a hallmark of a thoughtful and defensible choice.

The third step is being willing to delay closure on a decision until after

A s artificial intelligence creeps further into people's daily lives, so do worries about it. At the most alarmist are concerns about AI going rogue and terminating its human masters. But behind the calls for a pause

on the development of AI is a suite of more tangible social ills. Among them are the risks AI poses to people's privacy and dignity and the inevitable fact that, because the algorithms under you've done all the necessary heavy mental lifting. It's no secret: Closure feels good because it means you've put a difficult or important decision behind you. But the cost of moving on prematurely can be much higher than taking the time to do your homework. If you don't believe me, just think about all those times you let your feelings guide you, only to experience regret because you didn't take the time to think a little harder.

risk putting ourselves in an even more perilous position if we allow AI to reach a level of sophistication where it can make all kinds of decisions on our behalf. Indeed, we owe it to ourselves to resist the siren's call of AI and take back ownership of the true privilege - and responsibility - of being human: being able to think and choose for ourselves. We'll feel better and, importantly, be better if we do. (AP)

Bid to balance brain privacy in digital era

Battle for thought control in neurotech age

Socrates, the ancient Greek philosopher, never wrote things down. He warned that writing undermines memory - that it is nothing but a reminder of some previous thought. Compared to people who discuss and debate, readers "will be hearers of many things and will have learned nothing; they will appear to be omniscient and will generally know nothing."

These views may seem peculiar, but his central fear is a timeless one: that technology threatens thought. In the 1950s, Americans panicked about the possibility that advertisers would use subliminal messages hidden in movies to trick consumers into buying things they didn't really want. Today, the U.S. is in the middle of a similar panic over TikTok, with critics worried about its impact on viewers' freedom of thought.

To many people, neurotechnologies seem especially threatening, although they are still in their infancy. In January 2024, Elon Musk announced that his company Neuralink had implanted a brain chip in its first human subject though they accomplished such a feat well after competitors. Fast-forward to March, and that person can already play chess with just his thoughts. Brain-computer interfaces, called BCIs, have rightfully prompted debate

about the appropriate limits of technologies that interact with the nervous system. Looking ahead to the day when wearable and implantable devices may be more widespread, the United Nations has discussed regulations and restrictions on BCIs and related neurotech. Chile has even enshrined neurorights - special protections for brain activity - in its constitution, while other countries are considering doing so.

A cornerstone of neurorights is the idea that all people have a fundamental right to determine what state their brain is in and who is allowed to access that information, the way that people ordinarily have a right to determine what is done with their bodies and property. It's commonly equated with "freedom of thought."

Many ethicists and policymakers think this right to mental self-determination is so fundamental that it is never OK to undermine it, and that institutions should impose strict limits on neurotech.

But as my research on neurorights argues, protecting the mind isn't nearly as easy as protecting bodies and property.

Creating rules that protect a person's ability to determine what is done to their body is relatively straightforward. The body has clear boundaries, and things that cross it without permission are not allowed. It is normally obvious when a person violates laws prohibiting assault or battery, for example. The same is true about regula-

tions that protect a person's property. Protecting body and property are some of the central reasons people come together to form governments.

Generally, people can enjoy these protections without dramatically limiting how others want to live their lives.

The difficulty with establishing neurorights, on the other hand, is that, unlike bodies and property, brains and minds are under constant influence from outside forces. It's not possible to fence off a person's mind such that nothing gets in.

Instead, a person's thoughts are largely the product of other peoples' thoughts and actions. Everything from how a person perceives colors

and shapes to our most basic beliefs are influenced by what others say and do. The human mind is like a sponge, soaking up whatever it happens to be immersed in. Regulations might be able to control the types of liquid in the bucket, but they can't protect the sponge from getting wet.

Even if that were possible - if there were a way to regulate people's actions so that they don't influence others' thoughts at all - the regulations would be so burdensome that no one would be able to do much of anything. If I'm not allowed to influence oth-

If I'm not allowed to influence others' thoughts, then I can never leave my house, because just by my doing so I'm causing people to think and act in

certain ways. And as the internet further expands a person's reach, not only

would I not be able to leave the house, I also wouldn't be able to "like" a post on Facebook, leave a product review, or comment on an article.

In other words, protecting one aspect of freedom of thought - someone's ability to shield themselves from outside influences - can conflict with another aspect of freedom of thought: freedom of speech, or someone's ability to express ideas.

But there's another concern at play: privacy. People may not be able to completely control what gets into their heads, but they should have significant control over what goes out - and some people believe societies need "neurorights" regulations to ensure that. Neurotech represents a new threat to our ability to control what thoughts people reveal to others.

There are ongoing efforts, for example, to develop wearable neurotech that would read and adjust the customer's brainwaves to help them improve their mood or get better sleep. Even though such devices can only be used with the consent of the user, they still take information out of the brain, interpret it, store it and use it for other purposes.

In experiments, it is also becoming easier to use technology to gauge someone's thoughts. Functional magnetic resonance imaging, or fMRI, can be used to measure changes in blood flow in the brain and produce images of that activity. Artificial intelligence can then analyze those images to interpret what a person is thinking.

Neurotechnology critics fear that as the field develops, it will be possible to extract information about brain activity regardless of whether or not someone wants to disclose it. Hypothetically, that information could one day be used in a range of contexts, from research for new devices to courts of law.

Regulation may be necessary to protect people from neurotech taking information out. For example, nations could prohibit companies that make commercial neurotech devices, like those meant to improve the wearer's sleep from storing the brainwave data those devices collect.

Yet I would argue that it may not be necessary, or even feasible, to protect against neurotech putting information into our brains - though it is hard to predict what capabilities neurotech will have even a few years from now.

have even a few years from now. In part, this is because I believe people tend to overestimate the difference between neurotech and other types of external influence. Think about books. Horror novelist Stephen King has said that writing is telepathy: When an author writes a sentence - say, describing a shotgun over the fireplace - they spark a specific thought in the reader.

În addition, there are already strong protections on bodies and property, which I believe could be used to prosecute anyone who forces invasive or wearable neurotech upon another person. (AP)



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Cannes sets lineup with Lanthimos, Coppola and Trump film

LOS ANGELES, April 13, (AP): New films from Yorgos Lanthimos, Andrea Arnold and Francis Ford Coppola, as well as a portrait of 1980s Donald Trump, will compete for the Palme d'Or at the 77th Cannes Film Festival next month, organizers announced recently.

Thierry Frémaux, Cannes's artistic director who announced the selections in a news conference in Paris with festival president Iris Knobloch, said this year's lineup was plucked from 2,000 submissions. Though Frémaux noted he went into the process concerned about the effect of last year's strikes on American films, the lineup is typically full of top international filmmakers as well as a few hotly anticipated blockbusters.

Among the 19 films selected for competition is Lanthimos' "Kinds of Kindness," the Greek director's follow-up to the Oscar-winning "Poor Things." Its cast includes two stars of "Poor Things": Emma Stone and Willem Dafoe.

Paolo Sorrentino, the Italian filmmaker of "The Great Beauty," returns to Cannes with "Parthenhope," a Naples-set drama co-starring Gary Oldman. Arnold, the British director of "American Honey" and "Fish Tank," also returns to Cannes with "Bird," starring Barry Keoghan and Franz Rogowski.

Sure to draw attention will be Ali Abbasi's "The Apprentice," a film about the former president's early business career. In it, Sebastian Stan stars as Trump, Jeremy Strong plays Roy Cohn and Maria Bakalova co-stars as Ivana Trump. The Iranian director Abbasi was previously in competition at Cannes with 2022's "Holy Spider."

Numerous other big-name filmmakers are also returning to Cannes, which runs May 14-25. Among them: David Cronenberg ("The

Variety

Shrouds," with Vincent Cassel and Diane Kruger); Paul Schrader ("Oh, Canada," with Richard Gere and Uma Thurman) and the lauded Chinese director Jia Zhang-Ke ("Caught By the Tides"). Also in competition are Sean Baker ("Anora"), whose "Red Rocket" and "The Florida Project" also premiered at Cannes; and the French filmmaker Jacques Audiard ("Emilia Perez"), who won the Palme in 2015 for "Dheepan."

As previously reported, Francis Ford Coppola's "Megalopolis" will premiere in competition in Cannes. The 85-year-old director's selffinanced, long-gestating epic will debut 50 years after his "The Conversation" won the Palme d'Or.

Nominations

This year's Cannes follows a banner 2023 edition that featured the premieres of three films that went on to win best-picture nominations at the Academy Awards: Martin Scorsese's "Killers of the Flower Moon"; Jonathan Glazer's "The Zone of Interest"; and Justine Triet's Palme d'Or winner "Anatomy of a Fall."

"Anatomy of a Fall" was only the third film directed by a woman to win the Palme. This year, there are four female filmmakers in competition. Fremaux said he may add further selections in the coming weeks.

Cannes had already lined up a few notable world premieres playing out of competition including George Miller's "Furiosa: A Mad Max Saga" and Kevin Costner's "Horizon, An American Saga." George Lucas is set to received an honorary Palme d'Or at the closing ceremony. The festival will kick off May 14 with the French comedy "The Second Act," starring Léa Seydoux and Vincent Lindon. Greta Gerwig, coming off the success of "Barbie," is heading the jury that will decide the Palme d'Or. Some entries will take on added poignance, Frémaux noted, due to current events. Ukrainian filmmaker Sergei Loznitsa will debut his documentary "The Invasion," on Russia's war on his native country.

One new addition this year: The festival is launching a competitive immersive section featuring works of virtual and augmented reality.

Meanwhile, Kevin Costner's multi-episode epic "Horizon, An American Saga" will premiere at the Cannes.

The first chapter of "Horizon" will debut at the French film festival on May 19, giving the world its first glimpse of Costner's ambitious Western epic. The first two parts of "Horizon" are set to open in quick succession this summer, with Warner Bros. releasing chapter one in theaters June 28 and the second installment on Aug. 16.

"It's been 20 years since I've had the pleasure of being on the Croisette," Costner said in a statement. "I've been waiting for the right time to return and I'm proud to say that this time has come."

"The French have always supported films and believed deeply in filmmaking," added Costner. "Just as I believe deeply in my film." "Horizon," which will screen out of competition at Cannes, is di-

"Horizon," which will screen out of competition at Cannes, is directed by Costner and stars him, Sienna Miller, Sam Worthington and Jena Malone.

The 77th Cannes Film Festival runs May 14-25. George Miller's "Furiosa: A Mad Max Saga," also from Warner Bros., was recently announced as another high-profile premiere at Cannes. The full lineup will be announced Thursday.

The show debuted in 2010 with hosts Gilbert, **Sharon Osbourne**, **Julie Chen, Leah Remini** and **Holly Robinson Peete. Marissa Jaret Winokur** was enlisted as a roving reporter who would be in the field. A hosting shake-up occurred after the first season. Winokur's position was axed, and Peete and Robinson were replaced by **Sheryl Underwood** and **Aisha Tyler**. "The Talk" would go on to

"The Talk" would go on to have a number of hosting changes over its run. In 2018, Chen left the show after her husband, then-CBS Corp. boss Les Moonves was fired due to sexual misconduct allegations. Gilbert left her on camera post in 2019 but remains an executive producer. Osbourne's departure in 2021 made headlines following a heated on-air discussion about racism between Osbourne and Underwood.

Underwood is the only person from the early days of "The Talk" who remains on the show today. She sits alongside **Natalie Morales**, **Amanda Kloots**, **Jerry O'Connell** and **Akbar Gbajabiamila**.

In a joint statement released by CBS, **Amy Reisenbach**, president of CBS Entertainment and **David Stapf** who is president of CBS Studios said: "It goes without saying that hosting and producing a year-round talk show is no easy task." They went on to express "sincere gratitude" to the hosts, producers and crew and recognized "former show hosts and colleagues who contributed throughout the seasons." (AP)

'Civil War' chronicles America's collapse

The United States is crumbling in Alex Garland's sharp new film "Civil War," a bellowing and haunting big screen experience. The country has been at war with itself for years by the time we're invited in, through the gaze of a few journalists documenting the chaos on the front lines and chasing an impossible interview with the president.

Garland, the writer-director of films like "Annihilation" and "Ex Machina," as well as the series "Devs," always seems to have an eye on the ugliest sides of humanity and our capacity for self-destruction. His themes are profound and his exploration of them sincere in films that are imbued with strange and haunting images that rattle around in your subconscious for far too long. Whatever you think of "Men," his most divisive film to date, it's unlikely anyone will forget Rory Kinnear giving birth to himself.

In "Civil War," starring Kirsten Dunst as a veteran war photographer named Lee, Garland is challenging his audience once again by not making the film about what everyone thinks it will, or should, be about. Yes, it's a politically divided country. Yes, the President (Nick Offerman) is a blustery, rising despot who has given himself a third term, taken to attacking his citizens and shut himself off from the press. Yes, there is one terrifying character played by Jesse Plemons who has some pretty hard lines about who is and isn't a real American.

But that trailer that had everyone talking is not the story. Garland is not so dull or narratively conservative to make the film about red and blue ideologies. All we really know is that the so-called Western Forces of Texas and California have seceded from the country and are closing in to overthrow the government. We don't know what they want or why, or what the other side wants or why and you start to realize that many of the characters don't seem to really know, or care, either. This choice might be frustrating to some audiences, but it's also the only one that makes sense in a film focused on the kinds of journalists who put themselves in harm's way to tell the story of violent conflicts and unrest. As Lee explains to Cailee Spaeny's Jessie, a young, aspiring photographer who has elbowed her way onto their dangerous journey to Washington, questions are not for her to ask: She takes truthful, impartial pictures so that everyone else can.

Violence

"Civil War" a film that is more about war reporters than anything else - the trauma of the beat, the vital importance of bearing witness and the moral and ethical dilemmas of impartiality. Dunst's Lee is having a bit of an existential crisis, having shot so many horrors and feeling as though she hasn't made any difference - violence and death are still everywhere. She's also a pro: Hardened and committed to the story and the image. Her colleague Joel (Wagner Moura) is more of an adrenaline junkie, chasing the gunfire and drinking himself into a stupor every night. There's Jessie (Spaeny), the wide-eyed but ambitious newbie who is in over her head, and the aging editor Sammy (the great Stephen McKinley Henderson), wise and buttoned up in Brooks Brothers and suspenders, who can't imagine a life outside of news even as his body is failing him. All are selfmotivated and none of them have a life outside of the job, which might be a criticism for some movie characters but not here (trigger warning for any journo audiences out there).

The group must drive an indirect route to get from New York to Washington as safely as possible, through Pittsburgh and West Virginia. The roads and towns are set-dressed a little bit, but anyone who knows the area will recognize familiar sights of dead malls, creaky off-brand gas stations on two lane roads, boarded up shops and overgrown parking lots that all work to provide an unsettlingly effective backdrop for the bleak world of "Civil War."

Dunst and Spaeny are both exceedingly good in their roles, effectively embodying the veteran and the novice - a well-written, nuanced and evolving dynamic that should inspire post-credits debates and discussion (among other topics).

Dread permeates every frame, whether it's a quiet moment of smart conversation, a white-knuckle standoff or a deafening shootout on 17th street. And as with all Garland films it comes with a great, thoughtful soundtrack and a Sonoya Mizuno cameo.

Smart, compelling and challenging blockbusters don't come along that often, though this past year has had a relative embarrassment of riches with the likes of "Dune: Part Two" and "Oppenheimer." "Civil War" should be part of that conversation too. It's a full body theatrical experience that deserves a chance.

"Civil War," an A24 release in theaters Friday, is rated R by the Motion Picture Association for "strong, violent content, bloody/disturbing images and language throughout." Running time: 119 minutes. Three stars out of four.

Fashion icon Roberto Cavalli dies at age 83

ROME, April 13, (AP): Italian fashion designer Roberto Cavalli, known for a flamboyant, glamorous style and textile innovations, has died at age 83, his company announced Friday.

"Dear Roberto, you may not be physically here with us anymore but I know I will feel your spirit with me always," Fausto Puglisi, creative director at Roberto Cavalli since October 2020, wrote in an Instagram post.

"Rest in peace, you will be missed and you are loved by so many that your name will continue on, a beacon of inspiration for others, and especially for me," Puglisi added.

Born in Florence on Nov. 15, 1940, from a family of artists, Cavalli was orphaned of his father at just four years old, as he was killed in a Nazi roundup known as the Cavriglia massa-

cre in 1944.



Cavalli became renowned in the early 1970s for his animal prints and an excessive, sexy style that remained his trademark throughout his long career.

"It is with deep regret and a great sadness the Roberto Cavalli Maison participates in the passing of its founder Roberto Cavalli," his company said in a statement. "From humble be-

Cavalli ginnings in Florence, Roberto succeeded in becoming a globally recognized name loved and respected by all. (His) legacy will live on via his creativity, his love

of nature and via his family who he cherished." After founding his own fashion house in the early 1970s, Cavalli quickly became an iconic brand, loved by top celebrities like Madonna, Gwyneth Paltrow and Beyoncé.

Cavalli patented a new printing method for leather and debuted the patchwork denim that was one of his trademarks in Florence's Palazzo Pitti in 1972. He revolutionized jeans, creating a sandblasting technique to give denim a distressed look, and adding Lycra to jeans to make them sexier, stretchy.

Inspiration


Cavalli took frequent inspiration from the natural world, featuring animal prints and fish-scale sequins. The Cavalli woman ranged from hippie to slick rocker, in diaphanous gowns that caught the air, seductive beaded dresses or sexy skinny suits.

He stepped back from designing about a decade ago, after ceding 90% of the company to the Clessidra private equity group. The company is now controlled by Auriel Investment SA.

"Don't call me a designer. My talent is rather finding what makes a fabric, a dress, a woman special, thinking always of fashion as if it is dream of readyto-wear, something ready to be worn,□ he wrote in his autobiography, "Just Me," published in 2013.

He told The Associated Press in an interview that the woman he dressed was "a woman who believes a lot in herself. A woman who can show she is strong but at the same time soft and romantic."

LAS VEGAS, April 13, (AP): O.J. Simpson, the football star and Hollywood actor acquitted of charges he killed his former wife and her friend in a trial that mesmerized the public and exposed divisions on race and policing in America, has died. He was 76.

The family announced on Simpson's official X account that he died Wednesday of prostate cancer. He died in Las Vegas, officials there said Thursday.

Simpson earned fame, fortune and adulation through football and show business, but his legacy was forever changed by the June 1994 knife slayings of his ex-wife, Nicole Brown Simpson, and her friend Ronald Goldman in Los Angeles. He was later found liable for the deaths in a separate onto his hands and spoke his only three words of the trial: "They're too small." His attorney Johnnie L. Cochran Jr. told the jurors, "If it doesn't fit, you

must acquit." The jury found him not guilty of murder in 1995, but a separate civil trial jury found him liable in 1997 for the deaths and ordered him to pay \$33.5 million to relatives of Brown and Goldman.

A decade later, still shadowed by the California wrongful death judgment, Simpson led five men he barely knew into a confrontation with two sports memorabilia dealers in a cramped Las Vegas hotel room. Two men with Simpson had guns. A jury convicted Simpson of armed robbery and other felonies.



"It's all blood money, and unfortunately I had to join the jackals,' Simpson told The Associated Press at the time. He collected \$880,000 in advance money for the book, paid through a third party.

"It helped me get out of debt and secure my homestead," he said.

Less than two months after losing rights to the book, Simpson was arrested in Las Vegas.

Simpson played 11 NFL seasons, nine of them with the Buffalo Bills, where he became known as "The Juice" and ran behind an offensive line known as "The Electric Company." He won four NFL rushing titles, rushed for 11,236 yards in his career, scored 76 touchdowns and played in five Pro Bowls. His best season was 1973, when he ran for 2,003 yards - the first running back to break the 2,000-yard rushing mark. "I was part of the history of the game," he said years later. "If I did nothing else in my life, I'd made my mark. Simpson's football rise happened simultaneously with a television career. He signed a contract with ABC Sports the night he won the Heisman Trophy in 1968. That same year, he appeared on the NBC series "Dragnet" and "Ironside." During his pro career, Simpson was a color commentator for a decade on ABC followed by a stint on NBC. In 1983, he joined ABC's "Monday Night Football." Simpson became a charismatic pitchman. In 1975, Hertz made him the first Black man hired for a corporate national ad campaign. The commercials, featuring Simpson running through airports toward the Hertz desk and young girls chanting "Go, O.J., go!" were ubiquitous. Simpson made his big-screen debut in 1974's "The Klansman," an exploitation film in which he starred alongside Lee Marvin and Richard Burton. The film flopped, but Simpson would go on to appear in several dozen films and TV series, including 1974's "The Towering Inferno," 1976's "The Cas-sandra Crossing," 1977's "Roots" and 1977's "Capricorn One."

Coppola died Friday surrounded by family at home in Rutherford, California, her family announced in a statement. No cause of death was given.

Eleanor, who grew up in Orange County, Cali-fornia, met Francis while working as an assistant art director on his directorial debut, the **Roger Corman**produced 1963 horror film "Dementia 13." (She had studied design at UCLA.) Within months of dating, Eleanor became pregnant and the couple were wed in Las Vegas in February 1963.

Their first-born, Gian-Carlo, quickly became a regular presence in his father's films, as did their subsequent children, Roman (born in 1965) and Sofia (born in 1971). After acting in their father's films and growing up on sets, all would go into the movies.

"I don't know what the family has given except I hope they've set an example of a family encouraging each other in their creative process whatever it may be," Eleanor told The Associated Press in 2017. "It happens in our family that everyone chose to sort of follow in the family business. We weren't asking them to or expecting them to, but they did. At one point Sofia said, 'The nut does not fall far from the tree.'

Filmmaker

Gian-Carlo, who's seen in the background of many of his father's films and had begun doing second-unit photography, died at the age of 22 in a 1986 boating accident. He was killed while riding in a boat piloted by Griffin O'Neal, son of Ryan O'Neal, who was found guilty of negligence.

Roman directed several movies of his own and regularly collaborates with Wes Anderson. He's president of his father's San Francisco-based film company, American Zoetrope.

Sofia became one of the most acclaimed filmmakers of her generation as the writer-director of films including "Lost in Translation" and the 2023 release "Priscilla." Sofia dedicated that film to her mother.

In joining the family business, the Coppola children weren't just following in their father's footsteps but their mother's, too. Beginning on 1979's "Apocalypse Now," Eleanor frequently documented the behindthe-scenes life of Francis' films. The Philippines-set shoot of "Apocalypse Now" lasted 238 days. A typhoon destroyed sets. Martin Sheen had a heart attack. A member of the construction crew died.

Eleanor documented much of the chaos in what would become one of the most famous making-of films about moviemaking, 1991's "Hearts of Dark-ness: A Filmmaker's Apocalypse."

"I was just trying to keep myself occupied with something to do because we were out there for so long," Eleanor told CNN in 1991. "They wanted five minutes for a TV promotional or something and I thought sooner of later I could get five minutes of film and then it went on to 15 minutes.'

"I just kept shooting but I had no idea ... the evolution of myself that I saw with my camera," continued Eleanor, who ended up shooting 60 hours worth of footage. "So, it was a surprise for both of us and a life changing experience."

Eleanor also published "Notes: On the Making of 'Apocalypse Now'" in 1979. While the film focused on the film set tumult, the book charted some of Eleanor's inner turmoil, including the challenges of being married to a larger-than-life figure. She wrote of being a "woman isolated from my friends, my affairs and my projects" during their year in Manilla.

He was jailed after returning from Germany in January 2021, where he was recuperating from the 2020 nerve agent poisoning he blamed on the Kremlin, and was given three prison terms since.

He died in a remote penal colony above the Arctic Circle. Russian officials have vehemently denied involvement both in the poisoning and in his death.

According to Knopf, Navalny began working on the book in Germany, and continued writing it in Russia, both in and out of prison. (AP)

Evidence found at the scene seemed overwhelmingly against Simpson. Blood drops, bloody footprints and a glove were there. Another glove, smeared with blood, was found at his home.

Simpson didn't testify, but the prosecution asked him to try on the gloves in court. He struggled to squeeze them

Mister Cee was a key player in the rap community. He was formerly Big Daddy Kane's DJ and an executive producer on The Notorious B.I.G.'s groundbreaking 1994 debut, "Ready to Die."

The New York native was also a radio personality on his hometown's Hot 97. But he briefly quit his gig in 2013 after arrests in connection with soliciting prostitutes. Audio of one encounter surfaced online.

After that last incident, Mister Cee denied trying to solicit sex from a male, and said an undercover female police officer approached him. He also denied being homosexual. (AP)

EU drug regulators clear Ozempic, Wegovy of suicidal thoughts

EMA finds no link between diabetes, weight-loss drugs and suicide

LONDON, April 13, (AP): Drug regulators in Europe have found no evidence that popular diabetes and weightloss drugs like Ozempic and Wegovy are linked to a higher risk of suicidal thoughts or actions. The European Medicines Agency (EMA) regulatory committee announced the results of its review on Friday. It's the latest group to conclude there's no known tie between a new class of obesity drugs and suicide.

In January, the US Food and Drug Administration said a preliminary review showed no evidence of such a link, though the agency said it could not rule out that "a small risk may exist" and that it would continue to study the issue. A federally funded US study also found that people taking semaglutide, the medication in Ozempic and Wegovy, had a lower risk of suicidal thoughts than those taking older medications to treat diabetes and obesity.

The review by the European Union's regulators was triggered last July by anecdotal reports that people taking the

US and global measles cases on the rise, threatening gains

NEW YORK, April 13, (AP): Measles outbreaks in the US and abroad are raising health experts' concern about the preventable, once-common childhood virus.

One of the world's most contagious diseases, measles can lead to potentially serious complications. The best defense, according to experts? Get vaccinated.

Here's what to know about the year - so far - in measles.

Nationwide, measles cases already are nearly double the total for all of last year.

The US Centers of Disease Control and Prevention documented 113 cases as of April 5. There have been seven sents a renewed threat to elimination," the report's authors said.

The disease is still common in many parts of the world, and measles reaches the U.S. through unvaccinated travelers.

According to Thursday's report, most of the recent importations involved unvaccinated Americans who got infected in the Middle East and Africa and brought measles back to the US.

Health officials confirmed measles cases in 17 states so far this year, including cases in New York City, Philadelphia and Chicago.

More than half of this year's cases come from the Chicago outbreak,

China launches Queqiao-2 for lunar missions

Russia's new heavy-lift rocket finally takes off

BEIJING, April 13, (Agencies): The Queqiao-2 satellite has recently completed in-orbit communication tests, with its platform and payloads working normally, according to the China National Space Administration (CNSA) on Friday.

The functions and performance of Queqiao-2 meet mission requirements, and it can provide relay communication services for the fourth phase of China's lunar exploration project and future lunar exploration missions of China and other countries, said the CNSA, announcing the Queqiao-2 mission a complete success.

The satellite successfully completed a communication test on April 6 with Chang'e-4, which is now carrying out an exploration mission on the far side of the moon. From April 8 to 9, it conducted communication tests with the Chang'e-6 probe, which is yet to be launched.

Queqiao-2 was launched on March 20 and entered its target highly elliptical orbit on April 2 after midway correction, near-moon braking and orbital maneuver around the moon.

MOSCOW: Russia on Thursday successfully test-launched a new heavylift rocket from its Far Eastern space complex, a lift-off that comes after two aborted attempts earlier this week.

The first attempt to launch the Angara-A5 rocket from the **Vostochny** spaceport on Tuesday was canceled about two minutes before the scheduled liftoff due to a failure of the pressurization system of the oxidizer tank in the central block of the rocket.

Thursday's launch is the fourth for the Angara-A5, a heavy-lift version of the new Angara family of rockets that has been developed to replace the Soviet-designed Proton rockets.

Prehistoric tomb discovered in south China

Study sheds light on mammals' early evolution

BEIJING, April 13, (Xinhua): A study led by Chinese scientists on Jurassic mammals has shed light on the early evolution of mammals, according to the Institute of Vertebrate Paleontology and Paleoanthropology (IVPP) under the Chinese Academy of Sciences.

There are two important morphological and functional changes in the evolution from reptiles to mammals, one is the transformation of teeth from middle ear ossicular combination to improve auditory effectiveness.

An international research team led by the IVPP studied Jurassic mammal fossils from north China's Inner Mongolia Autonomous Region and southwest China's Yunnan Province, had revealed the earliest evolution of tooth, middle ear and jaw joint in mammals.

Physicist Peter Higgs, father of Higgs Boson theory, dies at 94

LONDON, April 13, (AP): Nobel prizewinning physicist Peter Higgs, who proposed the existence of the so-called "Higgs boson" that helped explain how matter formed after the Big Bang, has died at age 94, the University of Edinburgh said Tuesday.

The university, where Higgs was emeritus professor, said he died Monday following a short illness.

Higgs predicted the existence of a new particle, which came to be known as the Higgs boson, in 1964. He theorized there must be a subatomic particle of certain dimension that would explain how other particles - and therefore all the stars and planets in the uni-

verse - acquired Higgs mass. Without

something like this particle, the set of

equations physicists use to describe the world, known as the standard model, would not hold together.

Higgs' work helps scientists understand one of the most fundamental riddles of the universe: how the Big Bang created something out of nothing 13.8 billion years ago. Without mass from the Higgs, particles could not clump together into the matter we interact with every day.

But it would be almost 50 years before the particle's existence could be confirmed. In 2012, in one of the biggest breakthroughs in physics in decades, scientists at CERN, the European Organization for Nuclear Research, announced that they had finally found a Higgs boson using the Large Hadron Collider, the \$10 billion atom smasher in a 17-mile (27-kilometer) tunnel under the Swiss-French border.

The collider was designed in large part to find Higgs' particle. It produces collisions with extraordinarily high energies in order to mimic some of the conditions that were present in the trillionths of seconds after the Big Bang.

Higgs won the 2013 Nobel Prize in Physics for his work, alongside Francois Englert of Belgium, who independently came up with the same theory.

Edinburgh University Vice Chancellor Peter Mathieson said Higgs, who was born in Newcastle, was "a remarkable individual - a truly gifted scientist whose vision and imagination have enriched our knowledge of the world that surrounds us."

Venezuelan shooter returns to the Olympics at age 60

CARACAS, Venezuela, April 13, (AP): It's been a while - 40 years to be exact - since Venezuelan trap shooter Leonel Martínez last competed at the Olympics.

He was only 20 when he took part in the Los Angeles Games in 1984, but says he's in better shape now, at 60, as he prepares to compete in Paris after the second-longest gap between Olympic appearances in history.

"I give very little relevance to the number," Martinez told The Associated Press about his age. "Now I feel better than when I was 20 years old. Now I am much more confident than when I was 25 years old."

Only Japanese dressage rider Hiroshi Hoketsu waited longer to return to the Olympics. He first competed in Tokyo in 1964 and returned to the Games in Beijing in 2008.

Martínez, who is from Ciudad Ojeda in the western oil state of Zulia, didn't intend to wait this long. After finishing 41st out of 70 in Los Angeles, Martínez was planning to compete at the Seoul Games in 1988 but was absorbed with personal and business commitments.

retirement from the sport, Martínez decided to pursue his dream again.

"Something awakened in me. There was a new spark in my life," Martínez said in an interview at a hotel in Venezuela's capital of Caracas.

He returned to the sport in 2011 when he qualified for the Pan American Games in Guadalajara, México.

Another trap shooter from South America became his inspiration. Francisco Boza, the Peruvian who won the silver medal in that discipline in Los Angeles in 1984, convinced Martínez that age was just a "state of mind."

Martínez was amazed in 2015 when he saw Boza, who was 50 at the time, win a gold medal at the Toronto Pan-American Games, beating opponents half his age. It took several years to start attain-

ing success in regional competitions and get his confidence back. Martínez secured his spot in Paris after

winning the silver medal at the Pan-American Games in Santiago, Chile, last year. He missed gold by one point to Jean Pierre Brol, a 41-year-old from Guatemala.

"Why did so many people fail to make their dreams and goals come true? It's because they easily gave up," Martínez said. "You have to persevere. The more you try, the closer you get to reaching that goal." Martínez was practically born into the sport.

He was a teenager when his father, Alonso Martínez, who also competed internationally, started to let him use his guns to learn trap shooting - a discipline that requires accuracy to repeatedly aim at clay targets in split-second times.

Rojas tears Achilles tendon: Olympic triple jump champion Yulimar Rojas tore her left Achilles tendon and said she will miss this year's Paris Games.

The 28-year-old Venezuelan said on her Instagram account that she was injured while training in Spain. She said she had surgery in Madrid on Thursday.

"My heart is broken, and I want to apologize for not been able to represent you (Venezuelans) in Paris 2024," said Rojas, the world record holder in the event.

Rojas last competed in September when she won the Diamond League. She missed the world indoor championships in Scotland in March.

"I wanted to defend my Olympic title and I was looking forward to it, but I must stop now, understand this, recover and return at full strength to keep flying together," Rojas said.

Rojas set the world record at the Tokyo Olympics in 2021 with a jump of 15.67 meters and increased that to 15.74 a year later in an indoor arena in Serbia. Rojas won a bronze medal in the triple jump at the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Olympics.

Rojas is also a four-time world champion, winning the triple jump in 2017, 2019, 2022 and 2023, as well as a three-time world indoor champion. (AP)


The investigating judge decided to officially consider Rocha to be under investigation after hearing testimony from him on Friday.

Isak scores twice in 4-0 win

NEWCASTLE, England, April 13, (AP): Newcastle handed Tottenham another drubbing at St. James' Park as Alexander Isak's double helped secure a 4-0 win for Eddie Howe's team in the Premier League on Saturday.

Isak and Anthony Gordon both scored within 95 seconds of each other in the first half as Newcastle followed up last season's 6-1 home win over Spurs with another dominant performance to damage Tottenham's hopes of a top-four finish.

Isak, who also scored twice in that big win last April, capped a stellar performance with a second goal in the 51st minute to take his tally to 17 in the league and 21 overall this season. Gordon added his second assist of the game with a corner that was headed home by Fabian Schar for the fourth goal in the 87th.

Tottenham manager Ange Postecoglou, who took charge after last season, had said this week that he had not studied the tape of the 6-1 loss and he probably won't want to watch this one back, either.

Tottenham's defense fell apart re

peatedly and star center back Micky van de Ven was partially at fault for the first two goals as he slipped both times and let Isak and Gordon go past him inside the area. Gordon had set Isak up for the opener in the 30th minute and then netted the second himself in the 32nd after pouncing on a poor ball from Tottenham right back Pedro Porro back toward his own goal.

The third came when Bruno Guimaraes helped Newcastle win possession just outside its own area and then launched a long ball up the pitch for the speedy Isak to run onto. The striker made no mistake when one-on-one with goalkeeper Vicario, calmly slotting the ball inside the far post.

Isak has now scored in six straight league home games and became the first Newcastle player since Alan Shearer in 2003-04 to reach 20 goals in all competitions in a topflight season.



Australia to open F1 season in 2025 as Bahrain. Saudi races shift for Ramadan

LONDON, April 13, (AP): Lewis Hamilton's first race in a Ferrari will be in Australia.

Next year's Formula 1 season will open in Melbourne for the first time since 2019 after the full calendar for 2025 was revealed.

The Australian Grand Prix in Melbourne will be the opening race because the Bahrain and Saudi Arabian rounds of the F1 championship - the first two races of this year - are shifting to mid-April dates to avoid a clash with the Muslim holy month of Ramadan.

Next year, seven-time champion Hamilton will be starting a new era in his career when he s witches to Ferrari for 2025. That will follow 12 years with Mercedes, where Hamilton has won six titles.

Australia was last scheduled

to host the opening race in 2020 but it was canceled hours before the Friday practice session was due to begin as the COVID-19 pandemic began.

After Australia, the next races on the 2025 calendar will be in China and then Japan, fitting F1's plans to cut the travel distance between its events where possible with an eye to the sport's environmental impact.

The schedule stays at 24 races

- a record length for F1 - and there are no new circuits for next year, which will mark the 75th anniversary of F1. The season finishes with the Abu Dhabi Grand Prix on Dec. 7.
