THE visit of His Highness the Amir to Bahrain was the third of his Gulf tour. It was certainly as blessed as the previous two visits, and reveals the depth of relations between Kuwait and other member states of the Gulf Cooperation Council, which is built on mutual respect, love, and a single

This visit represented an opportunity to put the Head of State in front of the changes that Bahrain has witnessed, among other similar ones, from

economic openness to enhancing the movement of investments in the region, and working to diversify sources of income, so that oil is not the strategic commodity that these countries rely on. Over the past three de-

cades, Manama has worked on increasing opportunities in all fields, and has encouraged social openness, which is the backbone of

any successful economy.

It has become the focus of international rating agencies, whose indicators reveal that its rating has risen to levels that confirm it has emerged from the bottleneck in terms of the absolute dependence on oil.

There is no doubt that Bahrain is one of the countries that has worked for 20 years to diversify its sources of income based on its 2030 vision, and has taken important steps in doing so.

Its dependence on hydrocarbons has decreased, especially in terms of gross domestic product, exports, and financial revenues, so that it will not face any economic problems in the future that will hinder it and affect the social aspect.

It has promoted the tourism sector by opening itself to the world, facilitating entry into and exit from the country, granting instant visitation facilities, and encouraging investment in all sec-

What it achieved 15 years ago in the context of its economic vision has begun to be translated today through well-thought-out laws that anticipate the future. Now it is bearing fruit.

From this standpoint, His Highness's visit to Manama was also suitable to find out what can be achieved in Kuwait. This is due to the fact that the similarity of the characteristics of the societies of Bahrain and Kuwait gives the decision-maker the ability to compare in realistic circumstances.

How can we plan for a collaborative future between the two nations in line with the Gulf vision upon which the Gulf Cooperation Council was founded? This vision aims to establish a crucial strategic partnership that is economically, politically, and socially more adaptable.

Kuwait Airways, Jazeera for family visits


KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13: Due to expatriates submitting incomplete papers, the Residence Affairs Department has released a brochure outlining necessary documents for family visit visa approv-

These include a signed request from the sponsor, contact information, travel ticket, valid passport copies, sponsor's civil ID, address verification, and a sponsor's workplace confirmation.

Additionally, authenticated certificates of kinship are required attested by the Kuwaiti embassies and foreign ministries. Despite rumors, visa issuance for all visit types continues and added, it is not true that the ministry will stop issuing visit visas within two months.

Moreover, citing sources from the Directorate-General of Civil Aviation it has been reported that "No entry for family visit" passengers into the country except through Kuwait Airways or Jazeera Airways.

Sources told Al-Seyassah that "the violating passengers will be returned to where they came from.'

Bond 'historic'

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13, (KUNA): A joint statement released on Tuesday after talks between His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah and Bahrin's King Hamad bin Issa Al-Khalifa put much emphasis on the "historic bond" shared between the two Gulf Arab neighbors.

The talks, ahead of a pan-Arab summit hosted by the Gulf Arab kingdom in May, are part of efforts to ensure a "united Arab stand" in the face of "conflict and challenges" gripping the region, a measure they both agreed is necessary to protect peace and security.

On bilateral cooperation, His Highness the Amir and the Bahraini king collectively underscored that there remains room for progress in bilateral trade and investment, which entails exploring investment opportunities.

They discussed a joint security committee linking the two Gulf

Saudi Cabinet calls for ceasefire

Kuwait FM and British envoy discuss situation in Palestine


KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13, (Agencies): Kuwaiti Minister of Foreign Affairs Abdullah Al-Yahya received Tuesday the British Minister of State for the Middle East, North Africa, South Asia and the UN, Lord Tariq Ahmed.

Both sides touched on the historical bilateral ties between the UK and Kuwait as well as the latest regional and global developments especially the situation in Palestine.

Minister Al-Yahya reaffirmed Kuwait's stance on the Palestinian cause and its support to the Palestinian people to obtain their full rights and establish their independent state. Elsewhere, Saudi Arabia's Cabinet stressed Tuesday the need to end the ongoing Israeli war in the Gaza Strip and remove obstacles impeding the entry of humanitarian aid into the Strip.

The Saudi Press Agency quoted a cabinet statement as saying that the cabinet underscored the need to take steps toward implementing the twostate solution and recognizing the State of Palestine within the 1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital.

Parliament probes ministerial responses

Assembly objects to exclusion of MP's speech

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13: The National Assembly on Tuesday rejected the decision of Speaker Ahmed Al-Saadoun to remove the response of MP Abdulkate 2023-6 Kandari to the Amiri speech delivered on Oct 31, 2023 from the minutes of the previous session.

Al-Saadoun had earlier cut the statement of Al-Kandari from the television broadcast, pointing out this decision is in line with Article 69 of National Assembly Law. Al-Kandari then said it seems the seat of the Speaker is like magic; indicating that cutting his speech from the television broadcast indicates it included offensive phrases, but this is not true. He clarified that his speech was the polite response of a son to his father, referring to himself and HH the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah.

Then, the Assembly proceeded with the discussion and approval of the following incoming letters:

Request of the Human Resources Development Committee to extend the deadline to complete its investigation into the factors that led to the rising number of nominees to leadership positions in public institutions. The committee promised to submit its report to the Assembly before the current parliamentary year ends.

■ Request of MP Mubarak Al-Hajraf to assign the Public Facilities Committee to discuss the establishment of the Camel Market along the Eighth Ring Road in Artal. Some MPs objected; stating this should be referred to the Environment, Food and Water Security Committee but their number was not enough to lead to the rejection of the letter.

■ Request of MP Muhammad Al-Hewaila to assign the Education, Culture and Guidance Affairs Committee to discuss the decision of the Ministry of Higher Education to prevent the holders of secondary stage certificates obtained more than two years ago from applying for admission into the universities.

■ Request of a number of MPs to assign the Health, Social and Labor Affairs Committee to investigate the delayed registration of new medicines and medical equipment, and procedures adopted by the Ministry of Health in this regard. Minister of Health Ahmed Al-Awadhi commented on the letter; affirming that he and the ministry are concerned about the citizens' health and safety. He said no medicine is approved unless it passes the specified tests, which may take long time in some cases. He explained that "sometimes the delay is due to the procedures taken away from the ministry.

'Major resource of drinking water, desalination plants'

Citizens, residents urged to protect Kuwait Bay from pollution

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13: The Kuwait Society for Environmental Protection (KSEP) commented on the Municipal Council's announcement of "the new committee's initial approval to establish a sea bridge linking the Mutla'a City to Kuwait City via the Kuwait Bay."

In a press statement issued yesterday in response to the Municipal Council's proposal, the society called for mobilizing the efforts of concerned parties to address the pollution of Kuwait Bay and the challenges facing its cleanliness and protection.

It called on citizens, residents and all parties to interact positively with its "Kuwait Bay Life" initiative, which it launched in 2016, to preserve and protect the Kuwait Bay, and its components and natural and environmental habitats, as it is a major economic resource for drinking water and desalination plants, in addition to its coastal, beach, recreational and commercial importance.

The Kuwait Society for Environ-mental Protection said, "The importance of Kuwait Bay lies in it being an economic, environmental, natural, ecological and geographical area for the State of Kuwait.

Most importantly of all, it is classified in the Environmental Protection Law as a region and environment of a special nature. It is considered a meeting point for the ecosystem in the sea and the ecosystem on land, and is the second largest fish pond in the world.

Economic

It is also considered a suitable and safe area for shrimp breeding and nursery, and a home for migratory birds due to its warm climate, in addition to the availability of food and

It seems that we are in dire need today of a reminder of the goals of this initiative and campaign to always keep the environmental issue in mind.

The slowness of the currents inside the Bay makes it impossible for there to be any structural obstacles in this limited area. This will affect the

movement of water circulation and renewal in the Kuwait Bay, which in turn affects the accumulation of heavy metals and the nutrient levels in the water column, and thus affecting the fish stock.'

The society explained that the most prominent and important reason for preserving and protecting Kuwait Bay is the large fish stocks, which represent a major resource for food security in the country.

Permissible

National efforts must be exerted to solve the problem, the most prominent of which is the allocation of a national committee concerned with this matter. It should include representatives of the relevant and concerned parties, in addition to the allocation of chapter five (Biological Diversity) and Chapter Three, Articles 108, 109, and 110 of the Environmental Protection Law.

The Kuwait Society for Environmental Protection stated, "Perhaps the most important thing is that Articles 108 and 110 of the Environmental Protection Law No. 42/2014 amended by Law No. 99/2015 stipulate that it is not permissible to initiate any projects inside the city without obtaining the approval of the Supreme Council for the Environment. This is not currently available because the council has not been formed and its work has been suspended for quite some time.

The Supreme Council for the Environment cannot decide whether to approve or not until it obtains studies about the environmental impact and the opinion of the Environment Public Authority, as the decision is linked to its recommendation regarding the project's impact on Kuwait Bay."

In its statement, the Kuwait Society for Environmental Protection highlighted the importance of preserving Kuwait City.

It emphasized the importance of sustainable interaction with individual, collective and institutional responsibility towards it, and taking into account the interest of future generations, due to its economic, environmental, natural, ecological and geographical importance to Kuwait.

After the meeting, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs, Shereeda Al-Mousherji, said the cabinet was briefed first on His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah upcoming visit to the Kingdom of Bahrain tomorrow (Tuesday), and wished His Highness the Amir and his accompanying delegation success and a pleasant time.

"The Islamic Republic of Iran, with its realistic view of the political geography of the region, sought to establish balanced relations with neighboring countries and relied on reconciliation and religious and popular commonalities that trump points of difference to strengthen and consolidate these relations.

New horizons explored

Kuwait deep-rooted relations with the Kingdom of Bahthe leadership and the people of the countries.

Mutual visits between the leaderships, like His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah's upcoming visit to Bahrain, confirm the close relations and ties of kinship.

The continuation of visits give strong indications of the leaderships' keenness to launch joint relations for the benefit of their peoples and reflect the consensus on regional and international issues. The strength of the Kuwaiti-Bahraini relations was rep-

resented throughout history, such as Bahrain's position and it pivotal role in providing logistical support and military ground, air and naval support to the coalition forces during Iraq's brutal invasion of Kuwait. The Kingdom contributed to the drafting of resolutions condemning Iraq's invasion and calling for the regime's total

withdrawal from Kuwaiti territory, as well as its support of the return of legitimacy to Kuwait in all international forums. Bahrain also embraced about 12,000 Kuwaitis during the invasion and formed a committee to handle their affairs. as well as the Kingdom's efforts post-liberation through

medical support and infrastructure rehabilitation. In addition, the late King of Bahrain Sheikh Isa bin Salman Al-Khalifah visited Kuwait immediately after liberation on June 19, 1991 to congratulate the late Amir of Kuwait Sheikh Jaber Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah and the Kuwaiti people on the return of Kuwaiti legitimacy and the

demise of the Iraqi occupation. King Isa said, "It is a most joyful hour for me to meet my brother the Amir (Sheikh Jaber) in Kuwait after the scourge has been lifted of Kuwait and its return to its people.'

Returning gratitude and in recognition of Bahrain's great efforts, the late Amir of Kuwait Sheikh Jaber Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah went to Bahrain to express his gratitude and Kuwait's appreciation for all what Bahrain has provided

Moreover, in 2003, during the Iraq war, Bahraini troops headed to Kuwait to participate in protecting its borders during the entry of US forces into Iraq to oust the former Iraqi regime.

Honorable

Kuwait also has honorable positions with Bahrain, the last of which was Kuwait's support of the Kingdom during the unfortunate events that occurred in February 2011; the Kuwaiti naval forces participated under the Peninsula Shield Forces in Bahrain to maintain security in the Kingdom.

Kuwait also partnered with Saudi Arabia and the UAE to support the efforts of the fiscal program in Bahrain as part of an aid package amounting to about USD 10 billion in 2018.

Over the past decades, Bahraini-Kuwaiti relations have witnessed significant development at all levels, especially since the establishment of joint higher committee for cooperation between the two countries in 2001, leading to the signing of eight agreements in the field of diplomatic, consular, tourism, air, cultural, educational and media cooperation, memorandum of understanding and executive programs for cooperation in various fields.

The trade between the two countries amounted to about USD 482 million by the end of 2022, and Kuwaiti direct investments in Bahrain exceeded USD 2.3 billion.

In addition, the signing of the Kuwait Fund for Arab Economic Development 19 agreements with Bahrain was worth about USD 1.5 billion; trade between Bahrain and Kuwait increased to USD 113 million in 2023 by 10 percent compared to 2022.

The two countries are constantly seeking to develop bilateral relations, which consistently witness remarkable growth for the benefit of both. Kuwait and Bahrain.

'Cultural, touristic openness opens minds, leads to economic success'

"POLITICAL openness is a step that requires boldness in application. The countries that changed and developed positively were open countries, and coexistence is one of the most important means that make people progress, because it makes people respect the beliefs and ideas of others, which contributes to harmony and builds healthy relationships with those who are intellectually, culturally, and ethnically different from them," columnist Dr. Ghadeer Muhammad Asiri wrote for Al-Qabas daily.

"To achieve balance in society, coexistence and acceptance of others, which reduces the gap of differences and puts the state's interest as a priority through acceptance and cultural pluralism, and moves the state to an advanced level that is better than it was before is vital.

"Intellectual openness is an urgent need when a person lives in a society of multiple races, origins and cultures, so the difference in practices Customs, needs, and fashions are among the healthy practices of civilized societies, and require the citizen to interact with those who are different from him at work, public places, and agencies that provide public services in the country.

'Updating old laws is an urgent need in many countries, especially since the laws were developed on the basis of a structure different from the present, and they contain a large gap. We find boldness in advanced legislation, and adopting what is suitable for society is in itself improving the practices of individuals and making them open to global policies and global peoples.

"Countries that open their doors to tourism with licensed official visas are more prosperous and developed, and have achieved leading numbers in indicators of success with the availability of infrastructure resources for development projects, such as the United States of America, which achieved the figure of 100%, Britain 98%, and Singapore 85%, as well as some Gulf countries such as Qatar.

"The UAE and Saudi Arabia, which have come topping the best indicators of connectivity with the rest of the world, have achieved amazing results in entrepreneurship and economic openness, which has moved many countries' budgets to the indicators of success and globalism.

"Cultural openness is a step that precedes political and economic openness, and prohibiting cultural openness closes minds and obscures them from the large, civilized world. It is one of the steps in the United Nations' adoption of the 2030 Sustainable Development Plan, and an engine for development and the integration of cultures into sustainable policy programs in the world, which can be achieved by being informed and involved in the importance of having arts, civilizations, museums, exhibitions and artistic performances in any society, to educate people and make them quick to accept other civilizations and homogeneous races, and the need for positive change has become a necessity

"What is the easiest thing in Kuwait? The answer is the easiest thing is to change the minister and bring in a new minister. What are the things we are most accustomed to in Kuwait? The answer: Getting rid of the government and forming a new one. What is something that was constant and has changed today? Answer: Change the Prime Minister. Of course, as a result of this, every year or two, under the best circumstances, we have new parliamentary elections and new representatives," columnist Mubarak Fahd Al-Duwailah, wrote for

"What are the consequences of this abnormal situation? The answer: Every year we have a new government work program that undermines the government program which was approved less than a year ago, and was barely agreed upon with the National Assembly.

"This is the real reason for the stalled development in the country, and this is the reason why we lag behind the rest of the GCC countries.

"The reason is not the existence of parliamentary oversight, as some like to imagine, and the reason is not the existence of oversight institutions such as the Audit Bureau and others, but rather the instability of ministers in their ministries, and the lack of continuation of a government work program that was recently agreed upon -- all of this leads to the disruption of development.

"So why do we have a change in ministers, governments and representatives every day? The reason, I think, is that we cannot tolerate the opinion of others, and we can no longer tolerate criticism, and we quickly become frustrated with the political bickering that always occurs between representatives and ministers, and if we find a representative who has gone out of context and tact of speech, we generalize this event to everyone, and create a political crisis between the two authorities.

"The easiest way out of these crises is to dissolve Parliament and call early elections. A decision is soon issued to stop government work unless urgent matters are dealt with. Since when do we hear about the Silk City in the north of the country? Twenty years ago. A stable government and council could have built five silk cities.

"Since when do we demand street repair and maintenance? Since when do we demand repair and maintenance of the rain sewer network? Every minister who comes up with a plan to advance the country, but the lucky one among the ministers is the one who lasts two years before being dismissed for reasons he does not know. I say he is lucky because he saw whoever came before him did not last two months.

"Today, the MPs know the government's weak point. They ask any minister they do not want a number of questions and then an interrogation. He is changed and a number of ministers are changed before he ascends the podium. In order not to be unfair to the MPs, the selection of ministers is sometimes

a major cause of the crisis between the two authorities. As soon as there is a minister whose selection is announced, the people produce a list of his CVs that confirms the poor and rapid selection.

"Now what is the way out of these crises? Stability in the government apparatus is the way out. Make the best choice (the strong and honest one), then give him the opportunity to implement his agenda and vision, and let him bear the results of his work and face the National Assembly.

"If he is right, we support him and the people are watching over his representatives, and if he is wrong, let him go without regretting it. What is important is that we endure the democratic practice and bear its results, both good and bad. Only here will we see government programs transformed from ink on paper into tangible reality and sustainable development."

"The escalation of tension in the region ... and our national preparedness. An observer of the situation in the region does not need much analysis to know that the Middle East has become a hotbed of tension and conflicts -- regional and international, since Oct 7 last year, as well as the subsequent continuous escalation of tension between the regional parties, and between them and the United States and some western countries," columnist M. Adel Al-Jarallah Al-Kharafi wrote for Al Seyassah daily.

"Perhaps, the CIA director's statement that 'the region has not witnessed an escalation like this in four decades' comes in this context, although he did not indicate the role of American policy in this.

"The escalation in political discourse and armed skirmishes has reached a point that could turn our region into a war zone, and hostilities with dire consequences for the countries and peoples of the region.

"The bottom line here is our national security and the safety of our lands and our people if, God forbid, war breaks out. Many experts and observers expect the escalation of tension and the consequent outbreak of war. It is not only an exaggeration, but a possibility that can occur with any development in light of

"The fundamental questions here are: Have we understood the risks? Are we prepared to preserve our national security, food security, territorial integrity and sovereignty? Are there security and strategic plans to deal with the changes if a regional war breaks out, because it is very likely that the events and consequences will affect us? Or, are we just observing and making preserving our national security a mere reaction to developments, which could be the worst and most severe scenario?

"It is not a secret that the developments in the region and the escalation of tension therein have become a worrying matter for the Kuwaiti citizen who, at this stage, needs reassurance about his security and that of his homeland.

Ban sale of balloons, water pistols, foam sprayers; violators face law

Student, family attack teachers, vice-principals, many hurt

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13: The Ministry of Commerce and Industry (MoCI) intends to implement a ban on the sale and distribution of "balloons" and "water pistols" an foam sprayers" across all commercial outlets in Kuwait, reports Al-Oabas daily.

The Al-Qabas daily has learned that this ban will encompass cooperative societies, supermarkets, and stores, with significant penalties

imposed on violators, including closure of the point of sale and legal prosecution, reports Al-Qabas daily.

According to informed sources, the anticipated decision from the ministry will enforce the ban for a specific period, including the month of February. This action follows numerous complaints regarding the misuse of balloons, pistols, and water sprayers during national holiday celebrations.

The sources further revealed that the Ministry of Commerce has decided to prohibit the sale of balloons and water pistols based on pertinent data, which

> has been detailed as under: ■ The huge annual waste of water, specifically during Febru-

ary 25 and 26. The phenomenon of using balloons and water sprinklers causes an increase in the number of car accidents and damage to other people's property.

■ The Ministry of Health annually records a large number of injuries to the face and eyes due to the injured being thrown into balloons from water pistols filled with liquids.

■ The Ministry of Interior records a large number of cases of physical assault during the holiday period, which are sparked by throwing balloons and throwing water.

School staff attacked: The Ministry of Education said legal measures have been initiated following an attack on the educational and administrative staff of a school in Al-Ahmadi saying the incident has been referred to investigation, reports Al-Anba daily.

The ministry sources said there should be no laxity in the application of systems, regulations and laws regulating work within the school campus.

According to a security source, a student and his family members attacked teachers and assistant principals which led to the injury to some. A case has been filed at the Jaber Al-Ali police station, and medical reports have been attached to the case papers. The source stated that detectives investigated the incident and arrested the accused.

Fire in jewelry store: Following investigations into a fire incident at a jewelry store and café in Sharq, authorities have confirmed that the blaze was sparked by an electrical short circuit, reports Al-Anba daily.

Upon receiving a report, the Ministry of Interior Operations dispatched patrols from the Directorate-General of Fire Department (DGFD) and Capital Security patrols to the scene. Responding swiftly, the firemen managed to contain the flames, which had spread to the basement jewelry store, result-

ing in minimal material losses.'

11 injured in fire: Fire broke out at an apartment on the second floor of a residential building in Salmiya, causing injuries and shortness of breath to 11 people, reports Al-Rai daily quoting sources. Sources said firefighters from Bidaa and Salmiva fire stations, and teams from the Search and Rescue Center, rushed to the location immediately after receiving information

about the fire incident. Sources revealed that the fire spread quickly, prompting seven tenants of different nationalities to jump from the second floor, resulting in fractures in various parts of their bodies, while four others suffered from shortness of breath -- one of whom is in serious condition. Sources added the medical emergency personnel dealt with the injured.

A case was registered and investigations are ongoing to determine the circumstances leading to the fire.

This is the matter that tied the court's hands and distanced it from using its authority stipulated in article 132 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and Trials by amending the description of the accusation in question to a legal description which is supposed to exist - that is more correct and accurate.

According to its view, this is considered a legislative loophole and flaw that requires careful control and correction in order to place all individuals and groups in the field of fundraising with their various beliefs and orientations under the scrutiny of the auditor, and under the eye of the censor who prevents the recurrence of the incident in question, and protects the country from any harm that may

befall it or its position internally or externally at the local, regional, or international levels.

Death ruling commuted: The Court of Appeals commuted the sentence of death penalty to life imprisonment for three Asian drug traffickers who were accused of bringing into the country drugs and psychotropic substances for the purpose of trafficking.

During the court session, the defendants admitted to bringing 169 kilograms of psychotropic substances and ten kilograms of hashish and heroin for trafficking in Kuwait.

Ruling on Feb 19: The Criminal Court adjourned to February 19 to pronounce the ruling on the case filed against a Kuwaiti citizen who is accused of joining ISIS and supporting them with a donation of KD 4,000.

In his confessions, he explained that he met an ISIS member through the Telegram app, and spoke to him more than once. He then expressed his interest in joining the banned group, and went on to donate a sum of KD 4,000 to them, which they told him was for charitable work. Through that app, he pledged allegiance to the group at the request of the ISIS organization. At the time of his arrest, a firearm, a machine gun and ammunition were found on him.

Bedoun sprays gunfire, injures 2 Kuwaitis, surrenders

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13: A Bedoun resident shot two Kuwaiti citizens in the diwaniya of their house in Waha in Jahra, fled the scene, and surrendered himself at the police station later.

According to security sources, when the Operations Room of the Ministry of Interior received information about the incident, securitymen and paramedics rushed to the location.

They learned that the suspect - a Bedoun resident - went to his friend's diwaniya in Waha, Jahra and shot him in the leg and his brother in the back, after which he fled from the scene. The two victims were referred to Jahra Hospital for treatment.

The 1998-Bedoun man surrendered himself at the police station with the firearm he used to shoot the victims, revealing that he opened fire due to disagreements between him and his friend

The sources affirmed that the injured victims are still receiving treatment in the hospital, and a case has been registered.

Naval drill concludes: Kuwait Naval Force recently concluded the activities of the Ready Defender Exercise (24), which was held from Jan 28 to Feb 7, with the participation of units from the Coast Guard General Department at the Ministry of Interior, as well as forces from the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries, US Navy and the British Royal Navy, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

In a press statement, the Office of the Kuwait Army Chief of Staff disclosed that the activities included naval shooting and training for specific strike operations, such as conducting a multiparty amphibious raid consisting of mixed special forces, storming and searching commercial ships and oil carriers to reach the highest level of coordination in order to increase joint capacity and interoperability among participants. It explained that the exercise, which is held periodically, aims to enhance combat and defense capabilities; and contribute to achieving stability and peacekeeping in the Arabian Gulf region in general, and maritime security in particular.

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13: According to the Minister of Electricity and Water, and the Minister of State for Housing Affairs Dr. Salem Al-Hajraf, the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy is committed to the data classification policy issued by the Communications and Information Technology Regulatory Authority (CITRA). The ministry

(CITRA). The ministry follows the general strategy for cybersecurity issued by the Planning, Training and Information Systems Sector.

In his response to a parliamentary question directed by a member of the National Assembly MP Fahad Al-Masoud, Dr. Al-Hajraf explained

that the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy has an infrastructure that includes the latest technology, servers and storage devices to save and manage customer data securely. This is under the responsibility of several departments, namely the Automation Center Administration, the Customer Services Sector, the Information Systems Center Administration, and the Planning, Training,

In line with the state's policy and directives towards digital transformation, the ministry launched its services in several applications in order to facilitate customers and speed up the completion of transactions. A total of 20,357 services were completed during the year 2023.

and Information Systems Sector.

There are external parties that manage the applications and provide a high degree of security, including Zain Company, which manages the MEW-PAY application in accordance with Contract No. 5211.

According to the terms of the contract, the company provides a high degree of security, as does the Public Authority for Civil Information (PACI) and the Sahel application management. There are no electronic websites affiliated with the ministry that have stopped working due to lack of need for them or due to lack of updating.

KPC plans to establish fuel trading company

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13: Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) is reviving a plan to establish a fuel trading company as part of its preparations to deal with increasing quantities of products after the start of operation of a new refinery, reports Al-Anba daily.

Sources privy to the plan disclosed that KPC sent five employees from its International Marketing Department to undergo training at Oman Oil Company, which is considered the strongest sign that a long-term plan for the trading business is beginning to take shape.

Last week, Kuwait and Oman opened a joint oil refining project in the Sultanate of Oman, giving the two partners additional quantities of diesel and jet fuel to sell in global markets.

Kuwait aims to establish the company early next year, most likely in Dubai, to trade refined products instead of crude ones, according to sources who requested anonymity as the plans are confidential.

They said that the five Kuwaiti employees are working in the Dubai office of OQT -- the Omani commercial arm, where they are being trained in buying and selling fuel, logistics and finance. However, KPC did not respond to an email requesting for its statement in this regard as it was sent outside working hours.

State oil companies in the Middle East are working to build commercial arms to benefit from additional profits from buying and selling various types of fuel, such as gasoline and diesel; instead of leaving these activities to traditional commodity trading companies. Global companies like Shell and BP have units that trade huge amounts of oil and gas, which help boost their overall profits.

Kuwait's efforts to establish a trade unit date back to at least 2017, and the project did not take off in part due to political opposition. Since then, KPC has increased its refining capacity, giving it more fuel to sell.

MPW treated 73mn cubic meters of water last year

Ministry secures building licenses

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13: The Ministry of Public Works announced that the total volume of tertiary and quaternary treated water amounted to 73 million cubic meters in the year 2023, with the volume of tertiary treated water being 24 million cubic meters, and quaternary treated water 49 million cubic meters.

It indicated that the number of entities benefiting from treated water is 26, in addition to food security farms in Abdali and Wafra.

It is worth noting that the ministry's sanitary engineering sector is responsible for treating wastewater in its stations. It has been used in afforestation projects and fodder farms for more than 30 years. The treated water has now become the main source for irrigation of agricultural projects of all kinds.

Treated water is used for agricultural purposes in Wafra and Abdali farms through the treated water network from the Sulaibiya Control Center to the treated water stations in Wafra and Abdali.

On the other hand, sources in the ministry explained that the ministry has ob-

tained the necessary licenses from the concerned authorities to establish the office building of the Minister of State for National Assembly Affairs. The building project is also scheduled to be included in the ministry's budget for 2024/2025 in coordination with the Ministry of Finance to allocate a budget for the project.

The project is part of the construction projects implemented by the ministry for the benefit of government agencies, and the Ministry of National Assembly Affairs is one of these agencies. The plot of land was allocated for the construction of the office building earlier, and after receiving it, it became clear that there are some obstacles to it. The Ministry of Public Works, which is the competent authority for implementing the project, requested the removal of these obstacles to be consistent with the design of the building which has been completed.

The sources revealed that the Office of the Minister of State for National Assembly Affairs, in coordination with the concerned authorities, removed these obstacles and then handed over the land free of these obstacles.

They indicated that the location of the building is in Sharq, and it is an administrative building consisting of the offices of the Minister of State for National Assembly Affairs and assistant undersecretaries, as well as open offices for employees, a multi-use hall, a theater, a library, a cafeteria and warehouses.

Farwaniya Committee approves Ardiya rainwater tank expansion

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13: The Farwaniya Committee of the Municipal Council, during its third meeting of the second session yesterday headed by Khaled Mufleh Al-Mutairi, approved the request of the Public Authority for Roads and Transportation (PART) to allocate site for the expansion of a rainwater collection tank in Ardiya for government uses and two connecting paths for rainwater drainage.

It approved the request of the Ministry of Social Affairs for the allocation of a temporary location for the central market in Firdous Block 9.

The committee referred to the executive branch the letter sent by the Undersecretary of the Ministry of Interior in response to the request of the Municipal Council's Farwaniya Committee regarding the inquiries related to the five proposals to improve traffic movement on Salem Al-Muzain Street located in Khaitan.

It also referred to to the executive branch the letter submitted by a Kuwaiti citizen for the approval of the construction of a service street in Sabah Al-Nasser on the side of the Sixth Ring Road, and the letter submitted by a Kuwaiti citizen for the construction of an exit way from the roundabout in West Abdullah Mubarak Block 6.

The committee kept on its agenda the question submitted by the Deputy Chairman of the Municipal Council Khaled Mufleh Al-Mutairi regarding the Kabd Road extending from Sulaibiya Bridge to Jawakhir Kabd, and the letter submitted by the Ministry of Public Works for the allocation of sites for construction and temporary offices in various parts of Kuwait.

It also reserved the request submitted by PART for the allocation of sites for open basins to collect rainwater, open water channels, underground water connections, and rainwater drainage paths around the South Abdullah Al-Mubarak housing area.

Arab neighbors, they said that talks on security cooperation held in July 2023 led to the formation of "working groups" between the two sides aiming to keep intact peace and security in the two countries, which would be a step forward towards "preserving the unity" of the six-member of Gulf Cooperation Council bloc.

On recent happenings around the region, Kuwait and Manama called on Iraq to "respect the sovereignty" of Kuwait, which entails a total commitment to relevant United Nations agreements and conventions over the "complete demarcation" of Kuwaiti-Iraqi maritime borders.

They urged Baghdad to commit in equal measure to an agreement signed by the two Gulf Arab neighbors in April of 2012, which ultimately came into effect in December of 2013, while they rejected any "unilateral" Iraqi measure to nix joint security protocols aiming to regulate maritime navigation in the Khor Abdullah waterway between the two countries.

Kuwait and Manama went on to give their backing to the works of the United Nations Assistance Mission for Iraq (UNAMI), which provides assistance and support to Iraqis, in addition to efforts aiming to identify the remains of "Kuwaitis and third-country

The two sides also stressed that Al-Durra Field is located entirely within the maritime borders of the State of Kuwait, affirming that its natural resources are shared between Kuwait and Saudi Arabia.

Moreover, both sides touched on the situation in Palestine and other Araboccupied territories, expressing deep concern regarding the catastrophic humanitarian situation in the Gaza Strip.

Kuwait and Bahrain urged the Înternational Society and the UN Security Council to end the ongoing war in Gaza and protect civilians, calling to prevent any Israeli displacement attempts on the Palestinians.

The two sides agreed on the necessity of allowing international organizations to carry out their tasks in providing humanitarian assistance for the

Palestinian people. Further, both sides called on the international society to support the efforts of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA), stressing the agency's important role in providing aid to about 5.7 million refugees.

Both sides affirmed the need to reach a just settlement of the Palestinian cause by the principle of the two-state solution as stated in the Arab Peace Initiative and the relevant international legitimacy resolutions in a way that guarantees the Palestinian people their right to establish their independent state on the 1967 borders with East Jerusalem as its capital.

Regarding Yemen, the two sides

stressed the importance of reaching a comprehensive political solution to the Yemeni crisis in accordance with the three terms of reference, the Gulf Initiative and its implementation mechanism, the outcomes of the comprehensive national dialogue, and Security Council resolutions, including Resolution 2216.

Regarding navigation in the Red Sea, the two sides stressed the importance of maintaining the security and stability of the Red Sea region and respecting the right to maritime navigation therein per the provisions of international law and the 1982 UN Convention on the Law of the Sea to preserve the freedom of global trade.

On the other hand, King of Bahrain Hamad bin Isa Al-Khalifa granted His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah the Order of Sheikh Isa bin Salman Al-Khalifa at Bahrain's Sakhir Palace, in recognition and appreciation for his efforts to reinforce the bilateral ties between the two nations.

In turn, His Highness the Amir thanked the Bahraini King for his hospitality and warm welcome during his visit to the country, showing the deep brotherly ties between the two countries.

The Assembly also tackled the parliamentary questions forwarded to ministers. MP Marzouq Al- Ghanim disclosed that he has forwarded almost 70 queries; but he received only 28 responses, some of which are inaccurate. He said he asked the former oil minister to clarify the news published by Al-Jarida daily that Iran has been ignoring Kuwait and distorting facts the former oil minister's response was that such queries must be forwarded to the foreign affairs minister; which he did, but he has not received any response till date. He pointed out that since the issue concerns national security, it requires a clear reply --either to deny or affirm the published information. Minister of Foreign Affairs Abdullah

Al-Yahya asserted that he is ready to respond the MPs' queries, confirming that Al-Ghanim will receive the reply soon.

MP Hamad Al-Matar commented on the queries he forwarded to Minister of Education, Higher Education and Scientific Research Adel Al-Adwani about the private universities. He stressed that no other country provides 90 percent of the revenues of private universities like Kuwait, yet these universities are not hiring national academic staff and they impose extra fees on students for absurd purposes. He said the government provides private universities with almost KD300 million revenues (about \$1 billion); so he wants to know the strategy adopted by the minister in dealing with private universities.

MP Jenan Bushehri stated that she forwarded three queries about Dhaman Hospitals Company to the minister of commerce and industry; but the latter's replies were sent to the Secretariat General of the Assembly, claiming they contain confidential information. She wondered what could be the secrets included in the answers to her queries. She urged the Assembly Office to review these answers and then reclassify them.

MP Falah Al-Hajri revealed that he asked the former defense minister to provide him with certain information like the number of military personnel who participated in the 1967, 1973 and 1990 wars; but the response he got was unclear and there was no exact figure, as he was merely informed that there were thousands.

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13: The Hawally Committee of the Municipal Council, during its sixth meeting of the second session yesterday headed by member Nasser Al-Jadaan, agreed to amend the status of the plots No. 145 to 153, transferred from A55 - B55, in Siddeeq Block 4, in accordance with the provisions of the law 40/1978. This was based on the request of the Ministry of Electricity, Water, and Renewable Energy, to allocate a site for a secondary transformer station (Station 5) in Mishref Block 6, and to allocate and install a site for the construction of a secondary transformer station (Station 2) in Mishref Block 6.

The committee also approved the creation of a U-turn on Nasser Al-Mubarak Street, and another in Rumaithiya.

The committee referred to the executive branch, to conduct a study, the Ministry of Health's letter for the allocation of land in Hawally Governorate to establish a specialized dental center. It also referred to the executive branch the letter submitted by a Kuwaiti citizen for converting a plot in Salmiya Block 6, Street 3 into a commercial

It also referred to the executive branch the request of the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy for allocating a secondary station site in Surra Block 5 to a proposed

The committee expressed its disagreement with the Ministry of Finance's request to reallocate the site decided upon by the Municipal Council's decision in favor of the Ministry of Finance.

The committee retained the proposal submitted by member Fahad Al-Abduljader for the construction of industrial speed bumps on Khalid Abdul Latif Al-Musallam Street in Al-Salaam Block 3, as well as the proposal submitted regarding traffic congestion in Jabriya and Surra areas.



Russia puts Estonia PM on a wanted list

TALLINN, Estonia, Feb 13, (AP): Estonia's prime minister has been put on a wanted list in Russia because of hver efforts to remove Soviet-era World War II monuments in the Baltic nation, officials said Tuesday as tensions between Russia and the West soar amid the war in Ukraine.

The name of Prime Minister **Kaja Kallas** appeared on the Russian Interior Ministry's list of people wanted on unspecified criminal charges, although it was unclear when she was added, according to Mediazona,



The move was related to her efforts to remove World War II monuments, other Russian officials said. There was no immediate reaction from Estonian authorities.

Estonia and fellow NATO members Latvia and Lithuania have pulled down monuments that are widely seen as

an unwanted legacy of the Soviet occupation of those countries

Russia and West clash over Ukraine: Russia accused the West on Monday of sabotaging agreements that would have prevented the war in Ukraine - but the U.S. and its allies put the blame squarely on Moscow, saying there is no escaping that President Vladimir Putin ordered the invasion of its smaller neighbor.

Days before the second anniversary of Russia's invasion on Feb 24, 2022, Russia's UN Ambassador Vassily Nebenzia again put the cause of the war down to the failure to implement the 2015 Minsk agreements, which he blamed on "Kyiv's sabotage" supported by the West.

The agreements aimed to resolve the conflict between Ukraine and Russia-backed separatists that flared in April 2014 after Russia's annexation of Crimea and its support for the separatists in the mostly Russian-speaking industrial east called Donbas.

France criticizes Russia: France condemned "hostile" disinformation maneuvers after the country's authorities on Monday accused Russia of operating a long-running online manipulation campaign against Ukraine's Western backers, in the lead up to the second anniversary of Moscow's military invasion of its neighbor.

The French foreign ministry said in a statement "no manipulation attempt will distract France from its support for Ukraine in the face of Russia's war of aggres-

Earlier Monday, French Foreign Minister Stéphane Séjourné said that a network of "at least 193" websites had been set up with the aim "to spread Russian disinformation," speaking alongside his German and Polish counterparts after a meeting near Paris involving Ukraine-related talks and other issues.

Séjourné said "Russia seeks to destroy Europe's unity and even worse, wants to make our democracies exhausted ... by blurring the limit between real and fake (news), by manipulating information.

Charles returns to London: King Charles III returned to London from his country retreat on Tuesday for what is expected to be further treatment following

Charles, 75, and his wife Queen Camilla flew by helicopter to Buckingham Palace from the royals' Sandringham estate in Norfolk, eastern England. The monarch was seen waving to well-wishers as the couple were driven from the palace to nearby Clarence House.

Royal officials announced last week that the king was diagnosed with cancer and will suspend public engagements, though he will continue with state business such as signing papers. They did not disclose what form of cancer he has, but said it's not related to his recent treatment for a benign prostate condition.

3 nations vow to make Europe stronger: The governments of Poland, France and Germany vowed Monday to make Europe a security and defense power with a greater ability to back Ukraine, amid concerns that former US President Donald Trump might return to the White House and allow Russia to expand its aggression on the continent.

The foreign ministers of the three countries met in the Paris suburb of La Celle-Saint-Cloud to have talks about Ukraine, amid other issues. They discussed reviving the so-called Weimar Triangle, a long dormant regional grouping that was designed to promote cooperation between France, Germany and Poland.

Polish Prime Minister Donald Tusk, who met with French President Emmanuel Macron in Paris and German Chancellor Olaf Scholz in Berlin on Monday, said he wanted to "revitalize" his nation's relations with its key European partners.

Hungary PM faces political crisis: Hungary's long-serving government of Prime Minister Viktor Orbán faces a rare political crisis after the president, a member of Orbán's ruling party, resigned amid public anger over her pardoning of a man convicted in a child sexual abuse case.

President Katalin Novák's weekend resignation came after it was revealed that she issued a pardon in April 2023 to a man convicted of hiding child sexual abuses in a state-run children's home. Former Justice Minister Judit Varga also announced her resignation from a seat in parliament over her role in endorsing the decision.

Some of Orbán's opponents say the resignations of two senior members of his nationalist Fidesz party are not enough, and that Orbán must bear the political



One park employee missing: Firefighters in Sweden were struggling for the second day on Tuesday to put out a blaze at a water park that's under construction at one of the country's biggest amusement centers. One park employee is missing and 16 people, mainly workers, were slightly injured.

Authorities could not say what had caused the fire at the Oceana water park in the popular Liseberg amusement complex in Goteborg, Sweden's second-largest city. The fire broke out on Monday and spread over several water slides and the pool area.

NY subway shooting kills 1: An argument between two groups of teenagers rid-ing the New York City subway exploded into deadly violence Monday when shooting started after the train's doors opened at a station, killing a man and wounding five

The gunfire broke out on an elevated train platform in the Bronx at around 4:30 p.m., a time when stations throughout the city are filled with kids coming home from school and many workers are beginning their evening commute.

A 34-year-old man was killed, police said. The wounded included a 14-year-old girl, 15-year-old boy and three adults, ages 28, 29 and 71. Some of the victims were believed to have been involved in the dispute and others were bystanders waiting for the train, police said, describing four of the injuries as serious.

"We don't believe this was a random shooting. We do not believe that this was an individual indiscriminately firing into a train or a train station," NYPD's chief of transit, Michael Kemper, said at a news conference. (AP)

Shooter had mental illness: The shooter at a Texas megachurch on Sunday had a history of mental illness and brought their young son to the attack that was carried out using an AR-style rifle and ended in an exchange of gunfire with two off-duty officers, authorities said Monday.

Houston police identified the shooter as Genesse Ivonne Moreno, 36, who they say wore a trenchcoat and carried a backpack upon entering Lakewood Church, which is led by the pastor Joel Osteen. Moreno used both male and female aliases, but investigators who looked at past police reports found that Moreno identified as female, Houston Police Commander Chris Hassig said.

The attack happened in between services at the Houston megachurch - located in a former NBA arena - and sent worshippers scrambling for safety.

During the shooting, Moreno's 7-year-old son was shot in the head and remained in critical condition Monday, authorities said. Moreno, who was killed by the officers, was not a known member of Osteen's congregation, said church spokesman Don Iloff.. (AP)

Biden forms task force to avoid docus mishandling

Put off election interference trial: Trump

WASHINGTON, Feb 13, (AP): Former US president Donald Trump is asking the Supreme Court to extend the delay in his election interference trial, saying he is immune from prosecution on charges he plotted to overturn his 2020 election loss.

His lawyers filed an emergency appeal with the court on Monday, just four days after the justices heard Trump's separate appeal to remain on the presidential ballot despite attempts to kick him off because of his efforts following his election loss in 2020.

"Without immunity from criminal prosecution, the Presidency as we know it will cease to exist," Trump's lawyers wrote, repeating arguments that have so far failed in federal courts.

Intervene

The filing keeps on hold what would be a landmark criminal trial of a former president while the nation's highest court decides what to do. It met a deadline to ask the justices to intervene that the federal appeals court in Washington set when it rejected Trump's immunity claims and ruled the trial could proceed.

The Supreme Court's decision on what to do, and how quickly it acts, could determine whether the Republican presidential primary frontrunner stands trial in the case before the November election.

There is no timetable for the court to act, but special counsel Jack Smith's team has strongly pushed for the trial to take place this year. Trump, meanwhile, has repeatedly sought to delay the case. If Trump were to defeat President Joe Biden, he could potentially try to use his position as head of the executive branch to order a new attorney general to dismiss the federal cases he faces or even seek a pardon for himself.

The Supreme Court's options include rejecting the emergency appeal, which would enable U.S. District Judge Tanya Chutkan to restart the trial proceedings in Washington's federal court. The trial was initially scheduled to begin in early March.

The court also could extend the delay while it hears arguments on the immunity issue. In that event, the schedule the justices set could determine how soon a trial might begin, if indeed they agree with lower court rulings that Trump is not immune from prosecution.

Senate passes \$95.3 billion 'aid' package for Ukraine and Taiwan

WASHINGTON, Feb 13, (AP): The Senate early Tuesday passed a \$95.3 billion aid package for Ukraine, Israel and Taiwan, pushing ahead after months of difficult negotiations and amid growing political divisions in the Republican Party over the role of the United States abroad.

The vote came after a small group of Republicans opposed to the \$60 billion for Ukraine held the Senate floor through the night, using the final hours of debate to argue that the U.S. should focus on more money overseas. But more than a dozen Republicans voted with almost all Democrats to pass the package 70-29, with supporters arguing that abandoning Ukraine could embolden Russian President Vladimir Putin and threaten national security across the globe.

"It's been years, perhaps decades, since the Senate has passed a bill that so greatly impacts not just our national security, not just the security of our allies, but also the security of western democracy, said Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, who worked closely with Republican Leader Mitch McConnell on the legislation.

The bill's passage through the Senate was a welcome sign for Ukraine amid critical shortages on the battlefield. Yet the package faces a deeply uncertain future in the House, where hardline Republicans aligned with former President Donald Trump - the front-runner for the GOP presidential nomination, and a critic of support for Ukraine - oppose the legislation.

doubt on the package in a statement Monday evening, making clear that it could be weeks or months before Congress sends the legislation to President Joe Biden's desk - if at all.

Still, the vote was a win for both Senate leaders. McConnell has made Ukraine his top priority in recent months, and was resolute in the face of considerable pushback from his own GOP conference.

Mexico seized over 40 tons of meth from drug lab: Mexican law enforcement agencies said Monday they seized over 40 tons of methamphetamine at the biggest drug lab found during the current administration.

The Mexican navy said Monday that the lab was located in Quiriego, a township in a remote part of the northern border state of

It said the 91,000 pounds (41,310 kilograms) of meth found there was equivalent to about half of the 162,000 pounds of the drug Mexico has seized all year so far. Another 28,000 pounds

(12,705 kilograms) of meth chemicals were found, the navy said. Photos distributed by the navy showed a series of large metal boilers and chemical reactors arranged in a line amid the brush and low trees of the site, which was visible from the air. Over 200 centrifuges, boilers and condensing chambers were discovered, according to the navy.

The navy said its personnel destroyed the equipment by blowing it. The Navy said the raid Thursday involved helicopters and suggested the meth was bound for export to Europe, Asia and the United States. But Mexico also has a big problem with domestic

The 72 boilers indicated the facility was capable of producing multiple times the amount of drugs than the second-biggest meth lab uncovered during the administration of President Andrés Manuel López Obrador. (AP)

Mexican police arrest members of drug gang: Prosecutors said Monday they have arrested six members of a drug gang in the Mexican resort of Cancun that allegedly killed and hacked up five people with a machete, and dumped three other victims in a shallow grave.

The gang, which prosecutors say also engaged in extortion, was protected by a network of motorcycle taxis and minors who acted

Authorities also announced the arrest of 23 people on charges they operated a fake tour agency that served as a cover for drug sales in Cancun.

The suspects operated a call center in which they offered sports equipment and tour packages to tourists, but then failed to deliver them. On the second floor they had a complex operation in which drug deals were allegedly made over the phone and delivered by Another suspect was arrested in Cancun who allegedly both or-

dered drugs on social media sites - which were delivered to him by express package service - and sold them also on social media, with home delivery included. The revelations Monday came one day after prosecutors con-

firmed an American woman and a man from Belize were shot to death late last week in what appears to have been a dispute between drug dealers at a beach club in the resort city of Tulum, south of Cancun. (AP)

Uncertainty surrounding Martinelli roils race: Not a 10year prison sentence for money laundering nor going into political asylum in Nicaragua's embassy have weakened the political aspirations of Panama's former President Ricardo Martinelli who still seeks to retake the presidency.

Just last week a judge sentenced the former leader to prison. Then Wednesday, he popped up in Nicaragua's embassy and received political asylum from President Daniel Ortega's government before he could be arrested.

Election authorities are expected to rule at any time that he is ineligible to compete in the May 5 election, because Panama's constitution bars anyone given a sentence of five years or more from running for president or vice president.

Martinelli has denied any wrongdoing and calls his legal troubles a political persecution, which were the grounds for granting his asylum request, according to the Nicaraguan government. On Friday, Brian A. Nichols, the US State Department's assis-

tant secretary for Western Hemisphere affairs, tweeted on X that Nicaragua's decision to grant Martinelli asylum "is yet another move to undermine the rule of law and subvert justice." (AP)

The records were shared with The Associated Press by an official with the National Council on Children and Adolescents, who insisted on anonymity due to fear of government reprisal against those violating its tight control of information. The official said many more children have jailed parents but are not in the records.

By arresting more than 1% of his country's population, Bukele, who won reelection to a second five-year term Sunday, is trying to break the chain of violence that has ravaged El Salvador for decades. But many worry that debilitating poverty, long-term trauma and government failures to protect their children could instead fuel

a future wave of gang warfare. "Kids aren't spared when their dad, brother or mom is detained, they carry this trauma with them," Nancy Fajardo, a lawyer and aid provider working with 150 such families. "They feel as if the president has robbed them of their family. ... It could push the kids to later join a gang as a form of vengeance for everything they're suffering." (AP)

'Hopes, dreams shattered': Kelvin Kiptum's family said Monday their dreams and future hopes have been shattered following the death of marathon world-record holder in a car crash Sunday night

a car through running. Kiptum's mother had complications following their son's birth and doctors advised against further pregnancies, Cheruiyot said in the interview. He recalled that in their last conversation Saturday night, Kiptum told him that he was at peak condition and felt he could run the upcoming Rotterdam Marathon in April in under two hours, predicting to bring down his record to 1:58-1:59. Jailed former Thai PM Thaksin gets parole

BANGKOK, Feb 13, (AP): Thailand's former prime minister Thaksin Shinawatra, who last year returned from more than a decade of self-imposed exile to serve a prison sentence for misdeeds committed while in office, has been granted parole and could be released this weekend, the country's justice minister announced Tuesday.

Parole for Thaksin would be a symbol of reconciliation between his populist political party and the country's conservative establishment, a rivalry that defined Thai politics for nearly 20 years and led to two military coups.

Justice Minister Tawee Sodsong told reporters ahead of the weekly Cabinet meeting in Bangkok that Thaksin qualified for early release because he is in the eligible category of inmates who have serious illnesses, are disabled or are aged over 70. Thaksin is 74 years

Tawee did not confirm the date that Thaksin will be released, but it is widely expected he could be released as soon as this weekend.

He is currently confined to a police hospital in Bangkok where he is serving time for convictions related to corruption and abuse of power while in office, convictions he decried as politically motivated.

JAKARTA, Indonesia: When Indonesians cast their votes on Wednesday for a new president in one of the world's biggest elections, the stakes will also be high for the United States and China and their mounting rivalry in the region.

The Southeast Asian nation is a key battleground economically and politically in a region where the global powers have long been on a collision course over Taiwan, human rights, U.S. military deployments and Beijing's aggressive actions in disputed waters, including the South China Sea.

Outgoing President Joko Widodo's foreign policy has avoided criticising either Beijing or Washington, but also rejected alignment with either power.

The delicate balancing act has paved the way for substantial Chinese trade and investment for Indonesia, including a \$7.3 billion high-speed railway that was largely funded by China, while Jakarta has also boosted defense ties and intensified military exercises with the U.S.

USAID provides nearly \$1.25m in disasters response to Philippines

WASHINGTON, Feb 13, (KUNA): The United States, through the US Agency for International Development (USAID), is providing nearly USD 1.25 million in humanitarian aid to respond to the needs of com-munities affected by severe flooding and landslides in Mindanao.

USAID said in a statement, "This new funding will provide emergency food, shelter, water, sanitation, and essential hygiene items to sup-port disaster-affected communities in Davao de Oro, Davao del Norte, and Davao City in Mindanao.

It added that USAID would work with other partners to "ensure this life-saving assistance reaches the most vulnerable groups, including single-parent households, persons with disabilities, pregnant and lactating women, the elderly, low-income families, and indigenous peoples."

In addition, and at the request of the Philippine government, the US Department of Defense, through the III Marine Expeditionary Force (III MEF), provided two C-130s to assist the Philippines Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), the Philippines Office of Civil Defense, and USAID in delivering 15,000 DSWD food packs to affected families.

Last week, USAID partnered with the Philippines Department of Human Settlements and Urban Development and the International Organization for Migration to provide emergency shelter for more than 5,000 affected persons. US-AID also supported the World Food Program (WFP) to transport DSWD food packs to 65,000 families.

TOKYO: The US and Japan pledged on Tuesday their continued close coordination, including cooperation at the UN General Assembly and the UN Security Council, in addressing human rights issues in **North Korea**, Japan's Foreign Ministry said.

This came during a Tokyo meeting between the US special envoy for North Korean human rights

Julie Turner and Japanese State Foreign Minister for Foreign Affairs Yoshĭfumi Tsuge.

Tsuge said the issue of Japanese abductions by North Korea in the 1970s and 1980s is a top priority for the Prime Minister Fumio Kishida administration with a time constraint, the ministry said in a press release.

PALU. Indonesia: Indonesian police on Monday named two Chinese nationals as suspects in the explosion of a smelting furnace at a Chinese-owned nickel plant on Sulawesi Island that killed 21 workers and injured dozens of others.

Four Chinese and nine Indonesian workers died instantly on Dec. 24 when the furnace at PT Indonesia Tsingshan Stainless Steel, or PT ITSS, exploded while they were repairing it. Eight others died in the following days while being treated at hospitals, bring-

ing the total number of fatalities to 21, including eight workers from China.

The furnace was located inside a nickel processing-based industrial area under the management of PT Indonesia Morowali Industrial Park, known as PT IMIP, in Morowali regency of Central Sulawesi province.

Following their investigation, police have enough evidence to desig-

CMA imposes fines for violations

KUWAIT CITY, Feb 13: The Disciplinary Board of the Capital Markets Authority convened vesterday and issued several financial penalties against various companies and individuals for non-compliance and

violations, reports Al-Jarida daily. Nakheel Agricultural Production Company (Nakheel) was fined 2,000 dinars for failing to disclose on the Kuwait Stock Exchange the ruling of the Court of Appeal, resulting in financial impact non-disclosure.

Al-Taameer Real Estate Investment Company (Al-Taameer) was penalized 1,000 dinars for not complying with property evaluations listed under "Investment Properties" in its financial statements.

The Chairman of the Board of Directors of Salbukh Commercial Company (Salbukh) received a 1,000 dinar penalty for various infractions, including delayed disclosure of management changes and improper asset disposal and Al-Safat Investment Company (Al-Safat) was warned for repeated financial dealings that violated Islamic Sharia, resulting in a 10,000

dinar penalty.

Securities Group Company was fined 10,000 dinars for falling below the minimum eligible regulatory capital requirements while the KFIC Financial Brokerage Company received a 1,000 dinar penalty for an employee providing unauthorized advice to clients.

Giad Holding Company was fined 5,000 dinars for failure to disclose essential information regarding a shareholder meeting, resulting in trading suspension.

Gatehouse Capital, an economic and financial consulting company, faced a 7,000 dinar penalty for conducting subscription contracts before obtaining necessary licenses from the Capital Markets Authority and Azian Capital Company was fined 23,000 dinars for non-compliance with International Financial Reporting Standard No. 9 (IFRS 9), related to financial instruments.

These penalties reflect the Capital Markets Authority's commitment to ensuring compliance and transparency within Kuwait's financial

As for the Kuwait Tax Authority, he stressed the importance of close collaboration with the tax payers such as organizing information and discussion seminars and round-table that speed up and facilitate implementation.

US applications for unemployment benefits fall again

The number of Americans filing for jobless claims fell last week despite more layoff announcements from high-profile companies recently.

Applications for unemployment benefits fell by 9,000 to 218,000 for the week ending Feb. 3, the Labor Department reported Thursday.

The four-week average of

claims, which evens out some of the weekly volatility, increased

by 3,750 to 212,250. Weekly unemployment claims are seen as a proxy for the number of U.S. layoffs in a given week. They have remained at extraordinarily low levels despite efforts by the U.S. Federal Reserve to cool the economy.

The Federal Reserve raised its benchmark rate 11 times beginning in March of 2022 in an effort to bring down the four-decade high inflation that took hold after

an unusually strong economic rebound from the COVID-19 recession of 2020.

Though inflation has eased considerably in the past year, the Labor Department reported recently that overall prices rose 0.3% from November to December and were up 3.4% from 12 months earlier, a sign that the Fed's drive to slow inflation to its 2% target will likely remain a bumpy one. (AP)

average long-term US mortgage rate edged higher this wk

The average long-term U.S. mortgage rate edged higher last week, reflecting a recent uptick in the 10-year Treasury yield.

The average rate on a 30-year mortgage rose to 6.64% from 6.63% last week, mortgage buyer Freddie Mac said Thursday. A year ago, the rate averaged 6.12%.

"Mortgage rates remain stagnant, hovering in the mid-6% range over the past several weeks," said Sam Khater, Freddie Mac's chief economist.

The move echoes an increase this week in the 10-year Treasury yield, which lenders use as a guide to pricing loans. The yield moved above 4% this week as bond traders reacted to the government's January's jobs report. The surprisingly strong report stoked worries that it could persuade the Federal Reserve to wait longer before it be-

gins cutting interest rates. Hopes for such cuts amid signs that inflation has declined from its peak two summers ago have been a major reason the 10-year Treasury yield has mostly pulled back since October, when it climbed to its highest level since 2007.

In an interview broadcast Sunday night, Fed Chair Jerome Powell said that the central bank remains on track to cut its benchmark interest rate three times this year. a move that economists expect could begin as early as May. (AP)

'Driving best possible bargain now is not the best long-term strategy'

→onventional wisdom says that you Conventional violette with the should never leave money on the table when negotiating. But research in my field suggests this could be exactly the wrong approach.

There's mounting evidence that a short-term win at the bargaining table can mean a loss in terms of overall trust and cooperation. That can leave everyone - including the "winner" - worse off.

As a former executive, I've managed large contracts as both a buyer and a seller. Now, as a business professor, I study these trading partner relationships, exploring what works in practice. My work supports what economic theorists and social scientists have been arguing for years: The best results come when people collaborate to create long-term value in-

stead of fighting for short-term wins. Research into art, science and practice of collaborative approaches dates back to the 1940s when the mathematician John von Neumann and economist Oskar Morgenstern used mathematical analysis to model competition and cooperation in living things.

Interest in collaborative approaches grew when researchers John Nash, John C. Harsanyi and Reinhard Selten won a Nobel Memorial Prize in Economic Sciences in 1994. Their work inspired academics around the world to delve deeper into what's known as game theory.

Game theory is the study of the outcome of strategic interactions among decision makers. By using rigorous statistical methods, researchers can model what happens when people choose to cooperate or choose to take an aggressive, power-based approach to negotiation.

Many business leaders are taught strategies focusing on using their power and playing to win - often at the other party's expense. In game theory, this is known as a zero-sum game, and it's an easy trap to fall into.

But not every game has a clear winner or loser. In economics, a win-win game is called a nonzero-sum game.

In this sort of situation, people aren't fighting over whose slice of a pie will be larger. They're working to grow the pie for everyone. A second dimension of game theory

is whether people are playing a one-shot or a repeated game. Think of a one-shot game as like going to the flea market: You probably won't see your trading partner again, so if you're a jerk to them, the risk of facing the consequences is low. An interesting twist uncovered by

studying repeated games is that when one party uses their power in a negotiation, it creates the urge for the other

The University of Michigan's Robert Axelrod, a mathematician turned game theorist, coined this a "tit-for-tat" strategy. His research, perhaps best known in the book "The Evolution of Cooperation," uses statistics to show that when individuals cooperate, they come out better than when they don't.

Another Nobel laureate, American economist Oliver Williamson, has offered negotiating advice that most would call a paradigm shift - and some, a heresy.

That advice? Always leave money on the table - especially when you'll be returning to the same "game" again. Why? According to Williamson, it sends a powerful signal of trustworthiness and credibility to one's negotiating partner when someone consciously chooses to cooperate and build trust.

The opposite approach leads to lost trust and what the Nobel laureate economist Oliver Hart calls "shading." This is a retaliatory behavior that happens when a party isn't getting the outcome it expected from a deal and feels the

other party is to blame. Simply put, noncollaborative approaches cause distrust and create friction, which adds transaction costs and inefficiencies

The million-dollar question is whether collaborative approaches work in practice. And from my vantage point as a scholar, the answer is yes. In fields as diverse as health care to high-tech, I see growing real-world evidence backing up the insights of game theory.

The lessons are simple yet profound: Playing a game together to achieve mutual interests is better than playing exclusively with self-interest

ExxonMobil to 'explore' for oil and gas in offshore area under dispute

Move could escalate tensions between Guyana and Venezuela

GEORGETOWN, Guvana, Feb 13, (AP): ExxonMobil said it plans to explore for oil and gas in a disputed area off South America's coast where the Venezuelan military had previously expelled two U.S. oil companies. The move could escalate tensions between Venezuela and neighboring Guyana, which awarded the exploration license.

Guyana considers the area part of its Essequibo region, but Venezuela has long claimed it as its own, holding a referendum in December in which voters supported a push to annex it.

Robert Persaud, Guyana's foreign secretary, told The Associated Press on Wednesday that ExxonMobil has every right to work in that region "because it is within established Guyana waters in a fully demarcated area.'

The oil giant said Tuesday that it expects to drill two exploratory wells north and west of its prolific Stabroek block, where three oil fields are producing close to 650,000 barrels of oil

The president of ExxonMobil Guyana, Alistair Routledge, told reporters that the concessions were granted by Guyana and that the company is committed to its operations despite the country's ongoing tensions with Ven-

"We are not going anywhere," he said.

Previous attempts to explore for oil and gas in that area have failed. In 2019, ExxonMobil was forced to abandon exploration activities after a Venezuelan military helicopter tried to land on a seismic vessel. And in 2013, officials aboard a Venezuelan gunboat detained the crew of a seismic vessel contracted by a Texas petroleum com-

New president appointed

Japan's Toyota group automaker Daihatsu reshuffles its leadership

TOKYO, Feb 13, (AP): Japanese automaker Daihatsu on Tuesday named a veteran at its parent company Toyota to replace its president as it tries to repair the damage from a scandal over cheating on vehicle safety tests. The troubles at Daihatsu Motor Co.

surfaced after a whistleblower reported the cheating. A third-party review found violations, such as carrying out tests on just one side of a car when both sides had to be tested, that had persisted for decades.

The appointments of a new president, executive vice president and director highlight Toyota's determination to play a leading role in the reforms at its 100% owned subsidiary.

Masahiro Inoue, now overseeing Toyota's business in South America, will become Daihatsu President effective in March, Toyota Chief Executive Koji Sato told reporters in Tokyo.

Inoue replaces Soichiro Okudaira, who is resigning. Okudaira also had been sent in by Toyota. Daihatsu's chairman, Sunao Matsubayashi, also resigned, while two other directors left the board but kept their positions at the company.

Masanori Kuwata, now at Lexus International Co., Toyota Motor Corp.'s luxury brand, becomes Daihatsu's Executive Vice President, under the changes announced Tuesday. Keiko Yanagi, a deputy chief officer at Toyota, was named a director at Daihatsu.

Inoue apologized to Daihatsu's customers, suppliers and dealers, saying he knows how to be a good listener to win people's trust because of his decades of working overseas.

'We will make our hearts one and aim for a new start," Inoue said.

The appointments highlight Toyota's determination to play a leading role in the reforms at its 100% owned subsidiary and prevent scandals.

Inoue said a business plan will be disclosed in April, including a new managerial direction.

The Japanese government has ordered production halted on an array of Daihatsu models until tests can be carried out properly and approved. The companies said some production has already resumed but work on other models will take time.

No major accidents have been reported in connection with the cheating, but the news has raised serious questions about oversight at Daihatsu and its corporate parent Toyota.

Daihatsu has said its workers were under heavy pressure to meet tight deadlines. Management neglected to address problems on the factory floor and the causes of the cheating were complex, Sato said.

Daihatsu has recently handed an investigation of its wrongdoing to the Japanese government. Daihatsu, which has a 100-year history and employs 40,000 people, is known for small models popular in Japan and the rest of Asia.





Gugino steals the show with over-the-top performance

'Lisa Frankenstein' delivers nostalgic fun

It will come as no surprise that the new movie "Lisa Frankenstein" is a real monster - stitched together from previous movies, painfully incoherent

and deeply, deeply dumb. This is a baffling display of filmmaking, what appears to be a sort of feminist take on the reanimated creature trope that has been shoehorned into a late-1980s setting, complete with New Wave songs, teased hair and brightly colored spandex. Why? Presumably to giggle at shoulder pads, hairspray and Echo and the Bunnymen.

Kathryn Newton stars as the goth-like high school misfit teen Lisa Swallows, who befriends a reanimated zombie bachelor who died in 1837. Cole Sprouse plays the corpse, who is missing body parts, uses grunts to communicate and resembles Johnny Depp from "Edward Scissorhands." Whoever suggested he'd shine deserves to be made mute.

Lisa's mother has met a grisly death and she has found herself in a new town with a new family after her dad remarries. Her stepmother (gloriously overthe-top Carla Gugino) hates her and her stepsister (Liza Soberano, hopefully not making a career-ending mistake) is a friendly cheerleader.

The arrival of a Victorian-era zombie into 1989 offers many possibilities but all the interesting ones are avoided as the filmmakers embark on a "Weird Science"-like, "My Fair Lady" reversal - cleaning him up and hiding him in her bedroom. "OK, Sparky, we've got to get you some new duds," Lisa says helpfully. Those duds include a blazer and a Violent Femmes T-shirt.

The other thing the zombie really needs is replacement body parts. "You're a dead man, not a Chrysler LeBaron," Lisa tells him in a line that's sure to kill with Gen Z. So parts are naturally harvested from people who are deemed to have crossed the pair. They use an axe to procure an ear, some fingers and a penis. (Yes, this is a quality movie: Chrysler AND weenie jokes.)

Director Zelda Williams is simply overmatched here, unable to conjure tension, interest, connection or coherence. "Lisa Frankenstein" lurches from idiocy to whimsy to grossness to ultra-violence, obsessed along the way with grade-school toilet humor,

like putting worms in fruit salads. But the blame needs to be spread around. I mean, how many jokes can you legally try to make about vibrators and menstrual cycles in one movie? "I got to go change my pad" is one of the lines expected to trigger howls of laughter.

Written by Diablo Cody - unhappily a million miles now from "Juno" - who has tried, if we use the best possible motive, to write a satire of '80s teen movies, but has made something unwatchable - unfunny, unclever and dull. "Weekend at Bernie's," which also dealt with a corpse, looks like a Christopher Nolan film in comparison.

Murderous

Maybe, like Cody's previous stab at horror "Jennifer's Body," this will become a cult hit one day. But that at least had some fun parts. This is pure lazy storytelling, like thinking that just showing us a clip of Bob Ross painting is somehow uproariously funny.

Lisa, who by the end of the movie is dressing as Madonna circa "Desperately Seeking Susan," has embarked on a murderous rampage and is rushing to lose her virginity before it all ends. Will she find love? Will she recognize true love before it's too late? Will we have to endure more jokes at the expense of REO Speedwagon's "Can't Fight This Feeling?" Who cares?

Filmgoers will note with alarm that by the time the credits roll, the sweet, goth-inclined outcast Lisa has evolved into an unhinged, violent, self-involved, murderous monster while the zombie has gone the other way, becoming more human and compassion-

ate. Talk about losing your way. "Lisa Frankenstein," a Focus Features release, is rated PG-13 for "violent content, bloody images, sexual material, language, sexual assault, teen drinking and drug content." Running time: 101 minutes. Zero stars out of four.

Tumor-related bacteria tied to young-onset colorectal cancer: study

CLEVELAND, Feb 13: New research from global health system Cleveland Clinic has mapped changes in tumor-related bacteria to uncover potential new strategies to combat the rise of young-onset colorectal cancer (CRC) in people under the age of 50.

The research reveals differences in tumor-related bacteria associated with young-onset colorectal cancer. Published in eBioMedicine (part of



young-onset

CRC cases more doubled



from around 95,000 to more than 225,000, according to the Global Cancer Association.

"The unexplained rise of youngonset colorectal cancer is of great concern," said Alok Khorana, M.D., Cleveland Clinic oncologist and primary investigator of the study. "Our team discovered that bacteria were more abundant and compositionally distinct in tumors from youngonset patients. These insights help us to better understand the disease causes and inform new prevention approaches, diagnostic markers, and therapeutic targets."

This retrospective study, funded by the Sondra and Stephen Hardis Family, used gene sequencing technology to compare tissue samples from 136 young-onset colorectal cancer patients with 140 average-age patients with the disease. They identified unique tumor-related bacteria

in the younger cohort and found that they were more likely to have leftsided, rectal and advanced stage tumors. Key microbes associated with young-onset cancers included Ak-

kermansia and Bacteroides. First authors of the paper were Shimoli Barot, M.D., of Cleveland Clinic Cancer Institute, and Naseer Sangwan, Ph.D., of Cleveland Clinic Lerner Research Institute. Dr. Khorana also holds the Sondra and Stephen Hardis Chair for Oncology Research.

"By detailing this microbial signature of young-onset disease, we can look toward new screening biomarkers and drugs targeting related bacteria," said Dr. Barot.

Dr. Sangwan added that "further research is needed into how lifestyle factors such as diet, medications and obesity may impact gut bacteria and contribute to young-onset colon can-

Thailand to crack down on pot market

Push for smoking ban in cars with children gains 'momentum' in US

CHARLESTON, W.Va., Feb 13, (AP): Smoking in cars with children is banned in 11 states, and lawmakers are pushing to join them in West Virginia, where more adults use cigarettes than anywhere else in the nation, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The state Senate on Monday passed a bill calling for fines for anyone caught smoking or possessing a lit tobacco product in a vehicle when someone age 16 or under is present. The bill passed on 25-8 vote and now goes to the House of Delegates, where similar legislation has failed and it faces an uncertain future.

Senate Majority Leader Tom Takubo, a doctor-turnedlawmaker, made a promise long ago to a patient whose father was a heavy smoker that he would try to ban smoking in vehicles carrying children in West Virginia. Takubo has made it almost an annual effort since 2017 to introduce the legislation, but it didn't gain traction.

The Kanawha County Republican and lung doctor said the inspiration for the bill was a patient who was not a smoker but lost half of her lung function. When her father smoked, "she had to climb down to the bottom of the car and put her head underneath the seat," Takubo said.

Violators would face a misdemeanor subject to a maximum fine of \$25. But it would be a secondary offense: smoking with children present cannot be the main reason a driver is pulled over.

Sen. Mike Azinger, a Wood County Republican, said the state has no right to infringe on parents' freedoms.

"The arguments for the bill are essentially emotional arguments," Azinger said. "This is a cut at the fundamental rights of parents making a decision over their children in their vehicle. This is a state going where it has no business going."

THAILAND: Two years after Thailand made pot legal, the country appears set to crack down on its freewheeling drug market with a ban on "recreational" use.

Legal cannabis has fueled Thailand's tourism and farming trades and spawned thousands of neon green shops, but it's facing public backlash over perceptions that under-regulation has made the drug available to kids and caused crime.

The Health Minister Chonlanan Srikaew said last week that he had recommended a draft bill to the Cabinet that would ban recreational cannabis use while allowing medical. The Cabinet is expected to approve sending that Parliament soon, but has not yet taken it up as of its most recent meeting on Tuesday.

A draft version of the law that was circulated for public comment in January would make using cannabis "for entertainment or pleasure" a crime punishable by a 60,000 baht (about \$1,700) fine. It would allow medical marijuana, but didn't give details of how it would be controlled.

Thailand was the first country in Asia to legalize cannabis. Decriminalization was spearheaded by the Bhumjaithai Party, which made it a major part of its platform in the 2019 general election campaign. The party's stronghold is in the be a new cash crop.

Party leader Anutin Charnvirakul became health minister and an important member of the military-led coalition, pushing through a 2022 amendment to the Narcotics Law that dropped cannabis from the list of controlled drugs.

Anutin had promised that cannabis would be allowed only for medical use, but in practice the market was nearly un-

The Health Ministry issued regulations that made cannabis a "controlled herb" that requires a license for planting or selling, as well as banning online sales, sales to pregnant women and people under 20, and public smoking. But cannabis can be purchased easily by practically anyone at many unlicensed establishments or online.

Thai media was quickly filled with reports of drug-fueled violence and abuse, including among young people, who were not supposed to have access to the drug.

The Health Ministry reported a spike in people seeking treatment cannabis-related psychological issues, from more than 37,000 patients in fiscal year 2022 to more than 63,000 patients in 2023. Other studies pointed to more young people Bubonic plague case

Alaskapox virus claims 1st victim in US: report

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Feb 13, (AP): An elderly man has died from Alaskapox, the first known fatality from the recently discovered virus, state health officials said.

The man, who lived in the remote Kenai Peninsula, was hospitalized last November and died in late January, according to a bulletin last week from Alaska public health officials.

The man was undergoing cancer treatment and had a suppressed immune system because of the drugs, which may have contributed to the severity of his illness, the bulletin said. It described him as elderly but didn't provide his age.

Alaskapox, also known as AKPV, is related to smallpox, cowpox and mpox, health officials said. Symptoms can include a rash, swollen lymph nodes and joint or muscle pain.

Only six other cases of the virus have been reported to Alaska health officials since the first one in 2015. All involved people were living in the Fairbanks area, more than 300 miles (483 kilometers) from the Kenai Peninsula, health officials said

All had mild cases and recovered without being hospital-

The man who died "resided alone in a forested area and reported no recent travel and no close contacts with recent travel, illness, or similar lesions," the health bulletin said.

It's unclear how AKPV is transmitted but researchers say it may be zoonotic, meaning it can jump from animals to humans. The bulletin said that tests found evidence of current or previous infection in several species of small mammals in the Fairbanks area, including red-backed voles, and at least one domestic pet. The man said he had cared for a stray cat at his home, the

The cat tested negative for the virus but it "regularly hunted small mammals and frequently scratched the patient," the

bulletin said. That opens the possibility that the cat had the virus on its claws when it scratched him. The bulletin said a "notable" scratch near the armpit area where the first symptom - a red

Health officials said there hasn't been any documented cases of humans passing on the virus but they recommended people with skin lesions possibly caused by Alaskapox to cover the affected area with a bandage.'

BEND. Oregon: Public health officials in Oregon have reported a case of bubonic plague in a local resident who they said likely contracted it from a pet cat.

All close contacts of the person and the cat have been contacted and provided medication, **Dr. Richard Fawcett**, the health officer for **Deschutes County**, said in a statement last

The county said Wednesday the case was identified and treated in its early stages and poses little risk to the com-

Symptoms of bubonic plague include the sudden onset of fever, nausea, weakness, chills and muscle aches, county health services said. Symptoms begin two to eight days after exposure to an infected animal or flea

Al 'companions': A double-edged sword for combating loneliness

The United States is in the grips of a loneliness epidemic: Since 2018, about half the population has reported that it has experienced loneliness. Loneliness can be as dangerous to your health as smoking 15 cigarettes a day, according to a 2023 surgeon general's

It is not just individual lives that are at risk. Democracy requires the capacity to feel connected to other citizens in order to work toward collective so-

In the face of this crisis, tech companies offer a technological cure: emotionally intelligent chatbots. These digital friends, they say, can help alleviate the loneliness that threatens individual and national health.

But as the pandemic showed, technology alone is not sufficient to address the complexities of public health. Science can produce miraculous vaccines, but if people are enmeshed in cultural and historical narratives that prevent them from taking the life-saving medicine, the cure sits on shelves and lives are lost. The humanities, with their expertise in human culture, history and literature, can play a key role in preparing society for the ways that AI might help - or harm - the capacity for meaningful human connection.

The power of stories to both predict and influence human behavior has long been validated by scientific research. Numerous studies demonstrate that the stories people embrace heavily influence the choices they make, ranging from the vacations they plan, to how people approach climate change to the computer programming choices security experts make.

Attached

There are two storylines that address people's likely behaviors in the face of the unknown territory of depending on AI for emotional sustenance: one that promises love and connection, and a second that warns of dehumanizing subjugation.

The first story, typically told by software designers and AI companies, urges people to say "I do" to AI and embrace bespoke friendship programmed on your behalf. AI company Replika, for instance, promises that it can provide everyone with a "companion who cares. Always here to listen and talk. Always on your side.

There is a global appetite for such digital companionship. Microsoft's digital chatbot Xiaoice has a global fan

base of over 660 million people, many of whom consider the chatbot "a dear friend," even a trusted confidante.

In popular culture, films like "Her" depict lonely people becoming deeply attached to their digital assistants. For many, having a "dear friend" programmed to avoid difficult questions and demands seems like a huge improvement over the messy, challenging, vulnerable work of engaging with a human partner, especially if you consider the misogynistic preference for submissive, sycophantic companions.

Relationship

To be sure, imagining a chummy relationship with a chatbot offers a sunnier set of possibilities than the apocalyptic narratives of slavery and subjugation that have dominated storytelling about a possible future among social robots. Blockbuster films like "The Matrix" and the "The Terminator" have depicted hellscapes where humans are enslaved by sentient AI. Other narratives featured in films like "The Creator" and "Blade Runner" imagine the roles reversed and invite viewers to sympathize with AI beings

who are oppressed by humans. You could be forgiven for thinking that these two stories, one of friendship, the other of slavery, simply represent two extremes in human nature. From this perspective it seems like a good thing that marketing messages about AI are guiding people toward the sunny side of the futuristic street. But if you consider the work of scholars who have studied slavery in the US, it becomes frighteningly clear that these two stories - one of purchased friendship and one of enslavement and exploitation - are not as far apart as you might imagine.

Chattel slavery in the US was a brutal system designed to extract labor through violent and dehumanizing means. To sustain the system, however, an intricate emotional landscape was designed to keep the enslavers self-satisfied. "Gone with the Wind" is perhaps the most famous depiction of how enslavers saw themselves as benevolent patriarchs and forced enslaved people to reinforce this fiction through cheerful professions of love. In his 1845 autobiography, Fred-

erick Douglass described a tragic occasion when an enslaved man, asked about his situation, honestly replied that he was ill-treated. The plantation owner, confronted with testimony about the harm he was inflicting, sold the truth-teller down the river. Such cruelty, Douglass insisted, was the necessary penalty for someone the simple truth" to a man whose emotional calibration required constant reassurance

Danger

To be clear, I am not evoking the emotional coercion that enslavement required in order to conflate lonely seniors with evil plantation owners, or worse still, to equate computer code with enslaved human beings. There is little danger that AI companions will courageously tell us truths that we would rather not hear. That is precisely the problem. My concern is not that people will harm sentient robots. I fear how humans will be damaged by the moral vacuum created when their primary social contacts are designed solely to serve the emotional needs of the "user." (AP)

South Americans miss out on Paris Olympics

Brazilian soccer crisis deepens

ARAB (*) TIMES

SAO PAULO, Feb 13, (AP): Brazilian soccer fans were already in a funk after a year that saw a string of poor results, a coaching void and a political tug of war at the country's federation.

Things got even worse Sunday after Brazil failed to qualify for the Paris Olympics thanks to a loss to archrival Argentina, meaning the two-time defending champion will not be part of the tournament this

"It is sad, but it is more of an embarrassment," striker John Kennedy said after the 1-0 loss. "We should have wanted to win more than we

Brazil also failed to qualify for the 1992 and 2004 editions of the Olympic tournament, but those blips didn't coincide with a crisis for the senior national team. Brazil is only in sixth place in South American qualifying for the 2026 World Cup and its biggest star Neymar has been out with a serious knee injury since

Some fans and analysts had hoped 17-year-old striker Endrick - who is set to join Real Madrid this summer - would provide some cause for optimism by showcasing his talent during the Olympic qualifying tournament. And many supporters had been hoping to see Endrick and the 32-year-old Neymar play together on the Olympic team in Paris and lead Brazil to an unprecedented third straight gold medal.

But the Brazilian teenager scored only twice in seven matches in Olympic qualifying. Argentina's World Cup-winning midfielder Thiago Almada netted five.

The Olympic soccer tournament features mainly Under-23 players and does not carry nearly the same status as the World Cup or contintental championships - such as the Copa America that starts in June - but missing out completely still stings the pride of many Brazilians.

Especially those who are viewing Endrick as the country's next big star, and had been expecting him to show that he could help lead the senior team's attack alongside Vinicius Jr. and Rodrygo at the Copa

Meanwhile, Brazil's senior team will return to action in March in friendlies against England and Spain

amid serious concerns about its cur-

Last year, Brazil lost a home match in World Cup qualifying for the first time ever; 1-0 to Argentina at the Maracana Stadium in Rio de Janeiro. It also lost at Uruguay and Colombia in the South American round-robin competition after two poor performances.

New coach Dorival Júnior was only hired in January after the president of the Brazilian soccer confederation, Ednaldo Rodrigues, failed to fulfill his promise to bring in Madrid's Carlo Ancelotti. Previous coach Tite stepped down after Brazil lost in the quarterfinals of the 2022 World Cup, and the team had been led by Fernando Diniz on an interim basis last year.

The frustration of seeing Argentina win the World Cup in Qatar as well as the last Copa America has only added to the pressure facing Dorival as he takes up the job - even before Sunday's loss.

"Brazil wasted a full year in preparations because we waited for a top coach (Ancelotti) who had signed no contract with us," said former Brazil left-back Júnior. "We burned a promising coach,

Fernando Diniz, just so he could be interim for a year. The time to fix all this for the next World Cup is very short.'

Rodrigues, the conferederation head, is also facing calls for his resignation. He was removed by a Rio de Janeiro court in December due to irregularities in his election but returned weeks later after a ruling from Brazil's top court. His full case is yet to be reviewed.

History, though, shows that missing out on the Olympics doesn't necessarily bode ill for the future.

The team that failed to qualify for the Barcelona Games in 1992 included Cafu, Márcio Santos and Roberto Carlos, who all went on to win the World Cup. And the squad that missed out on the Athens Games in 2004 included future stars Maicon, Diego and Robinho.

"They will have to prove this elimination is no different from those two," said 2002 World Cup winner Vampeta. "There's great players in this team, but they will be judged by whether they can drag the senior team out of the quagmire it is in now. It is an uphill battle to end this crisis.

to Udinese left their title hopes in tatters.

Massimiliano Allegri's side, which lost 1-0 at league leaders Inter Milan last week, stayed seven points behind the Nerazzurri, who also have a game in hand. Juventus are only one point above third-place AC Milan.

Lautaro Giannetti's first Serie A goal was enough to hand Udinese only their second win in 14 matches and lift them three points above the drop zone. Juventus forward Arkadiusz Milik missed a number of gilt-edged chances to equalize and also had a goal disallowed.

Milik was returning from a suspension and started in place of in-form forward Dušan Vlahović, who was out with a muscle problem.

But Salernitana have been in this position before.

Bavarians head to Lazio needing to bounce back

DUESSELDORF, Germany, Feb 13, (AP): This was meant to be the year that Harry Kane finally won a trophy. The Champions League might be his best chance now. Bayern Munich heads to Lazio

in the round of 16 on Wednesday needing to bounce back after a 3-0 loss to Bayer Leverkusen left it five points off the Bundesliga lead. Kane is on track to be a member of the first Bayern team since the 2011-12 season not to win the

Injuries are weighing Bayern down, coach Thomas Tuchel's tactics are in question and forward Thomas Müller questioned his teammates' mentality in the "nightmare" Leverkusen loss.

Kane has 24 Bundesliga goals already but never came close to a 25th on Saturday. He was shut out of the game as Bayern fell further behind the league leader. Bayern's attack was neutralized by Leverkusen and the entire team had just one shot on goal.

There are 13 games left and much can still happen, but Bayern's title hopes now rest on Leverkusen slipping up. Not so easy when Leverkusen is unbeaten in 31

That makes Wednesday's game at Lazio all the more important.

The Italian team, eighth in Serie A, may not be the hardest opponent Bayern could have faced in the round of 16, but the pressure is on the players and coach to improve.



Mbappé has been nusring a sore left ankle and was an unused substitute in Saturday's league game against Lille. Asked on Tuesday if Mbappé was ready to start against Sociedad in the first leg of their last-16 contest, Enrique replied with a terse "Yes" at the pre-match news conference.

Mbappé's PSG contract runs out at the end of June and the France star has yet to say if he will stay, with reports heavily linking him with a move to long-time suitor Real Madrid.

So it was put to Enrique that Wednesday's match at Parc des Princes could - potentially - be Mbappé's last home game for the club in the Champions League, given that Sociedad might elimi-

PSG is 11 points clear in the French league while Sociedad is only seventh in the Spanish league. But competition in Spain is generally stronger and Ligue 1 has not produced a credible rival this season, like it did when Montpellier (2012), Mbappé's Monaco (2017) and Lille (2021) won the title, and when Lens fell short by one point last season.

Once again, all eyes are on the Champions League as a true indicator of PSG's level.

Enrique may deliberately be trying to take some pressure off his players and understandably so, given PSG's underwhelming record in the competition.

The cash-rich Qatari club has spent fortunes on buying stars and paying huge salaries - Zlatan Ibrahimovic, Edinson Cavani, Mbappé, Neymar, Lionel Messi - yet PSG has been eliminated from the last 16 of the Champions League five times in the past seven seasons.

Arguably the most humiliating performance in PSG's history saw hammered 6-1 by Barcelona in 2017 - with Enrique in charge of Barca back then - having won the

Chelsea hold off Palace to ignite hopes

Gallagher the hero with a brace

LONDON, Feb 13, (AP): Conor Gallagher apologized to fans of former club Crystal Palace after scoring twice, including a crucial stoppage-time goal, to help Chelsea recover for a come-from-behind 3-1 win in the Premier League that ignited the team's hopes of a finish in the European positions.

The England midfielder spent a year on loan at Palace two seasons ago, when he scored eight goals and excelled in making late runs into the area.

Now he's doing that for Chelsea, steering home an equalizer at Selhurst Park barely 90 seconds into the second half and then putting his team ahead just after 90 minutes had been played with a strike from the edge of the box.

"I do love them," Gallagher said when asked how he felt to have inflicted pain on the Palace supporters. "It's sad but you can't beat that feeling. Sorry, Palace fans.

Argentina international Enzo Fernandez secured the points in the fourth minute of added time to leave Palace just five points above the relegation zone and its 76-year-old manager, Roy Hodgson, under more pressure.

Chelsea climbed to 10th place in

what remains another disappointing campaign for a club that has spent more than \$1 billion on players over the past two years. Yet it could still end in qualification for the minor European competitions, with seventhplace Newcastle only two points

away.
"We are trying our best to keep improving," Gallagher said. "Consistency is the biggest thing for us there have been games when we've been brilliant and games when we've been terrible.'

The 24-year-old Gallagher isn't one of Chelsea's many costly recent

arrivals - he is a product of the club's youth academy - but is proving to be one of the best-performing players under Mauricio Pochettino, whose own position has come under scru-

tiny this season. A thumping long-range strike by Jefferson Lerma gave Palace the lead in the 30th minute of a first half when Chelsea was lackluster, failing to register a single shot on target.

"It was extremely cruel," Hodgson said, "but the game is about goals and unfortunately we made mistakes

which led to goals."
"I don't think that is a fair reflection on the way the game was played. I think we deserved to come off with at least one point."

It was a 13th straight win for Chelsea over Palace.

Eriksson granted wish to take charge of Liverpool

Man Utd and Ratcliffe get Premier League approval over deal to buy 25% of the club

MANCHESTER, England, Feb 13, (AP): The Premier League has approved Jim Ratcliffe's proposed bid to buy a minority stake in Manchester United, the club said.

In a filing to the Securities and Exchange Commission on Monday, United said it had already been granted approval under its rules over who is allowed to be an owner or director of a soccer club. It also said it expected clearance from the Football Association as British billionaire Ratcliffe closes in on completion of

his deal to buy 25% of the club. League rules disqualify people from becoming owners or directors for reasons such as criminal convictions, sporting bans or involvement in other clubs.

Ratcliffe is one of Britain's richest people and the owner of petrochemicals giant INEOS. He agreed a deal to buy a stake in United in December and on Monday the deadline for completion was extended from Feb. 14 to Feb. 17.

As part of the deal, Racliffe's IN-EOS Sport division will take over control of United's soccer operation after more than a decade since it won the Premier League title and consistent decline in its on-field per-

The 71-year-old Ratcliffe was a boyhood United fan and last month described his proposed investment as the most exciting deal he has in

"I have done a few exciting things, but there is no question (about that),'

Ratcliffe has paid \$1.3 billion for "up to 25%" of the club and will invest a further \$300 million for "future investment into Old Trafford," United has said.

Ratcliffe will provide \$200 million upon completion of the deal and a further \$100 million by the end of 2024. That additional investment will eventually take Ratcliffe's stake up to 29%. Owners, the Glazer fam-

ily, will have a 49% stake under the

Under the filing, more details were provided about Ratcliffe's personal wealth which said his "liquid assets (primarily consisting of cash and readily marketable securities) were in excess of \$4 billion."

It said his net worth was "significantly in excess of those liquid assets"

Shareholders must respond before 23:59 ET to tender their shares, United said.

Sven-Goran Eriksson will finally get his chance to take charge of Liverpool.

The Swedish coach, who is a Liverpool fan and has said his wish has always been to manage the English club, revealed last month that he has cancer and might have less than a year to live.

Liverpool manager Jurgen Klopp responded by offering Eriksson, who coached England from 2001-06, the opportunity to come over and help coach his team in a training session, use his office and "have a few great hours together."

Now Liverpool has announced that Eriksson will be part of the management team for a "Legends" charity match against Ajax at Anfield on March 23. Eriksson will be in the dugout alongside Liverpool greats such as Ian Rush and t, the club said on Tuesday.

"All connected with the club and LFC Foundation look forward to warmly welcoming LFC fan Sven and his family to Anfield - and seeing him in the dugout on the day for a fantastic fundraising occasion," Liverpool said.

Eriksson, who turned 76 last week, said he has pancreatic cancer and that it is inoperable.

He was England's first ever foreign-born coach, after making his name winning league titles at club level with Lazio in Italy, Benfica in Portugal and IFK Gothenburg in his native Sweden.
