MP appeals for expat staff amid Assembly TV layoffs

Expert rules out dissolution in gov't formation

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6: Constitutional expert Professor Muhammad Al-Fili has clarified that the Constitution does not specify the period for the new prime minister to form his government, but it stipulates the accomplishment of this task as soon as possible.

He pointed out that the dissolution of the Assembly is not necessary in the event a new government is formed; but a new government is needed for a newly elected legislature. He reiterated that a new parliamentary term requires the formation of a new government, but the appointment of a new prime minister does not require a new legislature; hence, there is no need to dissolve the Assembly.

'Prioritize local firms with proven track records for road repairs'

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6: MP Abdul Wahab Al-Issa has proposed allowing local companies with a reputable track record to carry out road repair works, reports Al-Sevassah daily.

Al-Issa pointed out that the decision of the Central Agency for Public Tenders (CAPT) to cancel road repair contracts in all governorates for international companies, in response to the Ministry of Public

Works' request, "is predictable from the outset."

He said: "We have opted to remain silent in the hope of being proven wrong, trusting that foreign companies would find it economically unfeasible to bring their heavy equipment and skilled labor for short-term contracts lasting from six months to a year. If they secured the contract, subcontracting with local companies would be inevitable due to the presence of

their equipment and labor in Kuwait. This was validated in the State Audit Bureau's reports when the

estimated project costs soared by 200 percent." He suggested "opting for local companies with a clean track record, as this approach ensures swifter completion, reduced costs, and enhanced scrutiny of sample testing throughout the implementation pro-

Bid to prevent regional conflagration

Blinken in Turkey as Gaza war tensions grow

ISTANBUL, Jan 6, (AP): U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken kicked off his latest urgent Middle East diplomatic mission in Turkey on Saturday, as fears mount that Israel's war against Hamas in Gaza may explode into a broader conflict.

Blinken's fourth visit in three months comes amid worrying developments outside of Gaza, including in Lebanon, northern Israel, the Red Sea and Iraq, that have put intense strains on what had been a modestly successful U.S. push to prevent a regional conflagration in the weeks after the war began, and growing international criticism of Israel's military operation.

Blinken met with Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan and Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan to discuss what Turkey and others can do to exert influence, particularly on Iran and its proxies, to ease soaring tensions, speed up humanitarian aid deliveries to Gaza and begin in earnest to plan for reconstruction and governance of postwar Gaza, much of which has been reduced to rubble by three months of intense Israeli bombardments.

The immediate difficulty of Blinken's task was underscored just hours before his talks with Erdogan as Lebanon's Iran-backed Hezbollah militia fired dozens of rockets at northern Israel, warning that the barrage was just an initial response to the targeted killing, presumably by Israel, of a top leader from the allied Hamas group in Lebanon's capital earlier this week.

Meanwhile, stepped-up attacks on commercial shipping in the Red Sea by Yemen's Iran-backed Houthi rebels have disrupted international trade and led to increased efforts on the part of the U.S. and its allies to patrol the area and respond to threats, including possibly taking direct action against the group at its bases in Yemen. The Houthis have carried out at least two dozen attacks in response to the Israel-Hamas war in Gaza just since Dec. 19, which have further heightened tensions and raised risks for the global economy.

In Istanbul, U.S. officials said Blinken would be seeking Turkish buy-in, or at least consideration, of potential monetary or in-kind contributions to reconstruction efforts and some form of participation in a proposed multinational force that could operate in or adjacent to the territory. Turkey, and Erdogan in particular, have been harshly critical of Israel and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu for the prosecution of the war and the impact it has had on Palestinian civilians.

Lebanon's PM seeking to avert full-scale war leased by the premier's press of-BEIRUT, Jan 6, (Agencies): The fice, Mikati affirmed Lebanon's

prime minister of the Lebanese caretaker government, Najib Mikati, said on Saturday that he is holding contacts with influential capitals to spare the country full-scale war.

Mikati speaking during a meeting in the Lebanese capital with Josep Borrel, the EU High Representative for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy, warned that a full-scale "explosion of the situation in southern Lebanon might spill over to the whole region.'

According to a statement re-

adherence to the UN resolution 1701, however he noted its implementation "warrants cessation of the Israeli breaches of the Lebanese sovereignty and withdrawing from the occupied Lebanese territories."

His remarks came amid escalating tension across the southern borders, with recurring tit-for-tat gunfire exchanges between the Lebanese resistance and the Israeli forces.

Earlier today, Lebanon's He-

zbollah militia fired dozens of rockets at northern Israel on Saturday, warning that the barrage was its initial response to the targeted killing, presumably by Israel, of a top leader from the allied Hamas group in Lebanon's capital earlier this week.

The rocket attack came a day after Hezbollah leader Sayyed Hassan Nasrallah said that his group must retaliate for the killing of Saleh Arouri, the deputy political leader of Hamas in a Hezbollah stronghold south of Beirut.

Meanwhile, National Assembly Secretary MP Osama Al-Shaheen recently met with Chairman of the Central Committee at Kuwait Democratic Forum (KDF) Bandar Al-Khairan and Deputy Secretary General of the Islamic Constitutional Movement (ICM) Esraa Al-Maatouq.

During the meeting, Al-Shaheen honored the two groups and expressed his gratitude for the efforts they exerted in supporting the Palestinian cause; including the organization of the forum entitled, 'Palestine and Sustainability,' in coordination with the concerned entities and civil society organizations.

He called on the government to implement the recommendations presented in the special session on supporting Palestine; such as unifying efforts to support the issue, allowing Palestinian teachers in Kuwait to bring their spouses and children under family visa, allowing the injured Palestinians to undergo treatment in Kuwaiti hospitals, and filing a case against the Zionist entity. He asserted it is embarrassing to see South Africa filing a case against the Zionist entity at the International Criminal Court, while the Arab and Muslim countries have yet to take such a step. He urged the Arab and Muslim governments to take the necessary measures to match the action taken by Arab and Muslim In another development, MP

Fahd Al-Masoud confirmed holding a meeting with Assembly Speaker Ahmed Al-Saadoun who promised to revise the decision to terminate expatriate employees at the Assembly TV. He said he explained to Al-Saadoun that these employees are hardworking and some of them greatly contributed to the establishment of the Assembly TV. He also highlighted the humanitarian aspect of the issue, indicating these employees have financial obligations, and that they must provide for their families. He recommended granting them a grace period of six months in order to find new jobs or be reinstated to their posts at the Assembly TV in case a decision in this regard is issued. 'Famine looms'

Gaza uninhabitable 3 mths into war: UN

UNITED NATIONS, Jan 6, (AP): The U.N. humanitarian chief described Gaza on Friday as "uninhabitable" three months into Israel's war with Hamas, warning that famine was looming and a public health disaster unfold-

In a grim assessment of the devastating impact of Israel's military response to the horrific Hamas attacks on Oct. 7, Martin Griffiths said that Gaza's 2.3 million people face "daily threats to their very existence" while the world just watches.

He said tens of thousands of people, mostly women and children, have been killed or injured, families are sleeping in the open as temperatures plummet, and areas where Palestinians were told to relocate have been bombed.

"People are facing the highest levels of food insecurity ever recorded (and) famine is around the corner," Griffiths

Farmers suffering from over decade: Al-Baddah

Groundwater leakage sinking Wafra agricultural area: Kuwaiti farmer

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6: A Kuwaiti farmer Muhammad Al-Baddah called on the authorities concerned with agriculture and agricultural areas in Kuwait to work seriously and sincerely to end the problem of groundwater leakage in some Wafra agricultural plots that many Wafra farmers have been suffering from for over a decade.

In an interview with Al-Seyassah newspaper, Al-Baddah said, "The groundwater seeping from the ground is drowning a large part of the farm of my father (May God have mercy on him). It is dear to me, and I continue to be dedicated to it as a farmer, despite the high financial cost I have to bear and the huge loss of time and effort as a result of this problem. How long will this problem continue, as many farmers are suffering from it?"

Question: How did you deal with the problem of groundwater leakage?

Answer: I tried, with a lot of my efforts and my own money to address this destructive problem in my farm in Wafra, Block 4, but to no avail.

Q: Did you manage to combat the problem with your money?

A: Yes, I paid thousands of dinars to fill some sparkling wells adjacent to my farm, and thousands more to bring sand.

It is not possible to confront this major problem without the cooperation of the concerned authorities scientifically, sincerely, seriously, and in the spirit of one team in order to find the location of the defect and treat it as quickly as possible.

Q: Who did you address about this problem?

A: The Public Authority for Agricultural Affairs and Fish Resources, the Ministry of Electricity and Water, the Kuwait Institute for Scientific Research, and Kuwait University.

Q: Did these parties respond to you? A: The Public Authority for Agricultural Affairs and Fish Resources did not

do justice to me as it did to my neighbor, who chose to leave his farm, which was next to mine, and received an alternative plot in Wafra. I am waiting to receive justice from the PAAAFR, as an official there promised me.

Q: Will the problem worsen?

A: Ignoring the problem of groundwater leakage in Block 4 will worsen it dangerously, as several parts of it have become swamps of stagnant water where harmful insects such as mosquitoes breed. It has also become a dumping ground for the farm wastes near and far from my farm. Due to the growth of aquatic plants there, reckless youth throw a lot of water at it in order to catch birds from high above. All of this causes inconvenience and exposes us to danger.

Q: How did you live with the problem and continue your agricultural ef-


A: Agriculture is in my blood. In the second part of my farm in Block 4 where there are many fields and agricultural tunnels, I planted tomatoes, peppers, and eggplants. The high produce from them was good, both quantitatively and qualitatively.

Q: Do you normally produce large quantities of these types of vegetables?

A: Yes, large quantities are sent to the Sulaibiya market through the Agricultural Products Company. We also give large quantities to the farm patrons, as was the method followed during the era of my father Nasser Al-Baddah, one of the founders of the Al-Wafra Agricultural Area, the Farmers' Union, and the Al-Wafra Farming Association in the 1970s. This farm is our second home.

Q: Do you have any requests other than solving the problem of water

A: I would like to double my crops, especially in the fields, as I did before. I used to grow large quantities of potatoes annually, but the worsening problem of groundwater leakage in a large part of my farm prevents it from being fully planted this season.

'Kuwait helps save lives'

'Contributions reach millions in times of need'

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6: Kuwait's contributions reached millions of people in need around the world during difficult times, reports Al-Qabas daily quoting Nour Al-Qattan -- an official at the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) in the country and representative of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) in Kuwait Nisreen Rabiean.

In a press statement, Al-Qattan and Rabiean stressed the United Nations' commitment to maintain a strong partnership with Kuwait in order to achieve humanitarian goals. They affirmed that Kuwait's support made a big difference in the lives of forcibly displaced people around the world, and contributed to improving the living conditions of hundreds of thousands of refugees and their host communities.

They said the slogan, "Kuwait is beside You," gives a glimmer of hope to all peoples going through crises around the world. Both officials expect to witness this year an urgent need for protection and humanitarian assistance for about 300 million people around the world due to conflicts, the effects of global climate change and economic challenges.
Rabiean praised Kuwait's humanitarian efforts and sup-

port that made a difference in the lives of forcibly displaced people in the world. She revealed that UNHCR's partners in the local public sector are the ministries of Foreign Affairs and Interior, as well as Kuwait Fund for Development, which provided government funding for some of UNHCR's major projects in Iraq, Jordan and Yemen, and helped improve the living conditions of hundreds of thousands of refugees and their host communities.

Rabiean stressed that the existing cooperation with Kuwait as a humanitarian partner has contributed to supporting humanitarian response efforts in a number of countries witnessing conflicts, wars and natural disasters like Pakistan, Sudan, Somalia, Afghanistan and Ukraine. Kuwait was a major donor to the humanitarian appeal in the wake of the devastating earthquakes that struck Syria and Turkey, she

Al-Qattan talked about Kuwait's humanitarian contributions during the reign of HH the late Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jabar Al-Sabah including the year 2023. She said Kuwait has been playing a major role in supporting afflicted peoples for decades with the participation of all sectors of the State; including the provision of humanitarian and development assistance to those affected by regional and global crises, while the humanitarian agencies provide lifesaving assistance to those in need in different fields like health, food, shel-

ter, protection and education. She stated that the year 2023 witnessed a significant increase in humanitarian needs as a result of conflicts, natural disasters and the impact of climate change. "Kuwait responded immediately to emergency situations like the earthquakes in Turkey, Syria and Morocco; floods in Libva; the conflict in Sudan and the Gaza War. It built humanitarian air bridges to trans-

port vital aid for the people who lost everything in Gaza,"

She also tackled the United Nations' partnership with Kuwait in 2023, stressing that OCHA is grateful for its partnership with Kuwait. "In 2023, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs financed the Central Emergency Response Fund, while the Kuwaiti Fund financed the Humanitarian Fund in Yemen. Due to this support, our funds have been able to provide lifesaving assistance as soon as a crisis strikes.

We focused on proactive work for climate-related disasters, which allowed the humanitarian community to grant aid before the disaster occurred; thereby, reducing urgent needs and damages. OCHA also strengthened partnerships with non-governmental organizations; such as charitable societies, Kuwait Red Crescent Society and the private sector, especially in the fields of advocacy, training, qualification and resource development.

Talking about the humanitarian needs in 2024, Al-Qattan disclosed there will be an urgent need for protection and humanitarian assistance for about 300 million people around the world; taking into consideration the ongoing conflicts, effects of global climate changes and economic

She emphasized the need to give special attention to the Sudanese and Palestinian crises. In Sudan, the need for internal assistance has increased significantly due to the escalation of the conflict in 2023. This led to the displacement of a large percentage of the Sudanese population to neighboring countries. In the Gaza Strip, operational challenges have intensified due to the escalation of combat operations, instability, road closures, fuel shortages and reduced means of communication, she added.

'Kuwait keen on leading effective role during UNHRC membership'

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6, (KUNA): The State of Kuwait is keen on leading an effective role during its membership in the UN Human Rights Council, said the country's top diplomat on Thursday.

Being a member in this "significant" organization reflects the "illustrious" status that the State of Kuwait enjoys, as well as the trust of the international community, said Foreign Minister Sheikh Salem Abdullah Al-Jaber Al-Sabah. His remarks came upon Kuwait starting its three-year membership (2024-2026) at the Geneva-based Council.

It also reflects confidence of Kuwait when it comes to serving Arab and Islamic causes in relation to human rights, nonetheless on a global scale, he noted. This membership is yet another achievement throughout Kuwait's "balanced" foreign policy, Sheikh Sa-

Last October, the UN General Assembly elected Kuwait, along with 14 other countries to serve on the Human Rights Council.

Kuwait, along with Albania, Brazil, Bulgaria, Burundi, China, Cote d'Ivoire, Cuba, Dominican Republic, France, Ghana, Indonesia, Japan, Malawi, and the Netherlands were elected to serve for three years, beginning January 1, 2024.

The Human Rights Council, the UN's premier rights body, is tasked with the responsibility to uphold and advance fundamental freedoms globally. It was created in 2006 and consists of 47 member States, elected via secret ballot by the majority of General Assembly members.

Stability, security, peace

Kuwaiti Ambassador to Libya Ziad Faisal Al-Mashaan affirmed Thursday Kuwait's supportive position to efforts aiming to enhance stability, security and peace in that Arab country.

Al-Mashaan made the statement to KUNA after taking part in a meeting held by chairman of Libya's Government of National Unity (GNU) Abdul Hamid al-Dbeibeh with some Arab and Muslim ambassadors.

Al-Mashaan referred to the visit he

paid to the flood-affected city of Derna early September upon the directives of Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Salem Abdullah Al-Jaber Al-Sabah to be informed about the destruction in the

city due to floods. The visi showed Kuwait's backing to Libyans in their humanitarian plight, he noted. During meeting,

Dbeibeh stressed that Libya appreciates deep-rooted

Sheikh Salem ties with Kuwait, referring to his government's efforts aiming to boost them on all levels.

Al-Mashaan conveyed the congratulations of al-Dbeibeh to His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah on assuming office, wishing him every success in continuing the path of goodness and development to Kuwait.

Al-Dbeibeh also renewed his heartfelt condolences to Kuwait on the demise of the late Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, the ambassador said.

Meanwhile, the Libyan premier emphasized his government's endeavors to bolster stability and peace in the country that are topped with providing required support to the UN mission's efforts so as to hold parliamentary and presidential polls.

UAE's role applauded

The State of Kuwait on Friday applauded UAE's mediation efforts in the Russia-Ukraine prisoner swap.

Lauding the UAE's diplomatic efforts in sustaining world stability and peace, a Foreign Ministry statement also reaffirmed Kuwait's support to all similar initiatives.

Furthermore, the ministry statement stressed Kuwait's position vis-a-vis the Russian-Ukrainian conflict, which calls for adhering to principles of international law and the UN Charter of respecting sovereignty and territorial integrity of countries.

'Eggs, onions available in co-ops'

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6: A team of technical employees tasked to supervise goods and determine their prices in the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, headed by Faisal Al-Ansari, recently visited cooperative societies to ensure that the prices of 39 food commodities are the same as those registered in the ministry's system, reports Al-Anba daily.

In a statement to the daily, Al-Ansari disclosed that the team confirmed the availability of eggs and onions in cooperative societies.


He also said that Undersecretary of the ministry Ziyad Al-Najem will soon issue an administrative decision to form a committee, which will work for a period of two months to monitor the prices of Ramadan commodities in cooperative societies and central markets, as well as the stores selling meat, poultry, dates and in demand food products before and during the holy month of Ramadan.

He explained this committee is formed annually, coinciding with the

approach of Ramadan, as part of the ministry's commitment to protect consumers. He urged the public to report violations through hotline number 135, WhatsApp No. 55135135, official website of the ministry or the commercial centers. He affirmed the ministry is keen on addressing such reports in a bid to protect the consumers.

Name change ordered: Minister of Social, Family and Childhood Affairs Sheikh Firas Al-Saud recently issued Ministerial Resolution No. 260/2023 to change the name of the 'Charitable Societies and Charities Union' to 'Union of Charities and Foundations', reports Al-Anba daily.

It is said that the credit for placing Christmas trees in homes goes mainly to Germany, which began the current Christmas tree tradition with the advent of the sixteenth century, that is, 1,500 years after the birth of Christ, when religious Christians would bring decorated trees to their homes.

It is also widely believed that the Rev. Martin Luther, the founder of Protestantism, was the first to add lit candles to the tree, as he tied them to the tree's branches.

Until 200 years ago, Americans were opposed to placing a Christmas tree in the home, as it was a pagan symbol, and there was a law in Massachusetts that considered celebrating Christmas a criminal offense, but the situation in the West completely changed in 1846, when Queen Victoria was photographed standing with her family around the Christmas tree, and Americans became more accepting of its idea in the early twentieth century, and over time it became part of a global ritual, especially after the arrival of

From all of this, we discover that the Christmas tree has no religious connotations, or relationship to Christianity, and Christ (PBUH) was not born under a tree like what is portrayed by some these days.

The whole topic symbolizes joy and a happy event, while not forgetting the commercial aspect. Therefore, we find that dozens of countries, such as China, Korea, and Japan, celebrate Christmas

and place Christmas trees in their homes, shops, hotels, and public squares, as a symbol of joy, not as a religious symbol.

It is sad and disgusting that municipal inspectors, year after year, raided -- and the description is quite accurate -- many stores, confiscating their plastic Christmas trees, issuing tickets to their owners, and threatening them with fines and clo-

sure if they sold any of them. These and other actions are immoral and illogical, and are often intended to anger people of other religions, prevent them from joy, make their lives devoid of all beauty, and increase the monotony of life and make it boring, beyond the

misery it already is. How can a sane person imagine that a plastic tree no more than two meters in length could affect a religion that has not stopped expanding for a year, since it came to light more than 1,400 years ago.

In 1988, Scorsese directed The Last Temptation of Christ, based on the 1955 novel by the controversial Greek writer Nikos Kazantzakis of the same name, and starring unknown actors.

The film depicted the life of Christ and his struggle with various forms of temptation, including fear, doubt, depression, hesitation, lust, and his exposure to temptation. This at the time aroused the anger of some Christians, and Ramsay, the Archbishop of England at the time, stated that he was not opposed to showing the film. If a film was that weak, it poses a threat to Christianity, and this is not a defect

in the film! Let the people rejoice and celebrate, for it has been proven that the majority of those who called for extremism and fighting people of other sects were those with foreign agendas, and those who sought to conspire against their homelands, in cooperation with other countries, and among them were those involved in various suspicious relationships and dealings!

It is difficult and he left as he entered, in a clean white dress, not tainted by any objections or doubts, neither in his responsibility, nor in his competence, nor in his justice, nor in the sophistication of his morals, which always preserved his positions and enabled him to maintain a good reputation and purity

"He did not practice paralysis, nor was he held accountable to anyone, nor was anyone held accountable to him. His calculations were always for Kuwait that he Waleed Al-Jassem loved and the morals upon which he was raised.

Woe to those who recognize the significant importance they hold in a woman's eyes, as her admiration becomes the sole goal, and once trust is established, she may move on to gauge the impact of her

"This dynamics sometimes results in a woman undervaluing herself with an immoral partner while looking down on a righteous spouse. If one overlooks these inherent differences between women and men and pursues equality without acknowledging the physiological disparities, it becomes evident that equality is impractical, unjustifiable, and unhelpful.

"The narrative shifts to Europe, where class barriers were dismantled, and people were deemed equal under the law, despite not being so in the eyes of nature. Women, with their childish nature, were the first to tread this path. The lowest of women began to imitate the highest in adornment, acquiring wigs and makeup, and embracing cosmetic procedures. The consequence was the emergence of the "third sex," resulting in permissibility of values, loss of morals, weakened trust between men and women, reluctance to marry, and an increase in divorces for trivial reasons.

'Wise men observed how a woman could use her apparent beauty to manipulate and achieve her desires, understanding that she had replaced the strength of a man with this weapon. Despite the pain from cosmetic procedures, women strive to maintain their appearance as they age, as it becomes a crucial tool to ward off harm and maintain influence.

"Man and woman, both originating from the same species, were created to coexist, with one of them having an advantage to regulate humanity between them. The determination of this advantage, as the author ponders, is it not the

Creator who declared, 'The male different from the female'?"

"The suspension of family and visit visas is an ill-considered decision. The Ministry of Interior's decision is regarded as 'treatment by amputation'. The Minister of Interior's response to a parliamentary question included illogical measures that do not address the problem in a manner befitting Kuwait's status as a humanitarian country in terms of dealing with expatriate workers," columnist M. Adel Al-Jarallah Al-Khorafi wrote for Al-Seyassah daily.

'These workers are involved in important jobs and services, hence, the need to ease procedures for them rather than imposing restrictions. In his response to the above-mentioned parliamentary query, the Minister of Interior presented a number of justifications for his decision. Some have pointed out the good and bad aspects of the decision

"They argued that if anyone manipulates the procedures for the issuance of family and visit visas, it does not mean generalizing the act, such that lawabiding individuals are deprived of these visas as well.

'This is not consistent with the character of Kuwait that has been known for being fair in dealing with expatriate workers. Considering the existence of an international entity tasked to oversee the implementation of international labor laws and their principles, we do not want our country to record positions and violations against them!

"If a minority took advantage of the justifications for the Minister of Interior's decision to exploit the country's capabilities and services, then the Ministry of Interior must conduct a study based on valid, accurate and correct data. It has all the required data to determine the dimensions of the problem and ways to address it without harming a committed majority. The decision is akin to banning the use of cars if someone wants to prevent motorists from crossing the red light.

'The decision made matters worse, as the country is now suffering from closure, difficulty in recruiting workers, scarcity of tourists, and inability to visit Kuwait for those who wish to visit relatives or friends or for those who wish to come here for personal investment. Is Kuwait intended to become a 'locked box' that is difficult to open or enter?

"Personally, I suffered from this. Due to my previous foreign duties, I have many acquaintances and friends abroad. They have been unable to visit me to offer condolences to my nearest and dearest people, as they could not obtain visas. Please, His Excellency the Minister of Interior, do not close the country and turn it into a prison with justifications that can be addressed, even if they require more study and effort.'

'Shift us to another area'

Jleeb 'plot 4' residents want escape from 'hell-hole'

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6: Government housing owners in Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh's "Plot 4," are voicing their distress over the challenges posed by the presence of single individuals loitering in and out of the vicinity. Several residents shared their grievances, shedding light on issues such as crowded streets, broken infrastructure, and an abundance of grocery stores, leading them to call for urgent action and a potential relocation to another area.

Muhammad Al-Mutairi highlighted the daily struggles faced by the residents, emphasizing the narrow entrances and exits causing congestion, especially during the morning rush. Despite repeated appeals to the Ministry of Works for expansion, there has been no tangible

improvement. Youssef Al-Anzi expressed concern over the transformation of the area into a hub for Asian families and singles. He pointed out the proliferation of grocery stores in violation of residential regulations, along with reports of illicit activities such as the operation of makeshift restaurants and potential drug-related issues. Al-Anzi urged authorities to relocate these individuals, citing the negative impact on the community.

Deteriorating

Citizen Bufaisal drew attention to the deteriorating condition of the streets in Plot 4, attributing the problem to the neglect of official authorities. He noted the prevalence of potholes and speed bumps, creating hazardous conditions for both pedestrians and drivers. Additionally, he lamented the increasing number of single individuals occupying housing originally designated for citizens.

Muhammad Al-Kandari questioned the lack of action by the Ministry of Public Works in addressing the disrepair of sidewalk tiles. He highlighted the presence of loose labor roaming the streets day and night, causing disturbances and instilling fear among children. Al-Kandari also expressed concerns about the area's negative reputation and the inconvenience faced by residents.

Citizen Bou Abdullah called for the relocation of singles from the area, emphasizing the discomfort felt by many Kuwaiti families due to the presence of singles loitering. He urged authorities to prioritize the protection of Kuwaiti families from potential threats to their stabil-

Burashid raised concerns about abandoned cars cluttering the streets, mostly belonging to singles or non-Kuwaiti families. He criticized the lack of action by competent authorities to remove these vehicles, turning them into havens for stray animals and sources of environmental degradation. Burashid also highlighted the issues with expatriate workers crowding around association branches

In conclusion, the residents of Plot 4 in Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh are making several demands, including the relocation of the area to a more suitable location, intensified inspection campaigns on homes rented to singles, the removal of abandoned cars, and increased security efforts to address illicit activities in the community. The population statistics underline the urgency of addressing these concerns for the overall well-being of the residents.

Child dead, maids hurt in tent fire

Camel kick kills Kuwaiti citizen

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6: The investigator of the Al-Qashaniya Police Station has been directed to launch an inquiry into the death of a Kuwaiti citizen, who reportedly passed away after being kicked by a camel, reports Al-Anba daily.

Despite efforts to rescue the man, which included his transfer from the accident site in Abdali to Al-Jahra Hospital via an air ambulance, the attempts were unsuccessful. A misdemeanor case has been officially registered at Al-Oashaniya Police Station

Providing additional details, a security source disclosed that an officer at Al-Oashaniya Police Station received a call from Al-Jahra Hospital, notifying them of the arrival of a citizen born in 1979. Despite the hospital's efforts to save him, the doctors' report attributed the cause of death to a camel kick

The Al-Qashaniya Police Station investigations revealed the death occurred on a farm in the Abdali area, specifically at Kilo 56.

Child dies in tent fire: A child died and two domestic workers suffered burns following a camp fire in Subbiya, reports Al-Rai daily.

The security source said the two maids have been taken to a hospital. Meanwhile, the concerned authorities are working to determine the cause of the fire.

Bullet injures 50s man: A 53-year-old man has been admitted to the Jahra hospital with stomach injury, reports Al-Anba

The daily added, the man was shot in the stomach in mysterious circumstances and that he was taken to hospital by his brother.

His condition is believed to be critical. Meanwhile, the security sources said police are investigating the incident.

Panel preps study on supporting **SMEs during the camping period**

Study referred to Municipal Council to take necessary action

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6: The Municipal Council's **Public Cleanliness Com**mittee prepared a study on the proposal to establish commercial activities for supporting small and medium enterprises during the camping period, and referred it to the Municipal Council to take the necessary action regarding the proposal.

The study, which was approved by the Deputy Director General for Municipal Services Affairs and Chairman of the Public Cleanliness Committee Mishal Al-Azmi, included the requirements for establishing commercial activities to support small and medium projects during the camping period. It includes the following conditions:-

■ The area of the facility should not exceed 1,500 square meters. ■ A distance of no less than

100 meters should be left between each facility and the near-

■ The facility should be at least 100 meters away from the main

■ The materials used to establish the facility should be materials that are easy to dismantle and

■ It is not allowed to establish any facility using constructional building materials.

■ It is not allowed to build any fences, barriers, or sandpiles to

■ The fa-

and natural reserves by a distance of not less than 500 meters. ■ It is prohibited to use the facility for the purpose of renting to

others. ■ Necessary security and safety measures must be provided in accordance with the requirements of the Kuwait Fire Service Direc-

■ They must commit to cleaning the facility site after it is completely removed at the end of the camping period.

■ It is prohibited to throw, fill, or burn solid or liquid waste at the facility site.

■ They must commit to transporting the waste to treatment places in accordance with the ministerial resolution No. 354/2023 regarding the regulations for municipal waste management and public hygiene.

■ They must commit to establishing the facility only during the permissible period, which will be announced.

■ The practice of any activities or actions that would damage the natural environment, harm natural environmental life, or harm wildlife is prohibited.

■ They must adhere to the environmental protection law No. 42/2014, the article amended by law No. 99/2015, and the executive regulations of the law upon

■ The Municipality has the right to remove the facility at any time based on the request of the concerned authorities or for any other reasons, without the owner having the right to object or demand any compensation.

The study also determined the maximum number of facilities and their location, in coordination

with the Kuwait Municipality's Camping Committee, such that their total number is 15 establishments, distributed evenly by five establishments in the northern, southern and central regions of the country each. It also identified five types of activities that are permitted, which are cafes, restaurants, sweet shops, supermarkets, and children's games. These establishments are allowed for a duration of four months during the period from November 15, 2023 to March 15, 2024.

The study set the fees for facilities at KD 4,000 for the entire fourmonth camping season, as well as a cleaning insurance fee of KD 500.

It is worth highlighting that the Technical Committee headed by the Municipal Council member Dr. Hassan Kamal had recommended, in its last meeting before the New Year holiday, that the proposal to establish commercial activities to support small projects during the camping period be returned to the executive body to prepare a study after coordinating with the National Fund for Small and Medium Enterprises Development, the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, the Public Authority for Food and Nutrition, the Environment Public Authority and the Projects Sector of Kuwait Municipality.

125 environmental tasks carried out in '23

Kuwait diving team cleans seabed, removes 124 tons of debris: Al-Fadil

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6: The head of the Kuwaiti diving team, Walid Al-Fadil, announced that the team has "recovered 9 ships, boats and marine vessels weighing 101 tons to protect the marine environ-

This is in addition to lifting 124 tons of discarded fishing nets and harmful waste to the marine and coastal environment from more than 30 locations along the coast and sea of Kuwait, reports Al-Rai

Al-Fadil stated the team, which was formed 35 years ago, "carried out 125 environmental tasks and activities during the past year, and completed its comprehensive periodic maintenance of 107 marine anchors to ensure safe anchoring of boats and yachts around the islands and most importantly around coral reef sites.

"With regard to ensuring maritime navigation, he stated that "the team periodically monitors several sites in the Kuwait sea, to ensure the safety of navigational movement, and places warning signs when a boat sinks to avoid collisions, in addition to cleaning dangerous sites such as concrete in the north of the South Island, the Jaber Bridge, the sea anchors on the Asherij coast, and the iron pillars on the Fintas coast and also removes floating objects, whether wooden or plastic, that cause navigational hazard.'

He pointed out that "the team is conducting joint awareness campaigns with the regional office of the United Nations Environment Office in West Asia to enhance joint cooperation within the global campaign (Clean Seas) launched by the United Nations Environment Organization to protect the seas from plastic

Bids for Sabah Al-Ahmad Medical City project said evaluated: MEW

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6: According to informed sources in the Ministry of Public Works, the ministry has finished the technical evaluation of the bids presented by local consultancy offices to carry out the design and licensing work, prepare plans and documents for the Medical City project in Sabah Al-Ahmad Residential City, and supervise its implementation.

They revealed that three local offices met the evaluation percentages, as follows: the first 90.37 percent, the second 88.60 percent, and the third 87.78 per-

The sources explained that the Ministry of Public Works has referred the results of the technical evaluation of the bids to the Central Agency for Public Tenders (CAPT), which studied them and approved the opening of the aforementioned bids. These financial offers will be evaluated by

the ministry again and then referred back to CAPT to take the decision to award the tender to the winning bid in accordance with the applicable regulations and laws. The Medical City Project was sched-

uled to be implemented through the Ministry of Health, but the Council of Ministers decided in August last year to transfer the entire project to the Ministry of Public Works to implement it on behalf of the Ministry of Health.

The total time period scheduled for implementing the project is 68 months, divided into three stages - design: 18 months, proposal and award: 12 months, and implementation: 38 months.

The components of the aforementioned project were included in the terms of reference requested by CAPT for the purpose of appointing a local consulting office to design, license and prepare documents for tendering the city project and supervise its implementation, and accordingly the project requirements were updated.

MEW takes proactive steps to reduce power load in summer

Installing smart meters in all factories to resume

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6: According to informed sources at the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy, the ministry has started taking proactive steps to reduce electricity load rates during the summer season this year in order to avoid the electricity shortage that is expected during that period.

The ministry, represented by the Customer Services Sector, started conducting a field survey of the facilities of the Ministry of Education, including schools and mosques, in preparation for establishing the necessary infrastructure to install smart electricity meters in their facilities. Through these meters, the ministry can control and reduce loads in schools and mosques during peak



The sources highlighted the ministry's success in installing smart meters in the aforementioned facilities before the summer season, which would contribute significantly to reducing power consumption rates

They revealed that the ministry will also resume installing smart meters in all factories in the country, indicating that the Customer Services Sector has installed more than 1,000 smart meters

in a number of factories The sources stated that the ministry had previously requested avoiding factories to work during peak hours from 11:00 am to 5:00 pm with the aim of reducing electricity loads during this

They highlighted the absence of several visions among the various sectors of the ministry that would contribute, if implemented, to reducing electrical loads during the upcoming summer season.

The sources said, "During the past period, the ministry was suffering from a stagnation at the level of electricity production projects, either at the ministry level or at the level of the projects of the Public-Private Partnership Projects Authority, which has finally begun to witness a break through regarding its electrical and water projects.

Meanwhile, the second phase of the smart electricity meter project valued at KD9.97 million started immediately after the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy obtained approval from the Central Agency for

The U.N. children's agency UNICEF said Friday that most young children and pregnant women aren't getting enough nutrition, with fewer than 200 aid trucks entering Gaza every day - less than half the prewar level - and distribution hampered by the fighting.

A survey by UNICEF found that 90% of children under the age of two are eating two or fewer of the five essential food groups each day, mainly bread or milk. A quarter of pregnant women said they only eat one food group per day.

UNICEF says cases of diarrhea among children under the age of five have risen from 48,000 to 71,000 - an indication of poor nutrition. Normally, only 2,000 cases of diarrhea are reported each month in the Gaza Strip.

Israel cut off food, clean water medicine, electricity and fuel deliveries to Gaza immediately after the Hamas attack. In response to U.S. pressure it allowed a trickle of aid in through Egypt in late October, and the number of trucks has increased from about 100 to up to 200 every day.

Israeli authorities have repeatedly said there is enough food in the territory, and that they have taken the necessary steps to allow aid in, blaming any shortages on U.N. bodies.

But U.N. associate spokesperson Stephanie Tremblay reiterated Friday that "the current response is only meeting a fraction of people's needs."

She repeated what U.N. Secretary-General said last month: "It's a mistake to quote the effectiveness of the humanitarian operation in Gaza based only on the number of trucks. An effective aid operation in Gaza requires security. It requires staff who can work in safety. It requires good logistical capacity and

the resumption of commercial activity.' Tremblay said until those requirements are met, Gazans will not receive

enough aid. Nonetheless, the U.N. World Food Program reported that in December it reached 975,000 vulnerable people with food across Gaza and in the West Bank, she said.

In an indication of difficulties getting aid into Gaza, some international efforts are resorting to dropping supplies from planes. France announced Friday that French and Jordanian C-130 planes dropped a total of seven tons of medical aid to the Jordanian field hospital in the southern city of Khan Younis in a joint operation overnight.

'The humanitarian situation remains critical in Gaza," French President Emmanuel Macron said Friday on X, formerly Twitter. "In a difficult context, France and Jordan delivered aid to the population and to those who are helping them.'

The airdrop, a first from a Western country in the Gaza Strip, was agreed during Macron's recent visit to Jordan, where he met with King Abdullah II last month, the French presidency said.

Limited challenge

Moscow approves 2 challengers to Putin

MOSCOW, Jan 6, (AP): Russia's national elections commission on Friday registered the first two candidates who will compete with President **Vladimir Putin** in the March election that Putin is all but certain to win.

The commission approved putting Leonid Slutsky of the nationalist Liberal Democratic Party and Vladislav Davankov of the New People Party on the ballot for the March 15-17 vote.

Neither poses a significant challenge to Putin, who has dominated Russian politics since becoming president in 2000. Both candidates' parties are largely supportive in parliament of legislation backed by Putin's power-base United Russia party.

Slutsky, as head of the lower house of parliament's foreign affairs committee, has been a prominent back-er of Kremlin foreign policy



that is increasingly oppositional to the West. In the last presidential election in 2018, the party's candidate tallied less than 6% of the vote.

Davankov is a deputy speaker of the lower house of parliament, the Duma. His party was established in 2020 and holds 15 seats in the 450-member

The Communist Party has put forth Nikolai Kharitonov as its candidate, but the elections commission has not formally registered him. Kharitonov was the party's

candidate in 2004, finishing a distant second to Putin. A Russian politician calling for peace in Ukraine was rejected last month from the presidential ballot.

The elections commission refused to accept Yekaterina Duntsova's initial nomination by a group of supporters, citing errors in the paperwork, including spelling. The Supreme Court then rejected Duntsova's appeal against the commission's decision.

Putin is running as an independent, and his campaign headquarters, together with branches of the ruling United Russia party and a political coalition called the People's Front, have collected signatures in support of his candidacy. Under Russian law, independent candidates must be nominated by at least 500 supporters, and must also gather at least 300,000 signatures from 40 regions or more.

UK ex-minister quits conservatives: Britain's former energy minister said Friday he is quitting the Conservative Party and stepping down as a lawmaker over the government's backtracking on its environmental commitments.

Chris Skidmore said he could not support a forth-coming bill that will authorize new North Sea oil and gas drilling and called the U.K.'s retreat from its climate goals "a tragedy."

Skidmore has been a Conservative lawmaker since 2010. He wrote a government-commissioned review published a year ago setting out how Britain could reduce carbon emissions to net zero by 2050 while creating thousands of new green jobs.

He said that "as the former energy minister who signed the U.K.'s net zero commitment by 2050 into law, I cannot vote for a bill that clearly promotes the production of new oil and gas.'

"To fail to act, rather than merely speak out, is to tolerate a status quo that cannot be sustained," he add-

ed in a statement. He said he would step down when Parliament returns next week from its Christmas break.

Conservative Prime Minister Rishi Sunak has watered down some green goals that he said imposed "unacceptable costs" on ordinary people. He delayed a ban on selling new gas and diesel cars, scrapped a domestic energy-efficiency rule and greenlit hundreds of new North Sea oil and gas licenses. (AP)

Belarus Prez grants self immunity: President Alexander Lukashenko of Belarus signed a new law Thursday that gives him lifelong immunity from criminal prosecution and prevents opposition leaders living abroad from running in future presidential elections.

The law theoretically applies to any former president and members of his or her family. In reality, it only is relevant to the 69-year-old Lukashenko, who has ruled Belarus with an iron fist for almost 30 years.

The new measure appears aimed at further shoring up Lukashenko's power and eliminating potential challengers in the country's next presidential election, which is due to take place in 2025.

The law significantly tightens requirements for presidential candidates and makes it impossible to elect opposition leaders who fled to neighboring countries in recent years. Only citizens of Belarus who have permanently resided in the country for at least 20 years and have never had a residence permit in another country are eligible to run.

Belarus was rocked by mass protests during Lukashenko's controversial re-election in August 2020 for a sixth term, which the opposition and the West condemned as fraudulent. At that time, Belarusian authorities detained more than 35,000 people, many of whom were tortured in custody or left the country.

Lukashenko also has been accused of involvement in the illegal transfer of children from Russian-occupied towns in Ukraine to Belarus.

According to the text of the new law, Lukashenko, were he to leave power, "cannot be held accountable for actions committed in connection with exercising his presidential powers."

The law also says the president and members of his family will be provided with lifelong state protection, medical care, life and health insurance. After resigning, the president would also become a permanent lifelong member of the upper house of parliament. (AP)

German hospital fire kills 5: The death toll in a fire that broke out in a hospital in Germany this week has risen to five, with all of the victims patients, as investigators sought to understand the cause of the blaze.

The fire broke out late Thursday at the hospital in Uelzen, southeast of Hamburg. Emergency workers arrived to flames and calls for help. They evacuated several people, and were able to stop the fire from spreading any further, according to the dpa news agency, which cited police.

Senegal's Sonko faces setback: Senegal's top opposition leader on Friday suffered major setbacks in his quest to contest the presidency when a top court upheld the defamation conviction against him and the Constitutional Council rejected his application to be a presidential candidate on the basis that it was incomplete.

Ousmane Sonko's application case at the council was "examined without his representative (in) a flagrant violation of the law" before it was rejected, his lawyer, Ciré Cledor Ly, told reporters. "From the outset, the government has shown its willingness to invalidate Ousmane Sonko's candidacy.

The council's decision came hours after the Supreme Court rejected the jailed opposition leader's appeal of his conviction for defamation after being sued by a government minister. The trial was seen as the latest twist in a prolonged legal battle involving several charges which the opposition leader has alleged is to stop his presidential bid in the February elections.

"The trial was the very last chance," Sonko's lawyer Khoureychi Ba said of the ruling delivered after a session that started on Thursday. "I realize that Mr. Sonko's opponents have succeeded in eliminating him from the Feb. 25 presidential election," Ba

Sonko, who finished third in the country's 2019 presidential election, is widely seen as the main challenger to President Macky Sall's ruling party. Sall himself ultimately decided not to seek a third term in office after Sonko's supporters launched months of protests that at times turned deadly.

Although the Constitutional Council's decision has nothing to do with Sonko's conviction for defamation, the council has the final say on all the candidacies, including that

Trump 'ignites' Iowa campaign

SIOUX CENTER, Iowa, Jan 6, (AP): Former President **Donald Trump** urged his supporters Friday evening not to be complacent in the face of a commanding polling lead as he kicked off the sprint to the Iowa caucuses with his first events of the election year.

"Ten days from now, the people of this state are going to cast the most important vote of your entire lives," Trump told several hundred supporters gathered in Sioux Center. He implored them to turn

out on caucus night, warning, "Bad things happen when you sit

Trump held a pair of commit-to-caucus events, one in the far northwest corner of the state on the border with South Dakota and one in north-central Mason City. He'll spend Saturday in Newton



in central Iowa before heading to Clinton in the state's far east.

The visit came the day before the third anniversary of Jan. 6, 2021, when a violent mob of Trump's supporters stormed the U.S. Capitol as part of a desperate bid to keep him in power after his 2020 election loss. Trump did not acknowledge the date Friday, but railed against the treatment of those who have been jailed for participating in the riot, labeling them 'hostages" and saying it will "go down as one of the saddest things in the history of our country.'

More than 1,230 people have been charged with federal crimes for their participation, including felonies like assaulting police officers and seditious con-

Trump also asked at one point in Sioux Center whether there was anyone in the friendly room who wasn't planning to vote for him, but then quickly warned them not to raise their hands.

"They're going to say he incited an insurrection," he said to laughs.

And over and over, he repeated his false claims that the 2020 election was stolen - the same lies that motivated the

Trump also spent much of the night lashing out at President Joe Biden, who earlier Friday delivered a speech warning that Trump's efforts to retake the White House pose a grave threat to the country and democracy.

"We all know who Donald Trump is," Biden said near Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, where George Washington and the Continental Army spent a bleak winter nearly 250 years ago. "The question we have to answer is: Who are we?

Biden said Jan. 6 marked a moment where "we nearly lost America - lost it all."

Overturn

Trump, who faces 91 criminal charges stemming from his efforts to overturn his loss to Biden and other state and federal cases, continued to argue that it is, in-

stead, Biden who poses the threat. "He is a danger to democracy," Trump

charged in Mason City. The former president and his campaign have spent months accusing Biden and other Democrats of using the justice system to damage their chief political rival. There is no evidence that Biden has influenced the investigations led by state officials or the Justice Department - which has also indicted his son, Hunter Biden,

"Joe Biden's record is an unbroken streak of weakness, incompetence, corruption, and failure," Trump told the crowd in Sioux Center. "That's why Crooked Joe is staging his pathetic fearmongering campaign event in Pennsylva-

Trump's team is hoping for a knockout win in Iowa on Jan. 15 that will deny his rivals an opportunity to seize momentum and set the table for him to lock up the nomination by the spring. They also hope to turn out a wave of new voters who have never caucused before in a show of strength ahead of an increasingly likely general election rematch against Biden.

"You have to get out and vote because it sets the tone. It even sets the tone, frankly, for November," Trump said in Mason City.

While he remains far ahead in Iowa and other early state and national polls, Trump also continued to lash out at his top Republican rivals, unleashing some of his most pointed attacks to date against former United Nations Ambassador Nikki Haley, who has seen growing support in recent months following a series of well-reviewed debate performances.

Trump tried to cast both her and Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis, who was once the only rival he criticized, as "establishment pawns," alleging they would "sell" voters "out." DeSantis, who has staked his campaign on Iowa, entered the race with sky-high expectations but has struggled to gain traction against Trump.

"Sadly, the establishment losers and sellouts lagging far behind us in the Republican primary cannot be trusted on taxes, on trade, or anything else," Trump charged. "They'll betray you just like they betrayed me."

Haley's campaign has been celebrating Trump's recent attention - including a new attack ad - arguing it reflects his growing concern that she is gaining on him.

DeSantis and Haley needled each other at their own events in Iowa Friday, with DeSantis leaning into his opponent's flippant comment about the role of Iowa among the early-voting states. DeSantis, appearing with Texas Rep. Chip Roy and Kentucky Rep. Thomas Massie, hounded Haley for "insulting" Iowans by suggesting New Hampshire voters could "correct" the caucus results.

Evacuation

Ahead of the South Korean drills Friday, authorities blared broadcasts via street loudspeakers and sent text messages to residents on the five major border islands, asking them to evacuate to safe places. They worried North Korea could conduct a new round of firing training in response but lifted the evacuation order a few hours later as they detected no suspicious activities by the North's military, according to local

The Koreas' poorly marked western sea boundary witnessed bloody naval clashes in 1999, 2002 and 2009. The North's alleged torpedoing of a South Korean warship killed 46 South Korean sailors in March 2010, and the North's artillery bombardment of Yeonpyeong Island - one of the five border islands where the evacuation order was issued on Friday - killed four South Koreans in November 2010.

The 2018 agreement - reached during a short-lived era of reconciliation between the two Koreas, requires them to halt live-fire exercises and aerial surveillance in buffer and no-fly zones established along their border. But the deal is in danger of collapsing after both Koreas took steps to breach the accord amid bickering over the North's first successful military spy satellite launch in November.

South Korea resumed front-line aerial surveillance in protest at the North's satellite launch. North Korea responded that it would deploy powerful weapons at the border and won't abide by the 2018 deal any longer. South Korea later accused North Korea of restoring front-line guard posts that it had dismantled under the 2018 deal.

South Korea has previously accused North Korea of having already breached the deal numerous times with firing drills at the buffer zones, including one as recently as December 2022 off the Korean Peninsula's east coast.

"North Korea is now in the stage of finding a justification for provocation after scrapping the 2018 military agreement," said Lee Sang Sook, a research professor at the Institute of Foreign Affairs and National Security. "There is a possibility for North Korea to ramp up provocation steadily, so big and small provocations along the western sea boundary and the land border are expected this year."

In a recent key ruling-party meeting, North Korean leader **Kim Jong Un** fired off fierce, derisive rhetoric against South Korea, saying South Korea must not be considered as a partner for reconciliation or unification. He ordered the military to use all available means - including nuclear weapons - to conquer South Korea in the event of a conflict.

Concessions

Experts say Kim likely believes that a boosted military capability would increase his chances of wresting U.S. concessions if former President Donald Trump is reelected in the U.S. presidential election. In the ruling party meeting, Kim vowed to expand the country's nuclear arsenal and launch three additional military spy satellites this year.

Earlier Friday, North Korea's state media said Kim ordered authorities to increase production of mobile launch vehicles for missiles during a visit to a munitions factory. Kim said the role of the factory producing transport erector launchers, or TELs, is "very important" in bolstering North Korea's national defense because of a looming military showdown with its ri-

Mobile launch vehicles give North Korea the ability to move missiles around its territory, making it more difficult for adversaries to detect their launches in ad-

Yang Uk, an analyst at Seoul's Asan Institute for Policy Studies, said that North Korea is estimated to have more than 200 such launch vehicles, about 20-30 of them likely for intercontinental ballistic missiles designed to attack the U.S. mainland.

Kim's factory visit may also be related to the North's purported shipments of conventional arms to Russia for its war in Ukraine in return for receiving high-tech Russian weapons technologies.

U.S. National Security Council spokesman John Kirby said Thursday that recently declassified intelligence showed that North Korea has provided Russia with ballistic missile launchers and several ballistic missiles. The U.S. and South Korea have previously accused North Korea of supplying ammunitions and artillery to Russia.

Trains collide on Indonesia's main island of Java, killing at least 4 people

Two trains collided on Indonesia's main island of Java on Friday, causing carriages to buckle and overturn and killing at least four people, officials

The accident happened about 500 meters (yards) from Cicalengka train station in West Java province, said Ayep Hanapi, a spokesperson for PT Kereta Api Indonesia, the national railways.

He said the Turangga express train carrying 287 passengers was traveling from Surabaya, the capital of East Java province, when it plowed into a Bandung Raya commuter train with 191 passengers heading to Padalarang from Haurpugur station at

"All passengers of the two crashed trains have been evacuated safely," Hanapi said, adding that 37 people were injured and treated at several hospitals. By Friday afternoon, only two passengers were still hospitalized, he said.

Passenger Heri Aliyudin said the lights were knocked out in his cabin in the third carriage of the Turangga train. He recalled suitcases and bags fell onto several passengers. Those who were still asleep were thrown from their seats.

"I was so shocked, I couldn't move for a moment, it was total confusion," Aliyudin told Kompas TV

in an interview, "Then I grabbed my suitcase and shoved my way outside.

West Java Police spokesperson Ibrahim Tompo said at least four train crew members were killed the driver and his assistant on the commuter train and a steward and a security guard on the express

Television video showed several carriages overturned or badly mangled. One carriage plunged into a nearby rice field. People screamed as panicked passengers tried to get out of the train. Some walked through the fields carrying suitcases and other items as ambulances evacuated the injured. (AP)

Quake death toll rises to 126

WAJIMA, Japan, Jan 6, (AP): Aftershocks threatened to bury more homes and block roads crucial for relief shipments, as the death toll from the earthquakes that rattled Japan's western coastline this past week rose to 126 on Saturday.

Among the dead was a 5-year-old boy who had been recovering from injuries after boiling water spilled on him during Monday's 7.6 magnitude earthquake. His condition suddenly worsened and he died Friday, according to Ishikawa prefecture, the hardest-Officials warned that roads, already

cracked from the dozens of earthquakes that continue to shake the area, could collapse completely. That risk was growing with rain and snow expected overnight and Sunday. The death toll on Saturday rose to

126. Wajima city has recorded the highest number of deaths with 69, followed by Suzu with 38. More than 500 people were injured, at least 27 of them seriously.

The temblors left roofs sitting haplessly on roads and everything beneath them crushed flat. Roads were warped like rubber. A fire turned a neighborhood in Wajima to ashes.

More than 200 people were still unaccounted for, although the number has fluctuated. Eleven people were reported trapped under two homes that collapsed in Anamizu.

For Shiro Kokuda, 76, the house in Wajima where he grew up was spared but a nearby temple went up in flames and he was still looking for his friends at evacuation centers.

"It's been really tough," he said. Japan is one of the fastest-aging societies in the world. The population in Ishikawa and nearby areas has dwindled over the years. A fragile economy centered on crafts and tourism was now more imperiled than ever.

In an unusual gesture from nearby North Korea, leader Kim Jong Un sent a message of condolence to Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida, the official Korean Central News Agency reported Saturday.

Japan earlier received messages expressing sympathy and promises of aid from President Joe Biden and other

Japanese government spokesman Yoshimasa Hayashi told reporters that Japan was grateful to all the messages, including the one from North Korea. Hayashi said the last time Japan received a condolence saster was in 1995.

Along Japan's coastline, power was gradually being restored, but water supplies were still short. Emergency water systems were also damaged.

Thousands of troops were flying and trucking in water, food and medicine to the more than 30,000 people who had evacuated to auditoriums, schools and other facilities. The nationally circulated Yomiuri

newspaper reported that its aerial study had located more than 100 landslides in the area, and some were blocking lifeline roads.

The urgency of the rescue operations intensified as the days wore on. But some have clung to life, trapped under pillars and walls, and were freed.

TOKYO: Transport safety officials searched for a voice recorder from the severely burned fuselage of a Japan Airlines plane, seeking crucial information on what caused a collision with a small coast guard plane on the runway at Tokyo's Haneda airport.

On Saturday, heavy machinery worked for a second day to remove debris of the burned Airbus A320 for storage in a hangar to allow the runway to reopen. Transport Minister Tetsuo Saito said officials were aiming to reopen the runway Monday. Wreckage of the Japan Coast Guard plane had been cleared.

Saito said the airport's traffic control operation would create a new position for monitoring aircraft movement on runways beginning Saturday. There has been speculation traffic controllers might not have paid attention to the coast guard plane's presence on the runway when they gave the JAL plane permission to land.

Six experts from the Japan Transport Safety Board on Friday walked through the mangled debris of the Air-850-900 that was lying on the runway searching for the voice data

JTSB experts have so far secured both the flight and voice data recorders from the coast guard's Bombardier Dash-8 and a flight data recorder from the JAL plane to find out what happened in the last few minutes before Tuesday's fatal collision.

All 379 occupants of JAL Flight 516 safely evacuated within 18 minutes of landing as the aircraft was engulfed in flames. The pilot of the coast guard plane also escaped, but its five other crewmembers died. The coast guard aircraft was on a mission to deliver relief goods to survivors of powerful earthquakes in central Japan that killed at least 100 people.

New details have also emerged from media footage at Haneda airport. NHK television reported footage from its monitoring camera set up at the Haneda airport showed that the coast guard plane moved on to the runway and stopped there for about 40 seconds before the collision.

In the footage, the coast guard aircraft is seen entering the runway from the C5 taxiway, then shortly after the passenger plane touches down right behind and rams into it, creating an orange fireball. The JAL airliner, covered with flames and spewing gray smoke, continues down the runway before coming to a stop.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Niluka Kadurugamuwa told The Associated Press on Friday that the moratorium relates to all countries and will allow local researchers to build capacity be on a par with their foreign counterparts in joint researches.

Chinese ships have docked in Colombo in recent years for research based on agreements between between agencies in

China and Sri Lanka. Last October, Chinese research ship Shi Yan 6 docked in Colombo port for several days, while in 2022 the navy vessel Yuan Wang 5 docked at Hambantota in southern Sri Lanka. There were fears in India that these vessels could be used to monitor the region. (AP)

Kuwait oil drops

Price of Kuwait oil dropped by 93 cents to settle at USD 79.80 per barrel on Friday vis a vis USD 80.73 pb on Thursday, Kuwait Petroleum Corporation said on Saturday.

In international markets, forwards of the Brent crude oil rose by USD 1.17 to reach USD 78.76 pb while those of the West Texas Intermediate crude climbed by USD 1.62 to settle at USD 73.81 a barrel. (KUNA)

Development a sign of continued economic strength

US employers add a surprisingly strong 216,000 jobs

WASHINGTON, Jan 6, (AP): The nation's employers added a robust 216,000 jobs last month, the latest sign that the American labor market remains resilient even in the face of sharply higher interest rates.

Friday's government report showed that December's job gain exceeded the 173,000 that were added in November. The unemployment rate was unchanged at 3.7% - the 23rd straight month that joblessness has come in below 4%.

Some details of the report, though, may disappoint the inflation fighters at the Federal Reserve, who might now be inclined to delay any cuts in their benchmark interest rate. Average hourly wages rose 4.1% from a year earlier, up from a 4% gain in November, which could make it harder for the Fed to slow inflation back

Still, taken as a whole, the December jobs report reflected a healthy economy, with steady job growth, rising wages and cooling inflation. It provided the latest evidence that the Fed may be able to achieve a notoriously difficult "soft landing," in which the central bank would conquer inflation without causing a steep

Yet despite the low unemployment and easing inflation, polls show that many Americans are dissatisfied with the economy. That disconnect, which will likely be an issue in the 2024 elections, has puzzled economists and political analysts.

A key factor is the public's exasperation with higher prices. Though inflation has been falling more or less steadily for a year and a half, the lingering financial and psychological effects of the worst bout of inflation in four decades have soured many Americans on the economy. Prices are still 17% higher than they were before the inflation surge began and are still rising.

Pollsters and economists say there has never been as wide a gap between the underlying health of the economy and public perception. A poll conducted in November by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research, about three-quarters of respondents described the economy as poor. Two-thirds said their expenses had risen.

Asked why many Americans remain dissatisfied by the economy, Acting Labor Secretary Julie Su said Friday that "part of the unfortunate reality is we live in

Many of the Biden administration's domestic policies, including its investment in infrastructure, are "wildly popular," Su said in an interview with The Associ-

Despite their stated discontent with the economy, Americans have kept spending. Average hourly pay has outpaced inflation over the past year, leaving consumers with more money to spend. Indeed, as they did for much of 2023, consumers, a huge engine for U.S. economic growth, hit the stores in November, shopped online, went out to restaurants or traveled.

Friday's jobs report did contain some cautionary notes. Paul Ashworth, chief North America economist at Capital Economics, noted that the government revised down its previous estimate of job gains for October and November by a combined 71,000. And just as in November, December's job growth was concentrated in just a few industries: Leisure and hospitality companies added 40,000, healthcare 38,000 and governments 52,000.

Indeed, from October through December, private-sector employers have added just 115,000 jobs a month, the lowest three-month average since companies were laying off workers in mid-2020 during COVID-19 lockdowns

In addition, the proportion of people who either have a job or are looking for one fell in December to 62.5%, the lowest level since February.

The Fed prefers having more people in the labor force to help ease pressure on employers to sharply boost pay to attract or retain workers. Companies typically

Many such workers didn't like their hours and have taken other types of jobs. That trend, Kharasch said, has forced some restaurants to simplify menus or reduce their selection.

"It's constantly adjusting the menu to fit where our staff is at any one time,"

Kharasch said he thinks the minimum wage increases that are taking effect this year in some states will result in more automation, increased prices and a reduction in hours of operation to save money. Beginning April 1, California will require fast food companies to pay their workers at least \$20 an hour.

Krystle Phillips, owner of Roll Ice Cream LLC in St. Petersburg, Florida, which sells rolled ice cream machines, ingredients and supplies to ice cream trucks and stores, is struggling to find workers willing to work full time. Job candidates are demanding higher pay.

Short of help, Phillips, who considers herself an expert in refrigeration and lo-

gistics, has had to get up to speed on writing recipes and accounting. "It's been hard to hire these specialized positions," she said.

Fed minutes: Officials saw inflation cooling but were cautious about timing of rate cuts

WASHINGTON, Jan 6, (AP): The Federal Reserve's policymakers concluded last month that inflationary pressures were easing and that the job market was cooling. In response, the officials chose to leave their key interest rate unchanged for the third straight time and signaled that they expected to cut rates three times in 2024.

According to the minutes of their Dec. 12-13 meeting released Wednesday, Fed officials indicated in their own interest-rate forecasts that a lower benchmark rate "would be appropriate by the end of 2024" given "clear progress" toward taming inflation.

But they "stressed the importance" of remaining vigilant and keeping rates high "until inflation was clearly moving down sustainably" toward their 2% target. And though Chair Jerome Powell indicated at a news conference after the meeting that the Fed was likely done raising rates, the minutes show that Fed officials felt the economic outlook was uncertain enough that that further hikes were still "possible."

Powell had also suggested at his news conference that the Fed's policymakers discussed rate cuts during their meeting, a remark that helped ignite a stock market rally. Over the next few days, though, some other Fed officials tried to steer investors away from expecting any imminent cuts. Wednesday's minutes provided no explicit mention about a discussion of

Still, Paul Ashworth, chief North America economist at Capital Economics said "there is nothing in these minutes to dissuade us that the Fed will start to cut interest rates from this March onwards.

In the minutes of their meeting, the policymakers sounded optimistic about the outlook for inflation. They mentioned the end of supply chain backlogs that had caused shortages and higher prices, a drop in rents that is beginning to move through the economy and an increase in job seekers, which makes it easier for companies to fill vacancies without having to raise pay aggressively.

The central bank began raising rates in March 2022 to combat an unexpected resurgence in consumer prices that had begun nearly a year earlier. The Fed has since raised its benchmark rate 11 times to a 22-year high of about 5.4%.

The anti-inflation campaign has made steady progress, allowing the Fed to leave its benchmark rate unchanged since July. Consumer prices were up 3.1% in November from a year earlier - down from a fourdecade high 9.1% in June 2022.

Higher rates were widely expected to trigger a recession in the United States, the world's largest economy. But the economy and the job market have proved unexpectedly resilient.

The U.S. gross domestic product - the economy's total output of goods and services - grew at a robust 4.9% annual rate from July through September on strong consumer spending and business investment. At their meeting last month, some Fed officials noted that toward the end of 2023, the economy appeared to have slowed.

American employers added a healthy 232,000 jobs a month through November last year. The December jobs report, which the government will issue Friday, is expected to show that the economy added 155,000 jobs last month and that unemployment rose slightly to 3.8%. It would mark the 23rd straight month it's come in below 4%, longest such streak since the

Wall Street's hopes for rate cuts may be too optimistic

NEW YORK, Jan 6, (AP): Even when everyone agrees the interest-rate cuts that Wall Street craves so much are coming, there's still room for potential disappointment.

Since the Federal Reserve hinted last month its drastic rate hikes to get inflation under control may be done, bets have built on how much the Fed will lower its main interest rate in 2024. Inflation has eased back to 3.1% at the consumer level, down from its peak above 9%. That will hopefully give the Fed freedom to take it easier on rates.

Cuts to rates can supercharge financial markets, and stock and bond prices have already jumped in anticipation of such moves. The S&P 500 closed 2023 with a ninth straight winning week, for example. That's its longest such streak since January 2004.

As it stands, traders on Wall Street are forecasting a nearly three-in-four chance the Fed will cut its main interest rate by at least 1.50 percentage points through the year, according to data from CME Group. That would take it down from its current perch, sitting in a range of 5.25% to 5.50%, which is its highest since 2001. But for much of the past two years,

almost since the Fed began its harshest rate-hike campaign in decades, Wall Street has been quick to forecast an approaching easing of rates, only to be disappointed by false peaks as inflation proved to be stronger and more stubborn than expected. Investors "have repeatedly priced in

aggressive rate cuts just to walk them back," according to Jean Boivin and other strategists at BlackRock Investment Institute. "All this shows markets may extrapolate a lot from one piece of data or central bank comment.' Inflation has of course retreated and is

nearing the Fed's target of 2%. But it's still to be determined whether inflation will continue a steady, downward trend.

That raises the risk that the market may once again be overzealous in trying to front-run the Fed. Fed officials themselves see only half as many cuts to rates happening in 2024 as Wall Street does, based on the median projection of officials as of December.

Of course, no one has a perfect track record on this. Not even the Fed. Policy makers at the central bank famously dismissed rising inflation in 2021 as "tran-

SpaceX accused of unlawfully firing workers who were critical of Musk

NEW YORK, Jan 6, (AP): A U.S. labor agency has accused SpaceX of unlawfully firing employees who penned an open letter critical of CEO Elon Musk and creating an impression that worker activities were under surveillance by the rocket ship company.

A Los Angeles-based regional director for the National Labor Relations Board on Wednesday filed a complaint that consolidates eight unfair labor practice charges against SpaceX. The cases stem from the company's alleged actions following the circulation of the employees' letter back in June 2022.

The letter, among other workplace concerns, called on executives to condemn Musk's public behavior on X - the platform then-known as Twitter - and hold everyone accountable for unacceptable conduct. Musk's actions included making light of sexual harassment allegations against him,

which the billionaire denied. "As our CEO and most prominent spokesperson, Elon is seen as the face of SpaceX - every tweet that Elon

sends is a de facto public statement by the company," the open letter said at the time. The letter also referred to Musk's actions as a "frequent source of distraction and embarrassment."

A total of nine employees were soon terminated for their involvement in the letter, according to a November 2022 filing made on behalf of one of the employees to the NLRB, although only eight are included in Wednesday's

In addition to the firings, the complaint accuses SpaceX of interrogating other workers about the letter, announcing that employees were terminated for their participation in the letter and "inviting employees to quit if they disagreed with the behavior of

Chief Executive Officer Elon Musk.' The complaint also alleges that some were shown screen shots of communications between employees about the letter, which "created an impression among (SpaceX's) employees that their protected concerted activities were under surveillance."

Germany softens contentious cost-cutting plan for upset farmers

The German government on Thursday watered down cost-saving plans that have in-furiated farmers, announcing that it is giving up a proposal to scrap a car tax exemption for farming vehicles and will stagger cuts to tax breaks for diesel used in agriculture.

The cuts were part of a package agreed last month by leaders of Chancellor Olaf Scholz's unpopular three-party coalition to fill a 17 billion-euro (\$18.6 billion) hole in the 2024 budget.

Farmers staged a protest with tractors in Berlin and called for more demonstrations this month, and even Agriculture Minister Cem Özdemir spoke out against the cuts being implemented in full. He said farmers have no alternative to diesel.

The budget revamp was necessary after Germany's highest court annulled an earlier decision to repurpose 60 billion euros (almost \$66 billion) originally meant to cushion the fallout from the COVID-19 pandemic for measures to help combat climate change and modernize the country. The maneuver fell afoul of Germany's strict self-imposed limits on running up debt.

A government statement Thursday said Scholz, Vice Chancellor Robert

Habeck and Finance Minister Christian Lindner have now agreed to maintain the car tax exemption for farming vehicles in order to save those concerned "in some cases significant bureaucratic effort."

The tax breaks on diesel will no longer end all at once, giving farmers "more time to adapt," it added. They will be cut by 40% this year, with another 30% being cut in each of the next two years. (AP)

Europe's inflation climbs up after months of decline

FRANKFURT, Germany, Jan 6, (AP): Inflation plaguing Europe rose to 2.9% in December, rebounding after seven straight monthly declines as food prices rose and support for high energy bills ended in some countries. The rise in price levels fueled debate over how soon interest rate cuts could be expected from the European Central Bank.

The figure released Friday was up from the 2.4% annual inflation recorded in November - but is well down from the peak of 10.6% in October

ECB President Christine Lagarde warned that inflation could tick up in coming months, taking a detour from its recent downward path. The central bank for the 20 European Union countries that use the euro currency has raised its benchmark interest rate to a record-high 4% and says it will keep it there as long as necessary to push inflation down to its goal of 2% considered best for the economy

The faster-than-expected fall in inflation over the last months of 2023 had led some analysts to predict the central bank would start cutting interest rates as early as March.

The December rebound, however, was grist for analysts who predict that rates wouldn't start to come down until June.

"The increase serves as a reminder that interest rate cuts in the first quarter are unlikely, but this shouldn't dispel expectations of cuts later in the year," said Bert Colijn, senior eurozone economist at ING bank.

Differed

Views differed on the significance of the higher inflation number. December's increase was a "just a blip" that would be reversed in January, said Jack Allen-Reynolds, deputy chief eurozone economist at Capital Economics. He foresees a first rate cut in April. Inflation in December got a boost from the end of energy subsidies in Germany and France that had lowered prices a year ago.

Core inflation, which excludes volatile fuel and food prices, eased to 3.4% from 3.6% in November, according to European Union statistics agency Eurostat. The figure is closely watched by

Higher food costs led global supermarket chain Carrefour to announce this week that it will stop selling PepsiCo products in it stores in France, Belgium, Spain and Italy. The French chain pointed to price increases for popular items like Lay's potato chips, Quaker Oats, Lipton tea and Pepsi

The ECB and central banks around the world have rapidly raised interest rates to fight inflation. They work by raising the cost of borrowing for consumer purchases, particularly of houses and apartments, and for business investment in new offices and factories.

That lowers demand for goods and relieves pressure on prices - but it also can limit growth at a time when it's in short supply in Europe. The economy shrank 0.1% in the July-to-September

Inflation itself, however, has been a key challenge to economic growth because it robs consumers of purchasing power. The ECB said raising rates quickly was the best way to get it under control and avoid even more dras-

Officials at the U.S. Federal Reserve also stressed the importance of keep rates high until inflation is "clearly moving down," according to minutes of their Dec. 12-13 meeting released Wednesday. The Fed has signaled three rate cuts this year.

U.S. consumer prices were up 3.1% in November from a year earlier.

Inflation spiked around the world as the rebound from the COVID-19 pandemic strained supplies of parts and raw materials, then as Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022, raising costs for food and energy.

Europe has since found other supplies of natural gas outside Russia to generate electricity, power factories and heat homes, so energy prices have

Government stands firm

UK doctors' strike intensifies amid growing concerns over patient care

LONDON, Jan 6, (AP): The longest scheduled strike in the history of Britain's state-funded National Health Service entered its second of six planned days Thursday with doctors in England at loggerheads with hospitals over requests for some to leave the picket line to cover urgent needs during one of the busiest times of year.

The strike is the ninth organized by doctors in the early stages of their careers in just over a year amid an increasingly bitter pay dispute with the British government. Junior doctors form the backbone of hospital and clinic care in England, and plans were laid out before this week's walkout for them to return to work if hospitals got overwhelmed.

The British Medical Association, the union that represents the bulk of the 75,000 or so striking doctors, had agreed with NHS managers on a system for so-called derogations, in which junior doctors return to work in the event of safety concerns about emergency care. Hospitals were expected to show they had "exhausted" all other sources of staffing before recalling the newer physicians.

Incidents

On Wednesday, the first day of the strike, hospitals made 20 requests for junior doctors to return to work due to patient safety fears. A number of hospitals declared critical incidents, and others warned of significant waits in emergency rooms. None of the requests were granted.

It's unknown how many more appeals came from hospitals on Thurs-

The BMA said the refusal of hospitals to provide the necessary data "is fundamentally undermining the derogation process." The NHS Confederation, which represents hospitals, said the form-filling took time and could undermine patient safety.

During the strike, senior doctors, known as consultants, are providing some of the care that their juniors usually provide. But there's not enough of them to fill the gap and NHS managers have said that tens of thousands of appointments and operations will be postponed because of the walkout.

The strike is taking place at a time when hospital admissions for flu and CO-VID-19 cases are running at their highest rate this winter, according to figures from the U.K. Health Security Agency.

"This latest round of strike action will not only have an impact on this week but will have an ongoing effect on the weeks and months ahead as we struggle to recover services and cope with heavy demand," NHS England National Medical Director Stephen

Argentina suspends labor rule 'changes'

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Jan 6, (AP): President Javier Milei suffered a judicial blow Wednesday as a court suspended labor rule changes he recently announced as part of sweeping deregulation and austerity measures aimed at reviving Ar-

gentina's struggling economy. The ruling by a three-judge court came on a legal challenge brought by the main union group, the General Labor Confederation, which argued that the changes affected workers rights.

Milei's decree announced in December established several changes in labor rules, including increasing job probation from three to eight months, reducing severance compensation and allowing the possibility of dismissal for workers taking part of blockades during some protests. Alejandro Sudera, one of the three judges, said the administration went beyond its authority to decree labor changes, which first needed to discussed and approved by Congress.

Mile's government said it would appeal the court's ruling.

The union confederation applauded the court, saying the decision "puts a stop to the regressive and anti-worker labor reform.'

Labor activists have questioned whether Milei, a self-described anarcho-capitalist who has long railed against the country's "political caste," can impose the measures using emergency decree bypass the legislature.

On Dec. 20, a few days after taking office as the new president, Milei announced sweeping initiatives to transform Argentina's economy, including easing government regulation and allowing privatization of state-run industries. The libertarian economist made about 300 changes.

Rice and sugar prices surge

ROME, Jan 6, (AP): Global prices for food commodities like grain and vegetable oil fell last year from record highs in 2022, when Russia's war in Ukraine, drought and other factors helped worsen hunger worldwide, the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization said Friday. The FAO Food Price Index,

which tracks monthly changes in the international prices of commonly traded food commodities, was 13.7% lower last year than the 2022 average, but its measures of sugar and rice prices growing in that time.

Last month, the index dropped some 10% compared with December 2022. The drop in food commodity prices in 2023 comes despite a difficult year for food security around the world.

Climate effects like dry weather, flooding and the naturally occurring El Nino phenomenon, combined with fallout from conflicts like the war in Ukraine, bans on food trade that have added to food inflation and weaker currencies have hurt developing nations especially.

While food commodities like grain have fallen from painful surges in 2022, the relief often hasn't made it to the real world of shopkeepers, street vendors and families trying to make

Food insecurity

More than 333 million people faced acute levels of food insecurity in 2023, according to another U.N. agency, the World Food Program.

Rice and sugar in particular were problematic last year because of climate effects in growing regions of Asia, and prices have risen in response, especially in African nations.

With the exception of rice, the FAO's grain index last year was 15.4% below the 2022 average, "reflecting well supplied global markets." That's despite Russia pulling out of a wartime deal that allowed grain to flow from Ukraine to countries in Africa, the Middle East and Asia.

Countries buying wheat have found supply elsewhere, notably from Russia, with prices lower than they were before the war began, analysts say.

The FAO's rice index was up 21% last year because of India's export restrictions on some types of rice and concerns about the impact of El Niño on rice production. That has meant higher prices for lowincome families, including places like Senegal and Kenya.

Similarly, the agency's sugar index last year hit its highest level since 2011, expanding 26.7% from 2022 because of concerns about low supplies. That followed unusually dry weather damaging harvests in India and Thailand, the world's second- and third-largest exporters.

The sugar index improved in the last month of 2023, however, hitting a nine-month low because of strong supply from Brazil, the biggest sugar exporter, and India lowering its use for ethanol production.

Legislators have expressed frustration in recent months with the results of sustained spending increases on public education. Statewide, the share of students who can read at their grade level is 38%. Math proficiency is at 24%. The state's high school graduation rate hovers at 76% - well below

the national average of 87%. Lujan Grisham pledged in a statement to "continue to spend within our means, responsibly and with an eye toward accountability."

Her budget proposal includes a 3% increase in pay for workers at executive agencies and public schools statewide and larger increases of 8% for corrections officers and 14% for state police.



US invented shopping malls, but China writing their next chapter

China malls lead in urban transformation

n a recent research trip to China, I wandered through the Oasis Mall in suburban Shanghai. Like many Chinese shopping centers, this complex was filled with empty stores that reflected the end of China's 30-year-long economic expansion. But there also were

Along a stretch of the mall's interior walkway, a cluster of parents and grandparents sat on chairs. They were looking through a plate glass window, watching a dozen - to 7-year-old girls practice ballet steps, carefully following their teacher's choreography. A space initially designed for retail had

been turned into a dance studio. From 1990 through 2020, large, shiny shopping malls embodied China's spectacular economic

growth. They sprouted in cities large and small to meet consumer demand from an emerging middle class that was keen to express its newfound affluence. These centers look familiar to American eyes, which isn't surprising: U.S. architectural firms built 170 malls

in China during this period. Like their U.S. counterparts, many Chinese malls have fallen on hard times. The COVID-19 pandemic and the rise of online shopping have devastated foot traffic, leaving the nation with a huge overhang of retail space. But many Chinese malls are being re-imagined by owners and users as palaces of experience - civic areas for communities to meet and interact, with new configurations of public and private space.

As a longtime urban policy scholar, I was fascinated by the new uses I saw for malls in China. In my view, these experiments could become models for new. creative uses of retail space in the U.S., where the mall was invented.

China opened up to foreign trade

and investment less than 50 years ago. Since then, it has become the world's second-largest economy, surpassed only by the U.S.

Rising incomes and a massive population shift from rural areas to cities have created a growing middle class with significant purchasing power. GDP per capita increased from US\$293 in 1985 to \$12,500 by 2021

Today, approximately 350 million Chinese - 25% of the total population - can be considered middle class. More recent economic growth has generated growing income inequality that now is equivalent to U.S. levels.

Malls became a motif of modernity during the country's economic expansion. They offered consumers year-round protection from heat, humidity, cold and frost, as well as from busy streets and polluting traffic. Malls were safe environments where the steadily increasing numbers of more affluent Chinese families could shop and eat, stroll and meet.

Over the past 30 years, China's malls have faced economic booms

and slumps. For example, the New South China Mall in Dongguan which is twice the size of Minnesota's Mall of America, its largest U.S. counterpart - opened in 2005. But most of its 2,300 storefronts remained closed for over a decade as China fought off recession after the 2008 world financial crisis.

China weathered that downturn through aggressive economic stimulus policies, and within a decade it replaced the U.S. as the world's top driver of economic growth. This expansion buoyed its retail sector, including shopping centers. By 2018, a renovated and modernized New South China Mall was near full occupancy.

Then COVID-19 struck in 2020. The Chinese government adopted a rigid zero-COVID policy, in which local governments could impose lockdowns after detecting just a few cases. Hundreds of millions of people were restricted to their homes for weeks or months at a stretch.

This policy was lifted only in late 2022. China's economy has yet to fully recover, and many

experts argue that it will never again reach its previous rates of growth. An aging population, trade wars with the U.S. and a government focused on centralizing power under the Communist Party are all acting as drags on the economy, and online shop-ping is drawing consumers away from stores.

As a result, Chinese media reports abound with stories about well-known stores and venerable malls closing. In China, as in the U.S., what scholars once described as the "magic of the mall" has become an "allure of ruins."

But the Chinese are making creative use of excess mall space. New users are filling nonretail areas, such as indoor walkways and atriums that now house café tables. Others have become children's play spaces filled with giant inflatable figures. The Raffles City Mall in Shenzen has a rooftop pet playground, a stage, an art display area and a sun-shaded lawn.

China's informal economy of food stalls and sidewalk merchants is also filling the void. Although street vending has a long history in China, government officials sought to suppress it in recent years, calling it unsanitary and a throwback to pre-modern times. Now, however, they are encouraging it as a way to reduce growing unemployment, especially among young people, which currently exceeds 20%.

During my trip, I saw smallscale entrepreneurs selling produce, street food and crafts in mall parking lots and around public entrances. The distinction between public and private spaces is being reconfigured as vendors set up stalls in areas that once were open

Empty store spaces are also being repurposed. Some have been converted into electric vehicle showrooms, art museums and children's play centers with dance studios, paddling pools, small skating rinks, gyms and yoga centers. Others have been redesigned as sites for art or cooking classes, or for multiplayer electronic gaming and virtual reality experiences. The Dream Time Mall in Wuhan contains an indoor snow center that offers ski lessons, ice mazes and tubing.

I see these experiments as a shift in the meaning of the mall. What began as a cathedral of retail consumerism is becoming a place where people can connect and enjoy individual and collective experiences that aren't available

Some U.S. malls are moving in this direction, but China is doing it on a much larger scale. Just as former Chinese leader Deng Xiaoping once asserted that his government was pursuing its own version of socialism, with "Chinese characteristics," the U.S.-designed mall is being rewritten with Chinese characters. (AP)

On the other hand, 15.6% attend professional networking events, while only 3.7% depend on industryspecific publications.

The poll findings indicate that

career growth opportunities and work-life balance are key factors in employee loyalty in the Middle East. When it comes to factors that make professionals loyal to their

current employers, career growth opportunities (29.8%) and worklife balance (24.4%) are among the top priorities. The job market is witnessing a significant shift as professionals display a growing willingness to relocate for better career prospects. A majority of respondents (62.2%) are willing to relocate anywhere, showing a high level of mobility within the region. Meanwhile, 21.5% are willing to relocate within the Middle East, and 12.2% state that they would only consider relocating for exceptional opportunities.

Jo Koy ready to fulfill childhood dream of hosting Golden Globes

LOS ANGELES, Jan 6, (AP): Jo Koy remembers watching major award ceremonies like the Golden Globes with his mother on their living room sofa trying to guess the winners.

It was a ritual that Koy cherished as a child. Since then, he's grown as a comedian with various stand-up specials and several acting credits including last year's film "Easter Sunday."

On Sunday, Koy will live out his childhood dream of hosting the Globes - which is looking to return to form after being tarnished following years of scandal. He calls his upcoming duties a "very big moment."

"This is a throwback to my childhood, and now I'm the guy who's onstage," said Koy, the second Asian host in Globes history. (Sandra Oh emceed the show in 2019.) He wants to the inspire those from the Asian community in his first major host-

ing gig.
"As a kid and watching TV and not having that many role models to kind of indirectly inspire me, that's what this means to me," said the Filipino American actor, whose "Easter Sunday" film became the first big studio movie with an all-Filipino ensemble. He's released five stand-up specials on Comedy Central and Netflix, including his most recent Netflix special, "Live From The Los Angeles Forum."

"I know there's kids out there that will be watching the

Globes," he said. "And now when they see this, it's like 'Oh, it's possible. I can do this.' Things aren't so gray anymore. It's not just two colors on the palette. Sometime three. Every color is on the palette. This is a beautiful moment. I really want to make sure I knock this out of the park."

Koy hopes to leave a positive mark on the Globes, which are the first major broadcast of awards season. It airs live beginning at 5 p.m. Pacific on CBS and Paramount+ for users with a Showtime subscription.

Celebration

The show is known for being a celebration of television and film with a more party-like atmosphere compared to their Academy Award counterparts.

But the Globes faced tremendous backlash after a 2021 report in the Los Angeles Times found there were zero Black members in the group that only had 87 foreign journalists. The membership has since been revamped with a voting body of 300.

All indications point to a starry show, which will include presenters such as Michelle Yeoh, Will Ferrell, Angela Bassett, America Ferrera and Amanda Seyfried.

Greta Gerwig's "Barbie" leads the Globes nominations with nine including for best picture musical or comedy as well as

acting nominations for Margot Robbie and Ryan Gosling and three of its original songs. It is closely followed by its release date and meme companion "Oppenheimer," which scored eight nominations, including for best picture drama, best director for Christopher Nolan and nods for actors Cillian Murphy, Robert Downey Jr. and Emily Blunt.

Koy gave praise to Dick Clark Productions, the awards' producer, and an owner of the Globes' longtime home, the Beverly

"This production company has been nothing but top notch," he said. "The relationship with CBS is beautiful. It's fun to see this because this is how things should be ran. We need to start moving forward. That's what this is. We're moving forward now. You learn from the past and you make sure it doesn't happen again.

Koy said he's anxious to hit the Globes stage to deliver his brand of relatable humor.

"They're giving me the blessing to be me," he said. "I want to bring my style to the Globes. Of course, I'm going to have fun. But most importantly, I want to make sure everyone's happy. I'm going to make fun of myself. If I can do that, I can make fun of other people."

"I was a little surprised about that because I didn't develop it as a concept. I started writing and then when I read the outline, I learned that 'Memory' had to be the title because it was about both of them," Franco says. "The ways memories can be reshaped or the stories you tell yourself."

The film premiered at the Venice Film Festival and is being distributed by Ketchup Entertainment. Heading into awards season, Chastain has already snagged an Independent Spirit Award nomination for best lead performance.

After signing on, Chastain recommended Franco cast Sarsgaard, whose recent credits include "The Batman" and "The Lost Daughter," a 2022 Oscar-nominated drama directed by his wife, Maggie Gyllenhaal.

"I have spent a long time watching Peter's work and, as an audience member, really being moved by what he's done," Chastain says. "I didn't know Peter would want to do it, but I knew that he was someone that would bring so much to it without vanity. And that was important to me.'

After saying yes to the role, Sarsgaard did extensive research prior to filming, an experience which he found

NEW YORK, Jan 6, (AP): The last bedtime of 17-month-old Hayden Fell's life was heartbreakingly normal. Crib video shows the toddler in pajamas playing happily as his parents and sister sang "Wheels on the Bus" with his twin brother.

The next morning, Hayden's dad couldn't wake him. The tot had become one of several hundred seemingly healthy US toddlers and preschoolers each year who suddenly die in their sleep and autopsies can't tell why. But Hayden's crib cam was recording all night - and offered a clue.

Seizures during sleep are a potential cause of at least some cases of sudden unexplained death in childhood, or SUDC, researchers at NYU Langone Health reported Thursday after analyzing home monitoring video that captured the deaths of seven sleeping toddlers.

Research

Similar to SIDS in babies, SUDC is the term when these mysterious deaths occur any time after a child's first birthday. Little is known about SUDC but some scientists have long suspected seizures may play a role. In addition to some genetics research, scientists also have found that a history of fever-related seizures was about 10 times more likely among the children who died suddenly than among youngsters the same age.

The new study is very small but offers the first direct evidence of a seizure link. Five of the toddlers died shortly after movements deemed to be a brief seizure by a team of forensic pathologists, a seizure specialist and a sleep specialist. A sixth child probably also had one, according to findings published online by the journal Neurology.

"It's hard to watch," said Dr. Orrin Devinsky, an NYU neurologist and the study's senior author. "We have video which is in some ways the best evidence we may ever get of what's happened to these kids.

The recordings can't prove fevers triggered the seizures but researchers noted several toddlers had signs of mild infections. One, Hayden, previously had such febrile seizures when he'd catch childhood bugs.

That raises a big question: Feverrelated seizures are hugely common in young children, affecting 2% to 5% of tots between ages 6 months and 5 years. While scary, they're hardly ever harmful. So how could anyone tell if occasionally, they might be a warning of something more serious?

"I thought he would be fine and it was just a matter of letting this run its course,' said Justin Fell, explaining how multiple doctors told the Bel Air, Maryland, family not to worry whenever Hayden had a fever-sparked seizure. Instead, "it was every parent's nightmare.

Laura Gould, one of the NYU researchers, understands that agonizing frustration. In 1997 she lost her 15-month-old daughter Maria to what later was named SUDC - the toddler woke up one night with a fever, was her usual happy self the next morning but died during a nap. Gould later co-founded the nonprofit SUDC Foundation and helped establish NYU's registry of about 300 deaths - including the first seven videos offered by families - for research.

Gould doesn't want families to be scared by the new findings - they won't change advice about febrile seizures. Instead, researchers next will have to determine if it's possible to tease out differences between those very rare children who die and the masses who are fine after an occasional seizure.

"If we can figure out the children at risk, maybe we can change their outcome," she said.

It's hard for autopsies to find evidence of a seizure so using video from home monitors to reevaluate deaths "is actually very clever," said Dr. Marco Hefti, a neuropathologist at the University of Iowa who wasn't involved with the study but has also investigated SUDC

"It's not that parents need to be stressing out, panicking about every febrile seizure," he cautioned. But Hefti said it's time for additional research, including animal studies and possibly sleep studies in children, to better understand what's going on.

SUDC is estimated to claim over 400 lives a year in the U.S. Most occur during sleep. And just over half, about 250 deaths a year, are in 1- to 4-year-olds.

Sudden death in babies occurs more often and gets more public attention along with more research funding that in turn has uncovered risk factors and prevention advice such as to put infants to sleep on their backs. But SUDC happens to youngsters long past the age of SIDS. The Fells had never even heard of it until Hayden died.

Disorders

Hayden experienced his first seizure shortly before his first birthday, when a cold-like virus sparked a fever. Additional mild bugs triggered several more but Hayden always rapidly bounced back - until the night in November 2022 when he died.

Other recent studies, at NYU and by a team at Boston Children's Hospital, have hunted genetic links to SUDC finding that some children harbored mutations in genes associated with heart or brain disorders, including irregular heartbeats and epilepsy.

Heart problems, including those mutations, couldn't explain the deaths of the toddlers in the video study, Devinsky said. NEW YORK, Jan 6, (AP): Eli Lilly has launched a unique website to connect US patients seeking obesity treatment to doctors, dieticians and its new weight-loss drug, Zepbound. The drugmaker said Thursday it will

use the site, called LillyDirect, to pair visitors with third-party mail-order pharmacies for prescriptions and to care providers through a virtual medical weight-loss clinic.

The site also offers a directory for in-person care and help with insulins and migraine treatments.

Lilly says the doctors connected through the website are independent and not paid to promote its products, and the drugmaker also isn't paid to send referrals to them.

In November, U.S. regulators approved Zepbound, a version of the popular diabetes treatment Mounjaro, to be used as a weight-loss treatment. The drug joins Novo Nordisk's Wegovy in a hot field for care, chronic weight management.

At least 100 million adults are considered obese in the United States.

Indianapolis-based Lilly started its site to eliminate some of the complexity in the US health care system

that people face when they manage a chronic disease, Lilly CEO David Ricks said in a statement. Drugmakers frequently offer cou-

pons for their drugs or other help getting prescriptions, said Caitlin Donovan, a senior director for the non-profit Patient Advocate Foundation, which helps patients deal with serious or chronic health problems.

Pairing that prescription help with access to doctors in one location is unique, she added.

"Anything that's going to streamline any type of process is good because we have the least streamlined healthcare system in the world," Donovan said.

Telemedicine grew popular during the COVID-19 pandemic, and more companies have started offering virtual help directly to consumers for specific conditions, often through subscription plans. This trend has drawn concern from some doctors who see it simply as a push to sell more drugs.

US flu and COVID infections got worse over the holidays

NEW YORK, Jan 6, (AP): The flu season in the US is getting worse but it's too soon to tell how much holiday gatherings contributed to a likely spike in illnesses.

New government data posted Friday for last week - the holiday week between Christmas and New Year's show 38 states with high or very high levels for respiratory illnesses with fever, cough and other symptoms. That's up from 31 states the week before.

other winter viruses, and not just flu. But flu seems to be increasing most dramatically, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"We expect it to be elevated for several more weeks," said the CDC's Alicia Budd. So far, though, this is a moderate flu season, she said.

Interpreting flu reports during and after the holidays can be tricky, she noted. Schools are closed. More people are traveling. Some people may be less likely to go see a doctor, deciding to just suffer at home. Others may be more likely to go.

The flu season generally peaks between December and February; CDC Director Dr. Mandy Cohen said she expects it to peak by the end of this month. Officials say this season's flu shots are well-matched to the strain that is spreading the most.

According to CDC estimates, since the beginning of October, there have been at least 10 million illnesses, 110,000 hospitalizations, and 6,500 deaths from flu so far this season. The agency said 27 children have died of flu.

COVID-19 illnesses may not be as escalating as quickly as flu this winter. CDC data indicates coronaviruscaused hospitalizations haven't hit the same levels they did at the same point during the last three winters. Still, COVID-19 is putting more people in the hospital than flu, CDC

data shows.

Lauren Ancel Meyers of the University of Texas, said the nation is seeing a second rise in COVID-19 after a smaller peak in September.

"There is a lot of uncertainty about when and how high this current surge will peak," said Meyers, who runs a team that forecasts CO-VID-19, flu and RSV trends

A new version of the coronavirus, called JN.1, is accounting for nearly two-thirds of U.S. cases, according to a CDC estimate. But health officials say there's no evidence that that it causes more severe disease than other recent variants.

"I think one of the best parts of our team is everyone who steps onto the floor is a threat both offensively and defensively. It would be the Trojans last basket though. Oregon State got within a basket on a 3-point play by Rees with 1:34 remaining. It had a chance to send it into overtime, but Raegan Beers had a layup blocked by Rayah Marshall with one

tick on the clock to preserve the win.

"I wouldn't consider myself like an all offensive player. When it comes down to it, I'm able to make plays and basically do whatever I need to do," Watkins said. "What was good about tonight is that it was a gritty win."





Frattesi's stoppage-time winner proves decisive

ROME, Jan 6, (AP): It's only the season's midpoint and Inter Milan may already have its lasting image of what is looking more and more like a Serie A title run.

The moment came when Davide Frattesi leaped on top of a yellow fence lining the field and erupted in celebration toward the San Siro crowd as his teammates mobbed him so wildly that they pulled down his shorts.

Frattesi's stoppage-time winner proved decisive in a frenetic finish, Lautaro Martinez marked his return from injury with his league-leading 16th goal of the season, and Inter beat relegation-threatened Hellas Verona 2-1 on Saturday to secure the midseason lead in Serie A.

"I would have done much worse but I didn't want to get another yellow card for celebrating," said Frattesi, who came on 10 minutes before he scored.

The game wasn't won, though, until a penalty kick 10 minutes into added time from Verona striker Thomas Henry hit the post.

Then it was back to celebrating as Inter moved five points clear of Juventus, which visits last-place Salernitana on Sunday.

Inter had drawn its previous match and was eliminated from the Italian Cup by Bologna in late December. The

dramatic victory put Simone Inzaghi's team back on track for its title pursuit and the chance to stitch a second star onto its shirt to signify what would be a 20th Italian championship.

"The tough games to win are the dirty ones - but they're also the ones that enable you to go all the way," Frattesi said.

The match started as expected, with Lautaro finishing off a swift vertical

Grenier takes rain-marred GS

Odermatt dominates to win WC giant slalom in the fog at home

ADELBODEN, Switzerland, Jan 6, (AP): Swiss ski star Marco Odermatt is unstoppable in giant slaloms and proved it again Saturday racing through fog at his home World Cup

Odermatt dominated in a wire-towire win at Adelboden to join skiing greats Ingemar Stenmark and Hermann Maier by winning in three straight years on the storied Chuenis-bärgli course that is a rolling cow pasture in summer.

He celebrated with a body-surfing leap onto the finish-area safety barrier, sliding across the padded fence on his

Odermatt added to his huge 1.04-second lead from the first run to finish 1.26 ahead of Aleksander Aamodt Kilde. Filip Zubcic was third, trailing Odermatt by 1.77.

Kilde already was assured of a career-best result in giant slalom as he smiled and laughed in the finish area watching Odermatt's peerless run and exuberant celebration.

Odermatt sealed victory in worsening visibility yet his second-run time was beaten only by River Radamus of the United States who finished fourth after placing 20th in the first run.

"It was amazing," Odermatt said. "It was obviously not an easy nice race

Fog sitting across the top of the Chuenisbärgli hill forced organizers to shorten a course that typically takes about 1 minute, 20 seconds to a 58-second run.

A 29th career win in World Cup races for the 26-year-old Odermatt was an 18th in his preferred giant slalom discipline - including seven in a row since March - where he is the current Olympic, world, and World Cup champion.

Odermatt extended his lead in the overall World Cup standings as the strong favorite for a third straight season-long title. The 2020 overall champion Kilde is his nearest, and distant, active challenger after Marco Schwarz suffered a season-ending knee injury in downhill last month while leading the standings.

The Adelboden giant slalom has been a World Cup fixture since the first week of men's racing in January 1967.

In those 67 years, only Stenmark and Maier won Switzerland's sig-

nature giant slalom in at least three straight years. Stenmark won four in a row through 1982 and Maier won all three that could be raced between 1998 and 2001. Odermatt's 18 World Cup giant sla-

lom wins is tied for fifth all time, with Stenmark far ahead on 46. Ted Ligety of the United States is third on the career list with 24 wins. Canadian skier Valerie Grenier won her second career World Cup giant

slalom Saturday, a year after she triumphed at the same Slovenian resort. In the rain-marred race, Mikaela

Shiffrin finished in ninth position, nine days after the American won the previous GS in Austria. Saturday's result was the Ameri-

can's worst in 15 giant slaloms since

finishing 13th in Killington, Vermont, in November 2022. Looming in fourth, Grenier posted the best time in the second run and saw the three fastest racers from the open-

ing leg all fail to beat her. "I feel like I have no words. I am just so happy, so proud. It's crazy,"

Grenier said Grenier also won the race last year, when she became the first Canadian to

win a women's World Cup giant slalom in 49 years. She ended the season with a GS podium at the World Cup finals in Soldeu, Andorra. Grenier, who was the junior world

Sabalenka sets up a Brisbane final vs Rybakina

BRISBANE, Australia, Jan 6 (AP): Almost a year after contesting the Australian Open final, Aryna Sabalenka and Elena Rybakina will meet in the title match of a key tune-up event for the first major of 2024.

Top-seeded Sabalenka overpowered her compatriot and two-time champion Victoria Azarenka in a 6-2, 6-4 win Saturday that earned her a spot in the Brisbane International final against Rybakina, the 2022 Wimbledon winner. The win extended top-seeded Sa-

balenka's streak to 15 on Australian

soil, including a title run in Adelaide last year before her Grand Slam breakthrough at Melbourne Park. That 4-6, 6-3, 6-4 victory in the Australian Open final last January was the

highlight of Sabalenka's five wins over Rybakina in their seven career meetings. The Australian swing last year set Sabalenka on course for a career-best season, reaching the semifinals or better at all four majors, gaining the No. 1

ranking and finishing the year at No. 2 Sabalenka fired 10 aces and hit 35 winners against Azarenka, who won back-to-back Australian Open titles in 2012 and '13 and is also a two-time champion in Brisbane.

She broke her 34-year-old former Fed Cup teammate's serve three times and saved all three break points she faced.


Azarenka appeared to hurt her right knee late in the match, but later said it wasn't a major concern

Sunday's final will be the first to feature the top two seeds in Brisbane since 2015, when No. 1 Maria Sharapova held off No. 2 Ana Ivanovic in three sets.

Rybakina had 26 winners, eight aces and committed just 10 unforced errors as she advanced 6-3, 6-2 over 19-yearold Linda Noskova. She has conceded just 12 games

across four straight-set wins and said she felt like she was gaining momentum ahead of the Australian Open, which starts Jan. 14.

The men's final also will feature the top two seeds.

Since opening with a tough win over Andy Murray, Dimitrov hasn't dropped a set en route to his third final in Brisbane.

He rallied from 0-40 down in the seventh game of the second set, saving four break points, to hold his own serve and then broke Thompson's serve in the 11th game to set up the victory.

Thompson was coming off the biggest upset of the tournament. He saved three match points and rallied to beat 22-time major winner Rafael Nadal in an almost 3 1/2-hour quarterfinal on

Friday night. Coco Gauff will defend her title at the Auckland Classic against Elina Svitolina after beating fellow American Emma Navarro 6-3, 6-1 in a semifinal.

Gauff needed only 62 minutes to sweep past fourth-seeded Navarro and now has won 18 straight sets and nine consecutive matches over two years in Auckland. She has lost only 15 games in four matches so far this year.

Gauff's win in Auckland last year was the start of a golden run which culminated when she won her first maior title at the U.S. Open. She seems in similar, compelling form this year, dominating matches with her serve and powerful ground shots

She set down 10 aces in 12 games in beating Navarro.

Gauff broke Navarro in the opening game of the second set and went on to win the set in 32 minutes in a controlled and dominating performance. Her deep ground shots allowed her to follow to the net where she dominated and used her

powerful forehand with accuracy. Gauff's opponent in Sunday's final will be second-seeded Svitolina, who needed two medical timeouts on her way to a 2-6, 6-4, 6-3 win over Wang Xiyu of China.

Svitolina dropped her serve in the third game of the first set and again, to love, in the fifth game to trail 4-1.

She received courtside treatment for a lower back injury then left the court for a medical timeout. When she returned, she immediately broke Wang's serve but lost her own and lost the set 6-2. Svitolina took the second set with

'One of the biggest legends of the sport'

Former Kuwait and Brazil coach Mario Zagallo dies at age 92

RIO DE JANEIRO, Jan 6, (Agencies): Mario Zagallo, who won two World Cups as a player, one as a coach and another as an assistant coach for Brazil, has died. He was 92.

The first person to win the World Cup both as a player and a manager, Zagallo is for many Brazilian soccer fans synonymous with patriotism, grit and glory. Zagallo's coaching career extended beyond Brazil's national team, as he also took charge of other national squads, including Kuwait during the 1976-1977 season.

The only person to ever win four World Cup titles was also the last living member of Brazil's starting team in its first championship victory in the tournament in 1958.

Zagallo died late Friday night of multiple-organ failure as a consequence of multiple comorbidities, Hospital Barra D'Or in Rio de Janeiro said in a statement. Local media reported he was hospitalized after Christmas.

Brazilian soccer confederation president Ednaldo Rodrigues said in a statement in the early hours of Saturday confirming Zagallo's death that Zagallo "is one of the biggest legends" of the sport. The funeral will take place Sunday at the confederation's headquarters.

"We offer solidarity to his family members and fans in this moment of grief for the departure of this great hero of our soccer," Rodrigues said. Several Brazilian clubs where Zagallo played and coached also expressed their sorrow for his death.

Zagallo's social media channels called him "a dedicated father, a loving grandfather, a caring father-in-law, a loyal friend, a victorious professional and a great human being.

"A gigantic hero. A patriot that leaves us a legacy of great achievements," the text added, without giving more details about Zagallo's death.

One of the most charismatic and superstitious figures in Brazilian football, he also was known for his fondness of the No. 13 and constant use of the phrase "You will have to put up with me" - voiced loudly at critics.

He said 13 was his lucky number because it carries the last two digits of his birth year: 1931. He always highlighted any link, however coincidental, between 13 and his football successes.

Zagallo played a role in nearly every major chapter in Brazilian football history, from its first World Cup title in 1958 to the tournament it hosted in 2014. For-

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 6: The Football Association has officially announced the commencement dates for the qualifying rounds of His Highness the Amir's Soccer Cup for the 2023-2024 sports season. The preliminary round is scheduled to kick off on January 26, featuring matches between Al-Arabi and Al-Sulaibkhat, as well as Al-Nasr against Al-Sahel.

The same round will conclude on January 27 with fixtures including Al-Fahaheel versus Al-Shabab and Al-Qadisiya against Yarmouk. Additionally, Al-Salmiya will face Khaitan, and Kazma will take on Burgan on January 28. The pre-

Zagallo stopped playing professionally in 1965 and began his coaching career with Rio de Janeiro club Botafogo the following year.

Named national team coach in 1970. just before the World Cup in Mexico, he inherited a squad that included Pelé, Jairzinho, Gerson, Roberto Rivellino and Tostão. Brazil crushed Italy 4-1 in the final, becoming the first three-time champion.

He also coached Brazil in 1974, but without Pelé, the team finished in fourth place.

Zagallo was assistant coach to Carlos Alberto Parreira when Brazil won

meet in the final on February 26. the 1994 World Cup in the United States, again beating Italy in the final. Parreira many times said he felt as if

the team had two coaches, such was

Zagallo's influence in his squad.

And he was back at the helm four years later for the World Cup in France, when Brazil lost 3-0 to the hosts in a final marked by striker Ronaldo's unexplained convulsions before the game. Zagallo was criticized for letting Ronaldo play.

LONDON, Jan 6, (AP): Newcastle avoided an FA Cup upset by beating local rival Sunderland 3-0 in the third round of the iconic knockout competition on Saturday.

game having won just once in its past eight games - a slide that included being eliminated from the Champions League and League Cup. A derby against second-division Sunderland had been seen as a difficult encounter, but the visitors comfortably advanced to the fourth round.

Howe will hope victory provides a platform to turn the season around with the team 11 points adrift of the top four and Champions League qualification.

In front an intimidating Sunderland crowd, Newcastle was given an early advantage through Ballard's own goal in the 35th minute.

Isak doubled the lead in the 46th finishing from inside the box after Miguel Almiron's assist - and completed the scoring with a penalty in the 90th.

It was the first derby between the teams since 2016 and the first time Newcastle has beaten Sunderland since 2011.

Spurs won with a late goal from Pedro Porro, while Fulham overcame Rotherham 1-0 with a first-half strike from Bobby De Cordova-Reid. In London, Wolves played almost the entire match with 10 men but came from behind to earn a replay against Brentford.

Spurs hasn't won the FA Cup since 1991 and it made heavy work of a home tie against a side second to last in the league. Although Ange Postecoglou's team was on top throughout, Burnley defended stoutly and it wasn't until the 78th minute that Porro got the breakthrough.

His shot from 25 meters out was a worthy match winner and one of several spectacular strikes among the three games.

Only five league places separate Wolves and Brentford so, on paper, their fixture was one of the most evenly matched.

Brentford gained the momentum after just nine minutes when João Gomes was sent off for a bad foul. It took the lead shortly before halftime when Neal Maupay controlled a loose ball in the penalty box and fired home.

Although Brentford dominated in terms of possession and shots on goal, Wolves never looked beaten and it drew level 19 minutes into the second period when Tommy Doyle's screamer gave Brentford goalkeeper Thomas Strakosha no chance.

Fulham dispatched struggling Rotherham more easily than the one goal suggested.
