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Diversification key

'Kuwait must expedite its economic reforms'

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: Jihad Azour, the Director of the Middle East and Central Asia Department at the International Monetary Fund's Center, emphasized the urgency for Kuwait to expedite its economic reforms and diversify sources of income by expanding various economic sectors.

This strategic move, he said during a recent conference at the International Monetary Fund's Center for Economics and Finance in Kuwait, would not only enhance the business environment but also increase Kuwait's attractiveness to foreign investments.

Azour stressed the importance of opening new horizons and developing sectors related to renewable energy, the environment, and other avenues to achieve economic success

Furthermore, he underscored the need for Kuwait to enhance its social system, aligning it with crucial challenges in education, health, and housing. Given Kuwait's advanced economic status and efficiency, strengthening its regional role becomes imperative, leveraging ongoing transformations.

Acknowledging the positive impact of the OPEC+ agreement and rising oil prices in 2023 on Kuwait's economy, Azour highlighted the government's efforts to bolster financial reserves and improve the public financial situation. However, he emphasized the necessity for Kuwait to quicken its reform pace, sustaining growth, creating new jobs, and increasing non-oil sector income while reducing reliance on the oil sector.

Azour, expects the performance of the Kuwaiti economy, both oil and non-oil, to improve in 2024, stressing that the country was able during the past year to raise the level of its financial reserves by supporting the stability of oil prices, after three years of decline.

Reserves

Azour said the Kuwaiti investors are among the best in the region and the world, and they must be utilized to enhance Kuwait's role as a regional center for finance and business, calling at the same time for granting small, medium and emerging companies a greater role in the economy by enhancing their ability to obtain financing, and giving young entrepreneurs an opportunity to lead the transformation process by encouraging them to engage in work in the private sector.

He confirmed that the high levels of cash reserves provide Kuwait with a high degree of financial stability, he pointed out the importance of working on a comprehensive management of assets and debts that allows for reconciliation between financial capabilities and the possibility of borrowing, especially since the solvency and financial strength of the State of Kuwait allows work on both axes together.

He stated that carrying out tax reform is required within the strategy of diversifying sources of income and ensuring the sustainability of public finances is one of the elements of economic stability.

Azour described the Kuwaiti banking sector as "developed and ancient," as it enjoys a high level of solvency, liquidity, and the ability to stabilize in the face of global fluctuations and shocks, and this is what appeared to be the case clearly in 2023 with the rise in interest rates and the turmoil witnessed by some American banks.

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior Sheikh Talal Al-Khaled Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah has asked Foreign Affairs Minister Sheikh Salem Al-Abdullah to support and facilitate the procedures of Al-Durra Company for Domestic Workers in labor-exporting countries, reports Al-Seyassah daily.



were formed, meetings were held, and advance plans were prepared to support the smooth conduct of examinations. KUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: Regional representative of the United Nations Office on **Drugs and Crime in the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries Judge Dr Hatem** Ali confirmed that Kuwait is keen on confronting human trafficking crimes, reports Al-Anba daily.

Ali stressed in an interview with the daily that Kuwait and other GCC countries are being targeted by organized criminal gangs due to their economic prosperity and political stability.

He pointed out that Kuwait signed the agreement, issued a law in 2013 to combat human trafficking crimes and established a national committee to coordinate with the relevant authorities to combat the crime and a system for caring for victims, which is the shelter and a specialized administration in the Ministry of Interior and Public Prosecution, where the Capital Prosecution was tasked to investigate crimes of human trafficking and smuggling immigrants.

He explained the unrest that the world is currently witnessing, particularly in Ukraine, Gaza, Sudan and other African countries, contributes to the growth of organized crime and the falling of people into the clutches of these crimes like trafficking in drugs, weapons or human beings. He pointed out that organized gangs are desperate to make illegal profits from countries by using technology or elec-

tronic attacks on Gulf countries, including Kuwait. On Kuwait's efforts in the field of combating human trafficking, he affirmed: We reviewed it with all credibility and honesty. According to our objective standards as a general secretariat, Kuwait first joined and ratified the convention, began implementing it, issued a law in 2013 to combat human trafficking crimes, and then established a national coordination committee to fight against these crimes."

He went on to say that the Public Prosecution of Kuwait has allocated a specialized prosecution -- the Capital Prosecution -- to deal with human trafficking cases, while a national referral system has been established for the cooperation of first responders to identify and deal with cases suspected of human trafficking by referring them judicially or by providing the necessary care and protection and dealing with labor violations if they constitute a human traf-

Crackdown on illegals intensified nationwide

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: The recent inspection campaigns of the Residency Affairs Investigation General Department in the Interior Ministry resulted in the arrest of 290 individuals who violated the Residency and Labor laws, reports Al-Anba daily.

These campaigns are being carried out through the coordinated efforts of the Research and Investigation Department, Control and Coordination Department, Violators Follow-Up Department, Financial and Administrative Services Department and the Tripartite Committee.

A total of 290 individuals of various nationalities were arrested in Fahaheel, Mahboula, Farwaniya, Al-Rai and Hawally for violating the abovementioned laws.

Meanwhile, the security campaign conducted by Kuwait Municipality, Public Authority for Industry, Environment Public Authority and the Environmental Police targeting workshops in Shuwaikh Industrial Area led to the arrest of 28 individuals who violated the Residency Law.

All those arrested were referred to the concerned authorities.

'Make Kuwait clean': The Kuwait Municipality said the Public Cleanliness and Road Works Department continues its campaigns in various parts of the country to raise the level of cleanliness, reports Al-Rai daily.

The daily quoting Municipality sources said, yesterday, the team was acting in the Jahra Governorate, as part of its field campaign to raise the level of cleanliness in all governorates of the country.

In a press statement on the sidelines of the campaign, the Public Cleanliness Supervisor at the Jahra Governorate Municipality Branch, Daham Al-Enezi explained the campaign kicked off in Kabd during which rubble was removed and also abandoned and debris and all that obstructs the road and disKUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: Winter is no longer as cold as in previous years due to the rising global temperatures, which could lead to environmental and health problems, reports Al-Qabas daily.

A recent report published by New York Times quoted scientists as saying that the Earth is "burning" due to the unusually high temperatures throughout the world for a long time. It affirmed that the world is getting hotter and 2023 was the warmest in 150 years. The report confirmed that global tem-

peratures have exceeded record numbers since the middle of 2023 and did not stop until the end of the year. It added that June used to be the warmest month on the planet, then July became the warmest and so on until December. It indicated that temperatures are rising month after month. According to the European Union cli-

mate monitor, the temperature around the world over the past year was 1.48 degrees Celsius or 2.66 Fahrenheit warmer than in the second half of the 19th century, and those numbers are warmer by a large margin than in 2016 and the previous year was

The report stated: It is not surprising for climate scientists that unlimited emissions of greenhouse gases will lead to global warming, rising to unprecedented levels. Researchers are trying to understand if the year 2023 portends many more years in which this will not happen. In a press statement, Director of the

European Union's Copernicus Climate Change Service Carlo Buontempo explained that "the extreme events we have observed over the past few months provide dramatic testimony to how far we are now from the climate in which our civilization evolved.

Locally, experts confirmed to the daily that Kuwait is not isolated from this report. They stressed the need for the concerned State authorities to take urgent measures to keep pace with climate change, protect the environment and implement environmental projects that will mitigate the severity of the escalating temperature increase.

They cited the increasing levels of pollution as one of the causes of high temperatures, pointing out that greening is an urgent need to reduce the severity of high temperatures and dust storms.

They added the problem of rising temperatures and the resulting environmental and health repercussions are not individual, and that no country can confront climate change in isolation from international cooperation, especially with neighboring countries. They stated that Kuwait

needs advanced urban planning, which takes into account climate change and the sharp rise in temperatures.

They mentioned a number of reasons behind the increase in the emission of greenhouse gases in Kuwait, including the steady increase in the number of vehicles that drive in a limited urban area and cause exhaust emissions, in addition to the use of air conditioning devices to a much greater extent than global rates.

Meteorologist Issa Ramadan underscored the need to take measures to confront the phenomenon of global warming, indicating that many research and scientific institutions have started to prove that temperatures are significantly higher than they were in past eras.

"Many countries recorded an unprecedented rise in temperatures during the past year, and climate change has become a reality and a fact that cannot be denied.

Therefore, we must lay down plan, strategies and a road map to solve the problem of current and expected high temperatures, which will increase in the coming years. One of the important solutions in Kuwait is to start reducing gas emissions from car exhausts and move towards the use of electric cars, as well as the implementation of transportation projects like mass transportation in the form of electric trains and buses, uses clean fuel or electricity to mitigate these emissions," he added.

Former Director General of the Environment Public Authority (EPA) and Kuwait University Professor Dr Salah Al-

Mudhahi warned the study indicating rising temperatures is not the first and will not be the last. He said the 2015 Paris Agreement that signed, countries aims to commit to working to ensure that the rise in temperatures by the year



Dr. Al-Moudhi

2050 does not exceed more than 1.5 to two degrees, asserting this number is also high.

He explained that rising temperatures will lead to the disappearance of some islands or even island countries, as it raises ocean levels, especially the open oceans, and rising temperatures also melt ice and this phenomenon has already started.

As for Kuwait, Al-Mudhahi believes this would not have a significant impact on the country, considering its location within the Gulf and the presence of a strait.

Rulings enforcement eyed

SMEs owners petition PAHW

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: Continuing the plight faced by small and medium-sized enterprises referred to as "subcontractors," recent developments have seen several companies petitioning the "Public Authority for Housing Welfare" for assistance in enforcing judicial rulings involving 25 companies and private contractors, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

These entities have secured judgments totaling 2 million dinars in collective dues against a first-class company, recognized by the Central Tenders Committee, which has previously served as the main contractor for numerous projects with the Author-

According to sources, these companies have approached the PAHW, which typically withholds a portion of the main contractor's dues (as per the tender con-

tract), seeking support in recovering the subcontractors' outstanding payments related to the "labor housing" project in the Al-Shaddadiya area.

This request arises due to the main contractor's prolonged delay in settling these dues to the subcontractors, despite the project being completed over four years ago, and the main contractor having received full payment.

The sources emphasized that some contractors obtained judicial rulings as far back as April 2019, spanning more than four years. Yet, they face challenges in executing these rulings due to the main contractor's avoidance of payment, relocation of its headquarters, and disavowal by employees of the Judicial Judgments Implementation Department.

Man electrocuted at Mutla'a project

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: An expatriate was electrocuted while working on a housing project in Mutla'a, reports Al-Anba daily

The daily added, the victim born in 1974, was taken to the Jahra Hospital but was declared dead upon arrival.

It is not known if the victim was a professional electrician.

Coke in pens: Air Customs officers thwarted an attempt to smuggle cocaine hidden inside pens coming from a European country, reports Al-Anba daily.

A security said the seized items have been referred to the General Department of Narcotics Control for inventory and to identify the person to whom the cocaine was shipped.

'Wanted by law' **Drug addict held in Wafra**

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: Personnel from the General Traffic Department, Ahmadi branch, have arrested an unidentified Kuwaiti for possessing a "cocktail" of nar-

cotic substances. The suspect was taken into custody from Wafra. The man was seen driving against the flow of traffic and as soon as he saw the police vehicle, he tried in vain to escape. While issuing a citation the police officer discov-

ered the man was behaving abnormal and could hardly

speak clearly. After his name was cross checked with the police authorities, it was discovered he was wanted by law to serve one year imprisonment for drug abuse. He was also

wanted by law in three criminal cases, thefts and drugs. During a precautionary search of his vehicle, police found 151 narcotic pills and two small bags, one contained Shabu and the other contained 'chemicals' and KUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: In an ongoing effort to enforce municipal laws, the Ministry of Interior, in collaboration with the Public Authority for Industry and Manpower, the Public Authority for the Environment, and the Environmental Police, conducted a comprehensive campaign in various sections of the Shuwaikh Industrial Area. This operation, which involved 180 personnel from the participating entities, targeted garages and shops suspected of violating regulations, reports Al-Rai Arabic daily.

The campaign yielded several violations and warnings, encompassing issues related to hygiene compliance and failure to meet environmental requirements. Additionally, 28 individuals violating residency laws were apprehended and turned over to the relevant au-

The inspection included the suspension of 24 offices in line with the recent decision on domestic labor prices. This decisive action underscores the authorities' commitment to maintaining order and adherence to regulations.

Sanitation Supervisor Salah Al-Farhan, commenting on the joint efforts, stated, "Our focus during these campaigns was on the shops and garages along Mohammad bin Al-Qasim Street. The aim was to monitor any violations related to their operations, including infringements against garage owners breaching municipal laws, such as violations related to cleanliness and road occupancy."

Al-Farhan emphasized that these campaigns are part of their daily routine, ensuring that shops and garages, particularly in industrial zones, comply with municipal laws. Numerous violations were documented against shop owners who failed to adhere to municipal requirements and laws.

Director of the Inspection and Control Department at the Environment Public Authority, Nada Al-Dabash, highlighted the authority's participation in the campaign to monitor environmental violations. She explained that the team identified various violations, including the unauthorized use of outdoor spaces and non-compliance with environmental and engineering requirements in facilities.

Al-Dabash outlined the penalties for violations, stating that violating Article 18 of the Environmental Law could result in fines ranging from 5,000 to 50,000 dinars. Additionally, violations falling under Article 53 carry a penalty of up to 30,000 dinars. The severity of the penalty is determined based on the nature of the violation.

She urged everyone to adhere to environmental laws and familiarize themselves with regulations provided by the Environment Public Authority on its official websites to prevent violations.

The campaign also saw the removal of neglected heavy equipment from outdoor yards, emphasizing the authorities' commitment to upholding laws and regulations governing

Sabah Al-Ahmad sewage crisis overcome: minister

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: Minister of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy and the Acting Minister of Public Works, Dr. Jassim Al-Ostad said the ministry has put an end to the sewage crisis in the Sabah Al-Ahmad with a new pumping station operating from Wednesday on an experimental basis to facilitate and alleviate the suffering of citizens living in that area, reports Al-Rai daily.

He pointed out that after operating the station, the environmental impact resulting from the sewage crisis in the Sabah Al-Ahmad region will be studied, and a fact-finding committee will be formed to assess the environmental damage and the shortcomings of the state's infrastructure, in addition to a comprehensive study of the health status of sewage and treated water to ensure the creation of a healthy environment compatible with international health standards.

He stressed the importance of structural change in the sanitary engineering sector in the Ministry, which lacks the required capabilities at the present time, which resulted in the crisis, indicating that the reasons for the delay in the sewage station for the city of South Al-Mutla'a are currently being determined in order to avoid a repetition of the Sabah Al-Ahmad

Al-Ostad confirmed that the Umm Al-Haiman sewage station expansion project is one of the most important projects in the country's development plan and one of the pioneering projects in treating and utilizing wastewater.

In a statement to Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) during an inspection tour that included the expansion project and the project's "sewage pumping station" in the Sabah Al-Ahmad region he said the project serves the areas of Al-Ahmadi and Mubarak Al-Kabeer governorates, which cost the state about 1.5 billion dinars, and has an estimated capacity at 500,000

He added that the importance of the station lies in benefiting from treated water for use in farms, cosmetic agriculture as well as the Kuwait Oil Company's needs for this water in harmony with the environment, as well as benefiting from the methane gas resulting from the treatment plants to generate energy for the station.

He explained that the project was built in cooperation with the PPP Authority, a German company, and a Kuwaiti company specialized in this field, noting that in the future the way will be opened for citizens to subscribe publicly to the station.

He stated that the state owns 60 percent of the company's shares -- 50 percent for citizens and 10 percent for the government, represented by the Kuwait Investment Authority, while Umm Al-Hayman Water Treatment Company owns 40 per-

"However, this decision triggered dissatisfaction among some parents who were relying on electronic platforms for various services. These platforms, seemingly created by a Kuwaiti teacher heading the art education department in a ministry school, offered valuable features.

"Discontented parents argue that these electronic platforms signifi-cantly improved communication and collaboration between parents and schools, positively impacting student performance. The platform allowed parents real-time access to recommendations, observations, and updated data concerning their children's behavior and academic progress, along with general educational information like exam dates and school

"While the Undersecretary's commitment to protecting student and teacher data is commendable, there is a notable but intriguing aspect to the letter. On one hand, it encourages schools to reach out to the Ministry's Information Systems Department to identify electronic services not currently available on the approved plat-

"However, some questioned why the Ministry did not seek guidance from the banned platform or involve the expertise of the Kuwaiti teachers responsible for its development in enhancing the Ministry's official


"Critics also pointed out the absence of an executive timetable for the development of the Ministry's electronic platform in the letter.

"Therefore, a call is made for the Undersecretary to provide school administrations and parents with an esti-mated timetable for the development of the Ministry's electronic platform. Additionally, a suggestion is made to temporarily lift the ban on the banned electronic platform during the transitional period, with management transferred to the Ministry's Information Systems Department, respecting the intellectual property rights of the platform's owner.

"In conjunction with these proposals, there is a call for the Ministry to issue and update documents on protecting students' privacy and data, outlining policies, defining types of shared information, and specifying authorized individuals. Furthermore, a plea is made for the Ministry to issue and update an "Information Security" document to safeguard stored and circulated data from sabotage, malicious attacks, and unauthorized

"As the Kuwaiti teacher behind the banned platform is unknown personally, there is no moral hesitation in urging the Ministry to acknowledge and honor this teacher for their effective initiative. Additionally, a call is made for the Ministry to launch a program, in collaboration with relevant bodies, to sponsor outstanding educational initiatives by teachers.

Labor union elated over non-tampering of private oil sector law

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Private Oil Sector Labor Union Saud Al-Enezi revealed to Al-Sevassah the scenario prior to the adoption of the private oil

He explained that the law consists of 17 articles. There was an intention by some parties to cancel and amend seven articles related to fundamental gains for the benefit of national cadres working in the private oil sector, numbering a total of 14,000 Kuwaitis as per the latest census.

With the insistence, efforts and co-

operation of the members of the Human Resources Committee in the National Assembly and the Private Oil Sector Labor Union, the opportunity was missed for tampering with any

Accordingly, all 17 articles were approved and all the profits of private oil sector workers were preserved without

change until this insistence bore fruit on approving the adoption of the private oil sector law by the relevant parliamentary committee and referring it to a vote.

Al-Enezi said he hopes it will be voted on by the National Assembly as soon as possible.

He stressed that the adoption of such

laws is a positive step that benefits Kuwaiti youth working in the private sector, particularly those working in the private oil sector.

Al-Enezi expressed his surprise that the private oil companies that implement projects for government oil companies have not met the requirement of 30-percent Kuwaitiza-

He expressed gratitude to the representatives of the Human Resources Committee in the National Assembly -Faris Al-Otaibi, Bader Nashmi, Jarrah Al-Fawzan, and Abdullah Al-Anbai - as well as the representatives of the Kuwait Petroleum Corporation and the Ministry of Oil.

'Decrease seen in 2023 appointment rate in MEW'

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: Informed sources revealed a decrease in the rate of appointments in the Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy in the year 2023 compared to those scheduled to be appointed by about 1,612 employees, which is 63 percent compared to the year 2022.

They explained that the number of employees appointed in 2023 reached 2,729, compared to 4,341 employees in the year

The total number of employees in the ministry was 34,511 in the past year, including 33,640 Kuwaitis, which is 97.5 percent, while the number of non-Kuwaitis was 871.

The sources attributed the decline

in the number of appointees in the ministry to the lack of job vacancies and the large numbers that were appointed in the last three years, which reached approximately 13,000.

Meanwhile, the ministry intends to register 159,000 items (cables, bulbs, water pipes, meters and other materials in its stores on the Oracle inventory management system in the government finance department. The total financial value of these materials amounts to KD 58.558 million.

Audit

The sources explained that the data for these materials will be recorded on the aforementioned system through a detailed audit of each item separately, in accordance with the provisions of control over the mechanism for disbursing and following up these materials, as they are public funds that must be preserved and in implementation of article 1 of the general provisions of circular No. 10/2016.

The registration of these materials in the ministry's warehouses was supposed to be registered in 2016 in all the ministry's warehouses, but the slow documentary cycle and correspondence between the ministry and the Ministry of Finance and the large number of these materials prevented the implementation of this registration procedure.

The implementation of this procedure will remove an important observation from the State Audit Bureau's observations that are taken to the ministry annually and recorded in the annual performance evaluation report, especially since the current status of these materials means that there is a mismatch between all the materials present in the ministry's stores and their number in the annual inventory committee report, which prevents tight control over them.

In another development, Kuwait Ports Authority (KPA) has confirmed the issuance of final court rulings obligating companies to pay compensation amounting to more than KD22 million and to put the violating companies on the blacklist; such that they will no longer be allowed to register to operate at Shuwaikh Port and Shuaiba Port, reports Al-Anba daily.

In a press statement, the authority revealed this is the result of its serious follow-up on the necessity of confronting all forms of infringement on public funds and preventing the illegal practices of any company, with emphasis on the provision of an attractive environment for investment and improving maritime logis-

tic services in the country. It also stressed the importance of taking the necessary legal measures to ensure that the State's capabilities are not violated, removing the violating parties through proper lawsuits, and providing the Legal Advice and Legislation Department with all the evidence and documents necessary to file these lawsuits.

It then expressed pride in the Kuwaiti judiciary's announcement of a ruling obligating one of the companies to pay KD20 million compensation to the authority with the 'res judicata' issued by the Court of Cassation; in addition to two companies ordered to pay KD2.7 million -their registration fees for operating as a container handling contractor in Shuaiba Port from July 2002 to December 2015.

In another development, MPs Mubarak Al-Tasha, Adel Al-Damkhi, Hamad Al-Obaid, Abdullah Fehad and Abdulaziz Al-Saqaabi have submitted a bill on amending Personal Status Law number 51/1984, particularly Clause A of Article 189, such that the order of granting custody of the children in case of divorce shall be as follows: mother, grandmother (mother of the female spouse), father, aunt (sister of the female spouse), sister of the female spouse's mother, sister of the female spouse's father, grandmother of the father and father's aunt.

The existing law puts the father in seventh place among the relatives who could be granted custody of the children in case of divorce. The lawmakers explained that their bill is aimed at correcting this, considering the essential role of the father in raising the children.

Meanwhile, Secretary of Inter-Par-liamentary Group MP Muhammad Al-Mahan has called on the parliaments of Islamic countries to push for ceasefire in Gaza and to stop the genocide being committed by the Zionist entity against the Palestinians. He stressed the need to provide safe passages for the affected as a humanitarian gesture.

Al-Mahan made the statement at the recent meeting of the Permanent Palestinian Committee in the Organization of Islamic Cooperation hosted by the Iranian Parliament; during which he also called for confronting the Israeli attacks and foiling attempts to displace the people in Gaza. He stressed the need to file a case against the Israeli prime minister, and the political and military leaders, as they are war criminals. He stated that Israel and its supporter countries must respect the international legitimacy.

Treasurer of the group MP Hamad Al-Obaid and member MP Fahd bin Jame'e attended the meeting as well.

In addition, Undersecretary of the group MP Hamad Al- Matar, as well as members MPs Dawoud Maarefi and Shuaib Shaaban, will attend the first meeting of the Palestine Committee at the Asian Parliaments Union.

On the other hand, MP Fahd bin Jame'e forwarded queries to acting Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior Sheikh Talal Khalid Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah about the role of the National Council for Cybersecurity in protecting the websites of ministries and other public institutions, and addressing the loopholes that hackers use to infiltrate these websites and access important data.

He wants to know the agreements or contracts that the council signed with local and international companies and individuals concerned with cybersecurity, organizational structure of the council, regulations for the recruitment of officials in the council, number of its employees, their nationalities, qualifications, jobs, salaries and allowances, and if any of them have been appointed without publishing recruitment advertisements since the establishment of the council till date.

He also asked acting Minister of Information, Endowments and Islamic Affairs Abdulrahman Al-Mutairi about the number of electronic newspapers and media services that obtained licenses, mechanism for monitoring these entities, measures taken against the electronic media services without licenses, censorship regulations, and number of violations recorded since January 2020 till date.

That has raised the risk of possible retaliatory strikes by U.S.-led forces now patrolling the vital waterway, especially after a United Nations Security Council vote on Wednesday condemning the Houthis and as American and British officials warned of potential consequences over the attacks.

Iran's state-run IRNA news agency acknowledged the seizure in a brief report late Thursday afternoon, hours after armed men boarded it. IRNA said the seizure came as the result of a court or-

der, without elaborating.
The British military's United Kingdom Maritime Trade Operations, which provides warnings to sailors in the Middle East, said Thursday's seizure began early in the morning, in the waters between Oman and Iran in an area transited by ships coming in and out of the Strait of Hormuz, the narrow mouth of the Arabian Gulf through which a fifth of all oil traded passes.

The U.K. military-run group described receiving a report from the ship's security manager of hearing "unknown voices over the phone" alongside with the ship's captain. It said that further efforts to contact the ship had failed and that the men who boarded the vessel wore "black military-style uniforms with black masks.

The private security firm Ambrey said that "four to five armed persons" boarded the ship, which it identified as the oil tanker St. Nikolas. It said that the men had covered the surveillance cameras as they boarded.

The tanker had been off the city of Basra, Iraq, loading crude oil bound for Aliaga, Turkey, for the Turkish refinery firm Tupras. Satellite-tracking data analyzed by The Associated Press last showed the Marshall Islands-flagged tanker had turned and headed toward the port of Bandar-e Jask in Iran.

The St. Nikolas was earlier named the Suez Rajan, associated with the the Greek shipping company Empire Navigation. In a statement to the AP, Athensbased Empire Navigation acknowledged losing contact with the vessel, which has a crew of 18 Filipinos and one Greek national. The company did not elaborate.

Attention began focusing on the Suez Rajan in February 2022, when the group United Against Nuclear Iran said it suspected the tanker carried oil from Iran's Khargh Island, its main oil distribution terminal in the Persian Gulf. Satellite photos and shipping data analyzed at the time by the AP supported the allegation.

For months, the ship sat in the South China Sea off the northeast coast of Singapore before suddenly sailing for the Texas coast without explanation. The vessel discharged its cargo to another tanker in August, which released its oil in Houston as part of a Justice Department order.

It blamed Israeli ocupation's on-going genocide and displacement of the people of Gaza on rcurrent international failure to take concrete steps to hold Israel accountable and enforce international laws and consensus.

Reiterating continued coordination and support, the ministry thanked the South African leadership and people for taking this courageous step to mobilize the international community to expose Israel's genocide.

A continent away from the war in Gaza, South Africa accused Israel of committing genocide against the Palestinians there and pleaded with the United Nations' top court on Thursday to order an immediate halt to the country's military operation. Israel has vehemently denied the allegations.

South African lawyers said during the opening arguments that the latest Gaza war is part of a decadeslong oppression of the Palestinians by Israel.

The two-day hearing is the public side of a landmark case, one of the most significant to be heard in an international court and which goes to the heart of one of the world's most intractable conflicts.

South Africa is seeking binding preliminary orders to compel Israel to stop its military campaign in Gaza, in which more than 23,000 people have died, according to the health ministry which is run by Hamas.

"Genocides are never declared in advance, but this court has the benefit of the past 13 weeks of evidence that shows incontrovertibly a pattern of conduct and related intention that justifies as a plausible claim of genocidal acts," South African lawyer Adila Hassim told the judges and audience in the packed, ornate room of the Peace Palace in The "Nothing will stop the suffering ex-

cept an order from this court," she said. Israel, however, says it is battling a fierce enemy in the Gaza Strip that carried out the deadliest attack on its territory, killing more than 1,200 people, since its creation in 1948. Israel says it is following international law and does its utmost to avoid harm to civilians. It blames Hamas for the high toll, saying its enemy embeds in residential areas.

South Africa turns a deaf ear to such arguments, insisting Israel committed genocide by design.

"The scale of destruction in Gaza, the targeting of family homes and civilians, the war being a war on children, all make clear that genocidal intent is both understood and has been put into practice. The articulated intent is the destruction of Palestinian life," said lawyer Tembeka Ngcukaitobi.

"What state would admit to a genocidal intent? Yet the distinctive feature of this case has not been the silence as such, but the reiteration and repetition of genocidal speech throughout every sphere of the state

Ukraine's Zelenskyy rules out a cease-fire with Russia

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy on Thursday ruled out a cease-fire in his country's war with Russia, saying the Kremlin's forces would use the pause to rearm and regroup before overwhelming Kyiv's troops.

"A pause on the Ukrainian battlefield will not mean a pause in the war," Zelenskyy said

during a visit to Estonia.

"A pause would play into (Russia's) hands," he said. "It might crush us afterward." Limited cease-fires have occasionally been proposed since Russia's full-scale invasion in February 2022 but have never taken hold.

Both sides are scrambling to replenish their weapons after 22 months of fighting and with the prospect of a protracted conflict. With the roughly 1,500-kilometer (630-mile) front line mostly static during freezing winter weather, they both require artillery shells, missiles and drones that enable long-range strikes.

Zelenskyy noted that Moscow is allegedly buying artillery shells and missiles from North

Zelenskyy was in the Estonian capital Tallinn as part of a two-day swing through Baltic countries which have been among Ukraine's staunchest supporters in the war.

The Ukrainian president is pressing allies to provide his country with more support, after already receiving billions of dollars in military aid from its Western allies. "Ukraine needs more, it needs better weapons," Estonian President Alar Karis said during a joint news conference with Zelenskyy at the Presidential Palace. (AP)

'Peaceful way'

Germany ready to help calm tensions in South China Sea

MANILA, Philippines, Jan 11, (AP): Germany's top diplomat said Thursday that China's actions in the South China Sea (SCS) violate the rights of Asian coastal states like the Philippines and threaten freedom of navigation, but added that territorial disputes have to be resolved peacefully because "the world doesn't need another crisis."

Annalena Baerbock, who held talks with Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. and other top officials while visiting Manila, said Germany was ready to help de-escalate growing tensions and added that it was crucial to set up "mechanisms" to resolve the disputes peacefully and foster dialogue.

"There are truly rough winds blowing across the South China Sea and this is happening in the middle of one of the most dynamic economic regions of the world," she told a news conference in Manila, speaking through an interpreter.

"It is now important to set up mechanisms to solve tensions together in a peaceful way," she said without elaborating. "I think we all agree that the world doesn't need another crisis. There are too many crises at once.'

In a symbolic gesture of Germany's support for the Philippines, Baerbock visited the coast guard headquarters in Manila and boarded a patrol ship, where she briefly flew one of a number of surveillance drones that Germany donated to the Philippines.

Philippine coast guard officials said the drones would help the country defend its territorial interests in the South China Sea, enforce maritime laws and undertake search and rescue missions during accidents at sea. Chinese officials did not immediately issue a reac-

The decades-long territorial dispute escalated last year between Beijing and Manila, sparking fears it could degenerate into a major conflict that could involve the United States, a longtime treaty ally of the Philippines.

Chinese coast guard ships and accompanying vessels used military-grade laser and water cannons against Philippine coast guard and supply vessels and undertook dangerous maneuvers near disputed shoals, prompting the Philippines to file a large number of diplomatic protests against China, Philippine officials said.

The U.S. has repeatedly warned it is obligated to defend the Philippines if its forces, aircraft and ships come under an armed attack, including in the South China Sea. China has warned the U.S. and its allies not to meddle with what it says is a purely Asian dispute and build up its forces in the region, warning of unspecified consequences.

Bomb threat at judge's home adds tension

Trump's trial heads to closing arguments

NEW YORK, Jan 11, (AP): Donald Trump 's New York civil fraud trial is back in session Thursday for closing arguments after authorities responded to a bomb threat at the home of the judge who moved this week to prevent the former president from delivering his own closing statements.

Authorities responded to the threat at Judge Arthur Engoron's home on Long Island, a court official said. The proceedings are not expected to be de-

layed as a result. Trump, the leading contender for the Republican presidential nomination, has repeatedly disparaged the judge in the case, accusing him in a social media post Wednesday night of working closely with the New York Attorney General "to screw me."

At 5:30 a.m. on Thursday, hours before the trial's final day was set to begin, Nassau County police said they responded to a "swatting incident" at Engoron's Great Neck home. Nothing amiss was found at the location, offi-

The false report comes days after a fake emergency call reporting a shooting at the home of the judge overseeing Trump's Capitol attack criminal case in Washington, D.C. The two incidents follow a spate of similar false reports at the homes of public officials in recent days.

On Wednesday, Engoron had nixed an unusual plan by Trump to deliver his own closing remarks in the courtroom, in addition to summations from his legal team, after lawyers for the former president would not agree to the judge's demand that he stick to "relevant" matters."

That will leave the last words to the lawyers in a trial over allegations that Trump exaggerated his wealth on financial statements he provided to banks, insurance companies and oth-

New York Attorney General Letitia James, a Democrat, wants the judge to impose \$370 million in penalties. Trump says he did nothing wrong, didn't lie about his fortune and is the victim of political persecution.

The former president had hoped to make that argument personally, but the judge - initially open to the idea said no after a Trump lawyer missed a deadline for agreeing to ground rules. Among them, Engoron warned that Trump couldn't use his closing remarks to "deliver a campaign speech" or use the opportunity to impugn the judge and his staff.

Trump is still expected to be in court as a spectator, despite the death of his mother in-law, Amalija Knavs, and the launch of the presidential primary season Monday with the Iowa caucus.

Since the trial began Oct. 2, Trump has gone to court nine times to observe, testify and complain to TV cameras about the case, which he called a "witch hunt and a disgrace."

Clashed

He clashed with Engoron and state lawyers during 3½ hours on the witness stand in November and remains under a limited gag order after making a disparaging and false social media post about the judge's law clerk.

Thursday's arguments are part of a busy legal and political stretch for Trump. On Tuesday, he was in court in

Washington, D.C., to watch appeals court arguments over whether he is immune from prosecution on charges that he plotted to overturn the 2020 election - one of four criminal cases against him. Trump has pleaded not

James sued Trump in 2022 under a state law that gives the state attorney general broad power to investigate allegations of persistent fraud in business dealings.

Engoron decided some of the key issues before testimony began. In a pretrial ruling, he found that Trump had committed years of fraud by lying about his riches on financial statements with tricks like claiming his Trump Tower penthouse was nearly three times its actual size, or valuing his Mar-a-Lago estate in Florida at more than \$612 million based on the idea that the property could be developed for residential use, when he had signed an agreement surrendering rights to develop it for any uses but a club.

The trial involves six undecided claims, including allegations of conspiracy, insurance fraud and falsifying business records.

Trump's company and two of his sons, Eric Trump and Donald Trump Jr., are also defendants.

Besides monetary damages, James wants Trump and his co-defendants barred from doing business in New

State lawyers say that by making himself seem richer, Trump qualified for better loan terms from banks, saving him at least \$168 million.

Trump contends his financial statements actually understated his net worth. He said the outside accountants that helped prepare the statements should've flagged any discrepancies and that the documents came with disclaimers that shield him from liability.

Engoron said he is deciding the case because neither side asked for a jury and state law doesn't allow for juries for this type of lawsuit. He said he hopes to have a decision by the end of

Unofficial delegation set for Taiwan: The Biden administration will send an unofficial delegation comprised of former senior officials to Taiwan shortly after the self-governed island holds an election for a new president this weekend, a move that could upset Beijing in an already-fragile bilateral relationship.

A senior administration official confirmed the plan on Wednesday without offering more details, but said such a face-toface meeting was the "most effective way" to engage the new Taiwanese government and convey U.S. policy in the region.

The official, briefing reporters on condition of anonymity to discuss sensitive plans, said the administration believed the move would contribute to peace and stability in the region.

Beijing, which claims that Taiwan is part of China and vows to unify with it eventually, said Thursday that it firmly opposes any official exchange between the U.S. and Taiwan. Foreign Ministry spokesperson Mao Ning didn't say whether China regards

the planned delegation as a form of "official exchange." (AP)

Biden's son to plead not guilty: President Joe Biden's son will head back to court on Thursday for arraignment in Los Angeles on federal tax charges filed after the collapse of a plea deal that could have spared him the spectacle of a criminal trial during

the 2024 campaign. Hunter Biden is expected to plead not



guilty to nine felony and misdemeanor tax offenses. The charges stem from what federal prosecutors say was a four-year scheme to skip out on paying the \$1.4 million he owed to the IRS and instead use the money to fund an extravagant lifestyle that by his own admission included drugs and alcohol. Speaker Johnson facing pushback: As Speaker Mike Johnson gathered House Republicans behind closed doors Wednesday to sell the spending deal he reached with Democrats, one thing quickly became clear:

many GOP lawmakers weren't buying it. Rep. Warren Davidson of Ohio left early,

saying he'd had enough. "I'm not going to sit there and listen to that drivel, because he has no plans to do

anything but surrender," Davidson said. In the afternoon, 13 Republicans refused to support a routine procedural vote setting the stage for considering three GOPled bills. Germany denounces alleged far-right plot

BERLIN, Jan 11, (AP): German Chancellor **Olaf Scholz** on Thursday sharply condemned alleged plans by members of far-right groups who supposedly met recently at a mansion outside Berlin to devise a plot to deport millions of immigrants, even those with

German citizenship, if the take groups power. The alleged

plan. which was published in an article by the investigative journalists' group Correctiv on Wednesday, has led to an



uproar in the country because it echoes the Nazis' ideology of deporting all people who are not ethnically German.

Scholz said Germany will not allow anyone living in the country to be judged based on whether they have foreign roots or not.

"We protect everyone - regardless of origin, skin color or how uncomfortable someone is for fanatics with assimilation fantasies," the chancellor wrote on X, formerly Twitter.

"Anyone who opposes our free democratic order" is a case for Germany's domestic intelligence office and the judiciary, he said, adding that learning the lessons from Germany's history should not just have been lip service.

Scholz was referring to the Nazis' Third Reich dictatorship in 1933-45, which made race ideology, ostracism and deportation of Jews, Roma and Sinti, homosexuals and many others the cornerstone of its politics.

The Nazis' belief in the superiority of their own "Aryan" race eventually led to the murder of 6 million Jews and other minorities in the Holocaust

According to the report by Correctiv, members of the far-right Alternative for Germany party, or AfD, and the extremist Identarian Movement participated in the meeting in November.

At the meeting, a prominent member of the Identitarian Movement, Austrian citizen Martin Sellner, presented his "remigration" vision for the deportation of immigrants, he confirmed to the German press agency dpa.

Polish opposition frustrated: Poland's right-wing opposition. frustrated over its recent loss of power, urged its supporters to protest Thursday against moves by the new pro-European Union government to take control of state broadcasters and the state news agency.

The Law and Justice party, which governed for eight years before losing October's parliamentary elections, called for a protest by "Free Poles" outside parliament. It portrayed the protest as a defense of democracy and free media, although during its time in power it was criticized for curbing media freedom.

It was unclear what the response would be, but emotions have been riding high over an escalating standoff between the current and the previous government. (AP)

Vatican unveils plans: The Vatican on Thursday unveiled plans for a yearlong restoration of the monumental baldacchino, or canopy, over the main altar of St. Peter's Basilica, pledging to complete the work on Bernini's masterpiece before Pope Francis' big 2025 Jubilee. The price tag? About 700,000

euros (\$770,000).

The restoration and conservation project, funded entirely by the Knights of Columbus and using the expertise of Vatican Museums restorers, marks the first comprehensive work on the 10-story tall baldacchino in 250 years. The structure, which is positioned

over the basilica's main altar to provide a ceremonial covering for the tomb of St. Peter underneath, dates from the 1620s-1630s, when Pope Urban VIII commissioned Gian Lorenzo Bernini to create a canopy for the apostles' tomb. (AP)

Cyprus authorities criticized: A migrants' rights organization on Thursday criticized authorities in Cyprus for failing to speak out against an explosion that damaged its offices following threats against it by what it calls far-right and extremist groups.

Doros Polycarpou, who heads the Movement for Equality, Support, Anti-Racism nongovernmental organization, said a makeshift explosive device detonated before dawn Jan. 5 just outside his office, causing extensive damage.

Polycarpou said a security camera opposite the spot where the explosive was placed wasn't working because the power was inexplicably cut at the time, even though other establishments adjacent to the offices had electricity. (AP)

China seen as aiming to sway Taiwan's elections

TAIPEI, Taiwan, Jan 11, (AP): Using military threats, diplomatic pressure, fake news and financial inducements for politicians, China is being accused of deploying a broad strategy to influence voters in Taiwan's elections to pick candidates who favor uni-

China's ultimate goal is to take control of the self-governing island democracy, whose high-tech economy supplies key components for computers, cellphones and other electronic devices and ships much of the world's goods out from the Taiwan Strait. Beijing has long insisted Taiwan is part of China and must be regained, by military force if necessary, regardless of the views of the island's people.

Taiwanese Foreign Minister Joseph Wu says Chi-na's "global objective is that



they want to use Taiwan as a test ground. If they are able to successfully shape the results of the Taiwan elections, they will try to apply their tactics on other countries.

China has been sending warships and fighter jets near Taiwan on a near-daily basis in recent years, hoping to intimidate the island's 23 million people and wear down its mili-

tary, which relies heavily on support from the United States. China has described Saturday's elections as a choice between war and

While the numbers of such missions have dropped off slightly in recent days, Taiwan has reported a number of suspicious balloons traveling over the island from China. The Defense Ministry also sent out an air raid alert via cell phones about a Chinese rocket launch Tuesday that it later amended to describe as the placement of a satellite into space but on an "abnormal trajectory." It said the alert was justified by the potential threat to civilians on the ground

Previous efforts to intimidate Taiwanese voters with missile launches and direct threats were largely seen as backfiring after the election of China critics in

China has also restricted imports from Taiwan and invited local leaders on all-expenses-paid visits aimed at persuading them to press colleagues to support pro-China candidates in the elections for the island's president and 113-member legislature. Cases have been opened against dozens of ward officials for accepting such gifts in violation of Taiwanese law.

China in general refuses to acknowledge the legitimacy of Taiwan's political institutions in keeping with the Communist Party's insistence that the democracy does not exit.

In line with that policy, China has not commented on Taiwan's upcoming elections. However, the head of the Chinese Cabinet's Taiwan Affairs office, Song Tao, said on Jan. 2 that China would continue to "unswervingly oppose" Taiwan's independence while also working to "safeguard peace, expand exchanges, enhance cooperation, deepen integration and advance reunification to ensure that cross-Strait relations move in the right direction of peaceful development," according to the official Xinhua News Agency.

Surveys show most Taiwanese embrace their current de facto independence - including compulsory military service for all men, the ability to travel worldwide on Taiwanese passports, and the right to choose their leaders in democratic elections at all levels.

While the race remains tight, support is strong for the ruling Democratic Progressive Party, even though China has refused to engage with the government since President Tsai Ing-wen was elected in 2016. She is unable to run again due to term limits.

The DPP favors closer ties with the United States as a way to preserve Taiwan's separate status and has refused to agree that Taiwan falls under the sovereignty of the People's Republic of China, which has never exercised political control over the island or its outlying territories. The DPP's presidential candidate, current Vice President William Lai, leads most preelection surveys.

The main opposition Nationalist Party candidate, Hou Yu-ih, is appealing to voters who fear a military conflict with China that could draw in the U.S. and disrupt the global economy. Hou opposes Taiwanese independence and agrees with Beijing's view that Taiwan is part of China, although under separate governments.

A third candidate, Ko Wen-je of the Taiwan People's Party, has sought to straddle the differences by appealing to young voters turned off by the rivalry between the Nationalists, also known as the KMT, and

However, Taiwanese elections are often decided on the basis of local issues such as housing, employment, education and healthcare that are separate from relations with China.

Taiwan, long a melting pot of Asian and European cultures, was a Japanese colony for 50 years until 1945, when it was handed over to Chiang Kai-shek's Chinese Nationalist government at the end of World War II. The Nationalists relocated their government and military to the island in 1949 after the Communists under Mao Zedong took power on the mainland amid a civil war in which millions were killed and which has yet to be formally resolved.

China accuses the U.S. of encouraging Taiwan to raise tensions between the sides by supplying it with military weapons.


"Any attempt to use Taiwan to contain China is doomed to failure," Chinese Defense Ministry spokesperson Col. Wu Qian said at a briefing in Beijing last week. "Seeking independence by military force is a

China's armed forces would "as always take all necessary measures to firmly safeguard our national sovereignty and territorial integrity," he added.

The non-profit Taiwan Fact Check Center says fake news linked to the elections has been traced to China and the pressure is increasing. Online postings described as deep fakes have depicted Tsai and Lai as doing and saying things that were entirely fabricated.

"The creators of false information have their own motives," said the center's CEO, Eve Chiu. "They are all false accusations related to politics.'

Beijing-sponsored visits to China by district wardens, equivalent to city and county representatives in the U.S., have also raised concerns in Taiwan. Several officials are being investigated on suspicion they accepted free accommodations, travel and entertainment in return for promoting pro-China candidates. That would violate Taiwanese law, which was carefully written to end a legacy of vote buying and voter co-

Japanese nuclear safety agency requires power plant study on Jan 1 quake impact

Japan's nuclear safety regulators have told the operator of a nuclear power plant in the area hit by a powerful New Year's Day quake to study its potential impact.

The Nuclear Regulation Authority, or NRA, asked for further investigation even though initial assessments showed the Shika nuclear power plant's cooling systems and ability to contain radiation remained intact.


The order reflects Japan's greater vigilance about safety risks after meltdowns in 2011 at a plant in Fukushima, on the northeastern Pacific coast, following a magnitude 9 quake and a massive tsunami. The Jan. 1 magnitude 7.6 quake and dozens of strong aftershocks have left 206 people dead and dozens more unaccounted for. It also caused a small tsunami. But Hokuriku Electric Power Co., the plant's operator, reported it had successfully dealt with damage to transformers, temporary outages and turbulence in the spent fuel cooling pools that followed the quakes.

Chief Cabinet Secretary Yoshimasa Hayashi has repeatedly emphasized that the plant was safe. Eighteen of 116 radiation monitoring posts installed in Ishikawa prefecture, where Shika is located, and in neighboring Toyama briefly failed after the quake. All but two have since been repaired and none showed any abnormality, he said.

Shika is a town on the western coast of the Noto peninsula, where the quake did the most damage, leaving roads gaping, toppling and collapsing buildings and triggering landslides.

Hokuriku Electric Power Co., reported that water had spilled from the spent fuel pools in both reactors. Transformers in both reactors were damaged and leaked oil, causing a temporary loss of power in one of the cooling pools. Company officials reported no further safety problems at the Nuclear Regulation Authority's weekly meeting Wednesday.

But NRA officials said the utility should consider a possibility of fresh damage to transformers and other key equipment as aftershocks continue. (AP)

Modi's beach visit rakes up storm: Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi posted a series of photos on social media last week showing him snorkeling, strolling on a white-sand beach and lounging in

a chair next to turquoise waters in Lakshad-

weep, an island chain in the Indian Ocean. It was an "exhilarating experience," he wrote on X, formerly Twitter, as he peppered with praise the pristine lesser-known and remote Indian archipelago his government believes has untapped potential for tourism. The images were met with awe by Indians on social media, particularly Modi's supporters.

But some 70 nautical miles south, his beach photos raked up a storm.

In the tiny archipelago nation of Maldives, some saw the tourism campaign as an attempt to draw visitors away from their country. Three senior Maldives officials reacted to Modi's post over the weekend calling him a "clown," a "terrorist" and a "puppet of Israel." Many other Maldivians insulted Indian tourists on so-

In India, the response was swift.

Government officials, Bollywood stars and cricketers began urging people to turn to Lakshwadeep, in a push to promote lo-cal holiday destinations. Many holidaymakers posted screenshots on X with the hashtag #BoycottMaldives to show they had canceled their trips to the island nation. On Monday, an Indian travel portal, Ease-MyTrip, joined in by suspending bookings for flights to the Maldives, saying the move was made "in solidarity with our nation."

Japan grapples with earthquake aftermath

Evacuation center deaths raise concerns

TOKYO, Jan 11, (AP): The 7.6 magnitude earthquake that hit the western coastline of Japan on New Year's has killed 213 people as of Thursday. Eight of the deaths were at evacuation centers, where rescued people died from injuries and sick-

deaths weren't direct caused by the quakes, fires and mudslides. They happened in alleged

"The pressures and stress of living in a place you aren't used to lead to such deaths," said Shigeru Nishimori, a disaster official in Ishikawa prefecture, the hardest-hit region.

Some 26,000 people whose homes were destroyed or deemed unsafe are staying at schools and other makeshift facilities. Even minor rain and snow can set off landslides where the ground is loose from the more than 1,000 aftershocks that rattled the region for more than a week. Half-

collapsed homes might flatten. Shinichi Kuriyama, director at the International Research Institute of Disaster Science, who has studied the earthquake, tsunami and nuclear disaster that hit northeastern Japan in 2011, warned that the chances for death double among populations undergoing a disaster.

He said the number of deaths in Ishikawa evacuation centers surprised him.

"I'm really shocked," he said. "Communication is key and it appears to be sorely lacking.

Kuriyama said the most vulnerable can be overlooked, missing food that's being distributed, for instance, because they are unaware or can't reach it. He added that Japanese tend to "suffer in silence," which can make things worse.

Deaths from the New Year's temblor centered on Noto Peninsula in Ishikawa have climbed daily, as rescue teams pull more bodies from the rubble. Of the deaths, 98 were in Suzu city, 83 in Wajima and 20 in Anamizu, with the rest in smaller numbers among four other towns. The number of missing people declined in recent days and now stands

Destroyed

Those injured totaled 567, and 1,830 homes were destroyed or seriously damaged, according to Ishikawa officials. More than 14,000 homes were without electricity, and nearly 59,000 homes had no running water.

People slept on cold floors, some without blankets, amid dropping temperatures and harsh winds Sheets were hung for partitions to provide privacy and in an effort to curtail the spread of disease. A week after the disaster hit Ishi-

kawa, camping tents were set up at a big hall to accommodate 500 people - a change that could prevent further post-disaster deaths. People who are pregnant, sick or old get priority for the revamped accommodations.

Soon, they'll be able to move to the 110 hotels and inns that volunteered to accept 3,000 people from the quake-damaged region. Nearby prefectures were also offering to open up their hotels.

Attack kills election candidate: At least three people, including an independent election candidate, were killed in an attack on the latter's vehicle in a tribal district of Pakistan's northern Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KPK) province bordering Afghanistan, said police on Wednesday.

District Police Officer Rohan Zeb told media that independent candidate Kaleemullah Khan, contesting for the upcoming general elections from North Waziristan District, was on his way back home from Miranshah area when his convoy was attacked by unknown assailants in the Tappi area. "Two of his bodyguards were also killed in the firing," the official added.

Moreover, in a separate incident, former Senator belonging to Pakistan Muslim League Nawaz, Aslam Buledi was injured in firing in Turbat district of Pakistan's southwestern Balochistan province. He has been moved to the government run District Headquarters Hospital.

The attacks come at a time when the country is preparing for upcoming general elections scheduled to be held on February 8. Last week, the Senate of Pakistan passed a resolution demanding a delay in the polls due to security concerns and weather situation in KPK and Balochistan provinces.

The Maldives officials later deleted their posts and were suspended by the country's president for posting "derogatory" comments against India, in a bid to control the fallout with New Delhi.

The incident highlighted the fragile nature of the relationship between India and the Maldives and its susceptibility to a breakdown at a time when Beijing and New Delhi are both vying for influence in the is-

Arab GDP up by 1.8% to reach USD 3.4 trl in '23

Overall outlook of economy positive for 2024

KUWAIT CITY, Jan 11: The Arab Investment & **Export Credit Guarantee** Corporation "Dhaman" revealed that Arab GDP grew by 1.8% to reach about \$3.4 trillion in 2023, according to International Monetary Fund (IMF) estimates in October 2023, in conjunction with the growth of the global economy by 3% in 2023.

The Director General of "Dhaman", Mr. Abdullah Ahmad Al-Sabeeh, explained in the editorial of the fourth quarterly bulletin for 2023 that the overall outlooks of the Arab economy came positive for 2024, with an expected growth rate of %3.6, buoyed by the potential growth of 9 oil exporters that account for 78% of the Arab GDP, which could make up the downturn of other economies.

Al-Sabeeh attributed the decline in the performance of most Arab economic indicators in 2023 to several reasons, including the decrease of oil production by 5.2% and global crude oil prices by 16.5%, the negative effects of tightening monetary policies and lending criteria and the escalation of the geopolitical situation, the debt crisis and climate change, as follows: ■ The average GDP per capita in Arab

countries dropped by 4.7% to reach

\$7,482, with estimations to increase by 1.2% to hit an average of \$7,573 in 2024. While the average GDP per capita according to the purchasing power parity (PPP) rose by 3.2% to reach \$18.1 thousand in 2023, with continued significant disparity between oil exporters and other lower-income countries.

• The Arab population grew by 2% to exceed 456 million in 2023, and the average of the unemployment rate increased to 9.4% in the same year.

■ The average rate of consumer prices inflation in the Arab region rose to 12.1% in 2023, with expectations that it will decline to 11.7% in 2024.

■ The combined default surplus for Arab government fiscal balance fell to reach \$3.3 billion in 2023, with expectations to turn into a deficit of \$26.9

billion in 2024 to represent 0.8% of the Arab GDP.

■ The Arab debt indicators improved, as the government debt ratio stabilized at 47% of the Arab GDP, with estimates to decrease to 46.1% in 2024. In addition, the external debt ratio declined to 50.8% of the Arab GDP in 2023, and it is expected to reach 49.6% of the Arab GDP in 2024.

■ Arab foreign trade in goods and services dropped by 5.7% to less than \$3 trillion in 2023, due to the decrease of Arab exports by 9.7% and imports by 0.4%. Thus, the trade balance surplus declined by 39% to reach \$262 billion in the same year.

■ The current account surplus of Arab countries decreased by 52.3% in 2023 to reach \$180 billion, representing 5.3% of the Arab GDP, with forecasts to reach \$157 billion in 2024, representing 4.4% of the Arab GDP.

■ Arab gross official reserves surpassed \$1 trillion, enough to cover Arab imports of goods and services for 8.6 months, with predictions to exceed \$1.1 trillion in 2024.

Al-Sabeeh said that despite the optimistic outlooks of the IMF regarding the Arab economy, this optimism depends on the scenarios of the war on Gaza and its impacts on the global oil prices and on the economic and political situations of the neighboring countries, along with the effects of the important presidential and legislative elections scheduled to take place in about 40 countries during 2024, especially with the possible change in the USA and UK, besides the repercussions of the political, economic and climate developments on the region

US consumer inflation pressures may have eased further in Dec

WASHINGTON, Jan 11, (AP): The Federal Reserve, tentatively pleased with progress it's made in fighting inflation, has declared what amounts to a ceasefire: The Fed stopped raising interest rates in July, after imposing an aggressive 11 hikes since March 2022, to take time to see how the economy

So far, so good.

Inflation has kept slowing, and the economy has withstood the strain of the accumulated higher borrowing costs. Hope is growing that the central bank can achieve a rare "soft landing" by cooling the economy just enough to tame inflation without causing a recession. The financial markets, in fact, seem increasingly optimistic that the Fed can soon begin cutting rates, which would lighten borrowing costs for consumers and businesses.

On Thursday, the Labor Department was expected to report that underlying inflationary pressures eased further in December. Excluding volatile food and energy costs, "core" prices likely rose 0.2% from November, according to a survey of forecasters by the data firm FactSet, down from a 0.3% rise the previous month. And compared with 12 months earlier, core prices are thought to have risen 3.8% in December, down from a 4% year-over-year increase in November.

Economists pay particular attention to core prices because, by excluding costs that typically fluctuate sharply from month to month, they are a better guide to the likely path of inflation. But the war against inflation isn't

won just yet.

Overall inflation is thought to have edged higher last month, putting it further above the Fed's 2% target. According to the FactSet survey, economists think the broadest measure of consumer prices rose 0.2% from November to December and 3.2% from 12 months earlier. Both figures would mark a modest acceleration from the 0.1% October-November increase and the 3.1% year-over-year rise in November.

Those upticks wouldn't likely cause concern. The index of overall inflation tends to bounce around from month to

Still, it helps explain why, despite steady economic growth, low unemployment and healthy hiring, polls show many Americans are dissatisfied with the economy. That disconnect, a likely issue in the 2024 elections, has puzzled economists and political analysts. One thing has become increasingly clear, though: The public is exasperated with prices that are still 17% higher than they were when the inflation surge began in early 2021.

Overall, the progress against inflation has been significant. A year ago, the 12-month rise in the consumer price index was 6.5% - way down from a four-decade high of 9.1% in June 2022 but still painfully high. Now, it's just above 3%. And wage gains have outpaced inflation in recent months, meaning that Americans' average after-inflation take-home pay is up.

There are solid reasons for optimism that inflationary pressure will continue to recede in the coming months.

The Federal Reserve Bank of New York reported this week, for example, that consumers now expect inflation to come in at just 3% over the next year, the lowest one-year forecast since January 2021. That's important because consumer expectations are themselves considered a telltale sign of future inflation: When Americans fear that prices will keep accelerating, they will typically rush to buy things sooner rather than later. That surge of spending tends to fuel more inflation.

But that nasty cycle does not appear

to be happening.

And when Fed officials discussed the inflation outlook at their most recent meeting last month, they noted some hopeful signs: An end to the supply chain backlogs that had caused parts shortages and inflation pressures and a drop in rent costs, which is beginning to spread through the economy.

Still, John Min, chief economist at the foreign exchange firm Monex USA, suggested that "the easy part" was slowing inflation from 9% to around 3%. Going "the last mile" to reach the Fed's 2% target could prove the hardest stretch.

The December U.S. jobs report that was issued last week contained some cautionary news for the Fed: Average hourly wages rose 4.1% from a year earlier, up slightly from 4% in November. And 676,000 people left the workforce, reducing the proportion of adults who either have a job or are looking for one to 62.5%, the lowest level since

Google lays off hundreds of workers amid cost-cutting drive

WASHINGTON, Jan 11, (AP) Google has laid off hundreds of employees working on its hardware, voice assistance and engineering teams as part of cost-cutting measures.

The cuts come as Google looks towards "responsibly investing in our company's biggest priorities and the significant opportunities ahead," the company said in a statement.

"Some teams are continuing to make these kinds of organizational changes, which include some role eliminations globally," it said.

Google earlier said it was eliminating a few hundred roles, with most of the impact on its augmented reality

hardware team. The cuts follow pledges by executives of Google and its parent company Alphabet to reduce costs. A year ago, Google said it would lay off 12,000 employees or around 6% of its work-

Google is not the only technology company cutting back. In the past year, Meta -- the parent company of Facebook -- has slashed more than 20,000 jobs to reassure investors. Meta's stock price gained about 178% in 2023.

Earlier this week, Amazon laid off hundreds of employees in its Prime Video and studios units. It also will lay off about 500 employees who work on its livestreaming platform Twitch.

Google is currently locked in a fierce rivalry with Microsoft as both firms strive to lead in the artificial intelligence domain. Microsoft has stepped up its arti-

ficial intelligence offerings to rival

Google's and in September introduced a Copilot feature that incorporates artificial intelligence into products like search engine Bing, browser Edge as well as Windows for its corporate cus-

Generative AI chatbots raise concerns of widespread synthetic content manipulation

Al-fueled misinformation as immediate threat to global economy

LONDON, Jan 11, (AP): False and misleading information supercharged with cutting-edge artificial intelligence that threatens to erode democracy and polarize society is the top immediate risk to the global economy, the World Economic Forum said in a report Wednesday.

In its latest Global Risks Report, the organization also said an array of environmental risks pose the biggest threats in the longer term. The report was released ahead of the annual elite gathering of CEOs and world leaders in the Swiss ski resort town of Davos and is based on a survey of nearly 1,500 experts, industry leaders and policymakers.

The report listed misinformation and disinformation as the most severe risk over the next two years, highlighting how rapid advances in technology also are creating new problems or making existing ones worse.

The authors worry that the boom in generative AI chatbots like Chat-GPT means that creating sophisticated synthetic content that can be used to manipulate groups of people won't be limited any longer to those with specialized skills.

AI is set to be a hot topic next week at the Davos meetings, which are expected to be attended by tech company bosses including OpenAI CEO Sam Altman, Microsoft CEO Satya Nadella and AI industry players like Meta's

chief AI scientist, Yann LeCun.

AI-powered misinformation and disinformation is emerging as a risk just as a billions of people in a slew of countries, including large economies like the United States, Britain, Indonesia, India, Mexico, and Pakistan, are set to head to the polls this year and next, the report said.

"You can leverage AI to do deepfakes and to really impact large groups, which really drives misinformation,' said Carolina Klint, a risk management leader at Marsh, whose parent company Marsh McLennan co-authored the report with Zurich Insurance Group.


Polarized

"Societies could become further polarized" as people find it harder to verify facts, she said. Fake information also could be used to fuel questions about the legitimacy of elected governments, "which means that democratic processes could be eroded, and it would also drive societal polarization even further," Klint said.

The rise of AI brings a host of other risks, she said. It can empower "malicious actors" by making it easier to carry out cyberattacks, such as by automating phishing attempts or creating advanced malware

With AI, "you don't need to be the sharpest tool in the shed to be a malicious actor," Klint said.

It can even poison data that is scraped

off the internet to train other AI systems, which is "incredibly difficult to reverse" and could result in further embedding biases into AI models, she said.

The other big global concern for respondents of the risk survey centered around climate change.

Following disinformation and misinformation, extreme weather is the second-most-pressing short-term risk. In the long term - defined as 10 years - extreme weather was described as the No. 1 threat, followed by four other environmental-related risks: critical change to Earth systems; biodiversity loss and ecosystem collapse; and natural resource shortages.

"We could be pushed past that irreversible climate change tipping point" over the next decade as the Earth's systems undergo long-term changes, Klint said.

Amazon's Twitch lays off more than 500 employees

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan 11, (AP): Twitch, the video game streaming platform acquired by Amazon a decade ago for close to \$1 billion, is laying off more than 500 employees as the company tries to turn the tremendously expensive division profitable.

Twitch CEO Dan Clancy in an email to employees said that even with cost cuts and growing efficiency, the platform "is still meaningfully larger than it needs to be given the size of our business.

"For some time now the organization has been sized based upon where we optimistically expect our business to be in 3 or more years, not where we're at today," Clancy wrote.

Amazon purchased Twitch Interactive in 2014 for \$970 million as it looked for a way to take part in video gaming's growth as an online spectator sport.

Twitch is a multi-channel online network built for a generation of people raised with video games and like to watch some of the best gamers in the world as many people watch professional sports.

Last month Twitch, based in San Francisco, said that it was withdrawing from the South Korean market due to expensive network fees. Clancy said at the time that the network fees the company has been paying to South Korean internet operators were 10 times more than in most other markets. He did not provide specific numbers to back such claims.

Rightsize

"As you all know, we have worked hard over the last year to run our business as sustainably as possible," Clancy wrote. "Unfortunately, we still have work to do to rightsize our company and I regret having to share that we are taking the painful step to reduce our headcount by just over 500 people across Twitch.'

Amazon has cut thousands of jobs after a hiring surge during the pandemic. In March, Amazon announced that it planned to lay off 9,000 employees. That was on top of the 18,000 employees the tech giant said that it would lay off in January 2023.

Automakers expanded overseas

Chinese auto exports surged 64% with strong push by EVs

BEIJING, Jan 11, (AP): China's auto exports surged 63.7% in 2023 while domestic sales, boosted by year-end incentives, rose 4.2%, an industry association said Thursday.

Chinese automakers have aggressively expanded exports in search of growth missing at home as China's economy slows. They have also pushed into electric vehicles as government subsidies transformed China into the world's largest EV market, even as car sales have stagnated overall.

Auto sales in China totaled 21.9 million cars last year while exports jumped to 4.1 million, the China Association of Automobile Manufacturers reported. Domestic sales are down from a peak of about 24 million in 2017.

The surge in exports may propel China past Japan as the world's number one exporter of cars. Japan exported 3.6 million cars in the first 11 months of the year, with a final tally expected on Jan. 31.

An explosion in sales to Russia helped drive up China's exports in 2023, as European and Japanese makers pulled back because of the war in Ukraine. China exported 840,000 vehicles to Russia in the first 11 months of last year, including trucks and buses as well as cars.

The China Passenger Car Association said earlier this week that demand in Russia and neighboring countries is slowing and future export growth will depend on an expansion of EV sales overseas. Chinese EV makers have targeted markets in Southeast Asia, Europe and Australia, among others.

The manufacturers' association does not provide a breakdown for electric vehicles, but data released by the passenger car association showed that electric vehicles accounted for 24% of new car sales in China in 2023, up from 12% in 2021. Including hybrids, the share of newenergy vehicles in total sales reached 36% last year.

The Tesla Model Y was the bestselling electric vehicle in China last year, with 646,800 units sold, followed by the BYD Song sedan at 428,600 units, according to the passenger car group.

The Model Y retails for 266,400 to 363,900 yuan (\$37,500 to \$51,200), according to the Tesla website, and the BYD Song for 129,800 to 159,800 yuan (\$18,300 to \$22,500).

Bill Russo, founder of the Automobility consultancy in Shanghai, said Chinese firms have democratized the electric vehicle by driving down its price. The next challenge will be to convince buyers that an EV can meet their driving needs. But the first step is to make it available at a price that will get them to consider one, Russo said.

"That's the paradigm that the Chinese have broken, that you can make an EV affordable," he said in a recent interview. "What China is doing with the EV is it's using its domestic market to generate economies of scale that it can then take internationally.

Fitch Ratings said in a report last month that it expects the share of new energy vehicles including hybrids in China's total sales to rise to 42%-45% in 2024. It also projected that exports would grow 20% to 30% this year.

The European Union, concerned about rising imports from China, opened a trade investigation last year into Chinese subsidies for electric vehicles. The investigation is ongoing.

The Chinese manufacturer's association said the total sales of all vehicles, at home and abroad and including trucks and buses, reached the 30-million-unit milestone in 2023, a 12% rise over the previous year. It forecast growth would slow to about 3% this year.

ChatGPT-maker prepares for fight with NY Times, authors

NEW YORK, Jan 11, (AP): A barrage of high-profile lawsuits in a New York federal court will test the future of ChatGPT and other artificial intelligence products that wouldn't be so eloquent had they not ingested huge troves of copyrighted human works.

But are AI chatbots - in this case, widely commercialized products made by OpenAI and its business partner Microsoft - breaking copyright and fair competition laws? Professional writers and media outlets will face a difficult fight to win that argument in court.

Optimistic

"I would like to be optimistic on behalf of the authors, but I'm not. I just think they have an uphill battle here," said copyright attorney Ashima Aggarwal, who used to work for academic publishing giant John Wi-

One lawsuit comes from The New York Times. Another from a group of well-known novelists such as John Grisham, Jodi Picoult and George R.R. Martin. A third from bestselling nonfiction writers, including an author of the Pulitzer Prize-winning biography on which the hit movie "Oppenheimer" was based.

Each of the lawsuits makes different allegations, but they all center on the San Francisco-based company OpenAI "building this product on the back of other peoples' intellectual property," said attorney Justin Nelson, who is representing the nonfiction writers and whose law firm is also representing The Times.

"What OpenAI is saying is that they have a free ride to take anybody else's intellectual property really since the dawn of time, as long as it's been on the internet," Nelson said.

The Times sued in December, arguing that ChatGPT and Microsoft's Copilot are competing with the same outlets they are trained on and diverting web traffic away from the newspaper and other copyright holders who depend on advertising

Latest tech wonders shine at CES 2024

LAS VEGAS, Jan 11, (AP): Welcome to CES 2024. This multi-day trade event put on by the Consumer Technology Association is expected to bring some 130,000 attendees and more than 4,000 exhibitors to Las Vegas. The latest advances and gadgets across personal tech, transportation, health care, sustainability and more will be on display, with burgeoning uses of artificial intelligence almost everywhere you look

The Associated Press will keep a running report of everything we find interesting from the floor of CES, from the latest announcements to most quirky smart gadgets.

Roberta Wilson-Garrett used to be a morning person who would leap out of bed at dawn. Until, that is, she was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease six years ago.

Now her hands twist and tremor, making the morning, when her medicine is wearing off, especially difficult. It takes hours for her to get ready for the day. All her coffee mugs have lids on them now.

Boston-based GyroGear, a medical tech startup, debuted a hand-stabilizing glove at CES 2024 that it hopes will help people like Wilson-Garrett regain control of their lives.

"It makes life normal for me again, The things that you take for granted, I don't take for granted anymore,' Wilson-Garrett told AP on the show floor as her right hand shook. "It gives me back a piece of my old life when I have the glove on."

When Wilson-Garrett slipped on the black glove, her right hand relaxed, and she was able to hold a pen and write her name.

The GyroGlove is now available for \$5,899.

Can generative AI tell your future? A fortune teller showcased by South Korean manufacturing and IT services giant SK Group at ČES this week gives us a glimpse.

SK's AI Fortune Teller, which is powered by high-bandwidth memory technology, claims that it can tell users their fortune by reading their emotions. The machine snaps a photo of your face and, naturally, asks you to select a card from an on-screen deck. Within moments, the AI analyzes facial characteristics and produces an Tarot card-like print with a short, future-looking message or piece of advice.

This AI fortune teller isn't available to consumers outside of CES, but it's featured in the Las Vegas show to help display SK's latest tech and sustainability advances. Other attractions advertised at the "SK Wonderland" interactive exhibit include a fully-electric dancing car and train that's capable of being powered by hydrogen energy

new flying tax the S-A2 by Hyundai, made its debut at CES 2024.

The South Korean vehicle manufacturer envisions the electric vertical takeoff and landing vehicle as a commuter solution for urban areas with heavy traffic.

Hyundai claims the vehicle will be able to cruise at 120 mph (190 kph) at a 1,500-foot (460-meter) altitude while operating as quietly as a dishwasher.

The S-A2 builds on Hyundai's S-A1 concept, which made its debut at CES in 2020. Company officials say they are working to get the vehicle ready to meet flight standards set by nations around the world.

GE Appliances is looking to change the way you smoke food with its new \$1,000 indoor smoker.

About the size of a toaster oven or microwave, the GE Profile Smart Indoor Smoker can fit a full brisket cut in half, 40 chicken wings or three racks of ribs. It still uses wood pellets to achieve a smokey flavor, but its technology traps the smoke inside, making it "perfect for people who live in urban environments," like high-rise apartments, said Whitney Welch, a

spokesperson for GE Appliances. A focus on accessibility in the gaming industry is on the rise. Just this October, Sony launched the Ac-

cess controller for Playstation. To talk about the wins so far and the road ahead, CES 2024 featured a panel of four players for "The Evolu-

tion of Accessible Gaming.' For Paul Amadeus Lane, an accessibility consultant and broadcaster who moderated the panel, gaming is a lifelong passion, but when he got in a car accident that left him unable to use his fingers, he first thought his

gaming days were over. "It was like I lost a good friend. But then that good friend got reunited when I found out about all these accessibility features," Lane said during the panel.

Mark Barlet, founder of Able-Gamers, said people with disabilities are 56% more likely to be socially isolated, and combatting that is what drives his organization. Further, he says it's smart business.

"Twenty percent of the population has some sort of disability and you start looking at game companies competing for eyeballs - all of a sudden, talking about, 'Hey, would you like to sell more games?' becomes a really powerful conversation."

When asked what advice they'd give to game developers, panelists Liz Schmidlin, user research lead at PlayStation, and Michele Zorrilla, senior user experience researcher at Insomniac Games, echoed a similar statement: Start working accessibility conversations in early on in the



their natural voices.

While many current technologies focus on speech-to-text or text-tospeech, Whispp is using audio-toaudio-based AI, resulting in almost

real-time speech conversion. Users can recreate their distinct voice by providing recordings of their current or past voice, adding a personalized touch to their own communication.

At CES 2024, Whispp launched an AI-powered assistive speech and phone-calling app.

On Tuesday, businesswoman and media personality Martha Stewart took to the kitchen stage at the Samsung CES booth to craft her "Martha-tini" and smashed potatoes using the company's SmartThings technology.

Music leaders launch push to protect artists against Al

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Jan 11, (AP): Tennessee Gov. Bill Lee has unveiled new legislation designed to protect songwriters, performers and other music industry professionals against the potential dangers of ar-

Lee made the announcement while standing in the middle of Nashville's famed RCA Studio A, a location where legends such as Dolly Parton, Willie Nelson and Charley Pride have all recorded. Packed inside were top music industry leaders, songwriters and lawmakers, all eager to praise the state's rich musical history while also sounding the alarm about the threats AI poses.

"Tennessee will be the first state in the country to protect artists' voices with this legislation," Lee said. "And we hope it will be a blueprint for the country."

The legislation comes as states across the country and federal lawmakers wrestle with the challenge of curbing the dangers of AI. The bill hasn't been formally introduced inside the Tennessee Legislature and the text of the proposal has yet to be publicly distributed.

Lee said he wants to ensure that AI tools cannot replicate an artist's voice without the artist's consent. That involves turning to one of the state's most iconic residents: Elvis Presley.

The death of Presley in 1977 sparked a contentious and lengthy legal battle over the unauthorized use of his name and likeness, as many argued that once a celebrity died, their name and image entered into the public domain.

However, by 1984 the Tennessee Legislature passed the Personal Rights Protection Act, which ensured that personality rights do not stop at death and can be passed down to others. It states that "the individual rights ... constitute property rights and are freely assignable and licens-

able, and do not expire upon the death of the individual so protected. The move was largely seen as critical in protecting Presley's estate, but has since been praised as protecting the names, photographs and likenesses of all of Tennessee's public figures in the decades since.

Protections

It also was monumental in preserving name, photographs and likeness as a property right rather than a right of publicity. To date, only two other states - New York and California - have similar protections, making it easier to seek damages in court.

But no state currently has enacted protections against vocal likeness. And with AI posing a threat to almost every industry, artists and other creatives are increasingly calling for stronger protections against new AI tools that produce imagery, music, video and text.

'If a machine is able to take something from someone's lifetime and experience and re-create it without permission, or take someone's voice and use it without permission, let's just call it what it is: It's wrong," said four-time Grammy-nominated songwriter Jamie Moore.

Ultimately, the goal is to ensure that AI tools are not scraping and using an artist's song or voice in order to learn how to spit out a song itself without the artist's permission, said Bart Herbison, executive director of the Nashville Songwriters Association International. Another key aspect is fighting for proper payment.

Herbison said he watched generative AI tools advance from writing awkward songs in February of last year to spitting out moving and

emotional pieces by October. "What it can do now is freaky scary. It's all people can talk about in the writer's rooms," he said.

Other AI legislation is expected to pop up across the country as many statehouses resume work this month. Already in California, a lawmaker has proposed a measure requiring the state to establish safety, privacy, and nondiscrimination standards around generative-AI tools and services. Those standards would eventually be used as qualifications in future state contracts. Another proposal has been introduced to create a state-run research center to further study the technology.

On the federal level, the US Copyright Office is weighing whether to enact copyright reforms in response to generative AI. Meanwhile, a bipartisan group of U.S. senators has introduced legislation called the No Artificial Intelligence Fake Replicas And Unauthorized Duplications Act of 2024. Supporters say the measure will combat AI deepfakes, voice clones and other harmful digital human impersonations.

Still trying to make 'fetch' happen, now in song

'Mean Girls' gets a musical update

The first "Mean Girls," that compulsively ■ watchable high-school based social satire by Tina Fey, came out in 2004. The Broadway musical opened in 2018. Now it's 2024, and we have a screen adaptation of the theater adaptation. How long will this reconfiguring go on? Is there a limit? Or ... does the limit not exist?

Forgive us that utterly blatant setup for one of the original's most famous lines. It's just that some of them are so darned memorable. Like, "You can't sit here!" - screeched. Or when Regina, the haughtiest queen bee ever to carry a cafeteria tray, scathingly tells her minion Gretchen, who's trying out her new word "fetch," to "Stop trying to make 'fetch' happen. It's NOT going to happen!!' But even in "Mean Girls 17," should it come to

that, someone will still be trying to make "fetch" happen. And it's actually not a bad word to describe the experience of watching the new "Mean Girls" - a slick, fizzy bit of entertainment that's occasionally delightful and usually fun, even if the translation to 2024 definitely has its rough spots.

If you've recently re-watched the first film, you may be surprised here at how many lines remain, word for word. What's impressive is how many still work - unlike some social comedies that felt right 20 years ago but have scenes that fall with a thud now (see "Love Actually").

There are exceptions, though. I'll confess to feeling queasy throughout about the "dumb girl" character who remains in the Plastics, Regina's social group. There is, thankfully, no more reference to a coach sleeping with a student, which would not have been funny, even with Jon Hamm as the coach. Shaming has been conspicuously toned down - the insult in Regina's famous Burn Book is now "cow".

On the other hand, fat-shaming? That's still

there, as when the camera zooms in rudely on the

rear end of a character who's gained a few pounds. As for the casting, some of it works wonderfully, particularly the duo who introduce the film, which is again written by Fey, with music by Jeff Richmond (her husband), and lyrics by Nell Benjamin. Damian, the beloved character described affectionately by Janis as "almost too gay to function" (but that's only OK when she says it), and Janis, his best friend, a talented artist whose fallout with Regina left her in the dirt socially, function almost as quasi-narrators. Jaquel Spivey, of Broadway's "A Strange Loop," is hilarious and also moving as Damian - you wait for each new line, and he wastes none of them. And Auli'i Cravalho as Janis has a gorgeous voice and charismatic screen presence.

Vocals

Angourie Rice is the new Cady, the Lindsay Lohan role, a home-schooled math whiz who arrives in suburban Chicago straight from Kenya, where her mother was doing zoological research, into the snake pit of high school. Rice is a sweet presence but not as convincing in the "bad Cady" moments as Lohan. As for the Plastics, singer Reneé Rapp, formerly Regina on Broadway, imbues the role with powerhouse vocals and an angrier edge than the excellent Rachel McAdams did - when she's enraged, boy, you feel it.

Once again, Cady begins her first school day in math class with Ms. Norbury, once played by Fey - and again by Fey! Tim Meadows is also back as the principal; both look older but certainly not two decades.

Cady has a rough entry and ends up eating lunch in a bathroom stall, but is rescued by Janis and Damian. In the cafeteria, she has her first encounter with Queen Bee Regina. "My name is Regina George," sings Rapp, in some of the show's best

lyrics, "I am a massive deal. I don't care who you

are, I don't care how you feel." The Plastics - Regina, needy Gretchen (Bebe Woods) and intellectually challenged Karen (Avantika) - adopt Cady and teach her the rules: Wear pink on Wednesdays. No tank tops two days in a row. A ponytail? Once a week. Also: You can't date someone's ex-boyfriend, because those are "the rules of feminism." At such moments, one can literally hear Fey writing the line.

Things go south quickly when Cady falls for Regina's ex, Aaron, who sits in front of her in AP Calculus (leading to the excellent lyric "Calculust.") Regina isn't going to give up Aaron without a dirty fight. So Cady, aided by Damian and Janis, plots to bring Regina down from inside, pretending to be a loyal Plastic.

But at what point does Cady stop pretending and BECOME a Plastic? (Ask Janis.)

Directors Samantha Jayne and Arturo Perez Jr. keep the action moving briskly. A key visual difference is technology. In the 2004 film, friends spoke to each other on the telephone, in split screens. Now, of course, gossip and bullying take place via social media. In some ways this makes it all seem more vicious. When Regina takes an embarrassing tumble onstage at the Christmas performance, we witness a social media shaming that is much crueler than anything that happened in the 2004 version.

And yet, it's believable, of course. One comes away from this latest "Mean Girls" thinking that in some ways things may have gotten better for high schoolers than they were in 2004 - but in other ways, things have only gotten meaner.

NEW YORK: Christopher Nolan, Greta Gerwig and Martin Scorsese have been nominated by the Directors Guild for its top award.

The nominations to the 76th DGA Awards, which followed those by the Screen Actors Guild earlier Wednesday, went as expected. The other two nominees for the guild's top award, for outstanding directorial achievement, are Alexander Pavne for "The Holdovers" and Yorgos Lanthimos for "Poor Things.

Nolan's nomination, for "Oppenheimer," is his fifth DGA nod though he's never won before. Gerwig, nominated for "Barbie," was previously nominated for 2017's "Lady Bird." Scorsese's nomination for "Killers of the Flower Moon" is his 13th DGA nod; he has previously won for 2006's "The Departed" and for the series "Boardwalk Empire

The Directors Guild nominees often closely align with those of the Academy Awards. Over the past two decades, the winner of the DGA award has nearly always also triumphed at the Oscars. Last year, Daniel Kwan and Daniel Scheinert won both awards for "Everything Everywhere All at Once.'

The DGA's nominees for first-time feature filmmaker went to Cord Jefferson for "American Fiction," Manuela Martelli for "Chile '76'," **Noora Niasari** for "Shayda," A.V. Rockwell for "A Thousand and One" and Celine Song for "Past Lives."

The guild earlier on Tuesday announced other categories. The DGA nominations for best documentary are: "20 Days in Mariupol," "Bobi Wine: The People's President," "Beyond Utopia," "Kokomo City" and "Still: A Michael J. Fox Movie." HBO's "Succession" led the TV nominations, with four out of five nominations for direction. 76th annual DGA Awards will be held Feb. 10. (AP)

DiCaprio, 'Poor Things' face surprise snub

'Barbenheimer' dominates SAG nods

NEW YORK, Jan 11, (AP): The 30th Screen Actors Guild Awards on Wednesday heaped nominations on "Oppenheimer," "Barbie" and "American Fiction," while snubbing Leon-

ardo DiCaprio for best male actor.

As they were at the Golden Globes,
Greta Gerwig's "Barbie" and Christopher Nolan's "Oppenheimer" were again the lead nominees. Each film picked up four nods including best ensemble. Margot Robbie and Ryan Gosling were nominated for their performances in "Barbie," while Cillian Murphy, Robert Downey Jr. and Emily Blunt received nods for "Oppenheimer.'

Barbenheimer continues to rule Hollywood's awards season, just as it did the summer box office.

Cord Jefferson's "American Fiction" got the biggest momentum boost, landing three nods: best ensemble, Jeffrey Wright for best male actor and Sterling K. Brown for supporting male actor.

Nominated

Along with those three films, Martin Scorsese's "Killers of the Flower Moon" and Blitz Bazawule's "The Color Purple" were nominated for best ensemble, the guild's top award.

Most notably left out of that group was Yorgos Lanthimos' "Poor Things," which on Sunday won best comedy/musical at the Golden Globes. The film's star, Emma Stone, was nominated for best female actor while Willem Dafoe (but not Mark Ruffalo) was nominated for best supporting male actor.

But those were far from the only snubs in the nominations announced by Issa Rae, a co-star in both "Barbie' and "American Fiction," and Kumail Nanjiani on Instagram Live.

Nominated for best actor were Bradley Cooper ("Maestro"), Colman Domingo ("Rustin"), Paul Giamatti ("The Holdovers"), Murphy and Wright. DiCaprio had long been seen as a presumed nominee for his performance in Martin Scorsese's "Killers of the Flower Moon." Lily Gladstone, who is poised to potentially make history at the Oscars, was among the best female actor nominees, while Robert De Niro was nominated for best supporting male actor.

Todd Hayne's "May December" was completely shut out, as was Celine Song's tender love story, "Past Lives." Charles Melton, co-star of "May December," was expected to be among the supporting male actors. And neither Sandra Hüller ("Anatomy of a Fall") nor Fantasia Barrino ("The Color Purple") scored individual nominations.

Along with Gladstone and Stone, the nominees for best female actor are Carey Mulligan ("Maestro") and Annette Bening ("Nyad"). Bening's co-star, Jodie Foster, joined the supporting female actor category which

Expert stresses overall health amid rise of obesity-fighting drugs

Don't make weight loss the only goal, warns expert

If the buzz surrounding a medication could elevate it to celebrity status, then Zepbound is reaching Taylor Swift rank.

Zepbound is the newest addition to the weight loss drug arena. In November 2023, it joined the list of obesity-fighting drugs - administered as an injection - to be approved by the US Food and Drug Administration.

The key to Zepbound's weight loss potential is its active ingredient, tirzepatide. This is the same active ingredient found in the drug Mounjaro, which is approved to treat Type 2 diabetes.

The relationship between Zepbound and Mounjaro is similar to two other popular drugs making headlines, Wegovy and Ozempic. Both Wegovy and Ozempic contain the active ingredient semaglutide, with Wegovy approved for the treatment of Type 2 diabetes and Ozempic approved for the treatment of obesity.

Tirzepatide and semaglutide both mimic the digestive hormone GLP-1, which is released by the intestines when we eat to stimulate insulin production and help regulate blood sugar. GLP-1 also suppresses appetite while promoting a sensation of fullness.

Weight loss medications are intended to be used in conjunction with lifestyle changes, such as exercise and a healthy diet. But too often, people view them as a silver bullet for weight loss. And the high price tag and variable insurance coverage for these popular weight loss drugs create a barrier for many people.

I am a registered dietitian and dietetics educator. Whether I am counseling patients, teaching students or working in my community to address food access challenges and healthy eating, I focus on overall well-being. I am passionate about helping people make informed and realistic health decisions based on their circumstances and helping them see opportunities to overcome the barriers they may encounter.

The potential impact of these drugs is staggering, since more than 2 in 5 American adults are obese, according to the National Institutes of Health

Obesity is not just an American issue, nor is it going away. The World Obesity Federation estimates that by 2030, 1 in 5 women and 1 in 7 men will be living with obesity worldwide.

Cancers

Many serious health conditions are associated with obesity, including heart disease, diabetes, high blood pressure, stroke, certain cancers and osteoarthritis. By treating obesity, a person can reduce or reverse obesity-related disease and improve both their health and quality of life.

However, long-term weight management depends on a number of complex factors. Meal timing and types of foods eaten can affect energy levels, satisfaction and hunger levels. A person's typical schedule, culture and preferences, activity level and health history must be taken into consideration as well. No single "best strategy" for weight management has been identified, and research indicates that strategies for weight loss and maintenance need to be individualized.

In addition, it is critical to note that research on the long-term effects of these newer weight loss drugs is limited. The available research has focused specifically on weight loss, heart health and metabolism and has found that ongoing use of these new medications is necessary to maintain improvements in weight and related health benefits.

Common side effects and the emotional toll experienced by those who regain weight once they stop taking the drugs are trade-offs that need to be considered. More research is needed to better understand the long-term impact of both direct and indirect health consequences of taking drugs for weight loss.

Throughout my years working as a registered dietitian, I have counseled numerous people about their weight loss goals. I often see a hy-

perfocus on weight loss, with much less attention being placed on the right nutrients to eat.

Societal standards and weight stigma in the health care setting can negatively affect patients' health and can lead them to obsess about the number on a scale rather than on the health outcome.

Weight loss may be necessary to reduce risks and promote health. But weight loss alone should not be the end goal: Rather, the focus should be on overall health. Tactics to reduce intake and suppress appetite require intention to ensure that the body receives the nutrients it needs to support health.

Additionally, I remind people that long-term results require attention to diet and lifestyle. When a person stops taking a medication, the condition it's meant to treat can often return. If you stop taking your high blood pressure pills without altering your diet and lifestyle, your blood pressure goes back up. The same effects can happen with medications used to treat cholesterol and obesity.

Despite the prevalence of obesity and the emergence of newer drugs to treat it, 95% of the world's population doesn't get enough of at least one nutrient. According to one study, nearly one-third of Americans have been found to be at risk of at least one nutrient deficiency. Additional research indicates that those actively trying to lose weight are more prone to nutrient deficiencies and inadequate intake.

For instance, a decline in iron intake can lead to iron deficiency anemia, which can cause fatigue as well as an increased risk of many conditions. Adequate intake of calcium and Vitamin D reduce the risk of bone fractures, yet many people get less than the recommended amounts of these nutrients.

Concerns

It is true that a healthy body weight is associated with reduced health risks and conditions. But if a person loses weight in a manner that does not provide their body with adequate nourishment, then they may develop new health concerns. For example, when a person follows a diet that severely restricts carbohydrates, such as the ketogenic diet, intake of many vitamins, minerals, phytochemicals - or biologically active compounds found in plants - and fiber are reduced. This can increase risk of nutrient deficiencies and impair the health of bacteria in our gut that are important for nutrient absorption and immune function.

Nutrition recommendations set by the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine and the Dietary Guidelines for Americans provide guidance and resources to help meet nutrient needs to promote health and prevent disease, regardless of the strategy used to lose weight.

There is no doubt that striving for a healthy body weight can reduce certain health risks and prevent chronic disease. Whether a person strives to maintain a healthy body weight through diet alone or with medications to treat obesity, the following tips can help optimize health while attempting to lose weight.

n Adopt an individualized approach to healthy behaviors that promote weight loss while considering personal preferences, environmental challenges, health conditions and nutrient needs.

n Focus on nutrient-dense foods to ensure the body is getting required nutrients for disease prevention and optimal function. If medications reduce your appetite, it is crucial to maximize the amount of nutrients in the foods you do consume.

n Include exercise in your program. Weight loss as a result of reduced calorie intake can decrease both fat and lean body mass, or muscle. An exercise routine that includes strength training will help improve muscle strength and preserve muscle during weight loss.

n Seek professional help. If you are uncertain about how to adopt an individualized approach while ensuring adequate intake of essential nutrients, talk to a registered dietitian. They can learn about your individual needs based on preferences, health conditions and goals to make dietary recommendations that support health. (AP)

WHO urges vigilance

Nearly 10,000 COVID-19 deaths last month amid holiday spread

GENEVA, Jan 11, (AP): The head of the UN health agency said Wednesday holiday gatherings and the spread of the most prominent variant globally led to increased transmission of COVID-19 last month.

Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said nearly 10,000 deaths were reported in December, while hospital admissions during the month jumped 42% in nearly 50 countries - mostly in Europe and the Americas - that shared such trend information.

"Although 10,000 deaths a month is far less than the peak of the pandemic, this level of preventable deaths is not acceptable," the World Health Organization director-general told reporters from its headquarters in Geneva.

He said it was "certain" that cases were on the rise in other places that haven't been reporting, calling on governments to keep up surveillance and provide continued access to treatments and vaccines.

Pathogens

Tedros said the JN.1 variant was now the most prominent in the world. It is an omicron variant, so current vaccines should still provide some protection.

Maria Van Kerkhove, technical lead at WHO for COVID-19, cited an increase in respiratory diseases across the globe due to the coronavirus but also flu, rhinovirus and pneumonia.

"We expect those trends to continue into January through the winter months in the northern hemisphere," she said, while noting increases in COVID-19 in the southern hemisphere - where it's now summer.

While bouts of coughs, sniffling, fever and fatigue in the winter are nothing new, Van Kerkhove said this year in particular, "we are seeing co-circulation of many different types of pathogens."

WHO officials recommend that people get vaccinated when possible,

wear masks, and make sure indoor areas are well ventilated.

"The vaccines may not stop you being infected, but the vaccines are certainly reducing significantly your chance of being hospitalized or dy-

ing," said Dr. Michael Ryan, head of emergencies at WHO.

LONDON, Jan 11: With the availability of vaccines against human papillomavirus (HPV) and the ability to remove abnormal cells before cancerous lesions develop, cervical cancer could become a disease of the past for future generations, says an expert from global health system Cleveland Clinic, speaking during the Cervical Cancer Awareness Month of January.

Cervical Cancer is the fourth-most common cancer among women worldwide and is caused mainly by persistent infection with high-risk types of HPV, according to the World Health Organization (WHO). In its recent publications, the WHO estimates there were 604,000 new cases and 342,000 deaths from cervical cancer in 2020.

"The good news is that cervical cancer is preventable, and also highly treatable, especially if caught early," says consultant gynaecological-oncology surgeon Owen Heath MBBS MRCOG PhD, who practises at Cleveland Clinic London.

According to Dr. Heath, a combination of HPV vaccines and regular screening are needed to eliminate cervical cancer.

"While studies in the UK and Australia have highlighted the effectiveness of HPV vaccine programs in reducing the incidence of cervical cancers and pre-

cancers, more research is needed," he says.

"Regular screenings remain vital as some people may elect not to have the vaccine, or in some countries the vaccine might not cover all of the high-risk HPV types. In extremely rare cases, a cervical cancer could develop that is not directly linked to HPV."

The vaccines are normally administered to school children and in adults up to the age of 45, after which the likelihood of developing cancer from HPV is lower, although regular cervical cancer screenings should continue.

Symptoms

Dr. Heath points out that the vaccines are not just for women, in addition to transmitting the disease, men are also at risk of other health issues caused by strains of the HPV such as head and neck cancers.

Dr.Heath says cervical cancer can develop slowly with precancerous cells becoming cancerous over a period of many years, so regular screening is important.

While guidelines vary from country to country, he recommends women visit a doctor to ask about the screening frequency needed based on their individual risk profile. According to Dr. Heath, women above the age 65 can discontinue screening if this has been previously normal, but since cervical cancer can develop at any age, it is important to see an expert if there are any gynaecological symptoms.

The most common screening test now combines HPV testing with a pap smear. A cervical sample is analysed for the presence of high-risk HPV subtypes, if high-risk HPV subtypes are detected the cells in the sample are then looked at for any abnormalities, Dr. Heath adds

If a high-risk form of HPV is found in a woman, she will need to be monitored carefully, typically through annual screening.

"In the majority of cases, the body's own immune system can clear the infection, but if it persists it can cause abnormalities in the cells of the cervix that left untreated can develop into a cervical cancer.

"If there is evidence of persistence of HPV infection or cytological abnormalities, a detailed examination of the cervix called a colposcopy should be undertaken.

"This is a quick and effective means to achieve a diagnosis. Treatment of pre-cancerous areas on the cervix can be undertaken at the same time, by removing or ablating these cells," says Dr. Heath

If a patient is diagnosed with cervical cancer, surgical removal of the cancerous tissue is very successful if the cancer is detected at an early stage, says Dr. Heath.

He adds that fertility-preserving procedures could be offered at this stage, for example, a trachelectomy, where the cervix is removed but the womb remains. Later-stage cancers are treated with the combination of radiation and chemotherapy.

Odermatt finally gets a first World Cup downhill win

WENGEN, Switzerland, Jan 11, in downhill and here at home," (AP): Marco Odermatt finally won a World Cup downhill Thursday in his 36th attempt, following eight previous second-place finishes.

The Swiss star, who has 29 World Cup wins in giant slalom and super-G, was close to flawless in ideal racing conditions on his home nation's signature downhill track to be 0.58 seconds faster than Cyprien Sarrazin. Aleksander Aamodt Kilde was third, trailing 0.81 behind his long-time

"It's a dream, finally, my first win

Odermatt told Swiss broadcaster RTS. "I was very motivated for today. I skied with lots of risk.'

SKIING

Odermatt took gold in downhill at the world championships last season yet had eight runner-up results including twice at Wengen - without a win in the marquee discipline on the World Cup circuit.

His 30th career World Cup race

win, and his sixth this season, followed 18 in giant slalom and 11 in super-G. He also won Olympic gold in giant slalom in in Beijing in 2022.

The result was unofficial as lowerranked racers prepared to start after foggy clouds rolled across the storied Lauberhorn hill.

Odermatt was set to earn 100 World Cup points which would extend the two-time defending overall champion's lead in the standings to 372 points ahead of Marco Schwarz, whose season was ended

by a crash in downhill last month at Bormio, Italy. Kilde, the 2020 overall champion, is third.

The top three placings Thursday mirrored the season-long downhill standings, which Kilde won for the past two seasons.

The extra downhill race beneath the Eiger and Jungfrau mountains at Wengen replaced a race canceled because of poor weather last month at Beaver Creek, Colorado.

It used a shortened 2.95-kilometer (1.83-mile) course starting just above the signature Hundschopf jump that launched racers up to 40 meters (45 yards) through the air.

The top-ranked racers went down in sunshine and temperatures of about minus-4 C (25 F) with clear blue skies above the clouds at a finish-area altitude of about 1,300 meters (4.250 feet).

Odermatt excelled by being fast through the tricky S-shaped bends midway through the course where racer speeds dip to about 70 kph (44

Odermatt's top speed on the later Hanneggschuss straight was close

to 142 kph (89mph). Fifth-placed Dominik Paris topped 145 kph (90 mph) on the section where Johan Clarey set a World Cup speed record in 2013 of 161.9 kph (100.6

The extended four-race weekend at Wengen continues Friday with a super-G before the classic Lauberhorn downhill on Saturday that is the longest race on the World Cup circuit. The full distance of about 4.4 kilometers (2 ¾ miles) takes close to 2 ½ minutes to com-






Sané was sent off for pushing Austria's Philipp Mwene to the ground in a 2-0 friendly loss in November which ended a disappointing year for Germany. (AP)

Qatar gears up for Asian Cup kickoff

Excitement builds

DOHA, Jan 11, (Agencies): The upcoming AFC Asian Cup 2023 is set to commence in Doha, Qatar, on Friday, January 12, featuring the participation of 24 Asian teams. Divided into six groups, the tournament will see the top two teams from each group, along with the four bestranked third-placed teams, advancing to the knockout

Taking place across nine stadiums, including Lusail Stadium, Ahmad Bin Ali Stadium, Al Bayt Stadium, Al Janoub Stadium, Education City Stadium, Khalifa Interna-

tional Stadium, and Al Thumama Stadium, the opening match will see hosts Qatar facing Lebanon at Lusail Stadium in Lusail City.

The groupings are as follows: Group A - Qatar, Lebanon, China, and Tajikistan; Group B - Australia, Uzbekistan, Syria, and India; Group C - Iran, UAE, Hong Kong, and Palestine; Group D - Japan, Indonesia, Iraq, and Vietnam; Group E - South Korea, Malaysia, Jordan, and Bahrain; and Group F - Saudi Arabia, Thailand, Kyrgyzstan, and Oman.

The group stage will run until January 25, followed by the round of 16 starting on January 28 and concluding on January 31. The quarterfinals are scheduled for February 1 and 2, with the semifinals taking place on February 6 and 7. The tournament will culminate with the final at Lusail on February 11.

The financial strength and spending of Saudi Arabia, United Arab Emirates and Qatar has changed the soccer landscape in Asia but long-time eastern powerhouses Japan and South Korea are determined to redress the continental balance on field.

Japan, Asia's top team in FIFA's global rankings, has won its last 10 games and is favorite to clinch the Asian title for a fifth time.

Three-time winner Saudi Arabia has European Championship winning coach Roberto Mancini at the helm.

And there's more pressure than usual on the 'Green Falcons' this tournament because of the heightened attention on the Saudi domestic club scene since the signings of Cristiano Ronaldo, Neymar and Karim Benzema.

The imported stars have helped the development of national team players for Saudi. For the likes of Japan and South Korea, being able to recall players from big European clubs is an advantage in continental championships, and it helps breed confidence.

"I've been saying we'll look to win the Asian Cup after setting our shortand mid-term targets, as well as the longterm target that is the 2026 World Cup, Japan coach Hajime Moriyasu said.

Moriyasu was in charge when Japan lost the final of the 2019 tournament against Qatar which stepped in to stage this edition after China relinquished hosting duties in 2022.

"There are no easy opponents nor is it an easy tournament, so no changes there from the last to this one," he added. "The difference is I have lingering frustration from missing the title last

South Korea and Tottenham captain Son Heung-min arrives in Qatar in great form, scoring 12 goals so far this English Premier League season, just two more than compatriot Hwang Hee-chan at Wolverhampton Wanderers. Bayern Munich's Kim Min-jae became the first Asian defender to be nominated for the FIFA Ballon D'Or

'A back-and-forth match'

Real outlast Atletico to reach Super Cup final

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia, Jan 11 (AP): ders and a milestone by Antoine Griezmann, Real Madrid outlasted Atletico Madrid in thrilling extra time victory in the semifinal of Spanish Super Cup in Saudi Arabia on Wednesday.

Two late goals gave Madrid a 5-3 win over its rival in a match in which Griezmann surpassed Luis Aragonés as Atletico's all-time top scorer with

"It was a back-and-forth match," Madrid coach Carlo Ancelotti said. "They did well in the first half and in the second we were able to improve. Both teams played very well. It was a spectacular match, we won because we had a bit more energy in the end."

Atletico took the lead with a header by Mario Hermoso after a cross by Griezmann six minutes into the match, but Madrid went ahead with Antonio Rüdiger scoring in the 20th and Ferland Mendy in the 29th.

Griezmann scored his milestone goal with a right-footed low shot from outside the area after using a nifty move to change directions and get past defenders in the 37th. The France

forward had gone scoreless in three straight games since tying Aragonés with a pair of goals against Getafe in the Spanish league in December.

An own-goal by Rüdiger in the 78th put Atletico ahead again before Dani Carvajal equalized in the 85th to send the game into extra time. Rüdiger's own-goal came after a mistake by Madrid goalkeeper Kepa Arrizabalaga while going for a ball crossed into the area. Kepa couldn't hold on to the ball and it ricocheted off Rüdiger and went backward into the net.

Madrid took the lead late in extra time after Atletico defender Stefan Savic found his own net while trying to intercept a cross by Carvajal in the 116th, and Brahim Díaz sealed Madrid's win in stoppage time by hitting the open net after Atletico goalkeeper Jan Oblak had left his area to try to help the attack the other way. Díaz sped past Oblak near midfield to get to the ball and send it into the open net.

Díaz was shown the game's only yellow card for taking his shirt off during the celebration. No Madrid derby has gone without a yellow card since 1974.

It was the first of three matches in

less than a month between the Madrid rivals. They will also meet in the Copa del Rey next week at Atletico's Metropolitano Stadium, and in the Spanish league in February at Madrid's Santiago Bernabeu Stadium.

Madrid had won its last five games in all competitions and is enjoying an unbeaten run of 20 consecutive matches. The team's only loss this season came against Atletico in the Spanish league in September.

Diego Simeone's team went on a strong run after that home win against Madrid, advancing to the knockout round of the Champions League and getting near the top of the Spanish league, but it has won only two of its last six matches in all competitions and dropped out of the Champions League places in the Spanish league.

Atletico and Madrid also met in the 2020 Super Cup final, with Madrid winning on penalties in what marked the first time the competition was taken to Saudi Arabia in a lucrative multiyear deal for the clubs and the Spanish soccer federation.

It was a mostly quiet crowd during Wednesday match, and there seemed to be jeers during the moment of silence in honor of German great Franz Beckenbauer, who died this week.

Madrid midfielder Toni Kroos, who has criticized the decision by top players to play in Saudi Arabia, also was booed by the Saudi crowd.

The Super Cup's new "final four" format pits together the top two teams in the Spanish league last season and the last two Copa del Rey finalists.

Mbappé's future remains unclear

PARIS, Jan 11, (AP): What will do Kylian Mbappé when his contract with Paris Saint-Germain expires in June?

PSG would like to know, Real Madrid would like to know, and so would legions of fans at other big European clubs dreaming of seeing the France striker play in their colors. But Mbappé remains tight-lipped as the saga surrounding his possible transfer contin-ues and PSG pushes to keep hold of its star asset.

"He's made it very clear that he has an agreement with me,' PSG president Nasser Al-Khelaïfi told L'Equipe newspaper this week, without being more specific on the nature of the deal.

"We have a great relationship, he's the best player in the world. I'm not going to hide the fact that I want to keep him," Al-Khelaïfi said. "I'm confident because the best place for him is Paris, as a French player, as captain of the national team, vice-captain of PSG, having been there for seven years. He has the ambition to do great things with Paris.'

Details of the supposed deal reached between Mbappé and PSG have not been revealed. According to reports in French media, Mbappé agreed to forgo several financial bonuses if he joins another club, meaning he won't leave PSG for free.

Mbappé has been in a similar position before, making PSG wait until the end of his then-contract before signing a new one in May 2022 when Madrid was aggressively pursuing him.

He has said he doesn't know when he will be ready to announce his decision this time.

Asked whether Mbappé has explained why it takes him so long to make a decision, Al-Khelaïfi brushed off concerns.

"We're calm. I have 200% confidence in him. He's a good lad. He gave me his word and he's a man of his word. I believe in him," the PSG president said. "I can only say that I'm not stressed. Financially and about Kylian."
