PM stresses citizen welfare in gov't-parliament cooperation

Ten candidates enter fray on eighth day

KUWAIT CITY, March 11: Ten citizens (all men) on Monday filed their candidacy for the upcoming parliamentary election.

The total number of candidates has reached 204 including six women. The 10 candidates who registered on the eighth day are as follows:

Second Constituency: two (Marzouq Ali Al- Ghanim and Mishal Saleh Al-Merri) Fourth Constituency: five (Khalifa Mohammad Al-Khalifa, Abdulaziz Saleh Abbas,

Fawaz Thamer Al-Mutairi, Hadi Malouh Al-Majedi and Yaqoub Mohammad Jawhar. Fifth Constituency: three (Ahmed Mohammad, Abdulmuhsen Ali Akbar and Mohammad

Abdulamir Husain) In a press statement after filing his candidacy, former MP and National Assembly Speaker

Marzouq Ali Al-Ghanim said the corrupt parties mislead the public by hurling false accusa-

tions at others. He neither confirmed nor denied the speculation that he will run for the speakership, indicating every MP has the right to stand for such election.

Asked to comment on the adjournment of parliamentary sessions because of the absence of the government, Al-Ghanim clarified that he adopted this procedure as he believes it is in line with the Constitution and the National Assembly Law. He added this procedure was adopted by all the successive speakers and deputy speakers. He made clear that it is his honor to serve the people whether as a lawmaker or speaker.

Fourth Constituency candidate Dr Fawaz Al Jadee disclosed that he followed up the programs and ideas of other candidates, but they did not tackle the real concerns of the citizens. His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Dr. Mohammad Sabah Al-Salem Al-Sabah said Sunday the efforts to improve the citizens' standards of living must be given precedence in the cooperation between government and the coming National Assembly (parliament).

Hunger worsening in Gaza ... cease-fire talks at standstill Saudi King expresses sorrow for Palestinian plight in Ramadan

RIYADH, March 11, (Agencies): "As we witness the arrival of Ramadan this year, our hearts are heavy with sorrow for the ongoing suffering of our Palestinian brothers facing relentless aggression," Saudi Arabia King Salman bin Abdulziz Al-Saud said Sunday.

Marking the occasion of the advent of the holy month of Ramadan, King Salman made the remarks, conveyed by Minister of Media Salman bin Yousef Al-Dossary, to Saudi citizens, residents of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, and Muslims worldwide.

Quoted by Saudi Press agency (SPA), King Salman added, "we call upon the international community to uphold its responsibilities to put an end to these heinous crimes and ensure the establishment of safe humanitarian and relief corridors.'

In his speech, King Salman said they "extend our congratulations on the arrival of the month of Ramadan, expressing gratitude to Allah for its blessed advent.

"We supplicate Allah the Almighty, by His grace and generosity, to accept us among those who fast and perform the night prayers, with faith and seeking His reward," King Salman added.

dan on Monday as the Muslim holy month arrived with cease-fire talks at a standstill, hunger worsening across the Gaza Strip and no end in sight to the five-month-old war between Israel and Hamas.

Prayers were held outside amid the rubble of demolished buildings late Sunday. Some people hung fairy lights and decorations in packed tent camps, and a video from a U.N.-school-turned-shelter showed children dancing and spraying foam as a man sang into a loudspeaker.

But there was little to celebrate after five months of war that has killed over 30,000 Palestinians and left much of Gaza in ruins. Families would ordinarily break the daily fast with holiday feasts, but even where food is available, there is little beyond canned goods and the prices are too high for many.

'You don't see anyone with joy in their eyes," said Sabah al-Hendi, who was shopping for food on Sunday in the southernmost city of Rafah. "Every family is sad. Every family has a martyr."

Cash withdrawals still a trend despite digital payment push

KUWAIT CITY, March 11: curb money laundering. Howev-Despite the surge in digital payments and the government's efforts to promote electronic transactions, cash withdrawals remain significant in Kuwait, raising questions about the reasons behind this trend. While online and point-of-sale payments have increased, ATM withdrawals still constitute a substantial portion of total transactions, reports Al-Rai daily.

During 2023, financial pay-ment withdrawals reached ap-proximately 45.795 billion dinars, marking an 8.5% growth compared to 2022. Despite a slight decrease in ATM withdrawals, they accounted for about 23.5% of total transactions, totaling 10.722 billion dinars. Point-of-sale transactions reached 17.519 billion dinars, while website payments saw a significant jump to 17.553 billion dinars.

Government efforts to reduce cash transactions, such as halting cash payments for real estate transactions and pharmacy purchases over 10 dinars, aim to er, factors like rising household spending due to inflation and a significant portion of the workforce without bank accounts contribute to the persistence of cash transactions.

Additionally, the black market plays a significant role in cash withdrawals, particularly in money transfers and illicit activities like drug trafficking. Despite regulatory measures to combat money laundering, some individuals prefer cash transactions to avoid scrutiny.

While Kuwait excels in financial digitization compared to other Gulf countries, reducing cash transactions remains challenging. Globally, digital payments are expected to reach \$11.95 trillion by 2025, indicating a global shift away from cash.

While countries like Sweden have successfully reduced cash usage, Kuwait continues to grapple with the persistence of cash transactions, highlighting the need for further efforts to promote electronic payments.

With the advent of the holy month, the country's mosques fully prepared for the month of faith; hence, spiritual atmosphere prevailed in more than 1,800 mosques in various governorates. These mosques were decorated and prepared to receive crowds of worshipers for Tarawih and other prayers during the holy month, which is characterized by a spiritual atmosphere and reverence of faith.

Ministry of Endowments, which began early. The preparations and activities to welcome the holy month included a number of measures aimed at providing all means of comfort and safety for visitors of the Houses of Allah of all groups and ages.

The mosques were maintained inside and out, in addition to daily cleaning of bathrooms, ablutions and audio equipment, implementing safety measures for worshipers, ensuring all safety conditions are met, and addressing all complaints received last year to prevent their recurrence this year. No mosque was opened whose maintenance had not been completed in order to guarantee the safety of worshipers.

The women's prayer halls and outdoor courtvards are fully equipped, in addition to the presence of regular maintenance teams 24 hours a day.

With regard to controlling the collection of donations and beggars during the holy month; the ministry, in cooperation with other concerned authorities, adopted a mechanism aimed at regulating donations, as well as preventing begging, sympathizing with beggars, sleeping in the mosques during prayer times. There is also a mechanism for protecting the cars of worshipers and regulating traffic movement around the mosques where there are many worshippers.

The ministry arranged various activities including advocacy programs and cultural activities in mosques; such as fatwa councils, public lectures, scientific courses, Sharia lessons, thoughts on faith, and broadcasting faith programs on its websites and other means of communication.

With regard to the arrangements for Iftar, the ministry prepared Iftar banquets outside the mosques this year, while Ramadan centers were allocated in each governorate according to their needs. It organized Ramadan retreats, focusing on instilling national values and rejecting sedition and drugs.

Moreover, emergency centers were allocated to receive complaints and suggestions from worshipers through WhatsApp or the hotline throughout the day, and resolve them immediately. Qur'ans, chairs, water, incense, juice, dates and many other needs of worshippers have been provided.

'Positive response expected on visas' 'Pakistan, Kuwait relations on upturn'

KUWAIT CITY, March 11: The Ambassador of Pakistan to Kuwait Malik Muhammad Farooq says the relationship between Kuwait and Pakistan is distinguished, and is witnessing a new phase under the leadership of the two countries

In a press statement issued on the sidelines of a dinner party he held in honor of Pakistani Quran reciter Syed Sadaqat Ali, the ambassador affirmed that there will be fruitful cooperation in the future in a number of sectors.

He said, "We held discussions with the Kuwait Investment Authority to expand its investments in our country. We welcome the

private sector, as Pakistan is a Malik Farooq large and promising market".

The ambassador highlighted the importance of cooperation with Kuwait in the field of food security, considering it a very important sector.

He stressed that there are a number of companies interested in this aspect, in addition to interest in other sectors such as renewable energy. Ambassador Farooq referred to the visit of the Prime

Minister of Pakistan to Kuwait, which resulted in the signing of seven agreements in a number of fields, most of which are related to food security and the provision of agricultural materials, as well as in the field of electricity and solar energy

He indicated that his country has established a special council for investment promotion and provision of facilities to investors, adding that his country seeks to enhance investments in five areas, including food security, energy, and information technology.

Concerning the visa problems and the continued placement of Pakistan on the blacklist even after visas were opened to other nationalities, Ambassador Farooq said, "We aspire to support and promote Pakistan as a country friendly to Kuwait. We are talking with the Kuwaiti side in this regard. We believe that His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishaal Al-Ahmad is a great supporter and encourager of our country. I am sure you will notice positive changes in the near future."

He went on to say, "We have an elected government in which two major parties with sufficient experience participate, especially in the economic field. It is focusing on reforming the economy in the current stage, attracting investments, and providing facilities to investors. It also seeks to provide security and a wise policy for the investor.'

Regarding the export of Pakistani meat to Kuwait, the ambassador said, "We had good discussions with the livestock company in this regard, and they are also interested in live animals. However, this matter is subject to special measures and conditions. From our discussions with the company, we noticed their interest in supplying live livestock, especially since we are a Muslim country. Perhaps we will witness the presence of live Pakistani livestock in Kuwait during the blessed Eid Al-Adha."

With regard to military relations, the Pakistani ambassador said, "After signing the defense cooperation agreements between the two countries, things began to move very well".

Referring to visits to military and defense committees from both sides, he indicated that cooperation is based on the training aspect and providing the Kuwaiti army with official uniforms, adding that his country's army is characterized by high professionalism.

Ambassador Farooq revealed an offer his country made to Kuwait to acquire Pakistani "GF Thunder" fighters, which are good fighter jets.

He highlighted the mega deal concluded between Pakistan and Iraq recently in this field, as well as its acquisition by some Gulf countries such as the United Arab Emirates and Qatar, in addition to African countries and some countries from East Asia.

Meanwhile, the Pakistani Quran reciter Syed Sadaqat Ali expressed his happiness for his visit to Kuwait.

In a statement to reporters during the dinner party held by the Pakistan Embassy in his honor, he said he personally supervised the training of thousands of learners in the field of reciting the Quran, revealing that he currently runs centers specialized in the Qur'an and its sciences in a number of countries around the world.

Ali explained that he was born in 1950, and visited Kuwait for the first time in 1965. He worked here as a teacher and visited it several times later. He has been associated with the Qur'an since his childhood, and began memorizing it from the age of ten. He had participated in many international forums and competitions in which he obtained first place.

8 Arab nations start Ramadan

The moon-sighting authorities in the Saudi Arabia, Qatar, Iraq, Egypt, Syria, Lebanon and Palestine confirmed seeing the crescent moon of the holy month of Ramadan of the Hijri year 1445 on Sunday evening, thus starting fasting as of tomorrow (Monday)

30 charities collecting donations in Ramadan

KUWAIT CITY, March 11: Assistant Undersecretary for the Social Development Sector in the Ministry of Social Affairs Dr Khaled Al-Ajmi revealed that 30 charitable organizations are contributing to the fundraising project during the month of Ramadan, reports Al-Anba daily.

Regarding the approved mechanisms, Al-Ajmi revealed that donations are collected through electronic collection devices (K-Net and L-Net), in the headquarters of charitable organizations, or through bank deductions. He said seven teams in the governorates and a social media monitoring team are closely following up the fundraising program.

He added there are special Iftar forms for those who are fasting and food basket projects that are filled on the website for charitable work, specifying the day and location in which the Iftar will be held or the food baskets will be distributed; with the immediate approval of the Charitable Societies and Foundations Department.

He stressed that monitoring and follow-up are carried out electronically, as violations are entered directly through the website for charitable work and carried out through the special application on the website. About the outcome of charitable work, Al-Ajmi indicated that the organization must submit weekly reports on the outcome of its work; while the teams will submit their comments directly through the application or call the attention of participating charities.

"The primary challenge lies not with women or the government but with a narrow-minded religious authority that espouses unilateral interpretations. These closed-minded individuals refuse to acknowledge alternative viewpoints, hindering progress and the flourishing of diverse opinions.

"Women's involvement in politics is essential for societal progress, as it encompasses various aspects of life, including political, social, and economic affairs. Restricting women to domestic roles is unjustified, considering their capabilities and contributions to various fields.

"Despite some timid recognition by the government, women's potential remains largely untapped, with token appointments to certain ministries that are traditionally associated with femininity. The government should actively seek to include highly educated and accomplished women in positions of authority

"Voters must prioritize competence over gender, ethnicity, or sectarian affiliations when selecting candidates. Kuwait still lags behind in many areas, and limiting women based on outdated prejudices only hampers progress for the entire nation, not just women. "Having a female representative in Abdullah Al-Salem Hall adds a valuable political and social dynamic, helping to ease tensions and mitigate conflicts during sessions.

MoJ real estate auctions yield 7.8% hike: report

KUWAIT CITY, March 11: Throughout February, the Ministry of Justice conducted a series of real estate auctions resulting in the sale of 10 residential properties, two investment properties, and an apartment, fetching a total of 9.26 million dinars, reports Al-Jarida daily.

This marked a 7.8 percent increase from the initial value of 8.59 million dinars.

The residential properties sold during the auctions totaled 7.19 million dinars, reflecting an 8.9 percent increase compared to the initial value of 6.60 million dinars.

Notable sales included a house in the Mansouriya area, spanning 750 square meters, which sold for 1.05 million dinars, marking a 17.9 percent increase from the initial price of 890 thousand dinars.

Additionally, a house in the Al-Mangaf area, covering 400 square meters, fetched 495 thousand dinars, a 12.5 percent increase from the initial price of 440 thousand dinars.

Similarly, a house in the Jaber Al Ali area, with an area of 400 square meters, was sold for 294 thousand dinars, marking an 8.8 percent increase from the initial price of 270 thousand dinars. Another significant sale was a house in the Rawda area, sold for 1.01 million dinars, a 6.8 percent increase from the initial price of 750 thousand dinars.

Radical maintenance of roads on cards

KUWAIT CITY, March 11: The Ministry of Public Works has unveiled its plan to offer a package of contracts and tenders for the radical maintenance of roads in various governorates to local, Gulf and foreign companies; indicating the specified period for implementing the contracts is within 1,095 days, reports Al-Qabas daily.

The ministry enumerated the works covered by these contracts as follows:

1. General maintenance of roads and squares, small construction works, emergency and urgent works, miscellaneous works, small supplementary works for asphalt or tiles, etc.

2. General maintenance work and the construction of pressure and gravity lines and their accessories in the sanitary sewage network. This includes cleaning, photography, opening of seals, replacing damaged lines or creating new lines, in addition to connecting government buildings or residential plots to sanitary sewers, as well as emergency and urgent works in various locations.

3. Maintenance, replacement, and reconstruction of sewers, cleaning inside and outside the sewers, and constructing rainwater sewer lines. 4. Maintenance, supply and installation of

road and traffic signs of all types and shapes. It includes maintenance, supply and installation of safety barriers and road side grilles.

5. Maintenance and planning for paving surface of roads and parking lots, and placing prominent, reflective ground traffic signs on the asphalt for all types and shapes of roads. It includes installing plastic poles and reflective signs on barriers.

6. Radical maintenance work for agricultural areas and their branches and annexes.

7. Maintenance work on all external and border roads in the southern part of the country.

The ministry added these contracts include the maintenance of Salmi Road; with the aim of developing highway infrastructure and safety systems, asphalt maintenance for highways, and repairing potholes and bridge expansion joints.

"Renowned international relations expert Khattar Abu Diab has aptly described Kuwait as the "diplomatic dean of the Arabs," highlighting its role as a cautious mediator seeking to foster reasoned dialogue. Kuwait's mediation efforts, spanning conflicts between Egypt and Saudi Arabia in Yemen, South Yemen and Oman, and Pakistan and Bangladesh in the 1970s, underscore the efficacy of its neutral stance in diplomacy.



The United States, Qatar and Egypt had hoped to broker a cease-fire ahead of the normally joyous month of dawn-todusk fasting that would include the release of dozens of Israeli hostages and Palestinian prisoners, and the entry of a large amount of humanitarian aid, but the talks stalled last week.

Hamas is demanding guarantees that any such agreement will lead to an end to the war, while Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has vowed to continue the offensive until "total victory" against the militant group and the release of all the remaining hostages.

The war began when Hamas-led militants stormed into southern Israel on Oct. 7, killing some 1,200 people, mostly civilians, and taking around 250 hostage. Hamas is still believed to be holding around 100 captives and the remains of 30 others following an exchange last year.

The war has driven around 80% of Gaza's population of 2.3 million people from their homes and pushed hundreds of thousands to the brink of famine. Health officials say at least 20 people, mostly children, have died from malnutrition and dehvdration in northern Gaza.

Israeli forces have largely sealed off the north since October, and aid groups say Israeli restrictions, ongoing hostilities and the breakdown of law and order have made it nearly impossible to safely deliver desperately needed food in much of the territory. Israel has meanwhile vowed to expand its offensive to the southern city of Rafah, where half of Gaza's population has sought refuge, without saying where civilians would go to escape the onslaught. President Joe Biden has said an attack on Rafah would be a "red line" for him, but that the United States would continue to provide military aid to Israel.

Pharmacists' concerns grow as licensing decision nears expiry

'Planned open sit-in unlikely to occur'

KUWAIT CITY, March 11: Reports have been circulating about a group of pharmacists planning an open sit-in at the Ministry of Health headquarters in the coming days to protest the ongoing decision regarding the timing of granting licenses to private pharmacies. However, health sources have indicated that the sit-in is unlikely to occur due to the imminent expiry of the decision's term. They explained that the

decision of the Minister of Health Dr. Ahmad Al-Awadhi to stop granting licenses to private pharmacies was issued at the beginning of January. More than two months have passed, which means the time period for its implementation will end in 20 days, as the duration of the decision is only three months.

The decision included new licenses only, as there were reports that the minister had approved the renewal of licenses for existing private pharmacies during the last period. This means the existing private pharmacies can continue and

On the other hand, a number of pharmacists expressed their concern about the possibility of the decision being extended before it expires at the end of

They stressed that the recent health decisions were taken into consideration, and need further scrutiny and review.

The pharmacists stressed

suspend licenses, as well as the decision issued earlier to close some private pharmacies, had negatively harmed the interests of citizens and pharmaceutical services as a whole, and cost the state budget exorbitant amounts of money in compensation cases.

Kate's photo retracted Center right 'wins' in Portuguese elections

MADRID, March 11, (Agencies): Portuguese center right party, the Democratic Alliance, won legislative elections by thin margin against the left-leaning Socialist Party. Chief of Socialist Party Pedro Nuno Santos conceded defeat saying that his party will now lead the opposition.

The national TV reported this after 99 percent of the votes were accounted for last Sunday night.

The Democratic Alliance, led by Luis Montenegro, got 29.5 percent of the votes, taking up 79 seats in the 230-seat Parliament, while Santos' Socialist Party won 28.7 percent of the vote, taking 77 seats.

'Image appeared manipulated': The first official photo of Kate, the Princess of Wales, since her abdominal surgery nearly two months ago was issued Sunday after weeks of speculation about her whereabouts

But The Associated Press and other news agencies later retracted it from publication because it appeared to have been manipulated, fueling more conjecture.

The photo of Kate in a chair surrounded by her three children was credited to her husband, William, Prince of Wales and heir to the throne, and was said to have been taken earlier in the week in Windsor.

"Thank you for your kind wishes and continued support over the last two months," Kate said on social media. "Wishing everyone a Happy Mother's Day.

AP initially published the photo, which was issued by Kensington Palace. While there was no suggestion the photo was fake, AP retracted it because closer inspection revealed the source had manipulated the image in a way that did not meet AP's photo standards. For instance, the photo shows an inconsistency in the alignment of Princess Charlotte's left hand.

The Kensington Palace media office is not open on weekends and a voicemail left for a spokesperson was not immediately returned.

The release of the photo followed weeks of gossip on social media about what had happened to Kate since she left a hospital Jan. 29 after a nearly twoweek stay following planned surgery. She hadn't been seen publicly since Christmas Day.

The royal family has been under more scrutiny than usual in recent weeks, because both Kate and King Charles III can't carry out their usual public duties due to health problems

WASHINGTON, March 11, (AP): Jack Lobel is a college sophomore who will be voting in his first presidential election this fall, casting a ballot for Joe Biden.

At 19, he's six-plus decades Biden's junior, which isn't lost on him. But Lobel is spokesperson for Voters of Tomorrow, one of 15 youth organizations that announced Monday that they are jointly endorsing the reelection of the oldest president in US history - defying polls consistently showing voter concerns about the 81-year-old Biden's age.

"If age were really a concern we would not see this much energy around these groups," said Lobel, an urban studies major in New York. As he worked on hammering out the joint endorsement this week he was also writing a paper for his American urban politics class and taking a midterm in his voting and political behavior class.

The crash early Saturday wasn't considered terrorism-related and no one was injured, the Metropolitan Police force said.

The driver was arrested by armed officers and held under the Mental Health Act after being taken to a hospital. He has since been released on bail.

Metal fencing was placed in front of the entrance to the palace and the gates were boarded up Sunday as tourists strolled past in the rain.

Police said they were investigating the circumstances of the crash.

34 bodies removed from funeral home: Nearly three dozen bodies were removed from a funeral home in northern England, and a man and woman were arrested Sunday on suspicion of fraud and preventing a lawful burial, police said.

Humberside Police announced the developments after five days of investigation at three branches of Legacy Funeral Directors in Hull and East Yorkshire.

Assistant Chief Constable Thom McLoughlin said 34 bodies had been taken to a mortuary in Hull for identification.

A 46-year-old man and 23-year-old woman, whose identifies weren't disclosed by authorities, were arrested on suspicion of preventing a lawful and decent burial, fraud by false representation and fraud by abuse of position.

No other details were available about the nature of the suspected crimes.

In the US there have been several sensational cases of funeral home operators being arrested after dozens of bodies and cremated remains were found on their properties.

5 cross-country skiers found dead: Five crosscountry skiers have been found dead after going missing over the weekend near Switzerland's famed Matterhorn, Swiss police said Monday.

Rescue authorities announced a search in difficult weather conditions Sunday for six skiers missing. The group set off Saturday on a route between the resort town of Zermatt, at the foot of the Matterhorn, and the village of Arolla, near the border with Italy.

A crew of three rescuers and a mountain police team deployed near the Dent Blanche, or White Tooth, cabin found the bodies of five of the skiers.

A search was continuing for the sixth person. The nationalities or other identity details of the victims were not immediately indicated.

Irish prime minister concedes defeat: Irish Prime Minister Leo Varadkar conceded defeat Saturday as two constitutional amendments he supported that would have broadened the definition of family and removed language about a woman's role at home were headed toward rejection in early vote tallies.

Varadkar, who pushed the vote to enshrine gender equality in the constitution by removing "very old-fashioned language" and trying to recognize the realities of modern family life, said it was clear the amendments were "defeated comprehensively on a respectable turnout.

"It was our responsibility to convince the majority of people to vote 'yes' and we clearly failed to do so, Varadkar said.

5 dead in 'murder-suicide': Honolulu police said Sunday they were investigating what appears to be the murder-suicide of a family, including three children, at a Manoa home Police first arrived at the home at 8:30 am

but left after no one answered the door. Lt Deena Thoemmes said during a news conference Sunday afternoon. She explained the initial call was from an anonymous person and police had no cause to enter the home.

Officers returned at 9:15 am after receiving another call and were able to speak with a caller. Upon entering the residence, they found four people who had been fatally stabbed and appeared to be a wife and three children aged 10, 12 and 17. The husband also was found dead.

A preliminary investigation showed the husband fatally stabbed his wife and children, Thoemmes said. She added the husband's cause of death was under investigation when asked whether he stabbed himself.

The ages of the adults was not immediately known. The medical examiner's office will release the identifications of the deceased.

There was no history of domestic calls to the residence and police did not have a motive for the killings, Thoemmes said.

Witnesses reported there had been an argument in the home early Sunday morning, police said. (AP)

Arkansas shooting kills 3: Three people were killed and several others injured early Sunday when a shooting broke out at a private party in Arkansas, police said. Officers found multiple gunshot victims

when they arrived at the scene near Jonesboro's downtown area around 5 am. Jonesboro police said in a Facebook post.

A man and woman, who police said were acquaintances of the shooter, were killed, police said. They added that the shooter also died. Another woman, who was also an acquaintance of the shooter, was injured.

Three other people who had no relationship to the shooter were injured. A fifth person was also taken to the hospital with injuries sustained in the shooting, police said Sunday afternoon.

Suspect dies in shootout: A suspect in a weekend shooting that killed two people and injured another at a North Carolina home died in a shootout with deputies hours afterward outside another house, a sheriff said Sunday. In a social media post, Iredell County Sheriff Darren Campbell said that Justin Michael Strawser was wearing a bulletproof vest and firing at deputies when he was killed in the shootout Saturday outside a home in Mooresville. The deputies and four minor children inside the home with Strawser weren't hurt, he added.

Deputies had responded to a call about shots fired at a different Mooresville home, where they discovered two dead people inside the house and someone critically injured on the back porch. All three were found restrained and bound, and the third was taken to the hospital with life-threatening injuries, the sheriff said. (AP)

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti, March 11, (AP): Haiti's prime minister Ariel Henry was last seen in Puerto prime minister **Ariel Henry** was last seen in Puerto Rico, negotiating his return to a homeland gripped by violence and controlled by heavily armed gangsters. With his fate in the air and the situation in Haiti dete-riorating by the day, the world has been left to wonder whether the country will fully descend into anarchy or whether some semblance of order will be restored. It's easy to blame this latest spasm of violence in the West's first free Black republic on longstanding poverty, the legacy of colonialism, widespread defor-estation, and European and US interference.

However, a series of experts told The Associated Press that the most important immediate cause is more recent: Haitian rulers' increasing dependence on street

United Nations and American interventions have come and gone. Without a solid tradition of honest political institutions, Haitian leaders have been using armed civilians as tools for exercising power.

Importation

After a US-backed UN force pushed out the coup's After a US-backed UN force pushed out the coup's leaders in 1994, a World Bank-sponsored structural adjustment led to the importation of rice from the US and devastated rural agricultural society, Deibert said. Boys without work flooded into Port-au-Prince and joined gangs. Politicians started using them as a cheap armed wing. Aristide a priest turned politician

cheap armed wing. Aristide, a priest-turned-politician, gained notoriety for using gangsters. In December 2001, police official Guy Philippe at-

tacked the National Palace in an attempted coup and Aristide called on the gangsters to rise from the slums, Deibert said.

"It wasn't the police defending their government's Palais Nacional," remembered Deibert, who was there. "It was thousands of armed civilians."

"Now, you have these different politicians that have been collaborating with these gangs for years, and ... it blew up in their face," he continued.

Many of the gangs retreated in the face of MINUS-TAH, a UN force established in 2004.

Rene Preval, the only democratically elected president to win and complete two terms in a country notorious for political upheaval, took a hard line on the gangs, giving them the choice to "disarm or be killed," said Robert Fatton, professor of government and foreign affairs at the University of Virginia.

China's congress ends with show of unity

BEIJING, March 11, (AP): China's national legislature wrapped up its annual session Monday with the usual show of near-unanimous support for plans designed to carry out ruling Communist Party leader Xi Jinping's vision for the nation.

Asia

The weeklong event, replete with meetings carefully scripted to allow no surprises, has highlighted how China's politics have become ever more calibrated to elevate Xi.

Monday's agenda lacked the usual closing news conference by the pre-mier, the party's No. 2 leader. The news conference has been held most years since 1988 and was the one time when journalists could directly ques-tion a top Chinese leader.

The decision to scrap it emphasizes Premier Li Qiang's relatively weak status. His predecessors played a much larger role in leading key economic policies such as modernizing state companies, coping with economic crises and leading housing reforms that transformed China into a nation of homeowners.

The nearly 3,000-member National People's Congress approved a revised State Council law that directs China's version of the cabinet to follow Xi's vision. The vote was 2,883 to eight, with nine abstentions. Other measures passed by similarly wide margins. The most nays were recorded for the annual report of the supreme court, which was approved by a 2,834 to 44 vote.

Along with following the guidance of Xi Jinping Thought and other party directives, developing "new qual-ity productive forces" - a term coined by Xi last September - emerged as a catchphrase at this year's congress.

The term suggests a prioritizing of science and technology as China confronts trade sanctions and curbs on access to advanced know-how in computer chips and other areas that the U.S. and other countries deem to be national security risks.

Dismissed

On the diplomatic front, China kept Wang Yi as foreign minister. He had stepped back into the post last summer after his successor, Qin Gang, was abruptly dismissed without explanation after a half-year on the job.

Analysts thought the Communist Party might use the annual congress provincial meetings were opened to the media for the first time since the COVID-19 pandemic, though they were carefully scripted with prepared remarks and none of the spontaneity once glimpsed in decades past.

The contrast with polarized politics in the US and robust debate in other democracies could not be more stark: China's political rituals, void of any overt dissent, put unity above all.

Marching orders endorsed by the congress include calls to ensure national security and social stability at a time when job losses and underpayment of wages have sparked a growing number of protests.

TOKYO: Japan on Monday marked 13 years since a massive earthquake and tsunami hit the country's northern coasts. Nearly 20,000 people died, whole towns were wiped out and the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power plant was destroyed, creating deep fears of radiation that linger today. As the nation observes the anniversary, AP explains what is happening now at the plant and in neighboring areas. A magnitude 9.0 earthquake struck on March 11, 2011, causing a tsunami that battered northern coastal towns in Iwate, Miyagi and Fukushima prefectures. The tsunami, which topped 15 meters (50 feet) in some areas, also slammed into the nuclear plant, destroying its power supply and fuel cooling systems, and causing meltdowns at reactors No. 1, 2 and 3. Hydrogen explosions caused massive radiation leaks and contamination in the area The operator, Tokyo Electric Power Company Holdings, says that the tsunami couldn't have been anticipated. Government and independent investigations and some court decisions have said the accident was the result of human error, safety negligence, lax oversight by regulators and collusion. Japan has since introduced stricter safety standards and at one point shifted to a nuclear energy phaseout. Prime Minister Fumio Kishida's government reversed that policy and has accelerated restarts of workable reactors to maintain nuclear power as a main source of Japan's power supply. A deadly Jan. 1 earthquake in Japan's northcentral region destroyed many homes and roads but didn't damage an idled nuclear power plant. Even so, it caused worry that current evacuation plans that solely focus on radiation leaks could be unworkable.

best easy on the gangs and at worst tied to them, he said.

"The autonomy of the gangs has reached a critical point. It is why they are capable now of imposing cer-tain conditions on the government itself," Fatton said.

"Those who created the gangs created a monster. And now the monster may not be totally in charge, but it has the capacity to block any kind of solution,' he said.

The gangs, along with many Haitian politicians and business people, earn money from an illicit brew of "taxes" gleaned through extortion, kidnappings, and drugs and weapons smuggling, Fatton said.

"There are all kinds criminal networks in the area," he said.

After Preval, gangs, politicians and business people extracted every dollar they could, said Francois Pierre-Louis, a professor of political science at Queens College at The City University of New York.

"It was open house for gangs, drugs, the country, basically ... became a narco-trafficking state," he said. "Basically, the gangs got empowered, and not only they got empowered, they had state protection, politicians protecting them."

Meanwhile, the U.S. military said Sunday that it had flown in forces to beef up security at the US Embassy in Haiti and allow nonessential personnel to leave.

The aircraft flew to the embassy compound, the U.S. Southern Command said, meaning that the effort involved helicopters. It was careful to point out that "no Haitians were on board the military aircraft." That seemed aimed at quashing any speculation that senior government officials might be leaving as the gang attacks in Haiti worsen.

MEXICO CITY: A student from a rural Mexican teachers' college where 43 youths disappeared in 2014 has died in a confrontation with police, officials said Fridav

Prosecutors in the southern state of Guerrero said the confrontation occurred late Thursday on a roadway near the Ayotzinapa teachers' college.

Sources at the college said the dead student, and another who was wounded, were attacked by police.

But state police said the students were armed and opened fire on officers after police tried to pull over the vehicle they were riding in because it was reported stolen. Prosecutors said drugs and a gun were found in the vehicle.

Federal officials said five buses and trucks apparently came from the teachers' college to protest after the confrontation, and the occupants set two state police patrol vehicles afire. Several of those protesters were arrested.

The under-funded radical rural teachers' colleges in Mexico have a decades-long tradition of violent protests and clashing with police.

When the 43 male students from the Ayotzinapa school were abducted in 2014, they had been hijacking passenger buses which they were going to use to travel to a protest.

9 dead after eating sea turtle: Eight children and an adult died after eating sea turtle meat on Pemba Island in the Zanzibar archipelago and 78 other people were hospitalized, authorities said Saturday.

Sea turtle meat is considered a delicacy by Zanzibar's people even though it periodically results in deaths from chelonitoxism, a type of food poisoning. The adult who died late Friday was the

mother of one of the children who succumbed earlier, said the Mkoani District medical officer, DrHaji Bakari. He said the

turtle meat was consumed Tuesday. Bakari told The Associated Press that laboratory tests had confirmed all the victims had eaten sea turtle meat.

Authorities in Zanzibar, which is a semiautonomous region of the East African nation of Tanzania, sent a disaster management team led by Hamza Hassan Juma, who urged people to avoid consuming sea turtles. In November 2021, seven people, includ-

ing a 3-year-old, died on Pemba after eating turtle meat while three others were hospitalized. (AP)

The report highlighted that escalating tensions in the Middle East, particularly military activities in the Red Sea and the Bab al-Mandab Strait, have also contributed to the boost in gold prices. This environment led many investors and speculators to seek refuge in the precious metal as a hedge against global trade risks.

Furthermore, gold futures contracts for April delivery witnessed a significant increase of 0.95 percent, reaching a new peak of \$2,185 per ounce. This coincided with the stabilization of the US dollar's exchange rate against major currencies and a decrease in 10-year Treasury bond yields to 4 percent.

gold prices surge to record high amid global economic uncertainty

The Federal Reserve's indication last week of an impending end to the era of financial tightening by June has further enhanced the appeal of investment assets, particularly gold, according to the report. Analysts are closely monitoring reports scheduled for release this week, including inflation rates, the performance of the American retail market, the consumer confidence index, and industrial production figures. All these factors are anticipated to directly impact gold trading in the foreseeable future.

Annual increase noted in securities abroad

KUWAIT CITY, March 11: Kuwait's official reserve assets witnessed a 3.59% annual decline, amounting to 532 million dinars (\$1.736 billion) by the end of January 2024, marking the lowest level since November, reports Al-Rai daily.

According to monthly data from the Central Bank of Kuwait, the value of re-serve assets in January stood at 14.279 billion dinars (\$46.609 billion), down from 14.811 billion dinars (\$48.345 billion) in the same period of 2023.

Monthly statistics indicate a 2.33% decrease compared to December 2023, when reserves were at 14.62 billion dinars (\$47.722 billion). It's worth noting that these reserves exclude external assets held by the General Investment Authority, which surged to \$923.45 billion, up from \$803 billion in July 2023.

Official reserves encompass external assets under the control of monetary authorities, utilized to meet balance of payments financing needs or intervene in exchange markets.

The annual performance was affected as foreign currency and deposits abroad dropped by 3.89% to 12.645 billion dinars in January 2024, compared to 13.157 billion dinars the previous year.

Special Drawing Rights (SDRs) declined by 1.12% to 1.325 billion dinars, whereas the reserve position with the International Monetary Fund decreased by 4.30% to 224.6 million dinars. The gold reserve remained stable at 31.7 million dinars,

Foreign assets boost Kuwaiti banks' growth

Kuwaiti banks' assets reach KD 87.15 bln at January end

KUWAIT CITY, March 11: Local banks and their branches inside Kuwait recorded assets totaling 87.15 billion dinars at the end of last January, compared to 85.53 billion dinars in the same month of 2023, with a growth rate of 1.9% annually, equivalent to 1.62 billion dinars (\$5.3 billion), reports Al-Qabas daily.

The monthly statistics issued by the Central Bank of Kuwait attributed the annual growth mainly to three reasons -- foreign assets balances increased by 2.22 billion dinars, by 9.7%, to 25.14 billion dinars; growth in demands on the private sector by 1.03 billion dinars, by 2.3%, to 45.24 billion dinars and demands on public institutions increased in January by 2.6%, amounting to 0.09 billion dinars, at 3.69 billion dinars.

Meanwhile, there has been a notable decrease in various aspects of Kuwait's local interbank market, with deposit balances declining by 24.8%, loans to banks drop-ping by approximately 20.4%, and demands on both the government and the Central Bank decreasing by 15.2% and 9.5%, respectively. Additionally, other assets saw a decline of 4.9%.

Moreover, there was a significant increase of 28.9% in foreign assets, attributed to rises in foreign investments and credit facilities to non-residents by 13.9% and 20.4%, respectively. Loans to foreign banks also experienced growth, increasing by 8.3%, while other assets expanded by 15.5%; the balance of deposits with foreign banks decreased by 2.1%.

In a related development, data points to a notable surge in the net foreign assets of local banks, which increased by 26.3%, amounting to 2.66 billion dinars, reaching 12.76 billion dinars by the end of January 2024. This increase is primarily attributed to a 9.7% rise in the balance of foreign assets, reaching 2.22 billion dinars, coupled with a 3.4% decrease in the balance of foreign liabilities, which decreased by 0.44 billion dinars.

Significant increase in stock market liquidity

Kuwait's collective investment systems see 5.4% surge in assets, hits KD 2.44 bln by Jan

KUWAIT CITY, March 11: At the end of last January, assets managed within collective investment systems experienced a notable increase of 5.4 percent, reaching a total value of 2.44 billion dinars, compared to 2.31 billion dinars in December, reports Al-Jarida daily.

Statistics from the Capital Markets Authority revealed a 7.04 percent increase in the total assets of Islamic Sharia-compliant systems, reaching 989.53 thousand dinars, while traditional investment systems saw a 4.3 percent increase, totaling 1.45 billion dinars.

Money market collective investment systems held

the largest share, representing 48.13 percent of licensed systems, with traditional systems accounting for 549.97 thousand dinars and Islamic ones for 625.95 thousand dinars. Securities collective investment systems followed, comprising 41.1 percent of the total assets, with traditional securities at 831.71 thousand dinars and Islamic systems at 173.05 thousand dinars.

Real estate collective investment systems accounted for 4.5 percent of total assets, with 111.37 thousand dinars, while REIT funds represented 2.4 percent at 59.74 thousand dinars. Debt instruments comprised 1.85 percent with about 45.3 thousand dinars.

Existing collective investment systems for holding systems totaled 24.61 thousand dinars, about 1 percent of the total, while private equity assets amounted to 4.63 thousand dinars, representing 0.18 percent.

Contractual collective investment systems represented approximately 0.67 percent, totaling 16.5 thousand dinars.

Market indices showed positive growth, with the Premier Market Index up 6.5 percent, the Main Market Index up 7.2 percent, the General Market Index up 6.6 percent, and the Main Market 50 Index up 7.9 percent.

Absolute liquidity in the stock market increased significantly to about 1.478 billion dinars, up 67.2 percent from December, with an average daily trading value of approximately 67.2 million dinars, a 29.2 percent increase.

The concentration of liquidity in the first market was notable, receiving 66.8 percent of the stock market's liquidity, with the main market receiving 33.2 percent. Comparing liquidity distribution between the first and main markets showed progress in the main market's share for January 2024 compared to 2023, indicating higher liquidity concentration levels.

India signs trade accord with 4 European nations for \$100b investment

India signed a trade agreement with Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland on Sunday includes a commitment of \$100 billion in investments and creating 1 million direct jobs in India in the next 15 years. India committed to reducing

import tariffs on industrial products from the four European countries that comprise the European Free Trade Association, or EFTA

"The landmark agreement be-tween India and EFTA is set to bring significant economic bensuch as better integrated efits. and more resilient supply chains, new opportunities for businesses and individuals on both sides leading to increased trade and investment flows, job creation, and economic growth," an EFTA communique said.

India's Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal said India for the first time had signed an agreement with an important economic bloc in Europe. India is also working on trade pacts with Britain and the European Union.

The agreement includes trade in goods and services, investment promotion and cooperation, intellectual property, government procurement, trade and sustainable development, and dispute settlement. It will

provide a window for Indian exporters to access European and global markets, Goyal said in a statement

The agreement was signed in New Delhi by Goyal, his Swiss counterpart Guy Parmelin, Ice-land's Foreign Minister Bjarni Benediktsson, Liechtenstein's Foreign Minister Deminique He Foreign Minister Dominique Hasler, and Norway's Trade and Industry Minister Jan Christian Vestre. (AP)

Japan's economy avoids recession by growing in 2023 final quarter

TOKYO, March 11, (AP): Japan's economy managed to grow in the fourth quarter of last year, averting a recession, according to revised government data released Monday that had previously shown a contraction.

Real gross domestic product, or GDP, grew in October-December at an annual pace of 0.4% instead of a contraction of 0.4%, according to the Cabinet Office. Real GDP is a measure of the value of a nation's products and services. The annual rate measures what would have happened if the quarterly rate lasted a

year. The revision reflects an improvement in private capital investment. It also means Japan avoided sinking into a technical

recession, generally defined as two straight quarters of contraction.

The growth rate for the whole year stood unchanged at 1.9%. Japan's economy grew 0.1% in the final quarter of last year from the previous quarter.

Expectations are mixed on what the latest data might mean ahead of Bank of Japan policy

board meetings. Some expect the central bank to start raising interest rates this month or next month. Japan has so far stuck to a

super-easy monetary policy. The data show consumer spending remains weak as wage growth dulls, inflation sets hold in previously deflation-struck Japan and the yen continues to weaken against the U.S. dollar.

"The results also highlight the sluggishness of private consumption, reflecting a decline in purchasing power. Private consumption is likely to remain weak," S&P Global Market Intelligence said in an analysis.

The GDP revision had been expected because of recent data showing robust capital expenditures.

'GCC economic growth dampened by oil cuts'

KSA, UAE economies stand strong: ICAEW

DUBAI, March 11: The latest Economic Insight report for the Middle East, commissioned by ICAEW and compiled by Oxford Economics, projects a slowdown in 2024 as oil production cuts persist. The GCC growth forecast has been revised down to 2.7% from 3.9% three months ago, while non energy-sectors are expected to drive growth in Saudi Arabia and the UAE.

Despite the energy sector exerting downward pressure on GCC economic growth, robust non-energy performance is expected to offset some of the impact. However, disruptions in shipping routes through the Red Sea and Suez Canal have pushed up freight and raw material costs, suggesting possible loss of momentum in the coming months.

"The opening of stores like this one is a breath of fresh air for those who can't afford to buy local meat. As you've seen, the product is of high quality, and so much the better," retired teacher Rabah Belahouane said after waiting in line at a new store for 30 minutes.

By importing food products, Algeria hopes to avoid skyrocketing prices affecting those who can't afford locally sourced red meat. Such inflation plagued the country as recently as last year when the onion supply couldn't keep up with demand. Neighboring Tunisia plans to import bananas from Egypt while Mali plans to accept donated fuel from Russia.

For Algeria, the decision to import 100,000 tons of red meat this Ramadan reverses a previous policy banning the import of the products. That policy was designed to help bolster domestic ter Tayeb Zitouni said last week.

The import plan comes as meat prices remain high relative to the median income and minimum wage in Algeria which has struggled to tame inflation and rising cost of living.

Butchers understand that their prices present challenges for consumers nationwide but disagree with officials like Zitouni who blame them.

"Local meat is expensive. It's unfortunately become a luxury product, but that isn't butchers' fault or reason to unfairly single them out," said Salim Lamari, the 40-year-old owner of a family butchery east of Algiers.

He said that butchers depended on livestock farmers who had to raise their prices amid drought and spikes in the price of animal feed.

The crisis led Algeria - where politicians have long been skeptical of imports - to grant new import licenses to private businesses and the state entities governing the meat industry.

The country has expanded existing contracts with meat suppliers in Argentina and begun importing from Brazil, Spain, Italy, Ireland, Russia and Australia as the first week of Ramadan begins.

The meat has been vacuumpacked and shipped to be distributed nationwide in refrigerated vehicles.

Transport minister blasts call

The union for Germany's train drivers calls for another strike

BERLIN, March 11, (AP): A union representing many of Germany's train drivers has called for another strike in a long and bitter dispute with the state-owned main railway operator over working hours and pay, drawing sharp criticism from the country's transport minister.

The GDL union called on drivers of Deutsche Bahn's passenger trains to walk out for 24 hours starting at 2 a.m (0100 GMT). Tuesday. Meanwhile, drivers of freight trains will walk off the job from 6 p.m. (1700 GMT) Monday.

The walkout was announced on Sunday evening, in keeping with a union announcement last week that it would no longer give a 48-hour notice before striking. It follows a 1 1/2-day walkout last week.

The main sticking point in the dispute that has dragged on for months is GDL's demand for working hours to be reduced from 38 to 35 hours per week without a pay cut.

In several weeks of talks between the two sides, moderators suggested a reduction from 38 to 36 hours by 2028, but details of their proposal didn't satisfy GDL. The union demanded a new offer by Sunday evening, which wasn't forthcoming.

Transport Minister Volker Wissing told the Bild newspaper that "striking instead of negotiating is irresponsible." He pressed GDL to resume talks and said formal arbitration proceedings must be launched.

GDL chairman Claus Weselsky "is overstepping the mark further and further," Wissing added.

Private operators run some regional train services in Germany, unaffected by the dispute with Deutsche Bahn.

GDP growth projections for Saudi Arabia and the UAE have been revised to 2.1% and 4.4%, respectively,down from4.4% and 4.8% three months ago. Meanwhile, the UAE's non-oil GDP is estimated to have expanded by 5.6% in 2023, driving overall GDP growth of 3%. The sharp decline in GCC oil

output last year, resulting from the introduction of oil cuts, set a very low baseline. Even with the OPEC+ group's voluntary extension of output cuts through Q2, the regional energy sector is poised for growth this year. The report forecasts a cumulative expansion of the energy sectors by 1.3%, a notable turnaround from last year's 5.7% decline. In Saudi Arabia, specifically, oil activities are expected to grow by 0.7% this year after a 9.5% y/y plunge in 2023.

Non-energy sectors in the GCC are positioned to continue benefiting from government and private investment.Saudi Arabia is pushing forward with Vision 2030 by directing funds into giga and mega projects and turning its attention to Expo 2030 and the FIFA World Cup 2034.Investment activity is expected to be strong in the UAE too as plans around 'We the UAE 2031', Dubai Economic Agenda D33, and other strategies are implemented. Meanwhile, Qatar's plans for LNG capacity expansion in the latter part of this decade are expected to have a positive medium-term impact.

Hanadi Khalife, Head of Middle East, ICAEW, said: "Despite the GCC economic outlook facing mounting headwinds from the war in Gaza and disruptions in Red Sea trade, we are encouraged by the resilience of non-energy sectors to drive recovery. TheUAE and Saudi Arabia's unwavering commitment to diversifying their economies away from oil and meeting ambitious vision deadlines, speaks volumes about their pragmatic and fiscally prudent approach. Initiatives such as the Kingdom's bond sales abroad to address fiscal deficits and the UAE's removal from the Financial Action Task Force (FATF) grey list will enhance both countries' reputations and help attract more foreign direct


China's stocks trade higher as curtains drawn on annual parliamentary meeting

HONG KONG, March 11, (AP): Chinese stocks ended Monday with gains on Monday as the country's national legislature ended its annual meeting.

The Hang Seng Index added 1.3% to 16,570.86, again led by the tech index, which surged by 2.7%. Among gainers, JD.com jumped 6.6% to 98.75 Hong Kong dollars, E-commerce giant Alibaba Group Holding gained 2%, and Tencent was 3.2% higher.

Elsewhere in China, the Shanghai Composite Index fluctuated between small gains and losses during morning trading and closed at 3,068.46 by the end of the trading day with a 0.7% gain. The smaller market in Shenzhen rose 2.3%.

China's consumer price index, the CPI, rebounded by 0.7% in February and reached its highest level in 11 months, driven by a surge in consumption during the holiday season, according to data from China's sta-



lasted for 17 consecutive months. "Deflation remains a significant concern among investors regarding China's economic landscape," said Stephen Innes of SPI Asset Management.

He said that beyond increased government spending, it is evident that the economy requires structural reforms to encourage citizens to spend rather than save.

Arabian blades ... Tradition steeped in history, beyond gender norms

Since olden times Arabian blades signified chivalry and bravery and were used to fend off attackers and protect oneself from harm.

Nowadays, the steeped history of the Arabian blade continues to be appreciated throughout the region and particularly in the Gulf with many of still produced by blade-smiths regardless of gender.

On this subject, KUNA explored the process of making swords, daggers, and knives in the Kingdom of Bahrain, which to this day is forged by skillful and talented hands.

Blade manufacturing in Bahrain dates back to around 1783, said Zohour Al-Sayegh, a woman blade-smith who inherited the craft from her ancestors, told KUNA.

Al-Sayegh affirmed that blades played a

huge part in the history of the region as well as the tradition built around it, and these days, blades adorn households throughout the Gulf region in remembrance of the glorious past.

Matters such as the weight of the persons and their stature dictated how a blade was forged, she indicated, noting that Arabian blades were used in the current times in celebrations whether they were weddings, national occasions, or other festivities.

Al-Sayegh revealed that there were protocols and social considerations governing the forging of blades, noting that in wedding celebrations, blades for the grooms should be made differently from the ones made for in-laws, friends, acquaintances and family members.

Some blades were meant to be held with the left hand so that the right one might be extended in a gesture of peace, said Al-Sayegh providing further insight into the social intricacies of the profession.

The Arabian sword, for instance, is unique in design from the hilt to the tip of the blade and it rarely gets confused with other types of blades from across the globe, she pointed out.

She said that blades usually weighed between six to eight kilograms, noting that some types of swords signified the rank of a swordsman back in the olden days.

On the process itself, Al-Sayegh indicated that sword-making took around three to four months of hard work and mastery depending of the type of blade produced.

In regards to daggers and knives, the bladesmith said that men and women used to carry such weapons for daily usage and event protection. (KUNA)

'Oppenheimer' shatters records at Oscars

LOS ANGELES, March 11, (AP): "Oppenheimer," a solemn three-hour biopic that became an unlikely billion-dollar box-office sensation, was crowned best picture at a 96th Academy Awards that doubled as a coronation for Christopher Nolan.

After passing over arguably Hollywood's foremost bigscreen auteur for years, the Oscars made up for lost time by heaping seven awards on Nolan's blockbuster biopic. including best actor for Cillian Murphy, best supporting actor for Robert Downey Jr. and best director for Nolan.

In anointing "Oppenheimer," the Academy of Motion Pictures Arts and Sciences did something it hasn't done for more than a decade: hand its top prize to a widely seen, big-budget studio film. In a film industry where a cape, dinosaur or Tom Cruise has often been a requirement for such box office, "Oppenheimer" brought droves of moviegoers to theaters with a complex, fission-filled drama about J. Robert Oppenheimer and the creation of the atomic bomb.

"For better or worse, we're all living in Oppenheimer's world," said Murphy in his acceptance speech. "I'd like to dedicate this to the peacemakers.

As a film heavy with unease for human capacity for mass destruction, "Oppenheimer" also emerged - even over its partner in cultural phenomenon, "Barbie" - as a fittingly foreboding film for times rife with cataclysm, man-made or not.

Sunday's Oscars at the Dolby Theatre in Los Angeles unfolded against the backdrop of wars in Gaza and Ukraine, and with a potentially momentous U.S. election on the horizon. Awards for the documentary winner, "20 Days in Mariupol," and best international film, "The Zone of Interest," brought geopolitics into the Oscar spotlight.

The most closely watched contest went to Emma Stone, who won best best actress for her performance as Bella Baxter in "Poor Things." In what was seen as the night's most nail-biting category, Stone won over Lily Gladstone of "Killers of the Flower Moon." Gladstone would have become the first Native American to win an Academy Award.

Instead, Oscar voters couldn't resist the full-bodied extremes of Stone's "Poor Things" performance. The win for Stone, her second best actress Oscar following her 2017 win for "La La Land," confirmed the 35-year-

But protest and politics intruded on an election-year Academy Awards. Late during the show, host Jimmy Kimmel read a critical social media post from former president Donald Trump. "Thank you for watching," said Kimmel. "Isn't it past your jail time?"

Nolan has had many movies in the Oscar mix before, including "Inception," "Dunkirk" and "The Dark Knight." But his win Sunday for direction is the first Academy Award for the 53-year-old filmmaker. Addressing the crowd, Nolan noted cinema is just over a hundred years old.

Incredible journey

"Imagine being there 100 years into painting or theater," said Nolan, who shared the best-picture award with Emma Thomas, his wife and producer. "We don't know where this incredible journey is going from here. But to know that you think that I'm a meaningful part of it means the world to me.'

Downey, nominated twice before (for "Chaplin" and "Tropic Thunder"), also notched his first Oscar, crowning the illustrious second act of his up-and-down career.

"I'd like to thank my terrible childhood and the academy, in that order," said Downey, the son of filmmaker Robert Downey Sr.

"Barbie," last year's biggest box-office hit with more than \$1.4 billion in ticket sales, ultimately won just one award: best song (sorry, Ken) for Billie Eilish and Finneas' "What Was I Made For?" It's their second Oscar, two years after winning for their James Bond theme, "No Time to Die."

stars' arrival on the red carpet and turning the Oscar' attention toward the ongoing conflict. Some protesters shouted "Shame!" at those trying to reach the awards.

Jonathan Glazer, the British filmmaker whose chilling Auschwitz drama "The Zone of Interest" won best international film, drew connections between the dehumanization depicted in his film and today.

"Right now, we stand here as men who refute their Jewishness and the Holocaust being hijacked by an occupation which has led to conflict for so many innocent people, whether the victims of October the 7th in Israel, or the the ongoing attack on Gaza, all the victims, this dehumanization, how do we resist?"

A year after "Navalny" won the same award, Mstyslav Chernov's "20 Days in Mariupol," a harrowing chronicle of the early days of Russia's invasion of Ukraine, won best documentary. The win, a first for The Associated Press and PBS' "Frontline," came as the war in Ukraine passed the two-year mark with no signs of abating.

Chernov, the Ukrainian filmmaker and AP journalist whose hometown was bombed the day he learned of his Oscar nomination, spoke forcefully about Russia's invasion.

"This is the first Oscar in Ukrainian history, and I'm honored," said Chernov. "Probably I will be the first director on this stage to say I wish I'd never made this film. I wish to be able to exchange this (for) Russia never attacking Ukraine."

In the early going, Yorgos Lanthimos' Frankensteinriff "Poor Things" ran away with three prizes for its sumptuous craft, including awards for production design, makeup and hairstyling and costume design. "Poor Things" fared second best to "Oppenheimer," with a total of four awards.

Kimmel, hosting the ABC telecast for the fourth time, opened the awards with an monologue that emphasized Hollywood as "a union town" following 2023's actor and writer strikes, drew a standing ovation for bringing out teamsters and behind-the-scenes workers - who are now entering their own labor negotiations.

The night's first award was one of its most predictable: Da'Vine Joy Randolph for best supporting actress, for her performance in Alexander Payne's "The Holdovers." An emotional Randolph was accompanied to the stage by her "Holdovers" co-star Paul Giamatti.



Legislators grapple with the fate of Connecticut's bug ambassador

Students lobby to dethrone state insect, voraciously predatory praying mantis

Battle over vaccination policies

West Virginia lawmakers passes bill allowing student exemptions

CHARLESTON, W.Va., March 11, (AP): West Virginia's GOP-controlled state Legislature voted Saturday to allow some students who don't attend traditional public schools to be exempt from state vaccination requirements that have long been held up as among the most strict in the country

The bill was approved despite the

objections of Republican Senate Health and Human Resources Chair Mike Maroney, a trained doctor, who called the bill "an embarrassment" and said he believed lawmakers were harming the state. "I took an oath



Maroney

to do no harm. There's zero chance I can vote for this bill," Maroney said before the bill passed the Senate 18-12. The House already approved a version of the bill in February and swiftly approved the Senate bill on Saturday, the last day of the state's 60-day legislative session

"It's a bad bill for West Virginia, it's a step backward. There's no question, no question there will be negative effects," Maronev said. He added, "It's an embarrassment for me to be a part of it, it should be an embarrassment to everybody." West Virginia, with some of the

lowest life expectancy rates in the U.S. and a quarter of all children living in poverty, is one of only two states, along with California, that don't permit nonmedical exemptions to vaccinations as a condition for school entry.

Mississippi had the same policy until July, when a judge allowed people to start citing religious beliefs to seek exemptions from state-mandated vaccinations that children must receive before attending day care or school.

The new proposed vaccine law in West Virginia, which now heads to the desk of Republican Gov. Jim Justice, allows virtual public school students to be exempt and for private and parochial schools to institute their own policies either exempting students or not.

All students participating in West Virginia school activities that result in competition, including but not limited to sports, still need to be vaccinated.

The bill stipulates parents can't sue private schools and school owners, administrators, boards and staffers for deciding whether to allow exemptions or not, as long as the school provides families with a notice for parents to sign acknowledging the policy annually and upon enrollment.

"I personally do not urge passage, but your health committee urged pas-sage of this bill," Maroney said before introducing the bill in the Senate.

The bill's original intent, as introduced in the state House of Delegates, was to eliminate vaccine requirements for students in public virtual schools. It was expanded in a House committee to allow private schools to set their own vaccination standards, unless a student participates in sanctioned athletics.

The bill also created a religious exemption for any child whose parents or guardians present a letter stating the child cannot be vaccinated for religious reasons. That was taken out in the Senate

HARTFORD, Conn., March 11, (AP): When it comes to state insects, most states honor beloved and benign bugs, like butterflies, honey bees and ladybugs. Connecticut has designated a voracious predator as its bug-to-be-most-proud-of for decades, but its reign could soon come to an end.

The European "praying" mantis, recognized by its raptorial forelegs and known for catching and eating the occasional bumble bee and butterfly along with all kinds of other insects, has been awaiting its prey from atop Connecticut's pedestal since 1977, after a group of kids in Vernon proposed it to lawmakers.

Now legislators have been confronted by more schoolchildren - two groups of them - who submitted dueling proposals to replace the mantis, with either the Autumn Meadowhawk Dragonfly or the Spring Azure Butterfly. And unlike the mantis, which was introduced to the state in the 1890s to help farmers combat pests, both are native to Connecticut and therefore important to the state's environment, the students argued.

"By having a non-native European praying mantis as our state insect, we are overlooking the thousands of native insects that are present in Connecticut's ecosystem," Katherine Boye Williams, 16, a junior at the Watkinson School in Hartford, told a legislative committee on Friday

Williams said it's "been a source of irritation" that the praying mantis gets all the glory, and she hopes greater attention paid to natives like the Spring Azure Butterfly will spark more interest in protecting the state's environment.

According to the Smithsonian Institution, 48 states

have officially designated State Insects, nearly all of them colorful or fuzzy, with notable exceptions such as New Mexico's Tarantula Hawk Wasp and South Carolina's state bug -- a cousin to Connecticut's and also not native to the U.S. -- the Carolina mantis.

Williams said her school's environmental coalition ultimately recommended the Spring Azure Butterfly after a long process that included debating the merits of multiple candidates recommended by entomologists, whittling the list down to two, reaching out to 100 other schools, organizations and individuals for input, and ultimately collecting 1,189 votes for the tiny blue butterfly with roughly an inch-wide wingspan. "The Spring Azure, like Connecticut, is energetic

and small," she told lawmakers, and its colors even match the Connecticut state flag.

Representing the other bug contender during Friday's public hearing, state wildlife biologist Jane Seymour read a letter on behalf of students at Center Road School in Vernon, Conn. They extolled the virtues of the Autumn Meadowhawk Dragonfly, including how it eats mosquitoes and other biting bugs and how its flight has been studied for aeronautics purposes, including by Connecticut-based Sikorsky Aircraft.

'The Meadow Hawk Dragonfly is an interesting and beautiful creature that has been on this planet for 300 million years. That's more than the dinosaurs," the students wrote in the letter, noting their fears about how the insect's habitat is at risk.

Seymour supports the student-led efforts. Mantis religiosa can be a "voracious predator," she said, and it "ate everything" after it was introduced in the U.S.

Recognized for its habit of standing motionless on four hind legs while appearing to "pray" with its two forelegs, Mantis religiosa originated from northern Africa, southern Europe and parts of Asia and can now be found throughout Connecticut from early May or June until the weather turns cold, according to the state register and manual.

"Although it's a cool-looking insect, it's harmful to our native insects and it should be replaced," Seymour said.

France's Macron announces legislation to allow 'aid in dying' under strict conditions

Monthslong legislative process will start in May

PARIS, March 11, (AP): French president Emmanuel Macron has announced new legislation to legalize "aid in dying" that will allow adults facing end-of-life illness to take lethal medication, a first in the country.

The move follows last year's report indicating that most French citizens support legalizing end-of-life options.

In an interview published Monday by French newspapers La Croix and Libera-

tion, Macron said the new bill will be restricted to adults suffering from an incurable illness who are expected to die in the "short or middle-term" and who are suffering "intractable" physical or psychological pain.

Macron said the law will offer "a possible path, in a determined situation, with precise criteria, where the medical decision is playing its role.'

He gave the example of of people with terminal cancer, some of whom until now have gone abroad to end their lives

Discovery dating back over 1 million years

Ancient stone tools found in Ukraine, rewrite early human history in Europe

WASHINGTON, March 11, (AP): Ancient stone tools found in western Ukraine may be the oldest known evidence of early human presence in Europe, according to research published Wednesday in the journal Nature.

The chipped stones, deliberately fashioned from volcanic rock, were excavated from a quarry in Korolevo in the 1970s. Archaeologists used new methods to date the layers of sedimentary rock



perhaps scraping animal hides, he said.

The researchers suggest the tools may be as old as 1.4 million years, but other experts say the study methodology suggests that they may be just over 1 million years old, placing them in roughly the same date range as other ancient tools unearthed in Spain.

The very earliest stone tools of this type were found in eastern Africa and date back to 2.8 million years ago, said Rick Potts, who directs the Smithsonian Institution's Human Origins Program. The Ukraine site is significant because "it's the earliest site that far north," suggesting that the early humans who dispersed from Africa with these tools were able to survive in diverse environments. "The oldest humans with this old stone tool technology were able to colonize everywhere from warm Iberia (Spain) to Ukraine, where it's at least seasonally very cold - that's an amazing level of adaptability," said Potts.

FDA will take deeper look into safety

Only people aged 18 or above who are capable of forming their own views will be allowed to get in the process, meaning those with severe psychiatric conditions and neurodegenerative disorders such as Alzheimer's disease won't be eligible, Macron specified.

Patients who seek to enter the process will need to reconfirm their choice after 48 hours and they should then receive an answer from a medical team within two weeks maximum, Macron said. A doctor will then deliver a prescription, valid for three months, for the lethal medication.

People will be able to take the medication at home, at a nursing home or at a health care facility, Macron said.

If their physical condition doesn't allow them to do it alone, they will be allowed to get help from someone of their choice or by a doctor or a nurse.

Macron said the new bill will refer to "aid in dying ... because it's simple and humane," rather than terms like euthanasia or medically assisted suicide

Medically assisted suicide involves patients taking, of their own free will, a lethal drink or medication that has

"This is the earliest evidence of any type of human in Europe that is dated," said Mads Faurschou Knudsen, a geophysicist at Aarhus University in Denmark and co-author of the new study.

He said it's not certain which early human ancestors fashioned the tools, but it may have been Homo erectus, the first species to walk upright and master the use of fire.

of Lilly experimental Alzheimer drug

INDIANAPOLIS, March 11, (AP): Federal regulators put off a decision on whether to approve an Eli Lilly Alzheimer's drug by making an unusual request to have outside advisers look at the treatment.

Lilly had expected the Food and Drug Administration to decide on donanemab's approval by the end of the month. But the drugmaker said Friday that the agency now wants more information about its safety and effectiveness. No date has been set for the advisory committee meeting.

The FDA often asks committees to review drugs that are first in their class of treatments. Donanemab, if approved, would follow Eisai's Legembi, which was approved last year, and Biogen's Aduhelm.

Eli Lilly and Co. Executive Vice President Anne White said in a statement that the Indianapolis-based company remains confident in donanemab's potential and will work with the FDA.

The company said the agency wants to learn more from a pivotal study Lilly conducted on the drug.

The 18-month, late-stage study showed that patients taking donanemab declined about 22% more slowly in terms of memory and cognitive ability than those who received a dummy infusion. The delay amounted to about four to seven months.

been prescribed by a doctor to those who meet certain criteria. Euthanasia involves doctors or other health practitioners giving patients who meet certain criteria a lethal injection at their own request.

Macron set no date for the legislation to be applied, saying it will first need to follow a months long legislative process that will start in May.

A 2016 French law provides that doctors can keep terminally ill patients sedated before death but stops short of allowing assisted suicide and euthanasia.

Some French patients travel to other European countries to seek further options. Assisted suicide is allowed in neighboring Switzerland as well as in Portugal. Euthanasia is currently legal in the Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg and Spain under certain conditions.

Christopher Bell pulls out an emotional victory for Joe Gibbs Racing at Phoenix

AVONDALE, March 11, (AP): Christopher Bell and the rest of Joe Gibbs Racing have been through more than their share of heartbreak in the desert.

Owner Joe Gibbs' son, the team's vice chairman, died unexpectedly in Phoenix two years ago. Last fall, a broken brake rotor spoiled Bell's NAS-CAR Cup Series championship hopes in the Valley of the Sun.

Winning at Phoenix Raceway will never erase the anguish, but it's certainly another step in the healing process.

Bell surged into the lead when Martin Truex Jr. was forced to pit and then pulled away for an emotional NAS-CAR Cup Series win at Phoenix Raceway on Sunday.

"This one feels really good," Bell said. "You don't get cars like that very often, as you know. Just super, super proud to be on this 20 car.'

JGR has been through a whirlwind of emotions in Phoenix.

In 2022, hours after Ty Gibbs won an Xfinity season championship for his grandfather's team, vice chairman Coy Gibbs was found dead in his hotel room. Ty's father was 49.

Bell and JGR returned to Phoenix Raceway in November as part of the championship four vying for the Cup Series title. Instead of mending emotions, the team left dejected after Bell's car broke early in the race.

Given another shot, Bell held his emotions in check and the crew gave him the fastest car on a perfect afternoon in the desert that ended with a massive celebration on victory lane. "It is a little bit cathartic," Bell's

crew chief Adam Stevens said. Bell's win in the No. 20 Toyota also

ended Chevrolet's perfect start to the season after winning the first three races. He is the eighth different winner in eight races at Phoenix Raceway's mile tri-oval.

Chris Buescher finished second after being wrecking 27 laps into last week's race in Las Vegas and Ty Gibbs was third for his career-best finish. Brad Keselowski and Ryan Blaney rounded out the top five.

"We had a rough go last week," Buescher said. "This was good to get everybody back to prove that we're in this together and we're going to win one of these things as a team."

The Phoenix race marked the debut of NASCAR's new aerodynamics package for short tracks in hopes of producing more passing on tracks of a mile or less and road courses. Goodyear also produced tires with thicker treads designed to retain heat and increase lap-time falloff.

Starting 13th, Bell took advantage of the changes, overcoming a slow pit stop to charge back to the front. Bell moved into the lead with 40 laps to go when leader Truex had to pit for fuel and tires.

Bell led the final 49 laps for his seventh career Cup Series victory - first since Homestead in October.

"I drove a rocket ship today," Bell said. "It just took off."

Truex and his crew made calculated gamble on lap 217, opting to stay out when most of the leaders went into the

KARACHI, Pakistan, March 11, (AP): Quetta Gladiators finally sealed a playoff spot in Pakistan Super League cricket after four years as Mohammad Wasim pulled Shaheen Shah Afridi for a last-ball six and handed Lahore Qalandars a six-wicket defeat.

phy despite being stunned by a loss to Mexico in the group stage of the tournament. It was the first women's Gold Cup, created to bring teams in the region more meaningful competition.

"It was a difficult game. Brazil challenged us in a different way," Horan said. "I'm really, really proud of us finding a way to get a goal and finishing out the game and getting a trophy.

It was the fourth time that the Unit-ed States faced Brazil in a tournament final. The Americans also won the previous three, including the 2004 and 2008 Olympics.

The game drew a sellout crowd of 31,528 to San Diego's Snapdragon Stadium, a record crowd for a CON-CACAF women's match.

"I'm just so happy for the team," Kilgore said. "This is a team and a program that will always have attention and expectations on it. We always say that pressure is a privilege and it is, but it's another thing to walk the walk.

Both Brazil and the United States have qualified for this summer's Olympics in France.

Its total of 281-7 completed the 14th-highest successful fourth innings run chase in test history.

Montreal secure 3-2 win at home Messi sidelined, Inter Miami suffer first loss of season

FORT LAUDERDALE, March 11, (AP): Lionel Messi wore street clothes and watched from a sideline box as Montreal took advantage of several Inter Miami defensive miscues to hand his team its first loss of the season - a 3-2 defeat at home. Messi did not play after previously being listed as questionable with a shin injury.

The injury happened in a 2-2 draw at Nashville in the CONCACAF Champions Cup last week. Messi went to contest a pass from Nashville's Lukas Macnaughton, who appeared to step on the 36-year-old's calf and cause his left ankle to twist. Trainers tended to Messi as he writhed in pain on the pitch in the 77th minute, but he remained in the match.

Messi left that match with a bruise, but head coach Gerardo "Tata" Martino said Sunday the team and Messi had previously agreed that he would rest against Montreal - no matter what happened at Nashville.

Martino has been tasked with finding ways to manage Messi's workload and recovery as he has played every minute of Inter Miami's first

four games of the season. Resting the eighttime Ballon d'Or winner makes sense - Inter Miami will play two more games over the next six days. That's four games in a ten-

day stretch. And Ibrahim Messi was called

Nottingham Forest's survival hopes dealt a blow

LIVERPOOL, England, March 11, (AP): Liverpool and Manchester City showed the Premier League what it will be missing when Jurgen Klopp walks away at the end of the season.

Anfield played host to a typically full-blooded, high octane clash of titans in the last English top-flight encounter between Klopp and Pep Guardiola before the Liverpool manager stands down.

No wonder Guardiola says he will sleep easier when his long-time rival is no longer standing in his way.

He likened Liverpool to a "tsunami" as the defending champions had to dig deep to survive long periods of pressure in the second half.

"They come from everywhere," Guardiola said after a 1-1 draw that kept second-place Liverpool one point ahead of City in third.

Arsenal ended the weekend top of the standings on goal difference, but the Londoners' 2-1 win at Brentford felt like a sub plot in comparison to the latest and possibly last clash between Klopp and Guardiola.

John Stones gave City a first-half lead and Alexis Mac Allister leveled from the penalty spot after the break.

That only told part of the story of a thrilling encounter, which saw Luis Diaz miss a big chance to fire Liverpool ahead and Phil Foden and Jeremy Doku hit the woodwork for Čity. In stoppage time, Klopp thought Liverpool should have been awarded a penalty for Doku's chest-high challenge on Mac Allister, only for VAR to dismiss appeals.

"Why would the guy in the VAR studio think that is not clear and obvious? What must you have for lunch if you think that is not clear and obvious?" Klopp said.

Perhaps Klopp is mellowing as he counts down his final days at Liverpool, but he preferred to focus on the performance of his rebuilt and injury-stricken team. "For us, besides the result, the most important information is we are right there, we go the distance. Let's see what we get for it, but the boys fought so hard through everything to be there," he said. "Today I saw the best 53 minutes we had against Manchester City. It was exceptional and important as well that we learned that about ourselves. It would be fascinating to see how this team could develop under Klopp, who has so quickly remolded Liverpool following the departure of key players like Sadio Mane, Jordan Henderson and Roberto Firmino. Few expected him to mount a title challenge so soon, let alone compete on four fronts this season, with the League Cup already secured. Against the odds, his team is also still in contention for the Europa League and FA Cup. A second league title of his reign is the priority and Liverpool showed it can go head-to-head with a City team that is defending last season's treble of trophies - the Premier League, Champions League and FA Cup. Liverpool's 2020 title is the only thing that stopped City from completing a clean sweep of six straight triumphs under Guardiola from 2018. Guardiola has repeatedly described Klopp's Liverpool as the biggest challenge of his coaching career and has edged him to the title by a single point on two occasions. "He made us a better team, he made me a better manager. I wish he will be back soon, because football needs personalities like him," Guardiola said.

MADRID, March 11, (AP): Real Madrid made peace with its fans with a comfortable win over Celta Vigo and reclaimed a seven-point lead at the top of the Spanish league.

Vinícius Júnior scored his third goal in four games as Madrid eased to a 4-0 victory that followed consecutive draws that included a lackluster performance against Leipzig in the Champions League, which prompted jeers from the home crowd at the Santiago Bernabeu Stadium.

Madrid had drawn four of its last seven matches in all competitions. It advanced to the quarterfinals of the Champions League on Wednesday despite a poor performance in a 1-1 draw against Leipzig.

Defender Antonio Rüdiger set up two goals on Sunday, and Turkey international Arda Güler made his scoring debut with Madrid. The hosts got two own-goals.

The victory maintained Madrid's cushion at the top after second-place Girona beat Osasuna 2-0 on Saturday and third-place Barcelona defeated Mallorca 1-0 on Friday. Barcelona, the defending champion, is eight points behind Madrid with 10 rounds left.

Guaita's own-goal came after a firm header by Rüdiger bounced off the crossbar and the goalkeeper's back.

The 16th-seeded Shelton advanced to face Sinner in the round of 16. The 11th-seeded Tsitsipas will face Lehecka.

Noskova beat Swiatek in three sets in Australia, becoming the first teen to beat a No. 1-ranked woman at that event in 25 years. The rematch was competitive for a set, but Swiatek eventually rolled to victory in just under 73 minutes.
