ICJ deposition submitted

Kuwait reaffirms pledge to ecosystem protection

BRUSSELS, March 23, (KUNA): The State of Kuwait on Friday submitted a written deposition to ICJ registry on its commitment to ecosystem protection.

The document, presented by Ambassador to the Netherlands Ali Al-Thifeeri at The Hague-based International Court of Justice, came upon a request by the UN General Assembly, according to an embassy statement.

Through the deposition, Kuwait is seeking to reaffirm fulfilling commitments, protocols and international agreements it signed vis-avis climate protection.

Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Oil Imad Al-Atiqi, Minister of Foreign Affairs Abdullah Al-Yahva and Kuwait's Governor to OPEC Mohammad Al-Shatti had significantly contributed in producing the deposition.

Commitment reaffirmed

JEDDAH, March 23, (KUNA): Prince Mohammad bin Salman bin Abdulaziz Al Saud, the Crown Prince and Prime Minister of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, received His Highness the Prime Minister of Kuwait Sheikh Dr. Mohammad Sabah Al-Salem Al-Sabah, on an official visit to the sisterly Kingdom.

During the meeting, held late Thursday night, His Highness the Prime Minister conveyed to the Crown Prince the best regards of His Highness the Amir of Kuwait Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah and his wishes of everlasting prosperity and progress for the sisterly Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

Thank you, Abu Faisal ... but where are the zakat funds for those in debt?

THANK you, Deputy Prime Minister, Minister of Defense, and Acting Minister of Interior Sheikh Fahad Yousef Al-Sabah (Abu Faisal), for the generous gesture you bestowed upon those in debt among the daughters of Kuwait for whom life has been tough.

Some of them trusted their husbands and fell under pressure from them, because of which they issued dud cheques and were consequently thrown into prison. This is the first time an Interior Minister is

this. In fact, it is the first time the suffering voices of these women are being heard and responded to, especially since some of them were subjected to great injustice. This happened after their husbands made them take loans but were unable to repay them. After they divorced, the hus-

bands moved on with the loan amounts they obtained from their divorced wives, and the latter were left with the burden of repaying were thrown into prison.

May Almighty Allah bless you, Sheikh Abu Faisal. You have proven that you honor the position you have, and you work in accordance with the humanitarian teachings upon which Kuwaiti society was built. However, the truth must be put before eve-

In such humanitarian cases, there is no room for evading responsibility. Therefore, we ask - What about the money from zakat funds? Why does it go abroad when those closest to you are more deserving of such funds? Aren't the oppressed and those in debt in Kuwait more deserving of it? Why is this money spent on aid, some of which are questionable, and projects are established in some countries, until it has become a permanent destination for workers in those funds? Also, when there is aid and projects for some African countries, is it usually limited, as if it is a drop in the ocean of what is paid to some

A significant segment of Kuwait has been plagued by debts after being lured by usurers and merchants who sought to accumulate illicit wealth, and the law was on their side. Some of them even placed the responsibility on the creditor who was greedy and did not do due diligence before lending his money, which is in accordance with the Sharia rule.

However, there are some who cheated on this principle when they enacted laws that serve those with special interests who want to seize people's lives.

These laws no longer exist in any other country, and the Sharia ruling grants the debtor the right to obtain zakat to pay off his

According to the verse, "Zakat is only for the poor and the needy, and those who collect them, and those whose hearts are to be reconciled, and to free the captives and the debtors, and for the cause of Allah, and (for) the wayfarer; a duty imposed by Allah. Allah is Knower, Wise.'

Yes, the debtors who are stranded and find themselves behind prison bars are Kuwait's eternal problem, and they will remain so.

The laws must be changed in Kuwait similar to Jordan, the Emirates, Saudi Arabia, Bahrain, and other Arab and Western countries. They made the preservation of rights more just and imposed on the creditors to be more cautious and not throw people in prison. On the other hand, the principle followed in Kuwait is "take him and cuff him."

Biometric drive strengthens global security cooperation

KUWAIT CITY, March 23: The establishment of a comprehensive biometric fingerprint database, initiated by the Ministry of Interior, is poised to significantly enhance security cooperation not only within the Gulf region but also globally, fostering connectivity with Interpol, Arab nations, and particularly the Gulf states, reports Al-Rai daily.

This development will help in identifying individuals sought by security agencies or implicated in legal matters, while concurrently reducing instances of individuals attempting to enter the country by altering data on their passports.

The sources disclosed that Kuwait's prompt action in conducting fingerprinting for its population and instituting a three-month timeframe commencing from March 1 was in alignment with Gulf-wide coordination efforts.

This initiative was also spurred by other nations' urgency to finalize security integration and information exchange, thereby mitigating issues related to nationality duplication.

The Ministry of the Interior told the daily that the biometric fingerprinting before the impending deadline is for all those mandated to undergo this process and must proactively fulfill this requirement to prevent any disruptions to their ministry-related transactions.

It has been noted that approximately 1.7 million persons have already completed or updated their

Furthermore, the issue of dual nationality has become a focal point of shared concern among Gulf nations, and puts a financial burden alongside other socioeco-

The implementation of biometric fingerprinting is expected to facilitate the resolution of this matter by simplifying the identification of individuals holding multiple nationalities, who may exploit varying identities and documents during cross-border movements.

The sources underscored collaborative efforts among Gulf nations to address this issue by leveraging advanced security measures, including biometric fingerprinting, which will serve as an authoritative means of identification for all applicants. It was highlighted that this requirement has become a fundamental prerequisite for travelers entering or exiting numerous countries worldwide.

KUWAIT CITY: The Ministry of Foreign Affairs expressed Saturday the State of Kuwait's strong condemnation and denunciation of the terrorist attack in Kandahar Province, southern Afghanistan, which caused the injury and death of a number of innocent civilians.

UNITED NATIONS: The U.N. Security Council is set to vote on a resolution demanding a humanitarian cease-fire in Gaza during the Muslim holy month of Ramadan, but the United States warned the measure could hurt negotiations to halt Israeli-Hamas hostilities.

The resolution, put forward by the 10 elected council members, is backed by Russia and China. who vetoed a U.S.-sponsored resolution Friday that supported "an immediate and sustained ceasefire" in the Israel-Hamas war in Gaza. (AP)

ISTANBUL: Turkiye is planning to launch the satellite, Turksat-6A, into space in early July, Industry and Technology Minister Mehmet Fatih Kacir has announced.

In remarks published by the local press on Saturday, the minister said the satellite was under testing at the space systems center in Ānkara.

Turksat is the first locally made satellite, he said, indicating that the launch would be during the week starting on July

World rallies behind Princess of Wales after 'cancer' reveal

LONDON, March 23, (AP): Support poured in from around the world Saturday for Kate, the Princess of Wales, after she revealed in a candid video message that she is undergoing chemotherapy for cancer following major abdominal sur-

The princess's poignant video, in which she spoke about the "huge shock" and "incredibly tough couple of months" for her family after her diagnosis, came after weeks of frenzied speculation on social media about her health and well-

"This of course came as a huge shock, and William and I have been doing everything we can to process and manage this privately for the sake of our young family," Kate said in the video, which was recorded Wednesday in Windsor.

"It has taken us time to explain everything to George, Charlotte and Louis in a way that is appropriate for them, and to reassure them that I am going to be OK," she added, referring to her three young

Kate, 42, did not say what type of cancer was discovered after she underwent what she described as "major" abdominal surgery. She said she is now in the early stages of preventative chemotherapy, and is "getting stronger every day."

The royal said it had been thought that her condition was non-cancerous, until post-surgery tests revealed the diagnosis. The announcement will at least partly

tamp down the intense and sometimes fantastical speculation and conspiracy theories about her condition that have multiplied on social media since Kensington Palace announced in mid-January that she had been hospitalized for un-

specified abdominal surgery.

Hashtags including "WeLoveYo-uCatherine" and "GetWellSoonCatherine" were trending Friday on X, formerly Twitter, while political leaders and cancer survivors sent messages of



Travelers to Holy Lands spiral

Umrah ticket rates could hit KD 700

KUWAIT CITY, March 23: The number of travelers to the Holy Land to perform Umrah doubled in the first 10 days of the holy month of Ramadan; while ticket prices increased to as high as KD300 and employees in travel agencies revealed ticket prices will rise up to KD700 in the last 10 days of Ramadan, reports Al-Seyassah daily quoting a reliable source from Kuwait International Airport.

The source told the daily that the number of flights to Jeddah, Taif and Madina reached 25 per day; revealing that the demand for Umrah destinations increased by 30 percent compared to previous

The daily obtained information that

ticket prices in the first 10 days of the holy month ranged from KD150 to KD250 on normal days, and reached KD300 at the end of the week.

A number of employees in the tourism and travel sector said the prices will double in the last 10 days of Ramadan, hinting that prices will range from KD350 to KD700. They affirmed that the travel agencies have prepared attractive packages including tickets, accommodation and transportation; specifying options for the pilgrims in terms of suitable accommodation as well as the provision of breakfast and suhour meals.

Regarding land trips, the prices range from KD100 to KD150 including visa, hotel and transportation.

Ramadan is ideal time to invest in morals, values: 'Read Quran'

"IT is time for me to write about what my pen was unable to write at that time, and my letters were unable to express. I was reading the biography of the purest man on the face of the earth, and the most honorable of God's creation, upon him be the best prayers and peace, who said, 'I wished I had met my brothers," his companions said: "Aren't we? Your brothers? He said: You are my companions,

but my brothers are those who believed in me but did not see columnist, educational consultant and certified trainer in the field of childhood and adolescence, Nada Muhal-

hal Al-Mudhaf, wrote for Al-Qabas daily.

"So I remembered the visit of gifted youth to me from the Joint Talent Academy School in the Royal Camp, which I held in the winter, in the presence of a crowd of children, aged 15-16 years, and in one of the exercises I gave them to discuss aspects of personality development: 'What is the personality that I would like to have; to contemporize it? What is the best book you have read? So the answers are that they wished they had been contemporary with the best Messenger, peace and blessings be upon him, and the best book is the Qur'an.

"Indeed, for the majority of memorizers of the Holy Qur'an, memorizing the Qur'an did not hinder their studies and academic excellence. There is no doubt that the blessing, God willing, will enhance and bless them, and increase their excellence and study.

"Where are we today regarding the morals of the Messenger, peace and blessings be upon him, who wished to see us? Let go of idealism.

"Tell me today, you are a guardian, whether you are a father or a mother, a principal, a teacher, or a coach. Where are we in terms of humility, compassion, patience, containment, and all the fine Islamic morals?

"Ramadan is a very beautiful opportunity, and its blessings are show-ered upon us every day. There is still plenty of time to seize this holy month in investing in those morals and values, instilling them in the souls of our children, and making sure to read the Noble Book of God in the month of Ramadan and other than the month of Ramadan, so that it may be light, illumination, and blessing for us."

Also:

"The term identity, which is linguistically derived from the third-person pronoun "he," with its social meaning, is a description of the concept of a thing for the purpose of inferring it. Through this, the symbolism of this thing and its relationship to a society is clarified. In order to arrive at the identity of this "thing," we must research its origins. And its foundations and that is indicative of the mind and its sensory tools, and not just by transferring from what is prevalent," columnist **Sadiq Qasim** wrote for **Al-Qabas** daily.

"Based on the above, we can say that the Kuwait Towers, which now constitute a national identity, have become a symbol of our country since the time of the establishment of those towers in the seventies of the last century until now, and they can be taken as one of the greatest icons of our Arabian Gulf, and accordingly, during Saddam's brutal invasion, Saddam's decimated army tried to attack these towers, but his tanks were unable to topple even a single stone from this edifice, whose steadfastness at that time expressed the steadfastness of the entire Kuwaiti people, in those difficult days.

"But what are the meanings of these Kuwait Towers? What is her identity? What is the reason for designing it this way? What are you talking about? I ask questions of this kind, because I am amazed that there are officials in the state that have distorted the identity of the Kuwait Towers, out of ignorance and lack of knowledge and this is what amounts to obliterating the national identity of a distinctive civilizational symbol.

"I saw, in a television segment presented during a previous celebration of National Day, that the design of the three Kuwait Towers came to reflect the shapes of "the incense burner, the sprinkler, and the 'kohl'," but I was not convinced by this interpretation, especially since the shape of the incense burner in the past did not resemble the shape of what is in the current Kuwait Towers, and if the large tower was indicative of the incense burner, so its design must be different from the current one, and closer to the incense burner that I know. As for the middle tower, if it represents the sprinkler, then the ball in this case must be placed at the bottom of the tower and not in the middle, in order to actually mimic the shape of the sprinkler and the giant lighting pole, which may resemble the shape of a 'koh, if we ignore its unique architecture.

"I remember, from my university days, that one of my distinguished professors told me that the Kuwait Towers were designed to reflect the Kuwaiti economy, which was previously built on extracting and selling pearls. The three towers symbolize the "point" of the needle in the pearls, and the different sizes of the balls indicate the nature of the different sizes of the

"What is strange is that such a great edifice of great importance to the state, everyone differs in defining its identity and the purpose of its design? This is what prompted me to research the issue of this disparity. I started with tourism projects, and I found that one of its officials had stated to the Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) that the towers were designed in the form of "the incense burner, the sprinkler, and the kohl." I personally am not convinced by this statement, which has been recorded on the Wikipedia website. As a fact, and in the curricula of the Ministry of Education in Kuwait as well, which repeated the same words.

"I began to research the origin and basis of the topic, and I found that the idea of the Kuwait Towers began in 1965. They were water tanks that were architecturally designed in the shape of mushrooms to feed the surrounding areas instead of transporting water through sump tank vehicles. Six sites were identified for it in Kuwait at that time, and the most important of the six sites was the one in front of Dasman Palace, as the late Sheikh Jaber Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah (may God have mercy on him) ordered that the design of the towers in front of the palace located on Al-Khaleej Al-Arabi Street be different from the rest of the sites, so the Danish architect was chosen.

"Melini Bjorn designed these towers. Melini mentioned this in the book 'The Art of History," and said: "The design of these towers came to reflect the contemporary renaissance of Kuwait and technology that serves humanity" (pp. 40-41).

"This was confirmed by what was stated in the brief project memorandum, which was prepared in 1976 by the project contractor, the Swedish company VBB. It was specifically stated in the fifth item of the memorandum: 'The Kuwait Towers are a symbol of technological progress, and that they indicate the renaissance of the strong Kuwaiti economy'.

"I address the gentlemen responsible for the Ministry of Information, the Ministry of Education, the National Council for Culture, Arts and Letters, and finally the gentlemen in charge of tourism projects, with my hope to resolve the issue of the identity of the Kuwait Towers, by conveying the correct information through the available media about that lofty symbol of Kuwait, which has not been determined.

"We must focus on what is happening in our schools in terms of public cheating, to the point where we are watching (our children) go out on media channels bragging about having cheated in tests, or brazenly attacking their school administration and monitoring committees for putting pressure on them and not letting them cheat,' columnist Walid Ibrahim Al-Ahmad wrote for Al-Rai daily.

"Now we reached a more difficult stage, with students vandalizing the cars of teachers and school principals who prevent them from cheating!

"Last week, I was very happy when the Court of Appeal ruled in a historic ruling that a male and female citizen be imprisoned for two years with hard labor for running and masterminding a 'gang' to help students cheat by leaking high school exam papers.

"The court also ruled to imprison two teachers for 6 months for photographing exam questions, creating groups via WhatsApp to sell the questions, and making huge illegal profits from selling the questions!

"The court also proved that one of the suspects transferred 177,000 dinars to a company account in one day to camouflage his suspicious activity in selling high school question papers.

"What is painful is what makes you think a thousand times before breaking the laws. This ruling requires more oversight, referral to the prosecution, protection of school administrations and examination committees from student threats by referring the accused to the prosecution, without compromising.

"The educational process has collapsed in recent years through miserable educational outcomes after the spread of public cheating in government and the private sector schools, to the point that our schools have begun to produce students who do not succeed except through private tuition and a generation that does not know how to form a small sentence.

"It is a shared responsibility between home and school. Whenever understanding exists, the outcome is positive, and whenever discord and lack of follow-up exist between the two parties, there is joint destruction.

"For those who want to know the extent of fraud in the country, and those who return with unworthy certificates from abroad, especially doctorate certificates, should research the number of forged certificates and go to the Higher Education Administration to check the equivalency of the

certificates. - Compiled by PFX Fernandes

He said Kuwait has established an addiction treatment center specialized in providing medical services to citizens and expatriates suffering from addiction.

He disclosed the center also provides medical follow-up services by visiting clinics with new or previous addiction cases -- around 51,480 cases; indicating that no deaths were recorded in the center last year.

Security, traffic plan set to tackle 'girgian' issues

KUWAIT CITY, March 23: The Ministry of Interior has announced its security and traffic plan for the holy month of Ra-

which includes providing a number of fixed and mobile security patrols in all governorates to ensure the security and safety of everyone, reports Al-Anba daily.







urday showed a fleet of emergency vehicles still gathered outside the ruins of Crocus City Hall, which had a capacity of more than 6,000 people in Krasnogorsk, on Moscow's western edge.

Videos posted online showed gunmen in the venue shooting civilians at point-blank range. The roof of the theater, where crowds had gathered Friday for a performance by the Russian rock band Picnic, collapsed in the early hours of Saturday morning as firefighters spent hours fighting a fire that erupted during the attack.

In a statement posted by its Aamaq news agency, the Islamic State's affiliate in Afghanistan said it had attacked a large gathering of "Christians" in Krasnogorsk. It was not immediately possible to verify the authenticity of the claim.

A U.S. intelligence official told the AP that U.S. intelligence agencies had gathered information in recent weeks that the IS branch was planning an attack in Moscow, and that U.S. officials had privately shared the intelligence earlier this month with Russian officials.

The official was briefed on the matter but was not authorized to publicly discuss the intelligence information and spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity.

Messages of outrage, shock and support for those affected have since streamed in from around the world.

On Friday, the U.N. Security Council condemned "the heinous and cowardly terrorist attack" and underlined the need for the perpetrators to be held accountable. U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres also condemned the terrorist attack "in the strongest possible terms," his spokesman said.

Meanwhile, in Moscow itself, hundreds of people stood in line Saturday morning to donate blood and plasma, Russia's health ministry said.

Putin, who extended his grip on Russia for another six years in this week's presidential vote after a sweeping crackdown on dissent, had publicly denounced the Western warnings of a potential terrorist attack as an attempt to intimidate Russians. "All that resembles open blackmail and an attempt to frighten and destabilize our society," he said earlier this week.

In October 2015, a bomb planted by the Islamic State downed a Russian passenger plane over Sinai, killing all 224 people on board, most of them Russian vacation-goers returning from Egypt. The group, which operates mainly in Syria and Iraq but also in Afghanistan and Africa, also has claimed several attacks in Russia's volatile Caucasus and other regions in the past years. It recruited fighters from Russia and other parts of the former Soviet Union.

"She has been subjected to intense scrutiny and has been unfairly treated by certain sections of the media around the world and on social media," Prime Minister Rishi Sunak said. King Charles III, who is also undergoing treatment for an unspecified type of cancer, said in a statement that he was "so proud of Catherine for her courage in speaking as she did." Prince Harry and his wife Meghan, who have been estranged from the royal family since their move to California in 2020, said they wished "health and healing for Kate and the family.

Until Friday there had been little information about Kate's condition, and her months-long disappearance from public view fueled a flurry of rumor-mongering about the "missing" future queen.

Officials had only said that Kate's surgery in January was successful and recuperation would keep the princess away from public duties until April.

Feelings of distrust about the royals gained ground earlier this month after Kate acknowledged that she had edited an official photo released to mark Mother's Day in the U.K. The photo, which was meant to calm and reassure the public, triggered a backlash after The Associated Press and other news agencies retracted the image over concerns it was manipulated.

Even a video published last week by The Sun and TMZ that appeared to show Kate and William shopping near their home did not dispel the negative coverage, with some armchair detectives refusing to believe the video showed Kate at all.

Slovaks head to polls

Poland's govt readies new self-defense law

WARSAW, Poland, March 23, (AP): Poland's government has prepared new legislation to boost the nation's capacity for self-defense, including more funding for first aid courses, better public warning systems, and more emergency shelters, officials said Friday.

Ministers of defense and of the interior said the bill was prompted by the war that neighboring Ukraine is



fighting against Russia's aggression. Russia has recently captured territory in the east, while Ukraine is running critically low on ammunition.

The legislation will be put before Parliament probably in May, after consultations with the public and with local authorities, ministers said.

Polls will close at 2100 GMT and results are expected Sunday

If no candidate gets a majority, which is expected, the top two finishers will go through to a runoff on

Hungary's Orbán congratulates Putin: Hungary's populist prime minister, Viktor Orbán, has congratulated Russian President Vladimir Putin on his victory in an election whose outcome was never in doubt after systematic crackdowns on dissent.

Orbán, widely seen as Putin's closest ally in the European Union, sent the letter of congratulations on Thursday after the release of official election results in Russia, according to his press chief. The Hungarian leader was the only head of a EU country to congratulate Putin on his reelection, which will extend his nearly quarter-century rule of Russia by another six

Putin's landslide victory was widely criticized by Western leaders, who characterized the result as preordained in Russia's repressive political system. The EU criticized the election as taking place in a "highly restricted environment exacerbated also by Russia's illegal war of aggression against Ukraine.'

Russia court rejects Navalny's mom suit: A Russian court has rejected a lawsuit filed by the mother of Alexei Navalny, the Russian opposition stalwart who died in prison in February, that claimed he received inadequate medical care, a close Navalny colleague said Thursday.

Ivan Zhdanov, head of the Anti-Corruption Foundation that was started by Navalny, said the court in the town of Labytnangi, near the Arctic prison where he died, turned down the suit because it said only Navalny himself could be the plaintiff.

"Alexei filed claims against the colonies many times for failure to provide medical care. The claims were denied. Now that he was killed, his family's claim is being denied with mocking wording," Zhdanov said on the Telegram messaging app.

Spanish regional leader under pressure: A Spanish judge has opened an investigation into alleged fraud and false documentation against the partner of Madrid's powerful rightwing regional president, Isabel Díaz Ayuso, who has recently faced a wave of calls to resign over several controversies.

The move Friday is certain to put more pressure on her party, Spain's main conservative opposition Popular Party, to take action against her.

Ayuso, who is seen as a possible future party leader and prime ministerial candidate, has come under fire in recent months on several fronts. Last week, news reports said the Spanish tax office was investigating accusations of tax fraud against her partner, Alberto González Amador.

British man sentenced to life: A British IT worker who befriended and worked for an older couple, poisoned them with fentanyl and monitored their death with his cellphone was sentenced Friday to a minimum 37 years in prison.

The sentencing of Luke D'Wit, 34, came two days after he was found guilty of murder in the deaths of of Stephen and Carol Baxter, 61 and 64, last April at their home in West Mersea, 70 miles (113 kilometers) east of London.

During the six-week trial at Chelmsford Crown Court, jurors also heard that D'Wit had created a fake will on his phone to make him a director of their shower mat company, a day after he killed them. He even monitored them remotely as they died from his deadly concoction.

2 held over Irish gas station explosion: Two men were arrested Friday in connection with a gas station explosion in 2022 that killed 10 people and tore apart the heart of a village in northwestern Ireland, police said.

The blast shattered Creeslough, County Donegal, a village of 400 near Ireland's rugged Atlantic coast. The Applegreen gas station and a building that housed the town's main shop and post office were destroyed and an adjacent apartment building was damaged. Flying debris shattered windows in nearby cottages.

Four men, three women, two teenagers and a 5-year-old girl were killed. Eight people were injured. Ireland's police force, An Garda Siochana, said two men in their 50s were in custody but released no details about their alleged connection to the deadly eruption.

Texas bus-truck collision kills 2: A cement truck veered into a school bus carrying more than 40 pre-K students returning from a field trip to a Texas zoo Friday, killing a boy on the bus and a man in another

vehicle, authorities said. Officials said the bus rolled over on the highway in the rural outskirts of Austin, where a heavy presence of emergency vehicles shut down traffic for hours. The roof of the bus was crumpled, and much of another vehicle nearby was pulverized. Personal items were strewn across the road.

Four people in critical condition were airlifted from the crash site. Six others with potentially serious injuries were transported by ambulance, said Kevin Parker, division chief Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical Services.

An ambulance bus transported about 10 other patients to a children's hospital with minor injuries, Parker said. Passengers on the bus included 44 students and 11 adults, according to the Hays Consolidated Independent School District. (AP)

Student's body found in river: Riley **Strain**, a University of Missouri student who went missing in Tennessee's capital for nearly two weeks, has been found dead in a river, police announced Friday. No foul play is suspected, investigators said.

Metro Nashville police officials confirmed that Strain's body had been recovered from the Cumberland River about 8 miles (12.8 kilometers) west of downtown at around 7:30 a.m. Police Chief John Drake told report-

ers that workers on the river initially found Strain's body and alerted authorities. Medical examiners later confirmed it was Strain, he said. Police department spokesperson Don Aaron said an autopsy will be conducted Saturday.

"We have reports that normally under these circumstances ... with his height and weight, he could have surfaced between 14 and 20 days," Drake said. "This is the 14th day. So we were really expecting to find

US Senate passes \$1.2 trillion funding package

WASHINGTON, March 23, (AP): The Senate passed a \$1.2 trillion package of spending bills in the early morning hours Saturday, a long overdue action nearly six months into the budget year that will push any threats of a government shutdown to the fall. The bill now goes to President Joe Biden to be signed into law.

The vote was 74-24. It came after funding had expired for the agencies at midnight, but the White House sent out a notice shortly after the deadline announcing the Office of Management and Budget had ceased shutdown preparations because there was a high degree of confidence that Congress would pass the legislation and the president would sign it on Saturday.

"Because obligations of federal funds are incurred and tracked on a daily basis, agencies will not shut down and may continue their normal operations," the White House statement said.

Prospects for a short-term government shutdown had appeared to grow Friday evening after Republicans and Democrats battled over proposed amendments to the bill. Any successful amendments to the bill would have sent the legislation back to the House. which had already left town for a twoweek recess.

But shortly before midnight Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer announced a breakthrough.

Difficult

"It's been a very long and difficult day, but we have just reached an agreement to complete the job of funding the government," Schumer said. "It is good for the country that we have reached this bipartisan deal. It wasn't easy, but tonight our persistence has been worth it.'

While Congress has already approved money for Veterans Affairs, Interior, Agriculture and other agencies, the bill approved this week is much larger, providing funding for the Defense, Homeland Security and State departments and other aspects of general government.

The House passed the bill Friday morning by a vote of 286-134, narrowly gaining the two-thirds majority needed for approval. More than 70%

flected anger among Republicans over the content of the package and the speed with which it was brought to a vote. House Speaker Mike Johnson brought the measure to the floor even though a majority of Republicans ended up voting against it. He said afterward that the bill "represents the best achievable outcome in a divided government."

In sign of the conservative frustration, Rep. Marjorie Taylor Greene, R-Ga., initiated an effort to oust Johnson as the House began the vote but held off on further action until the House returns in two weeks. It's the same tool that was used last year to remove the last Republican speaker, Kevin McCarthy

The vote breakdown showed 101 Republicans voting for the bill and 112 voting against it. Meanwhile, 185 Democrats voted for the bill and 22 against.

Rep. Kay Granger, the Republican chair of the House Appropriations Committee that helped draft the package, stepped down from that role after the vote. She said she would stay on the committee to provide advice and lead as a teacher for colleagues when needed.

Johnson broke up this fiscal year's spending bills into two parts as House Republicans revolted against what has become an annual practice of asking them to vote for one massive, complex bill called an omnibus with little time to review it or face a shutdown. Johnson viewed that as a breakthrough, saying the two-part process was "an important step in breaking the omnibus muscle memory."

Still, the latest package was clearly unpopular with most Republicans, who viewed it as containing too few of their policy priorities and as spending too much.

"The bottom line is that this is a complete and utter surrender," said Rep. Eric Burlison, R-Mo. It took lawmakers six months into

US vice president visits Puerto Rico

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, March 23, (AP): US Vice President Kamala Harris visited Puerto Rico on Friday as part of a whirlwind trip to tout the federal aid the US territory has received following deadly hurricanes and attend a Democratic fundraiser.

Her visit comes days after US President Joe Biden launched a campaign targeting Latino voters ahead of the November general elections. While those in Puerto Rico cannot vote in US presidential elections despite being US citizens, more than 5 million Puerto Ricans live in the US mainland.

Accompanying Harris for the roughly five-hour visit to the island were US Energy Secretary Jennifer Granholm and Housing and Urban Development Deputy Secretary Adrianne Todman. Welcoming them



was Gov. Pedro Pierluisi, a Democrat whose New Progressive Party has long pushed for statehood. Harris' first stop was to visit

a new home in the northern municipality of Canovanas, located near the capital. It had been destroyed after Hurricane Maria hit the island in September 2017 as a powerful Category 4 storm, killing nearly 3,000 people in its aftermath.

En route, the motorcade passed people holding their phones up as it went by. Some onlookers leaned out of their cars to take photos as they waited for the motorcade to pass, while others stood outside businesses and homes as the motorcade continued. One girl held a sign imploring help to fix their home. "I see we are making a difference. There is still

more work to do," Harris said as she stood on the lawn of the new home draped with a large Puerto Rican flag. "We are ambitious. Yes, we are impatient."

It was Harris' first visit to Puerto Rico as vice

president. She visited as a US senator in 2017 after devastating hurricanes Irma and Maria pummeled the Harris said one of the ongoing challenges Puerto

Rico faces is intermittent energy sources, with outages still occurring daily since Maria razed the power grid.

Machado names substitute: Venezuelan opposition powerhouse María Corina Machado on Friday named a substitute to her presidential bid while she fights a government ban on her running for office.

The announcement comes as Machado faces increasing political repression from the government of President Nicolás Maduro as well as pressure from foreign leaders and fellow government opponents to abandon her candidacy.

Machado made the announcement two days after authorities arrested two of her campaign staffers and issued warrants for seven more, accusing them of links to an alleged anti-government plot. She told reporters that college professor Corina Yo-

ris will be registered as an opposition faction's presidential candidate ahead of a Monday deadline. The presidential election is set for July 28. "Today is a great day and we have taken a big step,

a great step, for the electoral victory in which we will defeat Nicolas Maduro," Machado said from her camaign headquarters in Venezuela's capital, Caracas. She said Yoris is "a person with my full confidence, honorable, who will carry out this process with the support and trust of everyone."

As of the announcement, Machado said, Yoris was not subject to a ban on running for office.

Obrador won't fight drug cartels: Mexico's president said Friday he won't fight Mexican drug cartels on US orders, in the clearest explanation yet of his refusal to confront the gangs.

Over the years, President Andrés Manuel López Obrador has laid out various justifications for his "hugs, not bullets" policy of avoiding clashes with the cartels. In the past he has said "you cannot fight violence with violence," and on other occasions he has argued the government has to address "the causes" of drug cartel violence, ascribing them to poverty or a lack of opportunities.

But on Friday, while discussing his refusal to go after the cartels, he made it clear he viewed it as part of what he called a "Mexico First" policy.

"We are not going to act as policemen for any for-eign government," López Obrador said at his daily news briefing. "Mexico First. Our home comes first."

López Obrador basically argued that drugs were a US problem, not a Mexican one. He offered to help limit the flow of drugs into the United States, but only, he said, on humanitarian grounds.

'More than 33K fled in 13 days': More than 33,000 people have fled Haiti's capital in a span of nearly two weeks as gangs continue to pillage homes and attack state institutions, according to a new report from the UN's International Organization for Migration.

The majority of those displaced have traveled to Haiti's southern region, which is generally peaceful compared with Port-au-Prince, which has an estimated population of 3 million and remains largely paralyzed by gang violence. "Attacks and generalized insecurity are pushing more and more people to leave the capital to find refuge in provinces, taking the risks of passing through gang-controlled routes," IOM said in its report released late Thursday.

Scores of people have been killed and some 17,000 people overall left homeless since the gang attacks began on Feb. 29, with gunmen targeting police stations and the main international airport that remains closed. They also stormed Haiti's two biggest prisons and released more than 4,000 inmates.

65 migrants bodies found in Libya: The UN's migration agency expressed alarm Friday over the discovery of a mass grave containing the bodies of at least 65 migrants in the deserts of western Libya.

Earlier this week, Libya's criminal investigations authority reported the grave had been found in the Shuayrif region, 350 kilometers (220 miles) south of the capital, Tripoli.

On its Facebook page, it said 65 bodies of unidentified migrants had been unearthed from the grave, samples were taken for DNA testing and the bodies were reburied in a specified graveyard for later investigation.

The UN's International Organization for Migration said the nationalities of the discovered migrants and the circumstances of their deaths was not known, but that they likely died while being smuggled through the

Electoral silence in Senegal: The Senegalese people observed on Saturday electoral silence as a prelude to presidential elections due on Sunday following two weeks of heated campaigns by the nomi-

Up to 19 candidates have been jostling to win the Senegalese minds and hearts and occupy the presidential post for a five-year mandate

The head of the Independent Election Commission, Abdullah Silla, said in a statement broadcast by the Senegalese news agency that the commission observers and representatives of the nominees would be present at the ballot stations. This is the first time that such elections are held without the

nomination of the president, he said. President Macky Sall had delayed the elections that were originally set on February 25, however, the constitutional council had intervened, amid public protests, annulling the president's decision and ordering that the voting must be held before the end of his tenure. Later on, he set the balloting on March 24.

The election general directorate reported that the elections would be supervised by 2,457 observers including 1,568 national observers and 889 foreign ones. (AP)

2 killed, 23 hurt in stampede: Hundreds of students in northern Nigeria rushed to get food donated to their school by the government to help ease hardship, resulting in a stampede that left two dead and 23 others injured, school authorities said Friday.

Africa's most populous country is facing one of its worst economic crises in decades, triggered by surging inflation and a declining local currency. They followed the introduction of new monetary policies by President Bola Tinubu, who since his election last year has set out to stabilize the economy and attract foreign investment.

The students of Nasarawa State University near the nation's capital, Abuja, had gathered to receive bags of rice donated by the state government. The situation got out of control following a crowd surge, university spokesperson Abraham Habu Ekpo said. It is not the first time this year that distribution of food has triggered a deadly stampede, as citizens in the country of more than 210 million people are becoming more desperate because of growing hunger and job losses. (AP)

China hits Philippine boat with water cannons

MANILA, Philippines, March 23, (AP): Chinese coast guard ships hit a Philippine supply boat with water cannons Saturday in the latest confrontation near a disputed shoal in the South China Sea, causing injuries to its navy crew members and heavy damage to the wooden vessel, Philippine officials

The United States and Japan immediately expressed their support to the Philippines, as well as alarm over Chinese forces' aggression off the Second Thomas Shoal, which has been the scene of repeated confrontations between Chinese and Philippine vessels over the past year.

The far-flung shoal has been occupied by a small contingent of Philippine navy and marines on a marooned warship since 1999, but has been surrounded by Chinese coast guard and suspected militia vessels in an increasingly tense territorial standoff. It's the second time the Philippine boat Unaizah May 4 has been damaged by the Chinese coast guard's water cannon assault in March alone.

The repeated high-seas confrontations have sparked fears they could degenerate into a larger conflict that could bring China and the United States into a collision.

Washington lays no claims to the busy seaway, a key global trade route, but has deployed Navy ships and fighter jets in what it calls "freedom of navigation" operations, which China has criticized.

The US has also warned repeatedly that it's obligated to defend the Philippines - its oldest treaty ally in Asia - if Filipino forces, ships and aircraft come under an armed attack, including in the South China Sea.

Escorted by two Philippine coast guard ships, the Unaizah May 4 was en route to deliver supplies and a fresh batch of Filipino sailors to the territorial outpost in the shoal at dawn Saturday when they were blocked and surrounded by Chinese coast guard ships and suspected militia vessels.

"Their reckless and dangerous actions culminated with the water cannoning of Unaizah May 4, causing severe damage to the vessel and injuries to Filipinos onboard," a Philippine government task force dealing with the territorial conflicts said without elabo-

The hostilities dragged on for about 8 hours, they said.

"The Philippines will not be deterred - by veiled threats or hostility - from exercising our legal rights over our maritime zones," the government task force said in a statement. "We demand that China demonstrate in deeds and not in words that it is a responsible and trustworthy member of the international community.'

Chinese coast guard spokesperson Gan Yu said the Philippine vessels intruded into what he said was China's territorial waters despite repeated warnings.

MANILA, Philippines: A former Filipino congressman accused of masterminding the killings of a provincial governor and several others has been arrested in East Timor and will be deported to the Philippines, Philippine justice officials said Friday.

Police arrested Arnolfo Teves Ir. while he was playing at a golf driving range Thursday in East Timor's capital of Dili, where he has tried to seek asylum, the Philippine Department of Justice said. His arrest had been sought through an Interpol red notice asking police worldwide to locate and apprehend him.

Teves is facing murder charges in connection with the killings of Negros Oriental Gov. Roel Degamo and eight other people, including some seeking aid at his home in Pamplona town in March last year. At least 17 others, including a doctor and two army soldiers, were wounded in the attack, police said then.

At least six men armed with assault rifles and wearing military camouflage and bullet-resistant vests walked calmly into Degamo's residential compound and opened fire in an attack that was captured on security cameras. The shooters fled in three SUVs and authorities later announced the capture of a number of suspects.

Teves denied any involvement in the killing of Degamo and the other victims and said without elaborating that he was set up. The killings refocused attention on

MEULABOH, Indonesia: About 70 Muslim Rohingya refugees are feared missing or dead from a boat that made a grueling sea voyage from Bangladesh and sank off Indonesia's coast this week with 75 survivors, UN agencies said.

A statement issued jointly by UN High Commissioner for Refugees, or UNHCR, and the International Office for Migration, or IOM, said they were 'extremely concerned about the scale of potential loss of life," saying that accounts from survivors indicated about 150 people originally were aboard.

That likely would have included a crew of about five people, who apparently abandoned the vessel and whose whereabouts are unknown. Two survivors told The Associated Press on Friday that the captain and four crew abandoned the boat for another one when the refugee vessel started to sink. Indonesian fishermen raised the

alarm about the stricken vessel Wednesday when they started rescuing its passengers, and an Indonesian search and rescue ship on Thursday pulled remaining people from the capsized hull about 22 kilometers (14 miles) off the western coast of Indonesia's Aceh province.

The U.N. joint statement did not specify the exact number of people believed lost, but a website maintained by UNHCR said 75 people were "reported dead or missing" from a boat whose details match the one that capsized Wednesday.

"If confirmed this would be the biggest loss of life so far this year," said the statement, referring to a steady stream of boats carrying Rohingya seeking to escape crowded refugee camps in Bangladesh and Myanmar.

Kuwait's renewable energy ambitions face challenges

Nation aims for 22 gigawatts of renewable energy by 2030

KUWAIT CITY, March 23: A recent report by "Arabian Gulf Business Insight" sheds light on Kuwait's ongoing challenges in transitioning to clean energy, despite the nation's announcement of a 20-year renewable energy strategy, reports Al-Qabas daily.

Despite possessing approximately 7% of global oil reserves, Kuwait remains one of the largest emitters of greenhouse gases in the

The country aims to counterbalance its significant oil production capacity, exceeding 3 million barrels per day, by achieving renewable energy capabilities of around 22 gigawatts by 2030.

However, experts suggest that Kuwait's progress in renewable energy projects remains sluggish. Robin Mills, CEO of Qamar Energy Company, highlighted Kuwait's missed opportunities in advancing large-scale renewable energy initiatives, including the Al Shaqaya project.

Mills emphasized Kuwait's favorable solar and wind energy potential and

the potential benefits of reducing air pollution and cutting costs through renewable energy adoption.

Governance challenges and historical reliance on oil revenues have hindered Kuwait's transition to renewable energy, according to Tadhg O'Donovan, chief energy scientist at Heriot-Watt University Dubai.

Meanwhile, analysts predict significant growth in solar energy capacity cross the Middle East, with solar energy projects expected to increase substantially. Countries like the UAE, Saudi Arabia, and Egypt are poised to lead this growth, while Oman and Algeria have already initiated tenders for solar

Despite these projections, Kuwait has yet to feature among the top 10 countries in the region in terms of the value of renewable energy projects under implementation. Saudi Arabia leads the pack with renewable energy projects exceeding \$10 billion, followed by the UAE, Egypt, and Morocco.

Kuwait's challenges underscore the need for concerted efforts to overcome governance obstacles and expedite the implementation of renewable energy initiatives, aligning with global trends towards sustainability and environmen-

Government efficiency key to Kuwait's competitiveness

Kuwait ranks 38th globally, fifth in Arab world on Global Competitiveness Index

KUWAIT CITY, March 23: Kuwait has secured the 38th position globally and fifth in the Arab world on the Global Competitiveness Index for the year 2023, showcasing significant advancements in key competitive factors, reports Al-Qa-

The government efficiency, a pivotal aspect of the index, is evaluated through five sub-indicators: public finance, tax policy, institutional framework, business legislation, and social framework.

The report encompasses 64 countries, selected based on the availability of comparable international statistics and cooperation with local partner institutes for reliable data collection.

The competitiveness ranking relies on 335 criteria derived from extensive research, economic literature, international, regional, and national sources, as well as inputs from the business community, government agencies, and academics.

Continual review and updates of standards are undertaken to incorporate new theories, research, and evolving global economic dynamics.

The report serves to illuminate nations' strengths and weaknesses, identifying areas for enhancement in economic, political, and social domains. It aids policymakers in prioritizing key competitiveness issues to rejuvenate productivity, spur growth, and elevate living standards.

However, companies operate in a national environment that enhances or hinders their ability to compete domestically or internationally – this area of research is called "country competitiveness", and this is what the Global Competitiveness Taxonomy covers.

The following are the most prominent recommendations:

■ Providing an integrated electronic portal to serve the business and investment sector to contribute to supporting the wheel of economic growth, raising the domestic product, and facilitating the operations of the import and export system to raise the level of economic performance in the country.

■ Enacting laws and legislation to address the imbalance, achieving balance in the demographic composition, and developing planning policies to modify the current composition.

■- Applying best practices in sustainable investment, to enhance the competitiveness of the Kuwaiti financial market, with the aim of attracting more foreign investments to it.

■ Supporting investment in the knowledge economy to achieve high added value, and create the appropriate environment to unleash creative energies, with the aim of contributing to reforming the economy in an innovative way, to increase competitiveness potential and drive economic growth.

Al-Zour Refinery faces production cuts

Kuwait crude oil output to hit 4 million in 2040!

A ccording to the statement issued by Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) last week, our current production is capped at 2.4 million barrels per day due to two voluntary reduction cuts totaling about 238,000 barrels in 2023 and 2024. Our three local refineries are operating at 1.4 million barrels per day, and an additional

three refincurrently operational Oman, Vietnam, and Italy, with a combined capacity of about 600,000 barrels per

day. Therefore, KPC's refining capacity stands at two million barrels per day. Consequently, there isn't much net Kuwaiti crude oil remaining for global

This formidable challenge facing KPC makes it unlikely for us to make significant progress in discovering new oil reserves or increasing our production. One temporary solution may be to reduce refinery cuts, as we are currently doing with our latest Al-Zour refinery by cutting its throughput by 200,000 barrels to free up crude oil for sale.

However, KPC did not provide details on the progress towards achieving its target of four million barrels, such as reaching three million barrels net of Kuwait Oil Company (KOC), excluding the Neutral Zone, for example. It also did not address whether we have halted the decline in crude oil production or how we are meeting the demands of our long standing customers.

It is disheartening to witness the decline in our primary source of income and the inability to increase our crude oil production. This raises recurring questions about our policy with OPEC+ regarding our commitment to reducing production at a time when Kuwait is in need of every barrel, as we are barely meeting our own foreign and domestic obligations.

Despite cutting our production once last year, we find ourselves compelled to reduce it again this year, resulting in the need to cut production at the Al-Zour refinery by 200,000 barrels per day to meet our crude oil sales obligations. Meanwhile, other OPEC+ members not only refuse to cut production but also exceed their established quotas, depriving us of additional funds while we face deficits in our budgets by the end of the financial year.

Predicting crude oil production for 2040 in 2024 is projecting too far ahead. KPC should have instead informed the USA about Kuwait's production for a nearer term such as for 2026-2027 or even shorter periods. Or it should wait for about six years to achieve such a figure, considering the uncertainties regarding the fate of fossil fuels and the development of alternatives to oil, or after figuring out when KPC can achieve a production level of three million barrels without taking into consideration the production from the Neutral Zone.

hundreds of thousands of financial aid applications need to be fixed

The U.S. Education Department said it has discovered a calculation error in hundreds of thousands of student financial aid applications sent to colleges this month and will need to reprocess them - a blunder that follows a series of others and threatens further delays to this year's col-

A vendor working for the federal government incorrectly calculated a financial aid formula for more than 200,000 students, the department said Friday. The information was sent to colleges to help them prepare financial aid packages but now needs to be recalculated - even as the department works through a backlog of more than 4 million other financial aid applications.

A statement from the Education Department says the problem won't affect 1.3 million applications that were processed correctly and distributed to colleges this month. Officials said they have fixed the error and it will not affect future records.

It's unlikely that many students, if any, received financial aid offers based on the incorrect information since the department only began sending records in the last two weeks. Once colleges receive that information, it usually takes several weeks to assemble financial aid pack-

Students applying for college have been left in limbo this year as they await the Education Department's overhaul of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid. The form, known as FAFSA, is used to determine eligibility for federal Pell Grants, and colleges and states use it to award their own financial aid to students.

The update was meant to simplify the form but took months longer

than expected. It gives colleges less time to make financial aid offers to students, and it gives students less time to decide where to enroll.

This is another unforced error that will likely cause more processing delays for students," said Justin Draeger, president and CEO of the National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators.

After so many delays, he added, "Every error adds up and will be felt acutely by every student who is counting on need-based financial aid to make their postsecondary dreams a reality."

The latest misstep has to do with the Student Aid Index, a new formula used to determine students' level of financial need after they submit the FAFSA application. For some students, the department forgot to factor in certain financial assets including investments, savings and total cash, according to an agency memo sent to colleges on Friday. (AP)

Move to potentially net former president billions

Trump's social media company approved to go public

NEW YORK, March 23, (AP): Donald Trump is returning to the stock market, and the former president stands to reap a sizeable payout in the process.

Shareholders of Digital World Acquisition Corp., a publicly traded shell company, approved a deal to merge with the Trump's media business in a Friday vote. That means Trump Media & Technology Group, whose flagship product is social networking site Truth Social, will soon begin trading on the Nasdaq stock market.

Trump is set to own most of the combined company - or nearly 79 million shares. Multiply that by Digital World's closing stock price Friday of \$36.94, and the total value of his stake could be nearly \$3 billion.

The greenlight arrives at a time the presumptive Republican presidential nominee is facing his most costly legal battle to date: a \$454 million judgment in a fraud lawsuit.

But Trump won't be able to cash out the deal's windfall immediately, unless the company's board makes changes to a "lock-up" provision that prevents company insiders from selling newly issued shares for six months.

Trump's presidential campaign did not immediately respond to request for

When a publicly traded shell company agrees to buy a private company, the target company takes its place on a stock exchange once the combination is approved by shareholders. If recent activity in Digital World's stock is any indication, shareholders of Trump Media could be in for a bumpy ride.

Many of Digital World's investors are small-time investors who are either fans of Trump or trying to cash in on the mania, instead of big institutional and professional investors. Those shareholders helped the stock more than double this year in anticipation of the merger going through. But on Friday, the shares lost almost 14%.

Trump's earlier foray into the stock market didn't end well. Trump Hotels and Casino Resorts went public in 1995 under the symbol DJT - the same symbol Trump Media will trade under. By 2004, Trump's casino company had filed for bankruptcy protection and was delisted from the New York Stock Exchange.

Ahead of Friday's approval, Digital World's regulatory filings listed many of the risks its investors face, as well as those of the Truth Social owner once Trump Media also goes public.

Alleges monopoly on smartphone mkt

US Justice Department sues Apple

WASHINGTON, March 23, (AP): The Justice Department on Thursday announced a sweeping antitrust lawsuit against Apple, accusing the tech giant of engineering an illegal monopoly in smartphones that boxes out competitors, stifles innovation and keeps prices artificially high.

The lawsuit, filed in federal court in New Jersey, alleges that Apple has monopoly power in the smartphone market and leverages control over the iPhone to "engage in a broad, sustained, and illegal course of conduct.'

"Apple has locked its consumers into the iPhone while locking its competitors out of the market," said Deputy Attorney General Lisa Monaco. Stalling the advancement of the very market it revolutionized, she said, it has "smothered an entire industry.'

Apple called the lawsuit "wrong on the facts and the law" and said it "will vigorously defend against it."

The suit takes aim at how Apple allegedly molds its technology and business relationships to "extract more money from consumers, developers, content creators, artists, publishers, small businesses, and merchants, among others.

That includes diminishing the functionality of non-Apple smartwatches, limiting access to contactless payment for third-party digital wallets and refusing to allow its iMessage app to exchange encrypted messaging with competing plat-

It specifically seeks to stop Apple from undermining technologies that compete with its own apps -- in areas including streaming, messaging and digital payments -- and prevent it from continuing to craft contracts with developers, accessory makers and consumers that let it "obtain, maintain, extend or entrench a monopoly.

The lawsuit - filed with 16 state attorneys general - is just the latest example of aggressive antitrust enforcement by an administration that has also taken on Google, Amazon and other tech giants with the stated aim of making the digital universe more fair, innovative and competitive.

"The Department of Justice has an enduring legacy taking on the biggest and toughest monopolies in history,' said Assistant Attorney General Jonathan Kanter, head of the antitrust division, at a press conference announcing the lawsuit. "Today we stand here once again to promote competition and innovation for next generation of tech-

Antitrust researcher Dina Srinavasan, a Yale University fellow, compared the lawsuit's significance to the government's action against Microsoft a quarter century ago - picking a "tremendous fight" with what has been the world's most prosperous

President Joe Biden has called for the Justice Department and the Federal Trade Commission to vigorously enforce antitrust statutes. While its stepped-up policing of corporate mergers and questionable business practices has met resistance from some business leaders - accusing the Democratic administration of overreach - it's been

lauded by others as long overdue. The case seeks to pierce the digital fortress that Apple Inc., based in Cupertino, California, has assiduously built around the iPhone and other popular products such as the iPad, Mac and Apple Watch to create what is often referred to as a "walled garden" so its hardware and software can seamlessly offer user-friendly harmony.

The strategy has helped Apple attain an annual revenue of nearly \$400 billion and, until recently, a market value of more than \$3 trillion.

Leaders from over 30 countries meet in Brussels to promote nuclear energy

BRUSSELS, March 23, (AP): In the shadows of a massive monument glorifying nuclear energy, over 30 leaders and delegations from around the world backed the idea of using the controversial energy source to help achieve a climate-neutral globe while providing countries an added sense of economic and security independence.

Such a summit would have been unthinkable a dozen years ago after the 2011 Fukushima nuclear accident in Japan, but a warming planet creating a need to phase out fossil fuels and the war in Ukraine laying bare dependence on Russian energy have turned the tide in recent years.

"We have to do everything possible to facilitate the contribution of nuclear energy," said Rafael Grossi, the head of the International Atomic Energy Agency. "It is clear: Nuclear is there. It has an important role to play," he said.

The one-day meeting is being held next to the 1958 Atomium, the 102-meter (335-foot) -tall construction of the nine iron atoms, which sought to promote the peaceful use of nuclear energy in the wake of the nuclear bomb explosions at the end of World War II and their use as a geopolitical deterrent ever since.

Fatih Birol, executive director International Energy Agency, tried to reinvigorate that peaceful mission.

"Without the support of nuclear power we have no chance to reach our climate targets on time. Renewables will play the major role in terms of electricity, especially solar supported by wind and hydropower," Birol said. "But we also need nuclear power especially in those countries where we don't have major renewable potential."

"We have to do whatever we can to increase the current nuclear capacity, which is currently only less than

10% of global electricity generation,' he said.

In Europe, France is the leader in nuclear energy and accounts for about two-thirds of its overall provisions.

French President Emmanuel Macron said that "thanks to the nuclear model, France is one of the few countries that exports its electricity, which is an opportunity.'

"We should be much more concerned about, for example, CO2 emissions, which have a direct impact on you and me and on our health every day," he said. "Our priority must be to get out of coal and gas and move towards nuclear power and renewable

The devastating impact of a nuclear accident, like the 1986 one in Chernobyl, Ukraine, was barely a talking point at the meeting. Outside the meeting, environmental groups sought to highlight the dangers of the technology and convince leaders that renewable energy sources like wind and solar were much more practical and worthwhile.

Building nuclear plants takes many years and projects are often marred by cost and deadline overruns, and environmentalists stressed that point with demonstrations outside the summit

"Nuclear, all the evidence shows, is too slow to build. It's too expensive. Much more expensive than renewables," said Lorelei Limousin of Greenpeace. "The government must focus on developing renewable energy, energy savings, the real solutions that work for people like home insulation, public transport - not nuclear energy fairy

Thursday's meeting was to be a strategic planning session without any practical outcome expected.

BoE isn't ready to cut rates LONDON, March 23, (AP): The Bank of England kept its main interest rate unchanged at a 16-year high on Thursday and avoided signaling, unlike other central banks, when it might start to cut even though inflation has dropped sharply

from multidecade peaks. The decision to leave the key rate at 5.25% was widely anticipated in financial markets and comes a day after the U.S. Federal Reserve also kept its benchmark rate steady. But unlike the Fed, the Bank of England gave few explicit indications that it was getting ready for a series of interest rate reductions soon.

The Swiss National Bank went the other way by becoming the world's first major central bank to cut rates in the current cycle, with its surprise quarter-point reduction Thursday.

In the U.K., market expectations that lower interest rates were on the horizon got a boost this week with news that inflation fell to a 2.5-year low of 3.4% in February - more than anticipated - and is now not far off the Bank of England's target rate of 2%.

Bank Gov. Andrew Bailey said there have been "further encouraging signs" that inflation is coming down but that more evidence was needed "to be sure" that inflation will fall to his goal and stay there.

"We're not yet at the point where we can cut interest rates, but things are moving in the right direction," he said. The bank's rate-setting Monetary Policy Committee acknowledged that inflation has been trending lower and

could fall below the 2% target in the

second quarter of the year. One rate-setter voted for a quarter-point reduction, while the others backed no change, including two who had voted for a hike last month. That change shows the bank is slanting toward easing the costs to borrow to buy

homes or cars or invest in businesses. "With wage growth still elevated and underlying inflation pressures likely to pull inflation higher again in the second half of the year, we think we are still a few months away from the first rate cut," said Luke Bartholomew, senior economist at asset management firm abrdn. "However, once cuts start, ongoing economic weakness could see rates fall quite

Central banks around the world raised interest rates aggressively in late 2021 from near zero to counter price rises first stoked by supply chain issues during the coronavirus pandemic and then by Russia's invasion of Ukraine,

materially over the next few years.'

Britain's governing Conservative Party hopes that lower inflation and the ensuing decline in interest rates may trigger a feel-good factor ahead of a general election that has to take place by January 2025.

California's unemployment rate is the highest in US

SACRAMENTO, Calif., March 23, (AP): California's unemployment rate is now the highest in the country, reaching 5.3% in February following new data that revealed job growth in the nation's most populous state was much lower last year than previously

California lost a staggering 2.7 million jobs at the start of the coronavirus pandemic, losses brought on by Gov. Gavin Newsom's stay-at-home order, which forced many businesses to

The state has added more than 3 million jobs since then, a remarkable streak that averaged just over 66,000 new jobs per month, according to the state Employment Development Department.

But a recent analysis of unemployment data by the federal government revealed that job growth slowed significantly last year. The federal government releases job numbers each month that state officials use to measure the health of the economy. Each year, the federal government analyzes these numbers to see if they match payroll records. Normally, the revisions are small and don't impact the overall view of the economy.

But this year, while the data initially showed California added 300,000 jobs between September 2022 and September 2023, the corrected numbers released earlier this month show the state added just 50,000 jobs during that

"I think California's economy is the leading edge of the national economic slowdown," said Sung Won Sohn, a professor of finance and economics a Loyola Marymount University. Estimating the number of jobs is

tricky. The number is based on monthly surveys of workers. The recently corrected numbers show that the survey overestimated job growth in some sectors - with the biggest difference coming in the professional services category, which includes the often high-paying professions of lawyers, accountants and engineers, according to an analysis by the nonpartisan Legislative Analyst's Office in California.

Researchers poised for groundbreaking discoveries

April's total solar eclipse promises to be best yet for experiments

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., March 23, (AP): April's total solar eclipse promises to be a scientific bonanza, thanks to new spacecraft and telescopes - and cosmic chance.

The moon will be extra close to Earth, providing a long and intense period of darkness, and the sun should be more active with the potential for dramatic bursts of plasma. Then there's totality's densely populated corridor stretching from Mexico to the U.S. to Canada.

Hundreds if not thousands of the tens of millions of spectators will double as "citizen scientists," helping NASA and other research groups better understand our planet and star.

They'll photograph the sun's outer crownlike atmosphere, or corona, as the moon passes between the sun and Earth, blotting out sunlight for up to 4 minutes and 28 seconds on April 8. They'll observe the quieting of birds and other animals as midday darkness falls. They'll also measure dropping temperatures, monitor clouds and use ham radios to gauge communication disruptions.

At the same time, rockets will blast off with science instruments into the electrically charged portion of the atmosphere near the edge of space known as the ionosphere. The small rockets will soar from Wallops Island, Virginia - some 400 miles outside totality but with 81% of the sun obscured in a partial eclipse. Similar launches were conducted from New Mexico during last October's "ring of fire" solar eclipse that swept across the western U.S. and Central and South America.

"Time for the biggie! It is pretty exciting!!!"

Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University's Aroh Barjatya, the rockets' mission director, said in

NASA's high-altitude jets also will take to the air again, chasing the moon's shadow with improved telescopes to study the sun's corona and surrounding dust.

"Dust sounds boring," acknowledged NA-SA's eclipse program manager Kelly Korreck. "But at the same time, dust is actually really interesting. Those are the leftover remnants from when the solar system was forming.'

More than 600 weather balloons will be launched by college students along the track, providing livestreams while studying atmospheric changes. Cloudy skies shouldn't matter.

"Lucky for us, the balloons flying to 80,000 feet and above don't care if it's cloudy on the ground," said Angela Des Jardins, an astrophysicist at Montana State University who's coordinating the nationwide project.

And if the Federal Aviation Administration approves, a 21-foot (6.5-meter) kite will lift a science instrument three miles (5 kilometers) above Texas in an experiment by the University of Hawaii's Shadia Habbal. She, too, wants to get above any clouds that might hamper her observations of the sun.

Normally hidden by the sun's glare, the corona is on full display during a total solar eclipse, making it a prime research target. The spiky tendrils emanating thousands of miles (kilometers) into space are mystifyingly hotter than the sun's surface - in the millions of degrees, versus thousands.

"In terms of the value of total eclipses, science still cannot explain how the corona is heated to such extreme temperatures," said retired NASA astrophysicist Fred Espenak, better known as Mr. Eclipse for all his charts and books on the subject.

The U.S. won't see another total solar eclipse on this scale until 2045, so NASA and everyone else is pulling out all the stops.

April's eclipse will begin in the Pacific and make landfall at Mazatlan, Mexico, heading up through Texas and 14 other U.S. states before crossing into Canada and exiting into the Atlantic at Newfoundland. Those outside the 115-mile-wide (185-kilometer-wide) path, will

get a partial eclipse. Scientists got a taste of what's to come during the 2017 total solar eclipse that stretched from Oregon to South Carolina. This time, the moon is closer to Earth, resulting in more minutes of darkness and a wider path.

"Any time we can observe for longer, that gives scientists more data," Korreck said.

Another scientific bonus this time: The sun will be just a year away from its maximum solar activity, as opposed to 2017 when it was near its minimum. That means lots more action at the sun, possibly even a coronal mass ejection during the eclipse, with massive amounts of plasma and magnetic field blasted into space.

Plus there are two new spacecraft out there studying the sun: NASA's Parker Solar Probe and the European Space Agency and NASA's Solar Orbiter. They'll join other spacecraft on eclipse duty, including the International Space Station and its astronauts.

Closer to home, April's eclipse, unlike previous ones, will pass over three U.S. radar sites typically used for monitoring space weather. The stations will tune in to what's happening in the upper atmosphere as the skies dim.

How to keep pollen from ruining your spring

Allergy season arrives early in US

CHICAGO, March 23, (AP): Allergy season is here - and it's earlier and stronger than expected.

More than 80 million Americans deal with itchy eyes, runny nose and other symptoms of seasonal allergies, according to the Asthma and Allergy Foundation of Amer-

The level of misery people will face depends on where they live and what they're allergic to, but there are things you can do to feel better.

Dr. Rachna Shah usually starts looking at pollen counts in the Chicago area in April. But she peeked at her data in mid-February, and saw tree pollen was already at a "moderate" level.

"This season has been so nuts," said Shah, an allergist and director of the Loyola Medicine Allergy Count. "Granted, it was a pretty mild winter, but I didn't expect it to be so early.

Shah said she believes this season will be longer than other years, assuming the weather remains warm. Experts say climate change has led to longer and more intense allergy seasons.

The Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America issues an annual ranking of the most challenging cities to live in if you have allergies, based on over-the-counter medicine use, pollen counts and the number of available allergy specialists. This year, the top five were Wichita, Kansas; Virginia Beach, Virginia; Greenville, South Carolina; Dallas; and Oklahoma City

Dr. Nana Mireku is an allergist in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, and said "people are pretty miserable right now and allergists are pretty busy.'

There are three main types of pollen that cause seasonal allergies. Earlier in the spring, tree pollen is the main culprit. After that grasses pollinate, followed by weeds in the late summer and early fall.

Some of the most common tree pollens that cause allergies include birch, cedar, cottonwood, maple, elm, oak and walnut, according to the Asthma and Allergy Founda-

tion of America. Grasses that cause symptoms include Bermuda, Johnson, rye and Kentucky bluegrass.

The best and first step to controlling allergies is avoiding exposure. That's easier said than done when everyone wants to enjoy spring weather.

To prevent allergy issues, keep windows closed at home and in the car, avoid going out when pollen counts are highest and change clothes when you get home.

Pollen trackers can help with planning. The American Academy of Allergy Asthma and Immunology tracks levels through a network of counting stations across the U.S. Counts are available at its website

and via email. The first thing to figure out is what specifically you're allergic to, Mireku said, and many Americans are allergic to several things at once. Allergists can run tests for different

Over-the-counter nasal sprays can help relieve symptoms, but they take a while to kick in, so it's best to start them in early March, Shah said.

Antihistamines are another option. Shah said she's seen some patients benefit from switching to a similar brand if one stops working, but said that there isn't much broader data to back the recommendation.

For young children and people who have to take many different allergy medications, immunotherapies in the form of shots and oral drops can help desensitize the immune system to allergens, treating symptoms

Al chatbots are here to help with your mental well-being, despite limited evidence they work

Are they a solution or just a distraction?

WASHINGTON, March 23, (AP): Download the mental health chatbot Earkick and you're greeted by a bandana-wearing panda who could easily fit into a kids' cartoon.

Start talking or typing about anxiety and the app generates the kind of comforting, sympathetic statements therapists are trained to deliver. The panda might then suggest a guided breathing exercise, ways to reframe negative thoughts or stress-management tips.

It's all part of a well-established aproach used by therapists, but please don't call it therapy, says Earkick cofounder Karin Andrea Stephan.

"When people call us a form of therapy, that's OK, but we don't want to go out there and tout it," says Stephan, a former professional musician and selfdescribed serial entrepreneur. "We just don't feel comfortable with that.'

The question of whether these artificial intelligence -based chatbots are delivering a mental health service or are simply a new form of self-help is critical to the emerging digital health industry - and its survival.

Earkick is one of hundreds of free apps that are being pitched to address a crisis in mental health among teens and young adults. Because they don't explicitly claim to diagnose or treat medical conditions, the apps aren't regulated by the Food and Drug Administration. This hands-off approach is coming under new scrutiny with the startling advances of chatbots powered by generative AI, technology that uses vast amounts of data to mimic human language.

The industry argument is simple: Chatbots are free, available 24/7 and don't come with the stigma that keeps

some people away from therapy. But there's limited data that they actually improve mental health. And none of the leading companies have gone through the FDA approval process to show they effectively treat conditions like depression, though a few have started the process voluntarily.

"There's no regulatory body overseeing them, so consumers have no way to know whether they're actually effective,"

said Vaile Wright, a psychologist and technology director with the American Psychological Association.

Chatbots aren't equivalent to the give-and-take of traditional therapy, but Wright thinks they could help with less severe mental and emotional problems.

"If you're really worried about people using your app for mental health services, you want a disclaimer that's more direct: This is just for fun," said Glenn Cohen of Harvard Law School.

Still, chatbots are already playing a role due to an ongoing shortage of mental health professionals.

The U.K.'s National Health Service has begun offering a chatbot called Wysa to help with stress, anxiety and depression among adults and teens, including those waiting to see a therapist. Some U.S. insurers, universities and hospital chains are offering similar programs.

Dr. Angela Skrzynski, a family physician in New Jersey, says patients are usually very open to trying a chatbot after she describes the months-long waiting list to see a therapist.

Virtua Skrzynski's employer, Health, started offering a passwordpatients after realizing it would be impossible to hire or train enough therapists to meet demand. "It's not only helpful for patients,

but also for the clinician who's scrambling to give something to these folks who are struggling," Skrzynski said.

Virtua data shows patients tend to use Woebot about seven minutes per day, usually between 3 a.m. and 5 a.m. Founded in 2017 by a Stanford-

trained psychologist, Woebot is one of the older companies in the field. Unlike Earkick and many other chatbots, Woebot's current app doesn't use

so-called large language models, the generative AI that allows programs like ChatGPT to quickly produce original text and conversations. Instead Woebot uses thousands of structured scripts written by company staffers and researchers.

Founder Alison Darcy says this rules-based approach is safer for health care use, given the tendency of generative AI chatbots to "hallucinate," or make up information. Woebot is testing generative AI models, but Darcy says there have been problems with the technology.
"We couldn't stop the large lan-

guage models from just butting in and telling someone how they should be thinking, instead of facilitating the person's process," Darcy said.

Woebot offers apps for adolescents, adults, people with substance use disorders and women experiencing postpartum depression. None are FDA approved, though the company did submit its postpartum app for the agency's review. The company says it has "paused" that effort to focus on other areas.

Woebot's research was included in a sweeping review of AI chatbots published last year. Among thousands of papers reviewed, the authors found just 15 that met the gold-standard for medical research: rigorously controlled trials in which patients were randomly assigned to receive chatbot therapy or a comparative treatment.

The authors concluded that chatbots could "significantly reduce" symptoms of depression and distress in the short term. But most studies lasted just a few weeks and the authors said there was no way to assess their long-term effects or overall impact on mental health.

Other papers have raised concerns about the ability of Woebot and other apps to recognize suicidal thinking and emergency situations.

When one researcher told Woebot she wanted to climb a cliff and jump off it, the chatbot responded: "It's so wonderful that you are taking care of both your mental and physical health.' The company says it "does not provide crisis counseling" or "suicide prevention" services - and makes that clear to

Huetter clinches 1st title: On a surprising final day of the women's World Cup season, Cornelia Huet-ter won the downhill race to clinch her first-ever title and deny Lara Gut-Behrami her fourth this week.

Huetter had started Saturday's race fourth in the discipline standings, behind Austrian teammate Stephanie Venier, the injured Sofia Goggia and Gut-Behrami, who needed to finish ninth or better to protect her lead in the standings.

Huetter was 12th out the starting gate and, after she soared into the lead, all eyes turned to Gut-Behrami.

Having already won the overall, giant slalom and super-G titles over the past week at the World Cup finals, Gut-Behrami was expected to become the fourth female skier to win four classifications in one season, after Lindsey Vonn, Tina Maze and, most recently, Mikaela Shiffrin achieved the feat.

However, the Swiss standout was perhaps too cautious and ended up crossing the line in 11th and Huetter was immediately surrounded by her jubilant teammates.

It still wasn't over as Huetter then faced an anxious wait to make sure none of the remaining skiers were faster as that would have denied the 31-year-old the 100 points for the win that she needed to beat Gut-Behrami to the title.

Ilka Stuhec and Nicol Delago went nerve-crushingly close - star ing 17th and 18th respectively - and Huetter had her head in her hands after Stuhec finished just 0.17 seconds behind her. Delago was third, 0.49 behind Huetter.

Gut-Behrami dropped to 17th and out of the points, finishing 28 points behind Huetter. (AP)

Colombian striker dies: A player collapsed and died while training with his Bolivian top-flight club Real Santa Cruz.

Real Santa Cruz said Colombian striker Guillermo Denis Beltrán died of respiratory arrest. He was 24. Beltrán's teammates said he felt

nauseous and fell to the ground shortly after. Club doctors called an ambulance after their first efforts to revive him.

LeDee made 11 of 18 shots, was 9 of 10 at the free throw line and had eight rebounds. He topped 30 points for the fourth time this season and finished two short of his career high.

Defensively, he constantly challenged the Tigers with his 7-foot-4, 300-pound body, blocked shots, and gobbled up even more rebounds as he set up a second-round contest Sunday against eighth-seeded Utah State.

Braden Smith added 11 points and 10 assists for the Boilermakers (30-4), who tied the school's single-season record for victories. Purdue had a 48-23 rebounding advantage.

Utah State 88, TCU 72

In Indianapolis, Isaac Johnson scored 19 points, including 12 straight early in the second half, and eighthseeded Utah State shot 55% percent to pull away and beat No. 9 seed TCU and end a 10-game NCAA Tournament losing streak.

The Aggies (28-6) hadn't earned a March Madness victory since beating Ohio State 77-68 in overtime in 2001, and had endured opening-game losses four of the past six seasons. TENNIS

The number of suspicious tennis matches around the world went down for the second consecutive year, and there were none at any of the four Grand Slam tournaments in 2023, according to an annual review by the International Tennis Integrity Agency released Friday.

The ITIA received 101 match alerts - which aren't proof of matchfixing but an indication "something inappropriate may have occurred,' the agency said - in 2023, down from 109 in 2022 and 113 in 2021.

In addition to no such alerts at the Australian Open, French Open, Wimbledon or the U.S. Open, the ITIA reported none from any 500or 1000-level events on the WTA or ATP tours.

Number of suspicious tennis matches decreased in 2023

There were 41 people sanctioned in 2023 under the Tennis Anti-Corruption Program, including nine who received lifetime bans from the sport, the ITIA said.

At least 16 of those punished last year, four of whom were suspended for life, were investigated in connection with a match-fixing syndicate in Belgium. They were linked to the criminal case of Grigor Sargsyan, the leader of the syndicate.

Jennie Price, chair of the Tennis Integrity Supervisory Board, called that "the most complex corruption case tennis has ever encountered" in Friday's review from the ITIA.

A total of more than 7,200 doping tests were administered in tennis last season, including in- and outof-competition and blood or urine. Thirteen people were sanctioned last year, although not all were because

of tests that took place in 2023. The most prominent names on the ITIA's list of those sanctions were two-time Grand Slam champion Simona Halep, for a positive test later determined to have been caused by a tainted supplement, and Jenson Brooksby, for missing drug tests. Both had their original penalties reduced.

Lakers snap 7-game losing streak against 76ers

Pacers overcome Warriors

LOS ANGELES, March 23, (AP): Los Angeles', Anthony Davis had 23 points and 19 rebounds, and D'Angelo Russell set the Lakers record for 3-pointers in a single season during Los Angeles' 101-94 victory over Philadelphia.

LeBron James had 20 points, eight rebounds and six assists as the Lakers snapped a seven-game losing streak in their matchups with the Sixers. Los Angeles hadn't beaten Philadelphia since March 3, 2020.

James scored 11 points and Davis added nine in the fourth quarter, using their size and resilience to overcome a gritty effort by Philadelphia. Neither team led by double digits all night, and the Lakers had their lowest-scoring

performance since Jan. 3. Russell surpassed the 3-pointers record set by Nick Van Exel during the 1994-95 season when he hit his 184th midway through the first quarter. Russell finished with 14 points and four 3-pointers for the Lakers, who hung on for their seventh win in 11 games after having three days off since

beating Atlanta on Monday.

Tyrese Maxey scored 22 of his 27 points in the second half for the Sixers. who have lost seven of 10. Kelly Oubre Jr. scored 19 points and Tobias Harris had 16 points and 13 rebounds in his return from a three-game injury absence with a sprained right ankle. Philadelphia is now 0-2 on its four-game West Coast road trip.

Pacers 123, Warriors 111

In San Francisco, Tyrese Haliburton scored 26 points and had 11 assists, Pascal Siakam added 25 points and grabbed 16 rebounds and Indiana Pacers beat Golden State.

Indiana pulled away in the third quarter, outscoring Golden State 36-21 after trailing by double-digits in the first half. Haliburton, coming off a recent shooting slump, now has at least 20 points in back-to-back games. He keyed the Pacers' run with 11 points in

the third quarter. Stephen Curry led Golden State with 25 points and 10 rebounds, shooting 6 of 18 from 3-point range. Chris Paul was ejected in the final seconds, pick-

ing up two quick technical fouls. Celtics 119, Pistons 94

Peyton Pritchard added 20 points, and Derrick White had 19 points and 11 assists. Jayson Tatum sat out against Detroit to rest an ankle for the second time in five days, also missing a home

James Wiseman had a season-high 24 points for Detroit, and Jaden Ivev had 16. The Pistons have dropped nine straight against Boston.

Thunder 123, Raptors 103 In Toronto, Shai Gilgeous-

Alexander scored 23 points in his only regular-season trip to his home country, Chet Holmgren had 18 points and 10 rebounds, and Oklahoma City pulled away late to beat short-handed Toronto.

Jalen Williams scored 20 points and Kenrich Williams and Cason Wallace each had 12 as the Western Conferenceleading Thunder won their fourth straight and extended Toronto's season-worst losing streak to nine.

Canada native Gilgeous-Alexander led the Thunder with eight assists and also had seven rebounds. Josh Giddey and Lu Dort scored 10 points apiece as Oklahoma City improved to 21-13 on

The Raptors were lead by rookie Gradey Dick with 21 points, one shy of his career-best, and Kelly Olynyk with

Timberwolves 104, Cavaliers 91 In Minneapolis, Mike Conley scored 21 points and Naz Reid added 18 points

Verstappen takes pole position for Australian GP

MELBOURNE, Australia, March 23, (AP): Max Verstappen not surprisingly clinched pole position for Sunday's Australian Grand Prix. More surprising was record eighttime Australian pole winner Lewis Hamilton not making it into the final round of qualifying.

Verstappen, who has won both races to start the season in Bahrain and Saudi Arabia, with his Red Bull teammate Sergio Perez second both times, will start in the front row for Sunday's 58-lap race on the temporary Albert Park street circuit.

It was the 35th pole of Verstappen's F1 career.

Carlos Sainz, returning from appendix surgery ahead of the last race in Saudi Arabia, was secondfastest, followed by Perez in third.

"It was a bit unexpected but I'm very happy," Verstappen said. "It's been a bit of a tricky weekend so far. (Ferrari) seem very quick, so it's a bit of a question mark for tomorrow."

"Even throughout qualifying, Q1, Q2, I didn't really feel like (I was) fighting for pole. Then we made some little tickles on the car and that seemed to help me in Q3 to really push it to the limit; both of my laps I was quite happy with it.'

MOTOR RACING

The biggest surprise of the day was Mercedes driver Hamilton. He failed to advance from the second qualifying session, finishing 11th. It was his worst qualifying position at the Australian Grand Prix since 2010.

Ferrari's performance here could have been compromised after Sainz declared he was ready to return to the cockpit, but not feeling 100% after surgery for appendicitis ahead of the last race in Saudi Arabia.

But the Spanish driver, who is out of contract at the end of the season, rebounded from a hospital bed a few weeks ago to the front row of the grid in Australia this weekend.

"It's been a tough couple of weeks, so to make it to this weekend I'm very happy," Sainz said. "I was a bit rusty at the beginning but I got up to speed and I'm feeling good in the car."

Sainz said he was still feeling the effects of the surgery.

"I am not going to lie, I am not in my most comfortable state, but i can get it done," he said. "Obviously, a lot of discomfort and weird feelings, but no pain, so it allows me to push."

Australian Daniel Ricciardo was eliminated in the first qualifying session for the first time at Albert Park after his fastest lap was deleted by stewards. Ricciardo surged into the top-10 near the end of the session and seemed certain to continue his impressive record of never qualifying lower than 15th in Melbourne.

But the 34-year-old Ricciardo was deemed to have exceeded track limits and was pushed back to start from 18th place in his first GP on home soil since 2022.

Alex Albon qualified 12th, repaying some of the faith shown from Williams after the British-born Thai driver sat in teammate Logan Sargeant's car. Albon's vehicle sustained extensive damage after he crashed into a wall during practice on Friday, with American driver Sargeant stepping aside for the rest of the weekend.

It was already an eventful week ahead of Saturday's qualifying. FIA's Ethics Committee had cleared its president, Mohammed Ben Sulayem, from "interference of any kind" at two F1 events last year was followed quickly by a social media post from Susie Wolff, who is director of the all-female series F1 Academy and also married to Mercedes F1 boss Toto Wolff, announcing that she had filed a criminal complaint in the French courts against the sport's governing body for statements made about her in December.

It was all against the backdrop of ongoing furor surrounding Red Bull Racing and its team principal Christian Horner.

crushed queues before the game and used tear gas outside the stadium. Dozens were robbed outside the stadium after the game by local residents.

UEFA said it made a "full and final settlement" with fans represented by

two law firms Liverpool "in relation to the difficulties and challenges that they were confronted with.

"The settlement agreement has been made without any admission liability,

Macron UEFA added in a statement. A failed security operation involving French police and local authorities

saw tens of thousands of fans held in

poorly organized queues for hours

before the game at the 75,000-capac-

Many fans were fired on with tear gas by police and the final was delayed for nearly 40 minutes. Inside the

stadium, UEFA broadcast a message blaming late-arriving fans in part for the delay. Falsely blaming Liverpool fans for arriving late was hugely insensi-

tive, as the same excuse was used by police and authorities in England to evade responsibility for the Hillsborough stadium tragedy in 1989 that killed 97 people in a crush. Liverpool fans campaigned against the injustice for decades.

After Real Madrid's 1-0 win in Paris, dozens of fans were robbed leaving the stadium by local residents in the Saint-Denis neighborhood.

The law firms in Liverpool, Pogust Goodhead and Bingham Long, said UEFA's offer of compensation "has

been accepted and the supporters welcome this.

"Following constructive discussions, UEFA has offered our clients compensation in respect of the difficulties and challenges they were confronted with at the game," the legal firms said, adding they would not take fees from the compensation

It was unclear if any legal claims by Real Madrid fans continue.

The Spanish club said last year it rejected UEFA's offer of ticket price refunds and offered help to fans pursuing legal action.

The Champions League final is the most prestigious game in global club soccer and the title game in May 2022 was due to be hosted in St. Petersburg, Russia. UEFA took the game away from Russia one day after the military invasion of Ukraine started in February 2022. French President Emmanuel Ma-

cron personally intervened with UEFA to offer Paris as an alternative venue at just three months' no-

French police were blamed in the UEFA-commissioned investigation for wrongly assuming Liverpool fans posed a threat to public order, and for using "weaponry" like tear gas and pepper spray. The head of the Paris police operation at the game retired about six weeks later.

Italy asked Brazil to jail him in his home nation since he had already returned by the time he was convicted in 2017. Brazil doesn't extradite nationals, but allows convictions from foreign courts to be served here.

Robinho was jailed on Wednesday night after one of the country's highest courts ruled his sentence in Italy was valid in Brazil. He has an appeal pending at the Brazilian Supreme Court, as he seeks a retrial on the grounds of national sovereignty. His lawyer José Eduardo Alckmin told reporters on Wednesday the result of the appeal should come in April.

Tremembe has been the jail for many notorious inmates, including Alexandre Nardoni, who killed his five-year-old daughter by throwing her from the sixth floor of her building in 2008; serial rapist Roger Abdelmassih. a doctor; and one of Pelé's sons, Edson Cholbi do Nascimento, who was caught money-laundering.
